

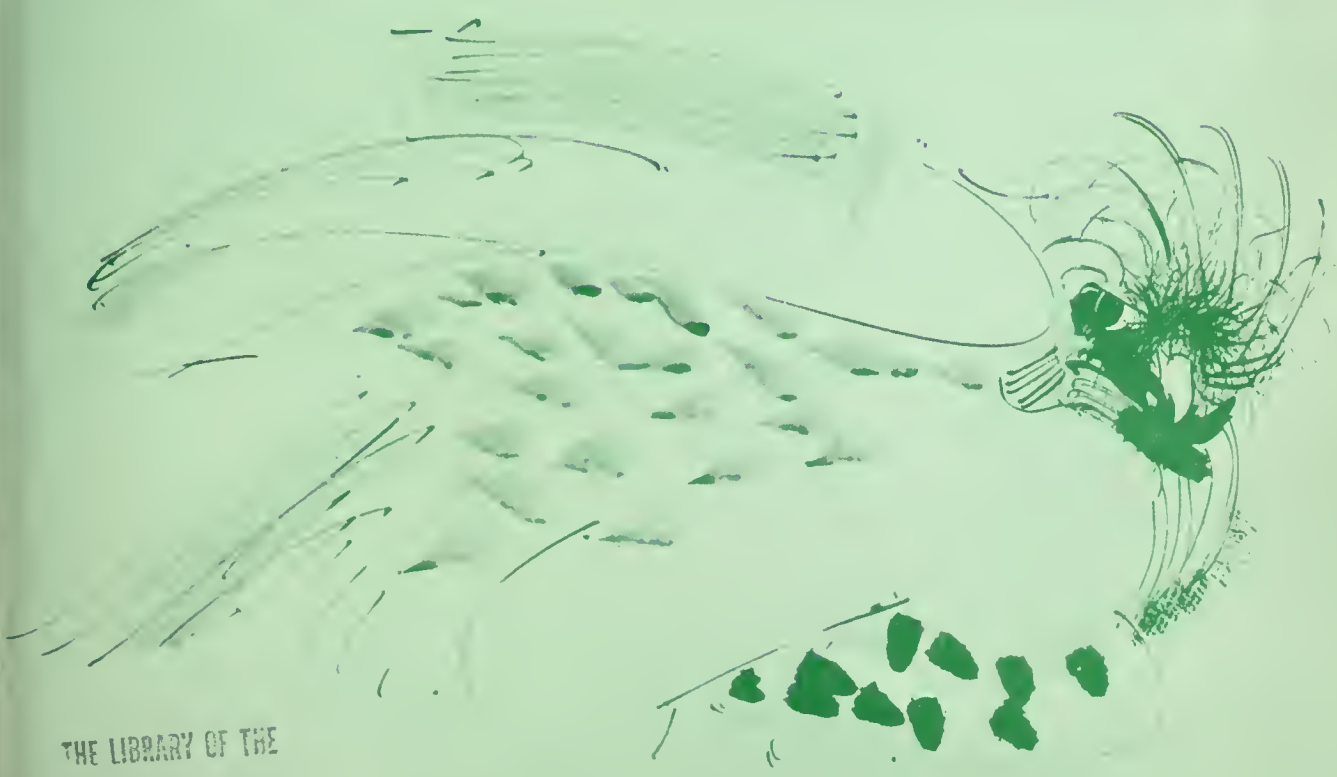

We are proud to present the final choices of an interpretive-selective representation of art works from 5,000 amateur artists from 58 counties in Illinois.

The ninth annual Illinois Town and Country Art Exhibition reflects the rapidly growing interest of Illinois residents in art and crafts endeavors. We are pleased to note the many artists, 56 percent of the exhibitors, who are displaying their works on the state level for the first time.

This year the number of county winners was more than double the 1963 total. Seven University of Illinois jurors, with 21 art critics from cooperating colleges and universities in the state, selected 616 junior and adult division winners at 38 local and area exhibits. From the county winners, 448 pieces entered the four district exhibits. A team of three jurors chose 108 works of art by 96 artists, representing 38 widely distributed counties, to be displayed at this exhibit.

Jurors for the state exhibit were Professors Peter Bodnar, George N. Foster, and A. Doyle Moore. They awarded blue ribbons to those entries that they considered to merit special recognition.

Annually since 1961 the College of Agriculture has purchased approximately five special recognition award entries for its permanent collection. The purchase awards are available for public viewing in University classrooms and in a traveling exhibit.

Many of the art works are for sale at the prices indicated. Arrangements for purchase should be made with the artist.

A LOOK AT THE ILLINOIS TOWN AND COUNTRY ART EXHIBITION

Town and Country Art Exhibition Jurors

It is appropriate that an Introduction to the ninth Town and Country Art Exhibition review the background of the program, examine its present status, and project some possible goals.

Nine years ago the first exhibition consisted of a small number of entries brought together by the rural recreation staff and the county farm and home advisers. It was held in the Agriculture Library in Mumford Hall, and there was little comparison, either in quality or in quantity, between that display and the present one.

Three general needs became apparent from examination of the work of those participating in the first exhibit: (a) the amateur artists needed a source of technical consultation in order to improve their craftsmanship; (b) they needed assistance in developing a greater awareness of the things around them that would provide the basis for art worthy of exhibit; and (c) they needed a knowledge of display techniques.

In general, the amateur needed to be encouraged to see the things around him with a new awareness and to record his own perceptions in a personally creative and technically competent manner.

That these needs have to a great extent been met is evidenced by the present show. Several factors have been responsible: Members of the art faculty who have served as jurors and critics for the local shows over the years have offered invaluable criticism. The art instruction provided by the Division of University Extension and other adult education programs has raised the standards. And the vigorous efforts of the amateurs themselves to improve have perhaps been the most outstanding reason.

In the exhibition, technically competent painting and sculpture are the rule rather than the exception. The work is indicative of the amateur artist as a searching person who looks at everything for sources of ideas. Common subjects, the everyday things in his environment, become the basis of his art expression. A simple comparison shows that the Town and Country artist of today is more competent in displaying his art than was the artist of the past.

In the next ten years, we hope to see greater effort in the areas of sculpture, ceramics, metals, and weaving. The need for emphasis in these areas is obvious from the absence of such works in this exhibit.

The Town and Country artist is to be complimented. His work is representative of the best effort of amateur artists throughout the state.

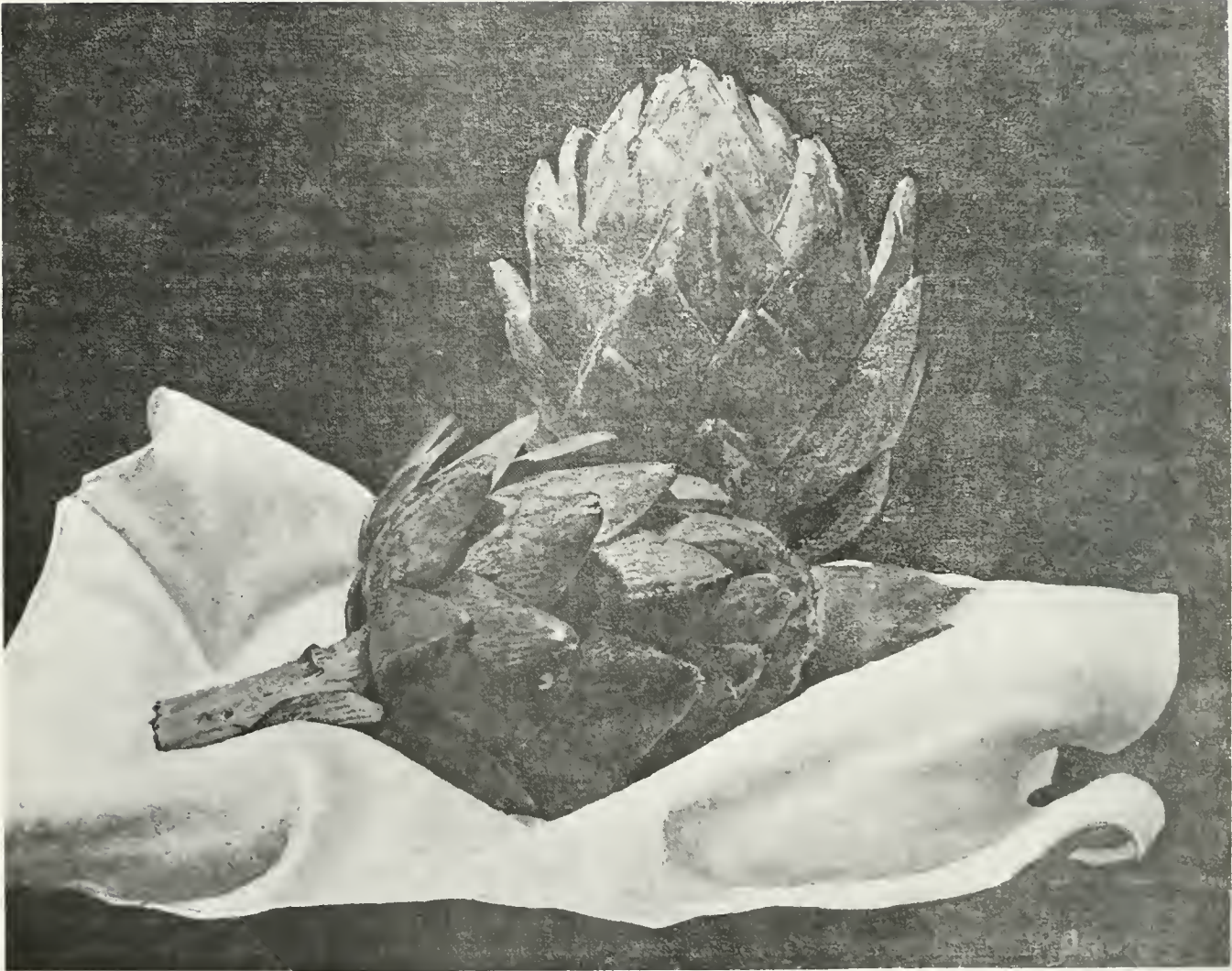

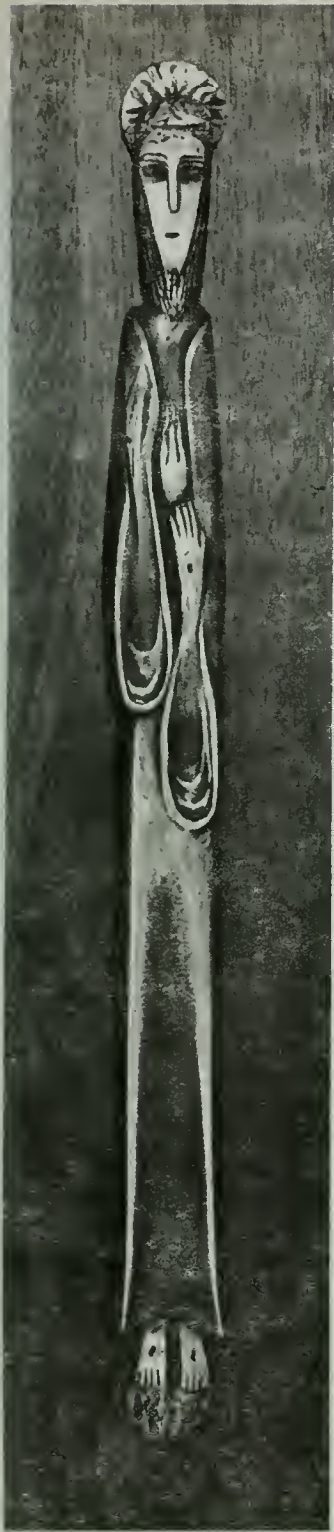

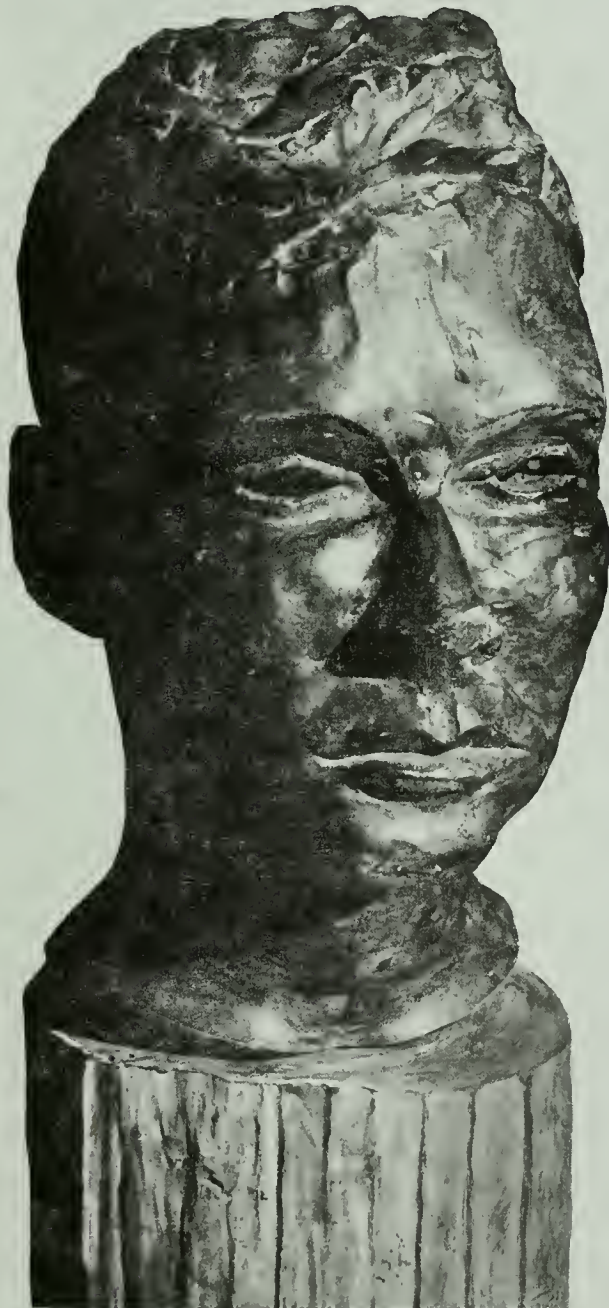

DISTRICT TOWN AND COUNTRY ART EXHIBITIONS

An increase from 263 county winners in 1963 to 584 in 1964 created the need to initiate the first district art exhibits. Illinois' five cooperative extension districts comprised the areas from which the entries in the four exhibits were selected. Cooperation was obtained from four universities in the state to provide facilities for displaying the exhibits. These universities were among 11 institutions of higher learning in Illinois from which jurors for the county exhibits were chosen. The 108 works selected for this display fulfill the purpose of the district exhibits to provide fewer and higher quality state entries on a comparative basis.

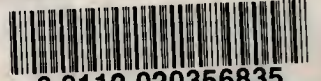
