

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

s students began to arrive on campus in late August, they saw familiar faces—and some faces that had never left campus.

While most were taking advantage of being home for the summer, some stayed on campus working for the college.

One, sophomore Eric Harvey, became a handyman for the Physical Plant and now claims to be a "grasscutting expert."

Even though students had work to do, don't think for a minute the summer was all work and no play.

Sophomore Jen Klages went to a Grateful Dead concert. Junior Shön Meale traveled home to spend time in England.

Back in the states, seniors Dave Shelek and Brian Dickman were cooking up their own fun. They went skinny-dipping in the Wheeling Park pool and watched junior John Bowers' car roll into Morlan Hall one afternoon.

Sporting events seemed to highlight many students' summer. Senior Chris Colcombe attended the All-Star game in Pittsburgh. Meale went to some World Cup soccer games.

The summer proved quite successful for Phi Kappa Tau as they were presented with the Rolland Maxwell Award.

While students were busy resting and relaxing, administrators were busy on campus. With enrollment up almost 20 percent, the college was faced with its largest in-coming class in four years.

About 250 new students were registered to attend fall classes. The class was comprised of 84 women and 134 men from 21 states. Eigh-

teen students were from 11 foreign countries.

A Bethany tradition—the matriculation ceremony—was revived. The Class of 1998 marched through the Oglebay Gates and signed a book marking their entrance into the college.

This tradition began when the school opened in 1840, but, during the 1930s, fell by the wayside.

With the semester in full swing, fall convocation was the scene of the presentation of awards for academic achievement and leadership.

The Anna Ruth Bourne Award was presented to Phi Mu for maintaining a cumulative GPA of 3.30 for the 1994 spring semester. Delta Tau Delta earned the W. Kirk Woolery Award, with a 3.17 cumulative GPA.

The Richard B. Kenney Freshman Leadership Award was presented to Christy Cooey and Tony Michael for demonstrating outstanding scholarship and leadership during their freshman year.

After the awards presentations, former Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm charismatically addressed those in attendance.

Through the wizardry of computers, Bethany joined the ranks of other colleges by adding e-mail and an online library card catalog.

With the school year progressing rapidly, it was time to invite moms and dads to Bethany so they could enjoy the experience too.

Preparations for Parents' Weekend rounded out the month of September. Greek organizations warmed up their vocal cords, and practices for the FAC Talent Show became more serious.







ith classes back in full swing, everyone was looking for a fresh start—the Psi chapter of Beta Theta Pi included. The Betas moved into their new house, much to the relief of the brothers.

Bethany Theatre began its season with "Canterbury Tales...Retold." This original, energetic, interactive production encouraged audience participation, a refreshing break from traditional theatre. It featured sophomore Eric Armstrong and Eric Margerum, assistant professor of Fine Arts.

Rush provided an opportunity for freshmen to get to know more about the Greek system on campus. And when they call it rush, they mean it. With open houses, preference parties and Bid Day, the whole campus seemed to be in a frenzy.

Of the 682 students on campus, 67 percent were Greek affiliated after this year's Bid Day, with Delta Tau Delta welcoming its largest pledge class in five years. More than 20 fresh-

men pledged the fraternity.

One of the first orders of business in February was passing the spring SBOG budget. More than \$100,000 was made available, including \$4,000 in contingency.

In sports, senior Joe Childress racked up 1,166 career points in men's basketball, going over the 1,000 mark in the Bison's game against Thiel early in the month.

In the midst of all this activity, the weather proved most interesting. Temperatures fluctuated from springlike to sub-zero overnight. Coughs, sore throats, stuffy noses, and injuries resulting from icy conditions kept Health Service busy the entire month.

A common stress reliever, the Thursday night trip to Drover's, took a turn for the worse this month. "Cheap wings" no longer existed, as Drover's dropped their 20 percent discount, much to the dismay of students.

The administration found itself in dispair as well, with

enrollment down 8.3 percent from the fall semester. Sixtyone students did not return for the spring semester.

But Alpha Psi Omega had its own cure for the mid-February blues. Cabaret provided lots of laughter by taking a satirical look at the school, including Bethany's own administration.

Along with this relief from the blahs of February, many students began planning for spring break. Aerobics classes, tanning sessions, swimsuit shopping and saving up were on many students' agendas.

With what seemed to be a light at the end of the winter tunnel—weather-wise—Snow Carnival was only a fleeting hope. Instead, Renner Union Programing Board hosted Mardi Gras, Bethany-style, a scaled-down version of the annual New Orleans festival. The combination of Brownie Mary and cash prizes for the best costumes allowed everyone to end the month with a good time. \Diamond



















ison athletes pounded their way onto the playing fields this year and found it was a time to celebrate in a big way. The stampede started in grand style with the men's soccer team capturing the NCAA Division III championship, a feat long in the making but still welcomed after all these years. The football team saw more than 70 new recruits, and despite a season with more losses than wins, it started the rebuilding process. On the women's side of things, the soccer team won the PAC title for the fourth time in a row. The softball and basketball teams, along with the men's baseball team, made it to postseason play; all were invited to ECAC tournaments. he fall season of Bison sports began with great expectations and proved to be a season to remember.

Heavy recruitment and coaching changes promised to bring excitement to the Bethany world of sports. For the first time in more than five years, women's tennis was on the roster of fall sports, coached by Lisa Campanell-Komara. Coach Ted Eskildsen took over women's soccer, as coach Jan Forsty moved over to volleyball.

The biggest success story of the fall season was the men's soccer team. Making a comeback from a point in the season when play-offs were a distant hope, the team went on to capture the national title. The 27 years were worth the wait for the sweet taste of victory that will last a lifetime.

The men's soccer team wasn't the only champion. The women's soccer team claimed its fourth consecutive Presidents' Athletic Conference title. The Bison recorded the best record in the history of the women's soccer program and the first

winning season since 1987. Junior forward Missy Miller was named PAC most valuable player for the second year in a row.

The tennis team tied the school record for the most wins in a season, finishing 6-6.

Three Bison were named to All-Conference teams: German exchange student Beatrix Maier earned first team All-PAC honors while freshman Keri Rohland and sophomore Bobbi Mills were named to the second team All-PAC. Maier finished 10-1 for the season, and is Bethany's first PAC champion ever.

The cross country teams concluded their season by competing in the NCAA Division III Southeast regional championship at Piedmont Park in Atlanta.

The football team was graced with more than 70 plebes fresh off the high school gridiron. Although they had a losing season, the gridders made a good showing for such a young team. Sophomore Bison defensive back Shedrick Young repeated the feat he

achieved last year when he was voted one of the top defensive backs in the PAC by the coaches and named to the PAC defensive first team.

Meanwhile, sophomore offensive tackle Regis Bane made PAC offensive second team while PAC defensive second team honors went to senior defensive end Eric Carder and senior defensive back Dave Shelek.

Carder was also named the recipient of the Ray Nola Memorial Award. This award is given every year to the senior athlete who best exemplifies the attributes of scholarship, dedication and loyalty.

In volleyball, sophomore Liz Broughton was named to first team All-PAC squad. Named to the second team was sophomore Wendy Shaffer. Junior Leigh Henderson and freshman Amy Thomas were named to the honorable mention team.









After the game, the Bison were presented with their national championship trophy. The victory was by far the sweetest of the 280 career wins for coach John Cunningham.







Heating up the cold months by

lthough the winter season may not have produced championship teams, there was no lack of record-breaking athletes. From basketball to swimming to indoor track, old school records were shattered all season long.

Men's basketball had a disappointing season (5-20, 1-7), but found talent in many of the young players, and superstars in some of the veterans. But it was two leaders, senior center Joe Childress and sophomore guard Kevin Kozup, who provided the core for the cagers' victories.

Placing third on the all-time Bison scoring list, Childress passed the 1,000 point milestone and finished his illustrious Bethany career with 1,267 points.

Childress' season accomplishments of 15.4 points and 7.9 rebounds per game, as well as 54 percent shooting from the field, all ranked him in the top six in the conference. He was also named first team All-PAC center.

Also awarded first team status, Kozup was the only player in the PAC to average more than 20 points per game; his season average was 21.1 points per game. Kozup also finished seventh in the nation in threepoint baskets per game, averaging 3.9 per contest.

The women's basketball team (15-9, 5-3) was invited to post-season play. The team entered the Eastern College Athletic Conference tournament as the No. 3 seed. but lost to Alvernia in 75-68 in overtime.

Senior guard Chris Colcombe finished her career with 902 points, 684 rebounds (third all-time at Bethany), 212 steals (second all-time), 237 assists (second all-time) and 53 blocks. Colcombe started in all 94 games over the past four years. Freshman

forward Stephanie Cunningham made honorable mention and was voted Freshman Player of the Year.

The swim teams broke records too. Senior Laurelyn Rawson made first team All-PAC in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 25.32, breaking a school record. She also broke school records in the 200vard and 100-yard freestyle events. The women also captured six places in the third team all-conference, with school record-breaking times by the 200-freestyle relay team, 400-freestyle relay and 400medley relay teams.

Senior Matt Tucker, who led the men to seven overall places, was named to the PAC second team for the 1,650-yard freestyle.

This winter was also an inaugural season for two Bison sports teams-diving and indoor track. Diving was re-introduced as a varsity sport with the completion of the Health and Recreation Center.

The season was an exciting one for the indoor track team, filled with record breakers and individual successes. Senior Rich Beckett broke his own school record, winning the 110-meter high hurdles with a time of 7.86 seconds. Senior Brian Dickman ran the 55-meter dash with a time of 6.73 seconds, a new Bethany record.

Junior Shedrick Young also broke a record in the long jump with a jump of 21 feet 11 1/2 inches. Young also set an indoor record for the triple jump with a distance of 42 feet 5 1/2 inches.

Sophomore distance runner Joe Martin set records in the 1,500-meters, with a time of 4:44.00, and in the 1,000-meters, with a time of 3:01.74. Senior Adam Kradel broke a distance record in the 5,000-meters with a time of 17:57.14. ◊

pring also saw its share of champions. Teams didn't live up to everyone's expectations, but many had shining moments.

Softball regained the PAC championship title. It finished the season 23-18-1 on the strength of senior centerfielder Shelley Cooper and sophomore third base player Wendy Shaffer's All-PAC First Team performances.

Shaffer was the Presidents' Athletic Conference leader in home runs with five, and she led the league in doubles with 13. Senior catchers Sharon Finney and Jen Mossgrove split time behind the plate, and both earned Second Team honors. Postseason play brought an invitation to the ECAC tournament. Although Bethany hosted, the home field advantage wasn't much help. The team lost but still took pride in a successful season.

The struggles of two teams, men's tennis and golf, weren't without the benefit of some bright spots in their seasons. Men's tennis returned after eight years, and ended up capturing third place in the PAC. Although a shortage of players caused the golf team to be disqualified from the PAC tournament, freshman Brian Taylor made Second Team All-PAC and junior Brian Stefan placed fifth in the Spiedel Invitational.

In track, seniors Brian Dickman and Rich Beckett continued to pave the way. Both attempted to compete in nationals, but fell short. Once again, Dickman earned top honors in the PAC. At the PAC championships, Dickman placed first overall and Beckett took second.

Dickman was first in the 100-meter dash and in the 400-meter hurdles. Beckett placed first in the 200-meter dash and in the 110-meter high hurdles. Both were on the teams that took first in the 4×100

relay and the 4 x 400 relay.

Junior Karalee Demko broke a school record the 1,500-meter run. Freshman Kathleen McGow set a new school record in the 800-meter run.

The greatest hopes were pinned on the baseb team. The team didn't capture the PAC title expected, and also lost the ECAC tournament postseason play. However, the Bison finished the season (23-12) on a good note, with impressive staposted by both the team and individual players.

The team led the PAC in many categories: hitti (.456), batting (.351) and slugging (.479). The squ led the conference in doubles (69); runs scored (24 home runs (18); bases stolen (70); RBIs (234) and fielding (.957). In pitching, the team finished wan ERA of 3.17.

Individual players also stole the spotlight. Sen pitcher Ken Richey finished the season 9-1, with ERA of 1.75. Richey also broke single season Betha records. These feats earned Richey PAC Pitcher the Year honors and ranked him among the Top NCAA Division III pitchers in the nation.

Freshman pitcher Mark Dunst led the PAC wan ERA of 1.32. Junior shortstop Jeff Weekley's doubles set a Bethany single season record, as a his stolen bases record—27 for 30. He set a Bethan record with a career total of 74 stolen bases.

Weekley also set a single season Bethany recovered with 35 runs scored, and with 34 RBIs. All of Weekley's records made him the leader in the PAC stolen bases, doubles, runs scored and RBIs.

Finally, senior second baseman Bill Mattes took first ranking in the PAC with four home ru


