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


To His Excellency, Henry B. Cleaves, Governor, and the Honorable Executive Council:

## REGISTRATION REPORT, 1894.

This report is for the year 1894. According to the provisions of the law, the returns from town clerks of the births, marriages, and deaths which occurred in that year are not made until the month of June, 1895. While most of the town clerks make their returns very promptly, a smaller number have not done so, and from some of them the returns have come only after repeated notifications. The extreme delay of a very few clerks has compelled me to put their cases into the hands of the county attorneys.

After their receipt in this office, the returns from every town are counted and then they undergo successively, several critical examinations for the purpose of determining whether each return is properly signed by the town clerk; whether each birth, marriage, or death occurred within the calendar year for which the returns are received; whether each occurred within the city or town whose clerk has sent them; whether each blank is fully and correctly filled, and whether there are indications of carelessness and the absence of facts which might have been obtained.

If the count in this office does not agree with that returned by the town clerk, the discrepancy must be investigated; if unsigned returns are found, copies are made and sent to the clerks for signature; if dates are other than that of the year for which the returns are made, doubt necessitates inquiries of the local registrars; the careful examination of "place" is for the purpose of excluding duplicates from the tabulations, particularly duplicates of marriages; if any of the more important facts of a record are wanting, or there is doubt as to the real cause of death, or uncertainty in other directions, the town clerk or other person to whom the matter is properly referable, receives an "abstract" of the record which he is requested to fill out and return. The additional facts thus

collected are added in red ink that the additions made in this office may be distinguished from the original facts of the record.

It is thus that, after several months of this necessary work, the returns are made ready for the tabulation for the report. This work and the delay which it causes is indispensable. The first demand in reports on vital statistics is the elimination, so far as possible, of errors and deficiences, and the same assertion is emphatically true of the central records which are to remain permanently in the State House, and which will become more and more valuable with each year's accessions to them.

The foregoing is written in no apologetic spirit, but as a statement due to those who think that "timeliness" should be above all other considerations in reports of all kinds. In a report of this kind, which is prepared as a work which many classes of persons will consult for various purposes in the years to come, as well as in the year of its publication, the nearest possible approach to truth in every tabular or other statement is the first desideratum; the earliest practicable appearance of the work is a secondary one.

Population.—The population of the State of Maine in 1890 was, as given by the eleventh census, 661,086. In 1880, the population of the State was 648,936. There was, therefore, a gain of 12,150 in the decade between the last two census enumerations. The following table exhibits the population of the several counties in 1880 and in 1890, and the gain or loss in each.

Sex.—Table No. 2 shows the distribution of the population of Maine by age-groups and by sex, as determined by the census of 1890, and Table No. 3 gives the ratio of the sexes at the two last census enumerations, not only for the State of Maine, but for the other New England States as well. It will be noted that, at the last census enumeration, the number of females in the State of Maine was smaller than that of the males, that this was true in Vermont at both census periods, and that in the other states there has been an excess of females in both census years.

Density of Population.—Table No. 4 shows the comparative density of the population in the several New England States at the last two census enumerations. The extremes of density were in Maine and Rhode Island, there being in 1890, 22.1 persons per square mile in Maine, and 318.4 per square mile in Rhode Island.

Total area 66,465 miles, of which 4,460 or 6.7 per cent is water.

In our own State, as is shown in the map which accompanies this report, a large part of some of the counties is unsettled and covered with forest. This timbered region is represented by the shaded portion of the map. It results, therefore, that the degree of density differs quite widely in the different counties. The following is a tabular statement of the comparative density of the population in the several counties.

Birth, Marriage, and Death Rates.—In this report the birthrates, marriage-rates, and death-rates from all causes, are stated as so many among each 1,000 of the population as shown by the census of 1890.

Death-rates from individual causes, or from groups of diseases are expressed as per 10,000.

Relation of Births to Deaths.—As the total number of births registered in Maine in the year 1894 was 13,940 and the number of deaths was 11,012, the natural increase of births over deaths was 2,928.

In the following table it appears that, in some of the counties, there has been a natural loss of population due to the fact that the number of registered deaths exceeds the number of births.

A comparison of the tables already given offers interesting suggestions as to the conditions which are influencing gain or loss of population in the different parts of the State. Generally it may be said that in the older counties in which agriculture is the leading industry and in which large manufacturing centers are absent, the census enumeration shows either a loss or only a very slight gain in population. In the same places, the town clerks' returns exhibit generally either a preponderance of deaths over births, or only a slight excess in the number of births, as compared with the number of deaths.

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## NOTES ON BIRTHS.

In the State of Maine, in the year 1894, 14,607 births were registered, including still-births (14,028 in 1892, and 14,604 in 1893).

The number of living children born was 13,940, and the number of still-births was 667.

Of the whole number of living children of which the sex was certified, 7,107 were males and 6,787 were females. In 46 births, the sex was not stated. For each 100 girls born there were 104.7 boys, (106.7 in 1892 and 107.4 in 1893).

This preponderance of the births of boys over girls conforms with the results of the registration of births almost everywhere. Thus, the number of boys to each 100 girls is, in Vermont (1894), 106.8; and in Massachusetts (1894), 105.4.

Birth-Rate.—The birth-rate of living children for the State was 21.09 for each 1,000 of population, using the figures as given in the census returns for 1890 as the basis of calculation.

The birth-rate of the different counties varied widely. It was the highest in Aroostook, 35.84, and the lowest in Waldo, 14.04. In six counties, Aroostook, Cumberland, Hancock, Androscoggin, Washington and York, the birth-rate was above that of the whole State. The birth-rate in each county is shown in Tables No. 6 and No. 11.

For the purpose of comparison it may be stated that in 1894 the birth-rate in New Hampshire was 20.87; in Vermont, 20.55; in Massachusetts, 29.90; in Rhode Island, 26.57; and in Connecticut, 24.96.

Parentage.—Of the total births in the State, 63.75 per cent. were of native parents; 19.48 per cent. were of foreign parentage; 14.96 per cent. were of parents, one of whom was foreign; while of 1.81 per cent. the nationality was not stated.

Lincoln county, as in 1892 and 1893, had the largest percentage of native-born parents, to wit, 92.82 per cent. (89.30 in 1892 and 93.10 in 1893). Waldo followed with 91.79 per cent. of native parentage (89.10 in 1892 and 90.80 in 1893,) and only 0.77 per cent. in which both parents were foreign-born.

In Hancock county, in 86.80 per cent. of the births, the parents were native-born.

In Franklin the percentage was 86.28, and in Oxford, 84.22.

Low percentages of native-born parents were shown in Androscoggin county, where, in 38.18 per cent. of the births, the parents were native-born, and 48.84 per cent. were foreign-born; and in York county with 51.43 per cent., and in Aroostook with 54.97 per cent. of the parents native-born.

The percentages of parentage, whether American-born or foreignborn may be found for the other counties in Table No. 16. Comparing the percentage of the births in our twenty cities with that of the rest of the State, we find that in the cities, 43.02 per cent. of the births were of American parentage, while in the rural parts of the State, the percentage of American-born children was 74.07.

The largest percentage of foreign-born parents was in Lewiston, 68.47, and in Biddeford, 67.95 per cent.

The lowest percentage of foreign-born parents was again in Belfast where no birth was reported in which both parents were foreign, while in Ellsworth only 4.16 per cent., and in Rockland 7.74 per cent. of the births had both parents foreign-born. For further comparisons see Table No. 17.

Comparing the statistics of the other New England states with our 63.75 per cent. of American-born parents, we find that in 1894, in Vermont 79.07 per cent. of the births were of American parentage; in Massachusetts, 32.45 per cent.; in Rhode Island, 32.97 per cent.; and in Connecticut, 43.2 per cent.

Seasons and Births.—The largest number of births in any one month in 1894 was 1,335 in March; the smallest was 962 in January; the largest quarterly total was 3,779 in the second quarterd the smallest, 3,208 in the last quarter.

In the first quarter there were 3,277 births, (3,474 in 1892 an; 3,395 in 1893).

In the second quarter there were 3,779 births, (3,774 in 1892 and 3,694 in 1893).

In the third quarter there were 3,667 births, (3,557 in 1892 and 3,504 in 1893).

In the fourth quarter there were 3,208 births, (3,160 in 1892 and 3,267 in 1893).

The three consecutive months in which the largest number of births occurred were March, April and May, 3,914.

Twin Births.—In 1894, 133 twin births occurred; in 59 instances the twins were both boys; in 36, both girls; in 38 a boy and a girl. In 90 cases the parentage was American; in 19 foreign; and in 22 instances the parentage was mixed. Of the 266 children, 234 were born alive, and 32 were still-born.

Triplets in Mexico and North Berwick. Other facts may be learned by consulting Tables No. 18 and No. 19.

Still-Births.—Of the 667 still-born children, 364 were males, and 280 females. In 23 the sex was not stated. With the exception of 10 still-births, as to which the nativity of the mother was not stated, 477 were of American mothers, and 180 were of foreign mothers.

The largest number of still-births, 94, occurred in Cumberland county, while the minimum number, 13, was reported in Piscata-quis county.

The largest number of still-births, 65, was returned in December; the smallest number in any one month was 42 in November. See Tables No. 20 and No. 21 for other details.

## NOTES ON MARRIAGES.

There were 5,591 marriages registered in the State during the year 1894, (5,726 in 1892 and 5,795 in 1893). This gives a marriage-rate of 16.92 (persons married) to every 1,000 of population, or the rate of 8.46 marriages per 1,000 persons.

Marriage-Rates.—The marriage-rate was higher in Aroostook county than elsewhere in the State, it being for that county 19.84 per 1,000. The lowest marriage-rate, that of 13.00 per 1,000, was in Lincoln county. See Table No. 6.

Comparing the marriage-rate of Maine (16.92 per 1,000) with that of the other New England states, we find that for the same year, 1894, it was in New Hampshire, 20.60; Vermont, 17.02; Massachusetts, 16.44; Rhode Island, 17.4; and Connecticut, 14.2.

Nativity.—Of the 5,279 records of marriage in which there is a statement of birthplace, in 73 per cent. the groom and bride were both American; in 11 per cent. both were of foreign birth; in 8 per cent. the groom was American and the bride of foreign birth; while in 8 per cent. a foreign groom and American bride were united.

Seasons.—The largest number of marriages, 636. were solemnized in October, while the smallest number in any one month, 298, occurred in February. See Table No. 24.

Ages of the Married.—The largest number, both of grooms and brides, were between 20 and 25 years of age. While still under 15 years of age, 14 brides were married; in the age-period 15-20 years, there were 187 grooms and 1,626 brides; in the period 20-25 years, 2,050 men and 2,081 women were married; from 25-30, 1,552 men and 899 women; from 30-35, 678 men and 346 women; from 35-40, 415 men and 222 women; from 40-45, 215 men and 140 women; from 45-50, 155 men and 97 women; from 50-55, 106 men and 65 women; from 55-60, 82 men and 42 women; from 60-70, 100 men and 41 women; from 70-80, 43 men and 8 women; over 80, 1 man. See Table No. 25.

In 764 marriages the bride was older than the groom; 916 widowers and 605 widows were remarried; 139 men and 196 women were remarried after having been divorced from a former marriage.

Table No. 26 exhibits the fact that 4,505 men and 4,766 women were married the first time; that 908 men and 723 women were married the second time; that 129 men and 76 women were united in a third marriage; while 11 men and 3 women contracted marriage a fourth time.

The oldest groom was 84 years of age and the oldest bride was 76; in two marriages the bride was only 13 years old.

## NOTES ON DIVORCES.

Six-hundred and seventy-four divorces were decreed in the year 1894, (552 in 1892 and 627 in 1893) and this is at the rate of over one divorce to every nine marriages solemnized within the same year.

Some of the causes for which divorces were granted are: Adultery, 92, or 13.6 per cent. of the whole number; extreme cruelty, 9, or 1.3 per cent.; desertion, 195, or 28.9 per cent.; intoxication, 53, or 7.8 per cent.; cruel and abusive treatment, 158, or 23.4 per cent.; failure to support, 44, or 6.5 per cent. The other divorces were granted for multiple or associated causes.

The wife was the libellant in 496 divorces, and the husband in 178.

In the divorces granted for adultery, the husband was the libellant 47 times, and the wife 45 times.

On account of extreme cruelty, the wife was the libellant in 8 cases and the husband in 1.

For desertion, the husband was the libellant 84 times, and the wife in 111.

For intoxication, the husband was the libellant in 7 cases, and the wife in 46.

For cruel and abusive treatment, the husband was the libellant in 30 instances, and the wife in 128.

For failure to support, the wife was the libellant in the 44 divorces decreed for that cause.

Two divorces were granted before the marriage life had lasted 6 months; 14, before one year; 206, after from 1 to 5 years marriage; 184, after 5 to 10 years; 179, after 10 to 20 years; 71, after 20 to 30 years; and 16, after more than 30 years married life. Tables No. 27 and 28 may be consulted for more detailed statements.

## NOTES ON DEATHS AND THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

Death-Rates.—In the year 1894, 11,012 deaths were registered in the State (12,147 in 1892 and 11,134 in 1893,) which is equivalent to a death-rate of 16.66 for every 1,000 of population as returned by the census of 1890 (18.37 in 1892 and 16.84 in 1893). Based on the estimated population for 1894, the death-rate would be slightly lower, 16.54.

By referring to Table No. 6, it will be seen that the death-rate of Aroostook county was lower than that of any other county, being only 13.46, while the older counties, Kennebec, Androscoggin, Cumberland, York and Penobscot show death-rates of 19.86, 19.22, 18.57, 18.26, and 16.40, respectively.

The death-rate in the cities was 19.65 (20.46 in 1892 and 19.89 in 1893) as compared with that of the rest of the State with the cities omitted, which death-rate was 15.39 (17.46 in 1892 and 15.54 in 1893).

Death-Rates Compared.—For the year 1894 the death-rate of Maine was 16.54; of New Hampshire, 18.32; of Vermont, 16.27; of Massachusetts, 18.65; of Rhode Island, 19.00; and of Connecticut, 16.8.

Season and Mortality.—The largest number of deaths occurred in January, 1,266; the smallest number of deaths in any one month was 761 in November. During the spring months 2,764 deaths occurred; during the summer, 2,634; during the autumn, 2,538; in the winter, 3,066.

In the first quarter of the year there were 3,166 deaths (3,964 in 1892 and 2,653 in 1893).

In the second quarter there were 2,660 deaths (2,926 in 1892 and 2,825 in 1893).

In the third quarter there were 2,774 deaths (2,780 in 1892 and 2,878 in 1893).

In the last quarter there were 2,402 deaths (2,427 in 1892 and 2,750 in 1893).

Table No. 30 exhibits the total number of deaths which occurred in each month of the three years for which a report has now been made. In 1892 the highest mortality occurred in January, as it did in the year for which this report is made. In the former year

a serious epidemic of influenza gave an excessive and abnormal mortality during the first five months of the year. In 1893 the largest number of deaths occurred in August, with a number nearly as large in April and in December. The smallest number of deaths in each of the three years has been in November. The number of deaths for 1894 in each month by counties is shown in Tables No. 6 and No. 34.

Sex and Mortality.—Of the 11,012 decedents, 5,570 were males and 5,422 were females. The sex of 20 was unstated.

Among children dying before they were 5 years old, 1,201 were males and 1,012 were females; there were 189 more deaths among boys under 5 years of age than among girls within the same ageperiod. On the contrary, at the age-periods from 10 to 50 years there was a preponderance of deaths among females, while there were more deaths among males at the ages from 50 to 90. At the age of 100 years and over, four persons died, two men and two women. See Table No. 34.

Age and Mortality.—The following shows the number of deaths which occurred within each age-period, and the relation which the percentage in each period bears to the whole number of deaths:

The Causes of Death.—Of the 11,803 deaths, including still-births and premature births, the cause of 11,028 was certified, leaving 775 of which the cause of death was unspecified or so ill-defined as to preclude satisfactory classification.

The following table shows the mortality from ten prominent causes in the three years 1892-94. In 1894, as well as in 1893, diseases of the brain have headed the list, while the next most prominent cause of mortality in the State has been consumption. In 1892, however, pneumonia, many cases of which were sequels to the existing epidemic of influenza, was first as a cause of death.

By referring to Table No. 31 it will be noticed that the causes of death are arranged under eight "Classes," and that the causes of death in some of the classes are distributed into several "Groups." The following notes on some of the classes and groups of diseases and individual causes of death will be arranged in accordance with the classification shown in this Table 31 and the classification of the causes of death to be found in the latter part of this report.

Zymotic Diseases.—The death-rate from the zymotic diseases is often used as an index of the healthfulness of states and towns and cities, and of the efficiency of their sanitary organizations. The lists of the zymotic diseases usually include small-pox, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, whooping cough, diphtheria and croup, and the diarrheal diseases. The following table shows the number

of deaths that resulted from each of these causes in 1894 in each of the New England states, the total deaths from these causes, and the zymotic death-rates per 10,000 of living population. It will be noted that the zymotic death-rate of Maine is lower than that for any other of these states, and that the highest death-rate for these diseases is in Rhode Island.

Infectious Diseases. — Disregarding influenza, the number of deaths caused by this group of diseases was 684 in 1892, 678 in 1893, and 536 in 1894. In the last year there were, therefore, 142 fewer deaths from these causes than in 1893, and 148 rewer than in 1892. The number of deaths in 1894 from measles was smaller by 34; from scarlet fever, by 51; from whooping cough, by 31; from croup, by 21; from tetanus, by 4; from simple continued fever, by 10, than in 1893. On the other hand there were, in 1894, 4 more deaths from diphtheria, 4 more from cerebro-

spinal meningitis, 1 more from typhoid fever, 3 more referred to malarial diseases, than in 1893. Including influenza, the total number of deaths caused by the infectious diseases was 1,439 in 1892 and 831 in both 1893, and 1894.

Small-Pox.—No death has resulted from this cause in any of the years covered by the Vital Statistics reports, 1892-94.

Measles.—This disease caused the death of 21 persons of whom 11 were males and 10 females.

The largest number of deaths in any month was 5 in April. Aroostook had a larger number of deaths from this disease than any other county. In one-half of the counties no death occurred from measles. The following shows the number of deaths from measles arranged by counties, months, and age-periods.

Scarlet Fever.—The total mortality from this disease was 29 (36 in 1892 and 80 in 1894),—13 males and 16 females. The largest number of deaths occurred at the age-period 1-5. The largest monthly number of deaths from this cause was 4 in February,

April, and June. There were 8 deaths in the first quarter, 11 in the second, 5 in the third, and 5 in the last three months of the year. Cumberland and Washington counties each had 6 deaths from scarlet fever; Hancock and York had 4. In seven counties no death occurred from scarlet fever. Of the 29 deaths from this disease, 11 were in the cities. The following is an exhibit of the scarlet fever deaths arranged by counties, months and age-periods.

The scarlatinal death-rate per 10,000 for the State was 0.44; for the cities, 0.56. For the same year it was, in New Hampshire, 1.62; in Vermont, 1.81; in Massachusetts, 2.90; in Rhode Island, 3.27; and in Connecticut, 0.79.

Influenza.—During the year for which this report is made, 295 deaths were attributed to influenza. The percentage distribution of deaths from this cause was as follows: January, 42.8; February, 24.4; March, 9.8; April, 6.8; May, 3.7; June, 2.7; July, 0.3; August, 1.7; September, 1.3; October, 2.1; November, 1.0; December, 3.4. The following gives the age incidence of deaths reported as having occurred from influenza:

In 1892 a large percentage of the deaths from influenza was among elderly persons, 68 per cent. of the deaths from this cause being of persons 60 years of age or older; in 1893, 60 per cent. of the deaths were of persons who had reached or passed the age of 60, while in this year, 1894, 69 per cent. of the deaths were of persons 60 years of age and older.

The influenza death-rate for the whole State was 4.46 for each 10,000 of living population (11.43 in 1892 and 2.31 in 1893).

Whooping Cough.—The number of deaths from whooping cough was 20 (54 in 1892 and 51 in 1893), of which 10 were males and 10 were females. The number of deaths in the cities was 9. All but 3 of the 20 deaths from this cause were among infants under 1 year of age.

The death-rate in the State from whooping cough was 0.30 per 10,000; that of the cities, 0.46; of Vermont, 0.51; of Massachusetts, 1.94; of Rhode Island, 3.43; of Connecticut, 1.59.

Diphtheria.—For this statistical year there were 77 deaths from diphtheria (106 in 1892 and 69 in 1893). Of the decedents, 49 were males and 28 were females.

Ages: Under 1, 3; 1-5, 30; 5-10, 25; 10-20, 13; 20-30, 3; 30-40, 2; 40-50, 1.

Of the 77 deaths, 39 were in the cities and 38 in other places. The diphtheria death-rate for the State was 1.16, and for the cities, 1.53.

CROUP BY COUNTIES AND MONTHS.

It is now conceded that the two diseases, croup and diphtheria, are etiologically one and the same. The combined death-rate for the two diseases is, for Maine, 2.10 per 10,000 of living population; of our cities, 2.81; and in the same year for New Hampshire, 3.11; Vermont, 3.37; Massachusetts, 8.04; Rhode Island, 4.39; Connecticut, 4.51.

Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.—The number of decedents was 34 (38 in 1892 and 30 in 1893), 16 males and 18 females. Thirteen of these deaths were in the cities. Deaths from this cause occurred in every month excepting December; distributed by quarters, they were 10, 9, 10, 5. The death-rate from this disease was 0.51.

Tetanus.—This disease was the cause of 6 deaths (7 in 1892) and 10 in 1893). The decedents were, males 1 and females 5. All of these deaths occurred from June to November, -June, 3; July, 1; October, 1; November, 1. No county had more than one case.

Ages: Under 1, 5; 60-70, 1.

Typhoid Fever.—Including 11 deaths from "gastric fever," 6 "fever," 1 "catarrhal fever" and one from "slow fever," there were 277 deaths from typhoid fever. Of these, 150 were of males and 127 of females. The age distribution of the decedents shows that the loss from this disease is principally from among those active and productive age-periods when human lives are of the most value to the State; 75 per cent. died between 10 and 50 years of age. Ages: Under 1, 1; 1-5, 14; 5-10, 9; 10-20, 61; 20-30, 91; 30-40, 36; 40-50, 20; 50-60, 14:

60-70, 16: 70-80, 10; over 80, 4; not stated, 1.

The largest number of deaths, 40, occurred in September, and the smallest number, 11, in April. By quarters, 72 were in the first, 43 in the second, 75 in the third, and 86 in the last quarter of the year, and 1 not stated.

The typhoid death-rate of 5.77 in the cities is considerably greater than that in the villages and rural towns which is 3.53. The rate for the State is 4.19. The typhoid death-rate for the same year was, in New Hampshire, 3.27; Vermont, 3.34; Massachusetts, 3.35; Rhode Island, 4.26; Connecticut, 3.07.

TYPHOID FEVER.

Malarial Diseases.—Eight deaths were returned as from malarial diseases. The diagnosis in 5 of the cases was "malarial poisoning"; in one, "malaria"; in one, malarial anemia; and in one,



pernicious intermittent fever. All but one of the decedents were males. The ages were 19, 1; 30-40, 2; 50-60, 2; 60-70, 2; 70-80, 1. Three of the deaths were in Penobscot county, and one each in Franklin, Kennebec, Knox, Waldo, and York. In the other New England states, in the same year, the number of deaths attributed to this cause was in Vermont, 4; Massachusetts, 73; Connecticut, 103; and in New Hampshire and Rhode Island, none.

Tuberculosis.—This most destructive disease of civilized life was the cause of 1,449 deaths in the year for which this report is made (1,513 in 1892 and 1,446 in 1893) and this is equivalent to a death-rate of 21.92 per 10,000. The death-rate from the same cause in the same year, was 18.96 in New Hampshire; 18.29 in Vermont; 32.12 in Massachusetts; 22.54 in Rhode Island, and 19.92 in Connecticut.

Cerebral Tuberculosis.—(Tubercular Meningitis.)—The number of deaths was 56; 32 were of males and 24 of females. The number in the cities was 27. The death-rate for the State was 0.62; for the cities, 1.38.

Ages: Under 1, 14; 1-5, 24; 5-10, 11; 10-20, 4; 20-30, 1; 30-40, 1; over 70, 1.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis.—(Consumption.)—From this cause 1,262 deaths were registered in 1894 (1,352 in 1892 and 1,299 in 1893).

Ages: Under 1, 13; 1-5, 15; 5-10, 12; 10-20, 154; 20-30, 364; 30-40, 219; 40-50, 157; 50-60, 110; 60-70, 114; 70-80, 74; 80-90, 22; not stated, 8.

It is thus shown in this report, as in the two previous reports, that the smallest number of deaths occurred at the age-period 5 to 10 years, and that, of the decedents whose ages are given, 80 per cent. died at those periods when their deaths entailed the greatest loss to the State.

As to the sex, 548 of the decedents, or 43.4 per cent. were males, and 714, or 56.6 per cent. were females.

The State's death-rate from consumption was 19.09 in each 10,000 of population; that of the cities, 21.89. Outside of our State, in the same year, the death-rate from consumption was for Vermont, 16.91; Massachusetts, 24.40; Rhode Island, 19-21; Connecticut, 16.08.

Tuberculosis Mesenteric.—There were 31 deaths from this cause, 16 males and 15 females.

Ages: Under 1, 5; 10-20, 4; 20-40, 7; 40-60, 9; over 60, 6.

Tuberculosis, Other Forms.—Of these deaths, 94 in all, the cause assigned was in 70, tuberculosis, general tuberculosis, or acute tuberculosis; in 18, scrofula; in 3, diseases of joints or bones; in 1, psoas abscess; in 1, tuberculosis of spine; and in 1, tuberculosis of kidney.

Diarrheal Diseases.—The total number of deaths caused by the diseases under this group was 602 (662 in 1892 and 642 in 1893). The death rate for this group of diseases was 9.11 per 10,000. That of New Hampshire in the same year was 13.36; Vermont, 7.43; Massachusetts, 15.95; Rhode Island, 17.14; Connecticut, 15.57.

Infantile Diarrhea.—This, as synonymous with cholera infantum, or including it, was the cause of 468 deaths (546 in 1892 and 507 in 1893). A reference to the following table will show the number of deaths which occurred in each month. The same table shows also the death-rate for each county. There were in the first quarter of the year but 19 deaths from this cause; in the second quarter, 37; in the third quarter, 365; and in the fourth quarter, 47. The largest number of deaths occurred in August, 140.

Of the children dying from this cause, 55 per cent. were less than 6 months old, and another 30 per cent. were less than 1 year, making 85 per cent. of deaths within the first year of age.

Ages: Under & months, 260; 6-12 months, 147; 1-2 years, 60; age unknown, 1.

Of the 468 deaths from infantile diarrhea, 260 were returned from the cities. This represents an urban death-rate from this cause of 13.27 (15.20 in 1892 and 14.33 in 1893), which is strongly in contrast with 4.47, the rate for the villages and the rural districts (5.33 in 1892 and 4.95 in 1893).

The death-rate of Maine from this affection was 7.08. For the same year it was in New Hampshire, 10.62; in Vermont, 5.75; for Massachusetts, 11.95; for Rhode Island, 13.20; for Connecticut, 8.60.

Dietetic Diseases.—Twenty-nine deaths were returned under this class of causes; 18 of malnutrition of infants, 1 of rickets, and 10 of alcoholism. The special death-rate from alcoholism was 0.15. For the same year it was 0.24 in New Hampshire; 0.03 in Vermont; 0.89 in Massachusetts; 1.22 in Rhode Island; and 0.58 in Connecticut.

Constitutional Diseases.—With tuberculosis transferred to the class of zymotic diseases, there were 663 deaths from constitutional diseases, or a death-rate of 10.03 per 10,000 for the State.

Rheumatism.—The returns give 66 deaths from this cause (68 in 1892 and 46 in 1893),—32 males and 34 females. Twenty-six of these deaths were in the cities. The special death-rate for this disease was, therefore, 1.00, while that of the cities, slightly higher, was 1.33. For the same year it was in Vermont, 0.90; Massachusetts, 0.97; Rhode Island, 1.98; Connecticut, 1.15. The following shows the deaths from this cause arranged by counties, months and age-groups.

From the preceding tabular arrangement it will be seen that the largest number of deaths, 11, occurred in Cumberland and Penobscot counties, and that the largest number in any one month was 11 in January.

Cancer—From cancer in its various forms and locations there were 474 deaths (404 in 1892 and 433 in 1893). Of the decedents, 177 were males and 297 females. The cancer death-rate for the State was, therefore, 7.17. In the same year the death-rate was in Vermont, 4.78; in Massachusetts, 7.00; in Rhode Island, 5.45; in Connecticut, 5.10.

Distributed as to its more frequent locations, there died of cancer of the stomach, 117; of the breast, 38; liver, 31; uterus, 74; abdominal and intestinal, 22; throat, 3; rectum, 14; lip, 3; neck, 4; face, 20; tongue, 3; mouth, 4; jaw, 4; various, 29; parts unspecified, 108.

Diabetes.—The deaths from this cause numbered 71 (55 in 1892 and 65 in 1893). The special death-rate from diabetes was, therefore, 1.07 in 1894. Thirty-nine of the decedents were males and 32 females.

Ages: 1-5, 2; 10-20, 4; 20-30, 6; 30-40, 4; 40-50, 8; 50-60, 9; 60-70, 20; 70-80, 14; over 80, 2; unknown, 2.

Old Age.—There were registered 697 deaths as due to old age,—354 men and 343 women. Eleven were less than 70 years old, 121 were between 70 and 80, 437 were 80 to 90, 121 were 90 to 100, while 2 were over 100 years old, and the age of 5 was unknown.

From Table No. 34, however, it may be seen that the whole number of persons who died at the ages between 70 and 100 years or more was 3,242 (3,801 in 1892 and 3,147 in 1893), or one death in every three and one-half was of a person who was between 70 and 100 years of age or older. Assuming that all these 3,242 died

of old age, the death-rate from old age was 49.04 in every 10,000 living at all ages.

Comparing with other states we find that, in the same year, the death-rate of old persons (70 years of age and over) was, in New Hampshire, 51.10; Vermout, 48.84; Massachusetts, 34.42; Rhode Island, 29.52; and Connecticut, 34.16.

The following shows the number of deaths in each county, of persons 70 years of age and over, and the number of their deaths in each 10,000 of the population at all ages.

OLD AGE.

Centenarians.—Among the persons whose decease occurred in 1894, four had reached or exceeded the age of 100 years. Two of these persons were women and two were men. Their names, together with a few facts relating to the life history of each were as follows:

November 3, Polly Dickey died at Stockton Springs at the age of 103 years, 10 months and 19 days. She was born in Frankfort. Her father was Daniel Lancester who, it is recorded, was of French nativity. The maiden name of her mother was Mehetable Clifford, American by birth.

March 2, Ann Cawley died at South Berwick at the age of 100 years and 7 months. Her father, John Cawley, as well as her mother, was born in Ireland.

March 6, Benjamin Thompson died in Kennebunkport at the age of 100 years, 2 months and 7 days. He was born in Kennebunk-

port, and this was the birthplace of his father whose christian name he bore.

February 25, Henry Hancock died in Portland at the age of 100 years, it was thought. England was his birthplace.

Diseases of the Nervous System.—The number of deaths registered under the causes included in this group was 1,543 (1,459 in 1892 and 1,457 in 1893), or 23.34 to every 10,000 of population.

In the same year the death-rate from this group of causes was in Vermont, 17.99; Massachusetts, 27.17; Rhode Island, 23.81; Connecticut, 22.91.

Inflammation of the Brain or Membranes.—The number of deaths was 286 (236 in 1892 and 263 in 1893),—149 males, 135 females, and 2 not stated. Of these, 155 were in the cities. The death-rate from the several diseases grouped under this head was 4.32.

Ages: Under 1, 91; 1-5, 71; 5-10, 18; 10-20, 15; 20-40, 28; 40-60, 29; over 60, 32; unknown, 2.

Apoplexy.—From this cause 408 deaths occurred (488 in 1892 and 422 in 1893),—of 194 males and 214 females. Of these, 105 were in the cities. The State's death-rate from apoplexy was, therefore, 6.17; that of the cities, 5.36; that of New Hampshire in the same year, 7.81; Vermont, 4.24; Massachusetts, 7.67; Rhode Island, 7.69; Connecticut, 7.15.

The largest number, 44, occurred in August; the most fatal of the four seasons was the spring. In the two preceding years, the largest number of deaths from this cause occurred during the winter.

Conversely, the smallest number of deaths, 25, was in June; the smallest number in any one season was 98 in the autumn months. Nearly 76 per cent. of the deaths were of persons 60 years of age and upward.

Softening of the Brain.—From cerebral softening there were 48 deaths,—those of 28 males and 20 females.

Paralysis.—Of the 336 deaths from "paralysis," 154 of the persons were males and 182 were females.

Epilepsy.—Nineteen males and 12 females died of epilepsy, 31 in all.

Diseases of the Heart.—From diseases of the heart, including those from endocarditis, valvular disease of the heart, hypertrophy and dilatation, pericarditis, angina pectoris, and unspecified, there were 940 deaths (816 in 1892 and 875 in 1893.) As may be noted, Waldo county had the highest death-rate from diseases of the heart, and Aroostook the lowest. The rate for the State was 14.22; that of New Hampshire for the same year was 17.2; Vermont, 17.07; Massachusetts, 17.28; Rhode Island, 12.67; Connecticut, 13.60.

Diseases of the Respiratory System.—Without the inclusion of tuberculosis, 1,312 persons died from the various respiratory diseases as tabulated on page 103 (1,796 in 1892 and 1,407 in 1893). From these diseases there were, therefore, 95 fewer deaths than in 1893 and 484 fewer than in 1892. The death-rate from the

respiratory diseases in 1894 was 19.85 in each 10,000 of population, as compared with 21.28 in 1893 and 27.16 in 1892. For the New England states the death-rate from this group of diseases was: Maine. 19.85; New Hampshire, 23.60; Vermont, 18.84; Massachusetts, 27.82; Rhode Island, 26.50; Connecticut, 21.39.

Pneumonia.—The number of deaths registered under this cause was 1,023 (1,431 in 1892 and 1,143 in 1893), of which 493 were males and 530 females. The death-rate from this disease was, therefore, 15.47 per 10,000 (21.56 in 1892 and 17.27 in 1893), and as 330 of the deaths occurred in the cities, the urban death-rate was 16.84. For the same year the pneumonia death-rate was in New Hampshire, 16.81; Vermont, 14.92; Massachusetts, 18.32; Rhode Island, 17.61; Connecticut, 13.71.

Bronchitis.—From this cause, including both acute and chronic bronchitis, 209 deaths were registered (287 in 1892 and 197 in 1893). Among these decedents, 91 were males and 118 females. Of these 209 deaths, 88 were in the cities. The largest number of deaths in any one month was 36 in January. The smallest number of deaths occurred in September. The largest number of deaths in three consecutive months was 76 in January, February and March; the smallest number in any three consecutive months was 25 in August, September and October. The number of deaths by quarters was 76, 63, 27, and 43.

The bronchitis death-rate of the State was 3.16; of the cities, 4.49. In the same year the bronchitis death-rate was in New Hampshire, 5.18; Vermont, 1.78; Massachusetts, 7.02; Rhode Island, 6.75; Connecticut, 5.47.

Pleurisy.—Fifteen deaths are charged to this disease (18 in 1892 and 19 in 1893)—8 males and 7 females. In each of the months January, April, May, June, August, and September 2

deaths occurred from pleurisy; and in March, July, and December 1, each; in the other three months, none.

Diseases of the Digestive System.—The combined mortality from this group of diseases was 685 (659 in 1892 and 653 in 1893), or a death-rate of 10.36. The distribution of these under their several causes will be found on page 103.

Peritonitis.—There were 137 deaths from this cause (129 in 1892 and 151 in 1893),—52 males and 85 females. Fifty-three of them were in the cities, the same number as in 1893. The following shows the county, month, and age-distribution of the disease:

Appendicitis.—Of the deaths classified under this cause, 21 in number, all were returned as due to "appendicitis." All but 2 of the decedents were males. The number of deaths in each month was, January, February, March, and October, none; April, 2; May, 3; June, 3; July, 6; August, 3; September, 2; November, 1; December, 1.

Cirrhosis of the Liver.—Nineteen deaths were ascribed to cirrhosis of the liver—those of 15 men and 4 women. Of these 19 deaths, 7 were in the cities and 12 in the rural parts of the State. The

death-rate for the State from this one cause was 0.29 per 10,000 (0.19 in 1892 and 0.18 in 1893); that of Connecticut for the same year was 1.01. The data for comparison with other places is wanting.

Diseases of the Urinary System.—There were 442 deaths referred to the diseases under this group, equivalent to a death-rate of 6.69.

Nephritis.—Acute and chronic, caused the death of 80 persons, 42 males and 38 females. The death-rate from nephritis was, therefore, 1.21.

Ages: Under 1, 1; 1-5, 3; 5-10, 1; 10-20, 1; 20-30, 4; 30-40, 6; 40-50, 6; 50-60, 14; 60-70, 15; 70-80, 20; over 80, 9.

Bright's Disease.—This was the cause of 219 deaths (204 in 1892 and 217 in 1893)—125 males, 93 females, and 1 not stated. Of these deaths, 64 were in the cities.

Childbirth.—Under the group of accidents and diseases of reproduction, 41 deaths were registered, not including puerperal fever (69 in 1892 and 59 in 1893). This is equivalent to a special death-rate of 0.62.

Accidents.—From accidents of various kinds, 286 persons met their death (376 in 1892 and 330 in 1893). Of deaths from falls there were 22; 3 by falling down stairs; and one each from a scaffold, a windmill, a load of hay, a high chair, on the ice, upon a circular saw; while 13 were unspecified.

Fractures caused 23 deaths,—fracture of skull, 6; of spine, 1; of hip, 10; of thigh, 4; vertebral column, 2.

Eleven deaths were from gun or pistol shot; one death was from a cut.

From railway injuries there were 24 deaths.

From burns and scalds, 22 deaths occurred. Two deaths from falling into boiling water; one from lighting a fire with kerosene; the rest, unspecified.

From poisoning, 7 deaths occurred,—from opiates, 4; eating clams, 1; in two instances, the character of the poison was not specified.

From drowning, 73 lives were lost,—falling from a wharf, 2; falling through the ice, 1; the upsetting of a canoe, 1; falling into a well, 1, a child. The rest were unspecified.

The returns indicate that 4 deaths occurred from machinery accidents. Two persons were lost at sea.

The death-rate from accident in this State was 4.33; in Vermont, 5.33; in Massachusetts, 8.31; in Rhode Island, 6.23; in Connecticut, 6.94.

Homicide.—Under this group 6 deaths were registered. This is equivalent to a death-rate of 0.10. For homicide the rate for New Hampshire was, in the same year, 0.03; for Vermont, 0.15; for Massachusetts, 0.11; Rhode Island, 0.24; and Connecticut, 0.11. The total number of homicides in New England was 54 (29 in 1893).

Suicide.—Within the year, 39 persons took their own lives (59 in 1892 and the same number in 1893), 28 males and 11 females. Of the males, the occupation of 8 was farmer; 4, laborer; 4, sailor; 2, machinist; 1, treasurer of a savings bank; 1, school supervisor; 1, contractor; 1, lumberman; 1, mason; 1, carpenter; 1, harness maker; 3, not stated.

Of the females, the occupation of 4 was returned as housewife, and 2 as housekeeper; 1, housework; 1, servant; 1, dressmaker; and the occupation of 2 is not given.

As to the means employed, 11 committed suicide by hanging, 5 by shooting, 6 by drowning, 2 by cuts, 7 with poison, and in 8 the method was not stated.

The youngest suicide was a boy of 15 years and 3 months; the oldest, a man of 88. The largest number of suicides in any one month was 6 in June. There were 5 in November and the same number in December. By quarters, the suicides were, 5, 11, 9, 14. The largest number in any county was 6 in Cumberland; the highest death-rate from suicide was in Franklin county. The rate for the State per 10,000 of population was 0.59; that of Vermont in the same year was 0.90; Massachusetts, 1.01; Rhode Island, 1.20; Connecticut, 1.39.

# NOTES TO ACCOMPANY CLASSIFICATION OF THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

No argument is needed to convince the thoughtful person of the many uses and the value of well-kept records of births, marriages, and deaths, and correct statistics based upon them. Much of the value of mortality statistics depends upon the care with which reports of the causes of death are made, and the certainty with which they may be interpreted in this office.

As a help in making clear what is required in reports of the causes of death, the following explanatory notes are appended:

The omission of a single fact, called for in the blank certificate of death, may appear but a trivial matter; but, if it is place of birth, the nativity of the decedent cannot be tabulated and it adds one more to the column "unknown." If age or sex is omitted, the same is true, and an aid which may be needed in placing the death under its real cause is not at hand.

A cause of death may be unclassifiable because the anatomical part affected is not given. Examples: hemorrhage, inflammation, congestion, suppuration, abscess, mortification, dropsy, tumor.

Again, the omission to specify the part affected is a bar to satisfactory classification though it may not render the death entirely unclassifiable. Examples: tuberculosis, cancer.

Classification is sometimes impossible because mere symptoms, instead of causes of death are given. Examples: exhaustion, debility, weakness, asthenia, shock, coma, asphyxia, heart failure.

Faulty nomenclature is a cause of uncertain interpretation. Examples: inflammation of the bowels, typhoid pneumonia. Accuracy should not be sacrificed by the use of popular terms. "Inflammation of the bowels" suggests several diseases but indicates none definitely. The same is true of "typhoid pneumonia."

When two definite causes of death are stated, their relative malposition is a cause of uncertainty. "Heart disease and rheumatism" looks like a transposition. If the cause of death was acute rheumatism followed by heart disease, it should be so stated, or if brevity is imperative, "rheumatism, heart disease."

Please remember that a death can be classified under only a single cause. A redundance of causes is sometimes confusing, but an additional explanatory word or two is often of great service and gratefully received.

The following causes of death properly or improperly used are arranged alphabetically for convenience of reference.

Abscess. State location and cause.

Accident. State cause and character.

Albuminuria. State attendant disease, causal condition.

Aneurism. State location and mode of death.

Ascites. If possible, state cause.

Asphyxia. State cause or circumstances.

Asthenia. Should give cause or attending conditions.

Atrophy. Needs explanation.

Bilious Colic. See 123 of Classification.

Blood Poisoning. Too ill-defined. See "Septicemia."

Bowels, disease of. Is indefinite.

Bowels, inflammation of. Enteritis? Peritonitis?

Burns and Scalds. State how the injury happened and by what.

Cancer. Give part affected.

Carbuncle. Do not use for malignant pustule, or anthrax of man.

Cellulitis. State part affected.

Childbirth. State cause and mode of death. See "Classification."

Calculus. State kind, and mode of death.

Caries. State part affected.

Congestion of Lungs. Pneumonia? Bronchitis? Or a symptom of other pathologic process?

Convulsions. What variety! Epileptic? Puerperal? Uremic? State the determining cause if possible.

Croup. Membranous?

Debility. State cause or circumstances.

Dentition. Avoid, if possible, or state the mode of death and its cause.

Dropsy. State parts affected and, if possible, the cause.

Drowning. State how it happened, and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.

Enteritis, Entero-Colitis. State whether diarrhea was present.

Erysipelas. State part affected, and whether surgical or what.

Exhaustion. Cause of "exhaustion?"

Fever. State kind of fever.

Fistula. Alone, is too indefinite.

Flooding. Avoid. See Class VI, Group 9.

Fractures. What bone; what mode of death?

Gangrene. State parts and causes.

Gastro Enteritis. In this office must be classed as Gastritis or Enteritis: Please advise which, and whether diarrhea was present.

Heart Failure. But slightly better than "unknown." Avoid its use if possible, or add cause of heart failure.

Heart disease. State variety and cause if possible.

Hernia. If strangulated, or subjected to operation, please state so.

Hemorrhage. State seat of, and cause.

Hydatids. State parts affected.

Infantile Fever. If typhoid, please state so; otherwise must be relegated to the ill-defined class.

Innutrition. As the result of what?

Intemperance. Use "Alcoholism" instead, or qualifying words.

Jaundice. If known, state cause.

Malarial Diseases. Use only for the disease caused by the specific parasite of malarial disease, and say whether it was contracted outside this State.

Malformation. State kind and whether congenital.

Marasmus. Objectionable; if used, state cause.

Malnutrition. State cause.

Malignant Pustule. Use only for the disease which is caused by the inoculation of the anthrax bacillus.

Metritis. State whether puerperal.

Mortification. If used, state kind and parts involved.

Necrosis. State seat, cause, and mode of death.

Neurasthenia. State cause.

Ovarian Tumor. State mode of death, whether following operation or otherwise.

Paralysis of Brain. (?)

Pelvic Cellulitis. State whether puerperal.

Perforation of Intestines. If following typhoid fever, state so.

Peritonitis. State whether idiopathic, puerperal, traumatic, or a sequel of appendicitis.

Phlebitis. State cause, variety and seat.

Phthisis. Is very often transcribed "phthisic" by town clerks. Please do not use alone.

Poisoning. State by what, and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.

Privation. Without explanation is ill-defined.

Septicemia. State whether puerperal, traumatic, surgical.

Shock. Surgical? Apoplexy? Fright? Should not be used alone.

Spine, Disease of. Should state whether disease of vertebræ or spinal cord.

Starvation. State circumstances.

Stillborn. Should be used only for children that have never breathed—those that are born dead.

Strangulation. State what kind or what circumstances.

Suffocation. From what cause?

Suicide. By what instrument, means, or mode?

Teething. Is ill-defined. Avoid its use if possible.

Thrombosis. State location.

Tuberculosis. State what parts affected, or if generalized, parts primarily or principally involved.

Tumor. Give kind, location and mode of death.

Ulcers and Ulceration. State location and nature.

Uremia. State cause, or with what diseases or conditions associated.

Wounds. State with what inflicted, and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.

The foregoing list comprises the assigned causes of death which have given the most trouble in this office. Without being unmindful of the difficulty in some cases of making an exact diagnosis, the undersigned begs to request that the terms used in certifying the causes of death be such as to leave no doubt in the mind of the registrar as to the intended diagnosis of the cause of death.

# ON THE CLASSIFICATION OF THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

(Reprinted from the First Annual Report.)

A registrar about to adopt a system of classification of the causes of death for his State must be very uncritical and easily satisfied to be pleased with any of the arrangements which he finds in use. In various states of our Union, the classifications differ among themselves enough so that he who would compare the statistical results of one state with those of another must constantly be on the alert that the classes or groups of diseases compared, contain the same individual causes of death. Recent investigations into the causes of diseases have so changed our conceptions of the nature of many of them that the existing nosologies appear antiquated. As Mr. Wynter Blyth has said, "the present classification was based upon an old—a dying—pathology."

Nevertheless, the compiler of this report deems it altogether out of place to attempt to satisfy himself with a rearrangement. He has, however, ventured a few changes which will, undoubtedly, place a few of the individual causes of death and groups of diseases more in line with the places to which they will be assigned in the future.

The most important innovation has been the placing of tuberculosis in its various forms, and syphilis, in the group of "Specific Neoplastic Diseases," a term which was, I believe, suggested by the Society of Medical Officers of Health of England. Zymotic Diseases has been retained as a convenient designation of the first class of causes of death; but as a name for the first group, or order, under this class, infectious diseases has been substituted for the objectionable term miasmatic diseases.

Minor changes are the removal of croup from the respiratory diseases and placing it after diphtheria, a position which it already occupies in the classification in use in some of the states. Tonsil-

itis has also been placed near diphtheria as a designation of certain affections, sometimes fatal, and not always differentiated with certainty from diphtheria. Tetanus is included with the infectious diseases and the malarial diseases have also been grouped with the infectious diseases. In some American lists of the causes of death they already occupy that position, but in the table in use by the registrar general of England these diseases form a group by themselves.

Under the diarrheal diseases, infantile diarrhea is used instead of cholera infantum, and scurvy and rickets are both placed under the dietetic diseases. In the group of diseases of the nervous system, inflammation of the brain or its membrane, as used in the English tables, is much better than some of the terms under which diseases of this kind are classed in this country.

## STATE OF MAINE.

# LAWS RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION OF VITAL STATISTICS, 1895.

Chapter 118. Laws of 1891, as Amended by Chapter 233, Laws of 1893, and Chapter 154, Laws of 1895.

- Section 1. The secretary of the State Board of Health shall be the registrar of vital statistics for the State, and shall furnish to clergymen, and others authorized to marry, to sextons, to physicians, town clerks, clerks of the society of Friends, and to clerks of courts, a copy of this act; and suitable blanks for recording births, marriages, deaths and divorces, so printed, with appropriate headings, as readily to show the following facts and such others as may be deemed necessary to secure an accurate registration.
- I. The record of a birth shall state its date and place of occurrence, full Christian and surname, if named, color and sex of child, whether living or still-born, and the full Christian and surnames, color, occupation, residence and birthplace of parents.
- II. The record of a marriage shall state its date and place of occurrence, the name, residence, and official character of the person by whom solemnized, the full Christian and surnames of the parties, the age, color, occupation, and residence of each, the condition, whether single or widowed, whether first, second or other marriage; and the full Christian and surnames, residence, color, occupation, and birthplace of their parents.
- III. The record of a death shall state its date, the full Christian and surname of the deceased, the sex, color, condition, whether single or married, age, occupation, place of birth, place of death, the full Christian and surnames and birthplaces of parents, and he disease or other cause of death, so far as known.

- Section 2. The attending physician, accoucheur, midwife, or other person in charge, who shall attend at the birth of any child, living or still-born, within the limits of any town or city in this State, shall report to the clerk of such town or city within six days thereafter, all the facts regarding such birth, as required in section one of this act.
- Section 3. Every person authorized to unite persons in marriage shall make a record of every marriage solemnized before him, in conformity with the requisitions prescribed for blank records of marriages in section one of this act, and shall within six days thereafter, deliver or forward to the clerk of each town in which the marriage intention was recorded, a copy of such record of marriage.
- Section 4. Whenever any person shall die, or any still-born child shall be brought forth in this State, the undertaker, town clerk, or other person superintending the burial of said deceased person, shall obtain from the physician attending at such bringing forth or last sickness, a certificate, duly signed, setting forth as far as may be, the facts required in the record of a death, according to section one of this act; and it shall be the duty of the undertaker, or other person having charge of the burial of said deceased person, to add to said certificate the date and place of the proposed burial; and having duly signed the same, to forward it to the clerk of the town or city, where said person died, and obtain a permit for burial; and in case of any contagious or infectious disease, said certificate shall be made and forwarded immediately.
- Section 5. In the case of any deceased person not having had the attendance of a physician in his or her last sickness, the town clerk may issue and sign the certificate of death, upon presentation of such facts as may be obtained of relatives, persons in attendance upon said deceased person during said last sickness, or present at the time of death or from any other source, and the permit for burial shall be issued upon such information. Said certificate and permit shall not be required before burial in cases where it is impracticable to obtain the same within a reasonable time after death, but in all such cases, said certificate shall be obtained as soon as practicable after death.
- SECTION 6. Parents shall give notice to the clerk of their city or town of the births or deaths of their children; every house-

holder shall give notice of every birth and death happening in his house; the eldest person next of kin shall give such notice of the death of his kindred; the keeper of a workhouse, house of correction, prison, hospital, almshouse, or other institution, and the master br other commanding officer of a ship, shall give like notice of every birth or death happening among the persons under his charge.

Section 7. Except as provided in section five, no interment or disinterment of the dead body of any human being, or disposition thereof in any tomb, vault or cemetery, shall be made without a permit as aforesaid, from the clerk of the town or city, where said person died, nor otherwise than in accordance with such permit. No undertaker or other person shall assist in, assent to, or allow any such interment or disinterment to be made, except as provided in section five, until such permit has been given as aforesaid; and it shall be the duty of every undertaker or other person having charge of any burial place as aforesaid, who shall receive such permit, to preserve and return the same to the clerk of the town within six days after the day of burial.

Section 8. The town or city clerk shall appoint two suitable and proper persons, in each town or city, as sub-registrars, who shall be authorized to issue burial permits based upon a death certificate, as hereinbefore provided, in the same manner as is required of the town or city clerk; and the said record of death upon which the permit is issued shall be forwarded to the town clerk within six days after receiving the same, and all permits by whomsoever issued shall be returned to the town clerk as required by section seven of this act. The appointment of sub-registrars shall be made with reference to locality, so as to best suit the convenience of the inhabitants of the town, and such appointment shall be in writing and recorded in the office of the town or city clerk.

Section 9. Town clerks and sub-registrars may issue burial permits to persons in contiguous towns, when by so doing it would be more convenient for those seeking a permit, but in all cases the permit shall be made returnable to the town clerk of the town in which the death occurred.

Section 10. The assessors shall, when taking the annual inventory, collect and return to the town clerk, before the first day of June, the births which have occurred within their respective

jurisdictions, during the year ending December thirty-first next preceding, together with the names of such children.

Section 11. The clerk of every town shall keep a chronological record of all births, marriages, and deaths reported to him, and shall annually, in the month of June, transmit a copy of the record of all births, marriages, and deaths occurring during the year ending December thirty-first next preceding such said report, to the state registrar, together with the names, residences, and official stations of all such persons as have neglected to make returns to him in relation to the subject matters of such records, which the law required them to make, all to be made upon blanks to be prepared and furnished by the state registrar.

Section 12. The clerk of courts for the several counties shall, annually, during the month of February, make returns to the registrar of vital statistics in relating to libels for divorce in their respective counties for the calendar year next preceding. Such returns shall specify the following details; the number of divorces granted, and the names of the parties including the maiden name, and any other former name of female, if any, when ascertainable.

Section 13. The state registrar shall cause the returns made to him in pursuance of the preceding sections eleven and twelve to be arranged alphabetically for convenient reference, and carefully preserved in his office. He shall annually make and publish a general abstract and report of the returns of the preceding year in such form as will render them of practical utility, not more than two thousand five hundred copies of which shall be printed and bound in cloth, one copy of which shall be forwarded to every town, one copy to each senator and representative, one copy to each state and territory in the union, and the remainder to such departments, libraries and persons as the state registrar shall direct.

Section 14. The sum of twenty-five hundred dollars per annum, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for printing and binding the circulars and blanks, for postage, and to defray the expenses of clerical work in carrying out the provisions of this act.

Section 15. The town clerk's record of any birth, marriage or death, or a duly certified copy thereof, shall be *prima facie* evidence of such birth, marriage or death, in any judicial proceeding.

If any person shall willfully neglect or refuse to SECTION 16. perform any duty imposed upon him by the provisions of this act, it shall be a misdemeanor, and he shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars for each offense, for the use of the town in which the offense occurred, and it shall be the duty of the state registrar to enforce this section as far as comes within his power, and when the state registrar knows, or has good reason to believe, that any penalty or forfeiture under this act has been incurred, he shall at his discretion forthwith give notice thereof, in writing, to the county attorney of the county in which said penalty or forfeiture has occurred, which notice shall state as near as may be, the time of such neglect, the name of the person or persons incurring the penalty or forfeiture, and such other facts relating to the default of duty as said state registrar may have been able to learn, and upon receipt of such notice the county attorney shall prosecute the defaulting person or persons.

The clerk of each city or town shall be paid by SECTION 17. such city or town for receiving, recording and returning the facts required to be recorded by this act, the sum of fifteen cents for each birth, marriage and death, and for each birth or death duly reported to the town clerk, physicians shall receive twenty-five cents from the town in which the birth or death has occurred. shall be the duty of the town clerk to enforce, so far as comes within his power, sections three, four, six, seven and ten, of chapter one hundred and eighteen, laws of eighteen hundred and ninetyone, and when he knows of any birth, marriage or death, which is not reported to his office in accordance with the provisions of said chapter, he shall collect, so far as he is able to do so, the facts called for in the blank certificates of birth, of marriage, or of death, as furnished by the state registrar, and shall record them as is prescribed in said chapter one hundred and eighteen; and for every birth, marriage or death thus collected and recorded he shall receive from the town the sum of twenty-five cents.

Section 18. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed. [Approved March 30, 1891.]

Section 19. A physician who has attended a person during his last illness shall, when requested, forthwith furnish for registration

a certificate stating, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the name of the deceased, his age, the disease of which he died, and the date of his death; and a physician or midwife who has attended at the birth of a child dying immediately thereafter, or at the birth of a still-born child, shall, when requested, forthwith furnish for registration a certificate, stating to the best of his knowledge and belief, the fact that such child died after birth or was born dead. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to make a false return in regard to any birth or death.

Section 20. When a birth, marriage or death occurs in an unincorporated place, it shall be reported to the town clerk in the town which is nearest to the place at which the birth, marriage or death took place, and shall be recorded by the town clerk to whom the report is made; and all such reports and records shall be made and recorded and returned to the state registrar as is provided in chapter one hundred and eighteen, laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one.

Section 21. The clerk of each town shall, on the first Monday of each month, make a certified copy of the record of all deaths and births recorded in the books of said town during the previous month, whenever the deceased person, or the parents of the child born were resident in any other town in this State at the time of said death or birth, or whenever they were recently resident in any other town, or whenever the remains of any deceased person have been carried to any other town for burial; and shall transmit said certified copies to the clerk of the town in which said deceased person or parents were resident at or near the time of said birth or death, or to which the remains of such deceased person have been carried for burial, stating in addition the name of the street and the number of the house, if any, where such deceased person or parents so resided, whenever the same can be ascertained; and the clerk so receiving such certified copies shall record the same in the books kept for recording deaths or births.

Such certified copies shall be made upon blanks to be furnished for that purpose by the registrar of vital statistics.

Section 22. No body of a deceased person whose death was caused by cholera, yellow fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever, small pox or other pestilential disease, shall be removed from place to place in this State by any railroad, steam-

boat or other common carrier, unless there shall be attached to the outer case in which said body is inclosed, a certificate from the board of health where such person died, stating the disease causing such death, and that necessary precautions against infection satisfactory to said board have been observed. It is further provided, that a certificate of death giving heart failure as the only cause of death shall not be deemed sufficient upon which to issue a burial permit, and such certificate must be returned to the physician who made it for the proper correction and definition. If the body of a deceased person is brought into this state from without for burial, and if it is accompanied by a permit issued by the legally constituted authorities of the state from which it was brought, such permit shall be received as sufficient authority upon which the clerk of the town in which said body is to be buried shall issue a permit for burial; but if it is not accompanied by such permit, then the person or persons in charge of it shall apply for a burial permit to the clerk of the town in which it is to be buried, and the clerk of the town shall issue such permit when furnished with satisfactory information.

Section 23. The provisions of this act shall be enforced, and violation hereof shall be punished, as provided by section sixteen of chapter one hundred and eighteen of the public laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, unless otherwise provided for by law.

SECTION 24. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.
