TRUSTEES' REPORT.

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council.

The trustees of the Worcester Insane Hospital, having in charge the Worcester Insane Asylum, would respectfully submit their annual report, together with the reports of the superintendent and treasurer.

The administration by the latter officers of the affairs of the asylum has been marked by intelligence, devotion, economy and efficiency. Under Dr. Scribner's supervision its history and record can challenge comparison with that of any like establishment. The superintendent desires and the Board would recommend and ask that an appropriation be made by the Legislature of \$30,000, for the purpose of re-equipping and re-furnishing the kitchen and kitchen departments and for necessary changes in the laundry.

If the State Board of Insanity, in performing its duty of providing for the increase in numbers of the insane, should desire to formulate a plan for caring for a greater number of patients in connection with this institution, the trustees would be glad to be heard upon that question.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Worcester Insane Hospital, acting for the Worcester Insane Asylum.

I herewith present for your consideration the twenty-fourth annual report of the superintendent of the Worcester Insane Asylum.

There were in the institution Oct. 1, 1900, 482 patients, — 240 men and 242 women. During the past official year 1 man and 34 women have been admitted, making a grand total of 517 persons under treatment, — 241 men and 276 women. Of this number, 1 woman was discharged as recovered, 1 man and 3 women as much improved, 2 men as not improved and 17 men and 16 women died, - a total, discharges and deaths, of 40 persons, - 20 men and 20 women. Sept. 30, 1901, 477 persons were enrolled as patients here, — 221 men and 256 women. Of this number, but 476 were actually present, 1 man having escaped and being still at large. The whole number of patients under treatment corresponds exactly with that of the previous year, but the daily average is somewhat greater, being 476.82, as against 470.18 the year before. Among those discharged there was 1 case of recovery. This patient, a woman, improved steadily from the time of her admission here, and was finally allowed to go home to her family. She has remained well for a long time, and I trust that her recovery will prove a permanent one. Of the other persons discharged, 2 men were sent out of the State, and 1 man and 3 women were taken home by relatives. Of those admitted, 1 man was transferred from the Medfield Insane Asylum, 27 women from the Worcester Insane Hospital, 3 women from the Boston Insane Hospital and 4 women from boarding out.

In almost half the number of those admitted the cause of mental disease was unknown. In those cases where a cause was assigned, mental anxiety, heredity and religious excitement predominated, and in the order given. Unfortunately for the value of statistics, the assigned causes in many cases seem not to be the true causes. There is no doubt that heredity is the great predisposing cause in the vast majority of cases. Given a faulty nervous inheritance, very many causes of strong excitement are sufficient to occasion mental symptoms often terminating in actual insanity. In such cases the exciting cause is liable to be given undue prominence, and overshadows the more important underlying hereditary taint. In attempting to distinguish between heredity and intemperance, cause and effect are so closely interwoven that differentiation is often impossible. Dementia, as usual, was the predominating mental condition in those admitted. The majority of these cases, however, were younger and in considerably better physical health than those received for some years past. Only 1 death has occurred in this number and that in a case received from boarding out.

Among the causes of death, phthisis, as usual, heads the list, though not by so large a percentage as has been common. The lessening of this ratio may possibly be due in some measure to chance, perhaps also in part to a greater accuracy in diagnosis. In a population drawn, as ours is, not by direct commitment from the general public, but by transfer from other hospitals, deductions as to ratio in causes of death are liable to be somewhat fallacious.

The general health of the institution has been excellent. One of our female nurses contracted typhoid fever from some unknown source. The disease, however, ran a favorable course. No other cases followed this, showing conclusively that the causation was from some source extraneous to the institution. Within my knowledge of the asylum no case of typhoid fever has ever originated here.

Although each year the institution is caring for a greater number of patients, sanitation has kept pace with the increase, and in all respects the institution is better prepared to care for its present numbers than ever before.

In reviewing the medical work of the year, I find that very little acute disease of a serious nature has come under treatment. An effort has been made, in groups of cases, with many of our more hopelessly demented patients, to arouse their benumbed mental faculties to renewed effort by a systematic and continued course of active treatment. In many instances no mental change seemed to occur, and in those cases where some slight response appeared to follow, no permanent relief was attained. In all it seemed that the sense of well-being was increased. In another class of cases, where active stomach symptoms of a distressing nature were present, often with delusions dependent thereon, treatment gave decided relief to the physical ailment, but, beyond perhaps a slight lessening in the expression of the delusions, no permanent mental improvement followed. Probably decided mental improvement is not likely to follow any special line of investigation among patients of the character of those in this institution.

Our school for nurses has operated to improve the character and intelligence of the service, placing the medical work of the institution upon a much more satisfactory basis. During the summer one of our nurses was given a special term of service at the Memorial Hospital.

The work of improvement and repair has continued steadily during the past year. As all expenditures have been met from our own income, the work has naturally not progressed as rapidly as if done from appropriation; much, however, has been accomplished. An important advance has been made in the improvement of the house ventilation, by the use of electrically driven fans, placed wherever there seemed special need to supplement the general service. The large fan at the engine room, which forces air into the building for the purpose of general heating and ventilation, is entirely capable of supplying the requisite amount, but cannot in all cases secure a proper distribution of this air without some special assistance. The operation of this supplementary fan service has been so satisfactory that I should advise its extension wherever ventilation seems in any way faulty. Our engineering plant has been pushed to still further completion, the electric lighting system extended, much interior painting done, and a great amount of miscellaneous work of all kinds has furnished an abundance of profitable employment. For some time the major operations of extension and repair have absorbed much of our resources. Many furnishings and fittings remain to be provided for the wards. is expected that expenditures of this character can easily be met from the current funds of the institution.

The most extensive undertaking of the year has been the construction of a congregate dining room for the accommodation of the female department. This room is of such capacity that it is expected to afford dining facilities for all of our female patients and nurses. Circumstances have unavoidably delayed the finishing of this work somewhat beyond the original estimate of time; but the room is now rapidly approaching completion, and will be ready for occupancy at a very early date. With the experience of the last year in the male department, I feel sure that the opening of this dining room for our female patients and nurses will be attended with greatly increased opportunities for the improvement of the service and for the betterment of general conditions. Nearly all of the work in connection with this improvement has been accomplished by

our own employees, with the assistance of patients, and all expenses have been met from current funds. It was at first expected that this additional room would enable us to care for from 15 to 20 more patients. The carrying out of our perfected plans, however, will result in an increase in the capacity of the institution by some 40 persons. Thus the work of the past two years will result not only in an improvement of facilities, but also in a substantial increase in the numbers of patients which can be cared for here. It would undoubtedly be wise to enlarge the congregate dining room in the male department to substantially the capacity of that in the female department, thus providing for a still further increase in capacity.

With the increase in the numbers of patients has come the necessity for the employment of more nurses and for an extension of the service in all departments. To find accommodation for these additional employees it has in some instances been necessary to make use of rooms which would more properly be devoted to patients. The time is close at hand when still further provision must be made in this same direction, as we must look forward to a continued increase in the numbers of patients. With the added capacity of the present year the asylum can doubtless provide accommodation for a number well in excess of 500. If plans which have already been formulated can be carried out, a still further increase can be provided for later on. The great pressure upon the State establishments for the insane, at the present time, is for the accommodation of women. Fortunately, the added capacity of this institution for the past year has been in the female department.

To make adequate provision for the annual increase in the numbers of the insane in the community is a matter which has long engrossed the attention of the legislators of this Commonwealth. Considering that additional provision must be made each year for 400 insane persons, it behooves each institution to do its part in assisting to solve the problems of expansion now confronting the State in the care of the insane. Undoubtedly this additional provision can be made, for a time, more quickly and more economically by the enlargement of existing institutions. While some additional capacity can no doubt be provided here, any large increase must be accomplished by

some supplementary scheme. In my judgment, the asylum can well form a nucleus for the elaboration of such scheme as may commend itself to your judgment. I recommend to your Board the consideration of this matter.

One of the most urgent needs of the institution is for the improvement of our kitchen facilities. Our present kitchen is old, and repair here has not kept pace with the expansion in the other departments. Simple repair would not satisfactorily accomplish the object sought; reconstruction and enlargement are demanded. A preliminary plan of the changes and additions needed here has already been presented to your Board, and in a general way has secured your approval; I recommend that immediate steps be taken for the elaboration of this plan. A new drying room is needed in the laundry, and should be provided at as early a date as possible. The present room is not only inadequate for the needs of the institution, but, from the character of its construction, is a fire menace as well. With the changing character of our patients, a burden out of proportion to the general ratio of increase in numbers has been thrown upon the laundry department. Under existing conditions the laundry dry room and some portion of the kitchen improvements could be paid for from current funds. revenues, however, would not suffice for the completion of the whole work in as short a time as the good of the service demands. As I understand the law taking effect with the new year, it will be necessary to seek legislative permission to use current funds for any extraordinary purpose. In compliance with this law, I respectfully recommend that permission be sought for the undertaking of such portion of the work outlined above as may be considered of an extraordinary nature, and that a special appropriation be asked for to cover the expense connected therewith which cannot be met from current funds.


