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PREFACE.



The following pages are the result of research and study during leisure hours snatched from an active business life of the last ten years. No other seems to have made any effort to collect or preserve any extended record of this family, and the facts here recorded have been compiled from wills, deeds, Friends' records, family bibles, tombstones, and such like original sources. While the disentangling of a great mass of constantly increasing material has often been very preplexing, the self imposed labor has been one of pleasure and has been pursued, more as a recreation than a task. The whole has been gathered, item by item, a little from this one and a little from that one, one fact from one source and another elsewhere.

The author is well aware of the incompleteness of the work, but to those who understand the subject this needs no apology. The lack of fuller details, in many instances, has been owing to apparrent apathy and the want of cooperation on the part of many who might have furnished imporant data. Absolute accuracy has been aimed at so far as has been possible, but in a work like this, where proper names and dates are enumerated by thousands, it is quite probable there are occasional errors. In many instances it has been necessary to depend upon others for copies of records, and in some cases the writing has been

so carelessly done that it was difficult to decipher. In the spelling of proper names, that found in the original or that given by the copyist has been followed, except in a few instances where this was positively known to be wrong. Such inaccuracies as have been discovered in the printed matter, and such additional information as has come to hand, will be found in the appendix. Mere typographical errors which cannot mislead are not noticed.

Grateful acknowledgements are tendered to all those who have rendered no small aid in making valuable suggestions and furnishing important data. Of these, it is proper to make especial mention of Gilbert Cope, the well-known genealogist, and J.-W. Barnard, Esq., of West Chester; Col. Franklin-A. Dick, Spencer Bonsall, and the late William-F. CHAPTER I.

A SHORT ACCOUNT OF EARLY PENNSYLVANIA SETTLERS BEARING THE NAME OF CARTER.

Before entering upon the main subject of the work, short sketches will be given of some of the other early settlers bearing the name of Carter. This was not a part of the original plan of this book and no special effort was made with this end in view; but recent examination of scattering notes, picked up while searching for information relating to Jeremiah Carter, led the writer to believe that their compilation would form an interesting, and perhaps instructive chapter. Since no effort has been made to collect material for this special subject, it cannot be supposed that the chapter is an exhaustive one. It is really only a starting point for those who desire to pursue the subject further.

I. EDWARD CARTER, of Aston in the Parish of Bampton, Oxfordshire, England, emigrated to Pennsylvania, in the year 1682. Before leaving England, he purchased 250 acres of land of William Penn, which, in 1684, was located in Aston township, Chester [now Delaware] county. He was a carpenter by trade, and first resided in Chichester, but subsequently removed to his land in Aston,

where he probably lived until his death. Edward Carter seems to have been quite an active citizen, as his name is mentioned frequently in the early Provincial records. He was one of the jurors called to attend the first session of Court convened for Chester county, which met 14th, February, 1683. In 1684, he was appointed one of the collectors "to gather the assessments," for Chester township. He was appointed constable for Northlev in 1686. [Northlev seems to have been the name given to Aston before 1687.] He was a member of the Provincial Assembly in 1688. He was a member of the Society of Friends. He was appointed one of the trustees for Chester Meeting property, 5, 10 mo. 1687, and was, in consequence, one of the trustees of the lot donated by Jurian Keen, in 1688, "to the use and behoof of the said Chester meeting of the people of God called Quakers, and their successors for ever." The first Chester meeting house was completed on this lot in 1693. It appears that Friends' meetings were regularly held at the house of Edward Carter, as the following entry is found in the records of Chichester and Concord (now Concord) Monthly Meeting, 23, 7 mo. 1703: "The meeting formerly ordered to be att Edward Carters the Last fifth day of every month is now Removed to Chichester meeting house." The former order does not seem to have been recorded. The name of Edward Carter's wife seems to have been Margaret.

By a will, dated 17, 2 mo. 1699, and recorded at Philadelphia, Alice Tremain, of Aston, widow, devised legacies to John Baldwin* [who married Katharine Turner, née Carter,] and to his wife and daughter; also to Edward, Margaret and Robert Carter, and to John, Prudence, Hannah and Lydia Carter the children of Robert Carter. Edward Carter and his son Robert were residuary legatees and executors.

At Concord Monthly Meeting, 12, 5 mo., 1703, a letter dated 21, 4 mo. 1703, was received from Hannah Hilt, widow of John, complaining of the executors of Alice Tremain for refusing to give a Bible which was willed to her late husband. The meeting appointed George Pearce and Philip Roman to speak to Edward and Robert Carter [executors] about it. At the meeting held 23, 7 mo. 1703, "Margrett Carter makes report to this meeting that the Bible is delivered according to order."

The last mention of Edward Carter, as living, is the minute above referred to, 12, 5 mo. 1703, and it is supposed he died shortly after this date, as the report at the meeting on 23, 7 mo. 1703, is made by his wife, instead of by himself.

Robert Carter was the "only son and heir" of Edward above. He was for many years a resident of Aston township, and succeeded to the title of the land located by his father. In 1702 he was the owner of 375 acres in that township. In 1717 the Aston land passed to his son John. He was elected a member of Assembly from Chester county in 1698 and 1699, and again in 1703. He was settled in Marlborough in 1722, but removed to Kennett before his death in 1750 or 1751. Robert Carter and Lydia Walley declared intentions of marriage at Chester Monthly Meeting, 10, 7 mo. and 1, 8 mo. 1688, and "things being clear conserning ym they are left to their liberty to proseed according to Truth's order." They were probably married soon after. She was probably a neice of Robert Wade, or of his wife, who had settled at the mouth of Chester Creek about 1675 and were very prominent in the early history of that locality. Robert Carter and his wife were members of Chester Friends' Meeting until about 1694 when they were joined to Chichester Meeting. In 1709 they again became members of Chester Meeting. Robert seems to have lost his membership in the Society before 1720. Lydia Carter and her daughter Mary received a certificate from Chester Monthly Meeting to New Garden, 30, 3 mo. 1720, from which it appears that the mother was a preacher.

Robert and Lydia (Walley) Carter had the following children:

- i. Prudence, b. 6, 11 mo. 1689; m. Caleb Pusey, Jr., 5, 9 mo. 1712.
- ii. Fohn, b. 8, 4 mo. 1691; d. 21, 2 mo. 1693.
- iii. Hannah, b. 22, 12 mo. 1692; m. Stephen Harlan, 26, 7 mo. 1723.
- iv. Lydia, m. Joseph Coebourn, Jr., 22, 3 mo. 1718.
- v. Fohn, m. Isabell Atkinson, 3 mo. 1716.
- vi. Mary.

If the records are correct, there were two sons named *John*, the first dying in infancy.

John Carter, of Aston, son of Robert and Lydia, seems to have been a blacksmith. He married Isabell Atkinson at Falls Meeting, Bucks county, — 3 mo. 1716. Isabell Carter presented her certificate from Middletown, Bucks county, to Chester Monthly Meeting, 30, 10 mo. 1717. John Carter died, June, 1760.

From Friends' records, wills, etc., John and Isabell Carter appear to have had the following children:

- john, m. Barbara Ruth, dau. of Francis and Barbara,
 25, 3 mo. 1749, and had a son Isaac and a dau. Lydia,
 and possibly a son Joseph.
- ii. Edward.
- iii. Robert, m. in 1753.
- iv. Samuel, m. Mary Barnes, (?) in 1756, and seems to have settled in North Carolina.
- v. Joseph, d. 1765; seems to have had a son Hugh and a dau. Sarah.
- vi. Hannah, m. Samual Farro in 1756.

Perhaps there was another daughter Margaret.

Katharine Carter, before mentioned, probably came to Pennsylvania in 1682. She came as a servant* to John Blunston, who came from Derbyshire, England in 1682, and settled in Darby township. In 1687 she married Edward Turner, in Philadelphia. Edward Turner died shortly afterwards and his widow, Katharine, married John Baldwin, of Aston township, carpenter, 4. 4 mo. 1689. This marriage also took place in Philadelphia. On the 30, 4 mo. 1702, John Baldwin, obtained a warrant for 100 acres of land, "fifty thereof in right of his own service to Joshua Hastings, and fifty in right of his wife Katharine, servant to John Blunston."

They had two children, Ruth and John, the latter of whom married Hannah Johnson. John Baldwin, Jr., was a saddler, in Chester, and died in 1728. John Baldwin, Sr., died in 1732 leaving considerable property.

II. JOSEPH CARTER came from Cheshire, England, about 1698 and settled in Providence township, Chester county. He was a Friend and was attached to Chester Monthly Meeting "y° 28th of y° 9 month 1698." The record reads, "Joseph Carter late of Newton meeting in Chishire in old England produced his certivicate to y° satisfection of the meeting." He probably belonged to Providence particular meeting. For several years his name appears quite frequently on the meeting records. On 28, 4 mo. 1708, "Providence meeting informs of Joseph Carter being concerned with one not of our Comunion in relation to marriage, this meeting having laboured with him to convince him of his error & advises him to desist."† On the 30, 6 mo. 1708, it is recorded that Joseph Carter, contrary

to advice of friends, "hath actually married to one who doth not any wayes profess the truth with us," and is therefore disowned as to membership.

In 1701-2 Joseph Carter appeared at Court as constable for Edgemont township. In 1711 he held 114 acres of land in that township. He was a taxable in Upper Providence in 1715. In 1722 he was taxed upon land valued at £30 in Edgemont township, but is set down as a non-resident. John-Hill Martin, Esq, of Philadelphia, has in his possession, a copy of the original "Articles of Agreement between Jos. Carter, Jos. Carter, Jr., and Jacob Carter of ye one part, and John Crosby, Junior, and Richard Crosby, all of ye township of Ridley," etc., dated 24 December, 1740.* Possibly this is the same Joseph, and that Joseph, Jr., and Jacob were his sons.

Deborah Carter, daughter of Joseph, married Abraham Darlington in 1712.† Deborah Carter seems to have been from Cheshire, Eng. Abraham Darlington was the son of Job and Mary, of Darnhall, a small township in Cheshire, England. On the 30th, January, 1718–9, Job Darlington wrote from England to his son as follows: "My dear son Abraham I saw on Tuesday last Joseph Carter, thy first father in law and he desired to be remembered to you all," etc. It is probable that Joseph Carter (II) was a near relative of Deborah, possibly her father. If so, then he must have returned to England in 1719 on a visit. Deborah Carter did not long survive her marriage, for in 1716 Abraham Darlington contracted a second marriage with Elizabeth Hillborn of Bucks county.

III. GEORGE CARTER came from Bucklebury in Berkshire, England, about the year 1714, as on the 27th of September of that year he purchased 102 acres of John

Wilson in Bradford township, Chester county, and is named as "late of Bucklebury," etc. He settled in that part of the township which, after the division, became East Bradford. On the 1st of November, 1716, he purchased 260 acres of James Whitacre. George Carter, George Strode and John Willis erected a mill in Bradford in 1720, which was then called Bradford Mill, but for more than a century it has been known as Strode's mill. George Carter died in 1727. His wife's name was Elizabeth.

They had the following children:

- i. Anna, m. William Mack.
- ii. Rachel, m. (1st.) Abraham Marshall, 29, 3 mo. 1740; (2d.) Richard Baker, 7, 11 mo. 1754.
- iii. George, m. Lydia Worth, 19, 4 mo. 1744.
- iv. Elizabeth, m. Samuel Worth, 27, 10 mo. 1744.
- v. John, b. 26, 11 mo. 1723; m. Hannah Cope, 10, 2 mo. 1746; and d. 14, 6 mo. 1770.

A full account of the descendants of John and Hannah (Cope) Carter will be found in the Genealogy of the Cope Family, by Gilbert Cope, a copy of which may be seen in the library of the Pennsylvania Historical Society at Philadelphia.

IV. WILLIAM CARTER, of Wapping, in the county of Middlesex, England, was among the first purchasers of land in Philadelphia under the propriety of William Penn. He owned land in the neighborhood of Second and Chestnut Streets. A cross street was cut through this land and was named Carter's Alley, though more recently it has been changed to Carter Street. William Carter was a man of considerable wealth and was much engaged in land transactions. In the office of the Recorder of Deeds in Philadelphia, his deeds occur very frequently, especially before 1700. The first one recorded

is dated "6th 2nd mo. 1685" and signed 7th July, 1686. It conveys land to Thomas Howell and describes William Carter as "of ye Citie and county of Philadelphia." From the Records of the Common Council of Philadelphia it appears that he was a very active citizen. He was appointed an alderman for the City of Philadelphia, by William Penn, on 25 October, 1701,* and became thereby one of the Associate Justices [Judges] of the City Court,† a position he held for many years. He appears as clerk of the market in 1721

The Provincial Council of Pennsylvania were indebted to William Carter "12th of ye 7th mo 1683," for various things, pork, wheat, and a loan of a small amount of money.

In the account book of Nathaniel Allen, ship cooper, of Philadelphia, (now in the possession of William John Potts, of Camden, N. J.), is found an account with William Carter, which begins "9th mo 30 day 1699" and ends "9 mo 25 day 1707."

According to the Friends' records of Philadelphia, William Carter was buried 21, 12 mo., 1738. His will is recorded in Will Book F, p. 101, in the Register of Wills' office, Philadelphia. It was signed 6 November, 1738, and proved 16 March, 1739. The will is very long, occupying six large folio pages of manuscript. He is named as blockmaker, of Philadelphia. He was a man of considerable wealth and made bequests to various charitable purposes.

He mentions his wife Mary, but does not mention any children, and it is possible that he either had none living or that he never had any.

He refers to his sister's daughter, Sarah Williams, but does not name the sister.

He speaks of his brother Edward's grand-son, Edward-Otto Byard, merchant in Antigua, W. I.

He mentions his kinswoman Katharine Gregory, and her daughters Elizabeth and Mary.

His kinswoman Mary Smith wife of William.

His wife's daughter Mary Morris.

His kinsman, Robert Carter, of Bucks county.

The two daughters of his kinsman, William Carter, of Bucks county, deceased.

He refers to relatives near Limehouse on the Thames east of London.

Mary Carter, wife of William above, was probably a widow when she married him, as he refers to her daughter in his will. In her own will she refers to her son Howell Sutton, which would indicate that her first husband's name was Sutton. Mary Carter of the City of Philadelphia, widow of William (IV,) died about the beginning of the year 1748. Her will is recorded in Will Book I, p. 39. The original will signed 22 June, 1746; first codicil 28 Nov. 1746; and second codicil 20 Nov. 1747. It was proved 16 January, 1748.

She mentions her friend James Pemberton, of Philadelphia.

Her trusty friends William Logan and Israel Pemberton merchants of Philadelphia.

Her much esteemed friends Michael Lightfoot and Daniel Stanton.

Her son Howell Sutton, if yet living.

Her son-in-law John Morris and Mary his wife.

Her grand-sons William Morris and John Morris, and grand-daughter Mary Morris.

She also mentions Joseph Morris, brother of John.

The witnesses to the will, Peter Stretch, C. Brockden and Owen Jones; to first codicil, C. Brockden and Owen Jones; to second codicil, Joseph King and Owen Jones.

Katharine Carter, wife of William, died at Philadelphia, 2, 7 mo. 1720. She may have been the first wife of the above William, and Mary who is named in his will, his second wife.

William Carter son of William and Mary, was buried 27, 6 mo. 1729, according to Philadelphia Friends' records. He may have been a son of William of Wapping, and his wife Mary. If so he was probably quite young.

V. EDWARD CARTER, who at his death is named as of Bucks county, was probably in the Province of Pennsylvania at a very early date, and was possibly the brother, spoken of in the will of William Carter, before referred to.

He does not seem to have been a land owner, as no deeds are recorded in his name. His name is signed to a petition in the Penn Manuscripts, preserved in the Pennsylvania Historical Society, dated 18, 3 mo. 1691.

Letters of Administration were granted at Philadelphia to William Byles, on the estate of Edward Carter, late of Bucks county, 5 December, 1702. The following is a copy of the record which is given here in full on account of its quaintness.

"JOHN MOORE Reg" Gen" for the probate of the Wills & granting lett"s of administracon

TO

WILLIAM BYLES of the county of Bucks Mercht GREETING.

WHEREAS Edward Carter late of the county afores husbandman lately dyed Intestate (as is affirmed) I desiring that the goods rights & creditts weh were of the s'd decds may be well & truly administered & converted & disposed of to pious uses doe by virtue of authority afors Grant unto you the sd William Byles (in whose fidelity in this behalf I very much confide) full power by the tenor of these psents to administer the goods chattells, rights & creditts weh were of the sd decedes wthin the sd province &

Territorys faithfully to dispose thereof As Also to ask, collect, levy recover, & receive the credits whatsoever of the sd decedes weh at the time of his death were owing or to him did any way belong & to pay the debts in web the sd deced' stood Obliged as far forth as the goods right creditts will extend according to their rate order of Law especially if well & truly administered the same & making a full & pfect Inventory & conscionable appraisemt of all & singular goods rights creditts weh were of the sd deced & exhibiting, the same into the Registers office on or before the fifth day of March next & of rendering upon thy solemn affirmacon a full and true acct of the sd Administracon at or upon the fifth day of December next ensuing doe by these psents ordain, constitute & depute you the s^d William Byles Administra or of all & singular the good rights & creditts of the sd deced within the limitts aforesd Saying harmless & for ever indemnifying the sd propriet & Govern' myself & all other officers agt all other persons by reason of your Administracon aforesd saving to the others their rights In Testimony whereof I have affixed the seal of the s^d office to these psents dated at Philadelphia this fifth day of December anno Rgni Rge Domnæ nost annæ primoq in the — year in the sd Proprietors Government annoqe Dnj 1702."

VI. JOHN CARTER, of Bucks county, married Grace White, 1st mo. 1702-3.* He was related to William Carter, (IV.) of Phiadelphia, and may have been a son of Edward Carter, of Bucks county, (V).

The children of John and Grace (White) Carter were:

- i. Mary, b. 10, 1 mo. 1703-4; m. Joseph Doan, 14, 10 mo. 1726.
- ii. Robert.
- iii. William, d. before 1739, leaving two daughters.
- iv. Martha.

The will of John Carter, of Bucks county, yeoman, is recorded in Will Book C, p 204, at Philadelphia. It was signed 20 Mar. 1709, and proved 17 May, 1710. He men-

tions his wife Grace, his sons Robert and William, and his daughters Mary and Martha. He refers to his kinsman William Carter of Philadelphia.

VII. THOMAS CARTER, Sr., and his family were in Pennsylvania as early as 1685, as shown from the following entry from a manuscript book in possession of the Pennsylvania Historical Society, entitled "Registry of Arrivals in Philadelphia, 1682–86." Thomas Carter, Sr., and Frances, his wife, Thomas, Henry and John, his sons, and Ann, his daughter, arrived in the ship Bristol Merchant, John Stephens, master, 10th, 9 mo. 1685.

This family probably settled in Philadelphia, Thomas Carter, Sr., probably died within a few years after his arrival as the Friends' records of Philadelphia state that "Tho. Carter was Buried ye 17th day of ye 7th mo. 1689."

Thomas Carter, brickmaker, was buried, 3, 5 mo. 1710.* Letters of Administration on the estate of Thomas Carter, dated 10 July, 1710, were granted to John Carter, of the County of Philadelphia, brickmaker.

Henry Carter, brickmaker, was buried 27, 3 mo. 1709.* The will of Henry Carter, brickmaker, is recorded in the Philadelphia Register of Wills' office, in Book C, p. 159. It was signed 5 October, 1708, and proved 24 May, 1709. He mentions his wife Susannah and minor children but does not give their names. The executor was "his friend Edward Church," and the witnesses, Francis Cooke, William Robinson and Thomas Carter.

Susannah Carter, widow, married Robert Heaton, 1720. [Bucks county Friends' record.]

John Carter, brickmaker, was granted Letters of Administration on the estate his brother Thomas at Philadelphia, 10 July, 1710. He was admitted a freeman at

Philadelphia, 27 May, 1717. Of him I have no further data. Perhaps he was one of the Johns whose marriage is recorded at Christ's Church.*

Thomas, Henry and John Carter, brickmakers, are without doubt the sons of Thomas Carter, Sr., and who came in the ship Bristol Merchant, 1685.

VIII. THOMAS CARTER, according to the records of Christ's Protestant Episcopal Church, of Philadelphia, was buried 22 Jan. 1743-4. The will of Thomas Carter, staymaker, of Philadelphia, is recorded in the Register of Wills' office at Philadelphia, in Book G, page 88. It was signed 12 August, 1743, and proved 5 February, 1743-4. He says he is "of sound mind, but having lost the use of my leggs and hands by the dry gripes," etc. He mentions "my own daughter Sarah, now in London, and my son Thomas, now here." He also mentions his brother Joseph.

IX. JOHN CARTER, when a small boy, came from England to this country about the year 1720. When he came to man's age he married Sarah Packer, third child of Philip and Rebecca (Jones) Packer. Rebecca Jones was only daughter of Daniel and Rebecca Jones who came to Philadelphia from England in 1682. This is the account as told by the descendants of the family. They suppose the marriage took place in Salem county, N. J. According to the records of Christ's Protestant Episcopal Church at Philadelphia, a John Carter married Sarah Baker, 2 June, 1722. Possibly this is the same John and that the names Packer and Baker have been confounded and one mistaken for the other, either by the patish clerk or the later descendants of the family, an occurrence which is not infrequent in early family names.

John and Sarah (Packer) Carter had the following children: Nathan, Joanna, Jeremiah, Daniel, Martha Sarah and Mary. There are numerous descendants of this family in New Jersey, Indiana and other States. John Carter's son Daniel, left ten children, and Daniel's son Nathan was married three times and left twenty children. The descendants of this family possess pretty full records of births, deaths and marriages.

X. RICHARD CARTER, born in Warwickshire, England, about 1669, emigrated to Pennsylvania at an early day. He was by trade a wheelwright. On the 22d of 6th mo., 1716, he purchased 200 acres in what is now Warwick township, Lancaster county, between "Pequea and Conestoga creeks, near the Susquehanna river," and was one of the first settlers of that township. It was through his influence that the township was named in honor of his native county in England. In 1739 he was appointed the first constable of the township. He died 9 July, 1750, at the age of 81 years, and lies buried in the graveyard of the Union Meeting house in that township.

After the year 1700 persons bearing the name of Carter become quite numerous. Some of these are doubtless the descendants of those already spoken of, while others belong to entirely different families. As an aid to those who may be interested in other lines of the Carter families and who desire to pursue the subject further, I will append a few notes that may be of service.

William Carter, Jun., was admitted a freeman, 22 April, 1717, according to the minutes of the Common Council of Philadelphia.

Elizabeth Carter, widow, baker, was admitted to freedom, 17 May, 1717.

Letters of Administration were granted to Elizabeth Carter, widow, 24 December, 1718, on the estate of William Carter.

The will of Elizabeth Carter, widow, is recorded in the Register of Wills' office at Philadelphia, in Will Book G, p. 146. It was signed 23 February, 1742, and proved 24 October, 1744. The only relationship she mentions is in making a bequest to her grand-son Thomas Hall, son of Henry Hall. She mentions Henry Hall, his wife and children; also Samuel Sharp and children.

Possibly these Williams and these Elizabeths are identical, though if the first dates are correct it seems a little improbable.

I have in my possession an original letter written by "Richard Carter of Dan'," dated "Philadelphia, 9th Mo. 17th, 1802," in regard to John Coppock's bond," etc I know nothing of his family connection.

CHAPTER II.

TRADITIONS AND WHAT IS KNOWN OF JEREMIAH CARTER
AND HIS WIFE,

As is the case with most old families, traditions have become attached to the Carter family, which are preserved by the descendants and told as veritable facts. The traditions relating to the early settlement of this family may be reduced to the following:

- rst. Jeremiah Carter came from England in 1684 and settled in Philadelphia where Dr. Jayne's building now stands, and the cross street known as Carter's alley or Carter street received its name from him.
- 2d. The Carters received a grant of lands in Philadelphia and in Chester (now Delaware) county and settled thereon at an early date.
- 3d. The Carters of Chester are descended from "three brothers" who setted there at an early date.

Experience has demonstrated to every genealogist that little reliance can be placed upon traditions unsupported by documentary evidence. Traditions doubtless have their origin in fact, but when told from generation to generation, they become greatly exaggerated, lose sight of important facts, or more likely become confounded with other stories in no way connected with the original account.

After seven or eight years of inquiry and research, I am well satisfied that there is little, if any truth in these stories.

The first is believed to be wholly incorrect, excepting the place of nativity. It is simply the history of William Carter (IV) attached to Jeremiah. See page 15, ante. The second seems to be the story of the other Carter settlers attached to Jeremiah, while the third simply mistakes the three sons of Jeremiah, for the original settlers. The following is all that is known at present of this old settler.

JEREMIAH CARTER 1 came to Pennsylvania in 1682. He was doubtless a native of England; at least this is the tradition of the family, and there are other reasons for believing so. His name has not been found upon any of the lists of arrivals, neither have I found any document which gives his place of nativity or the exact date of his arrival. The tradition of the family states that he was a member of the Society of Friends, but there seems to be nothing on the records of Friends' meetings to show that he was recognized as a member, though his children were members. From deeds he appears to have been a "linenweaver" by trade, though in his will he is simply designated as "yeoman." I am told that some of the ancient weaving appliances were still in existence within the last quarter of a century. As he became a land-owner after a few years, it is probable that he followed the occupation of farming part of the time at least.

In Dr. George Smith's History of Delaware county is given a map of early settlements. The name of "Jeremy Carter" appears as a settler on the south side of Chester Creek in Chester township. Nothing has been found to prove that Jeremiah Carter was related to any of the other Carter settlers of the Province. There is some reason for believing that he may have been related to Joseph Carter (II) who came from Cheshire, but this will be referred to more fully in Chapter III under the account of Jeremiah's daughter Hannah.

The name of Jeremiah Carter's wife was Mary. In a warrant for the survey of 250 acres of land, on file in the Department of Internal Affairs at Harrisburg, bearing date of 24th of 3 mo. 1715, it is stated that Jeremiah Carter and his wife came into the Province of Pennsylvania in the year 1682. This warrant, however, unlike most papers of this kind, does not mention from whence they came. From the reading of this warrant, it is presumed that they were married at the time of their settlement, though it is believed that all their children were born in America. Possibly they were married just prior to their emigration. On the 27th of 6 mo. 1689, a jury of women was called at the Court of Chester county to report on a case then pending.* Mary Carter was one of this jury. It is the only jury of women that appears on the records.

Jeremiah Carter seems to have first become a landowner in 1690, as William Woodmanside, of South Harold, in the township of Chester, county of Chester, yeoman, deeded to "Jeremiah Carter of said township Linning weaver," twenty acres for the consideration of £6, 6s, dated, 9, 10 mo. 1690.† Robert Wade of Chester township and his wife Lydia, conveyed by deed of gift to Lydia Carter, daughter of Jeremiah Carter, of said township, 50 acres of land, dated 11, 7 mo. 1694; her father to have the use of it until she reached the age of 21 years, paying the yearly quit-rent of one-half bushel of good wheat.‡ Robert Wade had settled at Upland-afterwards called Chester-in 1675, and was a very prominent character in matters of both church and state. His residence—called "Essex House"—was rendered famous as being the house in which William Penn was first entertained on landing at

Upland on the 29th of October, 1682. Wade obtained a patent, dated, 15 April, 1689, for 230 acres of land on Chester creek in Chester township, which he called "Hopewell of Essex," and the above mentioned 50 acres was part of it. Robert and Lydia had no children of their own, and as this daughter of Jeremiah Carter was probably named in honor of Lydia Wade, the Wades returned the compliment by this gift.


The remainder of this tract, Wade and his wife conveyed to Henry Worley on the 8th of March 1697–8, calling it 180 acres. Henry Worley and his wife Mary conveyed the same tract to Jeremiah Carter, on the 23d of November, 1702. It was re-surveyed in 1703 and found to contain 215 acres instead of 180. A reproduction of the plat of this survey is given on the next page, showing outlines, areas and adjoining lands. By this purchase Jeremiah Carter became the possessor of 285 acres, which with other additions has remained in the possession of his descendants to the present generation. It has long received the name of Carterville or Cartertown, and is located on the south side of Chester Creek a short distance west of the present City of Chester.

Jeremiah Carter was appointed Supervisor of Highways for Chester township, 21 February, 1709-10. An examination of the Court Records at West Chester would probably show other appointments.

In the Minutes of the Board of Property, page 83, is the following entry:

"Jeremīa Carter having made it appear that he and his wife came Servants* into this Province in the Year 1682, and that Henry Swift and his wife & Richard Whigsted came servants about the same Time and have sold their several Rights to the said Jeremia who now desires a Warrt for laying out the same being 250 acres which is granted and signed."

At the Request of Jeremiah Carter of the County of Chester that We would Grant him to take up in right of himself and his Wife Ope hundred acres of Land they having made it appear to us that they came Servants into this Province in ye year 1682, And also that We would Grant him to take up one hundred and fifty acres of land in Right of Henry Swift & his wife and Richd Whigsted who also came Servants into this Province about the aforesaid Year And have now sold their several Rights to the sd Jeremiah Carter; These are to Authorise and require thee to Survey or cause to be Survey'd unto ye sd Jeremiah Carter the aforesaid Two parcells of Land containing together Two hundred and fifty acres that has not been already Survey'd nor appropriated nor is Seated by the Indians, To be holden of the Propr under the Yearly Quitrent of one half-penny Sterel for every acre and make a Return thereof into the Secretaries Office in Order to a further Confirmation. Given under our hands and Seal of ye Province at Philadia 24th 3mo 1715

To Jacob Taylor Survey Gen!.

Among the surveyor's papers is filed a survey for Jeremiah Carter of 250 acres in Sadsbury township, dated, 4 November, 1715. There is a tradition that a lot in the City of Philadelphia was granted to Jeremiah Carter, but considering it of little value he never secured a title for it, and it reverted to the Proprietor. As all original purchasers of land in the Province were entitled to a lot in the City, the tradition is probably correct, as his name does not appear as a landowner in Philadelphia. He con-

veyed the Sadsbury tract to his son Edward, 2 July, 1716.

On the 29 and 30, November, 1731, Jeremiah Carter, of Chester township, weaver, and wife Mary, conveyed by lease and release, to Nineveh Carter, one of their sons, 88 acres, part of the 180 (215) acres purchased of Henry Worley in 1702. These 88 acres were at the south and west of the whole tract.

Jeremiah Carter died about the end of 1736 or beginning of the year 1737, as his will was proven, 6 January, 1737. If he was not less than twenty-one years of age when he came to America, as it is reasonable to suppose, he must have been at least seventy-six years of age, and possibly four score at his death.

Mary Carter wife of Jeremiah was living 17, January 1735, the date of her husband's will. How long she survived I have not learned.

There was at a very early day, laid out upon the Carter tract, a graveyard which is located on the right hand side of the Concord road. Whether Jeremiah Carter and his wife were buried here or in the Friends' burying ground at Chester, I do not know. Many of the descendants of Jeremiah and Mary Carter sleep in this private burial ground.

The following is a copy of the will of Jeremiah Carter as it appears in the original on file at West Chester. It in and recorded in Will Book B, page 17.

I Jeremiah Carter of the Township and County of Chester and Province of Pensilvania yeoman being at this time in Rasonable Good helth of body and of a sound mind and mamory Thanks be to God for the same and now Considering the Unsertainty of this Life and that it is appoynted for all men once to Dye Do make and ordain this my Last Will and Testament in maner and form following, That is to say

First I Will that all my Just Debts & funaral Charges be fully satisfied Contented and Paid.

Secondly I Give and bequeath unto my Loving Wife Mary Carter The Massuage Tenement plantation or tract of Land where I now Dwell Sittuate in the Township of Chester with the Dwelling hous and all other out Housing thereunto Belonging and allso all my whole Estate both Real and Personall in Every kind and nature whatsoever to my said Wife During the time of her widdow hud Butt if my said wife should Marry again after my Decase Then I will and Likewise Impower my said wife to make her one Chise of two of the best Rooms in my said house and no more and shee shall have Butt one half of my personall Estate and half of the Rents and Profitts of all my Lands and Teniments During her naturall Life, and my Son Abraham Carter shall have the other half of my personall Estate and half of the Rents and profitts of all my said Lands and Teniments During the said Term and Immediatly after my said wife Decese.

Thirdly I give and Bequeath to my son Abraham Carter all that massuage Tenement plantation or tract of Land abovesaid to the only proper uce benifeet and behoofe of him my said son Abraham Carter his heirs and assigns

for Ever.

Fourthly I Give and bequeath to my son Abraham Carter all my personall Estate in Every Kind and nature

whot soever after my wifes Deceass.

Fifthly I Give and bequeth to my son Edward Carter five Pounds Current money of Pensitvania to be Raised and Levied out of my Estate and paid within three years after my wifes Deceas

Sixthly I Give and bequeth to my son Nineveh Carter five pounds Current money of Pensilvania to be Raised and Levied out of my Estate and paid within three years

after my wifes Decease.

Seventhly I Give and Bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Barnard five Pounds Current money of Pensilvania to be Raised and Levied out of my Estate and paid within three

years after my Wifes Deceas.

Eightly and Lastly I Give and Bequeath to the Children of the said Sarah Barnards Ten Pounds Current Money of Pensilvania to be Raised and Levied out of my Estate and Devided Equelly between the said Children and paid them within three years after my wifes Decease.

And I Do hereby nominate Constitute and appoint my Loveing wife Mary Carter and my son Abraham Carter and my son Edward Carter to be whole and sole Executors of This my Last will and Testament And I Do hereby utterly Disallow Revoke and Disannul all and Every other former Testaments wills Legacies and Executors by me in any wais before This time named willed and bequeathed Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to Be my Last Will and Testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this Seventeenth Day of Jenuary In the Year of our Lord 1734-5

CHAPTER III.

AN ACCOUNT OF THOSE IN THE SECOND GENERATION IN-CLUDING THE NAMES OF THEIR CHILDREN.

- 2. Lydia Carter,² [Jeremiah¹] was probably the eldest child of Jeremiah and Mary Carter. She was born before 11, 7 mo. 1694, as on that date Robert and Lydia Wade, conveyed 50 acres of land to her father Jeremiah in trust for herself. From the will of her brother Abraham, dated, 29, Dec. 1787, it appears that this land descended by her death to her brother Edward. Whether she arrived at woman's age or died young is not known. As she is not named in her father's will in 1735, it is presumed that she was not then living.
- 3. Hannah Carter,² [Jeremiah¹] daughter of Jeremiah and Mary Carter, married Thomas Morgan in 1722 and died before 1731. The most that is known of her is gathered from the records of Chester Monthly Meeting relating to her marriage, of which the following are extracts:

At Chester Monthly Meeting held at Providence meeting house 26th of 1st month, 1722.

"Thomas Morgan & Hannah the Daughter of Jeremiah Carter Appered here and Declared their Intentions of taking Each other in marrage this being the first time, therefore this meetting Apoints Thomas Candel [Kendall] & David Wilson to make Inquiery into his clearness and conversation and make Report thereof at our next meetting."

At Chester Monthly Meeting held at Providence meeting house the 30th of 2d month, 1722.

"Thomas Morgan & Hanna the daughter of Jerimiah Carter Appered here and declared the continuance of their Intentions of takeing Each other in marriage this being the second time and the friends that were Appointed to Inquier Report they have made Inquiery & find nothing to obstruct and alsoe have broft a paper of her fathers consent soe they are left to their Liberty to consumaate their s⁴ Intentions According to Good order and this meeting Appoints Joseph Cobron & John Carter to Attend the said marrage to see that good order be keept and alsoe to bring the Certificate in order to be Recorded."

The women's meeting made similar minutes to the above and appointed Agnes Salkeld and Lydia Vernon to inquire respecting her clearness from others, also Sarah Coubourn and Martha Townsend to attend the marriage.

EXPLANATION.—In Friends' certificates of Marriage it is customary for near relatives to sign their names in the right hand column. Jeremiah and Mary Carter were the father and mother of the bride, and Edward, Sarah and Nineveh, her brothers and sister. Evan and John Morgan were probably brothers of Thomas. Abraham and Elizabeth Darlington sign among the relatives and so seem to have been related either to the Carters or Morgans. Abraham Darlington's first wife was Deborah Carter,* daughter of Joseph, who may have been a relative of Jeremiah. No other relationship is known. The names at the bottom of the right hand column were probably under the middle column in the original certificate, but the recorder has placed them as above. John Cartert in the first column was son of Robert and Lydia, and Isabell Carter in the second column was his wife.

Thomas and Hannah (Carter) Morgan probably left no children, as her father does not mention any children of his daughter Hannah in his will. Thomas Morgan married a second wife, Elizabeth Key, 17, 12 mo. 1730-1.

4, Sarah Carter,² [Jeremiah,¹] daughter of Jeremiah and Mary Carter, was probably born before 1700. The date of her death is not known. She was twice married and by her first husband became the ancestor of a large number of descendants, many of whom have been persons considerable note.

She first married Thomas Barnard, (14, 1 mo. 1722-3,) second son of Richard* and Frances Barnard, who are supposed to have come from Sheffield, England. Thomas Barnard resided on land in Aston township, purchased by his father. He was first married to Elizabeth Swayne in 1715, but it is believed there were no children by this union. On 6, 9 mo. 1719, he was appointed an overseer of Chichester meeting in place of John Kingsman.

Thomas Barnard and Sarah Carter being members of Friends' meeting, their marriage was in accordance with the customs of that society. The following are extracts from the records relating thereto.

At Chester Monthly Meeting held at Providence meeting house, 28th of 11th month, 1722, (January, 1723.)

"Thomas Barnatt and Sarah the dauther of Jeremiah Carter apeared here and declared their intentions of taking each other in marriage this being the first time: hee is desired to bring a Certificate from y° monthly meeting to where he belongs of his Conversation and Clearness in relation to marriage to our next meeting."

The women appointed Sarah Head and Sarah Coebourn to inquire respecting her clearness.

At Concord Monthly Meeting held 7th, 11 mo., 1722, Thomas Barnard requested a certificate to Chester Monthly Meeting in order to marry a daughter of Jeremiah Carter. John Dutton and Edward Robinson were appointed to inquire concerning his clearness from other engagements, &c. The certificate was granted, 4, 12 mo. 1722.

At Chester Monthly Meeting held 25, 12 mo. 1722:

"Thomas Barnat & Sarah y^e dauther of Jeremiah Carter apeared here and declared y^e continuance of their intentions of marriage with each other this being y^e second

time and he producing a certificate from Concord & Chichester Monthly Meeting to ye satisfaction of this meeting and also a paper from under his mother's hand of hir consent and likewise a paper from Jeremiah Carter of his consent therefore they are left to their liberty to Consumate their said Intentions according to good order and this meeting appoints James Hinde and Joseph Townsend to see that good order bee kept and make report thereof at our next meeting and bring ye Certificate in order to bee recorded."

The women appointed Lydia Vernon and Sarah Head to attend the marriage.

At Chester Monthly Meeting held, 25, 1 mo. [March.] 1723, the men's report appears as follows:

"The friends that were apointed to attend ye marriage of Thomas Barnat & Sarah Carter report they saw nothing but what was orderly and have brought ye certificate in to be recorded."

In the list of witnesses to the certificate, Jeremiah and Mary Carter were parents of the bride; Edward Carter and Hannah Morgan, her brother and sister; and Thomas Morgan, her brother-in-law; Richard Barnard, Lucy Dutton. Mary Roman, Rebecca Flower, and Sarah Coebourn were the brother and sisters of the bridegroom; Jacob Roman and William Coebourn, his brothers-in-law; and Rebecca Dutton was his neice, the daughter of his sister Lucy.

Sarah Barnard's right of membership was transferred from Chester to Concord Monthly Meeting by certificate, dated, 29, 2 mo. 1723, and was received and accepted by the latter, 1, 5 mo. 1723.

After the death of her husband, Thomas Barnard, she married Benjamin Weldon, of Chester county, at Chichester meeting, 13, 12 mo. 1734-5. In the Friends' monthly meeting records, Sarah Barnard is spoken of as a "widow with children." The following are the names of those who signed the marriage certificate.

Benjamin Weldon had first married Hannah Hurford in 1728. It is believed that Benjamin and Sarah Weldon had no issue.

5. Edward Carter² [Jeremiah¹,] son of Jeremiah and Mary Carter, was probably born prior to 1700, and died 1777. As he is sometimes called "weaver," he had probably learned his father's trade. He seems to have resided in Chester township, and as he was a land owner probably followed farming. In his will he is named as of Chester. On the 2d, July, 1716, his father conveyed to him 250 acres of land in Sadsbury township. On the 10th, December, 1722, "Edward Carter, weaver," conveyed this tract to John Guy of Sadsbury, yeoman, and wife Isabel, for £25. On the 18th of April, 1719, he purchased 50 acres of Thomas Baldwin. From the will of his brother, Abraham, it appears that he inherited from his sister Lydia the fifty acres conveyed by deed of gift from Robert and Lydia Wade.

He married Mary Camm, daughter of John Camm, of Providence township, 4th 9 mo. 1731. From the records of Chester Monthly Meeting, held at Providence meeting house, 27th, 7 mo. 1731, it appears that Edward Carter and Mary Camm appeared and declared their intentions of marriage for the first time. The men appointed Samuel Lightfoot and Robert Wilson to inquire respecting him; and the women appointed Mary Sharpless and Elizabeth Taylor to inquire as to her clearness, &c. At the next

meeting, held 28, 8 mo. 1731, they appeared the second time, and nothing being found to obstruct, were allow ed to proceed. Henry Miller, Edward Woodward, Mary Sharples and Elizabeth Taylor were appointed to oversee the marriage. The marriage was consumated at Providence Meeting, 4, 9 mo. 1731.

I have not been able to learn whether Edward and Mary Carter had any children or not, but as none are mentioned in his will, it is safe to conclude that there either were none or that they had died prior to the date of the will.

The following is a copy of his will as it appears in the original, on file in the Register's office at West Chester, Pa. It was made, 8 June, 1776, and proven, 27 May, 1777. It is recorded in Will Book F, page 255.

I Edward Carter of Chester in the County of Chester and Provence of pennsylvania yeoman being at this time in Reasonable Good helth and of a sound mind and memory thanks be to God for itt now calling into mind the mortality of my body knowing That it is appointed for all men

onst to Dye Do mak and ordain this my Last Will and testement in manner and forme following First I will that all my Just Debts and funarall Expences Be fully Satisfied Contented and paid as soon as itt can Conveniently be Done after my Deceas: And itt is my will allso that one half of the money should be Raised out of my personall Estate and the other Half to be Raised out of my Raill Estate to pay off the said Debts Secondly I Give unto Mary Miller and her Daughter Hannah all my personall Estate in Every kind and neature what so Ever: Thirdly I Do Give unto my Brother Abraham Carter all my Land and premises Lying and being in the County and township of Chester butting and bounding on Chester Crick to the only proper uce Benifitt and behoofe of him my said Brother Abraham Carter his Heirs and assigns for Ever: and all other will or wills by me made at any time before this Date Do I mak null void and of none Effect Confirming this and no other to be my Last will and testement

Fourthly and Lastly I nominate Constitute and appoint my Brother Abraham Carter and my True and trusty friend Samuall Armar to be my Executers of this my Last will and Testement: In Witness whereof I have here unto sett my hand and Seal this 8th Day of June Anno Domini 1776

This will was proven at "West Town: May y^e 27^{th} A D 1777" before T. Taylor, Reg^r , by all the witnesses except Jacob Howell. Letters were granted to Abraham Carter and Samuel Armar the same day.

Who Mary Miller and her daughter Hannah were does not appear.

6 Nineveh Carter,² [Jeremiah,¹] son of Jeremiah and Mary Carter, was born, probably before 1700, and died sometime between 1755 and 1757.

He married Mary Clayton, daughter of William, Jr., and Mary (Marten) Clayton,* 3, 4 mo. (June) 1731. They appear to have resided in Chester county until 1745, perhaps at different places, as in 1732 they changed their membership from Chester to Concord Monthly Meeting. In 1745 they seem to have removed to Buckingham, Bucks county, but returned to Chester again in 1753. Nineveh Carter is sometimes styled "weaver" and sometimes "yeoman." Whether he followed the occupation of weaving or farming is not clear.

The following notes and extracts are taken from church and legal records, given in the order of date.

At Chester Monthly Meeting of Friends, 24, 12 mo. 1728-9, (February, 1729). "Nineveh Carter apeared here and desired that he may come under the care and notice of this meeting which is allowed of."

At Chester Monthly Meeting, 29, 1 mo. (March) 1731, Nineveh Carter, son of Jeremiah, requested a certificate to Concord Monthly Meeting in order to marry Mary, daughter of William Clayton. Richard Barry and Joshua Cowpland were appointed to inquire as to his clearness from other engagements.

At Concord Monthly Meeting, 5, 2 mo. (April) 1731, Nineveh Carter and Mary Clayton, Jr., declared their intentions of marriage, the first time. He was requested to bring a certificate of clearness from Chester Monthly

Meeting, and of his parents' consent. The women appointed Elizabeth Dutton and Hannah Dinge to inquire as to her clearness.

At Chester Monthly Meeting, 26, 2 mo. 1731, Nineveh Carter was granted a certificate of clearness to Concord Monthly Meeting to proceed in marriage with Mary Clayton.

At Concord Monthly Meeting, 3, 3 mo. (May) 1731, Nineveh Carter and Mary Clayton appeared the second time and declared their intention of marriage. The required certificates being produced, and they being reported clear from other engagements, they are allowed to proceed. The men appointed John Dutton and Thomas Dutton, and the women, Hannah Dinge and Elizabeth Dutton to attend and oversee the marriage.

From the records of Concord Monthly Meeting it appears that "Nineveh Carter son of Jeremiah of Chester township and Mary Clayton daughter of William of Chichester," were married, 3, 4 mo. (June) 1731, at Chichester meeting.

Mary Carter, the wife of Nineveh, obtained a certificate of membership from Concord Monthly Meeting, dated 6, 7 mo. (September) 1731, which was presented to Chester Monthly Meeting on the 27th of the same month.

Jeremiah and Mary Carter conveyed by lease and release to Nineveh Carter, weaver, one of their sons, 88 acres in Chester township (part of the 215 acres mentioned on pages 28 and 31, ante,) on 29th and 30th of November, 1731. On 27 and 28 March, 1733, he sold this land to Joseph Parker for £110.

Nineveh Carter and wife Mary obtained a certificate from Chester Monthly Meeting, dated 31, 5 mo. 1732, which was received by Concord Monthly Meeting 7, 6 mo. 1732. On 5, 6 mo. 1745, Nineveh Carter, wife Mary and children obtained a certificate from the latter meeting to Buckingham Monthly Meeting, Bucks county.

At Chester Monthly Meeting, 28, 5 mo. 1753, a certificate was received from Buckingham Monthly Meeting, Bucks county "for Nineveh Carter and his wife but as there is severall children who are now grown up and no mention made of them in the Certificate, etc." On account of some irregularity the certificate was returned. At a subsequent meeting held 24, 9 mo. 1753, another certificate was received which was accepted.

Mary Carter, widow of Nineveh, produced a certificate to Concord Monthly Meeting for self and daughter Mary, from Chester Monthly Meeting, 1, 1 mo. 1759.

From the best information obtainable it appears that there were, at least, the following

7. Abraham Carter,² [Jeremiah,¹] son of Jeremiah and Mary Carter, is said to have been born, I July, 1700, and probably died in 1789 as his will was proven in April of that year. It is altogether likely that he lived in Chester township during his entire lifetime, and as he was a landowner it is probable that he was a farmer by occupation.

He is mentioned in his father's will, made, 7 January. 1735, and is made principal legatee of the paternal estate; possibly because the other children had already received their portions. As he was still unmarried it is likely that he had remained with his parents during their lifetime.

Beside the paternal estate he became possessed of other lands adjoining, partly by purchase and partly as legatee of his brother Edward's will.

He retained membership in the religious society of Friends until 1764, when he was disowned by Chester Monthly Meeting for a breach of discipline.

He married Mrs. Lydia Spruce, *née* Clayton, daughter of William, Jr., and Mary (Marten) Clayton, and widow of John Spruce, Jr.,* probably in the year 1739, as he offered an acknowledgement, on 31, 10 mo. (December) 1739, to Chester Monthly Meeting for marriage "out of meeting." Thomas Cummings was appointed to read it before the meeting.

Lydia Spruce, *née* Clayton,† was born in Chichester township, 4, 4 mo. 1716, and died 9, 2 mo. 1796,‡ aged 79 years, 8 months and 5 days.

^{*} John Spruce, Jr., was the son of John Spruce, Sr. He married Lydia Clayton in 1736. She was disowned by Friends' meeting, 4, 2 mo. (April) 1737, for marriage by a priest. [Friends termed all ministers who officiated for wages, priests.] John Spruce, Jr., died intestate and letters of administration were granted to his father by request of the widow, 23 January, 1738-9. It is probable there were no children.

William Clayton, Jr., in his will made, 8 October, 1757, and proven, 8 January, 1758, makes a bequest to his daughter Lydia Carter, wife of Abraham Carter.

The following is a copy of the will of Abraham Carter as recorded at West Chester, in Will Book H, page 311. It was made 29 December, 1787, and proven 27 April, 1789.

I, Abraham Carter of the township of Chester in the county of Chester in the state of Pennsylvania, yeoman, considering the uncertainty of this mortal life and being somewhat weakly in Body but of sound and perfect mind and memory blesed be Almighty God for the same, do make and publish this my last will and Testament in manner and form following (that is to say) *Imprimis*, It is my will & I do order that my just Debts and Funeral expenses be fully paid and satisfied by my Executors here-

after named as soon as may be after my decease.

Item I give, devise and bequeath unto my Dear and loving Wife Lydia Carter one full and equal third part of my Goods, Chattels, and Personal Estate, To Hold, to her, her Executors, Administrators and assigns forever, exclusive of and beside her Dower or thirds and in all and singular my Messauges, lands, Tenements and Hreditaments. But if it shall happen through sickness or other unforseen accident that the said third part of my Personal estate and the Dower or thirds of my Real Estate shall be insufficient to support her in a decent manner then and in such case my Will is and I do order and direct that my two sons Joseph and Daniel shall make up such deficiency so as to procure her a comforable maintainace and support during her natural life.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my two sons Joseph Carter and Daniel Carter all this messuage, Plantation and tract of land where I now dwell and which was devised to me by my late Father Jeremiah Carter, deceased, including the land I bought of John Pennell also about seven or eight acres of meadow Ground to be bounded according to the present Fences thereof part of fifty acres of Land devised to me with other Land by my Brother Edward Carter, deceased, to be equally divided between them share & share alike To Hold to them and to their several and re-

spective Heirs and Assigns forever as Tenants in Common they paying thereout to each and every of the children of my son William Carter, deceased, the sum of five pounds in Gold or Silver money within the space of two years next after my Wife's decease. But if it shall happen that my s^d son Daniel shall die without Issue lawfully begotten of his Body then and in that case my Will is that his part thereof shall descend to my said son Joseph his Heirs and Assigns

Item I give, devise and bequeath unto my son Edward Carter all that tract of fifty acres (the Meadow aforesaid only excepted) devised to me by my brother Edward Carter. deceased, which descended to thim by the Death of our Sister Lydia Carter to whom the same was granted and conveyed by Robert Wade and Lydia his wife by Deed of the 11th 7thmo 1694 and all the other tract of fifty acres of Land devised to me by my said Brother Edward Carter which he purchased of Thomas Baldwin the 18th of April 1710 To Hold to him my son Edward & for his assigns and during the term of his natural Life he making no Waste or Destruction of the Timber thereupon and paying thereout to my Daughter Agnes the sum of twenty Pounds in Gold or Silver money within the space of two years next after the decease of my Wife,, and immediately from and after the decease of him my sd Son Edward I give and devise the fifty acres descended aforesaid by the Death of our Sister Lydia (excepting the aforesaid meadow) to my two sons Joseph and Daniel their Heirs and Assigns forever as Tenants in Common, And the aforesaid other fifty acres heretofore purchased of Thomas Baldwin, I give and devise to the Heirs male of the Body of my said son Edward lawfully to be begotten and to the Heirs and assigns of such Heirs or Heir male forever and for want of such Heirs, and Assigns forever as Tenants in Common. all the rest, residue and remainder of my estate whether Real, Personal or mixed of what kind, nature, degree or quality soever, I give, devise and bequeath to my two sons Joseph and Daniel to be equally divided between them share and share alike, To Hold to them, their several and respective Heirs and assigns forever.

And Lastly I nominate and appoint my said two sons Joseph and Daniel, Executors of this my last will and Testament, hereby revoking all former Wills and Testaments by me made and declaring this only to be my last Will and Testament.

IN WITNESS whreeof I the said Abram Carter have hereunto set my hand and Seal the Twenty ninth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty seven.

Signed, Sealed and published and declared by the said Abraham Carter as and for his last Will & Testament in the presence of us who have subscribed our names as Witnesses thereto in his presence and at his Request. Sam. Shaw, Jesse Bickston, Joseph Ashton

If there were any other children than those named in the will, they probably died young.

Abraham and Lydia Carter both lie buried in the graveyard mentioned on page 31, ante.

CHAPTER IV.

AN ACCOUNT OF THOSE IN THE THIRD GENERATION WITH THE NAMES OF THEIR CHILDREN.

8. Jacob Barnard,³ [Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Thomas and Sarah (Carter) Barnard, was probably born about the year 1724, and died the latter part of February 1754, at the age of about 30 years it is supposed.

It appears that he was a wheelwright by occupation, and after he came to man's age resided in Douglass township, Berks county, where he probably carried on his trade. He does not appear to have been married.

On the 6th of December, 1751, a deed of partition was executed by Jacob Barnard of Douglass township, Philadelphia [now Berks] county, wheelwright, of the first part; Isaac Barnard of Aston, millwright, of the second part; John Hewes, of Chichester, tanner, and wife Mary of the third part; and Thomas Barnard, of Chichester, tanner, of the fourth part—children of Thomas Barnard, deceased.*

The will of Jacob Barnard, "of Berks county, yeoman," is recorded at Philadelphia, in Will Book K, p. 155. It was made and signed 23 February, 1754, and proven 1 March, 1754. He devises his estate to his brother Isaac, brother Thomas, and sister Mary, wife of John Hughes, [Hewes] to be divided equally between them. They are all appointed executors. The witnesses to the will were Thomas Potts, Edward West and Samuel Evans.

The inventory of his estate filed with the will designates him as "late of the township of Douglass and county of Berks." Among the items was included a lot of wheelwright tools. The appraisers were Derrick Clausen, Thomas Potts and Felty Kalor.

9. Isaac Barnard,³ [Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Thomas and Sarah (Carter) Barnard, was probably born about 1726, and died in 1761.

He was a millwright by trade, and a resident of Aston township.

He married Isabella Day, probably, in 1753, as he made acknowledgement, in that year, to Friends meeting for marriage to one not a member and by a priest. It was noted in the minutes that she was not a member "altho she inclines towards friends." She died 13, 12 mo. 1801.

The will of "Isaac Barnard of Ash Town" [Aston] is recorded in the Register's Office, at West Chester, in Will Book, D, page 353. It was made 17 August, 1761, and proven 3 December, 1761. He names his wife "Issble," son James Barnard, daughter Hannah Barnard, and his brother Thomas Barnard. He names Thomas Barnard and Richard Dutton as his exeuctors.

At Orphans' Court at Chester, 16 March, 1762. "Upon the petition of Isabella Barnard the Court appoints James Day, Jun^r, and David Jackson to be Guardians for James and Hannah Barnard, infants under 14 years of age, the children of Isaac Barnard deceased."

On 15 March, 1763, "Thomas Barnard, executor of Isaac Barnard, late of Aston, deceased, exhibitted the accompts of his administration on the said deceased's estate which being examined are allowed, etc."

In 1764, James Day, guardian of Isaac Barnard's children was assessed with 60 acres and buildings.

On 15 Dec. 1772, Isabella Barnard presented an account to the Orphan's Court against the estate of Isaac Barnard, deceased, for maintaining the deceased's child Hannah, which was allowed.

James Day, of Chester township, by his will proven, 27 June, 1780, makes bequests to his niece Isabella Barnard, and to her son James and daughter Hannah.

On 18 March, 1783, James Day, guardian of James Barnard exhibited to the Orphan's Court a stated account of his guardianship which was allowed.

All these official papers make mention of but two children, but Thomas-Dick Barnard, a son of the above James, stated during his life time that his grandparents—Isaac and Isabella Barnard—had another daughter, *Isabella-D*.

10. Thomas Barnard,³ [Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Thomas and Sarah (Carter) Barnard, was probably born about 1728, and died in 1770.

He was a tanner by trade. He resided for several years in Berks county, but returned about 1759 to Chester county, and afterward seems to have lived in Chichester township. In 1764 he was assessed with 100 acres in Upper Chichester; also among other things with 1 negro.

He was three times married. In 1754 he married, Sarah Walker, daughter of Thomas Walker, in Berks county. She seems to have died within the next five years. The Records of Concord Monthly Meeting state that Thomas Barnard brought a little daughter with him from Berks

county. Her name is not given, and there seems to be no mention of her afterwards. She probably died young or unmarried.

He seems to have married a second wife about 1761, as on 5, 8 mo. 1762, Thomas Barnard (of Chichester Meeting) made an acknowledgement for marriage by a priest to one not a member. Who she was is not now known, but she seems to have died within a few years.

In 1765 he married, as his third wife, Agnes, (19) daughter of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Carter. She was his first cousin, and for this marriage he was disowned by Friends meeting in 1766.

He died intestate and letters of Administration on his estate were granted to Archibald Dick, 19 Dec. 1770. The Administration accounts were filed in 1773.

Tr. Mary Barnard,³ [Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] daughter of Thomas and Sarah (Carter) Barnard, was twice married. She first married John Hewes, second son of William*

William Hewes, 2d, was the son of William Hewes, 1st, who is supposed, according to Dr. Smith, to have come over with John Fenwick from England in 1675, and first settled in Salem county, New Jersey, but afterwards, in 1678-9, he settled in Lower Chichester, where he purchased land of Roger Pedrick. He died about 1698. His wife's name was Deborah. They were both active members of Chichester Meeting—William, 1st, being one of the founders of that meeting. The family tradition states that he came from Wales. He built a brick house in Lower Chichester, and on the sill of the front door the letters W. H. were cut. Sarah Bezer, wife of William, 2d, was the daughter

and Mary (Withers) Hewes, of Chichester, 22, 11 mo. 1746-7.

He was a Tanner by trade and seems to have resided in Chichester township. He owned land in Chichester, and in Douglass township, Berks county.

The will of John Hewes, of Chichester, tanner, is recorded at West Chester. It was made 2 Feb. 1759, and proven 2 March, 1759. He gave the homestead to his wife Mary during her life time and afterwards to his children Christiana and Jacob; also 200 acres in Douglass township, Berks county, purchased of Thomas Barnard, to his wife until his children became of age or married. Other lands in Chichester and in Berks county were to be sold by the executors. He named as executors his wife and Richard Dutton of Aston.

He was born about 1716 and died 1759. He lies buried in the graveyard of Chichester Friends Meeting.

Mary (Barnard) Hewes married, as her second husband, Archibald Dick, about the year 1760.

Archibald Dick was a very prominent man in his day. In 1771, he purchased an estate in Chichester, near Marcus Hook, of Mary Norris of Philadelphia for £456. At the south-west corner of Marcus Hook Cross Roads, there stands a large, quaint-looking old frame house, which was no doubt once considered a very grand mansion. This according to John-Hill Martin was the residence of Archibald Dick. He was a man of considerable wealth, and

of Edward and Ann Bezer. Mary Withers wife of William, 3d, was the daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth (Collet) Withers. William Hewes, 3d, and Mary Withers were married 12, 9 mo. 1713. The following table shows three generations of ancestors of John Hewes.

lived in much the style that was common in Chester county in those days. He drove, when visiting Philadelphia, a barouche with four splendid horses, with his negro driver and servants.*

In the time of the Revolutionary War, he was active in the cause of the colonies, and a true patriot. He was Assistant Deputy Quartermaster General in 1779, but when he received the appointment I do not know. On 5 April, 1780, he was appointed Assistant Forage Master for Chester county. He bore the rank of Major. He died of a pulmonary affection contracted from exposure in the army. The Dutton MS. gives the date of his death as 9, March, 1782, while some of his descendants give it as 23, March, 1782.

His will was made 9 Feb. 1782, and proven 23 April, 1782. It is recorded at West Chester. He divided his estate equally between his two sons. He emancipated his slaves and gave to each a legacy in money. One, who appears to have been a favorite and was called "Cuff," was made a charge upon his estate, and lived to see, at an extreme old age, the great-grandchildren of his "Old Massa"—the children of the late Archibald-T. Dick, of West Chester.

13. Jeremiah Carter,³ [Nineveh,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Nineveh and Mary (Clayton) Carter, seems to have lived, at different times, in Chester and West Nottingham townships, Chester county, and in the vicinity of Wilmington, Delaware.

On 24, 11 mo. 1755, he received a certificate of removal from Chester to New Garden Monthly Meeting.

On 12, 10 mo. 1757, he married Rachel Brown, at West Nottingham meeting.* She was the daughter of Thomas, deceased, and Ellen (Cowgill) Brown, of West Nottingham township. She was born 23, 11 mo. 1727-8, and died 27, 9 mo. 1763.

He seems to have removed to within the bounds of Wilmington Monthly Meeting in 1761 or 1762, as all dates after the birth of his daughter Lydia, 27, 11 mo. 1760, are found in the records of that meeting.

He married a second wife, probably about 1765, whose name was Rachel, also. Her maiden name is not known.

The last mention of him is that made in the minute of his daughter Tacy's death, 28, 8 mo. 1769, in the records of Wilmington Monthly Meeting.

She was disowned by Chester Monthly Meeting 29, 6 mo. 1767, for marriage by a priest to James Day, who was not a member.

James Day died 11, 11 mo. 1807.* From his will made 17 Aug. 1804, and proven, 7 Dec. 1807, and recorded at Media in Will Book B, p. 65, he seems to have been a resident of Middletown. The names of the children are learned from the will.

Martin Carter,³ [Nineveh,² Jeremiah,¹] is believed to have been a son of Nineveh and Mary (Clayton) Carter, though the proof is not positive, but there seems to be no other place for him among the Carters. In 1762 he was a member of Chichester Friends meeting, but was disowned in 1771 for a breach of discipline. He was restored to membership in 1787, and in 1788 he received a certificate of membership to Chester Monthly Meeting. It is probable that he had resided in the town of Chester for some time previous to the latter date as he was assessed with a lot and buildings there in 1784.

His name is found among the list of citizens of Chester township, who suffered on account of the inroads and depredations of the British army in its passage through Chester county, in 1777. His loss is set down at £1, 155.†

His name appears in the following doggerel lines which appeared in Chester about 1795. The other names are those of residents of the town, well known at that time.

Fire! Fire! cried Anthony Guyer, Where? Where? said Squire Eyre, It's up street, said Parson Heath, It's down town, said Dr. Brown, It's here! It's here! cried Charley Lear, It's in Anderson's Hall, said Captain Paul, You all are wrong, said Peter Deshong, It's up in the shed, said Morris's Deb, You lie! You lie! cried Kerlin Sie, I'll go to it, said Mrs. Hewitt, You sha'nt, you sha'nt, said John Denant, It's time you're startin', said Dr. Martin, You'd better be quick, said Thomas Dick, I'll be there in an hour, said Richard Flower, Here's my bucket, said Jonathan Duckett, Put on the water, said Martin Carter, They're all too lazy, said Mrs. Daisy, The roof is rotten, said Johnny Shotten, Keep off my toes, said Odenheimer's Rose, I'll make them whiz, said Odenheimer's Liz.

His wife's name appears to have been Jane, and they were probably married in 1762, as he made an acknowledgement in that year at Chichester Friends meeting for marriage by a justice to one not a member.

Martin Carter died 7, 1 mo. 1808. His will is dated 4, 10 mo. 1801, and is recorded at Media, in Will Book, A, p. 356. He names his wife and each of his children.

17. William Carter,³ [Abraham,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Carter, was probably born in the year 1740, and died 29, 11 mo. 1785.*

He was a shoemaker and after he became a man seems to have resided in Philadelphia, somewhere in the vicinity of Front and Arch streets.

On 28, 11 mo. 1763 he received a certificate from Chester to Philadelphia Monthly Meeting.

On 17, 10 mo. 1765, he married Hannah Ashburnham, daughter of Thomas, at Philadelphia Friends meeting house.

He died intestate, and Letters of Administration upon his estate were granted to Hannah Carter, Peter Howard, and John Burchall, 6 December, 1785. In addition to the Administrators, Joseph and Daniel Carter, [brothers of the deceased], of Chester township, signed the bond.

As Abraham Carter, in his will dated 29, Dec. 1787,† makes a bequest to "each and every of the children of my son William Carter, deceased," there were probably several children, but the name of only one is known.

18. Edward Carter,³ [Abraham,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Cartèr, was probably born about 1743, and died 3, 5 mo. 1821.

He seems to have been a farmer and resided in Chester township. He inherited ninety-two acres from his father upon which he probably lived. In 1784 he was assessed with one hundred acres, this was probably the same which he afterwards inherited, but was already occupied by him.

He first married Eleanor Dod, daughter of Thomas and Ann Dod, about the year 1770. She was born in 1745, and died 19 Feb. 1810, aged 65 years and 5 months.

Eleanor Dod has quite an interesting history as told by her descendants. She was of English parentage, and when a young girl was invited by a sea captain's wife to come on board the ship and see the cabin and furniture, before the vessel sailed. She accepted the invitation and employed a boatman to take her out to the ship as it lay at anchor in the harbor; but when she set foot on deck the captain ordered the boatman away and at once weighed anchor and set sail for America with Miss Dod on board. Years passed and no tidings came from the long lost daughter. Her family probably knew or suspected that she was somewhere in America, as about the year 1790 her brother Thomas set out to search for his lost sister, but he died on his passage to America.

But at last, when she had been many years married and her own daughters were grown up and settled in life, she was put into communication with her family after the following manner. An Englishman on a visit to America, being in the neighborhood, heard that Mrs. Carter was of English birth, and called to have a chat with her. This led to the unexpected discovery that he knew her parents and family in England. When he returned she sent with him a letter to her people, which he delivered in person, and of course gave full information as to her circumstan-

ces in America. This was the first her people knew of her exact whereabouts.

The following is a copy of the first letter received from her mother, which was transcribed many years ago. The original is not known to be in existence.

Dear Son & Daughter. This comes with my blessing to you and your two Daughters and glad to hear you are all well as it leaves me at present considering my being so far advanced in years. Father has been dead 15 years the 7th of March last and he was Interred at Hartiell Church, your brother Joseph is dead he died about a year ago after being Married about 3 times. He has left 5 children to morne the loss of a Parent. Your Brother Thomas died about 6 years ago on his Passage to America in serch of you which if possible would have found had pleased God permited life and health.

Your Brother Samuel is married and has no Children, and is a verry great miser, your sister Nancy is married and has one son and never a daughter, your sister Mary is married and has had 9 children one of the nine dead. Your Brother John has had 7 children in his time of matrimony one dead out of the seven, your sister Sarah is married and has seven Children 2 sons & 5 daughters. I am settled with my daughter Sarah and verry happy we live.

Your Brothers & Sisters all live within a verry small compass of each outher, one of Sarah daughters is Chrisened Ellen after you and the godfathers & godmothers are people that has [have gone] to America and almost all their talk was about you and the Country that you live in and let me know if you ever wrote befor as i never Rec^d a letter from you since you went before this which gives great satisfaction to hear you are living so well settled in the world. So concluding with my blessings to you and your Family from your loving mother till Death.

Edward Carter married as a second wife, Mrs. Catharine Scott, widow of William Scott.* She died in 1843. There were no children by this marriage.

The will of Edward Carter is recorded in the Register's office at Media. It was made 14 August, 1819, and proven 9 May, 1821. The following is a copy.

I Edward Carter of the Township of Chester in Dela-County and State of Pennsylvania being of good health and of a sound disposing mind, memory and understanding, Do make and publish this my last Will and Testament in manner following to wit. I order all my just debts to be honestly paid by my Executors herein after named. I bequeath unto my well-beloved wife Catherina Carter according to a marriage contract made and fully agreed upon by and between me and my said wife previous to our marriage and in lieu of her thirds in my real estate all the household furniture she owned previous to our marriage. I give and devise unto my daughter Ann Roberts her heirs and assigns for ever all my plantation or real estate with all my right title and interest in the same, bounded by land of Nimrod Maxwell, Joseph Johnson, Irwin Armstrong, Thomas Malon, Chester Creek and Land belonging to the heirs of Abraham Carter deceased, containing fifty acres more or less, situate in Chester township aforesaid, the said Ann Roberts to have and take possession at my decease. I also give and devise unto my said daughter Ann Roberts all my personal property of whatsoever nature or kind it may be, excepting what I have bequeathed to my wife Cathrina Carter. I subject my real estate to a legacy of six hundred dollars which I bequeath to my daughter Hannah Culin, two hundred dollars of which to be paid to herself in two years after my decease, the remaining four hundred dollars to be paid two hundred dollars a year to herself without interest till all be paid, but if the said Hannah Culin should die before she receives said Legacy then and in that case my will is that it be equally divided among and paid to her children as they shall come of age, without interest. nominate constitute and appoint John McMichal and Doc-

tor Job Terrel of Chester Executors of this my last will, making all other wills, legacies and bequests by me heretofore made and declaring this and no other to be my last will and Testament. 19. Agnes Carter,³ [Abraham,² Jeremiah¹] daughter of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Carter, was twice married. She first married her cousin Thomas Barnard, (10) about the year 1765, and by him had one son, *Isaac*, (25). See page 53, *ante*.

She married, secondly, John Evans, of Uwchlan township, Chester county. The marriage license was granted 26 August, 1772.* He was the son of Lewis and Sarah Evans.† He died in Uwchlan township in 1783, aged 38 years. He was a farmer and hotel keeper. Silas Evans, a grandson of Agnes (Carter) Evans, has in his possession a small gold ring bearing the following inscription.: "T. B. Remember, the Giver." It was a present from Thomas Barnard (10) to his wife Agnes (Carter) Barnard.

Agnes (Carter) Evans survived her husband many years and during the last few years of her life lived with her youngest son Elam, in Uwchlan township.

20. Joseph Carter,³ [Abraham,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Carter, was born in Chester township, Chester county, 17 November, 1749, and died 2 February, 1830, aged 80 years, 2 months, 4 days. He was a farmer and resided on part of the Cartertown land. In 1784 he was taxed with 100 acres and buildings, 4 horses, 5 cattle, 12 sheep, and 12 acres sowed. In connection with his brother Daniel, he inherited from his father's estate, jointly, 165 acres, 2 roods and 37 perches. This property they occupied jointly until 1793, when they made a division of the land, Joseph receiving as his share, two tracts, aggregating 85 acres, 3 roods and 29 perches.*

There existed in the minds of the earlier settlers a strong belief that there were valuable deposits of copper on the Carter land especially upon that portion lying along Chester creek which fell to Joseph's share, and two shafts were sunk about the beginning of the present century. A very interesting article was published in "Hazard's Register," for May, 1832, which described a visit to these mines at that time. The writer says, "Leaving the quarries, he conducted us by a romantic path about half a mile further up the creek, where near an old deserted saw mill, we found traces of an ancient mine. Two shafts appear to have been sunk here which are yet visible but filled with

water and overgrown with bushes and vines. We were informed that about thirty years ago, three assays were made of the copper ore obtained here, the average result of which was 53 per cent of copper, with 48 ounces of silver in every one hundred pounds, and one grain of gold in every ounce of the ore. Before any great depth had been obtained, the progress of the work was suspended owing to want of funds, and it ever since has been neglected." Watson's "Historic Tales of Olden Times," 1833, also mentions these shafts. A fuller account than is here given will be found in Martin's History of Chester, page 418.

He married Margaret Cloud, daughter of Robert and Madeline Cloud. She was probably a descendant of William Cloud who came from Seend, Wiltshire, England, at a very early date. A short account of William Cloud is given in Smith's History of Delaware County, page 453. Margaret Cloud was born 11 June, 1753, and died 20 October, 1827, aged 74 years, 3 months and 9 days.

Joseph and Margaret Carter lie buried in the graveyard at Mount Hope Methodist Episcopal Church a short distance west of Village Green in Aston township. A neat tombstone of white marble marks the grave of each.

The family Bible of Joseph Carter is in the possession of Henry Carter, of near Elkton, Md. It was printed at Berwick in 1793.

The will of Joseph Carter is recorded at Media, in Will-Book C, page 187. It was made 16 July, 1828, and proven 6 February, 1830. The following is a copy.

Be it remembered That, I, Joseph Carter, of the township of Chester in the County of Delaware and State of Pennsylvania, being of sound mind and memory, sensible of my mortality and not knowing how soon I may depart this life, have thought fit to make and hereby do make my last will and testament, in manner following, that is to say:

First, I will and direct that all my just debts and funeral expenses shall be paid and satisfied as soon as conveniently can be, after my decease.

Item, I give and devise to my son Abraham Carter and to his heirs and assigns for ever, the House and lot of land whereon I now dwell, to gether with the pot-house and other buildings thereon, also three acres of the Wood Land on Chichester road, being part of the residue of a tract of thirty acres or thereabouts, with the appurtenances, he paying to his brother William One hundred dollars.

Item, I give and devise unto my son Robert Carter and to his heirs and assigns, twenty-two acres of my tract of Woodland on the Chichester road.

Item, I give and devise unto my son William Carter one hundred dollars to be paid to him by his brother Abraham as herein before mentioned.

Item, I give and devise unto my sons Joseph and Cloud Carter my Fishing-place at the Lazaretto to hold to them my two sons Joseph and Cloud, their heirs and assigns forever part and share alike as tenants in common.

Item, I give and devise unto my son Daniel Carter and his heirs and assigns forever my saw-mill and land on Chester Creek, Beginning at an Old Beech tree and running between Hopewell field and the Barn field to the run, thence Northward to a Cedar tree near the line of James Barnard's land, thence along the same to the place of beginning.

Item, I give and devise unto my son Edward Carter and to his heirs and assigns forever, all the remainder of said tract of land lying between the part devised to my son Daniel and the Concord road, bounded by Chester

Creek and my brother Edward's land.

Item, I give and devise unto my son Daniel Carter and John Westley Carter, and to the surviving of them and to the heirs of such survivor for and during the natural life of my daughter Margaret Gorbey, all that piece of land with the appurtenances, containing about twenty-three acres and thirty perches lately allotted by deed of partition to me from my brother Daniel Carter (excepting one half of the wood land of the said described tract) also two acres of meadow land adjoining said last described piece of land and land of Nancy McMickel in trust, nevertheless that they the said trustees or the survivor of them or the heirs of such survivor, shall after my decease make lease of the said premises so to them devised in trust and re-

ceive and take the rents and profits thereof and pay over the same, and as the same shall be received by them unto my daughter Margaret Gorbey for her own sole and separate use from time to time, during all the time of her natural life and her receipt during her coverture and notwithstanding her coverture (and none other receipt but hers) shall be a full and sufficient discharge for the payment aforesaid.

Item, It is my wish and I will and direct that my said son Daniel, his heirs and assigns, tenants and occupiers of the land herein divided to him, shall have liberty to raise water from the Creek over and across the land devised by me to my son Edward, he or they repairing all injuries and damages done to the said Edward by raising and conducting said water.

Item, I give and devise to my sons Robert, William, Joseph, Daniel, Edward and Cloud, the remaining part of the woodland on Chichester road, being the residue of a tract of thirty four acres or thereabouts (twenty two of which I have devised to my son Robert and three acres to my son Daniel) to hold to them, their heirs, and assigns as tenants in common.

Item, It is my will that all my said children shall have the liberty to dig stone for their own use only, out of the quarry on the land by me devised to my son Daniel, and they shall have privilege of a road to and from said quarry over and upon the land devised by me to my son Edward.

Item, It is my will that, in case the copper mine shall be opened on the land devised by me to my son Daniel, the profits thereof shall be divided equally amongst all my children, their heirs and assigns with this exception, that Daniel shall have two shares.

Item it is my will that if any or either of my said Children bring account or demand against my estate for any matter of thing whatsoever, the amount of such demand or account shall be deducted from the part and share of my Estate devised for the one who shall make such demand, and shall be divided amongst the others of my said Children. And for and concerning all the rest and remainder of my estate, real and personal, whatsoever and wheresoever not herein before devised, I give and bequeath the same unto all my children, their heirs and assigns in

- 21. Daniel Carter,³ [Abraham,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Abraham and Lydia (Clayton) Carter, was born in Chester township, 13 January, 1753, and died 7 October, 1833, aged 80 years, 8 months and 24 days.

He was a farmer and spent his life upon his portion of the paternal estate in Chester township. He was joint heir with his brother Joseph '(20) to certain real estate, which was divided in 1793. His share embraced a tract of about 80 acres. See page 64, ante.

In 1792 he married Martha Boon of Calcoon Hook. She was born 17 July, 1771, and died 1806, aged 35 years. She was of Swedish descent, but I have been unable to learn the names of her parents or the line of her ancestors.* She is said to have had a brother Andrewand sisters.

The will of Daniel Carter is recorded at Media in Will-Book C, p. 287. It was made 4 October, 1833, and proven 10 October, 1833. The following is a copy.

I Daniel Carter of the Township of Chester in the County of Delaware, State of Pennsylvania, being of a sound disposing mind, memory and understanding, Do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following to wit:

I give and devise unto my son John Wesley Carter, his heirs and assigns forever, the following described land, Beginning at the Concord road in the corner of my land and Edward Carter's, thence along the line to the Chichester road, thence up said road to opposite Daniel Carter Junior's front door, thence to a white oak tree marked with three notches about a perch from the fence in the woods, thence straight through the woods to another marked white oak tree with three notches near Concord road, thence out to the said road, thence down the same place of beginning, Containing Four acres more or less with all the woods and improvements thereon.

^{*} The founder of this family was Anders Bonde, a Swede, who settled at "Kalkoen Hoek" on the Delaware in 1639. The Swedish pronounciation of the name was Boon'-da, and signified a peasant. With some of his descendants the name became corrupted to Boon. In the list of Tydable persons in 1677, will be found the name of Andries Boen and Swen Boen. Andries Boon took up 200 acres from Upland Court, 14 June, 1681. In a list of Swedish families, given in "Clays Annals," residing in New Sweden in 1693, are found those of Anders Bonde, Sven Bonde and Johan Bonde. It is stated that Anders Bonde was born in Sweden and had been in this country fifty-four years. His name is sometimes given as Andries-Swanson Boone.

All the Remainder of my Estate, Real Personal and mixed together with all my right title and interest to and in the Quarry by the Creek on the land of Daniel Carter Junior, I give and bequeath unto my sons Gillied, John Wesley and Abraham Carter their heirs and assigns forever share the share alike to be by them divided off into three equal shares as soon as possible after my death, subject to the payment of One hundred and fifty Dollars a piece to each of my daughters, viz Ann Lloyd, Eliza Trites, Agnes Morrison, Eleanor Ward, and Mary Peirce to be paid in three years after my death without interest, each of my said sons shall pay equal shares of said Legacies. My Will is that my son John Wesley Carter shall have the Wheat which is in my Barn and Granary and that my son Abraham retain his Wheelright shop and have liberty to sell or move it off also that Eijah Ward shall retain his stable with the like privileges.

I appoint my sons John Wesley and Abraham Carter Executors of my last Will and Testament, revoking all wills, legacies and bequests by me heretofore made, declaring this and no other to be my last Will & Testament.

Witness my hand and seal October 4th 1833.

22. James Barnard, [Isaac, 3 Sarah, 2 Jeremiah, 1] son of Isaac and Isabella (Day) Barnard, was born 12 December, 1755, and died 18 February, 1806, aged 50 years, 2 months, 6 days.

James Barnard resided in Aston township, until 1792, when being elected Sheriff of Delaware county, he purchased a farm near the borough of Chester upon which he resided until 1800, when he removed into the borough where he continued to reside until his death in 1806. He was Sheriff of the county from 1792 to 1795. He was appointed Register, Recorder, Prothonotary and Clerk of the Courts of Delaware county, in 1800 and held the position until his death in 1806. He was a Vestryman of St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church for the years 1801, 1802 and 1803.

He married Susannah Dutton, about the year 1780. She was possibly the daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth (Smith) Dutton.* She died 1, 8 mo., 1823.†

The will of James Barnard is recorded at Media in Will Book B, page 22. He named as his executors, Thomas-B. Dick and Jacob-D. Barker. The will of Susannah Bar-

nard is recorded at the same place, in Will Book, C, page 29. Her executor was her son Isaac-D. Barnard.

24. Isabella-D. Barnard, [Isaac, 3 Sarah, 2 Jeremiah, 1] is said to have been a daughter of Isaac and Isabella (Day) Barnard. Examine statements on pp. 51 & 52, aute.

She married Jacob-D. Barker.* In 1793 he owned land in Chester township adjoining the Carter land, but seems to have been a resident of Upper Chichester.

As before intimated there seems to be some obscurity about Isabella-D Barnard. For instance, The Dutton MS. gives the marriage of Jacob-D. Barker and Sarah Barnard as occurring 2, 4 mo. 1789, and the death of Sarah-D. Barker on 29, 10 mo. 1822. It is possible that two persons have been confounded. If any further light is had on this point it will be given in the Appendix to this work.

In 1784, 1787, and 1788 he was assessed with 160 acres of land in Upper Chichester township.

He died 5, 3 mo. 1824.† His will is recorded at Media in Will-Book C, page 46. It was made 2 March, 1824, and proven 9 March, 1824. His Executors were Joseph Walker, Jacob Howell and Jacob Barker.

25. Isaac Barnard, ⁴ [Thomas, ³ Sarah, ² Jeremiah, ¹ and Agnes, ³ Abraham, ² Jeremiah, ¹] son of Thomas and Agnes (Carter) Barnard was born about 1767 and died 1800.

He lost his father when he was very young, and in 1773 John Jacobs, Esq., was appointed his guardian. From the effects of white swelling he was rendered a cripple for life. His mother gave him a good education. When he grew up he was employed by a business firm in Philadelphia as a clerk. He never married

27. Jacob Hewes, [Mary, 3 Sarah, 2 Jeremiah, 1] son of John and Mary (Barnard) Hewes, was born at the homestead, in Lower Chichester, 7, 2 mo. 1752, and died 29, 4 mo. 1795, aged 43 years, 2 months, 11 days.

He resided at the homestead in Lower Chichester township. He was twice married, first to Rachel Perkins, daughter of Thomas and Hannah Perkins, about the year 1774. She died 31, 3 mo. 1781.

He married, second, Esther Pyle, daughter of Isaac and Jane Pyle, at Chichester Meeting House. She was born 15, 5 mo. 1763, and died 9, 9 mo. 1839, aged 76 years, 3 months, 24 days.

Letters of Administration were granted upon the estate of Jacob Hewes, to Esther Hewes and Jacob Pierce, 8 May, 1793. The will of Esther Hewes, is recorded at Media in Will-Book C, page 456.

28. Elisha-Cullen Dick,⁴ M. D., [Mary,³ Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Archibald and Mary (Barnard) Dick, was born 15 March, 1762, near Marcus Hook, below Chester, Pa., and died in the year 1825, at Alexandria, Va., aged about 63 years.

In early boyhood he was sent to the Pequea Academy, and while there was a member of the family of Rev. Robert Smith, D. D.,* and under whose fatherly care he completed his classical and mathematical studies. He returned to his father's house at the age of sixteen and there pursued a course of reading and study under the direction of Rev. Samuel Armor, a learned Episcopal clergyman, whose services were especially engaged for this purpose by his father. In 1780 he commenced the study of medicine under Dr. Benjamin Rush, then Professor of Theory

and Practice, with whom he continued until 1781 when he was entered as a student in the office of Dr. William Shippen, Professor of Anatomy, where he completed the regular course of medical studies, and on the 21st of March, 1782 he received the degree of Bachelor of Medicine.*

Two days after Dr. Dick's graduation his father died, and he fell heir to one-half the paternal estate. On 29, April, 1783, he sold his undivided half-interest in the Marcus Hook estate to Isaac Dutton and turned his steps towards Charleston, South Carolina, where he intended to pursue his profession. He had obtained letters of introduction to prominent gentlemen upon the route, and among others, to Col. John Fitzgerald, aid to General Washington, and to Mr. Henry Lyles, a merchant of Alexandria, to be used in case of sickness or accident in his journey.

He did not design to stop in Alexandria, but accidentally learning, while at the tavern in the place, that a female relation of his was then in town, in accordance with the courtesy and high-breeding of those days, he considered it his duty to call upon her. The old lady insisting upon his staying a day or two, he consented to do so, and took the opportunity to deliver the two letters mentioned above. Col. Fitzgerald and Mr. Lyles, with true hospitality, sought to make his stay in Alexandria agreeable by putting him into communication with the best citizens of the town.

The practice of Alexandria was then chiefly in the hands of Drs. Brown and Ramsey. The latter being then extremely ill, Dr. Dick was earnestly requested by many citizens to aid Dr. Brown in the care of the sick

during the illness of Dr. Ramsey. This he consented to do, and Dr. Ramsey's death occurring in a very short time—the same friends so urged him to abandon his settlement in Charleston and remain in Alexandria that he concluded to do so, and that town became his home and the theater of his professional labors.

In October, 1783, he married Hannah Harman, daughter of Jacob and Sarah Harman,* of Darby, Chester county, Pa. She was born about 1763, and died 1843 aged 80 years.

Dr. Dick, if we may judge from an oil painting now in the possession of James-A. Pearce, Esq.,—his great-grandson, at Chestertown, Maryland, was a very handsome man. He was five feet ten inches in height, of well proportioned figure, and of more than ordinary bodily powers. The profile portrait on page 77 was engraved by St. Memin and is said to be an excellent likeness. As a physician, he ranked among the leading men of his profession. He possessed much literary ability and culture, and was distinguished for those excellent qualities which constitute the true gentleman, and never fail to secure for their fortunate possessor a high place in the scale of regard of those who can appreciate that which elevates and adorns humanity. He had what was then termed "a fine genius for painting in oils," and an exquisite ear for music, singing with great sweetness and power, and playing with equal skill upon several instruments.

In 1794 he commanded a company of Cavalry raised in Alexandria to aid in the suppression of the Whisky In-

surrection in Western Pennsylvania. He was an active and distinguished member of the "Alexandria Washington Lodge, No. 22, A. F. and A. M.," where he was intimately associated with General Washington, whose personal friend he was. He was Worshipful Master of this Lodge on the 18th of September, 1793, when the corner stone of the Capitol at Washington City was laid, and invited General Washington to act on that occasion as Master which he did, and the President of the United States, arm-in-arm with Dr. Dick, headed the Masonic procession and participated in the ceremonies. On the 22d of February, 1800, Dr. Dick delivered at the First Presbyterian Church an oration on "The Day and Decease of Washington," which gave evidence of high oratorical ability.

In General Washington's last illness in December, 1799, Dr. Craik who attended him called, as consulting physicians, Drs. Brown and Dick. Perceiving that the situation of the patient was a critical one, they remained with him until he expired. When all hope of recovery from less extreme reemedies had been abandoned, Dr. Dick proposed an operation which he ever afterwards thought might have proved effectual in saving the General's life, but it did not meet the approval of the family physician.

The Doctor, in the latter part of his life, was a very zealous member of the Society of Friends, and his papers afford evidence that he was a decided Christian and a very diligent student of the Bible. A few years before his death he made his residence at his farm in Fairfax county, Virginia, but his death took place in Alexandria in 1825. He was buried in the Friends burial ground on Queen street in that place. He outlived all his children.

Mrs. Dick's parents were of the Society of Friends, and she was brought up in that faith. After the death of her husband she united herself with the Episcopal Church. She was a remarkable woman in every respect—well-cultured, polished and graceful in manner, endowed with singular powers of conversation, and of a genial, sprightly disposition. There was a charm about her which was felt by every one who enjoyed her company. She was not only an accomplished lady, but a woman of real worth, possessing the most thorough knowledge of all those important duties which render one useful and helpful in the various relations of life. After the marriage of her grand-daughter to Rev. D.-M. Wharton, she resided with them till her death which took place in 1843, at the advanced age of 80 years. Previous to her decease she had been blind for many years.

29. Thomas-B. Dick,⁴ [Mary,³ Sarah,² Jeremiah,¹] son of Archibald and Mary (Barnard) Dick was born 12 March, 1766, near Marcus Hook, and died 21 April, 1811, aged 45 years, 1 month, 9 days.

He was by profession a lawyer, having studied law with Thomas Ross, Esq., commencing his studies 17 April 1788, and being admitted, at Chester, to the Bar at Delaware county 9 February, 1790; to the Bar at New Castle, Delaware, 18 February, 1790; at West Chester, 23 February, 1790; and at Philadelphia 25 October, 1790. He resided and practiced law at Chester until 1794, when he returned to Easton and remained there until 1798, when he returned to Chester to reside. He had a very large legal practice, with sometimes as many as seventy cases a term. His docket is still preserved and gives evidence of having

been carefully kept. He is said to have been an eloquent pleader. He wrote his name Thomas Dick until 1793, when he introduced the middle letter B., probably for Barnard, his mother's maiden name.

He married Mrs. Phebe Hart, *née* Brinton, daughter of James and Mary Brinton, of Chester county. She was born about the year 1763* and died 30 December, 1840, at the age of 77 years. She was buried in the Friends burial ground at Chester.

Thomas-B. Dick was accidentally drowned in the Delaware river, on 21 April, 1811, while out gunning and fishing in a row boat during a snow storm; but how the accident occurred no one knows as he was alone. His body was not recovered until and 29th of the month. His will is recorded at Media in will-book B, page 146.

A committee on his case reported, 7, 3 mo. 1820, that, "on examining the Records no account has been found of his having a right here, but some apprehention being entertained that his right, or evidence of it, yet remains in some one of the Monthly Meetings of the City of Philadelphia," inquiry is directed to be made there. The committee reported on 2, 5 mo. 1820, "that they have ascertained that he had a right of membership in Philadelphia Monthly Meeting, and he having for many years appeared amongst us as a member; they are continued to take another opportunity with him and report to next meeting."

On 6, 6 mo. 1820, he offered an acknowledgment which was accepted, and on 3, 4 mo. 1821, he requested a certificate to Bradford Monthly Meeting which was granted.

After the death of his wife Hannah, he married Julianna Dillin, in 1829. She was a widow with children, one of whom is O.-E. Dillin, of Philadelphia, and another Sarah-Ann who married Abraham-P Rudolph and removed to Woodbury, N. J. He had no children by this marriage and none have been reported by the former marriage.

At the time of the division of the Society of Friends he went with the Hicksite branch, which being in the minority, were crowded out of the Bradford meeting, This branch built a new meeting house (since torn down) on land adjoining. It is said that this congregation dwindled down until Joseph Carter and his dog were the last to attend.

He lived in West Bradford township, Chester county, near Sugars Ford, on the east branch of the Brandywine. 48. Ann Carter,⁴ [Edward,³ Abraham,² Jeremiah,¹] daughter of Edward and Eleanor (Dod) Carter, was born, 28, 6 mo. 1771, and died, 9, 1 mo. 1863, aged 91 years, 6 months, 11 days.*

She was three times married. First to Samuel Johnson, son of Samuel Johnson, Sr., 2 July, 1791.† He was a hatter, and died of yellow fever, in Philadelphia, in 1793. She married, second, John Roberts. He was a copper smith. She married, third, John McMichael, of Chester township. He died in 1824. Ann McMichael survived her husbands many years and died at a great age.

Robert Carter, [Joseph, Abraham, Jeremiah,] son of Joseph and Margaret (Cloud) Carter, was born 21 August, 1778, in Chester township, Chester county, (now Delaware) and died 23 October, 1851, at Walnut Hill, Cecil county, Md., aged, 73 years, 2 months, 2 days. He was by occupation a farmer and paper-maker.

About the year 1815, he removed from Delaware county to Cecil county, Md., and erected the first (I believe it was the first) paper mill in that county, about six miles north of Elkton, and gave it the name of the "Cecil Paper Mills." The first mill was small, and the paper-making was done in the old way—by hand. The capacity of the mill was about three or four hundred pounds a day. About the year 1834 he put in a cylinder machine which increased the capacity of the mill to one half ton a day. In 1836 the mill, books, etc., were totally destroyed by fire. The mill was, however, immediately rebuilt, and improved from time to time. About 1842 he sold out the business and rented the mill to his sons, Joseph-C. and William-G. Carter, and retired to his farm where he resided until his death.

He was twice married; first to Lydia Levis, daughter of John Levis, 5 September, 1805. She was horn 12 September, 1784, and died 8 May. 1820, aged 35 years, 7 months, 26 days. Isaac-D. Barnard* had rather limited facilities for obtaining more than an ordinary common school education At the age of thirteen years he was taken from school, and employed in his father's office† as clerk. He became a very expert assistant. After his father's death in 1806, he was retained in the office of Thomas-B. Dick [No. 29] Clerk of the Court. He was a great favorite on account of his obliging attention on all occasions. In 1809 he entered the office of F. Wolbert, Prothonotary of Philadelphia, where he remained two years. In 1811 he entered the office of Wm. Graham, Esq., of Chester as a student of Law. Shortly after he attained his majority he was commissioned a Captain in the regular army. He served during the war of 1812 and for his gallantry was appointed Major out of the regular order of promotion. After the close of the War he left the Army and resumed his studies, and was admitted to the bar in 1816. He practiced law at West Chester, where he soon became a leading member.

He was Deputy Attorney General for Chester county from 1817 to 1820; in 1820 he was elected to the State Senate, and in 1826 he was appointed Secretary of the Commonwealth under Governor Shultze. Shortly afterwards he was elected to the United Senate. In 1831 he resigned his seat on account of ill health. He was buried in the Friends' graveyard at West Chester, but in 1854 his remains were removed to Oaklands Cemetery where a monument had been erected to his memory.

He married Harriet Darlington, daughter of Judge Isaac Darlington of West Chester, 30 November, 1820, but left no children.

Their second son was Gideon Pearce who married Julia Dick. An interesting account of the Pearce family may be found in a work entitled "Old Kent of Maryland."

Catharine-Susannah Shannon was a daughter of Captain Shannon a British officer who was lost at sea. Captain Shannon's wife was the third daughter of Col. James Ramsey, who was a younger son of a noble Scotch family represented by the Earl of Dalhousie. By the death of his elder brother he became heir to the estate, but as the estate consisted chiefly of the title he had the good sense not to assume a rank his means would not permit him to sustain and allowed the title to pass to another branch of the family. He was appointed to the command of a fort at Albany in 1720, as successor to Sir William Dick. During this period he was Lieutenant Governor of New York. The following table exhibits three generations of ancestors of Gideon Pearce.







WHEREAS Abraham Carter late of the Township of Chester, in the (then County of Chester but now) said county of Delaware, in & by his last Will and Testament* in Writing, dated the Twenty ninth Day of December, which was in the year of our Lord One Thousand seven Hundred & Eighty seven, did, amongst other particulars, Devise as follows, that is to say, "Item, I Give, Devise & Bequeath unto my two Sons, Joseph Carter and Daniel Carter, all this Messuage, Plantation & Tract of Land where I now dwell, which was devised to me by my late Father, Jeremiah Carter, deceased, including the Land I bought of John Pennell, also about seven or eight acres of Meadow Ground to be bounded according to the present Fences thereof, part of Fifty acers of Land devised to me with other Land, by my Brother Edward Carter, deceased, to be equally devided between them, share and share alike. And Whereas on the Twenty third day of March now last past, the said Joseph Carter and Daniel Carter, did by a certain written Article of Agreement, nominate and authorize James Barnard, Jonathan Richards, Thomas Sharpless, John Burchall, and Thomas Pedrick, Yeomen, of the said County of Delaware, to make Partition of the said devised Premises between the said Parties agreeably to the tenor of the said recited Will and of the article of Agreement, in which Article a special covenant is contained to this effect—That as soon as the said Partition should be made by the authorized persons aforesaid (or any three of them) the same partition should be certified under their Hands and Seals and delivered to the said Parties, whereupon mutual Releases should pass between the same parties: And Whereas the whole of the said authorized Persons have by their Schedule, under their Hands and Seals and bearing date the Tenth day of April in this present year, Certified the said Partition in manner and form as is therein contained, whith is delivered to the said Parties.

ter's) Estate, Right, Title, Interest, Use, Possession, Property, Claim and Demand whatsoever, as well at Law as in Equity, or otherwise howsoever, of in, to and out of All that Messuage or Tenement and Piece or Parcel of Land thereunto belonging, situated in the said Township of Chester, Beginning at a white Walnut-Tree, being a corner of Edward Carter's Land (and also the place of beginning of the first described piece of Joseph Carter's allotment) thence by the said Joseph Carter's first described piece of Land, south forty three degrees and one half East, Sixty perches, and six tenths to a stone, thence South sixteen Degrees West, Thirty nine perches to a stone in Concord Road, thence crossing the said Road, South Twenty Degrees West, Thirty nine perches to a stone standing in Chichester Road, thence up the said road South Seventy five Degrees West, Thirty four perches, South sixty six Degrees West, Twenty six perches, and South Seventy five Degrees and three quarters West, Thirty two perches to a stone, a corner of the second piece allotted to Joseph Carter (party hereto) thence North Twenty Degrees and a half West, forty one perches, crossing a run, and North Ten Degrees and one half West, Fifty seven perches to a Gum Tree, a corner of Joseph Carter's second piece aforesaid and in Edward Carter's Line, thence along the said line, North sixty one Degrees East, one hundred and five perches and six tenths to the place of Beginning, Containing Seventy eight Acres, three Quarters and eight perches, be the same more or less-(Which is the purparty of the said Devised Premises, so as aforesaid assigned to the said Daniel Carter, to be held by him in severalty) Together with all and singular other the Houses, Buildings, Gardens, Orchards, Woods, Meadows, Marshes, Ways, Waters, Watercourses, Rights, Liberties, Privileges, Improvements Hereditaments and Appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belonging, or in anywise appertaining-And the Reversions and Remainders, Rents, Issues and Profits thereof (saving and excepting here out to the said Joseph Carter, his Heirs and Assigns forever, the one full moiety or equal half part of all kinds of quarries and mines that are or shall be discovered to be upon the above described purparty, and the like share of the Benefits, Advantages and Emoluments therefrom to arise, and likewise the full and free Right, Liberty and Privilege of ingress, egress and regress touching the said quarries and mines at all times forever hereafter, without the lawful Let, Hindrance, Molestation or Denial of the said Daniel Carter, his Heirs or Assigns or of any other person or persons whomsoever, claiming or acting by, from or under him, them or any or either of them, in Law, Equity or otherwise howsoever) To Have and to Hold the said hereby Granted and Released Premises and every part

and parcel thereof (except as before excepted) with the Appurtenances, unto the said Daniel Carter, his Heirs and Assigns, To the only proper Use, Benefit and Behoof of the said Daniel Carter, his Heirs and Assigns forever: So that neither he the said Joseph Carter nor any of his Heirs, nor any other person or persons for him or them, or in his, their or any of their name or names, right or stead, shall or may hereafter by any manner of ways or means whatsoever, have, challenge or Demand any Estate, Right, Title or Interest whatsoever (except as before excepted) of, in, to or out of the said leneby Granted and Released Premises, or any part or parcel thereof, but thereof and therefron, and of and from every part and parcel thereof, he, they and every of them, is, are and shall be utterly excluded and forever barred by these presents.

Lydia-M. Carter, (179). Additional. William Snowden who married Lydia-M. Carker, was born 20 May, 1815, in Anne Arundel county, Md. He was the son of Philip and Patience (Hopkins) Snowden. Philip Snowden was the son of Samuel Snowden, and Patience Hopkins was the daughter of Joseph Hopkins who was born 11, 11 mo. 1744. The home of Samuel Snowden was in Prince George's county, Md., on the road from Baltimore to Mt. Vernon, and during the Revolutionary War, Mrs. Gen. George Washington made her home at his house. The Snowdens are members of the Society of Friends.

Samuel Snowden was a Slaveholder. One day a car riage drove up to his house, and a Friend, wearing a broad brim hat, got out and asked to remain over night, which was cordially granted. When he was ready to leave on the next morning, he said to Mr. Snowden, "My friend, did thee ever think it was wrong to hold thy fellow beings in bondage?" Mr. Snowden replied that he had never thought much about it. As the Friend drove away he said, "I want thee to think of this matter." Mr. Snowden

became convinced that slavery was wrong and emancipated his slaves—seventy-two able-bodied men and women—and gave them homes. Those under age he left to the care of his children, until they should become of age. The old men and women were left a charge upon his children during their lives. Samuel Snowden was engaged in the iron business. William and Lydia-M. Snowden's post-office is Ogden, Clinton county, Ohio.




