


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

PREFACE.

“THAT a community of women should offer to the English Church a new book of Offices, appears presumptuous as well as unnecessary, unless some explanation be given of the causes which led to the attempt. S. Margaret’s Sisterhood, founded by the Rev. J. M. Neale, in 1854, was early provided with a MS. translation, abridged and simplified, of the shorter Sarum Hours, and with various other Offices, selected from Roman or Gallican uses, where Sarum was insufficient or apparently unsatisfactory. For although Dr. Neale considered the Sarum book as that of which the adoption was generally binding upon us, he preferred a degree of eclecticism to a servile following of the old English use, when better Offices were to be found elsewhere.

“Other persons, aware of our possessing many MSS., asked us to prepare a book which should supply Offices yet wanting in existing manuals, and provide abundance of materials for devotion from which they might select portions suitable for use. We have thus endeavoured to respond to their request, and the present volume is the careful, but very imperfect result of our labours, containing, besides much supplementary matter, the Breviary Offices from Prime to Compline inclusive, Matins being already in course of publication separately.

“In this compilation, our founder’s plan has been retained: *i.e.* Sarum has been followed wherever possible. The Psalter, and Proper of Seasons exactly reproduce Sarum, with a few abbreviations and simplifications; except a few alterations mentioned below.*

“If it be asked why the Roman books would not suffice us, and why we should try to resuscitate a use long dead, we answer that the Gallican breviaries present us with rich and varied treasures of Scriptural applications and mystical interpretations, which might be sought vainly in the Roman forms; and that Sarum far surpasses Rome in the dignity and variety of its daily office; in its absence of unseemly haste (as when Rome continually replaces longer Psalms by Ps. cxvii.) and in its sedulous and hearty use of continual intercession for living and dead.”

* The Christmas Eve Vesper Hymn is continued through the Octave, as in the York Breviary, instead of, as in Sarum, using *A solis ortus* both at Lauds and Vespers. The proper Office of S. Thomas of Canterbury is changed for the Common of a Martyr, the Antiphon, *Ÿ.* and *R.* to the Memorial, being all that are retained from the original. The Saturday Ants. after Trinity are from the Roman Breviary: because it was necessary to take the lectionary for Matins from that source, and those Ants. must agree with the lectionary of the current month. It should be added, that, also according to Dr. Neale’s usage, in accordance with the present custom of the English Church, invocations of Saints and Angels are as a rule omitted, except when occurring in Psalms, Canticles, etc.

With such words the first edition of the Diurnal Breviary Offices was offered for the use of the Church. It proved acceptable beyond expectation, and a new impression was soon called for. Several men versed in the subject had now become interested in this book, and it was pointed out by them that certain alterations, bringing it into still closer accordance with the Sarum Breviary, would render it more valuable, trustworthy, and suitable for English use. The Offices for the Proper and Common of Saints had mostly been translated from French uses. Further study revealed merits in the equivalent Sarum Offices, which had previously been unperceived, and it was decided to remodel these portions of the book.* The preface to the concluding volume of the Night Hours (that volume having been arranged in accordance with these Diurnal Offices) contains a list of the divergencies from Sarum, still retained: which also may be clearly seen by comparison with the new Latin edition of the Great Breviary of 1531, now in course of publication at Cambridge. It should be added that the Office for the Dead is indicated for monthly recitation, according to the modern Roman practice, as its daily use after the old English manner would probably be deemed excessive; and that the Commendatory Office is Gallican and Benedictine.

The Prefatory Notes to the Kalendar explain the principle on which a number of new names have been added to it.

Owing to illness and absence, the original compiler was unable to finish her work. The publication of this edition has therefore been greatly delayed. We now once more send out our book, with many thanks to the kind and learned persons who have assisted us (particularly the Revs. H. G. Morse, A. T. Chapman, W. J. Blew, and G. Moultrie (the latter of whom has given most happy translations of several beautiful hymns); and with the humble prayer that our Lord may be pleased to let it contribute in its small measure to His honour and glory.

GENERAL RUBRICS.

(SARUM.)

ADVENT.—If any Feast, not being a Principal or Greater Double, fall on any Sunday in Advent, it is transferred to Monday, and on Sunday are said first Vespers of the Feast, with Memorial of Sunday. If on Monday, on Sunday are said first Vespers of the Feast. If on Saturday, Vespers are of the Feast, except the Saturday before Advent Sunday, when the first Vespers of Sunday are said, with Memorial of the Feast. Any Feast, which is the Feast of the place, falling on the first Sunday, is transferred to Monday, though on the other Sundays it is not transferred, but the whole office is said on its own day. On all Feasts in Advent a Memorial of the Feria is made at Lauds and both Vespers.

CANDLEMAS.—If Candlemas Day fall on Sunday, the whole Office is of the Feast, with Memorial of the Sunday. This applies to Septuagesima and Sexagesima. If on Monday, its first Vespers are said on Sunday. If on Saturday, the second Vespers of the Feast supersede the first Vespers of Sunday.

LENT.—On all Feasts kept in Lent, a Memorial of the Fast is made at Lauds and both Vespers. Lent Compline is not altered for any Feast, except that on the Annunciation the hymn takes the Christmas doxology.

From Ash Wednesday till Passion Sunday, Simple Feasts of the three first classes are observed with Memorial of the Feria. Simples of the fourth class are marked by a Memorial in place of first Vespers and Lauds, but are not otherwise noticed. Simples of the three first classes falling between Passion Sunday and Maundy Thursday may be transferred till the Octave of Easter.

From Passion Sunday till the morrow of Low Sunday no notice is taken of any Simple Feasts, but only of Doubles, and of these, only till Maundy Thursday. If any Double Feast fall on the Saturday before Passion or Palm Sunday, Vespers are to be of the Sunday, with solemn Memorial of the Feast.

If the Annunciation falls on any Sunday, including Palm Sunday, it is transferred to Monday, and in this case, and also when it falls on Monday, on Sunday are said first Vespers of the Feast. If it falls on Saturday, Vespers are of the Feast; except the Saturday before Passion or Palm Sunday, on which two days Vespers are of Sunday.

But if it be the Feast of the place, the whole Office is said on its own day, unless it be Passion or Palm Sunday, in which case it is transferred to Monday: the first Vespers being said on Sunday.

If it falls on Wednesday in Holy Week, the Office is of the Feast, but its second Vespers are superseded by first Vespers of Maundy Thursday.

On Tuesday in Holy Week the Office of the Dead is said throughout, unless prevented by a Double Feast, in which case it is said, if possible, on the day before. No Feasts are celebrated on or after Thursday in Holy Week; but Double Feasts and Simples of the three first classes are transferred to any convenient day after the Octave of Easter; Simple Feasts of the fourth class are omitted for that year.

(When the Feast of S. Edward (March 18) fell between Passion Sunday and

Easter Day it was omitted, not transferred; and the Translation of S. Edward (June 20) was kept for that year with two Vespers instead of one.)

EASTER-TIDE includes the season from Easter Day till Nones on Saturday in Whitsun Week inclusive. Feasts above the lowest class occurring in Easter Week, or on the three days preceding, are transferred to Tuesday after the Octave, or other convenient day, such that they can have both Vespers. Simple Feasts of the fourth class are omitted for that year. This same order serves for Whitsun Week. If a Double Feast occurs on Low Sunday it is transferred to Monday; if on Rogation Sunday, it is kept. Simple Feasts above the fourth rank occurring on either of these Sundays are transferred. If any Double Feast fall on the morrow of Low Sunday, or of Rogation Sunday, Vespers on Sunday are of the Feast, with solemn Memorial of the Sunday. No Memorials of Ferias are made in Easter-tide on any Double Feast, except when such falls on Rogation Monday or the Vigil of the Ascension, in which case Memorial is made of the Fast at Lauds only, before other Memorials. If a Simple Feast of the fourth class occurs on either of these days, it is observed only by a Memorial made at first Vespers and Lauds. The Memorials of the Resurrection are said on Sunday, whether the Office be of Sunday or of a Feast, except on the Invention of the Cross. Easter Compline does not change for Festivals, except that on the Annunciation the Hymn takes the Christmas Doxology as directed in the Rubric for Office of the Feast.

(When Low Sunday fell on the festival of S. George (April 23) the Feast was transferred to Monday, not Tuesday; and a Memorial was made of S. George at second Vespers of Sunday: Vespers of Monday being of S. George, with Memorial of first Vespers of S. Mark.)

If Low Sunday fall on SS. Philip and James (May 1) the Feast is transferred to Monday; but the second Vespers of Low Sunday are of SS. Philip and James, with Memorial of Low Sunday, and Vespers on Monday are of Invention of the Cross with Memorial of the Apostles.

If a Double Feast, or Simple above the lowest class, occur on the vigil of the Ascension, it is not transferred: but a Memorial of the vigil is made at Lauds. At first Vespers of the Ascension a Memorial is made of a Double, but not of a Simple Feast.

If a Double, or Simple of the three first classes, occur during the Octave of Ascension, it is kept, with Memorial of the Ascension, at both Vespers and at Lauds. If on Sunday, it is kept, with Memorial of the Sunday preceding that of the Ascension. If on the morrow of Ascension, Memorial of a Double Feast is made at second Vespers of Ascension Day. Simple Feasts of the fourth class are merely commemorated.

Simple Feasts of the three first classes occurring on the Octave of Ascension are transferred to the morrow. Simples of the lowest class are omitted. No Feast occurring on Whitsun Eve is to be observed or commemorated on that day. Doubles and Simples of the three first classes are transferred till after Trinity Sunday.

CORPUS CHRISTI.—Any Feast above the lowest class occurring on the Feast of Corpus Christi is transferred to the first vacant day in the Octave. The Office of the Feast is kept throughout the Octave with Rulers, including Sunday, unless any Feast of nine lessons intervene: in which case the Office is of that Feast, even if on Sunday; and Memorial and middle lessons are of the Octave, except on the Commemoration of S. Paul, when the whole service is of that Feast.

VIGILS.—Sarum Vigils noted in this book: Those of Christmas, Epiphany,

Easter, Ascension, Whitsun, S. John Baptist, SS. Peter and Paul, S. James, S. Laurence, Repose of Blessed Virgin, S. Matthew, SS. Simon and Jude, All Saints', S. Andrew, S. Thomas. No proper Office was provided for Vigils of Saints' days: but the first Vespers of the Feast were said under that name, and in some cases, had a proper Collect.

OCTAVES.—The directions for keeping Octaves vary, according as the Feast is counted as having, or not having, Rulers of the choir. Octaves, according to Sarum, are :

1. All Principal Doubles; Corpus Christi, Visitation, Holy Name, S. Stephen, S. John Evang., Holy Innocents [S. Thomas of Canterbury, and Nativity of B.V.M., which have not Octaves in this book]. (All the foregoing had Rulers throughout the Octave, except the Dedication of a Church, falling between Septuagesima and Easter, in which case it had Rulers on the Octave day only.)

2. Nativity of S. John Baptist, SS. Peter and Paul [SS. Laurence, Andrew, and Martin: not marked with Octaves in this book. S. Andrew's Octave was kept during the days before Advent; but in Advent a Memorial only of the day in Octave was said, until the Octave-day, which was kept with Memorial of the Advent Ferial. The Octave-day of S. Martin was not kept when it fell on a Sunday.] This second division had no Rulers through the Octave; except that SS. Peter and Andrew had them on the Octave-days.

(All Saints, if kept with an Octave, should apparently be considered as having Rulers. It had no Octave in old English use.)

When a Feast is kept with an Octave, the Office of the Feast, beginning at Lauds, is said for the six following days, with these exceptions: At Lauds the five Psalms are said under the first Antiphon. The Antiphons to Benedictus, and to Magnificat at Vespers, are taken from among the Antiphons to Psalms at first Vespers, unless otherwise provided for. At Prime, Antiphon to *Quicumque* and Collect, as directed in Psalter for days in Octaves. At Vespers, the Psalms of the second Vespers of the day are said with the first Antiphon at Lauds, except when otherwise directed. The *R̄.* is not said.

On the Sunday falling within an Octave with Rulers, at first Vespers are said Psalms of second Vespers with the first Antiphon of Lauds; all the rest as at first Vespers of the Feast, except that the *R̄.* is not said. Lauds are said as through the Octave. Second Vespers are said as on the Feast, except that the *R̄.* is not said. Memorial of the Sunday, at Lauds and both Vespers.

But in an Octave without Rulers, on the Sunday within the Octave, the Offices are of the Sunday with Memorial of the Octave, unless a Double Feast or Simple of any of the three first classes fall on the Sunday, in which case the Offices are of that Feast, with Memorial, first of the Sunday, and next of the Octave.

On the Octave-day, all is said as on the first day, except that at first Vespers the Psalms (when not otherwise ordered) are all said under the first Antiphon, and no *R̄.* to the Chapter is said at either Vespers.

SIMPLE FEASTS.—It is necessary to understand that Simple Feasts in the old English and in the modern Roman use have little in common except the name. In the latter rite, Simple Feasts are all of one type: they begin after the chapter at first Vespers, have Ferial Psalms and three lessons at Matins, and end with Nones; never having second Vespers. So that a Feast of three or nine lessons means respectively a Simple or a Double or Semi-double. In the English use, Simple Feasts were of five classes, the lowest of which only was similar to the Roman. The first three had first and second Vespers, and the

first two had nine lessons at Matins. If therefore anything like the ancient forms of keeping Feasts is to be maintained, it is necessary to mark these varieties, and this is here done in as plain a manner as could be devised. The Simples are divided into four sets, as follows:

First Class=—Simples with Triple Invitatory.

Second Class=—Simples of nine lessons with Double or Simple Invitatory.

Third Class=—Simples of three lessons with Double or Simple Invitatory, but with Rulers of the Choir.

Fourth Class=—Simples of three lessons without Rulers of Choir.

No Feast of only three lessons, without Rulers, has second Vespers, nor is any Memorial of it made instead of second Vespers. The Antiphons and Psalms at first Vespers are of the Feria, and the proper Office begins at the Chapter, continuing till Nones inclusive on the day following, with Ferial Psalms at Matins.

N.B.—These, as well as many others of the foregoing directions, are given here in case it be desired to keep any of these Feasts with their full Office; a case provided for, though not intended, in the Proper and Common of Saints.

COMMEMORATIONS.—These were Offices of devotion, used monthly, weekly, or at other intervals, and differing in different places, both as to their subject and their frequency. Of this nature is the monthly recitation of the Office of the Blessed Sacrament, and of the Holy Name, mentioned in Proper (but neither of these appears to have been so used in former times), and the Office of the Blessed Virgin as set down for use at Quinquagesima, before and after the Octave of Ascension, &c. This Office is set down in the Common of Saints. Commemorations never had second Vespers, nor any Memorial in lieu of second Vespers.

Commemorations are superseded by all Feasts with Rulers, by Octaves with Rulers, by Rogation Monday and Wednesday, Ember days, Vigils, and also weekdays of the third class.

MEMORIALS.—1. Memorials are appointed in the Breviary at Lauds and Vespers only. When the Office of any Feast which is not transferred, or of a Greater Feria, is superseded by that of a day of higher dignity, a Memorial is made of such superseded day, its proper Office being wholly omitted in case of Occurrence, or omitted at first or second Vespers, according to circumstances, in case of Concurrence. These especial Memorials are thus formed:

- (1) At Lauds, Ant. to Ben.: at Vespers that to Mag., from the omitted Office.
- (2) V̄. and R̄. following the hymn in the same Office.
- (3) Collect of that Office, preceded by *Let us pray.*

2. It has been thought advisable to place in the Kalendar of this book, in order that it may form in some degree a chart of Church history, the names of many Saints connected with important events in the Church, and more especially in that of our own country. Although these names are marked in the Kalendar with their proper dignities, as set down in English or Roman books, this has been done only for the sake of supplying information to those who desire it, as the compilers of the present volume do not presume or wish to offer new Festivals for observance. These names are commemorated by Memorials set down in the Proper of Saints, as are also most of the black-letter days of the Prayer-book Kalendar. ALL DAYS MARKED * IN THE PROPER OF SAINTS ARE MEANT TO BE COMMEMORATED BY MEMORIALS ONLY. The only Festivals in the Proper of Saints intended to be kept with full Office, are those for which the Matin Offices are provided in the third volume of "Night Hours." These Memorials, as well as those referred to in paragraph 1, take precedence of those in the Psalter.

3. The number of Collects, including Memorials, said at any one Office, must not exceed seven: that being the number of petitions in the Lord's Prayer. The order of precedence in Memorials is as follows:

- (1) Memorial of any Feast-day of which the full Office is not kept.
- (2) Of Sunday.
- (3) Of day in Octave.
- (4) Of the Feria, in Advent and Lent.
- (5) Season Memorials, as, in Easter, of the Resurrection, etc.

The Memorials forbidden on certain days are those in this book. Such directions do not refer to the Memorials peculiar to any religious community.

ANTIPHONS.—The Antiphons to Benedictus, Magnificat, and Nunc Dimittis are sung before and after the Canticles on all Principal and Greater Doubles. At other times the first few words only are said before the Canticle, the whole being said after. In this latter way Antiphons to Psalms are always said according to the use of Sarum. (The Roman use is also provided for in this book.) When the words of an Antiphon are taken from the beginning of the Psalm or Canticle, they are not repeated, but the Psalm is continued from the point where the Antiphon ceased.

COLLECTS.—If the Collect be addressed to the Father, it is concluded, *Through Jesus Christ our Lord*, etc. If to the Son: *Who livest and reignest*, etc. If in the beginning of the Collect the Son has been named: *Through the same*, etc.; if the mention of the Son occurs at the end: *Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost*, etc. If the Holy Ghost has been named, in the ending is said: *In the unity of the same Holy Ghost*.

When many Collects are said in the Litany, the first only shall end: *Through Jesus Christ*, etc., or otherwise, as above. The others shall be said without any ending at all, except the last; but every Collect shall have *Let us pray* before it.

But when Collects follow one another as Memorials, etc., the rule is different. The Collect for the day *always* (except on Good Friday and Easter Eve) ends with full ascription: the Collect of the Memorial last in order, likewise takes its full ending: the intermediate collects, if ending, *Through*, etc., close at the word *Lord*, without ascription; but if ending otherwise, they retain their full termination.

DIGNITY OF FEASTS.

ENGLISH.

The English uses differed from each other considerably in dignity of Feasts: scarcely at all in form and order of service. The Sarum dignities are given here, and in the Kalendar of this book, except in cases of Saints not found in Sarum Kalendars, but only in York, Hereford, etc.

Principal Doubles.

Christmas Day, Epiphany, Easter Day, Ascension Day, Whitsun Day, Repose of Blessed Virgin Mary, Feast of the place, Dedication of Church.

Greater Doubles.

Purification, Trinity Sunday, Corpus Christi, Visitation, Holy Name, Nativity of Blessed Virgin, All Saints.

Lesser Doubles.

S. Stephen, S. John Ev., Holy Innocents, Circumcision, Annunciation; Easter Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and Whitsun Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday; Low Sunday, Invention of the Cross, Nativity of S. John Baptist, SS. Peter and Paul, Transfiguration, Exaltation of Holy Cross, Conception of Blessed Virgin.

Inferior Doubles.

SS. Andrew, Thomas, Thomas of Canterbury, Matthias, Gregory, Ambrose, George, Mark, SS. Philip and James, Augustine of England, James, Bartholomew, Augustine of Hippo, Matthew,

Michael and All Angels, Jerome, Translation of S. Edward, SS. Luke, Simon and Jude, All Souls.

All other Feasts are Simples : divided into four classes : see p. xi., and Kalendar.

Principal privileged Sundays.

First Sunday in Advent, Passion Sunday, Palm Sunday.

Greater Privileged Sundays.

Second, third, fourth in Advent ; Septuagesima, and all after till Passion Sunday.

Lesser privileged Sundays.

Those on which a series of Matins lessons was begun : first Sunday after the Octave of Epiphany, Rogation Sunday, first Sunday after Trinity.

Inferior privileged Sundays.

All the rest, throughout the year.

Principal Ferias.

Ash-Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, Vigil of Whitsun Day.

Greater Ferias.

All week days from Passion Sunday to Maundy Thursday.

Lesser Ferias.

All week days from Ash-Wednesday to Passion Sunday, the first and third Rogation Days, the last nine days of Advent.

Inferior Ferias.

Week days in Advent before *O Sapientia*.

ROMAN.

Doubles of the First Class.

Christmas Day, Epiphany, Easter Day, Monday and Tuesday, Ascension Day, Whitsun Day, Monday and Tuesday,

Corpus Christi, Nativity of S. John Baptist, of SS. Peter and Paul, Repose of Blessed Virgin Mary, All Saints, Dedication of Church, Patron or Title of Church.

Doubles of the Second Class.

Circumcision, Feasts of Holy Trinity, and of the Purification, Annunciation, Visitation, Nativity and Conception of the Blessed Virgin ; Birthdays of Apostles, Feasts of Evangelists, S. Stephen, Holy Innocents ; Invention of the Cross, Holy Name, SS. Joseph, Laurence, Michael.

Greater Doubles.

Transfiguration, Holy Cross Day, Conversion of S. Paul, S. John Port-Latin, S. Barnabas, Beheading of S. John Baptist, Lammas Day, S. Anne, Presentation of Blessed Virgin Mary, minor Patrons.

*Semi-Doubles.**

Days within Octaves. The rest are set down in the Kalendar.

All other Feasts are Simples.

Greater Sundays of the First Class.

First Sunday in Advent, first in Lent, Passion Sunday, Palm Sunday, Easter Day, Low Sunday, Whitsun Day, Trinity Sunday.

Greater Sundays of the Second Class.

Second, third, and fourth Sundays in Advent, Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays ; second, third, and fourth Sundays in Lent.

Greater Ferias.

Ferias in Advent and Lent, Ember Days, Rogation Monday.

* The difference between Doubles and Semi-Doubles is that in the latter the Ants. to Psalms and Canticles at Lauds and Vespers are not doubled.

GENERAL NOTES (ROMAN USE).

Although this book endeavours carefully to represent the old English use, with as little alteration as possible, there are certain points regarding which some persons may give preference to the reformed Roman use; and, in order to accommodate all parties as far as possible, they are here set down: noting that *one use or the other must be wholly followed in these particulars*, as there are great discrepancies between the two; and also that the rubrics in the body of the book refer to English use alone, except when otherwise specified.

1. DIGNITY OF FEASTS.—See tables of Concurrence and Occurrence.
2. FEASTS IN HOLY WEEK.—All Doubles deferred till the first days unhindered after Low Sunday: all others wholly omitted.
3. OFFICE OF THE DEAD.—Said on the first day unhindered in every month, and on every Monday in Advent and Lent, except in Holy Week.
4. PRIME.—See rubric before the Office.
5. DOUBLING OF ANTS. TO PSALMS.—On all Double Feasts, these are doubled as well as those to the Canticles.
6. VESPERS.—Said in Octaves, &c. with the five Antiphons of Lauds: not with the first only.

OF SAYING OFFICE.

THE Sarum manner of saying Office was not only elaborate, and complicated by varieties of Invitatories and Rulers, but probably, as elsewhere, received many modifications in process of time. The following notes attempt to combine correctness with as much simplicity as possible:—

The bell being rung for the commencement of the Office, all rise (except in Lent), and turn to the Altar, make the sign of the Cross, and say in silence the Lord's Prayer, and, if it be so ordered, the Angelic Salutation. The Officiant then begins aloud (signing himself with the Cross), *V.* "O God, make speed," etc., and the Office proceeds. (In Lent all kneel till the Officiant begins the *V.*) The Alleluia following the Gloria is said by all together. In Christmas- and Easter-tides the whole Office is said standing; but the choir kneels when the Priest gives the blessing. At other times, those not engaged in singing are permitted to sit during the Psalms; the Ferial Petitions and other Prayers are said kneeling, on Ferias when the Miserere is said, and the Priest, if present, alone stands when it is so noted in the Psalter; but at other times all stand. The three Gospel Canticles are recited, all standing. The Hymns are said or sung antiphonally, verse by verse. The Psalms are repeated antiphonally, whether said or sung, in this manner:—the first half of the first verse of each Psalm is said by the Precentor, the whole choir joins him in the second half; after which the even verses are said on one side, and the uneven on the other; or the first half of each verse is said by the Officiant, and the second by the choir. But when Psalms occur among the Petitions, they are not so said; the Officiant says the first half of each verse, and the congregation the other half; or the whole is said by all together. Antiphons are said in this manner:—1, Before the Psalm or Canticle, the Officiant or Precentor says or sings the first two or three words alone, and the Psalm is then begun. 2, Afterwards he again begins the Antiphon alone, and the choir joins in for the remainder. But when an Antiphon is doubled it is said or sung before the Psalm or Canticle, according to rule 2. After, the whole is said or sung by the choir.

On Wednesday in Holy Week there is no kneeling at Vespers or Compline. Nor on Maundy Thursday, except at Lauds. On Good Friday all kneel before the first Antiphon at every hour, and again for the Prayers after repetitions of the Antiphon, and so on Easter Eve.

The manner of saying the *R.* differs at Vespers and at the little hours. To put it briefly, at Vespers the Officiant or other person appointed says the first few words, and the choir take up the rest. At the little hours (*i.e.* Tierce, Sexts, Nones) the Officiant says the whole of the first sentence, and the choir repeats it all afterwards; except in Lent, when the rule is the same as at Vespers.

The exact manner in which the *R.* was recited at Salisbury was as follows:—
'At First Vespers on the Greater Feasts the *R.* is thus said: Two clerks only sing the three or four first words, the whole choir then joins in; the following versicles are sung by the two clerks only, and the repetition of the *R.* is sung by the whole choir. At Second Vespers (as also at First Vespers except on the

Greater Feasts), one boy begins the R̄. and sings the versicles, the choir taking up and singing the R̄. as above. At the little hours, except in Lent, and on three Sundays preceding, one clerk says the whole R̄. which is then repeated by the choir; the clerk sings the following versicles, the choir sings the repetition of the R̄., then the clerk sings the final versicle, and the choir answers with the final R̄.'

The manner of saying the Gradual in Easter Week was as follows:—"Two clerks sing the four first words; the choir joins in and sings till the beginning of the first V̄. which is sung by two clerks. Two seniors sing the R̄. "Alleluia": the whole choir repeats, "This is the day," etc. Two seniors sing the next V̄. and the choir takes it up at the last word, which it sings, and then sings "Alleluia." A simpler manner of saying the Gradual is given in the body of the book, as so large a staff of clerks is not likely often to be available.

The Lord's Prayer and Apostles' Creed are said wholly in silence wherever they occur in Office.

The Confessions and Absolutions are said in a low voice.

The organ is not used during Lent, except on Sundays and on Maundy Thursday.

When two or more Offices are said by aggregation, that is, immediately following one another, the usual silent beginning is omitted in all but the first; and the Collect and Preces, if common to all, are said only in the last.

Space does not allow us here to dwell on the spiritual meaning which underlies the whole Office, and so richly repays investigation. We conclude in the words of the "Myrroure of our Ladye": "Though this be true after the spiritual meaning, yet after the letter the changing that is in God's service from one thing to another is ordained to let it drive away your dulness, that ye should not wax tedious and weary, but gladly and joyfully, not in vain joy, but in joy of spiritual devotion, continue in God's service. Therefore sometime ye sing, sometime ye read, sometime ye hear; now one alone, now twain together, now all. Sometime ye sit, sometime ye stand, sometime ye incline, sometime ye kneel, now toward the Altar, now toward the choir. And all to the praising of our Lord Jesus Christ; and so to exercise the body to the quickening of the soul, that all such bodily observances should not be found without cause of ghostly understanding. Now join to all this the fruit of that thing that is sung and read, and thereto the fellowship of the Angels among you in time of God's service, and most of all the marvellous and unspeakable presence of God Himself, from Whom our Lady is not far, and see whether it be not nigh another Heaven to serve and praise God in the choir."

NOTES ON THE KALENDAR.

THE whole position of English Catholics is historical. The Kalendar is the chart of Church history, and, as set forth in the present attempt, more especially of English Church history.

The first conversion of England on the introduction of Christianity into the land was during the Roman occupation—of this, ALBAN the protomartyr is the representative. The Romans left the country, and the heathen Saxons drove the British into Cornwall, Wales, and Cumbria. DUBRITIUS and DAVID Abp. are among the greater Bishops of this Church. With these is associated GERMANUS of Auxerre, who helped them to conquer and root out Pelagianism. But the British Church was not missionary.

We turn to Ireland. Its people, the Gaelic Celts, had populated part of Scotland. They were, properly speaking, the Scots. The Picts of the east and of Strathclyde were probably Cymri. We have, first, independent missions, possibly from Rome. PATRICK, to Ireland, A.D. 460; NINIAN, to the Picts of Strathclyde, 432; PALLADIUS, to the Northern Picts, 430; TERNAN to the same district. This closes the second stage.

In the third, we must keep two lines in view: the Roman and the Celtic missions to this island.

At the opening we have COMGALL, the great Abbot of Bangor, near Belfast, the centre of life and civilization; and KENTIGERN (the little deserted child brought to Servan of Culross), afterwards Bishop of Glasgow and Strathclyde, and founder of S. Asaph monastery in North Wales, and friend of S. David in his old age. These two lived through the great period, though apparently independent of the chief actors. AUGUSTINE, 597, converted the Anglo-Saxons. PAULINUS went to York. Both missions seemed ready to perish. The Cymric Christians would have nothing to do with them. CADOC of Llancarvan, SAMPSON of Dol, GILDAS of Glastonbury, fled from the heathen Saxon.

About the same time COLUMBA, after his quarrel with Comgall, landed in Iona, and spread light all around. His disciple DROSTANE penetrated to Deer in Buchan. Columba died; but from his monastery came AYDAN to Northumbria, and, with OSWALD its king, converted the north of England. Aydan was succeeded by FINNAN, and he by COLMAN. England was subdued by Celtic missionaries; then came the clash with the Roman mission at Canterbury. There were COLMAN, CUTHBERT, HILDA, and BEGHA in the north among the Celts, and WILFRID in the south. Wilfrid prevailed, and Colman fled, carrying the remains of Aydan. Cuthbert submitted; and thenceforward the Church was one. The Celtic traditions were still preserved at Iona, till ADAMNAN, the historian of Columba, submitted to the now prevailing practices.

In the early Saxon period we have CHAD, JOHN OF BEVERLEY, BEDE, BOTOLPH, GUTHLAC, ALDHELM. At the same time, WINIFRED in North Wales, and Nathalan, a saint whose history is not absolutely certain, in Scotland. Thus closes what may be called the third period.

The fourth extends to the Norman invasion. We have SWITHIN the reformer; DUNSTAN, COLUMBANUS,* and BONIFACE, missionaries; ETHELDREDA, EDMUND and EDWARD, martyrs, and EDWARD the Confessor.

The fifth period is that of Norman civilization. In England, ANSELM. In Scotland, MARGARET, and afterwards DAVID. Then the contenders in England with royal power—THOMAS of CANTERBURY and EDMUND. Of more quiet persons, HUGH and THOMAS of HEREFORD.

Nearly all the local saints of this Kalendar have now been enumerated. BRIDGET was associated with Patrick. MAGNUS, a devout king of the Orkneys, 1102. OSMUND, the compiler of the Sarum rite. WULSTAN, the protector of the Saxons from the early Normans. GENOVEVA was connected with Germanus.

Their names are set down in the first of the following lists. The second gives the history of the Religious Life.

The names in the third list belong to Saints of the universal Church, and need no comment.

The fourth list gives the names of post-Reformation Saints. CHARLES BORROMEO, bishop of Milan; FRANCIS de SALES, of Geneva; and THOMAS of VILLANOVA, the saintly bishop of a very poor see.

No reference is made in this analysis to the black-letter Saints of the Prayer-book Kalendar, except in so far as they enter into this historical scheme. Many of the rest of them were retained in the Kalendar for no very apparent reason, unless the ancient connection between the English and Gallican Churches be counted sufficient cause.

* Soon after lived Benedict; not in this period. Their systems long were rivals.

These Sunday Psalms are said at Lauds on every Sunday throughout the year, (except from Septuagesima to Easter, when certain Psalms are changed, as below) and on all Festivals.

Lauds, being said immediately after Matins, are not begun with the Invocation, &c., like the other Hours, but straightway with the Sacerdotal V̄. and R̄.

V̄. The Lord is high above all heathen.

R̄. And His glory above the heavens.

V̄. O God, make speed to save us.

R̄. O Lord, make haste to help us.

V̄. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost.

R̄. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Alleluia.

[*From Septuagesima till Wednesday in Holy Week, inclusive, instead of Alleluia is said :*

Praise be to Thee, O Lord, King of eternal glory.]

The Antiphons are said entire both before and after each Psalm on Sundays of the first class, and on Double Feasts in the Roman use: at other times (and always in the Sarum use), the first words only are said before, and the whole Antiphon is said after each Psalm.

Ant. The Lord is King * and hath put on glorious apparel: He hath girded Himself with strength, and His seat is from everlasting.

16 The overflowing of the water : passed by.

17 The deep uttered his voice : and lifted up his hands on high.

18 The sun and moon stood still in their habitation : at the light of Thine arrows they went, and at the shining of Thy glittering spear.

19 Thou didst march through the

land in indignation : Thou didst thresh the heathen in anger.

20 Thou wentest forth for the salvation of Thy people : even for salvation with Thine Anointed.

21 Thou woundedst the head out of the house of the wicked : by discovering the foundation unto the neck.

22 Thou didst strike through with his staves the head of his villages : they came out as a whirlwind to scatter me.

23 Their rejoicing : was as to devour the poor secretly.

24 Thou didst walk through the sea with Thine horses : through the heap of great waters.

25 When I heard, my belly trembled : my lips quivered at the voice.

26 Rottenness entered into my bones : and I trembled in myself, that I might rest in the day of trouble.

27 When He cometh up unto the people : He will invade them with His troops.

28 Although the fig-tree shall not blossom : neither shall fruit be on the vines ;

29 The labour of the olives shall fail : and the fields shall yield no meat ;

30 The flock shall be cut off from the fold : and there shall be no herd in the stalls ;

31 Yet I will rejoice in the Lord : I will joy in the God of my salvation.

32 The Lord God is my strength : and He will make my feet like hinds' feet.

33 And He will make me to walk : upon mine high places.

7 A God of truth and without iniquity : just and right is He.

8 They have corrupted themselves : their spot is not the spot of His children.

9 They are a perverse : and crooked generation.

10 Do ye thus requite the Lord : O foolish people and unwise ?

11 Is not He thy Father that hath bought thee : hath He not made thee, and established thee ?

12 Remember the days of old : consider the years of many generations.

13 Ask thy father, and he will show thee : thy elders, and they will tell thee.

14 When the Most High divided to the nations their inheritance : when He separated the sons of Adam ;

15 He set the bounds of the people : according to the number of the children of Israel.

16 For the Lord's portion is His people : Jacob is the lot of His inheritance.

17 He found him in a desert land : and in the waste howling wilderness.

18 He led him about, He instructed him : He kept him as the apple of His eye.

19 As an eagle stirreth up her nest, fluttereth over her young : spreadeth abroad her wings, taketh them, beareth them on her wings ;

20 So the Lord alone did lead him : and there was no strange God with him.

21 He made him ride on the high places of the earth : that he might eat the increase of the fields.

22 And He made him suck honey out of the rock : and oil out of the flinty rock.

23 Butter of kine, and milk of sheep, with fat of lambs and rams of the breed of Bashan : and goats with the fat of the kidneys of wheat, and thou didst drink the pure blood of the grape.

24 But Jeshurun waxed fat, and kicked : thou art waxen fat, thou art grown thick, thou art covered with fatness.

25 Then he forsook God Which made him : and lightly esteemed the Rock of his salvation.

26 They provoked Him to jealousy with strange gods : with abominations provoked they Him to anger.

27 They sacrificed unto devils, not to God : to gods whom they knew not ;

28 To new gods that came newly up : whom your fathers feared not.

29 Of the Rock that begat thee, thou art unmindful : and hast forgotten God that formed thee.

32 For they are a very froward generation : children in whom is no faith.

33 They have moved Me to jealousy with that which is not God : they have provoked Me to anger with their vanities ;

34 And I will move them to jealousy with those which are not a people : I will provoke them to anger with a foolish nation.

35 For a fire is kindled in Mine anger : and shall burn unto the lowest hell ;

36 And shall consume the earth with her increase : and set on fire the foundations of the mountains.

37 I will heap mischiefs upon them : I will spend Mine arrows upon them.

38 They shall be burnt with hunger : and devoured with burning heat, and with bitter destruction.

39 I will also send the teeth of beasts upon them : with the poison of serpents of the dust.

40 The sword without and terror within shall destroy both the young man and the virgin : the suckling also, with the man of grey hairs.

41 I said, I would scatter them into corners : I would make the remembrance of them to cease from among men.

42 Were it not that I feared the wrath of the enemy : lest their adversaries should behave themselves strangely ;

43 And lest they should say : Our hand is high, and the Lord hath not done all this.

44 For they are a nation void of counsel : neither is there any understanding in them.

45 O that they were wise, that they understood this : that they would consider their latter end !

46 How should one chase a thousand : and two put ten thousand to flight ?

47 Except their Rock had sold them : and the Lord had shut them up.

48 For their rock is not as our Rock : even our enemies themselves being judges.

49 For their vine is of the vine of Sodom : and of the fields of Gomorrah.

50 Their grapes are grapes of gall : their clusters are bitter.

51 Their wine is the poison of dragons : and the cruel venom of asps.

52 Is not this laid up in store with Me : and sealed up among My treasures ?

53 To Me belongeth vengeance : and recompense.

54 Their foot shall slide : in due time.

55 For the day of their calamity is at hand : and the things that shall come upon them make haste.

56 For the Lord shall judge His people : and repent Himself for His servants ;

57 When He seeth that their power is gone : and there is none shut up, or left.

58 And He shall say, Where are

their gods : their rock in whom they trusted ?

59 Which did eat the fat of their sacrifices : and drank the wine of their drink-offerings ?

60 Let them rise up and help you : and be your protection.

61 See now that I, even I, am He : and there is no god with Me.

62 I kill, and I make alive ; I wound, and I heal : neither is there any that can deliver out of My hand.

63 For I lift up My hand to heaven : and say, I live for ever.

64 If I whet My glittering sword : and Mine hand take hold on judgment ;

65 I will render vengeance to Mine enemies : and will reward them that hate Me.

66 I will make Mine arrows drunk with blood : and My sword shall devour flesh.

67 And that with the blood of the slain, and of the captives : from the beginning of revenges upon the enemy.

69 And will render vengeance to His adversaries : and will be merciful unto His land, and to His people.

10 I have been left unto Thee ever since I was born: Thou art my God even from my mother's womb.

11 O go not from me, for trouble is hard at hand: and there is none to help me.

12 Many oxen are come about me: fat bulls of Basan close me in on every side.

13 They gape upon me with their mouths: as it were a ramping and a roaring lion.

14 I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint: my heart also in the midst of my body is even like melting wax.

15 My strength is dried up like a

potsherd, and my tongue cleaveth to my gums : and Thou shalt bring me into the dust of death.

16 For many dogs are come about me : and the counsel of the wicked layeth siege against me.

17 They pierced my hands and my feet ; I may tell all my bones : they stand staring and looking upon me.

18 They part my garments among them : and cast lots upon my vesture.

19 But be not Thou far from me, O Lord : Thou art my succour, haste Thee to help me.

20 Deliver my soul from the sword : my darling from the power of the dog.

21 Save me from the lion's mouth : Thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the unicorns.

22 I will declare Thy Name unto my brethren : in the midst of the congregation will I praise Thee.

23 O praise the Lord, ye that fear Him : magnify Him, all ye of the seed of Jacob, and fear Him, all ye seed of Israel ;

24 For He hath not despised, nor abhorred, the low estate of the poor : He hath not hid His face from him, but when he called unto Him He heard him.

25 My praise is of Thee in the great congregation : my vows will I perform in the sight of them that fear Him.

26 The poor shall eat, and be satisfied : they that seek after the Lord shall praise Him ; your heart shall live for ever.

27 All the ends of the world shall remember themselves, and be turned unto the Lord : and all the kindreds of the nations shall worship before Him.

28 For the kingdom is the Lord's :

and He is the Governour among the people.

29 All such as be fat upon earth : have eaten, and worshipped.

30 All they that go down into the dust shall kneel before Him : and no man hath quickened his own soul.

31 My seed shall serve Him : they shall be counted unto the Lord for a generation.

32 They shall come, and the heavens shall declare His righteousness : unto a people that shall be born, whom the Lord hath made.

THE Lord is my Shepherd : therefore can I lack nothing.

2 He shall feed me in a green pasture : and lead me forth beside the waters of comfort.

4 Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil : for Thou art with me ; Thy rod and Thy staff comfort me.

5 Thou shalt prepare a table before me against them that trouble me : Thou hast anointed my head with oil, and my cup shall be full.

6 But Thy loving-kindness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life : and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

11 But as for me, I will walk innocently : O deliver me, and be merciful unto me.

12 My foot standeth right : I will praise the Lord in the congregations.

WHOSOEVER will be saved : be-

2 Which Faith except every one
do keep whole and undefiled : without
doubt he shall perish everlastingly.

3 And the Catholick Faith is this :
That we worship one God in Trinity,
and Trinity in Unity ;

4 Neither confounding the Per-
sons : nor dividing the Substance.

5 For there is one Person of the
Father, another of the Son : and
another of the Holy Ghost.

6 But the Godhead of the Father,
of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, is
all one : the Glory equal, the Majesty
co-eternal.

7 Such as the Father is, such is
the Son : and such is the Holy Ghost.

8 The Father uncreate, the Son
uncreate : and the Holy Ghost un-
create.

9 The Father incomprehensible,
the Son incomprehensible : and the
Holy Ghost incomprehensible.

10 The Father eternal, the Son
eternal : and the Holy Ghost eternal.

11 And yet they are not three
eternals : but one eternal.

12 As also there are not three in-
comprehensibles, nor three uncreated :
but one uncreated, and one incom-
prehensible.

13 So likewise the Father is Al-
mighty, the Son Almighty : and the
Holy Ghost Almighty.

14 And yet they are not three
Almighties : but one Almighty.

15 So the Father is God, the Son
is God : and the Holy Ghost is God.

16 And yet they are not three
Gods : but one God.

17 So likewise the Father is Lord,

the Son Lord : and the Holy Ghost Lord.

18 And yet not three Lords : but one Lord.

19 For like as we are compelled by the Christian verity : to acknowledge every Person by Himself to be God and Lord ;

20 So are we forbidden by the Catholick Religion : to say, There be three Gods, or three Lords.

21 The Father is made of none : neither created, nor begotten.

22 The Son is of the Father alone : not made, nor created, but begotten.

23 The Holy Ghost is of the Father and of the Son : neither made, nor created, nor begotten, but proceeding.

24 So there is one Father, not three Fathers ; one Son, not three Sons : one Holy Ghost, not three Holy Ghosts.

25 And in this Trinity none is afore, or after other : none is greater, or less than another.

26 But the whole three Persons are co-eternal together : and co-equal.

27 So that in all things, as is aforesaid : the Unity in Trinity, and the Trinity in Unity is to be worshipped.

28 He therefore that will be saved : must thus think of the Trinity.

29 Furthermore, it is necessary to everlasting salvation : that he also believe rightly the Incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

30 For the right faith is, that we believe and confess : that our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is God and Man.

31 God, of the Substance of the Father, begotten before the worlds : and Man, of the substance of His Mother, born in the world ;

32 Perfect God, and perfect Man :

of a reasonable soul and human flesh subsisting ;

33 Equal to the Father, as touching His Godhead : and inferior to the Father, as touching His Manhood.

34 Who although He be God and Man : yet He is not two, but one Christ.

35 One ; not by conversion of the Godhead into flesh : but by taking of the manhood into God ;

36 One altogether ; not by confusion of Substance : but by unity of Person.

37 For as the reasonable soul and flesh is one man : so God and Man is one Christ ;

38 Who suffered for our salvation : descended into hell, rose again the third day from the dead.

39 He ascended into heaven, He sitteth on the right hand of the Father, God Almighty : from whence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

40 At Whose coming all men shall rise again with their bodies : and shall give account for their own works.

41 And they that have done good shall go into life everlasting : and they that have done evil into everlasting fire.

42 This is the Catholick Faith : which except a man believe faithfully, he cannot be saved.

The Office of Corpus Christi is said throughout the Octave, even on Sunday, except a Feast above the lowest class occur, in which case the Feast is kept, with Memorial of Corpus Christi. A simple Feast, above the lowest class, occurring on the Octave Day, is transferred.

This Office may be used on any Thursday in the year, if unhindered by a Vigil or Double Feast, except in Advent and Lent. Alleluia is omitted in the R̄R̄. of the Little Hours, etc., except in the Octave of Corpus Christi, and in Eastertide.

At the Hours all as on the first day, except that the Psalms at Lauds are said under the first Ant. and the Ant. to Quicunque is, on this day, and henceforth throughout the Octave, Thee duly, &c., p. 31. At Second Vespers, all as on the first day, except the R̄., which is omitted.

On the Octave Day, the Psalms are said under the first Ant., Christ the Lord, &c. All the rest, including R̄., as at

First Vespers on the first day. Ant. to Quicunque, Thee duly, &c., p. 31. At Vespers, all as on Second Vespers of the day, except the R̄., which is omitted.

After the Octave of Corpus Christi, all as in the Psalter at every Hour.

SECOND SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

[*The Ants. to the Magnificat for First Vespers are not Sarum. For the Sarum arrangement see p. 207.*]

Ant. to Mag. And all Israel from Dan even unto Beersheba knew: that Samuel was established to be a prophet of the Lord.

O LORD, Who never failest to help and govern them whom Thoudost bring up in Thy stedfast fear and love; keep us, we beseech Thee, under the protection of Thy good providence, and made us to have a perpetual fear and love of Thy holy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Ant. to Ben. A certain man made a great supper, and bade many: and sent his servants at supper-time to say to them that were bidden, Come, for all things are now ready. Alleluia.

Ant. to Mag. Go out quickly into the streets and lanes of the city: and bring in hither the poor, and the maimed, and the halt, and the blind, that my house may be filled. Alleluia.

Ant. to Mag. Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: for with the same measure that ye mete withal, it shall be measured to you again.

FIFTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. I beseech Thee, O Lord, do away the iniquity of Thy servant: for I have done very foolishly.

COLLECT.

GRANT, O Lord, we beseech Thee, that the course of this world may be so peaceably ordered by Thy governance, that Thy Church may joyfully serve Thee in all godly quietness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. And Jesus entered into one of the ships: and sat down, and taught the people. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Master, we have toiled all the night, and have taken nothing: nevertheless, at Thy word I will let down the net.

SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet, anointed Solomon king in Gihon: and all the people came up and rejoiced, and said, God save king Solomon.

COLLECT.

O GOD, Who hast prepared for them that love Thee such good things as pass man's understanding; pour into our hearts such love towards Thee, that we, loving Thee above all things, may obtain Thy promises, which exceed all that we can desire: through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not kill: and whosoever shall kill, shall be in danger of the judgment.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. If thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee: leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way, first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift. Alleluia.

SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. When the Lord would take up Elijah into heaven by a whirlwind, Elisha cried: My father, my father, the chariot of Israel and the horsemen thereof.

Ant. to Mag. What shall I do ? for my lord taketh away from me the stewardship : I cannot dig, to beg I am ashamed ; I am resolved what to do, that, when I am put out of the stewardship, they may receive me into their houses.

TENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Wisdom hath builded

her house, she hath hewn out her seven pillars : she hath sent forth her maidens, she crieth upon the highest places of the city.

COLLECT.

LET Thy merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of Thy humble servants ; and that they may obtain their petitions, make them to ask such things as shall please Thee ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. And when He was come near, He beheld the city, and wept over it, saying, If thou hadst known ! : For the days shall come upon thee, that thine enemies shall cast a trench about thee, and compass thee round, and keep thee in on every side, and shall lay thee even with the ground, because thou knewest not the time of thy visitation. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. It is written, My house is the house of prayer : but ye have made it a den of thieves. And He taught daily in the temple.

ELEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

of Thy heavenly treasure ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Two men went up into the temple to pray ; the one a Pharisee, and the other a publican : This man went down to his house justified rather than the other. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. And the publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying : God be merciful to me a sinner.

TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. All wisdom cometh from the Lord : and is with Him for ever.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, Who art always more ready to hear than we to pray, and art wont to give more than either we desire or deserve : pour down upon us the abundance of Thy mercy ; forgiving us those things whereof our conscience is afraid, and giving us those good things which we are not worthy to ask, but through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ, Thy Son, our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Jesus, departing from the coasts of Tyre and Sidon, came unto the sea of Galilee : through the midst of the coasts of Decapolis. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. He hath done all things well : He maketh both the deaf to hear and the dumb to speak.

THIRTEENTH SUNDAY
AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. My son, keep thy father's commandment, and forsake not the law of thy mother : bind them continually upon thy heart.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and merciful God, of Whose only gift it cometh that Thy faithful people do unto Thee true and laudable service; grant, we beseech Thee, that we may so faithfully serve Thee in this life, that we fail not finally to attain Thy heavenly promises; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves : which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Which now of these three, thinkest thou, was neighbour unto him that fell among the thieves? : And he said, He that shewed mercy on him. Go, and do thou likewise. Alleluia.

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY
AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. In all this, Job sinned not with his lips : nor charged God foolishly.

COLLECT.

ALMIGHTY and everlasting God, give unto us the increase of faith, hope, and charity; and, that we may obtain that which Thou dost promise, make us to love that which Thou dost command; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. And as He entered into a certain village, there met Him ten men that were lepers, which stood afar off : and they lifted up their voices, and said, Jesus, Master, have mercy on us.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Were there not ten cleansed? but where are the nine? There are not found that returned to give glory to God, save this stranger : Arise, go thy way, thy faith hath made thee whole. Alleluia.

FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER
TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Remember not, Lord, our offences, nor the offences of our forefathers : neither take Thou vengeance on our sins.

COLLECT.

KEEP, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy Church with Thy perpetual mercy; and, because the frailty of man without Thee cannot but fall, keep us ever by Thy help from all things hurtful, and lead us to all things profitable to our salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Ant. to Ben. Take no thought,

saying, What shall we eat? or what shall we drink? : for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness : and all these things shall be added unto you. Alleluia.

SIXTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. But the Almighty Lord hath disappointed them : by the hand of a woman.

Ant. to Ben. Jesus went into a city called Nain : and behold, there was a dead man carried out, the only son of his mother.

Ant. to Mag. And there came a fear on all, and they glorified God, saying : That a great prophet is risen up among us, and that God hath visited His people.

SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. O Lord, Lord, the

King Almighty, the whole world is in Thy power : and there is none that can gainsay Thee.

COLLECT.

LORD, we pray Thee, that Thy grace may always prevent and follow us, and make us continually to be given to all good works ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. And Jesus spake unto the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath-day? : And they held their peace. And He took him, and healed him, and let him go.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. When thou art bidden to a wedding ; go and sit down in the lowest room ; that, when he that bade thee cometh, he may say unto thee, Friend, go up higher : then shalt thou have worship in the presence of them that sit at meat with thee. Alleluia.

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. God open your hearts in His law and commandments : and send you peace.

COLLECT.

LORD, we beseech Thee, grant Thy people grace to withstand the temptations of the world, the flesh, and the devil, and with pure hearts and minds to follow Thee, the only God ; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Master, which is the

great commandment in the law? : Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. What think ye of Christ? whose Son is He? They say unto Him, The Son of David : He saith unto them, How then doth David in spirit call Him Lord, saying, The Lord said unto my Lord, Sit Thou on My right hand?

NINETEENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. When the sun shone upon the shields of gold : the mountains glistened therewith.

COLLECT.

O GOD, forasmuch as without Thee we are not able to please Thee; mercifully grant, that Thy Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Jesus said unto the sick of the palsy : Son, be of good cheer, thy sins be forgiven thee.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. But when the multitude saw it, they marvelled, and glorified God : Who had given such power unto men.

TWENTIETH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. And all Israel made

great lamentation for Judas, saying : How is the valiant man fallen, that delivered Israel !

COLLECT.

O ALMIGHTY and most merciful God, of Thy bountiful goodness keep us, we beseech Thee, from all things that may hurt us; that we, being ready both in body and soul, may cheerfully accomplish those things that Thou wouldest have done; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. Tell them which are bidden, Behold, I have prepared my dinner : come unto the marriage. Alleluia.

Second Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. The wedding is ready, but they who were bidden were not worthy : go ye therefore into the highways, and as many as ye shall find, bid to the marriage. Alleluia.

TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY.

First Vespers.

Ant. to Mag. The Lord hear your prayers, and be at one with you : and never forsake you in time of trouble.

COLLECT.

GRANT, we beseech Thee, merciful Lord, to Thy faithful people pardon and peace, that they may be cleansed from all their sins, and serve Thee with a quiet mind; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Lauds.

Ant. to Ben. There was a certain nobleman, whose son was sick at

Mortify in my members the lusts of the flesh, and all harmful emotions, and give me true and persevering chastity with Thine other gifts which please Thee in truth, so that I may with chaste body and pure heart offer unto Thee the sacrifice of praise. For with what mighty contrition of heart and fountain of tears, with what reverence and awe, with what chastity of body and purity of soul, should that divine and heavenly Sacrifice be celebrated, wherein Thy Flesh is indeed eaten, where Thy Blood is indeed drunk, wherein things lowest and highest, earthly and divine, are united, where is the presence of the holy Angels, where Thou art in a marvellous and unspeakable manner both Sacrifice and Priest.

TUESDAY.

WHO can worthily celebrate this Sacrifice unless Thou, O God, makest him worthy? I know, O Lord, yea, truly do I know, and this do confess to Thy loving-kindness, that I am unworthy to approach so great a Mystery, by reason of my numberless sins and negligences; but I know, and truly with my own heart do I believe, and with my mouth confess, that Thou canst make me worthy, Who alone canst make that clean which proceedeth from that which is unclean, and sinners to be righteous and holy. By this Thine Almighty power I beseech Thee, O my God, to grant that I, a sinner, may assist at this Sacrifice with fear

and trembling, with purity of heart and streams of tears, with spiritual gladness and heavenly joy; may my mind feel the sweetness of Thy most blessed Presence, and the guardianship of Thy holy Angels round about me.

WEDNESDAY.

FOR now, O Lord, mindful of Thy venerable Passion, I draw near to Thine Altar, to offer Thee that Sacrifice which Thou hast instituted, and commanded to be offered in remembrance of Thee for our well-being. Receive it, we beseech Thee, O God Most High, for Thy holy Church, and for the people whom Thou hast redeemed with Thy Blood. We bring before Thee, O Lord, if Thou wilt graciously vouchsafe to behold, the tribulations of the poor, the perils of the people, the groans of prisoners, the miseries of orphans, the necessities of strangers, the helplessness of the weak, the depression of the weary, the infirmities of the aged, the aspirations of the young, the vows of virgins, the lamentations of widows.

THURSDAY.

FOR Thou, O Lord, art merciful unto all, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made. Remember what is our substance, because Thou art our Father and our God. Be not angry with us for ever, nor restrain the multitude of Thy mercies upon us, for it is not in our righteousness that we pour forth our prayers before Thy face, but of Thy great compassion. Take from us our iniquities, and graciously kindle the fire of Thy Holy Spirit within us. Take away the heart of stone from our flesh, and give us a heart of flesh, to love Thee, choose Thee, please Thee, follow Thee, enjoy Thee. We pray Thy mercy, O Lord, that Thou wouldst vouchsafe

graciously to look upon Thy family attending on the ministry of Thy holy Name, and that the prayers of none may be in vain, the petitions of none unfruitful, do Thou put into our minds those prayers which Thou art graciously pleased to hear and fulfil.

FRIDAY.

WE beseech Thee also, O Lord, Holy Father, for the souls of the faithful departed . . . that this great Sacrament of Thy love may be unto them salvation and health, joy and refreshment. O Lord my God, grant them this day a great and abundant feast of Thee, the living God, Who didst come down from heaven, and gavest life unto the world, even of Thy holy and blessed Flesh, the Lamb without spot, Who takest away the sins of the world; even of that Flesh, which was taken of the holy and glorious Virgin Mary, and conceived of the Holy Ghost, and of that Fountain of mercy which the soldier's spear caused to flow from Thy most sacred Side, that therewith enlarged and satiated, refreshed and comforted, they may rejoice in Thy praise and glory.

I pray Thy mercy, O Lord, that on the bread to be offered unto Thee may descend the fulness of Thy benediction, and the sanctification of Thy Divinity. May there descend also the invisible and incomprehensible Majesty of Thy Holy Spirit, as it came down of old on the sacrifices of the fathers, Which may make our oblations Thy Body and Blood. And teach us, Thy unworthy servants, to approach so great a Mystery with purity of heart and the devotion of tears, with reverence and trembling, so that Thou mayest graciously and

favourably receive this sacrifice for the good of all, living and departed.

SATURDAY.

I INTREAT Thee also, O Lord, by this most holy mystery of Thy Body and Blood, wherewith we are daily fed, washed, and sanctified in Thy Church, and are made partakers of the One Supreme Divinity, grant unto me Thy holy virtues, that fulfilled therewith I may draw near with a good conscience unto Thy holy Altar, so that these Sacraments may be made unto me salvation and life; for Thou hast said with Thy holy and blessed mouth, "The Bread which I will give is My Flesh, which I will give for the life of the world. I am the Living Bread Which came down from heaven. If any man eat of this Bread, he shall live for ever."

O most sweet Bread, heal the palate of my heart, that I may taste the sweetness of Thy love. Heal it of all infirmities, that I may find sweetness in nothing out of Thee. O most pure Bread, having all delight and all savour, which ever refreshest us, and never failest, let my heart feed on Thee, and may my inmost soul be fulfilled with the sweetness of Thy savour. The Angels feed on Thee fully. Let pilgrim man feed on Thee after his measure, refreshed by this nourishment on his way. Holy Bread! Living Bread! Pure Bread! Who didst come down from heaven, and givest life unto the world; enter my heart, and cleanse me from all impurity of flesh and spirit. Come into my soul; heal and cleanse me within and without; be the protection and continual health of my soul and body, so that I may by a straight way arrive at Thy kingdom, where, not as now in mysteries, but face to

face, we shall behold Thee; when Thou shalt have delivered up the kingdom to God Thy Father, and shalt be God All in all, then shalt Thou satisfy me with Thyself by a wondrous fulness, so that I shall never hunger nor thirst any more. Who with the same God the Father and the Holy Ghost, livest.

Daily.

JOY with peace, amendment of life, space for true repentance, the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit, perseverance in good works, a contrite and humble heart, and a happy consummation of my life, grant unto me, O Almighty and merciful Lord; for Thy mercy's sake. Amen.

Grant that my soul may hunger after Thee, the Bread of Angels, the Refreshment of holy souls, our daily and supersubstantial Bread, Who hast all sweetness and savour, and every possible delight. Let my heart ever hunger after and feed upon Thee, Whom the Angels desire to look into, and my inmost soul be filled with the sweetness of Thy savour. May it ever thirst for Thee, the Fountain of life, the Source of wisdom and knowledge, the Fountain of eternal light, the Torrent of pleasure, the Richness of the House of God. May it ever compass Thee, seek Thee, find Thee, stretch towards Thee, attain to Thee, meditate upon Thee, speak of Thee, and do all things to the praise and glory of Thy holy

Name, with humility and discretion, with love and delight, with readiness and affection, with perseverance even unto the end. And be Thou ever my Hope and my whole Confidence; my Riches; my Delight, my Pleasure, and my Joy; my Rest and Tranquility; my Peace, my Sweetness,

THE PENITENTIAL PSALMS.

According to the Sarum use, the seven Penitential Psalms are said daily in Lent, one at each Office with Psalm li., Miserere. But before a Festival in Lent, at Nones of the Vigil, the three last Psalms are said, namely, Psalm cii., Domine exaudi; Psalm cxxx., De profundis; and Psalm cxliiii., Domine exaudi: that they may be completed before the First Vespers of the Festival.

They are appointed to be said consecutively, after Sexts on Ash-Wednesday, before the blessing of ashes, and the ejection of penitents; after Nones on Maundy Thursday, at the reconciliation of penitents; and on Rogation Monday after Nones.

[According to the Roman use, which some may prefer, the seven Psalms are not said daily, but only on Fridays in Lent, with Litany, after Lauds. (The Sarum Litany, p. 320, may thus be used.)

The earlier part of the Sarum Ash-Wednes-

Have compassion on *his* groaning, O Lord, have compassion on *his* tears; and since *he* trusteth only in Thy mercy, admit *him* to the sacrament of Thy reconciliation. Through.

[*Instead of Prayers (1) and (2), may be said the following :*

I COMMEND thee, dearest *brother*, to Almighty God, and commit thee to Him, Whose creature thou art; that when thou shalt have paid the debt of mankind by death, thou mayest return to thy Maker, Who formed thee from the dust of the earth. When, therefore, thy soul shall depart from the body, may the resplendent host of Angels hasten to thee; may the judicial council of Apostles come to thee; may the triumphant army of white-robed Martyrs meet thee; may the white and ruddy band of Confessors encompass thee; may the choir of joyful Virgins receive thee; and may the love of the Blessed who rest in the bosom of the Patriarchs enfold thee. May Christ Jesus appear to thee with a mild and gracious countenance, and may He assign thee to be one of those who ever stand before Him. Mayest thou know nothing of the horror of darkness, of the flames of hell, of racking torments. perish before God. And let the righteous be glad and rejoice before God. Let then the legions of hell be confounded and brought to shame, and let not the ministers of Satan dare to hinder thy way. May Christ, Who was crucified for thee, deliver thee from torment; may Christ, Who vouchsafed to die for thee, deliver thee from death; may Christ, the Son of the living God, place thee in the ever verdant pastures of His Paradise, and may He, the true Shepherd, number thee amongst His sheep. May He absolve thee from all thy sins, and may He assign thee a portion at His right hand among His elect. Mayest thou see thy Redeemer face to face, and standing before Him for ever, behold with happy eyes the open vision of the truth. And placed thus among the hosts of the blessed, mayest thou enjoy the sweetness of divine contemplation for ever and ever. Amen.]

But the other answering, rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemnation? and we indeed justly: for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but this Man hath done nothing amiss. And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when Thou comest into Thy kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, To-day shalt thou be with Me in paradise. And it was about the sixth hour, and there was a darkness over all the earth until the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani? that is to say, My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me? After this, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled saith, I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and they filled a sponge with vinegar, and put it upon hyssop, and put it to His mouth. When Jesus therefore had received the vinegar, He said, It is finished. And when He had cried with a loud voice, He said, Father, into Thy hands I commend My Spirit: and having said thus, He gave up the ghost.

BE mindful, O most loving Jesu, of that hour, in which, hanging on the Cross Thou didst cry, My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me? And again, Father, into Thy hands I commend My Spirit: and having said this, didst give up the ghost. By that Thy most precious

Death, which was our life, we pray Thee not to forsake this Thy *servant*, who hath none other helper beside Thee; but vouchsafe to receive *his* spirit and to cause *him* to enter into Thy kingdom, where *he* may love Thee and the Father and the Holy Ghost, with perpetual love, and together with Thy Saints and elect, may tell of Thy loving-kindness for ever and ever. OFFICE OF THE DEAD.

The Office of the Dead is said on every *feria* through Advent till Christmas Eve, from the morrow of the Octave of Epiphany till Tuesday in Holy Week inclusive, and from the morrow of Trinity Sunday till Advent, but never on Double Feasts, or through their Octaves.

On these days are said usually, only Vespers, one Nocturn, and Lauds: Noct. 1 on Monday and Thursday, Noct. 2 on Tuesday and Friday, Noct. 3 on Wednesday and Saturday: but, if festivals intervene, so arranging as, if possible, to say the 3 Noct. once in the course of the week.

The three Nocturns are said on special occasions, on the first vacant *feria* in Holy Week, and on All Soul's Day.

[In Roman use this is said, except in

Easter-tide, on the first day of every month, not hindered by a Double Feast, in which case it is said on the first day not so hindered. But in Advent and Lent, on every Monday not so hindered, except in Holy Week. In Choirs it is said after the Office of the day, i.e. Vespers after Vespers, and Matins after Lauds of the day, unless the use of the place be different: out of Choir it is said as occasion serves.]

Some Roman variations are braeketed.

14 Withdraw not Thou Thy mercy from me, O Lord : let Thy loving-kindness and Thy truth alway preserve me.

15 For innumerable troubles are come about me; my sins have taken such hold upon me that I am not able to look up : yea, they are more in number than the hairs of my head, and my heart hath failed me.

LESSON VII. Job XVII.

MY breath is corrupt, my days are extinct, the graves are ready for me. Are there not mockers with me ? and doth not mine eye continue in their provocation ? Lay down now, put me in a surety with thee ; who is he that will strike hands with me ? My days are past, my purposes are broken of, even the thoughts of my heart. They change the night into day : the light is short because of darkness. If I wait, the grave is mine house : I have made my bed in the darkness. I have said to corruption, Thou art my father : to the worm, Thou art my mother, and my sister. And where is now my hope ? as for my hope, who shall see it ?

R̄. On me who sin every day, on me who never repent, hath the fear of death fallen: because in the grave there is no redemption, have mercy upon me, O God, and save me. V̄. Save me, O God, for Thy Name's sake, and avenge me in Thy strength. Because.

4 Blessed is the man whom Thou choosest, and receivest unto Thee: he shall dwell in Thy court, and shall be satisfied with the pleasures of Thy house, even of Thy holy temple.

5 Thou shalt shew us wonderful things in Thy righteousness, O God

of our salvation : Thou that art the hope of all the ends of the earth, and of them that remain in the broad sea.

6 Who in His strength setteth fast the mountains : and is girded about with power.

7 Who stilleth the raging of the sea : and the noise of his waves, and the madness of the people.

8 They also that dwell in the uttermost parts of the earth shall be afraid at Thy tokens : Thou that makest the out-goings of the morning and evening to praise Thee.

9 Thou visitest the earth, and blessest it : Thou makest it very plenteous.

10 The river of God is full of water : Thou preparest their corn, for so Thou providest for the earth.

11 Thou waterest her furrows, Thou sendest rain into the little valleys thereof : Thou makest it soft with the drops of rain, and blessest the increase of it.

12 Thou crownest the year with Thy goodness : and Thy clouds drop fatness.

13 They shall drop upon the dwellings of the wilderness : and the little hills shall rejoice on every side.

14 The folds shall be full of sheep : the valleys also shall stand so thick with corn, that they shall laugh and sing.

Note, that if any of these Feast-days fall upon a Monday, then the Vigil or Fast-day shall be kept upon the Saturday, and not upon the Sunday, next before it.

Days of Fasting or Abstinence.

- I.—The Forty Days of Lent.
- II.—The Ember Days at the Four Seasons, being the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday after the First Sunday in Lent, the Feast of Pentecost, September 14, and December 13.
- III.—The Three Rogation Days, being the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Holy Thursday, or the Ascension of our Lord.
- IV.—All the Fridays in the year, except Christmas Day.
