School of Agriculture

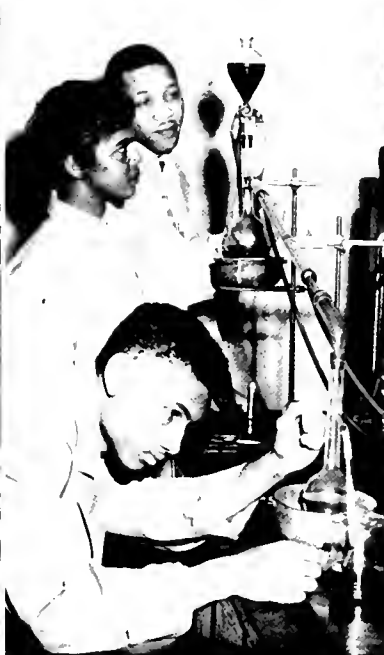

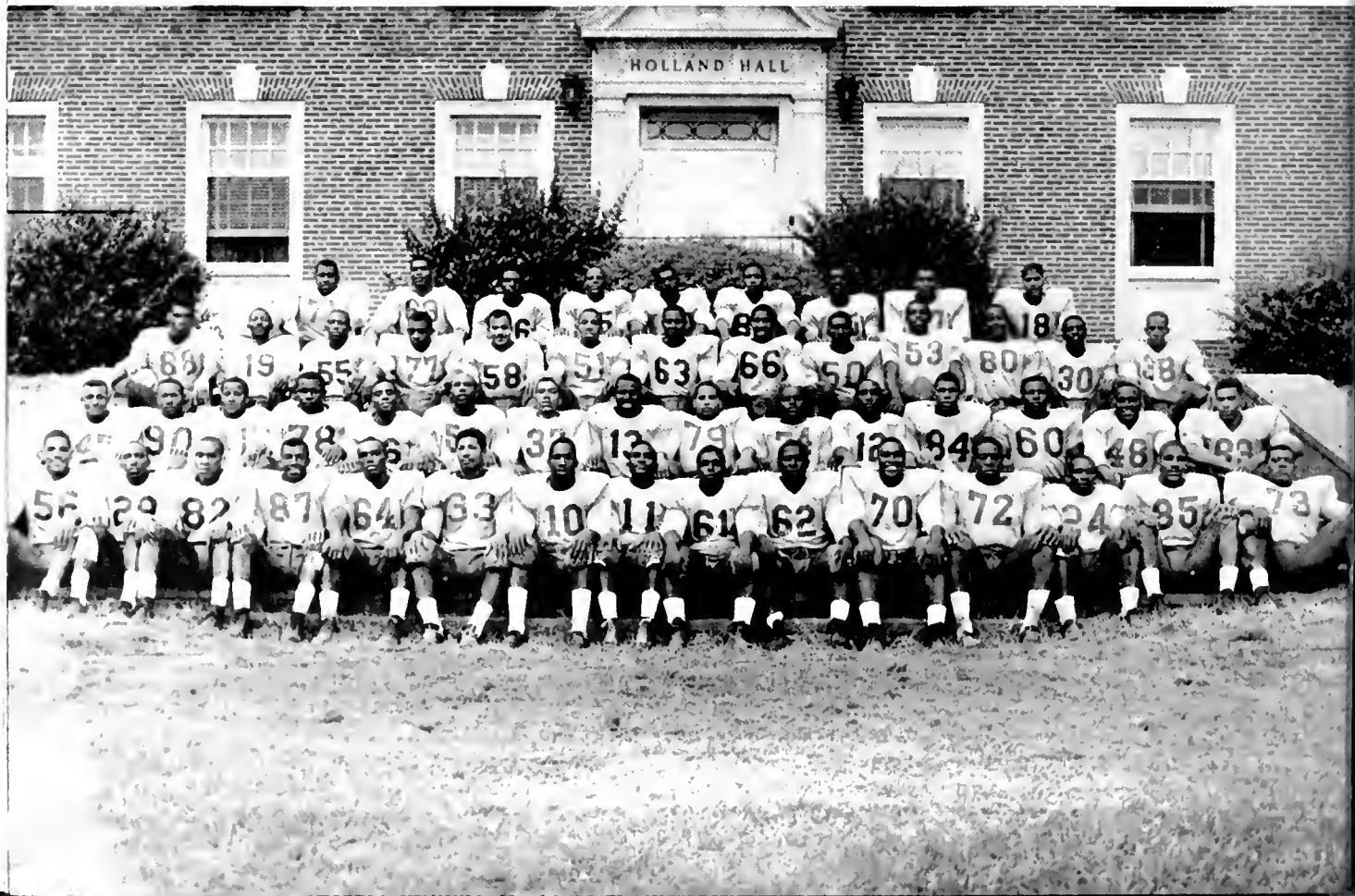
Football

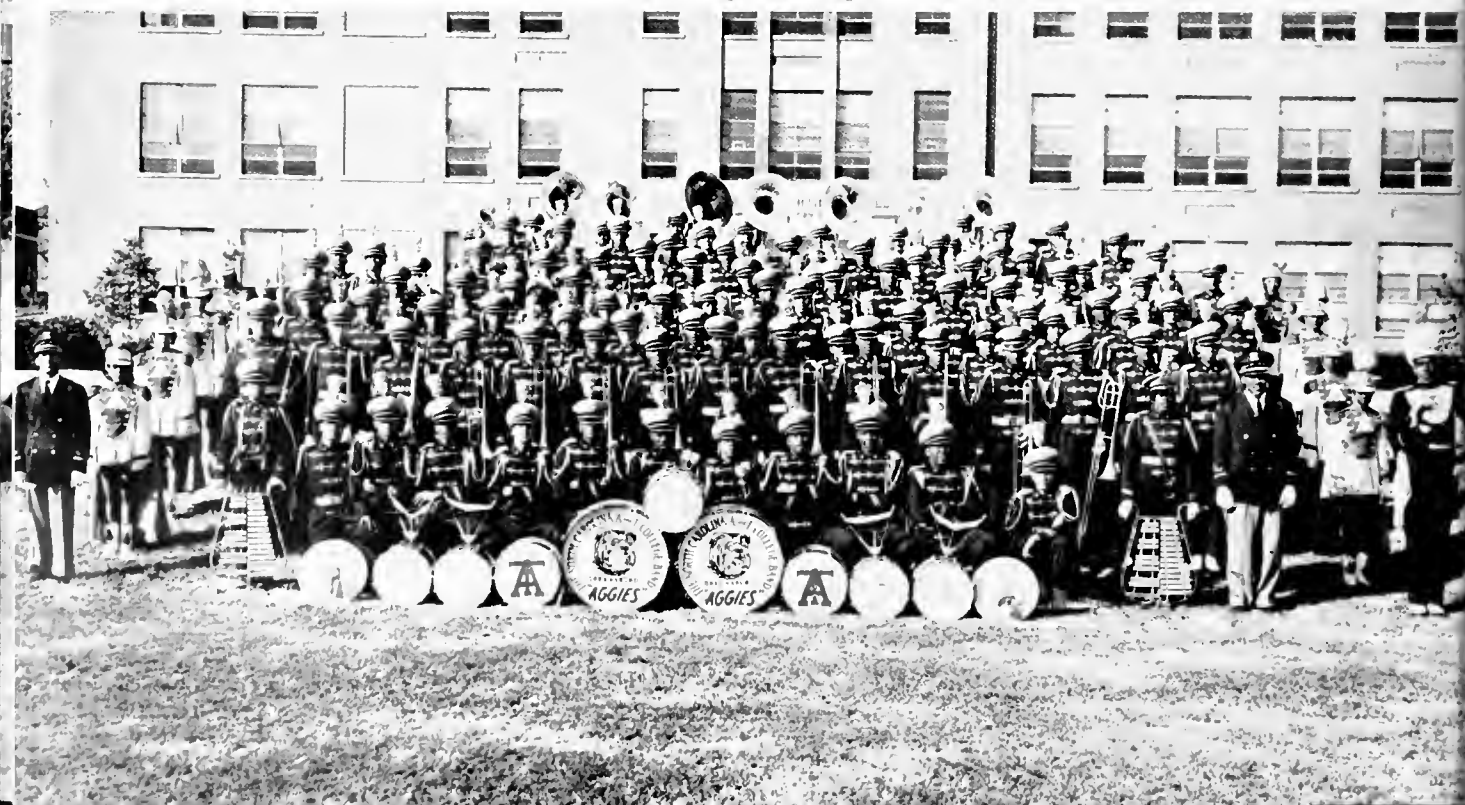
Marching Band

Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity

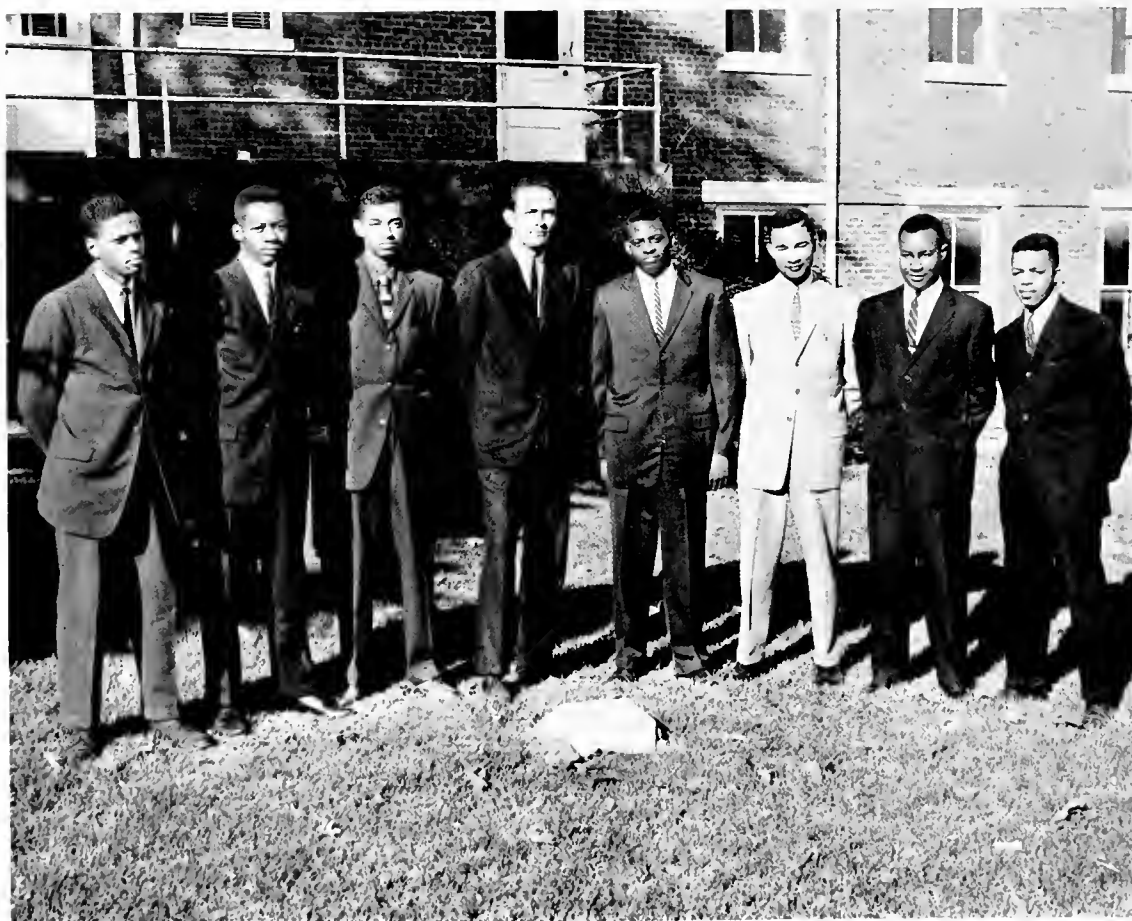

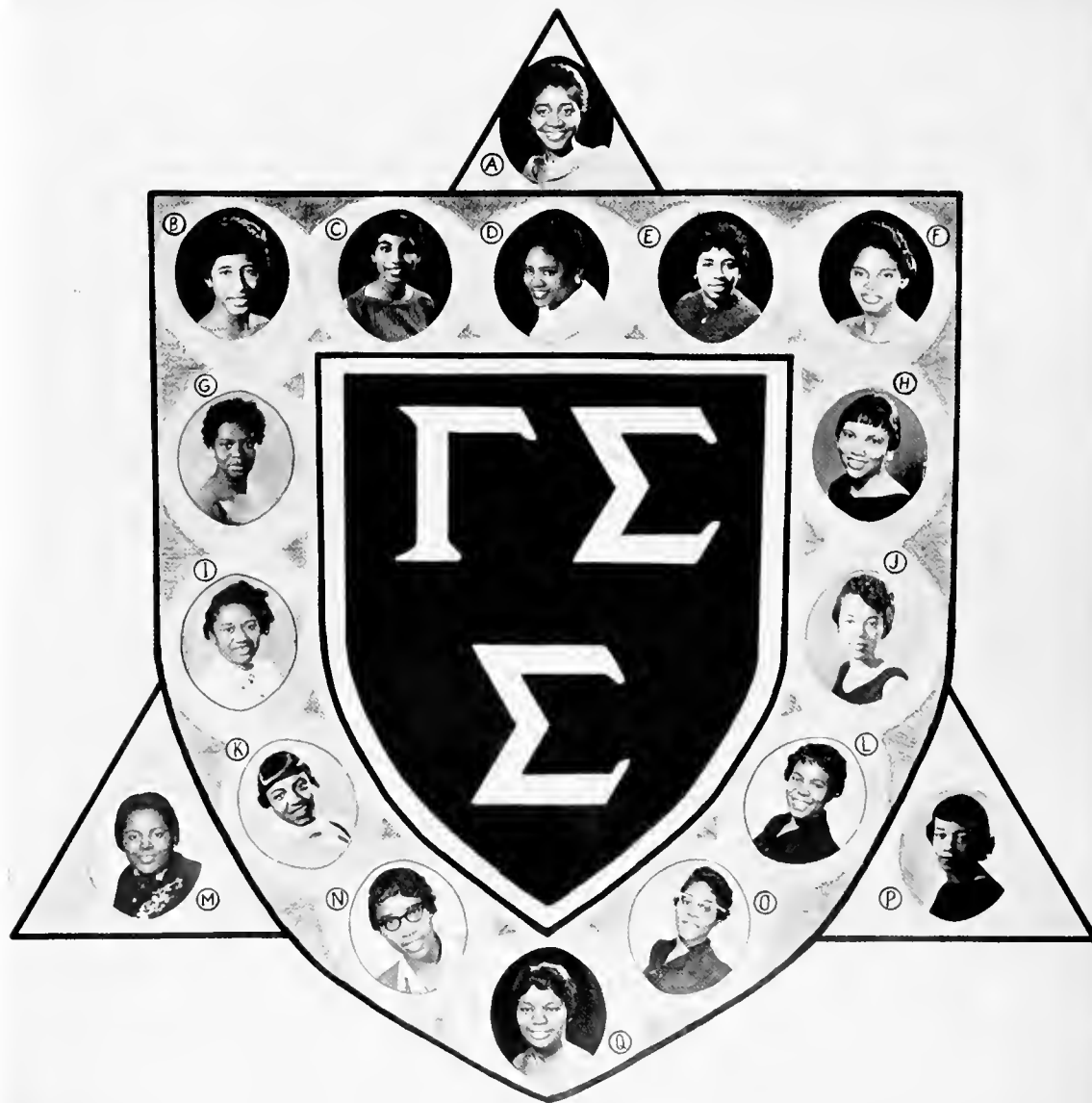


Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity

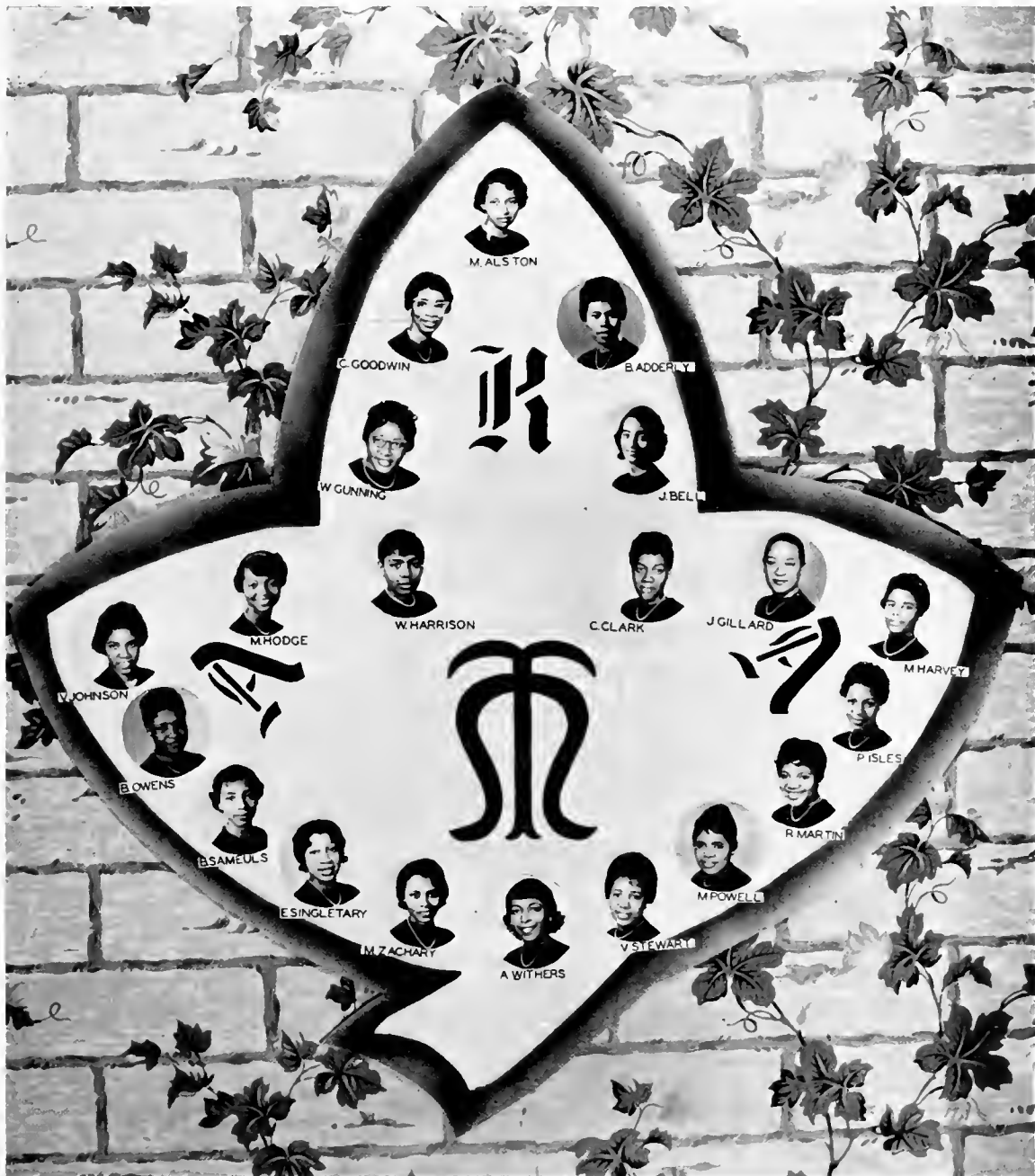

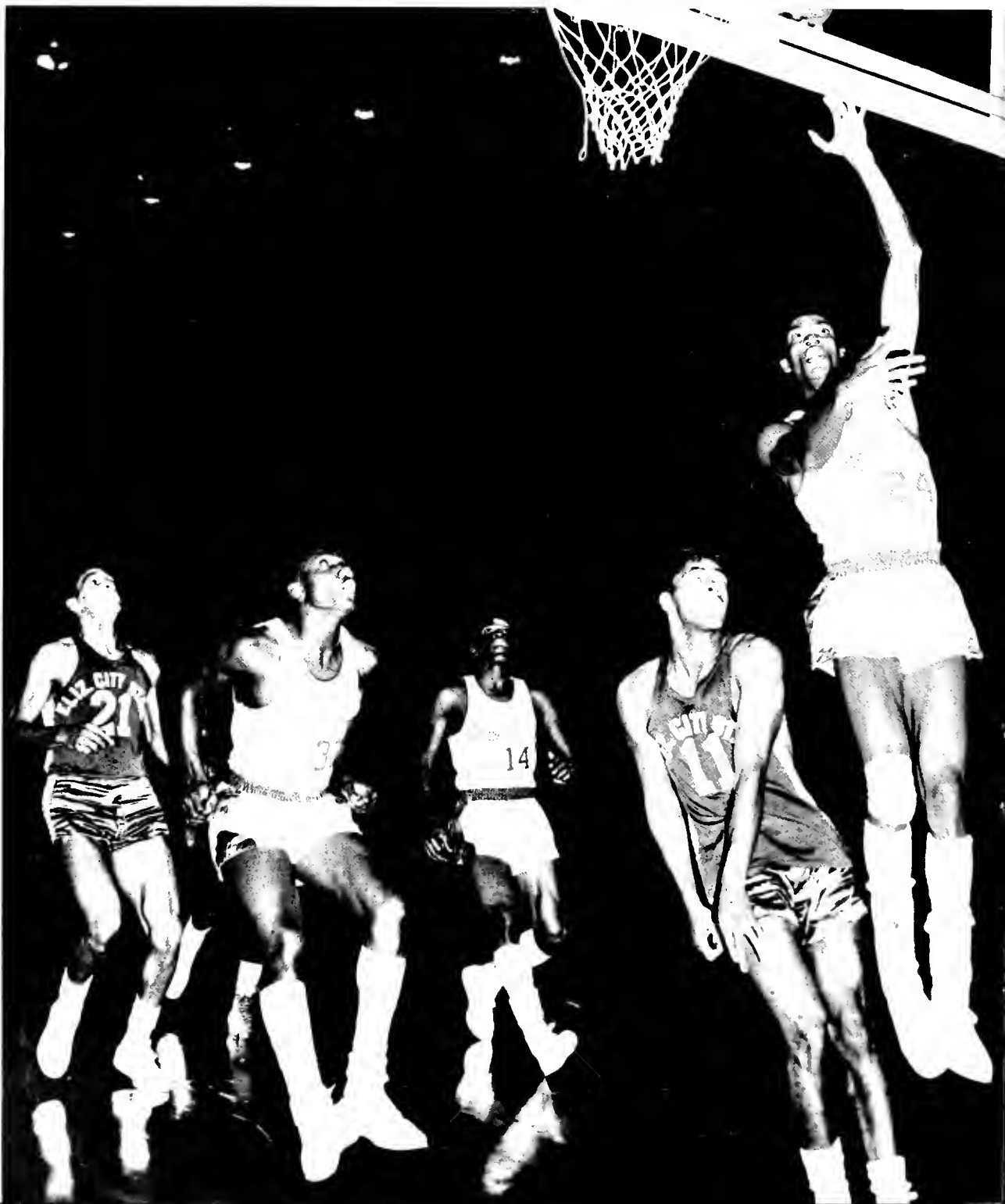

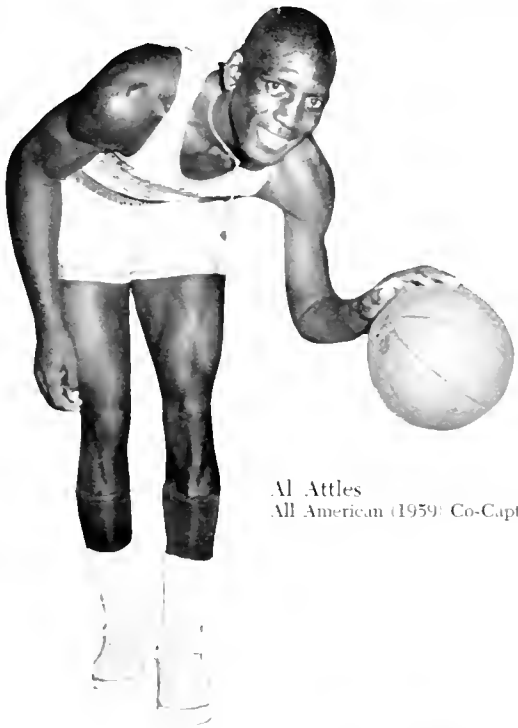


Basketball Review

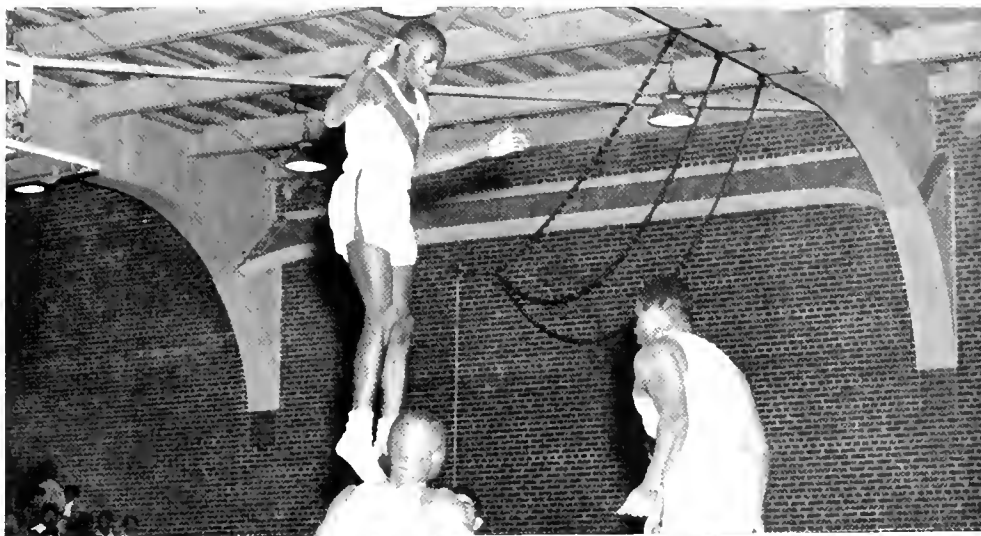


Congratulations on your fast approaching graduation. For the past four years, one major objective has been before you--Graduation, and I am happy for you and with you that it is now in sight.
