These progressive developments have come about through the efforts of many persons, members of the Trustee Board, the President, an outstanding faculty and staff, and a fine group of serious students.




School of Education and General Studies

Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity






Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity



Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.




