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Commencement Activities

Lycoming College graduated its third class from the four-year college on Sunday afternoon, June 3, at the one-hundred and third annual commencement exercises of the institution.

Highlight of the precommencement activities was reached Saturday, June 2, when Robert F. Rich, president of the Board of Directors announced that the Board had voted unanimously to name the new library building in honor of Dr. John W. Long, who has served for 30 years as president of the college. Former Congressman Rich emphasized the role Dr. Long has played through the years in bringing the college to its present four-year level.

Students, alumni, and faculty members spontaneously applauded the announcement by Mr. Rich.

At 10:00 a.m., Saturday morning, the Senior Class Day exercises were held in the Clarke Building.

Shirley Williams, Sara McGarvey, and Harvey A. Hartman, all of Williamsport, were awarded the top honors from the school.

Miss Williams received the coveted faculty prize, considered the highest honor accorded to a graduating senior. It takes into account the student's contribution to the school, as well as academic work.

Miss McGarvey and Mr. Hartman were named to the Sachem, select academic honor group established this year. Hartman became the first underclassman to gain such recognition by maintaining a 2.7 average for his first three years.

pointment he served five years as the District Superintendent of the Camden District, New Jersey Conference of the Methodist Church. He delivered an inspiring message on the subject "The Measure of Our Faith."

The graduating exercises, which were being held outdoors in flag court for the first time, started at 4 p.m. Sunday afternoon with the traditional parade across the athletic field beneath sunny skies. After the Rev. Lawrence Lykens, pastor of the Montoursville Methodist Church, had given the opening prayer, Dr. John W. Long, president, introduced the graduating honor students.

Miss Sara E. McGarvey, of Williamsport was graduated *magna cum laude*; and six seniors, Francis F. Carducci, Vincent R. A. Crouse, Rhoda Pontz Heyner, Raymond A. Overdurf and Shirley Williams, of Williamsport, and Ralph Schneider, Bronx, N. Y. were graduated *cum laude*.

Dr. Long introduced the speaker, the Reverend Alexander K. Smith, D.D., Superintendent, South District, Philadelphia Conference of the Methodist Church, who spoke on the subject "Who Lifts His Mind to Such a Height."

Sudden rain and wind whipping across the campus interrupted the commencement address being delivered by The Rev. Dr. Smith, but the speaker resumed after graduates and friends had seated themselves in Clarke Chapel.

Dr. Smith contrasted the utilitarian theory of how far one can go with the more important idea of the proper dedication of the mind of the individual. Dr. Smith went on to explain how the liberal arts college helps prepare its students for this proper dedication of mind and sound direction, by stating four principles of a liberal arts education.

"Observation, calculation, experimentation and application," he said, advances the student beyond the purely utilitarian values of life.

In applying what he had said, Dr. Smith remarked that a man who understands history is not overcome by futurity, but rather lifts his mind up to better things. "No man who correctly reads history can ever despair the future," Dr. Smith added, quoting the English historian Macauley. Such a mind, he went on, "is commanded by the authenticity of the centuries and not the confusion of contemporaries."

Men possessing this understanding will not only enjoy personal integrity, but also be contributors to their republic, he added.

The man who makes his contribution is a part of a high religion, Dr. Smith concluded. Education without this high religion can be only cleverness, he added, charging the assembled seniors and terminal students to gird themselves with high religion.

Dr. Long, assisted by Academic Dean, William S. Hoffman and Director of Admissions, G. Heil Gramley, conferred degrees on one hundred and nine seniors (sixty-six received the Bachelor of Arts degree and forty-three received the Bachelor of Science degree). This list includes those students who completed their undergraduate work since last June, embracing summer session graduates and February graduates, as well as those completing their work the last semester. Eighteen terminal students were awarded two year certificates.

Mrs. Mary Landon Russell, assistant professor of piano and organ, supplied the organ music for the processional and recessional and the a cappella choir, directed by Walter G. Melver, associate professor of voice, offered the choir anthems.

The benediction was given by the Rev. Ralph W. Wott, pastor of the Hamden Methodist Church, Baltimore, Maryland, and father of one of the graduates, Lucille Wott Smead.

The plaque in honor of Miss Martha B. Clarke originally placed in the old chapel was transferred to the narthex of the new

chapel. This was very appropriate since it was the money made available through the will of Miss Clarke which was largely responsible for the Clarke Building.

On one end of a pew in the Clarke Memorial Chapel a plaque was placed, reading:

A plaque on the front of one of the pillars of the Metzler Memorial gate was changed to read:

instead of Williamsport Dickinson Junior College.*

Methodist Educational Foundation

A meeting was held at the Methodist Building in Washington, March 6, 1951, attended by the presidents and representatives of the three Methodist Colleges in Pennsylvania at which time consideration was given to the establishment of an educational foundation which has for its aim the promotion on a state-wide basis of financial help through the churches. The goal established by the general conference of 1948 is a contribution of 50c each from every member of the church within the State. A second meeting of this group was held in Carlisle, May 3, and action was taken at the recent annual session of the Central Pennsylvania Conference, held at Pine Street Church, endorsing the idea. Bishop Wicke of the Pittsburgh area and Bishop Corson of the Philadelphia area, together with Bishop Flint of the Washington area attended the first meeting and gave to that extent at least their endorsement of the plan. This matter will be studied further in the hope that such an organization can be created and used in the interest of Methodist educational institutions in Pennsylvania.

Richard W. Wolf Resigns Position For Music Career

Richard W. Wolf, publicity director, resigned his position, effective June 7, 1951. He is presently working in New York City to further his music career.

A graduate of the class of 1950 from Lycoming, Mr. Wolf is well known for his student musicals: "Student Life" in 1949; "Sidney Goes to College" in 1950; and "The Good Old Days," this year. Music from this year's show has been published by Broadcast Music Incorporated of New York.

Estimates of Higher Education Enrollments

Estimates of Higher Education Enrollments over the period 1950-51 through 1954-55 have been released by the Office of Education. During the current academic year full-time male undergraduate enrollments are expected to total 1,059,000. This year it is estimated that 274,700 males will complete their four-year courses and graduate. In 1951-52, enrollments will decrease to 844,800 with 205,300 graduating. In 1952-53, 757,600 undergraduate males will be enrolled and 202,200 will graduate. In 1953-54, there will be 719,500 such enrollees and 178,000 graduating. The low will be reached in 1954-55 when 690,200 will enroll and 166,900 will graduate. After 1954-55 an upturn in male enrollments is expected.

Lycoming College needs the loyal support of all alumni and friends at the present time and especially for the next few years so that the full quantity of young people attending college may enjoy the privileges offered at Lycoming.

Fire Towers

For some years safety has been a matter of a great deal of concern to our directors and administration as well as the faculty and student body. It was decided finally to erect two towers at the east and west ends of the middle section of Old Main building to take the place of present stairways.

Mr. Clarence Wagner, architect, prepared the plans. Jacob Gehron and Sons were awarded the contract and are now erecting the stairways to be completed before the opening of college next September.

This will add greatly to the safety of students in Old Main building and is a part of the complete remodeling of Old Main building which was started a few years ago with important changes both on the first and second floors.

Summer Groups at Lycoming

The Methodist Youth Caravan trained at Lycoming from June 19 to 29. This is the seventh summer that Lycoming has been selected as a Methodist Church training center for the student caravan program. The purpose of the program is to help revitalize and strengthen the youth program of local churches and communities. Each youth team is composed of four persons and a counselor and will work in the annual conference to which it is assigned for seven weeks.

This year there were thirty-five young men and women from 18 states and ten counselors present. States represented included Oregon, Texas, Oklahoma and Tennessee. Thirty different colleges also were represented. Each student qualifying for caravanning has had two years of college or the equivalent.
