Though Lowndes and others indicate 9 vols., there is no volume 9 of the Review. It is complete in 8 volumes, the last terminating on the 29th of July, 1712. The only perfect copy known is that purchased at Chalmers' sale by Mr. Crossley. At the close of the 8th volume, De Foe commenced a new paper under a similar title, but of a larger size, each number consisting of only one leaf. A few numbers only exist. The

Robinson Crusoe is the most popular, delightful, and extraordinary of all Defoe's Works, and has lost none of its original attraction, even at the distance of a century. Dr. Johnson observed, 'nobody ever laid it down without wishing it were longer.'

Lowndes says Robinson Crusoe first appeared in a periodical publication, entitled The Original London Post, or Heathcote's Intelligence, from Nos. 125 to No. 289 inclusively: the latter, dated 7 October, 1719. But this is an error, copied from Dibdin's Library Companion, p. 607, and repeated since by the compilers of the Grenville Catalogue and other Bibliographers. The following is the correct statement:

THE FIRST VOLUME of Robinson Crusoe was published in 8vo. 1719, 364 pp., preface 2 pp. with an engraving of Robinson Crusoe, sometimes placed as a frontispiece, and was entered at Stationers' Hall, for William Taylor, 23 April, 1719. Of this volume there were four editions in the same year, as is indicated on the title-pages. Sixth edit. 1722, with plates.

THE SECOND VOLUME, called 'The far-

Mr. Wilson, the biographer of Defoe, observes, 'The popularity of the work no doubt occasioned it to be printed in The Original London Post or Heathcote's Intelligence; but it is not impossible that Taylor sold Heathcote the right of printing it in his paper. In No. 125 of the Intelligence, Wednesday, Oct. 1719, occurs the commencement of Robinson Crusoe, which was continued on the first leaf of each succeeding number without intermission to No. 289, Oct. 19, 1720, (and not as Dibdin states, and Lowndes copies, 7 Oct., 1719), being the end of the second volume of Robinson Crusoe.

On reverse of No. 289 is an announcement of a third volume, to be had of Taylor. The third volume is that entitled 'Serious Reflections,' and met with no success. Indeed, it is seldom reprinted with the work.

All the above-mentioned editions are in the Grenville Library, British Museum.

'Defoe,' says Mr. Park, 'has been charged with surreptitiously appropriating the papers of Alexander Selkirk (See SELKIRK) in the formation of this celebrated work: but the charge, though repeatedly and confidently brought, appears to be destitute of foundation.' Some have assumed that Arbuthnot, others that Harley, Earl of Oxford, wrote the first part, and put it into the hands of Defoe, who wrote the second. But these assertions are without sufficient foundation, and are refuted by Wilson.

HALLE, Edwarde. CHRONICLE.

To arrive at an exact bibliographical knowledge of the variations in this volume requires considerable patience in the collation; most of the copies known being made up of the several editions (Mr. Grenville's for instance. See Collations in *Bibliotheca Grenvilliana*, i. p. 297).

It should be premised that the several editions or issues are similarly printed in Black Letter; that Halle did not live to bring his labours to a conclusion, and that R. Grafton issued the work after Halle's death, stating, in his Address to the edition of 1548—"that Halle dying, and *'being in his latter time not so painful and studious as he ought to have been,'* he undertook the completion of it"—although he (Grafton) published a Chronicle, which goes expressly under his own name. Bp. Tanner, in his *Bibliotheca Britannica*, p. 372, cites an edition printed by Berthelet, dated 1542, but no copy with that date, or with a dedication to King Henry VIII., is known, it is therefore regarded as supposititious.

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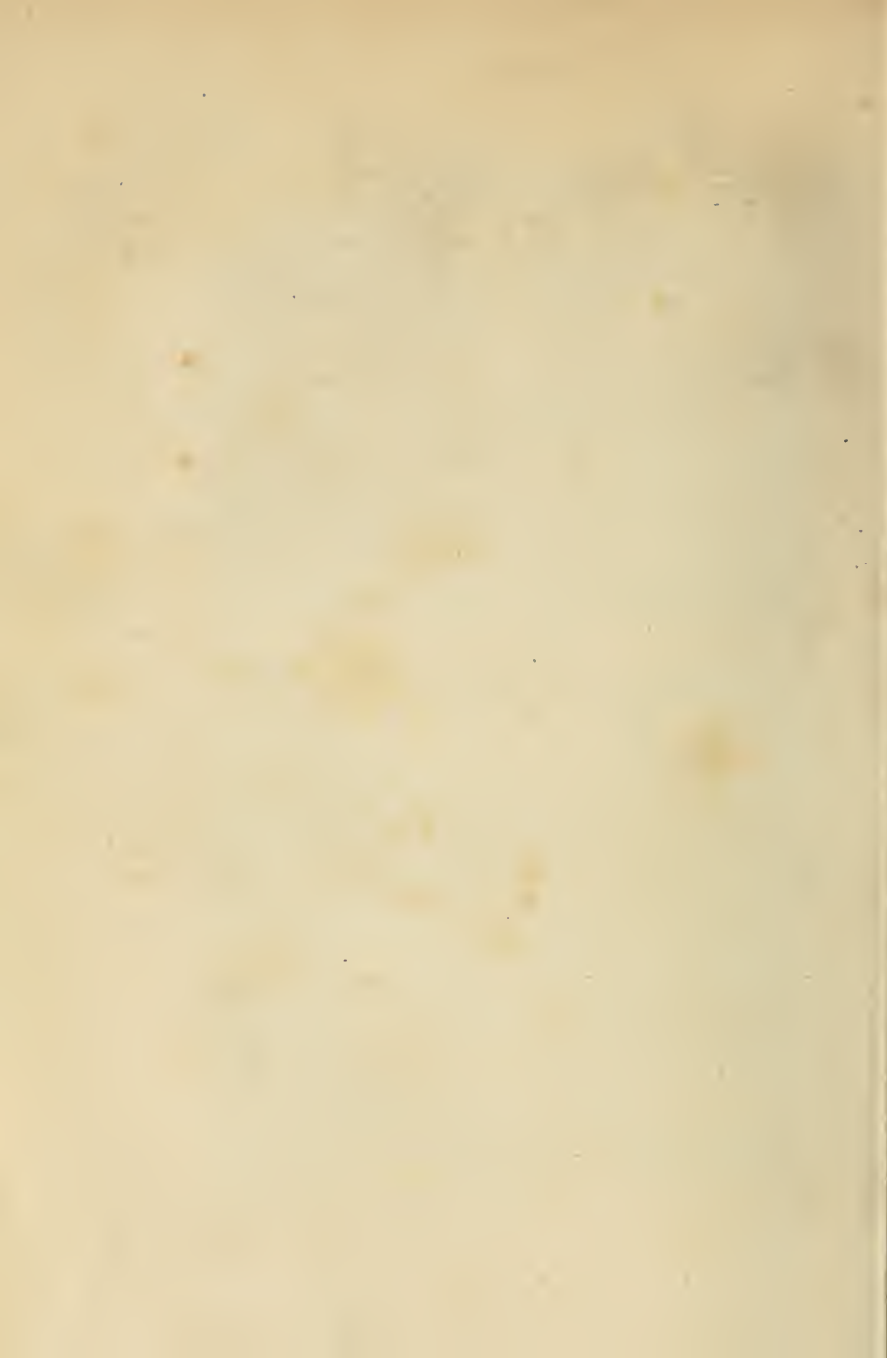
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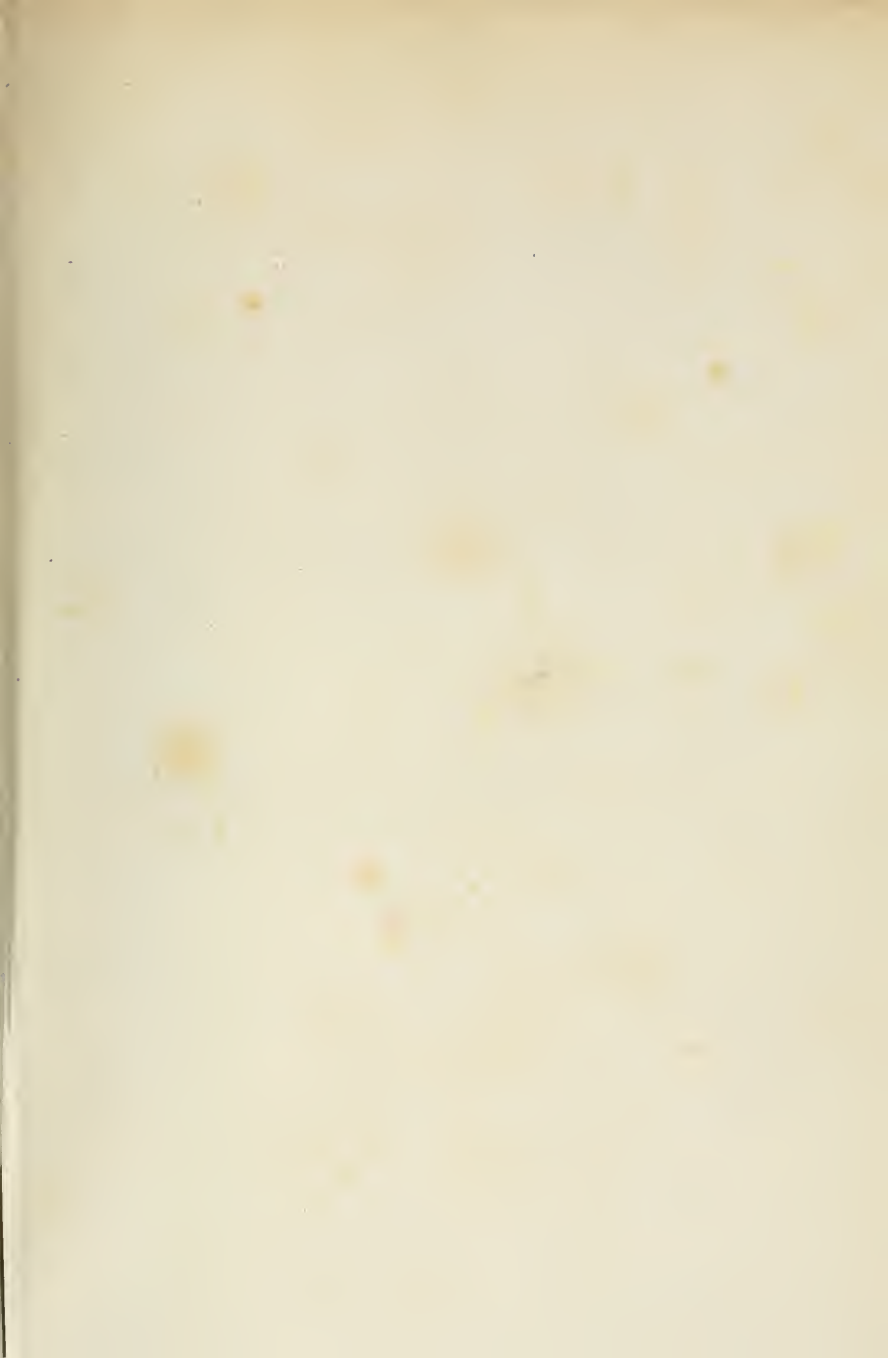
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
