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PREFACE.



THE author of this Family History (HOMER ELHANAN AYLSWORTH, M. D., of Roseville, Ill.) devoted several years of his life to its preparation. He traveled through the various States of the Union and the Dominion of Canada in search of material, and wrote several thousands of letters, involving a large expenditure of money, which he cheerfully paid from his own resources, and although his family is so much poorer by this expenditure, yet they are abundantly richer in the knowledge of the successful result of that labor, and the glorious intellectual monument he has erected to his memory. It was, indeed, unfortunate that the worthy Doctor could not have lived to have realized the full fruition of his hopes, but Providence ordered different.

After the author's death the members of the family residing in Rhode Island approached the editor in regard to the publication of the work. So strong was their entreaty that he wrote to the author's excellent wife to ascertain how near completed the work had been left. He was informed that all the material gathered by the Doctor in his travels and all correspondence received had been incorporated in the work, and, so far as known, it was now as complete as genealogies generally are. Armed with this information he agreed to undertake the publication which has been very materially aided through the liberal contributions of Judge Eli Aylsworth, (page 247), his son Hiram B. Aylsworth, (page 392), both of Providence, R. I., and Hon. Allen B. Aylsworth (page 420), of Toronto, Canada. The author's widow, notwithstanding the already large expenditure of money in the preparation of the work,

placed another liberal allowance to the publication fund. With these means, aided by the single subscriptions to the book, its publication has been effected.

The editor believed that if the work was published after being so nearly completed by its original author, that it should reflect his likeness from every page, and another had no right to rob the worthy composer of his justly earned fame. He believed the members of the family residing in the States and Canada would feel that this was no more than his just due. Therefore, he has adhered (and some might say too strictly) to the original plan. Be that as it may, he has changed nothing but what was imperatively needed, and what has been added from more recent correspondence has been prepared on the author's plan. In short this work is substantially as Dr. Aylsworth left it.

The editor has caused to be inserted, as a fitting frontispiece to the work, a portrait of its author. He has also placed a fine steel engraving of Judge Aylsworth, facing his biographical sketch. He flatters himself it will afford great pleasure to the readers of this book to view such a fine illustration of one of the oldest living members of the family.

A great difficulty met the author and editor, and that was to decide on the spelling of the name. It will be seen by reference to these pages that the compiler has taken up this question and discussed it in a very able manner, and came to the conclusion that the standard spelling was AYLSWORTH, and so adopted it in this work. With this explanation it will be seen why so many families who spell it Ellsworth and in various other ways should find it here spelled Aylsworth.

To show the great diversity in the spelling of the name, a special index has been prepared and inserted at the end of the general one, to illustrate this feature.

With all the care that has been bestowed in the preparation of this work, errors in spelling of names of persons and places may have occurred, typographical errors, if not misplacements and omissions. Many of these, no doubt, would have been rectified had its author lived. Many of these errors were beyond the power of the editor to correct, yet so far as he has been able to do so he has spared no pains in order to accomplish it. He has labored earnestly to have the work correct in every particular, and to retain that confidence the family so generously placed in his keeping. How well he has done his work is not for him but the members of the family to determine.

The work has been printed by Herbert Whipple Greene, Esq., (page 392) whose wife and children claim descent from Arthur of Quidnesset.

The work has been set up entirely by one compositor, Mr. Frank Kay, which is by the way a rare thing in printing offices for so large a work. To his experienced hand and thoughtful attention and the interest he has taken in the work its typographical appearance is indebted.

Mr. Robert F. Belcher, the foreman of the office, has rendered the editor many favors.

In the name of the family the editor thanks all of the above gentlemen for their many courtesies.

To facilitate easy reference to the name of every person mentioned in these pages an elaborate index has been prepared, to which the editor desires to call the attention of the reader. He would have the reader when using this index to note this particular feature — that a certain name is given but once, although it may belong to several persons; for instance: There may be several John Aylsworths, James Aylsworths, or William Aylsworths, given in the work, yet they will all be found under the head of John, James, and William, respectively. If the name carries more with it, like John C., Arthur A., etc., each will be found in its appropriate place. The editor has found by experience to produce each John by itself does not help the reader in the least, as he is obliged to look at each reference page to obtain the information sought for, and that this method brings the reference pages nearer together and thereby assists materially.

The following index contains over nine thousand names, including about eighteen hundred bearing the name of Aylsworth, nearly fifteen hundred distinct surnames, about five thousand families, and nineteen thousand references.

The editor congratulates the family upon the successful publication of their history, at the same time thanking them for the many courtesies extended to him during its publication, and he trusts that they will in future enjoy many hours of pleasure as well as profit in the searching of its pages.

INTRODUCTION.



IN the year 1840 Sylvester Aylsworth, of Utica, issued a twelve-paged pamphlet of genealogical information, and, notwithstanding the repetition which it necessitates, the subject matter is reproduced in this place complete, with the exception of the family records of William and Catharine (Havens) Aylsworth and of their male descendants, which appear in the body of this work with additions.

This presentation is made in order to credit the Register as a whole, the labors of whose author in the then uncultivated field of printed American genealogies were most praiseworthy.

APPENDIX.

After examining all the collections obtained on the subject of ancestry, I come to the following conclusions:*

In 1660 Charles II. was restored to the throne of Great Britain. Four years after, A. D. 1664, the Episcopalians having obtained the ascendancy of power in Church and State, commenced a severe and cruel persecution upon those dissenters who refused compliance to the "Conformity Act," (or their particular forms of worship,) imposing fines, imprisonment, proscription, banishment, and death. (*See Neal's History of the Puritans, London edition, 1733, Vol. 4*)

At this time, A. D. 1664, one of three brothers, (I conclude the eldest,) fled to Holland. He there became incorporated with the Dutch, and spelt his name after the Dutch pronunciation ELSWORT. After a few years residence there, he with his family emigrated to America, and settled in the city of New York, where many of the descendants still remain. His name is believed to be THEOPHILUS.†

He and his descendants professed their attachment to the Dutch Reformed Church. They spell their name ELSWORTH.

Six years after, A. D. 1670, the persecution was again renewed with increased severity by the same power; I believe the second brother fled at this time. He emigrated to America, and settled in Connecticut. From him descended the family of that State who spell their names ELLSWORTH. To this family belonged Chief Justice Oliver Ellsworth, who was born at Windsor, Ct., April 29, 1745, and died 1807, aged 62 years, and William W. Ellsworth, present Governor of that State.‡

The third brother who remained in Wales was *my* ancestor. I conclude he was several years younger than the other two, and at the time of persecution was too young to excite suspicion. From calculation I make his birth A. D. 1656, his emigration to America A. D. 1681, his death 1725, his age 69 years. He settled in North Kingston,†† R. I., where many of his posterity still remain. From him descended a num-

orous posterity, who have scattered over several States. The name was originally spelt AYLSWORTH. It was so spelt by him and is still so spelt by his descendants. § His christian name was Arthur.

The descendants of these three brothers resemble each other in their general appearance and natural turn; having sandy hair, light skin, dark blue eyes, and often red whiskers.

These three brothers were Welchmen.

* The Register might with propriety have stated the grounds upon which these conclusions were based. If the conclusions to the author's mind apparently justified a prevalent traditional account of the exodus of Arthur and other members of his father's family from England, a statement to that effect would have been preferable.

The account here given of the three brothers appears untenable, even though the unity of the three genealogies originating in Christopher, Josia, and Arthur, should prevail when carried further back.

For Theophilus the name of Christopher should be substituted, and the date, 1664, at which time he is supposed to have fled from England to Holland, must be abandoned, as well as the date 1670, at which Josia, the ancestor of the Windsor families is supposed to have left England. The latter was born in 1629, and the former about the same period. The consequent disparity in the ages of the three persons said to have been brothers is remarkable to say the least.

WILLIAM, second son of Arthur and Freelope, (whose son I am,) was born in North Kingston,* R. I., February 2, 1753, married Catharine Havens June 5, 1774; who was born in Newport, R. I., December 11, 1758.

In December 1775 they removed from their native State, and arrived on the 16th of the same month at the town of New Canaan, Columbia Co., N. Y., where they settled and spent their days.

They were amongst the first settlers of the country, commenced life with very limited means, endured the toils and privations incident to the settlement of a new country, being frugal and perseveringly industrious, they with the blessing of God, acquired a competency, reared a numerous family, who were permitted to "arise up and call them blessed." Lived esteemed and when removed by death left a numerous circle of friends and acquaintances to mourn their loss.

The former departed this life October 23, 1820, in his 68th, and the latter July 6, 1822. in the 65th year of her age.

ARTHUR who was a carpenter, settled in West Greenwich, he had four sons, Philip, David, John, and Chad.†

PHILIP (my great Grandfather,) settled on the homestead at Quitnie-seck Neck, see page 4.

JOHN had three sons, whose names were Arthur, John, and Josiah.‡

ROBERT was a carpenter, settled in East Greenwich, had one son whose name was Anthony.§

THOMAS was deaf and dumb, had no issue.

JEDIAH, called Chad, born in 1696, settled in West Greenwich, where he died in January, 1773.

CATHARINE married a gentleman by the name of Green.

ELIZABETH married a gentleman by the name of Peleg Card.

MARTHA married John Davis, whose residence was in Newport, R. I.

JEDIAH, sixth son of the above family, married Elizabeth Major, by whom he had one son, THOMAS, and three daughters, after whose death he married Mary Wood, by whom he had one son, PELEG, and two daughters.

THOMAS, son of Jediah and Elizabeth, married Susanna Randall. She died leaving one son, who died in youth—when he married Martha Harrington, by whom he had two sons, and three daughters. ANDREW, recently deceased. ELIHANAN, born Aug. 31, 1772, resides in Burlington, Otsego Co., N. Y.

THE RHODE ISLAND TOWN RECORDS.

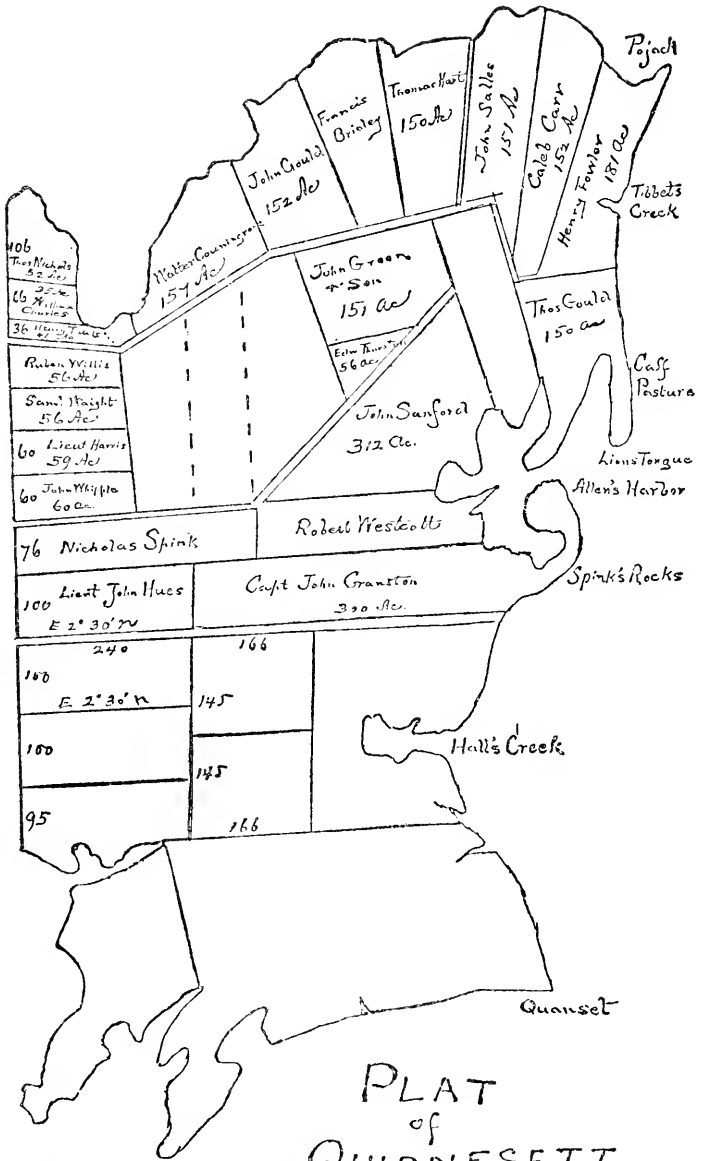


THE southern part of the State of Rhode Island was settled by Englishmen in the vicinity of the present site of Wickford in 1639, the section being known as the Narraganset country, from the name of the tribe of Indians inhabiting it. It was named King's Province March 20, 1654, and the boundary established May 21, 1669, about the time that the town of Westerly was incorporated. King's Towne, though settled first, was not incorporated until 1674. Its name was changed to Rochester June 23, 1686, but the former name was restored in 1689. It was divided into North and South Kingstown Feb. 26, 1722-3, and June 16, 1729, the three towns, Westerly, North Kingstown, and South Kingstown, were incorporated as King's County, having the same territory as the present County of Washington, to which its name was changed Oct. 29, 1781. Charlestown was taken from Westerly Aug. 22, 1738; Exeter was taken from North Kingstown March 8, 1742; Hopkinton was taken from Westerly March 19, 1757; Richmond was taken from Charlestown Aug. 18, 1747.

The County of Kent, taken from the County of Providence June 15, 1750, consisted originally of two towns, East Greenwich, incorporated Oct. 31, 1677, and Warwick, and included the present territory of that county. West Greenwich was taken from East Greenwich April 6, 1741, and Coventry was taken from Warwick, Aug. 21, 1741.

Scituate was taken from the town of Providence Feb. 20, 1730, and Foster was taken from Scituate Aug. 24, 1781.

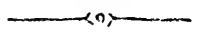
A Rhode Island town council, together with its other functions, is a court of probate. The town council records, real estate records, and the records of births, marriages, and deaths, are kept by a town clerk. The voluntary recording of births, marriages, and deaths was quite generally resorted to in early times as of possible future importance in the settlement of estates or otherwise. One of the early acts of the King's Towne Council was a resolution that the inhabitants of the town

present such facts for record, that each one might claim his inheritance. Owing to what seems to many a parsimonious policy on the part of the town councils, whose powers are ample and whose duties are plain, these town records which have been accumulating for two hundred years, have not, in some instances, been properly cared for. Some of the towns, however, have recently provided fire-proof safes or vaults for their records, and indexed many of the older volumes.

The records of most importance to this genealogy are those of North Kingstown, Exeter, East Greenwich, West Greenwich, Coventry, Scituate, and Foster. The North Kingstown records are of great importance, as containing nearly all the recorded evidence relating to the immigrant's family. These records were so badly injured by fire in December, 1871, as to render an examination of them very laborious. Many records were either destroyed or so injured as to be of but little value.

In getting from the Rhode Island town records the dates and localities will be given as in the records, hence the reader must have due regard both to old style dates and to the division of the towns already noticed.

Quidnesset, or Quidnesset Neck, is a tract of land in the form of an irregular quadrilateral lying in the town of North Kingstown, R. I., between East Greenwich and Wickford, containing perhaps 5,000 acres, and bounded on the north by Hunt's River and Potowomut Neck, on the east by Narragansett Bay, on the south by Wickford Bay, and on the west by a line running about due south from Hunt's Bridge and nearly coinciding with the old Pequot path, an Indian trail which afterwards became the Queen's highway, and which is at present known as the Post road, which path and ancient thoroughfare skirted the bay far enough from the shore to avoid the inlets. By the side of this road and about midway in the western boundary of Quidnesset is the rock known as "Devil's Foot," which appears to have been an early land mark in that vicinity. The northeast point of Quidnesset is called Pojack, and the southeast Quanset. Between these two points there is on the north a small inlet called Tibbets' Creek, and on the south one called Hall's Creek, while about midway is situated an inlet of larger dimensions known as Allen's Harbor. The surface is undulating, the highest point being about a mile northwest of this harbor, where some rugged cliffs are found facing the southeast, and from which may be obtained a picturesque view of the adjacent country and bay.

A plat of Quidnesset dated Feb 8, 1717-8, evidently not completed, indicates upwards of thirty lots on the tract, averaging about 150 acres each, though eight lots, mostly in the northwest corner, range from thirty-five acres to sixty acres each. The names of the owners of twenty-three lots are noted. One of the four lots having no other iden-

tity on the plat than their outlines claims our attention. This is a pentagonal tract lying between Allen's Harbor and the northwest corner of Quidnesset, containing about 400 acres, which tract, or the greater part of which tract, belonged to Arthur Aylworth, as he and his family are known to have owned upwards of 300 acres of it. Between the highway on the southeast side of this tract and a pine grove, which has grown upon land once cleared off, is a lot which has been known for many years as the old orchard. In this lot and near the grove is a plat of ground cleared partially of the drift boulders, so common in the vicinity, in which lies partly imbedded in the ground a large stone mantel, which, no doubt, formed part of the immigrant's fire-place. Here apple trees were standing within the recollection of persons still living, and here the plow has revealed other evidences, such as heaps of clam shells. etc., of its having been the site of a permanent house long ago. The ancient dwelling place in the old orchard is within a mile of the salt water, and situated in a westerly direction from it is a family cemetery, in which there are upwards of thirty distinct graves, but the greater number of them have no inscriptions.



THE FAMILY SURNAME.

THIS collection is properly named the Aylworth Genealogy. The name of the immigrant ancestor was Arthur Aylworth. His signature to deeds, will and codicil is recorded as autographic and uniformly written Arthur Aylworth. This form of the name prevailed among his descendants very generally for many years, and has been brought down to the present day by some.

Hence we would emphasize this fundamental fact, the original family surname. The results of a varying American orthography cannot set it aside. Traditional accounts, respecting the spelling of the name, must also yield to the superior force of unequivocal records.

The first variation in the spelling seems to have been the introduction of an *s* — Aylsworth — traces of which are found at an early date. The name has this form once only in the record of the immigrant's will, made between 1712 and 1720.

A record of the autographic signature of the immigrant's eldest son — Robert, is not found. In the body of instruments executed by him the name is clerically spelled Aylsworth. At the time his estate was settled, 1760, the records show much confusion in the spelling of his name, but the original form prevailed in his widow's will, and his son Ephraim's signature is recorded as autographic and spelled Aylworth in 1761, and Aylsworth in 1762.

The will of the son Arthur, of West Greenwich, was made in 1761. His signature was recorded as autographic in this and other instruments executed by him, and was written Aylworth.

John ^{his} X _{mark} Aulsworth is the recorded signature to the will of the son John, made in 1771, but in the body of the will the name is uniformly spelled Aylsworth. In 1776 his son Arthur signed his name "Aley, worth" in conveying land by deed.

It is probable that the son Philip made a will but no trace of it has yet been found. The clerical spelling of his name in 1736 was both Alworth and Aleworth, but the *s* became so thoroughly established in

the name with this branch of the family that Sylvester Aylsworth, his great grandson, concluded, erroneously, that the immigrant's name was Aylsworth.

The son Chad signed his name without the *s* certainly until quite late in life, but "being very sick and weak in body" when his will was made in 1756, he signed the same by mark thus, Chaad : C : ^{his}Aylesworth.

The clerical spelling of the name as found in the old town records, deeds, wills, etc., is not to be appealed to with confidence in justification of any particular orthography. In some cases the name is found spelled variously by the same hand in the same article or instrument. This inexcusable liberty was not uncommon. That confusion should appear in the spelling of a name so unusual and peculiar is not surprising, especially in a community removed from educational advantages. The immigrant's unvarying signature should settle conclusively the question of the proper orthography of the family surname.

The following list of unusual spellings, if of no importance otherwise, possesses a charm of variety, and is made from actual spellings of the name as found in various records and writings :

We observe, so far, but two important features — the essential characteristics of the immigrant's name — Aylworth, and the introduction of *s* (or *es*) Aylsworth, reflecting a changed pronunciation of the name.

But another element of confusion appeared about the time of the Revolution in the substitution of *E* for the initial *A*. The First Baptist Church of Newport records the marriage of Anthony Elsworth and Elizabeth Keiland, July 31, 1774. The *Newport Mercury* publishes the same marriage, but gives his name Anthony Aylsworth, and hers Betsey Keeling. The descendants of many families who emigrated from Rhode Island for one reason or another, or with no reason, have allowed the family surname to be spelled Elsworth or Eilsworth.

Arthur (2) Aylworth, of West Greenwich, was an inn keeper, and drovers from Saybrook, Conn., by the name of Elsworth, or Ellsworth, in passing to and from Newport were accustomed to stop at his inn. Abel Aylesworth often heard them talk over their relationship, and that they were all of the same family. The reader is referred to his statement elsewhere. Controversies arose as to the spelling of the name as between *Ayl* and *Ell*. The erroneous conclusion was entertained by some that Aylsworth was the Welsh form and Ellsworth the English form of the same name.

This surname was familiar in England at the time Arthur Aylworth came to America. An examination of old English works for variations the name has acquired in America has not yet been rewarded with any result sanctioning their use on such authority. The early variations that prevailed in England were slight in comparison with those that have prevailed in this country. A quite common variation placed an *e* after the *l* — Ayleworth. In such cases the *y* was sometimes omitted — Aleworth. The *s* so common in the American name, is extremely rare in the English, and its even rare occurrence may have resulted from the confounding of this surname with a very similar one in pronunciation — Aldesworth, known in the same locality. In a single instance only the initial letter *A* was found changed to *E*, the name then fully written being Elworth.

The following extracts, referring to graduates from the Oxford Colleges, in England, are both interesting and significant, as we can appeal to no higher authority for a proper and standard orthography of the surname at the dates given :

Anthony Aylworth, Doctor of Physic of New Coll, the King's professor of physic, and physician to Queen Elizabeth (graduated) July 5, 1582. He died April 18, 1619, and was buried in New Coll. Chappel. [Fasti Oxonienses, i. 222.]

Martin Aylworth, Doctor of Law of All-Souls Coll. (graduated) Nov. 27, 1621. [Fasti Oxonienses, i. 398.]

Henry Aylworth, Chancellor of the Diocese of Oxford, New Coll., D. C. L., March 9, 1660. [Oxford Catalogue.]

John Aylworth, Magd., B. A. Jan. 20, 1672,— M. A. Oct. 20, 1675. [Oxford Catalogue.]

“Surnames were introduced into England by the Normans and were adopted by the nobility about 1100” [Hayden] “Even after the conquest the practice was not introduced among the Saxon population, so far as reliable records testify, for one or two hundred years.” [Nicholas, Pedigree of the English People.] “The assumption of surnames by the common people is every where of much later date than their use by noble (gentle) families. As yet they can hardly be said to be adopted by the people of the wilder districts of Wales.” [Chamber's Encyc.]

Surnames often originated in local names, which seems to have been the case with the name of Aylworth. An English Gazetteer, printed in London, Eng., in 1775, cites two localities of this name in England, viz.:

Aylworth, Gloc, near Wythington.

Aylworth, Sussex, north of Eastbourne.

The following extracts from a description of the parish of Naunton is taken from Atkyn's History of Gloucestershire:

This parish lies in the hundred of Slaughter, four miles distant south-

west of Stow, four miles southeast from Winchcomb, and fourteen miles northeast from Gloucester. * * * The church is in the deanery of Stow; it is worth 120s. yearly. The Bishop of Worcester is patron. * * * The church is handsome with a beautiful tower adorned with battlements and pinnacles, and hath an aisle on the north side belonging to the family of the Aleworths;* it is dedicated to St. Andrew.

The images of the apostles have been painted in full length in the church windows, and some do yet remain entire. In the north windows are the images of St. Stephen and St. Catharine; and in one window is the image of John Bayle in a posture of prayer; and in several places is painted, to pray for the soul of Aleworth and the soul of John Bayle. The parish is eight miles in compass; it consists mostly of arable land. A brook, which breeds very large trouts, runs through this parish into Windrush River.

There are several hamlets, or smaller divisions in this parish:

1. Ayleworth, a mile from the church, where is the seat of the family of that name, who have a good estate in the place, and are of a very ancient descent; they have continued here ever since the Norman Conquest (A. D. 1066.)

“Alwin held Ailewurde in the reign of King Edward the Confessor (1042—1066); William Gozenboded held it in the reign of King William the Conqueror (1066—1085. It was taxed at one hide; there “was one plow’s-tillage in demean. It formerly paid a yearly rent of “6s.; it paid 3s. yearly in King William’s reign.” Domesday Book.†

Petronella de la Mere died seised of Elworth 47 Hen. III. (1263.) Gelbert de Clare, Earl of Gloucester and Hartford, was seised of this manor and Hartford in this parish, in the reign of King Edward the First (1272—1307); and his claim to a court leet, and other privileges was allowed in a *Quo Warranto* brought against him 15 Ed. I. (1287.)

This manor at the dissolution of religious foundations, did belong to the priory of St. Oswald’s in Gloucester, and was granted to Richard Andrews and Nicholas Temple, in trust. 35 Hen. VIII. (1544.) A farm in Ayleworth did belong to the priory of Lanthony, and was granted to Vincent Calmudée and Richard Calmudée 6 Eliz. (1564.)

Richard Ayleworth had livery of the manor and capital messuage of Ayleworth, with the lands lately belonging to the priory of St. Oswald’s and also a farm called de Lantone, 9 Eliz. (1567.) Other lands in Ayleworth, and a grove, did belong to the chantry of St. Mary in Westbury, and was granted to Anthony Cope. 10 Jac. (1613.) John Ayleworth was seised of lands in Naunton, Calcut, and Ayleworth, 16 Ed. IV. (1477.)

* In all historical extracts the orthography of this surname will be strictly copied.

† Domesday Book is one of the oldest and most valuable records in England, being a statistical survey of the country by William the Conqueror, and completed in 1086.

2. Bail Farm, another hamlet which did belong to a family of the same name, as appears by the glass windows in the church.

3. Upper Harford. William de Clinton, earl of Huntington, was seised of the manor of Hartford 28 Ed. III. (1355) Richard son of John Browning, was seised thereof 2 Hen. IV. (1401.) The priory of Lanthony was seised of lands in Harford and Aylesworth* 13 Hen. IV. (1412)

There are thirty-four houses in this parish, and about one hundred and forty inhabitants, whereof sixteen are freeholders: yearly births 5, deaths 4. Payments, to the royal aid 1692, 079£—11s—04d; 1684 to the land tax 063£—19s—00d; 1694 to the poll tax 022£—13s—00d.

Rudge's History of Gloucester, gives a briefer description of the parish of Naunton, and of Ayleworth, says it gave name to a family who were ancient possessors of it,—that lands in Naunton had belonged to the family of Ayleworth so early as 1477—has no variations in the spelling of the name, and to what is said by Atkyns concerning Richard Ayleworth, adds that "Joshua the last of this family died in 1718 when the manor, with the estates passed by purchase to —— Herring, Esq."

The reader will not fail to notice the variations in the spelling of the name in Atkyns' history, which are accounted for by supposing that the historian followed his authorities, giving the spellings as he found them; or as Lambard remarks in his history of Kent, concerning a similar case, "by depravation of the writers out of the sundry copies as I suspect."

Domesday has, beside the reference to Ailewrde given above, also a reference to Aldeswrde in Gloucestershire, and Strypes Memoir of the Ref. II P ii. page 6, referring to the year 1552, contains this clause: "And the tenths in Aldesworth, Linton and Skipton solas, in the connty of Gloucester, etc."

The introduction to Vol. IV. of Domesday, in speaking of the names of both places and persons says, "The caprice however with which they have been written as to spelling either in one or the other record is unaccountable."

We see from the foregoing that the place or locality called Ailewurde in Domesday became the Ayleworth of Atkyns' and Rudge's histories and the Aylworth of the old Gazetteer.

The syllable *Ayl* has a notable tendency to variations in spelling. Strype's Lives has four forms for one name—Aylmer, Elmer, Ailemer, and Elmer—all applied to one individual, Bishop John Aylmer, 1521—1594.

The name, however spelled, is a compound word, concerning the

* This may refer to the Aldesworde of Domesday, and the Aldesworth referred to in Strypes Memoirs, and not the Aylworth in Naunton parish.

derivation and meaning of which there is some difference of opinion, as will appear from the following references:

AYLSWORTH. This name admits of several meanings: *Eal*, Saxon, finished, completed, and *worth*, a farm-house or village. *Ayles*, Cor. Br., low meadow, flat lands, washed by a river, sea, or lake, and *gwerth*, a worth, farm, house, or village. [Arthur's Etymological Dictionary of Family Surnames, New York, 1857.]

"But since here is none other thing woorty Note, let us make toward Ailesforde; for there you may see the most assured marke of great Antiquitie, that we have within the Shyre of Kent.

Ailesforde, or Eilesforde * * * called in some Saxon copies, Egelesford, that is, the Foorde or passage over the River Egle, or Eile; or rather the passage of Ecclef which is a place in this parish; in others Angelesford, which is the passage of the Angles, or English men." [Lambarde's History of Kent.]

The name of Eigel, the hero-archer, is probably to be sought at Aylesbury, formerly Æglesbyrig, as well perhaps as at Aylesford, Aysworth and Aylstone. [Isaac Taylor, Words and Places, London, 1870, p. 223.] The Anglo-saxon *woerthig* which appears in English names in the form of *worth* bears a meaning nearly the same as *ton* or *garth*. It denotes a place warded or protected. [Ib. p. 80.] *Ton* or *garth*, a place surrounded by a hedge or rudely fortified by a palisade. Originally it meant only a single croft, homestead, or farm. [Ib. page 79.]

WORTH. Who shall decide when etymologists disagree? No less than six origins have been found for this little word, which has been made to stand for *a possession, a court, a farm, a place, a fort, and an island*. A very *worthy* subject for the etymologist. [Lower, Sug. Surnames.]

Worth — properly speaking, any sufficiently warded place, it had come to denote a small farmstead at the time the surname arose. [Bardsley.] The primary sense of *worth* is *strength*. [Webster.]

Professor Charles Dod, in a series of articles on the surnames in the New York Directory, published in the *Home Journal* of New York, makes an elaborate comparison of names based upon their known or supposed etymology. In one of these articles, in that journal of August 17, 1881, the names Aylesworth and Elsworth are brought into Mr. Dod's groupings with evident embarrassment as to the true etymological relations of the first member of these compounds. However, in a note he arrives at the probably correct etymology of the first part of the name in *Eigil*. The note referred to reads as follows:

"*Elsworth*, it is known historically, is homogenous with Aylesworth, in which the first syllable is either a transposed form of *Elyas*, (old spelling of Elias,) or an abbreviation of *Aylmer*, *Elmeric*, with the pos-

sessive *s* added. Or, noting that the English town of *Aylesbury* was originally spelt *Æglesbyrig*, we may conclude most reasonably that *Ayl*, and sometimes *El*, is a contraction of *Eigil*, one of the gods of Norse mythology."

In Domesday the names of places and persons commencing with the syllable *Ale*, *Ail*, *Æl*, *Aile*, *Ail's* and *Ales*, are strikingly numerous, and it is not improbable that very many names commencing with the syllable *Al*, such as *Alumard*, *Alunardus*, *Aluerdus*, *Alwaretone*, *Alwarditone*, *Aluerdestone*, *Alwaresberie*, *Alunar'bil*, etc., were pronounced with the long sound of *a* as in *Ale*.

In the names *Agelunardus*, *Aiglestorp*, *Aighelestorp*, of Domesday, and *Æglesbyrig* of the Saxon Chronicle we see more distinctly the source of the first syllable of the family surname — *Eigil*, as before stated.



ENGLISH GENEALOGIES, HERALDIC NOTES AND HISTORICAL NOTES.



THE parentage of Arthur Aylworth is yet unknown to his American descendants, but having in view the possibility of its discovery at some future time, various extracts which have come to notice relating to persons of the name in England are inserted here as of interest and of possible value in the prosecution of an inquiry. Following the plan adhered to throughout this work in all quotations from permanent records, the surname is reproduced with the orthography of the record.

“Sir John Champneys, Kt. married Elizabeth dau. of Sir Hugh Bytton of Bytton, Co. of Gloucester, Kt. Till this period the chief seat was Champneys in the parish of Stanton-drew, Co Somerset. To their son, John Champneys Esq. the Moor was granted as a crest temp. Henry IV (A. D. 1422—1461.) He married Joanna, dau. of Sir Humphrey Aylworth, of Aylworth, or Aylesworth. Co. Gloucester, Kt” [Berry’s County Genealogies, Kent, page 40.]

As elsewhere stated, it should be remembered that there were two distinct localities in Gloucestershire, Aylworth and Aldesworth, apparently causing some confusion.

In the second year of his reign (1548) Edward VI. sold chantries, colleges, etc. His book of sales of the same contains a memorandum of the sale of “a mansion and tenement called ‘The Mansion-House’ of the College of New-hal in the Mountrey within the city of Wells, etc. Yearly value 38£—14s.; purchase 728£—0s—2d.; purchaser John Ayleworth and Will Lacye.” [Strype’s Eccl. Mem. II. Part II. page 405.]

The city of Wells is in Somerset.

“In 1293 the temporalities of the Abbot of Cerne in Remescomb, were valued at 13£—15s. 32 Henry VIII (1541) this manor, inter alia, was granted to Thomas Arundel and his heirs, to be held of the

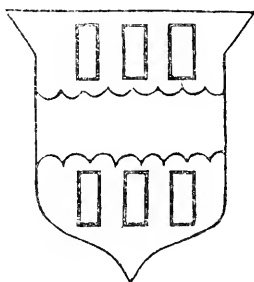
“king in chief, by Knights service. On his attainder, 6 E. VI (1553) “it was granted to John lord Fitzwarren, who, the same year, had “license to alienate this manor and 40 messuges, and 40 gardens, 6400 “acres of land, and 100s rent here, and the advowson of the chapel “value 12£—9s—4d to John Ailworth and heirs.” [Hutchins’ History of Dorset.]

“Letters were sent (Dec 9, 1558) to John Ay’worth, receiver of the counties of Somerset,” etc. [Strype’s Annals I., Part I., page 18.]

This was but a few weeks after the accession of Queen Elizabeth, who was prompt to look after the interests of her treasury.

Here lies Antony Aylworth descended from an eminent and ancient family in the County of Gloucester, born in London, liberally educated in the school of Winton, sometime a fellow of this college* a Doctor of Medicine and Regius† Professor under Queen Elizabeth for about fifteen years, a man of piety virtue and learning, equally dear while living to those in health and those in sickness: when at length the period of seventy-two years had been completed on the eighteenth day of April in the year of our Lord 1619, he peacefully fell asleep in the Lord, leaving [to mourn his loss] two sons Martin and Antony.

4. On an inescutcheon within an orle of Cinquefoils a crescent [DARCY] impaling azure a chevron between three griffins heads erased or [GOWER]” Visitations 1566 and 1574.

“Peter Aylworth of Takley in Com. of Oxen. gen. second sonne to Anthony, marryed Anne, daughter to Willm. Gower, of Woodhall in Com. Wigorn, gent., and by her hath yssue Thomas Aylworth, his eldest son and heir apparent; Willm. second sonne; Elizabeth now 4 years of age.” [Harleian Sec. V—216, page 8.]

Note to the above: “On the north wall of the chancell of Tackley Church this cut in stone: ‘Here lyeth the body of Peter Aylworth Esqr., once Ld. of this mannour, and Anne his wife, the daughter of Will. Gower of Woodhall. He deceased in the year MDCXI, (1611). This done by his son Marke.’ Over it is a fess engrailed quarterly (1) a fess between three garbes, (NOWERS). 2 Three stags lodging. (3) Semée of five foyles and an escocheon, impaling, GOWER, viz. a chevron between three wolves’ heads erased (all without colours). Und. the said Mon. is a raised monument of stone. Wood, E. I. p. 110.”

On page 53 will be found a much full description of the arms found “in Mr. Aylworthe’s house at Tackley.” In the remarks which follow and in quotation from Wood’s MS. E. I., p. 103, it is stated that “George Nowers Knight ob. A^o MCCCXXV.”

“ * * * And then chose (Sept. 5, 1683.) Mr. deputy Ailworth

Chamberlain of London, in the room of Sir Thomas Player, who laid down." [Luttrell, State Affairs, Vol. I. p. 278.] "Sir Peter Aylworth chamberlain of London (Dec. 3, 1685) being lately dead, his majestic hath constituted Peter Rich Esqr., alderman, in his stead." [Ib. p. 323.]

Thomas More died in 165. He was a writer as early as 1641. In his life given in Athenæ Oxonienses, Vol. 4, occurs the following:

"But the puritanical rebellion breaking out 'soon after, he took up arms for the parliament, became a gent. of the guard to Robert Earl of Essex the general of the forces belonging to the said parliament, took the covenant, and was made lieutenant of a troop of horse belonging to Capt. Richard Aylworth under the command of Col. Edward Massie."

In the life of Anthony A'Wood, author of Athenæ Oxonienses, occurs the following:

"Sunday (June 28, 1585,) after dinner, the University troop headed by Dr. Aylworth, chanc. of the diocese, went seven miles from Oxen. to meet and conduct thereto 4 loads of muskets, pikes, &c. for the scholars to train with. There appeared 60 horse divided into two bodies. They came in at 7 o'clock at night. Of the said troop the E. of Abendon was captain, Dr. Aylworth before mentioned was lieutenant, Dr. Clutterbuck of All-Souls cornet. But I saw no colours they had."

This refers to Henry Aylworth, D. C. L.

"Humphry Aylworth S. T. B. Vicar Church of St. Marys, towne or port of Sandwich Rent, April 12, 1597."

"Humphry Aylworth, (S. T. B., refig. 1601), rector Church of St. Michael, Harbledowne, Westgate Hundred, County Kent, in 1601." [Hastid's Hist. of Kent.]

Frances Aylworth. Kyneton in Co. Warwick, 20 Elizabeth,—1577-78.

Morant's Essex, describing Melescham, alias Mulsham-hall, says:

" * * * Of this Lord (William Blount, Lord Montjoy) they were purchased by Thomas Denny Esq: at the request of William Aylworth of Chelmsford. And a common recovery passed in Michaelmass-term, 1522, by Thomas Denny, and William Aylworth against Sir William Blount Lord Montjoy, of the maners of Mulshams, Brayhams, and Warrokys, with appertenances, and 10 messuages, 1000 acres of arable, 40 of meadow, 800 of pasture, 400 of wood, and 300 acres of more in Great and Little Leighes, Black Notele, Fayrestede, and Felsted. Oct. 2, 1531, these estates were purchased of Aylworth by William Walsingham, Esq., etc."

John Gunter of Raclon, Co. Sussex, and of Gilleston, in Wales, ob. 1557 Ing. p. m. mar. Jane, dau. and heir of Henry Aylworth of Co. of Wilts. 1st wife. [Berry's Sussex]

Extract from Widdowe Ayleworth's will 1636 Co. Buckingham: "I give to my brother John Ive my two houses at Burnham Townes Ende: and out of those 2 houses I give to the poore of Burnham 20s a year

and 6s. 8d. for a sermon, at the day of my buriall (which was St. Johns day at Christmas) [27 Dec.] or the Sunday followinge after, during (sic) the Worlde's Ende. And for want of payment of the 20s. and the 6s 8d thus it shall be lawfull for the churchwardens and overseers to enter upon the said houses &c. *Concordat cum originali Ita testor JOHANNEL WRYGHT, vicar de Burnham.*" [Collectanea Topographica and Genealogica, Vol. 4, p. 284]

Extract from parish register of Croydon, Surry :

"Thomas Aylworth, gent. wounded the xvii day of May, lay long languishinge under the hands of surgeons into the xx day of June and then dyed and was buried the xxi day 1515 in the middle chancell in Croydon churche."

Note to the above: "The arms of Edward Aylworth Esq., probably his father, were formerly in one of the windows in the hall of Archbishop Whitgift's Hospital. See Steinman's Hist. of Croydon, p. 68." [Coll. Top. and Gen., Vol. 2, p. 295]

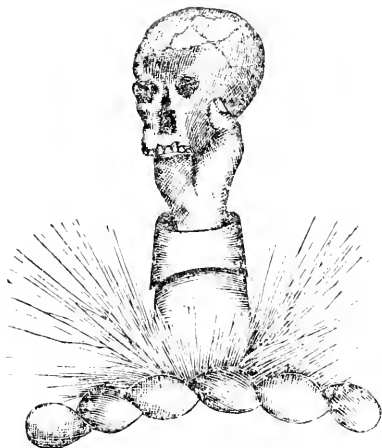
Abstract of the will of William Ailworth, Gent. :

William Ailworth, of Gomonly, als. Gumly, in the County of Leic^r. Gent. to be buried in the Church of Gumly. To Willm. Underwood of Artlingborough in the County of North^{ton} Yeoman, my nephew and godson, & to his heirs forever, all that my mannour of Gomonly als. Gumly, with the appertenances &c whatsoever in the countyes of Leicesters & Northampton.

To Susanna my wife ten pounds yearly. My executor shall find, provide, & allowe to & for my said wife during her life in my dwelling house at Gumly afors^d competent and sufficient meat, drink, lodging, washing, fire, candle, and other necessaries as well in sickness as in health, & convenient for a person of her age, degree, and calling; all of which I devise unto her in lieu and recompense of such dower &c. To every of the brothers & sisters & William Underwood five pounds apiece."

He then gives "yearly forever" £20 to the support of each of four free schools at Little Harrowden, Pitchley, Atlingborough, and Hal-loughton, "the masters of every of the schools to be at the time of election a Graduate of one of the two Universities of Oxford or Cambridge, of a sober, peaceable, and discrete behavior," etc. Also says: "My executor and his heirs shall forever have the nomination and election of all the said schoolmasters." The will was made 10 Aug. 1661. [See Collec., Topog. and Geneal., Vol. III. p. 330.]

Thus far there has been found but one description of arms, (already given incidentally), so Guillim says in a general form: "Ho beareth Argent, a Fesse engrailed between six Billets Gules: by the name of Aylworth." Nichols' Hist. Leicestershire, West Goscote Hundred, gives same, as also Gilbert, in his Historical Survey of Co. of Cornwall, and other authors.



Washbourne and Fairbairn both have a description of the Aylworth crest — an arm vested sa. out of rays. or, in hand ppr. a human skull. It is referred to Somerset, Gloucester, Kent, and Devonshire.

AMERICAN TRADITIONS.



BESESIDES Arthur Aylworth, of North Kingstown, R. I., there are early traces of but few persons of the name on this side of the Atlantic.

Robert Aleworth, Pemaquid, 1631. [Farmer's Register.]

Francis Aleworth, Dorchester, freeman, May 15, 1631, was chosen lieutenant at a court of Assistants, [Prince ii., Annals 32], but returned to England in March, 1632. At the court in March, 1631, another man with this surname was ordered to go "as unmeet to inhabit here." [See Farmer's Reg. and Savage's Gen. Dict.]

Francis Aleworth took the freeman's oath in Boston, May 14, 1634. [New Eng. Hist. and Gen. Reg.]

Edward Aleworth (or Aldworth), aged 13, embarked on the ship *Freelove* in London for Bormoodes. June 10, 1635. Elizabeth Aldworth, aged 15, embarked the next year in London for the same destination, where Bartho Aldsworth owned a plantation and slaves, about 1680.

This name is found in the States. Alfred Aldsworth, who, at the time of his death, resided in Williamsburg, and was engaged in mercantile business, mar. June, 1835, Eliza Van Brunt, b. Feb. 26, 1831, d. July 5, 1851. Their children were, Albert Van B. Aldsworth, Eliza Ann, William Henry, Matilda, and Alfred. We have already seen that there was a family seat in Gloucestershire, Eng., spelled Aldesworth. This fact raises a presumption that the Aldsworths originated there.

Jeremiah Ellsworth, Rowley, 1650, m. 2 Dec. 1657, Mary, widow of Hugh Smith, and died 6 May, 1704. [Savage's Gen. Dict.]

Christopher Elsworth, New York, as early as 1653. Eldest child born 1655.

Thomas E. Alesworth, b. Sept. 22, 1800, mar. April 18, 1822, Margaret Gibson, in Cumberland Co., Pa. His parentage is unknown to his descendants. One account is that his father emigrated from England, remained in this country, near Philadelphia, several years, where

Thomas E. was born, and then returned to England with all his family excepting Thomas E. [Wm. B. Butler.] Another statement is that Thomas E. Alesworth went to Cumberland Co., Pa., from some part of the State of New York. [Josiah F. Ellsworth.] Thomas E. Alesworth was a local preacher in the M. E. Church, and died July 31, 1832. Margaret Gibson was dau. of John and Margaret (Reynolds) Gibson, of Franklin Co., Pa. Their family consisted of five children:

Elizabeth M., b. April 17, 1823, m. March 3, 1842, James E. Coan, res. Carlisle, Pa.

John Wesley, b. March 16, 1825, (bachelor), P. O., Slacks Canyon, Cal.

Josiah F., b. July 18, 1827, m. ———, dw. Williamsburg, Pa.

Charles Brewster, b. July 17, 1829, m. July 29, 1851, Rebecca Wilson, res. Johnstown, Pa.

Harriet, b. July 26, 1831, d. Nov. 2, 1854, Ottumwa, Iowa.

After his death, his widow married John M. Butler, who died March 3, 1874.

Charles B. Alesworth remembers that his mother told him that his father lived in or near Philadelphia, and that his ancestors were English.

John W. Alesworth says his father was a carpenter by trade, but that he never followed it for a business; that he was a school teacher at the time of his marriage; that he was also a Methodist preacher for a time, and a Presbyterian as to doctrinal preferences; that he thinks he withdrew from the Baltimore Conference and only preached occasionally while engaged in the saw-mill business.

The descendants of Arthur Aylworth may never learn the trans-Atlantic family history of their ancestor. At present they have no positive information respecting his English home. They desire, however, no doubt to learn the known and also the probable facts of his history. Keeping as far as possible from theories, purely speculative, the account presented in these pages has been prepared under the indulgence of a faint hope that something may yet be ascertained that will determine his English ancestry.

Arthur Aylworth was living in the Narragansett country July 29, 1679. He wrote his name as here given. The surname has been brought down to the present time in this form, which form was not uncommon in England at the date here given.

The Register states that he was a Welshman, born in England. Traditions respecting the matter are, as usual, somewhat conflicting. One says he was of Welsh descent; another that he was of English ancestry; another that he came from England near the border of Wales; another that he came from Monmouthshire, while from many sources we are told he came from the west of England.

Abel Aylsworth, of Arlington, Vt., was born in West Greenwich, R. I., in 1745, where he remained until he was about thirty years of age. He died in 1830, in his 86th year. The following statement made by him in 1824 was committed to writing at the time by Judiah, son of Frederick:

Arthur Aylsworth lived with narrator's father, and died at his house in West Greenwich, R. I., in July, 1760; he was narrator's grandfather, and died when he was 76 years old. Narrator was named Abel by his grandmother, called Aunt Mary, the wife of Arthur, and was so named for her brother, Abel Franklin, the uncle of Benjamin Franklin.

The brothers of Arthur Aylsworth were:

Robert, who lived at Exeter, south of West Greenwich.

John, lived in same town and died at his son-in-law's house, J. Rathbun.

Judiah, lived in Scituate, R. I.

Philip, lived at Quid Nesick Neck.

Children of Arthur Aylsworth and Mary Franklin:

Philip, small man.

David, tall man, full six feet.

James.

John.

Judiah, short, thick-set man.

Freelove, tall, spare, married Tenant.

Austis, tall, very fleshy, married Colvin.

Demis, married Phillips; 2d husband Travis.

Barbara, short, married Jonathan Hill.

Judiah, married Ruth Draper, daughter of Thomas Draper.

Children:

Abel, the narrator, small-sized man; was an ensign in Warner's Regt., and went to Quebec with General Montgomery in 1776.

Molly, middling size, married Abel Parker.

Lydia, short woman, married Thomas Gordon.

Arthur, short, stout man; soldier in Revolution.

Christian, tall and fleshy, married —— Harris.

Judiah, small man.

Stephen, slim and tall; soldier in Revolution.

Ruth, tall and large, married Budlong.

Judiah married for his second wife Rosanna Stafford, daughter of Jonathan Edwards, and widow of Stukely Stafford. Children:

Wanton, large man, more than common size.

Perry Greene, short, chunked man.

Stukely, large man, florid complexion.

John, large, stout man.

Judiah died April, 1800, and is buried in Pownal, Vt. He came from West Greenwich to Pownal in 1780, was called Esquire Chad in Rhode Island, and for thirty years prior to his removal kept a tavern at West Greenwich. The dispute about the way of writing the name dates far back. The children of Ruth Draper all wrote their name with the "y." The children of Rosanna Edwards all wrote their name Ellsworth. Narrator heard his father say that the Saybrook and Windsor Ellsworths wrote their name Ellsworth, and had often heard them talk over their relationship, and that they were all of the same family. They were drovers and took cattle to Newport to sell, and were accustomed to stop at the tavern of narrator's father.

Narrator's grandfather told narrator's father and narrator never to drop the "y" out of the name. He said his was the original Welsh name, and never mixed blood with the Danes. Narrator's grandfather took narrator and held up his hand and looked through between the first and second fingers on his right hand and told narrator never to leave out the "y" as long as he could see the two fingers, and made narrator, when a small boy, promise he would not. Narrator, when a Member of the Vermont Legislature, went to Boston and examined the books of English Heraldry — could find no name of Aylsworth, but found the English name Ellsworth, and said he should keep the "y" as long as he lived, but his sons could do as they pleased about it.

The opinion prevails, founded on tradition, that Arthur Aylworth left England on account of religious troubles. His childhood and youth must have been in the troublous times of Charles II. What part his father or other relatives took, if any, in the contests of that day may never be learned. According to tradition his relatives were adherents of the Cromwell party, and some were officers in his army.

The first settler in the Narragansett country, or second only to Roger Williams, was Richard Smith, Sen., "who for his conscience to God left faire possessions in Gloster Shire and adventured with his relations and estate to New England," etc.* A recent town history of Rhode Island says that Richard Smith, Sen., emigrated to this country in consequence of the persecutions practiced under the reign of Charles I. and that his son, Richard Smith, Jr., was a major in the service of Cromwell. From the circumstances it is probable that the son did not come to America for quite a number of years after his father came † The names of Richard Smith, Jr., and Arthur Aylworth are associated in a petition to the king in 1679. If the latter came from Gloucestershire, where was the seat of the Aylworth Manor? Personal associations in England may have directed Arthur Aylworth's course to Narragansett.

† Cromwell did not receive his commission until he was upwards of forty-five years of age. [Macaulay.] Richard Smith, Sen., was here several years previous to 1644.

The date previously given July 29, 1679, is the earliest recorded date yet found fixing his presence in this country. This date is that of the petition before referred to, and has the following heading:

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty. The humble Petition and Remonstrance of your subjects, the inhabitants of the Narragansett Country, in the southerne parts of New England, called by your Majesty's Commissioners the King's Province.*

* * * In the times of these troubles and contests, the Indians insolent and very injurious to your petitioners the inhabitants, not without private abettors, as was suspected, killed our cattle, destroyed our creatures and plundered some of our houses, soe that wee were hardly able to live among them; some of us loosing in some few yeares neare 150 head of cattle. And when complaint was made to our superiors at Rhode Island, wee could have no reliefe, which made some of us apply ourselves to the Massachusetts Collony for redress of these outrages and enormities committed against us, according to an order of your Majesty's granted unto them about the yeare 1663, but still were without remedy; which many of us saw would end in a warr with the Indians if not timely and wisely prevented. Which afterwards came on apace, to the ruin and destruction of your petitioners' visible estates in that Province So that it became a desolate wilderness againe; and instead of Christian people, replenished with howling wolves and other wild creatures. But it pleased the Lord in his due time to put a period to these warrs, and your petitioners the former inhabitants, went over from Rhode Island, whither we retreated with the little wee had left, where it cost us one half of our cattle to keep the rest and carry us over. So cold was their charity to their poore neighbours in distress; and then and since imposed taxes on us, when your petitioners had hardly anything left for the subsistence of themselves and their little ones; and settled in the Kings Province againe, when very dangerous living in [cellars and holes] under ground, till we got a little before hand to rebuild, which with our owne indusry and hard labour, we hope in time to effect, if not discouraged and hindered by many that threaten to turn us off.

May it please your Majesty, this being in short, the true state of affairs of the Narragansett Country and the people there inhabiting, from the first settlement to the present time. Your petitioners, the inhabitants thereof, do humbly supplicate your Majesty, as you have been pleased to send your gracious letters to the foure Collonys of New England

* The petition is too lengthy to be given in full. The whole is full of interest. The latter part is, however, inserted as showing the presumption that Arthur Aylworth, one of the subscribers, may have been in America quite a number of years before its date.

strictly to will and require them to take care of the inhabitants there at present, so that you would in your princely wisdow and Royall bounty and justice, for the future vouchsafe an eye of favour upon the poore inhabitants your petitioners, the first settlers thereof, in a more peculiar manner, who have been at great cost and charge, and have laid out (most of us) all wee have in this world upon the same, and are not able to subsist, if removed from thence; it being now become in a manner our native country to some of us, and is as to many our children who were there borne; and we hope and promise for ourselves and children that shall succeed us, that your Majesty in no part of New England shall have more loyall and faithful subjects than your pesent petitioners; humbly requesting and desiring, that your Majesty would put an end to these differences about the government thereof, which has been so fatal to the prosperitie of the place; animosities still arising in people's minds, as they stand affected to this or that government, and may be wronged and injured by either government of these that take place, the transactions of former things being fresh in memory, an impartiall and equal judicature being the great and earnest the desires of your petitioners to live under, being wearied out with the former contests and the troubles wee have mett with from both Collonies comuanding us, do all of us unanimously and with one consent supplicate your Majesty not to leave us to the government and dispose of those that seek advantages against us. The country being large and able to containe many families, may make an entire Province, if your Majestye see cause. And your petitioners shall ever pray, &c. And subscribe your Majesty's humble. loyall and obedient subjects.

FIRST GENERATION.



E are now prepared to present a fuller account of the immigrant's family, recapitulating some of the main facts already noted.

1. ARTHUR AYLWORTH came to America from either England or Wales previous to July 29, 1679,* possibly previous to King Philip's War, married Mary Brown, of Providence, a daughter probably† of Rev. John and Mary (Holmes) Brown, and settled permanently in Quiddnesset, where he died between Nov. 7, 1725, and Sept. 13, 1726. Her death doubtless preceded his a number of years. The natural order of their children's names is not known, but the names of the sons apart from the names of the daughters, as given the following lists, stand probably in their natural order, excepting the name of Thomas, though John may have been younger than Philip:

2. i Robert (2) eldest son, m. Ann Davis.
3. ii Arthur (2) m. Mary Franklin.

* July 29, 1679, Arthur Aylworth and forty-one others of Narragansett signed a petition to the King praying that he "would put an end to these differences about the government thereof, which hath been so fatal to the prosperity of the place; animosities still arising in peoples' minds as they stand affected to this or that government." [The Editor.]

† The probability that she was the daughter of Rev. John Brown rests upon a very strong presumption at least. As a matter of fact her home was in Providence, and she had nephews by the name of Andrew and John Brown. The latter a successful merchant of Newport, owner of shipping, etc.

Rev. James P. Root:—I think that Mary, who married Arthur Aylworth, must have been the daughter of Rev. John Brown, son of Rev. Chad. That they had a daughter Mary would be very natural, as his wife was Mary, daughter of Rev. Obadiah Holmes, the much persecuted and whipped Baptist saint. That Mary Aylworth would name a child Elizabeth, after her father's mother, and Chad, after her grandfather, would be natural. On the supposition that she was a daughter of Rev. John Brown and Mary (Holmes), Rev. James' son, Andrew, would be her nephew, who was born Sept. 20, 1705. The John Brown who died at Newport, 1764, aged 68 years, was undoubtedly son of Ensign John Brown, son of Rev. John. He was born March 25, 1697. Both were nephews of Mary if she was a daughter of Rev. John and Mary Brown.

The chaotic records at Wickford contain traces of Arthur Aylworth's will and codicil. Internal evidences indicate that both instruments were drawn by the same person. In giving below what remains of the record the spelling of surnames and the grammatical construction of the text is presented unchanged. Whenever the sense of the lost text can be assumed with any degree of confidence an attempt is made to supply the same in brackets, regard being paid to forms common at the time.

THE WILL.

[In the name of God, amen. I Arthur Aylworth of the town of King's Town in the county of Kings in the Rhode Island and Providence Plantations being * * * as to bodily health but of a] Perfect mind and memory [thanks be given un]to God. Therefore calling unto [mind the mort]ality of my body and knowing [that it is appo]inted for all men once to dye do make [and ordain] this my Last will and Testament that [is to say prin]cipally and first of all I give and Rec[ommend my] Soul into the hands of God that gave [it an]d my body I recommend to the earth to be [burie]d in a decent Christian Buriall at the [discre]ssion of my Executor, and as touching [such] Worldly Estate where with it hath pleas[ed God to] bless me in this life. There are complete or partial records of seven receipts given to the executor for the legacies in Arthur Aylworth's will, all "in full" except perhaps that of Chad:

"Robert Ayleworth," by mark, Oct. 13, 1626.

"Arthur Aylworth," by autograph, Nov. 25, 1726.

"John Aylworth," by mark, Oct. 7, 1726.

Chad Aylworth — record of signature destroyed.

John Green for his wife Mary Green — date destroyed.

Peleg Card for his wife Elizabeth Card, Nov. 23, 1726.

John Davis for his wife Martha Davis, Dec. 1, 1727.

It is evident the author of the Register did not consult the Rhode Island town records. The North Kingstown records then in their entirety would have furnished him abundant material. Little can be obtained from them now relating to years previous to 1700.

The immigrant was appointed to some kind of inspectorship Feb. 6, 1698-9. He was elected ratemaker May, 1699, and viewer of fences and supervisor of highways June 5, 1699. He deeded a quantity of land to Henry Tibbets Sept. 21, 1697. Neither the bounds, number of acres, nor consideration can be ascertained. The deed was acknowledged October, 1697. The record of his signature remains distinct.

I., to which locality, then a part of East Greenwich, they moved from North Kingstown before June 29, 1723. He bought of William Wanton, June 22, 1724, for £100 320 acres of land, it being the "31st farm in 3^d or last division," and was farmer and inn-keeper. She was younger than he but died first. Working in the hay field, he was taken sick on a Thursday in July, 1761, and died the following Sunday, aged 76 years. His will was made July 4, 1761, probably during his sickness, and proved Aug. 1st, following; the will being signed Arthur Aylworth, and the personal inventory amounting to £672.* The order of the first six names of their children is not known.

He certainly had a grandson, Christopher Aylsworth, the subject of a special sketch hereafter.

The town council of East Greenwich, Aug. 3, 1723, noticed the fact that "William Aylworth is again come to reside at the house of John Aylworth," and took such action as was customary when persons without certificates from their own town were changing residence, to prevent their obtaining residence and thereby possibly becoming a burden to the town. As this was the second time or more he had lived with John Aylworth's family he was doubtless a near relative. All tradition relating to the immigrant indicates that he came alone to America, and that none of his near kindred afterward associated with him. If it should be presumed that this person was the deaf-mute and that the name Thomas was a mistake, there is nothing apparent, at present, to sustain the presumption.

Five other children, viz.: Obadiah, Peleg, Mary, Nancy, and Catharine died in youth.

6. CHAD (2)—Arthur (1) the youngest son, was born in 1696, and named for Chad Brown. He married (1) in Newport, R. 7. MARY (2)—Arthur (1)—She was the eldest daughter, and perhaps the eldest child of the immigrant.‡ The Aylsworth Register makes no allusion to her. She married previous to the making of her father's will, John Greene, who, Ray Greene Huling tentatively concludes, was a son of Benjamin (2) Greene—John (1)—. He gave a receipt, Oct 13,

* Elizabeth and Mary Major, daughters of David Major, of the Island of Guernsey, came to Newport in 1717, bringing with them a letter from the church "In ye Vale in ye Island of Guernsey," dated in June of that year, and united with the Trinity Church at Newport, and having left their home on account of domestic misunderstandings with their stepmother. 1726, for his wife's legacy in the settlement of the immigrant's estate. The following is taken from an article by Ray Greene Huling in the Narragansett Historical Register, Vol. II, No. 3, pp. 167-8, relating to this man and his family:

"He is styled 'Lieut. John' in 1732. On Jan. 9, 1733-4, being then of East Greenwich, he purchased 149 3-4 acres of land in what is now West Greenwich, it being 'the first farm in the first division in the right of Samuel Cranston,' and in 1743 sold farms formerly belonging to his father and brother Caleb, both deceased. The Cranston farm was the site of his homestead. He married (2) Aug. 7, 1741, Priscilla Bowen, of Swansea, Mass., (having a daughter Freelove Bowen), who survived him. His will, made March 26, proved April 25, 1752, alludes to two sons deceased, in addition to those named below.

9. MARTHA (2)—Arthur (1)—married John Davis before December 1, 1727, and dwelt in East Greenwich, where he died, before Feb. 25, 1737-8, when letters of administration issued to Martha Davis, late wife and now widow of John Davis of said East Greenwich, yeoman, deceased. Inventory, consisting mostly of household goods, farming implements, and smith tools, amounted to the sum of £194-15s.-6d. Arthur Aylworth, of East Greenwich, and Peleg Card, of North Kingstown, were bondsmen. Nothing further has been discovered respecting their history.

* Near the site of the dwelling now on this homestead there is a family cemetery, containing at least thirty-six graves without inscriptions. Peleg Card, son of Philip, died Oct. 19, 1846, aged 92 years, and his wife Alice (Sweet) died May 24, 1826, in her 74th year. They as well as his father, Philip, dwelt there and were buried in the family ground.

EMIGRATION FROM RHODE ISLAND.

This seems to have been mainly in the direction of the Hudson River country, and particularly to the eastern tier of counties in New York and southern part of Vermont. The following list, though by no means complete, will aid to a view of this subject.

If Elizabeth Foster, a minor, who, by her guardian, received the same amount, and at the same time as Hannah, in the settlement of Sarah's mother's estate, was Sarah's daughter, she may have been either a married daughter of Jabez Tucker or Sarah's daughter by a former marriage. In either case, if Sarah's daughter, we should say she had also:

ii Elizabeth, whose surname was Foster, or who may have married Foster.*

12. MARY (3)—Robert (2). Arthur (1)—married, Sept. 28, 1739, Nathaniel Pettis. He may have been the person of this name who was born May 17, 1714, son of William and Mary Pettey. They had:

13. EPHRAIM (3)—Robert (2), Arthur (1)—married Alice Pettey, who was born June 4, 1718, and who was a daughter of William and Mary Pettey, of Charlestown, R. I. They had, by deed from his father, Aug. 11, 1742, fifty acres of land adjoining his father's homestead, in Exeter, but Sept. 13, 1760, they were living in West Greenwich. He died before Aug. 11, 1767, at which time the inventory of his personal property was presented to the Exeter town council, and his son William appointed administrator.† Their children, so far as known, were:

† William made his will June 21, 1768, in which he mentions all of his brothers and sisters in the above list. Under this will sixty acres of land were sold, Aug. 10, 1774.

This family lived about three-fourths of a mile from Lewis City, and northwest from the Four Corners meeting-house, and on what was called Black River. Several children are said to have died there and it was thought the place was an unhealthy one. Alice was taken into Connecticut, where she remained some time in her girlhood with a family by the name of Douglass. A tradition states that several members of the family were celebrated sleep-walkers. [Abigail, daughter of Moses Clark, Jr.]

14. PHILIP (3)—Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—married Elizabeth..... They probably lived in East Greenwich until after the birth of their sixth child, since the record of the births of six children are found there. The others are found in Coventry. His will, made Nov. 14, 1789, says that he was old and feeble, and mentions the names of all his children given below, except John and Phebe. Arthur Aylworth deed to "my son Philip," date May 29, 1742, land in West Greenwich.

Philip (3) made a gift deed to each of his two sons, Philip (4) and John (4), of land in Coventry, Feb. 12, 1761. At some uncertain date, between the years 1842 and 1848. Rev. James P Aylworth, in writing to his son Orin, gave a brief outline of family connections, in which he refers to his grandfather Benjamin as having had two brothers, Philip and James, no allusion being made to the sisters. If John (4) above married and reared a family, the fact, very likely, would have been familiar to Rev. James P. Aylworth, whose father was born in 1755. John's receiving a gift of land from his father at the age of twenty-two is presumptive evidence of but not proof of his marriage.

Bowen (4) Aylworth remembered the visit of his mother's brother, a

sea captain. to Canada in sailor's uniform. If we may suppose Bowen (4) to have been five years of age at the time the visit took place, then we have a date about six years prior to the making of the will of Philip (3), John's father, who does not mention him. He probably died or was lost at sea during this time.

PHILIP AYLSWORTH'S WILL.

In the Name of God Amen the Fourteenth day of November A. D. 1789 I Philip Aylsworth of Coventry in the County of Kent, in the State of Rhode Island, &c., yeoman being old and feeble as to bodily Health, but of a perfect mind and Memory thanks be Given unto God; therefore Calling unto mind the Mortality of my body, and Knowing that it is appoin ed for all Men once to Dye Do make and ordain this my Last will and Testament, that is to say, principally, and first of all I Give and Recommen d my Sole unto the hands of God that Gave it and my body I recommend to the Earth, to be buried in decent Christian burial at the discretion of my Ex-ecutors, nothing Doubting but at the General Resurrection I Shall Receive the same again by the Mighty power of God, and as Touching Such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to Bless me with in this Life, I Give devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form

Imprimis my will is that my Just Debts Last Sickness and funeral Charges be well and Truly paid by Executrix in Some Short Time after my Decease.

Item I Give and Bequeath to Elizabeth my dearly beloved wife the whole of the profits of my Homestead farm whereon I now Live, part Lying in said Coventry and part in west Greenwich the profits thereof to be at her disposal during her natural Life to Gether also with all my Right in the narrow Lane Saw mill (so Colled) with my part of the Eutentals thereunto belonging to Gether also with profits of all my Right to the fourteenth Lot Lying in the Grait Grass pond Swamp (So Called) and Called the freeborn Lot with the one half of the thirteenth Lot Lying in said Swamp Called the Bates Lot and all my Right in the Eastermost Lot in Said Swamp Called the pickset Lot all which I Give and bequeath the profits to my said wife during her natural Life to her own disposal and after the Decease of my Said wife I Give and Bequeath the aforesaid Tract of Land mill and Lots to my Two well beloved Daughters Namely Hannah aylsworth and Marey Aylsworth as an Absolute Estate of Inheritance in fee Simple to be Equally Divided and to Remain to them and their Heirs and assigns forever

Item I Give and Bequesth to my beloved Son Benjamin Aylsworth five Shillings in Keal Silver money. the Reason why I give my Said Son no more is because he hath had his proportion of my Estate already.

- Item I Give and bequeath to beloved Son Philip Aylsworth five Shillings in Silver money the Reason why I Give my said Son Philip no more is because he hath already Received his proportion in my Estate
- Item I Give and Bequeath to my beloved Son James Aylsworth the Lot of Land whereon he now Lives and is to be Know by the name of the Herenton Lot to gether also with all my Right in three Swamp Lots in the Said Grait Grass pond Swamp which I have not heretofore Given away also with one half of my Right in the Susquehannah purchase to be and Remain unto my Said son James to him and his Heirs and assigne forever
- Item I Give and Bequeath to my three beloved daughters Namely Freelove wells Sarah Aylsworth & Cory the other half of my Susquehannah Land to be Equally Divid between my Said three Last named Daughters to be and Remain unto them and Each and Every of their Heirs and Assigns forever as an absolute Estate of Inhari- tance in fee Simple
- Item I Give and Bequeath to my Dearly beloved wife and my Two Daughters namely Hannah and Marey (after all my Debts and Legacies be well and Truly paid) all my farming tools all my Live Stock and Housel furniture and all other Kind of my moveable Estate Let it be of what name or nature Soever to be and Remain for them and Each of them to be Equeally Divided between my Two Said Daughters Hannah and Marey after the Decease of my Said wife

15. DAVID (3) — Arthur (2), Arthur (1) — of West Greenwich, cooper, married March 8, 1741-2, Martha Franklin, daughter of James, of Scituate. James Franklin's will, made Aug. 8, 1748, proved Nov. 8, 1756, mentions: sons, Philip, James, Gideon, Ichabod, Uriah, and Elisha; daughters, Lydia Rowland, Abigail Handa, and Martha Aylsworth; and grand-daughter Sarah Lee [Scit. Rec.] David(6) of Pecksville, Pa., says his family consisted of two sons, Rufus, who died young, David, and some daughters, and that he went to sea a number of times though he did not become a regular sailor. His name is found in the town records as early as 1742, and was surveyor of highways, 1757, and constable, 1761. He seems to have dwelt in Coventry in 1753 and several years following, but subsequently in West Greenwich. His wife's signature appears on deeds he makes until July, 1783, when he alone makes a deed to his son David (4) of land in West Greenwich, identifying himself as David Aylsworth, of West Greenwich, but now residing in Pownal, Vt. His wife, Martha, was living Feb. 2, 1778, when they made a deed of gift to their "loving and trusty grand-son Blackburn Franklin Aylsworth." [W. G. Rec.] This could not have been David's son, then only two years of age. In his will, made Aug. 9, 1791, and proved last Monday in November, 1791, he mentions his wife, Ruth, to whom he gives the improvement and profit of his homestead farm in West Greenwich during her widowhood in lieu of dower, and after her death or marriage which may first happen then to, etc. To a daughter his land and buildings in Coventry; and to others his estate both real and personal in Stamford, Vt. In his will he mentions all the children's names below except that of Rufus:

16. JAMES (3)—Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—married Mary Wood, Feb. 8, 1733. [N. K. Rec.], daughter of William, of East Greenwich. The

history of this family is not certainly known beyond the record [E. G. Rec.] of the birth of their eldest son:

Eddy (4) b. March 15, 1733-4.

It appears that James Alworth bought a piece of farm property in Amenia, Dutchess Co., N. Y., in 1762, and in 1819 conveyed the same to his two sons, Henry and Samuel Wigton Alworth. Henry subsequently conveyed to John Egglestone in 1823. [County Records by Edw. Elsworth.] James Alworth, Jr., was one of the "Associators" of Amenia Precinct, Dutchess Co., June and July, 1775. Same list contains name of William Alworth. [Cal. N. Y. Hist. MSS., Vol. I., pp. 75-76] Possibly this latter person may have been William, eldest son of Anthony, b. Feb. 14, 1728.

17. JUDIAH (3)—Arthur (2). Arthur (1)—dwelt in West Greenwich,* where he was admitted freeman May 1 1744, as Chad Aylsworth, elected justice of the peace 1760, as Jeddiah Aylworth, and to same office in 1764-5, as Judiah Aylworth. His autograph, 1772 and 1773, was Judiah Aylworth. He was elected deputy from his town to the Rhode Island General Assembly, 1776, and was, some year, appointed to take the census of that town. He married (1) April 1, 1745, Ruth Draper, daughter of Thomas Draper, of West Greenwich; and married (2) March 11, 1764, Rosanna (Edwards) Stafford, daughter of Jonathan Edwards, and widow of Stukely Stafford. He moved to Pownal, Vt., in 1780, where he died in July, 1800, and where he was buried. Will made Aug. 4, 1796. His wife, Rosanna, died at Saratoga, N. Y., in July, 1809, and lies buried in Old Saratoga Cemetery, near Schuylerville. She had quite a family of children by her first husband. She was regarded as a woman of rare beauty.

THE WILL OF JUDIAH AYLESWORTH.

In the name of God, Amen. The fourth day of August A. D. 1796, I Judiah Aylesworth of Pownal in the State of Vermont, being old, and somewhat infirm in body yet through the goodness of God of perfect mind and memory, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die I do make and ordain this my last will and testament, and first of all I ——— my soul into the hands of God that gave it me, and my body I recommend to the earth to be decently buried nothing doubting but that at the general resurrection I shall receive the same again. And as to my worldly estate that it hath pleased God to bless me with I give and dispose of it in the following manner.

I give and bequeath unto my well beloved son Abel Aylesworth six shillings.

I give unto my son Arthur Aylesworth two pounds.

I give unto my son Judiah Aylesworth six shillings.

I give unto my son Wanton Aylesworth six shillings.

I give unto my son Perry Green Aylesworth three pounds ten shillings.

I give unto my son Stutely Aylesworth three pounds ten shillings.

The above legatees have had nearly all their portion before.

I give unto my grandson Daniel Aylesworth ten pounds.

I give unto my grandson Stephen Aylesworth one pound.

I give unto my grandson Reuben Aylesworth one pound.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Parker one silver table and tea spoon.

I give unto my daughter Lydia Gorton one silver table and tea spoon.

I give to my daughter Christiana Harris five pounds and one silver table and tea spoon.

I give my daughter in law Phebe Aylesworth one silver table and tea spoon.

I give unto my daughter Ruth Budlong one silver table and tea spoon.

I give unto my grand daughter Ruth Aylesworth one pound.

I give unto my beloved wife one feather bed and furniture one side saddle, one cord,(?) cow(?) one sheet,(?) shoat(?), one brass kettle, one

iron —— kettle, one warming pan, three chairs, one half of the pewter, half a case of knives and forks and one table.

Further my will is that for the maintainance of my wife so long as she remains my widow or during her life time I give unto her one third part of my farm to be improved by her during the abovementioned term, namely, during her widowhood or life time, with the use of the best room in the house with the privilege in the chamber, cellar and barn, further my will is that the above legacies to the legatees should be paid in neat stock and horses, in some short time after my decease except my grand-children's part, and that my will is should be paid when they become of lawful age that is twenty one the boys and eighteen the girls.

Further my will is that my two sons Frederick Aylesworth and John Aylesworth should pay the legacies by me given to the within named legatees out of personal estate in the way and manner as has been within mentioned.

I give and bequeath unto my son Frederick Aylesworth the one half of my farm I now live on with one half of the buildings thereon standing to him his heirs and assigns forever to be divided as hereafter shall be mentioned.

I give and bequeath unto my son John Aylesworth the other half of my farm with the other half of my buildings to him and his heirs and assigns forever to be equally divided quality and quantity between them, namely Frederick and John Aylesworth. I

I do now ordain and appoint my two sons Judiah Aylesworth and Frederick Aylesworth my executors of this my last will and testament and after all my just debts, funeral charges and legacies to the legatees shall be paid by my two sons Frederick and John what remains of my estate if any there be I give unto them namely, Frederick and John Aylesworth to be equally divided between them.

I do now ratify and confirm this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

18. ANTHONY (3)—John (2), Arthur (1)—married Sarah Briggs, dwelt in East Greenwich, and died in the Expedition against Crown Point.

Anthony Aylworth son of John Aylworth and Sarah Briggs daughter of Richard Briggs both of East Greenwich were married Jan. 9th 1728-9 by Thomas Spencer J. P. [E. G. Rec.]

Richard Briggs, "being very sick and weak in body," made his will March 29, 1733; mentioned his wife, Experience; sons, Richard, Francis, John and Caleb; daughters, Sarah Aylworth and Ann King; sons, Philip and Daniel; daughters, Mary and Adre Briggs; grand-sons, Richard Briggs, Caleb Tarbox and Richard Matteson. Proved April 28, 1733. Personal estate, £484. [E. G. Rec.]

"Whereas Anthony Aylsworth of East Greenwich . . . enlisted himself and went as a soldier in the Expedition against Crown Point in the regiment of soldiers raised by the Colony aforesaid, under command of Colonel Christopher Harris and there in said expedition died intestate," etc. The town council appointed "Sarah Aylsworth, the late

wife and now the relict widow of the said intestator," administratrix, Aug. 1, 1757. Inventory, 313£—19s.—9d. [E. G. Rec.]

The East Greenwich records afford the dates of the birth of five children. The name in the record is Aylworth.

The settlement of the estate left the widow in destitute circumstances, apparently, as the record shows that the personal estate lacked 63£—2s—3d. of paying the debts against it, which she paid, perhaps, by the sale of her home, for Christopher Aylsworth sold three-fourths of an acre of land Dec. 24, 1759 for 37£, it being "the same message or lot of land that my Uncle Anthony Ay'sworth formerly walled in by itself and dwelt on." However this may have been, the town council clerk made the following entry March 25, 1758:

"So that it appears to this town council that the said Sarah Aylsworth has fully administered on said estate and her bonds be given up."

We know that John (4) was reared in another family, and there is reason for believing Anthony (4) was also bound out. That the minor children were bound out is a natural inference.

19. ARTHUR (3)—John (2), Arthur (1)—became a freeman May 3, 1743, married Almy——, and dwelt in West Greenwich, R. I. The census of 1774 gives as his family two males over 16, and two females over 1. A deed which appears to have been made by this Arthur Sept. 14, 1775, designates Amey as his wife. David Culver administered upon his estate, and the inventory of his personal property rendered Oct. 14, 1794, amounted to 35£ 16s.

He obtained of Wm. Reynolds, Feb. 9, 1742-3, a forty acre lot, which is still none by his name. It appears that for some reason his family of children, except his son Joseph, left Rhode Island. It is stated that his

wife left the children, but at what time they emigrated has not been ascertained. Arthur died on his homestead. His son Joseph continued to live on the lot near where he also died. Two lonely graves are pointed out as being the graves of Arthur and his son Joseph. The title to the lot did not pass to Joseph, who dwelt there alone for a number of years previous to his death. The lot was sold by the town council for taxes, and about ten years after Joseph's death, Burton Briggs acquired title from the heirs of Arthur that could be found.

dwelt on his father's homestead, the same land which constituted the immigrant's homestead, in Quidnesset.

Edward Dyer's will was made Aug. 5, 1776, and proved April 21, 1788, the record of which has been injured, but it mentions his son, Edward, his grand-son, Ba[rat] Dyer, his daughter, Freelove Aylsworth, wife of Arthur Aylsworth; his daughter, Hannah, wife of Richard Card, deceased; his daughter, Phebe Dyer, and his son, John. The first bequest is lost, and one certainly, perhaps two, lost towards the latter part of the will.

The will of Arthur (3) was made in the year 1708, the record of which is among the mutilated records of North Kingstown, and though in fragments, shows that the original was quite an elaborate instrument. The following is a brief abstract of the same:

To eldest son Jeremiah 70 acres with dwelling house and other buildings thereon, bounded E. by high way, N. part by land of Christopher Allen and part by land of Jonathan Allen. [Record wanting.]

To John Dimond the profits of 20 acres with a dwelling house [record wanting] end of the lot of land which I purchased of my brother Job Aylsworth, bounded W. by lands of belonging to the heirs of Samuel Gardner, S. partly on land of John Spink, part on land of Silas Allen, and part on land of Christopher Allen, E. and N. by my other lands, which profits of 20 acres and buildings I give to John Dimon upon his supporting my grand daughter Mercey Aylsworth, etc.

To son Arthur all the remainder of my farm where I now live containing 120 acres with dwelling house and other buildings thereon, bounded N. on lands of Benj. Tanner, dec'd, E. on land of Jonathan Allen and part on land given to my son Jeremiah and partly on land I give [record wanting] Aylsworth and party [here is wanting four to six or eight lines of the record, probably] heirs of Samuel Gardner, dec'd, and partly on lands of Frances Reynolds and Henry Reynolds, which lands to Arthur Aylsworth during his natural life and after his decease all the same lands (saving 20 acres lying east of [wanting] 20 acres said Dimon is to have the [wanting] of which land I purchased of my brother Job Aylsworth) unto my said Arthur's two sons Hazard Aylsworth and William Aylsworth, equally.

To my grandson Samuel Aylsworth son of my son Arthur, after the decease of my said son Arthur, the Fo— [Forty?] acres of land which I purchased of my brother Job Aylsworth that is including the 20 acres which I have given John Dimond after my grand daughter is supported out of the same.

[Here follows bequests to two daughters, (and perhaps other bequests) the substance of which is unknown.]

To daughters Sarah Tanner, Mary Essex wife of Richard Essex, Freelove Hill, aforesaid, Catharine Sweet wife of Samuel Sweet, ———

To my grand daughter Rhoda Hill daughter of my daughter Anna Hill, dec'd,——

If Abigail Aylsworth the wife of my son Arthur should survive him, then she shall have profits of 1-3 the estate devised to her husband, so long as she shall remain his widow. Son William Ex'r.

Freelove (Dyer) died Sept. 26, 1790, in her seventieth year, and Capt. Arthur (3) March 18, 1801, in the eighty-first year of his age. This family of children consisted of four sons and five daughters. The order of their names not known:

23. JOB (3)—Philip (2,) Arthur (1)—married Sarah Clark, [Aylsworth Register] of whom nothing has been definitely ascertained as yet. The will of Elisha Clark, of North Kingstown, made March 20, 1750, and proved April, 1755, may allude to her as his daughter, Sarah Clarke, to whom he gave £200 in bills of public credit, one milch cow, and in addition a general setting out for housekeeping. Will also mentions daughters, Mary and Abigail, and sons, Benjamin, Thomas, Joseph and Elisha, Joseph was executor. The legacies were to be paid to the daughters at twenty years of age or on the day of marriage, which might first happen.

The date of their marriage is not known, but his name occurs in the town records under circumstances which lead to the conclusion that he settled in Quidnesett before 1760, and his family is referred to in the records Jan. 14, 1762, under circumstances which may indicate her decease before that time, but this is only an inference.

Job Aylworth of North King-town and Sarah Aylworth of Coventry

daughter of Philip, were married March 26, 1765. [Cov. Rec.] She was a daughter of Philip (3)—Arthur (2), Arthur (1).

He bought land in Coventry of Benj. Bates, March 25, 1767, and Oct. 5, 1768, sold the same to Francis Bates. "The 1-2 part of a certain logway adjoining to a river by the name Mossup [Moosup] River in Coventry whereon stands one corn mill and is a conveniency for a saw-mill, together with 1-2 said corn-mill, it being the same logway I bought of Benj. Bates, together with 1-2 the privilege of the stream and dam whereon said mill stands with privilege to erect a new saw-mill," etc.

He sold, Sept. 8, 1772, "the farm on which I now live," 102 acres in Coventry for £90, and probably emigrated soon after. The Aylsworth Register says: "he resided sometime in Schodack, N. Y., then moved to Canada." It is the opinion of some of his descendants that he dwelt in Saratoga Co., N. Y., awhile. He entered Canada in the scarce year, 1788, and settled in Ernestown, near Bath, where he, his wife, and three children died during the prevalence of spotted fever in 1803.

He was a man of resolute character. Having a distressing felon he removed the affected finger himself with a chisel and mallet.

Bowen was a surname common in Rhode Rhode Island at the time Job emigrated, though how it originated as a Christian name in this family has not been explained.

24. PHILIP (3)— Philip (2), Arthur (1)—married, July 1, 1753, Deborah (Waite) Dyer, of Exeter, widow of William Dyer, late of North Kingstown, brother of Freelove Dyer, wife of Philip's brother, Arthur Aylsworth.

Letters of administration were issued to Deborah Dyer, widow of Wm. Dyer, dec'd, Oct. 9, 1749. [N. K. Rec.] First inventory amounted to upwards of £300. Two others were afterwards presented, amount not known. In the year 1760 Barat Dyer desired the town council to approve of Philip Aylworth as his guardian. [N. K. Rec.]

Philip Aylworth, of North Kingstown, made to his son, Philip, Jr., a gift deed of 200 acres of land in West Greenwich, dated Dec. 16, 1754. [W. G. Rec.] This land was south of the land of Arthur (2) Aylworth.

Philip Aylworth, of West Greenwich, and Deborah Aylworth, his wife, sold land in West Greenwich to William Barker, Sept. 19, 1769. The signatures were both autographic, and the names spelled Aylworth. [W. G. Rec.]

It is probable that Philip and Deborah emigrated about this time, for on the 18th day of February, 1772, they deeded land in West Greenwich to Judiah Aylworth. The deed says: "Philip Aylworth of New Britain Dutchess Co. N. Y.," and mentions his wife Deborah Aylworth. His signature is autographic, and spelled "Aylworth." Her name is not signed to this deed. As near as can be learned they went to Canada about 1790 or 1791; remained in Ernesttown for a time, but crossed into Prince Edward County, where she died, probably at the house of her son Barret Dyer, advanced in years and not long after their arrival in Prince Edward County. Philip went back to Columbia Co., N. Y., but returned to Prince Edward County, where he died suddenly, when in the field at the home of his grand-daughter's husband, Asa Werden, at the age of perhaps 90 years.

Deborah (Waite) had a sister, Lucretia Hopkins, who died in Rhode Island, and also three brothers, Benjamin, Samuel, and George Waite, who went to Prince Edward County after she died, and who died there, probably. By her first husband she had two children, at least, Barret and Waty, who both went to Prince Edward County. Waty died at her brother's house in middle life, but Barret lived to old age, on the south side of East Lake.

25. THOMAS (3) - Chad (2), Arthur (1) - was born Aug. 21, 1726, baptized Oct. 16, 1726, at Trinity Church, Newport; admitted freeman May 6, 1746; made Ensign of 9th Company May, 1756. 2d Lieutenant March 14, 1758, and Captain of 2d Company of Scituate July 13, 1761.

He married (1) Susanna Randall,† and settled in Scituate,* where she died before June 24, 1758 ‡ He took part in the Expedition against Fort Frontenac in 1758, and afterwards married (2) Martha Harrington,§ who was born April 25, 1739, and who was a daughter of Amos and Mary (Bates)¶ Harrington, of Scituate. The family moved probably in 1776.∥ to "Old Dutch Hoosick," in Rensselaer Co., N. Y., where

they lived until quite infirm from old age, spending their last years with their children in Burlington, Otsego Co., N. Y., where she died, April 5, 1803, at the house of their daughter, Tabitha Weightman, and he at the house of their son, Elhanan Aylsworth, Oct. 13, 1814, aged 88 years, 1 month, and 22 days. They were members of the Baptist Church and were buried in the old Baptist Church cemetery, between West Burlington and Garrattsville. He was a man of simple habits, a plain, sturdy man, frugal, generous, neighborly, and honest.

26. JUDA (3)—Chad (2), Arthur (1)—married Stephen Colegrove, whose mother's name was Taylor, and dwelt in Foster, R. I.

The will of Stephen Colegrove was made July 30, 1811, and proved Dec. 12, 1811, mentions his wife, Juda, and all the children's names that appear below. Personal inventory, \$419.51. Letters of administration were granted to Caleb Colegrove April 4, 1812, to administer upon the estate of Juda Colegrove. [Foster Rec.]

The will of Stephen Colegrove, Sr., was made May 7, 1786, and proved June 23, 1787, mentions sons, Stephen, Thomas, William, Benjamin, Isaac, Nathan, Jonathan, and John, who got the homestead in Coventry; and daughters, Welthian Wightman, widow, Elizabeth Williams, Mary Nichols, and Phebe Corwin. [Cov. Rec.]

Stephen Colegrove and Phebe Millard married June 7, 1740. If this refers to Stephen, Sr., above, it must have been his second marriage, for his daughter Elizabeth married John Williams, Dec. 2, 1753. [Cov. Rec.] Mary married Samuel Colegrove of Coventry, son of Francis, Oct. 18, 1779, and their son Francis was born Aug. 22, 1760. She married John Nichols, Dec. 12, 1773. Stephen's daughter Phebe married Phineas Corwin of Norwich, Conn., Nov. 4, 1779. The will of Stephen's son John was made Feb. 18, 1817, and proved April 7, 1817, mentions his wife, Nancy; daughter, Hannah, wife of Reuben Blanchard; daughter, Amey Colegrove; grand-daughter, Nancy Phebe King, and sons, Archibald and Bela H. Colegrove. Cov. Rec.]

Stephen and Juda Colegrove, of Foster, both died in old age. Their children, of whom we have an account, are as follows:

One Thomas Colegrove, of Warwick, was admitted freeman May 6, 1746.

Jeremiah and Susanna Colegrove dwelt in Coventry at this time. Their children were: William, b. in Exeter, Sept. 17, 1760; Andrew, b. in Voluntown, Feb. 12, 1764; Samuel, b. July 26, 1767; and Silas, b. June 3, 1769. [Cov. Rec.]

28. PELEG (3)—Chad (2), Arthur (1) — was born Aug. 20, 1749, and married Nov. 26, 1772, Anna Cole, who was born March 23, 1755, and she was a daughter of Daniel and Anna (Young) Cole. Daniel Cole's will was made March 6, 1795, proved Oct. 2, 1795, witnessed by Asa Young, Abiather Young and Zolock Young, and mentions his wife Anne, son David, daughters, Sarah wife of Martin Luther; Anne, wife of Peleg Aylsworth, and Martha, wife of John Hammon; and granddaughter, Mary Aylsworth. Peleg Aylsworth was executor. [Foster Rec.]

They left Foster, R. I., in the Autumn of 1797, and settled in Edmeston, Otsego Co., N. Y., between the Wharton Creek and the Unadilla River, west of Edmeston Centre, where they dwelt until the year 1820, when they removed to the western part of the town of New Berlin, Cheungo Co., where he died, Aug. 20, 1824, and she Jan. 11, 1844.

29. ROBERT (4)—Robert (3), Robert (2), Arthur (1)— was born Feb. 1, 1742, and married in West Greenwich, R. I., April 12, 1761, Rosanna Straight.

His father gave him by deed, Nov. 28, 1762, ten acres of land in Exeter, R. I., but this lot was, perhaps, conveyed back to the father Feb. 14, 1764.

The statement is made by Albina Ellsworth, of Atco, N. J., that he settled in Shaftsbury, Vt., and that he had two sons who lived in Newfane or Townsend, Windham Co., Vt.; also that in 1838, when her father saw them, they were probably forty or fifty years of age.

30. JOSEPH (4)—Robert (3), Robert (2), Arthur (1)— was born April 1, 1750, [Ex. Rec.] and married Freelove Cowes. They settled in West Greenwich, where they evidently remained until after Nov. 12, 1781. Deeds to land in West Greenwich were made by Joseph and Freelove as late as 1784-5, and nothing indicates that they left Rhode Island before these dates.* They emigrated to Hoosac, N. Y., where he died before Jan. 10, 1794, the date of letters of administration granted to his widow.†

31. ALICE (4)—Ephraim (3), Robert (2), Arthur (1)—the first wife of Moses Clark, was married Nov. 18, 1773. He was born Dec. 29, 1751, the youngest of eight, the children of Thomas and Bridget (Barber) Clark, who were married Dec. 17, 1732, and who dwelt in Richmond, R. I. The names of the other children, in order, were: Ruth, William, Thomas, Elizabeth, Judeth, Lois, and Arnold.

Alice and Moses Clark dwelt in Richmond, near the line of Exeter, having four sons and four daughters:

- v Judeth (5) m. David, of Income and Sarah (Arnold) Potter. She d. in Voluntown, Ct. He was a wagon maker.
- vi Newman (5) m. (1) Deborah Lawton, (2) Hannah, of Elder Ezekiel J. Locke. He died at Brand's Iron Works, now called Wyoming, R. I.

Alice (4) died three days after the birth of her youngest child, and is highly praised by her descendants.

32. BENJAMIN (4)—Philip (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born Feb. 5, 1734-5, and married Mary Parker, who had two brothers, James and John, but whose parentage is unknown. His father made him a

deed of gift to land in West Greenwich, R. I., Nov. 14, 1756, but his wife, Mary, died Jan. 3, 1759, [W. G. Rec.] and he sold this land March 1, 1760. Since this deed says, "Benjamin Aylworth of West Greenwich," it is not likely he emigrated until after this time, though Rev. James P. Aylworth stated that his father, Abraham, was three years of age when Benjamin left Rhode Island.

He married for his second wife—probably in Rhode Island—Molly Eldredge, who was somewhat advanced in life, and emigrated to Niskayuna, N. Y., between Troy and Schenectady. He left this place in company with his daughter's family and settled near the present site of Saltville, Washington Co., Va., before Oct. 17, 1790, the dates of his patents to land there, signed by Gov. Beverly Randolph. Here he died about 1810. His wife, Molly, did not accompany him to Virginia, but died in Milford, Otsego Co., N. Y.

Benjamin and Mary (Parker) Aylworth had two children :

33. PHILIP (4)—Philip (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born June 7, 1737, and married June 14, 1762, Martha (6)—Joseph (5), Giles (4), Samuel (3), Giles (2), Anthony (1)—* who was born in West Greenwich, R. I., March 9, 1744-5, and who was a daughter of Joseph (5) and Hannah (—) Slocum.

They settled in Coventry, R. I., as appears from a deed of gift from his father Sept. 12, 1761, [Cov. Rec.] and other transfers of real estate. He sold land in West Greenwich in 1765, 1776-7, and land in Coventry 1766, 1769 and 1777. His signature to these deeds was autographic, and spelled "Aylworth."

They emigrated to Milford, Otsego Co., N. Y., living some considerable time at Pownal, Vt., before their final settlement in Milford, but accounts are so conflicting that the author has not been able to determine to his satisfaction the dates of these changes.

He died in Milford, of cancer, about 1809-10, and she in July, 1822, at the residence of her son Samuel, in the town of Butternuts, and not far from the village of South New Berlin, N. Y., in the cemetery of which latter place she lies buried.

Their family of children consisted of five sons and three daughters, of whom we have an account, but the order of their names is not certainly known :

34. JOHN (4)—Philip (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born Nov. 23, 1738, and was “3d son.” His father gave him by deed a lot of land in Coventry, R. I., Feb. 12, 1761, which fact raises the presumption that he may have settled there in married life. His history has not yet been established fully to the satisfaction of the author. One theory is that he followed the sea. This theory is based upon a credible account that Sarah, wife of Job (3)—Philip (2), Arthur (1)—sister of John (4), had a brother who was a sea captain, and who visited her in Ernesttown during the recollection of her son Bowen, who remembered his sailor uncle distinctly, and particularly remembered his captain’s uniform, and said he spelled his name Ellsworth. This sailor could have been neither Benjamin, Philip, nor James, hence we conclude it was John. All of the ten children of Philip (3) are carefully mentioned in his will made Nov. 14, 1789, except John and Phebe. Bowen, son of Job, was nearly twelve years old at the date of the will. That John was not mentioned in the will may be accounted for on several suppositions.

Another theory is that this John (4) was accidentally drowned previous to the birth of his only son:

97. i John (5) m. Lucy Dean.

This theory is based upon the account of Mrs. Alma Pierce, of Northville, N. Y., who having her mother, Mrs. Avis Gifford, daughter of John (5), for authority, thinks that her great grand-father’s name was John, and states that her grand-father, John (5), had an uncle, James, who had a son Philip. There is no doubt about the relation of this James, who was fully identified as James (4)—Philip (3)—. The Christian name of the mother of John (5) was Hannah.

35. JAMES (4)—Philip (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born April 3, 1743, and married (1) Rhoda Jenks, of Rehoboth, Mass. Their home

was near Bennington, Vt. He married (2) Lois Harrington,* and dwelt in Foster and Coventry, R. I. It is difficult to reconcile the statements made concerning his family. No record of the death of either has been discovered, but both probably lived to extreme old age.

They settled in Coventry where they remained until after April 16, 1792. In the year 1803 he settled in Luzerne Co., Pa., near Carbondale, where he died in 1834. His wife died in 1817.

37. ABEL (4)—Judiah (3). Artnur (2), Arthur (1)—was born Dec. 18, 1745, in West Greenwich, R. I., and was named by his grandmother, Mary (Franklin), for her brother Abel Franklin. He married Freelove, daughter of Hezekiah Matteson, of East Greenwich, Nov. 22, 1770, and settled in West Greenwich, from which town they emigrated after the Rhode Island census of 1774, but they were living in Shaftsbury, Vt., in 1777. "He was an En-ign in Seth Warner's Regt., and went to Quebec in 1776 with Gen. Montgomery. On the day the battle of Bennington occurred, Aug. 16, 1777, he was absent from home on duty, and his wife and children, together with his youngest brother, then sixteen years of age, walked to her brother Peleg Matteson's house, about four miles distant, in North Shaftsbury." They settled permanently in Arlington, Vt., before April 23, 1794, at which date his letter from the First Baptist Church of Shaftsbury was recorded in Arlington.

His wife died June 4, 1824, aged 76 years, and he May 14, 1830, aged 85 years, "in every relation in life a pattern for all, and beloved by all who knew them."

38. JUDIAH (4)—Judiah (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born July 23 1756, and married Oct. 15, 1780, Phebe Stafford, who was a daughter of Stukely and Rosanna (Edwards) Stafford, [W. G. Rec.] and dwelt in West Greenwich until after March 15, 1788. They moved to Pownal, Vt., shortly afterwards, where they remained until after 1801, and in the Autumn of 1814, from some place in the State of New York—perhaps from Minden, Montgomery Co.—he with others emigrated to the State of Ohio, and settled in Richmond, Rose Co., thirteen miles from Chillicothe, where he died in 1821.

40. WANTON (4)—(Judiah (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born March 23, 1764, and married Savra (or Sabra) Stewart, who was born in the State of Connecticut; and probably dwelling awhile in Herkimer Co., N. Y., removed to Penn Yan, Yates Co., N. Y., where he died.

*Phebe had no children, but reared a foster daughter by the name of Mary Dudley.

Y. awhile and removed to St. Josephs, Mich., where he died. Their children were "Perry Green and Harriet, another says "Harriet and Franklin."

42. STUKELY (4)—Judiah (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1)—was born Sept. 26, 1769, and married Mercy Harrington, who was born May 20, 1775, and who was a daughter of Stephen and Patience (Eldred) Harrington. They dwelt in Otsego Co., N. Y., first settling in the town of Laurens, but shortly moving north into the town of Hartwick, and locating about half a mile east of the South Hartwick post-office. He was a justice of the peace, supervisor of the town, assembly man three times, and State Senator two terms. The "Green Book" says he was elected to the New York State Senate November, 1824, to serve four sessions. In going to, or returning from, Albany he was injured by an accident to the stage, from which he never fully recovered, and died suddenly while cutting wood at his house, March 31, 1837, and was first buried on his own farm but afterwards his remains were removed to the cemetery on the west side of the creek and between the villages of South Hartwick and Jacksonville.

"Died in Hartwick, Otsego Co., N. Y., suddenly, Stukely Ellsworth, Esqr., aged 67 years. Few men have lived more beloved, or died more lamented than Brother Ellsworth. He enjoyed in an eminent degree the confidence of all who knew him, which has been evinced on several occasions by placing him in the most important posts of honor and trust. He has held a seat in both branches of our State legislature with credit to himself and profit to his constituents. About twenty years prior to his death he embraced the faith of unlimited salvation, which up to the time of his death was his stay and support." [From the Evangelical Advocate, April 28, 1837.]

His widow went to Walworth Co., Wis., where some of her children were dwelling, and died at the residence of her son, Stukely Stafford Ellsworth, near Elkhorn.

43. FREDERICK (4)—Judiah (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1) — was born Nov. 7, 1774, and married Jan. 25, 1798, Mary, daughter of Capt. Abel and Phebe (Burbank) Dimmick. They settled in the town of Pownal, Vt., but removed to Old Saratoga and thence to Saratoga Springs, about 1816. On the 5th of December, 1823, the husband met an accidental death by the falling of a limb of a tree upon him. The wife died also at Saratoga Springs, where, in the old cemetery, rest several members of this family.

They had nine children, six sons and three daughters, as follows:

45. RICHARD (4)—Anthony (3), John (2), Arthur (1)—was born Feb. 5, 1733-4, married Sept. 20, 1767, Lydia Straight, daughter of Thomas Straight, of West Greenwich, and dwelt in East Greenwich. [E. G. Rec.]

Whereas Richard Aylsworth, (with three others) preferred a petition to this assembly setting forth that on the 14th day of Feb. last past, they were captured on board the sloop Dolphin, in the service of this state, by the Portland Man of War, and carried to Antigua: from whence they obtained a passage to Nova Scotia, and from thence home to East Greenwich, which was attended with great cost and charges, which they have been obliged, since their return, to repay by their daily labor, and whereby their families are deprived of their necessary support, and therefore besought this assembly to commiserate their distressed situation and order their wages and expenses to be paid them. [R. I. Col. Rec., last Monday in Oct. 1776.] The total amount allowed was 55£—19s 7d.

Richard (4) was a member of Col. Archibald Crary's Regt. R. I. Soldiers of the Revolution. "The Regiments constituting a Brigade were raised for fifteen months ending March 16, 1778, then by Congress ordered to re-enlist for twelve months, and then for a third time pursuant to the same authority for twelve months ending March 16, 1780, making three years and three months before the brigade was disbanded. [Cowell, Spirit of 1776 in R. I.] In October, 1785, a committee re-

ported that there was due him on account of the depreciated money with which he had been paid, a balance of 15£-17s.—11d.

Financial embarrassments resulted in the forced sale of his home in East Greenwich, June 26, 1793.

“I, Lydia Aylsworth, wife of Richard Aylsworth late of East Greenwich, now residing in Adams in the County of Berkshire, Mass., for the love and good will that I bear to my brother-in-law John Aylsworth of East Greenwich, do willingly give, yield up and surrender all my right of dower and power of thirds to a certain lot of land with a dwelling house thereon, being in East Greenwich, Newtown, so called, and is lot No. 179,” etc. [Extract from deed, dated Sept. 23, 1793. Acknowledged before James Barker, Berkshire Co., Mass., Sept. 30, 1793, and witnessed by Susanna Aylsworth and Warner Aylsworth.]

The East Greenwich town council appointed Richard Aylsworth to do military duty for fifteen days, in room of Benjamin Gould, Aug. 4, 1777.

Richard Aylsworth and Arthur Aylsworth were adjudged not able to equip themselves with a gun, etc., agreeable to law June 29, 1778, by the town council.

At this writing it is impossible to give a satisfactory account of the family of Richard and Lydia (Straight) Aylsworth. The following is offered, however:

- iv Hannah (5) m. Greenman. She was a widow visiting relatives, from 1820 to 1828, with a child in his “teens.” She had perhaps three children, one of whom Lawrence. She probably dwelt in Seneca Co.
- v John ? (5) visited Sarah Levally; was of a roving habit, and probably never married.
- vi Freelove ?(5) may have dwelt in a Southern State. She solicited a niece to live with her and become heir to her property. Hence it is inferred she died childless.

Joseph P. Aylsworth, of Newport, thinks there was a daughter Betsy in this family who married——Capps, but his sister, Mrs. Champ-
lin, thinks not. He also states that Peter Holly was in some way related to his father. This was probably by the marriage of Sarah

Straight to ——— Holly. She was sister to Lydia, wife of Richard Aylsworth. He also believes, or thinks, there was another daughter by the name of Lydia belonged to this family.

46. ANTHONY (4) Anthony (3), John (2), Arthur (1)—was reared perhaps by Samuel Warner, and married Molly Marks, of Warwick, Nov. 26, 1762, and settled in East Greenwich.

Samuel Warner, of North Kingstown, made Anthony Aylsworth, of East Greenwich, cooper, a gift deed of "one acre of land on the west side of my farm in East Greenwich with a small dwelling house thereon." This deed was dated Feb. 10, 1775.

They adhered to the religious faith of the Friends, and emigrated in 1778* to Adams, Berkshire Co., Mass., where they both died, before it was customary with the friends to erect headstones. They were buried in the Friends Cemetery in Adams, where the remains of many of their descendants rests.

Their children of whom we have an account, were two sons and one daughter:

47. JOHN (4)—Anthony (3), John (2), Arthur (1)—was born June 14, 1748, and was reared in the family of Thomas Aldrich, a Quaker and prominent townsman, of East Greenwich, R. I. He married [Ex. Rec.] March 4, 1771, Bethana Fry, daughter of James Fry, of Exeter. They were Quakers, and dwelt successively in East Greenwich, Cranston, and Foster, but dwelt in the first named town until after March 23, 1805. Thomas Aldrich died before Oct. 28, 1795, and his wife Susanna (Spencer) before Dec. 29, 1798. She gave John (4) by will one water lot and two house lots in East Greenwich, but by codicil afterwards withdrew the gift of the water lot. She also gave Marah Aylsworth by will twenty Spanish milled dollars.

He married June 13, 1792, his second wife, Asa Vaughn, who was born Feb. 9, 1759, and who was the third daughter of Benjamin and Catharine Vaughn, of East Greenwich.

He bought land in Foster, March 22, 1805, where he died Jan. 28, 1829, and on which farm he was buried. His second wife died probably in 1849.

* The date of their emigration from Rhode Island may not be correctly stated. The town Council of East Greenwich adjudged Anthony Aylsworth not able to equip himself with a gun, etc., agreeable to law, Sept. 26, 1781. Perhaps this action referred to Anthony (4)—Anthony (3),—etc.

48. JONATHAN (4) - Arthur (3), John (2), Arthur (1) - was born Feb. 4, 1729, proposed freeman in 1751, accepted freeman in 1752, married Sarah ———, dwelt in Exeter, R. I., and leaving Rhode Island dwelt in the town of Pawling, Dutchess Co., N. Y., where he died previous to 1819.

He bought of Joshua and Amey Rathbun May 5, 1755, three acres of land for £155, and of Robert and Freelove Hill July 16, 1756, fifty acres for £600, and from same persons March 5, 1757, fifty acres for £600, all in the town of Exeter.

They appear to have had nine children who became of age, as the following abstract would indicate:

49. JOSEPH (4)—Arthur (3). John (2), Arthur (1)—third son. was born April 19, 1735. But little is known of his personal history. It is probable that he was living with his father at the time the census of 1774 was taken. His father died about Oct. 14, 1794, and Joseph continued to occupy the West Greenwich homestead, and was living entirely alone at the time of his death. In the winter of 1816 he was frozen to death while going at night from the tavern, then on Noose Neck Hill, to his home, which was not very far distant. Samuel Tillinghast administered upon his estate, the inventory of his personal property, presented Feb. 20, 1816, amounting to \$76.60.

Of his marriage no particulars have been learned. His grand-son, Joseph, of Clarksville, Madison Co., N. Y., furnishes the following list of his children's names, but if this gentleman's statement is correct, that his grand-father, Joseph, died in Dutchess Co., N. Y., of Small-pox, when his father, Joseph, was fourteen years of age there is some mystery requiring light. We conclude, at present, that if Joseph, who lived with Arthur (3) in West Greenwich, was Arthur's son, then Joseph (6) of Clarksville is mistaken respecting his grand father's Christian name. If the latter is mistaken, his grand-father was probably Jonathan (4) son of Arthur (3). In such a case the following list would be a partial list of the children of Jonathan (4) and Sarah, his wife, and compared with the list of the known children of Jonathan would give nine in number corresponding to the number of heirs at law indicated in the power of attorney of Justice and Catharine Leonard, for which see the preceding record. Should this view prevail the family history of Joseph (4)—Arthur (3)—etc., is enveloped in mystery.

This daughter chose Caleb Gardner for her guardian, Jan. 28, 1786.

Aug 15, 1817, Eunice Murray sold one-fifth of the estate of her grand-father, Arthur Aylsworth, the original deed being in the possession of Pardon Hopkins, of Noose Neck Hill, R. I.

51. ALMY (4)—Arthur (3), John (2), Arthur (1)—was born Dec. 28, 1739, and married March 18, 1761, Caleb B. Gardiner, who was born April 27, 1741. They dwelt in Hancock, Mass., where he died Aug. 3, 1806, 66 years of age, and she Dec. 24, 1811. Her name was some times written Amey.

Jan. 1, 1753, John Aylsworth deeded a part of his homestead farm in East Greenwich to this grand-son, Christopher, as a gift, but it seems this couple were living in North Kingstown May 14, 1753, where it was ordered by the town council that his certificate be got from East Greenwich. They deeded their land in East Greenwich to Sylvester Sweet, Dec. 24, 1759, and his name is found in the North Kingstown town meeting list as late as June, 1767. They had:

In December, 1775, he removed from Rhode Island with his wife and a child, a month old, in a wagon with a few cooking utensils, to the town of Canaan, N. Y., where they spent their days. They were among the first settlers of the country, commenced life with very limit-

ed means, endured the toils and privations incident to the settlement of a new country, and being frugal and perseveringly industrious, they, with the blessing of God, acquired a competency, raised a numerous family who were permitted to "rise up and call them blest."

Mr. Aylsworth, although a man loving retirement, was ever ready to help the distress, but made no ostentatious display of his deeds. He died Oct. 23, 1820, in his 68th year, and his wife July 6, 1822, in her 64th year.

The family of Job (3) Aylsworth is referred to in the town council minutes of North Kingstown, R. I., Jan. 14, 1762. If Job (4) was born in 1763, Otho Nial (4) who was older than Job (4), was born perhaps in 1761, and neither of these sons could then have been the children of Sarah Aylsworth, Job's second wife, whom he married in 1765. If the statement of Job (6) be correct, both Otho Nial (4) and Job (4) were the children of the first wife, Sarah (Clark).

62. ELSEY (4)—Job (3). Philip (2), Arthur (1)—was born in Rhode Island Nov. 10, 1772, married in Rensselaer Co., N. Y., Dec. 8, 1787, John Bristol, who was born Oct. 21, 1759, in Ulster Co., N. Y., and who was a son of Abraham Bristol, a Baptist preacher.

They lived a while, probably about five years, in Rensselaer Co., but followed her parents to Canada, and settled in Ernesttown, near Bath, where he died Oct. 28, 1849, and she in 1854. A notice of her death published at the time states that she lived until her descendants numbered 219, of whom 165 were then living, two of them belonging to the fifth generation; that she had her senses to the last, and that she had been a consistent member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church for over sixty years.

In a biographical notice of John Bristol, published at the time, we are told that he experienced religion in the twenty-seventh year of his age while under the ministry of Rev. Freeborn Garrettsen, and joined the M. E. Church in the United States, where he remained for seven years; that in the year 1793 he emigrated with his wife and family to Canada, where shortly after he was made a class-leader, which office he filled for forty years. His last illness was brief, being taken ill at five o'clock in the afternoon and dying about eleven at night.

65. BOWEN (4)—Job (3), Philip (2), Arthur (1)—was born Feb. 27, 1778, probably in the town of Schoduck, Rensselaer Co., N. Y., and was ten years of age when his parents settled in Canada. He married Nov. 21, 1797, Hannah Perry, who was born Aug. 3, 1781, and who was a daughter of Robert and Jemima (Washburn) Perry, of Ernesttown, Ont. They settled immediately on a farm three miles north of Bath, where they dwelt together sixty-six years, his death occurring upon the sixty-sixth anniversary of their wedding day, Nov. 21, 1863. She died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Lucas, in Camden.

He was a man of somewhat abrupt address, wasting few words in empty compliments, but of great equanimity of character, contented, prudent, and unostentatious, hewing square to the line of settled convictions. His religious character was, in a measure no doubt, moulded and stayed by the piety of his excellent wife. Within the circle of his acquaintance he was referred to as a model of industry, economy, and perseverance. About four years previous to his death a part of one of his feet was carried away by gangrene, and the part, contrary to expectation, healed and left him comparatively well again. An extended obituary notice appeared in the "Christian Guardian" of Toronto, Nov. 30, 1864, to the establishment of which paper he contributed. He also

aided in the erection of Victoria College, and afterwards contributed to its endowment, and is spoken of as one of the earliest and foremost supporters of the temperance movement in Canada.

Eowen and Hannah commenced housekeeping May 1, 1798, he being twenty, and she sixteen years of age. Her father, who entertained views somewhat aristocratic, was displeased with their marriage, and withheld from them for a time a father's sympathy, which, however, found expression a few years later in an endeavor to present her with an outfit of furniture, which he, without previous warning, placed at her door. She declined to receive the gift, but no doubt esteemed the generous overture as an indication of his parental approval, and accepted cheerfully her proper place in his affections.

Robert Perry was born in Rehoboth, Mass., in 1751, and was married to Jemima Washburn, of Attleboro, in March, 1772, and settled in Rutland, Vt., then a new country, in September of the same year. He had two brothers, David and Peter, who adhered to the Revolutionary cause while Robert clung to Britain, and was among the New England Royalists. After a reverse in the British cause between the years 1777-79, his family and others were driven into Lower Canada, where Hannah and two of her brothers, Daniel and David, were born. Robert Perry and family, with other New England Loyalists, removed, or were removed by the military authorities, from Lower Canada to the Bay of Quinte country about the year 1785-6, when Hannah was four or five years old. Often has she in after years related the particulars of that trying period, and of later periods in the settlement of this part of the Province, with clearness and precision. For eighty years she and her husband, her children and relatives, have been identified with the domestic, social, civil, political, and religious progress of this part of Canada. Their record would make up much of its history. * * * She remembered the voyage up the Bay of Quinte in the small French boats and its incidents, such as the fine sight of the tents pitched upon the shore (near the place where Bath was afterwards built) by a fatigue party that had preceded the main body of the settlers; the firing of musketry by the shore party to attract attention, the firing of the boat party in reply; the hearty cheers of both when they neared the shore, and the preparation made for their reception. * * * Hannah took her place, according to her age, at the family christening shortly after the settlement in Ernesttown, where her father allowed the Rev. J. Langhorn to baptize all his children. * * * They were glad when a man from the United States, by the name of McCarthy, a lay preacher of the school of Whitfield, came among them. Robert Perry at once opened his house to him. Hannah was present when he was arrested, as stated in Playter's History of Methodism in Canada, in her father's house on the Sabbath day while preaching, by an armed man under the authority of certain military dignitaries, who did not intend that dis-

sent should take root in Canadian soil. But how wondrously, by the prevalence of Pre-byterianism and Methodism in Canada has the presentment to which Mr. Perry gave utterance when he saw Mr. McCarthy put into a small boat and shoved off from the shore in charge of some soldiers after which he used to call "*a mock trial*," been fulfilled, though Mr. McCarthy's doom may never be known until the last day. "You may," said he, "banish, or drown, or burn McCarthy, but God will raise up a hundred from his ashes." * * * Hannah, then about eleven years of age, was converted and joined the first class formed by Dunham in the neighborhood, and probably the second or third in the Province, as it was during the first year of his superintendency. She continued a member until her death, viz., about seventy-four years. Her oldest brother, Robert Perry, Jr., of those days, became a traveling preacher of great power in the M. E. Church, and two of her brothers, David and Daniel, local preachers. Another brother, the late Peter Perry, of Whitby, was associated with M. S. Bidwell, now of New York, as the celebrated representatives of Lennox and Addington from 1824 to 1836, whilst her only other brother, the Hon. E. Perry, of Coburg, is now a member of the Legislative Council. * * * Her father, Robert Perry, when he died in 1837 left about 300 descendants. Hers must approach 250 in number. She leaves thirteen children, one hundred and three grand-children living, besides the great grand-children, of whom there are ninety, if not more. * * *

When Lorenzo Dow visited Canada for the last time, about thirty-six or thirty-seven years ago, he preached three times in the neighborhood and was entertained by her together with about sixty others who staid over night on the premises to here him preach on the second day. * * * Among her children one is a traveling minister among us, and quite extensively known, three are local preachers, others stewards, etc., whilst of her grand-children two are traveling ministers in another Methodist body in the Province. * * * Her father literally died of old age. She reached her eighty-fifth year. She was buried at the cemetery at Violet Church. [Extracts from a biographical notice of Hannah Aylsworth in the Wesleyan Daily Recorder, May 28, 1869.]

The following extract from a letter is inserted as a tribute to the memory of this estimable woman, and serves at the same time to illustrate filial devotion, refined sentiment, and scholarly taste of the writer of the letter, her youngest son :

BURLINGTON, N. Y., Monday, 5 o'clock, P. M. }
 Sept. 10th, 1855. }

MY DEAR HOMER—

The solemn task devolves upon me of informing you that your grand mother is no more. She died yesterday at precisely 20 minutes past 11 o'clock in the forenoon. I have just returned from the funeral, which was held at the brick school-house. The discourse was preached by Rev'd Mr Shank, of Hartwick, from Heb. 4:9, and now all that was earthly of that feeble tenement is sleeping well in the city of the dead. I was in almost constant attendance at her bedside for about fifteen hours before her death, and I must say, that seat was to me the seat of wisdom. It was my lot, it was my choice. Thought, busy thought! Reflections of the past mingled with the scene before me. On a dark but cloudless night, the 12th of June, 1769, her history began. Then onward was the fair and sprightly girl, the blooming bride, the pioneer to a distant wilderness, the pious mother, the frugal and diligent housewife, the invaluable neighbor, blessed by the sick and the poor. Then the aged matron who had outlived her own generation, and through the mutations of time became a stranger in her own neighborhood, In her downward progress her strength failed, then her memory, then her reason, and finally her speech. Her last few years, as you are well aware, were years of helplessness and dependence, as also years of pain. Knowing that her time had come I took my station by her side on Saturday evening about 8 o'clock to moisten her parched lips and minister to her relief as far as human agency allows. At 4 o'clock in the morning I called the family. She sank away slowly as the sun rose higher and higher, the hard breathing, the hollow moan, the heaving bosom, and the pallid features, all admonishing us that the soul had but a brief lodgment in its earthly tenement, then to close the last scene, a gasp and the gulf was passed which separates this world of trouble from the land of rest. There was the heart to whose pulsations I owe my vital breath; there was the hand that labored for my comfort; and there was

the eye that watched over my helpless infancy, but that heart, that hand, that eye, have been touched by the icy finger and was now committed to the unrevealing silence that is only broken by the last trumpet. Then, farewell, dear mother, thy memory well deserves the tribute of tears. O, how insignificant is all the patient toil by which I have sought to sooth thy declining years! * * *

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH.

Philip Aylsworth was born in Foster, R. I., and reared in Edineston, N. Y., where his parents dwelt at that period, and having remarkable natural gifts early acquired an education and engaged in teaching public schools from 1816 to 1822 in Luzerne Co., Pa., Seneca Co., N. Y., and in his own county, where he was school superintendent. In the spring of 1822 he went to the State of Illinois, and on the 11th day of May of that year established a ferry at the present site of Beardstown, on the Illinois River, and in 1827 surveyed and platted that city, naming it for his intimate friend, the proprietor of the land, Thomas Beard. He and his wife settled on the present site of Meredosia, on the same river, July 11, 1828, where he established a ferry, and immediately spent eight days alone with a horse and a hatchet blazing a trail through the timber and trailing a path through the tall prairie grass, between his ferry and the bluffs at Quincy, then little else than a mere landing. The railroad between these two points traverses this old trail, varying from it but slightly at a few points. He established his ferry just below the outlet of that lake called by the French traders who sometimes stopped there at that time *Mere d'Sier*. A cross with his name inscribed upon it still marked the grave of Osier, a trader who had been buried within a few rods of the place where he first landed his few effects and began his improvements. This beautiful city owes its euphonious

name to his happy thought of anglicizing the above phrase for the name of the place of his own founding.*

He remained at Meredosia seven years surveying land for the government and collecting taxes; served in the Black Hawk War as major; dwelt two years in Sacymore County, and in 1837 built the Babylon Mills on Spoon River, where he afterwards resided, and after which time he was identified with the interests of Fulton County.

Another item is worthy of mention here. To avoid the hardships settlers were then frequently subjected to by having their lands bought from under them by speculators, Mr. Aylsworth drafted a bill for Congress to act upon, giving settlers the prior right of purchase. This draft he gave into the hands of Joseph Duncan, afterwards Governor of the State, then the only representative in Congress from Illinois. Mr. Duncan failed to get any action upon it in 1829, but in 1830, owing largely no doubt to Mr. Aylsworth's earnest correspondence in the meantime with eastern representatives, Congress passed the bill with but slight alteration of the original draft—the first pre-emption law ever passed by Congress.

To the latest years of his life he continued in the enjoyment of his faculties in a remarkable degree, reading the finest print without the use of glasses, which he never used, and writing the smooth and delicate hand of his earlier years. His memory continued good to the last. He died at the age of 87 years, 8 months, and 2 days, and was buried on the heights of the bluff's near Babylon Mills, where several members of his family lie buried.

* This statement, which is from Mr. Aylsworth personally, of course sets aside a published derivation of the name "osler," a willow. It would be difficult, no doubt, to persuade even a French trader to believe that the lake is made of "osler," and if the lake was bordered with willows, which in fact was not the case, the most inconsiderate Frenchman would have paid more regard to his plurals.

Joseph Ellsworth, in the spring of 1803, moved from Litchfield, N. Y., into northern Vermont, and settled in the town of Fletcher, on land owned by Aaron Haynes, who at that time owned large tracts of land in what is now known as the counties of Franklin, Chitenden and Lamoille. At this time the country was quite new, there being but few families in town. For a few years they suffered the privations incident upon first settlers, and at the time known as the "cold season," it being impossible to raise grain, his courage failed and was on the point of moving his family back to New York, when his wife's father (Aaron Haynes) came up and thinking it better for him to raise his family in a new country furnished provisions and a team which helped them to a start. After this they prospered and soon had the rich lands converted into smooth, productive fields, all enclosed with the old-time stone wall which is still standing as a memorial of the strength and persevering energy of the first settlers.

For a few years the nearest market was nearly a hundred miles off, and all the pork and grain to spare were taken that distance with a team to be exchanged for needful supplies for the family. A large farm house was built and, for those times, well furnished, whose doors were ever opened to rich or poor alike, who ever found a welcome beneath its hospitable roof.

In 1814, while at work with his boys in the hay field, news came of the advance of the British upon Plattsburg. Only stopping long enough for a slight change of clothing, he set out on foot for the scene of action, where he met with the misfortune of a broken limb, but succeeded in capturing a British gun, which still remains in the family.

His sons and daughters, all except the youngest, settled within a few miles and built up good homes and fortunes for themselves. The youngest, Prosper, went back near the old home his father left, and there became a successful farmer.

Of this branch of the family a few have represented their town in the legislature, and some have filled the office of selectmen of the town in which they lived, but as a people have rather avoided office. It is not known that any member of the different families have ever been indicted for any crime, or been the recipient of public charity.

time of their marriage. Her father, Tisdell Dean, was accidentally killed in a saw-mill when she was a little girl and his children were "put out." Caleb A. Chadsey learned the cooper's trade at the age of nineteen at Fair Haven, Mass., and sailing from New Bedford, April, 1843, on a whaling voyage made the circuit of the globe, returning in 1846. She returned with her children to the old homestead in Canaan, where she died Sept. 8, 1867, at the advanced age of 87 years, a longer life than any other member of her father's family attained, retaining all her faculties in a wonderful degree to the last week of her life. She was a self-sacrificing and loving mother.

The following sketch is from the pen of Lara F. Aylsworth:

The advent of William, son of William and Catharine, after five daughters had blessed their household, was a notable event. The father could hardly believe the messenger who announced "to you a son is born." Nature was bountiful in her gifts to him, a frank and genial spirit shone out from his handsome face, much of family pride centered in him, and his friends wished him a better lot in life than their farm could afford.

While yet a young man he joined a party of surveyors going down the Hudson, and passing through Patterson, Dutchess Co., N. Y., he chanced to meet Nancy Weed, a fair young lady, whom, after a short acquaintance, he married. His people received her as a daughter and sister, and always loved the little lady of artistic tastes and graceful ways. His father generously started him in trade in Hudson, but the war of 1812 brought disaster to the young merchant. The father with his son and his family started out west in a lumber wagon to seek a new and more reliable field of work, and in April, 1816, they reached Clarence, N. Y. A farm of a hundred acres was bought, situated in Clarence on the Holland purchase, twenty miles east of Buffalo on the Salt Road, and three miles north of the State Road running from Albany to Buffalo. A small clearing and a log house were the entire improvements, and till land was cleared and a crop raised provisions must come from Caladonia, thirty-two miles east. The milling was done at Niagara Falls, twenty-seven miles west.

He found the settlement poor and discouraged but his enthusiasm, unflinching good nature and hope infused a new spirit into the almost disheartened company of pioneers. He was one of the first to form a school district and establish a school; was an elder in the first Presbyterian Church of Clarence, and a generous and honored member of the society. Being prospered in all he undertook he soon built a house and barn and bought one hundred and fifty acres of land adjoining his farm. To complete some payments he and his sons drew wheat to Rochester, seventy miles east, and sold it for three shillings [37 1-2 cents] per bushel. He put up a saw mill and a grist-mill on a stream of water running through his land. His brother Asahel spent some months with him, and helped set out an apple orchard close by the house on the south west so that when the country became cleared the trees would break the force of the winds from Lake Erie. Children of the fourth generation gather its fruits of unknown names save such as the family have given them.

A man of perfect health he never doubted his powers of endurance, and one day in August returning from Lockport he walked a few miles through a low, malarious swamp, taking off his coat he soon became chilled and was stricken down with chill fever. He suffered but a few days, no medical skill then at hand being able to relieve him. Often delirious he gave orders to his man, and in his lucid intervals would not allow them to be discharged. In a chill on the afternoon of Aug. 23, 1826, in the flush of his strength and prime of life, he died. He left a broken home, and children who all their life long have missed their father. They buried him in the then only public grounds, a mile and a half northeast of the homestead. One of his sons made a journey to Stockbridge, Mass., and brought home a stone to mark his grave. It

was the first set in the grounds. From the east and from the west the Aylsworths of Clarence have brought back their dead to rest in this yard.

From the loss of her husband the mother never fully recovered. After the first shock of grief was over her life was one of marked submission. Neither apathetic nor rebellious, all her views of life were "God wills it." She never lacked the loving devotion of her children. Her sons were right loyal to their mother. She was their first care. For years her lamp was trimmed and burning, and when suddenly the cry was heard at midnight, "Behold, the bridegroom cometh!" she rose up hastily and blessing her children, when out of this life. On New Year's day, 859, two sons with their families stood around her open grave comforting their hearts with thoughts of the happy reunion of father and mother, and the belief that the two would take part in the first resurrection.

Y., June, 1812, married (1) Oct. 8, 1815, Charlotte Brown, of Southbury, Conn., who died Oct. 20, 1818; married (2) Jan. 1, 1822, Polly, born Nov. 19, 1799, daughter of Abel and Mary (Hawley) De Forest, of Edmeston, N. Y., moved to Utica, N. Y., July, 1828, where he died suddenly of heart disease, Feb. 18, 1857, while answering the call of his door-bell. He was an elder of the First Presbyterian Church of Utica, and thoroughly interested in every good

cause, prudent in his undertakings and frugal in his expenditures, but generous in his charities. His interest in the family history is the subject of a special chapter devoted to his *AYLSWORTH REGISTER*. [See the first pages of this work, where he is given credit for the first history of this family.] She died in Binghampton, N. Y., Sept. 7, 1876, and was buried in Forest Hill Cemetery, Utica.

Y., a woman remarkable for personal beauty and many lovely traits of character, daughter of Thomas and Hannah (Brewster) Conkling, of Canajoharie, N. Y., and removed to the ancestral home in Canaan, N. Y., where they dwelt until he removed in 1838, to Granville, Ohio, where she died March 2, 1854. He married (3) October, 1863, at Canaan, N. Y., Elizabeth Gifford, and removed to Attica, Ind., where he died of paralysis Jan. 7, 1877. She was living in 1879 at Stuyvesant, N. Y.

He was always a consistent Christian, and for many years a subscriber for and contributor to the *New York Observer*, his writings being principally of a religious character; maintained an extensive correspondence, and was remarkable for his physical and mental vigor. "To him were given two of God's best gifts, wisdom and length of years."

Church of Canada, his labor being bestowed as follows: at Mitchell, Bond Head, Kleinburg and Colborne, each two years; Newcastle, one year; Cobourg, three years as treasurer and agent of the University of Victoria College, for which \$30,000 were raised to liquidate its debt; Bradford, two years; Bond Head and Owen Sound, each one year; Collingwood, two years; Stayner and Newcastle, each one year; locating in Collingwood in 1874 as a retired physician and minister. In his own words: "More than once, 'truth stranger than fiction,' has been verified in the scenes through which I have passed."

REV. ISAAC STONE.

For a more extended biography of the Rev. Isaac Stone than comes within the scope of this work the reader is referred to the *Northern Christian Advocate*, of Oct. 2, 1850, the Minutes of Black River Conference, and the *Black River Conference Memorial*, by Rev. P. D. Gorrie, New York, 1852.

Isaac Stone was born in Hoosick, N. Y., March 28, 1797, his parents being members of the Baptist Church, and his mother, Susanna, daughter of Thomas Aylsworth, a deeply pious woman, of whom he often spoke in terms of great affection, and at whose grave a few years previous to his death he wrote

* * * * * * *

And after many rolling years have passed,
And my own head is sprinkled o'er with gray,
I stand beside thy humble grave at last,
And here the tribute of my tears I pay.

And if to look upon thy grave and weep
Was so to be desired and sought so far,
Then what will be the bliss in heaven I'll reap,
To see thee, saint, in Jesus' crown a star!

The family consisting of the parents and four children moved to Lower Canada when he was about eight years of age, from which Province he returned to Hoosick at the age of sixteen, during the war of 1812, learned the trade of a blacksmith, and at about the close of his apprenticeship so injured himself in endeavoring to shoe a fractious horse as to permanently undermine his promising vigorous physical constitution. He left Hoosick in 1816 in ill health following hemorrhage from the lungs and pneumonia, and found in the family of his uncle, Elhanan Aylsworth, of Burlington, Otsego Co., N. Y., the hospitality, sympathy and care so uniformly manifested by that family, and of which he stood so much in need. They cared for him as for an own son, and his health improving, he taught school more or less until in 1820 he married Mary (Polly) Aylsworth, daughter of his hospitable uncle.

Soon after his arrival in Burlington he embraced religion, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in the year 1821 the Rev. Charles Giles, observing his intelligent and moving testimony on a love feast occasion, asked him to prepare to enter the gospel field, a course

already revealed to him. He was, therefore, in this year sent by this presiding elder to fill a vacancy on what was then the Marcellus circuit in Onondaga Co., N. Y., and was admitted into the Genesee Annual Conference in 1822. He filled successively the following circuits and stations, to wit: Herkimer, Westmoreland, Canajoharie, Otsego, Black River, Stockbridge, (from which he was transferred to Bleecker Street Church, Utica), Westmoreland, Rome, Verona, and Lowville. During his second incumbency on the Westmoreland circuit his first wife died, and while at Rome station he married his second wife, Miss Mercy Chittenden Hland, of Verona, N. Y.

At the first session of the Black River Conference in 1836, having fallen within its bounds when separated from Oneida, he was appointed presiding elder and sent in charge of the Oswego District for four years, near the close of which term he was bereft, within the space of three weeks, of two lovely and promising children, Mercy Hland Stone, aged 5 years and two months, and George Leverett Stone, aged 3 years and 7 months, the children of his second wife, of whom he was also bereft two years later.

His duties as presiding elder were discharged with great acceptability and usefulness, but, owing to the condition of his health, he preferred a single charge to a district, and from 1840 to 1847 he was stationed successively at Fulton, Weedsport, Potsdam, and Watertown, stations commanding the best talent in the conference. While stationed at Weedsport he married his third wife, Miss Rachel Clow, who survived his death many years.

At the conference of 1847 he was elected delegate to the General Conference of 1848, and also made presiding elder again, and put in charge of the Adams District, after which his health failed so rapidly that he was compelled to resign oversight of the district to the hands of others, and to retire from the regular and active work altogether. He took a superannuated relation in 1848. He, however, attended the session of the General Conference at Pittsburg, to which he was a delegate from his conference, but was obliged to set out on his homeward journey before the close of the session. His devoted wife was his companion on this journey.

For two years after he gave up his regular pastoral work he resided in Watertown, but thinking that a little manual labor in the open air might benefit his health he bought a small farm near the village of Jordan, Onondaga Co., N. Y., to which he removed, and on which he dwelt the remainder of his life. He preached occasionally, and probably oftener than prudence would dictate. He attended the conference session at Rome in 1850, and, in response to the passing of his character, addressed the conference. Speaking of his address, one of the members said: "It was one of the most thrilling ever heard on the conference floor. Such primitive itinerant zeal, such burning love, such ripeness

for his eternal reward as glowed on his pale countenance, and thundered forth in sepulchral tones from his half-consumed lungs, enforced by tears and gestures peculiar to himself, were enough to move heaven and earth. All hearts before him were melted, and the response was one general outburst of feeling. And though, like a true soldier, he panted for the strife of the field, yet to many hearts his speech was like that of Paul at Miletus, and we feared, alas, but too truly! that we 'should see his face no more.' [Rev. E. Arnold, in B. R. Conf. Mem.]

He preached his last sermon in the town of Lysander, a few miles from his home, and died Sept. 10, 1850, in the fifty-third year of his age and the twenty-ninth of his itinerant ministry, having filled some of the most important stations within the bounds of the Black River Conference. He was buried at Jacksonville, eight miles north of his home, beside his second wife and their two children. His first wife was buried at Verona, Oneida Co., N. Y.

He was a bright and shining light.

Returning from the State of Illinois he met an accidental death at Thorald, Ont., Dec. 9, 1858, in the language of the coroner's record, "by falling or walking off from the cars while in rapid motion." Although but recently recovered from a sickness requiring the attention of his physician for some time, and still quite weak, no fear was apprehended for his safety by his friends when he started on his homeward journey alone. Leaving Williamsville Station, Sycammon Co., Ill., his diary states that the Chicago & Alton Railroad train, on which he was traveling, was detained ten hours by a disabled freight train, and other detentions evidently occurred during the progress of his journey. The last entry in his diary was made at nine o'clock in the morning of Dec. 9th, after leaving Windsor, Ont. It is probable that as evening came on he fell asleep, and that the baggage agent aroused him about nine o'clock, as would appear from his testimony, and exchanged checks. In his weakened and wearied condition, perhaps not fully aroused to consciousness, or perhaps in a somnambulistic state, he collected his wraps, umbrella and valise, and probably stepped off the train, under the mental apprehension that it was time to change cars, as he had just changed checks for Utica. He was discovered at 9.15 P. M., by a woman stumbling over his body in her path as she returned home from a near neighbors. This occurred between Thorald and Suspension Bridge, and not far from the former place. His eldest son, then

in Illinois, as soon as apprised of the accident, took charge of his remains, which were placed in the Brick School-House Cemetery, not far from his home in Burlington, N. Y., where four generations of the family lie buried.

293. REV. JAMES PARKER (6)—Abraham (5), Benjamin (4), Philip (3), Arthur (2), Arthur (1) - was born in the town of Half Moon, Saratoga Co., N. Y., Sept. 10, 1783, and was a soldier in the war of 1812. His limited early advantages were so improved that he became a successful teacher of schools, and is said to have taught for twenty-two winters. He married Feb. 3, 1803, Lucy Barnes, born June 7, 1782, daughter of Comfort and Hannah (Conway) Barnes, of Saratoga Co., N. Y. At the age of seventeen he was converted and united with the M. E. Church, and in 1815, was licensed as a local preacher, in which relation he served the church acceptably until 1822, when he was received on trial in the traveling connection in the Genesee Conference, and after its formation was a member of the Oneida Conference of the M. E. Church, of which he was one of the fathers, and for about twenty-five years faithfully and acceptably served the church on various charges, principally in central New York.* While bestowing his pastoral and ministerial labors on Amber charge in 1846-7 his health failed so rapidly that in the spring of the latter year he actually gave out while preaching a sermon at Spafford Hollow. He died at his residence in Vesper, Onondago Co., N. Y., May 22, 1848. His wife survived him and died Aug. 9, 1865. They were both buried at Vesper.

In social life James P. Aylworth was cheerful, companionable, witty and instructive, his cheerfulness and wit never degenerating into anything unprofitable, was the joyous flow of a happily worded conversation. As a standard bearer of the church of his choice he was a judicious and faithful administrator of discipline; a lucid argumentative, able doctrinal preacher. A fuller biographical sketch will be found in the *Northern Christian Advocate* for July 5, 1848, and also in the Oneida Conference Minutes.

Reuben A. Aylworth was born in Half Moon, Saratoga County, N. Y., April 13, 1792, and died in Hampden, Geauga County, O., Sept. 3, 1880.

In 1810, he was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in 1814 was granted license and began to preach. For some three years he labored in the bounds of New York Conference, and then was transferred to Genesee Conference, where for four or five

years he did effective work. His appointments were: 1817, Caledonia Circuit; 1818, Lyons; 1819, Oleon Point; 1820, Bloomfield; 1821, Rochester.

At the close of this Conference year, being naturally of a delicate constitution, failing health caused him to ask for a superannuated relation, in which he continued until 1825, when he located, and continued thus until 1836. During this time, I think, while he was superannuated he removed to Pennsylvania. But, regaining his health sufficient to re-enter the active work, and having an intense desire so to do, in 1836 he was re-admitted into Erie Conference, in the bounds of which he then lived, and was appointed to Erie. But after five years more of effective work during which time he was on Jamestown District, and at Parkman, Chardon, Willoughby, and Painesville, he was obliged to turn aside again on account of ill-health. Accordingly, in 1841, he was replaced on the superannuated list, and, having purchased a farm in Hampden, Geauga County, O., he continued in said relation and lived on said farm until death removed him to heaven. From the time of this last superannuation until enfeebled health confined him at home, he was only a little less active, and none the less solicitous, in the church's work than when effective.

In his early manhood he was possessed of conscientiousness and convictions which commended him to the confidence of pure minded people, and fitted him for and followed him all through his chosen profession. As to his preaching, it was above the average, and was the means of doing great good. Many are living who speak of it as clear, earnest, and effective, full of grace and truth and power. As to his pastoral work, he was one of the best. He appeared to study the wants of his parishioners, and to have the happy faculty of adapting himself to them. His large heart and gentlemanly bearing won him the respect and confidence of every one, and prepared the way for his message. A veteran in the cause, who was converted under his ministry, married by him, visited by him, and who knew him well, said: "He was a perfect gentleman, very social, a most excellent pastor, and a splendid preacher."

For the last twenty years of Father Aylworth's life he was a great sufferer, not able to leave his premises, and later his house, and still later his room and bed; yet he bore all calmly, leaning upon his Saviour, and looking to the recompense of the reward.

The last few weeks were marked both by intense physical suffering, being almost deaf and speechless and blind, and by great trust. He spoke cheerfully of his death, and joyously of his prospects for the future, and prayed that all his children and those near to him might be gathered into the fold of Christ. And, when his speech was clear gone, still his lips continued to move in prayer. "He enters heaven with prayer."

DEATH OF AN OLD CITIZEN.

Mr. Lyman Ellsworth, for forty-seven years a resident of this village, died at his house on State Street, on Thursday morning, the 13th inst. He had been ill but a few days, and old age may be assigned as the cause of his death. He was born May 15, 1796, in West Killingly, Conn., from which place the family removed about 1810 to Granville, Washington County, in this State. Mr. Ellsworth there married in 1823, Miss Amanda Barnes, sister of Joseph Barnes, Esq., late of this town, and in 1833 removed to Canton, where he engaged in the boot and shoe business, which he pursued till a few months before his death. Mrs. Ellsworth died June 15, 1876, after a brief illness, aged 74 years.

Mr. Ellsworth served in the war of 1812, and participated in the battle of Plattsburg, and was a pensioner of that war. Highly esteemed by all who knew him, he seemed in a remarkable degree superior to that second childhood which is supposed to be characteristic of his advanced age. Forty years ago his establishment was one of the largest

of its kind in the county. Since 1852 he has resigned the control of the business to his son, J. B. Ellsworth, himself actually as foreman of the workshop, until a very short period preceeding his death. The funeral services were held at his late residence at one o'clock on Saturday last, Rev. Mr. Savage, of Norfolk, officiating. His remains were interred in the village cemetery.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH.

By REV. D. A. WHEADON, D. D.

Eli Aylsworth, still living (1887) at the age of eighty-five, furnishes a notable example of men who, by diligence, economy, and integrity, have risen from poverty to honor and wealth. He loves to tell to his children, and grand-children, and great-grand-children the story of his early years. He was born in Foster, R. I., June 6, 1802, in an unclap-boarded house of two unplastered rooms, with two windows, no cellar, and a chimney of stones and clay. A married uncle and aunt — his father's sister and his mother's brother — lived in the same house. The father possessed a small piece of land, enough to make him and his oldest son voters under the old charter by which the State was then governed. Only by unremitting toil and constant frugality was he able to meet the wants of a family which finally numbered twelve children.

The boy Eli did not enjoy the advantage of schools until he was nine years of age. They were then few and from one to four miles away. He went to school one summer, and afterward for three or four months in the winter. What other education he ever obtained was gained in practical life. When ten years old he earned his first money, except perhaps a few cents occasionally for an odd job. He found employment for the month of July in a hay field, and in payment received four silver dollars. In the autumn following he found a job of digging potatoes, his compensation being every tenth bushel. His share, sixteen bushels, he sold for two dollars. These six dollars he handed to his mother, requesting her to keep them for him, playfully adding: "I always intend to have money." He has them still, and frequently boasts of his promise to his mother. He tells of another promise made her. She was a Godly woman, and a member of the Christian denomination. When he was leaving home, she lovingly and faithfully sought to arm him against falsehood, profanity, and other prevalent vices. Under the examples around him he fell a few times into the use of profane language, but on his next visit home he frankly confessed it all to her, promising that that should be the end of it. "My son," said his mother, "I rely upon your word." And the promise has been kept for seventy-four years.

After the age of eleven years Eli never lived at home. He was hired at farm work in the summer, giving the proceeds to his father to aid in the maintenance of the family. Three years, bare-footed and coarsely clad, he worked eight months at one place, and in the winter went to school, doing chores for his board and paying his own tuition bills. Rising at midnight to chop wood, as he sometimes did, that he might get to school, was no easy way to get an education. When seventeen he was allowed to reserve for himself one-half of his wages, and out of the

summer earnings he clothed himself and loaned ten dollars to his grandfather. The note then given was repeatedly renewed, and after the death of the maker, in 1843, he received twelve and a half cents on the dollar. "I felt well paid," he says; "I took care of them." The love and sympathy shown the struggling boy were repaid in the care of the aged pair by the prosperous man. He also took care of his father and mother when sickness and age came upon them, and aided in the support of the younger children.

At eighteen he obtained a clerkship in a store for a year, retaining his entire wages, when another was obtained in a store where jobs of weaving by hand were giving out to the people of the vicinity. The failure of this trader gave him the opportunity of entering upon business for himself. He was twenty years old, and just married to Miss Martha Bennett, a lady of admirable character, and a member of the Christian denomination. He had a capital of one hundred and forty-nine dollars. He purchased a building, and with the help of the neighbors, in country fashion, moved it to the desired location, where it was literally placed "on a rock." When completed, it had cost one hundred and eight dollars, to be paid "in goods." He then went to Providence and sought the counsel of Mr. Randolph Chandler, an old merchant of the city, whose wise advice he implicitly followed, and returned home with a thousand dollars' worth of goods, mostly bought on credit. He worked hard, sometimes starting at two o'clock in the morning with butter, eggs, and other produce, for Providence, returning at night with a load of new goods. The business was so well managed that the first year's profits amounted to nine hundred dollars. For four years his house-rent cost him six dollars per annum. Mrs. Aylsworth was his most efficient helper, even bringing her cradle to the store that she might the more readily serve as clerk. For eleven years his stock of goods embraced a supply of liquors, as was at that time the prevalent custom of country merchants. But he noticed the mischievous effects of drinking habits upon the community. His children were growing up around him, and he determined that they should not be drunkards. So he sold out the business, and soon afterward opened a strictly "temperance store," which at that period was a novelty in trade. From that time he has been an uncompromising foe of intemperance.

Mr. Aylsworth thus became one of the substantial men of the town. He did some farming and also something in buying and selling real estate. His neighbors and townsmen trusted him. He was made a justice of the peace, and deputy sheriff, and held other offices. In 1838 he was made Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Providence County, being associated with the Hon. Thomas Burgess, and Judges Daniels, Potter, and Armstrong. Meanwhile, as wealth was increasing and honors were falling upon him, he was called in 1837 to the loss of

the wife of his youth, and the mother of his nine children. Three years later he married Maria Fairman, a lovely and excellent woman, and a member of the Baptist Church.

In 1841 Judge Aylsworth sold his store and removed to North Foster and settled on a farm. But he soon found it expedient to, in order to save a debt of seven hundred dollars, to purchase three lines of stages running between Providence and Danielsonville, Conn., which rendered necessary his removal to the latter place. After six months he removed again to Brooklyn, just across the river.

There was then but one church in Danielsville, the Congregational. The place was growing, and there was ample room for another. It so chanced that a Methodist local preacher, by the name of Wheeler, came into the town and opened a series of meetings in the conference room of the church, which resulted in about two hundred professed conversions. It soon became manifest that a large number of the converts desired to be organized into a Methodist Society, and another place of worship must be found. The Judge, though not a Methodist, promptly gave them sympathy and help. He at once hired for their use the ball-room of the hotel, the only available room in the town that was of suitable size, stipulating for the closing of the bar on Sundays and at all times of service. But the room proved not large enough, and for a time the depot freight house was secured. He resolved on the erection of a Methodist Church. He found four men of like spirit with himself who joined him in the work. A lot was bought, the lot on which the present church stands, and a contract was made by which the edifice was to be erected, and, when completed to the turning of the key, the price agreed upon was to be paid. This was done. The pews were then sold, and the proceeds were enough to reimburse the projectors of the enterprise and leave a surplus, which was turned over to the young society. It is only just to say that for this fine success the Methodists of Danielsonville are chiefly indebted to Judge Aylsworth. He was made one of the first Board of Trustees, and was kept in that position for some years after he left the State.

In July, 1842, he was called to mourn the loss, by consumption, of his devoted wife, and remained fourteen months in lonely widowerhood. He then married Miss Eliza S. Angell, of Scituate, R. I., a lady of a beautiful character and well fitted for her new position. She has been for many years a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and still lives to bless his home.

In 1850 Judge Aylsworth removed to Providence, R. I., where he was well known and had many friends. His excellent judgment and judicious management of the interests entrusted to him, soon brought him plenty of business. He was for a year a director of the Atlantic Bank, and was the first president of the Jackson Bank. In the same year, 1854, he became a member of the first board of directors of the Me-

chanic' Savings Bank, and of the loaning committee, and for nearly twenty years he was its vice-president. His directorship continued until 1878, when he declined a re-election. During this entire period, in full compliance with the spirit of the law of the State forbidding officers of savings banks becoming indebted to the bank, he would allow no paper bearing his name even as endorser to be accepted. In three years the bank was flourishing and successful, standing in the first rank of such institutions; and it is only just to say that much of its high character was due to his careful guardianship.

In 1856 he was elected president of the Westminster Bank, which position he still (1887) holds. At that time the stock, with a par value of 50, was worth only 40. It is now worth 60. The capital has increased from \$109,000 to \$200,000, and the bank has a surplus of \$60,000. The president modestly attributes a large share of this success to a good board of directors. And the Judge asserts, with a becoming pride and satisfaction, that in the thirty-one years of his connection with these several institutions he has not borrowed a dollar from any one of them. He has been engaged in many real estate transactions, and has, as assignee, executor, or administrator, settled about thirty estates, some of them very large, and one of over a million of dollars. He, as agent, has invested a large amount for other people, and has loaned some hundreds of thousands of dollars on western farm lands, and has given advice and assistance in these and other matters to many of his friends without money or price.

In political life Judge Aylsworth has had few ambitions. Yet in 1854, 1866, and 1867, he was honored with a seat in the General Assembly of Rhode Island, and in the last two was a member of the important committee on finance.

He has always been on the side of liberty and right. In the presidential election of 1824, the first after he attained his majority, he cast his vote for John Quincy Adams. He affiliated with the Whig party, as in his judgment the most in accordance with human freedom and the best interests of the country. He was always an anti-slavery man, and when pro-slaveryism entered on its struggle for the control of the nation, his whole soul revolted, and he heartily joined the Republican ranks at the organization of the party in 1856. In temperance, he has been all his life a habitual abstainer from intoxicating drinks, and is recognized as a non-partizan prohibitionist, willing to accept the restraints of a stringent, properly enforced license law. He is an intense hater of tobacco in all its forms.

On coming to Providence he connected himself with the Matthewson Street Methodist Episcopal Congregation, of which he is still a member. He was a member of the finance committee that in 1873 undertook successfully the task of removing its debt of nearly ten thousand dollars, and is a contributor to every good movement of the church.

The Judge has taken a deep interest in the preparation of this family history and has contributed liberally to its publication.

He is passing a serene old age in comfort, gradually disencumbering himself of weighty cares, and enjoying the society of his family and friends.

After a pleasant hour or two in greetings and social conversation, the dinner bell announced that the clams were ready, and all wended their way to the summer dining-room, where four tables, each laid for twen-

ty-five persons, were tastefully arranged. The bill of fare consisted of baked clams, chowder, clam cakes, baked blue fish, brown bread, pies, cakes, tea coffee, cold tea, melons, and innumerable tasty little dishes.

Mr. and Mrs. Joab P. Aylsworth have a fine reputation for preparing and serving shore dinners, but it was the unanimous opinion of all present that this feast surpassed any of their former efforts, and was as near perfection as it could be.

After having done ample justice to the splendid dinner, the party scattered about through the extensive buildings and grounds, the elder persons occupying the spacious parlors of the mansion, where stories and family reminiscences were related. Conspicuous among the number was the tall and erect form of the oldest living member of the Aylsworth family, Judge Aylsworth, who bears the weight of his years lightly. He was born in a little one-room house in the town of Foster, nearly eighty-two years ago, and is to-day very proud of his native town, in the praise of which he referred to U. S. Senator Aldrich, Mayor Hayward, Prof. Alonzo Williams, of Brown University, and other prominent men as Foster boys.

Besides the three brothers and one sister present at this gathering, the Judge has one sister, Mrs. Celinda Phillips, residing in Foster; another, Mrs. Marcellia Phillips, in Iowa, and a brother, Philip Aylsworth, in Kentucky. He has seven children, twenty-two grand-children, and eleven great-grand-children living.

Among those who rendered much assistance in making the gathering pleasant was our John H. Aylsworth, the artist, who has been "making faces" at Rocky Point and Oakland Beach all summer. His sallies of wit and funny sayings created shouts of laughter. Among other things he claimed that there was no other family in existence could show up as many "heavy weights" as the Aylsworths.

"The *Times* the other day contained a notice of the death of Robert Aylsworth, of Raisin Valley, who expired May 31st, aged 78 years, 2 months and 20 days. The death of this old pioneer deserves more than a brief mention. He was born in Adams, Mass., March 11th, 1799, and moved to Michigan in the fall of 1827. He located three and a half miles north of Adrian, upon the farm where he has resided until his death. He traveled from here to Monroe on foot, to enter the land which he has made a garden since. Himself and wife have lived together over half century, and have been for forty-two years members of the Friends' Church, in the Valley, being among the first attendants and supporters of the old log church, which stood on what is now known as the Bailey farm. DEATH OF AARON AYLSWORTH.

Aaron Aylsworth died in Clarence, N. Y., Oct. 3d, 1883, of apoplexy, in the 75th year of his age.

The deceased was born in Hudson, N. Y., in 1808, and came with his parents to Clarence in 1812. He spent his life on the farm where his father first settled, and lived to see the then wilderness blossom as the rose. He had kept in an extraordinary degree his vigor and youthful appearance, but during the past summer he heard the last steps of the coming messenger and made haste to set his house in order, to pass over Jordan. A last visit to his sons and daughter, to his only remaining brother and sister in the West, he and his wife had made, and had started home to the land they loved so well. Before reaching Detroit the strong man bowed himself to the stroke, while the silver cord was gradually loosening. He reached his home, but never fully realized it, and after lingering on the border-land patiently and meekly, as he had lived, he quietly passed to the long home above, where all tears are wiped away. Nature had endowed him with a strong, persevering and

industrious spirit, and added to these the rarer graces of a genial, hopeful and courageous heart, and his unfailing cordial salutations will linger a memory among all his friends.

Though past the three score years and ten his advice and decisions were still sought by his children, though some of them had gone out into the world years ago. During the great revival in the Baptist Church at Hunt's Corners in the winter of 1866 and '67, he was converted to Christ, and died in the full assurance of faith. As he said to a Christian stranger not long before his demise, "All that was settled with my Savior long ago." There were gathered at his funeral his bereaved widow and seven sons and daughters and one adopted grandson, All of his children were present, save one daughter, who was in St. Louis, Mo., and by irregularity of trains was delayed in Illinois till too late to pay the last token of respect to a father whom each delighted to honor.

He left to his children the best inheritance, a respected and unclouded name, as a citizen; as a neighbor, highly prized; as a husband and father, one whose departure was the going out, in a large degree, the light of the old home; and as a Christian, his life was its own exponent. His remains were interred in the old yard east of the church, where quietly repose his people to the fourth generation, and there left to sleep the sleep of peace until the glorious morning of the resurrection shall dawn.

DEATH OF MRS. JULIA AYLSWORTH.

[From Buffalo (N. Y.) Commercial, Feb. 28, 1887.]

Died in Clarence, on the afternoon of Feb. 23, 1887, of apoplexy of the lungs, Mrs. Julia Aylsworth, widow of the late Aaron Aylsworth. The deceased was born in Windham, Conn., Aug. 6, 1812, and while a child, came with her parents to Western New York. In her youth she became a teacher, and in 1833 was married. She was a woman of rare intellectual endowments, and her fine, quick mental perception, gave a zest to her pursuit of knowledge, even to the last year of her life. She was the mother of nine children, eight of whom survive to "rise up and call her blessed," and though not to all was given the privilege of ministering to her in her last illness, for her youngest son was detained at his home in Nebraska, she was as lovingly and anxiously remembered by the absent. While yet young, she gave her heart to her Savior, and the consolations of faith was her's, even down to old age. The death of her husband was a sorrow from which she could not

recover. The home which is gathering on "the other side" had great attractions for her, and when the summons came she was ready and anxious to depart. BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH.

Jonas Conkling, son of Asahel and Harriet C. Aylsworth, was the youngest of a family of boys. The daughters who had come to the household died in infancy; but nature, as if to make amends for the lack of a sweet, sisterly influence in the home, gave to this youngest son a double portion of those graces of spirit and person, and beauties of mind and heart which win admiration without exciting envy. He was born in Canaan, Columbia Co., N. Y., where the early years of his childhood were spent in the quiet seclusion of a country home. Later his father removed to Granville, O., where the surroundings were all different. The spirit of enterprise and ambition, which marks all towns bordering on the frontiers of a new country, gave a greater zest to study and a stronger desire for higher attainments. The town of Granville, O., was an enlarged and improved copy of Granville, Mass.

Here were found a cultured, intelligent community, surrounded with all the refinement and elegancies of an old eastern place, set down on a broader basis in a richer land, with an enterprising management, with fine schools and a liberally educated ministry. This, in the midst of a new country, was a sort of an open door to the new State of promise, Indiana. All these, with their influences, benign or heroic, told on the life of the young man, and helped to make him in later years that fair expression of a fine type of manhood which he became.

He was educated at what is now Denison University, but the real education, the acquisition of useful knowledge, which received its bent in that institution, went on to the last week of his life.

With the many advantages, for mental culture, there was no neglect in his father's house of those stern Puritanic doctrines which marked the religious faith and practice of those early days, of rigid intolerance of the simple amusements of the young. As years passed on they must have softened, in some degree, the strict discipline of that household, and it is possible that the punishments meted out to this youngest son were less severe than those the older ones had experienced, for some boyish freak of mischief. There was a strict attendance at church in those days, regularly as the Sabbath returned, and from three to five services a day, were a trial to the overflowing spirits of the boy, even of that period. Let us trust, however, that much of that enforced religious knowledge was not lost on that generation, nor its succeeding ones.

A picture of that home with its internal routine would not be difficult to imagine. The father, a genial man, with thrifty ways and few angularities of character, save that he always carried about with him the burden of a full belief, realization, and practice of that injunction of scripture with a promise attached: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." The stately, handsome mother presided over this house with a grace and dignity inherent to her.

The servants about the houses and farms in all that section were Welch by birth or descent; a slow, stolid race of deliberate comprehension, of faithful, unhurried service, and of names unpronounceable.

Fit subjects were they for the amusement of the bright, active, overflowing-with-fun Young America of that period, and many were the practical jokes which these restless boys invented, and their eager hands carried out, at the expense of the innocent Welch. Strange daring of youth when there was no question about the punishment to follow.

Time passed, and one by one the sons went out to try their fortunes further west. The youngest secured, at the age of seventeen, the position of a Hoosier schoolmaster near Fort Wayne. The experiences of one winter was sufficient, and he afterwards had position in the store of

his older brother, Charles, at Fort Wayne. Later he returned to Granville, and remained there some years after his marriage, when he moved on to his farm in Brownville, Neb., where he learned some of the hardships of pioneer life. The breaking out of the War of Rebellion drove him, with many other refugees, to their old homes. He soon located in Attica, Ind., where his brother, George, was in the banking business.

The life of Jonas Aylsworth which was spent in Attica, is an open book to which his family can turn and read a record of one to whom honor and respect are freely accorded; an excellent inheritance to the three sons who are taking their places in the world of business.

His business life was measured by a high standard, and his integrity bore the test of a period of over twenty years, in which he did a large business with the farmers and grain dealers of Fountain, Tippecanoe and Warren Counties, with them his word was above being questioned.

His loss is heavily felt in the City Milling Co., of Attica, which he planned, organized, and superintended, and to which he gave an unceasing activity, even when the mark of death was upon him. Faithful to the last, he fell at his post.

He was a Mason of many years standing, and secretary of his home lodge for a long period, and was respected, beloved and mourned by the brethren of fraternity, and buried with Masonic honors.

He was a man of fine personal appearance, six feet tall, with the manner and bearing of a gentleman, not by education and association alone, but as one "to the manor born." His face was of that fine, handsome type which has marked some members of each succeeding generation of the Aylsworth family from the time of Arthur, when these characteristics were first noticed and recorded. There was the same full beard, with the least touch of sandy in it, a forehead smooth, broad and white, above it lay waves of brown hair; blue eyes, large, honest and kindly, bespoke the true heart below; of fair complexion; in all these he stood a very Saul among his brethren.

But the spirit which dwelt in this house of clay was more beautiful. His charity was broad — a mantle large enough to cover the faults of those who were about him. His generous, sympathetic nature touched with pity for others in trouble made his house a home to any needing it. He had a forgiveness which forgot as readily as it forgave an injury.

Nature made him genial and sunny, and not often was hope eclipsed in that brave heart of his.

His reading had been extensive and comprehensive, gifted with a retentive memory, and being a close observer in all his travels, his mind was well stored, these and his keen sense of wit and humor, a vein of which he possessed, made him, when in congenial company, a man of rare conversational powers.

In political matters, in government, in historical research, in bio-

graphical knowledge, in the topics of the times, in the general march of intelligence, he was the lexicon to whom his wife and children could turn for correct and intelligent information.

Home loving, here his heart centered, and shown out most fair his blameless life. In his relations as husband and father, he was sympathetic, self-sacrificing and considerate, and one of the beatitudes which found a place in his heart, has had its fulfillment, for "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

Here his life was a benediction, and the "Peace on earth, good will toward men," which the angels sang above the Judean plain, was a pronounced trait in his character.

His disease, paralysis of the right side, came with but little warning, but was received and borne with such a meek, Christian resignation as his family can only recall with tenderest recollection.

Never a murmur or a frown, but just thankfulness that speech was not impaired. For the first week there was hope, but in the second the stroke fell again, and again born with patience and meekness. "Surely," said one mourning watcher, "grace must abound."

Death came by slow and painless approaches, heavy sleep with occasional awakening to clear perceptions, till on Saturday, the 11th of April, 1887, without a tremor, and scarcely a sigh, the spirit took its departure.

The funeral services, held at his house, were attended by a large crowd of fellow citizens and friends. He was buried in Riverside Cemetery, near the wife, son and father who had preceded him.

"May he have part in the first resurrection."

DEATH OF JONAS C. AYLSWORTH.

[From Attica (Ind.) Ledger, April 14, 1887.]

The death of Jonas B. Aylsworth, which occurred on last Saturday, afternoon, (April 11th), was not unexpected. From the time of his first stroke of paralysis, the physicians and family had but little hope. The death of Mr. Aylsworth is not only a loss to the family, but to the city of Attica. He was one of its most prominent and trusted citizens. His quiet ways did not permit his character or ability to be measured by the public generally, but those who were intimately connected with him in a business or social way will attest to both. His character was above reproach, and his success in all the duties placed upon him at-

tested to his fine commercial abilities. For twenty-four years he had done business with the people of this and Warren counties, and had daily come in contact with them. To-day, of all that vast number, not one can point to a disreputable or dishonorable act. Honesty was the corner-stone of his life and upon it he built a character that posterity will cherish and mankind praise. In public trusts he was just as trusty and efficient. For several years he served the government in a position full of delicate duties and served it well. As the representative of the people of this city in the council and on the school board he displayed good executive ability and wise forethought. In all the relations of life he performed all his duties unostentatiously, yet with that honesty of purpose and wisdom that made him a splendid reputation as a man with a well-balanced, broad and liberal mind, and a character as nearly pure as mortals ever build. To the young sons, just entering upon the threshold of life, his life must be a powerful incentive for good citizenship and useful lives. He has left them a name that is worth more than all the riches man can have. May they keep it before them as a guiding star and learn from it the path to success and honor among their fellowmen. To the bereaved widow and the young daughter, whose tears drop over the graves of father and mother in the city of the dead, the sympathy of all the people of Attica is extended. May they find consolation in a review of the honorable life of him whose loss is so keenly felt.

The Masonic Lodge of this city is another sincere mourner. He had been connected with this order for twenty-seven years, and had been its secretary for nineteen years, the only intermission being while in the government employ. His books are marvels of neatness, and his assistance to the order, both with pen and voice, was always valuable. In the lodge-room, as in the business world, his place will be hard to fill.

The funeral services took place at the residence on last Monday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. Wm. Wilmer. The remains were interred at Riverside Cemetery, the Masonic fraternity having charge of the burial services.

Jonas C. Aylsworth was born in Columbia County, N. Y., in 1831. He was the youngest child of Asahel and Harriet Aylsworth. In 1839 the family removed to Granville, O. His father was a farmer, and he was raised a tiller of the soil. His education was obtained at Granville College. In 1858 he went to Nebraska, where he lived five years; a part of this time he was a clerk in the United States land office. In the spring of 1863 he came to Attica and took an interest with Fallis & Plowman in a grist-mill. This firm sold out to Brown & Telford, and Mr. Aylsworth superintended it for them until July, 1874, when he was appointed special agent of the pension bureau. In October, 1877, he resigned and returned to Attica, and immediately the Attica Mills Co.

was incorporated and he became the president and manager. In this position he remained until the mills shut down. In the spring of 1884 the City Milling Co. was incorporated and a splendid new mill was built. Mr. Aylsworth became secretary and manager and held these positions at the time of his death. Much of the success of the new company is due to his reliable business methods and his honorable dealings. Mr. Aylsworth was married to Miss Mary W. Atkinson, of Pataaskala, O. She died in 1877, leaving four children, who now mourn the death of father. He married again in April, 1880, Laura F. Aylsworth, of East Clarence, N. Y., who survives him. Mr. Aylsworth served three terms as councilman of this city and several years as a member of the board of education.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH.

BY H. M. AYLSWORTH.

Homer Elhanan Aylsworth was born in Burlington, Otsego Co., N. Y., Sept. 8, 1838. His youth was passed upon a farm, attending the district school of the neighborhood winters, until he attained to the age of sixteen years. He possessed a vigorous, strong and evenly balanced, rather than a brilliant intellect, with a fondness for the fine arts. He possessed musical talents of a high order, which early attracted the attention of his father, and which he aided him to cultivate to the extent of his limited means. But his youth was passed in a rural community, far removed from the advantages desirable and necessary for the proper cultivation of the fine arts. He prosecuted, however, as best he could, his musical studies at home in connection with his farm life and school duties, until at the age of sixteen he was placed under the able instruc-

tion of Prof. J. A. Fowler, a then celebrated teacher and composer, having charge of the musical department of the Cherry Valley Female Academy, at that time a flourishing institution located at Cherry Valley, N. Y. Here he made such rapid improvement that two years later he was sufficiently advanced to embark in teaching piano and organ music; and as necessity compelled the effort to be made in his own behalf, he visited Ann Arbor, Mich., then a young growing town of the West, where he engaged in teaching vocal and instrumental music. He also had classes at Dexter, Chelsea, and Ypsilanti, neighboring villages, and remained at Ann Arbor and Dexter until the summer of 1875, when he visited Illinois, destined to be his future home. His stopping place was Williamsville, near Springfield, where he had relatives. He remained in that vicinity teaching district school and music until the spring of 1859.

His father having died in December, 1858, leaving his business affairs in an unsettled condition. Homer E., with his brother, Henry M., also teaching in the West, returned to the widowed mother and younger brother in the East, in the spring of 1859, and resumed for a time the business and duties of farm life, carrying on the old homestead. He found it necessary to institute a suit in the supreme court to recover the title to the patrimonial estate, which had been placed in the hands of a relative who refused to transfer it to the rightful heirs. This suit he prosecuted with great energy and ability, and succeeded in recovering the title to the property, although the litigation ended only in the court of appeals, the tribunal of last resort in the State.

The following year he resumed his studies, completing his preparatory course of study at Cooperstown Seminary, then under the able management of Prof. R. C. Flack, and in 1861 entered Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., for the Scientific Course, and graduated with his class in 1863, notwithstanding the want of means compelled him to teach for about twelve weeks during the winter months of each of the years of his college course. He was a thorough student. During the period of his college course he not only kept up with his college examinations but found time, besides teaching as stated, to prepare and deliver a number of lectures on music, geology, chemistry, and other scientific subjects traversed by him in his college course, which were ably prepared and well received, evincing thorough familiarity with the subjects treated, and a breadth of intellect possessed by few.

After his graduation he was engaged for a year as vice-principal in a preparatory school located at Newburg, on the Hudson, after the close of which engagement he returned to Illinois, and soon after commenced the study of medicine at Roseville, in that State, which he ever afterward made his home. He attended medical lectures at Ann Arbor, Mich., and graduated from the Medical Department of the University

of Michigan at that place in 1867. Returning to Roseville he engaged in the active practice of medicine, which calling he followed for a year and then founded the "Pioneer Drug Store" at Roseville and developed its trade, which business he successfully conducted until his death.

In June, 1867, he was united in marriage to Miss Flora A. Eldredge, foster daughter of Truman Eldredge, Esq., of Roseville, one of the sturdy and prosperous pioneers of Warren County, a lady of culture and refinement, who still survives him, to care for the three children, which were the fruits of their marriage.

He was prosperous in business, and saving in his habits, but life proved too short, in his case, for the accumulation of a fortune, although his family are left, with economy, a comfortable support.

The latter years of his life were employed in collecting the data for a record or history of the Aylsworth Family, dating back from the time of ARTHUR, the Emigrant. To this task he addressed himself with his accustomed zeal and energy, and labored with indefatigable industry. Besides writing many thousand letters he visited different sections in various States, and in Canada, where the family had been dispersed since its origin, at considerable personal expense, and had the satisfaction of knowing that his work was nearly completed, ready for the compositor, when was compelled to lay down the pen that had recorded so many deaths in the ancestral lineage before him, to take up, as we trust, the crown of immortal life and touch the strings of a golden harp in the presence of the angels! In this task, which had become to him a labor of love, he had the pleasure of meeting many pleasant acquaintances, some of whom have kindly and generously assisted and contributed to this great work since his death. But he left it, as a chronological and genealogical record, substantially as the reader finds it, its publication having devolved upon others whose names I would gladly mention had I sufficient information upon the subject.

In his domestic relations he was a kind husband and an indulgent father, and will be missed through the coming years most by the object of his greatest solicitude in life, his son, Murray, who has the misfortune to have been crippled from his birth, with no hope of recovery.

He was an exemplary citizen, ever lending support to the leading reforms. A temperance man himself all his life and deploring the ruin that intemperance so often invites upon individuals and families, he conscientiously abolished alcoholic stimulants from the list of commodities kept for sale in his place of business. Though this brought opposition in the way of competition in trade, he could not be induced to compromise with what he considered morally wrong for the sake of pecuniary gain. A conscientious adherence to what he considered right was the ruling principle of his life.

At the early age of thirteen years he experienced religion and united with the M. E. Church, which membership he retained at the time of

his death. Though sparing in the matter of personal expenditures, he gave liberally, according to his means, to the cause of religion, and promoted at all times, and under all circumstances, the interest of the church. He was in very deed a worker in the vineyard of the Lord. He was seldom absent from the prayer meeting, and Sabbath found him generally with the worshippers. He was chorister, and also Superintendent of the Sabbath School in his church at the time of his death, where he was very much beloved. Indeed his death, it is thought, resulted from a cold contracted in sitting chilled in church the Sabbath before.

And so in the mid-day of his manhood, in the full strength of his intellectual powers, while absorbed in his life work and engrossed in the performance of his life's duties, on the 30th day of January, 1885, he passed on to join the majority on the other shore of the river that borders the green fields of everlasting life, there to rest from his labors and receive his reward.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH.

BY REV. D. A. WHEADON, D. D.

Hiram Bennett Aylsworth, son of Judge Eli and Martha B. Aylsworth, was born in Foster, R. I., on the 19th of February, 1831, and in that town the first ten years of his boyhood were passed. In 1841 he removed with his father to Killingly, Conn., and a year later to Brooklyn, in the same State. His education, beyond the public schools, was obtained at the Smithville Seminary, now known as Lapham Institute, and at East Greenwich, while his training in the elements of business life was received at the hand and under the eye of his father, by whom he was taught the promptness, exactness, and fidelity which have marked his maturer and more responsible years.

At the age of seventeen he removed to Providence and entered upon a clerkship in the office of Mr. Preston Bennett, then agent of the Richmond Manufacturing Company, with whom he remained until May 20, 1850. He then became bookkeeper for Messrs. George F. Rice and Henry R. Congdon, wholesale dealers in boots and shoes in Providence. This house is now one of the oldest mercantile houses in the State, having been founded in the year 1815 by Charles Cobb, a member of the Society of Friends. It was not to be expected that young Aylsworth, with his energy, would be content with keeping books an hour longer than was necessary, and it excites no surprise to learn that in two years from that time he was on the road selling by sample. Such was the care he used in effecting sales that for thirteen years he did not lose a single bill, and so successful was he that on February 8, 1857, he was made a partner in the business, the name of the firm becoming Rice, Congdon & Co.

This position, so well earned and so gratifying to his ambition, was in four months followed by an event of greater consequence and more vitally touching his happiness. On the 11th of June, 1857, he was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Miller Hatfield, daughter of Elisha and Elizabeth (Miller) Hatfield, of White Plains, N. Y., and sister of Rev. Dr. Robert M. Hatfield, then of New York city, a lady of a lovely character, whose rare womanly virtues have for thirty years made her the delight of her husband and the joy and ornament of his home. Few men have been so fortunate in the companion of their life.

In February, 1860, Mr. James Rothwell purchased the interest of Mr. Rice, and for the next two years the business of the concern was conducted under the name of Congdon, Aylsworth & Co., and then by the retirement of Mr. Rothwell, of Congdon & Aylsworth. In 1875 Mr. Frank H. Congdon, a son of Mr. Henry R. Congdon, was admitted a partner, which arrangement continued until 1882. When the elder Mr. Congdon died, in 1883, Mr. Aylsworth became sole proprietor, re-

taining by agreement the old firm name of Congdon & Aylsworth. Down to May, 1870, the business had been located on North Main Street. At that date it was removed to the corner of Pine and Hay, and twelve years afterward, in 1882, to the corner of Pine and Peck Streets, where it still (1887) continues.

Whatever ambitions in life Mr. Aylsworth may have sometimes felt, the highest and dominant one has been to be a true business man. If he has at any time listened to other voices calling him, it has been only temporarily. While never refusing co-operation and aid in other weighty and worthy matters, his business has been his one work, and to it he habitually brings his undivided energies. He is not forgetful of his relations with those engaged in like pursuits with himself. He was one of the original members of the Board of Trade, and for three years a member of the executive committee. He was also one of the original members of the Providence Commercial Club, and for several years was one of the trustees of the Mechanics Savings Bank.

He is one of that class of business men, not too numerous, who believe in uprightness, integrity, and devotion to duty. A merchant's word is, in his view, a precious thing. Deceit and fraud are to him an abomination, and laziness a sin; yet for the unfortunate and distressed he has great tenderness and ready help. With his principles and habits it is not strange that his career has been prosperous and successful as well as honorable, or that men of like spirit with himself become his friends, attached to him with hooks of steel.

On his first coming to Providence Mr. Aylsworth attached himself to the newly formed Methodist Episcopal Congregation, which soon located and built a house of worship on Mathewson Street. Indeed, he boasts of having earned his first fifty cents in serving as its sexton. In 1869 he became a member of that church, and in subsequent years held the important offices of steward and trustee. In these positions his careful and methodical business habits made his services of great value. The plan adopted in connection with the twenty-fifth anniversary of the church in 1873, of liquidating its debt of nearly ten thousand dollars, originated with him, and, under his management as chairman of the finance committee, was carried to a successful issue. In 1876 he transferred his relations to the Union Congregational Church, where he performed a like service on a similar committee, with a much larger indebtedness. In these and kindred causes, charitable and religious, he gives freely of his wealth. He carries the principles of his business into his benevolences. He loves to make money, and he equally loves to give it away. Many thousands of dollars have gone in this way, and few know the conscientiousness and care with which these appropriations are made and distributed.

Politically, Mr. Aylsworth is a Republican. His innate hatred of oppression and wrong made him one. At the breaking out of the slave-

holders' rebellion he sent one of his clerks as a substitute, furnishing him with an outfit and continuing his salary, and when he returned wounded in the first battle of Bull Run he took him into his own family until his recovery and then gave him his old position. He then sent another, and continued a soldier in the field until the rebellion was throttled. He has been many times a member of the Republican State Convention and often of the State Committee, and in 1873 he was a member of the House of Representatives in the General Assembly. To the principles of his party he has always been warmly devoted, but, to his credit, party bonds have always sat more loosely upon him than principle, and he has on occasion found a keen pleasure in breaking the slate of party managers, or spoiling a nicely framed political intrigue.

In the year 1876 Mr. Aylsworth erected his pleasant house on Harvard Avenue, where he now resides. With his stalwart frame, strong constitution, temperate habits, and Christian style of living, he has good reason to hope for many years yet, surrounded by his friends and with his children near him.

Mr. Aylsworth has taken a deep interest in the publication of this family history, and has been the financial head of the enterprise.

The following is from the Town History of Shirley, Mass.:

This name is of very frequent occurrence in the towns of New England, and it is presumed that those who bear it are chiefly the descendants of Robert Harrington, who was settled at Watertown as early as 1642. Some of his posterity or kindred were located in Lexington, and it is believed that those of the name who found homes in Shirley wandered here from that town.

Mr. Hudson, in his history of Lexington, gives the names and birth dates of three brothers of the name which correspond with three that lived here a few years past the middle of last century. If these parties

were identical, they were the sons of Richard Harrington of Lexington, who was of the fourth generation from George, who was supposed to be a son or brother of Robert, the immigrant of 1642:
