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## PREFACE.

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THE conclusion of a second volume affords me an opportunity of recording my thanks to those who have kindly furnished me with articles relating to this County, without which I am afraid this publication would have lacked that interest which a variety of matter alone can afford.

It is manifest that the success of a work of this kind can only be achieved by consulting the tastes of those who support it, and it has always been my aim to try and impart such a variety of subject-matter as to render these pages interesting to all.

It would, however, add greatly to the value of this work if gentlemen resident in the County would occasionally be at the trouble of contributing short articles on various subjects; especially would I urge the desirability of placing on permanent record the discoveries which are constantly being made of antiquities.

Seeing also that the history of this County has yet to be written, there should be a wide field for research which only requires diligent working in order to yield a rich harvest of valuable material.

In restoring churches, traces of Saxon or Norman work are often brought to light where their existence was not suspected. Again, it frequently happens that monumental inscriptions which have been long concealed by an organ, or perchance by a pew, are, in the course of alterations, brought to light; their



fate is usually to be relegated to that obscurity from which they have for the nonce emerged; a little trouble spent in taking accurate copies of them and transmitting them to a publication of this kind would be time well spent, and would earn the gratitude of many, who, like myself, have been baffled in a genealogical research by finding an inscription half hidden by a pew, or a brass carefully concealed by an organ.

Local customs, phrases, field-names, curious superstitions, etc., are all worthy of investigation and recording, as forming so many links in the chain of historical evidence which connects us with the remote past.

I feel that some apology is due to my subscribers for the irregular manner in which the numbers forming this volume have appeared: this was due to causes which were beyond my control. I trust, however, that the new arrangements I have made for printing and publishing will insure the punctual issue of one number every quarter, and further, that my old subscribers will encourage the continuance of this work by their support.

## BEDFORDSHIRE NOTES AND QUERIES.



### SNAGGE FAMILY.

This family was seated at Marston-Moretaine early in the 17th century and acquired considerable estates there by the marriage of Thomas Snagge, son of Thomas Snagge of Lechworth, with Elizabeth daughter and coheirress with her two sisters of Thomas Dicons or Dickons of Marston-Moretaine. This Thomas Snagge attained to considerable eminence in the legal profession. In 1524 he was appointed autumn Reader of Gray's Inn and six years later double Reader of the same Society. In 1531 he took the coif and was called Serjeant of Law, and appointed Queen's Serjeant 29 April, 1590. O'Byrne in his *Representative History*, p. 61, says of him — "His name frequently occurs as a debater in the House, (he represented the county of Bedford in the Parliaments of 1571-86, and also sat for the Borough in the Parliament of 1588) the principal subjects on which he appears to have spoken were,—1, on the Bill for coming to Church, 10th April 1571, to which he was opposed ; 2, on the Treason Bill, 12th April, 1571, on which he agreed, ' that

in making of laws, plainness of speech should be used, all intrapments to be shunned and avoided'; 3, on the introduction of the Bill for the suppression of simony, 18th April, 1571, when he declared his opinion, 'the patron had nothing of worth or value, but a bare nomination.'

In the Parliament of 1588, assembled at Westminster, he was elected **SPEAKER**, and presented to the House as such, on the 6th of February."

His son Thomas who was knighted at St. John Fortescue's in 1603 also sat for the Borough of Bedford in the Parliament of 1586, and was sheriff of Beds in 1607. He died, and was buried at Marston the 2nd of February 1626. Thomas Snagge grand-son of the last named was also sheriff for this county in 1665, and his son Edward also served the same office in 1678. Edward Snagge, son of the last named was sheriff in 1705, and at his death in 1739 the family became extinct in the male line. There is a pedigree of this family in *The Visitations of Bedfordshire* ed. Harl. Soc., 1884, p. 140, entered in the year 1634 signed by Ralph Snagge representing the Kempston Branch, and by Thomas Snagge of Marston-Moretaine. The family came into this county from Letchworth in co. Herts., and according to Clutterbuck, *History of Hertfordshire*, vol. II., p. 386, a William Snagg, descendant of the Serjeant, sold Letchworth about 1616. He also mentions a George Snagg, A.B. of Sydney Coll. Camb. 1667, A.M., 1671; and Edward Snagg A.B. of the same college, 1695. The three wills which follow have been kindly placed at my disposal by His Honour Judge Snagge, a descendant of the family. The Serjeant appears to have been troubled with a graceless son who would seem to have indulged in

the raising of money on his reversion expectant on the death of his father, and for this and other sins he was practically disinherited, but provision was left for his repentance, though whether he ever amended his ways is not known to the writer hereof. His wife was Agnes (in the pedigree called Anne) daughter of George Rotherham of Luton. Is it possible that the marriage entry in the Milton-Bryant Registers which will be found at the end of this article, had anything to do with the unfortunate rupture between father and son? The name of Snagge is not common to this county and I cannot but think that there is some connection between the two. I should add that in 1642 Thomas Snagge died seized of the castle of Bedford and one third of the Barony of Bedford which was divided between the three daughters of William de Beauchamp who died in the reign of Edward I. With this Barony had anciently been associated the office of King's Almoner, and at the coronation of King James II. there were three claimants to the office viz., the Earl of Exeter, Sir George Blundell of Cardington, Knight, and the before-named Thomas Snagge. The office was adjudged to the Earl of Exeter. Following the wills will be found a few notes relative to the family which I have collected from various sources.

Extracted from the Principal Registry of the Probate Division of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice.

In the Prerogative Court of Canterbury.

In the Name of God: Amen.—The xxvijth of April in the yere of our Lorde God 1571 in the xiiijth yere of our Sovereigne Ladie, Quene Elizabeth, by the Grace of God of Englande, France, and Irelande, Quene

Defendor of the Faythe &c—I, Thomas Snagge th' Elder of Licheworthe in the Countie of Hertford and Dioc: of Lincolne, Gent'n being of good mynde and perfect memoire, Doe make and ordayne this my last will and Testament in manner and forme following — First, my Soule I leave presently in the hands of God my Creator and Redeemer, and my bodie in the yerthe to be buried at the direction of my Executors, perfectly hopeing onely in the Merritt of my Saviour Christis passion to have joyfull resurrection and the benefitt of his favorable and mercifull judgement and thereby of his great mercy both together agayne to receive only of his grace the fruition of His Kingdom in Christe J'hu, which ys all that I expecte, and hope for to contynue for ever and thus gladly am content to depart this mortall lyef in hope of lyef to come, forgiving all that hath offended me, and praying all to pardon me that I have offended. And for my worldly things that God hathe lent me whiche I leave to the worlde I dispose in manner and forme following.—

Item: as well in p'formance of agreement which I made with Ellen my wief before mariage, as also for her good lovinge and honeste dealing with me and myne sence mariage where I promised her to have after my deathe her good that she broughte and fortie poundes in money which I hadd of her and five pound's yerely oute of my lande.—Item: I give and bequeathe to the sayde Ellen my wief all my goods and Cattall whatsoev'r which she had at her mariage with me and that came to my handes at any tymes, and fortie poundes in money to be paid and Delivered to her within convenient tyme after my deathe.—And farther I bequeathe to my said wiefe one annuytie or yerelie rente of tenne pounds of

lawfull Englishe money during her lyef oute of my lands and tenn'ents in Lycheworthe in the Countie of Hertford to be paid at ij Feasts in the yere :—That ys at the Feaste of St. Michaell th' Archangell and th' annunciation of the Virgin Mary, by equal portions: And yf yt fortune the same annuytie or yerely rentt to be behynde and not payed in parte or in all at any of saide Feasts, wherein or whereat it ought to be payed, and then yt shall be lawful to the saide Ellen my wief, her Executors or Assignes to enter and distrayne and the distresse there so taken to leade drive and carry away and the same to withhold until the rente with th' arrerage thereof if any be well and truly p'formed and payde—Provided always that yf the saide Ellen my wief do challenge demande or clayme any right tightle or intereste of dowrye in any my landes and ten'ts or heriditaments whereof I was at any tyme seased during the coven'nte betwene her and me or will not release her said right tightle or interest of dowre to every soche person or persons and at every soche tyme and tymes as my sonne Roberte Snagg shall require her, that this p'nte legacie bequest and this my will to her and every parte & parcell thereof to be voyde and from thenceforth my wyll ys that she her Executors nor assignes shall not have nor inioye any thing by this my will and Testament, any thing in this my presente last Will and Testament notwithstanding. Farther—Whereas a certayne agremente betwene my Daughter Margaret Snagge Widowe, the late wief of Will'm Snagge my Sonne deceased for the relief and bringing opp of Thomas Snagge and Will'm Snagge the Sonnes of my said Sone Will'm by her which in my lyef tyme colde not be performed in writing although



agreed oppon nowe I doe referre the charge to see the same performed by my Sonne Robert in manner and forme following: viz.: Soe that my Daughter-in-law will give and assure towards the bringing up of the saide Thomas Snagge her Son and his brother Will'm the Sum of Twentie marks yerely oute of her landes and Tenements, which she had in ioynecture of my gifte during their infancie untill the said Thomas accomplishe the age of xiiij. yeres and also to assuer the same somme to the saide Thomas in soche sorte as my Sonne Robarte shall desire to be to hym after his saide age during her lief. Then I will appointe charge and commande my saide Sonne Robert uppon my blessing to see the bringing upp of them both in learning therew'th and then after the saide age of xiiij. yeres of the saide Thomas that he my saide Sonne Robert shall make to the saide Will'm her Sonne the yongest Sonne of my sayde Sonne Will'm one annuytie of xx<sup>s</sup> pound a yere oute of my Mannor of Hollubury in the Countie of Bedforde, To have and to holde to the said Will'm Snagge, the Sonne of the said Margaret and Will'm my Sonne, and to his heires for ever.—Item: I will and bequeathe to Edwarde my Sonne one annuytie or yerelie rent of xx<sup>s</sup> marks out of my Landes and Tenements in Licheworthe now in the tenure or occupation of John Petchat, To have and To holde to hym and his heires of his bodye Lawfullye begotten to be payde yerely at the Feaste of St. Michaell, th' archangell and th' annunciacon of the Blessed Virgin by even porc'ons, And for defalte of soche yssue the same to remayne to Roberte Snagge my Sonne and his heires for ever.—Item, I will that my Ex-ecutor shall see paid and performed the Some of lviiij<sup>s</sup>

to the use of Margery my daughter nowe wief to John Shepparde and that the saide John Sheparde shall not have the same excepte he putt in soche sufficient Sureties to my Executors as my saide Executors shall see good to make my saide daughter a compitent ioynecture and in soche sorte as my Executor will agre to, or to leave worthe twoe hundredth poundes the order and del'ing therein I refer to my said Sonne Robert with this that the money aforesaide be ymployed to her best commoditye.—Item: I give and bequeathe to the children of Alice my Daughter the wief of Edward Waryne twentie poundes to be equally divided betweene them at her day of Marriage or their sev'all ages of twentie years.—Item: That my Executors paye to Elizabeth the daughter of John Boleneste the Some of vij<sup>li</sup>. viij<sup>s</sup>. iiij<sup>d</sup>. which I owe her of her father's legacie.—Item: I give and bequeathe to Robert Snagge my Sonne all my messuages Lands Tenements and Hereditaments whatsoever in Lichworthe in the Countie of Hertforde or elsewhere in the Countie of Hertforde, and all my Messuages Lands Tenements and Hereditaments called Holnebury and all my Messuages Tenements Lands and Hereditaments in the Countie of Bedforde whatsoever in the saide Sheares and every of them with all and singulaire their appurtenances whatsoever To Have and To Hold to the said Robert Snagge my sonne and the heires males of his bodie lawfullie begotten. And for defaulte of soche yssue all and singular the premises to remayne to Thomas Snagge my Sonne and Heires Males of his bodie lawfully begotten, and for defalte of soche yssue to the heirs males of Will'm Snagge my Sonne lately deceased lawfully begotten. And for defalte of soche yssue to remayne to

Edwarde Snagge my Sonne and to the Heires males of his bodie lawfully begotten. And for defaulte of soche yssue to remayne to my right heires for ever.—Item: All my goods and Cattals whatsoever my debts payed my funerall discharged and my will performed I give and bequeathe to Robert Snagge my Sonne, whome I make my Executor of this my last will and Testamente.—In Witness whereof I have signed this my laste will in writing with my owne hande and putt my seale in the presence of Thomas Snagge—John Glanfelde—Henry Ancell—John Shepard—and Fernin Adams writer hereof.—Thomas Snagge—John Glanfelde—al's Nowell—Henry Anncell—Fernin Adams.—Proved at London the 25th of June 1571 and administration granted to Robert Snagge, Executor.

In the name of God Amen. The Seventh daye of Aprill in the yere of our Lord Christ A thousand five hundreth ninety one, and in the three and thirtieth year of the Reigne of my most gracious Sovereigne Ladye and Mrs. Elizabeth the Quene's Matie: I Thomas Snagge one of Her Matie's Serjeants at Lawe, being of wholle mind and perfecte memorye yealdinge therefore most humble thanks to Almighty God Doe make and ordayne this my last will and testament in forme following:—First—I bequeath to Elizabeth my loving wife my house called the Lodge in Marston Park together with the neather Lodge in the said Park called Hayward's Lodge and together with the Little Parke otherwise called the Broche together with all the thicke within the pale of the said Little Parke as it is now called, and together with the said other Parke wherein the said twoe Lodges doe stand, the woods and deere in them both

and the soyle and grounde in them and of them bothe. To have and to holde to my said wyfe from the daye of my death unto the full end and terme of three score years then next ensuing yf she liveth so longe. I bequeathe also to my said wyfe during the saide terme yf she liveth so long my conduitt and hoppe yarde in Cranfield in the County of Bedd and my Lane called Venyson Lane in Cranfield aforesaide. To have and to holde to her for the said terme to the intent aforesaide. Also, I give to my said wyfe one yearely annuity of twoe hundred markes by the years to be taken and levyed by her oute of all my Lands tenements Leases and hereditaments whatsoever payable to her during the said terme of threescore yeares yf she liveth so longe. And my will and minde also is that yf she cannot have the same with quietness that she shall or may distreyne for the same in all my saide Lands whatsoever other than the said Parkes at all time and times during the saide terme. Item: I also give and bequeathe to Elizabeth the my said wyfe the vse of all my plate and hangings for terme of her lyfe.—Item: I will for that Thomas my eldest Sonne hath ledd a very badd and loose lyfe and in the time of his saide looseness hath entered into great bonds to divers cosening and wicked persons for little or nothing received to pass away to them after my decease the wholle or greater parte of that which should descend or come unto him from me, that he the said Thomas shall yearely have paid unto him after my deathe two hundred pounds by yeare by my said wyfe so long as he shall live in good and vertuous lyfe and so longe as he be quieted against the saide wicked persons and every of them yf either of which happen to be broken then the same payment of the said twoe hundred pounds from that time

forthe utterly to cease. And further my minde is that if God give him the Grace to alter his said loose lyfe vppon good triall thereof had as hereafter is appointed to be adjudged and allowed and that he be cleared of the saide bonds without selling mortgaging or charging any parte of my possessions therewith that then my said wyfe shall or may make his and his Children's porc'ons what shall lyke her and in what sorte shall lyke her having regard to the proviseon for her other children and the payment of my debts and that my saide Sonne Thomas may from time to time during his lyfe distreyne for the same in all my saide Landes and Leases excepte the said Parkes during the lyfe of my said wife under the condition aforesaide. And I will to my said Sonne Thomas my Maner House at Marsonne or my Mannor House at Kempstone as shall best lyke his wyfe to dwell in and what house of them both she refuseth the same refused house I will shall goe out of all my saide Landes and Leases the Parkes excepted during the lyfe of my said wyfe, and that he shall or may distreyne for the same at all times during his lyfe in all my saide Landes and Leases the said Parkes excepted during his saide Mother's lyfe. Item : I will that if my Sonne Thomas doe die leaving Agnes his now wyfe that then the said Agnes shall have during her Life my Mannor House of Kempstone with all the edifices belonging to the same and with the same and with the Orcharde and garden thereof and one hundred pounds by yeare oute of all my Lands and Leases. And that she shall and may distrayne for the same in all the said Lands and Leases during the said terme. Item : I give to Lewys my Sonne Twenty Pounds by yeare of annuity for terme of his

lyfe to be yssuing oute of all my Landes and Leases, the said Parkes excepted during the lyfe of my said wyfe, and that he shall or may distreyne for the same at all times during his lyfe in all my said Lands and Leases the said Parkes excepted during his saide Mother's lyfe. — Item: I ordayne and make Elizabeth my wyfe my said Sonnes Thomas & Robert my Executors of this my will Provided allwayes and my will and minde is that if my wyfe marryeth not again that neither the said Thomas nor Robert nor any of them shall in any sorte meddle as Executors or Executor of this my saide will during the lyfe of their said Mother other than as Servants to her or by vser of their names or actions or sutes yf need be yf they or any of them doe take vpon him or them to meddle therein during her lyfe she keeping herself sole as aforesaid contrary to this proviso then I will that he or they that so medleth from thenceforth shalbe no longer Executor or Executors thereof but the Authority hereby given to them or him forthwithe thenceforthe to cease and determine as though they or any of them had never bene thereunto authorized by this my Will. Provided also that after the decease of my saide wyfe yf my saide Sonne Thomas be not at the time of her saide death and from the time of the making this my will till that time of godly and honest conversacon and a stayed man and to be judged and allowed of by my honourable and dere good Lords, the Lorde Mordente and the Lorde Sainte John of Bletsoe or the Survivors of them that then my said Sonne Thomas shall not in any wise meddle with th' execucon of this my saide will during the lyfe of my said Sonne Roberte. — THOMAS SNAGGE. Thomas Hunt, George Creswell.

Proved at London the 17th day of May, 1593, and administration granted to Elizabeth Snagge, widow and executrix.

In the Name of God : Amen.—The Ninth daie of October Anno D'ni One Thousand Six hundred twenty-one. I, Thomas Snagge of Marston Morteine in the Countie of Bedd: Knight: being of p'fect memory and of health praised bee God therefore, Revokeinge all other wills, Doe make and ordaine this my last Will and Testament in manner and forme following (that is to say) As touching any p'son that is to bee dissolved by death, I comitt my Soule to God that made it mortall and my mortall body to ye earth wherof it was made untill the daie of the general resurrection, at which tyme it shall be reunited to my Soule and enioye life eternall as I assuredly hope by the meanes and merrit of Jesus Christ my Redeemer. I give and bequeath unto Dame Ann my wife the vse and occupacon of all my plate and hangings of Tapistry and oras soe longe as she shall keep herself sole and unmarried. Item. I give and bequeath all my said plate and hangings unto my Sonne Raphe Snagge, to have the same ymediately after the marriage or decease of my said wife w<sup>ch</sup> shall first happen. Item.—I give to bee distributed to the poore people of Marston Mortaine three pounds—to the poor people of Kempston forty shillings. The residue of my goods and Chattels Leases Debts and Credits (my debts and Legacies paid and p'formed and funeralls discharged) I give and bequeath unto the said Dame Anne my loving wife, whom I ordaine and make my sole and onely

Executor of this my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto sett my hand and seale the daie and yere above written.—THOMAS SNAGGE, sealed subscribed and published as my last Will and Testament in the presence of Fr. Crawley—Cheny Rotheram—Will'm. Scott—Laurence Mable.

Proved at London the 7th day of June 1627 by Agnes Snagg widow, and executrix.

## BISHOP WILLIAMS AT WILLINGTON.

In that remarkable book, Hacket's *Life of Archbishop Williams*, is an account (*Part ii.* p. 61) of a visit paid by Williams when holding the see of Lincoln, "to the Mansion-place of Sir Gostwick in Bedfordshire," for the purpose of hallowing a chapel there. The account continues "The Knight's son and heir being born deaf and dumb, and continuing in that defect, no sooner did the Bishop alight, and come into the house but the young gentleman kneeled down and made signs to the Bishop, that he craved his blessing, and had it with a passionate embrace of love." And it goes on to narrate how the young man was able to enter into the marriage state with a young lady of a great and prudent family. It will be seen that no place is mentioned, but I think I am not wrong in supposing that Willington is intended, and the date probably about 1626. I desire to ask, can the young man and young lady be identified? Is there elsewhere any account of the chapel? Does the chapel still exist?

[The Gostwick referred to above would be Sir Edward, *eld. s.* of Sir Edward Gostwick by Anne, *d.* of John Wentworth, of Gosfield, Co. Essex. Sir Edward was born in 1619, and, according to Burke, deaf and dumb. The "young lady of a great and prudent family" was Mary, *d.* of Sir William Lytton of Knebworth, *Knt.*, who became his wife, and bore him several children. Sir Edward died 24th Feb. 1671, and Lady Mary on the 8th Dec., 1656.—*Ed.*]

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BROMHAM.—In the current number of *Notes &*

*Queries*, under the heading "Libraries and Churches," is a brief account of the library at Bromham Church, from the pen of John Pickford, M.A., which, being of local interest, I have transcribed for the benefit of our readers:—

"The Library at Bromham Church, near Bedford, was founded by Thomas, second Baron Trevor, of Bromham, and on a slab let into the outside wall, on the eastern side of it, is the following inscription in Roman capitals:—

'This small library was founded and freely given  
For the use of the Minister and Parish of Bromham  
By Thomas Lord Trevor in the year 1740.  
No book to be taken out without leave of the Minister  
Or Lord of the Manor.'

There is the following allusion to the little library in *Villa Bromhamensis*, a poem in Latin sapphics, written by his brother, Robert, Baron Trevor, afterwards, in 1776, created Viscount Hampden, and published by his younger son in 1792:—

'Forte si pisces tueatur imber  
Desuper pendens, hyemansve coelum ;  
Proximi clausum, recreat sacelli  
Docta supellex.  
Fratris hanc olim pietas dicavit  
Publice utendam, officio ministris  
Deditis sacro bona ne librorum  
Copia desit.'

Allibone's *Dictionary* has the following notice of the book in which *Villa Bromhamensis* is to be found, and which is a magnificent specimen of typography:—

'*Hampden, Rob. Trevor, Vice-Com., Britannia, Lathmon, Villa Bromhamensis, Poemata, nunc primum curante filio Joan. Trevor edita, Parmae, Typis Bodonianis, 1792 fol.,*

#### SANDY.

The Rev. Francis PALMER, Rector of Sandy, Bedfordshire. We should be exceedingly obliged to any contributor to the *Bedfordshire Notes & Queries* who can kindly give any information as to when the Rev. Francis Palmer became Rector of Sandy, or the Christian names of his parents and to what county his family belonged. He made his will in 1680, and it was proved 1685. He must, therefore, have died in the intervening period. He left a legacy to the poor of Sandy now called "Palmer's Dole," and a sufficient sum to build and endow a hospital for 10 poor widows at Bridgnorth, now called "Palmer's Hospital." His mother was sister to Colonel Francis Billingsby, who was slain by Cromwell's forces near the site of the Hospital, 31 March, 1646, and his mother was

buried in the church near, but there is no entry in the Parish Register of her burial. The inscription on the stone, which appears to have once marked his grave at Sandy, is not available, and that part of the Register where his burial would be entered is wanting. He appears to have died unmarried, and does not mention in his will any of the name of Palmer.

#### YIELDEN.

The following note relates, I expect, to William DELL, M.A., Rector of Yelden about 1645; it was written by some one living at Houghton Conquest, probably at the commencement of the last century:—

“ ‘ Mr. Dell The Chaplain of the Army, Who, I think, ‘ neither understood Himself, nor was understood by ‘ others, any farther than to be one Who took Reason, ‘ Sound Doctrine, order, and Concord, to be the Intoller- ‘ able maladies of Church and State, Because They were ‘ the Greatest Strangers to His Mind.’

Baxter's Life, Folio. Part. I. p. 64.

Was not buried (If I am rightly informed) in the Church, or Church Yard, But in One of His Own Closes at Westoning in Bedfordshire. If Mr. Lewis desires It, I will endeavour to procure Him a more Particular account of His Burial: But desire He will not give the Account as from me.”

Turning to *Bedfordshire Notes*, p. 26, I find it stated that he became Chaplain to the Parliamentary Army in 1645, and attended Sir T. Fairfax at headquarters. The account goes on to say: “ He was Master of Caius Coll.

· Cambs. He appears to have been of a peculiar and unsettled turn of mind, and was charged with three inconsistencies, 1st. for being professedly opposed to Infant Baptism, and yet having his children baptized. 2ndly. for preaching against universities and yet holding the Headships of a College, 3rdly. for being opposed to tythes and yet taking £200 a year from his Living. He was not, however, ejected for these things, but for non-conformity." In 1660 the parishioners of Yielden presented a petition to the Upper House setting forth their grievances, wherein they allege that he "hath declared in the public congregation that he had rather hear a plain country man speak in the church that came from the plough than the best orthodox minister that was in the country; upon Christmas-day last (1659) one Bunyon of Bedford, a tinker, was countenanced and suffered to speak in his pulpit to the congregation, and no orthodox minister did officiate in the church that day"—see *ante*, Vol. I., p. 241. What became of him I do not know, he disappears from Yielden in 1662 and was succeeded by Josiah Lamplough as Rector, in 1664, who was also Vicar of Westoning; the two livings appear, at that time to have been held together, and this probably accounts for his having been buried at Westoning. In the registers of Westoning are several entries relating to the children of "William Dell, gent.," which I here give: George, bapt. 14 June 1676—Elizabeth, bapt. 27 July, bur. 22 Aug. 1677—Humphrey, bapt. 6 Sept. 1678—John, bapt. 8 Oct., bur. 11 Oct. 1679—Katherine, bapt. 9 Jan. 1682—Thomas, bapt. 29 May 1684. These were probably connected with the subject of this notice.

## BEDELL FAMILY.

The earliest traces of this Ancient Norman Family in England, date from the year 1086, when Godwin Bedel held land in Buckinghamshire. The next date up to the present time of searching will be found mentioned in the Domesday of St. Paul's, A.D. 1222.

“ Ric Bedellus or Bedil Juror tenant of Sandon.  
Hugh Bedellus tenant of Arleigh.”

In Henry III. reign 1271-2 John de Bodele; Bedyll Sheriff.

In Edward I. A.D. 1299—“ Hugh Bedel of the Ward of Bradestrade (now Broadstreet) who had been removed from his office by Henry le Galeys then Mayor of London.” The name frequently occurs in the 13th Century, but the name does not occur in Bedfordshire until about 1566. I hope shortly to give the whole Pedigree of the Bedfordshire Family. The following extracts are taken from the Wootton Registers.

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#### BEDFORD, ST. PAUL'S.

Whilst so many interesting events have been happening to and within the walls of this ancient and fine building, it will perhaps not be considered out of place if I bring to the notice of your readers, many of whom are, probably, more less interested in the fabric, the following note which I was kindly permitted, by Mr. S. Tucker, Somerset Herald, to extract from the Visitation of the County of



Bedford, which was taken in the year 1634, and marked C. 31, and is now in the Herald's College, London:—

“These three figures [sketched in pen and ink] remaine in a glasse windowe in a chappell in ye south of the church of St. Paule in Bedford the 15th day of July 1634.”

Grey de	Norfolk	Hen. 6.
Ruthin	Mowbray	

These figures must have been in a window situated in what is now generally known as The Archdeacon's Court, and the question arises when did they disappear and what has become of them.

The first—Grey de Ruthin—was probably intended to represent either *Reginald de Grey*, who was summoned to Parliament as “Reginaldo Grey de Ruthyn,” from 6th Oct., 1389, to 26th Sept., 1439, and died in 1440, or his grandson and heir *Edmund de Grey*. The second—Norfolk—was probably a representation of *John Mowbray*, who was confirmed Duke of Norfolk by Patent of K. Henry VI., 11th March, 1444-5, and died in 1461. The third, that of *K. Henry VI.*, of course, speaks for itself.

As to the date of their disappearance, I fear that may have to be put down to the time of the Commonwealth and Sir Samuel Luke's soldiers, for we know that both the families of Grey and Mowbray were connected with the parish of Cople, in which Sir Samuel Luke, the Hudibras of Butler, resided, and what more probable than that the Puritan soldiers under his command should think they were doing their cause a real service by destroying in effigy the representations of those they looked on in the light of their enemies' ancestors. However this may be, it is quite certain

that whereas they once were, now they are not ; nor indeed is any trace or remembrance of them to be discovered in the memory of anyone now living that I can hear of.

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A CONTEMPORARY OF SHAKESPERE.

The following cutting is from the *British Medical Journal* of Dec. 13th, 1884, copied from the *New York Medical Record*. The name "Heldon" is not familiar to me as a Bedfordshire name ; possibly it may be a misprint or a misreading for "Helder" a common name hereabouts, and an *alias* for Spicer. F. A. B.

"In the churchyard at Fredericksburg, Virginia, is a tombstone, on which may be deciphered these words:— 'Here lies the body of Edward Heldon, practitioner in physics and chirurgery. Born in Bedfordshire, England, in the year of our Lord 1542. Was contemporary with, and one of the pall-bearers of, William Shakespeare, of the Avon. After a brief illness, his spirit ascended in the year of our Lord 1618, aged 76.'"

The word *last* which I have italicized would reasonably imply one of a number greater than two. Of two wives the latter is usually referred to as the 2nd. It is possible that Dame Alice may have been Sir William's *first* wife.—Ed.]

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#### THE DUNCOMBE FAMILY OF BATTLEDEN.

William Duncombe was the eldest son of William Duncombe, of Ivinghoe, Bucks., by his second wife Alyce, daughter of Edmond Whitton, of Nethercourt, Woodstock, Oxon., and was born about 1546. He married about 1566 <sup>(1)</sup> "Ellena filia Willi: Saunders de Potsgrave, in com. Beds, gen." She being heir to her brother Thomas, William Duncombe, by this marriage, became possessed of the manors of Battlesden, Lovelsbury and Potsgrave, together with other lands and the advowson of the last named place. He settled at Battlesden at the time of his marriage, and it remained the seat of his descendants until 1706, when it was sold by his great-great-grandson William Duncombe, M.P. for Beds and Ambassador to Charles XI. of Sweden, to Allen Bathurst (afterwards created Lord Bathurst). During the time that it was his seat, Battlesden became the resort of the celebrated constellation of wits of whom he was the patron and friend. And in 1724, Lord Bathurst sold the estate to Sir Gregory Page, Bart. in whose family it still remains. <sup>(2)</sup>

The first mentioned William Duncombe of Battlesden served the office of High Sheriff of Beds 34 Eliz. (1591). He is mentioned in MS. No. 12 of the Dodsworth Collection in the Bodleian Library, as residing at Dunstable, and as being possessed of "A Collection of Evidences of the

·Priory of Dunstable.” He died on 27th March 1603, and was buried at Battlesden, where in after years his son, Sir Saunders Duncombe, erected a mural monument to his memory, which bore this inscription, two or three lines of which have been erased by a chisel:—

“In hope of a joyful resurrection lyes interred the body of William Duncombe, Esq: who departed this life the 27th March 1603, who was the fourth son to William Duncombe of Ivinghoe, in com. Bucks, Gent. and Alice Witton, daughter to William Witton of Woodstock, in com. Oxon. Esq: and had issue by his first wife Ellen Saunders, daughter & heir to William Saunders, of Potsgrave, Gent: three sons & two daughters. The eldest son was Sir Edward Duncombe Kn<sup>t</sup>, who lived to the age of 71, and departed this life the 1st of March 1638; his second son is Sir Saunders Duncombe, who hath been a Gentleman Pensioner in ordinary to King James of blessed memory & also to King Charles about the space of 30 years; the third son was William, who being a Merchant died at Stode in Ger: and lyes interred in the chief Church there; the two daughters died without issue.”<sup>(3)</sup>

ARMS (in separate shields):—1. DUNCOMBE; 2. SAUNDERS (Per chevron sa. and arg. three elephants' heads erased counterchanged, tusked or. CREST—An elephant's head erased sa. ears and tusks arg.).

Sir Saunders set up at the same time a duplicate of this Memorial in the Church of Great Brickhill, in Bucks, (the manor of which belonged to another branch of the Duncombes), and Lipscomb transcribing it into his History of Bucks has made, as is not unusual with him, several mistakes.

The return to the *Inquisitio post mortem*, as it appears in Cole's Escheats (capt: ap: Amptill 3 Nov. 1 Jac:), shows

that William Duncombe died seized of the Manor of Battlesden als Braddylsden, and the Advowson which he held of the King as of his Honour of Gloucester by Knight's service; of the Manor of Lovells or Lovelsbury Close, which he held of the King as of the Monastery of St. Albans; and of the Manor of Pottsgrave and the advowson, which he held of the King *in capite*.

By his will dated 26 March, 1603, the day before his death, William Duncombe devised to his son Edward and eleven others, their heirs and assigns a house in the Church End of Leighton Buzzard (at a later date this was a Public House, known by the sign of the 'Golden Bell'), and two cottages adjoining with a rood of garden ground attached, and about two acres of meadow land in the common meadow called Little Woolsalls, in order that the profits should be employed for the benefit of the poor of Leighton Buzzard for the ensuing year; of the poor of the the town of Ivinghoe and the hamlet of Ivinhoe-Aston for the year after that; of the poor of the town of Dunstable for the third year; of the poor of the town of Battlesden for the fourth year; of the poor of the town of Pottsgrave for the fifth; then to commence again with Leighton Buzzard, and so each of these five localities were to have the benefit of the devise once in every five years for ever. The estate was let in 1819 (by the united Churchwardens of the various parishes interested, who have long exercised this right as it is not known in whom the legal estate is vested by inheritance), for a term of 15 years from Ladyday at an annual rent of £45, and for greater convenience it has been agreed amongst the officers of the 5 parishes that the rents shall each year be apportioned equally amongst them.

Mrs. Duncombe (Ellen Saunders) died 9 Nov. 1587; and by the inscription it would appear that Mr. Duncombe

married a second wife; but there is no mention of her. (4).

Sir Edward Duncombe, the eldest son, succeeded to Battlesden, and received the honour of Knighthood from King James I, "at Whitehall 23 July 1603, before ye coronacon of ye king." He was High Sheriff of Beds. 1615, and married Elizabeth, third daughter of Peter Osborn, of Chicksands Priory, Beds, Treasurer Remembrancer of the Exchequer, by whom he had nine children; she died 1628 & was buried in the Chancel of Battlesden Church. (5). It does not appear that Sir Edward had any issue by his Second wife Anne. . . . mentioned in his will. (6) He died 1 March 1638 aged 71, & by his will dated 1st. Jany 1637-8, directed that he should be buried in the Chancel of Battlesden Church, "neere his wife there;" he gave 20 shillings to the poor of Battlesden, 20 sh. to the poor of Pottsgrove, and 40 sh. to the poor of Leighton Beaudesert; & after reciting that upon his marriage with his "nowe wife Anne," he gave securities to provide her after his decease for her lifetime with a dwelling house of the value of £40 p. a, or pay down to her a sum of £300; he directed that if those securities should be given up, she should be permitted to retain the two rings and the diamond hatband which she had of his in her keeping, if not they were to be given up to his Executors. He gave to his son-in-law William Duncombe, of Litlington Park Esq. and William Bolsworth, of Leighton, Gent<sup>n</sup> all his lands &c in Yeldon, Turvey and Wroxhill, co. Beds, & in Roxton, Colleston, Chalfont, co. Bucks, and in Puttenham co. Herts, and all heriots, chattels of felons and fugitive felons of themselves in as free & ample a manner as the same were conveyed to him by John Eldred & Thomas Whitmore, by Indenture of 1 May

9 Jac. 1. (1611). As to his lease of Woburn, his jewels & all other his chattels, he bequeathed the same to the said W<sup>m</sup> Duncombe & W<sup>m</sup> Bolsworth not doubting that they would see all his just debts paid; and he appointed them his Executors. This William Duncombe, the Executor, as well as being Sir Edward's son-in-law, was also his first cousin, being the son of Sir Edward's uncle John Duncombe, of Litlington Park, Esquire of the Body to King James. William Okeland was appointed to preach Sir Edward's funeral sermon; he was probably the son of Rev. William Okeland presented by William Duncombe of Ivinghoe, to the Rectory of Great Brickhill in 1553.

Edward, the Eldest son of Sir Edward Duncome, married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Peter Osborn, by Dorothy his wife 6th daughter of Sir John Danvers, of Dantsey, co. Wilts, who married Elizabeth Nevill, 4th daughter & co-heiress of John, Lord Latimer, by Lady Lucy his wife, daughter of Henry Somerset, 2nd Earl of Worcester; but he appears to have died without issue, & Battlesden came to his brother (7)—

The R<sup>t</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup> Sir John Duncombe, who was born in 1623, and followed the King and the Cavaliers into France. The curious manner in which Knighthood was conferred upon him by the King in 1648, when Charles I. was a prisoner at Carisbrooke is related by Anthony & Wood (*Athen. Oxon.* Vol. iv. ii. Ed. Bliss 1820). Pepys, at first prejudiced against Sir John, afterwards became his admirer and friend, & his diary often alludes to him. At the Restoration Sir John was one of those selected by Charles II to be invested with the contemplated Order of the "Royal Oak," his Estate being scheduled at £1000 a-year. In 1660, Sir John Duncombe was elected M.P. for Bury St. Edmunds; and the Lord Lieutenant of Bedford-

shire reported to the King that it would be well to add to the number of Deputy Lieutenants of that County & recommended to him Sir John Duncombe "the last knight made by the late king, in the Isle of Wight, worth £2000 a year, & of a loyal family, who absconded during the late troubles & is now returning to live in Bedfordshire." In 1664, Sir John was nominated Master of the Ordnance, and on 22 May 1667 was appointed one of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury & Sworn a Member of the Privy Council.

On the resignation of Lord Ashley, Sir John Duncombe was made 13 Nov. 1672 Chancellor of the Exchequer in his stead, and continued in office until 26 March 1679, when he was "outed" as Evelyn says, by the Earl of Danby. In Aug. 1673, Lord Danby had been made Lord High Treasurer, & Sir John, refusing to go the unconstitutional lengths to serve the King's spendthrift necessities that Danby suggested & carried, resigned office. The immediate occasion which led to this result was Sir John's refusal to entertain a proposition made by Danby to appoint a General Receiver of Excise by Patent under the Great Seal, by which means the monies received from that branch of the Revenue were to be at the disposition of the Lord Treasurer, without the intervention of the Chancellor of the Exchequer. It is somewhat singular that this very office of Receiver of Excise was held by Mr. Kent, the partner of Sir Charles Duncombe (of the Ivinghoe family).

Sir John Duncombe married Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Humphrey May, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, & Vice-Chamberlain of the Household to Charles I, and sister of Baptist May, the Privy Purse. The latin inscription on her monument is now very illegible; but that on Sir John's states that he died 11 March 1687 in his 64th



year. He was succeeded at Battlesden by his son. (8)—

William, born about 1646, who married Hon. Jane Cornwallis, only child of Frederick 1<sup>st</sup>. Lord Cornwallis by his 2<sup>nd</sup>. wife Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Henry Crofts, of Saxham, Suffolk. Mr. Duncombe played a somewhat conspicuous and important part in the politics of the day. He was elected M.P. for Bury St. Edmunds 1672, and for Bedfordshire in the Convention Parliament of 1688-9, & shortly afterwards was appointed Ambassador to the Court of Sweden with the object of securing the neutrality of Charles XI. in the pending war with France, & of negotiating the Grand Alliance of England, Spain & the Northern Powers against Louis XIV. He remained at the post till August 1692, & on his return to England was appointed Deputy Lieutenant for Beds, & in 1695 elected with Edward, Lord Russell, M.P. for Beds. On the recall of Viscount Sidney, William Duncombe was appointed one of the three Lords Justices for Ireland: the others being Lord Capel & Sir Cyril Wyche, & they continued to govern that part of the kingdom from 1693 to 1695. The last public appointment which W. Duncombe held was that of Comptroller of Army Accounts; to this he was nominated by Queen Anne in 1707, in order to control the large and complicated military expenditure caused by Marlborough's glorious campaigns.

In 1706, he held the manor of Battlesden which had remained in the Duncombe family for about 140 years to Allen, eldest son of Sir Benjamin Bathurst, governor of the East India Company & Treasurer of the Household of the Princess Anne of Denmark. The motives which induced Mr. Duncombe to part with his family seat do not appear; his fortune might have suffered in the course of his political career, but this seems hardly probable con

sidering the ample estates of which his son Edward was possessed.

I do not find, as I thought I should, any note about the chiselled out portion of the Inscription on William Duncombe's monument. The following has probably something to do with—

John, eldest son of William Duncombe, of Ivinghoe, Bucks, (by Mary daughter and coheir of Richard Reynes, of Clifton Reynes, his first wife), was, according to Harl. MS. No. 5132. p. 53, "attainted." This statement appears only in that copy of the *Visitation of Bucks* in 1564, & seems to have been inserted after the Herald had completed his entries. The name of this John does not even appear among the issue of W<sup>m</sup> Duncombe in any other of the Visitations, and there is room to presume that it was added here at the instance of some member of the Bedfordshire family who were descended from William Duncombe's 2<sup>nd</sup>. marriage, & who might naturally wish to prevent the disgrace which this John brought on the family falling upon John Duncombe, of Litlington Park, his half-brother. The grounds of John Duncombe's untimely fate may be gathered from Strype's account. In his *Annals of the Reformation* Vol I. p. 195, he states: "March 14<sup>th</sup>. 1559. One Duncombe, Gent. and Company had committed a great robbery in Bedfordshire. They were examined before the Council. After being found guilty, they were carried down thither by the Sheriff of the County, and were hanged in a place where the said Duncombe might see two or three lordships that should have been his, had he behaved himself as he ought, which stirred him no doubt to repentance." Machyn gives a similar account in his Diary 1559-60. omitting the hoped for 'repentance.'

## NOTES BY THE EDITOR.

(1.) The marriage took place in Sept. 1560. Ellen Saunders at the time of her marriage was only about eleven years of age, having been baptized 21 Sept., 1549. This match, apparently, gave rise to a law suit relating to the manors of Battlesden and Potesgrave, &c. I have several old documents connected with this suit in my possession.

(2.) In 1884 these estates were sold, under an order of the High Court of Chancery, by the Trustees of the estates of Sir Edward Henry Page-Turner, Bart., and of Helen Elizabeth Page-Fryer, only d. and heiress of Sir Gregory Osborne Page-Turner, to the Duke of Bedford.

(3.) A facsimile copy of this inscription will be found on p. 375, *ante*.

(4.) The only fact that I have been able to discover regarding this second wife is—that her name was—Katherine, and that she married again at Harrold, to Thomas Catesbye, Esq., 1 Aug., 1603.

(5.) From the "Bishop's Transcripts," I find that she was buried 27 Nov. 1628.

(6.) Sir Edward's second wife was Anne, relict of Bonham, the marriage settlement was dated 22 June, 1630. See p. 377, *ante*.

The marriage licence I have discovered in vol. xxvi of the publications of the Harl. Soc. It is as follows;—

"1630 June 30 Sir Edward Duncombe, K<sup>t</sup>, Widower, aged [—], & Anne Beecham [?], of St. Michael le Querne, widow; at St. Sepulchre's."

(7.) I am unable to reconcile this statement with a MS. pedigree of the family in my possession attached to an abstract of title. In this pedigree there is no mention of Edward, s. of Sir Edward; though in the *Visitations of Bedfordshire*, Harl. Soc. pub. vol. xix, p. 101 there is a son 'Edward' given, and from the *Bishop's Transcripts* I find that he was baptised on the 9th of Jan. 1606. I have not been able to discover any record of his burial, but I imagine he died young. The writer must, I think, be in error when he alleges that Sir Edward, and his son Edward, both married daurs. of Sir Peter Osborn, named Elizabeth. My pedigree makes William, the eldest son; in the *Visitations* he is called "2nd sonne of Sr Edward and heir apparent now living 1634." That he was the eldest may be fairly presumed, for had he been born after Edward I should doubtless have come across his baptism in searching the *Bishop's Transcripts*. This William married in 1614 Elizabeth, d. of Sir John Poyntz and had issue, inter alia, Edward, eldest s. bapt. 16 Dec. 1619, bur. 4 Aug. 1634; John, 2nd. s. bapt. 20 July 1622. This John married Elizabeth, d. of Humphrey May and was knighted in 1648.

The writer of this article in calling Sir John brother of Edward (s. of Sir Edward) misses out a generation, viz.:—that of Sir John's parents—William and Elizabeth.

(8.) There is no date on Lady Elizabeth Duncombe's monument, but in the *Bishop's Transcripts* is recorded the burial of Elizabeth Duncombe on the 23rd Dec. 1687, which in all probability refers to her. The same authority gives the date of Sir John's burial as 6th March 1686; the date on the monument is the 4th, not 11th, of March 1686; that is O. S.

## THOMSON FAMILY OF HUSBORNE-CRAWLEY.

No one who has visited the Church of Husborne-Crawley can fail to have noticed the beautiful Monument in the North East angle of its chancel. Lysons in his *Magna Britannia*, vol. 1, p. 101, thus describes it ;—“ A handsome monument, with the effigies of a knight in armour and his lady under a canopy supported by Doric columns ; it has no inscription but by the arms appears to be that of the Thomson family.” As the inscription not only exists but is evidently contemporary with the monument it was probably hidden at the beginning of this century by the Manor pew of the Thomsons and Williamsons now no longer existing. The inscription faces West and is quite visible to the most casual observer. It reads thus ;—

“HIC JACET JOH'ES THOMSON  
ARMIGER UNUS AUDJTORIUM  
CURIAE SCACARII REGIAE MA-  
IESTATIS ET DOROTHEA UXOR  
EIUS QUI IOHANNES OBIIT  
TERTIO DIE APRILIS ANNO  
DN. 1597 AETATIS SUAE 76.”

The effigies of both husband and wife are in very good preservation, they lie side by side with uplifted hands as if,—

“ for past misdoings to atone

By saying endless prayers in stone.” \*

Both be-ruffled, he in armour, the small kneeling figures of two sons and one daughter above and behind them. The pillars supporting the canopy surmounted by a coat of arms and its mantling, are no longer upright. On the

South side beneath these figures are nearly circular shields containing,—in the one case, the lion passant guardant or,—the arms of the Thomson family quartered with those of Chadworth, Glover, and Smythe; in the other,—the arms of Dorothy Gilbert, only,—Azure, a chevron ermine between three eagles displayed or. These arms were born by the Gilberts of both Suffolk and Sussex. I should be glad to know to which of these families Dorothy Thomson belonged? I am the more interested as Christian Gilbert, wife and widow of Talbot Williamson, owner of the Manor House and pew 150 years later, bore the same arms as shewn by the mural tablet to the South of the East window. Also, can any one supply a fuller description of the Manor House than that contained in the following advertisement published after Talbot Williamson's death, A.D. 1765?

“To be Lett, and entered on immediately at Husband Crawley, in Bedfordshire, a handsome large HOUSE, delightfully situated, and at a very easy Rent. On the Ground Floor, a large Hall, two Parlours, a Drawing Room, a good Kitchen and Servants Hall, with many other convenient places, and two large Cellars.

On the First Floor, are 12 good Chambers with large Closets and several good Garrets. Out-houses, a Brew-house, Wash-house, a Laundry, a Coach-house, two Stables with stalls for 14 Horses; a large Garden well planted with Fruit Trees; two large Fish Ponds and exceedingly fine water. Distance from London about 40 Miles, seven from Bedford, three from Ampthill, and two from Wooburn.

For further Particulars enquire of Mr. Gregson, at No. 7 Stamp-Office, Lincoln's Inn; and of Mr. Rocks at Wooburn.”

No date, but probably the advertisement was cut from some Essex paper as the Williamsons had property at Writtle, and on the back of it is a report of the committal of a burglar to Chelmsford gaol who had broken into the house of Mr. Meredinton, Tanner, in that place. The John Thomson of the Husborne-Crawley monument seems to have been the first of the family who owned the Manor; his father (the great-grandson of Richard Thomson of Laxton, in com. York. gent. usher to K. Henry VI.) is described as of Wellinger in Com. Lincoln. I do not know which of John & Dorothy Thomson's descendants sold their estate to the Williamsons.\* In 1634 Francis Williamson, afterwards Sir Francis Williamson, Knight (third son of Robert and Anne Williamson of East Markham, Notts. High Sheriff, 12 James I.), of Eling in the County of Middlesex, & City of Westminster, is described also as "Armiger" of Husborn Crawley. Francis Williamson's elder son, Henry, admitted to the Inner Temple 1681, settled at Corhampton, and March, in the Isle of Ely; the second, Edmond, Serjeant-at-Arms to the House of Commons, of Queen's Street Westminster, apparently made Writtle his country home; but Edmond's son, Edmond, resided at, and loved his Crawley home, and was buried there May 1737, aged 67. Both Edmonds were constantly adding to their possessions at Crawley, and thus several old deeds and papers more or less connected with Crawley have passed into the keeping of their descendants. Perhaps some extracts from these papers may be of interest; but first as to the Thomsons of Crawley Manor

House. Robert Thomson, son of the John & Dorothy Thomson of the monument married Jane, sister of Sir Raphe Coningsby, Knight, and this Robert & Jane Thomson had a son John who, in 1607 married Judith, sister of Oliver, Lord St. John, Earl of Bolingbroke. Judith, who was buried 19 Nov., 1629, left a son—St. John Thomson who married Catherine, daughter of Richard Stone. This son is called, in various deeds, St. John Thomson “the elder,” to distinguish him from his own son, St. John Thomson “the younger.” St. John Thomson “the younger” married Barbara Wyvll, and by her had still surviving at his death two sons,—St. John, called “the sonne,” and Christopher; and five daughters,—Ursula, Catherine, Ann, Barbara, & Frances. Subjoined is a copy of the will of John Thomson “the sonne,” endorsed,—“Ye Coppe of my Father’s Will, St. John Thomson, Esq. I Xbr. 1710.”

“In the Name of God Amen. I St. John Thomson of Birchwood [? Birchmoor] in the parish of Wooburn in the County of Bedford, Esq. being in p’fect health praised be God but considering the certainty of death & uncertainty of the tyme thereof Doe make and ordain this my last will and testam’t in manner and form following that is to say—ffirst and principally I com’end my soul to Almighty God my Creator assuredly believing that I shall receive full pardon and ffree Remission of all my sins & be saved by the precious death and meritts of my blessed Saviour & Redeemer Jesus Christ and my body to the earth to be decently buried att discretion of my executrixes hereafter named and as touching my worldly blessings which the lord hath lent me I dispose of the same as followethe Imp’s I give all my household goods



and utensils & household stuff whatsoever to my five daughters Ursula, Catherine, Ann, Barbara, and Frances, to be equally divided between them share & share alike. Item I give to my Daughter Ursula three hundred pounds and to my said daughters Catherine, Ann, Barbara, & Frances, Two hundred pounds apiece to be paid within six months after my Decease & to my son Christopher Thomson one shilling to be paid him within six months after my decease. Item I give unto my daughters Ursula & Catherine all other my goods and Chattels whatsoever except my said household goods & make them Joynt Executrixes of this my Last will And I also give to the said Ursula & Catherine my Daughters & their heires & assigns for ever all my messuages Lands Tythes Tenements & hereditaments whatsoever in Husborn Crawley in the said County of Bedford or elsewhere in the Kingdom of England in Trust nevertheless that they shall sell all my Goods Chattells & Credits except my said household Goods and also my said Lands Tythes Tenements & Hereditaments or what part or parts thereof they shall thinke fitt, and out of the money thereby arising & the Rents & Profitts of my said Lands & Tenements pay all my just debts defray my funerall Expenses and to pay my said Legacyes hereby given to themselves & to their said brother & sisters and defray the charge of the trust hereby reposed in them and paye interest for all their said respective Legacyes after the rate of ffive per cent and from the time of my Decease until they shalbe paid & after my said debts and Legacyes & funerall Expences shalbe paid & discharged and the charges and Expences which the said Ursula & Catherine shalbe put to in this Execution of the said Trust hereby by me imposed on

them then the said Ursula & Catherine theire heires & assignes shall convey the residue of my said Landes and Tenem'ts & Hereditaments which shall remain unsold if any to my eldest son St. John Thomson his heires & assignes for ever and if they shall raise more money by the power hereby given them than will discharge my said debts legacyes & funeral expences and the charges & expences the shalbe put to in the execution of the Trust hereby reposed in them Then they shall pay the overplus and residue of the money soe raised to the said St. John Thomson my son IN WITNESSE I have hereunto sett my hand and seale the ffirst day of December Annoq' D'ni 1710 anno r'nae d'ne n're Anne dei gra' magne Britanniae ffranciae & hiberne d'ne fidei Defensor etc.—  
St. JOHN THOMSON."

"Signed sealed published & declared by the testator in ye presence of us whose names are here unto subscribed & attested in the Testator's presence by us Lucy Thomson, Anne fferney X her mark Thomas Gressam." Testator died 15th of March 1711. The will was proved the 15th of April 1711 by Ursula & Catherine Thomson. Apparently their mother Barbara was already dead: the Lucy Thomson may have been St. John Thomson's second wife. In 1720 Edmond Williamson mentions Sir Marmaduke Wyvill a friend & relation of Mrs. Ursula Thomson's. "The Sonne" St. John Thomson had, by a deed executed 1701, relinquished his rights to Crawley in consideration of other property; one must presume that the younger son Christopher, being cut off with a shilling, had proved himself unworthy of a son's place. I now proceed to give some extracts from the Court Rolls of the Manor of Crawley; - "Orders pains & bylaws made at

the Cort-Leete & Cort-Baron of the Manor of Husborne Crawley. St. John Thomson the younger, Esq. Lord of the said Manor there holden the Two & Twentieth day of April' Anno Dno 1672, and confirmed at the Cort Leete & Cort Baron held, for ye Manor the 22th day of Aprill 167 $\frac{2}{3}$  and confirmed at the Cort Leete and Cort Barron holden for mann \* Day of April 1677, Imp's. We order that the ditch between Redmount field & Almond moore & the gutters in Almond Moore be drawrne & scowered by them that have meadow ground there on paine to forfeite to the Lord of the said mannor for eu'ry not soe dooing Sixpence a pole betweene this and Whitsontide.

Item wee order that according to our ancient custome that every Landholder whatsoever shalbee allowed to keepe a sheepe for an acre of land or leys lying fallow or unfallow & so according to that rate & they that keepe above that rate shall forfeit to the Lord for eu'ry sheep for every time soe taken 1d.

Item Wee order that according to our ancient custome noe inhabitant whatsoever shall keepe or suffer to be kept upon the wheats barley or grass stubbles their sheepe That is to say in the unefields little clayfields high field or Redfields until St. Edward's day on paine to forfeit to the Lord for eu'ry time so taken iijd. a sheepe and likewise if they shalbe soe taken in Broadmead Drymead or the meadows before the time aforesaid they shall also forfeite to the Lord for eu'ry sheepe so taken. iiijd.

Item Wee order that noe inhabitants shall suffer his or their sheep to be fedde or kept upon the Com'ons unlesse

they be ffolded from our Lady day until *wellantide* on paine to forfeite to the Lord for eu'ry sheepe for eu'ry time soe taken iijd.

Item Wee order that the Hay ward whom wee choose to look to the field shalbe paid his wages after the rate of three farthings an acre for all Lands Leys and meadow ground w'ch is in the parish of Husborne Crawley whoe-soever holdeth the same.

Item it is ordered & appointed that all the Jury afore-said doe meet at the Church on Whitson Monday by ten of the Clock in the forenoon & afterwards goe to view all the Joynts & divisions in the meadow & fields where there is any between one party and party upon paine for every Juryman making default to forfeit to the Lord of the Manor——"

A further account is given on a sheet of paper of which the only date is a water-mark "G. R. surmounted with a crown," probably about the time of George II. "The Manor of Husband Crawley w'th Courts Leet and Baron; the sole Royalty of ffishing ffowling and hunting; a large Common thereto belonging called Crawley Heath and adjoining to the Duke of Bedford's warren and capable of being made into a warren. A large Mansion house with large barns stables and outhouses all in good repair sev'll acres of enclosed pasture lying under ye house, sev'll acres of ffeild sward Lamas and other Meadows grounds Tythe free of all hay; and sev'll other plowed lands in the open ffields in the tenure of Joh. Bowler under ye yearly Rent of . . . . . 66 0 0  
ffines of Court y'rely over & above ye Alienation  
ffines . . . . . 4 1 4

Extracts from the old Williamson Account Book kept  
by Mrs. Williamson (Christian Stanyforth), 1714-1720;  
her husband, 1720-1737; and their son Talbot Williamson,  
1737-1743; father and son both buried at Crawley.

“1720, Aug. 16.—Bought of Mrs. Vrsula Thomson and St. John Thomson her brother the great and small Tythe of Husborn Crawley in Comit. Bedfordsh'r w'th the sev'l Lands &c. for £3000. Mem'dn promised to pay Mrs. Mary Molyneux, sister of ye Lady Falkland 20 guineys for assisting me in it. Paid to Mrs. Thomson in part of payment £700 0s. 0d., and gave my note payable 15'th of Sep'r next for £201 2s. 9½d. The rest of the £3000 is left in my hands to clear two Mortgages of £1250 and for 4 sisters of £200 each and Interest due to you to the 15 of September next when I am by agreem't to pay for the estate and I am to commence the rents at Lady Day last. Note, Sr. Marmaduke Wyvill being a friend and Relation of Mrs. Thomson's he was present at her signing the conveyance and Mr. St. John Thomson's. There was also present Mr. Molyneux B'r of Sr. Francis Molyneux, Mr. Strangways, Mrs. Mary Molyneux daughter of the late woollen draper at Mr. Edward Halsey's Chambers in Staples Inn. Mr. Halsey & his cl'k Mr. Howard Witnesses.”

A Barbara Wyvill had married St. John Thomson “the younger” father of Mrs. Ursula Thomson; so probably Sir Marmaduke her cousin was Sir C. Wyvill Thomson of “The Challenger”; a descendant of the Thomsons of Crawley? Christian (Mrs. Edmond) Williamson had died & was buried at Isleworth June 1720; thus her widowed husband was the writer of the foregoing entries and thus continues :—

“1720. Aug. 27.—Went into Essex with Mr. Molineux, Mrs. Molineux, and Miss Molly and from thence to Crawley in Bedfordshire. Stayed in both places just 14 days.

Sep. 8.—Mem. Bought of Mr. Richard Smith of

Woburn eight pounds and in the parish of Crawley Husbands now in possession of Hen. Taylor a house barnes stable and 27 acres of lands for 30 years purchase, £240. To pay for it the 30th Oct. 1720.

Sep. 17.—Paid to Mrs. Barbara Thomson for South Sea Bond £204, in money 15s. being her part of fortune out of the purchase of Crawley.

1722. Aug. 9.—Paid to Tho. Norcliff, Esq.,\* for a piece of ground behind my garden wh'ch is part of the terras walk £5 5s. 0d; he gave me possession before Mrs. Christobello, J. Norwood, & Edw'd Beadle [the last E. W's footman].

1720. Jan. 18.—P'd to Mrs. Mary Molyneux, sister to Lady Falkland w't I promised her for helping me to ye purchase of Husband Crawley £21 0s. 0d.

Jan. 21.—To Edm'd Green, Mercer, Wooburn, for a piece of blew stuff to hang ye children's room at Crawley £3 6s. 8d." [1722. Edmond Williamson made Frances Golding of Poslingford his third wife, and thenceforth seems generally to have lived at Crawley from March to October of each year.]

"1723.—Pd. sister Brent for things sent to Crawley 3s. 6d.

April 2.—Came from London w'th ffamily.

June 5.—Pd. to Thomas French of Bowe Brickhill 5-day's work at the parlour chimney &c., £2 5s. 6d.

Mem. I gave ym their diet and have promised the brick-layer something more if he hath cured the chimney from smoking.

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\* Of Aspley Guise; there is a monument in the Church there erected in 1724 by Thomas Norcliffe to the memory of his Father, Mother, and 2 Brothers. Qy. Was it he who repaired & altered Aspley House in 1711, and did he then own it?

June 26.—Mem. Bought of Adam Beesan and Richard Whitehead of Ridgmont one acre of land in between sev'ill acres of mine in Sandfield in Crawley and this day paid them five pounds five shillings.

March 20.—Paid for one Scone Lanthorn for the hall at Crawley £1 1s. 0d. For a crakit one for ye passage at Westm'r 2s. 6d.

1724. May 2.—Paid for 3 hassocks for our pew 2s. 0d. for servants 1s.

Feb. 2.—Mem. came from London to Crawley.

Feb. 26.—Paid to Worster Palmer, Tho. Gee, & Mary Gee late Palmer for a messuage & lands in Crawley in Beds. £301 0s. 0d. We came to town the 15th of 8ber.

1728. July 8.—Given Mr. Lowe's servants when I dined there 3s. 6d.

May 28.—Pd. for Tulips Renunquluses from Mr Abbots 8s. 6d.

Nov. 5.—Pd. David Hosier of Ampthill in full for a bob Wigg £1 1s. 0d.

1735. April 6.—Given the cook to put her boy in breeshes 5s.

Aug 2.—Pd. Robt. Shaw his bill in full for the summer house £11 4s. 0d. Jan. 11.— Came from Crawley to London.

1737. April 11.—Pd. Thos. Emerton his bill in full for trees £1 9s. 0d. April 28. Pd. Endersby for making a rafter 3s. May 2. Edmond died at Crawley; he had had a severe illness in 1724. Pd. Mr. Harris the surgeon £28 0s. 0d."

A simple marble tablet on the southern chancel wall records his death 2d May 1737 aged 67 & that of his third wife in 1754 aged 75; and the fact that they



were erected by Christian, only daughter of Edmund Williamson.

Edmond Williamson was succeeded at Crawley by his elder son Talbot, born 1711. He had been educated at Westminster, entered at the Inner Temple December 1st 1724, & admitted to Christ College, Oxford, 20 Oct. 1727. The younger son Edmond (whose son Edmond became owner of Crawley on the death of Talbot Williamson's widow in 1792) at Westminster and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he was entered 15th June 1732. Talbot (so named after his paternal great-grandmother, Talbot of Worfield) Williamson takes up the account book by recording that :—

“ 1737 Sept. 14. My mother (step-mother) and sister (Christian, eventually Mrs. Jonathan Russell\*) went with Mr. Golding to his house at Poslingford to board with him.”

Confining the extracts to those concerning Crawley one finds Talbot following his father's example in buying up all the old farms and pieces of land to be sold around him, and at once setting himself to work to plant and improve grounds and gardens as the following extracts show :—

“ 1737 Oct. 15. Bought from Mr. Lowndes of Astwood a Verdoc Plum, a sort formerly brought from the East Indies, excelling the Gage, planted it on ye S. W. wall of the best Garden. Likewise 3 red Muscadine grapes & severall white figs, a baking pear call'd St. Caesar's Pear, Mr. Lowndes' people not knowing the true name, 4 Red-streaks in Barley Croft ; Morellas in best garden. Removed the Granary so as to stand in a line with the coachhouse.

---

\* She died at Queen Street, Westminster in 1803, aged 89, and was buried at Crawley. The handsome embroidered quilts recently sold at Tigrith sale last year were the work of her hands.

The stone caps from Oulney were 3s apiece; made the little dairy out of the coal house. My brother planted out the young ashes between the ponds in my absence. Dec. 15. Mr. Salvin & I came down from London to spend Xmas. He went up Monday 22nd of Jan., my brother to Cambridge Saturday before & to Suffolk; sent me Chili strawberries & 3 Muscadine vines. In March 1737-8 from Mr. Fauntleroy of Chelmsford 6 cuttings of the blew Hamburgh grape, and 5 of Lombardy, and 5 of the brick grape, 4 of the red Hamburgh, and 5 of St. Peter's and 6 of ye black Muscadine, 6 of ye Greek grape & 4 of ye clarett. August 17, Din'd at ye D. of Kents. Mr. Longueville promised me a Breda apricock w'ch he imported. Sep. 28, Mr. John Peppiatt, Deputy Clerk of the Peace was here and gave me the oaths of Allegiance and Abjuration & ye oath of office.

1738.—Mem. At the Qr. Sessions at Bedford ye 4 of October I was sworn in Justice of the Peace, the Duke of Bedford in ye Chair. Mr. Farrer, Mr. Beecher, Mr. Nodes, Dr. Brown, Capt. Sheldon present. 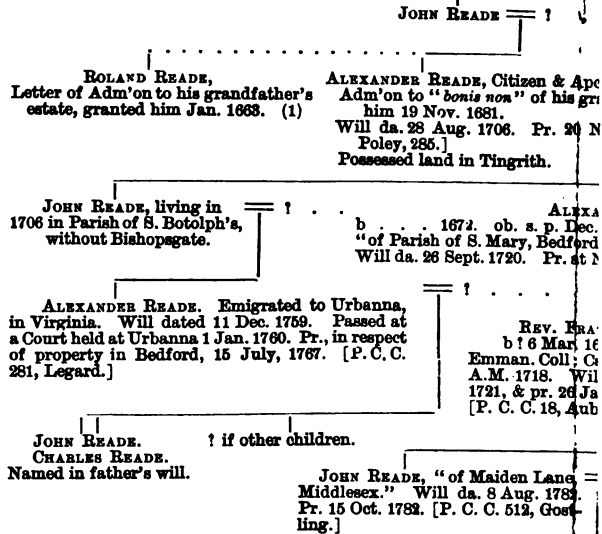

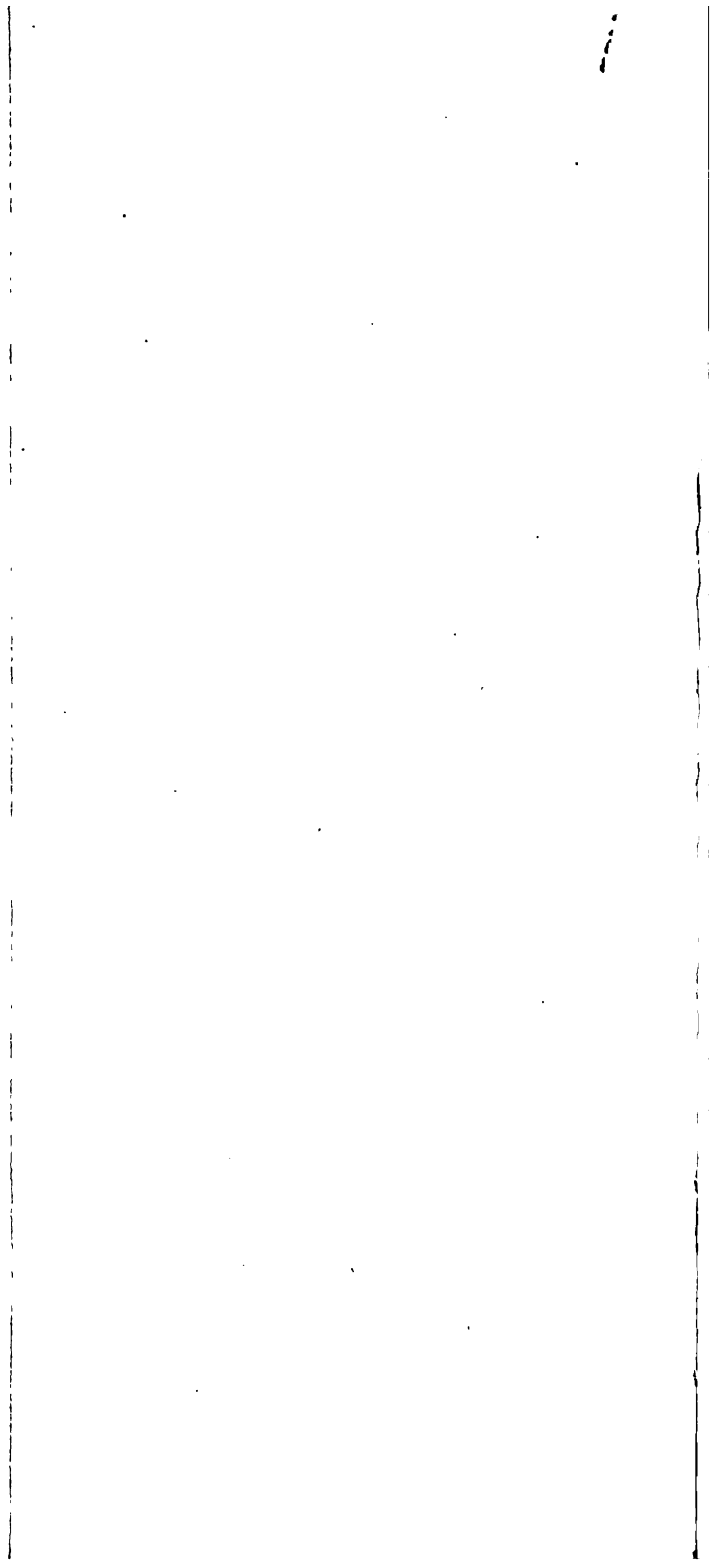

as the last by Talbot Williamson in the old family account book. Probably he here began one of his own. Possibly at this date he was appointed Gentleman Usher to the Princess Amelia, second daughter of George II. Much of his later life was passed at Kensington and in London; many kindly letters pass between him and his younger and only surviving brother Edmond, who in 1740 became Rector of Millbrook, Beds.

In 1752 Talbot Williamson married Christiana Gilbert. In 1765 he became out of health and in an old printed cutting we read:—"A few days since died at Ingatestone in Essex, where he went for the recovery of his health Talbot Williamson, Esq., of Queen Street, Westminster, many years Gentleman Usher to her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia; and this morning his corpse was removed to Crawley in Bedfordshire in order to be interred there tomorrow with his ancestors. He was a man of sound judgment, good morals, and a sincere friend, whole loss is severely felt by many and regretted by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance."

In the margin is written in an old hand:—"He died 9th June 1765." As far as one can judge from the letters note-books, and library which Talbot Williamson left behind him he deserved the encomiums lavished on his heart and understanding, morals and manners, by his truly afflicted widow in the long inscription on his mural monument at Crawley. He was only 55 and childless. What had dictated his choice of a wife one cannot tell, she is proved by the inscription on her tablet at Crawley to have been five years older than her husband, perhaps this fact had made him leave the mansion house and estate at Crawley to his widow "for life," little foreseeing that she would



survive him nearly seven and twenty years. That he tenderly loved his brother, and his brother's little son and two little girls, Christian eventually Mrs. Skevingtons, and Mary Mrs. Trevor, at Millbrook, is evidenced by all the letters that passed between them. This disposition of his estates proved the ruin of the old mansion house of the Thomsons. Talbot's brother pre-deceased Talbot's widow by more than sixteen years.\*

His only son, Edmond Williamson, eventually Rector of Campton cum Shefford, and Lolworth, Cambs. (and Lord of the Manor of Kempston, St. John's, by purchase about 1810), had grown up away from the Crawley home; and soon after he became possessed of it, in 1792, sold it to the then Duke of Bedford, who razed the old house and garden walls, etc., so thoroughly to the ground, that there is even already uncertainty as to where it stood. Some faint remains of fish ponds point to a site opposite the Parish Schools of Husborne Crawley.

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#### KNIGHTS OF THE ROYAL OAK.

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CHEYNE FAMILY OF SUNDON, BRAMINGHAM,  
 AND LUTON.

The following account of the origin of the Cheynes of Sundon, Bramingham, & Luton, may be of interest to some readers. First it may be as well to point out the

curious fact, that although they were near neighbours of the Cheynes of Toddington they had no connection whatever with them, except perhaps in a remote antiquity. The Cheynes of Toddington came from Sherland in the Isle of Sheppey. The Cheynes of Sundon and Bramingham were an offshoot of the family which flourished at Iselhampstead Chenies in Buckinghamshire as early as the reign of Henry III. Subsequently the same family acquired the manors of Drayton Beauchamp and Chesham Boys, Co. Bucks, and Cogenho, Co. Northampton. Under the will of Dame Agnes Cheyne, widow of Sir John Cheyne, Kn't, dated 20 Nov. 1494, (See Browne Willis, Cole's MSS, vol xxxix, pp. 38-49) the manor of Iselhampstead Chenies passed away from the Cheyne family, and through the heiress of her, Cousin Guy Sapcotes eventually fell to the Russells.

The Bedfordshire branch of the family sprang from the second marriage of Robert Cheyne of Chesham Boys. He was born c. 1488, and died 9 Dec. 1552. He married firstly Elizabeth, daughter of John Webb, Esq., and widow of Fulke Odell (or Wodhull) Esq.; secondly Mary, daughter of John Sylam of Bramhanger (otherwise called Bramingham), Co. Beds, gent. (whose brass is in Luton Church), and widow of John Lock, citizen and mercer of London. The licence for this second marriage was dated 5 Jan. 1520-1. The descendants of the first marriage inherited the lands in Bucks, and Northants, and subsequently acquiring the manor of Chelsea gave their name to the well-known Cheyne Walk. This line came to an end in 1728, upon the death, without issue, of William, 2nd Viscount Newhaven in the peerage of Scotland.

There were two children of the second marriage alluded to above, namely Thomas and Mary. Thomas Cheyne who thus succeeded to the manor of Bramhanger, or Bramblehanger, was twice married, first, c. 1545, to Elizabeth, daughter of Sir Thomas Rotherham of Someries near Luton; secondly to Frances, daughter of John Docwra of Putteridge, Co. Herts, Esq. He died 30 Jan. 1553-4. and his will was proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury 20 Apl. 1554 by his brother-in-law Thomas Docwra. His three children, Thomas, Mary, and Elizabeth, I believe, were all issue of the first marriage, but the evidence is not conclusive on this point. At all events an intimate connection seems to have been kept up between the Cheynes and the Rotherhams, for in the next generation but one there was a Rotherham Cheyne as well as a Cheyne Rotherham. Frances the second wife, the mother or the step-mother of the three children above named, seems to have got back her original name by marrying Anthony Docwra of Rudphin, Co. Warwick, whose will was proved by her in P.C.C. 21 Nov. 1586.

Thomas Cheyne, son and heir of Thomas Cheyne the elder, was born 29 April 1550 (See Inq. p.m. of the latter, 1 Mary No. 4). He was married at Icknam, Co. Middx, 9 Jan. 1577-8 to Frances, daughter of Barnard Brocas of Swakeley, Co. Middx., afterwards of Beaurepaire, Co. Hants, Esq. (See Inq. p.m. of his son Robert, 7 Car. I Pars III, 109). He acquired the manor of Sundon by purchase, letters patent confirming which were dated 30 July 1590 (Patent Roll 32 Eliz., Part 15, Nos 30 & 31). He was High Sheriff of Beds in the 39th of Eliz., died 27 Aug. 1612, and was buried at Sundon. He seems to have had as many as sixteen children, at least twelve

of whom, seven sons and five daughters, survived him. Sir Thomas, his eldest son, took the manor of Sundon; Robert, the fourth son, succeeded to Bramhanger; George the youngest, had the manor of Hayes in Stopsley; while by his will p. in P.C.C. 5 Feb. 1612-3 Henry, John, & Rotherham shared between them a house and lands in Roxhill, and the manor of Horton in the parish of Edlesborough, Bucks. This manor had been in the Brocas family, and probably came to Thomas Cheyne through his marriage.

It is proper to mention here that the John Cheyne just mentioned is responsible for a singular error in the pedigree which he signed in the Beds visitation of 1634. He has mixed up two generations, and is mistaken as to the names of his own grand-parents. What I have stated above, however, is based upon the evidence of wills and other confirmatory and independent records.

In a note in Harl. MS. 1429 we have a grandson of the Thomas Cheyne who married Frances Brocas delivering himself in the following fashion:—

“The Cheneys armes of Drayton or the Cheneys of Bramnellhanggar are all of one family only the halfe moone which belongs to Bramnellhanggar because hee weare the younger brother but I woold have my granmother arms was a Brocas of Southampton sheere Sir Pecksall Brocas was my great ounckle and I woold have his coat quartered with the Cneneys because my father did soe: that was 3 Lions Couchunt and the Ramping Lione the Crest was the King of moraucke [Morocco's] hedd.”

If his father quartered the Brocas arms, he certainly had no right to do so, for Frances Brocas was not an heiress. We find no trace of the quartering in the fine

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## ST. JOHN FAMILY.

In the *Bedfordshire Times* of Nov. 12th, containing an account of the funeral of the late Lord St. John, is a copy of an inscription in the Beauchamp Chapel to the memory of Lady Frances Cavendish, wife of Oliver St. John, 2nd Earl of Bolingbroke, and fifth Lord St. John of Bletsoe, as follows :—

“Here lies the Lady Frances Cavendish, youngest daughter of his Excellency William, late Duke of Newcastle, wife to Oliver, Earl of Bolingbrook, And one of the very fairest and most Beautiful of Women if the opinion of her Disconsolate Husband may be taken. Whose desire is conformable to that of her’s, that when God shall take him hence his body, and his only, may be laid in the Dormitory here underneath by her, as those who come after us and may be concerned to take notice thereof shall tender the will and repose of the Dead, which has always in all ages bin held sacred. The said Lady Frances Cavendyshe, Countess of Bolingbrooke died on the Assumption of Our Lady the 15th of August, 1678, having lived with her said Husband 23 years 8 months and 1 day to his great comfort.”

The writer of the article then goes on to say :—

“It is presumed and generally accepted as a fact that the husband of Lady Cavendish went abroad after her death, as he was never heard of again, and consequently the vacant space for the inscription of her husband will, in all probability, never be filled up.”

Turning to Burke’s *Extinct Peerage* I find that her husband is stated to have died *s. p.* 18th of March, 1687-8. I also find in the Bletsoe registers the following entry :—

"1688 March 28 The Rt. Hon'ble, Oliver, Earl of Bolingbrook, was buried."

Whence then arose the above story?

#### EDWORTH.

In the year 1691 was buried at Edworth, Beds., Peter ffeerey—yeoman who came a Travelling day Labourer to this Parish and threshed in the Parsonage barn. He died possessed of considerable property as shewn by his Will deposited at Northampton dated 20 June 1691—in which leasehold lands are identified in Steeple Morden Co. Cambs. Peter ffeerey was succeeded by Thomas ffeerey, his nephew, who died in 1712, leaving his wife Mary at The Middle Farm in Edworth. She died in 1758 and was

possessed of considerable landed estate as noted in her Will dated 20 July, 1758 — Northampton Registry. Madam Feerey (or Fairy) lived at the Middle Farm in Edworth from 1712 to 1758, and it was during this period that the following incident occurred:—

Mr. Tarrow, a lawyer living at Ampthill, Beds., was appointed by Madam Fairy as her agent in respect of her landed property, and gave peremptory orders upon a time to the tenants to pay in their rents to Madam feerey at Edworth at a certain day much earlier than was usual.

The tenants came to Madam feerey—greatly to her surprise—and asked to be allowed to pay their rents at the proper time; whereupon Madam Fairy said she had given no orders for their attendance at that time, and willingly complied with their request that payment should be deferred.

Shortly after midnight the agent (Tarrow) and his brother approached the house, disguised and armed. Forcing an entrance, they proceeded to Madam Feerey's chamber and demanded her money with many threats.

Madam F. assured them that she had no money in the house. The old lawyer then exclaimed, "You know me!" "Indeed I do not," said Madam F., although at the same time she recognized him distinctly.

The brothers after searching the house left, followed, unseen, by Madam Feerey, who from the other side of a thick hedge heard Tarrow say to his brother, "I'm certain the old b—h knows me, and I'll go back and shoot her;" but at his brother's urgent entreaty he gave up his design.

Madam feerey crept back, and calling up the parish constable told him to saddle her horse, and to accompany her forthwith to Ampthill.



Upon her arrival there in the early morning, she summoned the Ampthill constable, and proceeding to the house of her agent—upon gaining entrance found Tarrow asleep in his arm-chair, with a brace of pistols upon the table before him.

“ Good morning, Mr. Tarrow,” said the determined woman, “ You paid me a visit last night, and now I pay you one this morning,” and at once gave him into custody.

The agent and his brother were both tried for the attempted outrage, and were found guilty. Tarrow was sentenced to be hanged and his brother to transportation.

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#### LANGFORD.

The Vine Farm, in the parish of Langford, Beds., occupies a very isolated position at the extreme corner of the parish, abutting upon Astwick, and bounded on the south by the river Ivel, over which a bridge was built when the new cut was made some 40 years since.

When the river flowed in its ancient channel there was a ford about one hundred yards below the new bridge. Near to this ford stood the Vine House, a strongly built place, with walls and foundations of great thickness (in very early times a castle), surrounded by a moat on three sides, and on the fourth flanked by the river.

About the middle of the last century The Vine was occupied by a farmer, his wife and family, and during the night the house was broken into by a band of robbers (one of whom was a woman), who ransacked the premises and murdered (as they thought) the whole of the inmates.

A lad, however, escaped by hiding in a cupboard, and

saw from his place of concealment an infant laid upon the ashes by a woman who exclaimed, "If ever you live to be a man, say Rose of Royston wrapt you warm.."

The robbers then departed, and upon the labourers coming to their work in the morning they found the family were murdered.

The son now came from his hiding-place and told what he had seen and heard. A dog also was found upon the premises, and having been hamstrung was set at liberty and followed by the men until it came to a house in the town of Royston occupied by a butcher. When the dog crossed the threshold, a woman who was in the house exclaimed—upon seeing the way in which the dog had been maltreated—"I wish I knew who served my dog so! I'd lay their heart's blood cold."

The murderous gang were by this means discovered, and proved to be a band of gipsy tinkers, with whom Rose of Royston and her husband the butcher were associated.

The miscreants being thus brought to justice were tried for their misdeeds, found guilty, condemned to death, and were hanged at Cambridge.

the Lady Anne, daughter to Thomas, Lord Wentworth, Baron of Nettlested and Earl of Cleveland, died the 14th of April, 1671, aged 27. N.B.—She was buried opposite Mrs. Chrystian Ker's monument, two foot from the corner of the Earl of Bath's monument.

This entry does not occur in either the official or unofficial Register, but on a loose slip of paper, of which there are several, in the chirography of the period, evidently notes from which the clerk transcribed his official entries. She was married in 1660 to Sir William, 2d. Bart., of Kirkby-Mallory, co. Leicester. Her husband died 13 Apr., 1675, in his thirty-third year. [p. 174.]

1694.—[Feb. 7].—The Lady TEMPLE: [*in the Abbey*].

Second dau. & coheir of Sir Thomas Peyton, 2nd Bart. of Knowlton, co. Kent, by his first wife, Elizabeth, dau. of Sir Peter Osborne, Kt. She was married in 1684 or 1685 to Sir Thomas Longueville, 2nd Bart., of Wolverton, co. Bucks, who died 25 June 1685. She died 30 Dec. 1715, without issue. [p. 285.]

1715.—Jan. 21.—Mrs. Elizabeth LONGUEVILLE: in the North aisle, within the Tombs.

Third dau. & coheir of Sir Thomas Peyton (as above). She married William Longueville, of the Inner Temple, Esq. [p. 285.]

1718.—Dec. 19.—Nicholas ROWE, Esq., in the South Cross.

The celebrated poet. Only son of John Rowe, of Lamerton, co. Devon, Esq., serjeant-at-law, by Elizabeth, dau. of Jasper Edwards, of Little Barford, co. Beds, Esq. He was born at Little Barford 30 June 1674, and partly educated at Westminster school. He became poet-laureate in 1714. He was twice married. By his first wife, a dau. of Auditor Parsons, he left a son John, and by his second wife, Anne Devenish, an only dau. Charlotte. [p. 293.]

1726.—June 10.—The Right Hon. General William STEUART, Esq.: in the Duke of Buckingham's Vault in K. H. 7th's Chapel.

The inscription on his coffin-plate, exposed in 1867, describes him as follows: "General of the Foot and Commander-in-chief of all her late Majesty's Forces in Ireland, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, and one of her said Majesty's Privy Council in the aforesaid kingdom: died June the 4th 1726, aged seventy-four." He married, first, Catharine, Viscountess Grandison who died in 1725, and in the same year, Elizabeth 2nd dau. of Sir Rowland Alston, 2nd Bart. of Odell, co. Beds. Dr. John Herbert, Prebendary of Westminster. She died 2 Apr., and Elizabeth Paschall, spinster, described as her cousin and next of kin administered to her estate 12 May following. [p. 328.]

1739.—Oct. 7.—Mrs. Charlotte, wife of Henry FANE, Esq. : in the South Cross.

Only dau. of Nicholas Rowe, Poet-Laureate, by his 2nd wife Anne Devenish. She was baptized at St. Paul's, Covent Garden, Midx., 1 June 1718, and married, in July 1735, Henry Fane, Esq., a younger brother of Thomas, eighth Earl of Westmoreland, who survived her. She died 29 Sept., in her 22nd year. Her only dau. Charlotte, was born the 3rd, and baptized at St. James, Westminster, 27 May 1739, and married Sir William St. Quintin, fifth bart., of Harpham, co. York, but died without issue 17 Apr. 1762. [p. 352.]

1743.—Dec. 23.—Frances, Lady CARTERET : in General Monk's Vault in K. H. 7th's Chapel.

Only dau. of Sir Robert Worsley, 4th Bart. of Appuldercombe, Isle of Wight, by Lady Frances Thynne, only dau. of Thomas, first Viscount Weymouth, and first wife of John, 2nd Baron Carteret, who succeeded in 1744 as Earl Granville ; to whom she was married, at Longleat, co. Wilts, 17 Oct 1710. She was born 6 Mch. 1693, and died at Hanover, 20 June 1743, aged 49. Her son Robert succeeded to his father's titles, and died *s.p.* in 1776. [p. 365.]

1744.—Oct. 27.—The Right Hon. Grace CARTERET, Countess of Granville and Viscountess Carteret : in General Monk's vault in K. H. 7th's Chapel.

Youngest d. of John, first E. of Bath, by Jane, d. of Sir Peter Wyche, Kt. She was married when a mere child (m. l. dated 15 Mch. 1674), to Sir George Carteret, second Bart., of Metesches, then also a child, created, 19 Oct. 1681, Baron Carteret, of Hawnes, co. Beds, who died 22 Sept. 1695, aged 26, and was buried at Hawnes. She was created, 1 Jan. 1714, Viscountess Carteret and

Countess Granville, having become one of the coheirs to the great Bath estates. She died 18 Oct., aged 77. [p. 367.]

1745.—Oct. 19.—The Right Hon. Sophia CARTERET, Countess of Granville, daughter of the Right Hon. Thomas, Earl of Pontefract: in General Monk's vault.

Lady Sophia Fermor, 2nd dau. of Thomas, 1st Earl of Pontefract, and 2nd wife of John Carteret, first Earl Granville to whom she was married about 14 Apr. 1744. She died 7 Oct., in her 25th year. She married, first, as early as 1717 (as her only dau. was born before 1 July 1718) Nicholas Rowe, to whom she was 2nd wife. She married, secondly, at St. Margaret's, Westminster, 31 Jan., 1723, Col. Alexander Deanes who was buried at St. James, Westminster, 7 Nov. 1731. [p. 374.]

1763.—Jan. 11.—The most noble John, Earl Granville, Viscount CARTERET, etc.: in General Monk's vault.

Eldest surviving son of Sir George Carteret, first Baron Carteret, of Hawnes, co. Bedford, by Lady Grace Granville. He was born 22 Apr., and baptized at St. James, Westminster, 4 May 1690, and succeeded his father, as second Baron Carteret, 22 Sept. 1695, and, on the death of his mother, succeeded to her titles, as Viscount Carteret and Earl Granville. The celebrated commander in the war of the American Revolution. Son of John Burgoyne, Esq., (2nd s. of Sir John Burgoyne, third Bart. of Sutton, co. Beds), by Anna Maria, dau. of Charles Burneston, of Hackney, co. Midx., Esq. He was born the 4th, and baptized at St. Margaret's, Westminster, 5 Feb. 1722. His will, dated 10 Sept. 1783, with a codicil 1 June 1788, proved 22 Aug., 1792, mentions his children—John (born in Queen St., Soho on or about 25 July 1782), Maria, Caroline, and Edward. [p. 450.]

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#### ' HODDESDON FAMILY, LEIGHTON BUSSARD.

##### 17TH CENTURY STONE COFFINS.

Some interesting relics of antiquity have been discovered during the preliminary work in connection with the restoration of All Saints' Church, Leighton Bussard. The workmen last week came upon the family vault of the Hoddesdons, beneath the floor of the south transept. This vault contained four stone coffins—two with lids and two without. On the lid of the one coffin—that of Sir Christopher Hoddesdon—is the inscription of his death in 1610. The record in the register of the church is as follows:—"Christopher Hoddesdon, miles, sepultus fuit Octavo die Februarii, 1610."—The inscription on the lid of the second coffin is in similar style. The register has the following record:—"Mrs. Hoddesdon, uxor Christopher Hoddesdon, Knight, sepulta fuit primo die Januarii, 1602."—The other two coffins are supposed to be those of



the two daughters of Sir Christopher and Dame Hoddesdon, the stone lids of which have long been placed in the south transept, the inscriptions are deeply cut in letters of a very unusual character, and are as follows :—

*“Heare lieth

Sir Christopher Hoddesden was of a Herts. family ; he married 1st, Alice, d. of Alexander Carlisle, of London, who is apparently the wife referred to above as having died in 1602; and secondly Elizabeth, d. of William Blount, of Osbaldiston, co. Leic., widow of — Saunders. Mary Leigh, who ob. 26 Apr. 1641, was d. of Sir Thomas Leigh, cr. Baron Stoneleigh in 1643, by Mary, his wife, d. and coh. of Sir Thomas Egerton. Ursula, 1st wife of Sir John Leigh, Kt., appears to have been the only child of Sir Christopher Hoddesdon, and by this match the Leigh family acquired the manor of Leighton Bussard. Sir Christopher Hoddesdon was the founder of the local charity known as the “Widows’ Dole.” He left a tenement in Lake-street, which about thirty years ago was sold to Mr. Ridgway for £750. The property is now known as Hoddesdon Villas. The money realized by the

sale was invested in Government securities, and now provides the fund to pay the Vicar for an annual sermon on St. Thomas's Day and a yearly gift of money to nearly 140 poor widows. Several tessellated tiles and fragments of a very early period have also been found beneath the floor.

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The Will was pr. 25 Feb. 1556-7 by the Ex'trix above named.

The testator was the second son of John Cheyne of Drayton Beauchamp, Co. Bucks., Esq., who by his will (now only extant in his *Inquisitio post mortem*, No. 18, 27 Hen. VIII.) gave his son John the farms called "ye moose," "Harfreys," "ye plough land," &c., for the term of his life, and power to make his wife a jointure in the same for the term of her life. The elder brother of John Cheyne of Harrold was Robert Cheyne of Chesham Bois, who died 9 Dec. 1552 (see Pedigree in Part XV., *ante*).

His "newew Mr. Pole Dorrell" was the son of his sister Margaret, who married, in 1519, Paul Dayrell of Lillingstone Dayrell, Co. Bucks., Esq. E. C.

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#### PRICE OF BREAD IN THE XVIII<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY.

The following notes are transcribed from a fly-leaf of the Parish Registers of Kempston:—

"July ye 18 1795 John Brooks gave for a half peck

Brown Lofe one shilling and Ninepence, and wheat was sold at Bedford markit that same Day at three pound Fifteen shillings a load.

“July 20 1795 The price of Bread for the second sort was one shilling and Elevenpence For a half peack Lofe.

“July ye 23 The price of a half peck Lof was 2 shilings and three pence.

“August ye 3 The price of a half peck Broun Lofe was 2 shilings and three pence.

“April ye Eleventh 1796 Bread sell that same day Eleven pence a peck.”

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#### AN INTERESTING FIND.

Sir,—A small silver vessel was unearthed a few weeks ago in the vicinity of Newnham Priory, Bedford, and a description of it may be interesting to your readers. The silver vessel in question is of an elongated egg shape,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  inches long and  $3\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide, and weighs  $\frac{3}{4}$  lb. At one end is an orifice half an inch in diameter, bushed with gold and threaded for a screw stopper. It is evidently a “Calefactorium Manuale,” used in ancient times by the Priest, in severe weather, to keep his hands warm while celebrating Mass, it being filled with hot water and laid on the Altar, so that he could from time to time place his palms on it and thus keep up circulation in his fingers. I have most carefully examined it but can find neither emblem, monogram, nor Pyx mark. Let us hope that this interesting “relique en argent” will be preserved in some local museum.

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“THE GREAT PETERBOROUGH.”

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BY THOMAS WRIGHT, AUTHOR OF “THE TOWN OF  
 “COWPER.”

I.—FORTY-SEVEN YEARS.

Turvey Old Hall, the residence of the Mordaunts and the Peterboroughs, stood at a short distance from Turvey village; and the farm-house (Turvey Hall farm) which occupies its site, may be seen from the railroad—on the left in passing from Bedford to Northampton. What this old place was like we cannot tell; for, unfortunately, no one has as yet been able to come across drawings of it. The moat, however, the bowling-green, and the gardens are clearly indicated by the configuration of the ground.

Descended from a brave soldier of the Conqueror's time, who took his name from what may be styled his chief occupation, that of giving death to, or slaying his enemies (Dare Mortem), the Mordaunts were during many reigns a conspicuous family; and thanks to their abilities as soldiers and courtiers, and their persistency in taking unto

themselves heiresses, each head of the family for many generations was considerably richer both in estate and influence than his predecessor; until the time of Lewis, the third Baron, who was one of the wealthiest gentlemen in England. The family had held property in Turvey almost from the time of the Conquest. They became possessed of the magnificent mansion and estate of Drayton (Northants.) in the reign of Henry VII. Of the first Sir John Mordaunt, of his successor, Sir John (created Lord Mordaunt in 1532), and also of the second Lord Mordaunt, are fine effigies in Turvey Church. To Lewis the third Lord is an altar tomb, but there is no effigy of him. Lewis was succeeded by Henry, who, though innocent, was imprisoned and fined for supposed complicity in the Gunpowder Plot. John, the 5th Lord, was made Earl of Peterborough. Adjoining the southern wall of Turvey Church (exteriorly) is an altar-shaped tomb placed there to preserve the memory of a domestic who had served the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th Lords, as page and servant, with fidelity and zeal. The monument bears upon it a brass plate, with the following inscription:—

*“ Here lyeth John Richardson under this wall,  
A faithful true servant at Turvey Old Hall,  
Page to the first Lord Mordaunt of fame,  
Servant to Lewis, Lord Henry, and John:  
Payneful and careful and just to them all  
Till death toke his lyfe,  
God have mercy on his soule. Amen.”*

John, 5th Lord Mordaunt and 1st Lord Peterborough, had two sons, the elder, Henry 2nd, Lord Peterborough, was with Richard Rands, Rector of Turvey, co-author of “Halstead’s Succinct Genealogies,” published in London,



1685, which gives an account of the origin and history of the Mordaunts and the families with which they intermarried, a curious and valuable work, of which only 24 copies were printed. The younger, John, was by Charles II. raised to the peerage by the titles of Viscount Mordaunt of Ryegate and Viscount Avalon. His son Charles, afterwards 3rd Earl of Peterborough, the subject of this sketch, was born in 1657.

Of the boyhood of Charles Mordaunt little is known. In 1674, at the age of 16, he joined the navy, and some years later entered the army. Meantime (year 1675) when about 17 years of age, he succeeded his father as Lord Mordaunt. Returning to England in 1677 he fell in love with and married the daughter of Sir Alexander Fraser, of Durris in Mearns, Scotland; a lady with whom to her dying day he continued in cordiality, though from all accounts he was not the most constant of husbands. Shortly after his marriage he embarked on a frigate bound for the Mediterranean, and took part in operations against the Barbary pirates. 1680 saw him at the relief of Tangiers, but from this date to 1705, with the exception of service in the Low Countries in 1692 when he commanded the Royal Horse Guards, his life was of a civilian character. In politics he was a Whig, and hostility to the House of Stuart was one of the few things to which he was consistent through life. He had contracted an early friendship with Lord Russell and Algernon Sydney, whose principles he had imbibed, and it is matter of surprise that he did not share their fate, or, at least, suffer some kind of punishment; for, at the time of their execution, he took no pains to shield himself, but on the contrary fearlessly expressed his opinions. As a

soldier and a sailor Mordaunt had already attained distinction ; he was also well-known as a wit and a scholar ; and now he was to become prominent on account of his parliamentary eloquence. The question at issue just then was whether or not England should have a standing army. Mordaunt argued fiercely against the court party, maintaining that the only purpose of a standing army was “ for subverting our laws, and establishing that arbitrary power which is so justly abhorred by Englishmen.” He had the nation to back him, for the English had received too severe a lesson from the despotic actions of Cromwell’s officers not to dread a permanently embodied armed force. Add to this the fact that the officers of the small standing army then in existence were Roman Catholics, also the assumption of the time that these officers were ever ready to carry out the wishes of their arbitrary master (James II.)

Being in open and declared hostility with the court party, all chance for Mordaunt of public employment in England was at an end ; so in 1686 he asked and obtained leave to serve abroad. The same year he set out for Holland, and it is stated that he was the first Englishman of any position or note who openly invited William of Orange to England ; though William was far-seeing enough to know that affairs were not then ripe for a revolution. Mordaunt, however, became the prince’s most trusted friend, and when at length (October 1688) the invasion took place, rendered him most important services. Soon after William’s accession Mordaunt was raised to the peerage by the title of Earl of Monmouth, but though he at first enjoyed much royal favour, his influence with the King gradually declined, and at length William became

totally estranged from him. One of the causes of this estrangement was the extraordinary part Mordaunt played in what is known as the "Fenwick Plot." This affair is too complicated for us to enter into, so we shall content ourselves with recording that the result of the investigations into it in so far as they affected Mordaunt was that he was "turned out of all his places, his name was struck out of the Council Book, and he was imprisoned until the end of the session in the Tower."

Nothing, however, could subdue the elasticity of his nature. It is true that he endured his imprisonment with little patience, but it never entered his mind (as it would have into the minds of many) to regard the ruin of his fame and fortunes as irreparable. He had one of those spirits "on whom the deepest wound leaves no scar."

In 1697 on the death of his uncle, Mordaunt had succeeded to the title of Earl of Peterborough—along with a portion of the family estates. Unfortunately, however, the greater part of the property, including the beautiful place of Drayton, was left to the old Earl's only daughter, the Duchess of Norfolk (afterwards the wife of Sir John Germaine); which alienation proved to Peterborough for many years a source of the most bitter mortification.

## II. COMMANDER IN SPAIN.

William of Orange died in 1702. Anne succeeded. And now we arrive at the most eventful epoch in Peterborough's life. The war of the Spanish succession had commenced, the object of which on the part of the allies (England, Holland, and the Empire) was to place on the throne of Spain the Archduke of Austria, to the exclusion

of the nominee and grandson (Philip V. of Spain) of Louis XIV. of France ; by which means they hoped to preserve the balance of power in Europe. In 1702 occurred the affair of Vigo Bay, which resulted in the capture by the English of a number of Spanish treasure ships. Marlborough in 1704 crippled the power of France at the great battle of Blenheim. In 1707 the English Government decided to send an expedition to Spain, and Mordaunt was appointed to the leadership. His troops, Dutch and English, numbered in all 5,000. After touching at Lisbon, where he took on board the Archduke Charles, he proceeded to Valencia ; and hence, but for the opposition of the Archduke, who considered the scheme too daring, would have marched straight to the capital in the hope of finishing the war at one blow. From Valencia they proceeded to Barcelona, and now occurred one of the most brilliant actions in the annals of warfare. To enter properly into this affair, and to record Peterborough's stratagems and valorous deeds, would take too much space ; but we strongly recommend the reader who desires to be made acquainted with the particulars of this famous exploit, to consult the pages of Colonel Russell. Briefly then, in spite of the wretched incompetency and the contemptible behaviour of the other leaders, and in spite of other difficulties, seemingly insuperable, he succeeded in making himself master first of the fortification of Monjuich, and afterwards of the town itself. In the words of Macaulay, "The genius and energy of one man supplied the place of forty battalions," and "Peterborough had the glory of taking with a handful of men one of the largest and strongest cities of Europe." From Barcelona he marched to Valencia, taking towns and fighting battles

on his way ; then, a few days after his arrival, hearing of the near approach of a body of reinforcements to the Spanish general, he set out against them in the dead of night, and with only 1,200 men, defeated an army of 4,000.

A large army of Spainards now arrived in Catalonia, and Barcelona was attacked at the same time by land and sea. Peterborough marched after them, but it would have been madness for him to give battle of such numbers, especially as they were under the conduct of a Marshall of France. To many, indeed, it seemed that Peterborough's outlook was exceedingly desperate. But times of danger were those in which he exhibited his finest qualities.

And most his fortune and success were seen  
 With means the most inadequate and low ;  
 Most master of himself, and least encumbered,  
 When overmatched, entangled and outnumbered.

After harassing the enemy as much as he could with incessant alarms, cutting of stragglers, and introducing supplies into the town, Peterborough put himself on board one of the ships of the English Squadron, and by a clever movement, which almost resulted in the capture of the French fleet, relieved Barcelona. Having accomplished this, he returned to Valencia. The Earl of Galway, the leader of the Allies on the western portion of Spain, a sluggish man and an incapable general, inspired with emulation by Peterborough's successes, marched towards the capital, took several towns on his way, entered Madrid in triumph, and in its streets proclaimed the Archduke king of Spain. "It seemed that the struggle had determined in favour of the Archduke, and that nothing remained for Philip but a prompt flight into the dominions of his grandfather." The sequel, however, was otherwise.

The conquerers discovered that the country, which they thought they had subdued, was all in arms behind them. Their communications were cut off, and the people of Castile were rallying with enthusiasm round Philip. Once again Peterborough would have marched to Madrid, but his proposals were rejected by the foolish Charles. As a consequence, Peterborough remained in Valencia trifling away his time, and getting what pleasure he could out of that beautiful city. Meantime, the enemy had compelled Galway to retreat. Peterborough then laid before the Archduke a plan for regaining the city. The plan was rejected. This was the last straw. Peterborough could stand it no longer. Disgusted with the whole affair, he quitted the army, left the Archduke to do as he could, and set out for Italy. "From that moment to the end of the campaign the tide of fortune ran strong against the Austrian cause." In January, 1707, Peterborough returned once more to Spain, this time merely as a volunteer. His advice was asked. It was, as usual, freely and unreservedly given. But, as usual also, and to the utter ruin of the Austrian cause, it was rejected. Peterborough had now received formal letters of recall from the Home Government, and, before the new campaign had opened, he departed for England. In his summary of Peterborough's conduct in Spain, Lord Macaulay remarks—"Scarcely any general had ever done so much with means so small. Scarcely any general had ever displayed equal originality and boldness." The supreme command in Spain was given to Lord Galway, which incapable general, in 1707, encountering the Duke of Berwick on the field of Almanza, lost in a few hours 18,000 men, 120 standards, and all his artillery—a battle that decided the fate of Spain.

We may here fitly pause a moment and say something of Lord Peterborough's character, or rather quote Lord Macaulay's admirable summary of it. After calling him the most extraordinary character of his age, and describing him as a polite, learned, and amorous Charles XII. (Sweden), he says: "His courage had all the French impetuosity, and all the English steadiness. His fertility and activity of mind were almost beyond belief. They appeared in everything that he did—in his campaigns, in his negotiations, in his familiar correspondence, in his lightest and most unstudied conversation. But his splendid talents and virtues were rendered almost useless to his country, by his levity, his restlessness, his irritability, his morbid craving for novelty and for excitement. "Repose was insupportable to him. He loved to fly round Europe faster than a travelling courier. He was at the Hague one week, at Vienna the next. Then he took a fancy to see Madrid; and he had scarcely reached Madrid, when he ordered horses and set off for Copenhagen." In the words of his friend Dean Swift, written after 1707—

Mordanto fills the trump of fame,  
The Christian world his deeds proclaim,  
And prints are crowded with his name.

In journeys he outrides the post,  
Sits up till midnight with his host,  
Talks politics, and gives the toast.

Knows every prince in Europe's face,  
Flies like a squib from place to place,  
And travels not, but runs a race.

From Paris gazette *à la main*  
This day arrived, without his train,  
Mordanto in a week from Spain!

A messenger comes all a-reek,  
Mordanto at Madrid to seek ;  
He left the town above a week.

Next day the post-boy winds his horn,  
And rides through Dover in the morn :  
Mordanto's landed from Leghorn !

Mordanto gallops on alone,  
The roads are with his followers strown,  
This breaks a girth, and that a bone :

A skeleton in outward figure,  
His meagre corps, though full of vigour,  
Would halt behind him were it bigger.

“ He was,” continues Macaulay, “ the last of the knights-errant, brave to temerity, liberal to profusion, courteous in his dealings with enemies, the protector of the oppressed, the adorer of women.” Even the Duchess of Marlborough, though for the most part his enemy, was unable to resist the fascination of his wit and the charm of his manner. No man of his time was better known. He was ever indulging in some wild freak or other, a spirit of fun and malicious humour frequently held mastery over him, his eccentricities were proverbial, and his wild freaks adds one of his biographers “ were funds of frequent trouble to himself and amusement to his contemporaries.”

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### III. LOVE AND LITERATURE.

Upon Peterborough's return from Spain he was received coldly, many of his proceedings, especially his retiring to Italy without orders, having given displeasure to the Ministry ; and his conduct was the subject of protracted



inquiry in both Houses of Parliament. The discussion lasted ten days, but in the end the charges against him fell to the ground. Subsequently, a change of ministry having taken place, he was complimented and thanked, and, in addition, substantially rewarded.

The years 1709 and 1710 were sad ones. In the former the Earl lost his wife, and also his second son Henry; and in the latter occurred the death of his eldest son John, a Colonel in the Grenadier Guards. Lady Peterborough and both these sons are buried in the family vault at Turvey.

Subsequent to this, although Peterborough acted at different times as ambassador to various European States, there is little of interest to record in his public life; we shall therefore pass over it, and endeavour to get some glimpses of him at Parson's Green, Fulham, where he had a charming villa (Peterborough House) surrounded with pleasure-grounds and gardens; at Bevis Mount, a romantic cottage which he owned on Southampton Water; and at those resorts of the wits and scholars of the day—the famous coffee-houses.

First, however, a word about his second marriage. The Earl's fondness for the fair sex certainly did not decline as he grew advanced in years. About 1717 he was united to Anastasia Robinson, a young and charming woman, and a celebrated stage singer, at whose shrine he had for years been a worshipper; giving her, as Col. Russell puts it, "what there yet remained of his battered old heart." But the marriage was not made known to the world until a short time previous to his death. Fond as he was of his new lady (and his devotion to her to the last no one can doubt), it was not in Peterborough to restrain himself

from tender feelings towards other ladies also. His letters to one of the ladies with whom he coquetted, Mrs. Howard (afterwards Countess of Suffolk), have been published, and are a most curious mixture of earnest and acting—"high flown compliments, profound bows, vows, sighs, and ogles." "Henrietta Howard accepted the noble Earl's philandering, answered the queer love-letters with due acknowledgment, made a profound courtesy to Peterborough's profound bows, and got John Gay to help her in the composition of her letters in reply to her old \*knight." And this was when Peterborough, "that indomitable youth" as Thackeray calls him, was seventy years old. In one of his letters the Earl acknowledges the susceptibility of his heart in verse—and he could throw off very good lines when in the mood:—

I said to my heart between sleeping and waking,  
 Thou wild thing, that always art leaping or aching,  
 What black, brown, or fair, in what clime, in what nation,  
 By turns has not taught thee a pit-a-patation ?

From love we turn to literature, and it is in connection with his friendship with the leading men of letters of the day that Peterborough appears in one of his most favourable lights. After his return from Spain he was very much in the company of Pope, Swift, Bolingbroke, Gay, and other well-known authors, and his correspondence with the first two extends over a large number of years. It is in the midst of his remarks on this literary coterie, and their meetings at the coffee-houses and Parson's Green, that Thackeray takes occasion to deliver himself of the following admirable counsel to the young:—"Try," says

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\* Thackeray.

he, "to frequent the company of your betters. In books and life, that is the most wholesome society; learn to admire rightly; the great pleasure of life is that. Note what the great men admired; they admired great things: narrow spirits admire basely and worship meanly. I know nothing in any story more gallant and cheering than the love and friendship which this company of famous men bore towards one another. There has never been a society of men more friendly, as there never was one more illustrious." Peterborough's letters to Pope overflow with wit, and his letters to Swift are equally good. It was a letter-writing age; and Peterborough, like some of his contemporaries, bestowed as much care upon his epistolary compositions as an author does now-a-days in writing a book. In a letter dated Jan. 10th, 1713, Swift writes:—"At seven this evening, as we were sitting after dinner at the Lord Treasurer's, a servant said Lord Peterborough was at the door. The Lord Treasurer and Lord Bolingbroke went out to meet him, and brought him in. . . . He is at least sixty, and has more spirits than any young man I know of in England. He has got the old Oxford Regiment of Horse, and I believe will have a garter. I love the hang-dog dearly."

Good as may have been the talk at the coffee-houses—and Peterborough was a great frequenter of them—we like best to think of the Earl in his place at Parson's Green, or at Bevis Mount. At the former, especially, things went gloriously. The dinner parties given there were among the most memorable occurrences of the day. The Earl himself was head cook, and that circumstance alone was sufficient guarantee for the excellence of the dishes, for during his Spanish campaign he had made

himself thoroughly acquainted with the art of cooking—his knowledge of which, on more than one occasion in his journeyings, he had good reason to be thankful for; and though he did not parade his culinary knowledge, he was never ashamed of it, nor of the cook's dress in which he superintended operations. But the viands, though delectable, were not the chief source of pleasure. The guests were entertained with the finest music that the most gifted artists of the day could produce, Peterborough delighted everyone with his witty conversation, and his amusing anecdotes of his adventures; and the Earl's brilliant guests were not the men to allow conversation to flag that had once been well started, nor to hold by the reins their piquant talk or their hilarity. Then there were the grounds. On September 1st, 1711, Swift speaks of the fruit garden as the finest he had ever seen about London, and says there were abundance of hot walls for grapes, which were ripening fast. We have spoken of Peterborough's intimacy with Pope, Swift, and other men of letters; but it should be pointed out, too, that he was something of a writer himself. Little that he wrote however is now in existence. Horace Walpole, who includes him among "Royal and Noble Authors," speaks of him as "one of those men of careless wit and negligent grace who scatter a thousand bon-mots and idle verses, which we painful compilers gather and hoard till the owners stare to find themselves authors."

Peterborough, it appears, always had a hankering after the fame of an author; and in connection with his remarks on this trait in his character, Col. Russell tells a tale concerning the Earl's dealings with Voltaire, who was at the time his guest—a tale which reveals the latter in great

odiousness, and which, when we reflect also on the treachery with which Voltaire behaved to other of his benefactors, we are not very likely to disbelieve. The Earl wished to publish a book, and he "commissioned his guest Voltaire, who was more or less connected with literary work, to act as an intermediary between himself and the publisher. With this object he supplied Voltaire from time to time with various sums of money, intended to defray the cost of publication as it went on. The publisher received the first instalment only, and on the strength of this put a portion of the book in type. No more money, however, was forthcoming, and he was told by Voltaire that Peterborough objected to advance him anything further until the book actually came out. The publisher consequently was obliged to stop the publication for want of funds, which it had been agreed that he should receive; till at last, justly thinking that he had been hardly treated, he determined to brave an interview with the Earl himself, and to remonstrate with him personally on his breach of agreement. Then it all came out. It appears that Voltaire had appropriated the money, which had been given him regularly according to promise, while he had accounted for the delay in the publication of the work by blaming the publisher for his slowness and procrastination. It may be supposed that Peterborough, whose naturally quick temper had not been softened by age, on learning the treachery and dishonesty of his guest, became perfectly frantic. As bad luck would have it, Voltaire happened to come in while the interview was taking place and narrowly escaped with his life, as Peterborough drew his sword and rushed at him. Voltaire, however, managed to escape from the house, and concealed himself in a neighbouring

village during the night. The next day he returned to London, and almost immediately afterwards left England for the Continent."

At Bevis Mount, "his little Amoret" as he called it, Peterborough arranged some of his old guns, flags, and other spoils from Spain; and it is to these Pope makes allusion in his first epistle to Lord Bolingbroke:—

Our generals now, retired to their estates,  
Hang their old trophies o'er the garden gates.

In 1735 Peterborough, who for several years had been a martyr to a most painful disease, submitted to a dangerous operation; and in order to receive benefit from the warmer climate, he was advised to visit Lisbon. He reached his destination, but no improvement in his health took place, and on October the 25th of the same year he passed away. His remains were brought to England and interred in the family vault at Turvey church. Over the vault is a brass with the following brief inscription to his memory:—

*"Quod mortale fuit Caroli Comitis de Peterborough et  
sex suorum avorum hoc sepulchro jacet."*

In 1852, whilst alterations were being made in the chancel, two vaults belonging to the Mordaunt family were opened. They contained six coffins of lead and two leaden cists. The coffin of "The Great Earl" was found to be inscribed thus:—"The Right Honble. Charles, Earl of Peterborough and Monmouth, General of the Marines and Knight of the most noble order of the Garter, died at Lisbon, Oct., 1735, aged 78." The vaults were again carefully closed, and strong arches of stone thrown over them. The portion of the church above them is now the

organ chamber. The title of Earl of Peterborough and most of the honours of the family became extinct in 1814.

Excellent portraits of Peterborough are still in existence, but even without them we should be able to picture with tolerable accuracy the famous man who was so well known and so often described by his contemporaries, the "meagre, thin, wasted, little man," who, in spite of his eccentricities, his weaknesses, and his numerous shortcomings, will ever be regarded as one of England's greatest sons.

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#### ROE FAMILY, OF BEDS. AND HERTS.

The following account of this family is now printed for the first time from MS. notes inserted on the fly-leaves of a small book intituled "A Brief Exposition of ye Assemblies' Catechism occasioned by setting it up in my church in Bartholomew Close, Octob. 13th, 1706."

[The Rev. Anthony Burges, A.M., was Rector of the above church in Bartholomew Close from 26 Aug. 1663 to August 1709.]

The volume was long in the possession of the Roe Family, and contains a silhouette of the Rev. Samuel Roe, with the book-plate of its last owner, H. O. Roe, Esq., of Baldock, Herts.

WILLIAM ROE, M.A., of Trinity College, Camb. B.A. 1702, M.A. 1716. Rector of Pitchford and Frodesley, (near Shrewsbury) was born 16 Nov. 1683 and married Nov. 30 1708 at Magdalen Laver, Essex, by virtue of licence, Isabella, dau of Christopher Cooper, Vicar of Bishop Stortford, Herts (baptized there 20 Nov. 1689) He died of the small-pox 16 July 1741, *ætatis* 57. His wife died 13 May 1771 aged 82.

- 1.—WILLIAM died a bachelor 4 April 1761, aged 51 years.
- 2.—SAMUEL (of whom anon).
- 3.—CHRISTOPHER, born Nov. 1713, died 12 Nov. 1797 aged 84.

1746 Ellen, dau of Thomas and Ann Roberts. He died at Stotfold May 30 1780, about eleven o'clock at night, aged 68 years and was buried in the churchyard the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of June following.

His wife, born 25 July 1722, died 15 Aug. 1812 aged upwards of 90 years, and was buried 21 Aug. at Stotfold on the right hand side of her husband.

- 1.—ELIZABETH, born at Wednesbury in Staffordshire 10 Aug. 1747 died at Baldock 14 October 1836 in the 90<sup>th</sup> year of her age.

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## GOSTWICKE FAMILY OF WILLINGTON.

The following abstracts of Wills, &c., will help to throw some light on the history of one of the oldest families of the county, of which nothing now remains but their monuments in the Gostwicke Chapel at Willington Church. In Wotton's *English Baronetage*, I. 238, and in Burke's *Extinct and Dormant Baronets*, p. 223, will be found pedigrees of this family, but there are important discrepancies which want clearing up. There is also a Gostwicke pedigree in Raine's *History of North Durham*, which I have not yet seen. The pedigree in the *Visitations of Bedfordshire*, Harl. Soc., Vol. xix., p. 32, is anything but trustworthy. With the help of these wills, of the Bishops' Transcripts, and of monumental inscriptions I have been enabled to rectify materially the pedigrees above referred to, but much yet remains to be done to attain to anything like accuracy and completion. Branches appear to have settled at Marston Morteyne and Shefford. There was also a Robert Gostwicke, Mayor of St. Albans in 1587, whom I have not yet identified. The registers of Willington do not commence till 1676, so that, unfortunately, they throw no light on the early history of this

family. They bore for their arms—Argent, a bend gules cotised sable between six Cornish choughs proper, beaked and membered of the second; on a chief azure, three mullets or. On the tomb of Sir John Gostwick, in Willington Church, it will be noticed that the chief is charged with three horses' heads, coupéd argent, bridled or; this was granted to him, as Master of the Horse to Cardinal Wolsey. A sketch of this tomb and Latin inscription, and also one of the tomb of Sir William Gostwicke will be found in Fisher's *Bedfordshire Antiquities*. There is another interesting epitaph connected with this family, containing a chronogram, a kind of epitaph, usually in Latin, in which the tall capitals, added together, give the date. They appear to have come into use in the 17th century. I cannot do better than here quote the description of it given in the last number of the Journal of the "Society for Preserving Memorials of the Dead":—

“On the north wall of the chancel aisle in Willington Church, appropriated to the Gostwick family, is a conspicuous monument [bearing the date 1541, probably the period of its erection] which represents the kneeling figures of a knight, his lady, and their children. The inscriptions engraved on the tablets are as follows:—

*'To the memories of Sir Edward Gostwyke Knt. and Baronet, and Dame Anna his wife, eldest daughter of John Wentworth of Gosfield in Essex, Esqr., by whom he had issue 3 sonnes and 5 daughters. (They lived vertuously and died religiously). Shee in her widowhood like a true Turtle never joying after his departure till her dyinge Day.'*

*As a bright example of fidelity and social love, this marble  
 is inscribed with the name of Gostwyk. They lived equal in  
 piety and second to none. The one was quite wrapt up in the  
 love of the other. He first yielded to fate, that she might not  
 yield. She, however, was not a whit behind her husband in  
 love. He, when he had numbered both thrice and four times  
 six years [42], said, ‘O Anna, I have lived out my days,’  
 and fell asleep. She, when she had completed the years of  
 her beloved husband, said, ‘O Edward, I have lived out mine,’*

*and fell asleep. Thus they lived alike in mind, husband and wife; thus in life and mind alike they fell asleep.*

Here it will be observed, the first chronogram tells us in four words who is dead; those words contain also the date in Roman numeral letters. The second chronogram tell in a few words that the lady died soon after, and they also contain the date, and each contains the exact number of numeral letters required. I must here direct attention to the word 'conjungier' in the second chronogram; it is the archaic form of the infinite 'conjungere,' the usual form of the word which would not suit the chronogram; another letter 'I' was wanted to make the date, and the word which appears in the chronogram was consequently adopted: it contains the required letter and preserves the precise meaning intended. The word 'Turtle' in the English part of the inscription means the Turtle-dove, the bird noted for the constancy of its affection. The Gostwick family had been settled in the parish of Willington for about 400 years, when in 1529 John Gostwick bought the Manor of Willington of the Duke of Norfolk. Then continuing in succession until 1731, the last Sir William Gostwick, 'impoverished by the folly of political contests,' sold the property to Sarah, Duchess of Marlborough, who sold it to the Duke of Bedford. The Gostwick family is said to be now extinct. I saw this, and other Gostwick monuments in Willington Church, six years ago, when they were all in fair condition considering the lapse of time; they are duly cared by the Vicar and the persons employed about the church "

Burke, in a foot-note, says—"John Gostwyck and William Gostwyck were farmers of the fishery of the river Ouse



and of the coney warren of Willington in the 12th of Henry VII., as appears by an original account of the manor, then belonging to Thomas Howard, Earl of Surrey." Also "In Barnes's Edward III. mention is made of William Gostwick, who was taken prisoner in 1373, with several English knights and esquires, by the French, near Soissons, after having fought valiantly." There are, I believe, two (?) xivth century brasses, to the memory of Robert and Joanna Gostwick; I have not had an opportunity of seeing them, but judging from the inscriptions, copies of which I have, they would appear to have been put up at a much later period, for the style is not that of the xivth century; they are not referred to in Haines's *Manual of Monumental Brasses*. William Gostwick, sheriff for co. Beds. in 1595, was created a Baronet by King James I., 25th Nov., 1612; the title is supposed to have become extinct in the person of Sir William, the 5th Bart., who died s.p. in 1766. The Editor will be glad to hear from anyone possessing documentary evidence relating to this family. F. A. B.

Proved 4 July 1766 before the Judge by Dame Loveday Gostwyck, widow, Relict & sole extrix. to whom admon. granted, the probate of the said will of the said deceased by the name of Sir William Gostwyck last month to the said extrix. having been first brought in voluntarily & declared null & void as by Acts of Court will appear.

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The Sir Edward Gostwicke whose epitaph is printed on p. 179 was privately married at Gosfield Hall, as appears by an extract from the parish registers of Gosfield:—

## ANDERSON OF EYWORTH.

In the latest number of *Gloucestershire Notes and Queries* reference is made to a portrait of Miss — Elton, daughter of Ambrose Elton, of the Hazel, in the County of Hereford, Esq. "The said — Elton married Sir John Anderson, of Saint Ives, in the County of Huntingdon, Baronet, son of Sir Francis Anderson, of Eyworth, in the County of Bedford, Knight, by his second Lady, Audrey Botelar, daughter of John Botelar, Lord Botelar, of Bramfield, in Hertfordshire." (*Glouc. N. & Q.*, Vol. 4, p. 110.)

On a reference to the pedigree of Anderson of Eyworth, at page 75 of the Harl. Society's issue of the *Visitation of Bedfordshire* in 1634, Sir John Anderson, Knight and Baronet, third son of Sir Francis, is mentioned as having died "without yssue," but no mention is made of his marriage. In Burke's *Extinct and Dormant Baronetcies*, 1844, page 9, it is stated that John Anderson, Esq., of St. Ives, in Huntingdonshire, who was created Baronet 3rd January, 1628, died without issue in 1630, and the title became extinct. I shall be glad to hear of some confirmation of this marriage, and to be informed to which of the numerous daughters of Ambrose Elton the statement refers.

ANCIENT INDENTURE RELATING TO LANDS  
&c AT BEDFORD.

25 HENRY VI. 1446.

Be it known to all men now and hereafter that I Robert Ratele of Stacheden (Stagsden) have given, granted, and by this present Indenture confirm to John Worsle (Worsley) of Potynho (Putnoe) and Johanna his wife one tenement and eighteen acres of land with the appurtenances thereof situate in the town and lands of Bedford, of the which the said tenement called Tannerys is situated in the parish of St Peter de Merton in Bedford aforesaid between the tenement late of William Barton on the north and as far as the brook on the south or from Kings street to Sannedych.

Now, of the aforesaid acres of land ten acres lie together in the Bury field in the aforesaid parish of St Peter adjoining land of the Rector of St Peter's Church on the west and two acres of land are situate together in the same tract of ground under Clapham Hill between the land of Thomas Kempster on the east and the land of the Prior

and Convent of Newnham on the other side and six acres of land are situate in the same tract between land lately (in the holding) of John Muryell on the west. Which tenement and land with the appurtenances thereof I have lately acquired by lease of John Bowlearung, Robert Wassylen, John Cras, William Bette, and Thomas Kempster. The aforesaid tenement and land with all the appurtenances thereof to be had and to be held by the aforesaid John Worsle and Johanna his wife (in fee of the supreme lord and to render their due and accustomed services) in the form and under the condition following, that is to say that the aforesaid John Worsle and Johanna his wife pay by self or agent to me the said Robert Ratele or my authorized attorney heirs or executors twenty pounds sterling good and lawful English money in the manner herinafter written, to wit,—On the feast of St Michael Archangel next ensuing or within fifteen days six marks. And so from year to year and feast to feast (being warned of the same) or within fifteen days, six marks, until the aforesaid twenty pounds be fully paid. And if there should be default of payment of the aforesaid twenty pounds in part or in whole, contrary to the form above mentioned, or if the aforesaid John Worsle and Johanna, his wife, their heirs or assigns or any of these should make a waste or effect a sale in the aforesaid tenement and land with their appurtenances until the twenty pounds aforesaid shall have been fully paid to me the aforesaid Robert my heirs and executors, then it will be lawful and be it hereby lawful for me the aforesaid Robert my heirs and assigns to re-enter into and to have back and to possess all the aforesaid tenement and land with all appurtenances and to retain the same in my former state, the present indenture and the seisin

accruing from it notwithstanding. In witness thereof I have put my seal to one part of this indenture in the presence of the aforesaid John Worsle and Johanna his wife, and to the other part of the same indenture the aforesaid John Worsle and Johanna his wife have in the presence of me affixed their seals.

Witnessed by Thomas Kempston Mayor of the Town of Bedford, John Spery and John Arthur bailiffs of the Liberty of the town aforesaid, William Hunte Robert Colyer and others. Given at Bedford aforesaid on the twelfth day of the Month of May in the twenty fifth year of the reign of Henry VI. after the Conquest.

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#### BLUNHAM.

The following curious inscription is painted on a diamond shaped board apparently, from the style of lettering, of foreign workmanship; above the lettering is a shield, quarterly of four; 1 & 4—Sable, a chevron ermine between three lions ? passant; 2 & 3—Sable, a lion passant between six crossed crosslets or. The first quarter probably represents the arms of HILL of Silsoe, which are—Sable a chevron ermine between three cats argent, and doubtless the Thomas Hill referred to was a member of that family—possibly son of Edward Hill of Silsoe, by Mary, his wife, da. of Nicholas Denton of the same place, see *Visitation of Beds.* 1634, p. 118, ed. Harl. Soc. Sir Calisthenes Brooke was of co. Kent. The inscription is in an obscure corner of the church, partly hidden by the organ, and so likely to escape notice. Perhaps some correspondent could throw some light on the history of the people named.

Also I wol that after my deces my meyne meynall be kepte to geders in houshold in the maner of Danbury a quarter of a yeer of tho that wol be gouerned. And for to fulfille this my last wil of this testament I praye and ordene and make myn executors Sir John Depeden person of Southcherch, Sir Richard Valdryan p'son of Colmoord, Sir Stephen coy person of fflowlyng, Sir water holybreed person of clifton and to hem I bequethe and yeue all the goodes and katell that I haue other shal haue at my deyinge. And also I wol that my welbeloved cosyn maist. Raynold kentwood Dene of the chirche of poules in london be

sup'uisor of my testament as my ful truste is in hym right sp'ially And also I wol that Sir William Babyngton knyght be another sup'uisour of my saide testament written and enseelled vnder the seel of myn armes at Danbury in the counte of Essex the day and yeres abouesaide.

## ELSTOW.

There has recently been published "An Account of the Church and Parish of St. Giles, without Cripplegate, London," by Mr. J. J. Baddeley, Churchwarden of the Parish, the proceeds of which are for the benefit of certain charitable institutions. The Church is historically interesting as being the burial-place of Milton, Speed, Fox, Frobisher, Glover, Smyth, and many other public men. The volume is well brought out, being illustrated with woodcuts, and facsimiles which greatly enhance the value of the book, and the price, 10s. 6d., is moderate enough to enable all who take delight in such works to add the same to their libraries.

There are few topographical works published which will not, on perusal, yield something of interest beyond the confines of the places treated of, and in this instance, the reader will find a monumental description relating to the Crompton family, formerly of Elstow, whose pedigree was entered in the *Heralds' Visitation* of this County in 1669; it is as follows:—

*"In memory of MARY, Daughter of  
ROBERT CROMPTON, of Elvestoe in the  
County of Bedford, Esqr., the Pious,  
Charitable, Chaste & most beloved Wife  
of Capt. JOHN PERRY of this Parish, she  
was borne 20<sup>th</sup> of Novembr. 1651,  
Died 25<sup>th</sup> of Feb<sup>r</sup>. 1676. She had two  
Daughters, MARGERETT & MARY  
both here buried in their infancy  
whose death (Shee too much lamen-  
ting) hastened her owne,*

*Here to the Word of God she did attend  
Hence at the call of God Shee shall ascend  
Parents take Heede whilst you yr children love  
Yow doe not him forgett who is above  
Whose are yeir Children: Remember thy  
Sweete Flowers in y<sup>e</sup> Bosomes, Fade away"*

Mr. Baddeley gives the following extracts from the Parish Registers, relating to the foregoing :—

- " Margaret, D. of John Perry, Brewer, buried 23rd November, 1674.  
Mary, D. of Capt. John Perry, Brewer, buried 15th August, 1675.  
Mary, Wife of Capt. John Perry, Brewer, buried 28th February, 1676-7."

On page 138 are some more extracts from the same Registers relating to the Gray family of Wrest Park, as under :—

There are, besides, many names of historical interest to be found in the Registers of this Parish, but the book itself should be read to appreciate the varied amount of information contained in its pages. We hope that Mr. Baddeley's interesting volume will be the precursor of many more of a similar nature.

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#### LATHAM FAMILY OF ELSTOW.

The following interesting particulars with reference to the above family have just been forwarded to me from America; besides the Frances referred to in the letter below, who was baptised at Kempston 15th Feb. 1609, there occur in the Registers of Elstow the baptisms of two other daughters, viz., Elizabeth, bapt. 25 Sept. 1617, and

Sarah, bapt. 11 Oct. 1618. I do not know who was the father of Lewis Latham, but he appears to have had two brothers, viz., William, bur. at Elstow 20 Aug. 1632; will dated 25 July, 1632, in which he desires to be buried in Elstow Church, and bequeaths to his brother Simon 5s., to sister Ursula, wife of William Carter, 40s., to sister Elizabeth, wife of Thomas — 40s., residue to brother Lewis, whom he appoints sole exor.—Pr. at Bedford 1 Sept. 1632; and Simon, of Bletsoe, will dated 22 July, 1642, desires to be buried in Bletsoe Church, bequeaths to s. Oliver £50, now in the hands of Oliver, Lord St. John, of Bletsoe, all his property to be sold and given to wife, whom he appoints sole extrix., if she marry, said property to go to his daughters Frances and Elizabeth.—Pr. at Bedford 19 May, 1649. The Elstow Registers also contain the record of the burial of Lewis, son of Henry Latham, deceased, on 13 Sept. 1657; what relation he was to the above I have not made out. F. A. B.

“Lewis Latham, Gent., Sergeant Falconer to King Charles II., died 1655, May 15, as recorded in the Parish Register of Elstow, which I am informed does not commence till 1641. The will was proved at London 1655, Sep. 1, and I have a copy of the same. A portrait in oil has been preserved through the many generations, and is now in America. I have a photograph from it. Lewis Latham’s daughter Frances came to New England with her 2nd husband Jeremiah Clarke (father of Gov. Walter Clarke, of Rhode Island), and she is buried in Newport Cemetery, having died 1677, Sep. —. The stone is legible. Evidently Lewis Latham was descended from a junior branch of the house of Latham in Lancaster County, for his portrait shows the same coat of arms. The present

Earl of Latham (created 1880), who occupies Latham House, Lancaster, is a descendant, I think, of the early Lathams of Lancaster, through the senior branch. I do not know whether the foregoing is of interest to you, but deeming it possible that it might be I send it. I have not been able to discover the parentage of Lewis Latham, nor his earlier ancestry. It is probable he was kinsman of that Symon Lathom who wrote the 'Falconry' referred to in the *British Encyclopædia* as an authority. Editions of 1615, 1633, and 1652, of this curious work are in the British Museum.

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#### A LADY'S WILL OF THE XVII<sup>TH</sup>. CENTURY.

The following will of Frances Dobson, extracted from the District Registry Office, dealing entirely with personality, is interesting as throwing considerable light on the social life of 200 years ago. Contrasted with wills of the previous century, it shows that a very great advance had been made in the way of luxuries, more so, perhaps, than in education, for the spelling of some of the words appears to have been strictly phonetic, *ex. gr.* "prackticall Chatikism." Testatrix would seem also to have been a votary of fashion for her best fan of feathers which she leaves to her sister Lisle, she admits to be out of fashion, and a large portion of her bequests consists of jewellery. The will is a holograph, apparently in her own handwriting, but bears no date. According to the Luton Registers she was buried 17 Nov. 1680 ; on 15 Mar. 1661 is recorded the burial of Miss Ellen Dobson who may have been some relation of hers ; and in the Bishops' Transcripts of the

Whipsnade Registers is recorded the burial of Johannes Dobson, generosus, on 26 Jan. 1639. The Sir Edward Barkham, mentioned in the will, was of Wainfleete, co. Linc., and was cr. a Baronet 21 July 1661.

Her niece Katherine, d. of William Dobson, of St. Andrew's, Holborn, was wife of Thomas Pomfret, Vicar of Luton ; their marriage license was dated 27 Nov. 1661, and the marriage probably took place at St. Mary, Savoy, her father being at that time dead. What her connection with Luton was I have not been able to ascertain.

Item I giue to the poore of the towne and parish of Luton the sum of fiue pounds to be paid within ten dayes after my death if the mony bee found by mee att my death if not so soone as itt can be gott in.

Item I giue and bequeath to S<sup>r</sup> John Napier my great siluer pott w<sup>th</sup> the couer and also Doctor Frankes pictur and also my ring enameld w<sup>th</sup> black.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Lady Napier his wife a ring of twenty shillings and also my silluer candlestick and my box w<sup>th</sup> seales and waights and to little picturs the on of Mr. James Napier the other of glas, and I giue to Mr. John Napier and to Mr. Theophelus to each of them a ring of ten shillings and to Mrs. Susan Napier I giue my gold Lockett w<sup>th</sup> my Lady Barkham's haire.

Item I giue and bequeath to Mr. Edward Barkham a ring of forty shillings. Item I give and bequeath to my Lady Barkham a ring of twenty shillings and also my best bible w<sup>th</sup> the box itt is in and also my little booke commenly cald the christians pattern and the little pickture that hangs ouer my chest of drawers and I giue to her little daughter my gold Lockett with the pictur of the late king on itt.

Item I give and bequeath to Mr Alexander Napier my little silluer pott w<sup>th</sup> to handles and also my box with seuerall sorts of coynes and my three picturs of S<sup>r</sup> Edward Barkham, his Lady, and child and I give to Mrs. Napier his wife my braclett of my Ladyes hair that is sett w<sup>th</sup> pearle and I giue to ther eldest daughter my gold lockett with Mrs. Penelope Barkhams hair in it.

Item I giue and bequeath to my sister Lysle my best diamon ring that with the death's head on the insid of itt and my desire is that when she dyes shee will giue it to my goddaughter Frances Lysle, also I giue to my sister Lysle more my best cloth gounne and my best red petecote and I desire her that if shee do not weare itt out her selfe before she dyes that shee will leave itt to her goddaughter Katheren Lysle, also I giue my sister Lysle a compleat sute of my best and finest wearing linen and the strongest of my fine aprons and also my best fan of feathers which

tho out of fashion to keepe for my sake with the silluer handle on it.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Nephew John Lyle the some of forty shillings and also my booke of Doctor Frankes sermons, and I giue to his little son my booke of Doctor Hamans praectlicall Chatikism and I giue and bequeath to his to daughters Kathren and Frances Lysle to each of them the som of ten pounds a peece to be payd to them when they are the age of twenty years and able to dispose of it themselues, and I giue more to my god-daughter my paire of fine flaxen sheets which her mother gaue mee and also a paire of fine pillowbears.

Item I giue to my Neece Kathren Constable my fiue best chiores and also my colourd taby petecote and my hollow enameld ring w<sup>ch</sup> wasse my Ladyes.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Sister Haman my other Diamon ring and also my gold bodkin and my mantle with the silluer claspes which my sister Monson gaue me.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Neece Young the ring w<sup>th</sup> the emrod w<sup>ch</sup> her mother gaue me.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Neece Nicholas the sum of fiue pounds.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Neece Cony a ring of ten shillings.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Sister Sharp my best sute of diaper compleat and also my ring w<sup>th</sup> the agat stone cut like a death's head and to her to childeren Isaach and Dorothe I giue to each of them a ring of ten shillings.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Sister Ann Dobson a ring of twenty shillings and to her son John a ring of ten shillings.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Neece Frances Dobson daughter to my brother Beniamin the sum of twenty pounds ether to put her to some good calling wherby she may learn to gett her liuing or elce to be employed for her till shee come to age or be otherwayes preserd by a good match and if it pleas God that she dy before ether of this hapen then my will is that it go amongg my Neece Pomfretts childeren.

Item I giue and bequeath to my Neece Pomfrett my silluer chafing dish and also a paire of fine sheets and fwe hollon pillowe bears and also my feather bed and blankets and what other linen I shall not otherways dispose on.

Item I giue to her seven children the som of £5 a peece and I giue to her eldest daughter Frances Pomfrett a paire of hollon sheets and pillow bears and my fwe hollon table cloth w<sup>th</sup> eleuen fine napkins to itt and my will is that they bee layd up and kept for her till shee haue a house of her owne to us them her selfe.

Item I giue to my Neece Mary Pomfrett my bedstead with the curtains valens chairs stooles and carpetts of purple cloth belonging to itt and my will is that itt bee made very cleane and layd up for her till shee has a house to sett in her selfe.

Item I give to my seruant that shall be with me att the time of my death all my working day clothes of wollen or stufte and also 3 of my strongest stiffs and aprons and 3 of euery sort of my ordinary wearing linen and also a paire of those course sheets shee usually lise in.

Item I give and bequeath to my Nephew Pomfrett a ring of twenty shillings and all my bookes, my mony, and other goods w<sup>ch</sup> I haue not disposed of and do hearby



make and ordain him my sole executor and do desire him to see all this performed according to this my last will and testament, and I humbly desire Sr John Napier that hee will be pleased to see that thes my Legacies he duly performed especially what I haue giuen to the poore children both of my nephew Lysles and poor Frank Dobsons and also of Mr. Pomfretts that itt bee improved and expended for ther futter good ether to place them out or to prouid things necessary to that end.

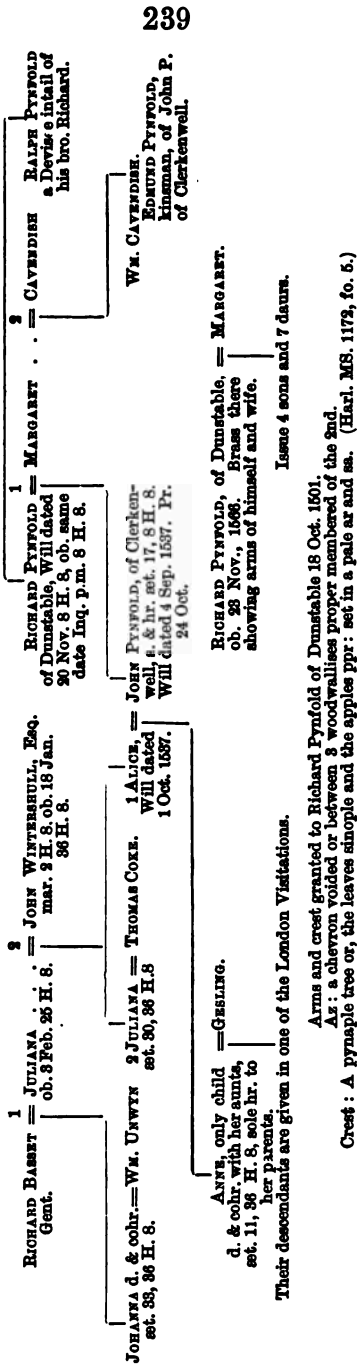

Cuthbert's. Though collated to the Archdeaconry of Bucks., in succession to Robert Newell, in 1643, he was not installed till after the Restoration, 19 July, 1660. He suffered considerable persecution during the troublous times of the Commonwealth and was about six years in prison. Walker says that his persecution was chiefly due to the enmity of Sir Samuel Luke (*Hudibras*). His will (extracted from the District Registry Office, Northampton) is very brief and is, I should say, eminently characteristic of the man, whose faith and constancy, persecution and imprisonment could not shake. In 1642 a complaint was made by the parishioners of S. Cuthbert's that he had engrossed the Rectory, over the head of the Incumbent, but whether this was true or not, I am unable to say. In the Parish Registers of St. Mary are the following notices relating to his family, and in the Church is a brass with the inscriptions given below:— F. A. B.

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#### THE LONG PARLIAMENT.

I am anxious to obtain some information of the Bedfordshire M.P.'s in the Long Parliament. The members returned at the General Election were as follows:—*County* Thomas, Lord Wentworth, 1640; Sir Oliver Luke. *Town*—Sir Beauchamp St. John, William Boteler, Sir Samuel Luke (double return, Luke seated 6 August, 1641). *Changes*—Lord Wentworth was summoned to the House of Peers 25 Nov., 1640. New writ ordered 5 Dec., 1640. Roger Burgoyne then clearly elected He is called "Bart." in

the Blue Book returns, but clearly by mistake ; it should be "Knight," and as he was not knighted until July 18, 1641 (see *Beds. N. and Q.*, part vii., p. 212) he must have been "Esq." only at the date of return. Both Sir O. Luke and Sir R. Burgoyne were "secluded" by Col. Pride, 6 Dec., 1648, and in a Contemporary List of the Parliament taken in May, 1652, the two seats for the County are described as "Vacant." In Bedford Town Sir Beauchamp St. John and Sir Samuel Luke continued to sit until also "secluded" in Dec., 1648, and both seats were "Vacant in 1652. So far all appears plain enough, but in the *Commons Journals* we find under date Nov., 1650, a "Mr. Richard Edwards of Bedfordshire," was admitted to sit in the House. My question is, who was this Mr. Edwards and what became of him? He was *not* sitting for either shire or town in May, 1652. My surmise is that Sir Oliver Luke died soon after the seclusion. He was an old man, having been in Parliament since 1597, and he was certainly dead before 1659. (A Contemporary List of the secluded members living 1659 does not contain his name.) A new writ may then have been ordered, and Edwards elected in his place, but if so, Edwards had died before May, 1652. Both the other secluded members were living in 1659—in fact, Burgoyne did not die till 1677, and Sir S. Luke till 1670. I wish to know the date of Sir Oliver Luke's decease, also that of the Richard Edwards and who he was? Further, I should like to have a few genealogical particulars of William Boteler? He was seated at Biddenham and afterwards knighted.

According to Burke the creation of the Baronetcy in the BURGoyNE family dates from 15th July, 1641.



O'Byrne's *Representative History of Great Britain and Ireland*, London, 1848, part I., p. 24, says that "RICHARD Edwards sat for the county [of Bedford] in the Cromwellian Parliament of 1656. This gentleman's family, now represented by George Nigel Edwards, Esq., of Henlow Grange, has been seated for many generations at Arlesey, the present lord of the manor of which place is Samuel Bedford Edwards, Esq. In this family were also vested the manors of Henlow—Lanthony, and Henlow—Warden, and the manor of Girtford, in the parish of Sandy. Richard Edwards, who died in 1691, is called on the epitaph over his monument in Arlesey, the last Grand Reader of the Temple. Oliver Edwards, of Cardington, a citizen of London, served the office of High Sheriff of Bedford, 12 George II., 1738; George Edwards of Henlow, the maternal uncle of the present representative of the family, the same in 1804; Samuel Bedford Edwards in 1825; and George Nigel Edwards in 1827. The last gentleman who assumed the name of Edwards in lieu of his patronymic Raynsford, on succeeding to his maternal uncle's estates, is a deputy lieutenant for this county."

In Nichols's *Colectanea Topographica et Genealogica* Vol. vi., p. 290, will be found a pedigree of this family, from which it would appear that the Richard Edwards referred to died at Henlow in 1657.

I am not able to give the date of SIR OLIVER LUKE's death. Though there are, in the work last referred to, copious extracts from the parish registers of Hawnes and Cople relating to the Luke family (Vols. III., pp. 85-8; and v., 362-5) the date of his death does not appear. Probably the registers for that period are deficient.

With regard to SIR WILLIAM BOTELER, he appears to

have been knighted at Whitehall the 4th July, 1641. O'Byrne says of him that "he sat for the county in the Cromwellian Parliaments of 1654-56. In what relationship this gentleman stands to the Botelers of Teston we are unable to state, as he is clearly not the Sir William Boteler mentioned in Collins's *Baronetage*, who was created a Baronet 17 Charles I. and who is mentioned by Clarendon in his *History of the Rebellion*, as having raised and armed a regiment in the service of the king, and as having fallen at the battle of Cropedy Bridge, 29th June, 1644."

In the *Visitations of Bedfordshire*, ed. Harleian Society, 1844, the William Boteler above referred to is entered as third son of Sir Oliver Boteler of Sharnebrook, by Anne, only da. and heire of Thomas Borham [or Berham] of Teeson [Teston] co Kent. This statement agrees with Burke's account of the family in his *Extinct and Dormant Baronets*, London, 1884, p. 76, where he states that William Boteler was created a Baronet by King Charles I., 3rd July, 1641, that he married 1631 Joan, da. of Sir Henry Fanshaw, Knt., of Ware Park, Herts., and at the breaking out of the civil war Sir William raised a regiment at his own expense for the service of the King, and was killed at its head in the battle of Cropedy Bridge, 29th June, 1644. The statement of O'Byrne seems to be outweighed by the evidence of the two last-mentioned authorities, and probably arose from confusing the two families of Boteler of Biddenham and Sharnbrook, both being indifferently spelt "Boteler" and "Butler."

## WOBURN.

I have recently purchased a curious little pamphlet entitled "The BLOODY TRAGEDY; or, a dreadful Warning to disobedient Children, giving a sad and dreadful account of one JOHN GILL, in the Town of Woburn in Bedfordshire, who lived a wicked Life." Then comes a short summary of his crimes, how he cut his Father's and Mother's throats, because they would not give him money when he asked for it; and how he robbed the house of plate and money and set fire to the house after violating and murdering the maid-servant. The imprint is "London, Printed by J. Evans and Sons, 42, Long-lane, West Smithfield (Price One Penny)." The pamphlet is a small one, consisting only of one sheet folded 4to. Page 1 is headed "The Life of John Gill," but curiously enough the pamphlet goes on to describe the criminal under the name of Mr. Jones! On page 3 is a rude woodcut representing a man riding on a monster like a dragon, with forked tongue and tail; and on page 6 is a circular woodcut about the size of a crown piece with a portrait, presumably of the criminal, though as these blocks were made to do duty for various purposes, it is quite possible that they have nothing to do with the text. There is no date on the pamphlet, and I should be glad to learn whether the man's name was Gill or Jones, and in what year the events related happened. I should add that the criminal was tried and sentenced to be hanged, after which he was cut down, and his body hung in chains.

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LENT LICENCE.

The following is a *verbatim* copy of an extract from the parish registers of Clophill The Sir Henry Moore, to

whom the licence was granted, was of Fawley, co. Berks., Bart., he resided at Clophill, and Dame Elizabeth his wife was a daughter of William Beverley of Cainhoe; she was married on the 31st day of Dec. 1620, at Clophill. Sir Henry was knighted *circa* 1626-7.

“A Licence given to Sr. Henry More & his Lady Dame Elizabeth for eating flesh for the space of eight Days, upon a Certificate fro’ Mr. John More Dr. of Physicke, yt Abstinence from Flesh would be very pr’iuditious to there health.

The 22d of March 1632.

The same licence renewed Martij 30——Testes.

The same renewed Aprill ye 7o.——Testes.

By me Willia’ Norma’

Minister of the Parish  
of Clophill.”

Documents, like the above, are of rare occurrence, especially of so late a date. It is moreover significant that the ancient discipline of the Church was not entirely disregarded even at that period. F. A. B.

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### DUNSTABLE.

#### ELKANAH SETTLE.

Filed in the Principal Probate Registry, Somerset House, London, is an administration bond of the Archdeaconry Court of Huntingdon, dated 23 Nov. 1683, in the goods of Elkanah Settle, of Hemel Hamstead, Co. Herts., barber, deceased. The administrator is Elkanah Settle, of St. Andrew's, Holborn, in the City of London, gentleman, "his kinsman." The sureties are William Cademan, citizen and bookseller, of London, and Morgan Barber, of the parish of St. Andrew's aforesaid, barber-surgeon. The penalty of the bond is one hundred pounds.

It is not unlikely that the Elkanah Settle last mentioned was identical with the City Poet, the Doeg of Dryden's satire, who was born at Dunstable in 1648, and who died, a pensioner of the Charter-house, in 1724. E. C.

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CRAWLEY FAMILY OF STOCKWOOD, IN  
 LUTON.

The family of Crawley was established in Luton in the reign of Henry VIII., and very possibly earlier. The first mention of the name, I have yet found, is the will of John Crawley 24 May, 1519. In this will, to which no probate is annexed, he expresses a wish to be buried in the church of Luton, "nigh the grave of my father." To his eldest son John he leaves his house at Nether Crawley, "which my mother dwelleth in," and the farm of "Haveryngsholy." To his wife Johan he leaves his house that he dwells in called "plentisse" till Richard his son come of age of 23 years. To his two sons, William and Thomas, his house at Dane Street in Luton. He also mentions two daughters, Johan and Alice. This will appears to be much more interesting and important than that of his brother Edward Crawley, of Luton, single man, and which is quoted by Burke and other editions of the Baronetage under date 1544, since it gives the names of

houses and lands which have been passed down in the Crawley family. When I examined the Crawley pedigree at the Herald's College mention only is made of three sons, viz., Richard, William, and Thomas. No mention being made of the eldest son John Crawley, I cannot help conjecturing that he died unmarried or without children, as we find his brother Richard's son, John Crawley, lord of the manor of Havering and other lands in Luton. John Crawley died circ. 1545, leaving these four sons and two daurs.

1. JOHN Crawley, died probably between 1519 and 1544, no mention being made of him in his Uncle Edward Crawley's will.
2. RICHARD Crawley, of whom presently.
3. WILLIAM Crawley, mentioned in the will of his father, dated 1519, & in that of his uncle Edward Crawley in 1544.
4. THOMAS Crawley, of Dunstable Lane, in Luton, who died in 1581. [Ancestor of the Gloucestershire Crawleys & Crawley-Boeveys.]

Richard Crawley, mentioned above as the 2nd son, but in the Records at the Herald's College described as the eldest son of John Crawley (1519), was a yeoman of Stoppesley, in Luton, and from his will, which bears date 15 June, 1551, proved at Bedford 26 Jan., 1578, he left to his eldest son, William Crawley, his house called "Plentyes" & 7 acres of land. To John Crawley, his 2nd son, he left his house in Luton. He mentions also two more sons, Thomas and Roger, and four daurs., Alice, Julian, Isabel, & Christian. We now revert to the 2nd son, John Crawley, who is thus described in the preamble to the parchment Roll belonging to Mr. John Sambrooke Crawley, the present owner of Stockwood Park, and other lands &

houses in & around Luton. "John Crawley, of Nether Crawley, Lord of the Mannor of Haverings and other lands in the Parish of Luton, in the County of Bedford, Lyeth Buried in the Parish Church of Luton. He was father of Thomas Crawley, of Nether Crawley, who was owner of the said Lands and of many other Lands. The said Thomas married Dorothy, dau. and coh. of John Edgerley, of Milton in the County of Oxford, gentleman, son of Robert Edgerley, of Milton aforesaid, gentleman. The said Thomas Crawley, was Buried in Someris Chappel at Luton [See slab in Luton Church. Died 15 December, 1629]; he was father of Sr. Francis Crawley, Knt., one of the Judges of the Common Pleas, who was seized of the lands aforesaid, and was also by Purchase Lord of Somerys Place in the Parish of Luton, which joyneth the said ancient inheritance of the Crawley's." This Mr. Thomas Crawley had another son Thomas Crawley [Vide "Par. Repr. of St. Mary Woolnoth," London, p. 130,] who was twice married, by his first wife he had two sons, Francis, bapt. 1619, and Thomas, bapt. 1620, and a dau., Sarah, bapt. 1620; by his 2nd marriage with Jane Conisby [md. 21 Nov., 1625,] he appears to have had a dau., Sarah, bapt. at Luton in 1626. To return to the eldest son, Sir Francis Crawley, Knighted by Charles I., at Whitehall, Nov. 4th, 1632. An account is given of this gentleman in Foss's "Judges of England" p. 8, also he is mentioned as voting in favour of granting the ship-money to Charles 1st. by Hallam and other historians. Sir Francis Crawley married Elizabeth, dau. of Sir John Rotherham, Knt., of Somerys Place, in Luton, by his wife Anne, dau. of Thomas Snagge, of Marston Morteyne, Sergeant-at-Law, and died 13th Feb., 1649 [Vide slab in Somerys Chapel of Luton Church,] having had 5 sons and one dau., viz. :

1. JOHN Crawley, Esq., Counsellor of Law, baptised at Luton, 1609, he married in 1632 his first cousin Mary, daur and heir of William Lambert by Mary sister of Sir Francis Crawley, at St. Dunstan's in the W. London, and died without issue in 1638. His widow married afterwards to Sir Edward Bagot, of Blithfield, Co. Stafford, Bart.
2. FRANCIS Crawley, 2nd son, of whom presently.
3. THOMAS Crawley, Doctor of Divinity, Rector of Barton-le-Cley, in Co. Beds., and of Amersham, in Co. Bucks. He died a bachelor, and was buried at Barton May 25th, 1677, in the chancel, where I believe there is a monument to his memory. This gentleman was of Trinity College, Cambridge, taking his degree of [D.D.] S.T.P. per litteras regias 1661.
4. ROBERT Crawley, 4th son, Doctor of Physick [M.D. per litteras regias 1661 of Trinity Hall, Cambridge] of Dunstable, Co. Beds. He married in 1663 Joane, dau. of Richard Taverner, of Hexton, Co. Herts, Gent. His marriage license describes him as being a bachelor, aged about 38, and his wife as a spinster, aged 24, and that they were to be married at Hexton. In the Stockwood Roll they are said to have several children. The parish registers at Dunstable would, no doubt, give the entries of their baptisms. I believe the following are correct :—
  1. John Crawley (1694) son of Robert Crawley of Dunstable, Beds., matriculated as a gent., at Lincoln College, Oxford, in 1688, taking the B.A. degree 27 Oct., 1692. I hope at a future

time to be able to say whether this gentleman left any descendants. [Query.—Who was Thomas Crawley, M.B., of Dunstable, who in 1748 was High Sheriff of Bedfordshire? I fancy he must be the same man who on 17 June, 1734, took his B.A. degree at Corpus Christi College, Oxford, taking his M.A. degree 7 Feb. 1737, and his B.M. 12 March 1742. It is very probable that he may have been a descendant of Dr. Robert Crawley, the fourth son of Sir Francis Crawley, the Judge.]

1. Elizabeth (1694).
2. Mary (1694).
3. Martha (1694).
4. Catherine (1694).
5. NICHOLAS Crawley 5th son died young.
  1. Anne only dau. married Rev. George Parish D.D., Rector of Wel Drake co. York. Bachelor aged 37, she being a spinster aged 35 (Marriage L. dated July 29th 1663. They appear to have been married at Barton-le-Cley co Beds on 5 June 1664). They died without issue.

FRANCIS Crawley, 2nd son, Baptd. 17 March, 1620, who came to be heir, was a Cursitor Baron of the Exchequer temp. Charles II. This gentleman's name appears in a list of Bedfordshire gentlemen who were fit and qualified to be made knights of the Royal Oak, with the value of their estates anno dom. 1660. Francis Crawley, Esq., in this list is stated to have £1000 per annum. He married in . . . Mary, dau. of Richard Clutterbook or Clutterbuck, of London, Merchant. He died 28 Feb., 1683-4, having had 4 sons and 3 daurs.

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#### A BRITISH URN FOUND AT KEMPSTON.

The following is a summary of a note on British Cinerary Urns recently found near the "Hill Grounds" at Kempston, Beds., which was read at a meeting of the Beds. Archæological and Natural History Society on Thursday, 12th Oct., 1888:—In the spring of the present year the workmen employed in the large gravel pit near the Hill Grounds, at Kempston, found some cinerary urns, a drawing of the most perfect example of which I now

lay before the Society. Although there is nothing unusual in the shape or ornamentation of this particular urn, the fact that it is clearly of the so-called British type and that it, and others like it, were discovered in a spot only a few hundred feet from the site of the Anglo-Saxon cemetery, explored some years ago by Dr. Fitch, is noteworthy, as showing that the elevated plateau of Gravel between Bedford and Kempston was used as a place of interment, not only by the Saxon settlers in this neighbourhood, but also, at an earlier period, by the British tribe which inhabited this part of Bedfordshire. This and all the urns were found at a depth of about two feet below the existing surface of the ground. In each case they were inverted, the mouth resting on the gravel, and they were filled with calcined bones and ashes, no traces of any implement or ornament being discovered in connection with them. That of which I give a drawing is in a tolerably perfect condition and is in the possession of Mrs. Charles Williamson, to whom the land belongs. It is of fire-baked clay, of a reddish colour, and is evidently hand-made. Its height is about eight inches, diameter at the top seven inches, and at the bottom four inches. It is rudely ornamented, as you see, by short inclined parallel markings, probably made with a sharply-pointed stick before baking. These urns were found within a few feet of each other on the western side of the field, while the Anglo-Saxon relics, which still occasionally turn up in the form of urns, lie on the eastern, or Bedford, side of it. I suppose we may assume they were originally covered by tumuli which have here, as elsewhere, in the course of centuries been levelled so that now no traces remain of them.

## STAUNTONS OF BIRCHMORE.

Some time back I had lent me by Mr. J. P. Earwaker a curious little volume, entitled "A DIALOGUE: or a DISCOURSE between a Minister and a Stranger, As they were On the *Highway* together, about Soul Affairs. By *Edmund Staunton*, D.D. London, Printed for Tho: Parkhurst, and are to be sold at the Bible and Three Crowns in Cheapside, near Mercers Chappell: And at the Gilded Bible on London-bridge, under the Gate, 1673." The work consists of 197 pp., and prefixed to it is "The LIFE and DEATH of Edmund Staunton, S.T.D." He was son of Sir Francis Staunton, of Birchmore, near Woburn, and was born in or about the year 1600. From this book I have gleaned the following particulars relating to his life. At an early age he was sent to Oxford and admitted to Corpus Christi College, where he made such good use of his time that while he was yet an undergraduate he was chosen a Probationer Fellow before 18 of his seniors (a Bedfordshire place falling void by the death of Mr. Andrews, a Fellow of the house). After he had taken his M.A. degree his father wished him to choose a profession, and he chose that of "Preacher," and one of his earliest efforts was at Witney in Oxfordshire, where he became so popular that the people flocked from all parts to hear him. This popularity seemed rather to displease the Incumbent who tried many devices to mar his success, amongst others that of spinning out the "Common Prayers" to tire the congregation out, and he would even leave the Church before the sermon hoping to induce others to follow, but the only one who followed was his faithful clerk! From Witney he went to Bushey where he stayed about two-years preaching and catechizing. He rebuilt also at his

own charge the Minister's house, and while there married a daughter of Mr. Scudamore, of Watford, by whom he had one daughter. This wife apparently did not live long, for he afterwards married again and had a large family."

Bushey appears to have been a good living for it excited the cupidity of Dr. Seaton, incumbent of Kingston-upon-Thames, who finding a flaw in the title endeavoured to oust him. The Attorney-General, Noy acting for Dr. Seaton, having taken a fancy to Staunton arranged that an exchange should be made. This was agreed upon and Seaton obtained possession of Bushey, but when Staunton tried to get possession of his new living, Seaton demurred and insisted that he should be curate only. By the intervention of Noy and others, Seaton finally relinquished his claim and Staunton was installed at Kingston-upon-Thames. Here he appears to have done good work and to have been very popular. While here he married his second wife. He appears to have lived at this place till 1648; but in the year 1634 he was suspended for refusing to read in his Church the Proclamation permitting sports and pastimes on the Lord's Day. During his suspension he took his degree of D.D. in Oxford. When the Assembly of Divines was called at Westminster, Dr. Staunton was nominated one of the six Preachers at the Abbey. In the year 1648 the Visitors appointed for the University of Oxford discharged Dr. Newlin from the headship of Corpus Christi College, and Dr. Staunton was chosen to succeed him. In 1660 he was discharged, in his turn, from this College and leaving many friends behind him he bent his steps to Rickmansworth, where he established himself for a while and went out preaching at

various places in the neighbourhood, till the passing of the Act of Uniformity 24th August, 1662, silenced him. After this period he appears to have had no settled home, but stayed now at one place, now at another, till he finally come to Bovingdon, a chapelry in the parish of Hemel Hempstead, where he ended his days in the house of a gentleman on the 14th of July, 1671, in the 71st year of his age, after an illness of six days. The writer of his life gives several extracts from a diary kept by Dr. Staunton—one of which I here give:—"When about 14 years old swinging in a rope in my father's kitchen at Birchmore, which was paved with freestone, and of an high roof, which I endeavouring to touch with my back and belly; when I was very high the rope broke, I fell down flat; but anon (the Lord appearing for my help) I brake out into a violent bleeding at the mouth or nose, or both, and so by degrees (through the blessing of God revived and recovered." Again—"When I was Minister of Kingston I drank ink one morning instead of Mascadine, yet had no hurt."

Although a Puritan he regularly kept the days of prayer and fasting with his family; he was also liberal with his means and charitable to the poor. On page 59 is the following:—

"Here lies Interred in the Parish Church of Bovingdon aforesaid, under a fair Stone, with this Epitaph engraven upon it, made by the Reverend Doctor Simon Ford:—

IN MEMORIAM

Eruditi & Sanctissimi Viri

EDMUNDI STAUNTON,

S. T. D.

Qui annum agens Septuagesimum primum Decimo quarto  
die Julij

Anno Domini 1671

Spiritum ejus in manus Domini Jesu

Christi summa pace deposuit.

*Scire cupis, Lector, cujus lapis iste sepulti est ?*

*En lege, summissima, sed lege, voce precor.*

*Se solum nota latuit pietate modestus,*

*Erubuitque suis conscias esse bonis.*

*Unde hæc, vera licet, si novit forte, verendum*

*Ne fugiat marmor, vel sinis ipse loquax."*

Then follows an acrostic on EDMUNDUS STAUNTON, also an anagram by J. B., and some Latin verses by Jonathan Tuckney, Fellow of S. John's College, Cambridge. After this comes "A brief Relation (chiefly) of his great care to promote Religion, and Learning, in the College of which he was President. By Mr. J. M., Sometime Fellow of the same."

Turning over, one day, some old papers connected with the Battlesden property I came across an old scrap of paper, imperfect in part, of which the following is a copy:

"Oct. the 19th, 1709.

Old Mr. Francis Staunton died at Wooburn at the beginning of the yeare as the great pl. . . . gland Edward Staunton s. . . . Staunton died in Flanders about 4 or 5 & thirty yeares agoe Will' Staunton son of old Mr. Staunton was hanged at Chelmsford aboute 4 or 5 & twenty yeares agoe old Mr. Staunton went to bed at night & was found dead in his bed in the morning at Wooburn. He had 4 children, 2 sons and 2 daughters.

John Lucy,  
ffrancis Cook."

Sir Francis Staunton was knighted at Bletsoe 24th of July, 1621, and entered his pedigree in the Visitation of 1634,\* according to which he had, by his wife Elizabeth daughter of Edmund Staunton, four children; Robert, Francis, Edmund, and William, and Robert his eldest son is there stated to have married Mary, d. of Edward Prescott of London, by whom he had issue Francis, Robert, Elizabeth, Mary, and Anne. This, however, I think, is wrong; Anne should have been made d. of Sir Francis which would then agree with the names of his five children enumerated on the monument set up to his memory in Woburn Church. The baptisms of the children of Robert Staunton, extracted from the Woburn Registers are as follow:—Francis, 26 July, 1625; Elizabeth, 13 Oct., 1627; Mary, 29 Oct., 1629; Robert, 1 June, 1634, the year of the Visitation, and there does not appear to have been another till 1639 when Katherine was baptized the 16th of May.

“I here append a copy of the Inscription referred to above, transcribed from a MS. in the Library at Woburn Abbey. The copy was made in 1861, and is not complete. I do not know whether the stone is still in existence, perhaps some correspondent would kindly supply the deficiencies if it is. The inscription reads as follows:—

“Here lieth Sr Francis Staunton, Knight  
 Who was High Shreife of this County, aged . . .  
 and dyed . . also Dame Elizab' his wife aged 66  
 . . . . . who died 1630.  
 The Mother's dead, father & Sonns survive,  
 It's grace must make them after death alive,

What though A golden name in marble sett

According to the registers Sir Francis was buried the 30th March, 1639, and his wife Lady Elizabeth on the 20th January, 1630. " William, s. of Francis Stanton " was bapt. the 11th of May, 1602; this must be the last-mentioned above, and probably the youngest, as I can find no baptisms after that date of the children of Sir Francis, then Francis Staunton. The earlier registers commencing in 1580 I have not had the opportunity of consulting. There is mentioned besides in the registers a Thomas Staunton of Woburn, gent., bur. 27th of July 1630, and his wife Jane, bur. 21st of November, 1615; also an Edmund Staunton of Woburn, gent., who had a daughter Elizabeth baptized 13th January, 1627. Possibly this may have been the Edmund Staunton, D.D., referred to at the beginning of this article, for by his first wife he had, it is there said, one daughter. There are Staunton entries also in the parish registers of Biggleswade, Cardington, Cople, Eversholt, Renhold, Ridgemont, Sandy, and Southill, but they relate, I think, to other families.

In looking over some old law-papers concerning a suit *Saunders v. Duncombe* relative to the Battlesden and Pottesgrove estates tried in the 31 of Queen Elizabeth,

1588, I find the name of Robert Staunton acting as Attorney for William Duncombe of Battlesden. Probably he was also connected with the Stauntons of Birchmore. In conclusion I may add that I shall be pleased to receive genealogical data relating to this family.

## CADDINGTON.

Bulle and by the churchwardens; 20 June 1517. An agreement for the erection of an oak ceiling and a reredos in the chancel of the church, dated 22 Aug. 1512. This appears to deserve transcription as a record of church decorative work of the time."

"This indenture made the xxiith day of August in the iijth yere of the reign of our Soverayn lord Kinge Henry the viijth between Thomas Phelipe, clerk and person of Temesford in the county of Bedford, of that won partye, and of William Ponde' of the sed Bedford, joyner, carver or carpinder, of that other partye, witnesseth that this sed William Ponde' shall make a floreth from the rodelofft of the chauncell or quere of the sed Temesford vnto the celed worke ouer the hye autour in the sed quere or chauncell, and shall imbowe, cele and knott and in euery degre shalkarve, joyne and make perfitt the said floreth after the form and fassion of the celed worke ouer the hye autour aforsed, and from the sed floreth shall make after his best maner a kerued and a clene joyned Reredose up to the sed celynge and ouer the sed hye autour, and agayn the middest of the sed reredose shalmake an autour of timberworke, and from the sed reredose vnto the rodelofft aforsed on the sonuth (? south)'side he shall make a clene imbowed kerued windo, and shall make the doors after the form and fassion of the queredores bench, and shalfind clene sesonable hart of oke for all and euery aforsed, and ther shall close and shitt in and make perfitt a close

chapell, and shall find all maner stuff and workmanship thereto, and shaltake non other workes in hand to this sad worke be perfectly ended; so that Thomas Phelipe, the parson aforesed, shalbe at no manor cost nor charge nother of stuff nor of workemanshipp, but the said William Pond, or his assignes shalfind all his costes and charge all maner stuff and workemanshipp other in ston, yron, tymber nedfull to this forsed worke. And the sed Thomas shal pay or caused to be payd to the sed William Pond or to his assynes in lawful money of Yngland *iii*l*. viijs. iiij*d**. In witnessse that the sed Thomas and William will and shall this bargayne eche to other performe, the sed Thomas and William eche to other these indentures have put to ther seales the day and tyme aforesed. Suerte for all and euery of the premisses is William Gimber, bocher, of Temesford. Witnessse, William Coper, John Cooper, Henry Tynghey, and the aforesed Gimber and Ponde' and more." [viii. 262,]

Is heartily sorry for doing anything in his church without the direction of his reverend diocesan ; the books complained of were composed for his own private satisfaction, and were printed and published without his procurement or knowledge. Prays for his freedom and dismissal, and vows to be ever hereafter so careful of all his words and actions, that neither the church nor any member thereof shall take offence or displeasure at him. 1660, June 20.—Petition of several of the parishioners and inhabitants of Yeavelden in the county of Bedford ; complain that William Dell, the rector, has been guilty of the offences mentioned in the annexed articles, and pray that he may be deprived of his incumbency, and some course taken for the better supply of his place. L. J., XI. 69. This petition was referred to the Committee for Petitions, and is endorsed as dismissed on the 25th July.

Annexed :—

1. Articles against William Dell ; he has reported that the King and his followers were like the Devil and his angels, and has approved of the murder of the King, and taking away of the House of Lords ; he has for 2 years past neglected the due administration of the sacraments, in consequence of which many children are unbaptized ; he has ceased to sing any psalms or read any chapters in the Holy Bible on the Lord's-day in the congregation ; he has cut down most of the timber trees growing on the

parsonage, declaring he would make the parsonage 300*l.* the worse for the next incumbent ; he has taken undue tithes, has neglected his ministerial office on the Lord's-day, has asserted that Sir George Booth would have cut the throats of all the godly in England ; has entrapped the gentry of the country into discourse, and then given false information against them ; he " hath declared in the public congregation that he had rather hear a plain countryman speak in the church that came from a plough than the best orthodox minister that was in the country ; upon Christmas-day last one Bunyon, of Bedford, a tinker, was countenanced and suffered to speak in his pulpit to the congregation, and no orthodox minister did officiate in the church that day." Since the restoration of the secluded members of Parliament he has declared that the power was now in the hands of the wicked, and that the land was like to be overflowed again with popery ; he has put forth several seditious books, and before the horrid murder of the late King he declared publicly in the congregation that the King was no king to him, Christ was his king ; Venice and Holland were without a king, and why might not we be without ; and that he did not approve of earthly kings. *Cal. House of Lords.* [v. 102.]

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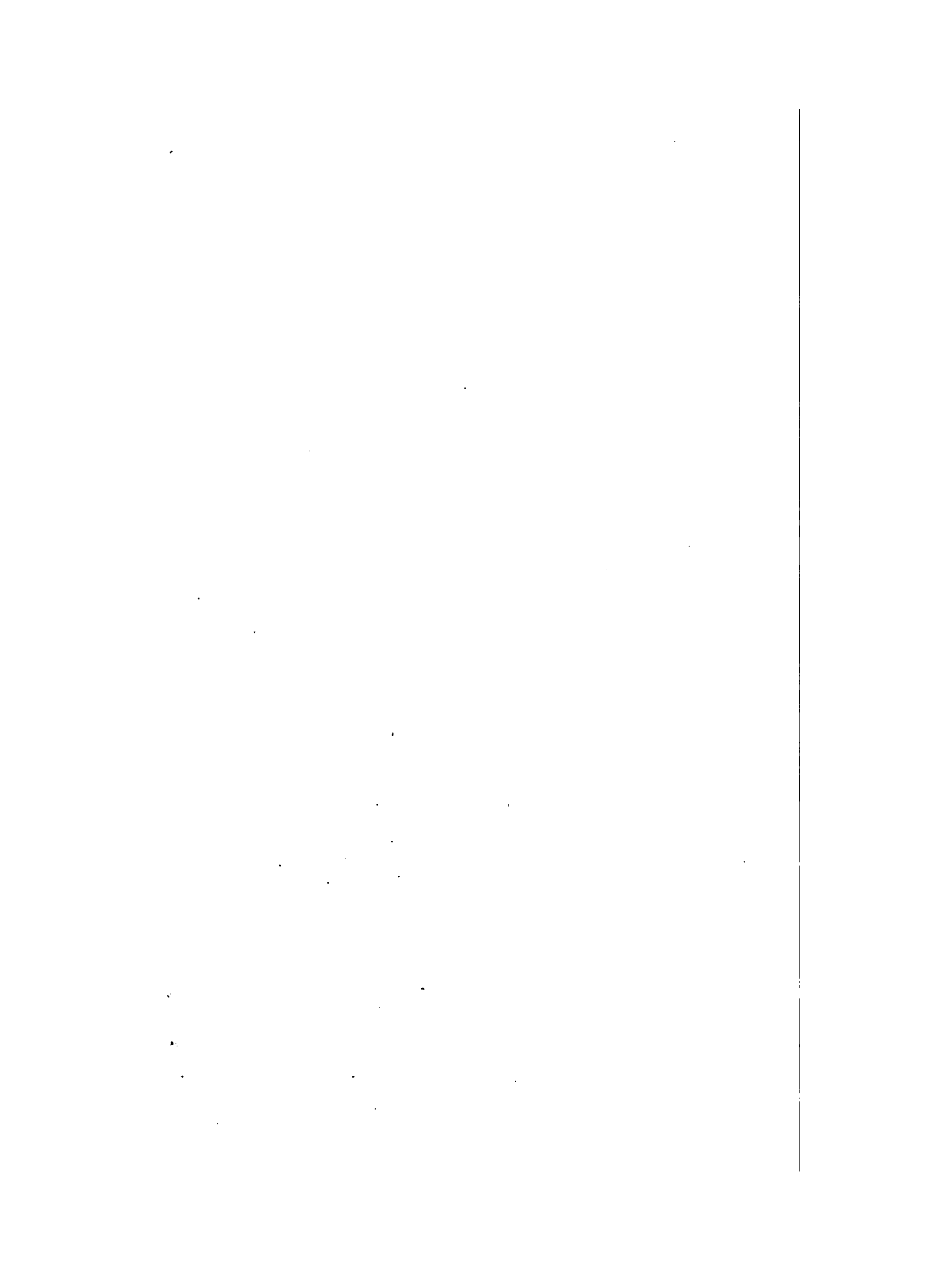


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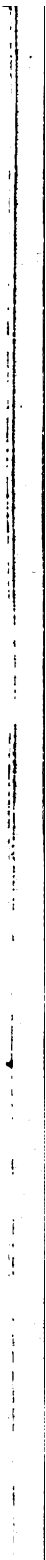
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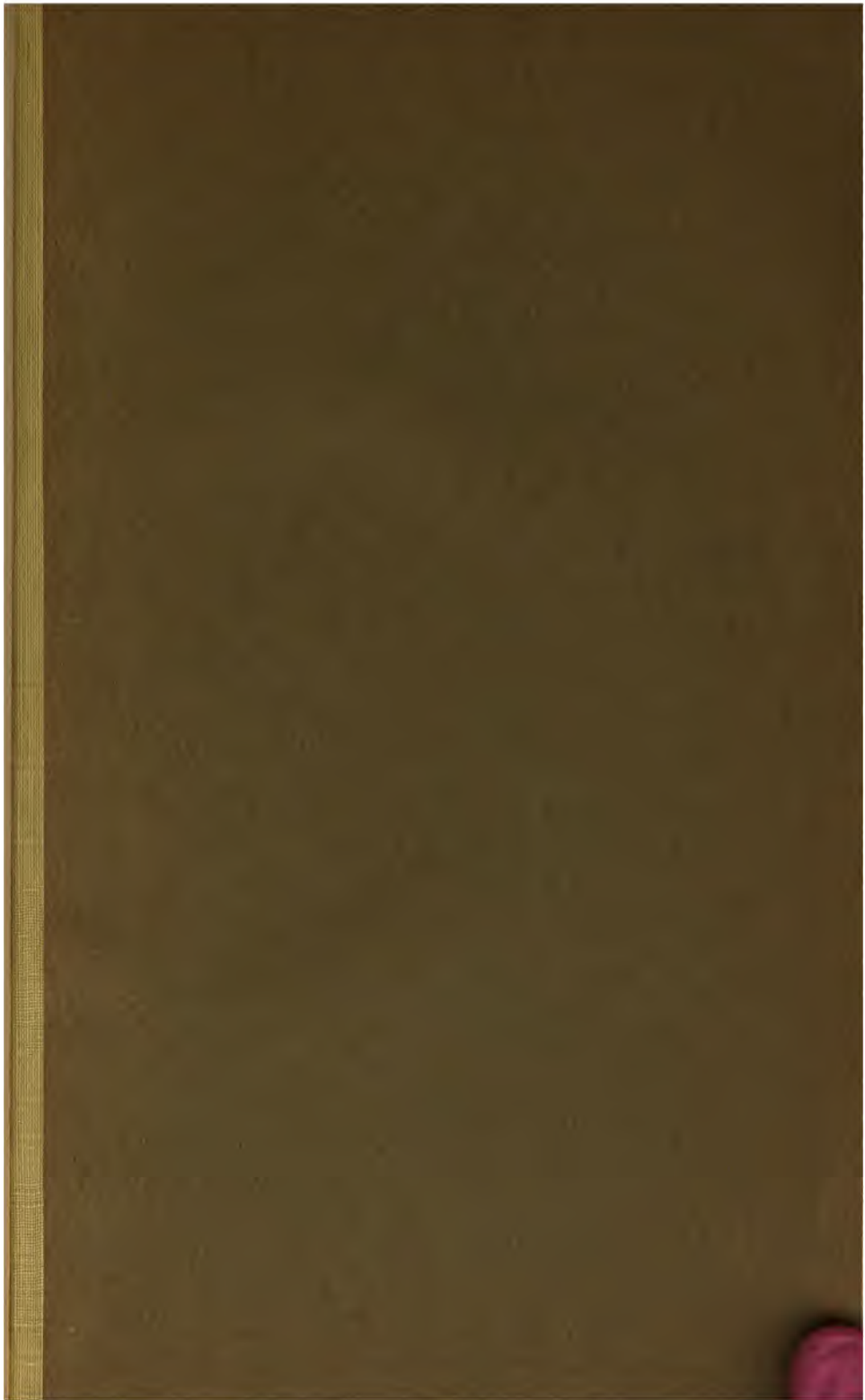
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
