Since the war Lycoming College has made progress which has been equalled by very few other institutions hut uncertain world conditions and the attempt to build up a strong defense program on the part of our government has made the future of young people, so far as their college education is concerned, very uncertain and Lycoming College will be affected unfavorably as well as other institutions.

The enrollment at the present time is only slightly below that of last year but we cannot tell how many former students will return.

You can do your college a most important service by thinking of the young people in your circle - church, service clubs, or other organizations and directing any who have not yet made their college choice for the coming year, to Lycoming College.

#### Estimates of Higher Education Enrollments

Estimates of Higher Education Enrollments over the period 1950-\$1 through 1954-55 have been released by the Office of Lducation. During the current academic year full-time male undergraduate enrollments are expected to total 1,059,000. This year it is estimated that 274,700 males will complete their four-year courses and graduate. In 1951-52, enrollments will decrease to 844,800 with 205,300 graduating. In 1952-53, 757,600 undergraduate males will instead of Williamsport Dickinson be enrolled and 202,200 will graduate. In 1953-54, there will be 719,500 such enrollees and 178,-000 graduating. The low will be reached in 1954-55 when 690,200 will enroll and 166,900 will graduate. After 1954-55 an upturn in male enrollments is expected.
