




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

THE ARCHITECTURAL DEPARTMENT

The School of Architecture of the University of Illinois offers two courses, one in Architecture, the other in Architectural Engineering.

The courses in Architecture aims to train the student to produce correct and beautiful works of Architecture. The first part of the course includes a broad field of liberal and scientific subjects to serve as a background of knowledge. The scientific group has to do with the principles underlying safe and economical construction. The larger part of the course, however, is devoted to the study of architectural forms and their application in architectural design. The course in Architectural Engineering follows the same general plan as the course in Architecture except that more attention is given to the scientific and structural studies.

The facilities and equipment for instruction are the best. A special feature is the large library of Architectural books, which is one of the finest in the country. The registration in the department at the beginning of the year 1913-14 was three hundred and fifty-two, placing the school first in this country—in point of attendance.

The Architectural Club is a student organization, membership in which is limited to students in the Department of Architecture whose average scholarship is 75 per cent or above. It is the publisher of this book.



The organization of the work in design is based on the idea that efficient training involves the attainment of a certain degree of proficiency, rather than the doing of a fixed quantity of work.

The course is divided into six stages of advancement called grades. Work in all these grades is carried on simultaneously, so that it is possible for students to enter or complete any of them at any time, irrespective of their class. The normal time required to complete them is three years; to students completing them in less time, special advanced work is open.

The work consists of the solution of problems, supplemented by individual criticisms, lectures, and library research. In the first three grades the problems deal generally with the elements of elevation and plan; in the last three with the composition of these elements into complete buildings, or groups of buildings. For the study and criticism of problems, the students are divided into groups of "ateliers", and are permanently assigned to separate quarters and to separate instructors.




