


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INTRODUCTION.

In the villages about Bolton, in Lancashire, there are to-day descendants of that Oughtred de Bolton who, in 1135, was living on the estates which, Sir Wm. Dugdale believes, he held on account of his descent from the Saxon Earls of Mercia. From Boelton, Bodelton or Bolton (boel a manor-house, and tun a town) he took his name, and many generations came after him as Lords of Bolton and bowbearers and falconers in the Royal Forests of Bowland and Gilsland. The estates were carried to another family by an heiress long after the days of the Conquest; and the Boltons have spread over England, Ireland and America.

Some families have been able to keep the line of their descent to the present day, while many, like the descendants of William Bolton of Reading, can offer only their inherited surname as a link to bind them to the possible common ancestor of the family.

Of the many families of Bolton two are well known in England. Captain William Bolton, an officer in the Cromwellian invasion of Ireland, settled at Waterford. His descendants of to-day are counted among the landed gentry.

Thomas Bolton of Woodbridge, in Sussex, 1615, had a descendant, Thomas Bolton, who married a sister of the great admiral, Lord Nelson. Their son, Thomas Bolton, by command of Parliament, took the name of Horatio Nelson and succeeded as 2d Earl Nelson, Viscount Trafalgar and Merton, Baron of the Nile and Duke of Bronte.

From the earliest times Boltons have been in the ministry in England, of the established church and also of the Puritan faith. The Rev. Samuel Bolton preached before the King, the Lords and the Commons, while the Rev. Robert Bolton preached and wrote for the cause of the dissenters. Thomas Bolton was bishop of Worcester, and Theophilus Bolton archbishop of Cashel in Ireland.

In Parliament from the early days the name of Bolton appears. In law there was Sir Richard Bolton; in construction, Matthew Boulton furnished money and energy for the fulfillment of the plans of Watt. The Soho works which produced the engine for Fulton's steamboat are still owned by the Boultons.

In America the Boltons have led honorable careers. Those of Philadelphia and Georgia came from Brookhouse, in Lancashire, and claim descent from that Oughtred who is the ancestor of the Boltons of County Waterford, Ireland, and those of Norfolk, in England. The late Rev. Robert Bolton, M. A., of Pelham Priory, N. Y., Col. Richard Bolton, and Prof. H. Carrington Bolton, lately of Trinity college, Hartford, are of this family.

Everard Bolton came to Pennsylvania in 1683 from Hertfordshire. From him have descended an honored line of merchants and soldiers. Gen. William J. Bolton of Philadelphia and Major Joseph Bolton of Harrisburg did gallant service in the recent war.

Of the Boltons in Canada Henry John Boulton, chief justice of Newfoundland, was a son of D'Arcy Boulton of England and a graduate of Oxford. The late Wm. Henry Boulton, M. P. P., was of Boulton of Moulton, County Lincoln.

The New England Boltons, whether in the professions, in business or on the farm, have shown patriotism in war, and industry in peace. In the frontier wars, against Louisburg, and in the Revolution the Boltons have borne their part. Four sons of William Bolton of Reading answered to the first call for aid when the British, under Pitcairn, marched toward Lexington. In their towns they have shown commendable enterprise as selectmen, postmasters, militia officers and members of the Legislature.

If we have not all achieved fame, may we not say with Stedman —

Noble deeds are held in honor, but the wide world sorely needs Hearts of patience to unravel this,—the worth of common deeds.

Beside receiving help from the Rev. Robert Bolton's book on the Boltons I am much indebted for valuable papers to the Right Hon. Lord Nelson of Trafalgar, Salisbury, Eng., to the Rev. Wm. S. Heywood of Sterling, Mass., Mr. Edward May Bolton

of Holyoke (who has published an account of the Boltons), Mrs. P. J. Cartwright of Boston, and to many who have so kindly copied records for me.

Before enumerating the early settlers of the name in New England I will give here a pedigree which, for Christian names, conforms strangely with the William, Nicholas, John and Stephen that appear among the Boltons here. The persistence with which William has been used in the oldest branch of the descendants of William of Reading, and the traditions of old-time prosperity lead me to hope that we may some day learn more from the unknown past.

The following letter addressed to the late Lord Thurlow (who married a Bolton in England) explains the pedigree; through the kindness of Lord Nelson

I am able to give it in full:


"My Lord

"I have the honour to inform your Lordship that I have made a careful search in this College without finding any other records of the Pedigree of the family of Bolton of Bolton in Lancashire than that sent to your Lordship—I enclose a copy of a Pedigree of Bolton descended out of Warwickshire bearing the same Arms and Crest as those entered to the family descended from a junior son of Bolton of Bolton. The quartering of whose Arms appear to be—Gules, three Gryphons heads, or—but I cannot

discover the name of the Coat or how it is brought in — Camden Clarenceux granted and confirmed these Arms to Thomas Bolton of Woodbridge Co: Suffolk who it is stated descended from Bolton of Lancashire and the quartering is there allowed to this Thomas Bolton without giving the name. The Confirmation of the Arms is dated Aug. 26, 1615.



The two Coats-of-Arms of Bolton most used are variations of the following:

On a bend gules three lions heads of the field.

Sable, a falcon, jessed and belled, or.

In the BOLTON GENEALOGY, heads of families are in black letter. When the number next a child's name has a cross(+) that name appears farther on in black letter following the same number. S. p. means without issue.

BOLTONS IN NEW ENGLAND.

William Bolton of Newbury, Mass., was a prosperous farmer. He married Jane Bartlet January 16, 1654–5. She died September 6, 1659. He married, second, Mary Denison, November 22, 1659. Of their sons, William, born May 27, 1665, was a soldier in the French wars and died March 30, 1694. Stephen, born January 3, 1669, was a turner and came into possession of his father's property. The only other son, Joseph, born July 8, 1682, does not appear on the records at any time. Inventories and wills of William Bolton, Sr., and of his daughters, show them to have had comforts beyond many of the pioneers of those days. He died March 27, 1697. (See Coffin's Hist. of Newbury.)

Nicholas Bolton of Dorchester was a freeman May 29, 1644, and died May 27, 1683. By his wife, Elizabeth, he had two children, John, and Elizabeth, who married Experience Willis October 25, 1676. Nicholas rang the bell and kept the church in order. He also desired very much to sell cider but his petition was refused. (See N. E. Gen. Register, vol. 5, p. 396.)

John Bolton of Bridgewater, "a son or grandson of Nicholas," by wife Sarah, had a large family. His eldest son, John, married Ruth Hooper in 1710, and had all daughters. "He was an ensign and left a large estate, and gave a tankard to the S. Bridgewater Church." Samuel married Rebecca Simmons in 1742. Elisha, by wife Mary, had: Seth, Jabez, Elisha, Meshech. Joseph, born 1704, married Deliverance Washburn in 1740 and had Joseph and Phillip. Joseph Bolton, Jr., married Mary Bolton in 1773 and had: Philip, 1774; Joseph, 1776; John, 1778; Barzillae, 1783; Tuniri, 1786, and daughters. Nathaniel, born 1706, married Deborah, widow of John Ripley and daughter of Israel Washburn, in 1740, and had a son Nathaniel, who married Jane Thompson in 1777. This son left an only surviving son, Oliver, whose descendants live at Orrington, Me., and at Waltham, Mass. Other descendants of John Bolton of Bridgewater are to be found in the southern counties of Massachusetts and in Maine. (See Mitchell's History of Bridgewater.)

William Bolton of Reading, Mass., 1720.

Thomas Bolton of Falmouth was appointed in 1740 "to settle the school-master and have the whole benefit of him." He had two daughters, and perhaps other children.

Dr. Hugh Bolton came from England to Londonderry, N. H., in 1730, and settled in Coleraine, Mass., in 1741. His wife, Elizabeth Patterson, was of the family into which Prince Jerome Bonaparte married. Of his sons, Hugh Bolton was a soldier. Matthew followed his father's profession; his descendant, Geo. C. Bolton, postmaster of Heath, Mass., has the spectacles and physician's scales of the emigrant Hugh. John commanded a company at West Point in the Revolution and gave all his property to clothe his soldiers. Hugh Bolton Miller was the historian of the town.

William Bolton of Windham, N. H., was an early settler, born in 1682 or '83 and died April 22, 1755. Children: James, Daniel, John and two daughters, Agnes and Grizelle.

Daniel and Polly (Fletcher) Bolton of Bolton, Mass., had the following children: Nelson, born March 26, 1807; Lowell, born January 8, 1809; Winslow, born October 12, 1810; Abigail, born March 28, 1812. He may be descended from Daniel Bolton, grandson of William of Reading.

FIRST GENERATION.

William Bolton was living at Reading, Middlesex county, Massachusetts-Bay Colony, at the time of his marriage, January 5, 1720, to Elizabeth, oldest daughter of John and Sarah White of Andover, Essex county. Both the town records and the church records speak of him as of Reading. They were married by Mr. Samuel Phillips, a well-known Congregational minister.

Elizabeth White was born at Andover April 8, 1688, and joined the South Church on profession of

faith June 1, 1712.

Thus it will be seen that William Bolton married a woman nearly thirty-two years of age. It may not be too much, then, to presume that he was, at this time, a man in middle life. We do not know how long he had lived at Reading before he went to Andover a-courting in 1719. Possibly he came from Virginia where lands were granted to one of the same name forty years before. It seems more probable, however, that he came from London or from Lancashire where William was a favorite name with the Boltons.

In those days when the selectmen made laws to protect the deer that ran wild on the meadows, and women spun at their wheels, our ancestors were married. The years that were spared to them in which to labor together were destined to be few, for Mr. Bolton died at Reading, September 10, 1725. His widow married, January 5, 1739, Timothy Dorman of Boxford. The Dormans, for over two hundred years, have been a well-known and prosperous family in and about Boxford.




Mr. Bolton married, second, Sarah Lewis of Reading, September 18, 1788. His farm was in the North Parish, at the Lynnfield line and the highway. He was a thrifty farmer, a loyal soldier and an active

citizen.

"At the anual town meeting held in Reading March thee 3d 1755, Regularly assembled: Tything men — Mr Ebenezer Emerson. Mr Michael Sweetser. Mr Thos Emerson. Mr Thos Parker. Mr Amos Flint. Mr Saml Lewis. Mr William Bolton."

Mr. Bolton was a tithingman from the North Parish for a number of years following. The tithingman "whose power reached over the threshold of every family in the hamlet, patriarchal, fatherly, neighborly," is a thing of the past, carrying us back to Plymouth, to old England and the Saxon times. On May 25, 1773, he sold his house and garden, with other lands in Reading, to Jeremiah Eaton, and three days later settled in Shirley. The same year he bought a large farm of the Hon. James Prescott, adding to it in 1794. The house, with the ridgepole parallel with the road and sloping back, after the manner of the time, to a shed in the rear, was conspicuous, as the first house west of West Groton, for its large chimney, and fine elm before the door. The place became known later as "The Peter Tarbell Place." Near by stands the old barn, doing duty to day as it did in the days before the Revolution.

In February, 1801, William Bolton gave an undivided half of the farm to his sons Timothy and Edward. He died April 30, 1804. The sons the same year sold forty-five acres of the farm to James Parker, gentleman; Mrs. Bolton, in 1806, sold her

share to the same James Parker. She lived to be over ninety-two years of age, and died at Reading. William and Mary had:

THIRD GENERATION.

4. William Bolton, Jr., was born at Reading, Middlesex county, January 21, 1744. He was married to Mrs. Abigail Sheldon by the Rev. Eliab Stone at Reading, March 28, 1785. From a deed of the time it appears that William Bolton gave Thomas Sheldon a piece of land in Shirley and promised to care for his mother until her death, and give her a Christian burial. This curious agreement was thwarted by the early death of Mr. Bolton on May 7, 1780, leaving a considerable estate to his family. He had moved to Shirley soon after 1767, having bought a part of the estate of Jonathan Moore, gentleman. His grave is marked by a stone with angel's head and wings, and the following:

He beat the drum for Henry Haskell's company which marched from Shirley on the alarm of April 19, 1775. Sergeant Bolton was at Bennington in July, 1777, and fought August 16 at the battle, under General Stark. In 1779 he was at Cheverick on the Hudson in the Second Massachusetts regiment. After his death, the following year, Mrs. Bolton married Ezra Smith of Shirley, brother to Lieutenant Sylvanus Smith of the Revolutionary war.

16. William Bolton, 4th, was born at Shirley, Mass., October 14, 1771. He married at Groton, Sally Farnsworth, October 14, 1790(?). The early years of his married life were passed at Reading. Later he moved to Shirley. Having bought a large farm of William Gould, lying in Fitchburg, next that of Lieutenant Jonathan Page, he moved there about 1797. This he increased in 1806. On April 4, 1827, Mr. Bolton gave the home and all his property to his son Aaron, "except a cow and household furniture brought by his wife Sarah at their marriage," the son to "furnish a good and comfortable support and maintenance . . . during their lives and the life of the survivor of them in the family of the s^d Aaron."



17. John Bolton was born at Shirley, Mass., October 24, 1774. He went to Vermont when a boy, and became a manufacturer. His grist mill on Wells river, near Danville, the saw-mill, built by his son William in 1824, his fulling mill, and the carding and cloth dressing mill which John Bolton erected in 1826, were among the first in the State. He also owned property in Massachusetts. The town of Boltonville, Vt., was named for his son.

Mr. Bolton married first, Betsy Tilton in 1798. She was born June 30, 1783. He married second, Cynthia Chamberlain, September 7, 1806. She was born December 30, 1782. His third wife, Abigail Wesson, whom he married March 4, 1830, was born January 26, 1790. John Bolton died March 28, 1843. John and Betsy had:





24. William Bolton from whom the village of Boltonville was named, was born in London, N. H.,

May 8, 1799. His parents very soon moved to Danville, Vt., where his youth and early manhood were spent. He learned the trade of coloring and cloth dressing, and worked in the factory of his father at Greenbanks Hollow, now so called, in Danville. He married, at the age of 19, Miss Almy Hooker of Danville, June 18, 1818, and went to Barnet, Vt., to reside, but the year following moved to Brock's Falls, and there made a permanent home.

For many years he was an active business man, the entire business interests of the place centering in his mills. He was an honest miller, and although a man of original notions, with many peculiarities, very outspoken in his opinions, he was highly respected by all who knew him. A strong anti-mason when the anti-mason war raged so fiercely; a whig and republican from his first vote to his last, it was his pride always to show his colors and to stand firm in the opinions he had formed. He was a constant reader and was well informed upon all the views and topics of the day. Genial and jovial he will be long remembered in his own and in the surrounding towns. He was appointed postmaster in 1831, and the name of Brock's Falls changed to Boltonville in his honor. His wife died February 9, 1840, and he married, January 1, 1846, Lydia Aldrich, widow of Josiah Rodgers. His health failing him in 1854, he retired from active business, but he was interested in the nursery business and made for himself an extensive vineyard.



The same year, April 12, Mr. Bolton married Dorcas, daughter of Jonas and Mary Winship, descended from Lieutenant Edward Winship of Cambridge. At the alarm, April 19th, 1775, Aaron Bolton enlisted under Captain Noah Miles, and in 1777 served under Captain Reed at Machias. Later he became a captain, and was long known and respected in Westminster as a militia officer, as selectman in 1800–1, 1803–4, and as an arbitrator in town boundaries and disputes. In the Worcester county deeds he is styled "Aaron Bolton, gentleman."

Captain Bolton's grave is marked by the first marble stones erected in the cemetery. Near him lies Colonel Rand of the Revolution, and not far away are the ancestors of General Miles and Senator Hoar. He was a Revolutionary pensioner in 1818. 313. Charles Edward Bolton was born at South Hadley Falls, Mass., May 16, 1841. He graduated from Amherst College in 1865, receiving a prize in mineralogy. He assisted in the work of the Christian and Sanitary Commissions in the Civil war, and was at the siege of Petersburg, Va. In ministering to the wounded on the field, he found a dying colored soldier, who had carried a large family Bible in his knapsack. This the man gave to Mr. Bolton, who presented it to Amherst College.

In 1865, he settled in Cleveland, O., becoming manager of a branch house for Hall's Safe and Lock Company, and took a leading part in Y. M. C. A. work, temperance reform, and in the growth and improvement of the city. He was successful in the real estate business, but lost heavily in the depression of 1873. Mr. Bolton then became vice-president and manager of the Cleveland Machine Company. He obtained patents for several of his inventions. He made five journeys to Europe, visiting Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Russia, Turkey, Norway, Sweden and other countries, writing for the Congregationalist, Chicago Tribune, Springfield Republican and other papers, in addition to business. For St. Nicholas' Magazine he prepared a series of articles on the "Progress of Invention," to be used in a book.

He was a delegate to the World's Y. M. C. A. Convention in London; also an Ohio delegate to the Sunday School Centenary. At the meeting held in the church of Rev. Dr. Newman Hall, under the Lincoln Tower, at the time of the burial of President Garfield in the United States, Mr. Bolton made one of the addresses. He traveled through Turkey with General Lucius Fairchild, ex-minister to Spain, and family, and camped for several days with an English party at the North Cape.

He organized and conducted the Cleveland Educational Bureau, to give the best lectures and concerts to the people at the lowest price possible, a re-

port of which is given in the *Century* for January, 1885, page 390. Four thousand persons attended every Saturday evening through several winters. Over six million pages of valuable reading matter were prepared and given to the audiences during three years.

For several years he has given illustrated lectures from Maine to California, on his travels through Europe and America, combining history and the study of the people, with description. The press has given hearty praise. The New York *Tribune* says: "Every part of Chickering Hall was crowded when Mr. Bolton lectured on 'The Lands of the Midnight Sun,' under the auspices of the Teachers' Association of the city of New York, * His style is such as to fix the attention of any audience, and applause was hearty and frequent."

The Boston *Herald* says: "Union Hall was packed to the doors last evening by an interested audience that listened to an illustrated lecture by Mr. Bolton on Re-united Germany and Heroic Louise."

* * He possesses a clear and musical voice, and a graphic, offhand manner, which enable him to command rapt attention."

Bishop John H. Vincent says: "Mr. Bolton is a close observer, a good student of men and things, and a clear and forcible talker."

General S. C. Armstrong says: "You are an educator of the people."

Mr. Bolton, always an ardent Republican, was most active in the Blaine campaign of 1884, instituting a novel method in politics by a mammoth tent for audience and speakers, with the distribution of tens of thousands of well-prepared political pamphlets. He was prominently mentioned for Congress from his district in 1888. His wife

Sarah Knowles Bolton, born at Farmington, Ct., Sept. 15, 1841, was the daughter of John Segar Knowles of Connecticut, descended from Henry Knowles, who came to Portsmouth, R. I., from London, England, April 17, 1635. Her grandmother, Mary Carpenter, was descended from Elizabeth Jenckes, sister of Joseph Jenckes, governor of Rhode Island, 1727–32.

Mrs. Bolton, on the side of her mother, Elizabeth Mary Miller, is descended from Nathaniel Stanley of Hartford, Ct., "one of the most distinguished men of the colony in both civil and military affairs;" lieutenant-colonel of First Regiment in 1739; assistant treasurer, 1725–1749; treasurer, 1749–1755. She is also descended through his wife, Anna Whiting, from Colonel John Allyn of Hartford, her grandfather. He was secretary of the colony after 1657; colonel in 1662; secretary of Council under Sir Edmund Andros in 1687, and historian of the Pequot war. Colonel John Allyn was the grandson of Colonel William Pynchon, one of the twenty-six incorporators of Massachusetts Bay Colony in the

charter granted by King Charles I; treasurer of the colony, and founder of Springfield, Mass., in 1636.

Her childhood was passed in the country, where she learned to love nature intensely, and to read all that came within her reach, especially history and poetry. Her father and only brother dying early, she became a member of the family of her uncle, Colonel H. L. Miller, an able lawyer of Hartford, Ct., where she graduated from the seminary established by Catharine Beecher. Her first book was a volume of poems, published by D. Appleton. After her marriage and removal to Cleveland, O., she became secretary of the Woman's Christian Association, and assistant corresponding secretary, with Frances E. Willard, of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

For several years she was a contributor to the Independent, Youth's Companion, Harper's Bazar, Congregationalist, and other journals. Of the latter paper she was for three years one of the editorial staff. For the Centennial Temperance Volume she wrote a sketch of the crusade in Ohio and elsewhere; for Mrs. Wittenmyer's History, a sketch of the temperance work in Cleveland.

She has passed two years abroad, in Norway, Sweden, Russia, Italy, England and other countries; in England, making an especial study of higher education for women, and of the means used by employers for the mental and moral elevation of their employees. On her return from Europe she

read a paper on the latter subject before the American Social Science Association at Saratoga.

Mrs. Bolton's books are: "Poems," a novelette, entitled "The Present Problem," "How Success is Won," "Social Studies in England," "Poor Boys Who Became Famous," "Girls Who Became Famous." "Stories From Life." "Famous American Authors," "Famous American Statesmen," "Famous Men of Science," "Famous European Artists" and "Successful Women." She has also, with her son, Charles K. Bolton, published a volume of poems, "From Heart and Nature." The press has spoken highly of her books, and the sale has been large. One of her poems, "United," was read on Veterans' Day, May 11, 1885, at the World's Exposition at New Orleans, and has been set to music. (See sketch of her in Appleton's Cyclopedia of American Biography.) Their son:




