

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council.

The trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital respectfully submit their fifty-ninth annual report, the report of the superintendent and treasurer, also tabulated statements, which give a detailed account of the affairs of the institution.

In our last report we stated that we had received notice of the intended resignation of Dr. Park, who had been for twelve years the faithful and successful superintendent of the Dr. Park retired from our service Nov. 1, 1890, and we renew the expression of our esteem for him, and of our appreciation of his service. Dr. Hosea M. Quinby, who had demonstrated his capacity and fitness at the asylum, succeeded Dr. Park as superintendent Nov. 25, 1890. has been here nearly a year now, and the admirable condition of the institution and the harmonious working of all its departments abundantly prove the wisdom of our choice. Dr. J. Frank Edgerly's term of service expired November 6, and Dr. Maurice W. Pearson was appointed assistant physician, and began service the same day. Dr. Hartstein W. Page resigned Jan. 16, 1891, to take the position of assistant physician at the Worcester Insane Asylum, and Dr. Clarence W. Pelton was appointed assistant physician here, and began service February 15. There have been no other We regard all the members of the staff as worthy of commendation and continued confidence.

The purchase of the farm referred to in our previous report has proved very advantageous to the hospital. It affords pasturage sufficient for a large herd of cattle, which furnishes seven hundred quarts of milk daily. The purchase of this amount of milk would cost more than the interest on the farm investment and the expense incurred there combined. A large part of the work there is done by the patients.

During the winter the city of Worcester laid out a street through land of the hospital on the shore of Lake Quinsigamond, in accordance with authority given by the Legislature in 1888. In consideration of a relinquishment of all claim for land so taken, the city government entered into an agreement with the trustees to extend the sewer system to the entrance to the hospital land without expense to the institution, whenever requested by the trustees.

The number of patients has been somewhat larger than in previous years.

Some months since the trustees received from the executor of the will of the late Jane E. Manson of Rhode Island the sum of \$988.58. We learned that the testator once had some relative an inmate of the hospital, and thus became interested in it. The income of the fund will be expended for the benefit of the patients.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

 ${\it To the Trustees of the Worcester Lunatic Hospital.}$

I have the honor to submit the following report of the superintendent of the hospital for the year ending Sept. 30, 1891, it being the fifty-ninth annual report.

There remained at the hospital Oct. 1, 1890, 785 patients, -376 males and 409 females; 307 males and 242 females were admitted: 246 males and 182 females were discharged, and 44 males and 37 females died, leaving at the end of the official year 825 patients, -393 males and 432 females. Of this number 262 were supported by the State, 436 by towns and cities and 127 by friends. largest number of patients in the house on any one day was 834, - 394 males and 440 females, - on August 1; and the smallest number 763, — 362 males and 401 females, — on December 14. The daily average number was 807.02. the 428 discharged, 129 - including 42 habitual drunkards are recorded as recovered, 48 much improved, 85 improved, 165 not improved, and one — a convict from State prison as not insane. One hundred and fourteen males and 83 females were discharged to the care of friends; 30 males and 28 females were removed by the overseers of the poor; 53 males and 47 females were transferred to other institutions: 36 males and 20 females were removed out of the State: 1 male and 2 females were boarded out; 4 males were returned to prison; and 8 males and one female eloped.

Although the daily average number of patients has been less than last year, the number of admissions has been 113 more. Since the first of January our numbers have steadily increased, seldom falling below 825, notwithstanding the efforts to relieve the crowded condition by transfers to other institutions and by removal of patients to almshouses. As

this institution when filled to its maximum capacity can accommodate but 650 patients, it is evident that a large number of our inmates are obliged to put up with very indifferent accommodations, and that they must suffer no little discomfort, crowded together in dormitories or sleeping on the floors of the corridors. Such a state of affairs not only interferes seriously with the cleanliness, order and discipline of the hospital, but, what is of far more consequence, enters as a positive factor in lowering the standard of health of the patients, and increases the rate of mortality. Good air is quite as essential as medicine or food in the treatment of the Our State in fact has recognized its importance, and has very wisely enacted a law compelling cities and towns to provide a certain amount of pure air in every school-house and public building within its borders; and she should therefore be careful that the provisions of the law are carried out in the institutions which she herself has built for her wards, and over which she has control. The law fixes the standard for good ventilation at not less than twenty cubic feet of fresh air per minute for each person in school-houses and public buildings; a quantity which, according to modern authorities, cannot be considered excessive at least, and can only apply to buildings not continuously occupied. For living apartments, shops, and especially for hospitals, double this amount is necessary. If we apply the test to this institution, it will be found that, although the air supply is fairly ample for the number of patients for which the hospital was designed, it falls far below the requisite quantity when the building is crowded, as at present, with nearly one-third more patients than it can comfortably accommodate.

Every hospital in the State is as crowded as this one, and must continue to suffer in this way for some years to come, even if immediate steps are taken to provide additional accommodations in a new institution; for such a building will certainly be two or more years in the process of construction. It is to be hoped, therefore, since all are agreed that the demand for more room is an imperative one, and as the site for a new hospital has been bought and plans perfected which meet the approval of those best able to judge of the present and future needs of the insane in Massachusetts, that the coming

Legislature will, at the earliest moment possible, authorize its construction and furnish the necessary appropriation therefor. It certainly cannot be difficult to find in Massachusetts men of integrity and business capacity, who can be trusted whether as a building committee or as a board of trustees --to administer with economy and discretion whatever funds may be appropriated for the purposes of this charity. needs of the insane are better understood than they were twenty years ago, when the Worcester and the Danvers hospitals were planned; and it is safe to say that no commission or board of trustees who should now undertake to build would take these or similar institutions for their pattern. Although complete in all their appointments and perfect specimens of their kind, they mark the period of transition from an old to a new order of things. Our ideas in regard to the methods proper for the care of the insane have changed greatly since these buildings were planned, and, as a result, an entirely new style of hospital architecture has been developed. The propriety of separating the chronic from the acute insane, and treating them in asylums specially adapted to their needs, is no longer questioned; and, as there are near at hand many examples of asylum construction wherein are provided all the essentials for the proper care and treatment of the chronic class at a very moderate expense, there can no longer be any excuse for extravagance of outlay or for mistakes in the matter of cost in our new building.

The death rate has been slightly in excess of that of last year, but there has been nothing in the causes of death to require special comment; they being, with few exceptions, directly attributable to chronic brain disease, with its various complications. The general health of the house has been good. The ward in which the cases of diphtheria occurred last year, after remaining unoccupied for some months and being thoroughly disinfected, was opened in December, and no further trouble has resulted therein.

Twenty-seven per cent. of this year's admissions are relapsed cases, and previous inmates of this or other hospitals. In no disease, probably, is the tendency to relapse greater than in insanity; a tendency which is, undoubtedly, largely increased by the too early removal of patients from

the hospital. Could our patients and their friends be made to see the importance of time as a factor in the cure of this disease, our percentage of recoveries would, I doubt not, be much greater in number and more permanent in character than at present. From the nature of the case, we can hardly expect the patient himself to view this matter in its true The majority of patients fail to realize the fact that they are ailing, and, instead of joining us in our efforts to cure them, are constantly placing obstacles in the way. We ought to be able to look to the friends of the patient for assistance; but they fail us, for in the majority of cases they listen to the importunity of the patient, and insist upon removing him from the hospital as soon as the more prominent symptoms of his disease have disappeared. Such patient, although on the road to recovery, is by no means recovered. His brain is still weak, and in a condition to succumb easily to excitment, such as he must inevitably encounter on his return home. Convinced, as most patients are, that they are well, and quite as able to manage their own affairs as they ever were, they chafe under the restraint which their friends find it necessary to throw around them, and too often become unmanageable and have to be returned to the hospital. Even when aware of their weak condition and fully resolved to keep themselves free from care and excitement, they are seldom able, on account of the strong temptation to resume work, which is always present, to carry out their purpose for a sufficient length of time to insure a permanent cure.

It has been the custom to admit visitors to the institution on any week day, — a custom which originated, no doubt, when the number of patients was small and the visitors correspondingly few. Now that the hospital has grown to its present proportions, a change seems to be necessary. Our visitors are numbered by hundreds, and monopolize so much of the attention of the officers and employees as to leave little time to devote to the patients. In the interest of the latter, therefore, it has been decided to restrict the visiting days to two in each week: Wednesday and Friday, from 10 to 12 A.M. and 1 to 4 P.M.

In the way of repairs and improvements, we have built

during the past year a bank wall in front of the hospital and an ice-house at the Hillside farm. A slate floor has been put down in the general kitchen, and all the outside wood work of the hospital building painted. A fire-alarm box has been placed near the house occupied by our farmer, on Plantation Street, and a hose-carriage with the necessary amount of hose purchased, to protect the farm buildings in case of fire. night watchman has been employed at the farm barns, it being deemed inadvisable to allow them to go longer unprotected, as they contain a great deal of valuable property in the way of stock, hay, grain and farm utensils, and are continually exposed to the inroads of tramps and intoxicated persons. As the plumbing throughout the building had begun to show serious defects, the result of fourteen years' constant use, and had come to require almost daily repairs, we have added a plumber to our permanent force of employees.

Our farm and garden are under a high state of cultivation, and are conducted, I believe, with economy and good judgment, and return to the hospital an actual profit in dollars and cents. The yield of fruit during the past season, and of all kinds of garden and farm produce, has been abundant; and, with the aid of our new purchase at "Hillside," we are able to produce all the milk necessary for the supply of the institution, having made during the year an average of over seven hundred quarts daily. At present there is no suitable place for storing our vegetables, and we are obliged to utilize the basement under our wards for this purpose, an arrangement which is very unsatisfactory, and, from a sanitary point of view at least, not at all to be countenanced. An ample vegetable cellar should be built as soon as practicable, and an addition made to our silo.

The current expenses for the year, less the amount received from articles sold, have been \$153,098.46; dividing this by 807.02, the daily average number of patients, gives \$189.71 as the annual cost of support, equivalent to a weekly cost of \$3.64.

We are indebted to the Hospital Newspaper Society for Christmas cards, papers and magazines; to the Worcester Club for periodicals and illustrated papers; and to their publishers for a copy of the "Daily Spy," the "Worcester Gazette," the "Unitarian Review," the "Salem Gazette" and the "Fitchburg Sentinel."

Much credit is due to the various officers and employees of the institution for the faithfulness and zeal with which they have performed their various duties. I am specially indebted to my immediate associates for the uniform courtesy shown me, and to your Board for their renewed confidence, and for the assistance, in the way of counsel and advice, which you have always been ready to give me.
