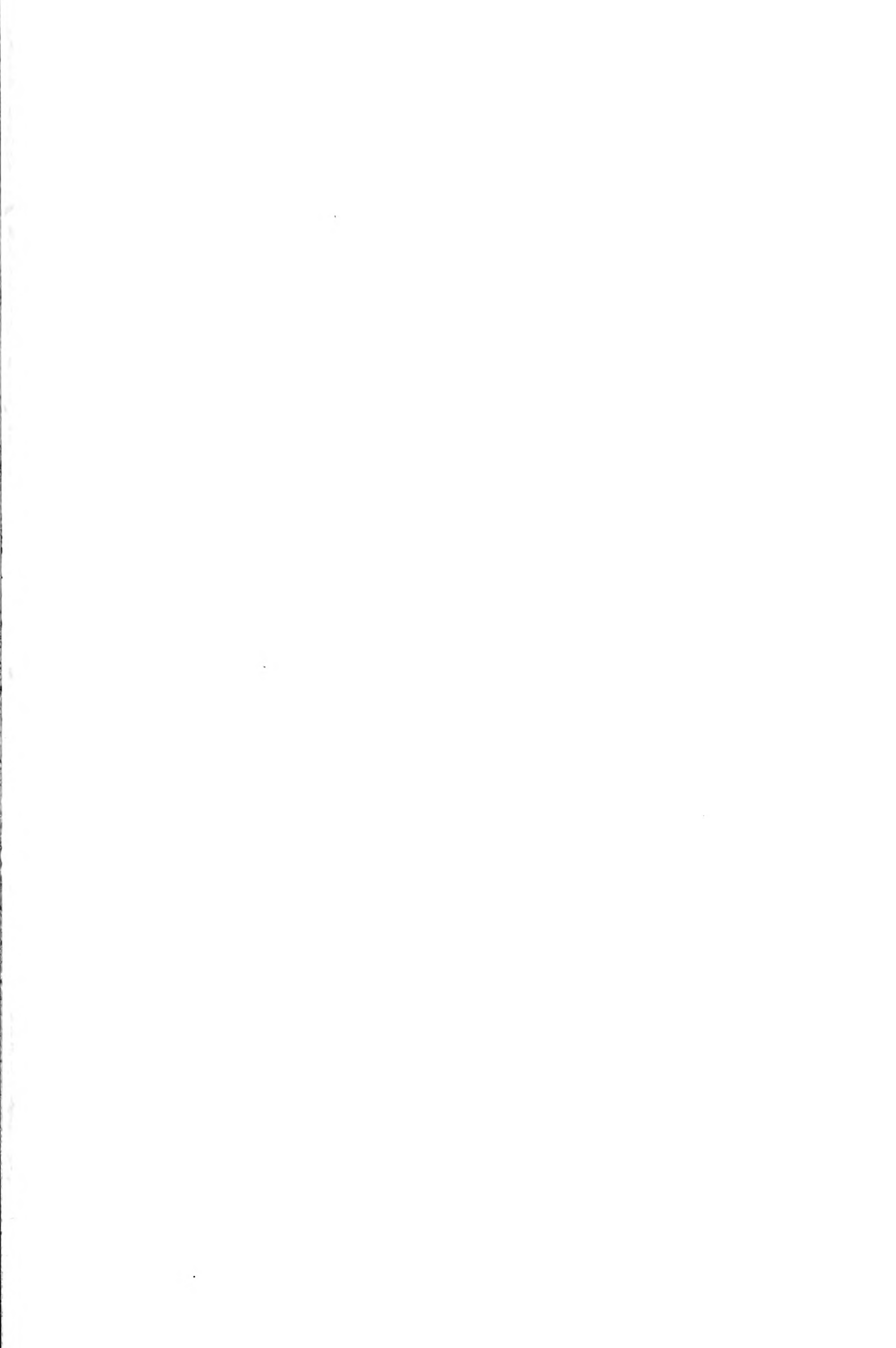
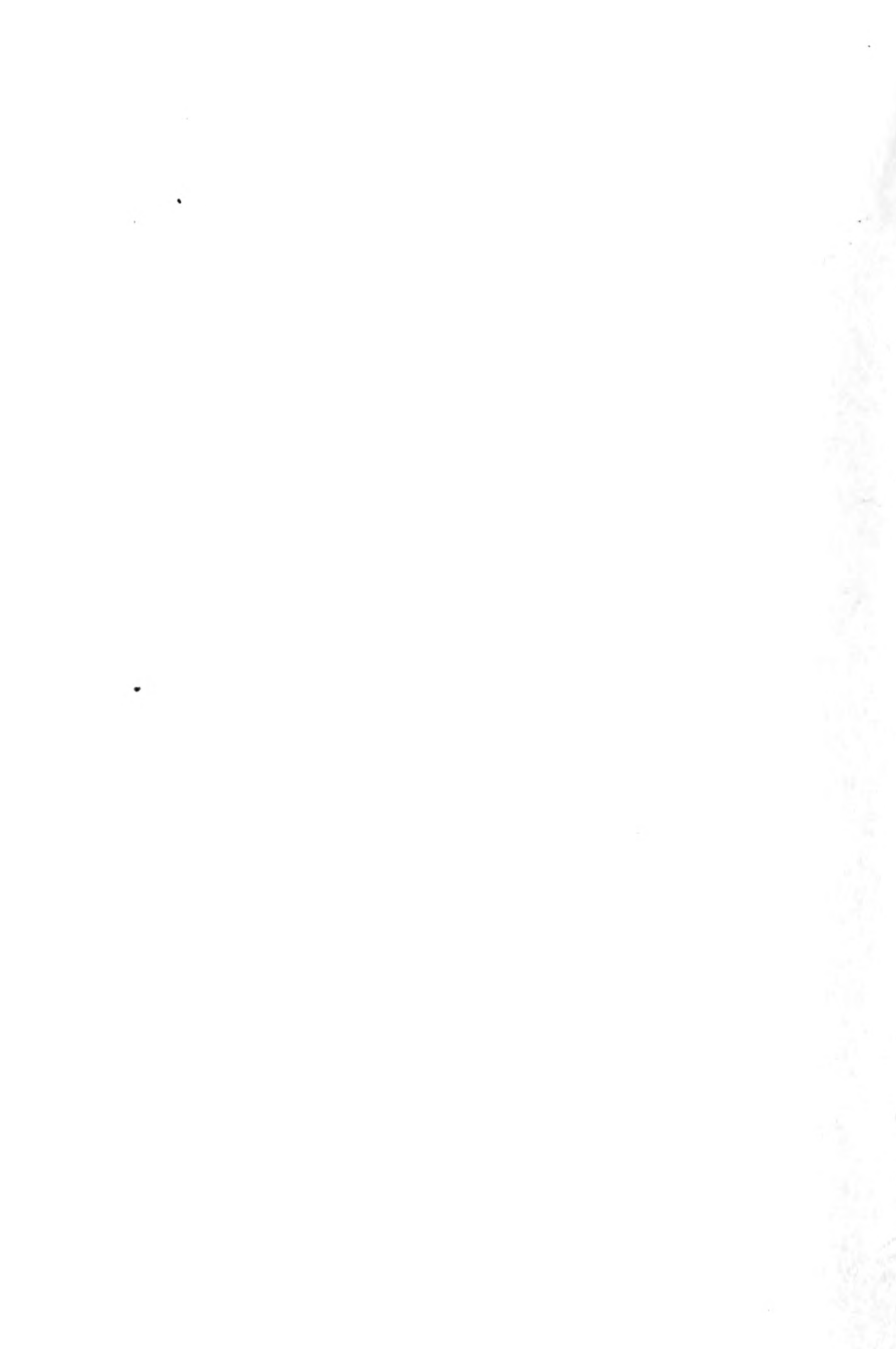


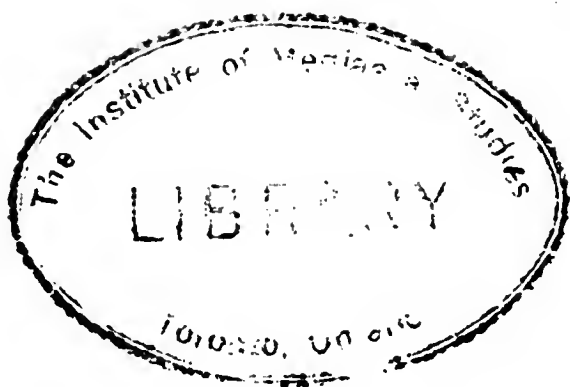

MEMBRANE 42.

July 4. To A. archbishop of York. Order to cause all the fencible men of
Chelmsford. the clergy of that diocese or dwelling therein between the ages of
sixteen and sixty to be furnished with arms, arrayed and kept in
array, ready to march with the archbishop for defence of the realm
when danger threatens by invasions of the king's enemies which it is
said they are preparing, as it is the king's desire to resist the hurt
and peril that may thereby happen, and also ready to put down any
lieges of those parts who shall rise in unlawful assemblies or levies
contrary to the peace, and order if need be to compel them so to do ;
and writ of aid in favour of the archbishop to that end. By K.

July 8. To the keeper, farmer or receiver for the time being of the lordship
Havering of Kaerdyf, in the king's hand by reason of the nonage of the heir
atte Bower. of Edward le Despenser. Order to pay brother John Tremyr 20s.
a year granted him for life by the said Edward lord of Glomorgan and
Morgannok at his exchequer of Kaerdyf, and the arrears since the
late king's death, who confirmed that grant ; as on 24 May last the
king also confirmed the same. By K.

July 10. To Thomas West and John de Roches and their fellows, appointed
London. to chastise and punish certain insurgents against the peace in the
county of Suthampton and Wiltesir. Strict order under pain of
forfeiture, upon information that contrary to their duty they have
set free from prison by mainprise or bail great numbers of men although
indicted for insurrection and not replevisable, to cause all those so
indicted to be taken without delay and kept in prison in safe custody
until delivered according to their commission, proceeding with all
speed and diligence they may to punish and chastise them. By K.

July 16. To the bailiffs of Great Jernemuth and the searcher of forfeitures,
St. Albans. and to the keepers of the passage in that port. Order, upon petition
of divers merchants of the Hanse of Almain, who lately laded three
ships of the city of Hamborgh now in that port with woollen cloths to be
taken over sea, to dearrest those ships and suffer the said merchants

to pass therewith and with their cloths, any command to the bailiffs etc. previously addressed to the contrary notwithstanding, and if there be any cause wherefore they ought not so to do, order to certify the same in chancery, sending again this writ; as the said petition shews that, by colour of the king's writ forbidding them to suffer any persons in that port to pass out without special command of the king, the bailiffs etc. have hindered their passage, and are keeping the ships and cloths under arrest, although the merchants have there paid customs, subsidies and duties thereupon. To the tenants of the king's manors of Kyngesswynford, Kynefare and Tetenhale for the time being. Order to pay to Richard Hampton the king's esquire fee farms of 11*l.* 10*s.* 6*d.* out of the manor of Kyngesswynford and 40*s.* out of the manors of Kynefare and Tetenhale, and the arrears thereof since 15 April last, on which day in recompense for 20 marks a year granted him by the king's father, the king granted him for life the said fee farms, amounting to 3*s.* 10*d.* a year more, which the tenants are bound to render at the exchequer. To the tenants free and neif of the king's manor of Langele Marreys. Strict order, upon their allegiance and under pain of forfeiture, without murmuring or difficulty to perform the works, customs and services which they ought, as they used to do before the disturbance now arisen in the realm, forbidding them on any pretence to withdraw the same in these times of disturbance, or to claim any other liberties or privileges than they formerly had, and commanding them to give up to the king and council to be cancelled a charter made to them concerning manumissions and pardons. To the auditors of accounts of the king's ministers in Cornwall and Devon for the time being. Order to suffer Richard Hampton the king's esquire by his own hands to take 6 marks a year of the issues and revenues of the office of havener in those counties, allowing him the same in his account from 15 February 51 Edward III so long as he shall hold office; as on that date the king, being prince of Wales duke of Cornwall and earl of Cestre, by letters patent confirmed on 15 April last, committed to him that office with authority to take in the king's name wines of the prises to him pertaining in those parts etc., and 6 marks a year for his fee. Order to busy themselves therein without awaiting the prior's presence, his discharge notwithstanding; as the king has hereby discharged him, remembering that he is guardian of the spiritualities, and may not conveniently attend to both. St. Albans. John de Ravenser keeper of the hanaper of chancery in his account
4 marks 13s. paid for privy business of the king by his order. By K.

Reading.

To the guardians of the peace and justices of oyer and terminer in Leycestershire, and to the sheriff. Order to cause proclamation to be made at the town of Warkenaby and elsewhere on the king's behalf forbidding any man of whatsoever estate or condition to go armed contrary to the peace or to the statute of Norhampton concerning the carrying of arms contrary to the peace, to lead an armed power, to make or procure levies or unlawful assemblies of the king's lieges, or so far as in him lies to suffer that to be done, or aught else which may tend to contempt or prejudice of the king, breach of the peace and of the statute, disturbance of the people, encouragement of evildoers, hurt or waste of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England or its possessions or injury of the brethren thereof, under pain of losing their arms and imprisonment [at] the king's will; and order to arrest all found acting contrary to such proclamation with their arms and armour, and imprison them until further order, causing their arms and armour to be appraised and answer made for them to the king, and certifying in chancery the names of those arrested, the description and price or value of their arms and armour, and all their own dealing in the matter; as on behalf of the brethren of the Hospital it is shewn the king that, although among other lands of the Templars conferred upon them by King E[dward II] they have hitherto held the manor and advowson of Rotheley and [advowson] of Warkenaby chapel and other chapels pertaining to that church with the profits etc., and although by letters patent the king has taken them and their possessions into his protection, William de Swopston parson of Ketelby has raised unlawful assemblies of lieges of the county at Warkenaby, and has stirred them up lawlessly by armed power to take, consume and carry away tithes there to the said brethren pertaining, contrary to the said statute.

Chelmsford. to John Fairfax clerk a seal appointed for the office of chancellor of
the bishopric of Durham during the vacancy thereof, which is in his
keeping, to be by the said John delivered to Hugh de Westwyk the
king's clerk, whom the king has appointed chancellor within the liberty
of the said bishopric during the vacancy. By K.

July 6. To the sheriff of Essex. Order to take of John son and heir of
Chelmsford. John Clerc of Ewelle late escheator in Essex and Hertfordshire security,
for which the sheriff will answer at his peril, to answer at the exchequer
at a day to be set for all that shall be found due from the escheator
to the king by reason of his office or otherwise, and to give him livery
of all lands, goods and chattels of his father taken into the king's hand,
and the issues thereof. Proviso that he shall duly sue out of the king's
hand any such lands held of the king, or of an heir within age in the

in dower or otherwise for life of his heritage; as he has proved his
age before the escheator, and the king has taken his homage and

stead. the king's esquire 10*l.* a year for life and the arrears since Easter
last; as for good service to the king's father and to the king on 11 June
last the king granted him for life 10*l.* a year of the said fee farm, which
his said father granted of the profits and revenues of the manor of
Cheillesmore.

July 23. To Ralph Wyke escheator in Cambridgeshire. Order to remove
Berkhamp- the king's hand and meddle no further with the manor of Fordham,
stead. delivering to Joan late the wife of Thomas de Felton knight any issues

escheator, that the said Thomas at his death held no lands in that
county in chief in his demesne as of fee nor in service, but held that
manor in chief by knight service jointly with the said Joan in fee
simple; and for 20*s.* paid in the hanaper the king has respited her
homage and fealty until Michaelmas next.

To William Berard escheator in Norfolk and Suffolk. Like order concerning the manors of Great Ryburgh, Little Ryburgh, Ingaldesthorp, Dersyngham, Banham, Greyis and Wilby co. Norfolk, the advowsons of Great Ryburgh and Ingaldesthorp, and the manor of Barwe co. Suffolk, all held jointly in fee simple of others than the king.

To the mayor, bailiffs and commonalty of Leycestre. Order under pain of forfeiture not to make or procure levies or unlawful assemblies of the king's lieges contrary to the peace, nor so far as in them lies to suffer it to be done, or aught else which may tend to contempt or prejudice of the king, breach of the peace and of the statute of Norhampton concerning the carrying of arms, disturbance of the people, encouragement of evildoers, hurt or waste of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England or its possessions or grievance of the brethren thereof, and if aught such be done or attempted, to cause it to be corrected and reformed; as on behalf of the said brethren it is shewn the king that, although etc. they have hitherto peaceably held the manor and advowson of Roytheley with Warkenaby chapel and other chapels pertaining to that church etc., William de Swepston parson of Ketelby etc. (*as above*, p. 3).

To Thomas de Illeston escheator in the county of Suthampton. Order in presence of the heirs and parceners to make a partition of the lands of Thomas de Mynstede deceased into two equal parts, and to give John atte Mulle and Isabel his wife, one of the daughters and heirs of the deceased, and Philip de Claverle and Christina his wife, the other daughter and heir, seisin of their respective purparties, sending the partition to be enrolled in chancery; as Isabel and Christina have proved their age before the escheator, and the king has taken the homage and fealty of the said John and Philip by reason of issue upon their said wives begotten, and they have paid one mark in the hanaper for pardon of the trespass they committed in taking the said Isabel and Christina respectively to wife without the late king's licence. Proviso that either parcener shall have to his purparty a share of the lands held in chief.

Order upon their allegiance and under pain of forfeiture on sight of these presents to cause chains of iron to be made, and the bodies of certain traitors and felons adjudged to be there hanged for their misdeeds in this insurrection, and to hang there so long as they should endure, to be brought again to the gallows wherever found and again hanged in chains as aforesaid; as the king is informed that divers evildoers have taken and removed them thence in contempt of the king and contrary to the said judgment.

To Henry Keel mayor of Coventre. Order on sight etc. to cause John Fuller of Crekkelade chaplain, taken by the mayor and imprisoned for alleged treasons etc., to come before the king and council at Redyng, with the cause of taking him in writing.

Order, upon petition made on behalf of Henry Muker master of a ship called the '*Holygost*' of Sounde, John Erwyte master of another ship called the '*Holigost*' of Sounde, Walter Slodorn of Hamleworth master of the '*Cruseberth*,' John Lange of Lubyk master of the '*Gabrielle*,' Nicholas Shonewolt of Danske master of the '*Mariknyght*,' Lawrence Nicholasson of Danske master of the '*Cristofre*,' and Everard Stroke of Danske master of the '*Mariknyght*,' merchants of Almain, to cease from causing them hurt or hindrance, to dearrest the ships and merchandise, suffering them and other merchants from time to time, after payment of customs and duties, freely to pass out of the port with their ships and with merchandise whatsoever by them bought within the realm, notwithstanding the king's writ forbidding the bailiffs to suffer any persons to pass out of the realm without special command of the king except well known merchants, and if there be any cause wherefore they ought not so to do, order to certify it in chancery under their seal, sending a copy of this writ; as the said petition shews that lately the said merchants brought thither divers merchandise from over sea, that some of them laded other merchandise in some of those [ships] to take to their own parts, and paid customs due thereupon, but that by colour of the said writ of prohibition the bailiffs and searcher are hindering their passage, and keeping their ships and merchandise under arrest, although they are well know merchants and of the king's friendship.

To the sheriff of Kent. Order to cause John the parish chaplain of Mepham to come to the Tower of London, delivering him to the custody of the constable until further order.

Order, if assured that the sale of the crop of certain lands of Percival Simeon in Abboteswalden and elsewhere to Thomas Morieux knight and Simon Caleware was made in good faith, to deliver the same to them, certifying in chancery his dealing therein with a copy of this writ; as the said Percival being indicted for taking part in this present insurrection, and for many evil deeds, for that he was a fugitive the escheator by virtue of his office took the said crop into the king's hand; and now petition is made on the purchasers' behalf, shewing that long before the insurrection etc., by indenture made between them and the said Percival and Joan his wife, they bought the crop of all his lands, paying down 25 marks.

Reading. To the sheriff of Lincoln. Order, upon petition of Stephen de Benyngton brother of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England and preceptor of the preceptory of Skirbek by the town of St. Botolph, on the king's behalf to order William de Harecourt to make no attempt by violence or unlawful power upon the petitioner's possession of that preceptory, telling him to sue in the king's court for any right he has therein, if he shall think fit; as the petition shews that at the instance of John Dyngleye late brother of the Hospital the late prior and the brethren thereof demised that preceptory to the said John and William for life at a certain yearly rent, performing divers charges, so that if the rent were not paid or charges found it should be lawful for the lessors again to enter and dispose of the same, that after the said John's death the charges and alms were not performed by the said William, wherefore during the vacancy of the Hospital the representative and brethren thereof did again enter and committed the preceptory to the said Stephen, but that by colour of his nomination aforesaid the said William is striving to disturb him therein, threatening by power to thrust him out. Order to deliver to the sheriff of Kent and his fellows appointed to chastise and punish certain rebels there who lately rose in insurrection contrary to the peace, in order that they may proceed to punishment and deliverance of those rebels, all indictments made before the said John and his fellows, appointed for the same purpose, for treasons and other misprisions for which great numbers of lieges of Kent are indicted it is said. Sheen. To the sheriff of Surrey. Order to receive Stephen Hulle of London 'draper,' whom the king is sending, being imprisoned in the prison of the king's household for burning the manor of the Savoye of John king of Castille and Leon duke of Lancastre for which he is indicted, and to imprison him in Culdeford (*sic*) castle, so as to have him before the king in the octaves of Michaelmas to stand to right touching matters that shall then be laid before him. Henley. To the escheator in Essex. Order to suffer the executors of Richard de Lyones to reap the corn growing within the manor of Lyston as his chattels, and to dispose thereof according to his will, as shall to them seem best for his soul. By K.

Henley. To the escheator in Cambridgeshire. Order under pain of forfeiture on sight etc. to seize into the king's hand all great beasts, sheep, fish, honey and other victuals meet for the expenses of the king's household which for whatsoever cause are forfeit to the king in that county, within or without the Isle of Ely, and to keep them for that purpose without diminution or sale, certifying from time to time their description, ownership, price and value. Order to arrest and imprison all who shall be before them indicted for the same, and all such as according to their discretion they shall be lawfully assured are guilty thereof, where they may be kept in safest custody without escape, mainprise or acquittal with those already arrested and not yet delivered, until by advice of the council the king shall take order for their deliverance.

Order, upon petition of William Bedelewe and others, merchants of Ireland, to view divers letters of cocket by them produced in chancery, and if thereby assured that the goods and merchandise by them cocketed in Ireland are those now newly put in six small vessels called ' hakebotes ' of Flanders to be taken thither, and were not exposed for sale at Sandewich, order to dearrest the said vessels and goods and deliver them to the said merchants, suffering them without a second payment of custom or subsidy to pass to Flanders in order to make their advantage thereof ;

as they have shewn that they laded those goods in a ship of Wynchelse called '*le Plenteth*,' Adam Ossemonde master, to be taken thither, and paid in Ireland the custom due thereupon, as by the said letters appears, that they put the same in the six small vessels, for that the said ship on the voyage was by a storm and contrary winds driven to Sandewich and there lost, and that by colour thereof the collectors have arrested and are detaining vessels and goods.

July 29. To all sheriffs, mayors, constables, bailiffs, ministers etc. to whom
Henley. etc. Writ *de intendendo* in favour of the president of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England for the time being appointed or his deputy, and order, as they would avoid the king's wrath, upon the suit, certificate or information of the president to arrest and deliver to him all brethren of the Hospital whom they shall find wandering to and fro about the country, to be chastised according to the discipline and rule of their order; as the king has learned that certain of the brethren, despising their profession and casting off their habit, some also persisting in their habit but abandoning themselves by reason of this vacancy and for lack of a pastor to insolence and folly, are wandering from country to country in rebellion against the said president, squandering the goods of the Hospital, and doing daily many things to the scandal of their order and the peril of their souls. Kent, 100s. a year and the arrears since 16 September 4 Richard II, on which day the king granted him so long as he should hold that office, which by letters patent of 30 March 1 Richard II the king committed to him for life, 100s. a year for his fee, as John de Beverle deceased late keeper had by grant of the late king.

May 4. To the collectors of the great and petty custom in the port of Bristol,
Westminster. the searcher and the keepers of the passage there. Order, of the king's reverence for the pope, to suffer the attorneys or proctors of Cosmatius Gentilis the pope's collector in England to pack in bales or chests, lade in a certain ship there and without payment of custom or subsidy to take over sea six pieces of tapestry of green powdered with roses for a present to the pope, a great curtain of serge of the same colour, two bankers of blue tapestry work, five pairs of linen sheets and two blankets for a bed, bed curtains of bluet containing six pieces, one great coverlet (*cultricem*) for a bed and six cushions for a chamber, five pieces of bed curtains of red, two great long pieces for chamber ornaments of red, two little pieces for the same of red, one banker of blue, two great red pieces of serge for ornaments of the hall worked with the arms of the pope, the king and the church, two great bankers and one little piece of serge of red for the hall, one piece of tapestry cloth paly (*palatam*) of red and black, five mantles of Irish cloth, one of them lined with green cloth, another of mixed colour lined with green cloth, a garment (*indumentum*) of russet lined with Irish cloth, one woollen cloth of green for accounts, three covered beds with testers, one rayed cloth for a yeoman of bluet, one piece of cloth of bluet containing five ells (*alas*), another piece of mixed colour containing seven, another of mixed containing nine, one piece of blanket containing six, one mantle of mixed colour lined with vair (*bayro*), with supertunic and hood lined and the whole suit, one mantle of bluet lined with grey work, a supertunic of the same suit and the whole suit, another garment lined with 'calabre,' a tunic lined with blanket and a hood lined, another garment without sleeves lined with vair and a tunic lined with lamb's fell, a furring of vair for a supertunic, a hat and a pair of gloves lined with grey work, a pair of gloves of 'bevyr,' a tunic of mixed [colour] lined with blanket, and two round mantles, one mixed the other black, a garment of Northfolch cloth lined with black cloth, a tunic of the same lined with green cloth, and a coat (*gipponum*) of another pattern, four strait tunics of blanket, one whole gown lined with sendal and all the suit of bluet, a garment of sanguine lined with sendal, a hood of 'vyolet' lined with scarlet, a piece of bluet containing ten ells, with towels and other linen, a tabard with supertunic and hood of one suit lined with blue sendal, a hood of sanguine lined with black cloth, a hood of scarlet doubled and a hood of sanguine single, also 30*l.* and the collector's books, any command to the contrary to them previously addressed notwithstanding.

Order to Westminster. view letters of cocket in possession of Robert Olyver, John Aukland, John Whithevede, John Chestre, Robert Hibbourne, John Horton, Henry del Grene, William Johanson, Stephen de Muston and Robert de Raigneton merchants of Newcastle upon Tyne, and if thereby assured that the wool, hides and woollfells found at Calais in a ship of Newehavene, Hugh Haynson master, were all customed in that port, and that the said merchants knowingly put no uncustomed merchandise therewith in the ship, nor had knowledge of fraud against the king committed by others, to suffer such of them as shall be found innocent therein to lade their wool etc. again in other ships and take them to any parts they will of the king's friendship, according to his licence granted to the burgesses of Newcastle upon Tyne; as their complaint shews that Robert Olyver lately laded in the said ship three sacks thirteen stone of wool in two sarplers, John Aukland 260 woollfells in one fardel, John Whithevede 200 woollfells in one fardel, John Chestre 300 woollfells in one fardel, Robert Hibbourne 200 woollfells in one fardel and 25 dakers of hides, John Horton 240 woollfells in one fardel and twelve hides, Henry del Grene 500 woollfells and 15 dakers of hides, William Johanson one last of hides and seven hides, Stephen de Muston thirteen dakers and Robert de Raigneton five dakers of hides, all to be taken to Flanders, that the ship was driven by a storm to the coast of France near Calais, and that by reason of other uncustomed goods therein found the treasurer has arrested and is unlawfully detaining the same, although in the port of Newcastle they paid customs, subsidies and other duties thereupon due both in England and at Calais, as by the said letters may appear. Proviso that all goods and merchandise of those who knowingly put uncustomed goods in the said ship be kept as forfeit to the king, and answer be made to him for the same.

May 6. To William Pakelesham steward of the king's honour of Reylegh. Westminster. Order not to distrain the abbot of Coggeshale to do homage for the manor of Tillyngham co. Essex, releasing any such distress made; as the king has taken his homage. By letter of the signet.

Norfolk, and that the ship was plundered by the said enemies of anchors and gear and of other goods and victuals therein, and was cast ashore at Hapesburgh within the prior's lordship, the king lately sent that petition to William de Elmham admiral of his fleet to the northward, commanding him to take information etc. and do the master speedy justice; and after upon the prior's petition that for speedy execution of justice the records and processes begun before the admiral should come before the king and council, shewing that the ship and the goods therein ought as wreck to pertain to the prior, the king commanded the admiral to send them at the quinzaine of Easter last and all things concerning the same, telling pursuers and defendants to be there at that day, and the admiral did so; and at that day appeared in chancery the prior by James de Byllyngford and Henry Maupas his attorneys, and the master in person, and the said processes being viewed and arguments heard on either side, it seems good to the justices, the king's serjeants and others of the council learned in the law that the ship etc. ought not to be called wreck, wherefore it is determined that the same be given up to the master with damages and costs in his suit, so that he content the prior etc. as aforesaid.

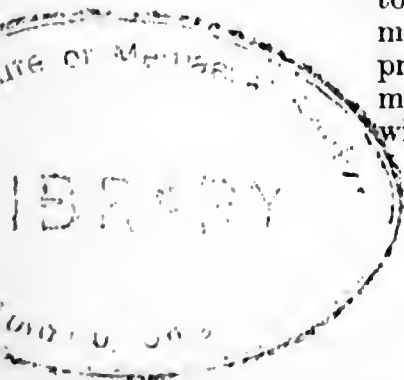

Order to take a simple seisin within some manor of the bishopric of Landaff, suffering the chapter of that church to have the keeping and disposal of the bishopric, now void by death of Roger the last bishop, and of the temporalities etc. thereto belonging, delivering to them any issues thereof taken, saving to the king the knights' fees and advowsons and the escheats that shall fall in during this vacaney, and the keeping of any lands acquired and annexed to the bishopric since the letters patent of King Edward II, who in consideration of the waste of woods etc. pertaining thereto by escheators or other keepers which might be suffered in time of vacancies without his will and knowledge, of his devotion of St. Peter and St. Paul in whose honour the church is founded, granted that at every vacancy of the bishopric the chapter should have the keeping and disposal thereof, as fully as the bishops had, or as the king might or ought to have during vacancies if the same were kept in his hand, saving to the king any knights' fees held of the bishopric, and the advowsons of churches, so that all rents and services of such fees arising during vacancies should remain to the chapter, and saving escheats aforesaid, rendering to the king 93*l.* 9*s.* 8*d.*, whereat the bishopric is taxed, if the vacancy should endure one whole year, and if for a greater or less time in proportion, with covenant that no escheator, sheriff or other minister of the king should by reason of a vacancy meddle in the keeping of the bishopric, the manors or property thereof, except that at the beginning of every vacancy the escheator or other minister of the king should in name of the king's lordship take a

simple seisin within some manor thereof, and forthwith depart, taking or carrying away no fealty or acknowledgment of any tenant of the bishopric or aught else, so that he should not abide more than one day or leave any substitute in his room ; and the king has confirmed that grant.

Thomas Wrenche, lately appointed to arrest all ships and vessels of more than sixteen tuns burden up to a hundred tuns from the mouth of the Thames to Lenne for the passage of the bishop of Norwich and other lords etc. sailing over sea in his company, and to bring them to Sandewich before 8 April next. Order to dearrest and deliver up to William Silvester, William Moldson and Adam Silvester divers small vessels of theirs called 'doggers,' if they exceed not sixteen tuns burden and are not sufficient for shipment of horses, and the victuals wherewith the same were laded; as by colour of their commission they have arrested those doggers, although they used not heretofore to be arrested for any expedition for that they are not sufficient for shipment of horses.

Here, on Friday after Passion Sunday, namely 13 March this year, the great seal was delivered by the king to the custody of Michael de la Pole the chancellor, as appears in a memorandum on the dorse of this roll.

April 9. To the bailiffs of Donewych and the collectors of customs in that Westminster. port, and to the collectors there of the subsidy of 6*d.* in the pound

last granted to the king. Order, upon petition of Francis Vyncheguerre and Simon Scalt merchants of Lumbardy, to suffer them without payment of custom or subsidy to carry over land from Donewych to London six bales, one pipe and three fardels of merceries; as their petition shews that at Seland they caused a small ship of Seland, John Pieresson master, to be laded (*cariari*, rectius *carcari*) with the wares aforesaid to bring to London, that on the voyage the ship was by the king's enemies of France driven to Donewych, and for safety thereof the goods were there put ashore to be carried to London over land, and that the bailiffs and collectors are demanding and purposing unlawfully to levy customs and subsidies, as if the same were there exposed for sale, which they are not; and Nicholas Luke, Nerius Bonvise and Lewis de Portico merchants of Lumbardy have mainperned in chancery for the petitioners under pain of the value of the goods, that they shall take them to London and nowhere else, and shall truly pay customs and subsidies thereupon.

Order to take the Westminster. fealty of Constance late the wife of Peter de Malo Lacu the sixth knight, and to remove the king's hand and meddle no further with fifteen messuages, thirty bovates of land and 10 acres of meadow in Kylllyngwyk, Hundmanby and Appelgarth and a moiety of the manor of Helagh in Swaldale, delivering to her any issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that at his death the said Peter held the said messuages, land and meadow as jointly enfeoffed with her by gift of Richard de Ravenser clerk and others made with the king's licence to them and the heirs of their bodies, and that they are held in chief by knight service, and the said moiety likewise jointly with her to them and the heirs male of his body by fine levied in the late king's court, which is held of others than the king; and for 40s. paid in the hanaper the king has respited the homage of the said Constance until Easter next.

To the same. Order to take of the said Constance an oath etc., and in presence of Thomas de Percy, to whom the king has committed the wardship of two thirds of the said Peter's lands until the lawful age of his heir, to assign her dower thereof.

May 7. To Hugh de Bysley escheator in Gloucestershire and the march of Westminster. Wales adjacent. Order in presence of Walter Herland, to whom the king has committed the wardship of two thirds of the lands of John Duyn, to assign dower to Henry de Burton and Alice his wife, who was wife of the said John; as for a fine paid by the said Henry the king has pardoned the trespass which he committed in taking her to wife, and she in marrying without the king's licence.

May 7. Order to the sheriff of Stafford to cause a verderer of Kynfare forest Westminster. to be elected instead of John de Perton knight, who is sick and aged.

May 6. Order to the sheriff of Cambridgeshire to cause a coroner to be Westminster. elected instead of Edmund Foster, who is dead.

May [*]. To William de Walleworth mayor of the staple of Westminster Westminster. deputed to take recognisances of debt therein. Order, upon restitution of the certificate by him made under the seal of his office to Robert bishop of London late chancellor of a recognisance for 40*l.* made in 3 Richard II by William Knight (*Chivaler*) of Chilham co. Kent to Thomas de Beere parson of St. Michael 'Paternosterchirche' London, the term of payment being then past, if upon search of the roll of recognisances before him made in that year he shall find that the same was made as aforesaid, to make a certificate under the seal appointed to the now chancellor, that action may be taken according to the statute, the first certificate notwithstanding ; as the said Thomas has kept that certificate in his own hands until now, and the late chancellor has long been discharged from office.

April 20. To the lieutenant or justice in Ireland, or to their representatives. Westminster. Order to command seisin of his father's lands in Ireland to be given to Robert son and heir of John de Haryngton knight, and the issues thereof taken since 26 April 51 Edward III to whose hands soever they are come, if withheld by reason of the ordinance made at Guldeford in 42 Edward III that all lords in England who had lands or lordships in Ireland should within a set time under pain of forfeiture of the same dwell there in person or send others there to abide in defence thereof, and for no other cause ; as on the aforesaid day the said Robert's age was proved, and the late king took his homage and fealty, and commanded livery to be given him of his father's lands ; and now the king has learned by his complaint that by colour of the said ordinance certain lands of his father in Ireland were taken as forfeit into the late king's hand for that the said Robert dwelt not there nor sent any as aforesaid, as by reason of his nonage he was not bound to do, and were by William de Wyndesore knight, then the late king's lieutenant in Ireland, granted to certain persons to hold so long as they should remain in the king's hand, wherefore the said Robert may not yet obtain livery of the same, though many times he has sued instantly with the king's ministers there ; and by view of divers inquisitions taken after his death the king is assured that the said John died long before the publishing of that ordinance, namely on the feast of Trinity 37 Edward III, and it is not reasonable, nor was it the intent of the late king or his council, that the same should apply to lands of heirs within age and in the king's wardship during their nonage. Proviso that, if not yet made, answer be made at the exchequer of Ireland by those lawfully chargeable for the issues of the said lands during the said Robert's nonage.

Westminster. Order to take of singular the merchants, alien and native, who will take wool or woollfells to any parts over sea of the king's friendship other than Calais security, for which the collectors will answer, for payment of duties which should be paid at Calais if the same were taken thither, in case it shall be adjudged in the next parliament that such duties ought to be paid for taking wool etc. elsewhere than to that staple, and until the next parliament to suffer them after paying the customs and subsidies thereupon due in England to take the same over at their pleasure, certifying the treasurer and the barons in their account at the exchequer of every such security, the number of sacks of wool and the quantity of fells. discretion he content those who travailed for rescue thereof, and if there be any cause wherefore they ought not so to do, order to certify it in chancery, sending again this writ ; as the petitioner has shewn that lately he laded the crayer with a certain quantity of wheat to be taken thither, that on the voyage the crayer was so hard driven by the king's enemies of France off Donewyche that the seamen and servants abandoned the same and fled ashore in a boat, that on the day of the capture it was rescued by them with other seamen in divers vessels of Donewyche and neighbouring towns, and was brought to Lowystoft, but that at the suit of the seamen of Donewyche, claiming that by reason of the rescue the crayer, wheat etc. were their goods, the bailiffs have arrested and are unlawfully detaining the same.

May 5. To the sheriffs of London for the time being. Order of the fee farm
Westminster. of the city to pay to Alexandra de la Mote 20*l.* a year and the arrears since 19 August last ; as in recompense for certain grants by the late king made to Roger Archer and the said Alexandra, then his wife, on 4 March 1 Richard II with assent of the council the king granted her for life 20*l.* a year at the exchequer ; and at her petition, for that she gave up those letters patent in chancery to be cancelled, on 19 August last the king granted her for life 20*l.* a year of the said fee farm.

May 27. To the archbishops etc. and all ecclesiastical persons holding any
Westminster. dignity or office, notaries public and others to whom etc. Prohibition against attempting aught which may tend to contempt or prejudice of the king, to impair the laws etc. of the realm, to the hurt of Francis prior of Montacute, to whom the king has committed the keeping of that priory for a set yearly farm, or to delay payment of his farm, and order to revoke any such attempt made ; as the king has learned by report of many that certain persons, believing him to be a schismatic and heretic, and an adherent of Robert of Geneva (*Gubinensis*) the antipope, are purposing to cite the said prior to answer in the court christian, to deprive him of the said priory and otherwise to trouble him ; and being examined before the king and council the prior publicly professed obedience to pope Urban, and it was there witnessed by credible persons that he is not a schismatic or heretic, nor an adherent of the antipope.

June 16. To the king's lieutenant in Ireland for the time being. Order, so
Westminster. long as Philip Darcy shall stand on the king's service over sea, not to compel him to abide in person in Ireland or to send men thither, but to excuse and discharge him thereof, notwithstanding the ordinance made in the parliament holden at Westminster in 3 Richard II, namely that under a pain therein contained all who have lands, rents, benefices, offices and possessions in Ireland should draw thither before Midsummer then next, and should thenceforward dwell there in aid of the lieges in those parts, to keep and defend the land against the Irish rebels, and that in case any should be absent without reasonable cause, he should be bound during such absence to find fencible men in his stead for defence of the land as need should be, regard being had to the quantity and value of such lands etc. ; as among other lords and lieges the said Philip is abiding on the service aforesaid with great

number of armed men and archers for recovery of the king's right, and it is the king's will that his lands in Ireland be not taken into the king's hand according to the said ordinance. Proviso that he shall contribute payment to the defence of Ireland according to his means and possessions as others do. By C.

lands and for the said goods or the value thereof, came not to the knowledge of the said Robert Clerk, Walter and Peter, and that by virtue thereof they meddled not with the premises so reserved; and order to charge with the rents and profits of the premises so reserved those who occupied the same from the time they were taken into the king's hand, as they shall be assured by rolls and memoranda of the exchequer or otherwise, or if need be by inquisition; as by complaint of the said Robert Clerk and Walter and of the heirs and tenants of the said Peter it is shewn that, although the first letters patent came not to them nor to their knowledge at any time, and notwithstanding the letters patent of 27 November aforesaid, they are being distrained to answer to the king for the issues and profits of all the premises and for the said goods.

Westminster. writ of *nisi prius* to command an inquisition which remains to be taken between the king and Robert de Swillyngton knight, Brian de Stapelton knight, Nicholas Gernoun knight, Roger de Boys knight, John de Pieshale clerk, Ralph de Walsham, William Philip, Robert de Asshefeld, Roger de Wolfreton, Henry Sergeaunt and Thomas de Wroxham concerning the advowson of Buttelee priory co. Westminster. suffer the abbot and convent of St. Edmund by mainprise of John Farwelle of Suffolk to have until the next parliament, where it may be determined whether the same ought to pertain to the king or to them, the keeping of all lands, goods and chattels of all men and tenants of others and of their own within eight hundreds and a half in Suffolk, and of their own men and tenants in towns and manors in Norffolk to the abbey pertaining (*adjacentibus*), who with other insurgents were lately convicted of divers treasons etc. and adjudged to die, not troubling the abbot and convent and John Rede late escheator by reason of the same, so that the abbot and convent answer to the king for what shall be adjudged to him ; as among other privileges granted to the abbots and convent by charters of former kings, it is granted that the soken of eight hundreds and a half shall fully pertain (*adjaceat*) to the abbey at all times, with all liberties, dignities and forfeitures to the crown pertaining, and that they and their successors shall have therein all forfeitures as well of men and tenants of others as of their own, the chattels of felons and fugitives, the year and a day and the waste, and murder pennies, that they shall have jurisdiction of causes whatsoever as well in those hundreds as in towns and manors to the abbey pertaining and wheresoever they have lands, soc and sac, and shall have all other liberties which their predecessors reasonably used and enjoyed by virtue of general words in the said charters, so that it shall be lawful for them without let of the king, his justices, escheators etc. straightway to seize the chattels of their tenants and others when convicted felons or unwilling to abide judgment, as might the king if the same were kept in his hand ; and now the abbot and convent have petitioned the king to remove his hand and deliver to them the lands and goods of the said insurgents, shewing that lands and goods of divers insurgents which were forfeit, appraised at 10*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* it is said, ought by virtue of those charters to pertain to the abbot and convent, but are taken into the king's hand as they aver ; and the said John has mainperned in chancery to answer for the issues of such lands and the value of such goods, if they shall be adjudged to the king. The king has commanded the escheator accordingly.

wherein he is condemned, if he may not prove by lawful documents that he paid the same.

June 8. To all archbishops etc. and ecclesiastical persons holding any dignity
Westminster. or office, all notaries public and others to whom etc. Prohibition against attempting aught which may tend to contempt and prejudice of the king or of his right; as lately by letters patent the king gave to Richard de Leuesham the keeping of the hospital of St. Edmund the Confessor Gatesheved, being void and in the king's gift by reason of the temporalities of the bishopric of Durham then in the king's hand; and now he is informed that, although the said Richard has long been in peaceable possession thereof, certain men scheming to impair the king's right, and of malice to disturb the said Richard therein, have made and procured appeals, citations, processes etc. to the king's prejudice, purposing to bring the king's right under jurisdiction of another.

June 11. To the abbot of Cerne. Order upon his allegiance and under pain
Westminster. of forfeiture to leave all else, and ceasing every excuse before the quinzaine of St. John Baptist next to draw to some castle or manor of his nearest the sea coast in Dorset, there continually to abide with his household armed and furnished until Michaelmas next, with other lieges to whom the king has given like command, in order to resist the king's enemies if they shall invade those parts; as the king has information that they have assembled a great fleet of ships and galleys, and are preparing to invade and destroy the said coasts this coming summer. Notice, upon his humble Westminister. petition, that by advice of the council he may make his advantage of the tithes of his said church and other profits thereto pertaining, the king's prohibition of 3 April last notwithstanding; as upon testimony of William Pakyngton the king's clerk, treasurer of his household, that Thomas de Barnolby clerk of the offices of the pantry, buttery and kitchen of the household, who is dead, was accountable to the king and rendered not account, the king ordered the archbishops etc. notaries and all persons holding dignity, office etc. to desist from sequestrating, carrying away or wasting the goods and chattels of the deceased until such account should be rendered and the arrears paid, and to revoke any attempt made to the contrary after his death; but the said petition has shewn that by colour thereof the said John is hindered from dealing with the said tithes etc., and Thomas atte More clerk, John de Staverton of Suffolk, Thomas West, John Betlowe of Norhamptonshire and Richard Overton of Berkshire have mainperned in chancery to answer for such tithes and profits as shall come to the said John's hands, if the same shall be adjudged to the king by reason of the account aforesaid.

Order to remove the Westminister. king's hand and meddle no further with the manors, lands etc. hereinafter mentioned, delivering to the rector and brethren of Edyngdon of the order of St. Augustine, commonly called the *Bons hommes*, any issues thereof taken; as it is found by inquisition, by the escheator taken of his office, that with the late king's licence William de Edyngdon late bishop of Winchester founded a chantry in Edyngdon church of a warden and certain chaplains to celebrate for the late king and his successors and for certain others, giving to them and their successors in almoil a messuage and 2 acres of land there, the advowson of the church and of Bradelegh chapel thereto annexed, that they with licence of the late king and assent of all concerned appropriated the said church and chapel, the said messuage, land and advowson being held in chief, that John de Edyngdon with licence etc. gave to them and their successors divers lands in Edyngdon and elsewhere in Wiltesir to hold of the said king and of other chief lords, that by authority of the said bishop, with his assent and assent of the diocesan and others whose assent was required, the chantry was after erected into a religious house, and the said rector and brethren were set there, and that such erection was by the late king confirmed by letters patent of 16 July 32 Edward III, confirming the estate of the rector and brethren and their successors in the said church and chapel and all other possessions of the said chantry, any right of the king by reason of services whereby the same were held, or right of keeping the same during vacancies, the statute of mortmain or any other statute notwithstanding, which letters patent, and the letters

of the bishop of Salisbury were shewn to the jurors of the said inquisition, that in 42 Edward III the then rector and brethren with that king's licence purchased of Robert Forstalle the manor of Stepellavyngton, except a messuage and 15 acres of land of the demesne lands of the manor then held in bondage by John Beriet, the whole manor being held in chief by knight service and by the service of rendering yearly 20s. to the ward of Devyses castle, subject to payment of 9*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* a year to the chantry of St. Katherine Wanbergh, that in 37 Edward III the then rector and brethren with licence etc. purchased of the said bishop Edyngdon the manor of Tenhide which, a messuage and 17 acres of land excepted, is held in chief by the service of one axe called a Danish axe ('*hache Daneys,*') and the said messuage and land of the abess of Romeseye as of her manor of Edyngdon by service of 9*s.* 6*d.* a year, and that John Aillesbury then rector was the first rector, and died on the eve of the Annunciation 5 Richard II; and although in that inquisition it is contained that the jurors know not whether by reason of the vacancy upon his death the keeping of those manors with the exception aforesaid pertains to the king or no, by colour thereof the escheator has taken all their possessions into the king's hand, as is shewn to the king by complaint of Thomas Odiham now rector; and after view and reading in chancery of the inquisition and of the late king's letters patent, and after mature deliberation with the justices, serjeants and others of the council learned in the law, it seems to them that the same were seized without title of law or reasonable cause.

Order to remove Westminster. the king's hand and meddle no further with two carucates of land in Lannouseynt, delivering up any issues thereof taken; as it is found by inquisition, of his office taken by John de Aston late escheator, that on Monday after the Nativity of the Virgin 35 Edward III Robert sometime prior of Plympton and the convent without the king's licence demised the premises, which are held in chief, to John Treury, Richard and Roger his sons, William Caly and Parnell Persoun for their lives, by reason whereof the premises were by the late escheator seized into the king's hand; and the king reckons the cause of seizure insufficient, for that the trespass is pardoned by virtue of pardons made by the late king in 50 Edward III.

July 12. To Thomas Couele escheator in Bukinghamshire. Order to remove Westminster. the king's hand and meddle no further with the manor and advowson of Turueston, delivering to Nicholas abbot of Westminster and to the prior and convent any issues thereof taken, in order to find certain yearly and weekly alms and charges for the soul of Queen Eleanor; as lately in name of a distress the king ordered the escheator to take into his hand all temporalities of the abbot, and to answer to the king for the issues thereof until further order, according to a judgment in the court of chancery in presence of the justices and others of the council for certain contempts etc. by the abbot committed against the king and crown; but the premises were given to the church of St. Peter Westminster, Walter then abbot, the prior and convent and to their successors by King Edward I for the purpose aforesaid, as appears by his charter, confirmed by charter of the king. Proviso that the abbot, prior and convent shall find the alms and charges aforesaid.

Order to remove the king's hand and meddle no further with two messuages and thirteen shops in a street called Holbourne in the suburb of London, delivering to William Savage parson of Handesworth and John Redesere chaplain any issues thereof taken ; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that long before his death William de Furnyvall knight was seised of the premises, and made a feoffment thereof to the said parson and John, their heirs and assigns, by virtue whereof they were seised of the same.

Dec. 5. To Margaret Mareschall countess of Norfolk and Anne who was Westminster. wife of John Hastinges earl of Pembroke. Order of the issues or farm of the manors of Burbache and Barwelle co. Leycester to pay to Henry Aleyn parson of Longelay, executor of Robert Twyford the younger, the arrears since Martinmas before 22 January 49 Edward III due to the said Robert at his death of 60l. a year which the said earl granted him for life of the said issues; as by letters patent of 22 January aforesaid, confirmed by the king on 9 June 1 Richard II, the late king committed to them for a set yearly rent the wardship of the earl's lands in England, except those in Kent, from Martinmas then last until the lawful age of his heir, so that they should pay the said Robert 60l. a year as aforesaid, if thereafter the king's council should adjudge that he had a right therein, and if by the king's writ they should have warrant for payment thereof, paying it to the king in case the said Robert should die during that wardship; and now it is finally judged by the council that in his life time he had right to receive the same, wherefore it is agreed that a writ should issue to the said Margaret and Anne as farmers of those manors for payment of the arrears to his executors for the time that they were farmers, as may appear by endorsement of a petition presented to the king by the said executor, which is in chancery.

Aug. 20. To James de Pikeryng escheator in Yorkshire. Order to give Westminster. Ralph brother and heir of Robert son and heir of Marmaduke de Lomley (Lumley) livery of the advowson of Lithum church and a

moiety of one knight's fee in Toucotes and Glaphowe ; as lately the king learned that the late king was deceived in a partition of knights' fees and advowsons of abbeys, priories, churches and chantries of Thomas de Thweng deceased his tenant in chief, between Walter Pedwardyn knight and Isabel his wife, being one daughter of Margaret one of the sisters and cousin and one of the heirs of the deceased, John de Huthom knight, being son of Maud a second daughter of the said Margaret and another of the said heirs, William Botreaux knight and Elizabeth his wife, being daughter of Katherine a second sister of the deceased and a third heir, when that king kept in his hand the purparty of the said Robert, being son of Marmaduke son of Lucy the third sister and the fourth heir, who died within age in the king's wardship, the said Ralph being now within age and in the king's wardship, for that certain fees, parts of fees and advowsons held by the deceased for life by gift of the said Marmaduke with reversion to Marmaduke's right heirs, which ought to remain in the king's hand during the said Ralph's nonage and then be delivered to him, were assigned and delivered to the said other heirs ; and the king ordered the sheriff to give notice to the said John, William and Elizabeth to be in chancery in the octaves of St. Hilary last to shew cause wherefore all the knights' fees and advowsons of the deceased should not be again taken into the king's hand, and a new partition made, the sheriff returning that the said Walter and Isabel had no lands in the county where notice might be given them, nor were they there found after receipt of that writ, and a day was given to the said John, William and Elizabeth until Friday in the third week of Lent in order that Walter and Isabel might have warning, wherefore the king ordered the sheriff of Westmorland to give them notice ; and at that day the said heirs appeared, and proceedings were continued until the quinzaine of St. John Baptist last, when the said heirs appeared, and William de Hornby the king's attorney alleged that at his death the said Thomas held for life as aforesaid the said advowson and moiety, and also the moiety of one knight's fee in Ellale, Scotford, Assheton, Stodagh, Thirnum, Kedelfelde, Fynchecroft, Scalegill, Clifleggh, Blaksterfelde in Esshestegh and Carneford co. Lancaster, and for that the said heirs could say nought to the purpose, it was determined by advice of the justices, serjeants and others of the council learned in the law, being then in chancery, that all knights' fees and advowsons assigned to them should be seized again into the king's hand, the partition annulled, and a new partition made, excepting the advowson and moieties aforesaid ; and the said Ralph's age is proved, and the king has taken his homage and fealty, and has commanded livery to be given him of his father's lands.

The like to John king of Castille and Leon duke of Lancastre concerning the said moiety of one knight's fee in Ellale etc. co. Lancaster.

Aug. 26. To John Derwentwater escheator in Northumberland. Order to Westminster. give Ralph son and heir of Marmaduke de Lumley seisin of all lands taken into the late king's hand by death of John de Lumley and by reason of his nonage ; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that at his death the said John held no lands in that county in chief in demesne nor in service, but by gift of Robert de Lumley knight deceased held for life eight husband lands, eight

cottages, 80 acres of demesne land, 3s. 4d. of rent of lands sometime of William Taillour and the service of William Peresson in Langhirst, 40 acres of demesne land, two husband lands, two cottages, a third part of one husband land and cottage, and the service of Robert Colleson, William Wryght and John Symson in the Aldmore, with the service of the heirs of John de Esshenden, all with reversion to the said Ralph; being son and heir of Marmaduke son and heir of the said knight, and that the same are held of others than the king; and the said Ralph proved his age before James de Pykeryng late escheator in Yorkshire, and the king has taken his homage etc. (*as above*).

Nov. 18. To William de Skypwyth the younger, escheator in Lincolnshire.
Westminster. Order to remove the king's hand and meddle no further with the manor of Rysgate and a fourth part of the manor of Braytoft which is parcel thereof, delivering to Ralph de Cromwelle knight, Matthew Redeman knight, Master Richard de Wynwyk canon of Lincoln, Master Peter de Dalton parson of Surflete, Ralph de Aderleye the younger, William de Wyum, William Stephenson of Kyrketon, Thomas Pynchebek and Richard de la Launde any issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that long before his death John Cressy knight granted to the said Ralph, Master Richard, Master Peter, Ralph the younger and William Stephenson, their heirs and assigns, a yearly rent of 40*l.* to be taken of the said manor, and after demised the said manor and fourth part for twenty years from Whitsuntide last at a yearly rent of one rose to the said Ralph, Richard, Matthew, William de Wyum, Peter, Thomas and Richard, their heirs and assigns, and that the same are held of the king in socage by the service of 40*s.* a year by the hands of the sheriff.

To William de Sallowe escheator in Notynghamshire. Order to remove the king's hand from the manor of Hudsake, delivering up any issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that John Cressy knight at his death held no lands in that bailiwick in chief in demesne nor in service, but held that manor by knight service of the duke of Lancastre.

Oct. 28. Order to the sheriff of Suffolk to cause a coroner to be elected instead
Westminster. of Richard de Rendelesham, who is insufficiently qualified.
Like order concerning Robert de Redeleshas.

Westminster. holding any dignity or office, notaries public and others to whom etc. Prohibition against any attempt which may tend to prejudice the king or his right, or to hinder the prosecution of his right of presentation to the church of Dynerth, that he be not wroth with them as those who impugn his rights; as a plea is pending before the justices of the Bench between the king and David ap Kenwrek clerk concerning the presentation to that church, which is void and in the king's gift, and the king has learned that the defendant, scheming to impair the process there begun and to bring the king's right to the jurisdiction of another, has in contempt of the king made and procured inhibitions, citations, appeals, inductions etc., whereat the king is moved to anger.

Aug. 20. To John Derwentwater escheator in Westmorland. Order to give
Westminster. Ralph brother and heir of Robert son and heir of Marmaduke de Lumbleye seisin of such manors and lands of Thomas de Thweng deceased kept in the late king's hand for the said Robert's purparty as are in his bailiwick; as a partition thereof was made between William de Botrieux knight and Elizabeth his wife, being daughter of Katherine sister of the deceased and cousin and one of his heirs. Walter Pedwardyn knight and Isabel his wife, being daughter of Margaret a second sister, John de Hothom knight daughter (*sic*) of Maud another daughter of the said Margaret, and for the purparty of the said Robert, being son of Marmaduke son of Lucy a third sister of the deceased and then within age and in the late king's wardship, that king kept in his hand the manor of Helsington extended at 22*l.* 14*s.* 8½*d.* a year, a yearly rent issuing from divers freeholds in Kirkeby in Kendale at 10*s.*, the free farm of divers freeholders in Kendale and elsewhere with the ponds of Skakeleswater and Grisse mere and the fishery thereof at 30*s.* 2¼*d.*, two thirds of a pasture and wood called the Haye and of a pasture called Moserthewayte at 12½*d.*, the service of Randolph de Dacre at 12*d.*, of Richard Vernoun at 6*s.* 8*d.*, Henry de Threllekeld at 16*s.*, Hugh de Dacre and Gilbert son of Christopher de Lancastre at 2*s.*, of Robert de Kyrkeby at 12*d.*, John de Souleby at 8*d.*, John Knot at 1*d.*, and of Robert Wasshyngton at 12*d.*, a fourth part of the fishery of the ' Fors ' and of the river Kent, the fishery of Wynandermere at 30*s.*, a fourth part of the hamlets of Senergh, Threllesgrope, Montjowe and Brentwode, pleas and perquisites of court in the premises at 10*s.*, a piece of land in Karneforde called ' Salteraere ' at 12*d.*, four messuages and 30 acres of land and meadow in Gayrestang extended at 29*s.* 8*d.* a year, 10*d.* of rent issuing from the manor of Ellale, 4*d.* of rent in Scotford co. Lancastre, and 4*l.* 5*s.* 3*d.* of rent to be taken yearly of the manor of Lounde co. York by the hands of the said William and Elizabeth to whom that manor was assigned; and the said Robert died within age in the late king's wardship; and now the said Ralph has proved his age before James de Pykeryng escheator in Yorkshire, and the king has taken his homage and fealty. Oct. 29. To the steward, farmer, receiver or bailiff of the castle and lordship
Westminster. of Walyngforde for the time being. Order to pay to Simon Lengenhulle the king's yeoman 10 marks a year for life and the arrears since 22 March 1 Richard II, on which date the king for his good service to Edward prince of Wales confirmed letters patent of the prince, giving the said Simon 10 marks a year upon the issues etc. of that castle and lordship.

Nov. 9. To the abbots of Rivaux and Wardoun presidents of the Cistercian
Westminster. order, and to the general chapter of the order in England. Notice that, notwithstanding the king's letters patent to them addressed, commanding them under a pain of 1,000*l.* not to trouble the abbot and convent of Rewley of that order contrary to the king's foundation or intent, not to attempt or procure aught to their prejudice, nor to proceed by censure or with other undue rigour against the abbot or any of the monks by reason of their suing for those letters, but to revoke any sentences fulminated against them, they may freely exercise that which merely concerns their spiritual jurisdiction, provided they attempt or procure nought to the prejudice of the said foundation or of the king's intent, and proceed not as aforesaid against the said abbot or monks ; as lately the king heard that the said abbots were minded so to proceed in a general chapter then to be held, and to attempt other things to the prejudice of the said house, and gave command as aforesaid ; but on behalf of the said abbots and chapter it is shewn that by colour of his letters patent they have deferred to exercise that which concerns merely their spiritual jurisdiction without advising him.

Nov. 10. To the bailiffs of Shrewsbury for the time being. Order to keep
Westminster. the assize and assay of bread and ale and amends of all victuals for sale in the borough, causing the same to be sold for a reasonable price to any who will buy as in other cities and boroughs of the realm, and the said assize etc. to be kept according to the statutes and ordinances, that for lack of justice no loud complaint come a second time to the king's ears whereby he must needs be further vexed ; as by complaint of the people the king is informed that, although the said town is a borough, and the bailiffs have had time out of mind the assize and assay and the amends aforesaid, they keep not the same, but suffer victuals to be sold at a price other than by law they ought.

Oct. 28. To the justices of the Bench. Order to allow to Adam Sperlyng,
Westminster. who is sailing to Normandy in the company of William de Wyndesore captain of the town and castle of Chirburgh there to remain to garrison the same, the king's letters patent of protection for one year, not troubling him in aught, although learning after by particular information that he sailed not nor purposed so to do, but is abiding in the city of London upon business of his own, having obtained the

same by fraud, on 24 October last the king revoked the said letters ; as the said William has witnessed in chancery upon oath that he was retained so to sail and did sail on the king's service, and the king hereby revokes the said revocation.

Nov. 10. To the receiver, farmer, bailiff or minister of the lordship of Walyng-
Westminster. ford for the time being. Order to pay to John de la Hay [knight
in margin] 100 marks a year which on 22 March 1 Richard II the
king granted him for life for good service to the king's father and to
the king, and the arrears since that date.

Westminster. hold pleas before the king. Order, upon petition of Thomas son of
Robert de Roos of Ingmanthorp knight, to proceed with what speed
they may in a cause pending upon a writ of *scire facias* between the
said Thomas and John son of John de Hastynge earl of Pembroke,
being one of the cousins and heirs of William de Cantilupo knight,
William son and heir of William la Zouche of Haryngworth knight
the other cousin and heir, the said William son of William under the
name of William la Zouche knight the younger, and John Tyndale
concerning the manor of Ravenesthorp and the members, namely
Thirleby and Boltby, and concerning divers lands in Azerlawe and
Braythwayte co. York which are in the king's hands by reason of the
nonage of John son of John, notwithstanding the allegation of William
la Zouche and John Tyndale that they hold the premises by the king's
commission until the lawful age of John son of John, and without the
king may not answer, craving the king's aid, so that the justices proceed
not to rendering of judgment without advising the king.

Nov. 17. To the keeper of the manor and park of Cheilesmore for the time
Westminster. being. Order to pay to John Catesby, so long as he shall stand in office,
his fee as steward of Coventre, and the arrears since 27 October
1 Richard II, on which date the king appointed him steward during
pleasure, taking the fee accustomed.

Nov. 18. To the mayor and bailiffs of Grymmesby for the time being. Strict
Westminster. order at their peril to suffer no foreigners now or hereafter dwelling or
abiding in the town, who will* take up the freedom (*burgensiam*) of
the town and bear charges with the other burgesses, to ply crafts or
traffic there as burgesses, or reap any benefit or emolument of liberties
or customs granted to the burgesses by charters of former kings
confirmed by the king, and to take of them no fines for shewing them
any favour contrary thereto, but to treat them as other foreigners
not dwelling there, their abode in the town notwithstanding, as it is
the king's will that they be treated by others ; as by petition of the
said burgesses it has come to the king's ears that, whereas for a set
farm they have as aforesaid the town with divers liberties and customs,
and great number of foreigners there dwelling and abiding, being as able
as the burgesses or more able to be burgesses and to enjoy the same, in
consideration of grievous charges daily borne by the burgesses, as

in finding vessels and fencible men for defence of the sea at the order of the king and the admirals and in other matters which concern the governance of the town, though many times required so to do refuse to be burgesses or to bear a share of such charges, they nevertheless ply crafts and traffic in the town as if they were burgesses, by colour of their abode there and of fines which the bailiffs yearly extort from them to their own profit, by permission and favour of the bailiffs unduly reaping the benefit aforesaid contrary to the said charters; and it is not lawful or reasonable that such foreigners, though there abiding or dwelling, should be free to traffic or reap that benefit unless they take up the freedom of the town and bear charges with the burgesses.

Nov. 5. To William Hastynge escheator in Suffolk. Order to remove Westminster. the king's hand and meddle no further with the manor of Pakenham Netherhalle, delivering to the abbot of St. Edmund any issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that Richard de Pakenham at his death held the same for life with reversion to the abbot and his successors by virtue of a fine thereof levied with the late king's licence in the quinzaine of Michaelmas 43 Edward III between the said abbot plaintiff and Ralph de Hemenale deforciant, whereby the reversion of the said manor, being of the said Ralph's heritage, was assured to the abbot and his successors and to their church, and that the same is held of the abbot.

Nov. 6. To the sheriff of York. Orders to give Thomas de Roos of Hamelak Westminster. knight seisin of a messuage and 7 acres of land in Oswaldekirk held by Robert Merling hanged for felony; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the sheriff, that the premises were in the late king's hand a year and a day, that they are held by knight service of the said Thomas as of his castle of Helmesley, that they are now held by Robert de Wymbilton for a set farm payable to the sheriff, and that Miles de Stapelton knight the late king's escheator seized the same in 27 Edward III, and that king had by his hands the year and a day and the waste thereof.

Nov. 16. To Roger Juyll escheator in Cornwall. Order to take the fealty Westminster. of Joan late the wife of Warin de Insula knight and to remove the king's hand and meddle no further with the manors of Alwarton and Trewarnayl, delivering to her any issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that at his death the said Warin held the same as jointly enfeoffed with her, and that they are held of Launceston castle as of the duchy of Cornwall by the service of 13s. 4d. a year.

To John Brode of Smethe escheator in Middlesex. Like order concerning a messuage, 3 acres of land, 3½ acres of meadow and 1 acre of pasture in Fulham, which the said Warin held jointly with her of others than the king, as the king has learned by inquisition taken by John de Newenton knight late escheator.

Dec. 9. To the mayor and bailiffs of Suthampton, and the collectors of the Westminster. petty custom in that port. Order, upon petition of Henry Smytman,

Falquinus de Ponte and their fellows, merchants of the Hanse of Almain, to take of them security that they shall not take the same to lands of the king's open enemies, and shall bring again to the realm wine to the value thereof, and to suffer them to lade again in a ship, John Benynghous master, the herring freighted at the Scone which they brought therein to Suthampton and, after paying the customs and subsidies thereupon due, to take it out of that port to Bordeaux ; as they have shewn the king that they paid the said collectors custom thereupon, and may not in that port deliver the herring to their advantage ; and for certain customs and prises upon their merchandise imported and exported which the merchants of Almain granted him, King Edward [I] by charter, confirmed by the king, granted among other liberties etc. that they all may take and carry whither they will within or without his realm and power their merchandise brought thither or bought or otherwise acquired therein, wines excepted, save to lands of open enemies of the realm, paying the customs due thereupon.

Nov. 6. To Master Arnold Brocas clerke of the king's works. Order to receive
Westminster. by indentures from the sheriffs of Wiltesir, Dorset and Suthampton the moneys arising from the sale of all the goods and chattels of Nicholas Wodehulle citizen of New Sarum and Philip Soydoun of Weymothe, and by oversight of Nicholas Bonham and Hugh Cheyne to spend them upon the repair of Old Sarum castle ; as the said goods are forfeit to the king for that the owners are outlawed at suit of William Canynges of Bristol in a plea of debt, and the king has commanded the said sheriffs to sell them, and the said Nicholas Bonham and Hugh to oversee the repair of that castle and control the expenses thereof.

To the sheriff of Wiltesir. Order to sell the said goods etc. (as above, *mutatis mutandis*), certifying the treasurer and the barons of the exchequer of the sums delivered to the said Arnold.

The like to the sheriffs of Suthampton and Dorset.

MEMBRANE 25.

Oct. 26. To the sheriffs of London. Writ of *supersedeas omnino*, and order
Westminster. to revoke and annul any execution of any writ of the exchequer to them addressed by virtue of a judgment rendered before the treasurer and the barons of the exchequer concerning two cellars, three solars and three houses thereupon built in the parish of St. Martin in the Vintry in the city of London which were of Thomas Swanlond deceased, putting Philippa wife of John Desterny in full possession thereof ; as the late king by letters patent granted the premises (among other lands etc.) to the said John and Philippa and to their heirs male so long as the same should remain in that king's hand, being in his hand by reason of moneys wherein at his death the said Thomas was bound to him, with reversion to that king and his heirs for lack of issue male of their bodies ; and by her complaint the said Philippa has shewn that by the said judgment William son of Walter de Chiriton recovered the same against her by default, as occupier of lands of his father, which she was not, taken into the late king's hand by reason of debts wherein the said Walter and his fellows farmers of the customs and subsidies were bound to the late king, and that she feared to be by the said William prejudiced by virtue of that judgment to the disherison

of the king ; and the king caused the record and process of the judgment to come before him in chancery, and upon view thereof before the justices, serjeants and others of the council learned in the law, after full deliberation it seems to them unreasonable that there should be execution of the premises, and the king has commanded the treasurer and the barons altogether to stay execution thereof.

Nov. 16. To the mayor and bailiffs of Sandewich. Order to deliver to Juliana Westminster. who was wife of William de Foxston, being his executrix, or to her attorney, a ship of his called the 'Godeyere' and the gear thereof ; as the same was arrested for that certain evildoers therein by force of arms entered a ship of certain merchants of Portugal of the king's friendship sailing off the coast of England, assaulted, beat and wounded the merchants, their men and servants, and took and brought away the ship and divers merchandise wherewith it was laded ; and at the prayer of the said William, who mainperned in chancery to answer for his ship or the value thereof if it should be adjudged to the king, the king ordered the mayor and bailiffs to cause the same to be delivered to him, and after ordered Robert de Assheton constable of Dovorre castle or his lieutenant to make inquisition concerning the value of the said William's ship and the gear thereof, and Peter Rede his lieutenant returned that it is appraised at 53*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* ; and now the said Juliana has petitioned for delivery thereof, shewing that ship and gear are lying in the port of Sandewich at the point of perishing if speedy remedy be not applied ; and Richard Hatfeld citizen and grocer of London and John Bradley of London grocer have mainperned in chancery under a pain of 53*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* to answer for ship and gear or for that sum, if the same shall be adjudged to the king.

Nov. 28. To the sheriff of Oxford and Berkshire for the time being. Order Westminster. to suffer Queen Anne to levy all fines, ransoms, forfeited issues, amercements and other profits in the manors of Yiftile co. Oxford, Hampstede Marschal, Swelfelde and Kerswelle and the hamlet of Godacre co. Berkes and the fees thereof, and of the men and tenants of the same from the death of the king's aunt Isabel countess of Bedford, and therein to enjoy the liberties and privileges granted her by the king, delivering to her bailiffs and ministers estreats etc., and not troubling them nor suffering them to be troubled by others, and to give notice of this command where need be within the sheriff's bailiwick ; as among other castles, manors etc. to her assigned in dower and for life, the king has assigned the premises to the queen, and has further granted that in such castles, manors etc. she shall have the return of all writs etc. (*as above, pp. 328, 329*).

Nov. 16. To all sheriffs, mayors, bailiffs and other ministers of the king to Westminster. whom etc. Order to arrest Walter Leuenant and all who maintain, counsel, aid, abet and favour him, and by mainprise, replevin or bail to cause them to come before the king and council, to answer etc. ; as in the late king's parliament at Westminster provision and order was made that all who in the court of Rome obtained dignities, offices, hospitals or benefices in the gift of the late king or other lay patron

of the realm, all who should there obtain any such dignities etc. [now occupied*] by any persons of the realm by reasonable titles, in case such provisions were not executed before the octaves of St. Hilary 38 Edward III, and all who should there obtain such benefices to the prejudice of the late king or his subjects in their persons, heritages, possessions, rights or goods, or of the laws, customs and liberties of the realm and crown, with all who should knowingly maintain etc. them, should at the suit of the king and of a party finding security to prosecute be by the sheriffs etc. arrested etc. as aforesaid, and if convicted should have the pain contained in the statute of 25 Edward III; and upon information that, although the church of Radeclive upon Sore was of the lay patronage of John Wynewyk, although in his life time the same was void, and Henry de Blacbourne was at his presentation admitted, instituted and inducted and held the same no small time, although the church was after void by resignation of the said Henry, and by the said John's death was at the gift of Richard de Wynewyk his brother and heir, and although he presented William Julyan, who was admitted etc. and peaceably held the same, the said Walter being not without knowledge of the patrons' right, averring in the court of Rome that the said church was void and pertained to the pope's provision, which it did not being of lay patronage, has procured a provision thereof in his own favour, and by colour thereof processes in the court christian and personal citations against the said William to appear without the realm in contempt of the king, although the right of lay patronage ought to be determined within the realm by the king's court and nowhere else; and the king by writ ordered the sheriff of Notyngnam at Radeclif upon Sore to warn the said Walter to be before the justices at Westminster in the octaves of St. Hilary 5 Richard II to answer to the king for his contempt and to the said Richard for damages, and he was after convicted before them, and put out of the king's protection, as appears by the record and process of the cause, which the king has caused to come before him in chancery.

To John Tyndale escheator in Norhamptonshire. Like order concerning the advowson of Corby church ; as the king has learned etc. that the same was held in dower by Elizabeth wife of the said William the elder, and that it is held in chief by knight service as parcel of the manor of Corby.

July 13. To the chancellor and treasurer of Ireland for the time being. Order
Westminster. to suffer Master Henry Bowet the king's clerk, advocate in the court of Rome and dean of the cathedral church of Dublin, so long as he shall be with the king and with the bishop of Norwich upon the king's service, by himself and his proctors to have all fruits, profits and advantages of the deanery since 10 February 6 Richard II as fully as if he were in residence, notwithstanding any statute or ordinance made in parliament that two thirds of the fruits of benefices in Ireland whereof those beneficed are out of Ireland shall be levied to the king's use in aid of the war there, releasing any distress made upon the said fruits by reason of the said dean's absence ; as in consideration of his good service in suing often for the king's business in the court of Rome, to the intent that thenceforth he should be with the king to prosecute those things wherewith the king shall charge him, and for good service to the said bishop then sailing over sea in the service of God and the king against the king's enemies, on the aforesaid date at the instance and prayer of the bishop the king granted that the dean should have the fruits etc. as aforesaid ; and now the king is fully informed that he is in the court of Rome as well for divers business wherewith the king has charged him as in the service of the said bishop.

June 26. To the warden of the Flete prison or his representative there. Order
Westminster. by mainprise of William de Brantyngham and Peter Bryan of the county of Suthampton to set free William de Upton, otherwise called William Hikeboy ; as Richard earl of Arundell and Guy Bryan knight were lately bound to the king by a recognisance made in chancery in 40*l.*, under a condition that Elizabeth who was wife of Edward le Despenser should deliver the prisoner, being his neif, to Thomas son and heir of her husband when he should come of age ; and for that the earl delivered the said prisoner to the king, and he is kept in the Flete prison during the king's will, at the prayer of the earl of Notyngham the king after discharged the earl of Arundell of that recognisance ; and the said William de Brantyngham and Peter have mainperned in chancery under a pain of 100 marks to have the prisoner in chancery at Martinmas next or give him up to that prison again, and that in the mean time he shall make no suit by law or otherwise that may tend to the prejudice of the said Thomas, save only by petition to the king and council.

Mainprise in chancery under a pain of 100 marks, dated the octaves of St. Martin this year and made by John Weston and John Colyngborne, to have him in chancery on the morrow of the Purification next, or to give him up to prison, and that he shall perform all things in the above writ contained.

Memorandum (*in margin*) of a mainprise in chancery under a pain of 100 marks, dated 12 March this year and made by John Weston and Nicholas Sale, to have the said William in chancery on the morrow of Ascension day next or give him up to prison, as in the above writ.

July 13. To the sheriffs of London. Order to dearrest and set free Stephen Westminster. Rauncelet, Hanekin Balouns, Francis de Castelnef and Bartholomew Gaucer of the lordship of Aquitaine and divers goods and merchandise in a ship of France arrested with them, suffering them to go whither they please, notwithstanding the king's command to arrest in name of reprisal and safe keep until further order certain ships of France which are in the port of London with the masters and seamen and all goods therein, by virtue whereof the said Stephen etc. were arrested; as that order was made upon learning that a ship laded at York with divers goods of the king's clerk Master Walter de Skirlowe keeper of the privy seal and other lieges of the price or value of 1,000*l.* was on the voyage to London in time of the present truce with France taken at sea off Great Jernemuth by a barge of Deepe in Normandy and brought to Deepe with the said goods and the seamen, and is there detained; but the said Stephen etc. are of the king's said lordship, and have paid him freight for their goods, as the treasurer has witnessed in chancery.

July 6. To Thomas Graa escheator in Yorkshire. Order to remove the Westminster. king's hand and meddle no further with divers lands etc. and a rent in the city of York, in Fishergate in the suburb thereof, and in Skirpenbek, delivering to the abbot of Whitby any issues thereof taken; as the king lately ordered the escheator to certify in chancery the manner and cause of taking into the king's hand lands of the abbot in that bailiwick, and he certified that he found by inquisition, before him taken of his office, that King Henry I gave the said lands and rent in York and Fishergate to the abbot and convent and to their successors, upon condition that every day and year they should find three monks chaplains to celebrate etc. in Allhallows church Fishergate for the said king, for his soul after death, the souls of his forefathers and heirs and of the faithful departed, and other works of piety and daily and yearly alms, that those services etc. are withdrawn and for twenty years past and more are turned to secular uses, that Anfridus de Chaunceys gave divers lands, meadows etc. in Skirpenbek to the abbot and convent and to their successors to augment the maintenance of those three monks, to celebrate for the souls of the grantor and his ancestors and for the souls aforesaid, that those services are altogether withdrawn, and that the premises in Skirpenbek were by him held in chief by knight service, certifying that therefore he took all the premises into the king's hand; and after deliberation with the justices, the king's serjeants and others of the council learned in the law, the king is aware that the premises ought not to have been so seized, although the said services ought to have been performed.

July 26. To William Cursoun of Billyngford escheator in Norfolk. Order Westminster. to give Stephen de Feltham livery of a messuage and 160 acres of land in Great Massyngham and the advowson of the church of Allhallows there, saving his relief if due; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that the premises came to the late king's hands by

death of Thomas de Feltham, tenant by knight service of the heir of Adam de Clifton tenant in chief, and by reason of the nonage of John son and heir of Thomas, which John died within age in the king's wardship, and that the said Stephen, being brother of Thomas, is cousin and heir of the said John and of full age; and on 27 October 48 Edward III the age of the said Adam's heir was proved, and the late king took his homage and fealty, and commanded livery to be given him of his father's lands.

July 24. To John Pokeswelle escheator in Somerset. Order to assign to Westminster. Elizabeth late the wife of James le Botiller earl of Ormond dower of a moiety of the manor of Brene; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that the earl was sometime seised of that moiety, and long before his death demised the same for life to Robert de Assheton now deceased; and by another inquisition it is found that the grant thereof was made after he espoused the said Elizabeth; and for a fine by her paid in the hanaper the king has pardoned her trespass in marrying Robert de Hereford knight without the king's licence.

July 6. To John Gawayn escheator in the county of Suthampton. Order Arundel castle. to give Andrew Wauton and Elizabeth his wife livery of the manor of Henton Daubenay with the issues thereof taken; as the king has learned by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that Ellis Daubenay at his death held that manor for life with reversion to Elizabeth Giffard and her heirs, by grant to her made with the king's licence by John Brounyng, and that the same is held in chief by knight service; and by reason of issue between them begotten the king has taken the homage and fealty of the said Andrew, who has taken the said Elizabeth to wife. By letter of the signet.

July 10. To the sheriff of York. Order upon his allegiance under pain of Worth manor. forfeiture to dearrest and deliver to John de Halsham and Philippa Dartheles his wife certain goods and chattels of theirs arrested in Dancastre it is said. By letter of the signet.

July 25. To David Haunemere, Peter de la Mare and William Wasteney, Westminster. justices appointed to take an assize of novel disseisin arraigned by Roger son of Robert Pertrich, Philip de Dokelton and John de Drayton against Hugh Wynchestre and John Somenour concerning tenements in Temedebury. Order that, if they may not all be present, two of them shall proceed to take that assize, the said David being one.

Vacated, because otherwise on the dorse of the Patent Roll for this year.

July 26. To the sheriff of Sussex. Order to set free Edward Dalyngrugge Westminster. knight, imprisoned for certain evildoings of which he was convicted before the justices of oyer and terminer in Sussex it is said, suffering him to go at large until further order. By K.

July 23. To the bailiffs of Norwich for the time being. Order to pay to Westminster. George de Felbrigge the king's esquire 40*l.* a year and the arrears

since 18 July last, on which date the king granted him 40*l.* a year for life of the farms and issues of that city, any other charge by the king or his officers heretofore or hereafter made thereupon notwithstanding.

July 24. To the sheriff of York. Order to cause a verderer of the forest of Westminster. Galtres to be elected instead of Thomas de Etton, who is dead.

July 23. To the sheriffs and coroners of London. Order to proceed to Westminster. rendering of judgment in an assize of fresh force arraigned in the court of London without the king's writ by John Woderoue perpetual chaplain of the free chapel of St. Mary Watton atte Stone against Thomas de Sancto Edmundo and Isabel his wife concerning his freehold in the parish of St. Swithun London, namely 5 marks of rent there, notwithstanding the allegation of the said Thomas that he was sole tenant of a garden which is parcel of the tenements put in view, whereof the plaintiff avers that that rent arises, that by process in chancery the late king recovered a tenter ground in the said parish, sometime of Robert Aguyloun knight and now the said garden, against the said Thomas and Idonea late his wife (now deceased) for that it was put to mortmain without his licence, that the said king granted that ground or garden to the said Thomas and Idonea for life, rendering 10*s.* a year at the exchequer, and that without the king he might not answer, craving the king's aid, and notwithstanding the king's writ ordering the sheriffs and coroners to proceed in that plea, so that they should not proceed to rendering of judgment without advising the king; as by complaint made on behalf of the plaintiff it is shewn that they have deferred to proceed, although an inquisition is taken concerning the truth of the premises.

July 1. To Thomas earl of Bukyngham the constable, Thomas de Holand Westminster. earl of Kent marshal of England and their representatives. Order to do justice to John Wawe esquire and John Waldeshof, executing that which concerns their jurisdiction, notwithstanding the appeal made by John Wawe to the king and council, and the king's commissions to Richard Lescrope knight, Guy de Bryan, Master Thomas de Stowe and Master John Blanchard deceased to take knowledge and proceed in that appeal and to hear and determine the same, and to John de Cobeham of Kent, William Walleworth, Master Thomas de Baketon and John Philipot knight deceased joining them with those commissioners; as the appeal was from a sentence of John Harleston, pretended commissary and representative of the constable, in a plea that John Wawe was security and debtor of John Waldshof for 1,000 *motouns du roy* or 200*l.* for acquittance out of prison of Thomas Hussell esquire for Charles de Chastelon then alleged prisoner of John Waldshof; and at suit of John Waldshof, averring that John Wawe took no heed to prosecute his appeal, but by colour thereof hindered the execution of the said sentence and commissions, the king commanded the said John de Cobeham, William, Thomas and Thomas to certify in chancery with what diligence the parties prosecuted their cause, and which of them was remiss therein, and by certificate of the said Thomas and Thomas the king has learned that at the instance of the parties the said Guy and Thomas Stowe

pronounced in favour of the appeal and of their jurisdiction, decreeing for producing the process at 22 February, that since that decree John Wawe has taken no heed to proceed so far as they know, but John Waldshef has of their particular knowledge given all diligence, many times instantly requiring them to make an end of the cause; and it seems therefore to the king that the appeal was not made in good faith, and the king reckons the same frivolous and abandoned on the merits thereof. The king has issued a writ of *supersedeas omnino* to the surviving commissioners.

July 15. To the treasurer and the barons of the exchequer of Ireland. Order
Westminster. to suffer John Bernalby esquire of the king's household to have the keeping of Dublin castle with the offices of gaoler and janitor thereof, which at Christmas 6 Richard II the king granted him with all fees, wages and profits thereto pertaining, so that he should abide there continually, and on 22 June 7 Richard II for his good service since the coronation the king granted him those offices, fees etc. for life as freely as the last keeper had them, the former grant notwithstanding; and Robert Dyngeley and Richard Gascoigne have mainperned in chancery that he shall truly keep the castle, delivering it to no man but the king and his heirs.

July 28. To Simon de Burele constable of Dovorre castle and warden of
Westminster. the Cinque Ports, or to his lieutenant. Order, upon petition of Ulrik Boweman merchant and fellow of the Hanse of Almain, to hear his plaint and information, to make inquisition and take information, to arrest all those who shall be found guilty of taking and carrying away his goods, and to keep them in prison in safe custody until they shall make restitution or content him of the value thereof and his damages; as he has shewn the king that a ship called '*la Cristofre*' of Stralissounde by him laded with victuals, arms, armour and other merchandise touched at the port of Eland by Berewic upon Tweed, that John More of Sandewich, John Sket of Hastynges master of the balynger of Hastynges, Walter Yonge master of the balynger of Wynchelsee, John More master of the balynger of the Rye, John Yonge master of the passage of Hethe, Simon Martyn of Dovorre, Roger Yonge of Hethe and other merchants and seamen of England by force of arms entered the said ship, and took and carried away gold in coined money, victuals, arms, armour etc. therein, and are withholding them, taking no heed to make restitution or content him for the same, though he has long sued for it, wherefore he prayed for remedy against the said John etc., who are now within the liberty of the Cinque Ports as he says.

July 12. To Robert Tresylyan and David Hanemere, justices appointed to
Westminster. hold pleas before the king. Order by writ of *nisi prius* to command an inquisition which remains to be taken between the king and John Rouland clerk, Thomas Charleton, John Grove, William Cosseby clerk and William Corveyser concerning a messuage, 160 acres of land, 30 acres of wood, 8 acres of meadow and 2s. of rent in Childernelangley co. Hertford, and 10 acres of land and 2 acres of wood in Hemelhampstede, to be taken before one of the justices.

July 20. To the coroners of the city of London. Order to direct the mayor
Westminster. and aldermen for the time being, and other persons to the number of

forty of the ablest men of the city who have had the estate of ruling the same and were held worthy so to do, to be before the king at the manor of Shene on this instant Sunday in order to hear and to do what shall then be laid before them. By K.

July 17. To the bailiffs and true men of Colcestre for the time being. Writ Westminister. *de intendendo* in favour of Robert earl of Oxford, and order to pay him every year the fee farm of the town; as the king has given him for life the town and castle of Colcestre with the hundred of Tendryng to the castle pertaining, the fee farm which the bailiffs and burgesses pay, or used to pay, to the king, and all liberties, profits etc. as fully as the king or the late king had or ought to have had the same in times past.

Order by mainprise of John Prestecote, Robert Hille the younger, Richard Bozoun, William Burleston and Thomas Reymound of Devon to deliver to them on bail John Sampson of Plymmuth imprisoned in the Tower prison at the king's command; as they have mainperned body for body and under a pain of 2,000*l.* that he shall be ready in the king's court day by day until Saturday after St. Swithun next to answer what shall be laid against him, and to do and receive what shall be by the council appointed, and shall return that day to prison there to abide at the king's will, unless other provision shall first be made him of the king's favour. To the justices of the Bench. Order, upon petition of the plaintiff, if it is pleaded to judgment in a cause between the prior of St. Andrew Norhampton and John Baukewelle parson of Little Billynge for render of 100*s.* arrears of a yearly rent of 20*s.* due to the prior as he says, to proceed to rendering of judgment, notwithstanding the defendant's allegation that he holds the said church by presentation of the king by reason of that priory being in the king's hand because of the war with France, that he found it discharged of the said rent, and that he may not charge or discharge the church without the king and the said prior, being the patron, and the bishop of Lincoln, being the ordinary, craving the king's aid, and notwithstanding the king's command to proceed in that cause the said allegation notwithstanding, so that they should not proceed to rendering of judgment without advising the king.

Oct. 3. To the sheriff of Norhampton. Order at his peril not to meddle Westminister. until further order in the return of a writ directing the sheriff to cause twelve men of the venue of Norhampton and Wendelyngburgh, each of them having at least 100*s.* a year of land or rent, to come before the justices at Westminster in the quinzaine of Michaelmas next, not being of affinity either with Robert Wendelyngburgh of Norhampton or with John abbót of Croulond and Robert Danyot, in order to give a verdict whether Robert Wendelyngburgh is a neif of the abbot belonging to his manor of Wendelyngburgh, and whether the abbot is seised of him in right of his church of St. Cutlac Croulond, or whether

Order to arrest John Auberd, Thomas Barbour of Seint Poule Lions, John his son, Henry Jakes, John Polard, John Seint Denys, Hamon le Gentil, John Kaynard, Salomon Kaynard, John Senaunt, John Fitz Ivonet, and other evildoers of Brittany to be named upon oath by the complainants, their ships and merchandise whenever and wherever found within the admiral's jurisdiction, to summon such as should be summoned, hear arguments on either side, and from time to time to do justice to the complainants; as by complaint of John Haulegh, Thomas Aisshenden, Thomas Haulegh, Richard Clerk, Richard Herri and Mark Fitz Mark merchants of Dertemuth the king has learned that lately in time of truce, trusting in safe guards of John duke of Brittany lord of Clisson late constable of France and of John Fou captain of Morleys in Brittany, they freighted two ships called '*la Marie*' and '*la Trinite*' of Dertemuth with merchandise to the value of 300*l.*, and touched at Barspal in Brittany to sell the same, that the men above named and other evildoers of Brittany by armed power with the strong hand entered those ships and, notwithstanding the truce and the said safe guards shewn them, took and carried away the said merchandise and all other goods therein, tore up the safe guards and threw them into the sea, brought the ships to Morleys, and there beat the complainants, the shipmasters, seamen and servants, and put them to ransom, and that although many times not without great travail and cost they have sued with the said duke and other lords and captains of those parts for restitution of their goods and reformation of their wrongs, they can obtain no justice, praying the king for remedy.

Westminster. within Wyndesore castle. Westminster. to suffer Thomas now bishop of Ely, the monks of St. Etheldred and all the men of their demesnes to enjoy the liberties hereinafter mentioned, as they ought to do, and as they and their predecessors used ever heretofore to do; as among other liberties granted by charters of former kings to the church of St. Etheldred, William late [bishop] elect and the monks there, and confirmed by the king, it is granted that the said church and men shall be quit in all the king's land of toll upon selling and buying, of passage, geld, danegeld and forfeiture of shires and hundreds, which liberties they have enjoyed since the date of that charter it is said.

July 12. To the sheriff of Devon. Order where required by the king's tanners
Westminster. in Devon to cause proclamation to be made of the grants made to them by charter of King Edward I, and of the confirmation and declaration by charters of King Edward II and the late king, causing the same so far as in him lies to be observed, and that no man at his peril under pain of forfeiture shall hinder or disturb the said tanners from digging tin and turf without malice to any upon the lands, moors and wastes of the king and of others whatsoever, and enjoying other the liberties and quittances to them so granted; as among other liberties etc. to them granted by the said charter, it is granted that all such tanners working in stannaries which were the king's demesne shall while there working be quit of pleas of neifty and all pleas and plaints which concern the king's court, so that they shall not answer before any justices or ministers of the king upon any plea within the stannaries arising save before the warden of the stannaries for the time being, except pleas of land or of life and limb, nor shall they leave their works by summons of any of the king's ministers save the said warden, that they shall be quit of all tallages, tolls, stallages, aids and customs whatsoever upon their own goods in towns, ports, fairs and markets in Devon, that they may dig tin and turf for smelting (*findendum*) tin everywhere upon the lands, moors and wastes of the king and others in Devon, diverting waters and watercourses to the works when need be, and may buy brushwood for smelting as used to be done of old time without let of the king or of bishops, abbots, priors earls, barons or others, that the said warden or his representative shall hold all pleas of trespass, plaint and contract made in working places which shall arise between tanners, or between them and foreigners, and shall have power to judge the said tanners and foreigners, doing justice to the parties, as was heretofore used therein,

and any tinner committing a fault for which he ought to be imprisoned shall be by the warden arrested and detained in Lydeforde prison and nowhere else, that if any tinner shall put himself upon an inquisition of the country touching any deed in Devon not concerning the stannaries, half the jury shall be of tanners and half of foreigners, and concerning a deed wholly concerning the stannaries the inquisition shall be as heretofore, and if he shall be a fugitive or outlaw, or shall commit a fault for which he ought to lose his chattels, the same shall be appraised by the said warden and the coroner, and delivered to the nearest townships to answer for them to the king before the justices in eyre in Devon, that all tin in Devon, white and black, wherever found and worked shall, under pain of forfeiture of it all, be weighed at Tavystoke, Asperton or Chaggeford by the king's weights appointed and sealed for the purpose, and shall under that pain be stamped in those towns before Michaelmas every year in the warden's presence; and that all tanners may lawfully sell all tin so weighed to any who will there buy, performing stampage and other customs due to the king, unless the king will buy it; and the late king after declared by letters patent that the words working in the stannaries and while they work there shall be understood of workmen travailling therein without covin, and not of others or of them travailling elsewhere; and as to the article that the warden or his representative shall hold all pleas arising between the tanners, that jurisdiction extends over places where workmen work and not elsewhere or otherwise; and the king is aware of great advantage that his forefathers used to take of those stannaries, and of the harm to him daily arising by malice of certain men going about to infringe the liberties and privileges of the tanners.

Order to deliver to John Elyngham serjeant at arms Richard Norbury 'mercier' and John Norhampton 'draper,' convicted of divers treasons etc. on Monday last before the justices appointed to deliver the Tower prison of them and of John More 'mercier,' to be brought to places by the king and council appointed, and there kept in safe custody until further order. Westminster. king's hand and meddle no further with one carucate of land in Hokebere and divers other lands in Dorset taken into the king's hand by death of Robert de Assheton knight, delivering up any issues thereof taken; as it was found by inquisition, taken by the escheator, that the said Robert at his death held those lands of others than the king, and that Ralph Cheyne and Maurice Russell were his next heirs and of full age; and petition was after made on behalf of John Weston of Inste and Margaret his wife and of John Tesaunt for livery of the premises, shewing that by other inquisitions it was found that the said Margaret, being one of the daughters of Isabel sister of Robert father

of the deceased, and John Tesaunt, being son of Stephen son of Joan the other daughter of the said Isabel, are cousins and next heirs of the deceased and of full age; and the king ordered the sheriff to give notice to the said Ralph and Maurice to be in chancery at a day past to shew cause wherefore such livery ought not to be given, and they came not, wherefore it was determined that the king's hand should be removed, and livery should be given as aforesaid.

purprestures made in forests, parks, chaces etc. in the times of former kings and of the king or hereafter to be made, and fines for entry thereof, courts, views of frankpledge, hundreds, wapentakes, 'wrek' and 'wayf,' royalties and free customs to the same pertaining, granting that she shall have for life all fines etc. of men and tenants in the said lands etc. and in the fees thereof, and all that the king might have of the year and a day, waste, forfeitures and murders in any courts of the king made and adjudged, as well before the king and in chancery as before the treasurer and the barons of the exchequer, justices in eyre for common pleas and pleas of the forest, justices of the Bench, the steward and marshals of the household, the clerk of the market, and other his justices and ministers whatsoever, as fully as if the premises were kept in the king's hand, so that she may levy and take the same by her bailiffs and ministers by estreats of such justices in their eyres, of the steward, marshals and clerk in their sessions, and by estreats of the exchequer to the said ministers delivered by the sheriffs in whose bailiwicks such lands etc. are, without let of the king, his bailiffs or ministers; and that in the said lands etc. and in the fees thereof she shall have the chattels of felons and fugitives, so that if any of her men and tenants or others therein ought to lose (*admittere*) life or limb for his misdeed, or become a fugitive and will not abide judgment, wherever justice ought to be done in the king's court or any other, such chattels shall be hers, and it shall be lawful to put her in seisin thereof without let of the king, his sheriffs or other bailiffs or ministers; also that in the said lands etc. she shall have the return of all writs of the king, the summons of all estreats and orders of the exchequer, and orders and estreats of justices in eyre and other justices whatsoever, and the execution of writs of summons of estreats and orders, to be by her bailiffs etc. made, so that no sheriff or minister of the king shall enter the premises to execute the same save upon default of her or her bailiffs, and by writs of the king she shall have justices in eyre whom she shall nominate for pleas of the forest when need be in all her forests, and all fines etc. and other profits of such eyres arising for trespasses of vert and venison, misdeeds and other causes, taking the same by her bailiffs and ministers by delivery to them of estreats of such justices, and fines etc. and profits of such as be not of or in her lands etc. she shall take at the exchequer by the hands of the sheriffs and bailiffs of liberties, as the king should do if the same pertained to him; and if sheriffs and bailiffs of liberties, hundreds, wapentakes and trithings shall be remiss in executions for her, whereby they shall be amerced or fined in the exchequer or other courts, such fines and amercements shall be hers.

To John Holt and William Thirnyng justices of assize in Norffolk. Order to proceed in the assize (*above mentioned*), notwithstanding a writ of *supersedeas omnino* to them addressed. By C.

their certificate sent into chancery the king after learned that the said merchants of France have there the ship and goods aforesaid.

April 28. To William la Zouche of Haryngworth knight, etc., appointed Westminster. at the complaint of Thomas Yool etc. Writ of *supersedeas omnino* (as above, p. 636).

May 6. To the sheriffs of London. Writ of *supersedeas omnino* in respect Westminster. of executing the king's late writ ordering them, upon an information that he purposed to depart to foreign parts in order to prosecute many things to the prejudice of the king and many of the people, to compel Thomas Pycot clerk to find mainperners, and if he should refuse to commit him to Newgate prison; and order by mainprise of John Inge, John Salesbury, Thomas Ecton and John Cammes of London to set free the said clerk if taken.

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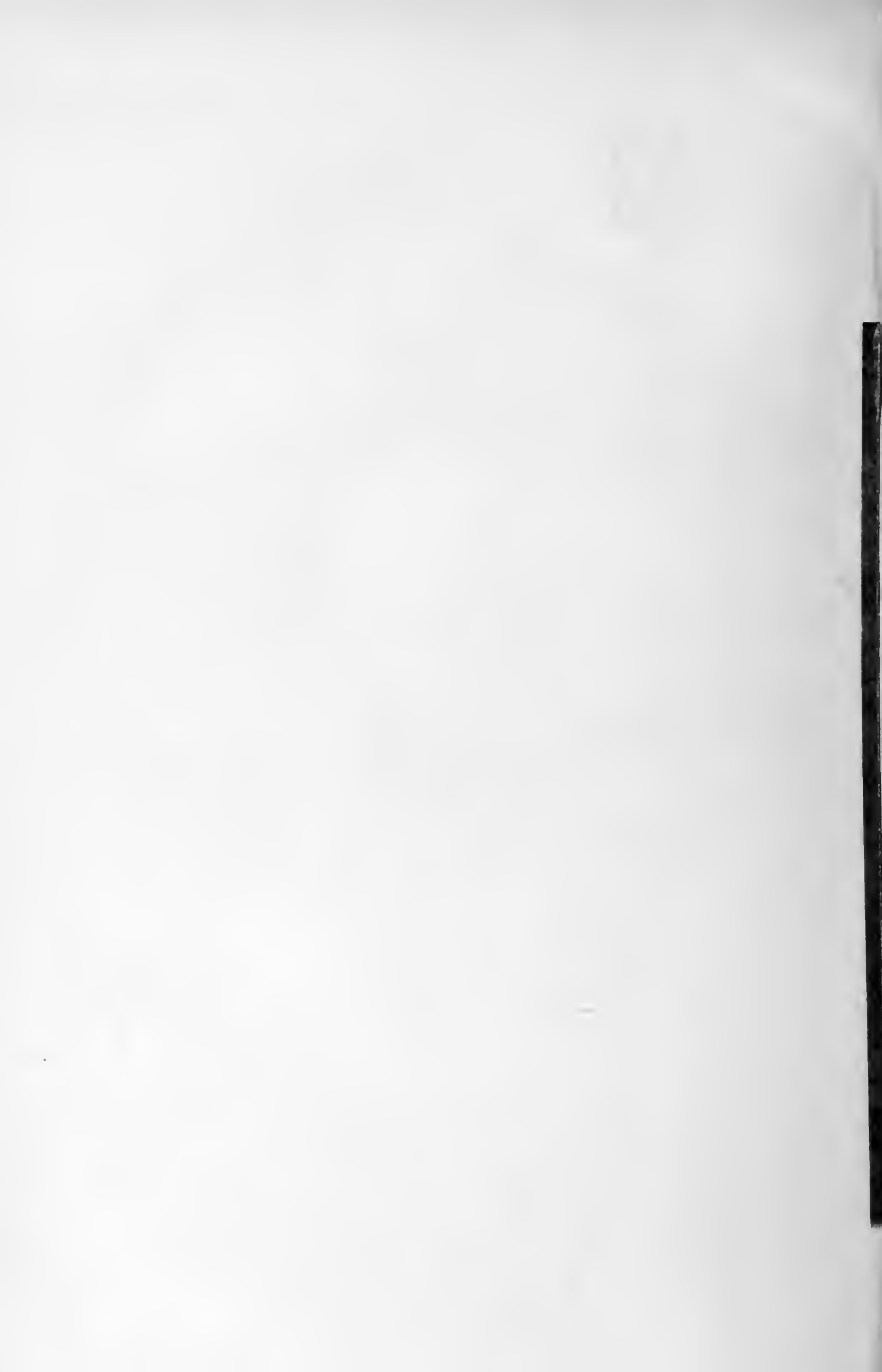
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
