

* General Grant in recommending him for this promotion, says: "He has been with me in every battle since the commencement of the Rebellion, except Belmont. At Forts Henry and Donelson, Shiloh, and the Siege of Corinth, as a Staff Officer and Engineer, his services were conspicuous and highly meritorious. At the second battle of Corinth, his skill as a soldier was displayed in successfully currying reinforcements to the besieged garrison, when the enemy was between him and the point to be reached. In the advance through Central Mississippi, General McPherson commanded one wing of the army with all the ability possible to show, he

having the lead in the advance, and the rear retiring.

"In the cumpaign and siege terminating with the fall of Vicksburg, General McPherson has filled a conspicuous part. At the Buttle of Port Gibson, it was under his direction that the enemy was driven, late in the afternoon, from a position they had succeeded in holding all day enemy was driven, late in the afternoon, from a position they had succeeded in holding all day against an obstinate attack. His Corps, the advance always under his immediate eye, were the pioneers in the movement from Port Gibson to Hwkinson's Ferry. From the north fork of the Bayen Pierre to Black River it was a constant skirmish, the whole skilfully managed. The enemy was so closely pressed as to be unable to destroy their bridge of boats after them. From Hawkinson's Ferry to Jackson, the Seventeenth Army Corps murched on roads not travelle by other troops, fighting the entire Bittle of Riymond alone, and the bulk of Johnston's Army was fought by this Corps, enturely under the management of General McPherson. At Champion Hill, the Seventeenth Orps and General McPherson were conspicuous. All that could be termed a battle there, was fought by the divisions of General McPherson's Corps and General Hovey's Division of the Thirteenth Corps. In the Assault of the 221 of May on the fortifications of Vicksburg, and during the entire siege, General McPherson and his command took unfading laurels. He is one of the ablest engineers, and most skilful generals. I would respectfully, but urgently, recommend his promotion to the position of Brigadier-General in the Regular Army."



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
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
