



A GIFT...



AND THEN THERE'S SEPHERS - - -



Stunt Night produced quite an array of amateur talent and humar to boot.

Religious Emphasis Week in December and the Pre-Easter Services were high an the calendar af religious activities and featured autstanding speakers.

In the music warld, Andrew Gainey's appearance marked a Red Letter Day, for he is a former Millsaps student who hit the big-time like a veteran.

The annual fraternity campus-wide dances -K A Black and White Ball; Lambda Chi's Purple, Green and Gold Ball; and Pikes' Cattan Ball were huge successes. Now the student body looks farward to the yearly Sig Barn Dance, which always spells a gay time.

With camprehensives over, the Seniars have taken a new lease on life and eagerly await the awarding of the Sheepskin.


BASKETBALL
