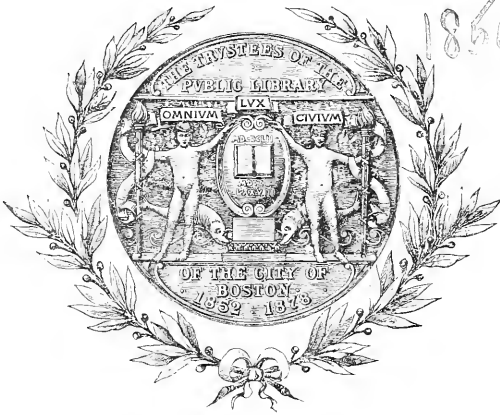

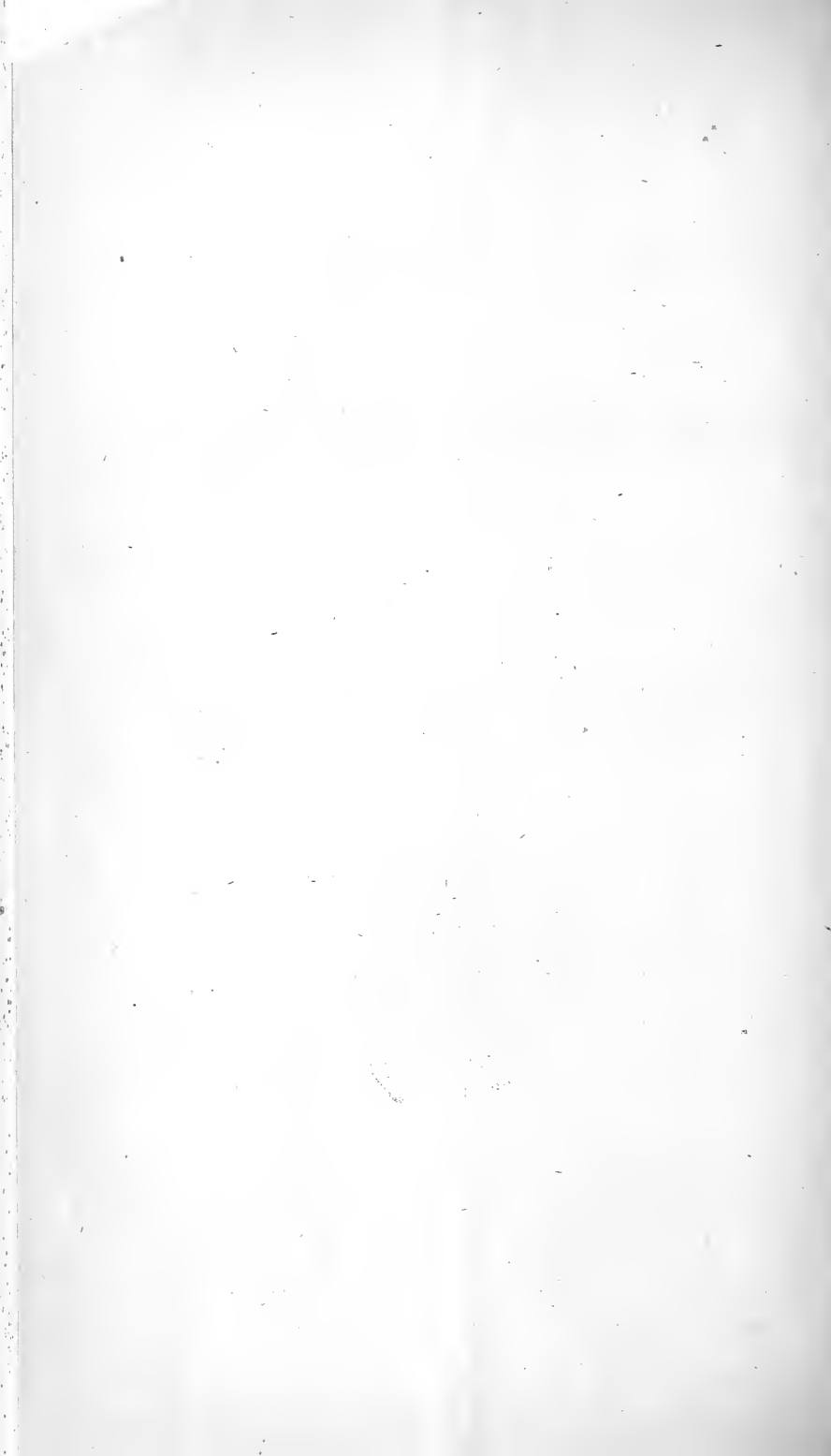

CHARLESTOWN, March 20, 1866.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

GENTLEMEN,—In compliance with the requirements of the Fire Ordinance I respectfully submit the following report :

During the past year, owing to the introduction of water into the city, great changes have taken place in this department, doing away with all the hand engines and reducing the number of men one hundred and forty. Engine Companies Nos. 1 and 4 have been relieved from service ; Engine Companies 2, 5, and 7, have been reorganized into Hose Companies Nos. 2, 3, and 4,—so the Department consists, at present, of one Steam Fire Engine, and Hose Carriage attached, with fifteen men ; one Hook and Ladder Carriage, with thirty men ; four Hose Carriages, with twenty men each ; and five engineers,—making one hundred and thirty men. One new steam engine has been purchased, to be used should occasion require ; three new four-wheeled carriages have been bought, and five of the hand engines have been sold. Each of the four-wheeled carriages carry five hundred feet of hose and a connection, by which six good and effective streams can be played from one hydrant.

A large number of fires have taken place, the past year, in very combustible localities, many of which were caused by incendiaries. But owing to the promptness of the department, and the generally good supply of water, a large amount of property has been saved.

To keep the Department up to the requirements of the city it is well to have a good and reliable supply of hose. A number of hydrants might be placed, to great advantage, in the city. As

more than one steamer is seldom required for the protection of the city, and the cost of keeping the same might be better expended, I would suggest that one of the steamers may be disposed of.

The buildings occupied by the department are in good order, needing but slight repairs. The apparatus, hydrants, reservoirs, and wells, are in good condition.

There are four thousand eight hundred feet of hose in good condition; the rest is not of much value.

There have been, during the past year, one hundred and thirteen alarms of fire,—sixty of which were caused by fires in the city; the others by fires out of the city or false alarms.

The whole amount of loss by fire, in the city, was \$30,815 00; insured, \$24,145 00.

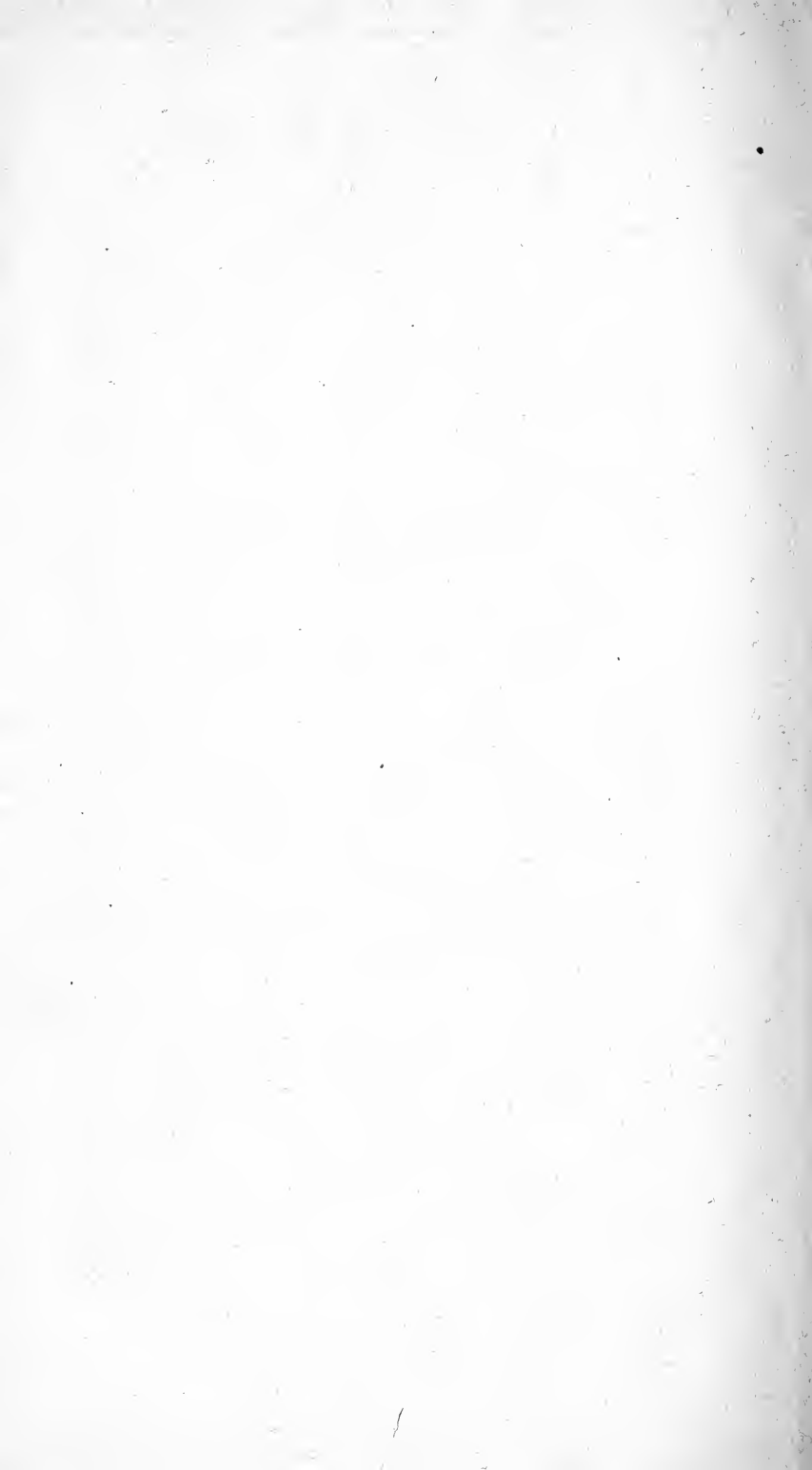
