

IT'S OSTEOPATHY "SHOP TALK" WHEN TURNER FAMILY HAS GET-TO-GETHER

Lycoming College has played a big part in the lives of six members of the Turner family, of Williamsport. All with one interest—osteopathy—the talented young men and women recently received wide publicity concerning their work in that field.

One is the practising osteopath; three are studying at Kirksville College of Osteopathy and two daughters are registered nurses, married to an osteopath and a surgeon.

Dr. Dudley B. Turner, Jr., '37, has offices in Williamsport with his father, Mrs. Larl B. Sanborn (Edna Turner, '38) is the wife of a staff surgeon at the American Legion Hospital in Battle Creek, Mich. A graduate nurse of the Philadelphia College of Osteopathy, Mrs. Sanborn is attending the University of

Michigan. The other nurse in the family, Letitia, '41, became part of a Turner and Turner combination when she married Dr. Stanley J. Turner, an osteopath, in 1944. She trained at the Hospital of the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania and then worked at the Philadelphia Osteopathic Hospital. Her husband is an osteopathic diagnostician and consultant in Detroit, Mich.

The three younger sons, John, Richard and Donald, all of the Class of '48, are now attending Kirksville College of Osteopathy.

So, it's only natural that when the Turner family gets together "shop talk" falls into one main topic—osteopathy. The six come by their interest honestly for their father, Dr. Dudley B. Turner, Sr., is an osteopath in Williamsport.
