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State Superintendent's Report

As this report covers a period of two years, 1899 and 1900, and no report for the former year has been printed, I have thought it best to insert portions thereof in this report, including statistics for 1899. While the law requires an annual report to the governor it authorizes the printing only of biennial reports of this department. These reports are in constant demand both in and out of the State and should be printed annually. The law should be amended to authorize their annual publication.

CONDITION OF SCHOOLS.

It is refreshing to note the marked improvement of the public schools of the State. This improvement has been made along several lines and is due to a number of causes. The personnel of the teachers has been greatly improved. A prominent educator remarked recently that the teachers of Montana, taken as a whole, excelled those of the State of California. This is, indeed, a high compliment, coming as it does from one familiar with the school work in both states, and who is abundantly well qualified to judge. The teachers of the state have done more professional reading during the past four years than in any previous ten years. They regard education as a science, and have come to study it as such. The old gadgrind method of the past which had for its goal the acquisition of facts, has given place, for the most part, to a better order of things. We have come to learn the great lesson that school is not merely "a preparation for life," but that it is life itself. This enlarged view of education, this increasing intensity of teaching, this clearer and fuller comprehension of its truest and highest aim, has done great things in the recent past for Montana schools, and promises yet greater things for the future.

A few short years ago there were those teaching school in the state who denied the statement that education is a science, and who refused to believe that like all sciences it is evolutionary. These endeavored to form themselves into an educational party or faction for purposes of self-defense. Encouraged by the commendation of a few ill-advised persons, they made hold declaration of their educational faith, and londly proclaimed their utter disbelief in anything that departed from the "ancient landmarks." But the teachers and even the patrons of the schools themselves catching a broader view of education than these had, made it impossible for them to long continue in school. As a result there is practical unity among the teachers of the State.

The modern teacher, the teacher who does the most for her pupils, and who, therefore, is best, possesses at least three great and essential qualifications—moral character, scholarship and teaching power. Such a teacher does not reject all that is old, but accepting all that is good in old systems of educatoin accepts also what is good in the new. He does not, however, shut his eyes to the light of the present lest he lost sight of some of the old paths. The teacher must know the thing he teaches. He must have far more knowledge than the class text-book contains. And he must know something else to be a successful teacher of today. He must know "how to teach," according to the highest standards and the best authorities of the world. Unless he possesses these qualifications he is not qualified to teach school. That the number of our teachers, who possess these high qualifications is steadily increasing, is a fact not to be questioned. This is most encouraging and accounts, in no small part, for the general excellence of the teaching in our public schools today.

A call of the roll of those engaged in educational work in the State two years ago shows that many changes in the State's teaching force have been made during this period. In most cases the changes have been wise ones, although, occasionally, the reverse has been the case. A better public sentiment regard-

ing good schools exists today than ever before. This sentiment accounts, in no small degree, for the improvement in the personnel of our teachers. Those who were unwise enough to refuse to respond to the demand for better and more rational work in the school room have found their places filled with those in sympathy with the spirit of the times. Montana is no longer a congential clime for the unprofessional and incompetent teacher, whose sole ambition is to "draw her salary." If such are still found in the State it is encouraging to note that the number is rapidly diminishing. We have learned, by sad experience it is true in many cases, that "As the teacher, so the school." This is most fortunate. No greater truth, concerning education ever was, or ever could be, spoken. If we are to have the best schools, or even good schools, then we must have the right kind of teachers.

STATISTICAL.

The reports to this office show that there are 696 school districts in the State, an increase of 18 over 1899; that the number of census children is 57,210, an increase of 3,578 over 1899; that the enrollment in public schools for the present year is 39,430, an increase of 2,213. In private schools 1898 were enrolled during 1900 and 1586 in 1899. 1214 teachers have been employed during the year, of which number 202 are males and 1012 females. In 1899, there were 1126 teachers employed.

LIBRARIES.

There are 32,987 volumes in the school district libraries of the State, valued at \$23,941.47, an increase of 8,020 volumes during the past year.

\$740,209.69 was apportioned to the 696 school districts of the state during the year. In 1899 there was apportioned to the 678 districts the sum of \$606,990.86. There are 700 school houses, which, including sites, are valued at \$2,531,942.

We give a comparative table of statistics, which shows, as well as figures can show, the educational growth of Montana during the past 32 years, or from 1868. The teachers of the State were paid \$570,161,72 during the year. The average salary for men

was \$60.04, and for women \$50.30. The corresponding figures for the preceding year were \$69.45 and \$49.15. Fifty five districts built new school houses during the past year. Thus it is seen that material and substantial gain has been made for the past year. The small increase in the number of districts, 18, is encouraging rather than otherwise. The creation of new districts has not been encouraged except in exceptional cases. Consolidation rather has been urged whenever practical, and this for reasons discussed elsewhere.

Comparative table of the financial and statistical reports of Montana from 1868 to the present year, 1900.

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From 1868 to 1889 the school age was from 4 to 21 years. In 1890 the school age was from 5 to 21 years, and in 1891 "was from 5 to 21.

Since 1892 the school age has been from 6 to 21 years.

STATE APPROPRIATION.

The state appropriation for 1899 amounted to \$80,248.00. This sum was apportioned to the twenty-four counties of the state at the rate of \$1.50 per capita for each census child. In 1897 the per capita was only 38 cents and \$17,731.56 was the amount apportioned. In 1896 the state appropriation amounted to \$51,027.60. It is estimated that the rate for the coming February apportionment will be \$2.00 per capita, which on the basis of 57.210 census children, will distribute the splendid sum of \$114.120 among the 696 school districts of the state. This, under the depressed financial condition of many of the largest districts of the state, due to the overthrow of the special tax law, will be doubly welcome this year, and be of material assistance in tiding these districts over their present financial embarrassment. The school income fund is derived from interest on the invested school funds, and rents accruing from leasing of school lands. Under the law only the income of the permanent fund can be used. Why February was chosen as the time for making the annual state apportionment it is difficult to see. I think it would be better to make it the first of December, just after the close of the fiscal year. I think the law should be amended accordingly.

COUNTY INSTITUTES.

The work of the county institutes has not been interrupted during the present year as it was in 1899. Institutes have been held in twenty-two counties, and the remaining two counties will hold theirs during December. I have attended and assisted at a majority of the institutes held in 1899 and 1900.

It is agreed among those considered best qualified to judge that the splendid professional spirit existing among the great majority of our teachers, and the striking advancement made generally in the schools throughout the state during the past four years, is due, in large measure, to the splendid work of the county institute. Too much cannot be said of the results that have come from it.

It is true that a very few teachers may still be found in Montana who see no good in the institute. But such are not gen-

uine teachers. They are only job holders. Their schools are always the very poorest to be found in the State. As already indicated, this class of teachers is rapidly diminishing. During the past institute season I have found but one of this class.

Regarding the institute work for 1899, I will quote from my report of last year. "The work of the county institutes has been seriously interfered with during the past year on account of the prevalence of contagious diseases particularly small-pox. In the counties of Flathead, Choteau, Cascade, Deer Lodge and Silver Bow no institute was held as it was not considered prudent. Should conditions warrant institutes in these counties will be held at an early date, otherwise they will be postponed until fall. In the remaining counties, however, with the exception of Valley, most successful institutes were held. The attendance was very good, nearly every teacher in the county attending, and the interest and spirit of the teachers were the best. The institutes were instructed by able and experienced educators, and the work done was of a very high order. Our institute law, though an abomination in many respects, has one salutary provision, which places the licensing of institute instructors in the hands of the members of the State Board of Education. This insures competent instructors for this most important work, as only those thus licensed are authorized to instruct in the institute. The policy of the State Board of Education is to grant licenses only to those who are fully qualified to do this work. I am fully of the opinion that the work of the county institutes for the past three years has done more than anything else in improving the schools of the State. Its work ought to be encouraged and aided still further by needed legislation. But as this report is not printed, and as the legislature will not be in session until the biennial report of this department is due, I will reserve my recommendations regarding changes in the school law till that time."

In 1897, the legislature, in a moment of mental paresis or al-erration enacted a law forbidding the holding of institutes in June, July and August. A more benighted law cannot be found among civilized peoples. Its speedy repeal needs only a moment's attention by intelligent lawmakers. Its enactment demonstrates the ease with which a "Monkey and parrot show"

has been made of our school laws in the past. The same legislature still further juggled with the institute law, mangling and deforming it until it is now as farcial as it is absurd. As it now stands the law is in conflict with itself. It should be amended by repealing the ridiculous legislation of 1897. This will leave it as it had been for a long time, and when no serious complaints were made against it.

Since the foregoing was written the board of school trustees of Great Falls have decided not to close their schools during the institute which was set for December 19th. Therefore the county superintendent, without consulting this office, announced that there would be no institute held.

The attorney general held, however, that it was the legal duty of the county superintendent to hold an institute even if several boards refused to dismiss school, and this office advised that one be held in conformity with the opinion of the attornev general. The Great Falls board was also instructed that it was its duty to close school during the time the institute was in session. The trustees, however, emphatically refuse to do so, claiming that there was no law requiring them to close, and that the institute was of little value. This state of affairs shows a surprising lack of professional spirit which is greatly to be regretted. This is the first time in the entire history of Montana that a city board of education has refused to close the schools and allow their teachers t attend the institute. This is a most unfortunate step backward and one greatly to be regretted. If such a policy were maintained throughout the State, public school education would be retarded. We would be going backward, not forward.

No institute could be held in this county last year owing to the prevalence of small-pox. The schools of the county suffered a positive loss in consequence. It is noticeable that those counties have the best schools which have had the best institutes every year. A century ago such action might not excite much comment, but the closing year of the nineteenth century is not the time when it can be allowed to pass unnoticed.

The legislature should, in the interests of good schools, so amend our institute law that trustees will be compelled to allow their teachers an opportunity of attending the annual institute.

STATE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

In my report of last year I said: "It is very gratifying to report the successful meeting of this Association, held at Helena. December 27, 28, 29, 1899. The attendance, notwithstanding the very many unfavorable conditions existing in the State, was the largest for a number of years. A most profitable session was held, one that will, it is believed, result in much good. The Association is composed of the professional teachers and educators of the State. It is thoroughly democratic. It strives to elevate the character of teaching, and raise the standard of our schools to the highest possible level. It is a strong educational factor in the state and deserves recognition by the legislature, something which, as vet, it has not received. Perhaps the most important action taken at the session was the appointment of a committee of five on the revision of the school laws. This committee is to report to the next legislature such amendments as it thinks ought to be made, and urge their adoption. That the school laws need a thorough revision has been strikingly demonstrated by the decision in the special tax case. Aside from this there are many other respects in which they are intolerably bad. At its recent meeting the constitution was amended so as to permit the holding of its annual meeting wherever the Association might elect. For a number of years past Helena has been the regular meeting place. The session for 1900 will, by a vote of the Asociation, be held in the city of Butte." The meeting at Butte promies to be a great success. Already preparations for it have been made by the teach ers, school board and citizens of that city. All the people of the city of Butte seem determined to cement that union which should always exist among educators. The obstacles, heretofore existing having been wisely removed, the way is now open for all teachers of Silver Bow County to ally themselves with the other educational forces of the State. That they have not always done so in the past is no fault of theirs. Much good is expected to come from this meeting.

It is no credit to the State of Montana that its laws do not recognize this Association. The legislature might well appropriate a small sum towards defraying the expenses of this association. It has done a great work in elevating and unifying the work of public education in the State. Its influence increases from year to year. It should be encouraged and upheld by all who desire to see every agency employed that is helpful in securing the best possible education for our youth.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

The rural school problem, like the poor, we have always with us. In Montana, however, this problem is far more difficult than it is in the central or eastern states. Distances are so magnificent in the State, school districts, in many cases, are so great, and the population to the square mile is so sparse, that it is impossible, under our present law, to give sufficient or even reasonable school advantages to the children of the small rural schools. When we reflect that the State of Montana is larger than the United Kingdom of Great Gritain, or of New York and New England combined; that it extends five hundred and fifty miles east and west and two-hundred and seventy-five to three-hundred miles north and south; that we have school districts from thirty to sixty miles long with from one to six or eight pupils attending school in each district, while several times that number are unable to attend by reason of the great distance from school; that out of this vast empire of territory containing some 146,000 square miles, or about 94,000,000 of acres only 696 school districts have been created or but one school district in 135,057 acres, we at once see that the rural school problem in Montana is beset with the greatest of difficulties. The creation of additional school districts will only make matters worse, not better. Already the number of census children in these districts is so small that only three to five months of an indifferent school can be maintained each year. Usually the teachers employed are those who will teach for the very lowest wages. Between the short terms of school and the short teaching these rural pupils have a hard time in obtaining even the rudiments of a common school education. To divide up these districts would make is impossible for them, in many cases, to maintain even the constitutional term of three months of school. It is manifest that this problem cannot be solved in this manner. If further argument were needed to prove this, is is found in the fact that during the past year 182

schools were maintained with less than fifteen children enrolled for the entire year, while the average daily attendance at these 182 schools was less than eight for each school.

During the year just past the reports show that 159 schools enrolled less than fourteen; 143, less than thirteen; 116 enrolled but twelve, while 92 could muster but eleven pupils for the whole year; 70 schools enrolled less than ten; 34, less than eight, 15 enrolled but five, 8 had but four pupils and 5 enrolled but three.

227 schools had less than six months of school for the whole year; 176, had less than five months; 124, less than four; while 118 schools had but three months and six maintained school for only two months for the entire year, or one month less than required by the constitution of the State to entitle them to receive apportionment of school moneys.

A consideration of these facts shows how imperative is the demand for legislation for our rural schools.

To point out the needs of these schools is much easier than to discover a remedy for them. In the Fifth Biennial Report of this department I urged this matter upon the attention of the Governor and legislature but nothing was done. I desire again to ask that it be given that consideration which its importance demands. In my former report I stated the manne in which other states were solving this difficult problem, viz., by combining the smaller districts and transporting pupils at public expense. I will only add that during the two years that have elapsed since that report was made a number of other states have adopted this plan. All the states that have adopted it report that it is the best and only practical solution of the question. Better schools, longer terms, a greatly increased enrollment and more regular attendance are the splendid results secured by this plan.

STATE COURSE OF STUDY.

Section 1705, of the political code, in referring to the duties of the superintendent of public instruction, reads: "He shall prepare and prescribe a course of study for all the public schools of the State." The year 1899 was made memorable, educationally, by the publication of a course of study for the public

schools, the first ever published in the State. It was in preparation for a considerable period of time and much labor was given to it. In its preparation most valuable assistance has been rendered by Dr. Oscar J. Craig, president of the State University, President D. E. Sanders of the Normal School and Prof. J. E. Klock city superintendent of the Helena schools. To these gentlemen I desire to express, in this public manner, my sincere thanks for their most valuable aid in the preparation of this work. They gave their time and labor, without the hope or expectation of pecuniary reward, most cheerfully and willingly. The course comprises the work of the eight grades of school. It is printed in convenient form, making a book of 139 pages. It has met with a generous reception. The educational fossil is not expected to approve of it, since the course does not approve of him. It compels study and investigation on the part of the teacher, and, hence the fossil is opposed to it. It is gratifying to know that many parents of the State are becoming interested in it, and have requested that copies be sent them. Much is expected from the use of the course. Heretofore, there being no authorized outline or plan of study, there has been no unity of plan or purpose in the different schools.

The county superintendents are of the opinion that the course of study has been of greatest assistance to the teachers, and that the schools have been much improved thereby.

EIGHTH GRADE DIPLOMAS.

The course provides that diplomas shall be granted to all pupils who complete the eighth grade and successfully pass the state examination. These diplomas are uniform and of beautiful design, but inexpensive. They are furnished by the different school boards.

An eighth grade examination was held last May, the only one thus far held, when many common school pupils throughout the state secured diplomas certifying that they had completed the work of the common schools as outlined in the course of study. This diploma admits the holder to any accredited high school in the state or to the preparatory department of the state educational institutions without examination. It is most

gratifying to read the reports of the county superintendents in answer to a circular letter regarding the success of this scheme. The plan was new in this state at least, and we watched its operation with the greatest interest. I am much pleased to report that it is much more than successful. It has created an interest and zeal in the country schools such as has never existed before. A single illustration will show perhaps as well as anything the splendid results that are being accomplished by granting these diplomas. Heretofore the average boy or girl attending the county school saw no goal ahead. Both expected to receive all the education they would ever get in the "deestrict" school. Having no definite object in view they would often drop out of school before even getting what education the school gave. One of these boys, whose father did not see the necessity of his son getting any more schooling than the district school afforded, continued in school till he had completed the eighth grade, and passed the State examination for a diploma. Graduating exercises were held in the school house. The father attended the exercises and was so impressed with what he saw and heard, so pleased with the idea of his son receiving a diploma, that he sent him to one of our state educational institutions to take a higher course of instruction.

I had the pleasure of presenting the diplomas to the graduating classes of a county. The pupils with their parents had come many miles in many instances, to the county seat where the graduating exercises were held. The enthusiasm and interest of parents as well as pupils showed how highly they approved of this plan. It should be followed and encouraged by every school officer in the state. It has brought one ray of hope, at least, to the rural school children.

STATE ARCHITECT.

I strongly urge the passage of a law providing for a state architect who shall have charge of the construction of all school buildings in the State. School houses have been built and will continue to be built, unless legislation be had without the slightest regard to heating, lighting or ventilating. The health, and often the lives even, of the pupils are put in jeopardy as a result. Moreover, very frequently the building is erected at

an enormous expense, greatly in excess of the necessary cost. The district is required to pay much more than it would have to pay if a competent architect was employed to draft the plans and supervise the construction. The state would save the expense, many times over, of such an officer, and school districts would be protected against incompetent and mercenary school trustees.

CIGARETTE LAW.

Section 542 of the penal code reads:

"Every person who sells or gives any tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, or cigarette paper to any minor under eighteen years of age, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than five hundred dollars or imprisonment not to exceed three months in the county jail, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court."

It is a notorious fact that not only is the health of many of our pupils seriously impaired by the smoking of cigarettes. but that it effects their school work quite as seriously. No cigarette pupil can do good work. So vitally does this matter concern the work of the schools that every school board and every school officer should demand the strictest enforcement of the law. The law is wise and humane, but it is shamefully and notoriously violated. Its strict enforcement will be in the interests of better schools as well as in the interests of humanity. It is a very common thing to see boys of eight to fourteen years of age smoking cigarettes. If their parents or guardians have not sufficient interest in or influence enough over them to prevent or to break up such a destructive habit, then the state, whose interest in its youth must always be paramount, should step in and supplement the training of thoughtless parents. It is as much the duty of teachers to instruct their pupils as to the evil effects of such vices as it is to teach them arithmetic or spelling. Let this be done objectively as far as possible. One living example or a single experiment performed before the class is worth more in the way of instruction than all the moralizing and preaching in the world.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Our law requires. Section 1861, political code, that "Attention must be given during the entire school course to the cultivation of manners, to the laws of health, physical exercise, ventilation and temperature of the school room." Probably no law of civilization was ever more persistently and generally violated than this, and yet there is no wiser or more humane statute in all our laws. How little does the average teacher think about, or, seemingly, care for the health of her pupils. If they can "recite" their lessons, say all their tables, and do that other thing, the doing of which insures the continuance of the teacher, "pass the examination," the children have received all they are entitled to receive in school. Thus thinks the average teacher. That they contract dangerous diseases from want of decent ventilation or fatal ones from criminal carelessness in compelling or permitting the little children to sit in cold drafts, is of little or no, importance compared to passing the examination. Even though the child dies the next day after the examination is held because of repeated violations of the law quoted, still there is great satisfaction that he "passed" before he died. When will teachers learn that health is of greater value than the smattering of education obtained at school, and that the education and training of the body is of quite as much importance as the education of the head. It has been proven by thorough experimentation that, in a course of years pupils who work at manual labor for one-half a day and attend school for the other half outstrip the pupils who attend the full time. In other words, physical exercise, bodily activity, increases the power of mental action. This all admit. It follows that physical exercises are necessary not only to satisfy the demands of the physical natures of the children, but to enable them to do their best mentally.

In the matter of ventilation two fearful mistakes are common, insufficient ventilation, and over-ventilation. Thermometers range from 50 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. I have often seen school rooms in which there were forty to fifty little children, with the thermometer near the 80 mark, closed so tightly that not a bit of fresh air could get in nor a particle of vitiated air escape. On the other hand it is not uncommon to see schools

with an equal number of small children, and that too in severe winter weather, with not only the windows wide open but the outside doors as well. Such carelessness should not be allowed to pass unnoticed. Many parents are forced to send their children to eastern schools where attention is paid to physical training, which ought to be obtained at home, and which might lum is a hard one to master at best, and without due attenbe if a little thought was given to this matter. The curricution to the physical needs of the pupil it is often impossible to do the work required. County superintendents should be required to dismiss any teacher, and to revoke his certificate, who neglects to comply with the law quoted above.

COUNTY FREE HIGH SCHOOLS.

The sixth legislative assembly passed a law providing for the establishment of a free county high school wherever the electors of the county should decide that they desired to have one. Six county high schools have been established under this law at the following places: Bozeman, Boulder, Dillon, Lalispell, Lewistown and Livingston.

Seventeen teachers are employed in these schools, and 386 pupils have been enrolled. The average number belonging is 336.8 and the average daily attendance, 324. The amount of money raised to support these schools annually is, approximately, \$16,600. This is raised by a special levy for the purpose at the time of making the general levy by the county commissioners. Although the law provides for the issuance of county bonds to provide money for building and equipping a school house for the school no building has, thus far, been erected. This is due to defects in the law regarding the issuance of bords.

The law is an excellent one, and already has accomplished splendid results. It is also a popular measure in those counties which have established free high schools. It needs amendment, however, particularly with reference to the bond feature. With the proper amendment it will be of much greater value as a factor in public education in the State.

SCHOOL DISTRICT LIBRARIES.

Our district library law while an excellent one in many respects needs amendment. It requires that in districts having a population of less than 2000 that not less than five nor more than ten percent, of the county school fund annually apportioned to the district shall be expended for books for the school library unless such rate would exceed fifty dollars in which event but fifty dollars are required to be thus expended. In districts of 2000 population or more fifty dollars for every 500 children or fraction thereof of 300 or more between the ages of six and twenty-one must be annually expended for the library.

Under this law 32,987 books have been purchased at a cost of \$23.941.47, 8,020 volumes being added to the libraries last year. I doubt if any other equal expenditure of school money in the whole history of Montana ever brought such good returns as this has brought. These books have already paid for themselves many times over, and we will have them, for the most part, for many years to come to instruct and inspire our school children. In the smaller districts, oftentimes, the school library furnishes all the proper reading matter the children have. It is unnecessary to speak to day of the advantages or even the absolute necessity of surrounding every boy and every girl with the best literature of the world. This litcrature comes to us to-day specially prepared and graded for pupils of all classes. Its cost is so small that it is little less than a crime to deprive children of it. Unfortunately, this law in the very small districts, and where the children need the books most, has been generally ignored. It should be so amended that the county superintendent should be required to expend the library fund for the establishment and maintenance of school libraries in those districts whose trustees neglect or refuse to comply with the law. It should be further amended to allow the use of books by the citizens of the district under regulations established by the trustees, ensuring the proper care of the books, similar to those adopted in all well regulated public libraries. The district library would thus become a strong educational factor throughout the entire district. This would, also, greatly enhance its usefulness and bring it into greater popular favor.

SCHOOL LAW.

The past two years has greatly emphasized the absolute need of a thorough revision of the school laws of the State. The amendments needed are quite too numerous to even enumerate, much less to discuss all of them. Perhaps the one most needed relates to raising money for the support of schools by the districts voting a special tax. The special tax law, so-called, having been declared inoperative and void by the Supreme Court, it is imperative that legislation be now had upon this matter. The law should be so amended that school districts may vote a special tax for the support of their schools as had been done during almost the entire history of Montana. This decision left many of the large districts in a very embarrassing condition. They relied upon this law as a means of securing the necessary funds with which to maintain their schools the usual time. But the people in the districts affected by the decision demonstrated anew their devotion to the public schools. The necessary money was cheerfully given by patriotic citizens and the schools were kept open for nearly the full terms. Reference has been already made to the institute law, which ought to be radically amended.

A joint meeting of a committee appointed by the State Teachers' Association and members of the boards of school trustees of a number of the largest districts in the State was recently held in the city of Helena to consider and agree upon some of the most needed amendments to the law. These amendments will be submitted to the legislature for adoption. I urgently recommend their serious and favorable consideration by the legislature. These amendments are in the interests of public education in the State of Montana, and should be adopted.

STATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

For a report of these reference is made to the report of the State Board of Education, which contains full information as to the condition of these schools.

REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS

I append a number of reports from county superintendents which show the condition of public education in their several counties.

CONCLUSION.

This year closes the term of office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. A survey of the past four years shows that much has been accomplished, and that much more, which has been undertaken, has failed of accomplishment.

Four years ago the educational forces of the state were, to a greater or less degree, divided, discordant and working along radically diverse lines. To-day they are united, harmonious and working along substantially the same lines. If nothing more than this had been accomplished, I should feel measurably satisfied with the work done.

I have had but one aim, one ambition—to do what was best for the education of Montana youth. I have no apologies to make for what has been done. I leave the work to speak for itself. That mistakes have been made, I admit. I have yet to find the person who is so inhuman that he never made one.

I have had no patience with that blindness which would turn back the work of the schools to what it was a century, or a half century ago. For this I have received the share of criticism which usually falls to the lot of public officials. But in laying down the complex and multifarious duties of this office I have the satisfaction of knowing that no unjust criticism has ever induced me to change my course. Under great obstacles, sometimes designedly thrown in the way, has no little of the work of this department been done. For the most part, however, school officers, teachers and the true friends of education in the State have accorded me loval support, and to them I tender my sincere thanks and the highest appreciation of their invaluable assistance in ridding the public schools of many of the evils and errors which had found lodgment therein. Although my time and thought will be largely occupied with the duties of another profession, which four years ago, against my own judgment and wish I left to assume the responsible duties of this office I shall ever hold in kindliest

remembrance those who have materially assisted me during the past four years in building up a system of public education in this treasure State the best that it was possible to build under the existing conditions. My ideal has been a system that should be freed both from the blighting influence of politics, and the educational dry rot of the "has been" teacher. Much has been accomplished, but vastly more remains to be accomplished. I commend the completion of the work begun to my successor, whom, I trust, will have that loyal and constant support from the teachers and school officers, which alone has made achievement in the past possible.

REPORTS OF COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS.

BEAVERHEAD COUNTY.

Dillon, Montana, November 15, 1900.

Hou. E. A. Carleton, Superintendent Public Instruction, Helena, Montana.

Dear Sir:—By the same mail I forward my annual report. I regret that it has been delayed, but the fact that some of the trustee's reports did not come in delayed me until a time, when I was obliged by other reasons to delay it even longer. I think the form of the report should be changed somewhat as under present conditions the trustees financial report is of little value in making out the superintendent's report. The trustee's report requires the amount of teachers wages yet unpaid at the end of the school year to be included in the teacher's salaries of that year; while the treasurer's report shows the amount actually paid out and the amount on hand at the end of the year irrespective of any outstanding warrants. The result is that in very few cases the trustee's reports are correct and that it is necessary to make out the report from the county treasurer's books.

I feel and believe that the schools of Beaverhead County have made considerable progress during the past two years though no doubt much more might have been done to improve the work. We feel that the greatest stride has been the establishing of the County Free High School which is succeeding beyond the expectations of its best friends. Four teachers are employed and the principal is joint principal of the High school and the Dillon schools. Seven teachers are employed in the latter this year which is one more than has been necessary before.

One new school house has been built and equipped in a country district. As it is a much better structure than the average country school house and is located in a region of poor buildings, I feel sure that the influence will be for the improvement of school houses. The second district in size in the county, has shown an encouraging growth. Three excellent teachers are employed this year as against two for some time past. The school house has been improved until it is second to none in the county, in comfort and equipment.

Fifteen districts have complied with the library law during the past school year as against three of the preceding year.

The average length of term has increased within the past two years owing to the increase in taxable property in the county and the larger income from school funds.

The State Course of Study has been in the hands of the teachers of the county for about one year and though not satisfactory in all respects the teachers feel that it is filling a long felt need and will yearly be a greater aid to the schools.

The most serious hindrance to effectual work in the schools of our county and especially is it true of the rural schools, is the frequent change of teachers and shortness of the term. So strong has become the habit of change in some districts, that the idea of retaining an efficient teacher seems entirely foreign to the trustees and patrons. Teachers entering such districts soon feel little incentive to work for the future of the district as tenure of office is so uncertain. In this way much money is wasted.

General interest in education is shown by our people, not only by their liberality in raising funds, but by the moral support they give to the schools.

In retiring from the office of superintendent of the common schools of Carbon County, I leave my best wishes for the cause of education and the progress of the schools.

FERGUS COUNTY.

Dear Sir:—It is with pleasure that I submit the following brief report from the county which I represent.

To indicate the progress of education in Fergus County during the last two years, attention might be called to the four substantial frame school houses erected during that time, and to the \$20,000 brick building owned by district 1. As further proof the county in August, 1899 voted the establishment of a Free County High School, which with its two teachers and forty

odd students is now a prominent educational factor of the community.

The charge which has been and is being brought about through the use of the course of study, is worthy of notice. Pupils and teachers alike are filled with an enthusiasm which cannot but have a marked effect upon the school work of the future. Nothing more effectual could have been done for the advancement of the cause of education in this county, than the adontion of the Course of Study.

The examination for 8th grade diplomas is an inspiration to the pupils, and has served in many cases to lengthen the school life of the boy or girl by from six to eight months. Much interest was manifested in the May examination, at which there was fifteen successful applicants. Teachers generally are coming to recognize the importance of normal training as a preparation for the best work and notwithstanding the gerat distance from the State Normal, many are planning for at least a term's work at Dillon.

FLATHEAD COUNTY.

Dear Sir:—In addition to the regular yearly report made to you, I desire to state that our county is being settled so rapidly that we can no longer be called a frontier settlement, but an up-to-date, active, bustling people, ar ' as soon as a means of procuring sufficient school funds is found the number of school districts will be largely increased, and uniformity in length of terms, which will mean more rapid advancement along systematic lines in our educational work will be a natural result.

We have at present thirty-three school districts and thirty-two schools in operation, 2415 children of school age with a total enrollment during the year of 1786. Forty-nine teachers, twelve males, and thirty-seven females. In the country districts wages average \$47, per month for males and \$40 per

month for females. I am glad to be able to say that the trustees of this county seem more and more disposed to raise salaries of, and employ first class teachers.

We have thirty two school houses, two of which are brick, twelve log, and eight frame. Five new frame school houses have been built since November of last year some of which are exceptionally attractive from an artistic as well as from a practical point of view.

Since the state course of study has been introduced there has been a decided improvement in methods of teaching, and a better understanding of the same as outlined by the state course of study, particularly among the teachers who attended this year's institute session. Without exception, they speak of the very helpful and practical instruction received in primary methods under Miss Kittlaus. In to-day's mail will send you a cut of the Kalispell and photograph of the Columbia Falls high school buildings. Will forward those of Libby and Bad Rock as soon as I receive them.

GALLATIN COUNTY.

Mr. E. A. Carleton, Supt. Public Instruction, Helena, Montana.Dear Sir:—Complying with your request of November 1, 1900, I submit the following:

During the past two years the schools of Gallatin County have made marked improvements in many ways. The teachers are progressive, all striving to bring our schools up to be second to none in the State. I am particularly pleased with the work of the teachers in educating public sentiment on the school library question, and also with the way many of them illustrate to the patrons the benefits of a library to the school. Without a library, no teacher can successfully follow the State Course of Study, which all of our rural teachers are trying to do.

Sedan has recently completed a \$1000 frame school house

which does credit to the progressive spirit of the residents of that district. The erection of another building is now in progress in Durham District, and it is hoped that it will be ready for occupancy by January 1, 1901. And so "the little log school house" is gradually disappearing.

Only one new district has been organized, and in one instance two districts were united to form one. Public sentiment is growing in favor of uniting the weaker districts thus enabling them to have longer terms of school.

The County High School has been established and is looked upon with favor by all. Under Professor Swam's able management, it has given universal satisfaction, and, with a few changes in the law, which the committee has suggested, we predict a successful future for our county high school. At present we have three most competent teachers, with ninetynine pupils enrolled.

MADISON COUNTY.

Office of County Superintendent of Schools, Madison County. Hon. E. A. Carleton, Superintendent Public Instruction, Helena, Montana.

My Dear Sir:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the schools of Madison County for the past two years. Teachers examinations have been held regularly and in pursuance of the authority conferred in the Montana Statutes. While very few have taken the County professional, a number have failed even in the third grade test. As a natural consequence we have a high grade of teachers at work in the County, the greater number holding first and second grade certificates.

The failures having had the tendency to send the would-be teachers into Normals or other schools for better preparation has had a most salutary effect on the working force of the County.

Two years ago at the County institute nearly twenty-five teachers were in attendance and the lack of professional spirit was keenly felt, but this year there were forty in attendance and the sessions were spirited, enthusiastic and full of real interest.

Instructors were excellent and the subjects presented to the teachers were most ably handled.

The schools are in as good a condition as circumstances will allow, where school boards are cramped for funds.

Most of the schools have a small library and while not extensive the trustees have been urged to comply with the Statactory provisions.

Usually I have ordered the books for the districts and have used the full allowance for such purpose.

There are districts where the culture and sentiment of the district demand the helps, stimulants, and needful apparatus, contrivances, and comfortable furniture for the school, and where trustees recognize the importance of seeking, good competent teachers, and paving them reasonable salaries, and aiding them in their laudable efforts to educate the children of the school. Such bright spots, however, are in the minority; the opposite is more often the case. In many instances the school grounds are bare, the fences torn down and neglected, no shade trees nor flowering shrubs, no walks, nor wells, an ugly log house, looking more like a barn than a house where human beings are to live, six hours a day for six or eight months in the year. The gable ends without any windows, the door in one of them, and from one to three windows in the long sidewalls. No provisions for good lights, the door opens directly into the school room, where besides the furniture are wraps, dinner-pails, saddles, bridles, etc.—kept during schools hours. Walls are dingy and often without sufficient plaster to keep the cold out, no paint or whitewash to relieve the accumulation of the dust of years. School appliances are few in number, tho' the past year most of the districts have added quite materially to the helps for their schools. However, this is a picture of many of our rural schools. The school year is divided into three terms, viz., fall, winter, and spring. During the winter term the older pupils attend school as they are not needed at home, then a thoroughly competent teacher is demanded and big pay; in fall and spring, the younger pupils can go and a

cheap teacher will do. Poor teaching and poor pay go hand in hand."

By reason of the large territory over which our forty-six school districts are scattered close supervision is impossible.

Fortunately school boards are awake to the fact that they hold a prominent and responsible position and this year a little money has been expended in buying paint, whitewash or canvass, and teachers have aided in applying it.

Trustees are taking more active interest in school affairs. The district records are better kept and all clerks have been furnished with printed instructions of how to keep the records and their duties fully outlined. Most of them are quite conscientious in the discharge of their duties.

Circular letters to trustees have had a salutary effect, meetings have been held with more regularity, schools have been visited, and several districts will build new school houses another year. The State Course of Study has been introduced in all of the schools. Gradation is being pushed with vigor and while it has produced a most unhappy confusion in most of the schools, by reason of the past systemless condition, symmetrical, and systematic work will prevail in the end, and the schools placed on an equal footing with other graded schools.

Special attention during the past two years has been given to Language and Reading with excellent results.

The usual helps, stimulants, and appliances employed in city schools as examinations, reviews, reports, graduation exercises, diplomas, etc., have been used to awaken the interest of the public and have proven a powerful incentive to the pupils.

Teachers have been required to leave an intelligible record of the scholarship of the pupils and the general condition of the school for his or her successor.

Our school laws, are, generally speaking, as open as a wire fence, and are quite similar to the "Articles of Confederation" in that we can demand, but enforce nothing. The laws governing the institutes are quite beyond reason, being too contradictory for consistency. Trustees are not forced to report annually, the law being merely directory.

No provisions are made for raising school money for carrying on school when districts are short of funds.

Superintendents are allowed to transfer pupils from one district to another, upon certain conditions, nothing is said relative to transferring the apportionment for such pupils.

In fact a number of the sections are quite incomprehensible. We should have new school laws, and the work should be done by those experienced in school affairs.

For the first time in the history of Madison County, a partial office has been established at the County seat for the county superintendent. I say partial, for the County Commissioners have seen fit to combine the office with that of the Judge of the district. It is to be hoped that in the course of time the commissioners will see the necessity of complying with the law and give the county superintendent an office. I have appreciated the uniform courtesy of the teachers, patrons of the schools, and state and county officials during my brief administration. As I retire from office I leave my best and most cordial wishes for the future welfare of the schools.

Dear Sir —Relative to the biennial report, we believe we can safely say, at no time in the history of this county have the schools been in such a flourishing condition. Our corps of teachers, as well qualified, enthusiastic professional workers, we consider above the average. This many of our school boards realize as there is a growing tendency to employ "home teachers."

Well built comfortable school houses are being viewed not only as a necessity, but an advantage. During the past two years eight commodious new buildings have been erected in the rural districts. While we see progression along this line, we regret so few of the boards seem to realize the need of libraries. To this end teachers are doing good work, by giving entertainments, the proceeds being devoted to good literature. As an illustration we may mention one rural teacher, who, aided by the district, has since the beginning of this school year, raised \$51.00 for this purpose.

Our institutes have been of special interest, every teacher in the county being in attendance, and a decided professional atmosphere existing.

Relative to changes in the school law, we should suggest the special tax law, a provision for the appointment of an examining board to assist the county superintendent in the regular teachers' examinations; that a special permit to teach be granted to no person holding only a third grade certificate, or who is not a graduate of an accredited normal, college or university.

The course of study certainly supplies a long felt need, thus placing our schools on a better basis than ever before.

Hinsdale must have a new building as the present one is over crowded, the board of trustees regrets the repeal of the special tax law. One district does not own its school building, four have very good furniture including organs.

The State Course of Study is causing a wonderful improvement in the school work. Four pupils were graduated last year.

As to the school laws at present they are of little use as they can not be enforced.




