



The Joint Standing Committee on Finance, to whom was eferred the City Treasurer's Statement of his Receipts and Expenditures for the financial year ending Feb. 28, 1873,

REPORT,

That they have made a careful examination of the books, papers, bonds, notes, mortgages, &c., in the hands of the Treasurer. They find that the accounts are correctly kept and properly vouched, and that the balance of cash on hand on the first day of March was, as he states, fifty-eight thousand two hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixty cents (\$58,266.60).

In conformity with the ordinance, the Committee submit herewith a detailed Statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the City for the said financial year, with a Statement of the City Debt, a Schedule of City Property, and the estimated value thereof. The Committee recommend that one thousand copies of the same be printed for distribution.

OF THE

OVERSEERS OF THE POOR.

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REPORT.

To THE HONORABLE CITY COUNCIL:

The Board of Overseers of the Poor would submit the following report of their work and financial condition, for the year just closed. No year since the breaking out of the Rebellion has witnessed more startling events, each tending to depress the laborer in his hire, and deprive the poor man of the limited means of supporting his dependent family. The result has been fully apparent by the increased demands on this department, and the amount of relief granted which the imperative accessities of the applicant seemed to require. We have, however, experienced no pecuniary embarrassment, and again would express our gratitude for the ample means granted by the City Council, by which we have been enabled to meet our numerous and pressing demands, and close the year free from debt. The following exhibit will show our resources and expenditures for the year:

We may represent the Almshouse buildings as in good repair; some paint and whitewash, however, will be required to give them a neat and wholesome appearance in the spring, though not at present absolutely requiring further improvements. We hope the City will at an early day introduce steam for heating, and gas for lighting, the house. We think, as a matter of safety, economy and comfort, the institution should be furnished with these modern improvements.

Additional security in case of fire should be provided. The distressing event which occurred in our neighboring City a few weeks since has shown the necessity of ample provision being made ready, in cases of emergency. We hope to have such

arrangements made as will insure perfect safety in case of fire, and would recommend that one or more fire escapes be provided for that purpose.

The bath boiler in the culinary department has never answered the purpose for which it was designed, although sufficient fuel is consumed to keep an abundant supply of hot water at all times. We desire to have it so utilized as to supply the necessity. for which it was established, which, we believe, could be accomplished with no additional expense for fuel. The well-earned reputation of the Superintendent of the Almshouse, with the eminent qualifications of his wife as Matron, is a prominent and very important feature in the management of the institution.

We had 45 inmates in the house under their care one year ago, since which time 92 have been admitted, making a total of 137. Of those admitted, 31 were lodgers and 61 were admitted for support. During the same time, 31 lodgers and 49 inmates have been discharged, and 8 removed by death, leaving our present number 49, 11 of whom are on account of other cities and towns, 6 on private account, 4 at work for their board, and 28 entitled to support by the City. The aggregate ages of those who have died were 486 years, the average age 60 years and 9 months; and the united ages of 10 of our oldest inmates are 754 years, an average of over 75 years.

Of the inmates, 5 are insane, and 6 are idiotic; 3 of them are incurable, being demented by epileptic fits. Upon the breaking out of the small-pox in the City, the Board deemed precautionary measures necessary to avoid the disease. The privileges enjoyed by the inmates were restricted, and no case of the dreaded disease, we are pleased to report, has been in the institution. We may report as good health has been enjoyed as could reasonably be expected in a family so largely composed of a class afflicted with all the diseases flesh could well inherit; most of the deaths having been the result of physical decay rather than from any local disease. The family fully appreciate the liberal provisions made by the City for their comfort and home associations. [The religious services held Sabbath afternoons have been much enjoyed by those who were unable to attend services at their wonted places of worship. It is always pleasant to see friends on such occasions, and we hope as many such will be present as opportunity may permit. The Board, with the responsible trust committed to their more immediate care, have been diligent in their duty, that no one might suffer for whom ample provision is made by the City. They are fully confident that, with the manifold requirements of their office, they have with held no relief that was in their province to bestow on the deserving applicant.

Our year just closed shows an excess collected by the Secretary over the previous year of \$364 73, and an excess of expenditure over the previous year of \$1367,06. This department, being credited with the amount collected for disbursements made by the Board, have been enabled to extend their relief some 60 per cent. over and above the sum appropriated for their use, as will appear by our financial statement. The whole number of families relieved directly from this office during the year has been 458, an excess of 105 families over the number aided the previous year. The number of disbursements made to these families has been, for groceries, fuel and provisions, 1680, and for cash 226, making a total of 1906, which is an excess of 488 over the previous year. We have also granted medical relief to 91 families in addition to the above number, to most of whom we have allowed medicine. as they were unable to procure it themselves. It thus appears that 549 families have applied to this Board for relief which has been granted. Many of the families relieved are largely represented with young children, and, should we average the whole number of families at 4 in each family, we have the total number of persons assisted during the year, 2196. Of the whole number of families aided, we find but 72 to be a legal charge to this City, while 151 are chargeable to other cities and towns in the Commonwealth; and 326 are aliens, no

place being liable by law for their support, except the State, which we have notified of 76 cases, reducing the number to 250 for whom no remuneration can be claimed for assistance rendered. I Should our acts be called in question, in respect to granting relief to an amount of more than sixteen hundred dollars (\$1600) to persons not legally entitled, and for which amount the City will never receive one dollar in return, we think the necessities of the applicant would justify the act, remembering the time portrayed to us in history, when the little band landed on our bleak and rock-bound shore, amidst the uneivilized natives, where they found friends and assistance in their destitution; or we may come down to the time, which seems almost in our own memory, when, after the destruction of our town by a foreign enemy, an appeal was made to the State for relief to save the inhabitants from suffering and starvation: lessons which far in the future be the day when our people shall forget, or deny assistance to, the poor who dwell in our midst.

Co-operating with this Board, or rather in furtherance of our benevolent work, the several charitable organizations of the City have found ample scope for all resources at their command. In addition to our local resources of relief, I am informed that more than four thousand dollars (\$4000) has been received from Boston, and distributed by the "Charlestown Relief Committee" to families in this city, who lost their employment by the fire of Nov. 9-10 in that city, a truly generous and speedy return for donations made by our people to relieve the distress in a distant city, caused by fire, but one year before ; truly exemplifying the blessing which is sure to return to the cheerful giver. Could our report close with no sad event to recall, our work would be pleasant to relate, for I know of nothing excelling a mission of charity, for it is charity which never faileth. We have been required to bury 19 male and 12 female adults, and 16 male and 14 female children, 61 in all; an excess of 26 over the previous year. 28 of the number, from the nature of the disease, were not allowed the last rites held sacred for departed friends; some of the number were strangers, whose resting place within the hallowed precinct can only be designated as the unknown dead. Eight of the above number have died at the Almshouse. One, the widow of a revolutionary soldier, having celebrated her 88th birthday, on the morning of her entree upon her 89th year, while patiently waiting, the Master called for her, releasing the decrepit form from its bodily sufferings, leaving many kind friends in whose hearts the name of Mary White will ever be of precious memory.

During the year, we have had 23 persons in the Insane Hospitals at Worcester and Taunton, three of whom have died, one has been discharged, and nineteen still remain. Two of those who died were sisters, and their aged mother, now in her 93d year, resides in this City. We have had during the same time 18 families residing in other cities and towns assisted by such cities and towns at the expense of this City, and one person at the State Workhouse for whose support we have paid one dollar per week.

During the year we have had official dealings and correspondence with sixty-three cities and towns in the Commonwealth, requiring careful investigation, by which we have been able to adjust controverted questions, and avoid the necessity of resorting to legal tribunals for twelve men to adjust what can be much cheaper and more satifactorily done by two. What formerly occupied six pages of our letter-book in a year, has required eighty-five pages the past year, and we are pleased to report the pleasant relation existing in our official duty, believing the same is reciprocal, and hope for its long continuance.

The Legislature passed the following act April 27th, 1865: ---

CHAP. 162, SECT. 1. No city or town authorities shall be allowed to send to either of the State Almshouses any person infected with small-pox, or other disease dangerous to the public health, nor any other sick person whose health would be endangered by removal; but all such persons, liable to be maintained by the Commonwealth, shall be supported during such sickness by the city or town in which they are taken sick, and notice of such sickness shall be given to the Board of State Charities, who shall have authority to examine the case, and order the removal of the patient if they deem it expedient.

SECT. 2. The expense incurred by any city or town under the provisions of the first section of this act, after notice shall have been given as therein required, and the bills for said support having been approved by the agent of the Board of State charities, shall be reimbursed by the Commonwealth to an amount not exceeding the rate of the average weekly cost of the support of similar patients at the Rainsford Island Hospital.

SECT. 3. Any Mayor, or Overseers of the Poor, who shall knowingly offend against the provisions of the first section of this act, shall be subject to a penalty of not less than fifty, nor more than one hundred dollars.

This law was evidently designed, for a judicious and humane purpose, to obviate an emergency frequently arising with Overseers of Poor in the discharge of their official duties, imposing, as it does, additional labor and burdens on cities and towns. We believe it was the design of the Legislature that its requirements should be kept in good faith by each interested party; and, with abundant cause for feeling aggrieved at the delays in adjusting our bills, we are unwilling to believe that any desire exists, on the part of those upon whom it devolves, to avail themselves of any special powers delegated by the act. We have notified the State in seventysix instances during the year, during which time they have paid \$257 19, being about 20 per cent. of the amount claimed. As we are required to make an investigation, give the notice, grant such relief as may be required, make a bill with a history of the person relieved in each case, and make oath to the correctness of the same, and as some of the persons were sick for many weeks, necessarily a large expense was incurred. And an average of \$3.38 paid by the State is really a very small compensation for the amount paid by the City, and the labor necessary in caring for them. We hope the law will be complied with, or, if defective, so amended as to give us the amount in full which justice and equity require and state to In this brief review it will be apparent, that our Board differ in respect to the method of relief afforded to the poor, with those who advocate the almshouse as the only place for such support. The reply of a wise philosopher to the inquiry of how man could best elevate his condition was, first, by action; second, by action; and third, by action. Let our poor be encouraged in active laudable pursuits, rather than isolated in an almshouse, where their pride and manliness would be marred. and the result would soon be manifest, and the applicants for relief would materially diminish, and the adage proved true, that industry must prosper. Such a course we can urgently recommend, particularly where there are young children. for a few years, the relief afforded should be nearly or quite equal to their full support in the Almshouse, their tender sensibilities will be protected and saved from any reflection of an unpleasant nature in their mature years. derices, nanosing p effice and a All of which is respectfully submitted. /d B l phone i or 4 . e phone a succepti s onica on JONATHAN STONE, Chairman. Chief Engineer of the Fire Department.

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REPORT.

Engineer's Office, Charlestown Fire Department, March 1, 1873.

TO HIS HONOR THE MAYOR, AND CITY COUNCIL:

Gentlemen, — In obedience to Sect. 6 of the ordinance governing the Fire Department, it becomes my duty, as Chief Engineer, to present to you the Annual Report of the Fire Department of Charlestown, — its condition; number of members, their ages, occupation, and residence; the apparatus and houses in charge of the several companies; number of fires and alarms; loss and insurance on the same, as near as could be obtained; amount expended for the support of the department; number of reservoirs, hydrants, wells, &c., where water can be obtained in case of fire.

FORCE AND CONDITION OF DEPARTMENT AND APPARATUS.

The Department consists of a Chief Engineer, four assistants, and ninety-one members, divided as follows: Four hose companies, of thirteen men each, including drivers; one hook and ladder company, of twenty-three men, including driver; one steam fire-engine company, of fifteen men, including engineer, driver, and fireman, and one spare driver. The engineer, fireman, and drivers are permanently employed. These companies have in their charge four hose carriages, two steam fire engines, and one hook and ladder carriage, all fully equipped and ready for service. The apparatus is in perfect order, with the exception of the steamer Mystic, which needs extensive repairs. The houses are all in good order, and need but slight repair. There are also belonging to the Department two hand jumpers, one of which is in service at the Poor Farm; and one fuel wagon, which needs repairs. There are connected with the Department, and in service, eight horses, all of which are in good condition, with one exception; one of the horses employed on the hook and ladder truck is not considered a proper horse for the service expected of him, and I would recommend that he be exchanged for one more adapted to meet the service required.

The Department, as we are aware, has been changed during the year from a volunteer to a paid system. On October 1, 1872, the paid Department went into commission; and I have no hesitation in saying that it has proved very satisfactory to the City Council and the citizens generally. The Department has been prompt and efficient, and has responded to every call with alacrity. The members are mostly of the old Department, and are considered good and reliable men. There have been purchased during the year, for the new Department, four horse hose-carriages and one hook and ladder carriage. Three of the hose carriages were built by Messrs. Leverick & Co., of New York, and are considered good and reliable carriages. The hook and ladder carriage was built by the same firm, and, after a few alterations by the Board of Engineers, is now considered to be in good condition. It carries seventeen ladders, and is otherwise fully equipped. Hose carriage No. 3 was built by Hunneman & Co., and is considered a first-class piece of apparatus. During the year, the steamer Howard was exchanged in part payment for a new first-class engine from the Amoskeag Manufactory, of Manchester, N. H. The engine was delivered in July last; and I can safely say

that in this engine our city can boast of as perfect a piece of apparatus as can be found. She has been put to a severe test on two or three occasions, one of which was the great fire in Boston, and has proved to be equal to the task. I would recommend that the steamer Mystic be exchanged in part payment for another of the same class, and that it be put in service in Ward One, to be run in connection with Hose Co. No. 3, on Winthrop Street. We are all aware of the very combustible nature of the materials of which the buildings on Bunker Hill are constructed, being chiefly of wood, where, in case of a high wind, our hydrant streams would be of little service, as the water pressure in that locality is not sufficient to be of the ability expected in case of a large fire. And in Ward One there is a large amount of valuable wharf property. and high buildings, where a steamer would be of more service than our hydrants. I hope this matter will receive the earliest attention of the City Council.

HOSE.

There are at the present time belonging to the Department 3,900 feet of leather hose, which I consider not reliable for hard service, and not a foot of it for steamer pressure. I would recommend that it be sold or exchanged, if possible, and good serviceable hose be purchased in its stead. We also have 7,400 feet of Boyd's cotton hose, most of which is in good order. I hope that this important branch of the Department will receive the earliest attention of your honorable body.

ACCIDENTS.

There have been no very serious accidents during the year, except in the case of Mr. Martin Turnbull, of Washington Hose Co. No. 3, who was badly injured at the large fire in Boston, Nov. 9th. He was well taken care of by the Relief Committee, of Boston, and our Charitable Association. Mr. Geo. W. Spurr, of Massachusetts Hook and Ladder Co., was injured by being run over by Washington Hose Carriage, July 29th. Mr. Thomas Williams, cf Hose 4, was slightly injured in running to an alarm, Nov. 5th.

Our Charitable Association has been reorganized, owing to the change of the Department. Although the Association is not very abundantly supplied with funds, it is in a flourishing condition. I hope it will be remembered by our citizens in the future, as it has been in the past.

PROTECTION FROM FIRES.

I wish to call the attention of the City Council to the necessity of immediate action to prevent the erection of wooden buildings having no preventives against fires; many such buildings having been erected without partition walls, and with defective chimneys, &c. There have also been erected brick buildings which the Board deem unsafe for firemen to enter in case of fire. I would recommend that an ordinance be passed giving the Board of Engineers power to act in such cases, as the present ordinance does not give any such power to the Board.

HYDRANTS AND RESERVOIRS.

The whole number of hydrants now in service is 125 Lowry's, and 36 single. New hydrant chucks are being constructed to take the place of the old ones now used, they having been in use since the introduction of water, and, being out of repair, are not considered of sufficient strength to be reliable, but will be repaired, and kept as a reserve in the different houses of the Department. There are 38 reservoirs and wells where water can be obtained. Within two or three years, two large reservoirs have been filled up and done away with by the Committee on Streets, as I know, against the wishes of the Board of Engineers — one at the corner of Main and Chapman Streets, a very combustible neighborhood; and the other at the corner of Bow and Richmond Streets, another wooden terri-

tory. I think this a very poor plan, for, in case of accident to our water-pipes, the only reserve is our reservoirs. At the fire at the Harvard School House, a break in our pipes caused a serious delay. I recommend that supply pipes be connected from the water-pipes with our reservoirs, so that we can keep them full and in good condition at all times.

FIRE ALARM.

Our fire alarm still continues to work well. During the year a 2500 lb. bell has been placed on the Bunker Hill Echool House, on Baldwin Street, and I can safely say that our city can boast of as perfect a fire alarm as any city in the Union. We have 22 stations where alarms can be sounded. I would recommend that an alarm-box be placed near the corner of Richmond and Canal Streets, and another between boxes 34 and 24, in the vicinity of Chelsea and Prospect Streets; and one in the vicinity of Waterman Mills, on Medford Street. These I consider are needed, owing to the very combustible material in those vicinities. I would also recommend that better accommodations be provided in the steamer house, for the batteries, &c., connected with the alarm.

FIRES AND ALARMS.

The Department has been called out to fifty-eight alarms during the year ending March 1st, 1873, nineteen of which were working fires. The Department has rendered assistance at three fires in Boston, two in Somerville, and one each in Cambridge and Chelsea. The whole amount of loss during the year from March 1st, 1872, to March 1st, 1873, was \$74,685; insurance, 57,925; total loss, \$16,760.

CONCLUSION.

In closing my report, I would take the occasion to tender my thanks to the members of the City Council for the respect and courtesy shown the Board at all times; to the exempt members of the Department for services rendered; to the Chief of Police, and members of the force, for the valuable assistance rendered the Department during the year; to the assistants associated with me, as I cannot let this opportunity pass without thanking them all for their prompt and faithful aid given on every occasion; to the officers and members, for the prompt and faithful manner in which they have performed all duties assigned them; and to the Chiefs and officers and members of the Boston, Cambridge, and Somerville Departments, for assistance rendered our Department during the year.

INSTRUCTIONS TO KEY-HOLDERS.

1. On the breaking out of a fire, notice should be immediately communicated to the nearest alarm-box, keys of which are always in the hands of the police, and responsible persons in the vicinity of the boxes.

2. Key-holders, upon the discovery or positive information of a fire, will unlock the box, pull down the slide or hook once, and let go. This gives the desired alarm all over the city, repeating itself four times.

3. All persons giving fire alarms are requested to remain by the box a moment, and, if no clicking is heard in the box, pull again; if you still hear no clicking, go to the next nearest box, and give the alarm from that.

4. Never signal for a fire seen at a distance. Never touch the hook except to give an alarm of fire. Be sure the box is locked before leaving it. Give an alarm for no cause other than an actual fire. Do not give an alarm for a chimney.

5. Owners and occupants of buildings are requested to inform themselves of the location of signal boxes near their property; also the places where the keys are kept. Be sure the alarm is properly given. One signal stroke of the bells and gongs is not given for an alarm of fire.

6. Alarms will be sounded upon the fire-bells thus: For box 5, five strokes, 1-1-1-1, with short intervals, and repeating; for box 32, three strokes, 1-1-1, a pause, then two strokes, 1-1, a pause, and repeating. Alarms for other numbers are given in a like manner.

CITY OF CHARLESTOWN.

IN THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-NINE.

AN ORDINANCE

FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE FIRE-ALARM TELEGRAPH.

SECT. 1. Any person or persons who shall wilfully deface, injure, or destroy, or in any way interfere with, the fire-alarm telegraph in this city, or any part thereof, or any of its appurtenances, shall, for every such offence, forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty dollars, for the use of the city.

SECT. 2. Any person who shall open any alarm-box connected with the fire-alarm telegraph, except by the authority of, or with the keys furnished by, the Board of Engineers, shall forfeit and pay therefor a penalty of twenty dollars for each offence, for the use of the city.

SECT. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the fifteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

To His Honor the Mayor, and Gentlemen of the City Council.

The following report of the doings of this office for the past year is offered for your consideration.

The number of visits made to city patients at their homes has been 720, and at my office I have received 57; making in all 777, exclusive of attendance at the Almshouse and Smallpox Hospital.

Whenever sent for by the Superintendent, I have visited the Almshouse, and at such other times as I thought necessary; making in all 62 visits. The general health of the inmates has been good, the calls for the physician having been for those who either were invalids at entrance, or those suffering from the diseases incident to old age. Scarlet fever made its appearance in December, and by it we lost an interesting child, the adopted daughter of the Superintendent. The other deaths have been, from pneumonia and scrofula, 1 each; 4 from consumption, and 3 from old age. There have been 2 births.

The Police Department have called for my services at the station-house 10 times; the attendance being generally to those who were suffering from the effects of liquor, or who, while under its influence, had met with some bodily injury. By direction of the Committee on health, free vaccination has been continued weekly at the City Hall, except during the hot months of summer. During the extreme excitement consequent upon the prevalence of small-pox, a physician was in attendance every afternoon, and two evenings in each week, to vaccinate free of charge any who might apply. The whole number of vaccinations performed, including primary and revaccinations, has been 2049: of these, 250 have returned, showing a good result; 133 were unsuccessful; and of the 1666 remaining, the result is unknown. The virus used has been carefully selected from healthy children, or obtained from the cow by responsible parties. The latter has been more often used, and with all who preferred it.

I have felt it my duty to urge upon the Committee on Health the necessity of having public vaccinators go from house to house, and see that all the inhabitants were vaccinated; and I am confident that, had the suggestion been followed, the epidemic would have been cut short.

The same suggestion is again made as was offered in my last report; namely, that, before admission to any of the public schools, the applicant be required to bring a certificate of successful vaccination from a physician in good standing. Among the children attending the primary schools, I have occasionally found those who were entirely unprotected from small-pox.

The duties of the physician in connection with the Health Department have been much increased by the presence of the prevailing epidemic. Since the 18th December, it has been a part of the physician's duty to visit such persons as have suffered from it, and, if sufficiently recovered, to order the removal of the red flag. At a later period the fumigator was placed under my orders, and I have since seen that infected houses and clothing were properly disinfected by him.

During the year ending to-day, there have been 340 cases of small-pox reported to the Health Officer; there can be no doubt that many cases have not been. At this time, there are 10 cases, distributed throughout the city, exclusive of those in the Hospital. The Small-pox Hospital was opened for patients the 18th February, since which time 11 patients have been admitted, and 3 have been discharged well; thus far no death has occurred. I have visited there daily, one or more times, as circumstances required. There are at present four male and four female patients; only one (male) being at all dangerous.

During the last month, five cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis have come to my knowledge; only two of the cases, as yet, having proved fatal.


Among the city patients not at the Almshouse, there have been 2 births, and 16 deaths. The deaths have been as follows: From measles, scarlet fever, cirrhosis of liver, cholera infantum, 1 each; from consumption, and valvular disease of heart, 2 each; and 8 from small-pox.

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REPORT.

CHARLESTOWN, Jan. 20, 1873.

TO HIS HONOR THE MAYOR, AND THE CITY COUNCIL:

Gentlemen, — In conformity with the ordinance, the Commissioner appointed by the City of Charlestown, for the care and maintenance of the Charles River and Warren Bridges, respectfully submits the following Annual Report.

By the Act of the Legislature in 1870, the Commissioners were required to build, "in lieu of the existing draw in Warren Bridge, a draw with a clear opening of thirty-six feet, in such a position as the Harbor Commissioners may determine." The necessity of extensive repairs to this bridge, and the importance of making such alterations and improvements in the draw of Charles River Bridge as would render it entirely reliable as a highway between the two cities, prevented the Commissioners from proceeding with the work on Warren Bridge until this was accomplished; and they were not able to obtain the plans and the approval of the Harbor Commissioners, and commence the work on Warren Bridge, until September. It was the intention of the Commissioners to extend and reconstruct the draw, replank the piers, put in new bulkheads, and repair the bridge with granite blocks, all of which would have been done within the estimate presented to the City Council when the annual appropriation was made; but, from various causes, over which the Commissioners had no control, the expense has exceeded both the estimate and the appropriation.

On submitting the plans to the Harbor Commissioners, as required by the Act, they objected to the proposed draw, inasmuch as it would require such an extension of the pier towards the Fitchburg Railroad bridge as to render it difficult for vessels to pass through without damage. Under these circumstances it was found that the only draw that could be used to obviate this objection was that known as the counter-balance pivot.

The adoption of this form of draw involved the making of a foundation pile pier in the centre of the bridge, and the raising of the grade of the bridge two feet, to suffer the draw to pass over the water-pipe on the north side. It was necessary also to remove the buildings on the piers, as the new draw would require much of the space occupied by them, and for the purpose of replanking the whole pier. These buildings, except the Superintendent's house, were too much dilapidated to be preserved; and they were accordingly destroyed, and new ones have been erected, at a cost of \$2,000. The raising of the grade has been very expensive, as it required the taking up of a large quantity of dock-mud, originally laid on the timbers, which had become dry, and hard to remove. The expense was also enhanced by the necessity of raising the curbstones on brick foundations, and the elevation of the sidewalks and bulk-heads. In short, the bridge, instead of being repaired as was contemplated by the Commissioners, has been, with the exception of the piles and floor of the bridge, entirely rebuilt. The Commissioners are gratified in being able to state that all the work has been done in a most thorough manner, and they believe at a less cost for material and labor than they anticipated, and that it will be many years before this bridge will require extensive repairs. Notwithstanding the bridge has

been almost entirely reconstructed, the public travel was interrupted only five weeks.

On account of the strong winds and rapid current, it has frequently been difficult to pass a vessel through the draw without delay and inconvenience to the public travel. The Commissioners have therefore decided to try steam instead of horse power, as the former can be used not only for opening and closing the draw, but, by means of a windlass, can assist a vessel in its passage through the bridge. If the experiment does not prove satisfactory, the engine can be disposed of, and the horse-power re-introduced at a small expense; but, if it is successful, the advantage will be very great.

As the Commissioners disagreed with the Fitchburg Railroad Company as to their being liable for the expense of raising a portion of the buildings belonging to the railroad to the new grade of the bridge, by mutual agreement the question was referred to the City Solicitor, of Charlestown, and Henry W. Bragg, Esq., who decided the law in favor of the Railroad, and the expense must consequently be paid from the bridge fund.

The sidewalk on the north side, over the water-pipe, has been covered with asphalt; and, contrary to the anticipations of the Commissioners, about \$500 of this expense has to be paid by the bridge, instead of the Water Board.

The number of times the draw on Warren Bridge has been opened for the passage of vessels from Jan. 1, 1872, to Jan. 1, 1873, is 7,724, being an increase of 600 during the year.

CHARLES RIVER BRIDGE.

Preparatory to making the alterations and repairs on Warren Bridge, important improvements in the machinery of the draw of this bridge were made, that no possible accident might occur while the Warren Bridge was closed to public travel. This was rendered more imperative from the fact that, by the splitting of one of the steel friction rolls, the principal truck was broken, and considerable damage done to the draw. This accident required several new trucks and gear wheels; and, although it involved considerable expense, all defective or weak parts were removed. The draw has since been entirely satisfactory in its operations, and is now in excellent order. The fender guards of both bridges have been rebuilt, and the principal expenditures for the coming year will be in providing new bulk-heads, and repairing the roadway on Charles River Bridge.

The number of times the draw on Charles River Bridge has been opened for the passage of vessels from January 1st, 1872, to January 1st, 1873, is 10,270.
