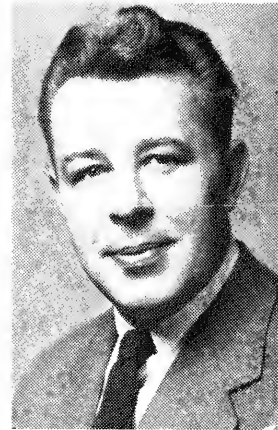

Death of Don Felix

The faculty and students were shocked to learn on the morning of September 30, that Donald J. Felix, Dean of Men, and instructor in physical education, passed away at the Williamsport Hospital. He had a malignant infection over a year ago, which affected his heart, and despite treatment his condition became worse until death ensued.

Don, as he was familiarly called, was the life of the campus. Beloved by students and faculty alike, he not only was a superb dean and instructor, but he was always ready to serve when called on to supervise social gatherings, campus activities, sports, picnics, and everything which called for leadership and efficiency. His life and position will be hard to replace.

The funeral was held Tuesday, October 3, in the Page Funeral Parlors, Williamsport. Dr. Long pronounced the eulogy. Six college students served as guards and pallbearers were members of the faculty.

Students have been called to the service; others have withheld enrolment, expecting to be called, and many parents, facing a more strenuous economic condition, have postponed sending their sons and daughters to college. New Faculty Members and Changes

Mr. William S. Hoffman, former Registrar at Pennsylvania State College, who so ably served as advisor to the college during the period when it was preparing for formal accreditation, has been appointed Acting Dean.

It is also a cause for satisfaction that Harold Hinkelman, who had been given leave of absence to work for his doctor's degree, has agreed to defer this work and retain his post as acting divisional director of business administration.

Due to the resignation of T. Sherman Stanford, Director of Admissions and Registrar, to accept the principalship of the high school in Ridgway, Pa., Mr. G. Heil Gramley has been appointed in his stead. Mr. Gramley for the past three years has been director of publicity and publications and instructor in audio-visual education at Mansfield State Teachers College. Prior to that he had considerable experience in high school work, notably in Williamsport and Los Angeles. He has degrees from Albright College and Bucknell University and has done post-graduate work at Pennsylvania State College.

Frank W. Hastings, holder of degrees from the Drexel Institute of Technology and the University of Pennsylvania, has been added to the faculty to replace Mr. John A. Streeter as professor of economics. Mr. Streeter is on leave of absence to work for his doctor's degree.

James L. Gleason, former college statistician, under Mr. Stanford, has been named assistant to Mr. Gramley, the new director of admissions. A student in the Dickinson Junior College, he served in the Army 8th Air Force in 1943, returning to complete his education in the college, and was among the first to graduate under the new four-year status of Lycoming College.

Mr. Vince Chimento, former halfback at Lafayette, has been appointed the new football coach. He has also been a baseball player in the Piedmont League and with the New York Giants.

While the Warriors lost their first game to Susquehanna University, coach Chimento has some good material and as soon as it can be

whipped into shape, Lycoming will give a good account of itself.

Mr. Ned N. Sweitzer, instructor in psychology, has been called to the service, leaving a gap in capability and congeniality hard to fill.

Miss Louise G. Frownfelter, assistant professor of speech, has resigned to accept another position, and J. Milnor Dorey, of the English department, has been transferred to her work.

The Matriculation Service
