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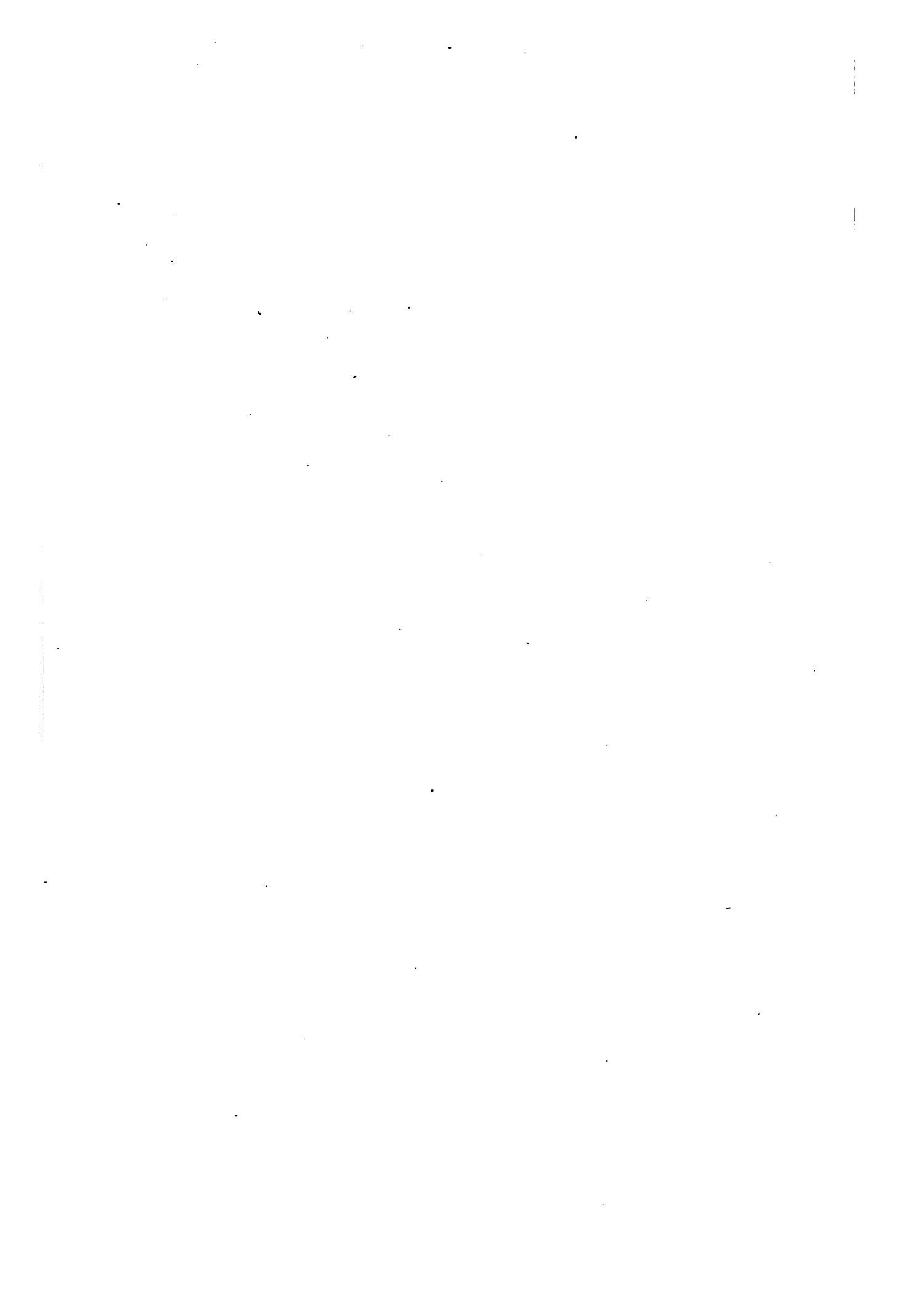

## *Preface.*

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**T**HE authors of this work have at last finished the task which they set before themselves. It has involved a far larger expenditure of time and money than they contemplated at first, but now that their labours are finished, this circumstance serves only to heighten the interest with which they regard its completion. The first portion of the manuscript was sent to the printers in the Summer of 1869; the last in November, 1881. More than fifteen hundred pages in all have been printed, and twelve years have passed away since the first sheet was struck off from the press.

During these years a great number of books and papers have been written on Cornwall or by Cornishmen, and as the authors have continued to prosecute their researches without intermission, they have succeeded in discovering many additional references in printed books and many curious manuscripts relating to the children of their native county. This supplementary catalogue of authors contains 343 pages, and in them are embodied many interesting particulars relating to the distinguished Cornishmen and Cornish families mentioned in the pages of the previous volumes. The list appended in the footnote specifies the names of the principal persons and families included in this catalogue.

The authors had not proceeded far in their undertaking before they found it desirable to divide their materials into two sections, the first to be classified under authors, the second under places and subjects. With the latter division this volume begins; it comprises in 104 pages many entries which will not be without interest to the student of the county or of the country at large, but the schedules of the

Acts of Parliament and of the Civil War tracts relating to Cornwall are probably the most valuable portions of this division of the work. The Acts of Parliament begin with 1266, and have been brought down to the close of the session of 1877. During those six centuries more than 450 different acts were passed in connexion with Cornwall. Most of them were passed for the purpose of facilitating the making of roads and railways, but some of the earlier acts were for other and stranger uses. One which came into law in the reign of Henry 8, ordered the Cornishmen to "work without pay" on the fortifications which were designed for the protection of the county against an invasion from the French; another authorized the destruction of numerous houses which had become ruinous in Bodmin and five other towns. The natives of Cornwall played such a distinguished part in the Civil War between the adherents of Charles I and the Parliament that the list of tracts on the events which took place in the county during that momentous period in our national life naturally occupies many pages of the third volume. Though much has been done for the elucidation of Cornish history the stubborn contest waged for the mastery between the followers of Sir Ralph Hopton and his victorious antagonists still needs a chronicler. Although a much larger number of the county gentry espoused the cause of the Parliament than is commonly supposed the preponderance of feeling with all classes was ranged on the side of the king. Through the valour of Sir Bevil Grenville and "the courage and fidelity of the Cornish," to use the words of the royal historian, the whole of Western England from the Land's End to the extremities of Somerset acknowledged the rule of the king and had not the flower of Cornish chivalry perished on the hill of Lansdown and around the walls of Bristol the struggle might have ended in a different manner than is recorded in history. Within recent years two works have been published by local antiquaries on the progress of the Civil War in Wales and Herefordshire, and at some future date perhaps a similar volume may appear on the fight in the west country. Such an undertaking demands the exercise of unwearied pain and patient research, but with proper treatment should end in the issue of a work of absorbing interest. When the historian of the future takes such a labour in hand and is confronted with the catalogue of the Thomason pamphlets in the British Museum, he will find that the list of "Civil War tracts" printed in the pages of the *Bibliotheca Cornubiensis* has spared him the labour of many days.

One of the gentlemen who criticized the first volume of this work remarked with undoubted truth and in no unkindly spirit that the information which it contained would only be appreciated as it deserved when accompanied by an ample index. The authors venture to hope that if this volume should meet his eye he will not be disappointed in that part of their labours. The index occupies 147 pages, and comprises on a rough calculation upwards of 12,350 separate headings,

several of which contain over 350 different references. Although it would be impossible to comment on all the important headings of the Index, it may not be amiss to draw attention to two or three matters which bear on the biography of Cornishmen. The endowments which in days only just past were confined at Exeter college, Oxford, to those born in Devon and Cornwall naturally attracted thither the youth of those counties, and for that reason a far larger number of Cornishmen have been connected with the university of Oxford than with its rival on the Cam. A reference to the index will show that 128 natives of Cornwall have been elected to fellowships at Oxford and 43 at Cambridge. For many centuries the enterprising inhabitants of the duchy have sought for the attainment of wealth through the mineral products of its soil, and it is no doubt through that cause that such a large number of its sons have been drawn to scientific studies. Since the formation of the Royal Society, 58 persons, either born in Cornwall or long resident within its borders, have become through their eminence in mineralogical and other pursuits, fellows of that body. A full list of these names is printed in the index, and Cornishmen may be pardoned for believing that no such record of distinction in scientific knowledge could be drawn up from any English county of corresponding size to their own. The authors hope that persons consulting the *Bibliotheca Cornubiensis* will notwithstanding its alphabetical arrangement refer to the Index, as it frequently contains many references to the same person and additional matter not to be found in the text. Advantage has also been taken of the progress of the Index to insert particulars down to the most recent date.

The authors have now but one more duty to discharge, and that is to render their hearty thanks to the printers who have with such care and pains passed this work through the press. With this final acknowledgment of their indebtedness, their labours in Cornish Bibliography have come to an end.

#### ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

Alien Priors. 4 *Hen.* IV. For a general seizure of alien priories not conventual. *Rot. parl.* 4 *Hen.* IV, *No.* 11 (1402-1403).

*NOTE.*—Under this act St. Michael's Mount, though conventual, was illegally seized but afterwards restored. *cf. Rot. parl.* 5 *Hen.* IV, *m.* 12; *Acts of the privy council* (1834) i, 190.

Allen river. *See* Padstow.

Apprentices. 6 *Geo.* III, *c.* 25, *s.* 6. For regulating apprentices, but not to extend to the stannaries (1766).

Archdeaconry. 7 and 8 *Geo.* IV, *c.* 10. For vesting in the dean and chapter of Exeter certain lands in the archdeaconry of Cornwall and enabling them to grant leases thereof (1827).

*NOTE.*—The property referred to was a building, garden and courtlage in the Close, Exeter, called the house of the archdeacon of Cornwall.

Assizes. 1 *Geo.* I, *st.* 2, *c.* 45. For holding the assizes for Cornwall at a convenient place in the

county, it being found inconvenient always to hold them at Launceston, act to commence 20 May, 1716 (1715).

Austell, St. *See* Grampound.

Austell, St. 5 and 6 *Vict.*, *c.* xiv. For taking down the market house, erecting a new market house, providing a new market place and regulating the markets and fairs at St. Austell (1842).

Austell, St. 37 and 38 *Vict.*, *c.* clxxxviii. For incorporating the St. Austell and Pentewan railway, harbour and dock Co. (7 Aug. 1874).

Barn Street. 1 *Geo.* III, *c.* 25. For amending the roads from Barn st. to Duloe church and from Lux st. to Crathick ford and from Bull post to Treworrey cross in Cornwall (1760-61).—Term and powers enlarged 10 *Geo.* III, *c.* 87 (1770).—Continuation of term and enlargement of powers 41 *Geo.* III (*U.K.*) *c.* 92 (1801).

Bishoprick. 39 and 40 *Vict.* *c.* liv. For providing for the foundation of a new bishoprick out of a part of the Diocese of Exeter (11 Aug. 1876).

*NOTE.*—Towards founding the new see the bishop of Exeter assented to the transfer of a portion of the endowment of his bishoprick to produce £800 a year.

Boconnoc. 48 *Geo.* III, *c.* 6. For vesting lands belonging to lord Grenville and Anne, baroness Grenville and a parsonage house to be erected

thereon, in the rector of the united parishes of Boconnoc and Braddock, in exchange for the parsonage house and part of the glebe lands of Boconnoc (1808).

Boconnoc. 49 *Geo. III, c. xiii*. For the inclosure of lands in Boconnoc, Braddock and St. Winnow (24 Mch. 1809).

Bodmin. *See* Cornwall Minerals Railway, and Grampound.

Bodmin. 32 *Hen. VIII, c. xix*. Respecting houses in Launceston, Liskeard, Lostwithiel, Bodmin, Truro and Helston fallen into decay, which being dangerous to the inhabitants, may be taken possession of by the public authorities, if not repaired by the owners (1540).

Bodmin. 8 and 9 *Geo. III, c. 69*. For repairing and widening several roads leading to and through Bodmin (1769).—Term and powers enlarged 26 *Geo. III, c. 129* (1786).—Continuing and amending and for amending other roads passing through borough of Bodmin and parish of Lauhydrock 51 *Geo. III, c. clix* (1811).—Repealing above three acts and for more effectually repairing roads 10 *Geo. IV, c. xix* (1829).—Amending preceding act and making a new road 3 and 4 *Will. IV, c. lxxxix* (1833).—Repealing two latter acts, for repairing roads and making new roads 5 and 6 *Will. IV, c. cv* (1835).—Granting further term and powers 29 and 30 *Vict., c. cxl* (28 June 1866).

Bodmin. 55 *Geo. III, c. lxxxv*. For providing a market for Bodmin and for abolishing sales in the streets (1815).

Bodmin. 2 and 3 *Will. IV, c. xlvii*. For making a railway from Wadebridge in St. Breoke to Wenford bridge, St. Breward, with a branch to Bodmin (1832).—Amendment of act, 5 and 6 *Will. IV, c. xciii* (1835).

Bodmin. 6 and 7 *Will. IV, c. xii*. For building new courts of assize at Bodmin and providing judges' lodgings, etc. (1836).

Bodmin. 27 and 28 *Vict., c. clxx*. For making a railway from the Cornwall railway to Bodmin (14 July 1864).—For extending the Bodmin railway to the Bodmin and Wadebridge railway, raising further moneys, etc. 28 and 29 *Vict., c. 53* (2 June 1865).—Further powers 30 and 31 *Vict., c. cxix* (15 July 1867).

Bodmin. 28 and 29 *Vict., c. 370*. Authorising the Bodmin and Wadebridge railway Co. to improve the line, to abandon portions thereof, and to raise further moneys (5 July 1865).

NOTE.—Commences with a recital of 2 & 3 *Will. IV, c. xlvii* (1832).

Bodmin. 29 and 30 *Vict., c. 13*. For better supplying with water the borough and parish of Bodmin (18 May 1866).

Bossiney. 29 and 30 *Vict., c. cccxlvii*. For making a railway from Delabole to Bossiney with an extension to Bossiney harbour and a branch near Trewarmet (6 Aug. 1866).

Boyton. 21 and 22 *Vict., c. viii*. Authorizing inclosure of certain lands (1858).

Bushford. 25 *Geo. III, c. 108*. For widening and repairing the roads leading from Bushford to Beal's mill in Stoke Climsland; and also the road from Pentercross in Pillaton to The Fighting Cocks in Botus Fleming (1785).

Callington. 4 *Geo. III, c. 48*. For repairing and widening several roads leading from Callington (1763).—Continuation of term 25 *Geo. III, c. 108* (1785).—Continuation of term and

enlargement of powers 46 *Geo. III, c. xv* (1806).—Above three acts repealed and new provisions made 7 and 8 *Geo. IV c. ci* (1827).

Callington. 20 and 21 *Vict., c. 20*. Inclosure act (10 Aug. 1857).

NOTE.—By the schedule attached to this act it appears that the inclosure commissioners gave their consent to the enclosure of Callington 29 Jan. 1857.

Callington. 32 and 33 *Vict., c. clii*. For making a railway from Callington to Kelly quay on the Tamar in Calstock to be called the "East Cornwall mineral railway Co." (9 Aug. 1869).—For a deviation in the parish of Stokeclimsland 34 *Vict., c. xxxiii* (25 May 1871).

Calstock. 19 and 20 *Vict., c. 106*. Inclosure act (29 July 1856).

NOTE.—The inclosure commissioners gave their assent to the enclosure of Calstock 2 June 1853.

Camborne. 30 and 31 *Vict., c. lxxi*. For better supplying with water the parishes of Camborne, Crowan and Illogan (31 May 1867).

Camel river. 7 and 8 *Vict., c. xxiv*. For regulating the navigable parts of the Camel river (1844).

Coals. 9 *Anne, c. vi, sect. lv*. For duties upon coals, candles, etc. A drawback to be allowed on coals used for melting copper and tin ores in Cornwall and Devon (1710). *cf. also 49 Geo. III, c. 98, Sch. A* coastwise (1809).

Coals. 14 *Geo. II, c. 41, s. 3*. For allowing a drawback of the duties upon coals used in fire engines for draining tin and copper mines in Cornwall. Act to commence 24 June 1741 (1741). *cf. also 49 Geo. III, c. 98, Sch. A* coastwise (1809).

Duchy. Sutton harbour. 39 and 40 *Vict.*, c. lxxvi. Authorising the duke of Cornwall and the Sutton harbour improvement Co. to enter into and carry into effect agreements for certain purposes (27 June 1876).

Engollan. 18 and 19 *Vict.*, c. 14. Inclosure act (1855).

NOTE.—The inclosure commissioners gave their assent to the inclosure of Engollan common 13 July 1854.

Evall, St. 29 *Car.* II, c. 8. Augmentations made by ecclesiastical persons to small livings (1676).

NOTE.—Sect. x provides that the act shall not make void a lease made by the dean and chapter of Exeter to Arthur Sprey of the tithe sheaf of the parish of St. Evall for an annual payment of £20 to the vicar.

Falmouth. 5 and 6 *Vict.*, c. 31. For indemnifying witnesses who may give evidence before the committee of the house of commons as to bribery at the election for Penryn and Falmouth (1842).

Falmouth. 8 and 9 *Vict.*, c. clxxiii. For deepening and improving Falmouth harbour and forming basins, docks and other works in Penryn creek (1845).

Falmouth. 10 and 11 *Vict.*, c. cxxvi. For constructing waterworks for supplying with water the town of Falmouth and parishes adjacent thereto (1847).—Further powers 25 and 26 *Vict.*, c. xxxiii (3 June 1862).—Further powers 40 and 41 *Vict.*, c. v (1877).

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Falmouth. 22 *Vict.*, c. xvi. For making docks and other works in Falmouth harbour and incorporating the Falmouth docks Co. (1859).—For making additional works and raising further moneys 27 and 28 *Vict.*, c. cxxvii (30 June 1864).—Authorising the F.D. Co. to complete parts of their undertaking, to make additional works and to raise further moneys 37 and 38 *Vict.*, c. clxxviii (30 July 1874).

Falmouth. 28 and 29 *Vict.*, c. 103. Providing for the discontinuance of a separate court of quarter sessions and a separate gaol in the borough of Falmouth (5 July 1865).

Falmouth. 33 and 34 *Vict.*, c. clviii. For confirming orders of board of trade under General Pier acts of 1861, relating to Falmouth, etc. (9 Aug. 1870).

NOTE.—Contains an "Order for the maintenance and regulation of the harbour of Falmouth."

Falmouth. 40 and 41 *Vict.*, c. cxxvi. Confirming an order made by the board of trade under the Sea fisheries act 1868, relating to Falmouth (1877).

Fal river. 30 *Car.* II, c. 20. For making navigable the river Fale alias Vale (1678).

Fal Valley railway. 37 and 38 *Vict.*, c. clxxix. For the construction in Cornwall of a railway in the parish of St. Stephens in Braunwell, to be called "The Fal valley railway" (30 July 1874).—Vesting in the Cornwall minerals railway Co. the power conferred by above act with respect to a portion of the Fal valley railway and for the abandonment of the remainder of that railway 40 and 41 *Vict.*, c. liv (1877).

IV, c. xl* (1825).—The above act repealed and reenacted with power to make new roads 1 and 2 *Vict., c. vi* (11 Apl. 1838).—Continued from 1 Nov. 1875 to 1 Nov. 1879 and no longer 38 and 39 *Vict., c. cxciv* (11 Aug. 1875).

Helston. *See* Bodmin, Falmouth and Truro.

NOTE.—The inclosure commissioners gave permission to enclose St. Ives Down (29 Mch. 1849).

Ives, St. 7 *Geo.* III, c. 52. For erecting a proper and convenient pier at St. Ives (1767).—Repealing this act and for further improving the harbour 16 and 17 *Vict.*, c. cxxix (4 Aug. 1853). *cf. also* 25 and 26 *Vict.*, c. 51, *Sch.* (29 July 1862).

Ives, St. 16 *Geo.* III, c. 36. For the encouragement and improvement of the pilchard fishery carried on within St. Ives bay (1776).—Repealed and other provision made for the fishery and defining the boundaries of the six stems 4 and 5 *Vict.*, c. lvii (21 June 1841).

Ives, St. 16 and 17 *Vict.*, c. clv. For making a railway from St. Ives to the West Cornwall railway at St. Erth (4 Aug. 1853).—Amendment of act 19 and 20 *Vict.*, c. xli (23 June 1856).

Marazion. *See* Falmouth.

Mawes, St. 17 and 18 *Vict.*, c. lvi. For improving the harbour, reconstructing the pier, and defining the limits of the port and harbour of St. Mawes (2 June 1854).

Mawgan. *See* St. Columb.

Mevagissey. 15 *Geo.* III, c. 62. For completing and maintaining the pier at Mevagissey (1775).

Mevagissey. 28 and 29 *Vict.*, c. 76. Confirming with amendments, provisional orders made by board of trade under General pier act 1861 relating to Girvan, Mevagissey and Stornoway (29 June 1865).

Militia. 38 *Geo.* III, c. 74. For raising a body

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of miners in Cornwall for defence of the kingdom during the war (21 June 1798).

Militia. 42 *Geo.* III, c. 72. For raising and regulating the militia in the stannaries (1802). *cf. also* 42 *Geo.* III, c. 90, s. 154 (1802); 43 *Geo.* III, c. 55, s. 12 (1803); 46 *Geo.* III, c. 90, s. 47; 46 *Geo.* III, c. 91 (1806).

Militia. 54 *Geo.* III, c. 20. For extending to the miners militia the provisions of an act authorizing the employment of the militia out of the United Kingdom (1813).—Amended by 55 *Geo.* III, c. 65 (1815). *cf. also* 15 and 16 *Vict.*, c. 50, s. 26, 38 (1852).

Mines. *See* Coals, Timber and Tin.

Mines. 2 and 3 *Vict.*, c. 58, s. 10. For the prevention of frauds by workmen in the mines of Cornwall (17 Aug. 1839).—Amended by 18 and 19 *Vict.*, c. 32, s. 28 (15 June 1855).

Mines. 21 and 22 *Vict.*, c. 109. Declaring and defining the respective rights of her majesty and the Duke of Cornwall to the mines and minerals in or under land below high water mark in or adjacent to Cornwall (2 Aug. 1858).

Mousehole. 31 and 32 *Vict.*, c. xlvi. For confirming orders of board of trade under General Piers acts 1861 for Brightlingsea, Mousehole, *etc.* (25 June 1868).

Penryn. 9 *Geo.* IV, c. 12. For indemnifying witnesses who may give evidence upon the Penryn disfranchisement bill (18 Apl. 1828).

Penryn. 31 and 32 *Vict.*, c. 46. For new electoral boundaries, etc. (13 July 1868).

NOTE.—The boundaries of the electoral district of Penryn and Falmouth are described in *Sch.* i.

Penryn. 33 and 34 *Vict.*, c. lxxxii. For con-

Pilchards. 5 *Geo.* I, c. 18. For recovering the credit of the British fishery in foreign parts and better securing the duties upon salt (1718).

Pilchards. 25 *Geo.* III, c. 58. For the encouragement of the pilchard fishery by allowing a further bounty upon pilchards taken, cured and exported (1785).—Continuation and amendment 26 *Geo.* III c. 45 (1786).



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**NOTE.**—By 19 *Geo. III*, c. 52 the duty was taken off salt and a proportionable duty put on pilchards consumed at home (1779). By 25 *Geo. III*, c. 58 the bounty of 7/- on the exportation of pilchards was increased to 9/- for the period between 25 June 1785 and 25 June 1786.

**Pilchards.** 52 *Geo. III*, c. 42. For amending the laws relating to bounties on pilchards (20 *Apl.* 1812).—Continued 59 *Geo. III*, c. 77 (6 July 1819).

**Pinnock, St.** 30 and 31 *Vict.*, c. 20. Inclosure act (31 May 1867).

**NOTE.**—The commissioners gave their assent to the enclosure of St. Pinnock 21 June 1866.

**Plymouth.** 31 *Geo. II*, c. 39. Land in Cornwall and Devon taken for fortifications (1757).—32 *Geo. II*, c. 30 (1758).—33 *Geo. II*, c. 11 (1759).

**Plymouth.** 14 *Geo. III*, c. 50. Land taken for dockyards (1774).—5 *Geo. IV*, c. xlix (3 June 1824).—17 and 18 *Vict.*, c. 15 (2 June 1854).

**Polbrock.** 37 *Geo. III*, c. 29. For making a canal, to be called the Polbrock canal, from Guinea port in St. Breock to Dunmeer bridge in Bodmin parish; and also a collateral cut from Cotton Wood near Ruthern bridge in Bodmin parish (3 *Mch.* 1797).

**Porthleven.** 51 *Geo. III*, c. cxcv. For constructing a harbour at Porthleven in Mount's bay (26 June 1811).—Amended by 53 *Geo. III*, c. xxxiv (15 *Apl.* 1813); 56 *Geo. III*, c. xxii (21 May 1816); 1 and 2 *Geo. IV*, c. xlii (19 *Apl.* 1821).

**Porthleven.** 32 and 33 *Vict.*, c. lxxiii. For the better regulation of the harbour of Porthleven. (12 July 1869).

**Post office.** 12 *Car. II*, c. xxxv, *sect.* xiii. For erecting and establishing a post office. A letter or packet post shall twice every week come by the way of Truro and Penrin to the town of Marketiew *alias* Marhasion (1660).

**Post office.** 9 *Anne*, c. xi, *sect.* xxvii. For establishing a general post office. A letter or packet post shall twice every week come by way of Truro and Penrin to the town of Penzance (1710).

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**Property Tax.** 46 *Geo. III*, c. 65, s. 40. Duchy to appoint commissioners for Cornwall (1806).

**Redd Down.** 9 and 10 *Vict.*, c. 117. Inclosure act (26 *Aug.* 1846).

**NOTE.**—The inclosure commissioners gave their assent to the inclosure of Tregear down in Egloskerry and Redd down 18 *Mch.* 1846.

**Redruth.** *See* Penryn.

**Redruth.** 5 *Geo. IV*, c. cxxi. For making a railway or tramroad from Redruth to Point Quay in Feock with branches, and for restoring, improving and maintaining the navigation of Restrongett creek (17 June 1824).—Further powers 16 and 17 *Vict.*, c. vi (9 May 1853).

**Redruth.** 2 and 3 *Vict.*, c. xii. For making a road from Redruth to and through Hayle (14 May 1839).

**Redruth.** 27 and 28 *Vict.*, c. cclxix. For making a railway from the Cornwall railway at Perranarworthal to the town of Redruth, with a line to join the West Cornwall line there, to be called the "Redruth and Falmouth junction railway" (25 July 1864).

**Rialton.** 57 *Geo. III*, c. 129. Vesting in his majesty part of the open commons and waste lands within the manor or royalty of Rialton and Retraighe *alias* Reterth, in St. Columb (11 July 1817).

**Salt.** 42 *Geo. III*, c. 93, s. 20, 21. For regulating the use of salt in curing pilchards (1802).—Excise duty on salt was abolished by 5 *Geo. IV*, c. 65 (1824). *cf. also* 39 *Geo. III*, c. 65 (1799).

**Saltash.** 2 *Geo. III*, c. 43. For repairing and widening several roads in Cornwall and Devon leading to Saltash (1762).—Term continued and powers enlarged 17 *Geo. III*, c. 79 (1777).—Continuation of term and alteration and enlargement of powers 42 *Geo. III*, c. xvii (1802).—The above three acts repealed and new provisions made 4 *Geo. IV*, c. vi (24 *Mch.* 1823).—Repealing the latter act, for more effectually repairing the roads and for making new roads 3 and 4 *Will. IV*, c. v (29 *Mch.* 1833).—Repealing previous act and for granting more effectual powers in lieu thereof 29 and 30 *Vict.*, c. cix (28 June 1866).

**Saltash.** 2 and 3 *Will. IV*, c. vii. For establishing a floating bridge over the river Tamar at Saltash (24 May 1832).—For empowering the Cornwall Railway Co. to purchase Saltash ferry and to maintain the same 10 and 11 *Vict.*, c. lxxii, ss. 18–20 (2 July 1847).

**Saltash.** 28 and 29 *Vict.*, c. cclxxxiii. For making a railway from the Cornwall railway near Saltash to the Tamar, Kit hill and Callington railway at Callington, to be called "The Saltash and Callington railway" (6 July 1865).

Scilly. 13 *Anne*, c. xxvi, sect. xxiv, xxvi. Relating to rogues and vagabonds. Masters of ships upon justices' warrants are to be compelled to take vagrants to the isles of Scilly (1713).

Scilly. 4 and 5 *Will.* IV, c. 43. For authorizing persons to act as justices of the peace in the isles of Scilly although not qualified according to law (13 Aug. 1834).

Sea sand. 7 *Jac.* I, c. xviii. For the taking, landing and carrying of sea sand for the bettering of ground and for the increase of corn and tillage within the counties of Devon and Cornwall (1609–10).—Act continued 3 *Car.* I, c. 5, sect. iii (1627), and 16 *Car.* I, c. 4, sect. xxxi (1640).

Seine fishing. 31 and 32 *Vict.*, c. 45, Pt. 5, s. 68. Sea fisheries act. Regulations as to coast of Cornwall (13 July 1868).

Sheriffs. Act of uncertain date, but *ante Edw.* III. All bailiffs, sheriffs, etc. that be receivers of wards of escheats shall be answerable to the exchequer, except the sheriff of Cornwall, etc. The sheriff of Devonshire shall be in these cases sheriff in Cornwall. *cf. Statutes of the realm* (1810) i, 197a.

Stannaries. *See Militia.*

Stannaries. 16 *Car.* I, c. xv. Against diverse incroachments and oppressions in the stannary courts (1640).

What gave rise to this hallucination was the fact that she was in possession of "Duchy Lands" in Cornwall under the will of Mr. John Rowe and of her grandfather who d. in 1804, and that the manor of Rialton given to her father by the same will, was given upon trust for him to sell it for the payment of the legacies, which he probably did, as he was the sole executor of the will. *cf. also The Standard* 5-8 Dec. 1843.

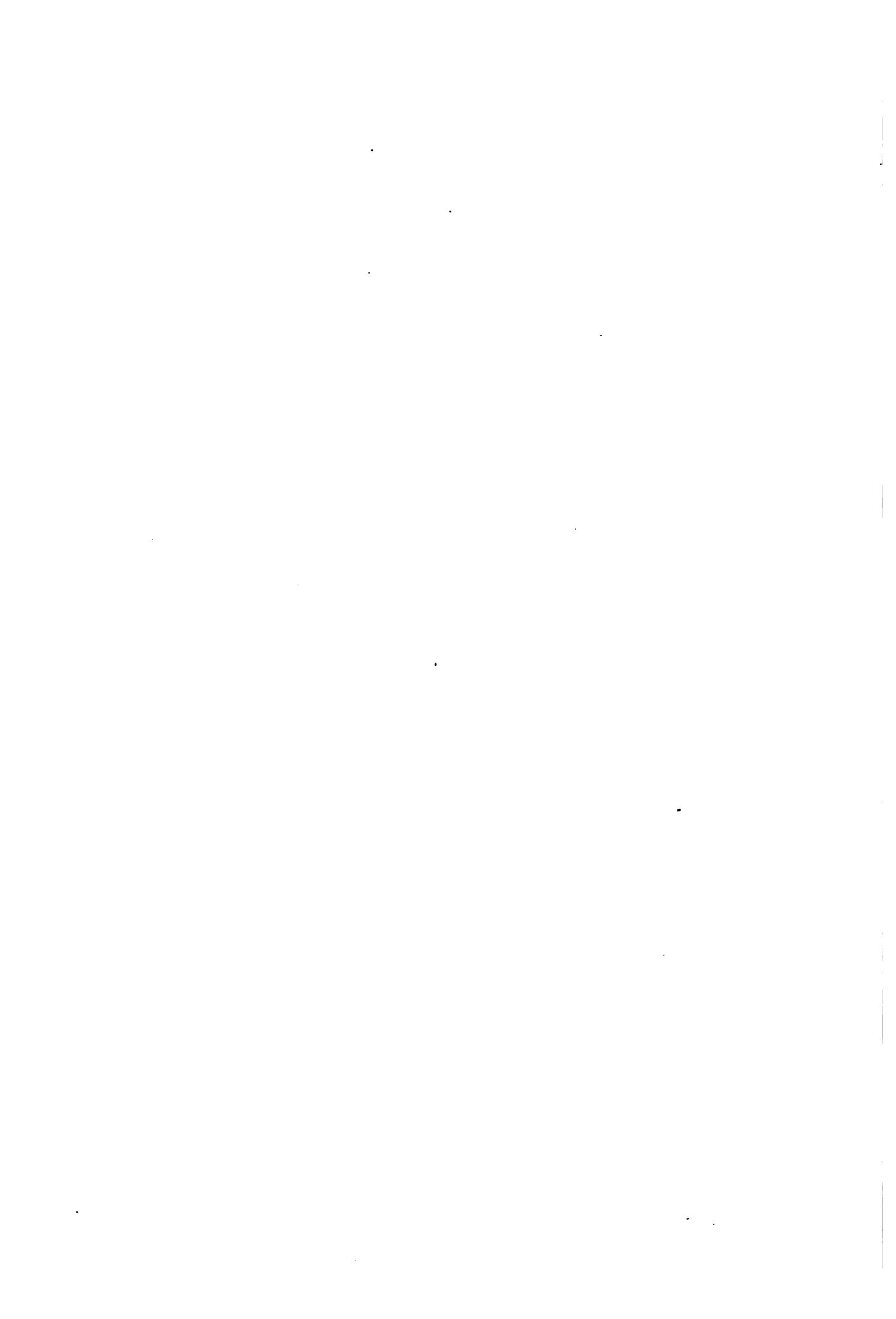
