Alvin V. Blount

Man of Honor & Distinction

Dr. Alvin V. Blount is a man rich in the history of North Carolina Agricultural & Mechanical University and the City of Greensboro. His achievements in the school and community (many are invaluable) are well documented.

Dr. Blount was graduated from North Carolina Agricultural & Mechanical University (NCAMU) and Howard University School of Medicine in 1947. He completed a postgraduate residency in Internal Medicine at the Pritzker-Barnes Reynolds School of Medicine in 1950.

Dr. Blount served in the Army Medical Corps during the Vietnam War as a chief of surgery in the 31st General Hospital in Korea from 1952 to 1954. Following his military service, he established a medical practice in Greensboro, North Carolina, and worked for over five years before returning from practicing medicine to the University of North Carolina. He is currently the medical director for the University of North Carolina Health Center and is on the faculty of the School of Medicine. He is also a member of Knickerbocker Hospital and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Blount has been married to Mrs. J. Richardson Blount for 33 years.

Dr. Alvin V. Blount was among the first to be desegregated. He was the first black physician to be admitted to the membership of several fraternities and the advancement of positive race relations in Greensboro. He is the only living litigant of the suit *Smilkins v. Moses H. Cone Hospital*.

As a result of a 1963 landmark Supreme Court decision hospitals throughout the South were desegregated and Blount became the first black surgeon admitted to the medical staff of Moses Cone Hospital. He was also one of the earliest black members of the United Fund and played an active role in helping the city stay on a course of civility during the Greensboro sit-ins.

Blount has been an integral part of AST's growth. He was a 1966 charter member of the NC AST Foundation Board where he serves as president-*emeritus*. He was president of the foundation for 23 years and under his leadership over \$25 million was raised for the university. In 1983, AST awarded Blount an honorary doctor of humanities and in 2000, the foundation board established the Dr. AV. Blount Scholarship Fund.

Blount is affiliated with numerous organizations including Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity Inc., NAACP, Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity Inc. and the Association of Guardsmen. He is co-founder of the Century Club for Hayes Taylor YMCA and a member of their Hall of Fame. In addition, Blount is the honorary past grand master and medical director of the Prince Hall Masons of North Carolina and past president of the Greensboro's Men's Club. He has received countless awards including the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, the highest honor that can be granted to a civilian in the state of North Carolina.

Blount is married to the former Gwendolyn Harris. They have seven children and 12 grandchildren.

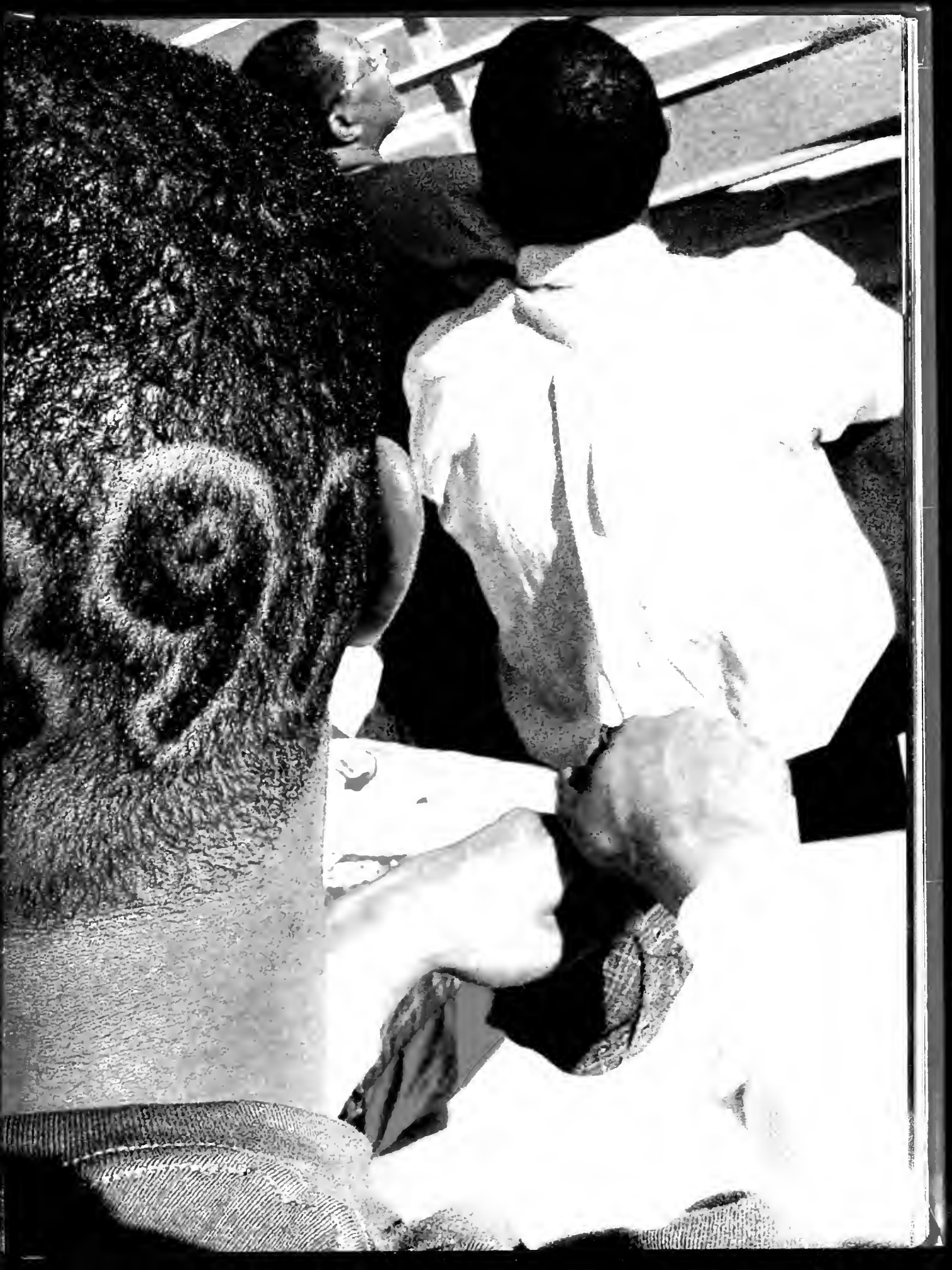

The Sebastian Health Center was dedicated in 1953 and named after the first African American physician, Dr. Samuel Sebastian. The Sebastian Health Center is committed to the concept of wellness. It is regarded as a wellness center as well as a place to seek care and treatment during illness. The Sebastian Health Center seeks to advance and maintain the health of university students by altering or eliminating health related obstacles and by empowering them to be self directed in their individual care.

The health services include health and medical education services to meet the university family's needs. Some of these include obtaining a flu shot, medical care, mental health assistance, women's health, help with dating violence, sexual health, or weight control. Other services of the health center include job services, HIV testing, an on-site psychiatrist, health education, and student insurance.

The health center is available to all valid North Carolina A&T students and is open during the week from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m., and the nursing portion closes at 12 midnight. The Executive Director of the Sebastian Health Center, Linda Wilson says that, "The main goal of the Sebastian Health Center is to keep our students well, so their matriculation process is easier."

The Garrett House is home for all university relations. This building was formerly housed in Dowdy Administration Building. The Garrett House was built in 1939 and is a two-story, 1900 square foot brick building with a Georgian-style cottage build. This house has white shutters with an "Aggie" blue door. The Garrett House was named after Mrs. Florence Garrett, who was among the first women students to attend the college. She was a member of the class of 1912. For most of its life, the Garrett House has been known as the "practice of home" for home economics students and was the first building on campus to have solar heating. From about 1970 until 1990, the Garrett House served as an applied science laboratory to study residential energy use.

Currently, the Garrett House offers the staff a close-up view of all campus life. Staff member Daphney Koch says, "We provide photography coverage, publications control, new hires for the university, provide alumni information, provide scholarships, and grants, host ribbon cutting and ground breaking of new buildings, coordinate events before hand with various organizations, and a host of other very important campus events." Michael S. Scott heads the University Relations Department.

The Office of International Programs (OIP) is a unit within the Division of Academic Affairs, and was established by Chancellor James C. Rankin in March 2000 to provide a focus and direction for the international offices of the University.

The objectives of OIP encompass all disciplines in the University, and includes academic exchange programs for students and faculty, study abroad, managing agreements with overseas institutions, working with faculty to develop new international programs, Global Studies Certificate Program, and global awareness activities through various cultural and educational activities throughout the year to provide a campus-wide global perspective. International students on our campus play a major role in helping the campus to develop that international perspective and we welcome them to our campus.

The Director of International Programs works closely with the Office of the Provost, the Deans and the Faculty to ensure international experience and exposure for all in our university community.

The International Students and Scholars Office (ISSO) works closely with undergraduate admissions and the School of Graduate Studies to insure that all international applicant inquiries and U.S. continental applications are handled consistently with federal regulations. The ISSO, a unit of the Division of Student Affairs, has been designated by the University as the office responsible for immigration advising and document processing for all foreign national students and scholars and H-1B temporary employment. Counseling Services



Counseling services provides students a place to talk confidentially with professionals about current and past issues that may be bothering them.



Counseling Services are located in Murphy Hall room 108. The Counseling Services provide students with the opportunity to discuss problems, issues, needs, dilemmas, and concerns with a trained professional counselor or a clinical psychologist. Students can talk about issues involving academic, career, social, personal, and emotional adjustments. There are a variety of types of counseling. Some of the counseling types are individual, group, individual test administration and interpretation, and University Diagnostic and Placement Testing. All counseling services are free of charge, voluntary, and confidential.

The Office of Career Services is available to students in order to assist them in every possible way. The primary mission of the Office is to provide centralized, comprehensive and progressive programs, services and resources designed to prepare students to successfully pursue meaningful career opportunities.

Continuous career development assistance is also available to alumni of the University. To ensure equal access for all AST students, Career Services is customer focused and centralizes the functions of full-time employment, summer internships, cooperative education, part-time employment, post-graduation employment, and career counseling. (All student recruiting must be scheduled through OCS — i.e., interviewing, information sessions, career fairs, etc.) Therefore, if an employer contacts you or your student organization for the express purpose of recruiting a company or agency, it is necessary to refer him or her to the Office of Career Services to assure centralized scheduling and marketing of the visit.

The centralized, comprehensive and progressive programs, services and resources provided by the Office are tailored to be a gateway for the enhancement of the skills necessary to keep the AST Agile competitive in the workplace. All students are encouraged to register with the OCS and actively take advantage of the services offered.

Henry & Shirley Frye

The duo of Henry and Shirley Frye has left an imprint on North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University that will be everlasting. Henry and Shirley shared 42 years together in holy matrimony and share love for their Alma Mater that is rivaled by very few. They both are committed to serving the greater good of the Aggie Community.

Henry Frye is a native of Ellerbe, NC, in Richmond County. He graduated Summa Cum Laude in 1953 from North Carolina A&T State University, Greensboro, with a major in Biology and a double minor in Chemistry and Air Science. He also graduated with honors from the UNC-Chapel Hill School of Law.

Frye was commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Air Force Reserve and later became Captain. He served as an Ammunition Officer in Japan and Korea.

Frye was the organizer and President of Greensboro National Bank. He practiced law in Greensboro for 21 years and was admitted to the Federal District, Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals and the United States Supreme Court.

In 1968, he became the first African-American to serve in the North Carolina House of Representatives in the Twentieth Century. He later gained a seat in the North Carolina Senate. In 1983, Frye also became the first African-American to serve on the Supreme Court of North Carolina. Then in September 1999, he was appointed by Governor Jim Hunt to Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

Frye's distinguished service to North Carolina has brought him commendations and awards from organizations across the state. For instance, he received the UNC-Chapel Hill's Distinguished Alumnus Award and the North Carolina A&T State University Alumni Excellence Award. He received the Doctor of Laws from both Shaw University and North Carolina A&T State University. The University of North Carolina at Greensboro presented him the Charles D. Melver Medal. Frye was also named the Lawyer of the Year by the Association of Black Lawyers and later received the North Carolina Academy of Trial Lawyers' Appellate Judges Award. Frye is a past Chairman of the Board of the American Judicature Society.

Shirley Frye is a retired educator who has devoted over 40 years to Greensboro Public Schools and higher education. She began her career, teaching 2nd grade and exceptional students before becoming a professor of special education and program coordinator at Bennett College.

After a short stint with the Department of Public Instruction, Frye returned to her alma mater, North Carolina A&T State University, where she was the Assistant Vice Chancellor for Development and University Relations.

Frye also worked as the Special Assistant to the President and Director of Planned Giving for Bennett College. She most recently served as the Vice President of Community Relations for WFMY News 2 in Greensboro.

Much of Frye's time is dedicated to service on many boards, including the Joseph McKinley Bryan Foundation, the Glaxo-SmithKline Foundation, Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation and the Boards of Visitors for Guilford and Greensboro Colleges and Wake Forest University.

She is also a member of the Greater Greensboro United Way, for which she chaired the Board of Directors in 2003.

She is a 1953 graduate of NCA&TSU, and received her master's degree from Syracuse University in Psychology and Special Education.

The auditorium was constructed in 1937 and named for Richard Berry Harrison who portrayed "De Lowde" in *Green Pastures*, a dramatic play in 1929. He also taught elocution and dramatics courses at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College.

Harrison received its first major renovation, since its opening. It closed in the spring of 2005 and reopened September 24th, 2006. Harrison is used for the Honor's day and Founder's Day ceremonies and other major concerts and performances.



On February 1, 1960, four African American students, Ezell A. Blair Jr. (now known as Jibreel Khazan), David Richmond, Joseph McNeil, and Franklin McCain from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College, sat down at the segregated F.W. Woolworth & Company lunch counter in Greensboro, North Carolina. Although they were refused service, they were allowed to stay at the counter, sparking off sit-ins and economic boycotts that were a landmark of the American Civil Rights Movement. Every year, these four men are honored on February 1st. However, the 2007 celebration seem even more special.

The day before, students held a special march honoring those who "sat down for us so we could stand." The few hundred students began the march in front of the monument sculpted by James Barnhill. They marched two by two in silence. "The silence of the march overpowered all the noise that was going on in the city," said freshman Charles Murrell. This march continued to the site of the actual sit-in 47 years ago. The Woolworth's, where the protest took place, is now a Civil Rights Museum. This tribute was brought forth by current student, A. Tibias Thorne, SGA Parliamentarian. This tribute looks to grow even larger in the years that come.

February One Monument
James Barhill, MFA

A Master sculptor and Associate Professor of Art at North Carolina A&T State University, James Barhill was born in Asheville, NC. After receiving his bachelor's degree in Art Education from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, professor Barhill studied for a year in Marburg, Germany.

He returned to North Carolina where he received his MFA at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. While earning his MFA degree, Barhill studied the human figure under the late Peter Agostini. The training Barhill received is very evident in his work.

Ronald Erwin McNair, Ph.D., was an American Astronaut. McNair perished during the launch of the Space Shuttle Challenger mission STS-51-L. He was a native of Lake City, South Carolina.

Dr. McNair received a B.S. in Physics from North Carolina A&T State University in 1971, and a Ph.D. in the same discipline from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in 1977. He was also honored with honorary doctorates in 1978, 1980, and 1984.

He was a 5th-degree black belt karate instructor and had won five regional championships. Among many other studies in the field of physics, Dr. McNair had conducted research in the scientific foundations of the martial arts. Additionally, he was a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc.

After graduation from MIT, he became a staff physicist at the Hughes Research Laboratories in Malibu, California. Dr. McNair was selected for the astronaut program in 1978, and flew on a Challenger mission in February 1984 as a mission specialist.

Dr. McNair was also a saxophonist; before the mission he worked with composer Jean Michel Jarre on a piece of music, Rendez-vous VI. It was intended that he would record his saxophone solo on board Challenger, making it the first piece of music played in space. After the disaster, the piece was renamed Ron's Piece.

Ronald McNair has been an inspiration to his University and family, including his niece, Desiree McNair, who is a Phi Kappa Phi Biology major at his alma mater.

No college diet is complete without time spent in a gym. Most colleges have a workout facility accessible to students. Some campuses have exercise rooms in dormitories in addition to larger gyms on campus. There is typically no additional cost for using these facilities or if there is it is a nominal reduced fee for students. Many college gymnasiums have exercise classes and opportunities for you to workout with trainers. Go to the gym with a friend.

There are places students can go to stay fit at A&T. Students can go to the fitness center in Moore Gym or the Aggie Suites. They can also take out a college membership at the YMCA. Students can also go running in Aggie Stadium or around campus.

Studies show that most students can work up to 20 hours per week without negatively affecting their grades. The benefits of part-time employment include gaining on-the-job training, becoming more connected to your campus life and building relationships with faculty and administration members that can be used later when you're in need of letters of recommendation.

Working over 20 hours a week leaves less time for you to concentrate on your studies and participate in extracurricular activities. However, full-time employment may impair student performance. For example, 55 percent of those students working 35 or more hours per week report that work has a negative effect on their studies. Students working full-time also reported the following liabilities: 40 percent report that work limits their class schedule; 36 percent report it reduces their class choices; 30 percent report it limits the number of classes they take; and 26 percent report it limits access to the library. Students who work full-time are also more likely to drop out of school. For example, the available evidence is consistent with a roughly 10 percentage point differential in graduation rates between full-time and part-time workers. In 2000, nearly 830,000 full-time college students worked full-time. Because of the adverse effects of such full-time work, tens of thousands of these college students are likely to drop out of school and fail to receive a college degree.

He also received the 2006 State Employees Award for Excellence, where he was honored in the category of safety and heroism for his courage in dealing with emergencies.

"Davis is very diligent in his work and takes great pain to ensure that his work is of the highest quality," said Dr. Sanjiv Saini, associate dean of the College of Engineering. However, what sets him apart is his vigilant observation of the daily activities in the building, keeping a watchful eye on the people in the building. He has demonstrated his willingness to go beyond the call of duty to take ownership of the safety and security of the people and property in the building. Most other cultures, if it's not my job, it's like, "Let me look the other way." He's not like that. He wants to make a difference. It's that serious courage in which you can look someone in the eyes or see someone slouched, and you go over and say, "Is there any way I can help you?"

That happened one late Friday afternoon in April. Davis was taking out the trash when he saw a student trying to climb out of a second-floor window at Cherry Hall, the building beside McNair. Davis took off. When he got to the classroom, he found the student shaking uncontrollably. Davis pulled him from the window and asked, "Are you all right? You're having a seizure." Davis calmed him down by draping a washcloth on the student's forehead and asking another student to sit with him. Then, Davis ran out and called an ambulance. The student, who was taken to the hospital, turned out to be fine. He hadn't taken his medication. But after that episode, everytime he saw Davis on campus, he'd hug him, shake his hand and say, "You know, you saved my life."

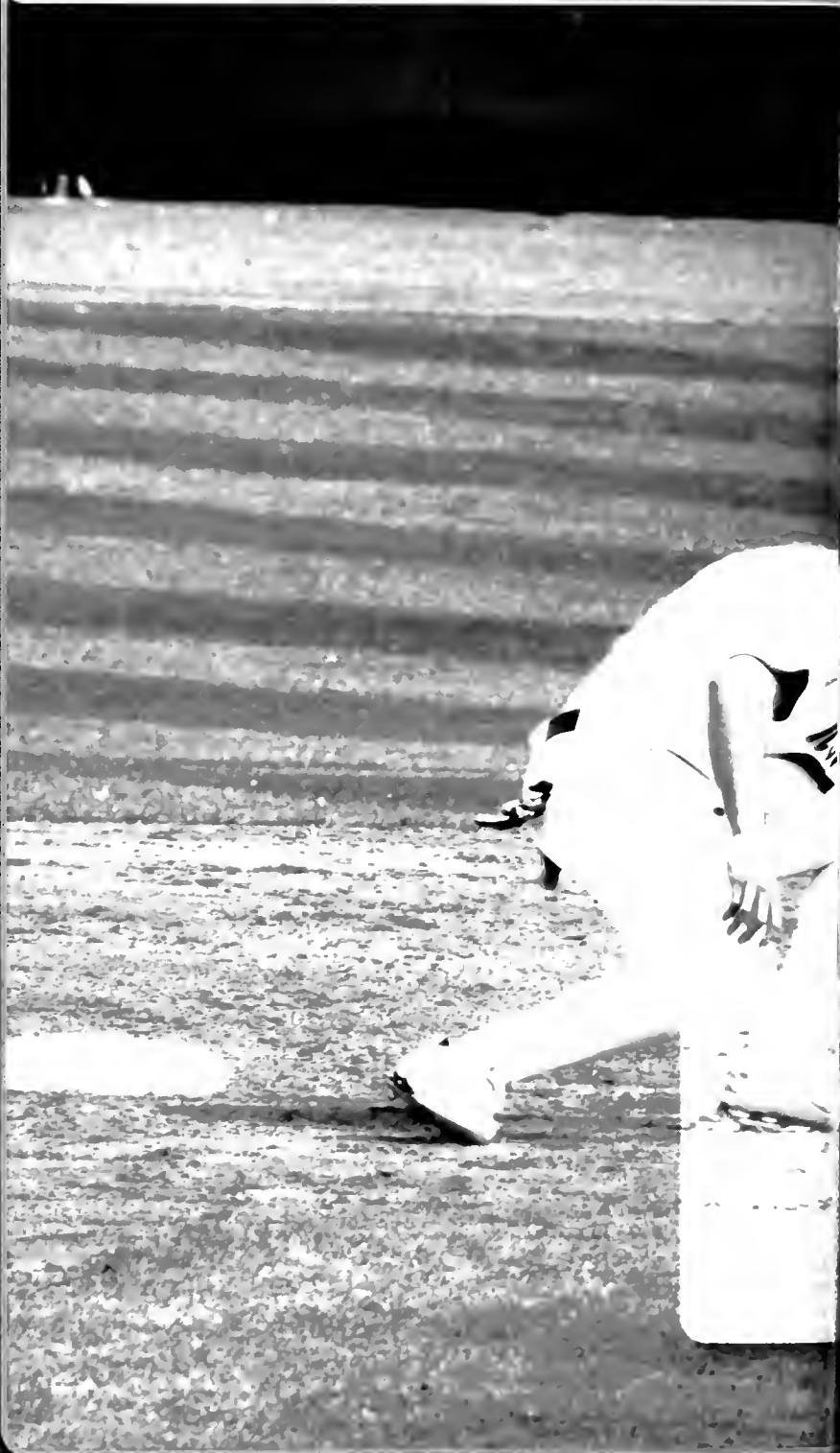
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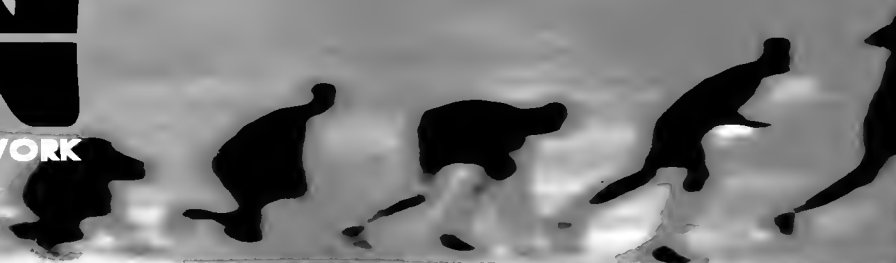

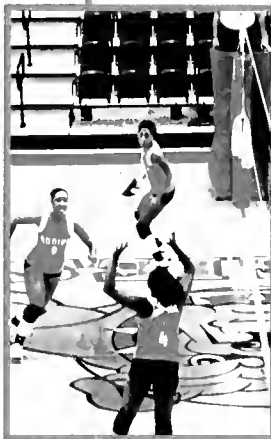

The North Carolina A&T Lady Aggie Volleyball season came to an end Friday, November 17, 2006 in Hampton, Va. as the Lady Aggies were defeated by Morgan State, 0-3.

The ladies, however, had an outstanding season. It began with a home game on August 27, 2006, as they defeated WSSU, 3-1. Unfortunately, the following home game for the Lady Aggies was unsuccessful as they played High Point, with an ending score of 0-3. The following game against Norfolk State in Norfolk, Va. the Lady Aggies were again come up short with an overall score of 0-3. Amazingly, they defeated their opponents four games in a row with scores of 3-1 against Kennesaw State, 3-1 against Loyola College, 3-0 against the NAVY, and 3-2 against North Carolina Central University, A&T rival school, which was a home game played on Tuesday, September 12, 2006. Of the successful games were played in October as the Lady Aggies three consecutive wins including two home games against Elon and Hampton. The scores from these games were 3-1, consecutively. The opponents for October and November were all defeated by the Lady Aggies. Only one game was a home game.

The Volleyball team is coached by Millicent Sylvan (Alam. State, '91), an assistant coach, Lyndsey Schmiedel (Kron, '01), a graduate assistant, Shea Shark, and manager, Kathleen Lynch. The composition of the team included three freshmen, three sophomores, five juniors, and three seniors. Seniors include the Arlene and Darlene Mitchell, who helped the team win 77.5 percent of its conference matches, while winning 66.7 overall matches in four years and Lauren Walker, who won team MVP 2005-2006, and was the team's top defensive player since her arrival as a sophomore.

The Lady Aggies had an overall season of fourteen losses and seventeen wins from all matches, seven wins and three losses from the conference, and ten wins and eleven losses from the non-conference.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C., October 24, 2006 -- The North Carolina A&T volleyball team showed the rest a nine-day layoff produces, but the Aggies were still able to defeat Winston-Salem State University Lady Rams 3-1 (30-22, 28-30, 30-13, 30-16) on Tuesday evening at the CE Gaines Center in Winston-Salem, N.C. in non-conference volleyball action.

GREENSBORO, November 13, 2006 -- Arlene Mitchell became the first Aggies volleyball player to record 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs in a career on Friday night in a 3-0 (30-23, 30-24, 31-29) loss to Grandea Webb on the road.

GREENSBORO, November 17, 2006 -- An era in Aggies volleyball that will be marked by two seniors who helped the team win 77.5 percent of its conference matches and overall matches in four years came to an end on Friday night.

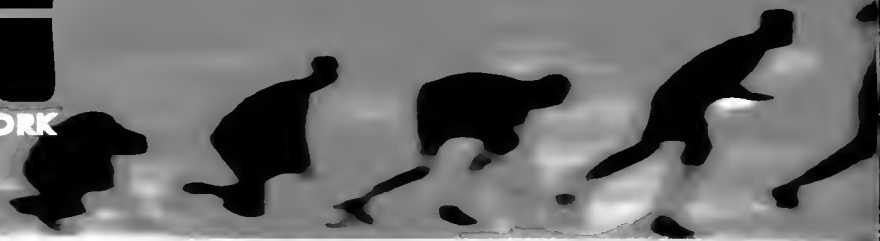

The North Carolina A&T State University Women's Tennis Team season came to an end on March 27, 2007 as they lost to Campbell 7-0 at Buies Creek. The Aggies finished their regular season 3-16 overall and qualified for the MEAC Tennis Tournament in Raleigh from April 21-22. The team has seven players, and is coached by head coach, Andy Smith UNC-Greensboro '85L and Volunteer Assistant Coach, Damon Martin NC A&T 'XXI. This season was Andy Smith's first time coaching at A&T. The team ranges from upperclassmen to lowerclassmen, having one freshman, four sophomores, and two juniors.

The season began on January 13, 2007 with an away game in Elin, NC. The ladies played Elin University, and lost 0-7. Two games after that, on February 4, 2007, the women had an outstanding comeback, and won against WSSU 7-0. Unfortunately, the following three games played by the Lady Aggies were unsuccessful. But, on Friday, February 24, 2007 in Altamonte, Florida, the women played UMES and won 7-0. The regular season of the Aggies ended with their single star player, Christina Ruffin, who was voted in the team's most improved player in 2005, and the ever improving freshman Jiyima Jones, assisting their team to its victories and qualification for the MEAC Tennis Tournament.

The overall record for the team this season includes overall record: 3-16, Conference: 2-7, Region: (0), Home: 1-2, Away: (0-8), Neutral: 2-1, vs. National ranked: (0-0), and vs. Regional ranked: (0-1).

February 2007 - NC A&T Men's Tennis coach James Dunwoody was given rave reviews on three brothers that have given the program some stability over the last two seasons. All day one of the annual MEAC Round-Up, Damon Jeremy and Jared Martin led NCA&TSU to a sweep of Delaware State (6-0) and Coppin State (6-2).

She is also an outstanding student who is on the Dean's List and a two-time MEAC All-Academic Team Selection. She is also a member of the University's Student Athlete Advisory Committee.

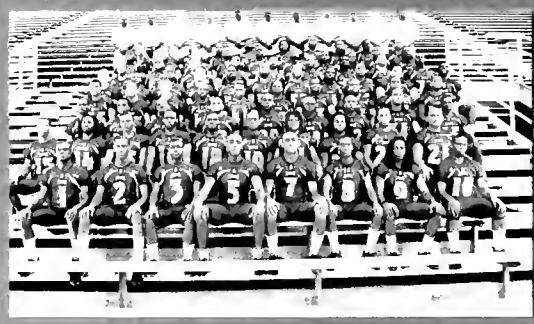

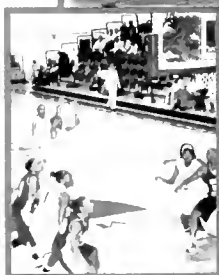

When the season began for Coach Hibbs and her Lady Aggies, many critics believed that they did not anticipate the success they would earn. With a team of all but one underclassman, Junior, Jasmine Gordon, growing pains for the team were rampant because Coach Hibbs only returned two players from last year's team. But where they lacked in experience, they had in talent.

The Lady Aggies set the tone for the season by winning their home opener over Statton, 61-42. The Lady Aggies learned early that Sophomore transfer student Amber Bland and Freshman To'Wuona Cook were key assets to their team's success for the season. Bland and Cook averaged almost 34 points a game. These two players, along with Freshman Taylor-James, led the Lady Aggies to an 11-2 Home record and second seed in the MEAC Tournament. Every home game the ladies played became a hostile environment for visiting teams.

As their inexperience in post-season play came to a head in their first round loss to Florida A&M, 21-21, giving them a 17-13 record for the season, Amber Bland and To'Wuona Cook received post-season honors including To'Wuona named as MEAC Rookie of the Year, the first ever title for any Lady Aggie. Amber Bland received All-MEAC First-Team honors as well.

Many people will be expecting the Lady Aggies to build upon their success of the past season and compete for a MEAC regular season title as well as a berth in the NCAA Tournament. The Lady Aggies are indeed laying the Foundation for success in NCAA Basketball.

- So what's the big deal about playing Division I women's college basketball? North Carolina A&T's three freshman starters - Lamona Smalley, Lonise Coulter, and To'Wuona "Tweet" Cook - combined for 43 points, 25 rebounds and eight assists to lead the Aggies to a 61-49 win over Statton of Carball Sports Center Friday night.

- All the numbers sound impressive. With North Carolina A&T's 91-69 win over Hampton Monday, the Aggies are 12-6 overall and 7-2 in the MEAC. To'Wuona "Tweet" Cook led the way with 23 points, eight rebounds and four assists, while Amber Bland finished with 21 points, seven rebounds and seven assists.

SPOTLIGHT ON YOU

To'Wuona "Tweet" Cook was named the MEAC Women's Basketball Rookie of the Year, becoming the first Aggie rookie in the history of the program to win the honor. Cook (15-8, Fayetteville, NC) recorded five or more assists 13 times this season. She scored 20 or more points five times and reached double figures percent 23 times.

Cook was also named to the MEAC all-conference second team. Cook helped the Aggies to their best season in 11 years. She also helped them to a second-place tie in the MEAC, the school's highest finish in 12 years.

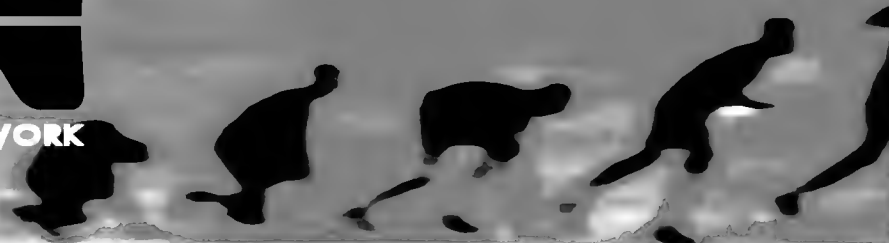

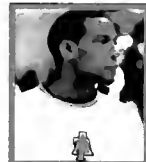

Steven Rush made history this season when he became the first North Carolina A&T Men's Basketball player in seven years to win MEAC Player of the Week honors. Rush became the first Aggie to earn All-MEAC first-team honors since the 2000-2001 season. Rush, who graduated from Greensboro Day School, came in with the reputation of being an outstanding shooter.

He lived up to those expectations. Rush led the MEAC in 3-pointers made per game for the entire season and ranked among the nation's best in the same category for most of the season.



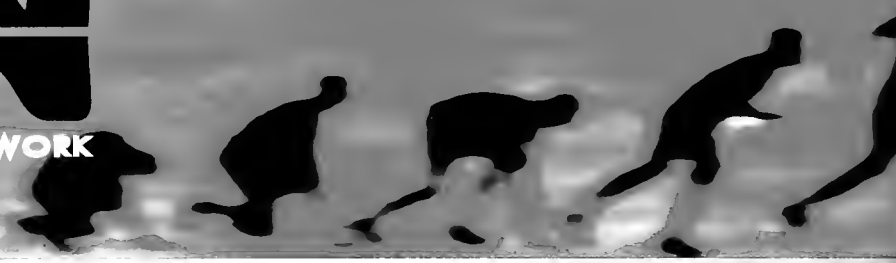

Overall, the swim team looks to improve in the pool, the classroom and in life. No matter how the team may perform in the future, they will always swim with pride.

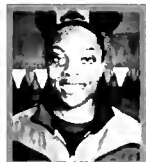

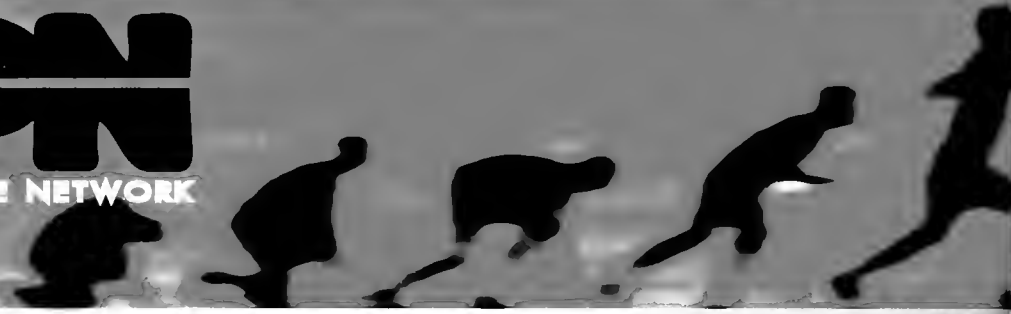

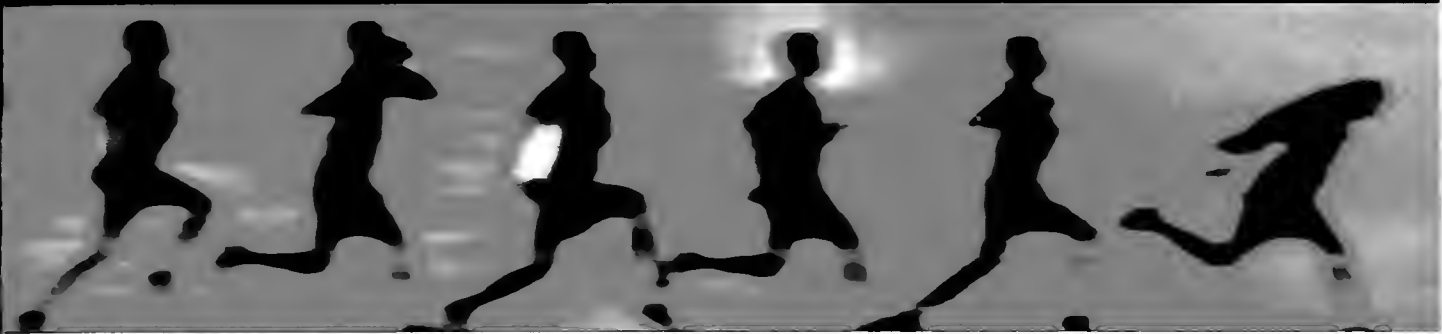

NCA&T competed strongly in the meac finishing with the third highest batting average of .323 and the sixth highest ERA of 5.17

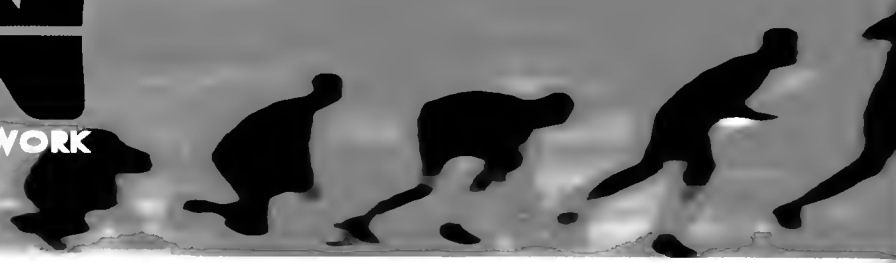

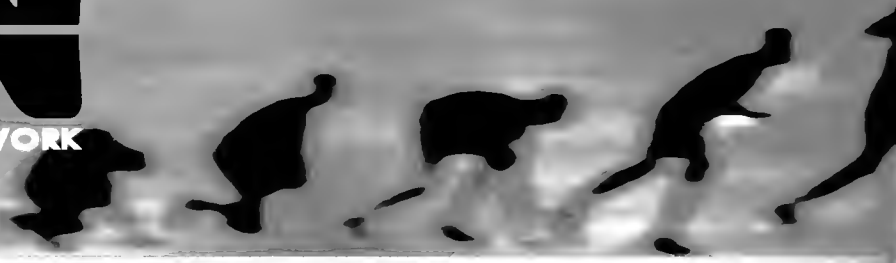

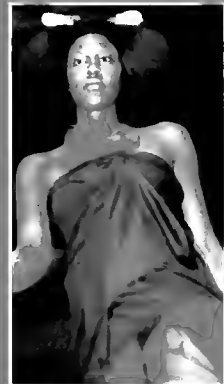

The event began with the invocation by Reverend Candis Brown of New Light Baptist Church Pastor. Christopher Tate delivered a song of joy and a message.

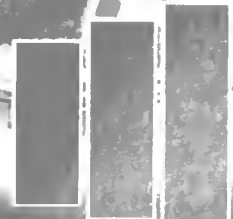

Frankie Day

What is a typical day like for you?

A typical day for me starts very earlier. I have my morning devotion and prayer, call my mother. We share what's going on in our lives and back home in South Carolina exchange our "I Love You's", shower and dress, eat a breakfast that consist of a veggie sausage on a half of wheat bread or maybe a whole-wheat pancake, a cup of juice or soy milk. Try to catch up on class administrative or personal work that didn't finish the day before, occasionally pack my lunch along with a few snacks because I know my day will be long, leave for work and arrive on campus to a nonstop day. When my baby was still alive "GeDee" my toy poodle she died last August I would feed her and administer her medicines (she was 4 years old) spend a little quality time with her and get her comfortable before I left home to go to work. I usually have several students already waiting to see me, most of them have not scheduled an appointment but I address their issues, which usually takes time away from something else I had in mind to do that day. I teach my classes and usually some of the students follow me from class with questions others just want to sit in my office and discuss their future in the arts. We tried over the last 2 to 3 years to get them to understand that my role has changed to have a more administrative responsibilities but they still want their time with me. Somewhere in all of this I try to find a brief to eat, rarely leave campus for lunch. But I'm working on changing that. I address the day-to-day program concerns attend a meeting here and there, right reports etc. all the things that go with running an academic program and assist a student to get me a salad from the cafeteria before going to rehearsal. I'm directing at that time. When GeDee was alive I would go home before rehearsal to create another rehearsal usually ends at 6:00pm and later if technical rehearsals are going on I'll finish rehearsal. I'm usually working in my office completing unfinished tasks from that day. At other times my evenings are spent coaching students that are preparing for theatre scholarship competitions and graduate school admission. By the time I get home I'm exhausted I have the car for my day, the good and the bad and I welcome a good night's sleep. So a typical workday for me is 12 to 14 hours.

What was your most memorable Aggie moment?

I have several memorable Aggie moments but the most recent one was when our student Natasha Williams came back to A&T to perform for the Visual and Performing Arts Department, Dance and Theatre Gala. She is currently starring on Broadway in the "Color Purple" at the Lyric Opera. She was so generous and giving of her time and talents to our theatre students and I just want to thank the University, the Department and Theatre Arts program for the opportunity to have her back. It was proud that I had participated in fostering her development. It was also a great opportunity. Natasha's success is a testament to the training and hard work of all our students and faculty in the Theatre Arts Program.

What is Aggie Pride for you?

Aggie Pride for me is an attitude of appreciation and gratitude for our students, faculty and staff heritage of producing excellence in their faculty and students. It is a pride in utilizing the knowledge, education, talents and gifts that one possesses. It is a pride in the hard work and diligent of integrity. It is being the best that you can be in all areas of your life.

How have you impacted the student body?

It is a great joy that my efforts as Theatre Arts Program Director and Executive Director of the Paul F. Robeson Theatre along with the support of talented theatre students, faculty and staff has been the ability to produce on campus "Theatre at A&T" has provided enrichment, education and entertainment for a new generation of theatre goers who will continue to support and experience "live" theatre long after they leave HBCU and

How did your time in college prepare you for your career and/or future endeavors?

I had a wonderful college and graduate school experience. I had great teachers that mentored and encouraged me in my love for the theatre. I had supportive and loving friends that shared my enthusiasm for the arts. I soaked up all the knowledge that I could in the classroom, in rehearsals and performance. I embraced the opportunity to learn not only from my teachers but other talented students in the program. I learned the art of sacrifice, hard work and focus. I spent long hours toward developing my craft. It was very mindful of the relationships that I established. I wouldn't allow anyone or anything to keep me from reaching the goals I set for myself. I stayed clear of negative situations and people. I affiliated myself with positive individuals that demonstrated the kind of qualities that would add to my development as a productive citizen and artist. My mother instilled in me to do my friends carefully. She is a disciplinarian that taught me to love and respect myself and my God-given gifts.

How do you feel about the role of Historically Black Colleges and Universities?

The role of HBCU is vital in the nurturing and development of our African American students. I attended an HBCU (South Carolina State) and wouldn't take anything for that experience. The training, support and genuine concern provided to me by the teachers at SCSC served to impact my life in profound ways. So many HBCU have rich legacies to draw on for African American students. The history, knowledge and pride gained in knowing whom I was attending an HBCU served me well when I entered graduate school in Illinois in 1978. Especially having been trained in theatre at an HBCU, I was more knowledgeable about Black playwrights and plays. African American History than the majority of my professors. I not only knew the works of Chekov and Ibsen but also the works of Ed Bullins and Alice Childress. Aggie theatre students graduating from our program will know the theatre contributions from both perspectives, Afrocentric and Eurocentric.

What strengths and skills have you developed since you have been an A&T employee?

I came to A&T in 1987 as a teacher of theatre and since that time I've grown into an administrator. A&T has provided the opportunity for me to develop and strengthen my leadership skills as an administrator.

What are your memories of the civil rights movement?

I was born in 1956 and the civil rights movement started in the 1960's and flourished in the mid sixties. I was too young. But I do remember as a little girl the riots that took place in DC after Rev. Dr. King was assassinated. We were riding in the car and I recall seeing stores burning and people running out of stores with TVs and all sorts of items.

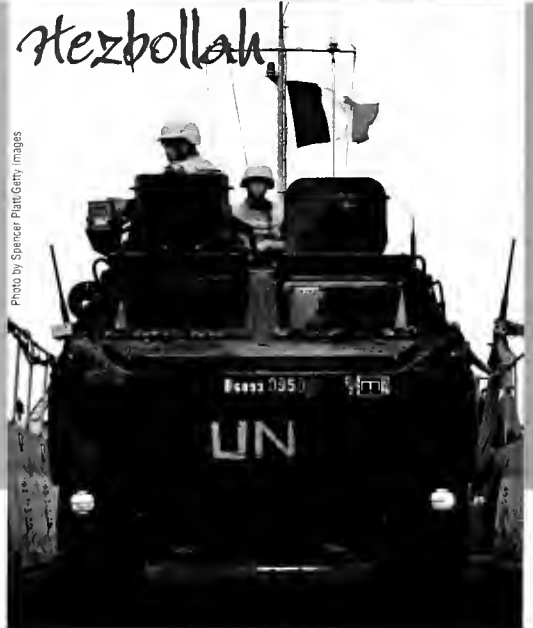

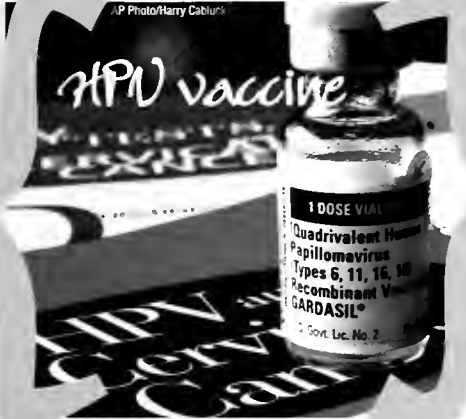

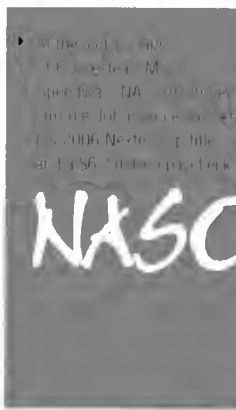

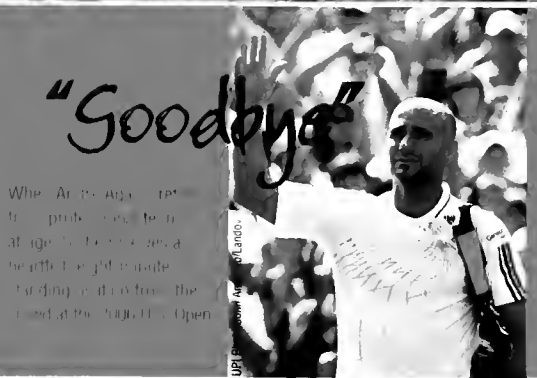

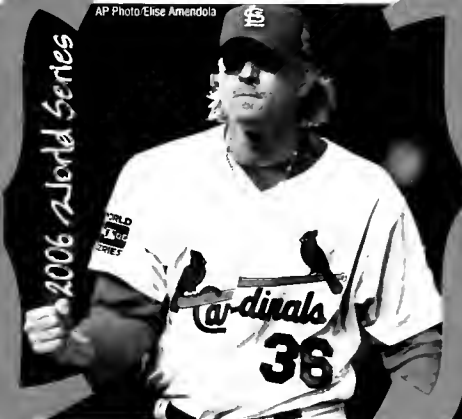
