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
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
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

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Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

Standard times* are given in all columns headed Toronto, Quebec, and Winnipeg.

The times* of the Sun's Rising and Setting are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction for . Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg

The standard times both for the rising and setting of the Moon's centre are given for every day for Toronto.

Quebec and Winnipeg.

The column, Sun on Meridian, gives the time that a watch keeping local mean time should show when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

Moon's Age. - This column shows to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto mean noon,

The column, Upper Transit of Pole Star, shows for every day the mean time* at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. It passes the meridian twice on October 13th.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11h. 58m. 2s. to the time of

the preceding upper transit.

The column, Transir or First Point of Aries, shows for every day the meantime* at which the First Point of Aries passes the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. (71° 30'), and for any other meridian a correction of 0.655 sees. per degree will have to be applied minus for longitudes west of the 71° 30', and plus for east. This column is put in especially to be used in connection with the Tables for Time and Azimuth of Polaris when vertical with certain other stars.

GREATEST ELONGATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This column gives the greatest Azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 42°, with the corresponding 1st corrections, which are additive, for latitudes up to 65°. (See pages 33 and 34.) A column for 2nd corrections for minutes of latitude is inserted under the heading "Azimuth values of changes of 1' in latitude" on page 34, to be used as follows:

From the time of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table. These constants are calculated for declination 88° 47′ 18″. The maximum error in the use of this Table will not exceed 3 secs. in the higher latitudes, and proportionately less for the lower latitudes.

Moon's Phases.—This Table gives the times (standard 75th meridian)* when the Moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180°, and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

* In the present Almanac the hours are numbered from 0 (midnight) to 23.

† Although these times are calculated for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg only the standard times at other places not differing much from them in latitude may be obtained with sufficient accuracy for ordinary purposes by adding four minutes for every degree west, and subtracting four minutes for every degree east of these places.

Star Table.

From the times of the transit of the First Point of Aries may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the approximate times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars, as seen from the parallel of 45° north latitude.

To ascertain when any star found in the following Table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the transit of the First Point of Aries for the given day in the calendar. If the result exceeds 24 hours, subtract 23h. 56m. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. The stars marked (...) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at places in and to the north of latitude 45°.

Eclipses.

In the year 1902 there will be five eclipses, three of the sun and two of the moon:

I.—A partial eclipse of the sun, 1902, April Sth. This eclipse will be partly visible in the Yukon District, but will be very small. Magnitude of greatest eclipse=0.065 (sun's diameter=1.0).

II.—A total eclipse of the moon, 1902, April 22nd; invisible in Canada.

III.—A partial eclipse of the sun, 1902, May 7th; invisible in Canada.

IV.—A total eclipse of the moon, 1902, October 16th; the beginning visible generally in North and South America and the western portions of Europe and Africa; the ending visible generally in North and South America and the extreme north-east portions of Asia.

AZIMUTH OF "POLARIS" AND LOCAL MEAN TIME.

By F. L. Blake, O.L.S. & D.L.S. (Astronomical Officer, Observatory, Toronto).

These Tables give the Azimuth of Polaris and the Local Mean Time (not Standard time) when in the same These Tables give the Azimuth of Polaris and the Local Mean Time (not Standard time) when in the same Vertical Circle with certain bright stars to be observed during the evening between sunset and midnight. The Local Mean Time is obtained by using the column under the heading of Time in conjunction with the Transit of the First Point of Aries over the meridian of longitude, 4h 46m or 71° 30′ W., and for any other meridian than this the tabulated Transit of First Point of Aries should receive a correction of 0.655 sees. for each degree of longitude differing from 71° 30′. Subtractive when the place of observation is West and additive East.

One of the simplest methods for obtaining time is to observe the transit of the Sun or stars across the meridian, but this line is not always known with sufficient accuracy, and these tables have been prepared with a view to supply surveyors, explorers and others with a ready means of obtaining a known line any clear night by which the Local Time and azimuth of the Pole star can be at once ascertained. This line is simply one that

by which the Local Time and azimuth of the Pole star can be at once ascertained. This line is simply one that passes through Polaris, the zenith of the observer and one of the stars of the tables. A method of obtaining this Vertical Circle would be as follows: A short time before the Local Mean Time of passage of the Time Star (this time should be taken out of the Almanac from the tables before the observation) have the instrument set up, well levelled and the collimation error reduced to zero. Sight on Polaris, clamp the azimuth plate and turn the telescope over to the other star and wait till it appears in the field of view. Then turn back again to Polaris and bisect accurately by means of the tangent screw, note the time angain turn over to the Time Star and take the time of its passage over the wires. This time should agree very closely with that in the tables, and if not your watch is in error. At the same time Polaris is at its tabulated Azimuth, corresponding to the latitude of the place and corrected for date and time interval.

Either before or after this observation the Latitude may be very easily obtained from the Latitude Tables which follow by sighting on Polaris, noting the time and reading the altitude circle.

The Transit of the First Point of Aries will be found in the calendar tabulated for every day of the year for longitude 4h 46m (71° 30')

Below each tabulated star will be found the Dates for observing the stars between sunset and midnight with corresponding Azimuth Corrections to the tabulated azimuths.

The elevation of the Time star is also given to help to identify it.

The corrections in column a' are decimals of a second of arc, and are to be multiplied by the time interval in seconds to give the correction.

EXAMPLE.

Suppose that in latitude 52° 30′ and longitude 106° 15′ by account on April 16th, 1902, Polaris was observed at watch time 23h 38m 55s and a Virginis (Spica) in the same vertical at 23h 41m 10s, giving a time interval of 135 seconds—required the watch error and Azimuth of Polaris. Also at 23h 45m 13s, watch time, Polaris was again observed to obtain the correction to the supposed latitude, the observed altitude corrected being 51° 17′. First of all to find the watch error.

The correction for an increase of altitude of one inch in the barometer or for a decrease of one degree in the thermometer, is to be added to the tabular refraction, but when the barometer is lower than 30 inches, or the thermometer higher than 47°, the corrections become subtractive. TIDE TABLES FOR HALIFAX, QUEBEC, AND ST. JOHN, N.B., 1902.

These Tide Tables, with Tidal Differences for other places, are issued by the Tidal Survey Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada. They are based upon direct observations of the tides, obtained by means of self-registering tide-gauges, which are kept in continuous operation day and night throughout the year. The records are reduced by the latest methods of analysis, and the computation of the tables is made in the Nautical Almanac Office, London.

The Tide Tables for Halifax are based upon the analysis of a record which was obtained during the years 1851, 1852, 1860 and 1861, with which there has been incorporated the record for one full year from the present tidegauge. The Quebec Tables are based upon the record for four complete years. The St. John Tables are based upon the record for two complete years.

The Tidal Differences are based upon simultaneous observations taken throughout the St. Lawrence and the Bay of Funday.

LEGAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES IN CANADA.

The legal weights and measures of Canada are the meperial yard, Imperial pound avoirdupois, Imperial gallon (of 277-27384 cubic inches), and the Imperial bushel. The Imperial gallon is equal to 4.54174 litres, while the wine gallon, used in the United States, is equal to 3.785 litres.

By Act 42nd Vic. (1879), Chap. 16 (amended by Chap. 30, Acts of 1898), it is provided: That in contracts for sale and delivery of any of the undermentioned articles, the bushel should be determined by weighing, unless a bushel measure be specially agreed upon, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows:—

Wheat, 60 lbs. Indian Corn, 56 lbs. Rye, 56 lbs. Pease, 60 lbs. Barley, 48 lbs. Malt, 36 lbs. Oats, 34 lbs.

Bcans, 60 lbs. Flax seed*, 56 lbs. Hemp, 44 lbs, Blue grass seed, 14 lbs. Lime*, 80 lbs. Castor beens, 40 lbs. Potatoes, 60 lbs. Turnips, 60 lbs. Carrots, 60 lbs. Beets, 60 lbs. Onions*, 50 lbs. Bituminous coal, 70 lbs. Clover seed, 60 lbs. Timothy, 48 lbs. Buckwheat, 48 lbs.

By the same Act the British hundredweight of 112 pounds and the ton of 2,240 pounds were abolished, and the hundredweight was declared to be 100 pounds, and the ton 2,000 pounds avoirdupois, thus assimilating the weights of Canada and the United States.

SHORT HISTORY OF CANADA.

FROM 1497 TO 1901.

The following brief resumé of the principal events in the history of our country is taken from the Statistical Abstract, and will be found of interest. The remarkable events of the year 1900–1901 are given in another portion of the Almanac.

CHRONOLOGICAL LANDMARKS IN THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

1497-June 24. Cabot discovered Cape Breton.

1500—Gasper Cortereal entered the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

1517—Sebastian Cabot discovered Hudson Bay.

1524—Verrazano explored the Atlantic coast of Nova Scotia.

1534—July 1. Landing of Jacques Cartier at Esquimaux Bay. First landing on Canadian soil.

1535-July. Second visit of Cartier.

August 10. Cartier anchored in a small bay at the mouth of the St. John River, which, in honour of the day, he named after St. Lawrence. The name was afterwards extended to the gulf and river.

1540-Third visit of Cartier.

1542-43—The Sieur de Roberval and his party wintered at Cap Rouge.

1598—The Marquis de la Roche landed 40 convicts on Sable Island, where they were left for five years without relief, only twelve being found alive at the end of that time.

1603—First visit of Samuel de Champlain to Canada.

1605—Founding of Port Royal (Annapolis), Acadia (derived from an Indian word "Cadie," a place of abundance), by the Baron de Poutrincourt.

1608—Second visit of Champlain. Founding of Quebec, the first permanent settlement of Canada. The name is said to be an Indian one, "Kebec," a strait. 28 settlers wintered there, including Champlain.

1611—Establishment of a trading post at Hochelaga.

Jesuits arrive in Port Royal, Acadia.

1613—St. John's, Newfoundland, founded. Ottawa River discovered by Champlain. (Champlain sailed up the Ottawa River, crossed Lake Nipissing, and descended French River into Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, returning by Lake Ontario.)

1617—Canada invaded by the Iroquois.

1620-Population of Quebec, 60 persons.

1621—First mention of the name "Nova Scotia" in a grant of the Province to Sir W. Alexander by James I. First code of laws promulgated at Quebec.

1624-Nova Scotia first settled by the English.

1625-Jesuits first arrive in New France.

1627—Canada granted to the Company of "100 Associates" by the king of France. Feudal system established in Canada.

1629—July. Capture of Quebec by the English under Sir David Kirke. 117 persons wintered there.

1632—Canada, Cape Breton, and Acadia restored to France by the Treaty of St. Germain-en-Laye. First school opened in Canada at Quebec.

1634—July 4. The town of Three Rivers founded.

August 13, Fort Richelieu (Sorel) founded.

1635—Sillery founded Jesuits' College in Quebec. Lake Michigan discovered by Nicolet. December 25. Death of Champlain at Quebec.

1639—Ursuline Convent founded at Quebec.

1640—Lake Erie discovered by Chaumonot and Brébœuf.

1642—May 18. Ville Marie (Montreal) founded by Maisonneuve.

1642-1667—Frequent and serious wars between the French and the Iroquois Indians.

1647-Lake St. John discovered.

1651-Expedition to Hudson's Bay.

1654—Acadia taken by the English.

1659—M. de Laval, first Roman Catholic Bishop of Canada, arrived from France. Lake Superior discovered by French traders.

1663--Company of "100 Associates" dissolved. Royal government established. First courts of law.

1664—Seigniories granted.

1667—Acadia restored to France by Treaty of Breda. White population of New France, 3,918.

1670—May 13 (n.s.). Hudson's Bay Company founded. 1672—Count de Frontenac appointed governor. Population, 6,705.

1673-June 13. Cataraqui (Kingston) founded.

1674-Iroquois established at Caughnawaga.

1689-August 5. Massacre at Lachine by Indians.

1690—Capture of Port Royal by Sir William Phipps, and unsuccessful attack upon Quebec.

1692-Population of New France, 12,431.

1695—Iberville took English forts in Hudson's Bay.

1697—Treaty of Ryswick. Mutual restoration of places taken during the war.

1698—Death of Frontenac. Population, 13,355.

1701—August 4. Ratification of a treaty of peace with the Iroquois at Montreal. Canadians granted leave to manufacture.

1709-10-11—Canada invaded by the British. Port Royal (Annapolis) taken by Nicholson (1710).

1713—Treaty of Utrecht, by which Hudson's Bay and adjacent territory, Nova Scotia (Acadia) and Newfoundland were ceded to the British.

1715-First ships built at Quebec.

1719—First government founded by the British in Nova Scotia.

1720—Population of New France, 24,434, and of St.
John's Island (Prince Edward Island), about
100. Fort of Louisburg built.

1721—January 27. Mail stages established between Quebec and Montreal.

1722—Division of settled country in Canada into parishes.

1739—Population of New France, 42,701. First forge erected in Canada—at St. Maurice.

1745-Louisburg, Cape Breton, taken by the British.

- 1747—Militia rolls drawn up for Canada. Courts of Justice constituted in Nova Scotia.
- 1748—Restoration of Louisburg to the French in exchange for Madras, by the peace of Aix-la-Chapelle.
- 1749—June 21. The city of Halifax founded by Lord Halifax; 2,544 British emigrants brought out by the Hon. Edward Cornwallis.
- 1752—March 23. Issue of the Halifax *Gazette*, the first paper published in Canada.
- 1755—Expulsion of the Acadians from Nova Scotia.

 About 3,000 were deported at the request of the New England colonists.
- 1758—First meeting of Nova Scotian Legislature.

 July 26. Final capture of Louisburg by the
 British.
- 1759—July 26. Capture of Fort Niagara by the British under General Prideaux, who was killed during the assault.
 - July 25. Commencement of the siege of Quebec. September 12. Battle of the Plains of Abraham and defeat of the French by General Wolfe, who was killed on the field. Loss of the British, 700; and of the French, 1,500.
 - September 13. Death of General Montcalm, commander of the French forces.
 - September 18. Capitulation of Quebec to General Townsend.
- 1760—April. Unsuccessful attack on Quebec by General de Lévis. Capitulation of Montreal and completion of the conquest of Canada. Population of New France, 70,000.
- 1762—British population of Nova Scotia, 8,104. First English settlement in New Brunswick.
- 1763—February 10. Treaty of Paris signed, by which
 France ceded and guaranteed to his Britannic
 Majesty in full right "Canada with all its
 dependencies."

Cape Breton annexed to Nova Scotia.

- 1764—June 21. Issue of the Quebec Gazette. In this year Pontiac, chief of the Ottawas, organized a conspiracy for a simultaneous rising among the Indian tribes, and a general massacre of the British. The plan was successfully carried out in several places and all the inhabitants put to death, but finally the Indians were forced to succumb.
- 1768—General Carleton, afterwards Lord Dorchester, appointed Governor-General.
- 1769—St. John's Island (Prince Edward Island) made into a separate province, with Walter Patterson for the first governor. The first meeting of an elected House of Assembly took place in July, 1773.
- 1774—The "Quebec Act" passed. This Act gave the French Canadians the free exercise of the Roman Catholic religion, the enjoyment of their civil rights, and the protection of their own civil laws and customs. It annexed large territories to the Province of Quebec and provided for the appointment by the Crown of a Legislative Council, and for the administration of the criminal law as in use in England. North-west coast of British Columbia explored by Vancouver and Cook.

- 1775 Outbreak of the American Revolution and invasion of Canada by the Americans; every place of importance rapidly fell into their hands, with the exception of Quebec, in an attack upon which General Montgomery was defeated and killed on 31st December.
- 1776—Reinforcements arrived from England, and the Americans were finally driven out of Canada.
- 1777—Order of Jesuits abolished by Papal decree and consequent escheat of their estates in Canada to the Crown.
- 1778—June 3. First issue of the Montreal *Gazette*.

 This paper is still published.
- 1783—September 3. Signing of the Treaty of Versailles and definition of the boundary line between Canada and the United States, viz., the great lakes, the St. Lawrence, the 45th parallel of north latitude, the highlands dividing the waters falling into the Atlantic from those emptying themselves into the St. Lawrence and the Ste. Croix river.
- 1784—Population of Canada, 113,012. (United Empire Loyalists in Upper Canada not included.) Fredericton, N.B., founded. Cape Breton separated from Nova Scotia politically.
 - British population of Nova Scotia, 32,000 (about 11,000 Acadians not included
- 1784-About this time began the migration into Canada and Nova Scotia of the United Empire Loyalists, as they were called-that is, of those settlers in the United States who had remained faithful to the British cause. This migration lasted for several years, and though it is not possible to arrive at any exact figures, it is probable that the number altogether was not less than 40,000. The Loyalists were well treated by the British Government, and large grants of land were made to them in various parts of the country. The banks of the St. Lawrence and the shores of Lake Ontario, in particular, were settled by about 10,000 persons, on lands allotted to them by the Government.
- 1785—May 18. Date of charter of St. John, N.B., the oldest incorporated town in Canada. Sydney, C.B., founded by Lieutenant-Governor Desbarres.
 - August 16. New Brunswick made a separate province; population, 11,457. Reintroduction of the right of habeas corpus.
- 1787—First Colonial See established in the British Empire in connection with the Church of England, in Nova Scotia,
- 1788—Western Canada (now Ontario) divided into five districts, and English law introduced. King's College (N.S.) founded.
- 1791—Division of the Province of Quebec into two provinces, viz., Upper and Lower Canada. Each province to have a lieutenant-governor, and a legislature composed of a house of assembly and a legislative council. The members of the council were to be appointed by the lieutenant-governor for life; those of the assembly to be elected by the people for

four years. Population of the two provinces, 161.311.

1792—September 17. First meeting of the parliament of Upper Canada at Newark (Niagara), under Lieutenant-Governor Sincoe. The House of Assembly consisted of sixteen members.

December 17. Opening of the Legislature of Lower Canada, at Quebec, by Gen. Clarke. The house of assembly consisted of fifty members.

1793—Abolition of slavery in Upper Canada. Upper and Lower Canada separated from the Church of England See of Nova Scotia, and constituted a separate See. Toronto founded as York. Rocky Mountains crossed by Mackenzie. Public accounts first published.

1796 -- The seat of government of Upper Canada removed from Niagara to York (Toronto).

1798—The name of St. John's Island changed to that of Prince Edward Island, in honour of the Duke of Kent, the change to take effect in 1800. Population, 4,500.

1799—Education Act passed in Upper Canada.

1800—Jesuits' estates taken possession of by the Government. King's College (N.B.) granted a royal charter.

1805-January 1. Founding of the Quebec Mercury.

1806—November 22. Issue of *Le Canadien*, the first newspaper printed entirely in French. Population of Upper Canada, 70,718, and of Lower Canada, 250,000.

1807-Grammar schools founded in Upper Canada.

1809—First steamer on St. Lawrence river.

1811-Judges excluded from parliament.

1812—War declared between Great Britain and the United States.

July 17. Mackinaw surrendered to the British.
July 18-20. U. S. troops repulsed at River Canard.

August 5. Tecumseh defeated U. S. troops at Brownstown.

August 16. Surrender of Detroit by the Americans under General Hull to General Brock.

September 16. U.S. troops repulsed at Presqu'Ile.

September 21. Gananoque raided by U. S. troops.

October 13. U. S. troops defeated at Queenston. November 10. Kingston bombarded by U. S. troops.

November 20. U. S. troops repulsed at Odelltown.

November 28. U. S. troops repulsed near Fort Erie,

CANADIAN TARIFF OF CUSTOMS.

MEANING OF TERMS USED.

In this Act, and in any other Act relating to customs,

unless the context otherwise requires,—
The initials "n. e. s." represent and have the meaning of the words "not elsewhere specified";
The initials "n. o. p." represent and have the meaning of the words "not otherwise provided for";
"The autresion "tealler" means a pinnerial realization.

The expression "gallon" means an imperial gallon; The expression "ton" means two thousand pounds

avoirdupois;

The expression "proof" or "proof spirits," when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spiries of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0 9198 as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature;

The expression "gauge," when applied to metal sheets or plates or to wire, means the thickness as determined by Stubbs's standard gauge;
The expression "in diameter," when applied to

tubing, means the actual inside diameter;
The expression "sheet," when applied to metals, means a sheet or plate not exceeding three-sixteenths of

an inch in thickness;
The expression "plate," when applied to metals, means a plate or sheet more than three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness.

FISH FROM UNITED STATES AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

The whole or part of the duties hereby imposed upon fish and other products of the fisheries may be remitted as respects either the United States or Newfoundland, or both, upon proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the Governments of the United States and Newfoundland, or either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from Canada, in reduction or repeal of the duties in force in the said countries respectively.

EXPORT OF GAME PROHIBITED.

The export of wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcase or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited; and any person exporting orattempting to export any such article shall for each offence incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export, be seized by any officer of the customs, and, if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for breach of the customs laws: Provided, that this section shall not apply to the export, under such regulations as are made by the Governor in Coun-cil, of any carcase or part thereof of any deer raised or bred by any person, company or association of persons upon his or their own lands.

Deer when shot for sport, under license, may be exported under regulations of the Customs Department.

Regulations respecting the export of "Home-bred Deer."

Any person who wishes to export any carcase or parts thereof of deer raised or bred upon his own land, or upon lands owned by a company or association of persons of which he is a member, shall make affidavit upon the face of the export entry to the effect that the deer, the carcase or parts whereof is so entered for exporta-tion, was raised or bred upon his own lands or upon lands owned or held by a company or association of persons of which he is a member (describing the location of such lands, and naming the association or company holding the same).

DUTIES ON MOLASSES AND SYRUPS.

Regulations respecting the manner in which molasses and syrups shall be sampled and tested for the purpose of determining the classes to which they belong with reference to the duty chargeable thereon shall be made by the controller of customs, and the instruments and appliances necessary for such determination shall be designated by him and supplied to such officers as are by him charged with the duty of sampling and testing such molasses and syrups; and the decision of any officer (to whom is so assigned the testing of such

articles) as to the duties to which they are subject under the tariff shall be final and conclusive, unless upon appeal to the commissioner of customs within thirty days from the rendering of such decision, such decision is, with the approval of the controller, changed; and the decision of the commissioner with such approval shall be final.

DUTIES ON WINES AND SPIRITS.

In the case of all wines, spirits, or alcoholic liquors subject to duty according to their relative strength of proof, such strength shall be ascertained either by means of Sykes's hydrometer or of the specific gravity bottle, as the Minister of Customs directs; and in case such relative strength cannot be correctly ascertained by the direct use of the hydrometer or gravity bottle, it shall be ascertained by the distillation of a sample and the subsequent test in like manner of the distillate.

MEDICINAL AND TOILET PREPARATIONS.

All medicinal or toilet preparations imported for com-pleting the manufacture thereof, or for the manufacture of any other article by the addition of any ingredient or ingredients, or by mixing such preparations, or by put-ting up or labelling the same, alone or with other articles or compounds, under any proprietary or special name or trade-mark, shall be valued for duty under the provision of subsection two of section sixty-five of *The Customs Act*, as amended by section fifteen of chapter ourteen of the statutes of 1888.

EDICINAL PREPARATIONS TO BE LABELLED.

All medicinal preparations, whether chemical or other, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of such manufacturer and the place where they are prepared, and the word "alcoholic" or "non-alcoholic," permanently and legibly affixed to each parcel by stamp, label or otherwise; and all medicinal preparations imported without such names and word so affixed may be forfeited.

DUTY ON PACKAGES.

Packages shall be subject to the following provisions: All bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels, and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass or any other material capable of holding liquids, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases, not otherwise provided for, in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors or other liquids are contained, and every package being the first receptacle or covering inclosing goods for the purpose of sale, shall in all cases, not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an advalorem duty or a specific and advalorem duty, be charged with the same rate of ad valorem duty as is to be levied and collected on the goods they contain, and the value of the packages may be included in the value of such goods;

All such packages as aforesaid containing goods subject to a specific duty only, and not otherwise provided for, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent. ad valorem;

Packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty;

All such special packages or coverings as are of any use, or apparently designed for use other than the importation of the goods they contain, shall be subject to the same rate of duty as would thereon be levied if imported empty or separate from their contents;

Packages (inside or outside) containing free goods shall be exempt from duty when the packages are of such a nature that their destruction is necessary in order to release the goods.

PENALTY FOR HAVING BLANK INVOICE WITH CERTIFICATE OF CORRECTNESS.

Any person who, without lawful excuse, the proof of which shall be on the person accused, sends or brings into Canada, or who, being in Canada, has in his possession, any bill-heading or other paper appearing to be a heading or blank capable of being filled up and used as an invoice, and bearing any certificate purporting to

show, or which may be used to show, that the invoice which may be made from such bill-heading or blank is correct or authentic, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty of five hundred dollars, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, in the discretion of the court, and the goods entered under any invoice made from any such bill-heading or blank shall be forfeited.

AFFIDAVIT OF IMPORTER CLAIMING LOWER RATE OF DUTY ON CERTAIN GOODS.

With respect to goods imported for manufacturing purposes that are admissible under this Act for any specific purposes at a lower rate of duty than would otherwise be chargeable, or exempt from duty, the importer claiming such exemption from duty, or proportionate exemption from duty, shall make and subscribe to the following affidavit or affirmation before the collector of customs at the port of entry, or before a notary multiple or a commissioner for taking affidavite.

the collector of customs at the port of entry, or before a notary public or a commissioner for taking affidavits: I, (name of importer) the undersigned, importer of the (names of the goods or articles) mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (awear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles) are imported by me for the manufacture of (names of the goods to be manufactured) in my own factory, situated at (name of the place, county and province), and that no portion of the same will be used for any other purpose or disposed of until so manufactured. manufactured.

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On and after the 1st day of August, 1898, section 17 of the said Act shall be repealed, and the following shall

be substituted therefor:—
"Articles which are the growth, produce or manufacture of any of the following countries may, when imported direct into Canada from any of such countries, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty

provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in Schedule D to this Act:—(a) The United Kingdom; (b) The British colony of Bermuda; (c) The British colonies, commonly called the British West Indies, including the following: the Bahamas, Jamaica, Turks and Caicos Islands, the Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, and the Virgin Islands, the Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia), Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago; (d) British Guiana; (e) Any other British colony or possession the customs tariff of which is, on the whole, as favourable to Canada as the British preferprovided in the British preferential tariff set forth in whole, as favourable to Canada as the British preferential tariff herein referred to is to such colony or possession.

Provided however, that manufactured articles to be admitted under such preferential tariff shall be bona fide the manufactures of a country or countries entitled to the benefits of such tariff, and that such benefits shall not extend to the importation of articles into the production of which there has not entered a substantial protection of which determined has not effected a substitution of the labour of such countries. Any question arising as to any article being entitled to such benefits shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose

decision shall be final.

"Raw sugar, including all sugar described in item
436 of Schedule A, may, when imported direct from any British colony or possession, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff.

"The Minister of Customs, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall determine what British colonies or possessions shall be entitled to the benefits of the preferential tariff under clause (d) of subsection 1

of this section.

"The Minister of Customs may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the intention of this section.

THE FRENCH TREATY.

(Circular from the Customs Department, dated 14th October, 1895.)

I beg to send herewith, for your information and guidance, text of a proclamation by the Governor in Council, dated the 10th day of October, 1895, declaring the provisions of the French Treaty Act in force on, from and after the 14th October, 1895.

tollows:—
"Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of French origin entering Canada

shall enjoy the following advantages:

1. Non-sparkling wines gauging 15 degrees by the centesimal alcoholometer or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing, containing 26 per cent. or less of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtaxe or ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

2. The present duty charged on common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) shall be reduced by

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes

and plums shall be reduced by one-third.

The following articles of Canadian origin imported direct from that country accompanied by certificates of origin shall receive the advantage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria or the French colonies:— Canned meats.

Condensed milk, pure. Fresh water fish, eels.

Fresh water isn, eets.
Fish preserved in their natural form.
Lobsters and crayfish preserved in their natural form.
Apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed.
Fruits preserved, others.
Building timber in rough or sawn.

Wood pavement.

Staves

Wood pulp (cellulose). Extract of chestnut and other tanning extracts.

Common paper, machine-made. Prepared skins, others, whole.

Boots and shoes.

Furniture of common wood.

Furniture other than chairs, of solid wood, common.

Flooring in pine or soft wood.

Wooden sea-going ships.

Your attention is also directed to the following provisions of "An Act respecting Commercial Treaties affecting Canada," Chap. 3, 58—59 Vict., viz.:—
"1. So soon as The French Treaty Act, 1894, chapter two of the Statutes of 1894, is brought into force by proclamation of the Governor General, the advantages granted to France by the treaty with that power mentioned in the said Act, with respect to its commerce with Canada, shall extend to any and every other foreign power which by reason of the operation of such foreign power which by reason of the operation of such treaty is, under the provisions of a treaty with Great Britain, entitled, in whole or in part, to the same or to the like advantages with respect to its commerce with Canada, to the extent to which in manner aforesaid such other foreign power is entitled thereto; and such advantages shall continue to so extend to such other foreign power so long as the said Act remains in force, or until the right of such other foreign power to such advantages under its treaty with Great Britain is sooner determined. determined.

3. The advantages so granted to France by the said treaty shall extend also to Great Britain and to the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada, so long as France con-tinues to be entitled to such advantages; and during the period for which France is so entitled to such advantages, all laws inconsistent with the enjoyment thereof by Great Britain and such British colonies and possessions shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent.

The Foreign Powers entitled to the same advantages The Foreign Powers entitled to the same advantages under the provisions of the said Act, as are granted to France by the Treaty in question, with respect to its commerce with Canada, are: —Argentine Republic, Germany (Zollverein), Austria Hungary, Muscat, Belgium, Russia, Bolivia, Salvador, Chili, Sweden, Norway, Columbia, Spain, Costa Rica.

Satisfactory proof of the origin of the goods in question shall be furnished to the collector at the time of entry.

SCHEDULE D.

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On articles entitled to the benefits of this preferential tariff under section seventeen, the duties men-tioned in schedule A shall be reduced as follows: The reduction shall be one-third of the duty mentioned in schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be two-thirds of the duty mentioned in schedule A in schedulé A.

Provided, however, that this reduction shall not apply to any of the following articles and that such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in schedule A, viz.: wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; tobacco, eigars and eigarettes.

Provided further, that the reduction shall only apply to refined sugar, when evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs is furnished that such refined sugar has been manufactured wholly from raw sugar produced in the British colonies or possessions.

METRICAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The French metrical system is based upon the (assumed) length of the fourth part of a terrestrial meridian. The ten-millionth part of this arc was chosen as the unit of measures of length, and called a *Metre*. The cube of the tenth part of the metre was adopted as the unit of capacity, and denominated a *Litre*. The weight of a litre of distilled water at its greatest density was called a *Kilogramme*, of which the thousandth part, or *Gramme*, was adopted as the unit of weight. The multiples of these, proceeding in decimal progression, are distinguished by the employment of the prefixes deca, hecto, kilo and myria, from the Greek, and the subdivisions by deci. earli if you the Latin :—

EXECUTIVE POWER.

A sovereign, exercising all powers of executive government through a cabinet composed of certain sworn privy councillors, who act as advisers of the crown, and conduct the public administration in accordance with law and constitutional usage. The crown is hereditary, but subject to such limitations as may be imposed by but subject to such limitations as may be imposed by parliament—i.e., by the crown, lords and commons. The head of the administration is the premier, or first minister, who is the choice of the crown; he selects the members of the cabinet and ministry, with the approval of the sovereign. The cabinet consists, at present, of sixteen ministers; the first lord of the treasury is generally premier. In addition to the inner or advisory council, called the cabinet, there are other ministers holding subordinate positions in the government, but who also retire with the cabinet in case of resignation who also retire with the cabinet in case of resignation or defeat. The whole number of persons comprising the government of England, including the chief officials for Scotland and Ireland, is fifty-six. The government hold office as long as they retain the confidence of the house of commons. The common law is the basis of justice in Great Britain and Ireland, and in all colonies and dependencies of the crown. Wherever, in the latter, the civil or other law is in force, it will be stated below in the case of the particular colony.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

The parliament of Great Britain is composed of the crown, lords and commons. The lords consists at present of 593—archbishops (2), hishops (24) and peers, the latter divided into 22 dukes, 22 marquesses, 142 earls, 34 viscounts, and 341 barons. The Ireland by 28 representative peers elected for life. speaker is the lord high chancellor of England, who is a member of the cabinet, and retires with a change of government. The house of lords has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except as respects taxation or money bills. It cannot initiate or annend such bills, but it may under exceptional conditions reject them as a whole. The house of commons is amend such bills, but it may under exceptional condi-tions reject them as a whole. The house of commons is the body where the chief political power rests. It con-sists of 670 members, elected by the legal electors of Great Britain and Ireland, as follows: England 465, Wales 30, Scotland 72, Ireland 103. All elections are now by ballot. Since the reform bill of 1832 the franchise has been widely extended to all classes who have a cause has been widely extended to an classes who have a stake in the country. The suffrage is now divided among freeholders, copyholders, leaseholders, occupants of lands and tenements, and lodgers of a specified value. The house of commons lasts for seven years, unless sooner dissolved by the crown with the advice of the sooner dissolved by the crown with the advice of the cabinet. Parliament is summoned, prorogued and dissolved by the sovereign. The speaker and deputy speaker of the commons are elected by the house for the duration of the parliament. Members do not require a property qualification, but they must be English citizens of the age of 21 years, not bankrupts, or idiots or criminals. Members are not paid. The system of local government has been much simplified quite re-

England and Wales are now divided into 62 cently. administrative counties, including the city of London. In every county there is a council composed of aldermen and councillors. Aldermen are elected for six men and councillors. Aldermen are elected for six years, half of them retiring every third year. A councillor is elected for three years. The counties are again divided into "urban districts" and "rural districts," in which councils are elected. The parish continues to be a unit of local government, and the duties formerly performed by "vestries" are now discharged by "parish meetings" and "parish councils." In cities and towns the affairs are administered by municipal corporations, consisting of mayor, aldermen and burgesses; the mayor and aldermen are elected by the council, and the burgesses by ratepayers. Women can be elected only to district councils and parish councils, including the London vestries. Married as well as single women can vote at parochial elections. In single women can vote at parochial elections. In Scotland there are parish councils, and municipal bodies in towns and cities. The councils of the latter consist of a provost and bailies. In Ireland in some towns and boroughs there are corporations consisting of mayor, aldermen and councillors. In the majority of towns local government is entrusted to commissioners, appointed by the Irish government.

BRITISH COLONIES AND DEPENDENCIES, viz.:

Aden, a British protectorate and fortified station; estimated population, 42,000, mostly Bedouins; area, 75 square miles.

PERIM, a dependency of Aden, has five square miles, and a population of 2,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Under the lieutenant-governor and council of Bombay, who are represented by a president or political resident, who is the commandant of the English troops in the peninsula.

Andaman and Nicobar Islands, a penal settlement; estimated population, 27,000; area, 2,635 square

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Subject to government of Bengal (see India). A chief commissioner and superintendent are appointed by the Indian government.

Ascension Island, a naval station; area, 35 square miles; population, about 500.

EXECUTIVE POWER. - This rocky island is under the control of the English navy.

Australia, Commonwealth of, a federal dependency with representative and responsible government; population (1899), 3,756,894; area, 2,972,573; see statistics given below for New South Wales (p. 105), Tasmania (p. 106), South Australia (p. 105), Western Australia (p. 106), Queensland (p. 105), and Victoria (p. 106), which form the new federation proclaimed in 1901, under the Imperial Act passed in 1900, in accordance with the vote of the people of these several dependencies.

vote of the people of these several dependencies.

Executive Powers.—The King represented by a Governor-General, appointed by the Crown, and advised by an executive council, consisting at first of seven members. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the people, as expressed by their representatives in parliament. The principles of English parliamentary government prevail in the commonwealth and states of the federation. The common and criminal law of England obtains in all the states. The judicature consists of a federal High Court, and such other federal courts as the parliament of the commonwealth may escourts as the parliament of the commonwealth may establish. The justices of these courts are appointed by the

Governor-General-in-Council, and hold office during good behaviour. The High Court is a court of appeal from the courts of the states. Appeals may be made from its decisions to the Privy Council of England under lim-The state courts remain under the sole jurisdiction of the state governments, and appeal can be made direct to the King-in-Council, as heretofore, under certain restrictions.

LEGISLATIVE POWER.—The King, Senate and House of Representatives. The Senators are elected by the people of the states for six years. Each state has an equal representation of six members, and half the number of senators shall retire every three years, but are re-eligible for re-election. The franchise for the election of a senator is the same as that for the popular body at the time of the union. The president is elected by the The place of a senator becomes vacant if he is absent for two consecutive months of a session. House of Representatives consists, as near as possible, of twice the number of Senators, but no state shall have a smaller representation than five members. Members are elected for three years. The Speaker is elected by the house. Members of each house receive £400 each as a sessional indemnity. Bills appropriating revenue or moneys, or imposing taxation shall only originate in the house of representatives. As in Canada and England by practice, the senate may not amend hills imposing taxation or appropriating revenue or moneys for or-dinary annual services of the government. But the dinary annual services of the government. Due sice senate may at any stage return to the lower house a bill requesting the amendment of any items or provisions therein, and the house may accept or reject such proposals. In case of a deadlock a dissolution takes place, and afterwards a joint sitting at which a majority of votes decide the fate of the disputed measure. The federal parliament has power to alter the franchise on which its members are elected, but it cannot diminish the voting powers of the people, or withdraw the right of women to vote as long as adult suffrage obtains in any states. The legislative powers of the federal parliament are alone enumerated, and all other powers rest with the state parliaments. In the event of a federal law conflicting with an existing state law the federal law shall prevail. The federal government has the administration of the departments of customs and excise, which form the chief sources of federal revenue, but of the net revenue from such duties not more than one-fourth shall be applied annually by the commonwealth towards its expenditure, and the balance shall be paid to the several states or applied towards the payment of interest on debts of the several states taken over by the federal government. payment of interest of cents of the several states taken over by the federal government. Uniform duties of customs must be imposed within two years after the establishment of the commonwealth. The king may disallow any federal law within one year from the governor-general's assent. The capital of the commonwealth will be within New South Wales, but at least 100 with the Duday and must be in federal tarritory. 100 miles from Sydney, and must be in federal territory. As the constitutions of the states of the commonwealth remain unchanged until amended by their respective parliaments, I may simply refer the reader for the present to New South Wales, Tasmania, South Australia, Queens-land, Western Australia and Victoria as given below.

Baluchistan, an independent feudatory state of India under the protectorate of England; population, 500,000, largely nomadic; area, 130,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A hereditary khan or chief, who is the head of a confederacy of chiefs, with undefined powers, and aided by an English political agent so far as British interests are concerned

Barbadoes, with representative, but not responsible government; population, 190,000; area, 166 square miles. EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, assisted by an executive committee, officials, military officers, and such other persons as may be nominated by the king, one member of the legislative council, and four members of the assemble, populated by the agreement.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of nine members, appointed by the king, and a house of assembly of 24 members elected annually by the people on a very liberal frauchise, including per-

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.-Legislative authority is exercised by the commissioner by

Bechuanaland, British; formerly a crown colony in South Africa. Annexed to Cape Colony in 1900. Poputation, about 72,000; area, 52,000 square miles.

Bermudas, with representative, but not responsible government; population, 17,500; area, 20 square miles.
EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, assisted by a privy council, appointed by the crown, and consisting of four official and two unofficial members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- A legislative council of nine members, three of whom are official, and six unofficial, but all appointed by the crown. A house of assembly of 36 members, elected by a freehold qualification. Members must have a property qualification, and are paid 8s. a day for attendance. Hamilton and St. George have corporations.

British Central Africa, comprising Nyasaland, an English protectorate; estimated population, 1,000,000. Area, estimated at 42,217 square miles. Execurive Power.—The affairs of Nyasaland are administered by an imperial commissioner under the instructions of the secretary of state for foreign affairs, and the territory beyond rande. Pritish in the and the territory beyond, under British influence, by a commissioner directed by the British South Africa chartered company.

British East Africa, comprising the East Africa protectorate and the Uganda protectorate, on the Maerland, is under the immediate jurisdiction of the foreign office, together with the islands of Zanzibar and Pemba still under the government of the Arab sultan. Commissioners and consul-generals represent British interests in the East African protectorates. total area is probably 1,000,000 square miles, with a population of three or four millions, of whom whites do not reach a thousand altogether.

British North Borneo, a British protectorate; estimated population, 175,000: area, 31,106 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of this protectorate

are, under a royal charter, administered by a court of directors in London, with a governor, treasurer-general and residents appointed by them, but in the case of the governor the appointment must be approved by the foreign secretary of state. The Indian penal and other laws are administered with such modifications as are necessary. English magistrates are stationed in the several provinces.

Brunei, a British protectorate; population, 15,000; area, 3,000 square miles,

EXECUTIVE POWER. - A native state, with a Sultan as a ruler. The consular courts at Borneo have jurisdiction here, with appeals to the supreme court of the Straits Settlements.

Canada, Dominion of, a federal dependency, with representative and responsible government. Population, now about 5,400,000; area, 3,315,647 square miles (exclusive of waters).

EXECUTIVE POWER. — The king represented by a governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised by a cabinet chosen from members of the privy council of Canada, and consisting of 12 ministers, holding departmental offices, besides one or more ministers without office. The government holds office as long as they have the confidence of the popular branch of parliament. The principles of parliamentary government are those of England. The common and criminal law of England prevails in all the provinces except Quebec, where the old French civil code and English criminal law are in force.

criminal law are in force.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - The king, senate, and house of commons. The senate is composed of 78 members, when full, appointed by the crown, possessed of property qualification and of the age of 30 years. The speaker is chosen by the crown. It has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except in the case of revenue, taxation, or money bills. Though it cannot initiate or amend such bills, it may reject them under extraordinary circumstances. Members are paid \$1,000 for a session of over 30 days, and a sum for travelling expenses at the rate of 10 cents a mile going and returning. The house of commons consists of 213 members, elected from 1885 until 1898 on a dominion franchise, which was, in the latter year, repealed. Dominion elections are run on the provincial systems, with some unimportant limitations. Members require no property qualification, but they must be of the age of 21, and British subjects, not disqualified by law. The speaker is chosen by the commons. Parliament has a legal existence of five years unless sooner dissolved by the governor-general, and meets once every year. Members are paid the same as senators. As Canada possesses a system of federal government, her legislative powers are limited to certain subjects of dominion or national import, set forth in the written constitution, or British North America Act, of 1867, with the residue of power not expressly given to the provinces in the federal government. All the provinces of Canada, except Prince Edward Island, possess a very complete system of municipal government, which entrusts certain quasi legislative powers to councils in municipal divisions known as cities, counties, townships, towns, villages and parishes, and elected by ratepayers. The rules and usages of procedure of the Canadian parliament and of the legislatures are bas don those of the imperial parliament. The closure loes not exist in Canada.

Provinces and Ter tories of the Dominion, Provinces and 1er tories of the Dominion, viz.—Nova Scotia, population, 499,116; area, 20,600 square miles. New Brunswick, population, 331,698; area, 28,200. Prince Edward Island, population, 103,258; area, 2,000. Quebec, population, 1,620,974; area, 228,000. Ontario, population, 2,167,978; area, 222,000. Manitoba, population, 246,464; area, 116,021. British Columbia, population, 190,000; area, 407,300. These figures are taken from the first bulletin of the census of 1001 and may be on revision subject to a few insign of 1901, and may be, on revision, subject to a few insignificant changes.

EXECUTIVE POWER. - In all these provinces there is a lieutenant-governor, appointed for five years by the governor-general of the Dominion in council, and aided by an executive council of eight or less members, who have seats in the legislature, and are responsible to the popular house in accordance with the principles of

English parliamentary government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - In Nova Scotia and Quebec there is a legislative council of 20 and 24 members respectively, appointed by the lieutenant-governor in council of each province. The assembly in these provinces consists of 38 and 73 members respectively, elected for five years on a limited franchise based on property and income. The speaker of the legislative council is appointed by the crown. In the five other provinces there is only one house, an elected assembly, viz., Ontario, 94 members; New Brunswick, 41; P. E. Island, 30; Manitoba, 40; British Columbia, 33. In all these provinces there is manhood suffrage, limited by residence and citizenship, but in P.E. Island 15 are elected on a special real estate qualification.* In all of these provinces the duration of the assembly is four years, unless sooner dissolved. Sessions are annual. In all of the provinces the speakers of the assemblies are elected by the members. In both houses members are paid. Members require no property qualification. The legislative powers of the legislatures are defined by the British North America Act of 1867. Widows and unmarried women, when taxed, can vote at municipal elections in Ontario and the North-West Territories; in Manitoba and British Columbia, all women who are taxed in their own right can vote at such elec-

North-West Territories, divided into districts, viz.: Alberta, Assiniboia, Athabasca, Saskatchewan, with representative but not responsible government. In addition to these partially settled and organized districts, the following divisions have also been made in the unsettled region; Franklin, Keewatin, Mackenzie, Ungava, and Yukon. The total population of the N. W. T. is now about 220,000 souls; area, 2,497,427 square miles

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A lieutenant-governor, appointed for five years by the governor-general of Canada in council, and assisted by a small executive council. The system is now practically responsible government, as in

the old provinces.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. assembly of 29 members chosen by ballot on a very liberal franchise based on residence and household qualification, Indians being excluded. It elects its own speaker, has a duration of four years unless sooner dis-solved, and meets once every year. Members do not require a property qualification, and are paid a small indemnity. Municipal institutions have been established in towns and rural districts, in imita-

The gold discoveries in the Yukon have rendered it necessary to provide a simple system of government for that region. A commissioner, a council—partly elective—and judges are appointed by the dominion government, under authority given by the parliament of

EXECUTIVE POWER .- A governor, assisted by an executive council of six or more members, having seats in the legislature and holding office on the principles of responsible government. The Roman Dutch civil and English

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT, -A legislative council of 22 members elected for seven years, presided over, ex officio, by the chief justice, and a house of assembly of 76 elected members. The members house of assembly of reflected memoris. The memoris of the legislative council must have a property qualification, but any person not an alien or otherwise disqualified may be elected a member of assembly. Members of both houses are elected by ballot on a very liberal franchise, based on property, income or wages, and certain elementary educational requirements. Members are paid. The debate may be either in English or Dutch. The assembly elects its own speaker, meets annually, and has a duration of five years unless sooner dissolved. A municipal system has been established, and councillors are elected to boards and councils.

EXECUTIVE POWER .- Governor, aided by an executive council of five members, composed of officials and the commander-in-chief. The Roman Dutch law and Indian penal code prevail.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- A legislative council of 17 members, including the members of the executive council, four other office-holders, and eight unofficial members appointed by the crown. The eight unofficial members appointed by the crown. governor is president. Government agents administer local affairs of the nine provinces.

The franchise, which can be exercised by British subjects and foreigners after five years' resiby British subjects and foreigners after five years' residence, is based on the payment of native taxes. EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, aided by an executive council of three official members. Natives are employed in administrative positions throughout the islands.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- Legislative council of 12 members, composed of the governor, as president, five official and six non-official members, all appointed by the crown. A system of local govern-ment exists and the natives are represented in village and district councils. An annual meeting of the high chiefs and representatives from each province is held under the presidency of the governor.

Gambia, crown colony; population, 15,000; area, 69 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Administrator, aided by an ex-

ecutive council of five members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- Legislative council of six persons, composed of the administra-tor, the three officials who are executive councillors, and two non-official members, all appointed by the crown.

Gibraltar, military colony; population, 24,700; including military; area, two square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, who is the general commanding and exercises all necessary powers of government.

EXECUTIVE POWER .- Governor, aided by an executive council composed of the commandant and four officials.

Guiana, British, with representative but not responsible government; population, 280,000; area, 109,-000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER. -Governor assisted by an executive council chosen from members of the court of policy. The jurisprudence is the English criminal law and the Roman-Dutch code.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Combined court, consisting of a court of policy of seven official and eight elective members, and also of six financial representatives, the elected members being chosen by a very liberal franchise based on property, income, taxes and residence. Membership to the combined court and court of policy is based on a property and income qualification. Taxation and finance are dealt with by the combined court alone. Municipal institutions have been introduced into this colony. institutions have been introduced into this colony.

Honduras, British; crown colony; population, 35,230; area, 7,562 square miles.
Executive Power.—Lieutenant-governor, assisted by an executive council of seven members, three of whom are unofficial

LEGISLATUR POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council appointed by the crown, and consisting of three official and five unofficial members. The lieutenant-governor is president, ex-officio.

Hong-Kong, crown colony; population, 352,000; area, 406 square miles. By a convention signed at Pekin on June 9, 1898, the Chinese government leased to Great Britain for 99 years the port of Kaulung and land farther inland, together with the waters of Mirs Bay and Deep Bay, and the island of Lan-tao. Area nearly 400 square miles, population 100,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER. -Governor, aided by an executive

council of six official persons.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT,-Legislative council, composed of the governor (president), six official and five non-official members, three nominated by the crown, one by the justices of the peace, and one by the chamber of commerce. Members must be registered as electors, and are paid an allowance. A municipal system exists in the settled districts.

Women can vote, but cannot be elected to the houses. Nigeria, an extensive sphere of British influence, coming within lines of demarcation arranged by treaties with Franca and Germany since 1885. LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council, or upper house, of parliament of 48 members, elected for six years on a franchise based on the ownership or occupancy of freehold or leasehold property, and certain professional qualifications. One-third retire every two years. Members must possess freehold property, but are not paid. The assembly contains 95 members, returned for three years on manhood suffrage. Members require no property qualification and receive an Indemnity, besides free passes over government railways after seven years' standing, the latter privilege extending to legislative councillors. LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. national congress of two houses exercising jurisdiction over national affairs. A senate of 30 members elected by the legislature of each province and by the capital; one-third of the body being renewable every three years. Senators must be citizens of 30 years of age, have incomes, and are paid. The house of deputies consists of 86 members, requiring no property qualification, but must be citizens for four years; they are elected for four years, but one-half must retire every two years. Members are paid. In the provinces there are legisla-tures of two houses elected for three years, and having full control over provincial affairs.

Austria-Hungary, federal monarchy, under parliamentary government; population, 41,358,886, or about 43,572,000 with Bosnia and Herzegovina; area, 240,142 or 264,204 square miles with the last mentioned countries, which are under its administration.

EXECUTIVE POWER. - Emperor king (Franz Josef I.), who rules by hereditary right over the united states of Austra and Hungary, with the title of emperor of Austria, king of Bohemia, king of Hungary, etc., and is aided by a common supreme ministry or executive council of three departments of state, responsible to the delegations, or two bodies of 60 members each, selected each year by the reichsrath of Austria and the reichstag of Hungary. Ministers may be impeached by the delegations. For Austria also there is a ministry of seven heads of departments responsible to the reichsrath. In each province there is a provincial council, which is an executive body, composed of the president of the diet and other members elected. The executive of Hungary is a ministry and nine heads of departments, responsible to the reichstag. One of these heads is minister for Croatia and Slavonia. The general administration of the affairs of the Ottoman provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina is exercised under instruc-tions of the imperial finance minister at Vienna. In these provinces there is a government for internal administration, judicial and legislative affairs.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .-- 1. The which transact the foreign, financial and delegations, which transact the foreign, mancial and military affairs of the whole empire—120 members in all—derive their power from the Austrian reichsrath, and the Hungarian reichstag, 20 from the upper and 40 from the lower house of the pariaments in question.

2. The Austrian reichsrath or imperial parliament, consists of an upper and lower house. The upper house (herrenhaus)consists of princes, nobles, archbishops, bishons and life members distinguished in artor science and ops, and life members distinguished in art or science, and who have rendered signal services to church or state. The lower house (abgeordnetenhaus) consists at present of 353 members, elected every six years by landowners, towns, chambers of commerce, taxpayers in rural districts. Females can vote on a special property qualification. 3. The parliament meets annually. For Austria there are also 16 provincial diets of one assembly, having the right to legislate on all matters not ex-pressly reserved for the reichsrath. The deputies to The deputies to the diets, who are archbishops, bishops, rectors of universities, and representatives of great estates, towns, etc., are elected for six years. Members are paid. 4. The Hungarian reichstag (orszaggyules) consists of an upper house (förendihaz) or house of magnates, arch-bishops, bishops, life peers appointed by the crown, state dignitaries and judges ex officio, delegates, here-ditary peers, archdukes. The lower house or house of representatives (kepviselöhaz) is composed of between 400 and 500 members, of whom the majority are reaurned by direct election every five years from towns and rural constituencies on a very liberal property, house, or income franchise. Croatia and Slavonia send 40 delegates to this house. Members to the lower house are paid, and travel at reduced rates. 5. For Croatia and Slavonia there is a provincial diet consisting of 90 members, elected for five years. In Hungary and Austria there is a very complete system of local government, based on the representation of communes and districts in councils and assemblies.

Belgium, limited monarchy, with parliamentary government; population, 6,744,500; area, 11,878 square miles. Executive Power.—Hereditary king (Leopold II.), advised by a council of seven heads of departments, responsible to and having the right of entry and speech in the chambers. In addition to this responsible ministry there is a privy council, composed of "ministers of state" without portfolio, who may be summoned for state" without portfolio, who may be summoned for consultation on extraordinary occasions.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - Parliament of two houses, composed of a senate and a chamber of representatives. The senate consists of half as many members as the lower chamber, elected for eight years, partly directly by constituencies and partly in-directly by provincial councils. All senators must be at least 40 years of age and pay taxes. The house of representatives is composed of members chosen directly by citizens paying taxes, of the age of 25, and resident Belgian citizens. Members of this house not resident in Brussels are paid, and receive a pass over government railways for the purpose of attending the session. The chamber is renewed by halves every two years. Both houses meet annually and nominate their own presidents and officers. The king has the power of dissolving the houses either simultaneously or separately. Belgium has an excellent system of local government in provinces and communes.

For the departments, provinces and cantons of the republic there are prefects, sub-prefects and corregidores entrusted with the administration of their internal affairs.

EXECUTIVE POWER. -President, elected for four years, but not eligible for a second term. Both the president and vice-president are elected directly by universal suffrage, and aided by a cabinet of six secretaries of state, to be appointed and dismissed by the president,

and not having seats in congress.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Con-LEGISLATURE FOWER AND TOCAL GOVERNMENT.—CON-gress of two houses; a senate of 63 members chosen for nine years—one-third renewable every three years. The vice-president is president of the body. The chamber of deputies comprises 205 members elected for three years by universal suffrage. Members of both houses are paid. Each of the 20 states of the republic must have administrative, legislative and judicial authorities in accordance with the American model, followed by the new constitution of 1891. The federal district has an elected council and a prefect appointed by the president. There is a system of local or municipal government in parishes and municipalities.

Chile, republic, with representative government; population, 2,800,000; area, 290,829 square miles. EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for five years

by delegates chosen for the purpose by ballot of the full electorate (the American system practically). He is aided by a responsible council of state of 11 members, five chosen by the president and six by congress. In

addition there is a cabinet of six secretaries of state.

Legislative Power and Local Government, — National congress of two houses; a senate of 40 members elected every six years by cumulative voting. Senators must have a certain income and are not paid; the chamber of 110 deputies elected every three years by all male persons who can read and write; deputies must have a small income. In legislation the president has a veto, but it may be over-ruled by a two-thirds vote of the members present in the two houses. The republic is divided into provinces, and the provinces into depart-ments for purposes of local government. Intendants and governors appointed by the president preside over the provinces and departments respectively. In the town districts there are elective councils.

China, absolute monarchy; population, about 405,-000,000; area. 4,234,910 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER. - Emperor (Tsait-ien Kuang-sü), who rules by quasi hereditary right, though the succession is not from father to son necessarily, but it is left to the reigning sovereign to appoint his successor from his relatives of imperial blood. He is aided by a grand council (chun chi ch'u) of notables, summoned as occa-sion demands. The duties of administration are under sion demands. The duties of administration are under the direction of the neiko or executive council, composed of seven heads of departments. The emperor's power is despotic except so far as it is controlled by the supreme or grand council. The public service is based upon superior education and literary attainments.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. — No system of legislative government exists in the European or American sense, but all laws and edicts are framed and promulgated by the emperor with the aid of his councils.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 27 members chosen by the representatives of the nine departments or states. The house of representatives includes 66 members elected for four years by universal franchises. The depart. for four years by universal franchises. The depart-

ments are under the administration of presidents or governors chosen by the federal executive, and have control of financial and other local matters.

The Chinese emperor was for years nominally suzerain of Corea, but the recent war with Japan for supremacy in the promontory has given the latter practically absolute control. EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by direct vote of the people who can read and write and are Roman Catholics, and aided by a cabinet of five ministers. A vice-president is also elected and acts as president of the equal of state, which is conveyed of president of the council of state, which is composed of the cabinet and seven other members.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Con-

gress of two houses; senate of 32 members elected for four years, one-half retiring every second year; a house of 42 deputies, chosen for two years. The electorate is the same as that for president. The government of the 16 provinces is entrusted to governors appointed by the federal executive. The cantons are regulated by political chiefs, and the parishes by political lieutenants.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President (Emile Loubet), elected for seven years by a majority of the votes of the senate and chamber of deputies meeting as a national assembly. He chooses his cabinet of responsible ministers from the chamber of deputies. In case of a vacancy by death or resignation a new president is immediately elected by the united houses. He has the right of dissolving the chamber with the consent of the senate. His ministry, who are members of and responsible to the chamber, consists of nine heads of departments. In connection with the work of administration there is also a council of state, of which the minister of justice is president. Its special duty is to act as a con-

sultative body in administrative matters. Members have the right of speech in both houses.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress or national assembly of two houses; a senate of 300 members and a chamber of 584 deputies. Senators must be 40 years old, and are elected for nine years—one-third retiring every three years. They are elected indirectly by an electoral body. The senate still contains a number of the life members originally elected by the united chambers, but henceforth all senators are elected. The chambers of deputies is elected for four years of age. Both senators and deputies must be 25 years of age. Both senators and deputies are paid, and the presidents of the two houses receive a large sum for entertainment. Members travel free on all rail-Both houses have the same powers of legislation except in the case of financial measures, which must except in the case of financial measures, which must be first presented in the chamber of deputies. The departments of France have a system of local government in which the commune is the unit. The prefect or warden of the departments is appointed by the central government. In the communes there are elected councils, but their acts are subject to the approval of the prefect. Centralization is the governing principle in France.

He has the aid of a chancellor and five heads of departments. In addition to these ministers (who do not constitute a responsible cabinet), the bundesrath or legislative federal council (see below) itself has administrative powers which it exercises

through 12 committees.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected by universal suffrage for four years, and aided by a ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Single congress of 37 deputies, elected for two years by universal suffrage.

Italy, constitutional monarchy; population, 32,050,000; area, 110,646 square miles. Its foreign possessions are Eritrea, Massowah, Keren, Asmara and Dahlak Archipelago, on the Red Sea, in which a civil governor is appointed by the king; Abyssinia and Shoa, Obbia Habab, Bogos, Assab, Aussa, Somali, and Gallaaland in Africa are under Italian influence or protectorate. The total population of these dependencies is propably over population of these dependencies is probably over 7,000,000; area, 546,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Vittorio Emanuelle III), aided by account of the control of th

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - - Parliament of two houses; a senate of 339 members, com-posed of five princes and 334 life members appointed by the king, and conspicuous for their position, scientific, literary or other attainments; a chamber of 508 deputies, elected by a very liberal franchise in which educational qualifications have a prominent place. Members of the two houses are not paid but they travel free. An excellent system of local government is exercised by means of provincial, municipal and communal councils.

Members of both houses are paid, excepting hereditary peers; the legislative powers of both houses are equal; voting is by secret ballot. The provinces of the empire are governed by governors, appointed by the emperor, and by representative assemblies for purposes of local administration.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years by electors chosen by universal suffrage, and aided by a council.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - Congress of two houses; a senate of 56 members, elected by | appointed by the sovereign,

universal suffrage, two for each state; a house of 227 representatives elected for two years by manhood suffrage. Members of the two houses are paid. Each of the 28 states of the federation has a governor and a legislature of two houses elected by the people.

Nepal, military oligarchy; population, 2,000,000; area, 54,000 square miles.

Executive Power.—Nominal hereditary sovereign, (Maharaja-Dhiraj), but the chief authority is in the prime minister.

Netherlands, constitutional monarchy; population, 5,004,000; area, 12,648 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary sovereign, at present a queen (Wilhelmina Helena Pauline Maria); a responsible council of ministers aids the sovereign.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- Statesgeneral of two houses; a first chamber of 50 members, elected for nine years—one-third retiring every three years-by the provincial states from the highest taxpayers or important officials; a second chamber of 100 payers or important officials; a second chamber of 100 deputies, elected by male tax-payers and lodgers of the age of 23, for four years. Members of both houses are paid. Ministers can attend the proceedings of both chambers, but they have only a deliberative voice except when they are members of either. Portugal, constitutional monarchy; population, 5,050,000; area, 36,038 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Carlos I.), aided by a responsible cabinet and a consultative privy council.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Cortes geraes or parliament of two houses; a house of peers, (camara dos pares) hereditary peers elected or appointed for life, peers, universities, and literary and scientific bodies having representatives; a house of 149 deputies (camara dos deputados), elected for four years by a very liberal franchise, regard being had to educational qualifications. Russia, the empire of, absolute monarchy; population, 129,000,000; area, 8,660,395 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary emperor, or czar of all the Russias (Nicholas II.), aided by a council of state, a ruling senate, a holy synod and a committee of ministers, in whose hands are entrusted the supervision of all the sequence and religious efficient of the results and religious efficient of the supervision of all the secular and religious affairs of the empire. All the work of government is in the hands of committees, cabinets or departments. Bureaucracy is the essence of government in the Russias.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- All legislative and administrative power is in the emperor and his councils. The empire is divided into viceand ins controls. The empire is divided into vice-royalties, governments and districts, governed by gov-ernors-general, appointed and controlled directly by the emperor. Military government rules in Russia. The only shadow of local self-government is to be seen The only shadow of local self-government is to be seen in the mirs or assemblies of the communes or parishes of European Russia. These "mirs" elect certain officers for taxation and purely local purposes, and are relics of old Aryan institutions which survived in the village assemblies of Iudia and Germany, and originated the township government of England and New England. In the provinces, towns and cities there are municipal institutions, but almost exclusively controlled by the large powers of the imperial authorities. large powers of the imperial authorities.

Laws are prepared by the council at St. Petersburg, and discussed by the parliament. The emperor has a veto.

18,089,500; area, 197,670 square miles. EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary king (Alfonso XIII.), now a minor, with a queen regent (Maria Christina) with powers limited by the constitution of 1876, aided by responsible ministers, nine in number.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Parliament (cortes) of two houses; a senate composed of three classes (1) 80 senators by their own right, princes, grandees, captains-general, archbishops, admirals, judges of the courts, patriarchs of the Indies, presidents of the council of state; (2) 100 life senators appointed by the crown; (3) 180 elected for five years by the communal and provincial states, clergy, universities, academies and largest taxpayers, one-half of the number being renewed every five years; a congress of 481 members elected on a very liberal franchise based on land, income, educational, professional and public services. The principle of the representation of minorities is observed in large constituencies. The cortes neet annually served in large constituencies. The cortes meet annually and the congress is elected for five years. The king has the power of summoning or dissolving the congress and

The diets of the two countries are to choose a successor to the throne in case of a failure of regular succession; and should they not agree on a suitable person, the choice is made by Swedish and Norwegian deputies. The common affairs of the united kingdoms are considered by the king, with the assistance of a council of state, composed of Swedish and Norwegian ministers.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .-- 1. In Sweden there is a council of state of 11 members; a diet or parliament of two houses; an upper or first house of or parliament of two houses; an upper or first house of 150 members elected by provinces and town corporations for nine years; a lower or second chamber of 230 members, elected by residents of rural districts and towns for three years on a franchise based on property and income. Members of the second chamber are alone paid. The ballot is in use.

2. In Norway there is a council of state to advise the king and a storthing or great court, of 114 members

king, and a storthing, or great court, of 114 members elected for three years on a franchise based on property and income, or public service. The system of election is indirect. The people elect certain deputies every three years, these latter assemble and choose the representatives to the storthing. The storthing, when presentatives to the storthing. The storthing, when elected and assembled for business, is divided into two houses, the "lagthing," or one-fourth of the storthing, and the "odelsthing" or remaining three-fourths of the storthing. The odelsthing has the whole right to inspect and consider public accounts. All new laws are initiated in the lower house, and are accepted or rejected by the lagthing. If the two houses do not agree, they assemble in joint session, and a majority of two-thirds decide. Members are paid.

3. A system of local government exists in both Norway and Sweden, and the representative principle prevails to a modified extent.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The supreme executive and legislative power is in a parliament called, when united in joint session, the bundes-versammlung or federal assembly, composed of two houses, a standerath or state council of 44 members, or two chosen and paid by each canton; a national rath or national council of 147 representatives elected by direct vote every three years and paid out of the federal funds. The federal assembly elects president and vice-president one year and a bunderrath or federal council for three years. Members of the council can sit and debate but not vote in the two chambers.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The principles of initiating measures by popular vote (the initiative), and of submitting acts to direct vote (the initiative), and of submitting acts to direct vote (the "referendum") are in force in this republic. The legislative powers of the nation are set forth in the constitution. Each of the cantons has a system of local government based on the fullest possible expression of the popular will. Legislative assemblies and executive councils exist, and in a few cantons there are landsgemeinden or assemblies of the male citizens for the purpose of making laws and appointing their administrators. The "initiative" and "referendum" also exist to a considerable extent. The cantons or states are sovereign and only limited by the constitution.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Hereditary sultan (Abdul Hamed II), whose executive and legislative authority is only limited by the precepts of Mahomet. The sultan is aided by a sadrazam (grand-vizier), and a sheik-ul-islam, who are respectively at the head of temporal and spiritual affairs under the direction of the sultan.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The people have no legislative or popular assemblies or councils. The whole country is divided into governments, appointed by and subject to the decrees of the

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years under the constitution by electoral colleges in each state equal to the whole number of its senators and representatives in congress; but practically the election is by the direct vote of the people. Each political party nominates a set of electors on a presidential ticket and the people vote directly for them. Under the constitution the electors meet in each state on a particular day and invariably cast their votes in accordance with the result of the election. There is also a vice-president elected by the same political method. The president is head of the executive, and has a veto over the legislation of congress, but it can be over-ridden by a two-thirds majority gress, but it can be over-ridden by a two-thirds majority in each house. He is aided by a cabinet of eight secretaries of state and heads of departments, appointed by himself with the approval of the senate, but having no seats in or responsibility to congress. In case of death, resignation or disability of the president, the vice-president succeeds. [On the assassination of President McKinley, Vice-President Roosevelt succeeded on 14th September, 1901, and holds office until March 4, 1905.] If there

is no vice-president the secretary of state or other members of cabinet succeed in order of seniority until a new president is appointed or the disability is re-moved. Elections for president and vice-president take place on the Tuesday following the first Monday in November every fourth (leap) year, and they take office on the 4th March following.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. — Congress of two houses; a senate of 90 members, or two from each state, chosen by the legislatures for six years; a house of 357 representatives elected every second year by the electors of the states in accordance with their respective election laws; universal suffrage limited in a few cases by residence, educational tests, registration and payment of taxes. Senators must be 30 years of age, citizens for nine years, and residents of the states which elect them. Representatives must be about 25 years of age, citizens for seven years, and residents of the states in which they are elected. The senate has the power of approving or rejecting the higher appointments and treaties made by the president, and of acting as a court of impeachment for the president, judges of the supreme court, and other high functionaries. It can also amend court, and other high functionaries. It can also amend bills for raising revenue, which alone can originate in the house of representatives. The vice-president is ex officio president of the senate, which may also appoint a temporary president. The speaker of the house is elected by its members. Members of both houses receive \$5,000 and travelling expenses every year. The territories are represented by one elected delegate in each case, who cannot vote in the house. The legislative powers of the congress are enumerated in the constitution. The supreme court of the United States can hear and determine issues of laws as to the interpretation of the constitution and may declare the acts of congress of the constitution and may declare the acts of congress unconstitutional or intra vires, as the case may be. The federal judges are appointed by the president with the approval of the senate. A permanent civil service is being gradually built up, and removals from office in the case of officials, not political in their nature, are very much less frequent of late years with the extension of civil service rules to all departments.

Executive Power.—In each state there is a governor and a lieutenant-governor and officers to administer the government. The governor and lieutenant-governor are elected by the people for four years in following states: California, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming. In the following states the term is three years: New Jersey and New York. In the following, two years: Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Ohio, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Wisconsin. In the following, the term is one year: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. All the governors have the power of veto over legislation except in Delaware, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island. It requires a majority or two-thirds vote to over-ride the veto. The governor is the head of the executive and has no responsible ministers in the English or Canadian sense, but the executive or administrative officers are generally elected.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—In all the forty-five states there is a legislature of two houses; an upper house, generally called senate, and a house of representatives, both elected by the people of the state. In the following states the senate is elected for four years, the house of representatives for two years, and sessions are biennial, with the exception of the states mentioned: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi (annual), Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina (annual), Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming. In the following states the term is for the senate two, for the house, two, and sessions biennial: Idaho, Michigan, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, South Dakota, Tennessee, Vermont. In the following states the term is one for both senate and house, and sessions annual: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island. In Minnesota the term of the senate is two years, of the house one, and sessions annual. In New York thesenate two, the house one, and the sessions annual. In New Jersey the senate three, the house one, and the sessions annual. Universal suffrage is the rule, though Delaware has a tax qualification in state senate elections. In some states the payment of a poll tax, illiteracy and residence enter into qualifications. In Colorado, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming women can vote. Members of the legislature are paid. All public officials, state and municipal, are elected as a rule, but the tendency in the older states is to have a permanent public service apart from political heads. In 31 states the judges are elected by the people; in five, by the legislature; in eight, appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the legislature or council. The Australian or Canadian ballot is now in force in 40 states; nine have passed stringent laws against corrupt practices at elections, but they ar

Throughout the union there is a very complete system of township, county, and city government. Township local government prevails in the New England states, the county is generally the unit in the south; in the middle and north-western states there is a mixed system. In several of the western states women can vote and be elected for municipal and school bodies. In all cases councils are elective. In the large cities there have been cases of gross corruption and mismanagement, and the best methods of improving municipal government are now attracting much serious attention.

Executive Power.—In the territories the governors and other officials, including judges, are appointed for four years by the president of the United States. The legislatures (council and house of representatives) of the organized territories of Arizona, Hawaii, New Mexico, Oklahoma, are elected for two years, but their powers of legislation are large, though subject to federal restrictions. In the other territories there are only governors and officials appointed by the president.

United States Dependencies:

CUBA; population, about 1,606,000; area, 35,994 square miles. The United States went to war with Spain for the independence of this island, where internecine strife prevailed for years, to the disgrace of Christendom. Spain was soon driven from her ancient dependency, but its independence has not yet been conceded by the United States. Preparations, however, are now in progress to give the island a permanent, independent form of government as arranged at a Constitutional Convention chosen by the people of the island.

GUAM (Ladrones). Ceded by Spain to the United States in 1898. A coaling station for the U.S. navy.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS. These islands were ceded by Spain to the United States on December 11, 1898. They are about 2,000 in number. Total area, 115,300 square miles; population, estimated, 8,000,000. No definite form of government has yet been established, but a small number of the natives continue to give a feeble resistance to the arms of the United States. A provisional government is now being formed for the conduct of affairs.

Porro Rico. Ceded by Spain to the United States on December 11, 1898. Area, 3,600 square miles; population, 798,560. A representative system of government, like that in the Territories, is now organized.

Uruguay, republic; estimated population in 1895, 900,000; area, 72,110 square miles.

EXECUTIVE Power.—President, elected for four years, and aided by a council of five ministers.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT,—Congress of two houses; a senate of 19 chosen by an electoral college for six years, one-third retiring every two years; a house of 69 representatives elected every three years by all male adults who can read and write.

Samoan Islands. The island of Tutuila and several small islands of the group are now under the control of the United States (p. 114).

Venezuela, republic; population, about 2,324,000; area, 593,943 sq. miles, but England claimed about 50,000 sq. miles as forming part of British Guiana—a question in dispute for years, and finally settled by the award of the tribunal of arbitration, 3rd October, 1899.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, chosen for two years, without veto power, and aided by a responsible ministry of six members, and a federal council of 19 members. Congress appoints the council every two years, and the latter choose the president.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; a senate of 24 members or two elected for each state legislature for four years; a house of 52 representatives, elected by direct vote for four years.

Wadai (Central Sudan), and subject states of Kanem and Bagirmi, estimated population, 2,750,000; area, 302,000 square miles. These semi-civilized states are now within the sphere of French influence, which also extends practically to the whole of the Sahara and Libyan Deserts.



THE KING ROYAL FAMILY.

THE KING.- Edward VII., of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of all the British Dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India. His Majesty was born at Buckingham Palace on November 9th, 1841; succeeded to the throne on January 22nd, 1901, on the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria; married Princess Alexandra of Denmark, March 10th, 1863. His Majesty is the eldest son of the late Queen Victoria and the late Prince Consort (His Royal Highness Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha).

THE QUEEN.-Alexandra, daughter of Christian IX., King of Denmark, was born at Copenhagen, December 1st, 1844, and was married to His Majesty (then Prince of Wales) at Windsor, March 10th, 1863.

The surviving children of the King and Queen are :-His Royal Highness, George Frederic Ernest Albert, Prince of Wales, Earl of Chester, Duke of Cornwall and York, born June 3rd, 1865; married his cousin, Princess Victoria May (born May 26th, 1867), only daughter of the late Duke of Teck, on July 6th, 1893. Has issue-Edward, born June 23rd, 1894; Albert, born December 14th, 1895; Victoria, born April 25th, 1897; and Henry, born March 31st, 1900.

Princess Louise, Duchess of Fife (Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar), born February 20th, 1867; married July 27th, 1889, Alexander William George, Duke of Fife. Has two daughters, Alexandra, born May 27th, 1891, and Maud, born April 3rd, 1893.

Princess Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6th, 1868.

Princess Maud Charlotte Mary Victoria, born November 26th, 1869; married 22nd July, 1896, to Charles, second son of the Crown Prince of Denmark.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodora, born April 14, 1857; married July 23, 1885, to Prince Henry of Battenburg, who died Jan. 20, 1896; and has issue three sons and one daughter.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert, Duke of Albany, born April 7, 1853; married April 27, 1882, to Princess Helen of Waldeck, and died March 28, 1884, having had issue one son, now Duke of Albany, who succeeded his uncle, the Duke of Edinburgh, as Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, on July 30, 1900, and one daughter.

THE KING'S CIVIL LIST.

Consequent upon the death of Her Majesty Queen | Victoria, and the accession of His Majesty Edward VII., there was passed in the Parliamentary session of 1901 what is known as the Civil List Act, the Act by which is determined what charges shall be made on the consolidated fund for the maintenance of the King and his family.

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown

Wales, Scotland and Ireland, in which the sovereign had a life-interest, and from which he received the rents. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites. At the Restoration the income from Crown lands was ascertained by a committee of the House of Commons to amount to £217,900 a year, in addition to £4,000 from the Forest of Dean. By the time Charles II. had been lands, from a variety of landed property in England and on the throne three years he had by his lavish bestowal of the lands on favorites reduced the income to £100,000. William III., by his grants to favorites who had accompanied him from Holland, made further havoc with the Crown domains; so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne Parliament endeavored to save the remnant by an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, but when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV. and Queen Victoria, on their accessions, surrendered their life-interest in the Crown lands in return for a Civil List. The same course was taken by Edward VII. when he came to the throne; and soon after Parliament assembled a committee of the House of Commons was appointed to recommend the new Civil List. It reported on the 4th of April, 1901, and its recommendations were embodied in an Act (1 Edward VII., c. 4), which was read a third time in the House of Commons on June 18th. By this Act the King's Civil List was fixed at a yearly sum of £470,000, assigned as follows:

In the event of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra surviving the King it is enacted that there shall be paid to the Queen during her life an annuity of £70,000.

Another clause provides that there shall be paid to the Duke of Cornwall and York "during the joint lives of his present Majesty and of his said Royal Highness, an annuity of £20,000"; that "there shall be paid to the Duchess of Cornwall and York during the continuance of her marriage with the Duke of Cornwall and York, for her sole and separate use, but without any power of anticipation, an annuity of £10,000; and that in the event of the Duchess surviving the Duke there shall be paid to her during her life an annuity of £30,000."

In respect to His Majesty's daughters, Princess Louise

(Duchess of Fife), Princess Victoria and Princess Maud (Princess Charles of Denmark), it is enacted that as a provision for them there shall be an annual allowance of £18,000 during their joint lives, "to be reduced at the death of each of the said princesses by £6,000."

The revenues of the Duchies of Cornwall and Lancaster are outside the Civil List arrangement. Those of Cornwall are vested in the eldest son of the reigning sovereign, who becomes by birth the Duke of Cornwall, by virtue of a patent of Edward III. in 1337. The Duchy of Lancaster was the private patrimony of Henry Bolingbroke, son of John of Gaunt. It is separate from the other possessions of the Crown in order and government, but united to it in point of inheritance.

THE BRITISH ARMY IN 1901-2.

The British Army in 1901, as in 1900, was on a warfooting. In March, when the army estimates were laid before the House of Commons, there were, in round numbers, still 250,000 men in South Africa, and a small force was still in China in consequence of the uprising

of the Boxers in the previous year.

What the South African war was costing Great Britain in 1901 is shown in the army estimates, in which £56, 070,000 were put down as the estimated expenditure on the war in the financial year 1901-2. For the year 1900-1 the actual expenditure was £61,286,700. In China, in 1900-1, the military expenditure was £3,450,000, as compared with £2,160,000, the estimated expenditure in 1901-2. In the aggregate Great Britain in 1900-1 expended £64,736,700 on war services, while in 1901-2 the aggregate estimated expenditure—an expenditure provided for by Parliament—was £58,230,000.

provided for by Parliament—was £58,230,000. In addition to these war charges the cost of the ordinary services in 1900-1 was £24,262,700. In 1901-2 the estimated cost of the ordinary services is £29,685,000, the large increase being due to increases in the strength of the military forces—chiefly in the auxiliary forces—due to the new organization scheme which was sanctioned by Parliament in the session of 1901. In all, the military expenditure for the year 1901-2 is estimated at £87,915,000. The actual expenditure in 1900-1 was £88,999,400. As illustrating the increase of expenditure on the army in the last two decades it may be noted that in 1886, when a Conservative government was in power, the total vote for the regular army, which then numbered 190,000 men, was £16,000,000.

The accompanying table, taken from the army estimates of 1901-2, brings out in detail the strength and cost of the British army in the two years in which, in consequence of the South African war, the army was on

The new organization scheme, the cost of the carrying out of which has so greatly swelled the ordinary military charges for 1901-2, is based on the fact that the war in South Africa has shown (1) that Great Britain requires a better army organization than that hitherto existing, and must be able to send at least three army corps about a summary of the send at least three army corps about the send of the send at least three army corps about the send of the send at least three army corps about the send of t

In the new plan, intended to meet these needs and these conditions, the Government decided to develop the existing system in preference to establishing a separate Indian army or to adopting compulsion for home defence. In pursuance of this policy the new organization scheme divides Great Britain and Ireland into six army corps districts, namely, Aldershot, Salishury Plain, Colchester and York: Scotland and Ireland each forming one division. In each of these military divisions there are to be troops of all arms necessary for an army corps. Three of the army corps are to be formed entirely of regular troops; the others are to include 60 battalions of militia and volunteers and 21 militia and volunteer field batteries. All these troops are to be specially trained for the places assigned to them in the army corps.

The scheme involves no large increase in the number of regular or enlisted troops, but a sufficient number of these are to be freed from garrison duty abroad and from duty at coaling-stations to admit, it is expected, of 18 additional battalions being available for service with the army corps.

By increases in pay and other inducements the militia force is to be increased from 100,000 to 150,000 men, and the men are to be much better trained in musketry. The Imperial Yeomanry, which was organized in connection with the old yeomanry troops and largely increased in numbers, is to be further augmented to 35,000 men. If practicable the existing Colonial Yeomanry forces are to be continued and affiliated with the British forces for Imperial service. As regards the Volunteers the new plan includes the raising of twenty-five additional battalions, as well as fitteen batteries of field artillery. The men in the Volunteer force are to be specially trained for army corps, and the new volunteer battalions and batteries are specially intended for the defence of positions around London.

The plan is designed to raise 126,500 additional menmost of them for the militia, the volunteers and the yeomanry. If the expectations of the War Office are fully realized, the total British forces will be brought up to an aggregate of 680,000 men. The make-up and the places in army organization assigned to these forces are set out in the table given below:—

Although public interest in the war in South Africa was less manifest in 1901 than in 1900 recruiting continued active. Up to July 27th recruits numbered 25,700, of whom 12,390 were for infantry, the others for special service. Troops were going and returning from South Africa all through the year. Large contingents of fresh troops were sent out as late as the end of August. By this time, however, the homeward stream was larger than the outward one. On May 1st there

were, according to official returns, 249,416 officers and men in South Africa. These troops were made up as follows:

The British forces now compose what is described as a short service army. This term distinguishes it from the army of a generation ago. In the army, as it existed prior to 1873, men enlisted for 21 years, and at the end of that time were discharged with a pension. In 1873 this long service system came to an end, and in its place there was established what is now known as the short service plan. Under this men enlist for 12 years. Most of them spend seven years with their regiments, and are then passed into the army reserve for the remaining five years of their term. This passing of men from the colours to the reserve makes it necessary in time of peace to recruit about 35,000 new men every year. The short service system is often the subject of much criticism; but it has always to be remembered, as Lord Wolseley, then Commander-in-Chief, told a meeting at York in 1897, that the short service system was adopted in 1873 simply because men would no longer enlist for twenty-one years.

About the time the short service system was established, what is known as the territorial system also came into being. Formerly infantry regiments were known by numbers, and generally in addition by titles which belonged characteristically to the regiments, or which commemorated some event or incident of outstanding importance in regimental history. Nowadays and since the early seventies, infantry regiments are known by the names of counties. When the re-arrangement took place regiments were assigned by name to this or that county, and their depots were then established in the neighbourhoods from which the regiments then took their names.

The casualties in the principal actions of the war during 1899-1900, before it lapsed into the guerilla stage, are set out in the accompanying table:—

There are now 69 of these depots, and English, Welsh, Scotch and Irish county names are borne by the various regiments. The idea at the bottom of the territorial plan was to give regiments territorial connections, to make them locally popular, and as far as was practicable to mass soldiers hailing from the same part of the country into regiments officially connected with the counties from which the men came. To this end, since the seventies, it has been the practice to recruit regiments from the parts of the country in which their depots are situated. No matter where the main body of the regiment may be stationed, at Aldershot, at the Curragh, in India, or in Malta, its depot remains in the neighbourhood to which the regiment is titularly attached. A staff of commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the regiment is stationed at the depot. There the recruits are received; they are put through a long and hard course of preliminary training, and at the end of this course are drafted from the depot to the colours.

Recruiting officers are permanently stationed in most of the large English towns and cities, and frequently these officers go on special duty into the country villages. London is, however, the great recruiting ground of the army.

A man who offers for the army may enlist for 12 years, the whole of which period is spent with the colours, or he may enlist for part of the term with the colours and the remainder of it with the reserve. The 12 year enlistment plan applies to the regiment of household cavalry, to the corps of ordnance artificers, to the band of the Royal Military College, the corps of army schoolmasters, the corps of armourers, bandsmen in the foot guards, royal engineers who enlist for appointment as military machinists, and men enlisted for appointment as sergeant master tailors. Less than 2,000 men on an annual average enlist under this 12 year plan All boys between 14 and 16, who are accepted to be trained as musicians, trumpeters, drummers, buglers, or tailors, must join for 12 years. The shorter service system, on the other hand, applies to cavalry of the line, royal artillery, infantry of the line, ordnance store corps, who serve seven years in the army and five in the reserve; the army service corps, who serve three years in the army and nine in the reserve; the foot guards and the medical staff corps, who serve seven years in the army and five in the reserve; royal engineers who serve seven years in the army and five in the reserve; and the post office corps and royal engineers of the telegraph and railway reserve, who serve three years in the army and three in the reserve.

CHEST MEASUREMENT AND WEIGHT.

The minimum chest measurement is fixed at 33 in., and the minimum weight at 115 lbs.; but the chest measurement and the weight of each recruit depend upon his height and the arm of the service he wishes to join, and are left to the discretion of the approving medical officers.

It is still possible under the short service plan for soldiers to re-enlist and to serve for 21 years. After this length of service has been put in, soldiers become entitled to pensions. For privates and gunners, the pension is from 8d to 1s 6d per day; for non-commissioned officers, 1s 3d to 3s 6d per day; for warrant officers, 2s to 5s per day. Soldiers discharged on account of wounds or injuries received in action, or for sickness incurred in the performance of their military duty, are entitled to a pension varying with the extent of the disability and with the length of service.

A soldier who has been in the army for not more than three months may claim his discharge on payment of £10. After three months the sum is £18, and in this case the permission of the commanding officer is necessary. Discharges by purchase, however, are allowed to the fullest extent consistent with the requirements of the service, and at ordinary times a soldier finds no difficulty in purchasing his discharge.

Until 1871, commissions in the army were bought and sold. Commissioned officers nowadays are drawn from the military academies at Woolwich and Sandhurst; and admission to these schools is obtained only after stiff examinations have been passed. In the army, promotion is by seniority. The pay of a lieutenant is 5s 4d a day; of a captain, 11s 7d a day; of a major, 16s a day; and of a lieutenant-colonel, 21s a day. There are some other allowances; but the pay and allowances of officers are not sufficient to maintain them in the style which, according to the social traditions of most regiments, officers are expected to keep up. Comparatively few of them are dependent entirely on their army pay.

What are described in England as the auxiliary forces comprise the militia, the volunteers, and the yeomanry cavalry. The militia is the oldest of these services. It is older than the standing army, and until

the second or third decade of the nineteenth century all men not suffering from bodily infirmities due to age or other causes, and not specially exempted, were liable to be drawn by ballot for the militia. They could serve either personally or by substitute. Ballots were taken in counties until 1830 to make up the quota of militia each county was compelled by the law of 1760 to equip and maintain.

The militia is a local force, each regiment being raised in the division of the county in which the regiment has its head-quarters. It is called out each year for a period of training which cannot exceed 56 days. The men enlist for six years, and when under training their pay, their discipline, and the general conditions of their services are very similar to the conditions in the regular army. Until as late as 1871 the militia regiments in each county were nominally under the command of the lord lieutenant of the county; and nowadays, although there are examinations for officers' commissions in the militia, in issuing these commissions the War Department gives preference to local landed gentlemen who are recommended or nominated by the lords lieutenants, the King's representatives in the counties. In connection with the militia there is a reserve consisting of men who have accepted extra bounties to hold themselves in readiness to serve abroad if need be in the regular army.

The yeomanry cavalry, which in 1900 was given the name of the Imperial Yeomanry, in its old form was a volunteer force, dating back to the Napoleonic wars. It was composed chiefly of tenant farmers. Many of the great landlords made it a condition in their farm leases that their tenantry should be of the yeomanry. For a long time the yeomanry was but lightly regarded as an auxiliary force. New life, however, was infused into it

during the war. Its numbers were greatly increased; and under a royal warrant of the 17th April, 1901, the force was reorganized. It then became permanently the Imperial Yeomanry. The old brigade organization was abolished, and the force is now organized in regiments of four sections, with a regimental staff and a machine gun section. The regiments are under training in camp for sixteen days each year.

Members of volunteer corps are enrolled for three years, and are compelled to put in sufficient time at the drill hall, on the parade ground, and at the rifle

ranges, to make themselves efficient, and to pass the annual inspection before an officer from the War Department. Non-efficient volunteers can be sued in the courts for any loss falling upon their regiment in consequence of their failure to earn the Government grant. The officers are drawn from the ranks of the professional and commercial classes. There is no pay to the holder of a volunteer officer's commission. On the contrary, he incurs considerable expense in connection with his office, a fact which accounts for vacancies in many of the volunteer corps.

THE BRITISH NAVY IN 1901-1902.

The sum of £30,875,500 will be expended in 1901-2 on the British Navy, and on additions to the fleet. This is the amount which was asked for by the Admiralty on March 19th, 1901, and subsequently voted by Parliament. In 1900-1 the amount was £28,691,000, so that in 1901-2 there will be expended on the navy £2,183,000 more than in 1900-1. Of the additional expenditure £223,000 represents the additional cost of manning the fleet, due to the larger number of men who will be in service in 1901-2. On ship-building there will be an increase in expenditure of £1,274,900, as compared with the amount voted for ship-building for 1900-1; and on armaments the increase in 1901-2 is £137,300.

The number of men allowed for in the estimates of 1901-2 is 118,625, an increase of 3,745 over the number for which Parliament voted pay in the naval estimates of 1900-1. These 118,625 men will be on the active list. In addition there will be about 28,650 men in the Royal Naval Reserve; and 7,300 in a recently established naval force known as the Royal Fleet Reserve. In the event of war there will be according to the Admiralty figures 154,575 men available for the manning of the fleet.

Mr. Arnold-Forster, the Secretary of the Admiralty, in submitting the estimates to the House of Commons on March 19th, stated that the vote for ship-building for 1901-2, which was £9,003,256, was the largest sum Parliament had ever been asked to vote in one session for new ships. "We have," he said, in describing the ships now in building, and detailing the ship-building programme for 1901-2, "completed or commenced, or asked authority to commence, twenty-three battleships. Of these five the Canopus, the Glory, Albion, Goliath, and Ocean, are already complete. Others are in various stages of completion, and we are asking authority to commence three more battleships, for which the designs are not yet completed. As to cruisers, we have commenced or asked authority to commence thirty. Of these the large majority are armoured cruisers, a class of vessel which is very largely required at the present time. One is already completed, and a large number are in an advanced state, and we hope will be soon available. The delays in construction have been owing to various causes, but the causes which have been responsible for those delays have diminished, are diminishing, and will pass away altogether. One of the greatest causes of delay has been in the supply of armour, and the answer to that problem is the great change in the form of armour now required. The whole method of making armour has been revolutionized. The whole plant of

the armour-makers has had to be reconstructed, and that has taken time. A very large programme of armoured battleships and cruisers was announced, and that had the effect which the Government anticipated, and the great armour manufacturers had in consequence expended enormous sums of money in providing plant. We are now getting an unparalleled delivery of armour. I admit, with knowledge of what I did not before possess, that a large part of the delay is still due to the engineers' strike. That may seem a far-fetched cause, but while ships of the Diadem class which were ordered prior to the strike were completed before contract time not one single ship after the engineers' strike has been completed within contract time. We are all agreed that this question of arrears is deplorable. We have not built ships as quickly as we want them, but the arrears have not been anything approaching to what we have been led to suppose by criticisms in the press. I have particulars before me of the rates of building in all the great countries of Europe and the United States, and I find we still hold prominence in the matter of building our ships. If we take the last four ships, the Albion, Canopus, Goliath and Ocean, they have been completed in two years eleven months and three years respectively, while Russian ships have taken eight years or six years and three months, and a French ship, the St. Louis, five years and five months, and the Gaulois three years and nine months. The only Power which has approached us has been Germany, which built one ship in three years and ten months. Therefore, though there has been delay it is not so serious as some people would have us suppose."

"We propose," continued Mr. Arnold-Forster, in coming to details as to the ship-building programme of 1901-2, "to commence this year three battleships, six first-class armored cruisers, two third-class cruisers, ten destroyers, five torpedo boats, and five submarine boats.' Concerning these submarine boats, Mr. Arnold-Forster made an interesting statement as to the attitude of the Admiralty towards them. "We have," he said, "a great deal of information about submarines. We do not attach to them an exaggerated importance, but an ounce of fact is worth a ton of theory, and when our officers and men see for themselves what these boats can do, they will learn more about them than any reports could tell them. The motor to propel these boats is the main point. If you can add speed to their other qualities they might become formidable vessels. We are comforted by the judgment of the United States and of Germany, which is hostile to these inventions, but we must regard our own situation, and it is not entirely the same as that of other nations. Our problem is that we live in the narrow waters of the Channel."

Mr. Arnold-Forster had prefaced these statements as to the naval programme for 1901-2 by a review of the work of the Navy in China, in which were some significant references to Canada and the Australasian colonies. "We had had proof in the recent operations in China, in the expedition for the relief of Pekin," he said, "of the adequacy of the Navy for the calls upon it. He was there as the mouthpiece of the Admiralty, and was glad of their assurance that the conduct of the naval contingent in China had been admirable. The gallant contingent who accompanied Admiral Seymour in the attempt to relieve Pekin was all that could be desired of British sailors, and the conduct subsequently of the naval detachment under the orders of General Gasele was equally creditable. Nor could he pass on without a word of tribute to the effective service rendered by the Australian contingents. For the first time since the war of 1812 we had a colonial naval force taking an active and effective part in the naval work of the Empire. We had had three Australian contingents—the contribution from H.M.S. Protector and two other contingents from New South Wales and Victoria—engaged in the defence of Pekin, and testimony had been borne both by naval and military officers to the effective service they rendered, and also to the excellent behaviour of the men. He indulged the hope that the remarkable precedent set almost on the day of the birth of the great Australian Commonwealth might some day-some not distant day-be imitated to the advantage of the Empire by the equally great Dominion of Canada."

It has long been the policy of the British Admiralty to build part of the new tonnage in the Government dockyards, and part in private yards. Of the twenty-eight new vessels (not counting submarine boats) sanctioned by Parliament in 1901 two battleships, one armoured cruiser and two sloops will be built in royal dockyards, in which there are now about 32,000 men at work.

The accompanying figures, covering battleships and all descriptions of cruisers (armoured, protected and unprotected) built or in building, show the comparative naval strength of Great Britain and six other powers on the 15th of January, 1901:

New arrangements were come to in 1901 between the Admiralty and nearly all the great British steamship companies, by which their finest vessels are held at the disposition of the Admiralty for employment as armoured cruisers when required. Under the previous agreements only the Cunard, White Star, Peninsula arand Oriental, and Canadian Pacific Railway companies were included. To these have now been added the Orient, Royal Mail and Pacific companies. Eighteen of itionally powerful defences.

the largest and swiftest passenger steamers belonging to these companies now receive an annual subvention, and thirty steamers in addition are held at the disposition of the Admiralty without further subsidy.

Like the English Army the Navy is manned by volunteers, and there is no compulsory service in connection with it. A large proportion of the seamen enter the service as boys. They are accepted for training-ships up to the age of eighteen, and when a boy reaches the age of eighteen his term of actual service in the Navy begins, and must last for at least twelve years. To be accepted for a training-ship, a boy between the age of fifteen and fifteen and a half must be five feet and half an inch in height, with a chest measurement of thirty and a half inches. If accepted when between fifteen and a half and sixteen a boy must be five feet and one and a half inches in height, and thirty-one inches round the chest. Between sixteen and sixteen and a half a boy must be five feet two and a half inches in height, and thirty-one and a half a boy must be five feet two and a half inches in height, and thirty-one and a half inches round the chest.

The pay of seamen ranges from one shilling and three pence a day for ordinary seamen, to nine shillings a day for chief gunners and boatswains. Men who have put in nine years' service in the Navy can pass into the Coast Guard Service. Those who stay in the Navy for a period of twenty-two years become entitled to pensions. The amount of pension is from eighteen pounds a year, upwards, according to the rating on retiring from the ranks. The average pension for men of all ranks is £31 a year.

The Naval Reserve, as the result of changes which were made in 1901-2, is now of two branches, the Royal Reserve and the Royal Fleet Reserve. The Naval Reserve is composed of men ordinarily in the merchant service, who put in a certain number of days training each year on board coast-guard ships, and who are liable to be called upon for service afloat in the event of war. The Fleet Reserve consists of men who have served twenty-two years in the Royal Navy and earned pensions, and of men who have served twelve years in the navy and have then transferred themselves to the Fleet Reserve. As with many seamen in the Royal Navy Service, 1 or pension begins at eighteen years of age, there is always a large proportion of pensioners who are in the prime of life. Before the Fleet Reserve was established many of these men were of the Seamen Pensioner Reserve. In future in the case of men who receive pensions it will be obligatory on them to join the Fleet Reserve.

For the work of the British Navy the world is divided out into nine stations. "Except for the small squadron France keeps off Newfoundland, and for the fleets of the States of the American Continents, we alone," said Mr. Goschen, in describing the naval-stations in his speech of March 10th, 1898, "have squadrons where other nations have isolated ships. When we have to reinforce our foreign squadrons we send out fullymanned and fully-commissioned men-of-war, so that at all times, besides our squadrons, we have traversing the seas a certain number of ships in commission, ready for war, if war should occur, at any moment."

In respect to coaling-stations, as in respect to the size of the fleet, Great Britain is admittedly without a rival. On the trade route from England to the East, by way of the Suez Canal, Great Britain has coaling-stations at Gibraltar, Malta, Aden, Ceylon, Singapore, Wei-hai-wei and Hong Kong. On the older route to the East, by way of the Cape, there are British coaling-stations at Sierra Leone, St. Helena, Capetown, Mauritius. In the West Indies the coaling-stations are at Port Castries on the Island of St. Lucia, and at Port Royal, Jamaica. Bermuda and Halifax are the coaling-stations in the North Atlantic. Esquimat is the station for the North Pacific; and in Australia the stations are on King George's Sound and on Thursday Island. Nearly all the stations are on islands, and are well defended. Gibraltar and Malta are regarded by naval experts as the only coaling-stations liable to serious attack, and they are so open to attack because both of them are within easy distance of European ports. Both of them, however, have exceptionally powerful defences.

MILITIA AND DEFENCE OF CANADA.

Previous to the confederation of the Provinces, the defence of this country was entirely in the hands of the Imperial Government, who for that purpose maintained troops in each Province, supported by various local volunteer militia corps. This volunteer militia had, when called upon, rendered most efficient service in times of trouble.

After Confederation the British Government gradually withdrew all the Imperial troops from this country, and at present only maintain a garrison at Halifax, and a naval establishment there and on the Pacific coast.

By the British North America Act the command in chief of all naval and military forces of and in Canada was vested in the Queen, and the control of the same was placed in the hands of the Dominion Parliament. A Department of Militia and Defence was at the same time established, the first Minister being Sir George E. Cartier, and the first Militia Act was passed in 1868, 31 Vic., chap. 40. The Act was subsequently amended in various ways, but is practically embodied in the present Militla Act 49 Vic., chap. 41 (Revised Statutes, 1886). By it the militia of Canada is declared to consist of all the male

inhabitants of Canada of the age of 18 years or upwards and under 60, not exempted or disqualified by law, this population being divided into four classes, as follows :-

The first class comprises those aged 18 or upwards and under 30, being unmarried or widowers without children.

The second class comprises those between the ages of 30 and 45, being unmarried or widowers without children. The third class comprises those between 18 and 45, being married, or widowers with children.

The fourth class comprises those between 45 and 60,

The following persons are exempt from enrolment and active service at any time; Judges, clergymen and ministers of all religious denominations, professors in colleges and teachers in religious orders, the wardens and officials of all penitentiaries and lunatic asylums, persons physically disabled, and any person being the only son of a widow and her only support. Certain other persons are exempt from service except in case of war.

The number of men to be trained and drilled annually is limited to forty thousand, except as specially authorized, and the period of drill is to be sixteen days and not

less than eight days each year

The Militia is divided into Active and Reserve land and marine force. The Active land and marine force is composed of men raised either by voluntary enlistment or by ballot, and the Reserve force consists, practically, of the whole of the efficient men not serving in the Active Militia of the time being.

The period of service is three years.

All of these pensions and allowances are granted upon certain other conditions, which are fully defined in "The Militia Pension Act, 1901."

"Severe." A wound requiring careful treatment in hospital, but not necessarily dangerous, often involving fractures of hone and constitute careful the approximation. fractures of bone, and sometimes even the permanent

impairment of a limb.
"Dangerous." A wound such as might occur from the penetration of the head, chest, abdomen, or any vital

organ.

THE LAKE ST. JOHN TERRITORY.

The territory in question extends from the head of navigation of the river Saguenay, at Chicoutimi, to the northern boundary of the Province of Quebec, a distance of 220 miles, and from the sources of the waters flowing into Lake St. John, from the East, to the river St. Maurice, and embracing the valley of the river Batiscan, a distance of 200 miles, the whole forming an area of 44,000 square miles or about 28,000,000 acres. Comparatively little is known of this great country, with the exception of the valley of Lake St. John, which, within the last few years, has been colonized with great rapidity, and now contains a population of some 40,000.

The Saguenay and St. Maurice regions are already the field of large lumbering operations, estimated at 60,000,000 feet, B.M., per annum, or equivalent to nearly one-fourth of the whole export of sawn lumber from the port of Quebec. The country is thus described by a gentleman who visited it recently:

The Soil "Is almost universally composed of a girl crev (24) whe land seems to be inexpansible. At Pointe-

port of Quebec. The country is thus described by a gentleman who visited it recently:

The Soil "Is almost universally composed of a rich grey clay, the land seems to be inexhaustible. At Pointeaux-Trembles I was shown a field of wheat, which had been producing that grain for the last fifteen years, without the application of any manure; and the grain I saw this year was as fine as any to be found in this district.

Truly one is struck with wonder at the richness of the soil, for I believe there is none richer in Canada."

The climate of the Lake St. John region is said to be that of Montreal; there is no doubt of its being superior to that of Quebec. The snowfall is certainly less. In fact, farmers complain that they do not get good sleigh roads till late in the winter. On the 25th September this year I remarked that the leaves of the trees were very little tinted, and potato stems were still green. Wheat and all grains ripen and produce abundantly, as may be seen from the following extracts taken from the census returns:

Potatoes, carrots and other vegetables yield abundantly and are of immense size. Wheat is of course the great test of the soil and climate of any agricultural country. Let us then compare its production at Lake St. John with the best districts of the Province, viz: The Eastern Townships, and we find that the census returns show in 1881 :-

Letter Rates, &c.

Canada.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, 2 cents per oz. If unpaid, such letters cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. If partially prepaid, the letter will be forwarded to its destination and double the deficiency charged on delivery. Letters mailed at any office for delivery at or from the same office, provided that the office is not one at which free delivery by letter carriers is established, are charged 1 cent per oz., and must be at least partially prepaid; otherwise they are sent to the Dead Letter Office. Letters of this nature mailed at and for delivery from an office at which there is a free delivery by letter carriers are liable to 2 cents per ounce. All postage must be prepaid by postage stamps.

Post Cards.—From any place in Canada to any place in Canada or to the United States, 1 cent each. British and Foreign, 2 cents each.

Private Post Cards.—The face of a Private Post Card may be used for advertisements, illustrations, etc., provided that a clear space of at least \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch is left along each of the four sides of the postage stamp, and a clear space \(3\frac{1}{4}\) inches long and \(1\frac{1}{2}\) inches wide reserved for the address at the lower right hand corner of the card. Private Post Cards must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by \(3\frac{1}{2}\) inches in width. Cards exceeding these limits are treated as insufficiently paid letters. The words "Private Post Card" must be written or printed on the face of private post cards addressed to places outside of Canada.

· United Kingdom, and the following British Possessions and Protectorates: Aden, Ascension, Bahama Islands, Barbados, Bermuda, British Central Africa, British East Africa, British Guiana, British Honduras, British India (except offices on the Persian Gulf), British North Borneo Company's Territory, including Labuan. Cape Colony, Ceylon, Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Gold Coast Colony, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Johore, Lagos, Leeward Islands, Malay States, Malta, Mauritius, Natal, Newfoundland, New Zealand (1 Jan., 1901), Niger Coast Protectorate, Niger Company's Territory, Orange River Colony, Sarawak, Sevchelles, Sierra Leone, Straits Settlements, St. Helena, Tobago, Transvaal, Trinidad, Turks Islands, Uganda, Windward Islands, Zanzibar. — Postage on Letters, 2 cts. per half oz.

Foreign Countries, except United States.—Postage on Letters, 5 cents per half oz. If sent unpaid, double postage will be charged.

United States.—The rate on letters to the United States is the same as in Canada, and at least one rate must be prepaid.

It is very important to bear in mind that the postage upon letters for the United Kingdom and all Foreign

Countries is calculated by the half ounce and double postage is charged on all unpaid letters.

Registration of Letters.

Persons posting letters containing value should be careful to require them to be Registered, and to obtain from the Postmaster a certificate of receipt for Registration.

The charge for Registration in addition to the Postage is, on all classes of matter, five cents.

Both the Postage charge and Registration fee should, in all cases, be prepaid by stamp.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced where an Unregistered Letter can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven.

Book Post, &c.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for domestic post, 5 lbs. (unless consisting of a single book, in which case a weight of 7 lbs. is allowed); for foreign post, 4 lbs. Limit of size, two feet in length, or one foot in width or depth.

Book packets must be open at both ends or both sides, and must not contain any letter or sealed inclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are free of Canada postage, and correspondence passing between blind persons in raised characters is chargeable at the rate of 1 cent per 2 ozs.

The rate on Book Packets between any two places in Canada is 1 cent per 4 ozs., which must be prepaid by stamps.

The rate to Great Britain, the United States and all Postal Union Countries, is 1 cent per 2 ozs.

Miscellaneous Matter.

Miscellaneous matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada upon prepayment of the rates indicated below. The regulations of the British Post Office do not admit of the transmission by mail to the United Kingdom (or other countries beyond the sea) of miscellaneous matter as such; but a great part of the matter referred to under that head may be forwarded to the United Kingdom by Book Post:—

- 1. On all pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, catalogues (in which may be included printed order lists), prices current, hand-bills, and other matter wholly in print, and on packages of seeds, cuttings, but not cut flowers, bulbs, roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts, the rate is 1 cent for each 4 ozs. or fraction thereof.
- 2. On maps, prints, drawings, engravings, plans and specifications, lithographs, photographs when not on glass or in cases containing glass, circulars produced by a multiplying process easy to recognize, botanical, natural history and entomological specimens when properly put up so as to prevent injury to the contents of the mails, visiting cards, whether printed, engraved

or written, sheet music, whether printed or written. stitched or bound, book or newspaper manuscript whether type-written or hand-written, printer's proof-sheets whether corrected or not and accompanying manuscript copy, such partly printed and partly written documents as deeds of land, wills, mortgages made under seal (including chattel mortgages), insurance policies, renewal receipts when attached to the policies, insurance receipts sent in bulk from head offices to agents, militia and school returns, customs manifests, bank pass books, also pass books of building, loan and investment societies, stubs of receipt books and other books of similar character, manuscript notebooks, minute books, voters' lists when written or partly in writing, school or college examination papers, municipal assessment rolls, partly printed and partly written Dominion and Provincial Government documents, statute labour returns, municipal returns in general, exhibitors' entry tickets for provincial and other agricultural and industrial exhibitions, blank books, photograph albums with or without photographs, printed forms entirely without writing, or filled in with figures only, and official or private post cards either wholly blank or printed as circulars or as forms to be filled up, and with or without a printed or written address, and indented or perforated sheets of paper containing characters which can be read by the blind, the rate of postage is 1c. for each 2 ozs, or fraction of 2 ozs.; and the postage rate must in every case be prepaid by postage stamps or stamped post bands or wrappers. No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision; (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

No packet of miscellaneous matter can be transmitted by mail if it exceeds 5 lbs, in weight, 30 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth, nor may the combined length and girth of any packet exceed 6 feet.

Legal and commercial papers generally are liable to letter rate of postage; the exceptions are restricted to the documents above specified, such as Deeds and Insurance Policies.

Printed or written requests for return are recognized on 3rd and 4th class matter, addressed to places within the Dominion, and same will be returned direct to the sender, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Newspapers and Periodicals.

The general postage rate on newspapers and periodicals published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, and addressed to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, and to newsdealers in Canada, is fixed by law at ½ cent per pound. The following exception, however, is to be noted: Newspapers and periodicals published not more frequently than once

a week and not less frequently than once a month, are entitled to pass free to regular subscribers and newsdealers in Canada within a circular area of 40 miles in diameter, having as centre either the place of publication or any established Post Office not more than 20 miles distant therefrom, the choice of a centre within these limits resting with the publisher; and such newspapers and periodicals are to be put up into packages and delivered into the Post Office, under such regulations as the Postmaster-General may from time to time make.

On all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, for delivery in the Dominion, other than those addressed to regular subscribers or news agents, from office of publication, the rate is one cent per 4 oz., to be invariably prepaid by Postage Stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing not more than 1 oz. each may be posted singly, if prepaid by Postage Stamp $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each.

The postage on *bona fide* specimen newspapers, and on papers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, is 1 cent per lb.

British and foreign publications received by mail may be re-posted in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 1 cent per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service.

Transient Newspapers.

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication, and British and foreign newspapers posted by news agents for regular subscribers in Canada. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, or the United States, they must be prepaid the following rates by Postage Stamp:—

If posted singly and weighing not more than 1 oz., half a cent each.

If weighing over 1 oz., one cent per four oz. or fraction of four oz.

The newspaper rate to England, whether for transient newspapers or for those sent to regular subscribers, is 1c. per 2 oz. by whatever route they may be forwarded.

Patterns and Samples within the Dominion.

Patterns and Samples of Merchandise and Goods for sale, not exceeding 24 oz. in weight, except samples of tea, which must not exceed 8 oz. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on prepayment by Postage Stamp of a rate of I cent per 4 oz. under the following regulations:

If insufficiently prepaid the packet will be forwarded charged with double the deficient postage, provided the deficiency does not exceed 5 cents.

Packages of Samples and Patterns, addressed to any place in Canada, may be registered by affixing thereto stamps to the value of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate, and provided such packet be handed into the Post Office for registration.

Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

The packet may bear on the outside the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended; and also a trade mark or number, and the price of the sample enclosed; inside, there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves. The particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers, and prices may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

Goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible.

Liquids, oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

United Kingdom, United States and Foreign Countries.

Patterns and samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in the United Kingdom, must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight; to the United States and other foreign countries, 12 oz.; and must be prepaid by postage stamp at the following rates:—1 cent per 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., with a minimum prepayment of 2 cents covering a weight of 4 oz.

Samples of liquids, oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

Useful Hints.

Register all valuable letters. Transmit money by Money Orders. Make complaints and inquiries in writing, and address the Postmaster-General at Ottawa. Preserve, and request correspondents to preserve, envelopes of missent or delayed letters. Send to the Postmaster-General envelopes of letters about which you seek information or make complaint. In addressing letters add the name of the County and Province in which the office addressed is located. Place stamp on the right hand upper corner of the address side. Put your own name and full address in or on letter, to insure return if it cannot be delivered. In affixing postage stamps moisten the envelope, not the stamp. When stamps are moistened the gum is apt to be removed.

Parcel Post with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and other British Colonies and Foreign Countries.

Closed parcels may be exchanged with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and most foreign countries and British colonies under the following Regulations:—

- 1. The dimensions of a Parcel must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.
- 2. A Parcel must not contain any explosive, combustible, or dangerous articles.
- 3. All Parcels must be securely and substantially packed and closed.
- 4. Oils, liquids, etc., can only be forwarded if put up with the same security required in connection with their transmission as samples in the ordinary mails. Fragile articles should be packed with special care.
- 5. Each Parcel must be plainly directed, and such direction must include the name and full address of the person for whom the parcel is intended.
- 6. For each Parcel the sender must fill up a Customs Declaration. On this form the sender will supply an accurate statement of the contents and value of the Parcel, also the address thereof, with signature and place of abode of the sender. The Customs Declaration must be securely affixed by mucilage or paste to the parcel to which it relates.

Parcels from the United Kingdom or any other place beyond the Dominion will be liable to Canadian Custom duties, and under existing regulations must be examined

for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs in the presence of the persons addressed.

Rates and limits of weight vary. See Postal Guide, or enquire at Post Office.

Prepayment by postage stamp is required in all cases. Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter.

Fourth Class Matter.

Postage rate one cent per ounce or fraction of an ounce, to be prepaid by postage stamp. Miscellaneous articles of merchandise, including seeds, bulbs, etc., to United States, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada, which is not of the nature of a letter, and therefore subject to letter rate of postage, nor entitled to pass as 3rd class matter, may pass as 4th class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or the United States. Fourth class matter must be so packed or put up as to be opien to examination of contents and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight. The limit of size is 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth, but the combined length and girth of any packet must in no case exceed 6 feet. When passing between Canada and the United States it will be subject to Customs regulations if liable to duty. The registration charge on 4th class matter is 5 cents in addition to postage.

A packet of 4th class matter may contain invoices and accounts, provided they relate exclusively to the contents of such packet; it is also permitted to enclose a card or slip of paper giving in a brief manner necessary directions for the identification or treatment of the article or articles contained in the packet. Care must be taken not to abuse this privilege by converting such notes or marks, designed solely for the facilitation of business between the sender and the addressee, into what might properly be called correspondence. A packet of 4th class matter containing a letter or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter in the ordinary sense will become liable to letter postage, and the sender will incur the penalty provided by law.

When several separate articles are enclosed in a packet of 4th class matter, there is no objection to each bearing a distinguishing number, so as to enable the sender to give directions by letter (sent of course separately and duly prepaid) respecting the several articles which the packet contains.

Prohibited Articles.

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes.

Foreign Post-Commercial Papers.

"Commercial Papers" are understood to comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way bills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, all kinds of manuscript music, the manuscript of books and other literary works. The rate is 1 cent per 2 ozs., but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 5 cents; this prepayment will cover a weight of 10 ozs. No packet must exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth, unless in the form of a roll, when a length of 30 inches is allowed, provided the diameter does not exceed 4 inches. The weight must not exceed 4 lbs.

There being a direct exchange of Money Orders between the Dominion of Canada and the countries and British Colonies distinguished by an asterisk (*), Orders drawn upon these countries and colonies are paid in the full amount for which drawn. Orders upon other countries and colonies, not so distinguished, are, however, subject to a small abatement on payment.

The Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes-Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes-G.C.M.G., K.C.M.G., and C.M.G.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions bear no title, but have the letters C.B. or C.M.G., as the case may be, attached to their names.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Knt," at end of name.

THE GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

THE TREASURY.

Chancellor of the Exchequer—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach. First Lord of the Treasury—Right Hon. A. J. Balfour. Financial Secretary to the Treasury—Joseph Austen Chamberlain.

Patronage Secretary to the Treasury—Rt. Hon. Sir William Walrond.

Junior Lords of the Treasury—H. T. Anstruther, W. Hayes Fisher, Victor Cavendish.

The Treasury, of which the Chancellor of the Exchequer is the political head, provides the means for meeting the charges for the military, naval, and civil services. The Parliamentary heads of each of the spending and administrative departments of the Government are responsible for the estimates for their respective departments; but it is the duty of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, with the permanent Secretary to the Treasury, to check all these estimates before they are submitted to the House of Commons in Committee of Supply. The Cabinet becomes responsible for estimates

which have been submitted to Parliament, and the rejection or reduction of an estimate by the House of Commons is tantamount to a defeat of the Government. The duties which bring the Chancellor of the Exchequer most prominently before the country, are those in connection with the Budget. The first Lord of the Treasury is one of its Parliamentary heads; but the duties of the First Lord are little more than nominal, and the office is usually held by the Leader of the House of Commons. The Patronage Secretary to the Treasury is the official title of the Government whip in the House of Commons. The Junior Lords are his assistants. Financial Secretary represents the Treasury in the House of Commons.

THE FOREIGN OFFICE,

Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs—Marquis of Lansdowne.

Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs—Visc't Cranborne,
All diplomatic intercourse is conducted by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who is usually of the House of Lords. The office is next in rank and importance to that of Premier, and is sometimes held in conjunction with that office. Ambassadors and consuls receive their instructions from the Foreign Office. Foreign ambassadors in London have their audiences with the Chief Secretary, and he also conducts the negotiations for international treaties. The Under Secretary represents the Department in the House of Commons.

THE COLONIAL OFFICE.

Secretary for the Colonies—Right Hon. J. Chamberlain. Under Secretary for the Colonies—Earl of Onslow.

The Colonial Office dates back to 1660, when a Committee of the Privy Council was appointed for the Plantations, as the Colonies were then called. This Council was continued until 1768, when colonial affairs were placed under the control of a Secretary of State, When the United States secured their independence in When the United States secured their independence in 1783, the office of Colonial Secretary was abolished, and colonial affairs were managed from the Home Office. In 1794 the colonies were placed under the care of the Secretary of State for War. This arrangement was continued until 1854, when the War Department was reconstructed, and separate Secretaryships of State were established for War and for the Colonies. The colonies are divided into three classes. In the first are the Crown colonies, in which the Crown has entire control of legislation, and which are administered from the Colonial office. Hong Kong and Cyprus are examples of Crown Colonies. In the second class are the colonies with representative institutions, but not responsible In these the Crown has a veto on legislagovernment. tion and retains control of the public offices. Such colonies are Ceylon and Newfoundland. The third class includes the colonies having responsible government, such as Canada and the Australasian colonies.

THE INDIA OFFICE.

Secretary for India—Lord George Hamilton.
Under Secretary for India—Earl of Hardwicke.
The India Office in its present form dates from 1858, when an Act of Parliament was passed which directed that all the powers and duties hitherto exercised by the old East India Company, or the old Board of Control, should in future be exercised and performed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. At the same time there was established a council to assist the Secretary for India. It consists of not less than ten members nominated by the Secretary. The majority of these members must be men who have served or resided these members must be men who have served or residued ten years in India, and have not left India more than ten years previous to the date of their appointment. Members hold office for ten years, and under the direction of the Secretary for India, conduct all the business transacted in London in relation to the government of India.

THE HOME OFFICE.

Home Secretary—Rt. Hon. Charles T. Ritchie.
Under Secretary—Rt. Hon. Jesse Collings.
The Home Department has the control of the London police force, and also the oversight of the police forces in the counties and municipal boroughs; and generally speaking the Department is responsible for the internal peace of the country. Prisons, convict establishments, criminal lunatic asylums, executions, and all matters connected with the post-judicial execution of the criminal law, come within the purview of the Home Office. It is also responsible for the administration of the factory code, and the laws relating to mining.

THE WAR OFFICE.

Secretary for War—Rt. Hon. Wm. St. John Brodrick. Under Secretary for War—Lord Raglan.

Financial Secretary for the War Office-Lord Stanley.

The Secretary for War has control of the army at home and abroad, and is responsible for its efficiency to the Sovereign and to Parliament. He directs all movements of troops, and all appointments made by the Commander-in-Chief are subject to his approval.

THE ADMIRALTY.

First Lord of the Admiralty—Earl of Selborne.

Secretary to the Admiralty—H, O. Arnold-Forster.

Civil Lord of the Admiralty—Captain E. G. Pretyman.

The Admiralty, which has charge of the Royal Navy, is administered by Lords Commissioners. The head of the Department, who is always of the Cabinet, is known as the First Lord of the Admiralty. The other Lords Commissioners or Junior Lords are Admirals without seats in Parliament, and are respectively at the heads of the departments into which the Admiralty is divided. The foreign movements of ships are at the instance of the Cabinet, the Foreign Office, and the Colonial Office, and it is from these authorities that the Lords of the Admiralty receive their orders. In time of war the orders go from the Cabinet. At other times the movements of vessels are at the instance of the Foreign Office and the Colonial Office.

THE COUNCIL

Lord President of the Council—Duke of Devonshire. Vice-President of the Council—Sir John E. Gorst.

The principal duties of this department are now connected with education. The Committee of Council for Education or the Education Department, as it is popularly called, exercises supervision over the various departments of state alded education, and distributes the grants for education annually made by Parliament. These grants date from 1833; and in 1839 the Committee of Council for Education was established. The Vice-President is always of the House of Commons, and he is practically the Minister of Education. On the 1st of April, 1900, the Committee of Council for Education came to an end, and the powers it had exercised since 1839, enormously increased, however, since 1870, were transferred to a new State Department known as the Board of Education. The new Board was created the Board of Education. The new Board was created under an Act of Parliament passed in the ordinary session of 1899. It consists of a President, the Principal Secretaries of State (these are the Secretaries for Foreign Affairs, for Colonial Affairs, for the Home Department, for War, and for India), the First Commissioner of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer. With the creation of this new Board there was for the first time a direct and general connection. was for the first time a direct and general connection between the Government and secondary schools in England. Heretofore the Committee of Council had been concerned chiefly with elementary education, except as regards the Science and Art Department. Now, however, inspectors representing the Board of Education may visit the secondary schools, and a connection is established between these schools and the municipal councils. With the new Board of Education there was also created a Consultative Committee, which is to keep a register of teachers, and advise the Board on any matters referred to it. Universities and other bodies concerned in education are represented on the Consultative Committee.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

President of the Local Government Board-Rt. Hon. W. H. Long.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Local Government Board—Grant Lawson.

This Department dates from the reform of the Poor

Law in 1834. From 1834 to 1847 its chief was not of the Ministry nor in Parliament. Up to 1871 it was occupied exclusively with the administration of the Poor Law. In 1871 it took over from the Home Department numerous duties in connection with municipal government and public health, and its title was changed to the Local Government Board.

THE BOARD OF TRADE.

President of the Board of Trade—Rt. Hon. Gerald Balfour.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade—Earl of Dudley.

The Board of Trade is in charge of the administration of the laws relating to limited liability companies, to bankruptcy; and it also has the oversight of all matters connected with the mercantile marine, harbours, canals, railways, and street car lines and electric lighting. The Labour Bureau is a department of the Board of Trade. Its work is confined to the collection and compilation of information of all kinds relating to labour. The Board of Trade also collects information relating to trade and commerce abroad.

THE POST OFFICE.

Postmaster-General-Marquis of Londonderry.

The Post Office in England controls the telegraphs, as well as the home and foreign mail departments. The telegraphs have been a Government undertaking since 1869. The Post Office savings banks, of which there are over 12,000, receive sums up to a maximum of £50 in one year, or £200 in all. They also do a life insurance, and an annuity business on lines intended to meet the needs and convenience of the working classes.

THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

Pres. of the Board of Agriculture-Rt. Hon. R. W. Hanbury.

The principal duties of this Department are the administration of the laws for preventing and stamping out cattle disease. It supervises the landing of live cattle imported from abroad.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

First Commissioner of Works-Rt. Hon. A. Akers-Douglas.

This Department has the custody and supervision of all Royal Palaces and parks, and also of buildings such as the Houses of Parliament, the Law Courts, and the public offices at Whitehall.

DEPARTMENT OF THE LORD CHAMBERLAIN.

Lord Chamberlain—Earl of Clarendon. Vice-Chamberlain of the Household—Sir A. Acland Hood

Comptroller of the Household-Viscount Valentia.

The Lord Chamberlain's Department has the general supervision of the Royal Household "above stairs," and also various duties towards the Sovereign and the Court. It is through the Lord Chamberlain that presentations at Court are arranged. In cities where there are royal palaces, he acts as the licenser of theatres. The Examiner of Plays is in the Department of the Lord Chamberlain. His sanction is necessary for the production of a play in any theatre, in England at which a charge for admission is made.

IRISH AND SCOTCH DEPARTMENTS.

Chief Secretary for Ireland—Rt. Hon. Geo. Wyndham. Secretary for Scotland—Lord Balfour of Burleigh.

These Departments for Ireland and Scotland respectively exercise functions very similar to those of the Home Department in England.

MINISTERIAL SALARIES.

The salaries received by the members of the Cabinet range from £2,000 to £6,000. The Lord Chancellor has also £4,000 as Speaker of the House of Lords. The political secretaryships and the under secretaryships of departments have attached to them salaries of £1,500 to £2,000 a year. Pensions are granted to such of the holders of Ministerial offices as after their retirement become too straitened in means to maintain themselves in a social position in keeping with the official rank they have held. These pensions are granted irrespective of length of official service. They range in amount from £1,000 to £1,200. At the present time no pensions of this kind are being paid.

THE BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

THE GENERAL ELECTION OF 1900.

As a result of the general election in Great Britain, which took place in October, 1900, and of subsequent by-elections, the House of Commons, which consists of 670 members, is now made up as follows:-

The Unionists have thus a majority of 136. After the general election of 1895 they had a majority of 152. When the Parliament of 1895-1900 came to an end the Government majority stood at 132, having been reduced to that number at the by-elections during the preceding five years. In the accompanying table, which shows the results of the election of 1900 in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, political parties are divided into Scotland and retaind, political parties are divided into three groups—Unionists, Liberals and Nationalists. Included in the Unionist group are the Conservatives and the Liberal Unionists. The Liberal group includes Liberals, Radicals and Lahour members. Excepting the case of Mr. T. P. O'Connor, who sits for the Scotland Road Division of Liverpool as a Nationalist, all the Nationalist members sit for Irish constituencies.

In an overwhelming majority of these uncontested returns in 1900 the seats went to Unionists. Not more than forty Liberals were returned without opposition. The statistics given

THE BRITISH CENSUS OF 1901.

The total number of persons returned as living in England and Wales at midnight on Sunday, March 31st, 1901, was 32,526,075. This shows an increase of 3,523,-550 upon the number enumerated on April 5th, 1891, and gives a decennial rate of increase of 12'17 per cent, which favourably contrasts with the increase of 3,028,-086, or 11'65 per cent. in the previous decennium. The increase is numerically greater than in any previous decennium, but the progression per cent. is lower than in any other decennium of the last century, except those terminating in 1861 and 1891.

Of the 32,526,075 persons enumerated 15,721,728 were males and 16,804,347 females. This gives an excess of 1,082,619 females, an excess which is partially attributable to the fact that men serving in the Army, Navy, and the Merchant Service abroad are excluded from the reckoning. In 1891 the excess was 896,723. To each 100 males enumerated there were 106'9 females. The proportion of females has been steadily increasing at each census since 1851, having been successively 104'2, 105'3, 105'4, 105'5, 106'4, and 106'9 to 100 males.

Inhabited houses number 6,266,496, as contrasted with 5,451,497 in 1891, an increase of 314,999, or 15.0 per cent. For the period ending 1891 the increase had been at the rate of no more than 12.8 per cent.

The population of Scotland was 4,471,957, showing an increase of 446,310 in the 10 years, or 11'1 per cent., against 11,2 and 7'8 per cent. in the two preceding decennia. The excess of births over deaths in the 10 years was 499,768, showing that the loss of population during that period by excess of emigration over immigration was 53,458.

The population of Ireland was 4,456,546, and less by 248,204 than the number recorded at the previous

Census in 1891; the decrease, which had been equal to 44 and 9·1 per cent. in the two preceding decennia, fell again to 5·3 per cent. in the last Intercensal period. The excess of births over deaths in Ireland during the Census period 1891-1901 was equal to 218,222. It follows, therefore, that the loss of population during that period by excess of emigration over immigration must have amounted to 466,426, or nearly half a million. The population of Ireland at the recent Census but slightly exceeded a half of that enumerated at the Census in 1841, and for the first time fell below the population of Scotland, which exceeded that of Ireland by 15,411.

The population of England and Wales in 1901 amounted to 78'4 per cent., or more than three-quarters of the aggregate population of the United Kingdom, showing a further considerable increase upon the constantly-increasing proportions at previous Census enumerations. The population of Scotland and that of Ireland were each approximately equal to 10'8 per cent. of the population of the United Kingdom. The proportion of the Scotch population differed but slightly from that at recent Censuses, whereas the population of Ireland, which in 1821 constituted 32'6 per cent. of the population of the United Kingdom, has continuously declined, and did not exceed 10'8 per cent at the Census of 1901. LEGAL AND JUDICIARY.

Supreme Court of the Dominion.

The Supreme Court, as a high Court of Appeal constituted by Dominion Statute (see Revised Statutes of Canada, Chap. 135), is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, and has appellate, civil and criminal jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The Judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually three Sessions—the first beginning on the third Tuesday in February, the second on the first Tuesday in October.

The Exchequer Court of the Dominion.

The Exchequer Court, also constituted under a Dominion Statute (see 50-51 Vict. Chap. 16), is presided over by one Judge and has original exclusive jurisdiction in all claims, suits or actions against the Crown. It has concurrent jurisdiction in relation to revenue cases and the enforcement of penalties, in cases in which it is sought at the instance of the Attorney-General of Canada to impeach or annul any patent of invention, or any patent case or other instrument respecting lands; cases against Crown officers for anything done or omitted to be done as such officer, and all actions or suits in which the Crown is plaintiff or petitioner.

Admiralty Division.

In pursuance of the powers given by "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," the Exchequer Court of Canada is declared a Colonial Court of Admiralty (See 54-55 Vic., Cap. 29.)

The Admiralty Court has all rights and remedies in all matters (including cases of contract and tort and proceedings in rem and in personam) arising out of or in connection with navigation, shipping, trade and commerce, which may be had or inforced in any Colonial Court of Admiralty, under "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," throughout Canada and the waters thereof, whether tidal or non-tidal, or naturally navigable or artificially made so.

Admiralty business may be transacted at the office of the Exchequer Court at Ottawa, or at the local registry offices.

There are Admiralty Districts presided over by Local Judges in Admiralty as follows:—

(a) The Province of Quebec constitutes the District of Quebec with Registry at the City of Quebec.

(b) The Province of Nova Scotia constitutes the District of Nova Scotia with Registry at the City of Halifax.

(c) The Province of New Brunswick constitutes the District of New Brunswick with Registry at the City of St. John.

(d) The Province of Prince Edward Island constitutes the District of Prince Edward Island with Registry at the City of Charlottetown.

(e) The Province of British Columbia constitutes the District of British Columbia with Registry at the City of Victoria.

(f) The Toronto Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Toronto, the limits being from time to time fixed by the Governor-in-Council.

(g) The Yukon Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Dawson, the limits being the Yukon Territory.

The Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario.

Court of Appeal for Ontario—Constituted for the hearing of appeals from the High Court of Justice, and from the County Courts. From the judgment of this Court an appeal lies, at the option of litigants, either to the Supreme Court of the Dominion, or to His Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over £1,000, or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. The Judges of this Court may be placed on the rota for the trial of Election petitions, with the Justices of the High Court, who as ex-officio Judges of this Court, choose from their number a Judge or Judges to sit in Appeal in case of there being a vacancy in this Court, or if, from illness or some other cause, one of the Judges of the Court is unable to be present, or is under any legal disqualification to hear an appeal. Sittings are held at such times and for such periods as the Judges shall, from time to time, deem necessary or convenient for the speedy dispatch of business, the five regular sittings being the first Tuesday in March and September, and the second Tuesday in January, May and November, due notice of the time of holding of further sittings being given. If required, a second division of the Court, consisting of Judges of the High Court, can also sit for the disposal of business.

High Court of Justice for Ontario.

The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Ontario, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also (with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men in the cases provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution thereon, and also in matters which relate to the King's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or smuggled goods) as may be done by His Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England, and also the like jurisdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators,

co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, inco-partnersmips, account, moregages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, and may decree the issue, repeal, or voidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law.

Divisional Court sittings are held on the first Monday of each month (except vacation) to dispose of such matters as may properly be brought before a Divisional Court.

LAW CIRCUITS.—Sittings for Hearing of Actions.
—In the Counties of York, Wentworth, Carleton and Middlesex, there is held an additional such Court in every year, in the vacation between Michaelmas and Hilary Terms; and in the County of York there is held another such Court, between Easter Term and the first day of July. Whenever in any year the judges may de-termine that it is not necessary to hold the latter such stitings may be dispensed with. The sittings for hearing of actions may, in the discretion of the Judges, be held separate and apart from the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery.

The Courts in each Circuit are presided over by the Chancellor or by a retired or present Justice of the High Court or of the Court of Appeal, or by a Judge of a County Court, or by some one of His Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by the Chancellor or one of the Justices to act in that behalf.

Weekly Sittings.—A Judge sits at Osgoode Hall every week except vacation for the purpose of disposing of all business except trials which may be transacted by a single Judge. Chamber business on Mondays and Fridays. Court business on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Sittings will be held at Ottawa and London respectively at least one day in each week (except vacation) to dispose of certain matters which can be determined by a single Judge. The Judges have now power on petition to constitute monthly or semi-monthly

Sittings in lieu of weekly.

CHAMBERS.—Chambers are held each day for such business relating to actions as may be transacted by a single judge out of Court. The Master in Chambers is empowered to obtain the assistance of any Official Re-

feree to sit with or for him.

Long Vacation extends from the 1st of July to the 3ist of August, both inclusive. There is also a vacation from the 24th December to 6th January, both inclusive.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT .- Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine the Great Seal. duties are to determine claims to land in Ontario, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favor of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees, or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. Judges—The Judges of the Superior Court (ex-officio), others appointed by commission.

COURTS FOR THE TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS. The nature of these courts is sufficiently indicated in their title. In respect to elections for the House of Commons of Canada, the Superior Courts by one of their Judges appointed in that behalf, are invested with special jurisdiction for the trial of contested elections, and appeals lie to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. In respect to elections for the Local Legislature of Ontario, the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature meet annually on or before the third day of Michaelmas Judge from their respective Courts or Division to be placed on the rota for the trial of election petitions during the ensuing year. In the case of death or the illness of a Judge so chosen, the Court of which he is a member meet and elect another Judge. Trials involving corrupt practices are presided over by two Judges, otherwise a single Judge presides, and an appeal lies to the Court of Appeal of the Province.

MARITIME COURT OF ONTARIO.—By 54-55 Vic., Cap. 29, this court has been abolished except as to pending business. Judge—J. E. McDougall, K.C. Registrar— John Bruce. Marshal-Wm. Boyd.

COUNTY COURTS .- Presided over by a resident Judge in each county, assisted in some counties by a Deputy or Junior Judge. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenot exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to \$600; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; in actions of contract to any amount if parties agree to try same in County Court, for recovery of or trespass to land where land does not exceed \$200 in value, partnership actions where capital was not over \$1,000, for legacies not exceeding \$200, where estate is \$1,000 or under, to enforce mortgages or liens, or for redemption, or for equitable relief where claim does not exceed \$200, to es-

tablish claim on insolvent estate where claim does not exceed \$400; but not to cases involving the title to lands of greater value than \$200, validity of devises or bequests exceeding \$200, nor where estate exceeds \$1,000, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to a Divisional Court.

COUNTY COURT SITTINGS AND COURT OF GENERAL SESsions.—The County Judge in each county holds a sitting of his Court and a Court of General Sessions in his county, for the trial of issues of fact, semi-annually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the County of York, in which county said Court is held four times, commencing on the first Tuesday in December and March, and the second Tuesday in May and September, the latter Courts for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempted from their jurisdiction, and (except in the County of York) a sitting for the trial of issues without a jury shall be held in each county on the first Tuesday in April and October in each year. The Judge may also, in his discretion, hold additional sittings at such times as may be deemed expedient to expedite business, but only for the trial of issues of fact without a jury.

COUNTY JUDGE'S CRIMINAL COURT.—Persons committed to jail for trial, on charge of being guilty of any offence for which they may be tried at a Court of General Sessions may, with their own consent, and subject to the provisions of the Act in that behalf, be forthwith tried by the Judge of the County Court and County County by the Judge of the County Court and General Sessions without a jury, and if convicted, be sentenced by said Judge; and the Judge sitting on any such trial for all the purposes thereof, is constituted a Court of Record, and the record in any such case shall be filed among the records of the Court of General Sessions last mentioned.

COUNTY COURT TERMS .- The several County Courts in COUNTY COURT IRRMS.—The several County Courts in Ontario hold four sittings in each year, commencing respectively on the second Monday in the month of January, and the first Monday in the months of April, July, and October, except the County of York, which commences on the first Monday in April, and the second Monday in January, June and October, and ending on the Saturday of the same week, unless extended by order of the Judge. order of the Judge.

COURTS OF REVISION.—The County Judges hold annually Courts of final revision of the Assessment Rolls of each Municipality, being in the light of Courts of Appeal from the first Court of Revision held by the Municipality; and also Courts for the Revision of the Voters Lists for Provincial Elections.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting and revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effect in Ontario, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Chancery Division. The County Judges are also Judges of

the Surrogate Courts. DIVISION COURTS are held for the summary disposal of cases by the presiding Judge, being the County Judge or his Deputy, or any Barrister appointed to hold the same; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract where the balance claimed is over \$100 and under \$200 and the original amount was ascertained by the signature of the defendant, and to \$100 in other the signature of the defendant, and to \$100 in other cases of debt, subject in some cases to an appeal to the Court of Appeal; but the sum of the account to be gone into cannot exceed \$400; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$60; and personal actions to that amount, if not excepted from their jurisdiction; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seducion or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Each Judicial District is divided into Court Divisions, and Courts are held once in two months Court Divisions, and Courts are held once in two months in each Division, or oftener at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of General Sessions, and in certain cases by the Judges.

THE LAW OF INTESTATES ESTATES.

DESCENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY.

As to all persons who died before the first day of January, 1852, the rules of descent are substantially the same as in England at that date.

Real estate of persons who died intestate (i.e., who have left no will) after that date and prior to the first day of July, 1886, descends first to lineal descendants and those claiming by or under them per stirpes, second to father, third to mother, and fourth to collateral relatives, subject to certain rules and regulations prescribed in the statute.

The surplus personal estate of intestates who died prior to the first day of July, 1886, is, after the expira-tion of one full year from the death of the intestate, to be distributed in the following manner: One-third shall go to the widow of the intestate, and the residue in equal proportions to his children, or if dead, to their lineal descendants; if there are no children or legal representatives subsisting, then where the net value of the real and personal estate does not exceed \$1,000, same belongs absolutely to the widow, and as to any excess over and above said amount after payments of debts, etc., the widow takes a moiety, and the other moiety goes to the next of kindred, in equal degree, and their representatives; if no widow, all to children; if neither widow nor children, all to next of kin, in equal degree, and their representatives. But no representation is admitted among collaterals further than children of intestate's brothers and sisters

All real and personal property of persons dying on or after the 1st day of July, 1886, devolves upon and becomes vested in the legal personal representatives for the period of a year (which may be extended in a pre-scribed manner) subject to the payment of debts and to the effectual dispositions of deceased. The real and personal property of a married woman, in respect of which she has died intestate, shall be distributed as follows: One-third to her husband, if she leaves issue, and one-half if she leaves none, and subject thereto, shall go as if firer husband had predeceased her. The realty and personalty comprised in a residuary devise or bequest is (unless the will otherwise directs) applicable ratably according to their respective value to the payment of the debts.

APPOINTMENT OF JUDGES IN CANADA.

By the British North America Act it is provided that the Governor General shall appoint the Judges of the Superior, District and County Court, except those of the Courts of Probate in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and that their salaries, allowances and pensions shall be fixed and provided by the Dominion Parliament. It is also provided that the Judges of the Courts of Quebec shall be selected from the Bar of that Province, and there is a similar provision for the selection of the Judges in Ontario, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, until the laws relative to property and civil rights and the procedure of the courts in those Provinces are made uniform.—Statistical Record.



INSANE IN CANADA.

The number of insane in Canada in 1891 as obtained by the census was 13,355, of which 7,162 were males and 6,193 females.

In every 10,000 males there were 29.1 insane, and in every 10,000 females there were 26.1 insane.

The insane, classified according to civil condition, were: single, 9,506; married, 2,815; widowed, 721; unknown, 313.

Of the single, 5 441 were males and 4,065 females; of the married, 1,239 were males and 1,576 females; of the widowed, 218 were males and 503 females, and of the unknown, 206 were males and 107 females.

According to ages there were 762 insane under 15 years old; 701 between 15 and 19 years old; 2,429 between 20 and 29; 2,643 between 30 and 39 years; 5,369 between 40 and 69 years; 878, 70 years and over, and 576 whose ages were unknown,

Under 15 years the percentage was 0.04; between 15 and 19 years it was 0.13; between 20 and 29 it was 0.28; between 30 and 39 it was 0.45; and between 40 and 69 years it was 0.57 per cent., showing a larger proportion of the insane among the population between 40 and 69 than among other age groups.

According to nativity, 5,853 of the insane were born in Canada of parents who were both born in Canada; 2,793 were born in Canada of foreign born parents; 612 were born in Canada of parents one of whom was born in Canada, and 3,044 were foreign born; 1,053 were born in Canada, but the birth-place of their parents were unknown.

These constitute two groups: (1) Those whose parents were foreign born, and (2) all the others. The first group have 90 in every 10,000 of the foreign-born population; the second group have 18 insane in every 10,000 of the native born,

Synopsis of Fishery Laws.

Net fishing of any kind is prohibited in public waters, except under Leases or Licenses. The size of nets is regulated so as to prevent the killing of young fish. Nets cannot be set or seines used so as to bar channels or bays. A general weekly Close-time is provided in addition to special close seasons. The use of Explosive or Poisonous substances for catching or killing fish is illegal. The use of fire arms for killing fish is prohibited. Mill-dams must be provided with efficient fish passes.

The above enactments and close seasons are supplemented in special cases, under authority of the Dominion Fisheries Act (Chap. 95 R. S.), by a total prohibition of fishing for stated periods. All communications relating to Fisheries should be addressed: Department of Marine

Abstract of Ontario Came Laws.

No person not a resident and domiciled in Ontario may hunt or kill any animal or bird in Ontario without having procured a non-resident license.

Deer .- Open season November 1st to November 15th, both days inclusive.

Only two Deer may be taken in one season by one

Moose, Reindeer or Caribou.—Open season November 1st to November 15th, in the year 1900, both days inclusive, and in every third year thereafter. Only one Moose, Reindeer or Caribou may be taken in

one season by one person.

No cow Moose, or young Moose, Reindeer or Caribou under the age of one year can be killed.

No Elk or Wapiti shall be hunted, taken or killed at

any time in Ontario.

No person may transport or have in possession, except from November 1st to 15th, any wild Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou, or head, raw skin or other part thereof, unless accompanied by affidavit that same was taken during the open season. Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou may not be carried or transported unless a

license shipping coupon is attached.

No hounds or dogs accustomed to pursue Deer are allowed at large where Deer are found, during the close

season for Deer.

Hounds or dogs running *Deer* during the close season may be killed on sight by any person, who shall not be liable to damage for so doing.

Open season September 1st to December

15th, both days inclusive.

Geese and Swans.—Open season September 15th to

May 1st in the following year, both days inclusive. Grouse.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Hares.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Partridge.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Pheasants.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. English or Mongolian Pheasants may not be killed before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Plover.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Prairie Fowl.-Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be killed

before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Quait.—Open season October 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive May not be bought or sold before both days inclusive May not be bought or sold before the 15th day of October, 1905.

Rail.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Turkeys, Wild.—Open season October 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be killed before

Shipe.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be sold before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Woodcock.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Insectivorous birds may not be caught, killed or sold, or had in possession without a permit, except Hawks,

Crows, Black-birds and English Sparrows.

Squirrels (Black and Grey).—Open season September

15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Beaver and Otter.—Open season November 1st to
April 1st in following year, both days inclusive. May
not be taken or killed before the 1st day of November, 1905

Muskrats.—Open season January 1st to May 1st, both ays inclusive. But no Muskrat may be shot during the days inclusive. month of April.

THE ONTARIO SUCCESSION DUTY ACT.

The Succession Duty Act, Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1897, Chapter 24, applies to the estates of persons dying on or after 1st July, 1892, and applies to real and personal property of every description except:

(1) Where the value of the estate after payment of all

debts and expenses of administration does not exceed \$10,000.

(2) To property given for religious, charitable or educational purposes.

(3) Property passing to or for the use of father, mother, husband, wife, child, grandchild, daughter-in-law or son-in-law of the deceased where the aggregate value of the property of the deceased does not exceed \$100,000.

The Act applies:
(a) To all property passing either by Will or intestacy

within Ontario, whether the deceased was domiciled in Ontario at the time of his death or elsewhere.

(b) To all said property which shall be voluntarily transferred by deed, sale or gift made in contemplation of the death of the grantor or intended to take effect after such death to any person in trust or otherwise.

(c) To any property taken as a donatic mortis causa made by any person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, or taken under the disposition made by any person so dying purporting to operate as an immediate gift whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise which shall not have been bona fide

made twelve months before the death of the deceased.

(d) To any property which the person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, having been absolutely entitled thereto has caused to be transferred or vested in himself and any other person jointly so that the beneficial interest therein, or in some part thereof, passes or accrues by survivorship on his death to such other person.

(e) To property passing under settlement, as to which see the Act

(f) To the beneficial interest arising by survivorship or otherwise (if any) from Annuities.

Where the aggregate value of the property of deceased exceeds \$100,000 and passes in whole or in part to or for the benefit of the father, mother, husband, wife, child, grandchild or other lineal descendant or daughter-inlaw or son-in-law of the deceased, the same shall be subject to a duty of \$2.50 for every \$100 of the value,

Where the aggregate value of said property exceeds \$200,000 the whole shall be subject to a duty of \$5 for every \$100.

Where the value of the property of the deceased exceeds \$10,000, so much thereof as passes to or for the benefit of the grandfather or grandmother, or any other lineal ancestor of the deceased except the father and mother, or to any brother or sister of the deceased, or to any descendants of such brother or sister, or to a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased, or of any descendant of such last mentioned brother or sister, shall be subject to a duty of \$5 for every \$100.


Where the value of said property exceeds \$10,000 and any part thereof passes to or for the benefit of any person in any other degree of collateral consanguinity to the deceased than is above described, or to or for the benefit of any stranger in blood to the deceased save as hereinbefore provided for, same shall be subject to a duty of \$10 for every \$100 of the value.

Provided that where the whole value of any said property does not exceed \$200 the same shall be exempt from duty.

Any property brought into Ontario for administration or distribution shall be liable to the duty.

Executors or administrators are directed to make and file with the Surrogate Registrar a statement under oath showing (a) itemized inventory of all the property of the deceased and the market value thereof, and (b) the several persons to whom the same will pass under the Will or intestacy and their degree of relationship (if any); and the executor shall before the issue of (if any); and the executor shall before the issue of Letters Probate or of Administration deliver to the Surrogate Registrar a bond with two sureties in a penal sum equal to ten per cent. of the sworn value of the property of the deceased liable to succession duty.

Should the Treasurer of the Province be not satisfied with the value so sworn to or with the correctness of the inventory, provision is made for a valuation and appraisement of the said property by the Sheriff of the County in which same is situate, with the right of appeal by either party from such appraisement to the Surrogate Judge of the County,

The Law Society of Ontario.

The Law Society was first established in 1797 by the Act 37, Geo. III., c. 13, which enabled the then practitioners of the law to form themselves into a society, and tioners of the law to form themselves into a society, and make rules for its government. By the Act of 1822, 2 Geo. IV., c. 5, "the Treasurers and Benchers of the Law Society" were formally incorporated; and under these and other statutes the Society has continued to be governed by a Board of Benchers, in the same manner as the various Law Societies of England. Under Revised Statutes of Ontario, c. 145, 1887, the Benchers are, exclusive of ex-officio members, elected by the Bar, the ex-officio consisting of the Attorney-General of the Dominion for the time being, if a member of the Bar of Ontario, and all members of the Bar of Ontario who have at any time held the office of Attorney-General of the Dominion or Ontario, or of Attorney-General of the Dominion or Ontario, or of Attorney-General of have at any time held the office of Attorney-General of the Dominion or of Ontario, or of Attorney or Solicitor-General of the former Province of Upper Canada, and any retired Judge of the Superior Courts of Law or Equity of Ontario; the elected, thirty in number, being chosen by ballot, for a term of five years, by the members of the Bar, in manner prescribed by the Act. Vacancies during the term are filled by the remaining Benchers. On the first day of Easter Term, annually, the Benchers appoint one of their body to be Treasurer,

who is also President of the Society. The Benchers sit in Convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the in Convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the admission of Attorneys and Solicitors to Practice, and of Students to enter the Society, the fees paid by whom form the revenue of the Society. Osgoode Hall, appropriately named after the first Chief Justice, is the Ontario "Inn of Court," or head-quarters of the Society, in which is provided accommodation for the Court of Appeal and Courts of Equity, and for the sittings in term of the Superior Courts; with a valuable and extensive library. sive library.

LIFE INSURANCE.

The Dominion Government requires all life insurance companies doing business in Canada to make up, under oath, and deposit with the Superintendent of Insurance within two months after the close of the year, in the form prescribed by law, a statement of their affairs. These statements are subsequently verified by the Superintendent of Insurance, by personal examination at the company's chief offices, and embodied in an annual report to Parliament. The business of life insurance, may be said to be whelly travected by surance may be said to be wholly transacted by companies authorized by the Dominion Government, there being but one or two institutions incorporated by provincial legislation.

In 1900 there were 37 companies operating in Canada, as follows .

The new business transacted in 1900 was \$68,896,092, distributed as follows:

The amount taken by native companies exceeded that taken by the British and American together by \$8,195,806.

The total amount of insurance in force December 31st, 1900, was \$431,069,846 (or almost five times what it was at the close of 1880), allocated as follows:-

Formerly the American companies held the foremost place, but for many years they have been obliged to give way to the energetic enterprise of the home companies, whose total business now exceeds that of the American companies twice over.

It is not pretended that these figures alone should be a guide in the selection of a company to insure in, inasmuch as they do not represent the summum bonum of any company, but are given simply to enable the reader to obtain an idea of the business transacted by some of the principal companies operating in Canada. In selecting a company to insure in, the main points to be observed are: (1) Its financial strength, to be tested by a comparison of the assets with the liabilities;

(2) An examination of the profit-earning power of the

company;
(3) Of its expense ratio;
(4) Of its premium rates;
(5) Of the conditions and privileges of its policy contract, etc.

PLANS OF INSURANCE.

Policies are divided into two main classes, ordinary life and endowment. The life policy is payable at death only, the endowment at the end of a specified period (usually 10, 15, 20 or 25 years), or at death, if that should occur sooner. The life policy is usually secured for protection for the family, while the endowment policy fulfils a double object, viz.: provision for the family in case of death within the endowment term, and a competency to the insured should he survive the period. The life policy may be secured with premiums payable each year that the life enters upon, or, which is more preferable and popular at the present time, by a limited number of payments; for example, a twentypayment life, after running for twenty years, is paid up, but the insurance is not payable until death. Similarly, fifteen and ten-payment life policies are paid up after fifteen and ten annual payments respectively, but are not payable until death. not payable until death.

not payable until death.

The endowment policy is generally secured by annual premiums payable for the same number of years as the endowment term, but this policy is sometimes written with premiums payable only through a portion of the term. For example, a twenty-year endowment by ten payments is a policy payable twenty years hence, or at prior death, with payment of premiums limited to the first ten years of the policy. The premium rates of most of the representative Canadian life insurance companies are uniform at all ages for the principal plans of insurare uniform at all ages for the principal plans of insurance. The rates of the American companies are invariably higher than those of Canadian companies.

AMENDMENT TO INSURANCE ACT.

The amendment to the Insurance Act, which was made at the 1899 session of the Dominion Parliament, among other matters, provides for these important changes:

(1) For the extension and uniformity of the powers of investing the funds of Canadian life insurance com-

panies, and

(2) That the interest basis of Reserves shall be as follows: for all new business transacted after January 18t, 1900, 3½ per cent.; for business existing as at January 1st, 1900, 4½ per cent. until January 1st, 1910, after which date the rate is to be 4 per cent. until January 1st, 1915, and thereafter 3½ per cent. As a result of the more stringent 3½ per cent. valuation, the life insurance companies were obliged to increase their rates, to take effect January 1st, 1900.

SURRENDER VALUES AND DIVIDENDS

Cash values, or paid-up values, are usually allowed upon surrender of life or endowment policies, after three or more annual premiums have been paid. It has now or more annual premiums have been paid. It has now become very general to endorse upon the policy the amount of these values. On policies taken out on the with-profit system, dividends are apportioned either annually, quinquennially, or accumulated for a period of ten, fifteen or twenty years, known as the Tontine, Reserve Dividend or Accumulative Period. The dividends to those who survive this period are increased by the dividends of those who die within it.

HISTORICAL DIARY FOR 1900-1901.

NOVEMBER, 1900.

1-The Ministry of Lord Salisbury is reconstructed.

2—General Kitchener having made a night march surprises Schoeman's laager at Steenkampsberg. He then pushes on for Schalkranz, but the nature of the country prevents him from following the trekking Boers.

In operations in the Belfast district Captain Chalmers of the Canadian Mounted Rifles is killed, and Major Sanders of the same command is wounded. Lord Roberts reports that both officers "behaved with great gallantry in the action. Sanders was wounded and his horse was killed, and Chalmers went to his assistance. Sanders implored him to leave, but was refused, and the gallant Chalmers was, I grieve to say, killed."

-The Lord Mayor of Dublin rules out of order a resolution to confer the freedom of the city upon ex-President Kruger.

The Toronto and Hamilton Companies of the Royal Canadian Regiment are enthusiastically welcomed home. The Cuban Constitutional Convention organizes at

Havana

The British force under Col. Le Gallais surprises the Boers near Bothaville. The Boers are repulsed, but Col. Le Gallais, 2 other officers and 8 men are killed, and 7 officers and 26 men are wounded. 100 Boers are captured, and 25 dead and 30 wounded are found on the field.

6-The action near Bothaville is continued. Boers try to seize a strong position on the bank of the Komati, but are prevented by Col. Evans and the Canadian mounted troops.

The United States Presidential election results in a

victory for President McKinley.

Elections to the 57th Congress of the United States result in a Republican victory.

Elections in Porto Rico show the election by the

Republicans of the entire House of Delegates.

7-The Hawarden Castle sails from Cape Town with the last of the Canadian Regiment, bound for South-

A convention between Spain and the United States is signed at Washington, by which the islands of Cagayan and Sibutu are sold to the United States for \$100,000.

Another batch of new appointments under the Salisbury administration is announced: Mr. Wyndham to the Irish Secretaryship, Mr. Gerald Balfour to the Presidency of the Board of Trade, Mr. Walter Long to the Local Government Board, Mr. Austen Chamberlain to the post of Financial Secretary to the Treasury, Viscount Cranborne to be Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs.

Dominion general elections are held. The Laurier Government is sustained.

8—Major Mackintosh, of the Seaforth Highlanders, occupies Philippolis, the Boers fleeing in all directions. Reports from Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee

announce the destruction of Boxer camps about Pekin.

General elections in Newfoundland result in the triumph of the Bond (Liberal) government over the Reid-Morine party.

9-General Sir Redvers Buller arrives in England. At the Lord Mayor's banquet in London Lord Salisbury makes a defence of the War Office, and reviews the

situation in South Africa and China. Sir Charles Tupper announces his retirement from politics.

10-Russian troops capture an arsenal near Yang

Tsun, killing 200 Chinese.

An Hispano-American Congress, in which many of the South American States are represented, meets at Madrid. The Anarchist Salson, who tried to kill the Shah of Persia, is convicted and sentenced to penal servitude for life

The steamer City of Monticello founders in the Bay of Fundy and sinks among the breakers. The passengers and crew, numbering 37, are all, except 4, lost.

Death of R. G. Dun, head of the mercantile firm of

Dun & Co.

11-The British force under Douglas arrives at Ventersdorp from Zeerust, capturing during the march 21 prisoners and a quantity of cattle and sheep.

Major-General Smith-Dorrien recommends four Canadians for the Victoria Cross and a fifth for some special mark of Her Majesty's favor: Lieut. Cockburn, Lieut. Turner, Private Kinsley and Sergt. Holland, of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and Lieut. Morrison, of the Royal Canadian Artillery.

12-The Paris Exposition is closed.

13-A Chinese Imperial edict is issued for the punishment of the anti-foreign officials.

14-The Victoria (Australia) Government is defeated on a want-of-confidence vote in the Legislative Assembly. Elections in Gaspe and Prince Edward Island result in the return of 3 Liberals and 2 Conservatives.

The Prince Edward Island Legislature having been dissolved writs are issued for a local general election to

take place on December 12.

16—The Earl of Rosebery is installed as Lord Rector the Glasgow University. His rectorial address on of the Glasgow University. His rectorial address on "The British Empire" is a strong appeal to the race to realize its responsibilities and to prepare to fight for its existence.

An insane woman throws an axe at Emperor William

in Breslau. His Majesty is unhurt.

Five Italians, 4 Greeks and a Frenchman are arrested at Johannesburg on the charge of plotting the assassination of Lord Roberts.

18—Lord Roberts issues an explicit order regarding the burning of Boer farms. The order states that no farm is to be burned except for an act of treachery, or farm is to be burned except for an act of treachery, or when our troops are fired on from the premises, or as punishment for the breaking of the telegraph or railway, or when used as basis of operations for raids, and then only with the direct consent of the general officer commanding. The mere fact that a burgher is absent on commando is on no account to be used as a recent feat burning the house. reason for burning his house.

A Boer force under Commandant Brand is defeated at Vaderspan with heavy loss. Brand is a son of the late Sir Henry John Brand, who was President of the Orange

Free State for many years.

The appointment of Mr. George B. Reeve as General Manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, in succession to Mr. C. M. Hays, is announced.

19-In the Reichstag Count Von Bülow, the Imperial Chancellor, denies the assertion frequently made that the Chinese imbroglio is traceable to the German occupation of Kiaochou. He announces the unanimous agreement of the powers at Pekin in the following demands upon China: (1) China shall erect a monument to Baron Von Ketteler on the site where he was murdered, and send an Imperial Prince to Germany to convey an apology. She shall inflict the death penalty upon 11 princes and officials already named, and suspend provincial examinations for 5 years where the outrages occurred. (2) In future all officials failing to prevent anti-foreign outrages within their jurisdiction shall be dismissed and punished. (3) Indemnity shall be paid to states, corporations and individuals. The Tsung IY amen shall be abolished and its functions vested in a foreign minister. Rational intercourse shall be per-mitted with the Emperor, as in civilized countries. (4) The forts at Taku and the other forts on the coast of The forts at Taku and the other forts on the coast of Chili shall be razed, and the importation of arms and war material prohibited. (5) Permanent legation gnards shall be maintained, and also guards of communication between Pekin and the sea. (6) Imperial proclamations shall be posted for two years throughout the Empire, suppressing Boxers. (7) Indemnity is to include compensation for Chinese who suffered through being employed by foreigness, but not compensation for native Christians. by foreigners, but not compensation for native Christians.

(8) China shall erect expiatory monuments in every foreign or international burial ground where graves have been profaned. (9) The Chinese Government shall undertake to enter upon negotiations for such changes in a visiting treaties recording trade and expirations. in existing treaties regarding trade and navigation as the foreign Governments deem advisable, and with reference to other matters having in view the facilitation of commercial relations.

20-Tennessee is swept by the most destructive tornado ever known in the State. More than 50 persons are killed and 100 injured, while the damage to property will reach large figures.

22-Ex-President Kruger lands at Marseilles and is given an enthusiastic welcome.

Death of Sir Arthur Sullivan the composer.

23-The Dewetsdorp garrison, 400 in all, with two reach the place in time, but pursues Steyn and De Wet.

The British Cabinet decides to recommend the Queen to make Major-General Lord Kitchener a Lieutenant-General, so as to enable him to take over the supreme command in South Africa when Lord Roberts shall leave that country

24 - Brakpan is fiercely attacked by the Boers, but the garrison drives them off.

Col. Willcocks, commander of the British troops at Coomassie, Ashanti, cables the British government that

the campaign is ended.

Ex-President Kruger arrives in Paris and is received with wild enthusiasm. President Loubet receives him at the Elysee palace with semi-official ceremonies, such as were accorded to the sovereigns who visited the Exhibition.

In the Danish Parliament a crisis is reached on the Government's scheme of tax reform.

Señor Mendez Capote is elected President of the Cuban Constitutional Convention.

25—Relations between Turkey and the United States threaten to become acute. The Porte persists in refusing to grant an exequatur to the United States Consul at Harpoot.

26-The Italian Chamber of Deputies, in spite of op position from the Minister of War, adopts a socialist motion in favor of the abolition of trials by court-martial.

27-The Herzog commando, 500 strong, holding a good position on a range of kopjes near the village of Luchoff, and completely barring the British advance, is driven back after five hours' fighting, by Col. Settle.

Death of United States Senator Cushman K. Davis.

Chairman of the Committee of Foreign Relations.

29-Lord Roberts hands over the command of the British troops in South Africa to Lord Kitchener, the Queen having approved of Lord Kitchener's promotion to Lieutenant General, with the rank of General while in command in South Africa.

The composite regiment of the Household Cavalry and the Canadian Contingent arrive at Southampton and are

warmly received.

The French Chamber of Deputies unanimously vote a resolution of sympathy with ex-President Kruger, the 559 voters cheering when the result is announced.

30—Lord Kitchener reports a number of encounters, Knox having engaged De Wet's rear guard, Paget having driven Viljoen and Erasmus back to Rietfontein, and Settle having defeated Herzog and occupied Luchoff. The members of the Royal Canadian Regiment just

returned from South Africa are reviewed by the Queen at Windsor.

The French Senate adopts a resolution of sympathy

with Mr. Kruger.

Nominations for the general Provincial elections are held throughout Quebec in 72 constituencies. Over 30 constituencies return Liberal members by acclamation, every member of the Government being elected.

DECEMBER, 1900.

France 3,000 square miles of the disputed territory.
General Porfirio Diaz is inaugurated President of Mexico for the sixth time.

2—The mounted troops are engaged all day northeast of Bethulie with part of General De Wet's forces. The Boers are headed off and retire in a northeasterly direc-

Mr. Kruger abandons his proposed visit to Berlin owing to the receipt of an official intimation that Em-

peror William regrets that, in consequence of previous engagements, he will be unable to receive him.

3—General Delarey, with 500 Boers, attacks a convoy proceeding from Pretoria to Rustenburg, burns half the convoy and kills 15 men. Guns and assistance are sent from Rustenburg and the Boers are driven off.

The returning members of the Royal Canadian Regiment and the composite regiment of the Household Cavalry are inspected by the Prince of Wales.

The final session of the 56th Congress of the United

States of America opens. The President's message touches upon the following: (a) Matters of Foreign Policy—(1) The unsettled Chinese question; (2) the unfavorable trade relations with Germany; (3) the settlement of the Samoan problem; (4) certain questions, satisfactorily settled, arising out of the South African satisfactorily settled, arising out of the South African War, in the matter of neutral cargoes; (5) the modus vivendi in the matter of the still unsettled Alaskan boundary; (6) the ratification of the Hague Treaty by the United States and all the great powers, Japan having been added to the list; (7) The Nicaraguan Canal question; (8) The unsettled claims of the United States against Turkey for injuries suffered by United States efficient in Turkiek dominions. (b) Matter of Devention citizens in Turkish dominions. (b) Matters of Domestic and Imperial Policy—(1) the currency question; (2) the necessity of measures to promote United States shipping and foreign trade; (3) the advisability of early action to remedy evils in connection with trusts; (4) the Philippine question—reporting favorable progress towards pacification and the institution of local government; (5) questions relating to Porto Rico, Cuba and Hawaii; (6) increased military needs—100,000 more required; (7) increased naval needs—new vessels, an increased force and a national naval reserve; (8) necessity for amendment of labor laws; (9) necessity for economy.

5-The Premier of the Netherlands declares against proposing arbitration between Great Britain and the Transvaal.

The visiting Canadian Contingent are received by both Houses of the British Parliament.

The work of the 15th Parliament of the reign of Queen Victoria begins. Fierce personal animosity and bitter invective mark the proceedings. The special session is called to make further provision for the expenses in-curred in South Africa and China.

6-Mr. Kruger arrives at the Hague, where he is warmly received. The States General authorize the President to welcome him in its name.

Federal elections, resulting in Liberal victories in two British Columbia constituencies (Burrard and Yale-Cariboo), complete the House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada.

7—A second supplementary estimate of £16,000,000 brings the total British Army estimate for the year up to £92,399,153.

General Provincial elections in Quebec result in an

overwhelming victory for the Parent Government, the Conservatives winning only 7 out of 74 seats.

Mr. Bond, Premier of Newfoundland, having received permission from Mr. Chamberlain, Colonial Secretary, to enlarge the Cabinet, owing to the importance of the problems connected with the Reid contract, completes the reconstruction of the Ministry.

8-General Kitchener cables that General De Wet has failed in his attempt on Cape Colony, and has trekked northward, abandoning 500 horses and many carts.

Queen Wilhelmina receives Mr. Kruger in audience.

10—The Boers attack Vryheid, but are repulsed with a loss of 100 killed and wounded. The British loss is 6 killed, 19 wounded and 30 missing.

Lord Roberts is given an official reception and a sword of honor at Cape Town.

In the British House of Commons a motion expressing disapproval of the nepotism of Lord Salisbury, and a motion censuring Mr. Chamberlain for owning shares in concerns competing for Government contracts, are lost.

The Imperial Chancellor, Count Von Bülow, replying in the Reichstag to a question on the failure of Mr. Kruger to secure an audience with Emperor William, explains German non-intervention on the grounds (1) that the United States had failed in its offer of mediation, and (2) that intervention might have led to war.

11-The negotiations of the Powers in regard to the joint China note are satisfactorily concluded, all agreeing to the conditions identically as outlined by Count Von Bülow, the Imperial German Chancellor, Novem-ber 19, with the exception of the introductory clause saying the demands are irrevocable, which is eliminated.

In the British House of Commons Mr. Brodrick, the Secretary of State for War, introduces the supplementary estimates of £16,000,000 for the army. The estimates are adopted.

FEBRUARY, 1901.

The remains are removed from Osborne and placed on board the royal yacht Alberta, which conveys them across the Solent to Portsmouth harbor. The coffin is carried out by Highlanders and blue-jackets and placed on a gun-carriage adapted as a funeral car.

2-The body of the late Queen Victoria is taken from Portsmouth to London, borne with solemn and stately pageant to Paddington and thence to Windsor, and, after a service in the historic chapel of St. George, is temporarily placed in the Albert Memorial Chapel. The King, the German Emperor, the Duke of Connaught, the Kings of Portugal and Greece, nearly forty Princes represent-ing every royal house in Europe, and a long array of ambassadors, appear in the procession.

4-The body of the late Queen Victoria is taken from the Albert Memorial Chapel, and, followed by a train of royal, imperial and princely mourners, is interred in the

Royal Mausoleum at Frogmore.

King Edward VII sends a message to his "People beyond the Seas," thanking them for their messages of loyal sympathy and declaring his purpose to work for the welfare and security of the Empire.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie sells out his controlling interest in the stock of the Carnegie Co., thus ensuring peace in the vast steel industry of the United States.

5-The German Emperor on his departure from England receives an ovation from the London populace.

The ministers of the Powers at Pekin decide to demand the death penalty upon all twelve of the Chinese officials named in the list submitted, including, for the purpose of the moral effect upon the Chinese, two who are dead. The sentence on the living must be inflicted, except in the cases of Prince Tuan and Duke Lan, which

the Emperor may commute to banishment to Turkestan.

Death of Mr. B. B. Osler, K.C., one of the foremost lawyers of the Dominion of Canada.

6—The Imperial yacht *Hohenzollern*, with Emperor William on board, sails from Sheerness for Flushing. Full naval honors are accorded the Emperor upon his

severe fighting. The British casualties are 24 killed and 53 wounded

The British occupy Ermelo, a large force of Boers under Louis Botha retiring eastward.

7-Lord Kitchener reports the destruction of Boer supplies and the capture of cattle and horses at Petrus-burg; also the dispersal of a party of Boers and the cap-ture of 12 wagons and cattle at Lillifontein, near Vry-

Wilhelmina, Queen of the Netherlands, is married to Duke Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin.

The Italian Ministry resigns as a result of a condemnation of its internal policy by the Chamber of Deputies. The Dominion Parliament is formally opened by the Governor-General Lord Minto.

The Conservatives of Quebec elect Mr. E. D. Monk, member for Jacques Cartier, as Dominion leader of the Quebec wing of the party.

8-Lord Roberts' detailed mail despatches, ranging from February 6 to November 15, 1900, are gazetted. They make favorable mention of many officers, especially Lord Kitchener, criticize General Buller, and state that no specific blame can be attached to Col. Broadwood for the Sanna's Post affair.

In the Belgian Chamber of Deputies a petition inviting Belgians to offer to arbitrate between Great Britain and the Transvaal is debated at some length.

The Dominion House of Commons passes an address of condolence to King Edward VII upon the death of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria.

9—The Cuban Constitutional Convention repudiate all debts contracted prior to the promulgation of the Constitution, except those contracted on behalf of the Revolution, from and after February 24, 1895. The Convention completes its work, with exception of the matter of the eligibility of General Gomez to the Presidency of the Republic.

10-Death of Congressman A. D. Shaw, formerly U.S. Consul at Toronto.

11—De Wet crosses the Orange River into Cape Colony near Zand Drift and attacks Philipstown, but is repulsed.

The annual meeting of the British Empire League is held at Ottawa. The annual report urges the establishment of an Imperial Consultative Council. A resolution Full naval honors are accorded the Emperor upon his departure.

The British War Office announces that in view of Boer activity in various directions the Government has deided, in addition to the large forces recently equipped locally in South Africa, to reinforce Lord Kitchener by 30,000 mounted troops beyond those already landed in Cape Colony.

Lord Cranborne, Under Secretary for the Foreign Office, virtually admits that Russia has acquired control of Manchuria, but adds that the Russian Government has given verbal assurances that the agreement is tem-

porary and provisional.

The United States Senate Committee on Relations with Cuba agrees to an amendment to the appropriations regarding Cuba, which virtually establishes a protectorate over the island.

26—Kih-Sin and Hsu-Chang-Yu, the two Chinese officials who were turned over by the Japanese to the Board of Punishments, are beheaded at Pekin on the spot where the four members of the Tsung-li-Yamen were put to death during the siege for favoring the foreigners. The powers reject the proposal of Prince George, Commissioner-General of Crete, to annex Crete to

Greece.

The Spanish Cabinet resigns.

27-General Kitchener announces the surrender of 300 Boers to General French, with guns, ammunition,

rifles and a large number of sheep, cattle, wagons, etc.
The Legislative Council of Newfoundland pass the
French shore modus vivendi bill, after spirited speeches by various members, who declare that it is the last time that they will support the measure and that they only do so because of a patriotic desire to assist the Empire during the continuance of the war in South Africa.

28-A despatch from Lord Kitchener to the War Office reports a long interview with General Botha at Middleburg, in which terms of peace were discussed. Lord Kitchener assured General Botha that Great Britain intended to grant representative government as soon as possible, the Dutch and English to have equal rights.

The third supplementary estimate of £3,000,000 for the expenses of the war is issued. This brings the total

Sir Alfred Milner leaves Cape Town to take up his new duties as Governor of the Transvaal and the Orange River Colony.

The Dominion Parliament passes a resolution to peti-tion the King for such a change of the coronation declaration as to eliminate expressions especially offensive to

the religious belief of any British subject.

The members of President McKinley's Cabinet tender their resignations.

2-Over 50 Boers in the Piet Relief district surrender, one a commandant.

A new extradition treaty between the United States and Switzerland is put into force.

The London County Council elections result in an overwhelming Progressive victory.

Death of Dr. George Mercer Dawson, head of the Geo-

logical Survey of Canada.

3 Sir Alfred Milner modifies the terms of peace offered by General Kitchener, declining to grant amnesty to rebels.

The Boers capture Pearston, on the Great Riet river. General Azcarraga declines the task of forming a Spanish ministry. Senor Vilaverde, who was Minister of Finance in the Silvela Cabinet, agrees to undertake the formation of a Cabinet.

4—Lord Kitchener reports several minor successes, including the capture of three guns.

The Hay-Pauncefote Treaty, intended to supersede the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty relating to the construction of

the Isthmian waterways, lapses, the last clause of the treaty allowing only up to March 4 for its ratification.

In the British House of Lords Lord Wolseley attacks the army system in operation since 1895, under which His Majesty's forces are not commanded by a professional soldier, but administrated by a sixtless completely. sional soldier, but administered by a civilian Secretary of State. The system he has honestly tried for five years and found wanting. Lord Lansdowne, in reply, censures Lord Wolseley's administration as Commander-in-Chief. Lord Rosebery concurs in Lord Wolseley's criticism of the system. There is, he says, no other Commander-in-Chief in the world to whom the training and discipline of the army is not entrusted. The present system is an attempt to thrust the Commander-in-Chief into the background and to substitute for him the Secretary of State.

Senor Vilaverde fails to form a Spanish Cabinet. Inauguration of Wm. McKinley as President of the United States. The parade is distinctly military in character. President McKinley's address is a strong defence of the expansion policy of the United States.

A riotous scene occurs in the British House of Commons which ends in the forcible ejection of 12 National-The House had been discussing an educaist members. ist members. The House had been discussing an education vote for some time when Mr. Balfour, the Government leader, amid loud protests from the Opposition, moved the closure. A section of the Irish members refused to file into the division lobbies. The police were summoned and the members forcibly removed.

The 40th anniversary of the emancipation of the serfs in Russia causes a demonstration by students at St.

Petersburg, which is broken up by the police.

A resolution for increasing Canada's guarantee with reference to the Pacific cable, so as to cover the actual cost of the work, passes the Dominion House of Com-

Premier Murray of Nova Scotia makes his budget speech in the House of Assembly, showing that the last fiscal year was the most prosterous in the history of Nova Scotia since Confederation. Total revenue, \$1,014,-123; total expenditure, \$937,261; surplus, \$76,862. President McKinley nominates the members of his

Cabinet as it stood at the completion of his first term.

6-The Boers attack Lichtenburg unsuccessfully. The British casualties are 36.

The fifth Queensland contingent for South Africa sails from Brisbane.

Mr. Chamberlain makes further modifications of the peace proposals of Lord Kitchener, declining, for the Government, to assume any liabilities regarding the debts of the late republics, but offering to set aside a million pounds to repay the inhabitants for goods requisitioned by the republican governments.

A force of 300 Boers occupy Maraisburg, 40 miles

north-east of Cradock, Cape Colony.

Mr. Balfour, the Government leader in the British House of Commons, introduces a motion to amend the standing orders by providing for the suspension for the session of any member who refuses to obey the directions of the Speaker. The new rule is adopted by a vote of 264 to 51.

In the United States Senate Senator Morgan (Dem., Ala.,) urges abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty.

A new Spanish Cabinet is formed under the Premier-

ship of Senor Sagasta.

Hon. Mr. Duffy, Treasurer of the Province of Quebec, delivers the budget speech in the Legislature. Mr. Duffy claims a surplus for the past fiscal year and estimates a reduction of expenditure for the coming fiscal year.

7-Death of R. G. Haliburton, son of Mr. Justice

Hallburton ("Sam Slick"), and one of those who fought for the Confederation of Canada.

8—The Strathcona Horse, the last of the Canadian corps to do service in South Africa, reach Halifax. Secretary Hay and Ambassador Cambon, acting for the United States and France, sign an agreement extending until March 24, 1902, the period allowed for the ratification of the French Reciprocity Treaty.

In the British House of Commons Mr. Brodrick, Secretary of State for War, unfolds a plan of army reform which contemplates: (1) The ability to send abroad 3 army corps with a division of cavalry, in all 120,000 men, and at the same time to have a sufficient force for home defence; (2) the division of the country into 6 districts, each district representing an army corps, and each commanded by an officer certified fit to command troops in time of war, the object of such division being "to centralize the responsibility and decentralize the administration"; (3) strengthening of the artillery by heavier guns, providing the army with a much larger body of mounted men and transport, and improving the musketry drill; (4) adherence to the voluntary system, as compulsion would be "like applying the spur to a willing horse." The net addition to the army under this scheme is estimated at 126,500 men, at a cost of £2,000,000, and 40,000 additional volunteers.

9-The United States Senate confirms the Supplemental Extradition Treaty with Great Britain which has been pending for some time. The treaty adds to the list of crimes for which a man may be extradited from one country to the other the following: (1) Obtaining under false pretences; (2) the destruction or obstruction of railways; (3) the endangering of human life; (4) the procuring of abortions.

social reformer, is placed under the ban of the Orthodox

11-United States Minister Conger leaves Pekin. The British reply to the communication from the State Department of the United States Government, stating the action of the Senate upon the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty, is received at Washington. It contains a formal rejection of the Senate amendments and makes no counter propositions.

In the British House of Commons Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, moves the appointment of a select committee to consider the new Civil List, hinting that an increase might be expected. Mr. John Redmond, the Irish leader, gives notice of a motion to oppose all consideration of the subject until the Government promises to alter the monarch's anti-Catholic declaration. Mr. Balfour announces that it is proposed

to appoint a commission to consider the matter.

In reply to a motion calling for an inquiry into the removal of General Sir H. Colvile from his command at Gibraltar Mr. Bredrick explains that Lord Roberts had blamed General Colvile for his failure to assist General Broadwood after the affair of Sanna's Post, and for his failure to help Col. Spragge at Lindley. Sir Henry Colvile had been reinstated in command at Gibraltar by Lord Wolseley, who had not asked the opinion of Lord Roberts. Mr. Brodrick asks the House to place con-fidence in the Commander-in-Chief and to refrain from public discussions of such cases, as such must militate against the discipline of the army.

Premier Murray introduces in the Nova Scotia Legislature three measures to encourage dairying, horticulture

and stock-raising.

12-The motion calling for inquiry into the circumstances connected with the dismissal of Sir Henry Colvile is negatived by 262 votes against 148.

The naval estimates are presented in the British House of Commons. They provide for 3 battleships, 6 armoured cruisers, 2 third-class cruisers, 10 torpedo boat destroyers, 5 torpedo boats, 2 sloops of war and 5 submarine boats. Estimated cost, £30,875,500. They bring the expenditure for the coming year up to £181,000,000.

An order is sent from Washington to General Chaffee for the evacuation of China by United States troops, leaving only a legation guard of 150 men. The troops are to be removed by the end of April,

Census returns show the population of India to be 294,000,000.

16—General Botha rejects the terms of peace offered him by Lord Kitchener on behalf of the British Govern-

A despatch from Lord Kitchener announces the cap-ture of the notorious Abel Erasmus of Lydenburg.

Nearly 3,000 troops sail from Southampton for South

The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York start from Portsmouth for Australia to be present at the inauguration of the new Commonwealth.

17-Student riots in St. Petersburg originate in a demonstration against the excommunication of Count

Tolstoi. About 700 students are arrested.

18—In the British House of Commons Mr. Arnold-Forster, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, explains the naval proposals of the Government. It is proposed to have 154,575 men available to man the fleet, of whom 118,625 should be on the active list, 28,650 on the Royal naval reserve, and 7,300 on the Royal fleet reserve. The Government would ask £9,000,000 for construction, the largest sum ever appropriated, out of which 30 new vessels were to be started.

In the British House of Commons Mr. Balfour states that the British Government had no knowledge of any decline of British influence in the Yang-te provinces. The British Government did not assent to the claim of Russia for the waters of Blonde and Elliott Islands. The Russian Government had remonstrated against the presence in the waters of Elliott Island of H.M.S. Plover. which was engaged in pursuing pirates. But British ships had a perfect right under the Treaty of Tien'tsin to go there.

In the British House of Commons Mr. William Redmond, Irish Nationalist, gives notice of motion objecting to the assumption by King Edward VII of the title, Defender of the Faith.

Mr. T. Harrington, M.P. is installed as Lord Mayor o Dublin.

19-Three train-wreckers convicted of treason and murder by the military court are executed at De Aar.

90 British marines arrive at Tien'tsin from the Taku forts, to replace the Indian guards on the land in dispute

between Russia and Great Britain. In the British House of Lords Lord Salisbury proposes

Mr. Harcourt introduces a bill respecting the University of Toronto and University College, involving the incorporation of the Board of Trustees, the separation of the Presidency of the University from that of University College, the reconstitution of the University Council and of the Senate, and the maintenance from the consolidated revenues of the province of the departments of chemistry, physics, mineralogy and geology, on the ground that advanced instruction in these subjects is concerned with the problem of the development of the mineral and other resources of the province.

In the British House of Commons Mr. Balfour announces the Government's refusal to permit Messrs. Merriman and Sauer to address the House against the establishment of a crown colony form of government in South Africa.

Replying to a question put by Sir Charles Howard Vincent, suggesting reciprocity towards Canadian products for the preference granted to British goods, the Chancellor of the Exchequer says such is not the inten-

tion of the Government.

29—The Law of Associations Bill, one of the most important measures considered by the French Parliament during the past decade, is passed by the Chamber of Deputies. Its object is to do away with unlicensed monastic societies.

A bill to abolish the Upper Chamber of the Legislature of Nova Scotia is thrown out by that Chamber, in spite of pledges given by nearly every member when appointed. The members urge that such pledges were unconstitutional, being a breach of parliamentary privilege, and therefore not hinding.

30—Lord Kitchener reports to the British Government the capture of 72 Boers in Orange River Colony, and announces that Gen. French has taken 51 prisoners and received the surrender of 93 Boers. Lord Kitchener also reports upon recent wrecking of trains at several

points.

President McKinley announces the promotion of Brigadier-General Lloyd Wheat, who supervised and endorsed the plans for the capture of Aguinaldo, to be a Major-General; also the promotion of Brigadier-Gena Major-General, also the promotion of languager-General of Volunteers Frederick G. Funston, who planned and carried out the capture of the Filipino leader, to be a Brigadier-General in the regular army.

1—Lord Kitchener reports the occupation of Nylstroom by Col. Plumer, the capture of three guns by General French on the Lower Pongola, and the capture of 31 prisoners in the Orange River Colony

Premier Murray of Nova Scotia brings down the esti-mates for the current year. The total revenue estimated is \$1,034,906, with an estimated expenditure of \$1,026,-

The decennial census of the Dominion of Canada is undertaken.

It is announced that Aguinaldo, the captured leader of the Filipinos, has taken the oath of allegiance to the United States.

3—Death of Mr. Richard D'Oyly Carte, the second of the famous triumvirate (Gilbert, D'Oyly Carte, Sullivan) who may be said to have created English comic opera.

4—The report of the committee appointed to consider changes in the British Civil List recommends that the new Civil List be fixed at about £470,000, a net increase of £67,000. Mr. Henry Labouchere is the sole signatory

of the minority report, recommending no increase.

The elections to the Danish Folkething result in an overwhelming defeat of the Government.

After a busy session the Legislature of Nova Scotia is prorogued. Provision has been made for aid in building a new railway from Halifax to Yarmonth, for the establishment of a College of Agriculture and Horticulture, and for municipal bonusing of manufacturing or ship-building industries building industries.

The new White Star steamer Celtic, the largest vessel

ever built, is launched at Belfast.

-Russia publishes an official statement of negotiations conducted by her with China regarding Man-churia. The agreement provided for the gradual evacuation of Manchuria and for the adoption of provisional measures to assure peace in that territory. account of alarmist rumors circulated in the foreign press regarding her intentions she has decided not to press to a conclusion her negotiations with China. The steamer *Ophir*, with the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York on board, arrives at Aden.

8-Lord Kitchener reports the occupation of Peters-

burg by Colonel Plumer. Sixty prisoners, a seven-pounder, 2 locomotives and 39 trucks are taken.

The famous Gainsborough portrait of the Duchess of Devonshire, which was stolen a quarter of a century ago, is brought back to England, having been recovered in Chicago through Scotland Yard and the Pinkertons. The death of Sir George Murray Smith, the well-known English publisher, and founder of "Cornhill Magazine," is announced.

The Italian Mediterranean squadron enters the harbor of Toulon under the command of the Duke of Genoa. The Maritime Prefect greets the Duke.

9-Lord Kitchener reports the surrender of a detachment of 75 men of the Fifth Lancers and Imperial Yeomanry to an attacking force of Boers near Aberdeen.

Supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year amounting to \$3,729,716, of which \$941,276 was a re-vote, are submitted to the Dominion House of Commons.

10-President Loubet receives the Duke of Genoa at Toulon. The President accepts a decoration from the King of Italy.

11—General Kitchener reports the capture of 80 Boer prisoners, including Commandant Bresla, near Dewets-dorp, by Col. Munro, with Bethune's Mounted Infantry. Commissioner Ross of the Yukon takes the oath of office at Dawson.

12-The Ophir, with the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York on board, arrives at Ceylon on its way to Australia.

The Cuban Constitutional Convention declares that it is opposed to United States control of foreign affairs.

-The Ontario Legislature is prorogued.

Bishop Bond of Montreal is elected Metropolitan of Canada, to succeed Archbishop Lewis.

17-A despatch from General Kitchener reports the occupation of Bathfont by Plumer, and of Dullstroom by Douglass' column.

A South African blue book containing recent despatches from Sir Alfred Milner and other official correspondence is issued. Sir Alfred Milner describes the last half year of the war in South Africa as a time of retrogression.

The Right Rev. A. F. I. Ingram is consecrated Bishop of London. During the ceremony Mr. John Kensit, the anti-Ritualist, makes a strong protest against the appointment, accusing Dr. Ingram of encouraging Roman practices in the English Church.

Mexico signs the convention of the Peace Conference.
This leaves China, Luxemburg and Turkey the only
countries which have not signed the peace convention.

18—In the British House of Commons Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, delivers his budget speech. The following are the main features: (1) A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the past year, the receipts amounting to £130,385,000, the expenditure amounting to £183,529,000 (£65,000,000 of the latter being for the war in South Africa and £3,000, 000 for China), a deficit of £53,207,000 resulting. The deed of sale of the Plains of Abraham by the nuns of the Ursuline Convent to the Dominion Government is signed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

author of philosophical works.

Death of Prof. John Fiske of Cambridge, the well-known lecturer and historian, and the last of that remarkable group of literary men which included Emerson,

5-In the British House of Lords Lord Selborne makes a statement on the new naval programme. In reply to criticisms of the Mediterranean fleet he asserts its efficiency. He also asserts the intention of the administration to maintain the old "two Power" standard.

In the British House of Commons Mr. Arnold-Forster makes a statement of the new programme of the Admiralty. The year's programme includes 3 battleships, 6 cruisers and 10 torpedo-boat destroyers. Replying a question regarding colonial contributions towards the cost of the navy (the proposal being made that two of the three new battleships be named the *Dominion* and the *Commonwealth*), he states his view that the colonies ought to contribute voluntarily, compulsion, of course, being out of the question.

In moving the second reading of the Defence Bill in the Australian Federal Parliament Sir John Forrest explains that all males will be liable to military service, but compulsion will only be employed in cases of emergency. The permanent forces will be liable to serve outside the Commonwealth, but the citizen forces will not be liable unless they voluntarily agree.

10-The United States indemnity claim against

Turkey, \$95,000, is paid at last.

The Danish (Conservative) Cabinet resigns.

18-Lord Russell is tried in the British House of Lords on a charge of bigamy (he having secured a divorce in the United States and re-married). He is found guilty, and condemned to three months' imprisonment.

The South Australian Parliament is opened.

19-Major Pinecoffin surprises a Boer commando at Honingspruit, capturing Commandant Hatting, two sons of General Prinsloo and 24 others, and killing and wounding 17.

A bill to amend the King's Declaration is introduced by Lord Salisbury in the British House of Lords.

Lord Rosebery addresses the City Liberal Club. He explains and amplifies his letter of the 16th, which has produced a great sensation, and declares his own inten-tion to maintain his position of isolation, saying, "I must plough my furrow alone." The result is, to quote the London "Times" (editorial), that the Liberal party "is now trisected instead of merely bisected. There are Little Englanders, Liberal Imperialists and Lord Rosebery.

A vigorous discussion takes place in the British House of Commons on a motion of protest against the recognition of Zanzibar slavery. Lord Cranborne, in defence of the Government, urges the unwisdom of proceeding with undue precipitancy and states that a pledge had been given the slave-owners that slavery was not to be interfered with. The motion is lost.

24-The elevation of Viscount Cromer to an earldom is announced.

The Filipino insurgent leader Zurbano, with 29 officers and 518 men, surrenders to the United States troops in Luzon

Rear-Admiral Schley, U.S.N., is granted a court of in-quiry into his conduct in the Hispano-American War. Death of Hon. George W. Allan, member of the Senate of the Dominion of Canada since Confederation, and Chancellor of Trinity University, Toronto. 25—In the British House of Lords a statement on the

situation in Crete is made by the Foreign Secretary. The four protecting Powers decline to accede to the proposals of the Cretan Assembly, looking to a closer union between the island and Greece.

The Finance Bill passes its third reading in the British House of Lords.

Senor Riesco is elected President of the Chilian Republic by a great majority

Free trade between the United States and Porto Rico, and the establishment of civil government in the island, are proclaimed. William H. Hunt succeeds Governor Charles H. Allen.

George Kennan, the United States auther and lecturer, best known for his book on "Siberia and the Exile System," is ordered out of Russia, the notice served upon him characterizing him as untrustworthy politically.

26—General Baden-Powell arrives at Southampton and is received with great enthusiasm.

King Edward presents medals to 3,000 returned yeomanry at the Horse Guards' parade in London. 32 non-commissioned officers and men decline to attend on the ground that their pay is in arrears and that they cannot endure to be decorated while their families are

In the British House of Lords the Premier, Lord

Salisbury, introduces a bill authorizing King Edward to Saisbury, introduces a bin authorizing King Laward to assume by proclamation within six months of the adoption of the bill a new title, which will probably be "Edward the Seventh, by the grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of British Dominions beyond the Sea, King, Defender of the Faith, and Emperor of India."



31—The grant of £100,000 to Lord Roberts is agreed to in the British House of Commons, Mr. Dillon strongly

The British House of Commons adopts the report of a resolution authorizing the expenditure of £2,000,000 on the Pacific cable, Great Britain's share under the agreement with the colonies. A bill founded upon the report is introduced.

Death of M. Szilagyi, the distinguished Hungarian jurisconsult and statesman, well known as an apostle of British constitutionalism in Hungary.

AUGUST, 1901.

1-A despatch from Lord Kitchener reports a letter received by General French from Kruitzinger, the Boer commando, announcing his intention to shoot all natives in British employ, whether armed or unarmed.

The British House of Lords unanimously vote the grant of £100,000 for Lord Roberts.

In the British House of Commons resolutions are carried authorizing the expenditure of £8,157,000 on naval and £6,352,500 on military works.

2-In the British House of Commons Mr. Chamberlain announces that the Government has telegraphed Lord Kitchener to inform the Boer leaders that all persons guilty of shooting natives in British employ shall, if captured, be court-martialled and executed

4-An invasion of Venezuela by Colombians is reported to have been successfully repelled.

5-Lord Kitchener's weekly summary reports 48 Boers killed, 19 wounded, 220 captured, 57 surrendered, with ammunition, wagons, horses, stock, etc.

The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York arrive at Port Louis, Mauritius.

The third reading of the King's Declaration Bill in the House of Lords ends in a practical withdrawal of the measure, though no division is challenged. Lord Salisbury announces that the Roman Catholics do not wish the offensive words of the original declaration withdrawn unless the Government at the same time withdraws the declaration regarding the security of the Protestant succession, and this the Government declines to do. Death of the German Dowager Empress Frederick,

Princess Royal of Great Britain and Ireland.

6-The British Minister at Pekin notifies his colleagues that Great Britain is unable to sign the settlement protocol which the Foreign Ministers had arranged to sign to-day.

A vote of £6,500,000 in aid of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony administration is agreed to in the British House of Commons.

President Schaffer of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Plate Workers issues a strike call to the vice-presidents of the various districts and to the presidents of all the lodges in mills of the United States Steel Corporation.

The British Antarctic Expedition ship Discovery leaves Cowes on a voyage initiated nearly ten years ago-the renewal of research in the so-called and very little known "Antarctic continent." The geological history of this land area, its connections, if any, with South America on the one side and South Australia and New Zealand on the other, the location of the South Magnetic Pole, and meteorological observations are the main directions in which the expedition is expected to add to the sum of human knowledge.

7-In accordance with instructions from the Imperial Government (the Governments of Cape Colony and Natal concurring), Lord Kitchener issues a proclamation threat-ening perpetual banishment to all leaders of armed bands, being burghers of the late republics and still re-sisting His Majesty's forces in South Africa, and all members of the Governments of the late Orange Free State and Transvaal unless they surrender by September 15. The proclamation also states that the cost of the maintenance of the families of all burghers in the fields who have not surrendered by September 15 shall be recoverable from such burghers and shall be a charge

upon their property.

A blockhouse near Brandfort, Orange River Colony, is rushed and captured by the Boers after severe fighting. 8-Lord Kitchener reports the surrender of Com-

mandant de Villiers and two field cornets at Warmbaths. De Villiers was second in command to Beyers.

A party of 50 of French's scouts proceeding to join a column near Bethesda are surrounded in the hills by a Superior force under Theron, and forced to surrender. Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee arrives at Hamburg.

9-A second force of Colombians invade Venezuela. The American Federation of Labor pledges itself to the support of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers in its strike against the United States Steel Corporation.

Death of Prince Henry of Orleans.

10-Lord Milner leaves Southampton on his return to Cape Colony.

11-A great demonstration against the British Government's Maltese policy is held in the island. The chief grievance for the past three years has been the policy of the Government in regard to the Italian language. The tongue of the people is Maltese (based on Arabic), but Italian is the language of the educated and wealthy. The Italian was compulsory in courts of law until 1899, when an order-in-council made English optional and designed to supersede the Italian in fifteen years. Another grievance is the complaint of military rule, as the island is not self-governing, though it has possessed since 1887 a complete civil administration, with elected members of the council vested with large powers, especially as to public expenditure—powers which have been used to bring about a deadlock. To foil "the systematic policy of petty obstruction" Mr. Chamberlain decided to carry out necessary measures by orders-in-council. cision has brought the troubles to a head. This de-

The German steamer Gauss sails from Kiel on an Antarctic expedition. Death of Signor Crispi, the famous Italian statesman.

12-Lord Kitchener sends the largest weekly return he has yet had to report to the War Office: Boers killed 39, wounded 20, prisoners 685 (including F. Wolsarans, late chairman of the First Volksraad), surrendered 85 (including Commandant de Villiers of Waterbeg), smallarms ammunition captured 100 rounds, wagons 254, horses 5,580, cattle 33,000.

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

The formal evacuation of Pekin is completed. The Chinese troops re-enter the city. The Americans and the Japanese simultaneously hand over the Forbidden

City to the Chinese authorities.

The Duke of Cornwall and York reviews nearly 8,000 troops on the Plains of Abraham and presents South African war medals.

The States-General of the Netherlands are reopened; the need of social reforms is emphasized in the Queen's speech.

Funeral services of state are held in Washington over the remains of President McKinley.
