One of the newest interests among the Alumni of Lycoming is in the Alumni Clubs, being formed in various areas. Four clubs have been organized and several more

are being planned for organization. Already organized are the following: Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Shamokin and Lycoming County.

These clubs will provide opportunity for the Alumni of each area to get together. The frequency of meeting is for the members of each club to decide. Some will meet more often than others. Meetings may include a banquet or be a more simple get-together, as the club may decide.

The idea of a club is to be an "arm of the college" in a given area, provide fellowship for Alumni, and to help Alumni keep abreast with the happenings of the College. Alumni Clubs may best serve the College in helping to locate prospective students and also in counseling them when requested. This is perhaps the greatest service any club can be to the College. The fellowship of a club provides opportunities to meet old friends and reminisce. Usually, there is news from the college that is of interest to all Alumni and may be reported at these meetings.

Organization of new clubs is always a possibility, if no club exists in your locality. A large group is not necessary to start a club. We, in the Philadelphia area, had an organizational meeting with only about ten persons present. Some groups have organized with even fewer present. Rev. Lawrence W. Lykens, Assistant to the President, will be glad to assist any group

theme, "A Distinguishing Mark".

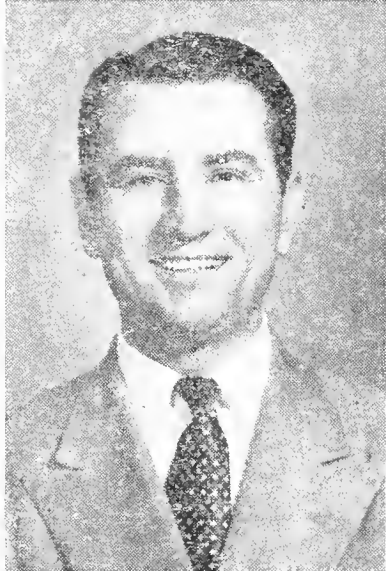

Another Lycoming Service

On June 5, 1955, a young man from Williamsport who has never attended a day class at Lycoming College should receive his degree from the college during graduation exercises. He will be the first person to graduate from our school who has completed his academic course in the college's evening class program—or "night school", as it is commonly called.

After World War II most of the veterans who wanted a college education were able to get it by enrolling in the regular day classes; however, there were many veterans—and non-veterans—who, because of daytime employment, found it impossible to secure a college education. It was to meet the needs of this group that Lycoming College instituted a program of evening classes in February, 1950.

The primary purpose of the night school is to make it possible for people regularly employed during the daytime hours to complete a program of study leading to a degree. But not all of those who enroll in evening classes do so for the purpose of earning a college diploma.

Often we have people enroll for one specific course, or series of courses, which will help them in the jobs they now hold. For example, one man has been taking, over a period of years, only accounting courses. By June, 1955, he will have completed our whole sequence of accounting courses from elementary to advanced.

Others who attend evening classes are doing so to complete state requirements for teaching and nursing certificates. Since Lycoming College has added teacher training to its curriculum, we have a number of graduates who have returned to take the education courses needed to certify them for teaching certificates.

And there are those who attend evening classes for the cultural value and intellectual stimulus derived from college courses. One Williamsport woman (a graduate of another college) has been attending evening classes regularly the past three years. She takes one course a semester, as she puts it, "to keep myself mentally alert".

The regular college faculty members teach the evening classes, and the course content is the same in both day and night school. An important difference between the two is in the distribution of class time. As any past or present college student already knows, a three credit course normally meets three times a week for a fifty minute period each time. Such a system proved to be unsatisfactory for evening classes, and after a period of experimentation, the college decided that one meeting per week per course for a period of two hours and thirty minutes was the best plan for night school.

One other difference is in the load that a student may carry during a semester. A normal daytime load is fifteen credits; a maximum load in evening classes is twelve credits per semester. That means a day student can earn a degree in eight semesters, but a night school student needs a minimum of ten semesters to complete his course. (Someone with time

on his hands figured that if a person were to take one three credit course each semester, he could earn a college degree in twenty years!)

During the four and one-half years that the evening class program has been in operation, there has been an average semester enrollment of about one hundred students. One hundred and twenty are enrolled in night school this semester.

CAMPUS CHATTER

Hi-jinks and rigorous rulings prevailed during Freshman customs week as frosh bowed to sophomore demands. In addition to sporting unusual garb, the Class of 1958 was glimpsed playing leapfrog near the Court House while college musicians added a further note of gaiety to the occasion.

Off the Hardwoods: Vince Leta, who last year held the No. 2 spot in scoring among the nation's small college cagers, was one of 24 men ordered to report for induction into the Army this month. The former Warrior basketball star was graduated from Lycoming last Spring.

The college's version of a Max Schulman character arrived at the Pennsylvania Railroad Station at 10:05 p. m., Thursday, Oct. 7 accompanied by his girl friend, Eunou Dnuora. There to greet him was Dr. John W. Long accompanied by students and faculty.

Yats, who arrived on a special train from Bermuda, made his first appearance on the campus since 1950 to help Dave Busey's gridders through the season. A traditional part of Warrior football activities, Yats has been coming back to the hilltop since 1948.

Warrior Wampum: Not only is the Blue and Gold launching its first season of football since 1950, it is also introducing Chief Winall—Indian spirit of brotherhood from the tribes of the Susquehanna area. Chief Winall will appear at all athletic events of the college in authentic Indian war costume. He'll be seen performing mock war dances and other antics for the benefit of sports spectators.

Students in the dormitory area Oct. 4 were not hearing imaginary bells. Rather they were hearing the signal for a fire drill staged in conjunction with Fire Prevention Week by the Williamsport Fire Department. The trial drill brought students in a mass exodus from Old Main and Rich Hall. After inspecting campus buildings the city firemen will make recommendations for improvements and corrections to the college board of trustees.

If G. Heil Gramley, director of admissions, was particularly jubilant in mid-September, just chalk it up to the 628 enrollment figure reached this semester. Both Mr. Gramley and Dean William S. Hoffman's offices were working overtime during the evenings to add sections of study for the opening of Fall semester classes.

In addition to the 277 freshmen, 163 sophomores, 81 juniors and 61 seniors, 36 student nurses from the Williamsport Hospital are attending classes at the college. 46 part-time students are also listed among registrants.

Sixty-eight young men and women have responded to membership in the Lycoming College Choir this fall. Walter G. McIver, Director, is very enthusiastic over the work which this group has done so far in rehearsal. He is very optimistic as he looks forward to a busy choir schedule.
