





Fifthly, Travellers may from the Examples mentioned in this Catalogue, learn to take God's Blessing along with them, by hearing from some Godly Minister or other a Farewell Sermon of which Sortare Mr. Featly's to Sir Tho. Warner and his Company bound to the West-Indies, for their Farewell on Sept. 6. 1629. and Mr. Hardy's, occasion'd by the Voyage of Nathan. Wych, Esq; President to the East-Indies. A. D. 1658.

Sixthly, This Catalogue may induce publick-spirited Persons, to pick up such Tracts as are mentioned herein, and throw them into the Society's Store, that thereby the Society may henceforward be able to surnish their Missionaries with Accounts of the Places they are sent to.

Aving had the Honour to be nominated among Others a Member of your Society, in the Royal CHARTER for Institution of it in the Year 1701. I have from that Time thought my self obliged (as far as my private mean Abilities could serve) to labour and assist in promoting your great Designs of Doing Good. For we must acknowledge this to be a Christian Duty and Debt, That in our several Stations We Allowe unto God and our Neighbour, and must one day give Account of our Discharge or Neglect of it, according to the Powers and Opportunities we had in this Life. A daily Duty, that when honestly and willingly perform'd, brings along with it so much Comfort and Satisfaction in our Mortal State, as to give a Pledge and Foretaste of its greater Reward Above.

I had the farther Honour of receiving your Commands for drawing up some ACCOUNT of this Society, with their Pro-

ceedings and Success in 1706. which you have since thought sit to be enlarged, and brought down to the present time. In a pursuit of those Orders, the better to discharge my Trust, I had occasion to pick up several Tracts and Papers relating to the General Subject of the Propagation of the Gospel, Conversion of Insidels. Institution of the College at Rome de propaganda Fide, Missions of the Monks and Jesuites, Methods of the Inquisition, &c. But more especially to the particular Affairs of AMERICA, the first Discovery of those Regions fufficient to be called A NEW WORLD, the several Expeditions and Voyages made to every Coast and Port and River. the Advances and Settlements there made, the Tyranny and Cruelty of the Spaniards in MEXICO and PERO, their Baptizing in Blood, and then teaching a Religion of fuch outward Pomp and Ceremony, as was very little different from the Pagan Idolatry. Above All, I fought for the Relations and Journalls of our own Countrymen upon those Seas and Coasts, their Discoveries and Observations, their Settlement of Plantations and Colonies, their Improvements in Trade and Strength, their Conversation with the Natives, and their Endeavours to bring them over to Civility and Religion.

Upon this View, my Curiosity by degrees encreas'd the little Stock, and brought me in a tolerable Connexion of Books and Papers, relating to those Arguments. And because I saw an Affinity of other Matters, and a fort of necessary Dependence of Things and Places upon one another; I proceeded to gather up some of the chief Tracts, of antient and modern Geography, of Astronomical Observations, of Experiments in Hydrography, of Shipping, and the progress of Navigation, of Commerce and Exchange, of War, Peace, and Embassies, of Voyages and Travels to all Parts of the World, especially to AFRICA and the EAST-INDIES, that chiefly supply

our Traffick to AMERICA.

I found some Difficulty in making a small Collection of this Kind, especially in getting up the lesser Tracts and single Papers; which I thought therefore, if once dispers'd and carry'd back into various Hands, would be harder to recollect and put together

together again. For this Reason I preserv'd them, and within my own Intentions all along devoted them to your publick Use and Service. I now humbly offer them to your Acceptance and Custody, to be reposited in such a Place, and under such Directions, as the PRESIDENT and SOCIETY shall think fit to appoint by any standing Rules and Orders: Which I submit to their Judgment, and would not feem to prescribe my own Opinion in the Disposal of them. Only I wish the Place to be allotted for them, may be capable of containing a much larger. Accession of Volumes, Globes, Maps, &c. that no doubt will be foon brought in by other Hands. However, I do hereby engage for the Delivery of my little Store (according to this printed Catalogue) upon demand made on me or my Affigns, as foon as there is fet apart any fuch convenient Room or Place for the Reception and fafe Custody of the said Books and Papers, for the continual Use and Benefit of this Corporation and their Successors for ever.

I have often thought with some Regret, on the want of proper Evidences and Memoirs for us to have recourse to, as the Nature and Occasions of our Foreign Business may require. I hope the World will so interpret this Omission and Desect in us, as to believe that we took more care of others abroad, than of our felves at home; and had fent over feveral little Libraries for the Use of our Missionaries, and their People in those distant Parts, before we thought of providing for our own nearer Accommodation: And let it be consider'd, that the constant Demands of our Aid and Assistance for Churches, Missionaries, Schools, Books, and other Exigencies, have been so great and pressing, that they have for several Years taken up more than our ordinary Income, and before this time we must have contracted our Expenses and Designs, if Her M A-JESTY in Her Pious Disposition had not extended Her Royal Favours to us. Nor have we been hitherro able to afford our felves a common Place to meet in, but have ow'd that Conveniency to the generous Care and Kindness of the President,

our continual Friend and Benefactor.

Hence the providing of a Select LIBRARY for the Propagation of the Gospel, seems of necessity to be assign'd over to another Age, unless some unexpected Friend and Patron shall arise up to our present Relief, and by charitable Gift or Legacy, supply us with a Stock sufficient for the Establishment and Maintenance of it. To keep up the Hopes of sinding such a pious Founder and Benefactor, and to excite some worthy Man of Wealth and publick Spirit, I have here form'd a rude Scheme of what may be done, and offer a little toward the Beginning of it:

Where any publick Work is visibly wanting, it is an honest Labour to bring in some Materials towards laying the Foundation; and so to leave the raising and finishing Part to longer Time, and more able Workmen. The Truth is, for any single Person to undertake the sounding a complete Library, requires a Genius, as well as a Fortune, above the common fort of Mankind, a BODLET, a TENISON, or some such superiour Spirit of Piety, Learning, and Liberality.

However, as the drawing of one Furrow was formerly the Designation of a City, so I hope this rude Draught may direct a little to the raising, surnishing, and endowing a sull and persect AMERICAN LIBRARY, to contain all forts of Books, Charts, Maps, Globes, Instruments, and other Utensils, that can possibly tend to the more exact Survey and Knowledge of the Earth and Seas, and Heavenly Bodies; and to be more especially stock'd with such Discourses, Letters, Journals, and other Instructions, as may best serve for the Conduct of our Missionaries, the Help of Mariners and Merchants, the Information of Strangers, and the Entertainment of all Persons, who wish well to the Propagation of our Faith, and to the Trade and Commerce of our Country, among ALL NATIONS.

I might easily suggest, that the LIBRARY here projected would serve to many excellent Purposes. Our own Members would be all glad to be better inform'd of the Air and Soil, the Manners and Customs, the Product and Trade, the Government and Religion of those Provinces, committed in Charity to our peculiar Charge. And when the special Books and

Papers are near at hand, they will often make it their business and pleasure, to satisfie their Curiosity and improve their Knowledge in the Assairs intrusted to them. And the consequence would be, that the more perfectly they understood the State of those Countries and People, they would be the better assected to do them good, and more able to advise and resolve on the best methods of so doing. Such a conveniency of Books and Writings with an easie Access to them would be our School and General Study, would instruct and improve us in our noble Profession of seeking and labouring to propagate the Gosre L of CHRIST.

In many of our Meetings and Committees, there arise in course such Questions and Debates, as are best decided by an Appeal to the authority of particular Tracts or Maps or Writings; and if they are within our Search and View upon any such emergent occasion, it will save trouble and needless Altercation and bring the Matters in question to an easie and effectual Issue. We can direct our Consultations, govern our Resolves, and answer all the Addresses and Proposals made to us with more certainty and expedition, when we have our Evidences open, and as it were the proper ORACLES before us

A Refort to this variety of Books and Papers would be of fome confiderable use and service to other Bodies of Men. The Honourable Commissioners for Trade and Plantations might here upon occasion command a Transcript of some valuable Notices of things that come immediately before them. Articles and Agreements made for Commerce and Exchange of Goods, Petitions for Equity and Right, Answers of Decision and Redress, Orders, Instructions, Reports, and many other Acts of mutual Correspondence between our Government here, and our English Colonies in those Parts: Of which uncommon kind, great numbers are to be found even in this poor Collection, and a more abundant Stock will I hope be soon added to it.

The Honourable Lords of the ADMIRALTY will please to observe, that they may have Searches here made for Commissions.

missions, Sailing Orders, Secret Instructions, Relations of Seafights, Descents, Retreats, &c. Proceedings in Courts Martial, and other Maritime Assairs, of which nature Many are here preserv'd and Many may be daily recover'd, which would perhaps otherwise be lost for ever. So likewise the Judges, the Advocates, and Proctors concern'd in the Court of ADMIRALTY might here find some of the oldest Precedents for Letters of Marque and Reprizal, Trials for Piracy and Depredation; Compacts for Freight and Passage; Allowances for Demorage, Averidge, and other Contributions; Policies of Assurance, Bills of Exchange; Complaints, Proceedings, Sentences, Appeals, and like Forms and Methods in Maritime Causes under the cognizance of that High and Ancient Court.

Nay the Historian, the Herald, and other Remembrancers of worthy Names and Families, may here find a Foundation, as it were, established upon the Floods, to many noble Houses, that have sprung from brave Adventurers and Commanders at Sea, who loved their Nation and did Honour to it, by spreading the Terrour of our Arms, and bringing home Spoils and Trophies in Wealth and Glory to the Publick and themselves. Such were the immortal Names of Patriots, HAWKINS, DRAKE, FROBISHER, RALEGH, CAVENDISH, SOMERS, &c.

And the greatest Ministers of State, might please to think, that such a Repository of Books and Papers of Navigation and Commerce might at one time or other be of some advantage in the most arduous Affairs of these Kingdoms: Particularly in afferting our Dominion of the Seas, in keeping up the wonted Superiority of English Fleets and Navies, in securing and encouraging our Fishery and our Manusactures, in forming and maintaining our Treaties and Alliances; there being already put into this impersect Collection the greatest part of the Articles of Peace and Amity, Alliance and Commerce, that have been made between this Crown and other States and Princes from the Beginning of K. James I. to the present Times: All in their first Editions publish'd by Authority, more correct than the later Recapitulations of them. To these are added

many private Papers of Negotiations and Intrigues, Cautions and Recoveries, Secret Articles, and other Political Mysteries, that may be turn'd and applied to some Use and Service at one time or other.

And in a narrower Sphere, all our English Companies establish'd for Trade and Commerce, to the East-Indies, to the Levant Seas, to Africa, to Russia, to Hudson's-Bay, &c. might here find a great many Treatises and Memorials relating to their peculiar Affairs; and perhaps of such Weight and Importance to them as may encourage each Company to lay the like Foundation of a Singular Library for all Books and Writings and Remains whatever, that more immediately concern their own Body.

But especially the GOVERNOURS and other Administrators of Justice in her Majesty's Plantations before they go from hence to take possession of their Charge, may the better qualifies themselves, if they please to see what has been written about their peculiar Province: When the Discovery and Settlement was made, what the Laws and particular Constitutions are, what Good Names and sufficient Estates have been gotten by Justice and Moderation, what Examples of Ruin and Insamy to Tyrants and Oppressors, what Credit and Comfort in Governing always and every where According to Law.

However (what is our greatest Concern) the Benefit of Access to this AMERICAN LIBRARY will be very convenient to our MISSIONARIES, when first approved and retained by Us. For it is well known, that upon their Entrance into this Service of God and his Church in Foreign Parts, they are so uncertain of their transportation by the Stay of Ships, Change of Winds, and other casualties, that they have generally a void Space of time upon their hands, which they cannot better spend, than in such a sober studious Place, where they may enquire after the Country and People they are going to, and may in effect converse with them before they see them. They may at least pick up such intelligence and notices of the Seas and Coasts and Rivers, of the Planters and Merchants, of the Soil and Air, of the Latitude and Situation, as may not at their

their Landing there expose them to a perfectly New and Unknown World, and drop them altogether Strangers and Pilgrims in it. The better acquainted they are with that Sphere wherein they are to act, the better Figure they will make in it; All the odd appearances of Mankind are commonly owing to

Ignorance and Surprize.

It might indeed take up their whole Time to study the One Necessary Thing, the Obligations of their Mission and the Duties and Difficulties of it; they will find here a good Collection of Discourses and Advices to that End and Purpose of recommending the wifest and most successful Methods of Propagating and Promoting the Gospel of Christ. But besides their knowledge of the General Duty, they must be let into the particular Disposition of the Country and Nation wherein they are to exercise their Mission, they must understand somewhat of the Constitution of that Government they are to live under, of the first Rife and following Advances of that Colony or Plantation that is to receive them, the Temper and Infirmities of the People, the present State of Letters and Religion among em, the most prevailing Errours and Divisions, and whatever else is most necessary to be known for their better discharge of the Care of those Souls. And as that Care is to extend toward the Negro Slaves and the Indian Natives, they might here examine the various Accounts that have been given by Eye-witnesses of their Genius and Capacity, their Notions and Manners, their Prejudices and their Obstinacy in them. to enable themselves to converse a little with those ignorant Natives, they might here dip into the Indian Languages, or the chief Dialects of the Borderers on us, by turning over the feveral Essays of Grammar and Dictionary, that are here to be met with in one or more of those Tongues, and especially by examining THE INDIAN GRAMMAR, and THE INDIAN BIBLE prepared and publish'd by the industrious and pious Mr. ELLIOT; with the Lord's Prayer, Creed, Commandments, short Catechisms, and other familiar Expofitions of our common Articles of Faith, which have been printed in New-England under the Encouragement of Mr. Boyle and

and the Corporation for the Propagation of the Gospel unto the Indians there adjoyning, and are most of them to be found in this Collection. Or if they have not time to run over the Books themselves, the very Catalogue however will supply them with the sull Titles of Such, as they may procure to carry with them, or may leave or send a Commission for them.

They ought all to furnish themselves with such Tracts and Differtations as recommend and explain the Great Duty of Planting the Gospel in All Nations, and direct the most effe-Etual ways and means of bringing over the poor Pagan Souls to Christian Knowledge and Salvation. All which are so directly useful to every Missionary, that I wish they could be made a Part of the Library allowed to Him by the Society. To supply the

want of that Accommodation, it seems the more necessary, that every intended Missionary should know where and how to look into them, and to draw out such Notes and Observations, as may especially remind 'em and assist 'em when they come Abroad. It is certain, that a Man of Conscience with his Thoughts upon the Indies may here prosecute his preparatory Studies with so much advantage and delight, that it would not be amis, if all our Missionaries were oblig'd hereaster by a Standing Order to take a previous Course of Studies in this Li-

brary for some Weeks before their Expedition.

For their fuller Information, I have cast in a good number of those Narratives and controversial Letters which the Jefuites and other Orders call'd Religious in the Church of Rome have publish'd to the World concerning their Labours and Successes (as they represent them) in spreading their New Gospel throughout the East-Indies, Ethiopia, Congo, Tartary, and other Insidel Parts; and especially of the Dissimulation and Bigotry of the Jesuites in China; where they have made themfelves Idolaters, instead of turning Men from Idols to serve the Living God. Together with all the Accounts I could gather up of the Society De propaganda Fide establish'd at Rome, first instituted and all along employed rather to convert Hereticks than Pagan Unbelievers, and therefore a standing Part of the INQUISITION, that Court which they call HOLY, and think the Proceedings MOST CHRISTIAN, when Nothing upon Earth can be more opposite to Christ and his holy Religion. I have added the Accounts of the Propagation of the Gospel in the East by the Danish Missionaries and some Relations of the Care of the States and Companies of the United Provinces in fettling Ministers of the Reformed Religion within their Colonies and Factories in the EAST-INDIES: And lastly, the Progress in some good Designs of promoting Christian Knowledge and true Devotion among the Papists in IRELAND, the Ignorant Sort in the High-Lands of SCOT-LAND, in WALES, &c. because these Matters are all in a connexion and dependance upon our Office of Propagating the Gospel. Among

Among the Uses to be made of this AMERICAN LI-BRART, I ought not to forget that it is capable of becoming the common Fund and Treasury of all the Remains of that Country, and of all the following Discoveries and Remarks that shall be hereafter made upon it. In such a fix'd Repository, some modest Mariners and Travellers may lay up their own Notes and Observations, who being diffident of their own Performance, and afraid of a critical World, would not suffer those Essays to appear in Publick. And even the most exact and perfect Writers would perhaps be equally pleased to depofite here their Journals and Itineraries, that for want of due encouragement, they could not get printed in their life-time, and yet would not have Posterity deprived of the knowledge and intelligence to be received from them. THIS however would be a convenient Place to preserve and dispose in order the several Letters and loose Papers that come so frequently from our Friends and Correspondents in those Parts; and all the Descriptions and Accounts that every Misfionary might be defired or enjoined to give of the particular District committed to him, relating not only to the State of Religion, but to the Natural History of those Ends of the Earth, of the Climates, Soils, Seasons, Winds, Tides, Waters, &c. of the Animals, Vegetables, Minerals, Fossiles, &c. of the Manufactures, Inventions, Commodities, and whatever may conduce to the better Cultivation and Improvement of those vast Regions, and the Trade with them.

To direct a Missionary in the Method of doing this Service to the World, there be very good Advices and Instructions given by Dr. Robert Hooke in his Preface to the Historical Relation of CETLON by Mr. Robert Knox. 1681. Fol. and by Mr. Boulton in his General Heads for the Natural History of a Country, for the sake of those who go beyond Seas. 1700. 8vo. and in other Tracts dispersed in this Collection.

Cause of serving God and our Country. The Improvement of any Suggestion here made, and the offer of maturer Thoughts I leave to the Judgment of the Society, and the Discretion of

every Member. In the mean time I doubt not, but that this imperfect Foundation will by degrees arise up into a consummate Building. Some Royal Bounty, or some other Noble Beneficence will provide a convenient Site and Structure for Us; Some pious Gifts and Legacies will be daily encreasing our Store of Books, Papers, Charts, Maps, and other Literary Merchandize. Then some one or other Publick Spirit will found a Librarian's Place, and affign a competent Salary or Support to it. Some other Endowments and Conditions will be fettled for Agents and itinerant Correspondents to procure and transmit hither all manner of Draughts, Figures and other Representations of the things of Nature and Art: And especially to pick up all the written Journals of Voyages, Travels, and Adventures; all the Descriptions of Coastings, Bearings, Soundings, Sands, Shelves, Rocks, Tides, and all manner of Observations and Experiments now lying in a thousand private Hands of Mariners, Merchants, Strangers, and perhaps Widows, Orphans, and Executors, who understand nothing of them, and would take but little care to preserve them from Fire or other Confumption.

It was a Glory done to this Nation by Mr. HAKLVYT and Mr. PVRCHAS (both Clergymen of the Church of England) that they spared no Pains or Cost, to hunt after and gather up a great variety and plenty of such Journals and Maritime Papers, which had otherwise long before this time been wreckt and lost for ever. Mr. Robert Ashley, in his Dedication of the Extracts of COCHIN CHINA to Sir Maurice Abbot Governour of the Honourable Company of Merchants trading to the East-Indies. 1633. concludes thus. " I could wish, " that as the remote Navigation published by the Venetian 46 Rhamusius awakened the Industry of Mr. HAK, LUTT and " happely of Mr. PURCHAS after him, to their diligent " Gatherings of the most remarkable Voyages of our Nation: So some other able Person ( of which our Country hath "good Store) were encouraged and stirred up to continue fuch Collections. Yet not only to the recording the Exploits of our own Nation; but also to collect and publish

"what they find worth the regarding amongst Foreigners, that may any way be serviceable for the instruction of Ours.

Now if such a common Bank or Treasury of Papers were once fix'd and establish'd in this Great City, I doubt not but many worthy Persons would be casting into it some or other valuable Remains, that would not otherwise outlive the prefent Possessor of them. Heirs and Executors are very apt to think Manuscripts and loose Papers to be a fort of Refuse not worth the keeping; and therefore if they could hear of any proper Office to receive them, they would transmit them thither for Acknowledgment and Thanks, or at least for some other small Consideration. There be now living many industrious Collectors of Voyages and Travels, Navigation, Commerce, &c. who probably after their Decease would not trust them to the custody of a careless Heir, or mercenary Administrator; but will be glad to hear of fuch a Publick Place as this, wherein they may be fafely disposed and preserved with the Memory of their Donour. If such a curious and judicious Collector as Mr. PEPTS had known of any fuch Defign, it is very probable that He would have given all his laborious Effects that way, and they would in fuch manner have made a National Treasure to Posterity.

To raise and fill by degrees such a LITERARY BANK I willingly subscribe and am ready to pay in this little Stock of mine, to begin with. And to prevent all Deceit or Mistake, I think it proper to present you with this Printed Catalogue of the sew several Books and Papers I have thus thrown together for your Use, that you may have the surer title to them, and that you may see what great room is lest for more ample Benefations of the like kind. In drawing the Catalogue, I have not only recited the general Titles of the distinct Volumes; but I have pointed at the particular Discourses, Letters, Instruments, and other eminent Acts contain'd in them; which I have likewise cast into a Chronological Series and Order of Succession, that so the bare Catalogue may be in Itself a fort of History of NAVIGATION and COMMERCE from the first Discovery

of the New World to the present State of Things.

And I did this with another View and Defire, that the future Publishers of any Volumes of VOYAGES and TRAVELS may observe such an orderly Method in the Connexion of their several Tracts according to Age and Time of Writing, which by fuch fuccessive dependance and reference would give Light and Strength to One Another, and the Booksellers and Readers would be trading in a Chain of Pearls instead of a Rope of Sand. I intimate this with the more willing mind, because few Books are more entertaining and instructive to the World, than fuch various Collections, and because the most accurate Descriptions of Remote Parts are still confined to small single Tracts, or perhaps to short and loose Papers, written upon the Spot, as Things and Thoughts offer'd themselves to the Senses of the Writer: If these were digested and put together in their native Simplicity, they would make a better figure and ferve to better purpose, than the elaborate Work of any one Author.

We might apply this to our immediate Province of AMERICA, of which the Coasts and Navigable Rivers, and All that relates to the Geography and Natural History of it, have been best described and accounted for by Eye-witnesses, who have sent or brought over the plain Narratives and Observations under their own hands. Now if a Collection of these separate Sheets were digefted according to Time and Place, and so publish'd in a Set of larger Volumes, this would be of good. Use and Service, and I hope therefore this CATALOGUE will lend fome encouragement and help to it. For example, in this short Catalogue may be found about twenty original Tracts relating to Newfoundland; above fifty concerning Virginia; a hundred . or more of New-England; and so on in proportion to our other Colonies and Plantations. Now if these were connected in due order of Place and Time, and fairly put into one or more Volumes, it would prevent the scattering and losing of many valuable Pieces, and tend much to encourage the reading and remembring of things of the nearest and most natural Importance to us.

But my Intention was not so much to Beg, as to fet a little Example of Giving. Only upon an occasional mention of this Design some Friends and Promoters of good Works readily cast in some Books, to the Titles whereof I have thought it honest to add the Donors Names. While the Press was working, I continued to gather up all the Reliques I could meet with of the like kind, and refolv'd not to be too much discouraged by those terrible Lets and Impediments of Doing Good, Trouble and Expence; and these additional Books and Papers I have cast into an Appendix or Austarium at the end of the other; which in a following Impression may be inserted in the same View and Order. There is an INDEX of Persons and Matters drawn out by the care and pains of the Rev. Mr. Robert Watts, which may be of great use to the dili-gent Searcher after these things; as it brings the variety of Matters into one view, and directs the fingular Use and Application of 'em.

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
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
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
