A BILL

To be entitled An Act making appropriations for the postal service of the Confederate States, for the year 1862 and 1863.

- I Whereas, in the administration of the affairs of the Post-Office
- 2 Department, in the year 1862 and 1863, current expenses for mail
- 3 service were met by drafts on postmasters, for accruing postage
- 4 and revenue under regulations providing for subsequent adjust-
- 5 ment of such transactions at the Treasury:
- 6 And whereas, it appears that estimates were submitted from time
- 7 to time by the Postmaster General, for appropriations by Congress,
- 8 of the revenues of the Department towards the necessary expenses
- 9 thereof, but from some cause certain appropriations estimated for
- 10 in 1862 and 1863 were omitted. .To remedy this omission-
 - 1 Section 1. The Congress of the Confederate States of America do
 - 2 enact. That the following sums be, and the same are hereby ap-
 - 3 propriated out of any money in the Treasury, being the revenues
 - 4 arising from postages, sales of postage stamps and emoluments

- 5 from box rents for the years eighteen hundred and sixty-two and
- 6 eighteen hundred and sixty-three, no appropriations having been
- 7 heretofore made for those years, viz:
- 8 For transportation of the mails, compensation of postmasters
- 9 and clerks, ship, steamboat and way letters, advertising, mail bags.
- 10 office furniture, blanks and printing, wrapping paper, mail locks,
- 11 kevs and stamps, mail depredations and special agents, postage
- 12 stamps and miscellaneous payments, for the year ending June 30th.
- 13 1862, two hundred and seventy-six thousand three hundred and
- 14 fifty-five dollars and twenty-three cents, (\$276,355 23.)*
- 15 For transportation of the mails, compensation of postmasters
- 16 and clerks, ship, steamboat and way letters, advertising, mail bags,
- 17 office furniture, blanks and printing, wrapping paper, mail locks,
- 18 keys and stamps, mail depredations and special agents, postage
- 19 stamps and miscellaneous payments for the year ending June 30th,
- 20 1863, two million seven hundred and thirty-seven thousand three
- 21 hundred and two dollars and thirty-cents, (\$2,737,302 30.)
