It's color that weaves the sunset, And forms the beauties of earth; It's color that governs the destiny, Of the wealth of beauties' birth.


But of the millions in that royal assemblage That are passing as beauties do, We defy the challenge of others, And pride ourselves on two.

HISTORY

CLASS OF JANUARY, 1930



N THE NIGHT OF JANUARY 26, 1926, the curtain of the Richard J. Reynolds Auditorium rose slowly and disclosed to the expectant audience of mothers and fathers a group of one hundred and thirty-six self-conscious little darlings who were realizing the greatest event yet to occur in their young lives, their graduation from grammar school! Sixty-five girls and sixty-nine boys that night arose to receive their diplomas which opened to them a new and

fascinating world.

The first year passes quickly and by the time we became Sophomores we had lost that feeling of awe which had characterized our Freshman year and had gained a sufficient amount of the traditional sophistication to win some respect from our upper classmen.

When we became Juniors our erstwhile sophistication grew to be rather than to seem to be. With this new energy produced by such inspiring desires we reorganized our class. Jarvis Smothers was elected President and Delphine Crump Vice-President. A constitution was drawn up, our class colors changed to purple and gold and our flower to the jonquil. After this sudden burst of class interest had subsided, our attention was turned to the arrival of our class rings.

Near the end of our Junior year we decided to entertain the Seniors at a Hallowe'en party. The cafeteria was converted into a veritable abode of witches, black cats, fortune tellers, and clowns.


Finally we became Seniors. What disappointment was in store for us! We had always looked upon Seniors with a sort of awe and reverence. And then we realized that Seniors were not so very different from the other students. They did not know everything and those much-talked-of Senior privileges simply did not exist! It was a disheartening discovery, it is true, but one which is destined to come to all Seniors.

Our class did not engage in extra-curricular activities to such a great extent, but it must be remembered that by the time graduation faced us, we numbered only fifty-three; some had gone to other schools, some had decided to take extra work and graduate in June, and some had either dropped back to lower grades or had stopped school entirely. On the football team we claimed the captain, Zeb West, and Donald Plaster. On the Student Council we were represented by Frances Martin and on the "Black and Gold" and "Pine Whispers" staffs by George Killian and Ione Perry. Edrie Conrad and Ruth Ziglar represented our class on the typewriting team. Five from our number, William Bach, Ruth Loggins, Frances Wilkinson, Geraldine Griffith, and Margaret Williams were elected to membership in the National Honor Society.

L. P. Tyree was our president during that last and most eventful year. The first big event to happen was the winning of the silver cup offered to the class with the highest percentage of paid-up subscriptions to "Black and Gold" and "Pine Whispers." Then came the "Junior-Senior" where we were the guests of honor.

Came the night of nights! What a transformation had taken place in the group who four years before had begun this adventure which now came to its conclusion! The thoughts which occupied the mind of each graduate that night would no doubt fill volumes that might be read with interest. But however numerous and varied might have been the sentiments of the individuals, there was one emotion prevalent in every heart—and that was happiness. Happy to leave our Alma Mater? No, but happy to have accomplished our goal and to have ended one phase of our education only to begin another vaster and more difficult, but with even a higher goal as its aim.

NINTH: We bequeath to the Class of January 1931 the illusions we had concerning the Senior privileges.


TENTH: Mr. Joyner's "cuts" we leave, with the greatest delight to the entire student body.

Over in the Auditorium The band a melody played Then misty figures crossed the stage And old loved speeches made.


The long empty halls beckoned. Low busy sounds seeped out From behind closed doors A rustling stir about.

Fifty-seven girls believe in this advice and assert that they use cosmetics. Twenty-two are teetotalers.


We can't understand why some people sleep in school! The Seniors say that their average bedtime is ten o'clock. (We presume they mean P.M. but we could be mistaken.)


You've heard about people loving school?—well, they've been found. Four seniors have been to school every day for four years.




"Mary, Mary, quite contrary" could apply to nine girls—at least part of it could, since nine claim Mary as their name.



The House of Representatives is one of the organizations of the Student Cooperative Government of the Richard J. Reynolds High School.




While all of these have functioned well during the year, perhaps the most outstanding work has been the work of the hall committee.







Judged good enough for production, the play is revised and rewritten at the practices, author and friends attend and criticize, and good points and bad are seen together.



In the Chamber of Commerce Poster Contest, held this year, Theron Snider won first place, Joe King took second; and Earline Heath, third place.


The Art Club also took first place in the Annual Stunt Night exhibition, which is held every year with many organizations of the school participating.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

URING THE SCHOOL-YEAR of 1929-30, Richard J. Reynolds High has accomplished much towards fulfilling its reputation as a school of high scholastic standards and talented students. Honors have been won in original play production, special essay contests, national problem contests, and musical awards.

The Senior American Problems Classes took first place in the National Contest for the best collection of information, features, and essays on the Negro Problem. The prize-winning assemblage consisted of poems, sketches, essays, interviews, and illustrations, which constituted much work and research on the part of the students.

The school received \$100 as first prize.

Being no small matter in this Kaleidoscope of Achievements, is the fact that Pine Whispers, our school newspaper, won a gold medal as the second best paper in a Scholastic Press Association Contest held March 13-14-15. The Black and Gold won special mention in this same contest.

Esther Roush's play "Death Comes to Sonia" was awarded first place in the state original play contest of April 12. The school was awarded a bronze placque, and Esther received a set of Carolina Folk Lore Plays autographed by Professor Koch, of the Carolina Playmakers.

Faith Lucille Brewer received first place in the state chemistry essay contest, for her essay, on the "Relation of Chemistry to an Industry of the United States." She will

receive \$20 in gold and her creation is to be entered in the National Contest.

Rosanelle Cash's theme, "How May the Pact for the Renunciation of War Be Made Effective?" was entered in the state contest and won first place. Rosanelle has received a handsomely framed reproduction of the signature pages of the Pact, as also did the school. The contest is under the auspices of the National Student Forum on the Paris Pact. The essay has been entered in the National Contest.

In the State Safety Essay Contest Gladys Shore won first place. She received a gold

medal and a cash prize of \$15.


In the state music contest at Greensboro, Earline Heath as winner of first place in the Soprano Solo awards, received a scholarship to Greensboro College, and Ruth Cumbie, winning first awards in piano solo contest, also won a scholarship to N. C. C. W. Thor Johnson took first place with a viola solo, as did Albert Blumenthal with a violin solo.

And while speaking of the music department it would not be amiss to mention that, after long dreaming, our band has at last succeeded in acquiring their much-needed uniforms. This was achieved through contributions from Winston-Salem citizens interested in our school, and the proceeds taken from a benefit concert rendered by the band.

One of the most outstanding individual achievements of the year is that of Feronia Prodromos, a seventeen-year old Greek girl who came to High School two years ago, and could not speak a word of English. She is taking a special course, including French and

English, and made an "A" average during the semester.

In reviewing the organizations of this school year, it is interesting to note that four new clubs were inaugurated at the beginning of the first semester. They are the Playwriters, College, Dramatic and Correct English Clubs. The Playwriters Club needs no advertising, since two of its members' original plays were produced by the Dramatic Club. The Dramatic Club presented six plays this year, all of which were well-attended, proving the school's keen interest in drama. Reasons for going to college, entrance requirements of various colleges, and problems of college life were the subjects to be studied in the College Club, for Junior and Senior girls. To learn to use correct English orally is the aim of the Correct English Club.



Another new organization whose members were recently initiated, has been the formation of an "Odd Number Chapter" of the Quill and Scroll Society. This is an association of high-school journalists whose outstanding work in this line have merited them the honor of joining the national fraternity. Thirteen members were elected to the society this year.

There are many results from various essay and skill contests still pending, but as the book goes to press it is impossible to prophesy their outcome. It is only to judge by the past achievements of our school during '29 and '30, that we can safely hope for the best. The Richard J. Reynolds High School this year as always, is climbing steadily upward, gaining new pinnacles of achievement in every line, and winning well-deserved

praise and commendation for its accomplishments.

This culminates Superintendent R. H. Latham's twentieth year as superintendent of Winston-Salem schools. During this time our school system has risen to the position of one of the best in the state. The above list of accomplishments are results of Mr. Latham's efficient leadership and direction in providing for Winston-Salem school children opportunities and equipment for acquiring recognition and distinction.
