



The year started out with high hopes with the return of



In both singles' play, Milligan lost all of its matches in the second round, with the exception of the women's No. I seed Cassie Lomison, who was runner-up, and Cheri Lomison, who won the fifth seed. "We were disappointed but [VI] is a really good team," Cassie said. "They deserved to go on. We thought we might have a chance, but UVA-Wise showed up and played awesome."

"We knew we were the underdogs and had to play well," Cheri said. "They played really well, so it just didn't work out."

Milligan's women head coach Marvin Glover said he was not really surprised with the way the tournament played out.

"I knew when the season started that VI was the team to beat," he said. "I thought Virginia -Wise had improved their squad. Tennessee Wesleyan was basically going to have the same team back, so it looked like we were going to be in a dog fight for second place. It would take something unusual to happen for us to compete for the championship. It pretty much panned out that

way going into the play today.

"I thought Cassie Lomison had another solid campaign as a sophomore. She played tremendously. Cheri Lomison won the championship at No. 5 singles and kept finding ways to beat opponents that have varying types of games. She was able to adjust her strategies and win essentially every time she stepped out onto the court.

"Lyndsey Bowie was a nice addition to our squad. We have two seniors, Sara Wallingford, who played No. 4 singles, and Amy Vincent, who played No. 3 doubles. Otherwise, we were intact for next season."

Milligan College Athletics Nationally Ranked

MILLIGAN COLLEGE. TN (January 5, 2003) - The United States Sports Academy has announced the official fall standings for The United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup. in which the Milligan College Athletic Department finished the fall season 34th nationally.

Milligan joins fellow Appalachian Athletic Conference (AAC) member Virginia Intermont as the only AAC representatives in the top 35. Milligan ranked 34th with 112 points, while VI's 28th place is comprised of 114 points. Other AAC schools ranked were Tennessee Wesleyan placing 64th. Covenant (Ga.) and Union (Ky.) at 85th place.

Milligan gained 30 points from women's cross country's 22nd ranking, 32 points from men's cross country's 21st place finish, and 50 points from women's soccer's 32nd final ranking.

"Milligan College has enjoyed a long tradition of athletic excellence and we continue to strive towards maintaining and improving all aspects of our intercollegiate athletics program." said Milligan Athletic Director Ray Smith. "We expect to compete at a very high level regionally and nationally. We are proud of our student-athletes, coaches and facilities and are pleased to receive this news."

The United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup was developed as a joint effort between the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and USA Today. The United States Sports Academy, based in Daphne, Alabama, is in its first year sponsoring the program. Points are awarded based on each institution's finish in up to 12 sports - six women's and six men's. Each national champion receives 100 points.

From the Range to the Fieldhouse

Buffalo used in Dances with Wolves & Quigley Down Under now at home at Milligan College

MILLIGAN COLLEGE, TN (Jan. 27, 2004) - Standing over seven-feet tall and weighing nearly a thousand pounds, Milligan College's newest addition towers above the inside entrance of Steve Lacy Fieldhouse. The college proudly introduced their recently-acquired American Plains buffalo at the Buffs' first home basketball game of the spring semester on Jan. 13.

The buffalo, which made appearances in the major motion pictures "Dances with Wolves" and "Quigley Down Under," did not come to Milligan in an ordinary way.

Milligan athletic director Ray Smith received a message on his answering machine one day in early December 2003 that started the buffalo's journey to the Milligan campus. The call came from former Elizabethton resident Tom Gentry, whose daughter, Missy Rotenberry, works at Shelor Chevy Corporation and Memory Lane Antique Mall in Christiansburg, Va. The antique mall had strangely found itself in possession of the buffalo, which carried a \$15,000 price tag, after its taxidermist-owner traded the buffalo as a down payment on a Chevrolet truck.

Originally from an Indian reservation in the plains of South Dakota, the meat of the buffalo was given to the local tribe according to their law and traditions

when the buffalo was killed in 1990. Over 400 hours of taxidermy work then went into restoring the buffalo for display.


After displaying the buffalo in the front window of the antique mall for a few years, Gentry and Rotenberry decided that they wanted other people to be able to enjoy the buffalo, too. After the thundering herd of Marshall University declined the gift because they already had a buffalo, Gentry remembered that the mascot of Milligan College was the buffalo, so they called Milligan athletic director Ray Smith.


"I grew up as a little girl in Elizabethton and I remembered the Buffaloes of Milligan College. I know that Milligan will be a good home for him and he will be enjoyed by many people," Rotenberry told Smith when they donated the buffalo to Milligan.

Getting the buffalo from Christiansburg to Milligan College proved to be another task. Smith had to locate and rent a truck with a door large enough to fit the 7'1" buffalo inside. With his wife and daughter, Smith made the two and a half hour trip to Christiansburg on New Year's Eve to pick up the buffalo. Several men and a lot of patience were needed to steady the weight of the buffalo and his oaktrimmed base while the truck's hydraulic lift did the rest of the work.

"The size of this buffalo is really very striking," said Smith. "It is so majestic."

Known to members of the Shelor Corp. as "Jerry," the buffalo now makes his home above the revolving doors in Steve Lacy Fieldhouse on Milligan's campus. A new name for the buffalo has yet to be determined, but Coach Smith foresees a "buffalo naming contest" in the future for the students.







Breaking the mold and showing what a servant is all about

reshmen get many first impressions

in the first few weeks of school. While some impressions have changed, others have not. In the beginning of the Fall 2003 semester, a handsome man with shoulder length hair and wearing a crisp blue shirt caught my eye walking into Seeger Chapel. He had an aura about him that screamed he was an incredible individual. As the semester went on I heard about him through other people before actually meeting him. Many students and Faculty talked about an incredibly humble, helpful, giving person, who was good with kids, and had a level of compassion for people that they could only dream of having.

Eric Blackburn had said "Dimitri Jansen—I can honestly say that he is one of the most spiritually influential students on Milligan Campus. Although many of us have not seen the heart and eyes of service for Christ he has displayed even under the darkness of night, his personality and the way he is able to look into someone's eye and talk to them at an understanding level displays his true heart. As a friend and roommate to Dimitri, I have had the opportunity to see him love even the unloved. I've seen him clothe and feed the homeless and I've seen him stand grounded

even when personal attack comes to him personally. Dimitri is truly a servant and inspiration to us all."

When given the opportunity to write about someone who "stood out," I knew he was the right candidate from what I had heard from others, and what I had observed myself. When Dimitri spoke with people, he listened intently to what they said to him, paused pensively to ponder about it, and then he answered them with his thought out responses.

I asked him who he felt really knew him. and he mentioned KJ Tencza, a former student at Milligan. I ended up interviewing Tencza, and talking to many other students and faculty about Dimitri. Tencza felt that I couldn't possibly begin to grasp who Dimitri really was unless I spent at least an entire day with him. Little did I know what adventures lay before me during our day trip to Gatlinburg, Tennessee.

On the morning of February 7, 2004, in 30 degree weather with snow falling all around, I met Dimitri in front of Milligan College. He thought it would be a great idea to start the day with a dip in the creek. Thoughtfully bringing for me a blanket and earplugs. Dimitri and I jumped in the creek, completely submerging ourselves in the icy depth of the water. It was an extremely cold event that I wouldn't mind doing again.

In the years before he began attending Milligan; Dimitri had spent 2 months in Austria attending a bible school, then 4 or 5 weeks traveling Europe. He was broke, didn't have a place to stay, didn't know anybody in town,

but came to register at Milligan anyway. He put up his tent at a campground about thirty minutes away from campus. "When I came here I had to register for class, find a job, find an apartment, then drive back to Florida, stay for a week, and get all my stuff for school by myself. Which you know, is totally doable, but you take for granted when your parents are helping you. I didn't know a soul in town. All I had were calling cards that I used at payphones, with cars screeching by". He had to call around to find an apartment, and go looking at all kinds of crummy places. "There was a lawnmower in one of the living rooms, ok?" One night while he was in his tent, a cat and a skunk got into a fight "And needless to say they came crashing into the tent." He said they were on his tent, and it looked a lot like the Psycho movie where one could see the outline of someone's hand through the shower curtain.

Dimitri survived that ordeal and stayed at Milligan long enough to major in photography. When asked what his dream job would be, he couldn't just pick one. "I think it would be really awesome to work, own, or run an art gallery that worked with artists that were great artists, and their Christianity came through that." He also thought he, "would like to work in a High School with kids, it would be great to do missions work, and I think it would be cool to work for National Geographic, it would be great to do really good commercial portraits."

Dimitri has many hidden qualities. Wher you meet him, you get that automatic here crush, but he's also someone you just want to run up and hug. Dr. Ruth McDowell Cook and Mrs. Anthony said "Dimitri gives great hugs."

Reading an "instrumental" quote he had written in his bible that he would like to exemplify; "He knows well that the World wit never see him as God sees him, and he had ceased to care," Dimitri said. "People won

emember what you said, won't remember vhat you did, but they'll always remember how ou made them feel." Tencza said, "Dimitri's trengths are definitely his people skills. He'll alk to anyone forever, and he'll do almost nything for almost anyone, even if he doesn't ave a clue who they are. That's some quality ou know." Dimitri said, "it's not so much me oving them but it's letting them know that they re loved, it is not my love that's important. here are people out there that are good eople and they can't see that they can be wed, if they can just see that it's possible that omebody could see good in them and love rem. That is God talking honestly, it's not me, ause I can't do it myself, honestly. I can't keep

Dimitri told me "I believe and I mean this, really do feel that the most important thing the world is just loving people.... I think that eople often times let us know that they are urting, you can see it in their face, you can see it in the way they are moving or walking r talking, or sometimes, they'll just say it. And eing open enough to God's leading, to look t that and realize, that person needs to be tlked to, and being willing to sacrifice and the time for that person, is really important."

He also said, "I really do care about cople... more than anything that is what they sed." In the one day I spent with him he spent me talking to and getting to know the workers the shops. I felt that we made many friends at day, and they were ecstatic that someone stually wanted to take the time to get to know em. They were astonished that someone ally wanted to know who they were. "I get acouraged when I think of people I acourage." He said, "If the thing that makes to the happy is making other people happy, if the always do it then you can almost always happy."

Another great quote he had written in his ble, "I shall not walk this way again, there re any good deeds I may do, or any kindness nay show, let me not defer from it but let me it now, for I shall not pass this way again" ow many people do we come across every ly, that we could spend time for? He said, "I we all these things at home that I have meant send to people literally for months now, I ink Oh I want to send them this package, I ant to send them this card, or bookmark, or irt or something to encourage them. And I ver get to it and it disappoints me. I'd been anning on sending my grandmother a ckage, and some pictures, and an article out what we did this past summer. I can

probably say I was going to send it for like 3 months, I even had it on a list. She passed away, and I never sent it. And it was then that it really impacted me. If you feel like God's telling you to do something, don't hesitate and do it." From the movie Point Break, he recalled a quote that was something to the fact of 'fear causes hesitation, and hesitation will make your worse nightmares come true.' "In all honesty, it broke my heart that I didn't send it to her. And I really wish that I had, and there's really not anything I can do about it now. But from that you can do better for other people in your life, you can call your parents more often, you can call your friends and let them know you are thinking about them, tell somebody they look good in their sweater, or that they look nice, or that a girl's makeup looks nice. Tell them because you're just trying to be nice, you can do those little things. It's tough when the lesson has to be learned through something like that, through regret or sadness. But it's a good lesson to learn you've just got to keep going."

Dimitri has many goals he has set for himself. "I would like to be much more consistent in my faith. I could stand a lesson or two in learning how to take orders and commands, to be under other people's leadership. I'm not very good at that either." Also he would like "to jump in the creek every day this semester; from now until the end of the semester."

Tencza also said one of his weaknesses was, "He tries to help out everyone, so much to the point that he doesn't care about himself. And it kills him. I mean he stays up till like 2 AM, and the whole time he's around people, and that is because people are just dying to spend time with him. So he's very spread out, I think he just get so tired." He was exhausted at the end of our day, but he still had plans for the rest of the evening.

Just getting to know Dimitri was an inspiration. Hopefully now you can understand why he "stands out," and how he is one of the many exceptional people that come through our lives. "The legacy I would like people to remember me for is showing people interest, basically just loving people, for them to feel loved. To obviously show them that God loves them through that."




Students learned from their professors to be an educator that cares about each student as an individual with unique learning abilities and experiences. This wasn't something that was only learned in the classroom, but rather from

Mrs. Rosemarie Shields



Rosemarie Klein was born on February 16. 1937 in a town that had coal mines on one side of the tracks and a steel mill on the other. This town was one where education was valued and teachers were respected.

"And the teachers deserved our respect." Shields said, "they were models. They spoke nicely, they were kind, and they were just moral, I thought."

Shield's college years helped to shape the kind of teacher she wanted to

be. After graduating, she received several scholarships to attend Chatham College, a private liberal arts fouryear college for women. In the fall of 1956, she transferred to Milligan College and became part of the first class to live in Sutton Hall.

Shield remembers the campus being quite different than it was in 2004. Most of the classes were held in Derthick Hall. commonly known as the Ad Building or the

Administration building There were also classes held in the library and chapel, with science lab in the basement and choir meeting on the third floor.

While at Milligan Shield's personal life encountered grea changes also. She me up with a former high school friend named Bruce Shields, and theil between sophomore and junio year, they were married They lived in a pinl trailer in the Hyder traile



court where the Hyder House yard is now and had their first child, Karen, while at Milligan.

After completing her student teaching at Happy Valley High School, Shields graduated from Milligan with her husband in the spring of 1959. After moving to Pennsylvania she attended Mansfield State College to earn her elementary certification. Her first teaching position was teaching a third and fourth grade at a two-room country school called Whiter Pine School. Teaching everything from P.E. to music, math, science, reading, and writing, Shields recalled it as definitely a learning experience and it was "fun."

"What I lacked in knowledge, I think I made up for in enthusiasm," Shields said.

In the years before returning to Milligan, Mrs. Shields taught in New Jersey, Allentown, Penn., and Illinois. She also spent some time working as a teacher for the U.S. Army in Germany when her husband became the pastor of a German congregation. Finally, in 1983, the Shields family returned to northeast Tennessee. Shields taught part time at both East Tennessee State University and Milligan. She also taught German and Latin at Davy Crockett and Daniel Boone High School. She then started to work as a part-time professor at

Milligan in Humanities and became the Public Relations director. Shields joined the staff as a full-time professor in 1984.

The legacy Mrs. Shields left behind was one that was

hard to match. "She is a wonderful teacherkind and patient, but she's also fair- she'll make your papers bleed. She has such a finesse, though, that even if your papers bleed, you don't feel too bad about it," senior Carrie Baker said.

Although she retired, Shields planned to continue teaching part time at Milligan. "I don't think I could stop completely," Shields said. "This is kind of like easing off."

Brandi: You joined us late on in the game, but you picked up on what was needed and got down to business. I knew you were going to do a great job and am glad that you joined. Thanks!


