There are four classes of mail matter, as follows:—
FIRST CLASS.—This class includes letters, postal cards, scaled packages, all matter wholly or partly in writing (whether manuscript or produced by type-writer copying press) drawings and paintings produced by hand, manuscript for publication not accompanied by proof sheets, and all personal corre-First Class.—This class includes letters, postal cards, sealed packages, all matter wholly or partly in writing (whether manuscript or produced by type-

companied by proof sheets, and all personal correspondence, whether in writing or in print. The rate is 22, for each onnee or fraction thereof, excepting postal cards and letters for local delivery posted at an office where no letter-carriers are one.

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POSTAL NOTES for any amount under \$5 may be purchased at a Money-order office, payable to bear-er within three months from the last day of the month during which it was issued. Price, 3 cents.

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


