

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council.

The Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital respectfully submit their Fifty-fifth Annual Report for the use of the Government, together with the reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer. Since their last annual report the resignation of Miss Anna S. Folsom has been tendered and accepted, and Mrs. Ellen S. Hale of Boston has been appointed and taken her place as a member of the Board.

The Trustees deem it just to express their high appreciation of the faithful and valuable services which Miss Folsom rendered to the institution, and their regret that her other duties seemed to her to render her resignation imperative.

During the current year Dr. Flood resigned his position as assistant physician; the two assistants remaining were each promoted, and Alfred I. Noble, M.D., of Boston was appointed to the position so left vacant.

During an absence of the Superintendent the affairs of the hospital were thoroughly and excellently cared for under Dr. Moulton's supervision.

We have brought to completion the work of building two new wards for the special care and management of the suicidal insane of either sex. We have named that in the women's department Hooper Hall, and that in the men's department Gage Hall. These wards are of novel design, and we believe them admirably suited to their purpose. The patients occupying them are under the constant and uninterrupted observation of the attendants. The cheerful and beautiful room in each ward in which the day is spent must contribute materially to the welfare of this most unfortunate class of our inmates. For the perfection of the plan on which the wards are built, for the intelligent and watchful supervision of their construction, we would express our great indebtedness to our Superintendent, Dr. Park. It is enough to say that under him the hospital has been maintained this year at the high standard which has marked his government in the past.

The Trustees have performed their duties in the development and sale of the land on Chandler Hill, which is under their charge. The demand for building lots steadily continues, and the remaining land has been materially increased in value by the erection of dwellings on the portions sold.

From all sales since 1874 we have received and paid into the State Treasury about \$82,000.

The Legislature has granted permission to the city of Worcester to take, for the purpose of a public park, a portion of the outlying land under our charge, bordering Shrewsbury Street, comprising twelve acres. We do not know whether this permission has been accepted by the city. Permission was also granted by the last Legislature to the city of Worcester to take a strip of land on the banks of Lake Quinsigamond, and lay out a highway on the land taken. If this is accepted, and the highway built, it will practically deprive the hospital patients of their former use of the lake shore for purpose of recreation, and will seriously impair the facilities for the care of patients which our grounds have afforded. Certain conditions were imposed by the General Court, upon its acceptance, which will diminish somewhat the consequences involved in the act if these conditions are maintained and enforced.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital.

I present herewith the Fifty-fifth Annual Report of the hospital, with the usual statistical tables giving a detailed account of the movement of population and the operations of the institution for the past year.

There were remaining in the hospital Sept. 30, 1886, 758 patients, -363 males and 395 females. The number of admissions during the year has been 315, representing 299 persons, —155 males and 144 females; making the whole number of cases under treatment 1,073. The daily average population has been 719.64. The largest number on any one day was 793 on December 2, and the smallest number 652 on July 22. Of this number 16 have been re-admissions, and the following transfers have been made from other institutions: From State Prison, 9 males; from Massachusetts reformatories, 5 males and 3 females; from Dedham Jail, 1 male; from Worcester House of Correction, 1 male; from Deer Island, 2 females; from the Worcester Insane Asylum, 1 female. The number discharged has been 379, —215 males and 164 females. Of this number 74 recovered, of whom 6 had previously been inmates of this hospital and been discharged as recovered — 1 fourteen times, 1 twice, and 4 once each — the 6 persons representing 20 recoveries; 39 were discharged much improved, some of whom undoubtedly made a complete recovery afterwards; 51 improved; 144 not improved, including 106 cases transferred by the Board of Lunacy and Charity to the Westborough Hospital, the State Farm at Bridgewater, Tewksbury Almshouse, and the Worcester Asylum; 61 (35 males and 26 females) died. The amount of acute disease has been very small, and most of the deaths have been the result of exhaustion attending chronic brain disorders. The large transfers of 42 to the new Westborough Hospital and 66 to the State Farm account for the marked decrease in our daily average for the year. Two cases of measles were brought to the hospital, but the spread of the disease through the house was prevented by careful isolation.

The number sent to Bridgewater was made up of criminals, and those who were known to have led vicious lives before they were insane. Unfortunately only those of the criminal class who were considered quiet and harmless were removed, leaving with us those whose discharge is most desirable.

Under the law authorizing the State Board of Lunacy and Charity to board in private families certain classes of the insane, 2 have been removed, and 1 returned. In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 339 of the Acts of 1885, known as the habitual drunkards' law, 11 persons, 8 males and 3 females, have been sent here. The objectionable features of this law were pointed out and discussed at some length in my last report. The experience of another year only serves more fully to convince me that it falls far short of accomplishing the object for which it was intended.

The committee on Public Charitable Institutions of the last Legislature gave the subject consideration after a public hearing, but failed to make any favorable report for the establishment of an inebriate asylum. I was particularly struck with the fact that at this hearing not a single petitioner personally interested in such an institution appeared before the committee to urge a favorable report. Such being the case it is not surprising that the committee should come to the conclusion that there appeared no pressing public necessity for providing such an establishment at an expense of \$100,000, and it may be considered useless to press this matter further if the friends and relatives of those who are afflicted with this deplorable disease are content to leave the petition for suitable provision for their recovery and reformation to the superintendents of the State hospitals and prisons, who are chiefly interested in the subject in their official capacity.

Since my last report the two new wards, Hooper and

Gage Halls, have been completed, furnished and occupied. As before stated they are intended for observation wards, and in their construction the sole object of securing accommodations where a constant oversight of the occupants could be had was kept in view. The rooms are light, airy, painted in harmonious colors, and as cheerful as the nature of the malady of the persons who occupy them will admit. They will, as now used, accommodate 50 patients, and were built at a cost of \$30,000. The new general hospital at Antwerp has eight circular wards, and I believe one or two other similar institutions have them in whole or in part, but so far as I know this is the only hospital for the insane where this plan has been adopted. It is a noteworthy departure from the usual style of hospital architecture, and affords an opportunity for a better classification of the patients.

Experience is constantly suggesting new methods of hospital construction, and a departure from the old time compact linear design is now the rule rather than the exception. I am more convinced each year, however, that to produce the best results in the treatment of the insane, or at least better results than we now attain, something else is required than mere change in the style of building. We hear frequently of hospitals being "homelike" - speaking entirely in reference to State hospitals. I confess I never have seen one to which this word in the ordinary acceptation of the term could be truthfully applied. A ward may be cheerful and sunny and comfortable; there may be pictures and carpets and musical instruments; the tables may be covered with books, and the walls painted in pleasing colors; the occupants of this ward may be happy and reasonably contented, but I have never heard one of them ever say that it reminded him of home. Thirty to sixty persons do not live in one room during the day-time at home, or go out to walk together, or have their meals prepared for them, or have entertainments furnished in chapel or amusement hall once or twice a week; nor are the members of a family constantly changing like the household of a hospital; neither is a home composed of people kept there against their will. We do not speak of a lar hote

or an ocean steamer as homelike, yet I think it would be no more inappropriate to do so than to apply the term to a hospital ward. If added to pleasant and attractive surroundings we could secure a more complete separation of the chronic and acute cases of insanity, I believe we should be able to increase the percentage of recoveries, and add to the comfort of the acute cases in the hospital. The problem of providing for the constantly increasing number of the chronic insane has not yet been solved in our State. It is no relief, except numerically, to a crowded hospital to remove the quiet and harmless incurables, yet whenever a transfer is to be made this is the class which is called for with tiresome iteration by the agent of the Board of Lunacy and Charity. It is the noisy and violent and vulgar, who from two to twenty years have torn and broken, and been profane and untidy, both night and day, and whom no system of medicine can possibly cure, who do so much to retard and prevent the recovery of the recent cases. Each of the State hospitals probably has from forty to seventy of such patients. An acute case of excitement placed in a ward with this class oftentimes acquires by contact and association the habit of being noisy and untidy, and by imperceptible steps passes into the incurable stage, or through a long and tedious period of convalescence. This unwholesome and baneful influence is not counteracted by paint or picture or carpet, or other means of cheer and comfort in the ward itself; it can only cease with the removal of the cause.

Every man in the State, whatever limitations he is willing to confess there may be to his abilities in other directions, is perfectly sure he knows how to farm. Believing that those who read this report will be interested in this department of the hospital, the farm account for the year is herewith appended. An examination of it will show that the farm is given credit only for what is delivered for consumption at the hospital and for cash sales, and is charged with everything paid out or furnished on its account. I believe this is a simple and the only way of determining the profit or loss in its management. Looking at it in this light the year appears to have been a successful one, and the result creditable to the farmer.

By an act of the last Legislature the name of the Asylum for the Chronic Insane was changed to the Worcester Insane Asylum. The difference in meaning between the words asylum and hospital is so small the general public do not understand it,—in fact, use the two words interchangeably,—the consequence is confusion in the correspondence of the two institutions. Scarcely a day passes that letters, bills, and goods are not sent to the wrong place, causing great inconvenience and a serious obstacle to the prompt transaction of the business of this hospital. It is ceratinly unfortunate that if a change was to be made a name had not been selected for that institution which is not practically identical with this.

The donations to the hospital during the year have been a large number of rare and valuable green-house plants from Mrs. Mary S. F. Dunn, newspapers from the Hospital Newspaper Society, and a copy of the Worcester Evening Gazette.

In November, Dr. Everett Flood, after five years of faithful service, resigned his position to engage in private practice. Dr. Alfred I. Noble was appointed to complete the number of the Medical Staff, and entered upon his duties December 11.

There have been no other changes in the corps of officers. I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to them, and to the employees in the various departments, for their co-operation and assistance, without which any attempt to achieve success in the management of the institution would be useless.

Your frequent visits during the year have made you familiar with the details of administration and the methods used for the cure, and where that is impossible, for the comfort of this most unfortunate class of the State's defectives. The suggestion and advice and personal support which I receive from your Board do much toward lightening the burden of care and responsibility which rests upon the Superintendent.
