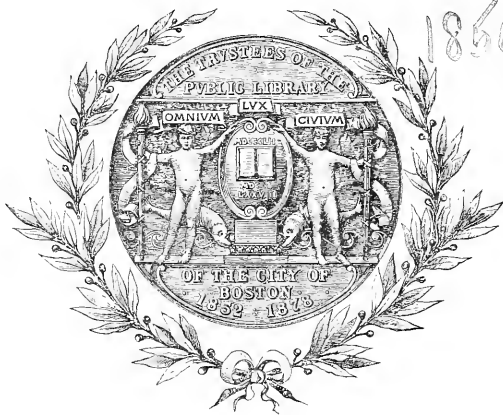

*To the Honorable Board of Mayor and Aldermen and Common Council:—*

GENTLEMEN:—

Agreeably to the Ordinance of the City regulating the Fire Department, I most respectfully submit the following Report, containing a list of the officers and members of the Department, and the condition of the apparatus in their charge; the number of fires the past year; together with the amount of and insurance on the same. Also, the number of reservoirs, hydrants, wells and other sources from which water can be obtained, in case of fire, and the expenses for the year ending at date.

The Department still continues in good condition; the Companies are full, and when called upon are as prompt as ever in the performance of all duties required of them.

I am most happy to state that there has been, comparatively with years past, a decrease in the number of fires.

The new Engine ordered for Howard Company No. 3, has been duly received, and thoroughly tested to the entire satisfaction of the Board and the Company who have it in charge. The 600 feet of Hose, ordered by the City Council, has also been purchased and equally distributed to the several Engine Companies.

The Engines and other apparatus belonging to the Department are in good condition.

August 24. Alarm at 1 o'clock, A. M., was caused by fire in the rear shop of Mr. Edward Foster, furniture dealer, under the old Methodist Church, at the head of Salem Street. Damage \$150. Supposed incendiary.

The buildings destroyed were owned by Mr. A. H. Allen, of Boston. Loss about \$20,000. Insured \$17,000. Cause unknown. Supposed incendiary.

September 4. Alarm at 9 o'clock, P. M., was caused by the rekindling of ruins of the fire on Saturday night previous, which was soon extinguished.

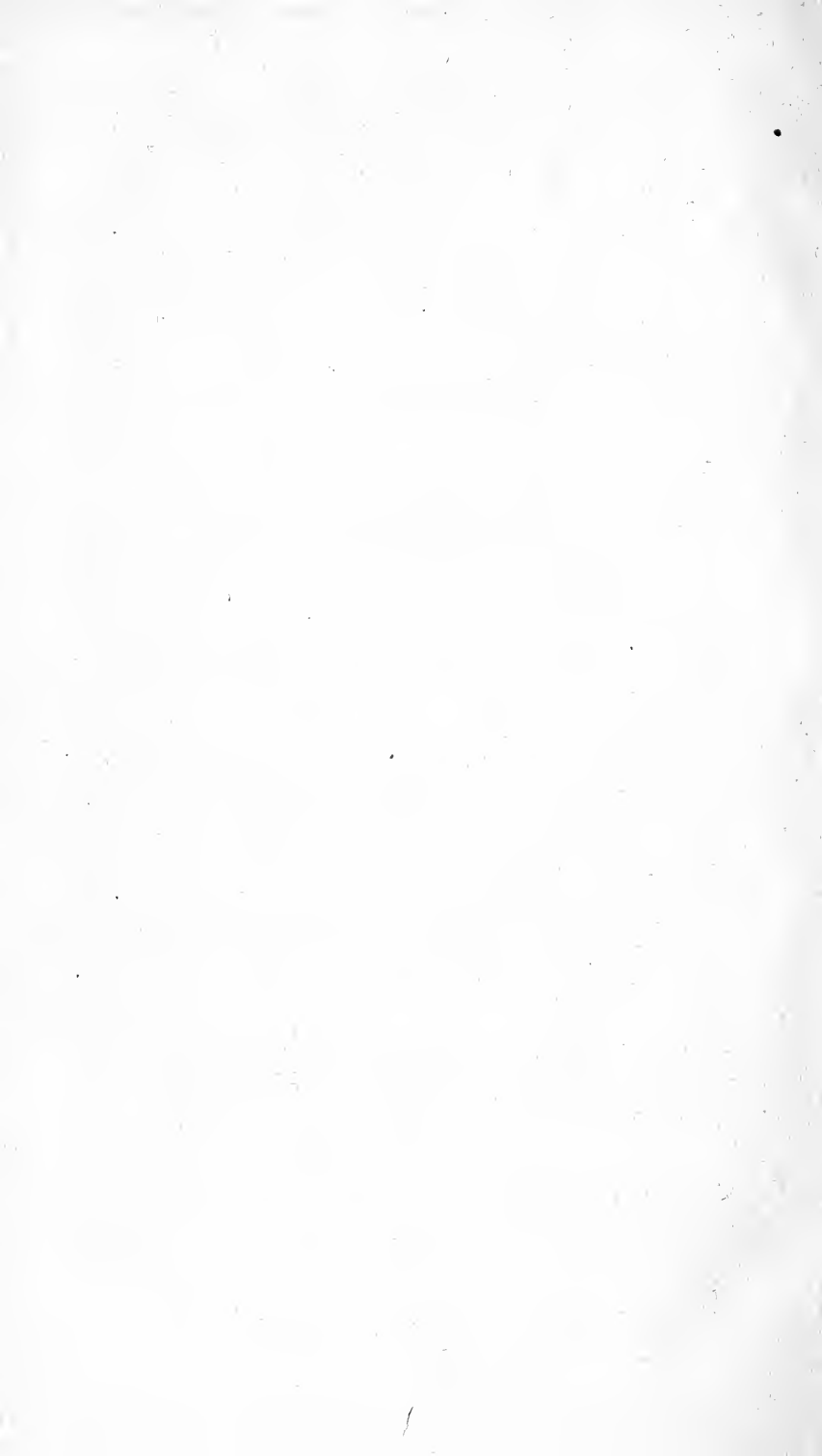
