PREFACE.

THE AUTHOR TO THE READER.

HAVE, for feveral years paîl, in common, I believe, with the religious fociety of which I an a member, felt much difapprobation at many things which conflitute a part of moft, if not all, the almanaes, in common ufe amongil us; things which, I conceive, have originated from the corrupt roots of idolatry and fuperflition. Out of the former, has arifen the names commonly given to the days of the week, and to many of the months; ard out of the latter, the pretence of foreknowing the particular kind of weather for the fucceeding year; the notion of the moon's governing fucceflively twelve different portions of the humanbody, according as the is fucceflively in the twelve figns of the Zodiac, &c.

I believe I cennot better express my objection to the names by, which the days of the week and many of the months are commonly called, than in the words of that faithful minifler of Chriff, John-Churchman, in a dialogue with a perfon, who requelted John 'o come to him on Saturdays and Wednefdays. " I alked him (fars John) what days of the week those were which he called Setur -day, and Wednelday ? he feemed to wonder at my ignorance,. but knew not how to tell me otherwife; I faid, I do not read in the foriptures of any days fo named ; he replied, that is true ; for what reason, then, Isid I, dost thou call them fo? because it is a common ention is he : fuppole then, faid I, that we lived in a heathen country among infidels wno withinned idols, fhould we follow their cuftoms because common? he replied by nomenant I then faid, if I have underflood rightly, the heathens gave the days of the week those names : 'I never heard that before, faid he, pray for what reafon? I anfwered, they worthipped the fun on the first day of the week, and named it, after their idol, Sunday ; . the moon on the fecond day of the week, fo came Monday, and the other days after other idols, for they had many gods ; third day they talled Fuelday after their idol Tuefco; and after their idol Woden, fourth day they colled Wodnefday, and fifth day, after their idol Thor, they called Thurfday; from Friggs Briday ; and after Saturn they called the leventh day Saturday ; and as I believe in I e only true God and Jefus Chrift, whom he hath fent

and expect eternal life by no other name or power, I dare not for conficience fake own the gods of the heathen, or name a day after them; but choose the names which the days were called by, when the Most High performed his fereral works of creation, viz. first, fecond, third, and so on, which is feriptural, and most plain and casily understood."

I object to the opinion that any man, as a mere natural philofopher, can foretell the weather, farther than (as our Saviour told the Pharifees) "When it is evening (he may fay) it will be fair weather, for the fkey is red; and, in the morning, it will be foul weather to-day, for the fkey is red and lowering. When he fees a cloud rife out of the welt (he may fay) there cometh a thower; and when the fouth wind blows there will be heat." By carefully obferving the appearance of the atmosphere, a man may, fometimes, make a tolerable guefs at the weather for a day or two beforehand; and any pretence of foreknowing more than this, without the fpirit of prophecy, as natural philofophy furilles neither foundation nor rules, muß he fuperflitious.

The fast feems to be pretty well attested that the mind of man, when affected with what is called lunacy. undergoes a periodical change, corresponding to the moon's polition with respect to the fun, that is, with respect to her being new or full, increasing or decreasing. For aught I know, other things may be alfected by the fame caufe; as, by the power of gravity, the undoubtedly has some influence upon our atmosphere, and as the quantity of light the affords us is conflantly increasing from her change to her full, and conflamily decreasing from her full to her change. But this has no connexion with the moon's being in any particular fign of the Zodiac; as the is new and full, increasing and decreasing in the fame fign, at different times; natural philosophy furnishes no foundation for believing that the moon has any appropriate influence on one part of the animal frame at one time, and on another part at another time. Pretended predictions of the wea-ther, the notion, juli mentioned, of the figns, and any belief in spannes alpetts of the planets and Bars, are the remains of that ancien: fuperflitious aftrology, long fince exploded, by all men of real fcience. I believe there is not a man to be found, poffeffed of knowledge enough to calculate an almanac, with accuracy, who does not know that fuch notions are idle and superfittious. It may be afked, why then do they continue to publish them, from year to year, as an effential part of their almanacs ?- Their common excufe is, " People in general (fay they rely fo much on thefe things, that without them, no almanae would fell—that almost the schole impretion would be upon the publisher's hands, leaving him his labor for his pains."

. I believe otherwife, and are willing, as appears by the prefent inflance, to rifk confiderably upon the iffue, heping that the number of my fellow citizens, who are rivetted to fuch fuper-It tions, is comparatively finalt. When a man is accustomed to regard the planets, their perpetually varied positions, and afpefts, as difpenting good or evil to him, in regulating the weather, on which may depend plenty, or famine, in governing; health or difease, life or death, also his health, by influencing the feveral parts of his body in rotation ; will not fuch a difpolition tend to weaker (to fay the least of it) that heart-tendering? sense of conftant dependence, or gratitude to, and reverent ado-ration of his Saviour, which a chriftian ought to feel ?-Oughthe not rather to confider the planets, as they really are, valt bodies of matter, although works of the fame Almighty hand, as inanimate and tenfelefs as the earth on which he treads ; and gratefully to receive every blefling which he enjoys as coming' immediately from the only tree God; the fourtain of life and light; humbly fubmitting also to every feeming evil which may befal him, as a judgment from the fame fource, mercifully. intende d for his correction and amendment, .

I have adapted the apparent time of each phenomenon to the latitude and meridian for which the Almanac is calculated ; except the transit of Mercury ; the first eclipfe ; the immerfions. and emersions of Jupiter's first fatellite; and the conjunctions of the Moon with fixed flars; of which, in all the Almanacs, the apparent time at Walhington is fet down, it being intended to. reckon our longitude from thence, as the established feat of government ...

Owing to a concurrence of many circumflances, which I hope will not commonly be the cafe with me, the feafon was fo far advanced before I could get this work ready for the prefs, that I fear it will be founds incomplete in many particulars, However, if my friends approve of the general defign, and will kindly excuse the imperfections incident to a firll attempt, and . want of fufficient time, I mean to fpare uo pains to make; my ;. future ones more complete and fatisfattory. There may be some inscouracies in the lift Friends' meetings, but it was the beft I could obtain ... I propose to take measures for having that and a more extensive account of courts quite correct in my next. ISAAO BRICCS

ECLIPSES for the YEAR 1799.

THERE are but two eclipses this year, both of the Sun, and a transit of Mercury over the Sun's difk, viz.

First Eclipfe.

On the 4th of the 5th month, invilible in the United States. & at 7h. 6m. afternoon. The Sun will be centrally eclipfed on the mer dian, at 7h. 1m. afternoon, in longitude 105° 22½ W. and latitude 8° N. In Mexico, this eclipte will begin a little before Sun-fet, which

will be the nearest approach of its visibility to us.

Second Eclipfe.


On the 28th of the 10th Month, visible in the Southern and Western fates. A line, passing foutheastwardly through Lake Superior and Lake Michigan, near the west end of Lake Eric, near the fouthwest corner of Pennylvania, near Clarksburg and Staunton, and condiderably fouthwest of Petersburg in Virginia, very near Edenton in North-Carolina, and into the Atlantic Ocean at Cape Hatteras, will divide those parts northeastward, where this eclipse will and be visible, from those fouthwest ward, where it will be visible. The following is a list of the principal places in the United States,

This mode (although a trouble fome one to the calculator) of reprefenting Mercury's path, by making a vertical circle, inflead of the ecliptic, the bafis of the projection, is preferred, in a publication addreffed to the community at large, becaufe, to these unacquainted with aftronomy, it is a much better direction where to look for Mercury on the Sen's difk, or face, at any particular time during his paffage. No one, but an allronomer, can judge with any precifion, of the position of the ecliptic, as it is, every moment, changing with respect to an observer on the earth's furface ; but any one can judge what would be the direction of a plumb-line, paffing through the Sun's center.

Mercury's path, in the above figure, is adapted to the city of Walhington. It was thought unneceffary to make a projection for each place where this almanac may be ufed, as the difference between this path and one adapted to any other place, within the United States, will be not at all material. In all places northeaftward of Walhington, Mercury will appear a little higher on the Sun's face before the middle of the transit, and a little iower afterwards : And in all places fouthwellward dehappen

To avoid the trouble of calculating parallaxes, all the circumflances of this tranfit are fet down fuch as they would be if viewed from the earth's center; as the greateft difference that could occur between an obfervation made there, and a corresponding one, in any place on its *furface*, would not amount to two minutes of time.

N. E. Aithough I have carefully calculated this transit, twice over, from the tables in the third edition of De la Lande's affronomy (the most approved, I believe, of any aftronomical tables now extant) yet my calculation differs, in time, more than an hour, from that in the Nautical affrance. We mult leave it to Mercury himfelf to determine which is neares to the truth.

And I pray that we, who are the natural branches, may not (through our difregard thereto) lofe our birthright for a mere mels of pottage ; (a poor temporary gratification) bur, lika the fons of Jonadab, keep all their precepts : that the Lord of hofts, the God of Ifrael, may not want a man of their pofferity to fland before him forev r.

You need not be fold, that they were very fingular and different from others in their drefs and addrefs; and, however light fome may now effecem thefe things, they fuffered greatly for the fame, both in body and in goods and their fufferings have opened to us a door of great liberty, but we do not, I fear fufficiently prize it; if we did, there would be no running back again into bondages If the Hebrew who might have been free and would not, deleaved

"have his ear bored through with an awl, and be fixed in Ia-Very for ever, fuch backfliders certainly do. There is fuch a digniy in the truth, and fuch a nobility in appearing I ke friends agreeable to our known principles, that it keeps even tranfgreffors in awe, and libertines at a diffance. A deviation opens a docr to every hurtful thing, and introduces an acquaintance that often. times leads to juin in this world, and, which is much worfe, (though far be it from me to limit the mercies of the Almighty) unfits us, I fear, for happinels in the world to come. My beloved young friends, do not plead for this er that, as feeing no harm in it : abftractedly confider, it may be indifferent, but as it is connected, of the utmost importance. A cocked-up hat, fashionable cloaths, or using the plural number instead of the fingular, may be called by you indifferent things ; you may fay that freech is to convey ideat, and what religion can there be in having a hat a little lower or higher ? And in the fame manner plead for every other liberty; but indeed these are very far from being it different things to us. These fingularities, as you may cull them are like the locks of Samplon's hair, wherein if we fuffer untfelves by any Delilah to be deceived, and depart from the plainzefs and fimplicity of our profession, we shall lofe our thrength, and become weak as other men : who, feeing us in their flate, will from entire us into those things I have hinted a. I do not, however, by this mean to be underflood, that we are to lay fuch a firefs on an external appearance, as in any wife to neglect whit is internal. Make the infide clean, and the outlide will be clean alfo. Our predeceffors in the truth, se krow, from well-grounded objections, laid alide greatly the exteriors men had added to religion, and recommended to us an inward purity of heart and foul. If therefore, we become dead to the power of truth, having neither form por power, we are fo far from exceeding other professions, ibet, in my opinion, we fall greatly flor. I pray it may not be fo with us; but, as our fafibers before us walked in truth that we may likewile to walk ; and have to fay to them that fucceed us, follow us as we have followed them, who followed the Lord Jelus in truth and rightecusness. May you allo be examples to the youth in other meetings ; that they, behelding your encumspection, and the fear of God impreffed on your minds, may be encouraged to tread in the fame path. Never be alhamed of being religious. I have thought nothing ever advanced the character of David more, than that zealous joyful felfabasement which appeared in his dancing before, the ark : and though, by the fpirit of the world, fuch may be defpifed, as alling too mian a jart for the dignity of human pride ; yet by the upright hearted they will be had in honour, and their fouls shall be fatisfie ' as with marrow and fatuefs, and now a

growing in that which is truly good ; when 'ennefs and barresneis thall attend the for fiers, who at length fhall be made to con-fels, Wild. v. 4. 5. "We fools accounted their life mainefy and their end to be without honour. How are they rumbered among the children of G d, and their lot is among ft the faints ? What hath pride profiled us, or what good bath riches and vaunting brought us ? All thefe things are paff. d away like a fhadow and as a poll that halleth by, and we are now confuned in our own wickednefs. But the righteous live for evermore, even they whom we had fometimes in derifion, and a proverb of repreach : their reward is with the Lord, and the care of the Moft High is over them." Thus by acting in character, agreeable to your profettion, you will gain all things; and out of it, lofe al!, For what advantage can the whole wor'd afford, or any thing therein, when the time comes, which is most fure, that we fhat have but one defire, even to die the death of the righteous, and our latter end to be like unto theirs, fo emphasically fet forth in the foregoing pallages.

I would now fer before you feme ou ward advantages you enjoy fuperior, to many of your brethren ; and prefs that proper afe to be made of them which may further this great purpole of life-To finish well. Our meetings have been favoured with a living acceptable ministry : many watering featons we have had, here a little and there a ittle. These bloffings are not to be lightly effeemed ; nor are we fo to desend son them, as to neglect in any wife our attention to that great Mi lifler, to whom both those that edify and those that are edified are forvants. If we do, we shall fuffer great loss ; and as, on a certain occasion, the Almighty faid to Mofes, " They are thy people, not mine" may it not be applicable to us ? A lamentable exchange or differense, to become the children of men, from being children raught by the Moft High, and in his truth eftablished. The end of all true ministry is to direct to this ; and the foftening flowers of the golpel are to water the heritage, that the good ground heing opened thereby, the true feed may take root and grow up, binging forth an increase proportionste to the talent icceived : is fome thirty, fome fix's, and fome an hundred fold. The frequent opperiumnes efforded us to meet together, are alfo great advaitages; I do intreat you, by no means neglect them, It is great encouragement to fee a meeting well and timely filled. I remember to have heard a friend orce fay in Kflimony. "That fuch as were indifferent about coming to meetings, were molt indifferent when there." This is a tru h. o which I believe onr experience will readily effent. Le us therefore in an efpecial manner g ard gaing this ind flerence ; and though we may have a tended many meetings, and ferm to be neverthelefs in a cill, elie

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fed flate, and hardly to know what good is, yet if we mifs but one, thatone might have been to us as the appearance of Jefus was to the difciples when they were very low in their minds. He then flood in the midfl of them, and faid, "Peace be unto yeu;" he flowed them his hands and his fide, and they were glad; he alfo breathed on them, and they received the Holy Ghoft. Observe, from this memorable meeting one difciple was adfent, and the report from others could not make him believe; and though our Lord, in condefection, afforded him another op, portunity, when he could only cry out, "My Lord, and my God !" yet are we not to prefume upon that, but cry earnefily to be endued with ability to perform the prefent duty in the prefert time.

Be exceeding choice of your company; for true it is, th t evil communications corrupt good manners. Be as careful what books you read; and avoid those in the leaft tending to libertinifm and deifm, as you would an infectious diffemper. Man, by all his earthly wildom, cannot find out God; finite cannot comprehend infinite. In his unregenerate flate, man may puzzle and perplex himfelf with matters too high for him. Meddle not therewith, but ever bare in rememberance, "The man that walketh uprightly, walketh fecurely;" and that fuch as " walk not after the flesh, but after the fpirit, there is no condemnatiou." This is enough for us to believe aid practife; let us leave the reft to the all wife Difposer of all things, and fav with David, "He that planted the ear, fhall he not hear ? And he that formed the eye, fhall he not fee ? And he that teacheth men knowledge fhall he not know ?"

After requelling your frequent perufal of the boly fcriptures, I would in a particular manner recommend to your reading the feveral volumes, intitled, Piery Promoted. What can more excite to piety, than to view men in their expiring moments joyfully leaving this world, from a confeioufnets of a life fpent in the fear of God? a time in which no dezzling chjeft can deceive, er any worldly enjoyment flatter. William Penn's Rife and Frogress, wrote by way of preface to George Fox's journal, Dr. Ratty's Liberty of the Fieth and Spirit diffinguished, and John Fry's Serious and Affectionate Address, I would also with you all often to read, and ferioufly to confider. The many journals left by worthy deceased friends will afford both delight and profit ; the experiences of great and good men being by the wife slways had n effecm. I am not feufible, whilf I thus recommend the examples of others, that great hurs hath been occasioned by the falling away of fome men, from whom better things might have been excelled, and that by heir foll many have been wounded. I confess this is a lamentable circumstance; but thould

thousands fall on the right, and ten thousands on the left-haud, truth is truth; and may the failures of others tend to make us more circumfpeft and careful of ourfel es, and quicken our endeavours, to the utmost of the ab lity afforded us, and to be fiedfaff, immoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord : ever bearing in rememberance, that the heft of men ale no longer fafe than whilf on their guard; that the higher the attainment, the greater the fall ; and that if the light that was once in us becomes darknels, that darknels is gleat indeed ! And as in the outward, when a man becomes blind, after having once feen, the lofs of fight is more feverely felt by him than by a perfon born blind ; fo when those who have once fpilitually feen afterwards fall into blindnefs, it is no marvel that the flate of fuch fhould be worfe than that of those who have not been fo enlightened. I have feen fo much hurt fustained by fome who have begun right, by not keeping to the fimplicity and imprency they once knew and began in, that I cannot but greatly defire our prefervation and perfeverance : and that with Jolliua we may refolve. That, le others do what they will, we will to the utmolt of our power follow on to know and ferve the Lord.

It is a fhort time we have to be bere, even the yourgeft : it will foon pass over, and flee as a shadow, or as a post that hafter eth by. How many ftrong perfons do we fee unexpectedly cal. led away ? Have we not had in our meeting very recent inflances ? By the records of our burials, I find in one month buried four young men, aged 28, 20, 18, and 17 years, and two in the 37th year. Were we conftantly to confider our latter end. it might lend much to make us wife, and fuppreis every inordinate defire. As I have dwelt pretty largely on this fubject in the beginning of this addrefs, I fhall not add much ; my end in refuming it being rather to fet before us the uncertainty when, than the certainty of our defolution : being fenfible of our apinefs to put fuch confideration, afar off, effectally in the young, the healthy, and the fliong. But although the aged muff die, the young may, and we lee they do. How greatly how effentially then doth it behove us to walk circumfpectly, not as foely, but like wife men, redeeming our time. It was nobly refolved by one of old, who faid, " All the days of my appointed time I will wair, until my change come." May you all be like minded : it will tend, I believe, to make your life comfortable, and your latter end peace.

As to your demeanor in your outward affaire, nothing can for perfectly direct you therein, as keeping to the truch ; sor can any thing elfe enable you to bear difspointments, which will unavoidably happen. Some prints, however, it hay not, be amifs to mentior. Treat all, with whom you have to do, with mecknels and calmacfs : a fort answer turn

away anger, and a wrong is fooner redreffed and acknowledged through a mild conduct that reproach. Instate not those in an higher fohere of life. Endeavour to live rather below than above vour fituations! I have often leen ex eeding hurt to individuals in this particular, who might have been very comfortable, had they confined their way of life to their fituation in it; but, by looking and aiming at an higher, have, to to support it, gone into hazardous undertakings, brought every great inconveriency on themfelves; and then have been ready to complain, and thick their lot lard. Another thing I would observe to those in freall circumstances, wlo may be in trades. and balinefs, that they do not truft their affairs in the hands of fuch as are likewife but of small circumstances. Men of greater may run hazards pot juffifiat le in them : if they have lefs bufinels on faccount of their caution, it is to be preferred, rather than to rifque the little they have, where there may be a danger. .

And fuch of you as may earn your breed with the fweat of your brow, repise not at it. Remember, that godlinels with conteatment is great gain. Providence, in the all-wife disposal of thing, has more equally beflowed his gifts than men perceive. The poor are exempt from many watchings, toils, and fatigues, which he tich ex etience ; their food is pleafant, and their reft fweet. The peffiction of the truth will make all conditions happy: Ind without it all is confusion. The poor in this world, poffeffing these greater riches, will not repine for want of the leffer : their bread will be fure, and their water never fail, and they shall sot even want outward bread. It will be a bleffing to have to admin ther to fuch ; and although at times their difficultes may appear great, fuch will remember what the apofile faish, " That the time is fhort, that they that weep be as though they wep not ; and they that rejoice as though they rejoiced not ; and they that buy as though they poll fl. d not i" and further, what he wrote to Timothy. "We brought nothing sinto this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out ; and having foud and raileent, let us be the rewith content." Thus is veified what the fame apolle wrote to his fame beloved "I muthy, " Godiaels is groh able unto all things, having the promife of the life that now it, (brough contantment) and of that which is to come" (y. its eff. ets)

I shell not enlarge; a few short hints may be better remembered than logger defcosifes; nor have I any defice to appear in this p blic manner: for could I have conveyed these advices as from an enarymous writer, it would have fuited my own inclination better; but I could not fee how that reight be done, fo as to a fiver the end proposed. Finstly, therefore, let we recommed to you, my dear young friends, in the words of the apcfile, "that ye be kindly-affectioned one to another in brotherly love, in honour preferring one another, and the God of love and peace be with you all. Amen.
