





Still every year they come from all over the United States and other parts of the world. This year there were students from sixty-one counties around Mississippi, from twenty-five states and from two foreign countries.

The 1,336 enrolled was a slightly larger total than before with 94% undergraduates and 6% graduate students. About 10% of the total were Adult Degree Program students.

One enduring quality of the school is that it's not only possible, it's likely that students will get to meet most of the people on campus, both students and faculty.

Even as new students arrive to replace the ones who have finished, most of the faculty, staff and administration remain, giving the school it's consistency of quality and purpose.


















