



REGISTRATION REPORT, 1893.

The delay in the appearance of this report is again due to the large amount of preliminary work which was required in eliminating, so far as practicable, errors, possible errors, and deficiencies in the returns before the tabulations were begun. Abstracts, or copies of a large number of records of births, of marriages, and of deaths were returned for a more complete statement of facts, or for the removal of doubt. It is believed that this part of the work will rapidly diminish as the people at large and those in particular whose duty it is to make returns, learn just what is wanted by this department.

Population.—According to the report of the eleventh census, the population of the State of Maine was 661,086 in 1890. The population of the State was 648,936 in 1880. There was, therefore, a gain of 12,150 in the decade between the two last census enumerations: This represents the balance of gain over loss, for seven counties suffered a diminution of population aggregating 12,906 while 25,056 persons were added to the population of nine other counties. The following table shows the gain or loss in each county:

Sex.—Table No. 2 shows the ratio of the sexes at the two census enumerations (1880 and 1890) not only for the State of Maine but for the other New England States as well. It will be noted that, at the last census enumeration, the number of females in the State of Maine was smaller than that of the males, that this was true in Vermont at both census periods, and that in the other states there has been an excess of females in both census years.

REGISTRATION REPORT.

Density of Population.—Table No. 3 shows the comparative density of the population in the several New England States at the last two census enumerations. The extremes of density were in Maine and Rhode Island, there being in 1890, 22.1 persons per square mile in Maine, and 318.4 per square mile in Rhode Island.

In our own State, as is shown in the map which accompanies this report, a large part of some of the counties is unsettled and covered with forest. This timbered region is represented by the shaded portion of the map. It results, therefore, that the degree of density differs quite widely in the different counties. The following is a tabular statement of the comparative density of the population in the several counties.

Birth, Marriage, and Death Rates.—In this report the birthrates, marriage-rates, and death-rates from all causes, are stated as so many among each 1000 of the population as shown by the census of 1890.

Death-rates from individual causes, or from groups of diseases are expressed as per 10,000.

As the gain in the population of the State was so small between the last two census enumerations, only 12,150, it makes but a slight difference in the rate and that only in the decimal of the number standing for it, whether it is based upon the results of the last census returns, or upon the estimated population. It is, however, probable that the rate of increase during the current decade has been considerably more rapid than it was between 1880 and 1890.

Relation of Births to Deaths.—As the total number of births registered in Maine in the year 1893 was 13,908 and the number of deaths was 11,135, the natural increase of births over deaths was 2773.

In the following table it appears that, in some of the counties, there has been a natural loss of population due to the fact that the number of registered deaths exceeds the number of births.

A comparison of the tables already given offers interesting suggestions as to the conditions which are influencing gain or loss of population in the different parts of the State. Generally it may be said that in the older counties in which agriculture is the leading industry and in which large manufacturing centers are absent, the census enumeration shows either a loss or only a very slight gain in population. In the same places, the town clerks' returns exhibit generally either a preponderance of deaths over births, or only a slight excess in the number of births, as compared with the number of deaths.

NOTES ON BIRTHS.

In the State of Maine, in the year 1893, 14,604 births were registered, including still-births (14,028 in 1892).

The number of living children born was 13,908, and the number of still-births was 696.

Of the whole number of living children of which the sex was certified, 7,185 were males and 6,685 were females. In 38 births the sex was not stated. For each 100 girls born there were 107.4 boys, (106.7 in 1892.)

This preponderance of the births of boys over girls conforms with the results of the registration of births almost everywhere. Thus, the number of boys to each 100 girls is, in New Hampshire (1893), 108.4; in Vermont (1893), 106.5; in Massachusetts (1893), 104.6; England and Wales (1893), 103.8; France, 106.4; Germany, 106.2; Italy, 107.1; Sweden, 105; Greece, 112.

Birth-Rate.—The birth-rate of living children for the State was 21.04 for each 1,000 of population, using the figures as given in the census returns for 1890 as the basis of calculation.

The birth-rate of the different counties varied widely. It was the highest in Aroostook, 32.44, and the lowest in Waldo, 15.67. In six counties, Aroostook, Cumberland, Piscataquis, Androscoggin, Washington and York, the birth-rate was above that of the whole State. The birth-rate in each county is shown in Tables No. 5 and No. 10.

For the purpose of comparison it may be stated that in 1893 the birth-rate in New Hampshire was 22.17; in Vermont, 20.51; in Massachusetts, 27.55; in Rhode Island, 26.47; in Connecticut, 25.4; in England and Wales, 30.8; in Scotland, 31; in Ireland, 23; in Germany, 36.7; Denmark, 30.6; Norway, 30.7; Hungary, 42.5; Switzerland, 28.5; The Netherlands, 33.8; Belgium, 29.5.

Parentage. Of the total births in the State, 63.17 per cent. were of native parents; 18.29 per cent. were of foreign parentage; 13.75 per cent. were of parents, one of whom was foreign; while of 4.79 per cent. the nationality was not stated.

Lincoln county, as in 1892, had the largest percentage of nativeborn parents, to wit, 93.10 per cent. (89.30 in 1892). Waldo

followed with 90.80 per cent. of native parentage (89.10 in 1892), and only 1.15 per cent. in which both parents were foreign-born.

In Hancock county, in 88.09 per cent. of the births, the parents were native-born.

In Oxford the percentage was 84.74, and in Franklin 80.89.

Low percentages of native-born parents were shown in Androscoggin county, where, in 43.06 per cent. of the births, the parents were native-born, and 41.92 per cent. were foreign-born; and in York county with 50.43 per cent., and in Aroostook with 51.58 per cent. of the parents native-born.

The percentages of parentage, whether American-born or foreign-born may be found for the other counties in Table No. 14.

Comparing the parentage of the births in our twenty cities with that of the rest of the State, we find that in the cities, 42.02 per cent. of the births were of American parentage, while in the rural parts of the State, the percentage of American born children was 73.36.

The largest percentage of foreign-born parents was in Biddeford, 65.88, and in Lewiston, 63.96 per cent.

The lowest percentage of foreign-born parents was again in Belfast where no birth was reported in which both parents were foreign, while in Ellsworth only 4.54 percent., and in Rockland 8.43 percent. of the births had both parents foreign-born. For further comparisons see Table No. 15.

Comparing the statistics of the other New England states with our 63.17 per cent. of American-born parents, we find that in 1893, in New Hampshire 48.56 per cent. of the births were of American parentage; in Vermont, 84.58 per cent.; in Massachusetts, 32.43 per cent.; in Rhode Island, 32.87 per cent.; and in Connecticut 41.8 per cent.; thus, with the exception of Vermont, the percentage of American parentage is greater than in any other New England state.

Season and Births.—The largest number of births in any one month in 1898 was 1,273 in May; the smallest was 1,032 in November; the largest quarterly total was 3,694 in the second quarter; the smallest, 3,267 in the last quarter.

In the first quarter there were 3,395 births, (8,474 in 1892).

In the second quarter there were 3,694, births, (3,774 in 1892). In the third quarter there were 3,504 births, (3,557 in 1892). In the fourth quarter there were 3,267 births, (3,160 in 1892).

The three consecutive months in which the largest number of births occurred were April, May and June, 3,694.

Twin Births.—In 1893, 106 twin births occurred; in 41 instances the twins were both ooys; in 40, both girls; in 25, a boy and a girl. In 61 cases the parentage was American; in 25, foreign; and in 16 instances the parentage was mixed. Of the 212 children, 187 were born alive, and 25 were still-born.

Triplets in Lewiston. Other facts may be learned by consulting tables No. 16 and No. 17.

Still Births.—Of the 696 still-born children, 373 were males, and 275 females. In 48 the sex was not stated. With the exception of 10 still-births, as to which the nativity of the mother was not stated, 484 were of American mothers, and 202 were of foreign mothers.

The largest number of still-births, 117, occurred in Cumberland county, while the minimum number, 7, was reported in Piscataquis county.

The largest number of still-births, 66, was returned in October; the smallest number in any one month was 31 in August. See Tables No. 18 and No. 19 for other details. •

NOTES ON MARRIAGES.

There were 5,795 marriages registered in the State during the year 1893 (5,726 in 1892). This gives a marriage-rate of 17.52 (persons married) to every 1,000 of population, or the rate of 8.76 marriages per 1,000 persons.

The marriage-rate was higher in Knox county than elsewhere in the State, it being for that county 20.20 per 1,000. The lowest marriage-rate, that of 13.46 per 1,000, was in Sagadahoc county. See table No. 5.

Comparing the marriage-rate of Maine (17.52 per 1,000) with that of the other New England states and some foreign countries, we find that for the same year, 1893, it was in New Hampshire 21.72; Vermont, 17.70; Massachusetts, 18.71; Rhode Island, 18.7; Connecticut, 16; England and Wales, 14.7; Scotland, 13.2; Ireland, 9.4; Germany, 15.8; Denmark, 14.1; Norway, 12.8; Hungary, 18.6; Switzerland, 14.7; The Netherlands, 14.6; Belgium, 15.2; Italy, 14.7.

As to the nativity of the persons married, there is for this year, as in the preceding year, an incompleteness in Table No. 20 due to the failure of some of the town clerks to return the birth-place of groom and bride, called for in the blanks sent from this office. Of the 5,125 records of marriage upon which these facts are based, in 74 per cent. the groom and bride were both American; in 11 per -cent. both were of foreign birth; in 7 per cent. the groom was American and the bride of foreign birth; while in 8 per cent. a foreign groom and American bride were united.

The largest number of marriages, 652, were solemized in June and the same number in November, while the smallest number in any one month, 315, occurred in February. See table No. 21.

As to the ages of the persons contracting marriage, the largest number both of grooms and brides were between 20 and 25 years of age. While still under 15 years of age, 14 brides were married; in the age-period 15-20 years, there were 179 grooms and 1,621 brides; in the period 20-25 years, 2,189 men and 2,243 women were married; from 25-30, 1,633 men and 877 women; from 30-35, 653 men and 395 women; from 35-40, 387 men and 237 women; from 40-45, 244 men and 137 women; from 45-50, 161 men and 93

women; from 50-55, 108 men and 55 women; from 55-60, 87 men and 36 women; from 60-70, 103 men and 46 women; from 70-80, 27 men and 10 women; over 80, 3 men. See Table No. 22.

In 806 marriages the bride was older than the groom; 781 widowers and 481 widows were remarried; 120 men and 149 women were remarried after having been divorced from a former marriage.

Table No. 23 exhibits the fact that 4,685 men and 4,970 women were married the first time; that 934 men and 714 women were married a second time; that 120 men and 63 women were united in a third marriage; while 14 men and 4 women contracted marriage a fourth time.

The oldest groom was 88 years of age and the oldest bride was 78.

In one marriage the age of the bride was 30 while that of the groom was 70; in another the respective ages were 16 and 54; in another, 15 and 56; in another, 16 and 63. In one marriage in which the groom and bride were both 78 years of age, the number of the marriage was the fifth for the bride, and the second for the groom.

NOTES ON DIVORCES.

Six hundred and twenty-seven divorces were decreed in the year 1893, (552 in 1892) and this is at the rate of over one divorce to every ten marriages solemnized within the same year.

Some of the causes for which divorces were granted are : adultery, 81, or 12.9 per cent. of the whole number; extreme cruelty, 13, or 2 per cent.; desertion, 194, or 30.9 per cent.; intoxication, 43, or 6.85 per cent.; cruel and abusive treatment, 114, or 18.18 per cent.; failure to support, 40, or 6.38 per cent. The other divorces were granted for multiple or associated causes.

The wife was the libellant in 461 divorces, and the husband in 166.

In the divorces granted for adultery, the husband was the libellant 53 times, and the wife 28 times.

On account of extreme cruelty, the wife was the libellant in 12 cases, and the husband in 1.

For desertion, the husband was the libellant in 77 times, and the wife in 117.

For intoxication, the husband was the libellant in 6 cases, and the wife in 37.

For cruel and abusive treatment, the husband was the libellant in 17 instances, and the wife in 97.

For failure to support, the wife was the libellant in the 40 divorces decreed for that cause.

One divorce was granted before the marriage life had lasted 6 months; 12, before one year; 156, after from 1 to 5 years marriage; 174, after from 5 to 10 years; 196, after 10 to 20 years; 67, after 20 to 30 years; and 17, after more than 30 years married life. Tables No. 24 and 25 may be consulted for more detailed statements.

NOTES ON DEATHS AND THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

Death-Rates.—In the year 1893, 11,134 deaths were registered in the State (12,147 in 1892), which is equivalent to a death-rate of 16.84 for every 1,000 of population as returned by the census of 1890 (18.37 in 1892). Based on the population for 1893, estimated either by the arithmetical or geometrical method, the deathrate would be, 16.74.

By referring to Table No. 5, it will be seen that the death-rate of Aroostook county was lower than that of any other county, being only 12.72, while the older counties, Kennebec, York, Franklin, Cumberland and Knox show death-rates of 20.24, 19.72, 18.98, 18.90 and 18.09, respectively.

The death-rate in the cities was 19.89 (20.46 in 1892) as compared with that of the rest of the State with the cities subtracted which death-rate was 15.54 (17.46 in 1892.)

The mortality during the year 1893 was markedly lower than in the preceding year, and in the absence of a general epidemic of influenza, such as prevailed in the early part of 1892, or of other cause which might be presumed to unusually swell the mortalityrate, the figures herein given, it may be hoped, are more nearly indicative of the average death-rate which will be shown by the returns for a series of years.

In the first annual report it was stated that, "it appears not far from the truth to affirm that the epidemic of influenza (la grippe) cost this State 1,000 lives in 1892, and raised the death-rate correspondingly." Otherwise than by the deaths returned for 1892 as from influenza, the death-rate was raised by the epidemic influence of this disease upon the prevalence and fatality of various other causes of death, particularly by the increase in the deaths from the respiratory diseases. In 1892 there were 755 deaths from influenza, and in that year there were 378 more deaths from pneumonia and bronchitis than in 1893, or a total of 1,133 deaths which we may apparently ascribe to the presence of influenza. It would seem, therefore, that, after making due allowance for errors in the diagnosis of influenza, its own mortality and its influence upon various other diseases was the cause of not less than 1,000 deaths in 1892. The total number of deaths in 1892 exceeded those of 1893 by 1,013.

Death-Rates Compared.—For the year 1893 the death-rate of Maine was 16.84; of New Hampshire, 20.35; of Vermont, 16.76; of Massachusetts, 20.13; Rhode Island, 19.6; Connecticut, 18.6; England and Wales, 19.2; Scotland, 19.4; Ireland, 17.9; Germany, 24.6; Denmark, 18.9; Norway, 16.4; Hungary, 31.1; Switzerland, 20.5; The Netherlands, 19.2; Belgium, 20.3; Italy, 25.3.

Season and Mortality.—The largest number of deaths occurred in August, 1,080; the smallest number of deaths in any one month was 796 in November. In 1892, the largest number of deaths fell in January with a high mortality in February and March, and the smallest number of deaths was in November, with an increase of only 3 in December.

During the spring months 2,965 deaths occurred; during the summer, 2,722; during the autumn, 2,688; in the winter, 2,731.

In the first quarter of the year there were 2,653 deaths (3,964 in 1892).

In the second quarter there were 2,825 deaths (2,926 in 1892).

In the third quarter there were 2,878 deaths (2,780 in 1892).

In the last quarter there were 2,750 deaths (2,427 in 1892).

In 1892 the diminution in the number of deaths progressively from the first to the last quarter of the year was very marked, due to the presence of the epidemic of influenza in the early part of that year.

In 1892 there were 1,537 more deaths in the first quarter than in the last quarter of the year.

In 1893 there were 97 more deaths in the last quarter than in the first, with no great difference in the mortality of any quarter.

Sex and Mortality.—Of the 11,134 decedents, 5,557 were males and 5,551 were females. The sex of 26 was unstated.

Among children dying before they were 5 years old, 1,351 were males and 1,080 were females; there were 271 deaths more among boys under 5 than among girls within the same age-period. On the contrary, at all the age periods from 5 to 50 years, and again, from 80 to 100 years there was a preponderance of deaths among females, while there were more deaths among males at the ages

from 50 to 80. At the age of 100 years and over, three persons of each sex died. See Table No. 29.

Age and Mortality.—The following shows the number of deaths which occurred within each age-period, and the relation which the percentage in each period bears to the whole number of deaths :

Infantile Mortality.—These numbers and percentages illustrate the well known fact that, in the earliest years of life, the rate of mortality is high. But while that is a truth of general applicability, it does not apply in a special manner to Maine as may be seen by the following comparative table :

This comparison brings out the fact that in this State the deaths of children in their early months constitute a relatively smaller percentage of the total number of deaths than in any other of the New England states, and that at the ages 1-5 years but one of the five other states presents so low a percentage. So far as statements of this kind may be taken as indicative of comparative salubrity of different states, a low mortality among children may be regarded with satisfaction. But neither the percentage of deaths at a given age, as compared with the total deaths, nor the death-rate at a given period of life based upon the total population, is of much use in comparing one place with another. If, for instance, one of the places compared, contains a relatively larger proportion of infants, no explanation, other than this fact, might be required for a comparatively high death-rate in the early period of life.

But a more trustworthy method of computing the death-rate for any given age-period is to base it upon the number of persons living at that particular age-period. As the distribution of the population by ages at the last census is still not forthcoming, it is here assumed that the age distribution of the population of the New England states differs but little from that of 1880. In the following table the death-rates are based upon the estimated number of children in each state at the two different age-periods.

The Causes of Death.—Of the 11,830 deaths, including stillbirths and premature births, the cause of 10,984 was certified, leaving 846 of which the cause of death was unspecified or so ill-defined as to preclude satisfactory classification.

By referring to table No. 26 it will be noticed that the causes of death are arranged under eight "Classes," and that the causes of death in some of the classes are distributed into several "Groups." The following notes on some of the classes and groups of diseases and individual causes of death will be arranged in accordance with the classification shown in this table 26 and the classification of the causes of death to be found in the latter part of this report.

Zymotic Diseases.—The death-rate from the zymotic diseases, is much used as an index of the healthfulness of states and municipalities, and of the efficiency of their sanitary organizations.

Applying it as a sanitary yard-stick to our State, its various counties and its cities, is an interesting diversion, and extended over a series of years will give results of value. Lists of the zymotic diseases usually include small-pox, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, whooping cough, diphtheria and croup, and the diarrheal diseases. The following shows the number of deaths that resulted from each of these in 1893 in each of the New England states and in England and Wales, the total deaths from these causes, and the zymotic death-rate per 10,000 :

ZYMOTIC DISEASES BY CITIES.

Infectious Diseases—Of the deaths caused by this group of diseases, exclusive of influenza, the number was six fewer than in the preceding year. In 1893 there were 26 more deaths from measles, 44 more from scarlet fever and 3 more from tetanus than in the preceding year. On the other hand, from diphtheria there were 37, from croup, 23; from cerebro-spinal meningitis, 8, and from whooping-cough, 3 fewer deaths than in 1892. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, including also those from "simple continued fever," etc., was exactly the same in 1893 as in the preceding year.

Small Pox -No death resulted from this disease.

Measles.—This disease caused the death of 55 persons of whom 25 were males and 30 females.

Ages: Under 1 year, 14; 1-5, 15; 5-10, 3; 10-20, 6; 20-30, 4; 30-40, 3; 40-50, 1; 50-60, 7; 60-70, 1; and over 80, 1.

In the first quarter of the year, there were 17 deaths; in the second, 23; in the third, 12; in the last, 3. Ten of the deaths were in cities. The largest number of deaths in any county was 11 in Penobscot. Three deaths from measles occurred in Bangor and the same in Biddeford. No other city had more than one death from this cause.

Per 10,000 of population, the death-rate for the State from this cause was 0.83. In some countries there is a higher rate of mortality from measles. For the five years, 1887-91, it was in Italy, 6.17; France (cities), 5.18; England, 4.68; Prussia, 3.20. In the New England states in 1893, it was 0.83 in New Hampshire; 0.27 in Vermont; 1.23 in Massachusetts; 2.64 in Rhode Island; 0.72 in Connecticut. Measles was the cause of 541 deaths in the six New England states, and of 11,110 deaths in England and Wales in 1893.

Scarlet-Fever.—The total mortality from this disease was 80 (36 in 1892),—39 males and 41 females. All but 16 of the decedents were under ten years of age; forty-four were between the first and the fifth year.

The largest number was in September, 12. There were 18 deaths in the first quarter, 23 in the second, 23 in the third, and 16 in the the last three months. York county had 33 deaths, the largest county number. Of the 80 deaths from this disease, 37 were in the cities. The following is an exhibit of the scarlet fever deaths arranged by counties, months and age-periods:

SCARLET FEVER BY COUNTIES, MONTHS AND AGE-PERIODS.

The scarlatinal death-rate per 10,000 for the State was 1.21; for the cities, 1.89. For the same year it was, in New Hampshire, 1.35; in Vermont, 0.69; in Massachusetts, 3.62; in Rhode Island, 5.08; in Connecticut, 2.72; in England and Wales, 2.35.

Influenza.—During the year for which this report is made, 153 deaths were returned as having occurred from influenza. It is quite likely that many of these deaths occurred from other causes than "*la grippe.*" In 1892, when there was no doubt as to the presence of epidemic influenza, 34.7 per cent. of the deaths from this cause occurred in January; 28.4 in February; 13.5 in March; 9 per cent. in April; 5.9 in May; and 8.5 through the other seven months.

In 1893, the percentage distribution of the deaths from this cause was as follows: January, 8.5; February, 7.8; March, 7.2; April, 9.2; May, 11.1; June, 6.6; July, 0.6; August, 1.9; September, 2.6; October, 3.3; November, 5.2; December, 36.

During the epidemic of influenza in 1892, the age group 5-10 had the nearest approach to immunity. During the year for which this report is made the smallest number of causes occurred at the

age 40-50. The following gives the age incidence of deaths reported as having occurred from influenza:

In the preceding year a large percentage of the deaths from influenza were among elderly persons,—last year 68 per cent of the deaths from this cause were of persons 60 years of age or older, this year 60 per cent of the deaths were of persons who had reached or passed the age of 60.

The influenza death-rate for the whole State was 2.31 for each 10,000 of living population (11.43 in 1892.)

Whooping-Cough.—The number of deaths from whoopingcough was 51 (54 in 1892,) of which 19 were males and 32 females. The number of deaths in the cities was 18; there were 8 in Calais and 4 in Portland.

In 1893, whooping-cough was the cause of 519 deaths in the New England States, and 10,176 deaths in England and Wales. It is evident, therefore, that this disease is worthy of more attention than the popular impression thinks it deserves.

Ages: Under 1 year, 32; 1-2 years, 12; 2-5 years, 6; over 5 years, 1. But one of the children was over 5 years of age; 44 of them were less than 2 years old.

The death-rate in the State from whooping-cough was 0.77 per 10,000; that of the cities 0.91; of New Hampshire for the same year, 0.61; of Vermont, 0.78; of Massachusetts, 1.22; of Rhode Island, 0.60; of Connecticut, 1.53; of England and Wales, 3.42.

Diphtheria.—For this statistical year there were 69 deaths from diphtheria (106 in 1892.) Of the decedents, 34 were males and 35 were females. All but 10 of them were under 20 years of age (in 1892 of 106, all but 5;) 46 of them were less than 10 years old.

Ages: Under 1, 4; 1-5, 21; 5-10, 21; 10-20, 13; 20-30, 3; 30-40, 3; 40-50, 2, not stated, 2.

Of the 69 deaths, 27 were in the cities, and 42 in other places. The diphtheria death-rate for the State was 1.04, and for the cities, 1.38.

DIPHTHERIA BY COUNTIES AND MONTHS.

Croup.—In the preceding year the number of deaths from croup, by a curious coincidence, was the same as the number of deaths from diphtheria. This year 83 deaths occurred from croup as compared with 69 from diphtheria. Of the 83 decedents, 46 were males and 37 females, and all but 2 were less than 10 years old.

Ages: Under 1, 28; 1-5, 40; 5-10, 13; 10-20, 2.

The death-rate for croup was, for the State, 1.26; for the cities, 1.84.

CROUP BY COUNTIES AND MONTHS.

In statistical reports the figures for croup and diphtheria are often combined, for it is now generally conceded that the two diseases are etiologically the same. The combined death-rate for the two diseases is, for Maine, 2.30 per 10,000 of living population; of our cities, 3.22; and in the same year for New Hampshire, 2.63; Vermont, 4.51; Massachusetts, 6.23; Rhode Island, 5.45; Connecticut, 5.86; England and Wales, 3.89.

Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis.—The number of decedents was 30 (38 in 1892), 16 males and 14 females. Seven of these deaths were in the cities. Deaths from this cause occurred in every month excepting July; distributed by quarters, they were 9, 5, 5, 11. The death-rate from this disease was 0.45.

Ages: Under 1, 8; 1-5, 9; 5-10, 2; 10-20, 3; 20-30, 2; 30-40, 1; 40-50, 3; 50-69, 1; over 60, 1 The mortality from cerebro-spinal meningitis in the New England States and in England and Wales in 1893 was: Maine, 30 deaths; New Hampshire, 3; Vermont, 38; Massachusetts, 121; Connecticut, 124; England and Wales, 13. Thus there were in our New England States 316 deaths from cerebro-spinal meningitis, or in New England with a population not quite one-fifth of that of Old England, there were twenty-four times as many deaths from this disease in this particular year.

Tetanus.—This disease caused 10 deaths (7 in 1892), 9 males and 1 female. All of these deaths occurred from March to November. This fact will be of interest to those who understand that the chief habitat of the bacillus of tetanus is the soil, and that wounds made by instruments or objects which are not clean are more likely to be followed by this disease. In 1892 all of the cases occurred in the months from April to October. No county had more than one case save Cumberland and Penobscot; in each of these counties there were two cases.

Ages: 10-20, 4; 20-30, 1; 40-50, 1; 50-60, 1; 60-70, 8.

Typhoid Fever.—Including 10 deaths from "bilious fever," 14 from "gastric fever," 4 from "catarrhal fever," and 1 from "slow fever," there were 286 deaths from typhoid fever, the same number which was registered in the preceding year. Of these deaths, 149 were of males, and 137 of females. The age distribution of the decedents shows that the loss from this disease is principally from among those active and productive age-periods when human lives are of the greatest value to the State; 73 per cent. died between 10 and 50 years of age.

Ages: Under 1, 1; 1-5, 12; 5-10, 18; 10-20, 61; 20-30, 85; 30-40, 43; 40-50, 21; 50-60, 18; 60-70, 9; 70-80, 8; over 80, 4; not stated, 6.

The largest number of deaths, 54, occurred in October, and the smallest number, 10, in January. By quarters, 51 were in the first, 39 in the second, 81 in the third, and 114 in the last quarter of the year.

The typhoid death-rate of 5.31 in the cities is considerably greater than that in the villages and rural towns which is 2.75. The rate for the State is 4.32. The typhoid death-rate for the same year was in New Hampshire, 3.21; Vermont, 4.02; Massa-chusetts, 3.35; Rhode Island, 3.40; Connecticut, 3.45; England and Wales, 2.29.

TYPHOID FEVER.

Malarial Diseases.—With regard to the origin of the disease in the five deaths which are attributed to malarial diseases, it is stated in three of the returns that the disease was contracted outside this State. No statement of the origin of infection is made in the other two returns. Three of the deaths were of males and two of females. The ages of the five decedents were 2, 9, 20, 41 and 47 years, respectively. In the New England States the number of deaths attributed to this cause was in Massachusetts, 86; Rhode Island, 6; Connecticut, 104; and in New Hampshire and Vermont, none.

Tuberculosis.—This disease in its various forms destroys more lives year after year than any other cause. It was the cause of 1,446 deaths in the year for which this report was made (1,513 in 1892) and this is equivalent to a death-rate of 21.87 per 10,000. The death-rate from the same cause was 21.22 in New Hampshire; 19.17 in Vermont; 32.93 in Massachusetts; 22.87 in Rhode Island; 21.66 in Connecticut and 21.44 in England and Wales.

Cerebral Tuberculosis. — (Tubercular Meningitis.) — The number of deaths was 45; 21 were of males and 24 of females. The number in the cities was 20. The death-rate for the State was 0.68; for the cities, 1.02.

Ages: Under 1, 8; 1-5, 18: 5-10, 8; 10-20, 4; 20-30, 4; 30-40, 2; 40-50, 1.

Pulmonary Tuberculosis. — (Consumption.) — From this cause 1,299 deaths were registered in 1893 (1,352 in 1892.)

Ages: Under 1, 22; 1-5, 24; 5-10, 12; 10-20, 153; 20-30, 388; 30-40, 259; 40-50, 136; 50-60, 104; 60-70, 79; 70-80, 88; over 80, 26; not stated, 8.

It is thus shown in this as in the previous report that the smallest number of deaths occurred at the age-period 5 to 10 years, and that of the decedents whose ages are given, 80 per cent. die at those periods when their deaths entail the greatest loss to the State.

As to the sex, 544 of the decedents, or 41.9 per cent. were males, and 755, or 58.1 per cent. were females.

The State's death-rate from consumption was 19.64 in each 10,-000 of population; that of the cities, 22.65. Outside of our State, in the same year, the death-rate from consumption was for New Hampshire, 19.57; Vermont, 17.36; Massachusetts, 24.69; Rhode Island, 19.02; Connecticut, 17.31; England and Wales, 14.68.

CONSUMPTION.

Tuberculosis Mesenteric.—There were 38 deaths from this cause,—11 males and 27 females.

Ages: Under 1, 4; 1-5, 4; 5-10, 6; 10-20, 4; 20-40, 11; 40-60, 5: over 60, 4.

Tuberculosis, Other Forms.—Of these deaths, 64 in all, the cause assigned was in 40, tuberculosis, general tuberculosis, or acute tuberculosis; in 15, scrofula; in 2, scrofulous or tubercular abscess; in 3, diseases of joints or bones; in 2, psoas abscess; and in 2, tuberculosis of kidney.

Diarrheal Diseases.—The total number of deaths caused by the diseases under this group was 642, which gives a diarrheal death-rate for the State of 9.71 per 10,000. That of New Hampshire in the same year was 14.23; Vermont, 6.65; Massachusetts, 20.84; Rhode Island, 20.99; Connecticut, 15.51; England and and Wales, 10. Infantile Diarrhea.—This, as synonymous with cholera infantum, or including it, was the cause of 507 deaths (546 in the preceding year.) A reference to the following table will show the number of deaths which occurred in each month. The same table also shows the death-rate for each county. There were in the first quarter of the year but 10 deaths from this cause; in the second quarter, 45; in the third quarter, 393; and in the fourth quarter, 58. The largest number of deaths occurred in August, 197, being the same number as occurred during the same month in the preceding year.

Of the children dying from this cause, 50 per cent. were less than six months old, and another 35 per cent. were less than one year, making 85 per cent. of deaths within the first year of age.

Ages: Under 6 months, 233; 6-12 months, 180; 1-2 years, 64; over 2 years, 4; ages unknown, 6.

Of the 507 deaths from infantile diarrhea, 277 were returned from the cities. This represents an urban death-rate from this cause of 14.33 (15.20 in 1892) which is strongly in contrast with 4.95, the rate for the villages and rural districts (5.33 in 1892).

The death-rate of Maine from this affection is 7.67. For the same year it was in New Hampshire 5.52; in Vermont 4.84; for Massachusetts, 12.08; for Rhode Island, 15.89; for Connecticut, 12.19.

Septic Diseases.—Of deaths from the diseases in this group, there were 44 from erysipelas, 71 from pyemia, and septicemia, and 32 from puerperal fever,—giving a special death-rate of 2.22. The largest number of deaths from erysipelas at any age period was 9 between 70 and 80 years of age, the next largest, 6, for the two extremes, under 1 year and over 80. Dietetic Diseases.—Only 21 deaths are returned under this class of causes; 7 of malnutrition of infants, 1 of rickets, and 13 from alcoholism. The special death-rate from alcoholism is 0.20. For the same year it was 0.40 in New Hampshire; 0.06 in Vermont; 0.92 in Massachusetts: 1.24 in Rhode Island; 0.59 in Connecticut: 0.82 in England and Wales. It may, however, be stated that statistics under this head are not very trustworthy on account of the difficulty in obtaining correct returns of the cause of death when it is due to alcoholism.

Constitutional Diseases.—With tuberculosis transferred to the class of zymotic diseases, there were 581 deaths from constitutional diseases, or a death-rate of 8.79 per 10,000 for the State.

Rheumatism.—The returns give 46 deaths from this cause; 25 males and 21 females. Fifteen of these deaths were in the cities. The special death-rate for this disease was, therefore, 0.70, while that of the cities was slightly higher, 0.76. For the same year it was in New Hampshire 0.72; Vermont, 0.72; Massachusetts, 1 35; Rhode Island, 1.05; Connecticut, 1.52; England and Wales, 0.29.

RHEUMATISM BY COUNTIES, MONTHS AND AGE-GROUPS.

From this tabular arrangement it will be seen that the largest number of deaths occurred in York county, 7, that there were 6 deaths each in Cumberland and Knox, and that the largest number of deaths from this cause in any two consecutive months was 12, in April and May.

Cancer.—From cancer in its various forms and locations there were 433 deaths (404 in 1892.) Of the decedents, 170 were males and 263 females. The cancer death-rate of the State was, therefore, 6.55. In the same year the death-rate was in New Hampshire, 7.34; in Vermont, 5.59; in Massachusetts, 6.85; in Rhode Island, 5.40; in Connecticut, 5.08; in England and Wales, 7.11.

Distributed as to its more frequent locations, there died of cancer of the stomach, 95; of the breast, 32; liver, 54; uterus, 47; abdominal and intestinal, 38; throat, 7; rectum, 9; lip, 5; neck, 3; face, 19; tongue, 6; various, 35; parts unspecified, 83.

CANCER.

Diabetes.—The deaths from this cause numbered 65, or a death-rate of 0.98 per 10,000. Thirty-three of the decedents were males and 32 females.

Ages: 1-5, 1; 5-10, 8; 10-20, 7; 20-80, 4; 30-40, 8; 40-50, 7; 50-80, 10; 60-70, 11; 70-80, 10; over 80, 4.

Old Age.—There were registered 642 deaths due to old age,— 293 men and 349 women. Only 5 were less than 70 years old; 105 were between 70 and 80; 401 were 80-90; 119 were 90-100; while 6 were over 100 years old.

From Table No. 29, however, it may be seen that the whole number of persons who died at ages between 70 and 100 years or more was 3,147 (3,801 in 1892), or one death in every three and one-half was of a person who was between 70 and 100 years of age or older. In other words assuming that all these 3,147 persons died of old age, the death-rate from old age was 47.60 in every 10,000 living at all ages. Comparing with other states we find that, in the same year, the death-rate of old persons (70 years of age and over) was, in New Hampshire 53.62; Vermont, 50.94; Massachusetts, 37.08; Rhode Island, 27.48; and Connecticut, 36.52.

OLD AGE.

Centenarians.—Among the deaths which occurred in 1893, six were of persons who had reached or passed the age of 100 years. The following are the names of these centenarians, together with a few facts relating to the life history of each.

January 20, Ruth Dearborn died in Garland at the age of 101 years, 2 months and 7 days. She was born in Northampton, N. H., that being the birthplace of her father, David Johnson. She was a widow.

March 10, Nancy Welch died in Lyman at the age of 100 years, 5 months and 19 days. She was born in Sanford, Maine, that being the birthplace of her father, John Paul. She was a widow.

March 13, Mary A. Butson died in Addison at the age of 102 years. She was born in England. Widow.

April 30, Nathaniel Young died in Linneus at the age of 100 years and 1 month. His birthplace was Gray, Maine. His father and grandfather, both bearing the name Nathaniel, were born in Dedham, Mass. He was a farmer and lumberman and was one of the early settlers of Aroostook county. Widower.

September 29, Dugald Black died in Pembroke, at the age of 101 years. He was born on Adams Island, New Brunswick; was a laborer. His father's name was John Black. Widower.

November 18, William Eldridge died at Hollis at the age of 100 years. He was a farmer by occupation. Widower.

Diseases of the Nervous System.—The number of deaths registered under the causes included in this group was 1,457 (1,459 in 1892), or 22.04 to every 10,000 of population.

In the same year the death-rate from this group of causes was in New Hampshire, 27.25; Vermont, 17.45; Massachusetts, 28.17; Rhode Island, 23.26; Connecticut, 24.42; England and Wales, 16.11.

Inflammation of the Brain or Membranes.—The number of deaths was 263 (236 in 1892),—134 males and 129 females. Of these, 128 were in the cities. The death-rate from the several diseases grouped under this head was 3.98.

Ages: Under 1, 75; 1-5, 63; 5-10, 33; 10-20,19; 20-40, 20; 40-60, 28; over 60, 25.

Apoplexy.—From this cause 422 deaths occurred (488 in 1892),—of 200 males and 222 females. Of these, 134 were in the cities. The State's death-rate from apoplexy was, therefore, 6.38; that of the cities, 6.84; that of New Hampshire in the same year, 8.80; Vermont, 5.24; Massachusetts, 7.39; Rhode Island, 7.27; Connecticut, 7.91; England and Wales, 5.70.

The largest number, 55, occurred in December; the most fatal of the four seasons was, as in the preceding year, the winter, 122 deaths.

Conversely, the smallest number of deaths, 26, was in June; the smallest number in any one season was 95 in the spring months. Nearly 75 per cent. of the deaths were of persons 60 years of age or upward.

As may be noted, Sagadahoc county has the highest death-rate from diseases of the heart, and Aroostook the lowest. The rate for the State is 13.24; that of New Hampshire for the same year was 16.7; Vermont, 17.90; Massachusetts, 15.68; Rhode Island, 14.09; Connecticut, 11.61; England and Wales, 14.58.

Diseases of the Respiratory System.—Without the inclusion of tuberculosis, 1407 persons died from the various respiratory diseases as tabulated on page 101. As 1796 persons died from this group of causes in 1892, there are 389 fewer deaths from these diseases than in the preceding year. The death-rate from the respiratory diseases in 1893 was 21.28 in each 10,000 of population. In the same year the death-rate from the same group of diseases was in New Hampshire 25.39; Vermont, 21.18; Massachusetts, 35.24; Rhode Island, 30.66; Connecticut, 27.29; England and Wales, 35.37.

Pneumonia.—The number of deaths registered under this cause was 1,143 (1,431 in 1892,) of which 594 were males and 549 females. The death-rate from this disease was, therefore, 17.27 per 10,000 (21.56 in 1892,) and as 406 of the deaths occurred in the cities, the urban death-rate was 20.72. For the same year the pneumonia death-rate was in New Hampshire 18.19; Vermont, 17.66; Massachusetts, 24.56; Rhode Island, 20.44; Connecticut, 18.37; England and Wales, 12.86.

Bronchitis.—From this cause, including both acute and chronic bronchitis, 197 deaths were registered (287 in 1892). Among these decedents 89 were males and 108 females. Of these 197 deaths, 72 were in the cities. The largest number of deaths occurred in April, 27, which exceeded only by one the number of deaths in February. The number which occurred in each of the other months of the year can be seen in the accompanying table. The largest number of deaths in 3 consecutive months occurred in February, March and April. The smallest number of deaths occurred in July, 5. The number of deaths by quarters was 67, 59, 25, and 46.

The bronchitis death-rate of the State was 2.98; that of the cities, 3.67. In the same year the bronchitis death-rate was in New Hampshire 5.07; Vermont, 1.35; Massachusetts, 7.76;

Rhode Island, 8.30; Connecticut, 6.53; England and Wales, 18.73.

BRONCHITIS

Pleurisy.—Nineteen deaths are charged to this disease (18 in 1892,)—9 males and 10 females. In February, 4 of these deaths occurred, in January, 3, in no other month more than two.

Diseases of the Digestive System.—The combined mortality from this group of diseases was 653 deaths (659 in 1892.) or a death-rate of 9.88. The distribution of these under their several causes will be found on page 101.

Peritonitis.—There were 151 deaths from this cause (129 in 1892,)—74 males and 77 females. Fifty-three of them were in the cities. The following shows the county, month, and age distribution of the disease.

Appendicitis.—Of the deaths referred to this cause, 14 were returned as due to appendicitis and 1 to perityphlitis. Of the total number, 15, 12 were of males and 3 of females. Three of these deaths were in October, and 3 in November.

Ages: 5-10, 2; 10-20, 5; 20-30, 1; 30-40, 8; 40-50, 2; 60-70, 2.

Cirrhosis of the Liver.—Twelve deaths were ascribed to cirrhosis of the liver—those of 11 men and 1 woman. Of these 12 deaths, 6 were in the cities and 6 in the rural parts of the State. The death-rate of the State from this one cause was 0.18 per 10,000 (0.19 in 1892); that of Connecticut for the same year was 1.08; that of England and Wales, 1.25. The data for comparison with other places is wanting. Diseases of the Urinary System.—There were 420 deaths referred to the diseases in this group, equivalent to a death-rate of 6.35.

Nephritis, acute and chronic, caused the death of 65 persons, 31 males and 34 females. The death-rate from nephritis was, therefore, 0.98.

Childbirth.—Under the group of accidents and diseases of reproduction, 59 deaths were registered, not including puerperal fever (69 in 1892.) This is equivalent to a special death-rate of 0.89.

Accidents.—From accidents of various kinds, 330 persons met their death (376 in 1892.) If the returns generally had stated more precisely the way in which the accidents occurred, it would have been practicable to classify them in a more desirable manner.

Of deaths from falls there were 26. Three were from a carriage, 3 by falling down stairs, and one each from a barn, a window, a vessel's mast, a hammock, into a vessel's hold, into a silo, while 14 were unspecified.

Fractures caused 32 deaths,—fracture of skull, 10; of spine, 4; of hip, 10; thigh, 5; leg, 2; unspecified, 1.

Seventeen deaths were from gun or pistol shot.

From railway injuries there were 16 deaths.

From burns and scalds, 35 deaths occurred. Two deaths from burning clothing; 1 from lamp explosion; the rest unspecified.

From poisoning, 21 deaths occurred,—from opiates, 8; lead poison, 3; aconite, 3; oil wormseed, 2; carbolic acid, 1. In 4 instances the character of the poison was not specified.

From drowning, 83 lives were lost,—one from capsizing of a sail-boat: one by the upsetting of a boat; and one while driving logs. The rest were unspecified.

The returns indicate that 10 deaths occurred from machinery accidents. Six persons were lost at sea.

The death rate from accidents in this State was 4.99; in New Hampshire, 7.75; in Vermont, 5.27; in Massachusetts, 8.68; in Rhode Island, 8.53; in Connecticut, 7.67; in England and Wales, 5.76.

Homicide.—Under this group one death was registered under homicide. This one death is equivalent to a death-rate of 0.02. For homicide the rate for New Hampshire was, in the same year, 0; for Vermont, 0.03; for Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, 0.08; for England and Wales, 0.11. The total number of homicides in New England was 29; in England and Wales, 337.

Suicide.—Within the year, 59 persons took their own lives (59 also in 1892), 40 males and 19 females. Of the males, the occupation of 21 was farmer, of one each, physician, clerk, carpenter, shoemaker, fisherman, tinsmith, stable keeper, laborer, lawyer, sail maker, caulker, miller, wood engraver, tanner. One had no occupation, and the occupation of 4 is not stated.

Of the females, the occupation of 5 was returned as housewife, and 5 as housekeeper; 3, housework; and the occupation of 6 is not given.

As to the means employed, 26 committed suicide by hanging, 7 by shooting, 8 by drowning, 3 by cuts, 5 with poison, and in 10 the method was not stated.

The youngest suicide was a boy of 13 years and 5 months; the oldest, a man of 85. The largest number of suicides occurred in October, 11; there were none in February; only 1 in July, and 2 in January. By quarters, the suicides were, 10, 14, 15, 20. The largest number in any county was 8 in Cumberland; the highest death-rate from suicide was in Waldo county. The rate for the State per 10,000 of population was 0.89; that of New Hampshire in the same year was 0.85; Vermont, 0.72; Massachusetts, 1.11; Rhode Island, 0.56; Connecticut, 1.31; England and Wales, 0.88.

The suicide death-rate in some European countries was as follows for the years 1887-91; Ireland, 0.24; Italy, 0.52; Scotland, 0.56; The Netherlands, 0.58; England, 0.80; Sweden, 1.19; Belgium, 1.22; Prussia, 1.97; France, 2.18; German Empire, 2.46.

NOTES TO ACCOMPANY CLASSIFICATION OF THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

No argument is needed to convince the thoughtful person of the many uses and the value of well-kept records of births, marriages, and deaths, and correct statistics based upon them. Much of the value of mortality statistics depends upon the care with which reports of the causes of death are made, and the certainty with which they may be interpreted in this office.

As a help in making clear what is required in reports of the causes of death, the following explanatory notes are appended :

The omission of a single fact, called for in the blank certificate of death, may appear but a trivial matter; but, if it is place of birth, the nativity of the decedent cannot be tabulated and it adds one more to the column "unknown." If age or sex is omitted, the same is true, and an aid which may be needed in placing the death under its real cause is not at hand.

A cause of death may be unclassifiable because the anatomical part affected is not given. Examples : hemorrhage, inflammation, congestion, suppuration, abscess, mortification, dropsy, tumor.

Again, the omission to specify the part affected is a bar to satisfactory classification though it may not render the death entirely unclassifiable. Examples : tuberculosis, cancer.

Classification is sometimes impossible because mere symptoms, instead of causes of death are given. Examples : exhaustion, debility, weakness, asthenia, shock, coma, asphyxia, heart failure.

Faulty nomenclature is a cause of uncertain interpretation. Examples; inflammation of the bowels, typhoid pneumonia. Accuracy should not be sacrificed by the use of popular terms. "Inflammation of the bowels" suggest several diseases but indicates none definitely. The same is true of "typhoid pneumonia."

When two definite causes of death are stated, their relative malposition is a cause of uncertainty. "Heart disease and rheumatism" looks like a transposition. If the cause of death was acute rheumatism followed by heart disease, it should be so stated, or if brevity is imperative, "rheumatism, heart disease."

Please remember that a death can be classified under only a single cause. A redundance of causes is sometimes confusing, but an additional explanatory word or two is often of great service and gratefully received.

The following causes of death properly or improperly used are arranged alphabetically for convenience of reference.

Abscess. State location and cause.

Accident. State cause and character.

Albuminuria. State attendant disease, causal condition.

Aneurism. State location and mode of death.

Ascites. If possible, state cause.

Asphyxia. State cause or circumstances.

Asthenia. Should give cause or attending conditions.

Atrophy. Needs explanation.

Bilious Colic. See 123 of Classification.

Blood Poisoning. Too ill-defined. See "Septicemia."

Bowels, Disease of. Is indefinite.

Burns and Scalds. State how the injury happened and by what. Cancer. Give part affected.

Carbuncle. Do not use for malignant pustule, or anthrax of man. Cellulitis. State part affected.

Childbirth. State cause and mode of death. See "Classification." Calculus. State kind, and mode of death.

Caries. State part affected.

Congestion of Lungs. Pneumonia? Bronchitis? Or a symptom of other pathological process?

Convulsions. What variety? Epileptic? Puerperal? Uremic? State the determining cause if possible.

Croup. Diptheritic, or membranous?

Debility. State cause or circumstances.

Dentition. Avoid, if possible, or state the mode of death and its cause.

Dropsy. State parts affected and, if possible, the cause.

Drowning. State how it happened, and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.

Enteritis, Entero-Colitis. State whether diarrhea was present.

Erysipelas. State part affected, and whether surgical or what.

Exhaustion. Cause of "exhaustion?"

Fever. State kind of fever.

Fistula. Alone, is too indefinite.

Flooding. Avoid. See Class VI, Group 9.

Fractures. What bone; what mode of death?

Gangrene. State parts and causes.

- Gastro-Enteritis. In this office must be classed as Gastritis or Enteritis: Please advise which, and whether diarrhea was present.
- Heart Failure. Slightly better than "unknown." Avoid its use if possible.

Heart Disease. State variety and cause if possible.

Hernia. If strangulated, or subjected to operation, please state so. Hemorrhage. State seat of and cause.

Hydatids. State parts affected.

- Infantile Fever. If typhoid, please state so; otherwise must be relegated to the ill-defined class.
- Innutrition. As the result of what?

Intemperance. Use "Alcoholism" instead, or qualifying words.

Jaundice. If known, state cause.

Malarial Diseases. Use only for the disease caused by the specific parasite of malarial disease, and say whether it was contracted outside this State.

Malformation. State kind and whether congenital.

Marasmus. Objectionable; if used, state cause.

Malnutrition. State cause.

Malignant Pustule. Use only for the disease which is caused by the inoculation of the anthrax bacillus into the skin.

Metritis. State whether puerperal.

Mortification. If used, state kind and parts involved.

Necrosis. State seat, cause, and mode of death.

Neurasthenia. State cause.

- Ovarian Tumor. State mode of death, whether following operation or otherwise.
- Paralysis of Brain. (?)

Pelvic Cellulitis. State whether puerperal.

Perforation of Intestines. If following typhoid fever, state so.

Peritonitis. State whether idiopathic, puerperal, traumatic, or a sequel of appendicitis.

Phlebitis. State cause, variety and seat.

- Phthisis. Is very often transcribed "phthisic" by town clerks. Please do not use alone.
- Poisoning. State by what and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.
- Privation. Without explanation is ill-defined.
- Septicemia. State whether puerperal, traumatic, surgical.
- Shock. Surgical? Apoplexy? Fright? Should not be used alone.
- Spine, Disease of. Should state whether disease of vertebræ or spinal cord.
- Starvation. State circumstances.
- Still-born. Should be used only for children that have never breathed—those that are born dead.
- Strangulation. State what kind or what circumstances.
- Suffocation. From what cause?

Suicide. By what instrument, means, or mode?

Teething. Is ill-defined. Avoid its use if possible.

- Thrombosis. State location.
- Tuberculosis. State what parts affected, or if generalized, parts primarily or principally involved.

Tumor. Give kind, location and mode of death.

- Ulcers and Ulceration. State location and nature.
- Uremia. State cause, or with what diseases or conditions associated.
- Wounds. State with what inflicted, and whether accidental, suicidal, or homicidal.

The foregoing list comprises the assigned causes of death which have given the most trouble in this office. Without being unmindful of the difficulty in some cases of making an exact diagnosis, the undersigned begs to request that the terms used in certifying the causes of death be such as to leave no doubt in the mind of the registrar as to the intended diagnosis of the cause of death.

ON THE CLASSIFICATION OF THE CAUSES OF DEATH.

(Reprinted from the First Annual Report.)

A registrar about to adopt a system of classification of the causes of death for his State must be very uncritical and easily satisfied to be pleased with any of the arrangements which he finds in use. In the various states of our Union, the classifications differ among themselves enough so that he who would compare the statistical results of one state with those of another must constantly be on the alert that the classes or groups of diseases compared, contain the same individual causes of death. Recent investigations into the causes of diseases have so changed our conceptions of the nature of many of them that the existing nosologies appear antiquated. As Mr. Wynter Blyth has said, "the present classification was based upon an old—a dying—pathology."

Nevertheless, the compiler of this report deems it altogether out of place to attempt to satisfy himself with a rearrangement. He has, however, ventured a few changes which will, undoubtedly, place a few of the individual causes of death and groups of diseases more in line with the places to which they will be assigned in the . future.

The most important innovation has been the placing of tuberculosis in its various forms, and syphilis, in the group of "Specific Neoplastic Diseases," a term which was, I believe, suggested by the Society of Medical Officers of Health of England. Zymotic Diseases has been retained as a convenient designation of the first . class of causes of death; but as a name for the first group, or order, under this class *infectious diseases* has been substituted for the objectionable term *miasmatic diseases*.

Minor changes are the removal of *croup* from the respiratory diseases and placing it after diphtheria, a position which it already occupies in the classification in use in some of the states. *Tonsil*- *itis* has also been placed near diphtheria as a designation of certain affections, sometimes fatal, and not always differentiated with certainty from diphtheria. *Tetanus* is included with the infectious diseases, and the *malarial diseases* have also been grouped with the infectious diseases. In some American lists of the causes of death they already occupy that position, but in the table in use by the registrar general of England these diseases form a group by themselves.

Under the diarrheal diseases, *infantile diarrhea* is used instead of cholera infantum, and *scurvy* and *rickets* are both placed under the dietetic diseases. In the group of diseases of the nervous system, *inflammation of the brain or its membrane*, as used in the English tables, is much oetter than some of the terms under which diseases of this kind are classed in this country.

STATE OF MAINE.

LAWS RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION OF VITAL STATISTICS, 1895.

Chapter 118, Laws of 1891, as Amended by Chapter 154, Laws of 1895.

SECTION 1. The secretary of the State Board of Health shall be the registrar of vital statistics for the State, and shall furnish to clergymen, and others authorized to marry, to sextons, to physicians, town clerks, clerks of the society of Friends, and to clerks of courts, a copy of this act, and suitable blanks for recording births, marriages, deaths and divorces, so printed, with appropriate headings, as readily to show the following facts and such others as may be deemed necessary to secure an accurate registration.

I. The record of a birth shall state its date and place of occurrence, full christian and surname, if named, color and sex of child, whether living or still-born, and the full christian and surnames, color, occupation, residence and birthplace of parents.

II. The record of a marriage shall state its date and place of occurrence, the name, residence, and official character of the person by whom solemnized, the full christian and surnames of the parties, the age, color, occupation, and residence of each, the condition, whether single or widowed, whether first, second or other marriage; and the full christian and surnames, residence, color, occupation, and birthplace of their parents.

III. The record of a death shall state its date, the full christian and surname of the deceased, the sex, color, condition, whether single or married, age, occupation, place of birth, place of death, the full christian and surnames and birthplaces of parents, and the disease or other cause of death, so far as known. SECTION 2. The attending physician, accoucheur, midwife, or other person in charge, who shall attend at the birth of any child, living or still-born, within the limits of any town or city in this State, shall report to the clerk of such town or city within six days thereafter, all the facts regarding such birth, as required in section one of this act.

SECTION 3. Every person authorized to unite persons in marriage shall make a record of every marriage solemnized before him, in conformity with the requisitions prescribed for blank records of marriages in section one of this act, and shall within six days thereafter, deliver or forward to the clerk of each town in which the marriage intention was recorded, a copy of such record of marriage.

SECTION 4. Whenever any person shall die, or any still-born child shall be brought forth in this State, the undertaker, town clerk, or other person superintending the burial of said deceased person, shall obtain from the physician attending at such bringing forth or last sickness, a certificate, duly signed, setting forth as far as may be, the facts required in the record of a death, according to section one of this act; and it shall be the duty of the undertaker, or other person having charge of the burial of said deceased person, to add to said certificate the date and place of the proposed burial; and having duly signed the same, to forward it to the clerk of the town or city, where said person died, and obtain a permit for burial; and in case of any contagious or infectious disease, said certificate shall be made and forwarded immediately.

SECTION 5. In the case of any deceased person not having had the attendance of a physician in his or her last sickness, the town clerk may issue and sign the certificate of death, upon presentation of such facts as may be obtained of relatives, persons in attendance upon said deceased person during said last sickness, or present at the time of death or from any other source, and the permit for burial shall be issued upon such information. Said certificate and permit shall not be required before burial in cases where it is impracticable to obtain the same within a reasonable time after death, but in all such cases, said certificate shall be obtained as soon as practicable after death.

SECTION 6. Parents shall give notice to the clerk of their city or town of the births or deaths of their children; every householder

shall give notice of every birth and death happening in his house: the eldest person next of kin shall give such notice of the death of his kindred; the keeper of a workhouse, house of correction, prison, hospital, almshouse, or other institution, and the seaster or other commanding officer of a ship, shall give like notice of every birth or death happening among the persons under his charge.

SECTION 7. Except as provided in section five, no interment or disinterment of the dead body of any human being, or disposition thereof in any tomb, vanit or cemetery, shall be made without a permit as aforeasid, from the clerk of the town or eity, where said person died, nor otherwise than in accordance with one, permit. The clerk of every town shall keep a chronological record of all births, marriages, and deaths reported to him, and shall annually, in the month of June, transmit a copy of the record of all births, marriages, and deaths occurring during the year ending December thirty-first next preceding such said report, to the state registrar, together with the names, residences, and official stations of all such persons as have neglected to make returns to him in relation to the subject matters of such records, which the law required them to make, all to be made upon blanks to be prepared and furnished by the state registrar.

SECTION 12. The clerks of courts for the several counties shall, annually, during the month of February, make returns to the registrar of vital statistics in relating to libels for divorce in their respective counties for the calendar year next preceding. Such returns shall specify the following details; the number of divorces granted; and the names of the parties including the maiden name and any other former name of female, if any, when ascertainable.

SECTION 13. The state registrar shall cause the returns made to him in pursuance of the preceding sections eleven and twelve to be arranged alphabetically for convenient reference, and carefully preserved in his office. He shall annually make and publish a general abstract and report of the returns of the preceding year in such form as will render them of practical utility, not more than two thousand five hundred copies of which shall be printed and bound in cloth, one copy of which shall be forwarded to every town, one copy to each senator and representative, one copy to each state and territory in the union, and the remainder to such departments, libraries and persons as the state registrar shall direct.

SECTION 14. The sum of one thousand dollars per annum, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for printing and binding the circulars and blanks, for postage, and to defray the expenses of clerical work in carrying out the provisions of this act.

SECTION 15. The town clerk's record of any birth, marriage or death, or a duly certified copy thereof, shall be *prima facie* evidence of such birth, marriage or death, in any judicial proceeding.

SECTION 16. If any person shall willfully neglect or refuse to perform any duty imposed upon him by the provisions of this act. it shall be a misdemeanor, and he shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars for each offense, for the use of the town in which the offense occurred, and it shall be the duty of the state registrar to enforce this section as far as comes within his power, and when the state registrar knows, or has good reason to believe, that any penalty or forfeiture under this act has been incurred, he shall at his discretion forthwith give notice thereof, in writing, to the county attorney of the county in which said penalty or forfeiture has occurred, which notice shall state as near as may be, the time of such neglect, the name of the person or persons incurring the penalty or forfeiture, and such other facts relating to the default of duty as said state registrar may have been able to learn, and upon receipt of such notice the county attorney shall prosecute the defaulting person or persons.

SECTION 17. The clerk of each city or town shall be paid by such city or town for receiving, recording and returning the facts required to be recorded by this act, the sum of fifteen cents for each birth, marriage and death, and for each birth or death duly reported to the town clerk, physicians shall receive twenty-five cents from the town in which the birth or death has occurred. Tt shall be the duty of the town clerk to enforce, so far as comes within his power, sections three, four, six, seven and ten, of chapter one hundred and eighteen, laws of eighteen hundred and ninetyone, and when he knows of any birth, marriage or death, which is not reported to his office in accordance with the provisions of said chapter, he shall collect, so far as he is able to do so, the facts called for in the blank certificates of birth, of marriage, or of death, as furnished by the state registrar, and shall record them as is prescribed in said chapter one hundred and eighteen; and for every birth, marriage or death thus collected and recorded he shall receive from the town the sum of twenty-five cents.

SECTION 18. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after the first day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-two, and all acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed. [Approved March 30, 1891.]

SECTION 19. A physician who has attended a person during his last illness shall, when requested, forthwith furnish for registration

a certificate stating, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the name of the deceased, his age, the disease of which he died, and the date of his death; and a physician or midwife who has attended at the birth of a child dying immediately thereafter, or at the birth of a still-born child, shall, when requested, forthwith furnish for registration a certificate, stating to the best of his knowledge and belief, the fact that such child died after birth or was born dead. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person to make a false return in regard to any birth or death.

SECTION 20. When a birth, marriage or death occurs in an unincorporated place, it shall be reported to the town clerk in the town which is nearest to the place at which the birth, marriage or death took place, and shall be recorded by the town clerk to whom the report is made; and all such reports and records shall be made and recorded and returned to the state registrar as is provided in chapter one hundred and eighteen, laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one.

The clerk of each town shall, on the first Monday SECTION 21. of each month, make a certified copy of the record of all deaths and births recorded in the books of said town during the previous month, whenever the deceased person, or the parents of the child born were resident in any other town in this state at the time of said death or birth, or whenever they were recently resident in any other town, or whenever the remains of any deceased person have been carried to any other town for burial; and shall transmit said certified copies to the clerk of the town in which said deceased person or parents were resident at or near the time of said birth or death, or to which the remains of such deceased person have been carried for burial, stating in addition the name of the street and the number of the house, if any, where such deceased person or parents so resided, whenever the same can be ascertained; and the clerk so receiving such certified copies shall record the same in the books kept for recording deaths or births.

Such certified copies shall be made upon blanks to be furnished for that purpose by the registrar of vital statistics.

SECTION 22. No body of a deceased person whose death was caused by cholera, yellow fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, typhus fever, typhoid fever, small pox or other pestilential disease, shall be removed from place to place in this state by any railroad, steam-

boat or other common carrier, unless there shall be attached to the outer case in which said body is inclosed, a certificate from the board of health where such person died, stating the disease causing such death, and that necessary precautions against infection satisfactory to said board have been observed. It is further provided, that a certificate of death giving heart failure as the only cause of death shall not be deemed sufficient upon which to issue a burial permit, and such certificate must be returned to the physician who made it for the proper correction and definition. If the body of a deceased person is brought into this state from without for burial, and if it is accompanied by a permit issued by the legally constituted authorities of the state from which it was brought, such permit shall be received as sufficient authority upon which the clerk of the town in which said body is to be buried shall issue a permit for burial; but if it is not accompanied by such permit, then the person or persons in charge of it shall apply for a burial permit to the clerk of the town in which it is to be buried, and the clerk of the town shall issue such permit when furnished with satisfactory information.

SECTION 23. The provisions of this act shall be enforced, and violation hereof shall be punished, as provided by section sixteen of chapter one hundred and eighteen of the public laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-one, unless otherwise provided for by law.

SECTION 24. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.


