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

Grant to the bailiffs and good men of Gloucester of pavage for 5 years to be applied under the survey and controlment of Robert Gilbert.

By letters patent, dated 10 December, 14 Henry IV, the custody of 9 acres of meadow in the parish of Chesewyke, co. Middlesex, was committed to Thomas Holgill on certain surety for 20 years at the yearly rent of 18s. and by letters patent, dated 6 June, 1 Henry V, there was committed to the same Holgill, amongst other things, for 20 years from the preceding Easter, the custody of a pasture called 'Juddescroft' in the town of Sutton at a yearly rent of 20d. and by inquisition, taken at Westminster on 25 November, 9 Henry V, before William Weston and Richard Gosselyn, late sheriffs of the said county, it was found that one Henry Paternoster was seized in his demesne as of fee of a little croft and 81 acres of land in Chesewyk, which descended successively to William Paternoster, his son and heir, and to Ellen and Isabella, minors, daughters and heirs of the latter, but during their minority the land was not occupied either by them or by any friend in their behalf; so that one John Bray, the said land lying amongst his holdings, intruded therein in the time of Richard II and occupied it as his own. Afterwards the said Ellen died without heir of her body, and so her pourparty descended to the said Isabella, as her sister and heir, who had issue, Alice Mede and Joan, and died. After her death the right descended to them, but the said John Bray, the occupier, alienated in fee simple the land in question, with lands of his own, to William Scrop, 'chivaler,' who granted to Richard II, and the heirs and assigns of that king. The lands have since remained in possession of the crown and its farmers, being held of the prebendary of the prebend of Chesewyke in the cathedral church of St. Paul, London, by fealty and the yearly rent of 116. of cumin. Afterwards at the suit of the said Joan and of John Dolman and Joan, daughter and heir of the said Alice, then deceased, made to the present king, one of the said 9 acres of meadow in Chesewyke and the said pasture in Sutton, were shewn to be identical with the croft and land mentioned in the said inquisition and the king was besought that the said letters patent, in favour of Thomas Holgill, so far as they relate to the same, should be revoked. Accordingly a writ of scire facias issued for him to show cause to the contrary, but, although the sheriff returned that he was duly warned by John Knot and Thomas Frankeleyn, he made default; wherefore, by advice of the justices, serjeants at law, and other learned persons of the council then being in the Chancery, it was adjudged that the said letters patent, so far as they related to the said croft and land, should be revoked and annulled; which is done accordingly.

And on this point he seeks judgment as to the writ. As regards the manor of Scrembyhalle the plaintiffs cannot deny as much, and on this point judgment is given that they take nothing by their writ but are in mercy. But as regards the castle they say that the defendant ought not to be allowed to vouch Daubeney to warrant, because neither Daubeney nor any ancestor of his had anything in the castle, in demesne or service, after the seisin of John de Dryby, Maud's ancestor; whereby he could make a feoffment; and this they are ready to prove. The defendant craves leave to imparl, and afterwards the plaintiffs return but defendant makes default. Judgment is given, therefore, that they recover and he is in mercy.

And he asks that recognition be made whether he, the plaintiff, in place of the tenant, by form of the statute, &c. has best right to have the said castle as his right to him and the heirs of his body coming by virtue of the deed shown here to the court and fine aforesaid by surrender of the said Ralph, Thomas and John, the parson, who had the castle and manor by grant of him, John de Kirketon, who had it by grant of the said John de Dryby as he asks in place of tenant, or the said Ralph and Maud to

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hold it in place of plaintiffs by form of the same statutes as the right of Maud as they hold it, &c. And Ralph de Cromwell and Maud do the like. Whereupon a day is given to the parties here in the quinzaine of Hillary to hear the election of the grand assize and the sheriff is commanded to summon four knights, &c. to make the election, &c. on which day the parties appear by their attorneys and the sheriff sends word that he has summoned Peter Bavent, knight, and John de Multon, knight, belted knights, John de Osgotteby and John Wildebore to be here on this day, &c. and he answers further that there are no more knights in his bailiwick unrelated to one party or the other. He died on Monday before the Purification, 9 Henry IV, leaving issue Richard his son and heir two years old, who, however, died on the feast of St. James, 3 Henry V; and she continued in possession until she married one Richard Oldecastell, esquire; and, afterwards, they surrendered their estate in the manor to Edmund Ruyhale, brother of the Richard above named. Edmund entered and then granted the manor to the said Richard Oldecastell and Elizabeth his wife and his heirs. Whereby they were seised, but the jury did not know whether the king's licence was had or not. But because the said Edmund, tenant for life only, thus alienated the manor in fee, one Thomas Charlecote on 14 August, 9 Henry V, entered the manor in the names of Isabel his wife, daughter of Margaret daughter of the abovenamed Laura Belamy, and of Margaret daughter of Alice Shortegrove, the other daughter of the said Laura, and of Agnes ap Rees, daughter of Elizabeth Coterell, daughter of the above-named Elizabeth, sister of the same Laura, co-heiresses of the said Laura and Elizabeth; whereupon the said Richard Oldecastell and Elizabeth his wife ejected the said Thomas and Isabel, Margaret and Agnes, the co-heiresses, and the said Richard Oldecastell died, and his said wife survived him and remained in possession until 8 October, 7 Henry VI, when she died, and from her death until the date of the inquisition the issues of the manor have been taken by one John Merbury, esquire, of the county of Hereford.

Afterwards at the suit of Henry Bourghchier, count of Ewe, James de Audeley, knight, Maurice Berkeley, John Pauncefote, knight, Richard de la Mare, John Russell, John Brugge, Guy Whityngton, Robert Andrewe, Nicholas Poynes, Edward Brugge and John Langley, it was shewn, on petition, that the manor is held of the king by fealty and the service of 1d. a year and not by knight service, as supposed by the inquisition; and that the said Richard Ruyhale, being seised long before 21 Richard II,

enfeoffed of the same John Malvern, chaplain, Edward Poywyke, Thomas Gayteley and John Gannowe, their heirs and assigns; which said feoffees, also long before 21 Richard II, enfeoffed the said Richard Ruyhale and the said Elizabeth his wife, and his heirs and assigns, whereby they were seised, and he and his heir died, and she married again, and, with her new husband, surrendered to Edmund Ruyhale, as abovesaid : but he, the said Edmund, during her life, enfeoffed of the manor John Merbury, Edward Brugge and William Poleyn, their heirs and assigns, and they enfeoffed the said Richard Oldecastell and Elizabeth, then his wife, and the heirs of their bodies, and afterwards he and then she died without such heir. (89.) A composition between Roger, then prior, and the convent of the one part and Boniface, archbishop of Canterbury, of the other. The said prior and convent in 48 Henry III sued the archbishop at Westminster before Sir Hugh de Bigod, justice of England, as to the return of the king's writs, chattels of fugitives and amercements of their men in their lands and fees and as to other liberties. The archbishop argued that he was not bound to answer in that court, but agreement was made to the following effect. The prior and convent shall have, by the hands of the archbishop or of his steward for the time being, the return of all writs and precepts of the king and of summonses of the Exchequer touching their fees or tenements, and the men, things and possessions in their fees in all counties of England: such writ after delivery to the sheriff, and being returned by him to the bailiffs of the archbishop, shall immediately be by them in like manner returned to the bailiffs of the prior and convent for execution, and, if the writ ought to return before the king, his barons of the Exchequer, his justices of the Bench, his justices in

eyre or those appointed for the keeping of the Jews or other royal justices, the bailiffs of the prior and convent, immediately after office done and executed in the matter, shall deliver the return with their execution thereof to the bailiffs of the archbishop, and they, in their degree, shall return the writ in its due course. But if any such writ of the king come which can be brought into and determined (deduci et terminari) in a county court or the archbishop's court, the writ after delivery by the sheriff to the archbishop's bailiffs, and by them to the bailiffs of the prior and convent, shall be dealt with and determined in the court of the prior and convent. All pleas whether by plaint or the king's writ, which touch the fees or tenements, men or tenants of the prior and convent shall be determined in their court as freely as they can be in the archbishop's court, unless there be default on the part of the prior and convent or their bailiffs. Judgments shall be done on their tenants in their courts on all pleas and trespasses and amends taken by their own ministers. Should a writ be issued against the prior the archbishop's steward after receiving it from the sheriff, shall return it to the prior's steward, and he shall summon, attach and distrain the prior to answer in the archbishop's court, and, if the steward neglect so to do, the archbishop and his bailiffs may summon, attach and distrain the prior. The matter of such writ shall in any case be dealt with and determined in the court of the archbishop at Canterbury. The like shall be observed should the prior be lawfully sued without writ, he being first warned by witness of two men that within three weeks he satisfy the plaintiff: saving always to the archbishop grand assistes, and juries provided in lieu of such, to be taken before his steward and the king's justices. All emoluments and profits from the men and tenants of the prior and convent shall go to the use of the prior and convent, and the archbishop and his ministers shall not meddle with any summonses, attachments or distraints or other things, which now they can do or ought to do by return of a writ or without writ, in the fees or tenements of the prior and convent, except in case of default of execution by the prior and conventor their ministers, but such occasions are not to be sought for, and three weeks are to be allowed the prior and convent to repair such default after complaint thereof made. Amercements incurred by the prior before the king are to go to the archbishop; and if they incur such in the court of the archbishop at Canterbury, the rate for one trespass or plaint shall not exceed a mark. If the case be not one of withernam and the prior be impleaded in the archbishop's court without writ and the damage be adjudged by the court at one mark or less and the prior refuse wager of law (legen sacramenti facere recusarerit) the plaintiff shall be satisfied his damages and the archbishop shall forego any amercement. The prior and convent henceforth shall receive in all counties, hundreds and lathes of hundreds in which they have lands (lastis hundredorum in quibus terras habent), possessions, men or tenants, all amercements whencesoever arising, chattels of fugitives and of persons condemned, and the year and waste of the same, and all profits and emoluments which can arise in such courts from their fees, tenants or men, for whatever reason amerced before the king, his justices, ministers or bailiffs, except amercements on the prior in person. Nor shall any suit be demanded of the prior

and convent or their tenants to any hundred or lathe of hundreds of the archbishop; saving only that the priory's men and tenants of Welles, Little Chart and Mepeham shall do suit and make presentments and judgments at the hundred courts of Kalehelle and Toltintre, and the others as they have been wont to do at other hundred courts and the prior and convent shall continue to appoint their attorney in the hundred courts of Kalehelle and St. Martin. The archbishop shall continue to have his rights and liberties in his hundred court of Toltyndre saving to the prior and convent the amercements and profits from their men and tenants in that and other hundreds, and their tumbrils, gallows, pillories and execution of judgments in their manors within the archbishop's hundreds and without. All amercements of their men and tenants in the said hundreds shall go to the use of the prior and convent, being levied and collected by the hands of their own ministers except fines; these shall be levied by the priory bailiffs and paid over to the archbishop's bailiffs in coin or Exchequer tallies, which fines the archbishop, together with the amercements, chattels, and all other emoluments and profits aforesaid, shall cause to be allowed at the king's Exchequer as and when his own are. This is to be observed in the account of every sheriff in whose bailiwick the prior and convent have lands. But if the prior and convent encourage their men to withdraw their suit from the archbishop's courts, the amercements for the withdrawal shall go to the archbishop. Appeal is to be from the prior's principal court at Canterbury to the archbishop's court there, the amercements, however, still to go to the prior. During voidances of the archbishopric the guardians thereof shall hand over writs to the prior and convent, after the confirmation of an archbishop elect, his steward shall do it as aforesaid. Moreover, if any one of a fee or in a fee of the prior and convent be charged or appealed of the death of a man, larceny, or other misdeed, and taken, and he cannot lawfully be judged in the court of the prior and convent, the bailiff of the prior and convent shall lead him as a prisoner to the next county court and deliver him there to the bailiffs of the archbishop, who shall immediately redeliver him to the bailiffs of the prior and convent, to be kept in the prior's prison, if the case be one for imprisonment, until the next coming of the justices in eyre into those parts or of some other justice appointed to deliver the archbishop's gaol. If such a case shall arise in Essex, Suthfolk, Northfolk, Buginhamsire, Oxenfordsire, and Devenesire or other counties in which the archbishop has no tenants or tenements, but the prior and convent have, then the ministers of the prior and convent having special mandate from the archbishop in that behalf, shall, unless he shall appoint somebody else, execute the office and keep the prisoner in custody until the coming of the justices in eyre, or until the archbishop or the bailiffs of the prior and convent at the archbishop's mandate, obtain a justice to deliver the said prison : if such prisoner has to be condemned before the said justices, the bailiffs of the archbishop shall deliver him to the said bailiffs, who shall execute the judgment. The goods and chattels of such prisoner shall remain to the prior and convent, unless the prisoner was in any fee of the archbishop, in which case the prisoner shall remain to the archbishop. If, however, the prisoner holds both of the fee of the

archbishop and of that of the prior and convent he shall be imprisoned in that fee in which he was resident, and if he had dwelling houses in both fees he shall be imprisoned in the fee where he was residing with his household at the time of his arrest. If he be condemned, his chattels in the archbishopric shall go to the archbishop and those which he had in the priory (prioratu) to the prior and convent. The like with the chattels of a fugitive. If a prisoner escape from the custody of the prior and convent or of their men or bailiffs, the prior shall pay the archbishop's treasurer the sum of money customary in the county for an escape, within a year from the day of escape, and the archbishop shall save the prior and convent harmless for such escape when paid for. But if not paid within the year the archbishop may distrain for the money, as also for amercements leviable by summons of the Exchequer, and reserved to the archbishop by the present composition unless paid within forty days of the delivery of the summons by the steward of the archbishop to the steward of the prior and convent, and for other amercements left unpaid for forty days from the day of . assessment; such distraint to be made in the manor of Edesham or another manor of equal value should Edesham be alienated. The archbishop shall also have reliefs and wards in all places where he or his predecessors have had them; and the prior and convent shall have reliefs and services in all places where they have had them. If any man or tenant of the prior and convent do wrong to the archbishop personally or to his personal property, he shall answer it in the archbishop's court, but the amercements shall go to the prior and convent. If any such man or tenant acknow-ledge indebtedness to the archbishop, and the steward of the prior and convent do not levy the debt within forty days after being required by the archbishop so to do, the archbishop's bailiff may distrain for the said debt. For this agreement the prior and convent have granted to the archbishop 40 marks of yearly rent payable in his treasury at Canterbury; with distraint in the manor of Godmersham, from which in future no other secular service shall be claimed by the archbishop. The prior and convent shall be bound to pay yearly at the accustomed terms to the archbishop the offerings (exennia) due from certain of their manors, as they have been wont, and such offerings shall continue to be distributed in the infirmary and elsewhore. The archbishop shall defend these liberties of the prior and convent by excommunication and interdict as if they were his own : and the prior and convent have voluntarily renounced any disputes, petitions and actions open to them concerning the advowsons of the churches in their manors and concerning 22,000 marks which they said were due to them from Stephen, sometime archbishop, for restitution of things taken away, which King John made, when the general interdict Saving also to the prior and convent their was removed. right of advowson in the churches of Brooke, in certain churches at London, Canterbury and Leans, the advowsons of which are known to belong to them; and also the churches of Fremingeham, Depeham and Halghestre, St. Dunstan and Aldermaricherich in London, and Sesaltre and Feyrfeld, which they have appropriated. Saving also to them their portions in the churches of Moneketon and Estrye and Depeham. The archbishop shall continue to create obedientiaries by advice of the

prior and elders, and to make such appointments to ministries and offices as have been accustomed. The archbishop has renounced all actions open to him touching offerings at the shrine of St. Thomas the Martyr. The parties renounce all apostolic letters touching the matters now arranged between them, saving to both the rights they claim in the church of Dover.

As to writs, &c. including bills and precepts returnable before the steward and marshal of the household, the arrangement is to be as in No. 39 above. The prior and convent are also to have fines for trespasses, extortions, deceptions, conspiracies, concealments, regrataries, forestallings, maintenances, double-dealings, falsities, and other misprisions, also fines for licence to agree, ransoms, issues forfeit, and all manner of forfeitures by writs of attaint, decies tantum or other writ, of all their men and tenants, holding elsewhere of the king or others, unless they also hold of the archbishop, in whatsoever court of the king arising. Amercements in like manner. Also current fines and amercements now in charge on townships or hundreds altogether belonging to the prior and convent. Also their bailiff shall be the archbishop's ministers within their demesne lands and fees for the purpose of the assise of bread, wine and ale, and other victuals, and weights and measures belonging to the office of the clerk of the market of the household; and the prior and convent shall have all amercements and profits arising therefrom.

Lincoln, taken before Robert de Wylughby, Ralph de Cromwell, William de Skipwyth and William Thirnyng, by virtue of a commission, dated 1 March, 18 Richard II [Calendar of Patent Rolls, 1388-92, p. 219], addressed to them and to Philip le Despencer, Richard Sydenham, John Markham, Edmund del Clay and Robert Martell, on the petition of the commonalties of England in Parliament, shewing that the ancient metes between the waters of Weland and Wytham had been rendered unrecognisable by floods and deposited sand; whereupon the sheriff was commanded to have twenty-four knights and others from the said parts on Friday after Corpus Christi then next at the stone cross on 'le Brigdyke' on the confines of the parts of Holland and Kesteven, Donyngton in Holand and Seint Sauvours in Kesteven; and to make proclamation for all concerned to attend the making of the delimitation. Meanwhile he was to cause the jury to diligently view the ancient boundaries or the places where they were formerly placed. And at the said time and place the sheriff returned the names of jurors from the two districts, together with a writ close de intendendo, dated 1 March, 18 Richard II, informing him of the issue of the above commission and commanding him to make proclamation for the attendance of those concerned. The sheriff also reported that he had made such proclamation and that he had caused the jury to view the boundary. Whereupon an inquisition was taken before the said commissioners at the said time and place by the oath of Andrew de Lek, 'chivaler,' John de Holbech, 'chivaler,' John de Meres, Randolf Bolle, Philip Garnoun, Thomas de Welby, Richard Stevenson, William Wyom, Stephen de Gobildik, John Sly, Ralph Farceux and John Grave of Holand and of John Paynell, 'chivaler,' Nicholas Hebden, 'chivaler,' John Walssh, 'chivaler,' Elias de Midelton, William de Boston, William de Cranwell, John Leek of Colby, Thomas de Sleford, Alan de Hekelsale, Anthony de Spanby, Ralph de Staunton and John de Haryngton of Kesteven; and after they had been charged to faithfully do, inform and declare in the premises and proclamation had been made by the justices that all persons of either district concerned should take part in the perambulation to inform the justices and jury, the justices and jury proceeded to make the perambulation and to set the bounds : and first by the oath and advice of the said jurors, as to the metes and bounds in the southern parts of the marsh that is in a place called Kenulfston, now within the

water of Weland, it was stated that the ancient metes and bounds begin in the said place, now under water, and that a stone cross stood there, the body of which has been destroyed by a flood and tempest, but the foot still lies there under the water and that this place is about two miles (lucas) west of Croyland; and the place being viewed by the justices and jury, it is considered that two crosses should be set up there, one of wood and the other of stone, on the east, or Croyland, adjoining the foot of the ancient cross. The jurors further say that the boundary runs northward from Kenulfston for about a furlong (stadium) to a place called Wodelodegreyves or Oggot on the other side of a dyke called 'le Newdyke' lately made, but a number of 'wylewes' have been planted there and grown up whereby the bounds are obscured; and, it is considered that the seven largest willows growing on the dyke on the south side thereof and the twenty-three smaller ones growing on the north side, in a place which is a division between the districts, shall be cut down to within one foot from the trunk (succidantur per unum pedem in latitudine a stipite earundem salicium) and that their growth should be cut yearly so that the bounds be not obscured. Also in place of the said willows a cross should be set up on the dyke that the bounds from that place to Wodlodegreyyes could be more clearly recognised : And from Wodlodegreyyes the boundary goes to a place called 'Goderameshend' on the south side of the water called 'la Glene' to a stake fixed on the bank of the said water opposite to, and south of, 'le Escote.' And it is considered that a stone cross should be erected there on the south bank of the said water near the said stake; and from Godrameshend the boundary goes down stream along the Glene eastward to a place called 'Goderamescote' and so by the same water to a weir at the corner of Goderamescote, northwards, and from the weir northwards across the water to the bank of the same water close to the north corner of Goderamescote, where a cross was erected by the close of Goderamescote by advice of the jurors and by view and judgement of the justices. Thence the boundary goes westward along the bank of a certain dyke round the north of the said close to a place variously called 'le Northflete,' 'Blakflete' at Fendykehend, 'le Prioures dyke, or le Neudykehend,' where it is adjudged that a wooden, or stone, cross be erected : and thence the boundary proceeds north by a dyke formerly called 'le Midilfendyke,' but latterly 'le Priouresdyke' to a place called 'le Erthlode' or 'Cheylbech,' which place was of ancient time one of the bounds where it is adjudged that a stone, or wooden cross should be erected. From Cheylbech the boundary goes to a place called 'le Flatpoles,' one of the ancient bounds and thence north to a place called 'le Herthstede,' in Nestylholme or Lestyngholme, and thence northward, to the stone cross on 'le Brigdike' mentioned above, thence by a place called 'le Syke' between a place called Gretfolyng Worthill on the west in Kesteven, and Litilfolyn Worthhill on the east in Holland, and thence northward along the Syke to Graftehirn or le Gryst, thence northward to a place called Gobyonboth or Mollebothe, thence, still northward, to Wragmerstake or Blakstake, thence, by a

syke called Schedyngfiete downstream unto le Southee; thence north by a dyke called 'le Oldee' along the midst thereof to le Wyloghbothe an ancient bound; thence north by a place called 'lee Oldee,' the division being marked by palings, piles and 'stakes' in the Oldee fixed by the said priors upon consideration by the said justices, to a place called 'Loveboneyng,' an ancient bound, thence north by the Oldee to the east part under and by the close of Terrebothe, marked by palings, piles and stakes driven in the Oldee by the jurors upon consideration of the justices, and thence down the Oldee, and similarly marked, to a water and bank called 'Kyme water' and downstream by the bank of that water to the place where it runs into the water of Wythum.
