



I am in the nations glory, New York City, making a tour of that grand and glorious place. Lo, who should I behold her me, none but our beloved president, Sherman Williamson. I had heard of his accomplishments as an artist and he informed me that on the following evening he was giving a piano recital in the City Hall. Being very glad to meet someone whom I knew, I accepted the invitation to hear him. We ventured further and as I inquired about some of the other members of our class, he told me that many of them were living in that city. He took me into apalatial drug store, equipped with all the necessities one might want, and on query I lound out that the proprietors were Olds and Olds, Inc. Anna was attractively attired and she told me that Jacqueline Lyles, who was quite a reputable dress designer in New York, had created the ensemble especially for her. Working on her

stall were such well-known designers as Ellen Davis, Lois Clay, Lottic Skelton, and Mary Francis Simmons. Sherman and I spent quite a pleasant evening together, but it was getting late and I had to be on my way. We parted and I walked on toward my hotel.

On stopping at the desk to inquire if there had been any calls, believe it or not. Wilmer Pinnix, the night clerk, informed me there had been no calls but some of our old classmates had registered as guests that very evening. Being very glad to see Mr. Pinnix, 1 stood at the desk and chatted with him Ior quite some time. From our conversation I learned that there was a National Medical Coinvention being held in that city and quite a few of our classmates were attending. Dr. Metvin Hardy, who is a promising physician in Raleigh, N. C.; Dr. Eva Bluloid Lane a surgeon at Walter Reed Hospital, Dr. Daniel Rave and Winnie Dixon who operates a clinic in Daytona Beach, Florida and Dr. Nathaniel Harris noted psychiatrist whose unusual ability had broken down racial prejudice in Savannah, Ga. and had a large number of white and Negro clients.

Alter attending Sherman Williamson's concert, I caught the midnight train from New York heading South. When I went into the dining car, there was seated opposite me a well dressed voung gentleman, who introduced himself to me as William Lawson field secretary for the N. A. A. C. P. You can imagine my embarresment when I realized he was an old classmate of mine. He informed me that he had visited several colleges in his tour. During this time he had come across several of our classmates. Louise Nixon had received a Ph.D degree in mathematics and was head of the Mathematics Department of Atlanta University. Charles Brabble was president of Livingston College and Maude Brady was a professor of home economics in the same institution. Mary Louise Plummer was an English instructor at North Carolina State College and Bessie Derr was head of the

business department. Elnora Faucett was secretary to the registrar at T. and T. College, and Lois Hamilton was head of the Nursery School at her alma Mater. While in Greensboro he met Sara Noreum, who was recreation director at Windsor Community Center. Robert Hold had finally realized the futility of trying to teach English and was now head of the music department at Howard University. Lawson and I were so engrossed in our conversation that we were both surprised when the conductor came through and called the next stop, which was Philadelphia, my desimation. So Eawson and I bid each other good-bye.

In Philadelphia, I ran across Jessye Mims, who was associate editor of the Philadelphia Tribune, a widely known newspaper. She was able to give me a lot of information about some of our friends because many of them had been written up in her newspaper. Among those who had made outstanding progress was James Hill, who was the progressive president of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company. Ruth McDaniel was the private secretary of this important business executive. He had as stenogrphers in his establishment Catherine Derr, Lucinda Dean, and Laura J. Bulland. The head accountants were Sadie Brooks and Nancy Griffin.

Jessye also told me that Rosa Free was lyric soprano and was at that time on a tour of the South. Rosa Keyes had become a model for Vogue Magazine. Marion Taylor was a successful architectural engineer and was at that time drawing plans for the palatial

home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cuthbertson, There had also appeared an article which stated that among those who were attending the annual Homemaking Institute at Bennett College recently were such successful home demonstration agents as Ketrina Smith, Beulah Griffin and Ada Alston. Two of the prominent dieticians present were Dainty McBraver and Maggie Mills. Jessve was on her way to interview Annie Barber who was business executive with Enice Powers as her efficient partner. Oscar Hinnant was successfully carrying out his duties as president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car porters. Loretta Turner was head of the Alterations department at John Wannamakers Department Store. William Skelton was sound control operator with Columbia Broadcasting company. Jessye could not think of any others whose names had appeared in her paper recently. I was only in Philadelphia for a shorttime, because I was on my way South, Upon my arrival in Atlanta, Ga., I was greeted by Elizabeth Howard and Claudia Headen who were doing social work in that city.

And behold a change was come over the spirit of my vision, and the veil was drawn over mine eyes shutting out from my vision the Thing To Be and I turned mine eyes Back to the Things That are, sure that as "coming events cast their shadows before," only goodness and truth and prosperity shall follow all the days that are to come to the fair and talented members of the class of 1046.

There are many aspects of church administration that are of a high order, but others are not well planned and are poorly carried out, largely because lew, if any, of the members have taken time to learn methods of improvement. The amount of money invested in church property has grown to the point where, as a matter of sound business policy, it should be in the hands of persons competent to safeguard its use and integrity.
