Jan. 26. **Westminster.** Grant for life to Giles de Bello Campo of two tuns of wine in the port of Bristol yearly, he paying the king's right prises for the same. By p.s.

Jan. 27. **Westminster.** Exemption for life of Nicholas de Castro, knight, from being put on assizes, juries or recognitions, and from appointment as mayor, sheriff, escheator, coroner, or other bailiff or minister of the king, against his will. By p.s.

Jan. 27. **Westminster.** Presentation of John Luffe of Little Branfeld, chaplain, to the church of Kyngesdoune, in the diocese of Canterbury, in the king's gift by reason of the voidance of the abbey of St. Augustine, Canterbury.

Jan. 28. **Westminster.** Commission for one year to Robert Kay to make provision of hay, litter, oats, beans, bread, peas and all necessaries for the sustenance of the king's great horses and stud beyond the Trent in the custody of Roger Normanvill, king's yeoman, and to take carriage for those victuals, to be paid for by the sheriff of York by view and testimony of the same Roger; he taking 3*d.* a day for his wages. Mandate to the sheriff of York to pay what is due for such purveyances from time to time as well as the wages aforesaid.

Jan. 27. **Westminster.** Pardon to Juliana le Fetherwif of the king's suit against her for having stolen from Henry de Lyndeseye a horse of the price of 10*s.* and 100*s.* of silver, whereof she is appealed, as well as of any consequent waiver. By p.s.

Jan. 27. **Westminster.** Grant to Robert de Ufford, earl of Suffolk, of a plot of land in the street of 'Redecrouchestrete,' in Crepilgate Ward, in the suburb of London, which came into the king's hands by the forfeiture of Felicia de Creye of Wyndesore and Levota, her daughter, to hold to him and his heirs by the service of rendering a rose at Midsummer. Jan. 28. **Westminster.** Licence for the alienation in mortmain by Thomas de Rokeby to the abbot and convent of Egleston of the advowson of the church of Great Usburn, held of the king in chief as of the honor of Knaresburgh, which church is of the taxation of 100*s.* according to the new taxation, and 18 marks according to the old taxation; and for the appropriation of the church by the abbot and convent. Exemplification, at the request of John Cosyn, warden of the chapel of St. Mary, Sibethorpe, of the tenors of records and processes before the justices of the Bench as follows:—

(1.) Pleas at Westminster in fifteen days of Michaelmas, 21 Edward III, Ro. 624, Nottingham to wit. John son of Ralph Champeneys of Quappelade and Margaret, his wife, and Roger son of William de Flete, demand against the said warden the manor of Sibethorpe as the right of Margaret and Roger, by writ of right because Stephen Waleys, chief lord, &c. released to the king his court thereof. They say that one Ralph de Sancto Paulo, ancestor of Margaret and Roger, was seized of the manor in the time of King Richard and that from him the right therein descended to Dionisia, his daughter and heir, who afterwards married Alexander Bozon of Kirketon in Hoyland, knight, and had issue Ralph, to whom the inheritance descended, and as he died without heir of himself, the right passed to his brother, Hugh, and from him the same descended successively to Simon, his son, and to John son of the said Simon, who died without heir of himself, wherefore the right passed to his sisters Joan, Alice and the said Margaret, and from Joan, because she died without heir of herself, the right of her pourparty descended to her two sisters, and the right of Alice descended to Roger, the demandant, as her son and heir.

The warden acknowledges this, and says that the said John son of Simon died seized of the entire manor with all its appurtenances in Sibethorpe, Shelton and Knyveton, and after his death the same descended to the said Margaret then married to the said John son of Ralph, the said Alice and also to the said Joan, who afterwards married John the elder, son of Reginald de Aslacton, knight, that afterwards by a fine (produced) levied in the king's court at Nottingham, on Monday after Martinmas, in the third year of the present king, before William de Herle and his fellows, justices in eyre, between the same John son of Reginald, plaintiff, and John son of Ralph and Margaret, deforciant, the latter acknowledged one third part of the manor to be the right of the plaintiff, by virtue whereof John son of Reginald was seized of that third part of the manor; as to the second third part of the manor he says that the same Alice by the name of Alice daughter of Simon de Kirketon in Hoyland, sometime wife of William son of Hugh de Flete, after the death of her husband, granted the same to the said John son of Reginald by a charter (produced), dated on Tuesday the vigil of St. Lucy, 3 Edward III; and as to the remaining third part he says that the same John son of Reginald was seized of that in right of Joan his wife; that afterwards by fine levied at York in fifteen days of Hilary, 8 Edward III, before William de Herle and his fellows, justices of the Bench, between the same John and Joan, plaintiffs, and Hugh de Aslacton, chaplain, deforciant, of the same third part, the plaintiffs acknowledged the same to be the right of Hugh, and he regranted it to them in tail, with successive

remainders to William de Stanford in tail, and to Reginald son of William del Wodehouses in fee, and he says that afterwards the said John son of Reginald granted the manor to Thomas de Sibethorpe, parson of Bekyngham, founder of the chapel, who endowed the chapel therewith, and in proof of this he produces deeds. Judgment for the warden.

- (2.) The like, on the octave of Hilary, 21 Edward III. Ro. 49, Nottingham to wit. William de Wodehous, demandant, and the same warden, tenant of the manor of Sibethorpe. The warden pleads that demandant released his right in the manor to the aforesaid Thomas, founder of the chapel, who endowed the same therewith. Judgment for the warden.
- (3.) The like, on the quinzaine of Martimas, 21 Edward III. Ro. 625, Nottingham to wit. The same warden is summoned to answer Thomas Freman of Sibethorpe and Emma, his wife, wherefore he took and unjustly detains their chattels. Thomas and Emma, by their attorney, William de Batheleye, complain that on Thursday after All Saints in this year at a place called 'Thomashous Freman' in Sibethorpe the warden took and detains a brazen pot and a pan.

The warden, by his attorney, William de Bitham, avouches the taking and justifies the same. He says that one John de Aslacton the elder, son of Reginald de Aslacton, knight, late lord of the manor of Sibethorpe, was seised of the tenement aforesaid as parcel of the manor and by indenture (produced), dated at Sibethorpe on Wednesday the Annunciation, 6 Edward III, enfeoffed the same Thomas and Emma of the same, to wit, a messuage in Sibethorpe lying in length from the highway towards the west as far as lands of the chantry of St. Mary, Sibethorpe, on the east, and in breadth between a messuage of Robert Adam and Geoffrey son of Richard de Kilvyngton, and six selions of arable land in the fields of Sibethorpe (specified in the indenture), they rendering yearly 6s. and coming twice a year to the grantor's court at Sibethorpe, and if the rent should be in arrear at any time, the said lord had power to distrain, and that the said manor afterwards became the property of the chapel as aforesaid. Judgment for the warden.

- (4.) The like, on the quinzaine of Hilary, 20 Edward III. Ro. 164, Nottingham to wit. Robert son of William del Grene of Sibethorpe demandant, the same warden, tenant of an acre of meadow and 16½*d.* of rent, in Sibethorpe, by writ of right because Thomas de Sibethorpe, chief lord, etc. released to the king his court. Demandant says that one Goscelin son of Roger de Sibethorpe, ancestor of the demandant, was seised thereof in the time of King Richard, and from him the right therein descended through Thomas, his son and heir, Roger, son and heir of Thomas, Alice, daughter and heir of Roger, William, son and heir of Alice, to Robert, the demandant. The warden says that William, demandant's father, by deed granted the premises to the said Thomas de Sibethorpe, who endowed the chapel with the same at its foundation, and he produces a writing of quit-claim, witnessed by William son of Geoffrey, Thomas, his brother, Thomas Peronel, Geoffrey Bithelane, William de Grantham, clerk, and others, wherein the premises are particularly set forth. Judgment for the warden.

(5.) The like. Ro. 561, Nottingham to wit. The prior of Thurgarton, demandant, and the same warden, tenant, of a bovate of land, 5 acres of meadow and 15s. of rent in Sibethorpe and Aslacton, by writ of right because Alice de Byngham, chief lady of the fee, released to the king her court. Demandant says that in the time of King Henry III the prior was seised thereof in right of his church of St. Peter, Thurgarton. John de Clone, who sues for the king, says that Joan de Stotevill was seised of the manor of Cotyngham, to which the advowson of the said church pertains, in the time of King Henry III, and presented to the same one Roger de Seyton, her clerk, that from her the manor and advowson descended to Baldwin, her son and heir, and from him to John, his son and heir, and because Baldwin held in chief of Edward I, the manor and advowson were with other lands taken into that king's hands at his death by reason of the nonage of the said John, at which time the church was void by the death of the said Roger, whereby the said king presented to the same Alan de Thorneton, his clerk, that when John came of age the said king gave back to him his lands and the advowson, and afterwards the said John surrendered the same to the same king and his heirs, and the king re-granted these to him, and Joan, his wife, in tail, and on the death of John and Joan the king's father took the same into his hands by reason of the nonage of Thomas, their son and heir, at which time the church was void by the resignation of Alan, whereby he presented to the same first John de Hothum, king's clerk, and on his creation as bishop of Ely the right to present still pertained to the same king by reason of the nonage of the said heir and descended from him to the present king.

And Thomas by John de Beverle, his attorney, answers that after the presentation of John de Hothum the church did not again fall void in his nonage as the king's advocate supposes.

The said John replies that John de Hothum was elected bishop of Ely on 14 June, 1316, and the election was confirmed on 20 July following, on which day the king took the fealty of the bishop at La Neyt and he was consecrated at Canterbury by Walter, archbishop of Canterbury, on Sunday after Michaelmas, to wit 8 October, 1316, as appears by a certificate of the prior and convent of Christ Church, Canterbury. He produces also (1) a writ close of the present king signifying to the justices here that by an inquisition, taken in 28 Edward I, before Richard de Haveryng, escheator, after the death of John Wake, who died at Lydell on 30 June in that year, it was found that the said Thomas at Midlent then last was of the age of two years; (2) transcript of a writ, dated 6 June, 10 Edward II, to Master John Walweyn, escheator on this side the Trent, testifying that although Thomas, son and heir of John Wake, has not proved his age in the usual manner, the king, at the request of Henry de Lancastre, has taken his homage for the lands which he holds in chief, and commanding the escheator to deliver seisin thereof. From which it is clear that the church became vacant while Thomas was in his nonage. After further arguments on both sides, it is adjudged that the king recover his presentation to the church.

Defendant answers that plaintiff, by a writing made on Saturday before St. Peter's Chair, in the eighteenth year of the king, granted to his sons Reginald and John the younger the said toft, land and moiety, with other tenements in Sibethorpe, by the name of a messuage wherein John the chaplain of the said Simon dwelt, by a messuage of William son of John, and of a toft called 'Raufcroft,' which toft is called 'Cakerowe and Ely' and which moiety was sometime of William Sheyle and is called 'Sheyleplace,' as well as all his lands, rents and services in Sibethorpe not contained in a fine levied in the king's court between him and Reginald and one Thomas de Sibethorpe, clerk; that afterwards, on Christmas Day, plaintiff by another writing granted to the said Reginald, his heirs and assigns, all the lands and tenements aforesaid as well those contained in the fine as those not contained in the fine, with all goods therein, except one mare and one foal; that Reginald, with the king's licence, by divers writings released in frank almain to the warden of the chapel, holding the church of Sibethorpe as appropriated, all right in the said moiety of a toft called 'Sheyleplace,' which lies to the north of the rectory of that church, and in the acre of land, by the name of two selions of land, whereof one selion lies on 'le Standard' and the other lies on 'Settecop furlong,' and in 12d. of rent, parcel of the said rent, which William son of Geoffrey le Clerc pays to the warden yearly by reason of an anniversary of the said Simon, his ancestors, heirs and relations, to be held in the church, and of alms for their souls, all his right in 2s. 6d. of the residue of the rent which Ralph de Sancto Paulo, lord of the manor of Sibethorpe, used to pay by reason of a dyke of the sluices of a water mill, now held by the warden on the north of the water of the Kersyk, in a place called 'Langebrig,' in Sibethorpe, on the soil of the ancestors of Simon, and by reason of trees growing on that dyke, which mill and weirs are now for a long time entirely destroyed and removed, and the dyke is filled in with earth, and in all other rent and services due to him or his heirs by reason of these or any other lands held by the warden; that afterwards the same Reginald, by a charter produced, granted in frank almain to the warden the toft now claimed, by the name of a plot of land in Sibethorpe, called 'Cakerowe,' to the west of the manse of the rectory and adjoining the churchyard [with] three cottages built thereon near the way leading from the rectory to the church, as well as the half acre of land aforesaid by the name of a selion of land between land of Thomas son of Gilbert and land sometime of the

said William Sheyle, for the enlargement of the rectory and churchyard, in exchange for three selions of land, specified to be granted to him by the warden with the assent of the said Thomas de Sibethorpe, the founder of the chapel, as well as for common of pasture which the warden had as rector of the church, and for a pardon of 40 marks wherein plaintiff was held for him and his heirs to Thomas for having a perpetual chantry of one chaplain in the church of Sibethorpe for the souls of him and his ancestors, heirs and relations, and of Robert de Scridelyngton, lately killed, according to an agreement made between Simon and Isabel late the wife of the same Robert, and Robert and John, sons of Robert and Isabel, and the other children of Robert and Isabel, and for having the houses of the said three cottages and their timber moved at the charges of the warden to some other place near 'le Grene' as he or Reginald should dispose, and making reasonable satisfaction to his servant, Simon de Claxton, and Agnes, wife of the latter, daughter of the said William Sheyle, for their estate for the life of Agnes in one of the cottages, to hold the premises on conditions specified; in proof whereof the quit-claim of Reginald is produced testifying to the above:—witnesses, Sir Geoffrey de Staunton, knight, William son of Geoffrey, Thomas Peronel, Sir Adam de Roldeston, chaplain, William Basset, yeoman of the said Reginald, Richard Hardewyn, sometime servant of the latter, John de Flyntham, then his servant, and others. Dated at Sibethorpe, on Friday, the morrow of Corpus Christi, 22 Edward III.

And afterwards John brother of the same Reginald, who had estate jointly with him in the plot of land called 'Cakerowe' and 'Ely,' by a writing reciting that the said plot of ancient time was always one and the same plot and always of the measurement of $3\frac{1}{4}$ roods and contains no more at the present time, although a part has been assigned to cottagers dwelling in the said three cottages, at will, from year to year for their curtilage and the residue of the plot towards 'le Bek' between the 'Kirkecauce' and the manse of the rectory has been set apart for a plantation and for this cause and no other a dyke for a division has been made and on this account it is called by different names as 'Cakerowe,' and 'Ely,' confirmed the grants of his brother and released all his right in any of the lands held by the warden.

Defendant says also that, when all the tenements aforesaid were in his seisin, plaintiff released for him and his heirs all right in the tenements now claimed according to the effect of the charters and writings of the said Reginald and John as well as in all other lands and rents in Sibethorpe and in the towns of Hokesworth, Sireston and Aslacton which were ever in the possession of him or his said sons, or of any ancestors or relations and are now in the tenure of defendant, that the king because some of the lands are held in chief as of the honor of Peverel by charter granted licence for him and his successors to retain the same tenements in frank almoin and he puts himself on the king's grand assize to try whether he has not greater right than the plaintiff therein. Judgement for defendant.

(2) The like, Martinmas, 22 Edward III, ro. 521. Nottingham, to wit. William son of William del Wodehouses by Northwell, by Robert de Marnham, his attorney, demands against the same warden the manor of Sibethorpe, by writ of right because

Robert de Swylyngton, the chief lord, released to the king his court thereof. Plaintiff says that the manor came to him as heir to his brother, Reginald son of William del Wodehouses, who was seised thereof, because the latter took the habit of religion in the abbey of Rughford.

The warden, by William de Grantham, his attorney, answers that one John son of Simon de Kirketon in Holand was seised of the manor and on his death without heir the manor descended to one Margaret then married to one John son of Ralph Champeney of Quappelade, to one Alice, late the wife of William son of Hugh de Flete, and to one Joan, late the wife of Peter Hedle, who afterwards married one John son of Reginald de Aslacton, knight (*militis*), the elder (*senior*), as his sisters and heirs; that afterwards in the king's court at Notyngnam, on Monday after Martinmas in the third year of the king, before William de Herle and his fellow justices then in eyre in the county of Nottingham, a fine was levied between the same John son of Reginald the elder, plaintiff, and the said John son of Ralph Champeney and Margaret, his wife, deforciant, of her third part of the manor, whereby they surrendered the same to him and his heirs, that the same John son of Reginald acquired in fee another third part of the manor from the said Alice under the name of Alice daughter of Simon de Kirketon in Hoyland and sometime wife of William son of Hugh de Flete, in free widowhood, and he and his wife Joan held the other third part as her inheritance; that afterwards in the king's court at York, on the quinzaine of Hilary, in the eighth year, a fine was levied before William de Herle and his fellows, justices of the Bench, between the same John son of Reginald and Joan, his wife, plaintiffs, and one Hugh de Aslacton, chaplain, deforciant, of the third part pertaining to Joan, whereby they acknowledged the same to be the right of Hugh and he granted the same to them in tail, with remainder to William de Stanford in tail, and to the said Reginald son of William del Wodehouses in fee; that the said John son of Reginald by charter afterwards granted in fee to Thomas de Sibethorp, parson of the church of Bekyngnam, founder of the said chapel, the said manor of Sibethorp entire, with all its appurtenances in Sibethorp, Shelton and Knyveton; that Joan died without heir of her body and the said William de Stanford likewise died without heir of his body; that afterwards a fine was levied in this court, on the octaves of Trinity, in the twentieth year, between the same Thomas, plaintiff, and John son of Reginald, deforciant, of the manor, whereby the latter acknowledged the same to be the right of Thomas and his heirs; that the manor being thus in his seisin Reginald son of William del Wodehouses released to Thomas all right of him and his heirs therein, and the said William, father of the plaintiff, whose heir he is, likewise released to him all right of him and his heirs and then the plaintiff here in Michaelmas Term, in the twentieth year, brought a writ of right against him touching his seisin, whereon judgement was given for Thomas; and that after this Thomas with the king's licence granted the manor to the warden and his successors in frank almon towards the sustenance of a warden and eight chaplains to celebrate divine service daily in the chapel and in the church of St. Peter, Sibethorp, and the chapel

of the blessed Anne in that church. and of three clerks to serve them, to find and maintain thirty-one in the church and chapels and the chancel of the church and a lamp to burn in the chancel at certain times, alms for the poorer parishioners of Sibethorp, to wit on every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, seven wheaten loaves each of the weight of 50s. to be distributed in perpetuity, and certain anniversaries, according to the ordinance for the appropriation of the said church; he says also that in Trinity Term of the twenty-first year the said Reginald son of William brought a writ of right against him in respect of the manor, whereon judgement was given in his favour, after which, in Hilary Term following, William del Wodehouses, the father, brought a like writ against him, whereon judgment was again given for him; and that afterwards a fine was levied here in the Bench, on the morrow of Martinmas last between defendant and the plaintiff, whereby the latter acknowledged the manor to be the right of defendant, and then the right of the warden in all the premises was confirmed by the king. Judgement for the warden.

Defendant answers that in Michaelmas Term last a fine was levied in this court between Thomas de Sibethorpe, parson of Bekyngtham, plaintiff, founder of the chapel, and demandant, deforciant, of the same rent, whereby the latter acknowledged the same to be the right of Thomas and granted the same to him and his heirs, with the homages and services of Robert son of William del Grene, of Sibethorpe, Robert Adam, William Elys, Henry Elys, Robert de Scrydelyngton, parson of the church of Skeldynghop, Isabel late the wife of Robert de Scridelyngton, Robert son of the same Robert, John Alisaundre of Sibethorpe, Simon de Sibethorpe and John the younger his son, William son of Simon de Sibethorpe and Cecily, his wife, Constance daughter of Roger de Botelesford of Sibethorpe, Alice daughter of Constance de Botelesford, Sarah late the wife of Walter de Esshewellethorpe of Sibethorpe, Henry son of the same Walter, Hugh de Sancto Paulo, Geoffrey Bythelane of Sibethorpe, John, his son, William son of John, John de Congham, William de Middleton, Elias de Middleton and their heirs, in return for which Thomas gave him 10 marks; and Thomas then granted the same in the foundation of the chapel after which plaintiff released to defendant all his right therein. Judgement for the warden.

Inscriptum and confirmation, for 20*l.* which the bishop will pay to the king, of letters patent of Ralph, bishop of Bath and Wells, dated at Banewelle, 1 June, 1349, made with the assent of his chapters of Bath and Wells, shewing that whereas, with the licence of all interested and by apostolic authority he has appropriated the parish church of Chyw to the bishop's table, he ordains that the vicar of that church shall find two chaplains, one attendant upon the cure of the parish and the other to celebrate masses daily in the chapel of Doundray, as has been wont to be done in the past, and to take part in the other divine offices in the church of Chyw, further that in the said church there shall be three chaplains, bound to celebrate daily masses as fixed by the vicar, one in honour of the Virgin Mary, another for the good estate of King Edward and for his soul when he is dead, and for the souls of his progenitors and successors and the faithful departed, and the third for the good estate of the bishop and for his soul when he is dead and for the souls of his predecessors and successors and of his relations and benefactors and the faithful departed, in which masses and the prayers special prayer shall be made for the peace of the church, the king and the realm, and these chaplains shall attend daily in the church of Chyw at the canonical hours with the vicar and chaplains aforesaid, and shall render assistance to the vicar at other times if required. And seeing that there are in his church of Welles boys called choristers (*choriste*) who serve in the divine offices, who have no rents assigned them for their food and clothing, so that many times they are in such want that they must needs be absent from the divine offices and seek elsewhere for means of livelihood, the bishop, with the assent of the chapters ordains that there shall be ten choristers to receive ten marks yearly from the vicar of the said church from fruits assigned to him below, to be paid by him in the church of Welles every quarter beginning from Michaelmas next. For the charges expended by him in prosecuting the annexing of the church as above, the bishop ordains that the dean and chapter of Welles and the prior and chapter of Bath shall be held to celebrate every year for ever on the morrow of the Purification solemn masses in their churches for his good estate, and his obit when he shall have passed away, as the devout and more solemn masses have been wont to be held there, on the day of his passing away, each chapter receiving for such celebration and holding 5 marks out of fruits assigned below to the church of Chyw and the vicar thereof. To enable the vicar to bear all the charges imposed on him by the foregoing, the bishop appropriates to him the lands, meadows, tenants and tenements, wood, underwoods and groves, as well as the manse of the rectory, which have been wont to be of the demesne of the church or the rectory aforesaid, the water-mill, great and small tithes and all fruits, rents and issues with all other profits received by the rectors of Chyw in the past, and endows the vicarage with these, saving to the bishop and his successors the tithes and issues of animals or of other things arising in their demesne and their jurisdiction of the church, and a pension of 20 marks to his churches of Bath and Wells of ancient time paid out of the church of Chyw. Each vicar at his institution shall swear on the Holy Evangelists to observe these ordinances. And the mayor, to wit John de Nuttele, and the commonalty and the others come in person and defend the force and injury, and as to the supposed impediment, the mayor and commonalty say that there is a great plot of land adjacent to the graveyard, to wit from a cross placed in the graveyard as far as the church of St. Maurice, and from the same cross as far as the wall by the house late of Walter de Helle, towards the city, which is their soil as parcel of the city and hath been so for all time, and they have ever held fairs and markets there as on their own soil; and because the bishop on the day in question would have dug in the same soil and had burial of the dead and divers other *mainours* done there they have recently hindered him, as lawful was for them to do.

The said John Otewy, Ralph and Walter say that they are men of the commonalty of the city aforesaid and as such came with the mayor to aid him, and as to the impediment that was lawful.

And upon this the mayor and commonalty and the others put in their plea John de Tille, touching the plea aforesaid.

At which day, come the bishop by Roger de Haywode, his attorney, and the others by their attorney aforesaid, and jurors likewise, who having been elected by consent of the parties and sworn find that within the limits and bounds named by the bishop they have several houses and there are buildings made of ancient time adjoined to an ancient wall between 'le Munstre Yate' and 'la Giehalle,' and between 'la Giehalle' and the church of St. Maurice, and as to the plots whereon the buildings are whether these are of the soil of the bishop or of the mayor and commonalty they are wholly ignorant, but that the whole plot void and not built on without the said houses towards the monastery, to wit from the corner within the gate of 'Munstre Yate' as far as the house late of William le Ismongere, and from that house as far as the fabric of 'la Wollefilde' and thence towards the High Street of the city as far as the gate called 'Thomes Yate' and thence in a straight line as far as the dyke called 'Templedych,' by the church of St. Maurice, and so along the dyke to the river of 'la Posterne,' is the bishop's soil and parcel of the graveyard, granted by the charter of King Henry shown to the jurors as evidence, and not the soil of the mayor and commonalty or parcel of the city, that the bishop and his predecessors in right of their church have been in continual seisin thereof, from the time of the gift, and that the plot where the impediment was made is parcel of the plot not built on and is the bishop's soil.

And it is to be known that this plea was pleaded and jury taken in the presence of Henry Sturmy, sheriff of Southampton, who
