

In presenting to our Members together with this first Volume of our publications my Statement of Accounts and Report of Proceedings, I may be allowed to congratulate our Society upon its prospects, and since all the

preliminary correspondence has passed through my hands, to add my thanks to many kind friends for their general expressions of sympathy with our objects, as well as for suggestions, offers of clerical assistance, loan of MSS., &c., in addition to their subscriptions.

Volunteer labour is indeed essential to our project. We cannot expect to obtain by subscription sufficient funds to offer remuneration in any degree adequate to the skilled labour involved in preparing for the press and editing such materials as those we have to deal with. It was stated in our first circular, that we could not undertake any printing until we were assured of an income of at least £100 a year. As will be seen in the Balance Sheet, our income (exclusive of donations to a general fund) for the year 1886 was rather more than this, and we may fairly hope for a still larger increase of support now that we have entered upon the visibly productive period of our life.

We have been very fortunate in being able to present to our Subscribers as our first publication, Bp Hobhouse's edition of Bp Drokensford's Register. The earlier Episcopal Registers are full of information and illustrations of mediæval life, both ecclesiastical and civil. It is a mine of wealth which has hitherto been scarcely worked at all, and it is much to be hoped that we may by the kind assistance of friends be able to continue a series now so happily begun. For a description of these Registers I would refer to Bp Hobhouse's preface.

For the present year we propose to publish an account of all the Chantries of the County from the report made upon them at the time of their dissolution, together with their foundations. This, which is the work of Mr. E. Green, is now in the press.

We have also in preparation: "Kirkby's Quest," by Mr. F. H. Dickinson; the "Cartularies of Bruton Abbey and Montacute Priory," by Mr. J. Batten; the "Cartulary of the Hungerford Family"; and we look forward to the publication of "Pedes Finium," "Subsidy Rolls," "Cartularies and Custumaries of Bath and Glastonbury Abbeys," &c., &c.

As Secretary of the Society, I shall be glad to receive any information, suggestions, and offers of assistance, and also to admit new Members.

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Editor+s Motes on the Register.



THIS Volume, the earliest now extant in the Diocesan Registry, is made up of various registers, irregularly kept, and bound up by a most ignorant hand, disregarding dates and subjects. The paging has been made subsequently to the binding, and intended as consecutive, though imperfect. Ancient quotations having been made from this paging, it must be retained. It rules the present calendar.

The Bp being always on the move, and *very* rarely at headquarters, had no central Registrar, perhaps no Registry Office. Entries of his various acts were made by chaplains in his retinue, and transcribed at leisure, or the original parchment *quaternus* sent up to Wells for custody. Ordination lists were certainly registered, for persons sought and got certificates from them (p. 162), but these have perished. Bp D., in 1310, had to recover his two predecessors' registers from their executors by threats (p. 38).

The same handwriting seldom prevails through many entries, nor the same form of entry: e.g., in Institutions the Patron's name is sometimes entered, sometimes not. In the dates, sometimes the Roman Calendar is used for the days of the month, sometimes the civil; sometimes the regnal year, sometimes the Bp's consecration-year.

The rules followed in this Calendar are :-

- I. To reduce the dates to our modern forms, where *close* accuracy is needed for understanding the entries.
- 2. To express the double year, e.g., 1312–3, during January, February, to March 25, 1313, New Style.
- 3. To leave the original headings in original wording and spelling giving the modern name, if ascertainable, in the text; thus identifying the places concerned, without losing the ancient forms of name.

- 4. To avoid repetition. To this end, whatever names occur in the margin (which must therefore be read *first*) are referred to in the text by initials.
- 5. To express the important names and subject of each document in old English type by way of eye-catch to help search.

The following Abbreviations have been made:-

Litt. dim. = Letters dimissory, *i.e.*, Bishop's writs, empowering the bearer to seek ordination from another Bishop.

Ind. = Induction.

Inst. = Institution or instituted.

Bp. = The Bp of Bath and Wells of the day.

D. and C. = Dean and Chapter of Wells.

R. D. = Rural Deans—who are often called simply Deans or Deans of their Rural Deanery, or (more puzzling still)

Deans of the benefice they happened to hold, e.g., Dean of Yarlington.

Canon. = Canon of Wells.

Cath. = Cathedral of Wells, not Bath.

Pat. = Patron.
Pr. = Presbyter.
P. = Parson.

The Appendix contains an explanation of terms, and some chronological helps.

The Editor must here express his regrets for the shortcomings of his work. During its progress the weakening of eyesight, and of other faculties, have often counselled him to give up an undertaking more fitted for the fifth than the eighth decade of life; but as the work could not be done save by a resident in Wells, he has persevered, but not without some retrenchment of labour. This retrenchment has been effected by omitting, after a certain date, he Royal writs for collection of clerical subsidies, and the licenses for study; and further by curtailing annotations, which he intended to serve as helps to the future history of his native county, a history for which the Somerset Record Society is designed to gather material.

Whatever the omissions, he is able to warrant that he has read through every entry (as far as legible) of which he offers an abstract, and that the abstract presents the pith of the entry to the best of his judgment.

[•] These entries may perhaps contain a few crumbs of interest, but they must be few.

Preface.

THE aim of this publication is not biography, but the contribution to history of such facts as lie embedded in the 306 folios of Bp Drokensford's Register of his administrative acts.

The contents of his Register are however so fragmentary and unarranged, both in subject and in date, that it will be needful to present to the reader some few facts of the Bp's history and mode of life and administration, for the better understanding of the brief and detached entries which constitute the volume.

Bishop John took his name from Drokensford in South Hants, now called Droxford, the son probably of its squire. He rose to be, by what steps we know not, one of the Lawyer-Statesman class of Bishop, who commended themselves to the service of the Crown by their business habits, and had generally acquired wealth by legal practice or civil service, rewarded usually by lavish Crown preferment, before their elevation to the Episcopate. Their administrative character was moulded by their antecedents. They were business-like, forensic, keen for the exercise of coercive jurisdiction, and trusting more to that external power, than to the more patient methods which sway man through the conscience and affections. Our Bp shows all the tokens of his previous training; but they were balanced by a natural character which was evidenced in acts of kindly consideration and bounty, and in the candid retraction of hasty and harsh proceedings.

To come to what bears more closely upon his Register and its confused constituents, the Bp was always on the move.

Whilst employed about Court, he was chiefly at West Greenwich, Stockwell, or at his official house in the Strand. He was not enthroned till over a twelve-month after his Consecration. It was four years before he felt settled enough to regulate his eleemosynary doles (see p. 161), which required local knowledge.

The list of his various abodes (see Appendix) will show what a moving life he led. At least sixteen official houses were kept in readiness for the occupation of a retinue. At all of these he did business, and dated documents every year; in this respect not differing from his mitred brethren, but he surpassed them in the number of his private residences, which were manors acquired during his civil service, either by gifts of wardship, or by other means open to a monied man. His dates show that he kept yearly residence on his manors in Hants and Surrey, and the attestations of the charters there executed show that his moving retinue was numerous.

His industry surmounted the difficulties of a restless and out-of-door life. He despatched an amazing amount of business. On each manor he exercised a personal oversight, and moreover kept in his own hand the threads of all correspondence, the carriers of which had to follow him from place to place. Wells was not used by him, or by any set of diocesan officers as headquarters, save that the Dean and Chapter furnished him skilled commissaries for his varied commissions. Bath was not a centre of diocesan action. There is no proof of the Bp residing there at all. Claverton and perhaps Bathampton afforded manor houses for his brief sojournings in that quarter. In his later years, after his court connexion was broken, Wyveliscombe was his favourite haunt. I subjoin in footnote^a some facts illustrative of his life, and proceed to a sketch of the official system to which his register refers.

Preface.

The Bp in relation to his Diocese and Officers.

His visiting staff consisted of the three Archdeacons of Wells, Bath, and Taunton, as now, save that the area visited by the Cathedral Clergy and by the Abbot of Glastonbury is now embraced in the ancient Archdeaconries. The Bp appointed the Archdeacons, and employed them or their officials (for much of their work was done by these deputies) largely in his varied commissions. The Archdeacon's Court had by this time acquired a substantive and original jurisdiction, wielded by its own judge (the official), but subject to appeal to the Bp, and to his suspension by inhibition—and also to his right specially reserved of exercising correction in cases coming to his cognizance whilst "in transitu" through the diocese.

Under the Archdeacons were the Deans of the 12 Deaneries, elected by the Incumbents (p. 286), and sworn at the Visitation Court to obedience to the Archdeacon. The Deans had power to cite all incumbents to their chapter, which was the only form of synod (save the Visitation Courts) cited by Bp D. It was used for inquiry into facts (corresponding to the Hundred-Court inquisitions in the civil system), for levying subsidies, including Peter-pence, for promulgating decrees and censures, and for other disciplinary purposes, but whether for consultation does not appear.

The Diocesan Synod is not mentioned. The Tenth of benefices levied for the canonization of Bp March (p. 273) was granted in Decanal chapters, and enforced on defaulters by Episcopal censures (p. 297).

The chief officer for the execution of coercive discipline was the Official, i.e., the Judge of the Consistory Court. He was not called, as now, the Chancellor, or official principal, for he seems to have had no compeers. He was not, as now, Vicar-General. Bp D. did not employ such an officer. The Official was appointed, like the Bp's other officers, "durantebene placito." Though he had fixed "Law-days" in Wells, when the office of the Judge could be promoted by any member of the diocese, wills proved, or licences sued, most of the diocesan business was committed to him by a special commission, coupling him with other commissaries, and often requiring him to

report to Bp for further instructions, or for the Bp's own judicial action, which the Bp often exercised in person, sitting "pro tribunali," wherever he happened to be. In testamentary jurisdiction the Bp often overrode his official, proving wills or issuing orders to executors, from his manorial houses (pp. 98, 143, 147, 214), sometimes outside the diocese. He seems to have deemed himself competent to sit "pro tribunali" "judicialiter" anywhere, constituting a court (p. 132) out of his retinue, or by the presence of a Notary public, and he did not forbear from matters belonging to the "forum civile," if invoked by consenting parties. These were arbitrations, probably held for convenience of the two parties, but nevertheless the entries are worded like the acts of a coercive Court, and the Bp obtained a coercive power by laying the parties under the bond of an oath (pp. 100, 132, 263).

Probably the remembrance of the ancient episcopal function of arbitration out of which so much of the episcopal jurisdiction had grown, had not yet faded away, and it was convenient to take advantage of the Bp's accessibility for settling disputes with small delay or cost. It will be remembered that most Bishops of the day had gone through a statesman's or a forensic training, and, moreover, had able men in their retinue, skilled in legal process.

The Apparitor-General was another officer of necessity for coercive jurisdiction. He was not only the general summoner or server of citations, but he was charged to find out the existence of intestate estates, and to take immediate steps for bringing them under the Bp's administration. His office was one of great risk and labour, and must have been largely effected by subordinates, though they are not mentioned.

I must here give a place to the Commissaries, for, though they were not standing officers, but created "ad hoc," they were a very effective part of diocesan machinery.

There must have been from twenty to thirty Commissions issued yearly. The persons employed were chiefly the Dean and Canons, then the Archdeacons, their Officials, and the Bp's Official, Rural Deans, and Incumbents; now and then a Prior.

The Commissions were all revocable, and often revoked and issued afresh with new names or new powers, implying that they were drawn hastily, and perhaps imposed upon persons who lacked either the will or the leisure for such service. The commission was often one of inquiry and report only, but quite as

often it was judicial, and sometimes with the fullest judicial powers of hearing and determining, and also of execution of sentence. Commissaries were always armed with coercive power for the discharge of their commission, even if one of inquiry only. In all matters within the "jus ecclesiasticum" they seem to have been allowed by the lay courts to cite witnesses, and to put them on their oaths, though left to compel attendance by spiritual censures.^a

The Chapters must here be mentioned in their relation to the Bp and Diocese, though having, like the convents, a life of their own. Of these two Chapters, that of Bath, consisting wholly of monks, had but a slight touching-point with diocesan movement. It had a voice in the Bp's election co-ordinate with that of Wells, and its consent, equally with that of Wells, was needful for the confirmation of certain Episcopal acts purporting to bind future Bps. The Prior had a privileged seat in Diocesan Synod. Beyond this the Priory touched the Diocese only as a Landowner, Patron, and impropriate Rector. It had no peculiar jurisdiction, the Bp being its Abbot.

The Wells Chapter had a much larger tie with the Diocese. The City and Suburbs of Wells, and nearly all prebendal parishes, were exempt from the ordinary jurisdiction of Bp and Archdeacon, and placed under the Dean or some Prebendary, or Ordinary, for visitation, for correction of clergy and laity, for probate of wills, and for marriage dispensations. The Dean had his Consistory Court, Registry, Official, Registrar and Apparitor.

Bp D. made a large use of the members of the Chapter as Commissaries, and a large use of his cathedral patronage for the support of those who had been or were useful to the Bp in the exercise of his jurisdiction. The Chapter seems to have served the Diocese chiefly by supporting able assistants to the Bp. It does not appear to have been used by him as a council, as in earlier times, except in matters of property, where the Chapter consent was required to validate an Episcopal act of alienation, or appropriation, or lifehold appointment. In such cases there is mention of long discussion ("tractatus") "with our chapters" but this I conceive was carried on chiefly by the applicants for the Bp's favour, who had to offer terms to the chapters for their consent.

b An insight into these proceedings is furnished on pp. 178, 179 in the cases of High Littleton and Twerton. In the Twerton case the Chapter had remonstrated with the Bp against yielding to the covetousness of Kington Nunnery in seeking the appropriation. That the Chapters were free to refuse confirmation of the Bp's acts is quite evident—See (inter alia) the Bp's reproof of the Priory of Bath for having been too easy in confirming alienations of Episcopal property.

Looking at the rarity of the Bp's visits to Wells, at the character of the statesmen-bishops of the day, and at the fact of there being two Chapters in this diocese of co-ordinate authority, and one being a body of monks disqualified by cloister life from attaining the needful experience, it seems highly unlikely that our Bp ever used his chapters as councils on matters of policy or government. Individual members of the Wells chapter (Dean Godley included, in spite of the Jurisdiction controversy) were much in his confidence; but the corporate attitude was often defiant, especially in his first visitation, and must have prohibited the mutual confidence needful for consultation.

The Dean and Canons seem to have acknowledged freely the Bp's right to use their services and their church in diocesan matters. He cited people to his consistory "in our church of Wells," and ordered documents to be registered "in the Treasurya of our church" (p. 180).

The Bath monks were not used—probably were not useful—for diocesan purposes. The whole Institution seems to have been languishing from the loss of its resident head, who was both Bp and Abbot. It resisted our Bp's first visitation, litigated with him over the appropriation of Bathampton Rectory, then made peace, and received from him an increase of revenue through the appropriation of the rectories of Bathwick (p. 179), Corston (p. 195), and St. Mary Stalls, with Lyncombe (p. 212), but there are continual evidences of the Bp's distrust of the administration of the Priory, e.g., a grave and dignified rebuke of Prior Robert's wastefulness in 1321 (p. 193) (see also p. 196), and the frequent displacement of the Sacristan and other officers in the Bp's nomination. The Bp visited the Priory again in 1323 (p. 217), but no injunctions are recorded.

The Incumbents of parochial benefices were at this date very shortcoming in efficiency. This was owing to several causes.

- 1. The absence of any system of clerical training.
- 2. The sources of supply of recruits for the ministry.
- 3. The Patron's power to nominate clerks in first tonsure.
- 4. The Nepotism of Popes and Bishops, and their laxity in enforcing corrective canons.

^{*} The references to the "Thesauraria," or strong room for custody of archives, vary in terms. I incline to think that there was only one for the diocese, and that in the Cathedral. Otho's Constitution No. 6 required the ordination lists to be preserved in the Bp's house, or in the Cathedral.

All these points are amply illustrated in this Register; e.g., as to 1 and 2:—

The Bp very frequently conferred the tonsure upon serfs on the day of their manumission. These men (or lads) were thus suddenly uplifted from the servile class, which had no means of education. They were no doubt selected by some patron as youths of promise, and the patron was morally obliged to find some education to fit them for Holy Orders. A few, we know, the most gifted, were helped to the universities, but this costly privilege must have been limited to a few. The majority must have picked up their knowledge by serving in minor orders under incumbents, and in the subordinate offices of the parish church.

The other source of supply was from the landed gentry, the families or patrons. These were nominated and instituted at any age if placed within the "Clerus" by tonsure, but the Bp had power over the youth as soon as instituted. He placed him under a tutor, who had also charge of the benefice as sequestrator, applying the funds to the education of the boy-rector, to the spiritual service of the flock, and to other demands.

A more common case was for the well born nominee to be instituted as an acolyte, or deacon, to ask for a license of study, renewable yearly, and so to postpone his admission to the priesthood and to the active service of his benefice. This Register proves^a that some of these favoured men never qualified themselves for their duties.

The Church was not so much answerable for this negligence as her officers. By the 10th Legatine Constitution of Otho, 1237, every incumbent was sworn at admission to residence. The License of non-residence for study was limited to a year by Pope Boniface. A constitution "contra plurales" was issued by him against the shameless pluralities of the day (unless papally dispensed), and another entitled "Execrabilis," voiding the benefices of those who did not advance to the priesthood. These restraints were all enforced at times by our Bp, and all evaded by the over-kind uncle in favour of his own nephews. In the case of Ivo de Berkeley (p. 41), whom he collated an untonsured boy to a Wells canonry, he earned a severe reproof, worth reading, from Abp. Reynolds, for the uncanonical act of promoting a "puer merè laicus" (p. 49). He was ordered to institute a nominee of the Abp's, which he did; and then, to conciliate the powerful family of Berkeley, he granted to Ivo 20 mks. a year until beneficed (p. 50).

In 1323 he became alarmed at the abuses of his very numerous Licenses for Study. In a commission to his official he sets forth the evils in black colour,

and requires him to examine the licensees as to their mode of life and attainments, revoking the licenses on proved abuse.

The Register shows that the licenses continued notwithstanding. There was consequently a large class of non-resident Incumbents. Their duties were fulfilled by deputies, "capellani," who were probably drawn from the lower ranks, and were ready to accept small remuneration, like the curates of pluralists fifty years ago. Our Bp took some pains to secure their efficiency. In his licenses of non-residence he sometimes required the deputy to be presented to him for examination before licensing him to the cure, or he put in some trustworthy man as lessee or "procurator" of the benefice, who could oversee all its interests, spiritual and temporal.

He must also have the credit of making inquiry (long since neglected) before institution into the character of the presentee. This was done through the R. D. Chapter, summoned for an "Inquisitio de Vacatione."

But on the whole, the parish clergy, incumbents and deputies, must have been very incompetent for the duties expected of them, specially for the highest, the guidance of the conscience through the Confessional, and the application of coercive discipline. I do not mention preaching, that not being expected.

The evidence of their unfitness is seen in the building up of a Penitentiary system by their side as a supplement. The reigning Pope, by the Bull "Super Cathedram," had sanctioned the appointment by the Diocesans of a limited number of Friars presented to them by the provincial head of each neighbouring order, and acting under the papal authority in preaching and receiving confessions independently of the parish priest, *i.e.*, of the confessor authorized by the Church (see pp. 9, 13 for introduction of the system of yearly licensing). The Pope also sanctioned the appointment by the Diocesans of penitentiary priests to act as confessors in each Deanery. In addition to these, Bp D. licensed temporary confessors within given areas, and also granted to some privileged families now and then the rights of choosing their own confessor. This privilege was strictly limited, and was probably sought on account of the insufficiency of the parish priest, or for some special knot of conscience.

There is one remarkable entry (p. 152), viz., an invitation through his special Penitentiary from the Bp to Priors and others, and to his leading laity, to consult him personally once a year on the state of their souls, and to receive his advice. It would have been pleasing to hear that this most fatherly relation ever was established, but looking at the area of the diocese, and the Bp's erratic habits, it is not surprising that nothing more is heard of it.

Very little occurs touching deacons or subdeacons as assistants to the parish priest, but the office of parish clerk, under the name of "Beneficium aquæ benedictæ," is illustrated in the case of an unqualified one at Chedzoy (p. 13), whom the Bp. displaced, and replaced by a tonsured "literatus." The lay officers, churchwardens and sidesmen, are hardly noticed.

The Brotherhood of \$\delta\$t. Andrew claims a diocesan position. It was formed to raise funds for the Cathedral-fabric, like the Brotherhood of St. Chad in Lichfield. It gathered throughout the diocese whatever was paid of custom under the name of "cathedrale," or cathedraticum, or given of goodwill, or by bequest. It published the Bp's Indulgence to stimulate parishioners in their parish churches, and probably with banners and processions—and carried the year's collection to an audit at Wells, or paid it to a lessee who had agreed to advance a given sum to the Chapter.

The Bp in relation to the Monastic Bodies.

The Bp was responsible for the discipline of only some of these Houses, not of all.

The Cistercians, Cluniacs, Templars, a Hospitallers of St. John of Jerusalem, and Friars were all exempt from ordinary corrective jurisdiction. They were obliged to apply to the Bp for the spiritual offices of consecration and orders, and if any parochial cure was attached to the house, they were in that behalf visitable, but otherwise they were extra-diocesan. Not so the great Benedictine Houses, or Augustinians, or the Hospitals.

The Register shows (p. 153) that Bp D. commenced (1309–10) visitation of the Abbeys of Bath and Glastonbury, and that he found his inquiries baulked by a conspiracy of monks sworn to silence, which he met by annulling the oath and proroguing the visitation. He seems to have broken through this illegal bond, and in the case of Bath to have established his visitor's rights, but no regular inspection of the House at Glastonbury is recorded. He visited in 1313 the Churches of the Glastonbury Archidiaconal jurisdiction (see Visitation Schedule, p. 159), and granted a penitentiary license to the Abbot, and consecrated the

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^{*} This Society was dissolved by Pope Clement in 1312, and their property soon after transferred to the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem. Four of the surviving Knights of the Temple were quartered under Bp D.'s care in Somerset monasteries (p. 98) by way of penance, and maintained by the Sheriff out of the escheated revenues. One of them entered the Benedictine order (p. 137).

Church of Meare at his petition (p. 219). Nothing occurs to show that interference was needed by internal maladministration of the Great Abbey, as in all the other bodies.

Muchelney, Athelney, Worspring, Keynsham, Bruton, Stavordale, were all visited; the three former found in disorder; all were crying out for poverty, the fruit of mismanagement. In 1321 the Bp issued an appeal, with an Indulgence, for the ruinous fabric of Athelney (p. 189). For Taunton Priory a scheme of Vicarial endowment for the appendant cures was ratified. In the exempt Cluniac House of Montacute (p. 94), a runaway Monk was restored after discipline. Of the internal state of Barlynch nothing is heard, save its poverty (p. 177). The Nunneries of Barrow, Buckland, Cannington, Ilchester, demanded a vast deal of the Bp's attention, and the severest measures of correction.^a

The alien priory of Stogursy was well nigh disbanded (p. 261). Under an incapable Frenchman as Prior, who had wasted the revenues, one Monk only abode faithful to his vows. The Bp required the Mother-House of Lonley, in Normandy, to recall the remainder, who were living loosely, and to send no more till he and the Patron, Sir Wm. Fitzpayne, had nursed the revenues.^b

The Hospitals of St. John, at Wells, Bath, Bridgwater, Bristol, and that of St. Katherine, Bristol, came under the Bp's inspection.

The three first were reinforced by fresh endowments requiring the Bp's ratification. Bridgwater (p. 268), came under his lash for neglect of its original duties to wayfaring poor in favour of its newer functions, created by the benefactions of Bp Burnell. Bp B. designed to make it a house of education for the town; and also of chantry devotions. The scheme for educating the townsmen was a most advanced one. Thirteen poor scholars able to teach grammar were to be fed in the house, and to keep school in the town under a Rector of Schools, who was privileged to send seven of his mendicant pupils for daily pittances in the house. This teaching body must have been most ample for the needs of such a town.

It is not easy to make a fair estimate of the spiritual condition and influence of the Monasteries as a whole. The Bp being charged with corrective authority, his Register must needs be a record of the shortcomings and not of the welldoings of the subject bodies. Certainly the stream of

^{*} The deplorable history of these houses being given in all fulness, with original documents, by Mr. Hugo, "Somerset Nunneries," there is no need to amplify here.

^b The house never revived to efficiency. The wars of Ed. III cut it off, like the other alien priories, from the mother-house in Normandy. The revenues were during war with France escheated to the Crown, and finally conferred by Hen. VI on his College of Eton.

endowment had ceased to flow towards them, the augmentations of income accruing chiefly from rectorial appropriation which the Bps were over-ready to grant.

Besides the administration of corrective discipline, the Bp received the profession of obedience, and conferred benediction on the Abbots or Priors elect of the non-exempt houses, having previously examined the process of election, and the "persona electi," *i.e.*, his age, birth, and regularity of his orders, &c. After benediction it was his function to request the patron to restore the temporals.

Our Bp in the case of the disordered Nunneries did more than this. Waiving the patron's congé d'élire, he ordered new elections, and dispensed with some of the usual steps of election. This was also done in the case of one male convent, viz., Stavordale, expressly to spare the poverty of the house, presumably by patron's consent (p. 30).

I will now proceed to the general state of discipline in the diocese under our Bp.

Though much has been said above, much remains to be said of this function, for coercive discipline was one of the most busy functions of a mediæval Bp. It was regarded as the right arm of the spiritual kingdom, and extended to every soul of man and to every duty. Even conscientious obligations such as oblations and tithes, which earlier ages had deemed voluntary, were by the 14th century all deemed enforceable by spiritual censures. Our Bp was fully instinct with this ruling principle of the Church to leave nothing to the free play of conscience, but to define sharply all duties, and how, when, and where to be done. On this principle he imposed upon the people of Wellington and Chard (p. 91) the duty of making their offerings on the dedication day of their churches equal to their Christmas offerings, and when they were found slack in obedience, desired that the names of defaulters should be reported to him for correction.^a Again at Wembdon, where a voluntary rate had been agreed to for repair of the Church, and imperfectly paid, the Bp ordered (p. 257) the Rural Dean to threaten proceedings against the defaulters.

Coercion was in fact the key of his administration. The cultivation of the conscience as the directing power of man's soul, the instruction of it in the Law

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^a This was followed up the next year (1316) by a mandate issued by him as Lord of the Manors of Wellington and Buckland to his tenants, bidding them make their offerings on dedication days, "as in the great mother church of Wells, and also the parish church," on pain of excommunication (p. 108).

of God, and the implanting of holy affections in the heart, seems to have been no part of the Church's system of guidance. There was no regular preaching; it was left to the friars on their rounds. There were no parish schools; parents were incompetent to teach at home. In Church all proceedings were in a strange tongue, save on a Saint's Day, when the history of a saint may have been rendered in English. The Confessional had its opportunities of teaching holy principles of conduct and checking vice, and in the hand of a holy pastor must have been a great occasion for instructing the conscience, an occasion which even the careless could not escape, but it was limited in practice to once a year, viz., to the preparation for the Easter Communion, and the numbers who then crowded to their priest's ear must have tended to make the office a hurried one. But in truth there were more serious limitations—

- 1. As we have seen, in the patent inadequacy of the ministering clergy.
- 2. By the system of indulgences, "ab injunctâ penitentiâ," i.e., remissions earned *beforehand*, through contribution to a privileged object, of any penance enjoined by a confessor.
- 3. By the system of commuting penance for money, thus giving the confessor the means of making his sacred office gainful, and covering it with suspicions of covetousness.
- 4. By the choice of confessors, enabling each man to choose the most lax and venal.

These causes are all visible in this register, limiting the value in operation of the spiritual guidance of the laity through the confessional.

It must be remembered that besides this private guidance there was an active machinery for restraint of evildoers, and for bringing them to repentance, a machinery still surviving in form. The visitation of a parish was an inquiry into the morals, "tam populi quam cleri." Immorality of any sort, save crimes cognizable by King's Justices, was presentable at the visitation court (even down to a shepherd's hiding from the tithe-owner the birth of twin lambs), and penance assignable.

If a whole parish were in contumacy, refusing to obey the Bp's monition,

^{*} See pp. 60 and 189 for our Bp's grants of indulgence, "ab injunctâ," issued in favour of his two Cathedral Fabrics, the Causeway from Poldon to Bridgwater (p. 259), &c. The value of such privilege to the holder would be that whatever discipline was enjoined by his confessor next Lent as the evidence of his penitence, he was free to treat it as done, up to the limit of the indulgence. This kind of privilege granted by Diocesans must be distinguished from remissions of pains in Purgatory granted by Papal authority, and sold by Papal agents.

e.g., to provide a cemetery, the whole flock could be debarred by interdict "ab ingressu ecclesiæ," or from all ordinances.

In case of a bloody brawl in the Church or precincts, the interdict always issued (see Martock case, p. 236, also pp. 232, 244-6), and could only be relaxed by invoking the Bp to execute his function of reconciliation, for which a special ritual existed in the Pontificale.^a

Coercive discipline acting in these and like forms seems to have been acting effectively for its purpose of repression, but of course it was unable to touch the conscience or the affections. It does not seem to have provoked serious resistance anywhere, and was probably quite supported by public opinion.

The Visitation of the Clergy was lodged in the same officers as those who visited the laity, but it was marred—

- 1. By papal dispensations in the matters of age, pluralities, attainments.
- By episcopal dispensations of residence, for study and for private appointments "obsequia" in noblemen's families, as chaplains, or for secular business.
- 3. By the mischievous privilege of Benefit of Clergy. The Bp, as guardian of this privilege, appears continually in this Register claiming by commissaries at every gaol-delivery held by the King's Justices at Somerton or Ilchester the bodies of any imprisoned Clerks. These men, sometimes after conviction by a jury, were transferred to the Bp's Gaol at Wells, not to be punished but to be purged. The commission issued to the Dean or certain Canons requiring them to proclaim a day of purgation, fixing the number of compurgators. On the appointed day, openly in the Cathedral, the accused avouched his innocence on oath, and if supported by the oaths of a "plena manus" of compurgators, he was sent out with a certificate of being restored to good fame. Failing the first purgation he was remanded for a second, at which he had to appear with compurgators of easier conscience (p. 189).

The hand of justice was thus staid, and the clerical wrong-doer encouraged by the impunity which was thus provided for him. To measure the extent of the mischief, it will be needful to remember that every tonsured man was a Clerk, even if he had never fulfilled a single

^a The function was an episcopal one, and was therefore included by absentee Bishops in commissions to their suffragans, that the inconvenience of delay might not be added to the other burdens. The cost, a heavy one, fell on the parish.

sacred duty. Some of those who were thus entitled to "Benefit of Clergy" were living in secular callings, and living discreditable lives.

Every diocesan register is full of warnings of the mischiefs of the system, but the privilege was valued by the class who were most injured by it, and the evil went on unchecked.

I will now proceed to the Relations, as seen in this Register, of the Bp towards (1) The Pope, (2) The Crown, (3) The Archbishop.

The Pope, John XXII, was at this time located at Avignon, a Frenchman in feelings and interest, immersed in European politics, into which he was fain to draw the English Bishops; witness his sentence against the Emperor Louis of Bavaria (officially registered p. 274); [see also pp. 1 and 186].

The Papal "Curia," still called "Romana," was held at Avignon, but was largely wielded by Italians, who, it will be seen, filled the English appointments as Nuncios, Penitentiaries, and Collectors, and were fastened on English Benefices by letters of "Provision." At the "Curia" it was necessary for every Clergyman who meant to rise to establish his credit. To get a proxy to represent some Ecclesiastical body was an object of ambition. To have a standing proctor in the Curia as well as in the Arches Court was the costly necessity of every Bishop, and to reinforce him with a second or third specially instructed in the event of active litigation. The litigant spirit of the times was intense, and the cost of litigation in a venal and distant Court was very high, and aggravated by long delays. A most unwarrantable amount of funds consecrated by benefactors to the service of God was squandered in these forensic strifes, and a keen forensic spirit engendered, the moral damage of which seems to have been little felt.

Besides its lofty position, as the highest court of appeal, the Curia was a fountain, at all times flowing through its agencies in England, of dispensations, briefs, provisory letters, and begging letters, all of them overriding the ordinary executive of the Church, and so begetting perplexity and disorder. The Register illustrates the extreme perplexity caused by them to the Diocesans, and the wiles needful for evading their full mischief. To take the case of Provisors. One form of the Papal brief of Provision entitled the holder, under the name of a "poor Clerk," to go to a patron, commonly a monastery, and claim a piece of their patronage of specified amount (see Croscombe case. p. 19). The Bp was bound to be the executor of this order, unless others were named. He usually appointed a Commission to inquire into the holder's qualifications, and then, if approved, to watch the case to its end. There was often much delay, and sometimes

remonstrance.^a The more common brief of provision entitled the "Provisus" or holder to claim a specified piece of preferment, vacant or about to be. The higher Cathedral offices were so often bestowed in this way, even after the Bp had duly filled the benefice, that his nominees established the practice of receiving his institution *contingently*, reserving their former preferment in case of eviction by a Provisor. Under this system the Ecclesiastical patron was never sure that he would be left free to exercise his patronage, and was tempted to practice evasions.

The Bp's Relation to the Crown is largely illustrated in this Register owing to special circumstances. Ed. II was greatly in need of counsel, and of money for his Scotch wars. There was now a regular system of obtaining subsidies from the Clergy in their provincial Synods. These subsidies were collected by clerical agency, viz., by the Bp, as collector in each Diocese, using as sub-collectors the chapter or an abbey (they having safe places for keeping the treasure). The Clergy were charged on their canonical obedience to pay the assessment of their benefices (laid on the basis of the Valor of 1291-2), and were subject to distraint by sequestration.

Under the pressure of Scotch wars, aggravated by the crusading imposts of Popes Nicolas and Clement, the demands were very frequent, the arrears great, the Barons of the Exchequer were most urgent upon the Bp for speedier exaction, whilst he pleaded that his sequestrations were evaded by an overpressed Clergy. Between 30 and 40 folios of the Register are filled with Royal Writs, sometimes very scolding ones, and the Bp's replies on this unwelcome subject.

Besides this large draft on the Bp time, he owed to his Sovereign the service of a Councillor. Some of the Writs of Summons to Parliament will be found in the Register, also a demand from the King in 1321 to have the Bp's opinion in writing when he had pleaded excuse for absence (p. 199); also a Proxy to Deputies to represent him in Parliament (pp. 273, 290). Of his non-episcopal state-employments there is little notice save in the indirect evidence of dates of abode.

In 1325 he joined with other Bps in Parliament (p. 253) in a remonstrance to Queen Isabella upon her conduct, and in a petition to the Pope begging his pacific intervention between the Kings of France and England. Whether the

^{*} See the remonstrance of the Abbot of Glaston (p. 209), stung by the unjust intrusion of an unqualified man into the Brotherhood. The Bp impliedly sympathised with the Abbot. I will here add that Richard de Cnolton, on whose case I have commented (p. 201), turns out to be a "poor Clerk" provided, i.e., thrust upon the Abbey's patronage.

Bps were acting as the spiritual estate of the realm in these movements does not appear. The absence of Abbots' names makes it doubtful what constitutional position, if any, the Bps were assuming. The Bp's relation to his Drimate often appears, and as one of real subordination. In the case of the boy Ivo de Berkeley, whom the Bp instituted as a Canon, Abp Reynolds not only inflicted a heavy rebuke upon the Bp, and upon the Chapter (for not treating the collation as null), but treated the benefice as having lapsed to his own patronage. The Bp was regularly cited to the Abp's Synod, which in its then unsettled form was sometimes called Convocation, sometimes Council, sometimes Parliament. In 1321 he was called to a Council of Bps in London (p. 193) to consider public events. He was also summoned to the consecration of the Bps of the Province, and was obliged to appear to all citations by proxies, if not in person (pp. 195, 196). In 1324 he joined the Bps of the Southern Province in asking the Pope's aid in bringing France to peace with England. The Bp held himself bound to publish all the Abp's provincial mandates, e.g. (p. 196), an order for a general intercession in behalf of the kingdom in 1322, which he issued to the exempt as well as the subject houses, as equally binding, by virtue of its synodal authority. All the Bp's judicial decisions were liable to appeal in the Abp's Court, already called the "The Arches," and in this court so frequent was the litigation that the Bp was obliged to keep standing counsel in constant pay.

It remains to notice some other functions of a mediæval Bp.

1. Appropriation.

It was competent for a diocesan, with patron's consent, to make an apportionment of the endowments of a benefice to a rector and a vicar; to institute the vicar to the cure of souls, and to induct the rector to the sinecure enjoyment of his portion, "in proprios usus." This was called appropriation or impropriation. When ratified by the Chapters, it became an act binding on the Bp's successors, The vicar was called "vicarius perpetuus," and had a freehold tenure, but his endowment was reviewable by the Bp, who often issued a new "ordinatio vicariæ" in a favour of a starved vicar (p. 180). The whole process of an appropriation will be often seen in the Register; see Index, s.v. Appropriation.

The Rector impropriate was cited to Visitations, and made amenable to the Ordinary for his obligations to maintain Chancel, &c. (p. 110).

2. Peterspence.

The collection of the dwindling tax, payable to the Pope from Saxon times, called "Denarii Si. Petri," or Peter-pence, was laid upon the Bp. It had been in

earlier times very troublesome, seeing that every householder was liable, but it had finally settled down to a fixed sum, which each Bp had to pay to the Papal collector, having levied it from the diocese in his own method. It was levied in this diocese through the decanal chapters, but from whom does not appear. Our Bp was unpunctual in his remittances to the Papal Collectors, and was threatened by them with Inhibition "ab ingressu Ecclesiæ," a punishment which he staved off by forwarding his dues (p. 129). The Diocese was assessed at £11 5s. by Pope Gregory circa 1273 (p. 23), and this seems to have been the final settlement of the impost.

3. Direction of Christian Bounty.

This often occupied the Bp, as it does the Bps of this day, yet the methods for effecting it were so very different from those of our day that they form an instructive contrast.

In behalf of the most favoured objects the Bp stimulated the bounty of his people by promise of spiritual benefits in the form of indulgences. He desired that these should be proclaimed on Holy days, when the people were obliged to resort to Church, and during the celebration of Mass. Other objects of bounty were for the time banned. He thus commended to his whole diocese the most urgent diocesan needs, the fabrics of his two Cathedrals, Bath in 1310 and 1324 (pp. 60, 241), Wells 1326 (p. 250); whilst to smaller localities he offered indulgences through local collectors, to stimulate bounty for the more secular object of repairing the causeway across the moor from Poldon to Bridgwater (p. 259), and another leading to the Chapel of St. Thomas Weare (p. 277).

Besides these methods he used more imperious ones, e.g., he published through the Vicars of Chard and Wellington an order intended for further circulation, requiring the people to make larger offerings on the dedication day of the parish Church; the names of defaulters to be reported to him for censure (p. 91). But if he made his authority burdensome in this matter of almsgiving, so did his Master at Avignon. Peremptory letters were often brought by the hands of Italian "Quæstors" (Quæstuarii, or Nuncii) demanding the Bp's warrant for their admission to the Churches of the diocese as pleaders for foreign institutions (pp. 181, 192). The Bp betrays his annoyance, sometimes by adding a saving clause in favour of the collections for his own Cathedrals, sometimes by barring the exhibition of relics and other popular allurements, sometimes by other restrictions (pp. 141, 192).

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Provision for disabled Clergy.

This function occupied a good deal of the Bp's time. He was sometimes invoked by the worn-out incumbent, sometimes he acted against his will (p. 289). In either case he obtained evidence by commission of the Incumbent's condition and of the value of the benefice, and then made an arrangement, often with patron's expressed assent, for the sustenance of the retiring officer. This arrangement was made binding on the successors by oath (pp. 50, 92, 101). It was in some cases too complex to work well, and required the Bp's interference to enforce it. This he could do by his almost unbounded power of sequestration.

He exercised the same authority in providing for the retirement of the Heads of religious houses (p. 158), and of Archdeacons (p. 24).

He also provided coadjutors for some of the worn-out incumbents (p. 107, bis 114, bis), and invested them with singular powers over their persons, their freehold, and their flock. In cases of infirmity disabling the aged Rector from superintending the troublesome business of taking tithe in kind, and farming the glebe, such intervention is represented as an act of mercy, and probably with truth, to the Rector. It certainly was a benefit to his flock, and to the neglected interests of the benefice.

Some cases occur where the Bp apparently intended the surplus revenue of the benefice to be carried to the Cathedral Fabric Fund, and with that view placed Dean Godley in commission over Doulting, and Precentor Gorges over Shepton Malet (pp. 114, 129).

Dispensation.

A general power of dispensation had doubtless been always conceded to the Episcopate. This had been restrained in part by papal constitutions, but it was still largely exercised by the Bps. Papal authority alone could dispense with plurality, non-residence, irregularity, matrimonial disabilities, illegitimacy as a bar to Holy Orders, and cure of souls. The Bp still dispensed with residence to the limit allowed by the Constitution of P. Boniface, viz., one year for study, and for "obsequia," *i.e.*, services undertaken as chaplains or otherwise in great houses. He could also dispense with banns of marriage, as the Bps. of our own day do, but no instance of the kind occurs in this Register. He could also dispense with illegitimacy so far as to qualify for minor orders and clerical employment without cure of souls. A full dispensation qualifying for sacred orders and cure of souls must be sought from Rome. When obtained, it was carried to the Bp whose duty it was to inquire into the allegations and bearer's character, and, if satisfied,

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to ratify and promulgate the instrument. The licenses conveying dispensation and other privileges are very numerous. Those for study, being repeated year by year to the same persons, I have ceased to calendar after 1324.

They were all paid for. The amount of fee is sometimes entered in margin. It was given by the Bp at this period to the neediest claimant in the Diocese, the Cathedral fabric.

The names of influential suitors asking for privilege are sometimes entered, showing the Bp's liability to incessant canvass. The dates show that he granted his boons on his journeys, and therefore without any consultation with his Chapter or Archdeacons, whose advice might have saved him from yielding too easily to personal urgency. His good nature was at last a subject of too late regret to himself, as to many in later times. In 1323 he testified against his own laxity, painted the fruits of it in dark colours, and charged his official, *i.e.*, his Chancellor, to undo by a strong hand (see p. 227) the mischiefs he had done.

Consecration by the name of dedication occurs often. It was applied not only to the setting apart of immovable property to sacred uses, but of many minor things, e.g., fixed altars, portable altars, called super-altars, for use in unconsecrated oratories, bells, oil for chrism and confirmation, water for the font, for reconciliation and other benedictory purposes.

In 1317 (p. 127) the Bp, pursuant to Otto's constitutions 1237, ordered the names of all clergy who were using anything unconsecrated to be returned to him. Several were censured, and some punished by mulct (p. 128). The movement was part of a general one, made by papal authority, and is a guarantee to the Churchmen of to-day, that though the consecration deeds have perished, their ancient Churches and cemeteries have been duly set apart to God's uses according to primitive observance.^a

The form of re-consecration after profanation, called **Reconciliation**, occurs in this Register. The Martock case (p. 236) is worth noting. The profaning bloodshed seems to have been most trivial, demanding no more purgation than the aspersion of Holy Water, which the Bp committed by messenger to the Abbot of Muchelney, who, as commissary, was bidden to hold inquiry on the spot, and then to declare the Churchyard restored to its uses. Trifling as the fray may have been, it was needful to teach men, by depriving them of Christian burial or of worship, to bridle their angry passions on ground consecrated to their Saviour's

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^{*} The dedication-day, which is still known, if not observed, in most parishes, is itself a record of the fact of the consecration of the Church. See the Burnham consecration, p. 115, and the Bp's certificate thereof given to the people with a view to the observance of the anniversary.

honour and uses. The cost of reconciliation was a considerable addition to this lesson. It was an Episcopal function, calling for the special mission of a suffragan in the absence of the Diocesan. The whole cost of the commission, and of the Procurations, *i.e.*, the sum payable by custom for entertainment of Bp's retinue was laid by the common law of the Church upon the parish.

Exquestration was a power very largely used by the Bp. The power extended to everything set apart to ecclesiastical uses, fabrics, glebes, cemeteries, vessels, growing or garnered crops. The Bp, as the "persona ecclesiæ" of the diocese, was the supreme guardian of the whole diocesan property. Even against the incumbents to whom he had given induction, or churchwardens to whom his court had committed the goods of the parish church, he could upon proof of neglect come in and resume administration by a writ of Sequestration. His civil duty obliged him to issue this writ, upon royal mandate, if a clerk was sued for debt in the King's court, or defaulted in payment of subsidies granted to the Crown, but the clerk's property was safe against the King's writ or the Sheriff's hand. As long as it was on ecclesiastical ground it could only be attached by the Bp.

The Royal writs which fill so many folios in this Register are all based on these constitutional principles, and abundantly illustrate them. They show indeed that at this period, in default of any system of tax-collection, the lay power was glad to use the ecclesiastical arm for levying the subsidies drawn from the clergy. That the Bp and his officers were unwilling agents in raising the very frequent and oppressive levies, is very evident from the evasive answers returned to the King's writs. "The Clerk has been cited," or "His goods seized, but no buyers to be found." "His property removed to a lay fee," therefore beyond ecclesiastical attachment. Answers like these abound, and are treated by the Crown officers with ample suspicion. The results must have been very fretting to all concerned. The demands on the clergy came very frequently. Two or three past subsidies were in arrear, when a new one was voted.

The Bp.s energies and officers were largely occupied in the unpalatable work of collecting. Nevertheless the sequestrating power, however onerous to wield, was too valuable to surrender. In rough-handed times it operated as a shield to the clergy against the unfair assessments imposed by officers of Shire or Hundred. It is still an important attribute of the Bp's Guardianship of dedicated property, though vastly fettered in its exercise.

Admission to benefices is the most frequent of the recorded acts. The process,

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from the earliest stage to the latest, varied but little either in substance or in form from the familiar process of to-day, but the benefices were far more varied, for they included Abbacies, Chantries, and (strange to say) Hermitages.

In the case of conventual Headships, the first step for the chapter of the vacant house was to sue the Patron's congè d'élire, the second to elect the Head, and report the election to the Bp. It was the Bp's place to inquire "de personâ et moribus electi," and "de processu," i.e., the validity of the procedure, and, if satisfied, to confirm the election, to report the confirmation to the Patron, praying from him (or from the Crown as the case might be) restitution of the temporalties. It only remained for the Bp to take the elect's profession, and to confer Benediction by way of License, qualifying, like Institution, for the exercise of spiritual functions. This procedure varied, of course, according to local statutes and exemptions. It was highly complex, full of cautions, aimed at securing honest appointments, but so dilatory and so burdensome to the means of a small house, that the Bp, apparently with Patron's consent, in some cases waived certain of its stages, and some patrons (pp. 204-5) on going abroad left proxies to act for them. In the Barrow case (pp. 245, 294) the Bp grew impatient of delay, and under urgency collated the Prioress elect without waiting for Patron, probably owing to the confusions of the times which were involving the Berkeley family.

Capitular appointments being all in the Bp's patronage, were conferred as now by the Bp's Letter of Collation, which gave the spiritual right to minister, followed by Installation, which gave the temporal rights annexed to the Stall. The offices called Dignities were conferred by the form of seisin known as "traditio Pilei," or "Birettæ," the delivery of the Bp's Hat (pp. 21, 25). To this day the Bp gives seisin of his diocesan Chancellor's office by delivery of a coin.

In filling the parochial benefice, the patron had a most mischievous width of liberty allowed to him, partly from laxity of law, partly from the Bp's laxity. The Council of Lyons, 1274, Sess. vi, had forbidden admission to a benefice of any one under 25. Boniface VIII in a decretal relaxed this rule on the plea that many had no means of obtaining academic education save by the help of a benefice. In our Bp's time, a Subdeacon was by this decretal qualified for admission, and allowed under Bp's permission seven years possession for finishing his studies and obtaining Priest's orders. Hence arose the word "possessioner" found so often in the Register, and the proceedings against possessioners who had never qualified. Hence also the very frequently

renewed licenses to study in some university, and letters dimissory entitling the bearer to seek ordination wherever he could find an ordaining Bp in the province. Hence also the practice of giving admission to the benefice by institution and induction without admission to the exercise of the office.^a This last our Bp often postponed until he could in person receive the oath of canonical obedience from the priest, and then give him full mission to his waiting flock. Amidst much laxity, he was strict on this point.

However lax the law, the Register shows a laxer practice. The sons of well-born patrons are presented in boyhood, in the first tonsure, quartered on the benefice for education, which they are yearly licensed to seek. Some, it may be suspected, never reached the priesthood, and never ministered. The Bp himself as private patron of Hannay, Berks, presented an illiterate clerk, for whom he was obliged to ask admission as a favour. He could not well be stricter with his own lay patrons, whose family interest in the benefice which their ancestors had created was far more demonstrable to reason and justice than it is now, after six centuries; and he was perhaps, when he weighed the interests of the flock, convinced that he could provide better for them by a "custos," or chaplain of his own selection, than by committing them to the care of their legal rector.

The normal process of admission was as follows:-

- 1. Presentation by Patron.
- 2. Inquiry made by R. Dean in his chapter touching the cause and date of vacancy, the person and character of the nominee, and other particulars required by the Bp.^b
- 3. (Sometimes) Examination in literaturâ or other doubted points.
- 4. Institution, with oath of Residence as prescribed by Otto's Const. 1237.
- 5. Mandate to Archdeacon or other inducting authority.
- 6. Induction.
- 7. Oath of canonical obedience, if not administered at time of institution by Bp.

In 1317 (p. 125), the Bp enlarged the terms of this oath, on which he laid great stress, as being the oath of fealty to him. He included certain specific duties, such as attending the decanal chapters and aiding their inquiries.

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Admission to endowed chaplaincies and chantries was carried out by similar forms. Even when a Church was to be held "in commendam," limited by law to six months, the "commendatarius" went through the same forms. The custom of conferring seisin by some overt form was so universal, that no possession was deemed safe without induction by some visible authority. Even the licensed Hermits were inducted into their cells by some Episcopal officer, before they could make their claim on the accustomed devotions of the people (p. 284).

Ordination.

Of this function (the ordination lists having been kept in a separate register, not extant) we learn very little. We learn that the ordinations were so rare, that candidates had to seek it in other dioceses by letters dimissory, which are very numerous. During the years of his State employments the Bp commissioned others to ordain for him, e.g., in 1310, and again 1325, the Bp of Llandaff, but only for the beneficed and the monastic clergy; in 1312 (p. 52), and 1325 (p. 257); in 1311, the Bp of Cork (p. 40). In 1310 (p. 33) he took out a commission from the Bp of Sarum to ordain in some obscure place in that diocese. The places of the few recorded ordinations were Wells Cathedral in 1311, and at S. Mary Redcliff in 1325 (for the sake of the Llandaff candidates), Bath probably in 1310. The function was always celebrated on Ember Saturdays. This rule prevailed till the introduction of our present ordinal.

Though barren of ordination records, the Register shows the Bp frequently conferring the first tonsure with his own hands, and in various Churches of the diocese, generally on festivals. The announcement in the margin is generally "Coronati." The persons receiving this crown where usually youths of the neighbourhood, and many of them emancipated on the same day from their serf-dom for the purpose.

The effect of the tonsure was to place them within the Clerus, and invest them with the immunities of the Clergy. They were thenceforth "Clerici," and though not entitled to minister until advanced to the lower orders, they were qualified to assist the Ministering Clergy (p. 13), and specially in the office of "Aquæ bajulus," the carrier of Holy Water, who is the ancestor of the parish clerk. It was probably as assistants to beneficed clergy that the young "Coronati" got their bread and their education, or at least a training. Few could afford to reach the

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Universities without a patron's aid. Not a few, it is to be feared, remained unadvanced, picking up a secular livelihood as scribes, accountants, as clerks (in the modern sense) to the bailiffs in Manor Courts, whose Court Rolls were kept in Latin. In these capacities they were useful to an illiterate community, but they did not enhance the efficiency or reputation of the Clergy, for it was from this class that the order of Clerks convict was recruited, who were delivered at every Assize to the Bp for his custody and ultimate purgation.

The word "Legítimatío" will be seen in the margin. This indicated two episcopal functions, and differing ones. The first was the Bp's return to a writ from the King's Court inquiring into the regularity of an alleged marriage as bearing on the legitimacy of suitors in the Court (see p. 128). The second was the removal by spiritual authority of the bar to Ordination constituted by bastardy. This bar the Bp acting under papal authority could remove in full. Without that authority he could only waive it as far as the lower steps of ordination and the holding of sinecure benefices. The number of legitimated persons is surprising. It is to be explained by the fact that many were sons of married clergy, whose marriage was not held invalid by the common law, but was discredited by the Church in divers ways, besides disqualifying their issue for the Church's commission. The Bp's or Pope's legitimation was only concerned with the ecclesiastical disability. It did not affect property.

Some functions are wholly unnoticed, e.g., Confirmation and Prearlying. The first, no doubt, was administered, though, owing to our Bp having no Suffragan to act in his frequent absence, intermittently. The second was perhaps never exercised by him, or by any of the Bps of his class. It may well be doubted whether he could freely communicate with the people of his village-flocks in their mother tongue. His correspondence was written in Latin. His communications with his bailiffs on manorial business were in French, and that was probably the daily language at his table, as it certainly was in all his intercourse with his sovereign and nobles, and in his utterances in Parliament and Synod.

I now conclude by adverting to two allegations against his official character.

1. Depotism.

This charge the Register establishes beyond all doubt. He brought discredit and reproof upon himself by the shameless promotion of his nephews, whilst disqualified by non-age and ignorance.

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
2. Litigiousness.

With regard to this, the Register gives a mixed verdict. He partook of the litigant spirit of the age, and thought it a duty, like all others of his day, in Church or State, to ampliate his jurisdiction; but in the special matter which has been remembered against him, viz., his contest with the chapter in 1320-1, during which he once grievously lost his temper, he was the first to show the peacemaker's spirit, and finally he yielded almost every point. The jurisdictions and privileges in debate were, it must be remembered, encroachments on the Bp's rights, some of them resting on not very clear claims. The Bp had reason on his side. The chapter was so convinced that the Bp's Official was the "causa litis" as to petition for his removal.^a

The contest was not long. The greater part of his twenty years he was certainly living on friendly terms with Dean Godley, and most of the resident canons, entering into their interests, promoting their anxious work in the Cathedral fabric. The admission of the Dean to purgation in 1326 (p. 264) was, I conceive, a friendly act to enable the Dean to clear himself publicly from a slander. It was a process which the Abbot of Glastonbury had offered to go through for a like object. In the end, at any rate, all ruffling was smoothed. In the endowment of the chantry for his own soul, the Bp coupled his fellow worker, the Dean, as partaker with him in a perpetual brotherhood of intended benefits.

All his faults are traceable to hastiness of temper and to warmth of heart, both contributing to overpower his judgment and his conscience; but he was also warm in his friendships, a peacemaker, and charitable to his numerous dependents—witness his frequent manumissions, and his daily doles to two hundred needy ones (p. 161).

These Dispensations were issued by Bps. under a Constitution of Pope Boniface VIII, called for (1) by the ignorance of the Clergy and by the instituting of minors into parochial cures, (2) the absence of any system of clerical training, and (3) the limitation of books to learned centres.

These entries are so numerous, that after fol. 154 I determined to extract them in separate list, which will show that they often refer to same person.

The Licence is sometimes contained in the Entry of Institution or Induction, and if so, not extracted in this list.

After this date I have omitted these Licences. Enough have been extracted to show their prevalence and their mischief. In Jan., 1323-24, the Bp issued Instructions to his Official (see fol. 214b) to examine the Licencees touching their places of resort and their studies, with power to cancel the abused dispensations. The Bp asserted that great abuse prevailed, but the system seems to have received no check.




Appendix A.

TERMS NEEDING EXPLANATION, WHETHER OBSOLETE OR USED IN SPECIAL SENSES.

- ALTELAGE = Altarage—The oblations of whatever kind made upon the Altars of a Church. The vicarage-endowment-deed always apportioned them to the rector or vicar, as deemed best.
- Appropriation or Impropriation—The grant by Bp or Pope of a Rectory to an ecclesiastical body "in proprios usus," in perpetuity, the spiritual duties being assigned to a resident vicar.
- CATHEDRATICUM or Cathedrale—An ancient and undefined right reserved in charters to the Cathedral in Wells (and to other Cathedrals), probably in aid of Fabric.
- Commenda—The committal of a vacant church or office to temporary care for a period of 6 months.
- CLERK-Used, not as now, for all ranks of the Clergy, but only for the lowest.
- DISTRAINT—An order attaching goods under pain of seizure in case of eventual disobedience.
- DE CAMERA, De scrinio, De archivis—Private funds (how distinguished from one another does not appear), on which the Bp frequently made charges in favour of retainers, ceasing with his own life.
- Familiaris—Applied to knights, chaplains, and others about the Bp's person.

- Inquisitio—An official inquiry for ascertainment of facts; or the jurors' verdict. The R. D. Chapters were habitually used by the Bp for such inquests, just as the Hundred-courts by the Sheriff.
- JUDEX UNICUS or Papal Judex—Bps and Abbots often received special commissions from Rome to hear special cases, with power to override all local jurisdiction and appeal short of Rome.
- Official principal, plus the Vicar-generalship.
- Ordinatio—An authoritative settlement, e.g., the apportionment of a vicar's endowment.
- Parochianus—Any member of the Diocese; used in the earlier sense of "parochia" when imported by Abp Theodore to express the area of a Bp's oversight.
- Portionist—The incumbent of one moiety of a benefice, like Backwell, where the advowson, like the manor, had been parted by co-heiresses, but with only one Church.
- Prior—The head or leader of any aggregate body, e.g., of the chaplains of the Lady Chapel, Wells.
- Possessioner—A pluralist or other person found in questionable possession of a benefice, and challenged to show title; sometimes stamped as "detentor."
- REQUESTÆ—Masses or other offices celebrated by the priest, upon individual request, and so entitling him to gratuity (pp. 263, 270).
- SERVIENS—When connected with Miles, a Squire.
- STUDIUM GENERALE—A place or a system of general education. The term University applied in the middle ages to any aggregate body, academic or not.

BATH—The Abbot's Lodgings before the annexation of the Abbey to the See in 1092.

London—In the Strand near Temple-gate. It was called "Hospitium."

It does not appear whether the manor houses at Cheddar, Cranmore, and Bathampton were kept fit for residence.

In those enumerated there was room for the Bp's retinue. In most of them was a Hall and Chapel.

The Bp had private houses in Surrey, Hants, and Kent, viz., at Wanton, Rockborne, Weyhill, Stockwell, West Greenwich, from all of which many documents are dated.

Appendix J.

RESERVED BENEFICES.

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The Pope's reservation of vacant benefices is noted on p. 118 as beginning on Dec. 8, 1316. On p. 147 is given a schedule of benefices kept vacant for the Pope's benefit from Dec., 1316, to Dec., 1319, with their value as assessed in 1292. At the last date they amounted to 46.

There was also a *temporary* reservation of First-fruits, which is noted as *ending* in Nov., 1319, p. 138; but in March, 1319-20, the Bp forwards the schedule of vacant benefices to the Pope's collector of First-fruits, as if he had become a permanent officer.

The impost became permanent. It was transferred to the Crown by Hen. VIII, and conferred by Queen Anne on the Bounty Board, which she created for the augmentation of benefices.

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
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
