CONSTITUTION.

I.—That the name of this Association be "The Congre-GATIONAL UNION OF CANADA."

II.—That it shall consist of Congregational churches and of ministers of the same church order received at a general meeting, and of those laymen who have been chairmen of the Union and are members of its churches.

- III.—That this Union is founded on the full recognition of the autonomy of the local churches, and therefore it shall not, in relation to them, assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal.
- IV.—That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation: 1. To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination. 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated churches. 3. To establish a fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere. 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated churches, accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary. 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces. 6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general. 7. To receive and administer such funds or other property as may at any time be given or entrusted to it.
- V.—To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated churches being represented by two lay delegates, the meeting to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.
- VI.—That the officers of this Union be a Chairman, General Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Statistical Secretary, and the Superintendents of departments appointed by the Union. That a committee shall also be elected annually who, with the officers, shall be the Executive Committee of the Union. The duties of the Executive shall be as follows: (1) To act as an Advisory Board with the General Secretary; (2) To prepare business for and make reports to the Union; (3) To carry out instructions of the Union; (4) To act for the Union in matters which may arise between sessions.
- VII.—The various kinds of work of the Union may be committed for cultivation and guidance to departments with a Superintendent and committee for each.

VIII.—That alterations may be made in this Constitution at any annual meeting, providing that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting next preceding, or published in at least four issues of *The Canadian Congregationalist* preceding the meeting.

STANDING RULES.

1. Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, should be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union, shall be referred to a standing committee on membership. Churches so applying shall present the written recommendation of three members of the Union. Ministers bearing regular letters of dismissal from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of Canada, and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these grounds. Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) Their membership in a Congregational Church; (2) Their ordination to the ministry; (3) If they have come from any other denomination, their good standing therein; and they shall satisfy the Membership Committee in relation to their literary acquirements, and their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views. (4) Should the Membership Committee be satisfied on these points and recommend the applicant for membership, the recommendation shall be filed with the Recording Secretary, and the application and recommendation shall then lie over until the next annual meeting, when a two-thirds vote of the members present shall be requisite for admission into membership.

[Note.—When a minister retires from the active work of the ministry and follows some other calling by which he makes his living, his name shall be dropped from the roll, unless he makes a request that his name be retained. (See Year Book 1906-7, pages 43-44.) Permission to remain on the roll must be obtained every year; the application to be endorsed by some Congregational Church of which the applicant is a member. (Minutes, Friday, June 12th, 1908.)]

- 2. The Union shall meet annually on the Wednesday after the first Sabbath in June, at 9 a.m., when, if the elected chairman be absent, a chairman pro tem. shall be chosen. After a devotional service, minute secretaries and reporters shall be appointed, the Report of the Executive Committee presented, and the Committees on Business, Membership, Nomination and Finance chosen on nomination by the Executive Committee. At 11 a.m. the Union will rise to give place to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society. The committees appointed by the Union shall meet on the Tuesday previous to the assembling of the Union, at such time and place as may be arranged in conference with the General Secretary.
- 3. On Wednesday afternoon the Union will hold no public session, in order that time may be given to the work of several committees.
- 4. The Chairman's address shall be delivered on Wednesday evening.
- 5. On Thursday morning the Chairman for the next year shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, if required, and the votes shall be counted by scrutineers appointed by the Chairman. If no candidate have a majority of the votes cast, the names of two persons having the highest number shall be reported, and another vote taken. The Union will adjourn at 11 a.m. on Thursday in favor of the Canada Missionary Society.
- 6. The meetings shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend to an hour.
- 7. No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; no member shall speak twice to the same motion without permission from the chair, and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by the chair.
- 8. The members of the Union shall register their attendance with the Recording Secretary in a book kept for this purpose. The Minutes of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of each day's session, and the Minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

- 9. One of the services on the Lord's Day during the meetings of the Union shall be regarded as a session of the Union, at which the Annual Sermon shall be preached, and in connection with it the Lord's Supper shall be celebrated. The attendance of the Union is expected at this service.
- 10. On Monday evening, during the sitting of the Union, a public meeting of the Union shall be held, the programme of which shall be arranged by the Executive Committee.
- 11. Application shall be made by the Statistical Secretary, one month at least before the annual meeting, for statistics of the several churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the annual meeting, and for publication if so ordered.
- 12. A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each church, on or near the Lord's Day prior to the meeting. From this source, the Finance Committee, after providing for other necessary expenses, shall pay in full, if possible, the travelling fares of its ministerial members (providing always that no member of the Union, whether ministerial or lay, attending the meetings, shall receive anything for travelling expenses unless such ministerial member shall have contributed not less than one dollar, and the church represented by the delegate not less than five dollars to its funds); or if unable to pay in full, shall deduct from the claim of each such equal amounts as may be found necessary; such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except with leave of the Union.
- 13. The delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointment by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if they were present at their annual convocations.
- 14. All supplies of pulpits required during the Sunday in which the Union is in session, which are not otherwise provided for, shall be filled by the Nomination Committee in connection with the pastor of the church where the Union is held,

and a copy of such appointment shall be posted on the door of the church where the Union is assembled.

15. In order to facilitate the introduction of properly accredited preachers to churches connected with the Union, which may require pulpit supply, the General Secretary is authorized to send to secretaries or pastors of churches a list of preachers approved by the Executive Committee.

16. The term of office of the Chairman and Recording Secretary shall be the calendar year subsequent to that in which they

were elected.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 8TH, 1910

The sessions of the Union began at 9 a.m., the Rev. James T. Daley, B.A., Chairman, presiding. Devotional services continued for an hour. At 10 o'clock the business of the Union was begun. The following committees were appointed:

Moved by Mr. Henry O'Hara, and seconded by Mr. T. T.

Young, that the report be adopted—Carried.

The following communications were presented:

Application for membership in the Union was made by St. James Park Congregational Church, Winnipeg. Referred to

Membership Committee.

Mr. Frank Saunders, of Middleville, applied for a license to preach, and also to be allowed to follow a course of study in preparation for ordination. Referred to the Executive of the Union.

Rev. W. Cannon, of South Maitland, N.S., applied for membership in the Union. Referred to Membership Committee.

Rev. E. LeRoy Rice applied for membership in the Union. Referred to Membership Committee. A letter was received from the Secretary of the Governor-General of Canada in acknowledgement of a resolution of sympathy and condolence sent from the Executive of the Union at the time of his late Majesty's death.

A letter was received from the Rev. Wm. Hipkin asking that the Rev. W. A. Robins be retained as a member of the

Union.

The following recommendation from the Executive was presented and adopted: "That in view of the appointment of a General Secretary no honorarium should be attached to any other office of the Union."

Rev. J. K. Unsworth reported on behalf of the Jubilee Fund

Committee, and made the following recommendations:

1. In regard to the repayment by the Vancouver First Church of \$3,187.50, we find that \$1,000 of this amount was paid by the Canada Congregational Missionary Society and is repayable to them and should therefore be placed to their credit to be used at their discretion.

In regard to the balance, \$2,187.50 contributed by the Central Jubilee Fund and now repaid by the Vancouver First Church on the sale of the property according to the terms of the Jubilee Fund lien, since this was intended to help the Church in Vancouver and since the First Church Trustees do not ask that it be reinvested in their new property, but promise if this amount is set aside for extension work in Vancouver to recommend to their church to set aside a similar or larger amount for the same purpose, we put on record our appreciation of their generous spirit, and recommend that this amount also be handed over to the Missionary Society to be invested in a new cause or causes in Vancouver upon condition that the Vancouver First Church set aside a similar or larger amount for the same purpose and on the condition that this amount so reinvested be recognized by a lien in favor of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society in the form used for the Jubilee lien, provided however, that this shall not be regarded as a precedent, and that the matter be completed in a reasonable time.

2. That the Treasurer of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society shall have charge of the balance of the Central Jubilee Fund and of such moneys as may from time to time be

placed to the credit of that Fund.

- 3. That in the event of the sale of the Immanuel Church property, Hamilton, and the erection of a new church commending itself to the judgment of the Home Missionary Society, they be instructed as trustees for the Union to allow the replacing of the Jubilee Fund lien for \$600 on the present property by a similar lien coming as second mortgage on the new property.
- 4. That the Committee be continued and consist of Revs. Hugh Pedley, W. T. Gunn, J. W. Pedley, F. J. Day, J. K. Unsworth, and Messrs. Charles Cushing, Charles Gurd, Henry O'Hara and Gordon O'Hara.

It was moved by Mr. Unsworth, and seconded by Henry O'Hara, that the act of incorporation be referred to the Business Committee for consideration of any matter of procedure of the newly incorporated Union.

On the motion of the Rev. J. W. Pedley the Rev. A. F. Pollock was added to the Nomination Committee.

The meeting then adjourned to give place to the annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, JUNE 8TH.

The evening session opened at 8 o'clock, with the Chairman, Rev. J. T. Daley, presiding.

The Scripture was read by Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, and prayer was offered by Rev. S. W. Anthony. Music was furnished by the choir, after which Mayor Field delivered the address of welcome to the Union. The Rev. Hugh Pedley, ex-Chairman, replied to the address.

The Chairman then delivered his address, taking as his theme, "The Growing Christian Experience."

The Rev. J. W. Pedley reported on supplies for Sunday. The meeting was then closed with music and prayer.

MORNING SESSION.

At 9 o'clock, devotional services were conducted by the Rev. W. E. Baker, of Cowansville, and an address on Humanity and Religion was delivered by the Rev. Prof. E. Albert Cook, Ph.D.

At 10 o'clock, the Chairman, Rev. James T. Daley, in the Chair, the minutes of the meetings of the previous day were

read and confirmed.

Rev. A. Margrett reported for the Business Committee that the Rev. E. H. Abraham, of Port Hope, had been invited to address the Union on Friday morning.

The Rev. E. H. Tippett was appointed Chairman of the

Business Committee.

Rev. J. P. Gerrie reported as follows for the Membership. Committee:

1. That the application of the Rev E. H. Peatfield, laid on the table one year ago, in accord with Standing Rule, be received, and his membership enrolled.

2. That the application of the Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, B.A., a graduate of our college, and pastor of the First Church,

Kingston, be received, and his membership recorded.

3. That St. James Park Church, Winnipeg, be received in-

to membership in accord with the application.

It was moved, and seconded, that Mr. George Pim act in the place of the Rev. Frank J. Day, and that Mr. W. Copp be added to the Finance Committee.—Carried.

A letter of greeting from the Rev. G. A. Sanden, of Red Deer, was read by the Recording Secretary and received; a letter from John Dougall & Sons, stating that copies of the Witness were forwarded for free distribution among the members of the Union, and also a letter from the Rev. W. Moulding Baker, now resident in Winnipeg, asking that his membership in the Union be allowed to continue. This last was referred to the Membership Committee.

The Rev. J. K. Unsworth stated that the copies of the Act of Incorporation as laid on the table were not those of the Act as finally passed by the House. He, therefore, moved a reconsideration of the Report of the Executive Committee.

--Carried.

It was moved, and seconded, that the Bill be read before

the Union.—Carried.

The Chairman appointed the Rev. J. P. Gerrie and Mr. Wm. Copp to act as scrutineers during the election of the Chairman for 1911. The ballot vote having been taken the scrutineers announced the election of the Rev. Frank J. Day, M.A., B.D., as chosen on the first ballot. Rev. J. P. Gerrie conducted the newly-elected Chairman to the platform and introduced him to the Union. The Chairman-elect then addressed the Union in a short speech.

Rev. H. G. Rice presented the Statistical report for the year, which, on the recommendation of the Chairman, was

referred to the Business Committee.

The meeting then adjourned.

FRIDAY MORNING, JUNE 10TH, 1910.

Devotional service was held at nine o'clock, conducted by the Rev. J. J. Hutchinson. An address on "Religion and the Church" was given by the Rev. Prof. E. Albert Cook, Ph.D.

At ten o'clock the Chairman of the Union took the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The Business Committee reported as follows:—

1. The order of business for the morning session.

2. That the order of speakers for the evening be reversed.

3. That the Recording Secretary be instructed to acknowledge, with thanks, the receipt of the copies of the *Daily Witness* and *Canadian Pictorial* from John Dougall & Sons, Montreal.

4. That the Secretary be instructed to convey to W. D. Lighthall, Esq., K.C., the very hearty thanks of the Union for his very great assistance in preparing and securing the passage of the Act incorporating the Union, and also to convey to Senator D. Gilmour and Mr. Haggart, K.C., M.P., our very hearty thanks for their assistance in securing the passage of the Act through the Senate and the House of Commons.

5. That a system of Credentials for delegates to the Union

be adopted, and that the Secretary of the Union be instructed

to send to each church forms for that purpose.

That the Secretary provide a register in which each one attending shall inscribe his name, and that from such register and from the credentials he form an official list of delegates and personal members of the Union.

After some discussion on the last paragraph, the report was

adopted as a whole.

The Rev. J. P. Gerrie reported for the Membership Committee, recommending for corresponding membership:

1. Rev. Geo. Watt Smith, of Glasgow, Scotland.

- 2. Rev. E. H. Abraham, of Port Hope, representative of the Presbyterian General Assembly.
- 3. Rev. J. P. McNaughton, of the American Board Mission, Smyrna, Turkey in Asia.
 - 4. Rev. J. W. Sutherland, Brandon, Manitoba.
 - 5. Rev. A. H. Brace, of the Baptist Church, Cobourg.

The report was adopted.

The report of the Temperance Committee was given by the Rev. E. D. Silcox. The following resolution was moved by Rev E. D. Silcox, seconded by George Pim, Esq., and carried un-

animously:

"That the Union has heard with profound gratitude of the phenomenal growth of Temperance reform throughout the Dominion and desires to place on record its heartfelt appreciation of the invaluable services rendered by the Dominion Alliance, the Anti-Alcoholic League of Quebec and all other Temperance organizations in their heroic endeavors to banish the hotel bar by securing the passage of Local Option By-Laws in so many municipalities. We desire to commend to all our churches the work of the Dominion Alliance and urge them to throw in their influence with it and assist it in any way possible in its noble efforts to further prohibition. And we especially ask our people to record their votes in favor of Local Option as being the best avenue open to us in securing eventually Dominion-wide prohibition, that being the goal to which we have steadfastly set our faces. In doing this, we are simply reaffirming the position taken by the Union in years past on this vital problem."

The Rev. E. H. Abraham was introduced to the Union as representing the Presbyterian Assembly. Mr. Abraham conveyed the greetings of the Assembly to the Union.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION.

The following report was presented by the Rev. Dr. Warriner:

Your Committee begs to report that, acting on the instructions received at the last meeting of this Union, it sent to the churches the proposed basis of Union between the Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches of Canada for their consideration with the request that they take a tentative vote, this vote not to be regarded as final, but simply as an aid to discussion, and as testing the attitude of the denomination to the question of Union.

The report was unanimously adopted.

The result of this action is set forth in the printed statements herewith presented, viz., the statement showing in detail the result of the test-vote, both as to churches and members voting, and the Report of the Sub-Committee thereon.

It will be seen from the statements that seventy-eight per cent. of all the votes cast were in favor of Union on the proposed basis. Later returns which have come to hand since the statements were printed, raise the percentage to eighty-two.

In regard to the second question submitted to the churches, viz., "If the proposed basis is not satisfactory what changes do you suggest?" We report that replies came in both from those who voted in favor of union and those who voted against. There are many who would prefer modifications in doctrinal statement or polity, who nevertheless accept the proposed basis rather than

that the Union which is sought should miscarry.

We learn from the printed despatches that the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church now sitting in Halifax has by a majority of 184 to 73 passed a resolution in favor of the proposed basis of Union, and directing that it be transmitted to presbyteries for their judgment. It is practically certain that the Methodist General Conference will, at its next meeting in August, take similar steps to test the feeling of its people.

As to any action which, in view of these facts, might seem to be appropriate on the part of this Union, your Committee is of the opinion that such action has already been anticipated in the testing vote now reported, and which in our judgment is more truly representative of the attitude of our churches than any vote which could at this session be taken by the Union.

We therefore recommend:

- 1. That this Union considers the action it has already taken as sufficient for the present, and will now wait until the other negotiating bodies have had an opportunity of testing to a corresponding degree the feeling of their constituencies.
 - 2. That the Committee on Church Union be continued.
- 3. That this Committee appoint a special Sub-Committee to investigate all the legal and administrative interests involved in the proposed Union, both as to individual Churches and Societies.

(Signed) W. Henry Warriner, Secretary Church Union Committee.

The adoption of the report was moved by the Rev. Hugh

Pedley, and seconded by Mr. Henry O'Hara.

After a discussion in which several members participated, Rev. G. Ellery Read moved as an amendment, "That the report be referred back to the Committee on Church Union for a definite pronouncement upon the proposed Basis of Union." The amendment was seconded by Rev. Horace G. Rice, and on being put to the vote was rejected. The original motion was then put to the Union and passed.

The Rev. G. Watt Smith brought greetings from the Congregational Union of Scotland, and also addressed the Union. The document containing the greetings was referred to the

Business Committee.

The Chairman directed that the Business Committee be asked to prepare a suitable resolution acknowledging the greetings of the Presbyterian Assembly, conveyed by Dr. Abraham.

The Benediction was pronounced by Rev. G. Watt Smith,

and the meeting adjourned.

The Union convened at 8 o'clock, the Rev. J. T. Daley, Chairman, presiding.

After the opening hymn had been sung, the congregation

was led in prayer by the Rev. George Watt Smith.

The duet, "Love Divine All Love Excelling," was sung by Miss Field and Mr. Page. An offering was taken in aid of the funds of the Union, during which the choir rendered the anthem, "Send Out Thy Light." The Rev. E. E. Braithwaite delivered an address on "The Supreme Value of Christian Scholarship," and the Rev. J. P. McNaughton, of the A. B. C. F. M. of Smyrna, Turkey in Asia, spoke on the work of Missions in Turkey.

The Benediction was pronounced by the Rev. J. P.

McNaughton.

SATURDAY MORNING, JUNE 11TH, 1910.

The Union assembled at 9 a.m. Prayer service was conducted by the Rev. J. P. Gerrie, and the Rev. Prof. Cooke gave an address on "The Church and Her Faith."

At 10 o'clock the Chairman, Rev. J. T. Daley, took the

Chair.

The minutes of the meeting of Friday morning were read and confirmed.

The report of the Business Committee was presented by the Rev. E. H. Tippett. The Committee recommended:

1. The order of business for the day.

2. That the Rev. E. LeRoy Rice be substituted for the Rev. B. V. Tippett to conduct the prayer hour on Monday.

3. That the Secretary be instructed to transmit to the Congregational Union of Scotland the reply drawn up by the Committee in response to the letter of greeting conveyed by the Rev. G. Watt Smith to this Union.

The Membership Committee reported through the Rev.

J. P. Gerrie:

1. That we note with satisfaction the cancelling of the proposed withdrawal from the Union of Zion Church, Toronto, and recommend that the papers be fyled.

2. That the name of the Rev. W. Moulding Baker, Winnipeg, be continued on the roll at his own request.

3. That the name of the Rev. W. Robins, of Angus, be

continued on the roll at his own request.

4. That the following evangelists and lay-pastors be endorsed, and their names printed in the Year Book after the list of Ministerial Members:

The report was unanimously adopted.

The report of the Executive of the Union was presented by

the General Secretary, Rev. W. T. Gunn:

That Mr. T. Sanders, now serving as pastor at Middleville, be granted license to preach for one year with permission to celebrate the Sacraments, at the request of the Church.

Also that Mr. Sanders be put under two years course of study. Adopted by the Union under the care of the Executive.

A communication from the Rev. Harold I. Horsey, of Ottawa, regretting his inability to be present at the Union meeting, was read by the Secretary, and ordered to be placed on fyle.

An application for membership from Rev. John Murray was referred to the Membership Committee, as was also an application from the Rev. C. S. Pedley, of Woodstock, now without pastoral charge, to have his name retained on the Union Membership Roll.

A communication from the Publishing Company, asking that its work be taken over by the Committee of the Union, was referred to the Executive Committee, with the request that a report be presented for discussion on Monday morning.

A letter from Judge Leet, of Montreal, referring to the Act of Incorporation, was referred to the Business Committee with instructions to provide for its discussion at a convenient time.

The Rev. Frank J. Day presented the report of the Finance Committee recommending that the expenses of the delegates be

paid, less a cut of \$5.00. Carried.

Mr. T. T. Young moved that the Statistical Report be referred to the Executive of the Union before being read to the Union. This was seconded by Rev. W. W. Smith. The motion

after being discussed was laid on the table.

Moved by the Rev. G. Ellery Read, and seconded by the Rev. J. K. Unsworth, "That the Secretary of the Committee on Church Union be requested to present to the Union in greater detail the suggestions as to modifications of the proposed basis of Union as these have been made by individuals and churches in response to the question (b) contained in the circular issued by the Committee prior to the 'Test Vote' taken this year."

After discussion, the motion was unanimously adopted, and the Business Committee was instructed to arrange a time for the presentation in accordance with the terms of the motion.

Pedley; Messrs. Henry O'Hara, D. O. Wood, T. B. Macaulay, Charles Cushing, Judge Leet, G. H. Wilson, J. F. McEwen, and J. R. Dougall.

The report was adopted.

The greetings of the Cobourg Ministerial Association were conveyed to the Union by the Rev. Dr. Shorey, pastor of the

Methodist Church, Cobourg.

Upon reconsideration of the report of the Nomination Committee, the name of the Rev. G. Ellery Read was substituted for that of the Rev. John Morton on the Committee of Church Union.

The Rev. Frank J. Day presented the report of the year's finances. The time for the presentation of this report was extended ten minutes.

The following resolution was then moved by the Rev. J. K. Unsworth, seconded by Rev. E. H. Tippett, and carried after the time for discussion had been extended another two minutes: That the Executive Committee be requested to prepare, in addition to the "Apportionment Plan," a table showing in compact form the giving of the churches to the five funds, and that copies be furnished to each church, to officers of Associations and to Laymen's Missionary Committee.

The report of the Department of Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies was presented by the Rev. E. H. Tippett and adopted, with its recommendation that the unexpended balance of the \$25 appropriated by the Union last year for the work of the Department be placed to its credit for the ensuing year.

Mr. D. O. Wood, of Toronto, and Mr. Geo. Williams, of Montreal, reported for the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

Moved by the Rev. W. T. Gunn, seconded by the Rev. H. D. Whitmore, that the Laymen's Committee be continued, and that the Nomination Committee be instructed to bring in recommendations for the same. Carried.

The Business Committee recommended that the papers on Church Union vote be brought down by the Secretary of the Church Union Committee on Monday morning for information and discussion.

A change was made in the programme, postponing the General Secretary's report in order to permit the Rev. Horace G. Rice to present the Statistical Secretary's report. This report, having been heard, was adopted.

The Benediction having been pronounced by the Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., the meeting adjourned.

SUNDAY EVENING, JUNE 12TH, 1910.

The meeting was conducted by the Rev. A. F. Pollock, pastor of the Church. The Rev. J. P. Gerrie offered prayer. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. W. E. Gilroy, B.A. The Communion service was conducted by the Rev. A. F. Pollock, assisted by the Rev. H. D. Whitmore and Dr. Warriner, who delivered short addresses. Prayer was offered by Deacons Henry O'Hara and Toms, and the Elements were distributed by Deacons Field, Rosevear, Pim, Copp, Moodie, Williams, Macaulay, McEwen and Waters. A collection was taken in behalf of the Provident Fund Society. The Benediction was pronounced by Mr. Pollock.

MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 13TH, 1910.

The prayer service, at nine o'clock, was conducted by the Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, and an address was given by the Rev. G. Ellery Read.

At ten o'clock the Chairman, the Rev. James T. Daley, took

the chair.

The minutes of the meetings held on Friday evening and Saturday morning were read and confirmed, after slight corrections had been ordered.

A telegram from the Rev. Enoch Barker and a letter from Rev. Daniel Macallum, both in response to telegrams of greeting sent by the Union on Saturday, were read and received.

The General Secretary, Rev. W. T. Gunn, called the attention of the Chair to the notice of motion given by the Rev. Principal Hill, D.D., at the last Union meeting. As Dr. Hill was not present, Mr. Gunn took charge of the motion, by consent of the Union, which was adopted, as printed in the Year Book of 1909-10, page 52.

The motion is as follows:

1. That article seven of the constitution be made article

eight.

2. That a new article numbered seven be added, namely: "The various kinds of work of the Union may be committed for cultivation and guidance to departments with a superintendent and committee for each."

- 3. That article six be amended by the addition of the words, "and the superintendents of departments appointed by the Union," and that a comma take the place of the hyphen separating the office of Secretary-Treasurer, thus creating the office of Treasurer.
- 4. The addition of a standing rule, number 16: "The term of office of the Chairman and Recording Secretary shall be the calendar year subsequent to that in which they were elected."
- Rev. J. K. Unsworth moved that his motion of which he gave notice last year, viz., "That the time for the Union meetings be changed from June to October," be referred to the Executive Committee. The motion was seconded by Dr. Warriner, and adopted.

The Business Committee reported on the order of the busi-

ness for the day. The report was adopted.

The Membership Committee reported:

1. That the Rev. Wm. Cannon, South Maitland, be received into membership by transfer from the Hants County Congregational Union, England.

2. That the application of Rev. John Murray be received, and in accord with standing rule be laid on the table for one

year.

3. That the name of the Rev. C. S. Pedley, Woodstock,

be continued as reported upon the roll.

A communication from the Rev. John Salmon, who announced his withdrawal from the Union, was referred to the Membership Committee.

Rev. W. T. Gunn reported for the information of the Union

on the work of the year.

The report of the Committee on Social and Moral Reform

was presented by the Rev. J. K. Unsworth.

Moved by the Rev. F. J. Day, and seconded by the Rev. J. W. Pedley, that the balance of the amount necessary for the work of the Committee on Social and Moral Reform be provided by the Union.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Day, and seconded by Mr. Unsworth, that the future financial provision for this work be left in the hands of the Executive.—Carried.

Dr. Warriner brought down the papers on Church Union in accordance with the instructions of the motion passed on

Saturday.

It was moved by Rev. G. Ellery Read, and seconded by Mr. G. Pim, that a vote of thanks be tendered to Dr. Warriner for the large amount of exacting and effective work he has done during the past year as Secretary of the Committee on Church Union.—Carried.

Rev. H. G. Rice moved that further discussion of the report on Church Union be postponed until 2.30.

The meeting then adjourned.

MONDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 13th, 1910.

The Union assembled at 2.40.

The minutes of the Sunday evening meeting and of the

Monday morning meeting were read and confirmed.

The report of the Union Executive on the communication sent by the Publishing Company was read by the General Secretary, Rev. W. T. Gunn, as follows: "That the Union regard with favor the offer of the Publishing Company to transfer its work to the Union, but advise that the matter be postponed till next year in order that the Executive may fully consider the matter and prepare plans for the reception by the Union of not only the Publishing Company, but the other departments of our denominational work."—Carried.

Rev. E. H. Tippett, for the Business Committee, reported on the order of the business for the afternoon. Report adopted.

Rev. J. P. Gerrie, for the Membership Committee, reported: "That the name of the Rev. John Salmon, Toronto, be dropped from the roll in accord with the request, and that the Secretary write to Mr. Salmon reciprocating his kindly greetings.

"That the revision of membership roll be referred to the Executive Committee to report next year." Report adopted.

Moved by the Rev. J. K. Unsworth, and seconded by the Rev. T. W. Gunn: That the Jubilee Central Fund as far as regards the claims of the churches upon it be hereby regarded as closed.

Also that the money now in hand in the Jubilee Central Fund and such as shall hereafter come into the Canada Congregational Missionary Society as trustees of this fund for the Union from churches which have ceased to exist be hereafter placed at the disposal of the Missionary Society as trustees for the Union to be used by them as a special extension fund,

the amounts so used to be secured by a lien similar to the Jubilee Fund lien.—Carried.

The Rev. J. K. Unsworth read the Act of Incorporation in its final form, and moved that the Act of Incorporation as read be substituted for that read in the report of the Executive Committee which was presented last Wednesday.

This was seconded by Dr. Warriner and carried.

A communication re the Act of Incorporation, addressed to the Union from Judge Leet, was read by the Rev. F. J. Day. It was moved by Mr. Day, and seconded by the Rev. H. D. Whitmore, That the Secretary acknowledge the receipt, and that the letter be referred to the Executive Committee in connection with matters already arising.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. T. T. Young, seconded by Rev. W. W. Smith, that the Statistical Report after being prepared by the Secretary be submitted to the Executive of the Union before

being presented to the Union.—Carried.

Moved by the Rev. J. W. Pedley, that the Committee appointed last year for co-operation with other churches be reappointed with power to add to their number. This was

seconded by Rev. J. K. Unsworth and carried.

Moved by Rev. W. T. Gunn, and seconded by Dr. Warriner, That the Constitution and By-laws of the Congregational Union of Canada existing prior to incorporation, with such amendments as have been made by the Act of Incorporation and by the Union at its present session, be and are hereby adopted as the Constitution and By-laws of this Union.—Carried.

Moved by the Rev. Hugh Pedley, seconded by Rev. J. P. Gerrie: That the Congregational Union of Canada heartily endorses the efforts of the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada toward the suppression of race-track gambling, of obscene literature and the "white slave" traffic, and we would urge upon the Dominion Government the strengthening of all legislation bearing upon these much needed reforms.—Carried.

The minutes of the afternoon proceedings were confirmed

and the meeting adjourned.

MONDAY EVENING, JUNE 13TH, 1910.

The meeting opened at 8 o'clock, the Rev. James T. Daley, Chairman, presiding. After the singing of the opening hymn, the Rev. E. H. Tippett, Superintendent of the Young People's Department, took charge of the proceedings. After a brief invocation by Mr. Tippett, the Scriptures were read by Rev. M. H. Sanderson, and prayer was offered by Mr. R. W. Carr. The hymn "Forward Be Our Watchword" was then sung after which Rev. E. H. Tippett introduced the Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, B.A., B.D., who gave an address on "The Call to Christian Citizenship."

Rev. J. T. Daley then resumed charge of the meeting.

The closing address of the Union was given by the Rev. J. W. Pedley.

In concluding the business of the Union, the Secretary presented an application from Rev. P. C. L. Harris to have his name retained on the roll of the Union, which was granted in accord with standing rule.

The following resolutions were then presented by the Rev.

E. H. Tippett, and unanimously passed:

1. That we congratulate our Chairman upon the able manner in which he has presided over our meetings, and that we express to him our thanks for the earnest and thoughtful address which he delivered.

2. That we tender our thanks to the Rev. W. E. Gilroy for his helpful sermon; to the choir for their assistance in the

evening services, and to the press for reports.

3. That we tender our thanks to the Rev. Professor Cook for his inspiring morning addresses, and request him to give them or such parts of them as can be arranged for for publication in the Canadian Congregationalist.

4. That we are grateful to the members, of the various churches of the town who have so kindly welcomed us to their homes and to all who have assisted in making our meetings so

successful and our visit so delightful.

5. That we deeply appreciate the splendid arrangements made by the Cobourg and Cold Springs Churches for our entertainment. The Committee has been wonderfully thoughtful in providing for us; the ladies have bountifully attended to our

physical needs, and the refreshing excursion on the lake was

thoroughly enjoyed.

6. The Congregational Union, of Canada, assembled at Cobourg, very cordially acknowledges the able greetings presented by Rev. E. H. Abraham, of Port Hope, on behalf of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, and heartily reciprocates the fraternal spirit of the address which we were privileged to hear. We rejoice that our two bodies have so much in common in thought and life, and would wish for our sister denomination very great success in her great testimony and service in the Kingdom of God.

7. That we extend our hearty thanks to the Minister of Militia for his courtesy in permitting to the Union the use of the Armoury; and to the local authorities for their interest in

securing this privilege for us.

8. That the Union place on record its sense of the deep loss sustained by the Congregational Churches of Canada in the death of Rev. Wm. McIntosh, of the First Church, Ottawa. During the years of his ministry, our late brother gave himself loyally to the work of our churches, first in the Eastern Townships of Quebec, then in the Maritime Provinces and later in the Capital City of the Dominion. At all times his great and generous heart prompted him to give whatever service he felt to be of value to the cause he loved so well, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific he left behind him many warm friends, both individuals and churches whom he had helped. To his church in Ottawa, and to the members of his family, we extend our warmest sympathy and pray that the Great Head of the Church send us many men of the type of William McIntosh.

A poem appreciative of the hospitality extended to the Union, written by Rev. Wm. W. Smith, was read by the author.

The Chairman presented the thanks contained in the foregoing resolutions to Rev. A. F. Pollock, who responded in behalf of the Churches of Cobourg and Cold Springs.

The minutes of the evening were taken as read.

After the singing of the hymn "Soldiers of Christ Arise," the meeting adjourned, and the Benediction was pronounced by the Rev. James T. Daley, Chairman.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE OF THE CONGREGA-TIONAL UNION OF CANADA FOR THE YEAR 1909-1910.

Your Executive would beg to report as follows:

During the year two general and eight sectional meetings of the Executive have been held. At these meetings the general denominational problems have been considered and also the problems of local churches and individual pastors. At every meeting the pastorless churches or those in any special difficulty have been carefully planned for, and this has resulted in a better co-operation and deeper sense of fellowship as well as having been of value in each case.

At the beginning of the year it was thought well, in view of the important matters brought up at the last Union which were to come before the churches last winter, that we should issue a pastoral letter from your Executive to the churches. This letter was accordingly drafted, approved by the Executive, and in the name of the Chairman for 1909 sent to the churches

Concerning the matters of business entrusted to us, the Act of Incorporation, the Apportionment Plan, and the completion of the Model Association Constitution, we would report as follows:

to be read at a Sunday service.

THE ACT OF INCORPORATION OF THE UNION.

The draft Act of Incorporation presented to the Union last year was again carefully considered by a small committee of the Executive, submitted to the Executive, and with a few verbal amendments was passed in the Senate and House of Commons, and is now become law as follows:

BILL AS FINALLY ASSENTED TO, MARCH, 1910.

The Senate of Canada.

BILL F.

An Act to incorporate The Congregational Union of Canada.

Whereas the voluntary association known as "The Congregational Union of Canada" has by its petition represented

that it is the General Assembly of the representatives of the Congregational Denomination of the Dominion of Canada, and is desirous of being incorporated; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition: Therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

1. The members of the voluntary association mentioned in the preamble, together with all persons who hereafter become members of the corporation hereby created, are hereby incorporated under the name of "The Congregational Union of

Canada," hereinafter called "the Union."

2. The objects of the Union shall be—

- (a) To promote, throughout Canada and elsewhere, evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational Denomination.
- (b) To cultivate co-operation in everything relating to the interests of that denomination.
- (c) To establish, throughout Canada and elsewhere, correspondence with the churches of that denomination and with similar bodies within and outside Canada.
- (d) To obtain accurate statistical information concerning religious matters, especially those concerning the Congregational denomination.
- (e) To hold consultations and meetings on all matters of and connected with the cause of religion.
- (f) To receive, invest and administer such property, real or personal, as may at any time be lawfully given or entrusted to the Union.
- 3. The head office of the Union shall be at the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, but may be changed by the Union from time to time to any other place in Canada; and branch offices may be established and meetings of the Union and of the Executive Committee and other Committees or Boards may be held wherever in Canada the Executive Committee or the other Committees or Boards may from time to time determine.
 - 4. The Union shall have power, for the objects aforesaid:—
- (a) To acquire by purchase, lease, deed or trust, or otherwise take, receive and hold grants, devises, bequests and gifts of real and personal property, for any estate or interest therein, either

absolutely or in trust; and to use, sell and dispose thereof; and to invest, change, and reinvest, and to apply the proceeds and revenue of such property for the purposes for which the Union is incorporated by this Act: Provided, however, that the annual value of the real property held by or in trust for the Union shall not at any time exceed the sum of one hundred thousand dollars in any one province of Canada, and shall not exceed in the whole five hundred thousand dollars: and Provided that the Union shall, within ten years after the acquisition of any real property, or of any estate or interest therein, sell or otherwise dispose of so much thereof as is not required for the use, occupation or other like purposes of the Union; Provided, also, that the exercise of the powers above mentioned shall be subject to the laws respecting the acquisition and holding of real property by religious corporations in force at the time in the province of Canada in which such real estate is situate, so far as such laws apply to the Union;

(b) to borrow money for the purposes of the Union upon the property of the Union, and to grant all ordinary and neces-

sary securities and mortgages for its loans;

(c) to establish a constitution and by-laws, and to alter them from time to time;

(d) to appoint and revoke all agents, officers and trustees it

may deem proper;

(e) to receive into the Union, or to affiliate, or to amalgamate with, all such associations having religious or charitable objects as it deems proper, and to provide for the administration of their business and property, and all such associations are hereby empowered to become united, affiliated or amalgamated with the Union.

(f) to establish and contribute to such missions, churches, branches, offices, colleges, schools, agencies, societies, publica-

tions, and other institutions as it may deem advisable.

5. The affairs of the Union shall be managed by a general board called the Executive Committee, elected as the Union may determine from time to time; and all committees and officers of the existing voluntary associations shall remain in office until they shall be replaced under the provisions of this Act.

6. The Union shall recognize the complete autonomy of the local churches, and shall have no power to assume in relation to them any legislative or administrative authority whatever, or to become a Court of Appeal except at the request of a church or churches.

For the preparation of this Act and kindly service in securing its passage, we are very much indebted to Mr. W. D. Lighthall, Esq., M.P., to its sponsors, the Honorable D. Gilmour, in the Senate, and Mr. A. Haggart, K.C., M.P., in the House of Commons, and your Executive recommend that the Union send a very hearty vote of thanks and appreciation to these gentlemen.

The Union is, therefore, now incorporated and ready to receive donations, legacies or such funds as may be entrusted to it, and we would suggest that this should be kept in mind in order that the Union, with its necessary and important duties, should be ranked with the other channels of denominational generosity.

In regard to the Model Association Constitution adopted by us last year and requiring articles dealing with the matter of ordination for its completion, your Executive would recommend:

That the following, as adopted after a great deal of consideration and discussion by the Congregational Association of Quebec, be adopted by the Union and printed in the Year Book as part of the Model Association Constitution, and also that it be adopted by the Union as governing the action of the Union in this matter in districts not organized into Associations.

Adopted April 15 and October 14, 1908, and October 19, 1909.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE CONGREGATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF QUEBEC.

NAME.

This Association shall be called the Congregational Association of Quebec.

BOUNDS.

The bounds of the Association shall be the Province of Quebec, and such districts adjoining as shall be included by vote of the Association.

PURPOSE.

The purpose of the Association shall be to promote evangelical religion, to cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated churches.

DUTIES.

The duties of the Association in carrying out this purpose are:

1. To give aid by information, advice, inquiry or other method on request of the ministers and churches concerned in

(a) A change of pastorate.

(b) The organization, consolidation or abandonment of fields.

(c) Any difficulty in any congregation.

2. Where requested, to examine and certify regarding

(a) The qualifications of ministers wishing to work within its bounds or desired by the churches.

(b) Candidates for the ministry.

(c) To act as the Council of Fellowship for the ordination and installation of men for the pastorate.

- 3. To give to a man a certificate of approbation to preach, and to have pastoral oversight of a church, for a period of time not exceeding one year, but which may be renewed. This ministry may include the administration of the Sacraments. No church should accept the ministry of any man who has not received such a certificate from the Association.
- 4. To preserve the records of the credentials of ministers within its bounds, recognizing as such all who furnish satisfactory evidence of regular ordination; whose moral character is above reproach; who are making the work of the ministry their main occupation; and those who have retired through

inability to serve the churches as pastors, and with the consent of the Association.

- 5. To exercise advisory oversight of the churches within its bounds.
- 6. To develop and guide the united activities of the churches, and to co-operate with the Denominational Societies, accepting an apportionment of money needed from the churches for the national schemes and aiding in its collection.
- 7. To apportion to each church its proportion of the necessary expenditure involved in carrying out the work of the Association.
- 8. As far as possible to prevent the alienation of property held by Congregational Churches, Societies, and Institutions.

MEETINGS.

The Association shall hold meetings for conference about the condition of the churches and methods of work; for deepening the spiritual and intellectual life; for the expansion of its missionary and educational activities.

Two regular meetings shall be held each year: the annual meeting for the election of officers and the standing committees on Tuesday and Wednesday of the third week in October, and the semi-annual at the time of the College closing.

Delegates or personal members from five churches shall constitute a quorum for business.

Inasmuch as the work of the Association requires that every church be represented at the meetings, the churches are expected to meet the travelling expenses of their own pastors and delegates.

The voting membership of these meetings shall consist of:—

- 1. One delegate from each church, or two provided they represent different sexes.
 - 2. Personal members described under Membership.
- 3. The Advisory Committee described under Executive Work.

ORGANIZATION.

1. Membership—The Association shall consist of:

(a) Congregational churches within its bounds and recog-

nized by it.

- (b) Personal members, viz.: ordained ministers who are pastors of its churches; professors in the Congregational College; ministers who are employed by any national or local Congregational Society in Canada; those who have retired from active service and are retained in personal membership by consent of the Association; ministers who are received by consent of the Association; those persons who, though not ordained, have acted as pastors of charges with promise of Ordination for not less than one year with consent of the Association.
- 2. Officers—The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator and a Scribe, who shall also be Treasurer. These shall be elected annually.

3. Executive Work—The Association shall appoint standing committees to investigate and to effect its work, viz.:—

(a) An Advisory Committee which shall seek to know the condition of all the churches within its bounds and to secure the visitation of every church each year; which shall be ready to aid any church that so requests in accordance with the purpose and method of the Association; which shall be the Examining Committee for candidates for ordination; which shall be in active communication with a central advisory board in the National Union; and which shall prepare programmes for the meetings, in conjunction with a representative of the entertaining church.

This Advisory Committee shall consist of the Moderator and Scribe, ex-officio, and of three others representing different sections. The three elective members shall hold office three years, one retiring each year. They shall be chosen from a list of names presented by a committee of three appointed by the Moderator. At the first election six names shall be presented, and afterwards, when only one is chosen, three names shall be presented. Such members need not be delegates and are per-

sonal members during their term of office.

- (b) Such other committees for special lines of work as the Association may from time to time appoint.
- (c) A representative on the Executive Committee of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, who shall at each meeting report the work of that Society to the Association.

Ordination.

1. Ordinary—

As a general rule Ordination shall only be given after the candidate has had the usual Seminary training, and shall be conducted in harmony with Section 2 (Duties).

2. Special—

(a) In the case of men of mature years and special gifts who may be desired by the churches to assume the pastoral oversight, and who have not been able to take an adequate course of preparation in any recognized College or Seminary, the Advisory Committee shall act as a Committee of Examination, and when satisfied as to their intellectual, moral and spiritual fitness, shall grant an interim license to preach which shall hold good until the next meeting of the Association. The Association may then renew the license, each time for a period of one year.

(b) Such men looking to Ordination must undertake a course of study extending over two years. Such study shall be under the direction of the Advisory Committee, who shall also set the examination. Should this not be wholly satisfactory the time may, on vote of the Association, be extended.

(c) During this period the candidate for Ordination shall be regarded as under probation. He shall have power, at the request of the church, to administer the Sacraments and preside at the ordinary church meetings, but the church should ask some ministerial member of the Association, preferably one of the Advisory Committee, to act as pastor for legal purposes, keep the church register, officiate at weddings and generally act as the special counsellor and friend of the church.

(d) The following shall be the course of study, except as it may be revised from time to time by the Advisory Committee:—

In explanation of these figures it should be said that the apportionment is made from estimates prepared by the Executive of our Colonial Missionary Society. Nor do they include gifts for Church Extension, nor the Home Mission Funds of the United Brethren Association, which are still under their own control. In 1908.9 the apportionment to each local church was made in the Central and Eastern Ontario and Quebec Districts only, and in these a number of churches which have adopted the weekly offering for missionary various funds and presented at a joint meeting. It should also be remembered that these figures do not include income from investments, legacies, special personal gifts, nor the contributions of the Woman's Board, except in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, funds will show better results after the completion of their first year under this system.

preparation for opening a second station, in the Provident Fund by a desire to increase the grants to our retired ministers. In the The need for large increase in our giving is caused in Home Missions by new work in the West and East, in Foreign Missions by Union Fund, a better administration, the support of the office of General Secretary and our increased co-operative work demand that this fund be ranked higher than in the past and placed with our other larger funds.

The various apportionments have been made with due consideration of the financial ability and past training of the various churches, as well as their membership.

The Secretaries of the various Associations were duly notified of the apportionment, and the matter was presented at the Association meetings. In the Quebec and Toronto Associations, the apportionment to the local churches was carefully made out in detail for each fund. In the Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick a lump sum only was assigned to each church, and owing to the fact that they take up collections for their Union a misunderstanding arose owing to their having never before been asked for any contribution to the Dominion Union, and most of their churches took up the "Union" apportionment on the understanding that this was for the expenses of their local Union. In the Western Association the matter was left to the Association representative of each special fund, and in this way fell through, and the churches did not have any regular and complete denominational Budget presented to them. This will be remedied in the coming year.

The churches in districts not organized received their local apportionment as last year from the General Secretary of the Union

In order that the matter may be dealt with by the Union itself before the close of the meeting, your Executive have endeavored to procure the necessary figures and estimates for the year 1910-11, and would present the following as the draft of apportionment for the year 1910-11.

It will be noticed that the Home Missionary contributions from the churches have increased over \$1,000.00, an increase in every association but the Toronto district. In foreign missions there is a decrease of about \$100.00, but every association shows a slight decrease except the North-Western Provinces; in the College and Provident Fund a decrease of \$452.00 and \$114.00 respectively, shared in each case by all the associations.

Part of this may be due to the adoption in so many churches of the duplex envelope and weekly giving. This will adjust itself another year. In part it may be due to an idea in some of the churches that this weekly offering does not need the attention to each cause given on the old special collection days.

It will be noticed also that the apportionment is with one exception the same as last year, this still allowing margin for fresh effort in every case. In the Union Fund the salary and expenses of the General Secretary were borne by Mr. S. H. C. Miner up till the end of October, four months of the year. This year the whole year's expenses come upon the fund, the estimate for which is therefore increased.

We present to you also the programme of the Union duly prepared and including as usual the various societies and corporations meeting with us.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

THE GROWING CHRISTIAN EXPERIENCE.

By REV. JAMES T. DALEY, B.A.

Chairman's Address at the Union.

In the last analysis, and to go down to the very root of the Christian religion, to be a Christian is not to acquire a notion of God, or even an abstract doctrine of His parental love; it is to live over within ourselves the inner spiritual life of Christ, and by the union of our hearts with His to feel in ourselves the presence of a Father, and the reality of our filial relation to Him, just as Christ felt in Himself the Father's presence and his filial relation to Him.

If by this is meant a full understanding and reproduction of the inner spiritual experiences of Christ we must say with Paul, "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended." But if living our life under the inspiration of Jesus and in the power He imparts be the meaning, the number is increasing of those who would add, "Reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

This growing Christian experience includes a growing experience of God. Not a notion of God, but an experience of God. Our relations cease to be speculative, formal or legal, they become vital, spiritual, filial. In Him we live and move and have our being. "He is the personal spirit perfectly good who in holy love creates, sustains and orders all," and He is

our Father.

It includes a vision of the great purpose of God, the kingdom proclaimed by Christ, whose end is righteousness in the individual and in the race. A kingdom of men made in the image of God, perfect as He is perfect. Toward this end the whole world is progressing under the leadership of the Holy Spirit. "History is the process of the Spirit realizing Himself in human life and institutions" not apart from men but through men and in partnership with them, not by special intervention but by continuous co-operation. We are working out our own salvation, and at the same time God is working in us both to will and to do of His good pleasure. This is what I mean by the growing Christian experience.

I remark in the first place this growing Christian experience

is the permanent element in the history of the Church.

"The Church," says Dr. Adams Brown, "is the divinely appointed means by which the kingdom of God is to be realized among men." With all its imperfections the Church is manifesting itself as such a means. Through it the majority of Christians have found God. Through it as a means of fellowship their courage is being perpetually confirmed and their faith strengthened. It has been the means of Christian service, the dispenser of charities, the promoter of education, the leader in all the great and uplifting movements of the centuries.

But the Church was first a product of the experience, then a means to promote it. It has its origin in Jesus Christ. He laid its foundation when He called the twelve to be with Him. He gave them no form of organization. He gave them life. In the inspiration of that life they went forth to tell others the good news of life through Jesus Christ. The few became a multitude bound together by the ties of a common love to one Lord and Master. Organization was inevitable. Life clothes itself with organic form. These men, filled with eagerness for Christian service, felt the need of greater efficiency. That efficiency they sought in organization. Deacons were appointed and the Apostles set free for the work of teaching.

From this simple beginning has grown the multiform

Church of the twentieth century.

Concerning the four great theories held in regard to the Church—Papal, Episcopal, Presbyterial and Congregational—we can say with Dr. Ross: "These theories did not take their origin in ambition, priestcraft and corruption. No, not one of them. Their primary causes lie deeper, in things more honorable alike to human nature and the grace of God. Ambition, priestcraft, and corruption may have been the rich soil nurturing wrong conceptions of the nature of the Christian Church; but the seed and the root of the gigantic out-growths which have divided Christendom were something better than human depravity." Indeed, we see not only in the origin but in the development and maintenance of these various Churches the efforts of conscientious men to express in organic forms principles most loyally held.

That errors should have arisen in the early days of the Church is not surprising. They still occur. The men of that day were human like ourselves. But, if human, they were Christian. Who can doubt it? It was the heroic age of the

Church. What cruel persecutions they endured!

What splendid testimony to spiritual power! What allegiance to Christ at cost of imprisonment, torture and death! Forced in part by these persecutions into providing for mutual defence and support the Church came gradually to recognize, as Ramsay puts it, that "as it was a world-wide institution, it must organize a world-wide system of administration." And in so doing these men believed they were following divine guidance.

The missionary spirit of that age is another evidence of the vigor of its Christian life. "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel" was the command of the Master. ready obedience they went forth, and with wonderful results. Ritschl traces "the origin of the old Catholic Church, with its complex of hierarchical and sacerdotal institutions, to the blunting of Paul's ideas, arising from the incapacity of the Gentile mind to enter into the depths of his experience, to think his great thoughts and share his wide spiritual outlook." very success imperilled the Church idea by making authority easy, if not indeed necessary. With the conversion of the Emperor, the persecuted Church became the Church of power temporal power. The subsequent ingathering of heathen multitudes with their heathen customs into the Church corrupted it, and ecclesiastical Rome aspired to an empire greater than had been under political Rome. Slowly but surely the Church became conformed to the Roman world in its methods and policy, in its worship and work, until the organization, with its definite and fixed ceremonies and creeds, its visible constitution, and specific bounds, came to be regarded as the great work of Christ. Uniformity and conformity were enforced by inquisition, sword and stake.

So it came to pass that organization, begun as a means to

express life, came to be used as a means to suppress life.

Was the Church still Christian? The Reformation is the answer. There is perhaps no event in history which has been represented in so great a variety of ways as the Reformation. It has been called a revolt of laity against clergy, of Teuton

against Italian, of Kings against Popes, the protest of indignant men against a corrupt and despotic Church. It was far more than these. It was the assertion of the principle of individuality, of the soul's rights and privileges in Christ, of its responsibility to God and possibilities of service to men. In

other words, the assertion of true spiritual freedom.

We must think of the Reformation as a revelation of the presence and working power of the Holy Spirit within the Church. The Holy Spirit who in its darkest period was never absent from the Church. We affirm the continuous presence and power of the Holy Spirit. We must reject any doctrine of Providence "which implies that things go their own way for the most part, and that God now and then intervenes." For even while ecclesiastics were framing constitutions and perfecting machinery the Holy Spirit was working in the hearts of men.

He was the spirit of revolt, stirring up the common people, manifesting Himself in the unsettling of the Church as well as in its establishment. He was the spirit of devotion. Church's power lay not in its organization, not in its control of thrones, but in its witness for Jesus. Humble souls were finding in Him the way, the truth and the life. "Art thou brother Francis of Assisi?" said a peasant to the saint in that dark age of the Church. "Yes." "Try then to be as all think thee to be, because many have great faith in thee, and therefore I admonish thee to be nothing less than people hope of thee." This was not only a tribute to the Christian character saint, it was evidence of the hunger of the common people for that which makes true saintliness. And he was the spirit of enlightenment. From him Wycliffe, Zwingli, Luther and others caught their inspiration. He was their guide into the truth that makes men free. And further, the Reformation is an object lesson to the Church for all the years to come. This is the lesson. Life is primary, form is secondary. The inward and spiritual is of greater importance than the external and concrete. Whenever the Church reversed the order the Reformation was repeated. Indeed the Reformation is less an event in history than a process in history.

The lesson has been needed. The Reformers failed to complete their work. "National Churches become to the several Protestant countries of Europe that which the Catholic Church

had been to the world at large." Uniformity and conformity were still insisted upon. In the protest against such Protestantism our Congregational fathers have had a glorious part. At the call of the spirit they girded themselves for the struggle. Freedom was their watchword. Freedom is their great contribution to the Church of the future. But let us not make the mistake of thinking that freedom is all that is to be considered, or that freedom means any particular form of organization, even the Congregational. The divine life will not be stereotyped. Life is primary, form secondary. Life is permanent, form changes,—" No existing Church order is final, no existing form of Church life does full justice to the spiritual man." From the extreme of individualism and independency into which our fathers went there has been a reaction. Against the "Granular Church theory of the old Independency," as Dr. Forsyth calls it, there has already been protest. So long as life is inoperative there is bound to be change. As Congregationalists we need not be timid about change. Rather let us fear lest insisting on any particular form of organization we be found trying to suppress life.

What we want first of all is the life of the Spirit within us. What is wanted by way of organization is the form best adapted to the needs of the present age in expressing that life. The day is surely gone for contending that the form of the Church must be that adopted by the Christians of the apostolic age. Their purpose of organization rather than their plan of organization should be ours: Efficiency in the expression of spiritual life. Organization is a means to an end; we should strive to see that it is the best means possible. In this we must be guided not by what has been good in former years or in other lands, but by what in our land and in our time will best secure the growing

Christian experience.

Passing now from this thought of organization, I notice in the second place that on the intellectual side this Christian experience has been expressed in various creedal statements. "Religion is life, a spiritual experience in which the affections and the will are active and the whole man involved." "Theology is the intellectual presentation of the subject matter of religion." The one is the fact of experience, the other the theory concerning the fact. Speculation concerning these

things that have to do with our human life is both inevitable and desirable. Out of speculation have come the creeds and systems of doctrine of the Christian Church. It is the fashion of the day to decry these. In the reaction from the scholastic forms in which Christian doctrines have been presented men have gone to another extreme. The age prides itself on being practical. It wants practical sermons. "Away with doctrine, let us have Christianity in its living form."

But life cannot be divorced from doctrine. So long as men have Christian experience there must be the attempt to explain it. The unity of the mind is one of the things emphasized by modern psychology. Intellectual feeling and will are never separated. "The intellectual unfolding of a great experience like religion is a necessity of the mind," writes Dr. Clarke.

The experience interpreted becomes of greater value to us. Our religious beliefs are often weak because we do not know with precision what they are, nor with clearness why they are. It is not lost time spent in making the discovery. For practical ends we should do so. Our persistence in Christian activity must in the long run depend on the quality of our belief. Definition gives clearness, conviction means strength.

The Puritans were not perfect men. They certainly were great men. "Take them for all in all, neither the world nor the Church has seen such men elsewhere in modern times," writes one historian. Macaulay adds, "they were the most remarkable body of men perhaps which the world has produced."

Without doubt much of their strength of character, much of their wealth of achievement, is due to the fact that they were men of conviction. They were men with a creed. They put their beliefs into definite statement in part for the spiritual edification of themselves and their children, and in part to declare to the world the reason of the hope that was in them. Freedom of belief does not mean vagueness of belief. The free man has cast off external authority and has committed himself to the guidance of the Spirit of Truth. Revelation is made by mental processes. The free man must do his own thinking.

This being true, certain features regarding creeds become apparent. In the first place, our creeds must be our own. They must be the expression of a real experience, a personal experience. Other men's creeds may serve as stimulants to thought;

they must never become substitutes for thought. We show ourselves worthy sons of the Puritans, not by subscribing to their creeds, but by taking our stand by their side as free investigators of truth. The mere acceptance of dogmas is in itself neither religion nor morality. The outcome of such a course is disastrous. "There has never been a lower morality, a more absolute dissoluteness and lack of all fibre of character, than in times and places where every article of the creed has been accepted without question. The brigands of Italy and Spain are orthodox Catholics."

Closely akin to this is a second feature of a creed. It must be held individually—that is, it must not be imposed on others. A faith that is forced fails to be a faith. There is great temptation for the orthodox to insist upon his views. Here our Protestant fathers failed. "The principles which had led them to sever themselves from the Roman Church," says Bryce, "should have taught them to bear with the opinions of others, and warned them from the attempt to connect agreement in doctrine with forms of civil government."

Those free men were illogical. They made their statements of faith standards of faith. Definition gives clearness, not always correctness. Conviction gives strength, not always sweetness. The death of Servetus was a victory for orthodoxy in the days of Calvin. It serves as an example of the misuse of a

creed by the severely orthodox.

Again, creeds must be held as temporary. They register the results of experience. They are never more than reports of progress. Having been stated, they become points of departure. Dogma is necessary, because it is the expression of life. It is

necessarily unstable, because the life is ever changing.

Creeds are but means to an end. The great objective of religion is love to God and love to man. Through the discipline of experience men are coming to learn that Christians are more than a brotherhood of believers, they are a brotherhood of lovers; that the heretic is not he who fails to pronounce the shibboleths of the creeds so much as he who fails in love to his brother man; that it is absurd for men in whom the spirit of love is manifest to excommunicate one another. "Master, we saw one casting out devils in Thy name and we forbade him, because he followeth not with us," was the report of the disciples. "Forbid

him not, for he that is not against us is on our part," was the Master's reply.

The Church has been divided by the misuse of creeds, but in the growing Christian experience men are finding their way to a closer union in that better fellowship of love.

In the third place, in the growing Christian experience the Bible has been an important factor. Of that there is no question.

"The Bible will ever be the book of power, the marvellous book, the book above all others. It will ever be the light of the mind and the bread of the soul. If there is anything certain it is that the destinies of the Bible are linked with the destinies of holiness on earth." To this utterance of a modern higher critic we all say "Amen."

Just now the Protestant world is disturbed by questions concerning the Bible. For three centuries the theory of verbal inspiration of the Scriptures was accepted with practically no dissent. The theory as set forth by one of the Reformers makes the writers passive agents of the Holy Ghost. "Amanuenses of God, hands of Christ, and secretaries and notaries of the Holy Ghost, since they neither spoke nor wrote by their will, but actuated, led, impelled, inspired and guided by the Holy Ghost." The inference was that such a book was exempt from error of any kind. Its statements, whether related to religion, science or history, were to be received as the authoritative word of God without possibility of error.

Thus the Reformers gave to the Bible the place of authority they had denied to the Church. In the present movement we see the Reformation reproduced under different conditions, but for the same end—the spiritual advancement of men. As in the former Reformation the value of the Church was not lessened but increased, so in this reformation the value of the Bible will not be decreased but enhanced, when men realize that the Spirit who spake through holy men in former days has not grown dumb, but still speaks His message of authority to the human heart

The theory of verbal inspiration claims for the Bible what it nowhere claims for itself. It moreover lends itself to uses for which the Bible is in no way responsible. There arose a dis-

position to predicate a kind of magical virtue in the Bible.

came to be kissed in the courtroom as the sacred thing which The theologian regarded it as a comalone could evoke truth. plete and final transcript of God's law and purpose. As such it becomes a store-house of arguments. Proof texts were selected without discrimination from the several books, little attention being paid to the context or the nature of the writing. By them almost any kind of preconceived theory or dogma could be established. The man who refused to believe the earth is round because the Bible speaks of "the four corners of the earth" was using the Scriptures only as countless others do who take these messages of life—poetry, oratory, passionate utterance alike and use them as one would the proofs in a proposition in Moreover, the theory places the value of the Bible on a false and insecure foundation. It makes it depend on a theory concerning it instead of upon the contents of the Scriptures. The words of Dr. Blake are doubtless true: "It is very certain that very many of those who have the firmest belief in the inspiration and authority of all the books contained in that wonderful library of Jewish and early Christian writings which we call the Bible have never seriously examined the grounds of their belief. They are sure that the books are inspired, but apart from their own experience of the spiritual force of the book they can produce no reasons for believing in their inspiration; their belief, as far as it is anything more than an inheritance from the traditions of the Christian Church, is an inference from experience."

The Scriptures are indeed inspired. Not in that mechanical way, but in ways in full harmony with the religious nature of man. The method is natural. By this is not meant that the experience is acquired apart from God. He is constantly working in us, both to will and to do of His good pleasure. All the powers and faculties of mind by which we respond are His gifts to us. He has endowed us with a nature capable of spiritual communion with Him. He does no violence to this nature. He does not stultify it by use of other means. In the words of Professor Browne, "It is not against the laws of the mind but through them that God realizes His purposes in us. This is an absolute condition of our mental and moral sanity. If we are to lead a moral and rational life of any sort, there must be an order of life on which we can depend. If religion is not to be an

excuse for indolence, we must work out our own salvation. It is indeed God who worketh in us, but He works according to law.

and in such a way as to call for all our effort."

It is in keeping with the method of Jesus in the training of Their knowledge was not forced. His revelation of Himself was by degrees. Much was left to their own discovery. At the end of His ministry He had to say, "I have yet many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear them now." The divine power to impart was limited by the human capacity to receive. Such is the Spirit's method. He guides men unto truth. They enter in to possess it. It becomes part of them their Christian experience.

The experience preceded the literature. Out of it the writings sprang. Holy men wrote as they were moved by the Holy Spirit, not as amanuenses, mechanically reporting abstract truth, but as men vitally concerned in that which they wrote; men who "faced duty, grappled with temptation, knew the guilt of wrong-doing, and reached out if haply they might find Him who would bring deliverance." Nor did they reach in vain. Conceptions of God, worship, duty and human relationships

were enlarged and improved.

The Bible grew with this growing experience. The marks of the growth are in it. There, too, are the marks of the human personalities through whom the Spirit spake. As the spring water bursting forth into the sunlight after its long journey through underground passages bears in it traces of the elements of earth through which it passed, so does this spiritual stream bear evidence of human channels through which it came. human touch makes the Bible not less but more interesting to us. God's greatest word to men was in the life of a man. made flesh. God's greatest messages to us continue to be through human lives by their personal contact or through their honest testimony. And in this especially lies the value of the New Testament; it brings us into touch, not with law, not with external authority, it brings us into touch with life. Through it we come into communion with the saints, and we find them men of like passions with ourselves, but men who in the struggle of life have come face to face with the redeeming personality of Christ, and have found victory. Through their testimony we, too, are brought into that divine presence, and in their victory we share.

"Treated as a book throbbing thus with personal life—as a book of honest testimony of experience broad and deep, in the moral and spiritual life—and approached through a true historical method, I have no doubt," says Dr. King, "that the Bible will ever be the book of power, the marvellous book, the book above all others. It will ever be the light of the mind and the bread of the soul. Neither the superstitions of some, nor the irreligious negations of others, have been able to do it harm. If there is anything certain in the world, it is that the destinies of the Bible are linked with the destinies of holiness on earth."

To his students, in danger of being bewildered in the maze of textual criticism, Biblical exegesis and Biblical theology, Dr. Briggs gives this word of counsel: "No one could exalt these departments, each and all of them, more highly than we are disposed to do, but notwithstanding it must be said that if all these studies could be accomplished in a most scholarly manner, the chief thing, the one supreme thing, might still remain unaccomplished—namely, the study of the Bible as a means of grace." Not too much study, but too little study, of the Bible is the danger to be feared.

"Hold the Book close, and aim at mastering it," writes Dr. Horton. "Learn its contents, understand its spirit. Knit it to your life, and shape your life by it. More and more it will convince you that if dogmas about it are extravagant, they err, not in magnifying it unduly, but in magnifying it in a mistaken

way."

This same devout scholar opens his heart to us in these words: "I want to take down to my grave a Bible that is marked with my tears and my love, and my prayers, a Book which I have cherished in my heart, by which I have guided my conduct through the slippery ways of men and up the arduous heights of heaven, the Book of man, that is also the Book of God, the Book that we learned to love as little children, the Book we learned to reverence in old age."

When in that spirit we come to the Bible, we are conscious of forces generating in us love, purity, self-sacrifice and trust. We find ourselves in the way of the richest spiritual experiences.

Nor are they those of the pious mystic only. The culture of the soul, the attainment of the inner spiritual life of Christ, will certainly include a relationship with God the most satisfying. But it will also include a great love and a great longing for mankind such as led the Christ out in service and sacrifice to save the world.

Missionary zeal will characterize it. The appeal of a needy world will not fall on deaf ears or cold hearts. It will beget "a holy desire to join with God and with Christ in the best of work."


To join with God—not to undertake something God has neglected through absence or lack of interest. The missionary will not be surprised nor dismayed by evidences of a work of grace prior to his advent. All men the world around are the children of "Our Father." There are no orphans. In all hearts the Spirit of Truth has been at work. "Not from the Hebrew race alone, but from all races, God has called forth great souls who have received His messages for their contemporaries and all after time. We utter their names with reverence, and acknowledge the important contributions that have been made to the religious history of the race by Confucius, Buddha, Zoroaster, Plato and other prophetic souls, who have reared themselves like soaring Alps above their fellows, catching and reflecting the light of the Eternal."

The growing Christian will find in all this not an excuse for leaving "the heathen" alone. He will, on the other hand, find in it a strong ground for faith in the success of his enterprise on behalf of men, his brethren, the children of his Father. The contributions made by Moses, Isaiah, Jeremiah and other prophetic souls are of a higher order than those that have been

named.

These the Christian has; but he has more—the life, the more abundant life through Christ is his, and in the possession of it is the obligation to go out in the spirit of the Master to impart it to others. And in that response to the need of the world he enters more fully into the inner spiritual life of Christ.

Nor will it be the extension of the kingdom only that will receive attention: into every part of human life the Christian experience must penetrate. All the many relations in which men stand with their fellow-men will be affected. Salvation acquires a new, a fuller, meaning. It is no longer regarded from the individualistic standpoint, it is no longer mere deliverance from future penalty. To be complete it must include both the individual and all those with whom he is bound by ties of human relationship. A redeemed society—the perfection of atonement—all men in harmony with God, therefore with one another. One body, fitly framed and knit together, through that which every joint supplieth, grown up in all things into Him who is the head, even Christ. In that will be the perfect Christian experience.

ANNUAL REPORT OF STATISTICAL SECRETARY.

PRESENTED AT COBOURG, JUNE 9TH, 1910.

In presenting this report we desire to convey our gratitude to the Secretaries of the Associations in Quebec and Ontario for the material assistance in the collection of reports from the churches which has been given this year. The possibility in this direction is illustrated by the good work of the Secretary in the Toronto District Association, who forwarded to your Statistical Secretary, before May 1st, practically full returns from the churches in that Association. We, however, regret that in the process of transition from the old to the new plan of collecting statistics some confusion has existed, which has given difficulty to some of the church secretaries and pastors in other Associa-Especially in the churches of the Western Provinces has this confusion been manifest. The collecting of full statistics from these far-away fields has been in the past an impossible task for the Secretary of this Union. When this task was undertaken by the enthusiastic Secretary of the Winnipeg Central Church, and later handed over to the Superintendent of the Winnipeg Extension Society, we expected to be in a position to present to this Union, for the first time, a complete report of the work in the fifteen or more fields of labor which we now have in the Western Provinces. Our disappointment was, therefore, great when we received on May 31st the budget of returns, containing only partial returns from three of these fields. immediately wrote to all the others, but the time has been too limited to receive replies from all for this report. We presume there has been misunderstanding somewhere, but not hearing from Mr. Weeks in relation to the matter, do not know where the trouble has been. A few reports, however, have come to hand during the last two days from the Western churches, which makes our returns for these churches about the same as in previous years. Owing to an apparent misunderstanding somewhere, we ask the Union to grant us the privilege of including in the tables which are published in the Year Book any returns which may later come to hand, and to correct accordingly before publication the summaries included in this report.

As the Associations take up the statistical work in connec-

tion with the churches within their bounds and make it an important feature of their reports at the spring meetings, the confusions which have existed this year will, we believe, be eliminated, and the presenting of statistics become of greater value to our churches.

As the supply of blank forms and schedules on hand prepared for the Union of Ontario and Quebec was sufficient for the present year, no attempt was made by your Secretary to rearrange the list of churches according to Associations. The supply of printed forms being now, however, exhausted, we recommend that the churches of this Union be grouped according to Associations; that those churches of Eastern Ontario not at present in any Association be placed either with the Toronto District Association or with Quebec, as this Union may determine; that during the present session a Statistical Committee, consisting of the statistical officers of the Associations, together with the Statistical Secretary of this Union, be appointed to consider the possibility of drafting and adopting uniform blanks and schedules for all the Associations, as well as a uniform time for collecting and tabulating reports in each. That the findings of this committee be presented before the close of this annual meeting.

We express sincere thanks to the many secretaries and pastors who have sent prompt and full reports of the work in their respective churches, and would earnestly urge the few who are still negligent in this respect to emulate their example. We would also point out the great inconvenience caused by the meagre reports which are sent by some, even of our well equipped and organized churches.

Sometimes the sober tasks of your Statistical Secretary are, however, brightened by rays of humor, which gleam from even

the meagre reports which come to his hands.

In conclusion, I desire to express my gratitude for the honor which the Union has conferred upon me by electing me to this office during the last three years. Any service which I have been able to render our denomination and the kingdom of Christ has been a pleasure to myself. Other duties, however, now make it necessary for me, with the completion of this year's work, to pass on the labor and honor of this office to some other. To my successor I extend congratulations and good wishes.

THE WORLD'S CONGREGATIONALISM.

By Mr. John Minshull.

This year the total of churches, chapels, and stations—which include head stations and out-stations of both the London Missionary Society and the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions—is largely in excess of previous years, owing to the inclusion of the out-stations of both societies.

A comparison of figures with last year in regard to membership shows an increase of 12,858, but a decrease of Sunday-school scholars of 4,387. The most noticeable increase in church membership is in the American churches, whilst there is a decrease in Great Britain, Australasia, and Canada.

No available statistics are obtainable of the number of "Free" Congregational churches which are to be found on the Continent of Europe, nor do they include figures relating to the McAll Mission in France, or to the Evangelical Continental Society. It is known that in other parts of the Continent, such as Sweden, there are important "Free" Congregational churches in Stockholm, Göteborg, and other large centres comprised in a Union, with a roll of something like 100,000 members. There has been a notable increase in the number of Church members in the "Free" churches in Austria-Hungary and Spain, those under the direction of the American Board.


THE DEATH OF KING EDWARD VII.

No event of the past year was more important in the history of the British Empire than was that of the death of our Sovereign, King Edward, which took place on May 7th, 1910. It came suddenly, and for a while the Empire seemed paralyzed and could not take in the situation. When the lamentable fact was recognized, there was genuine sorrow in all hearts, and emblems of national mourning were everywhere in evidence. Bells tolled out their mournful dirges, flags floated at half-mast, and when the funeral took place, on the 20th of the month, services were not only held in the churches, at which tens of thousands attended, but monster outdoor services were held, notably in Toronto, where the largest gathering ever seen in the city took place in Queen's Park, in front of the Parliament Buildings, where it was estimated that not less than 120,000 were present, of all classes, creeds, and races.

King Edward's reign extended over only nine years, but those were years of wondrous blessing to the Empire, for during this time our King had shown such tact and wisdom in bringing about happy relationships among the nations that he received,

justly, the title of "Edward the Peacemaker."

His reign throughout was characterized by sound wisdom and impartial judgment in matters of international interest, and his last words were absolutely true: "I think I have done my duty." When he ascended the throne he proclaimed his purpose to follow in the footsteps of his illustrous mother, good Queen Victoria of blessed memory, and we can truly say that he kept his promise. His loyal subjects trusted him implicitly, and their confidence was not betrayed. We are grateful to God not only for the services which he rendered the Empire, but the world. No Sovereign was ever more deeply lamented, and his name will be handed down to future generations as the King who did the people lasting good. But we no sooner say "The King is dead!" than we also say "Long live the King!" for Prince George of Wales, son of Edward VII., has been duly proclaimed King as George V. It is rather soon to speak of his regime, for it has only begun, but already both he and his consort, Queen Mary, have ingratiated themselves in the minds of British subjects in every part of the Empire, and in no place more so than in the Dominion of Canada. May God bless them both, as also the Queen-Mother, whom we so dearly love

CONSTITUTION.

I.-NAME.

This Corporation shall be called The Canada Congrega-TIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the heathen and other unenlightened people.

III.--MEMBERSHIP.

The members of this Society shall be persons subscribing \$2 annually, ministers of all contributing churches, one other representative from each church contributing \$10 annually, and two representatives from each church contributing \$50, or over, annually, and each year the delegates appointed from any church to the Congregational Union of Canada shall be delegates to this Society, provided that church be entitled to be so represented. Every benefactor making a donation of \$40 at one time shall be a life member.

IV. OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Society.

V.-MEETINGS.

An annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the Thursday following the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles.

VI. -- AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution can be amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed alteration having been given in two successive members of the *Canadian Independent*.*

BY-LAWS.

I .- FUNDS.

All funds arising from donations, legacies, subscriptions, or otherwise, shall be lodged by the Treasurer, as soon as collected, with some chartered bank, to be named by the Executive Committee. Money can be drawn from such accounts only by cheques, signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, but the President or Vice-President may sign for either in their absence.

II.—MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twenty-five members of the Society, including the officers, and shall be elected at the annual meeting, who shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society. Immediately after their election they shall appoint an Executive Committee, and such other committees as they shall deem expedient for the interests of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of that Board, and shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendents of Departments, and not more than twelve other members, together with two members of the Woman's Board, the same to be appointed by that Board, and who are members of this Society.

III. --- MEETINGS.

The Board of Directors shall meet at least once during the year, immediately before the annual meeting of the Society, at the call of the Secretary, to prepare reports, and a list of officers and committees to be nominated at the annual meeting, as well as to transact any other business connected with the interests of the Society.

IV .- PRESENTATION TO CHURCHES.

The work of the Society shall be presented and a Foreign Missionary sermon preached in each of the churches of the constituency at least once in each year. The Executive Committee shall see that news from the Society's work is distributed to the churches.

V.—DONATIONS FOR SPECIAL WORK.

When money is donated for missionary work outside the Society's missions, it may be forwarded to societies working in that field.

VI.—AMENDMENT.

These By-laws may be altered in the same manner as the Constitution.

FORM OF BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, incorporated by Act of the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, A.D. 1889, the sum of out of my estate, to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, without charge or deduction whatever, and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer and Secretary for the time of the Society shall constitute and be sufficient discharge of said legacy.

Wood, "That we approve the recommendation of the Executive Committee and instruct that an account be opened by the Treasurer, to be known as 'The Furlough Fund,' and that amounts be passed from the general fund, from time to time, equal to not less than one-third of the total salaries paid to the missionaries, in addition to any amounts received specially designated for this purpose."—Carried.

Moved by R. G. Watt, seconded by Geo. Williams, "That the matter of the transfer of the work of the Society to the jurisdiction of the Congregational Union of Canada be referred to the Executive Committee, with instructions to confer with the Executive Committee of the Union, and present at the next Annual meeting a draft of procedure for said transfer."

—Carried.

Moved by Chas. Duff, seconded by D. O. Wood, "That \$1,000.00 of the balance on hand be passed, as of the year now closed, to the Credit of the 'Furlough Fund,' as a commencement or nucleus of this fund."—Carried.

Moved by Chas. Duff, seconded by Wm. Copp, "That we refer to the Executive Committee the matter of how much this Society shall pay towards the expense of the Laymen's Committee for the year just closed, the Executive being hereby empowered to contribute such amount as they may consider best."—Carried.

Moved by Rev. E. C. Woodley, seconded by Rev. H. D. Whitmore, "That in view of the approaching visit of the Rev. R. Wardlaw Thompson, D.D., Foreign Secretary of the L. M. S., to Canada we extend to him a most cordial invitation to visit a number of our churches in the general interest of the world-wide missionary enterprise."—Carried.

The officers and Board of Directors were then elected for

the ensuing year.

Moved by Dr. Warriner, seconded by Geo. Williams, "That this Corporation, in annual meeting assembled, sends its greeting to our Medical Missionaries in Chisamba, Dr. and Mrs. Cammack, and assure them of our hearty appreciation of

the great value of their work and of our fellowship with them in prayer for God's continued blessing upon their labors."—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Warriner, seconded by George Williams, "That this Corporation, in Annual Meeting assembled, hears with deep concern that Dr. Currie has sent in his resignation to the Annual Meeting of the West Central African Mission. We would assure him of the warm place which he and his wife have in our hearts; our thankfulness to God for the great work which He has accomplished through them in Africa, and our earnest hope that it may be possible for him to reconsider his resignation."—Carried.

Moved by Rev. G. E. Read, seconded by Chas. Duff, "That this Corporation grant \$100 to the Publishing Society."—

Carried.

THE 29TH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE C. C. F. M. S.

In presenting this, the twenty-ninth Annual Report of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, your Executive would express the feeling of gratitude to God for the continuance of His blessing upon the efforts of our missionaries and the manifest increase of interest amongst the home churches.

We present first the work abroad and secondly the work at home.

1. Educational and Evangelistic Department.

Schools. Dr. Currie writes: The term began earlier than usual at the Station, and was continued throughout most of the Christmas holidays, to pave the way for the ladies (the Misses Melville) to leave for home in March. Since their departure the adult schools have been continued by Mrs. Currie, assisted by a band of native teachers.

At the outstations the pupils have had the benefit of the longer term, while the fine supply of school material sent out by the home churches, together with the tables and other conveniences made at the station, have enabled a larger number of pupils to be accommodated and better work to be done.

One of last year's schools was closed, owing to decline of population: one, closed last year, was re-opened, with much improved prospects. Two *new* ones were opened, in new districts, and kindergartens were started in three outstations."

At present the schools are:-

This shows a gain of 238 over last year.

Of the adult pupils, just noted, there are 591 boys and 476 girls.

Sunday School. This school under the superintendence of Mrs. Currie, with a native to conduct opening and closing exercises also increases in growth. The attendance for the

last two months has not gone below the 700 mark, the highest being 775.

Congregations. The average attendance on the services has again increased. It has been no unusual thing to have 800 at one service at Chisamba and 700 at Chiyunka.

Temple. Services have been held in the new Temple since last July, and already it begins to be too small for the accommodation of those attending. The new organ sent by the Woman's Board of Canada is no small help to the meetings, in aiding the heartiness of the singing, and with a choir of boys and men adds greatly to the attractiveness of the services.

The members of the church have not only preserved a satisfactory demeanor, coupled with active work for the salvation of those in their own neighborhood, but those who have been absent on trading expeditions have preached Christ in the caravans with which they were connected, and in the countries to which they went.

Workers. During the year there have been at work upon the field 6 missionaries, 3 evangelists and 61 teachers and assistants.

Conferences.

Two Conferences, with representatives from all of the Stations of the A. B. C. F. M. and English Mission, were held during the year.

The Woman's Conference in July, 1909, was well attended

and proved to be highly profitable.

The Men's Conference, held early in March, 1910, was also most successful. There were 120 delegates in attendance, called together for the definite purpose of the deepening of the spiritual life and the consideration of practical problems in connection with the work.

Judging from the programme, the time was most profitably spent.

A foreword reads thus: "All men are advised to spend, in the early morning, a time alone with God, in prayer and

meditation on the topic for the day."

The morning sessions were given to the presentation of such subjects as "God the Creator," "Prayer is Proper and Helpful," "Sin—All guilty—Separates from God—Wages of "— "To resist sin—Christian's duty—Help of Christ overcoming," "Christlikeness," and "Oneness with, or Abiding in Christ."

The afternoon sessions were given up to the definite search-

ing of the Scriptures, on the topics of the morning.

Judging from all the information to hand we feel that the Educational and Evangelistic Department of our work is in a

most prosperous and hopeful condition.

The Industrial Department. Dr. Currie's report says: This has been, from necessity, to some extent, neglected. I could not be absent and at the same time superintend the work in the shops. However, native foremen were placed in charge, with full directions covering each period of my absence, and under their superintendence remarkably good results were achieved. This is all the more encouraging as the foremen were only young men trained in the department.

The work done was confined to the requirements of our houses and stations. Thus a great advance was made in the outfitting of schools, repairing and building, etc. The ground plans for two new schools have already been marked out, and work on them has begun, so that next year they are expected to replace two smaller school buildings which have served their purpose, but no longer meet the needs of the work. They will each be built by the people in their neighborhood, while the Industrial Department supplies them with doors and windows from a fund provided for the purpose by the friends at home.

The whole department is moving steadily forward, but the necessity of a thoroughly qualified Industrial Missionary who could relieve Dr. Currie of this responsibility seems to be growing daily more imperative and your Executive is putting forth every effort to secure the right man upon whom we might lay the responsibility of a call to this work.

The Medical Department. The report covering the last six months of 1909, as furnished by Dr. Cammack, says:—

During the last six months we have given at the dispensary about 7,500 treatments, which does not include medicines sent to the villages or with caravans on journeys. We have performed one major and a large number of minor operations.

The dispensary building and five cottages have been rethatched. A large amount of work has been done on the stream by the boys who have come from the outstations for training as teachers, but it is too early to see what the results will be on the health of the station.

Our actual number of patients was less than last year, but the number of serious medical and surgical cases was much larger. The falling off of the others was quite largely due to our requiring pay from all who can afford it—and to our discouraging the constant attendance of "chronic" cases, who took medicines for imaginary ills.

I do not believe our requiring pay really keeps many away who need treatment, as it is well understood that no one is turned away who needs treatment because they have no pay, and the amount of pay asked—

8 CENTS FOR TEN TREATMENTS

is so small that almost all can afford it.

It does discourage those who seemed to think it a sin to visit the station and leave without a "drink" of medicine, and some "to rub on," whether they were sick or not; and I believe it has a very decided influence in encouraging the people to hustle for themselves and not expect the missionaries to hand out everything free of cost. Were it not for our white practice we would have to charge the natives much higher prices to make our work self-supporting.

We have had a noticeably larger number of cases from the districts where the new schools are located.

There has been no serious illness among the missionaries, but there have been many times when some of them did not feel fit for their best work for days or weeks at a time—a record that is not likely to improve until we get the surroundings of the station in a more sanitary condition.

The Work at Home.

Your Executive Committee has met three times since the last Annual Meeting for the transaction of such matters of business as properly fall to the lot of such a committee.

Trust Deed. Acting upon instructions received at the last Annual Meeting in relation to securing the best possible title to our property in West Central Africa, in accordance with the laws of the country (which laws enact that property cannot be held by a religious society) we had Dr. Currie legally authorized to hold the property (in trust) for us.

Delegates to Edinburgh. The appointment of delegates to the Edinburgh Missionary Conference, referred to your Executive, resulted in the naming of Revs. Dr. Hill and J. L. Alexander. Secondary meeting—Rev. R. K. Black and Mr. Pierce, Mr. V. E. Ashdown and Mr. H. O'Hara.

Missionary Institute. During the fall and winter several exploring tours have been made by Dr. Currie and one by Mr. Neipp, of the A. B. C. F. M., at Ochileso, with a view of finding openings for extension work and more particularly a location for the proposed Training Institute. The full report of these efforts has not yet come to hand. The report will be prepared by a committee composed of Messrs. Currie, Woodside and Sanders.

The plans for the Institute were endorsed by the whole West Central African Mission at their Annual Meeting, July, 1909.

Under these plans the Institute will be contributory to the work of all the stations of the American Board and possibly of the English Mission. There evangelists and teachers will be trained; teaching in nursing and elementary medicine, instruc-

tion in various industries, will be given. From this the general average of effective work, it is expected, will be greatly raised. A large staff of workers will be required, including a minister, a doctor, a teacher or two, one or two skilled mechanics and a farmer. The new plans for the Institute make it more a part of the whole mission than had been originally contemplated by us, but your Executive submit to you their endorsation in the belief of a still wider field of usefulness for this necessary Training School.

In preparation for assuming our share of the responsibility for the Institute and other new work your Executive has set aside \$2,000 as a nucleus for the extension of our field of operation.

Remembrance List. During the year your Executive prepared a list of 30 missionaries in which our Canadian Churches are especially interested. These are intended to remind us to pray definitely for the workers and their work. Information regarding these missionaries may be had from Rev. A. F. Pollock, our Educational Secretary.


Support of Evangelists and Teachers. Native evangelists and teachers to the number of 17 are, at present, being supported by churches, societies or by individual members, while others give toward the Kindergarten teachers as a whole.

This element of definite, personal touch with our native workers on the Mission field will be helpful in many churches

in arousing missionary enthusiasm.

Your Executive is taking steps to have this phase of the work more fully developed. When further details with a revised list of teachers reach us from Chisamba we hope to be in a position to assign many of these to our churches, Sunday Schools, young people's societies or to individual members who are willing to assume their support.

Our Missionary Forces. At the present moment we have only four on the field. The Misses Melville are on their way homeward for their well-earned furlough. They will attend the Missionary Conference in Edinburgh while in Great Britain, and reach Canada in July. Miss Diadem Bell sailed at the end of April on her return voyage to West Africa. Our

prayers for God's protecting care follow them in their long journeys East and West.

Under a new regulation of the American Board we are pleased to report that our African missionaries are released for furlough of fourteen months every five years. This more frequent rest time will keep our workers in better health and spirits, and give us an opportunity of hearing of the work. It will also make additional demands for funds and for workers.

Missionary Visit. During the past year our Western Churches, Victoria, Vancouver and Winnipeg, had the privilege of a visit from a returned missionary. Rev. J. P. McNaughton, of the A.B.C.F.M., Smyrna, Turkey, visited these churches in April last. This visit was highly appreciated, and resulted in greatly increased interest in foreign missionary effort.

Dr. and Mrs. Currie. We very much regret that Dr. and Mrs. Currie are likely to retire from work in Africa. In April, Dr. Currie presented his resignation to the meeting of the West Central African Mission (of which our missionaries and station are members), to be endorsed and forwarded to the Prudential Committee of the American Board. In this letter he desired release in 1911, when he will have been twenty-five years in service, with only two furloughs. He states that the health of Mrs. Currie is not now robust, and expresses his fear that he himself, if not soon relieved, may suffer a complete physical and nervous breakdown.

He considers that their time of usefulness in the mission has come to an end.

Dr. Currie does not speak of his intention regarding the future, but we gather that he does not expect to continue in missionary work.

We may say that when Dr. Currie first broached to us his intention to leave it came as a great surprise, in view of his recent plans regarding the Institute, and the members of the Executive immediately wrote, urging him to reconsider his intention, assuring him of our confidence in his faithfulness and ability as our missionary, and pointing out how much our expectations regarding the Institute were bound up with him.

We have not had time to receive an answer to these letters,

but it would seem that we shall probably lose Dr. and Mrs. Currie from our staff of workers.

Pending certainty on this point, we would only say their long term of service has resulted in building up one of the best mission stations in Africa, Dr. Currie's energy, wisdom, business ability and exceptional gifts of management of natives especially contributing to this end.

It will be a very great loss if these two most faithful and able workers feel compelled to give up our missionary work.

Recruits Wanted. The following workers are needed to carry forward our work:

A male teacher, to be superintendent of education, first of our Chisamba schools, and later of teacher-training in the Institute. This man could be sent forward at once.

Further, an industrial worker, a skilled mechanic, for industrial department at Chisamba.

Then a minister will be required for the expected vacancy at Chisamba.

We hope that pastors and others will bring these needs before their people, and that prayer will be made for these laborers for the harvest. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth laborers into His harvest."

THE MISSES MELVILLE, West Central Africa.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

TORONTO, June, 1910.

This department is thankful that it is possible to report

progress along all lines of our work.

The only exception is the distribution of missionary books. There have not been as many books and helps sold this year as in the previous year, but still a number have been passed along, and the department has been able to assist some teachers and leaders in securing suitable books for the work they were

undertaking.

Our representation at the Whitby Summer School showed an increase—10 Congregationalists in all, eight registered delegates and two leaders. Two representatives came from Quebec Province, four from Toronto and two from other points in Ontario. This year two conferences for young people will be held in Canada, the fifth Annual Conference at Whitby, Ont., July 4th-11th, and the first conference at Knowlton, P. Q., July 12th to 19th. I cannot over-emphasize the value of these summer schools in the training and equipping of young people for educational and other forms of missionary work and for the presentation of missions as a life work. It is impossible for a thoughtful young person to attend these conferences without giving the matter earnest consideration. We should like to urge our churches to send as many of their young people as possible to these summer schools.

The work of providing for two new school buildings and for the sending out of school supplies to Africa was handed over to this department. A trifle over \$1,000 was required and we are pleased to be able to report that \$625.00 of this amount has already been given and \$125.00 additional has been promised, leaving a balance of \$250.00 still to be raised, but which balance we hope to overtake in the near future. This amount, however, does not represent by any means the entire gifts of our Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies. Fifteen boys, teachers and evangelists are supported in our Chisamba Mission by various schools and societies, and a great many interests are repre-

sented in other gifts. An Indian orphan is supported by one school, a gift to the China Inland Mission. Two teachers are supported in India, a native teacher in Hongkong, gifts to Dr. Grenfell's Mission. To Dr. Scott's work in Ceylon, to work in Japan and to the Armenian Relief Fund, and last, but not least, the Sunday School of First Church, Hamilton, Ont., is contributing \$250.00 towards the expense of building the Institutional church at Landes, Sask.

It is our hope that in planning for the extension of the work in Africa the Foreign Missionary Society may see fit to assign us a missionary of our own, not because of any desire to separate our work from that of the church at large, but because it will give us something for which we will be responsible and will call forth our best efforts. We hope it will be the Industrial man. The energetic young people of Canada wish our

brothers and sisters over the seas the dignity of labor.

The great task before this department, however, is not the raising of money so much as the education and inspiration of the scholars of our schools and the young people of our societies, so that they may be led to give themselves to the work; that they may be enlisted in the army of Jesus Christ for active service abroad or at home. If the broad policy of the church with reference to missions is to be carried out, there must be a gift of life, as well as gifts of money, and we hope this year, under God's guidance and through His grace, to enter upon the work of enlisting soldiers for the army of the Great King.

Such a brief space of time, however, has elapsed that the report will not be lengthy, yet will suffice to show that something has been accomplished and that much remains to be done in this depart-

ment during the coming year or years.

A Missionary Remembrance List has been completed and circulated among the churches. The circulation of the Missionary Herald has been increased by several new names received during the Union and the Secretary will be glad to give information to any of our churches concerning the free distribution of this excellent Foreign Mission Monthly.

Every delegate and pastor in attendance at the Union was given a copy of the Story of Chisamba, and we will be glad to furnish copies to Presidents of Ladies' Auxiliaries and Laymen's organizations, also to pastors, and a copy for each Sunday

School library.

Attention has been called to the free leaflets printed by the American Board, and which will be forwarded on application to J. G. Hosmer, 14 Beacon St., Boston.

Our exhibit of some of the best missionary books and libraries during the Union meetings was much appreciated, the

sales amounting to nearly \$30.

It is too early to speak of plans for the future We see ahead a great field of work awaiting us. We ask the hearty co-operation of our churches in pushing forward the work of this department and putting it upon a permanent footing. Your Secretary will be pleased to answer all enquiries and give any information in his power concerning our missionaries and the work generally.

hand.

We believe that much of the success of our work in West

Central Africa has been owing to our special prayer for this station and our workers there.

Our "Remembrance and Prayer List of Missionaries" will, I believe, help us in our work for "Intercession in Missions."

New cards have been ordered through Rev. W. T. Gunn, and we hope to be able to meet the demand soon. I shall be glad to hear from any person interested in this work.

We have many who for various reasons have had to leave their Congregational Church home, but who for love of our African work still continue to "pray for us and our mission-

aries."

We are told that every great crisis in the missionary field has been turned in answer to prayer. If our membership of three hundred and seventy with those who "always pray for us" join together in prayer for the work, will not the problems before us be removed and the needs be supplied?

TREASURER'S REPORT, 1909-10.

The printed statement submitted herewith shows that another record has been made, our income for all purposes for the year ending May 31, 1910, being \$7,971.95, which is an in-

crease over the previous year of \$4.87.

The General Fund receipts, however, as will be seen from the table at the foot of the Financial Statement, were \$6,118.19, as against \$6,749.56 a year ago, a drop of over \$600. The list of expenditures shows how our funds have been appropriated: \$2,600 having gone to the American Board for salaries and other fixed charges to the end of the present month; \$300 to pay for Dr. Currie's recent exploration tour; \$450 advanced for school purposes; and \$200 voted at the last Annual Meeting for the Kanjundu Relief Fund. The other payments are shown in detail on the printed statement.

Remarkable increase is shown in the designated amounts received, which were \$1,853.76 against \$1,217.52 last year. This increase is accounted for largely by the fact that a special appeal was made through the Young People's Department for School Supplies, etc., and the response was encouraging. The bulk, therefore, of this amount for designated objects was for our own work, only \$520.01 going outside; in other words, so far as this latter amount is concerned, our Society acted as a forwarding agency, receiving and sending to the desired destination funds given for work in South America, in the West Indies, in Japan, in India, in Ceylon, in Turkey, and among the Deep Sea fishermen of the Labrador Coast; in all of which work our churches are interested.

Ontario, I regret to say, has fallen back \$837, and the Maritime Provinces, \$190; while Quebec has increased \$164 and the Western Provinces, \$370; and the miscellaneous and personal

are \$498 larger than they were last year.

Toronto has been called the "banner city of the banner Province," but—and I blush to say it—Toronto's gifts have gone behind \$204, the Northern church being the only one that has made a gain, the others having gone back from \$8 to \$182 each. Little wonder then that the Province has followed the lead of Toronto.

The balance of \$2.507.54 in hand in the designated fund includes \$2,000 set apart as a nucleus for new work, the proposed Institute being the special object. The balance is made up of Hospital Cottage Fund, \$176.53; Industrial Department, \$171.01; gift of Mrs. A. Boynton, Fitch Bay, for special work, \$100, and Toronto Bond Street Sunday School, towards School Building, \$60.


An examination of our books shows that Toronto Northern has regained first place as the largest giver, the amount being \$644. A close second is Montreal Emmanuel, with \$617.29. (\$174.09 more came to hand this week from Emmanuel, but too late to be reported. This will give them a good start for next year.) Then follow: Toronto Bond Street, \$416; Hamilton First, \$376.44; Winnipeg Central, \$325; Montreal Calvary, \$324.70; Toronto Western, \$250; Maxville, \$242.69; Montreal Zion, \$209.64; Brantford, \$176.36; Guelph, \$157.88; Granby, \$151.62; Toronto Broadview, \$151.50; Vancouver, Knox, \$147; Westmount, \$132.37; Ottawa Welcome Zion, \$123.50; Sherbrooke, \$121.55; Paris, \$117.42; and Fitch Bay, \$115 (including special gift of \$100 already referred to).

Two legacies have been received—one of \$150 from the estate of the late Hannah Hodgskin, of Guelph; the other of \$250.00 from the estate of the late Rev. G. Root of West Montrose. This latter was left for the missionary enterprises of the United Brethren denomination, which has since become merged into our body; and we appreciate the kindly interest of the executors in desiring to have the amount used in our African work, as they believe would have been the wish of our departed

brother.

Among the gifts received, we are glad to be able to record \$150 from the Woman's Board for a new school building, and \$150 from the Toronto Northern Y. P. S. for a similar object. Ottawa Welcome Zion has also completed a like amount for a school. We understand that Toronto Bond Street Sunday School has undertaken the building of a school, and \$60 towards this came to hand just before we closed our book.

Ninety-four churches have given this year, against 99 last year. Even where there are no Congregational churches at the present time, the Society and its work are often remembered; for

example, a few days ago, \$24 was received from the Congregationalists of Wood Bay, Man. The Hughes children, of Hartville, N. S., formerly of Milton, have sent \$55 for special work at Chisamba, and they have been contributing in like proportion for several years. Mr. Duncan Cook, of Inverness, P. Q., remitted ten dollars for our work; and Mrs. Bolton, of Wiarton, five dollars; and only a week or two before his death, that old veteran, Rev. Robert Robinson, sent ten dollars from Owen Sound, through the Toronto Northern Church.

Interesting letters accompanying remittances often find their way to the Treasurer. One pastor writes: "A few years ago, I despaired of getting the Church to take an interest in missions. I turned my attention to the Sunday School, and the response has been fine, and it is having a splendid influence on the Church. The parents are interested in the children's work, and we are fast becoming a missionary church." Here is a

suggestion for other pastors.

The duplex envelope system seems to be getting a firm hold on the churches. This system ensures a regular income for missions, and it should receive the encouragement of every pastor. One of our ministers writes: "The Duplex Envelope is the ideal for missionary giving, we find." Another contributor says: "We hope to do better another year, for we have adopted

the Duplex Envelope system."

And now, what of the future? We have not yet reached the Ten Thousand mark which has been before us. We see looming up on the horizon exceptionally large expenses to be met during the next two or three years, and we need a larger income. There is the Institute to be established, and the furlough allowance is to be set apart; one or two new missionaries also are to be sent out. In order to meet these and other possible contingencies, ten thousand dollars is asked for during the coming year. Our budget includes \$5,000 to cover the salaries of the present missionaries; the sending forward of an industrial man; travelling, freight, agency fees, etc. One thousand dollars must be set apart as a furlough fund; three thousand dollars towards the establishment of the Institute; and one thousand dollars for home administration, including our proportion of the General Secretary's salary (say \$360) and

the Laymen's Committee expenses (say \$250), with printing,

postage, travelling, etc. (say \$390).

If we keep the Ten Thousand Dollar mark steadily in view, and work it out along the apportionment plan which has been prepared, it will be easy for each church, and for each individual giver. We shall attain not so much through *large* gifts, as through *many* gifts. Let us each ask: "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?"

WORLD MISSIONARY CONFERENCE.

By Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, B.D., Official Delegate.

The World Missionary Conference, held in Edinburgh, Scotland, June 12th to 24th, is recognized as the greatest of missionary gatherings, and is spoken of as the greatest gathering in the history of the Christian Church. The Archbishop of Canterbury said, "It is the greatest gathering of the Church in this or any other land." Another speaker described it as the "most important ecclesiastical assembly since Nicaea." There were delegates from almost every country in the world and of every race and color, from the black men of Africa to the white men of Britain and all the shades between. These men of various nationality and dress mingled together, stood on a common platform, discussed the problems of the mission field in their world-wide relations. Here the Church of England and the Church of Scotland, Congregationalist and Methodist, Baptist and Brethren, all branches of the Protestant Church, met for a little while on the Highlands, and looked out upon the world-wide work of the Christian Church. Regret was expressed that the Roman Catholic Church was not represented.

This Conference was great in preparation. In July, 1908, the International Committee of nineteen met in Oxford, England, and appointed eight commissioners to investigate the missionary work from various standpoints and to prepare printed reports of their findings, these reports to be the basis for discussion in the meetings of the Conference to be held in Edinburgh. One hundred and sixty societies were represented, and all the Protestant denominations. The commissioners were appointed because of their special ability and knowledge of the particular phase of the work to be investigated. commissions deal with the whole range of missions in relation to the modern world. These commissions were taken up under the following heads: (1) Carrying the Gospel to all the non-Christian world; Mr. John R. Mott, M.A., D.D., chairman. (2) The Church in the mission field; Rev. J. Campbell Gibson, chairman. (3) Education in relation to the Christianization of national life; the Bishop of Birmingham, the Right Rev. C. Gore, chairman. (4) The missionary message in relation to non-Christian religions; Prof. Cairns, of the United Free Church, chairman. (5) The preparation of missionaries; President McKenzie, D.D., Congregationalist, chairman. (6) The home base of missions; Rev. Jas. L. Barton, D.D., Congregationalist, chairman. (7) Missions and governments; the Right Hon. Lord Balfour of Burleigh, chairman, with the Hon. Seth Low, of New York, vice-chairman. (8) Cooperation and the promotion of unity; Sir Andrew H. L. Fraser, chairman. Proof copies of these reports, marked "strictly private and confidential," were placed in the hands of all official delegates before the Conference opened.

The Conference was great in its purpose, which was nothing short of the investigation of the whole missionary problem in all its encouraging and discouraging aspects. Men did not come together to deal with small matters, nor to look from narrow viewpoints. Let it be said men made it quite clear they were not giving up their theological or ecclesiastical views. They loved their own particular denomination, and wanted to bear

their share of the work of evangelizing the world.

The Conference was great in its personnel—Archbishops and Lords, Congregational Union Chairmen and Presbyterian Moderators, Baptists and Methodists, Knights and men of the lowest castes of India, white men and black men, red and yellow. It was a great tribute to the power of our glorious Gospel to lift all men to a common platform of brotherhood.

The Conference was great in interest, deep and cumulative. Thousands of delegates had travelled thousands of miles, in nearly every case bearing their own expenses; each, after reaching Edinburgh, paying in the neighborhood of \$3.00 for tickets of admission to the meetings. The great halls in which the meetings were held were filled to overflowing from 9.45 a.m. to 9.30 p.m., with the exception of the few hours taken for lunch and dinner. Speakers were so numerous, and each man had so much to say, that it was necessary to set a time-limit, that each might have a fair chance. The limit was seven minutes, and the Chairman rigidly held speakers to this; when the Bishop of Birmingham had exceeded his time a little the Chairman facetiously said. "If all speakers will face the clock they will be heard by all, and there will be manifest other advantages." The seven-minute rule was well adhered to, and men

in most cases at once went to the heart of their subject. The mid-day prayer hour was most helpful, as men of various creed and race unitedly joined in prayer to the Lord of All, Christian and non-Christian, for guidance and blessing in the missionary work.

We were all impressed with the magnitude of the missionary work in many lands, among many races, in many tongues. We were impressed with the obstacles in the way. How difficult to Christianize old civilizations reaching far into past ages, the aggressions of Islam, which to-day is most active in its operations. On the other hand, we were impressed with the boundless resources of Christian countries. Never did the Church possess so many men and so much wealth as now, and with all we were most impressed that He who said "Go ye therefore and make disciples of all nations" also said, "All authority hath been given unto Me in heaven and on earth."

P.S.—The report of the Conference is now being printed, and will be issued in nine volumes. This will be the most up-to-date, most comprehensive and most useful missionary library. It would be good missionary work for every Ladies' Missionary Auxiliary to place a set in their Sunday School

library, that they might be accessible to all.—J. L. A.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I .- NAME.

This Corporation shall be called "The Canada Congregational Missionary Society," and shall conduct its operations within the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

ARTICLE II. -- OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be as set forth in the Act of Incorporation, namely, to plant and to foster Congregational Churches in suitable localities; to aid churches in sustaining their pastors where required.

ARTICLE III. - MEMBERSHIP.

All persons being members or adherents of Congregational Churches, paying two dollars annually into the funds of the Society, shall be members, and those who subscribe at one time twenty dollars or more shall be life members. Churches subscribing annually ten dollars or more may be represented at the annual meeting of the Society by one delegate, and churches subscribing fifty dollars or more may be represented by two delegates. Each auxiliary branch contributing annually to the funds of the Society ten dollars or more may be represented by one delegate. The above-mentioned subscribers and delegates shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV .- OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, an Honorary President, a Secretary, an Honorary Secretary, a Treasurer, a Superintendent and two Auditors, and an Educational Secretary and Superintendent of Immigration may also be appointed. The Standing Committees shall be a General Committee and an Executive Committee. These officers and committees shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall all be members of the Corporation. The General Committee shall consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer,

Superintendent, Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration, Honorary President and Honorary Secretary, and not more than twenty-five members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Honorary President, the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Superintendent, the Honorary Secretary, the Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration Department, one member from each District Association within the bounds of the operations of the Society, and one from the Winnipeg Congregational Church Extension and Building Society, and these members shall hold office from the date of their election by their various Associations.

ARTICLE V .- DUTIES.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and its committees, when practicable, and shall seek to promote the general interest of the Society's work.

The Secretary shall have charge of the books and correspondence of the Society, shall call the meetings of the Society and its committees, and shall exhibit the records of the pro-

ceedings at each meeting.

The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Society, disbursing them as directed by the General or Executive Committee, and shall present annually a full account of all receipts and disbursements.

The Superintendent shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, to whom he shall report quarterly, visit the churches of the Congregational order within the bounds of the Society's operations with a view of deepening their interest in its work, and of securing liberal contributions for the Society, and shall explore new mission fields, secure missionaries for vacant churches, and have a general oversight of the interests and work of the Society.

The Auditors shall examine the accounts of the Society when required, and make an annual audit of the Treasurer's

books previous to the annual meeting of the Society.

The General Committee shall exercise all the corporate powers of the Society, have charge of annual mission grants made to the churches, examine, employ and direct all the missionaries of the Society, and have a general supervision of its affairs. They shall present a report of the work of the Society at each of its annual meetings.

The Executive Committee shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society during the interval between the annual meetings of the General Committee; shall receive all applications from churches for aid from the Society, and report thereon to the General Committee, to whom they shall make an annual report of their proceedings.

ARTICLE VI.-MEETING.

The Corporation shall meet annually on the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles. A public annual missionary meeting shall be held on the evening of the next day. Special meetings for the despatch of special business may be called by the Executive Committee at such time and place as may be deemed desirable, provided that a month's notice be given thereof. The General Committee shall hold their meeting at the same time and place as the Corporation, at the call of the Secretary; and the Executive Committee shall hold their quarterly meeting at the time and place it may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE VII. - CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

All sums of money specially collected, given or bequeathed for the purpose, together with the proceeds received from the sale of disused church property, shall form a Church Extension and Building Fund, which shall be invested by the Corporation, who may apply the income thereof, by the General or Executive Committee, by the way of loans, or otherwise, for the organization of churches in new fields, and for the erection or enlargement of places of worship where they may be required.

ARTICLE VIII .-- AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Auxiliary branches of this Society may be formed in churches and localities, to co-operate in the work of the Society. Each branch shall, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, make an annual report to the Secretary and send to the Treasurer all funds collected on its behalf.

ARTICLE IX. - MISSIONARIES.

Each missionary in the employment of this Society must be a regularly accredited member of a Congregational Church, and shall endeavor faithfully to promote all the interests of the Congregational denomination in Canada. He shall send to the Secretary a half-yearly statement of his work, and furnish such statistical returns as may be called for.

ARTICLE X .-- MISSIONS.

Each church requiring a missionary grant by the General Committee must make application therefor through the Secretary, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, according to the printed forms provided, in which a certificate to the effect that all previous pledges of support to its pastor have been fulfilled shall be inserted. Churches aided by this Society are required to make an annual collection for the funds and to keep their property sufficiently insured; and such churches acquiring property shall have inserted in the Trust Deed a clause providing that in case the church shall at any time be disbanded or cease to exist the property shall revert to the Society.

ARTICLE XI. - RECEIVING AND DISMISSING PASTORS.

Churches aided by this Society are required, as far as practicable, in the settlement and dismissal of pastors, to carry out the recommendations passed by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, in 1876, in relation to Councils. In cases where this is impracticable, the sanction of the Executive Committee must be obtained before a settlement or dismissal of a pastor is consummated.

ARTICLE XII. -CONVEYING PROPERTY.

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate, and to discharge mortgages; and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person, on behalf of the Corporation, to accept conveyances of real estate and to receive mortgages. The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may require it.

ARTICLE XIII. -AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, one day's notice having previously been given of the proposed amendment, in writing.

NOTICE.

It is becoming more than ever a practice among Christian people to recognize the Lord's portion in their Last Wills and Testaments, whereby, though they be dead, they speak and act in the furtherance of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent objects. American Congregationalists are among the most wise and generous in this day, and have left legacies of blessings for succeeding generations. Among the members of our Congregational churches in Canada there have also been those who have followed a likewise generous course.

For the guidance of those who may desire to make like bequests, the following legal form is subjoined. The amount bequeathed may be devoted specially to the Church Extension and Building Fund, in which case the income would only be used, or may be given for the general purposes of the Society.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CANADA CONGREGA-TIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society was held in the Congregational Church at Cobourg, Ont., June 8th, at 11 a.m. The Honorary President, Mr. Charles Cushing, occupied the chair in the absence of the President, Mr. Geo. H. Wilson. Rev. E. C. Woodley was appointed Minute Secretary.

The report of the Secretary, Rev. W. T. Gunn, was read and adopted.

The Treasurer's report was presented by the new Treasurer,

Mr. Gordon H. O'Hara, and adopted.

In the absence of the Educational Secretary, Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, his report was read by the Secretary and adopted.

Rev. F. J. Day, Honorary Superintendent of Immigration, reported the work of his department, which was duly accepted, and a hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Day and Rev. E. H. Tippett for the valuable service rendered.

The Secretary was also instructed to extend a similar vote of thanks to Rev. Dr. Patterson, of Halifax, Presbyterian Immigration Chaplain, for his services to Congregational immigrants

at that port.

Moved by Mr. H. O'Hara, seconded by Rev. Hugh Pedley, and carried by unanimous standing vote: "That the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, assembled in the annual meeting at Cobourg, June 8th, 1910, desires to place on record its hearty congratulations extended to Mr. Charles R. Black, our Treasurer for so many years, upon his recovery from his serious illness and subsequent operation during the last winter. We desire also to record our very sincere regret that this illness, with pressure of business cares, has made it necessary for Mr. Black to resign his office of Treasurer of the Society, an office he has filled for so many years with an integrity, ability and loyalty that have been highly appreciated by all our churches, not only giving generously to this part of our denominational work which he loved, but inducing others to give, and sparing nothing of time or labour to forward the interests of the Society.

The books of the Society, so admirably kept, and the funds so carefully and successfully administered, are in themselves a very high testimonial. We are glad that as a member of our Advisory Committee on Investments the Society is still to have the benefit of Mr. Black's wisdom and experience.

"In the name of the churches throughout the Dominion and of all the friends of our home missionary work, we desire to express to Mr. Black our most hearty gratitude and our hope that he may yet be spared to many years of happy life and of

interest in our work."

At the adjourned meeting on Thursday morning, June 9th, on motion of Rev. Frank J. Day, it was resolved that the C.C. M.S. guarantee sixty per cent. of any deficit in providing for salary and travelling expenses of the Secretary of the Union.

On motion, the question of the grant to the Laymen's Missionary Committee was referred to the Executive, as was also the question of a grant to the Congregationalist.

Short addresses were then given by Rev. Frank J. Day on the work in Amherst Park, by Rev. W. T. Gunn on the new

The Benediction was pronounced by Rev. W. W. Smith.

The public meeting of the Society on Thursday evening was addressed by Rev. J. K. Unsworth and Rev. W. T. Gunn, the general theme being Canada and Congregationalism.

FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

It is with pleasure that your Secretary presents this, the fifty-seventh, Annual Report of the varied and interesting work

of the Society.

During the year we have aided in the support of thirty-nine pastors and pastoral supplies in fields as widely separated as Margaree, in Cape Breton, on the east, and Victoria, in Vancouver Island, on the west, between which lies a journey of nearly 4,000 miles. These pastors have been earnest and successful in their work, and, though the statistics are not complete, there have been added to the churches under their care

over two hundred on profession of faith.

New church buildings have been going up. We have the pleasure of reporting the erection of the third church in Winnipeg, to be called Crescent Congregational Church. This has been erected by the Western Congregational Church Extension Society and is a very fine frame building, with a beautiful auditorium seating 500, and several very convenient class rooms. They start with thirty members, and will have as their permanent pastor Rev. E. R. Weeks, who has resigned the Western Superintendency to take this charge.

Out on the Saskatchewan prairie, at Landis, under Mr. Gervan's care, "The Congregational Church Institute" rose up last fall, a two-story building about 25 x 40, seating 150 in the

hall, and open all week for the use of the people, the pastor and wife and little one living in the upper story.

At Balmoral, Sask., on Dr. Ralph's field, has gone up the "Church of St. John," of which we have as yet no picture or

accurate description.

Point St. Charles is also, after many tribulations, entering into a new building which, when finished, will be a beautiful and commodious church home, and a monument to the generous brotherly help of the Congregationalists of Montreal. To this our Society has been able to grant from its building fund one thousand dollars.

Down in Beach Meadows, N.S., we are also helping the people to build a new and larger church, to replace that which, up on the hill, weathered the salt winds of ocean for over fifty

years.

Away west in Vancouver is First Church, aided so much by this Society in years past, and whose property, taken over in a time of storm and debt, has stood in our name for ten years. This property has been deeded back to the Church, sold by them for \$100,000.00, and this year, on a new site in the west of the city, there will go up a beautiful building modelled after Emmanuel Church, Montreal, but having the Sunday School under the main auditorium. It is a pleasure also to know that they plan to set aside between ten and fifteen thousand dollars for extension work in Vancouver and the Province, so that the coming fall may see the erection of a third church in that western city.

Then in sunny Alberta an active, enthusiastic band of Congregationalists have gotten together in Calgary, and are at present looking for a site and discussing the plans for their first

building.

Looking over our field as a whole, and beginning with the sunrise in our Eastern Provinces, Margaree has had a good year under Mr. Bevis, in spite of many removals to the west. New pastors were secured during the year for Economy, South Maitland, Kingsport and Keswick Ridge, and good reports come in of their work. Liverpool has gone ahead, Milton secured a student supply for the summer, and for a little while every field in the Maritime Provinces was supplied; but the pastor at Liver-

pool has since resigned, and we are looking for a new man for that field.

In Quebec, Franklin Centre has been doing well, and Point St. Charles, growing with their difficulties and because of them, have entered happily into the basement of their new building.

In Ontario, Eastern district, Ottawa South has begun regular work, having secured Mr. Sleep as its permanent pastor, and the prospects are good. Kingston First, a good friend of the Society, will need our help for a little, but with Mr. Rice as pastor should not need it long. Kingston Calvary has continued its faithful evangelistic and missionary work with success under Mr. Whitmore, and has our congratulations.

For the Ontario Central District, Cobourg, with its present welcome, speaks visibly of its new life and strength. Alton has lately lost its pastor, Barrie has been without marked change, and Parkdale feels that a change of site should be made, and with other matters now pending in connection with the sale of Zion Church there may be an altogether new opportunity con-

fronting us next fall in Toronto.

In the Western Association, Stratford has had one of the very best years in its history. Hamilton Immanuel and Forest Lake Shore and Ebenezer report a good year. Woodstock is at present without a pastor, but has passed through this trying time

very well so far.

In the North-West, Winnipeg marks the year with the call of Rev. Edgar Whitehouse to St. James Park, the building of Crescent Church, and the call of Rev. E. R. Weeks to that charge. It is worth reminding ourselves that in less than three years these Winnipeg people have secured these two splendid sites and buildings worth with equipment over \$30,000.00, and that the unprovided debt upon them is now only about \$12,000.00—a good record for three years.

Brandon, under Rev. J. M. Sutherland, has had a good year. The Welsh field, under Mr. Morris, remains the same. Dr. Ralph's field is growing, and this year undertakes for the first time a fair measure of his support, and Dr. Ralph asks for another man to help him.

Rev. Geo. S. Gervan, at Landis, has seen the rapid growth of his field and work—the building of the Congregational Institute. Here also a large measure of support will come from the field this year. Our Swedish work, with its four pastors and twelve preaching stations, is going steadily ahead and asks for less help this year.

Calgary, our newest cause, has a very promising start with a band of earnest evangelical men of good ability, and should

grow fast. [A lot has been secured.—Ed.].

Victoria has had a good year under Mr. Carson, asks for a smaller grant than last year, and hopes next year to stand alone.

During the year a number of matters of general importance have been before us. Having in regard the increased cost of living, we have felt it necessary to raise the rate of remuneration for the summer services of our students, and now ask the churches to provide at the rate of \$30.00 per month over board and travelling expenses to and from the field.

We have also, after careful consideration, entered into an agreement with our United Brethren Association whereby all their Home Missionary funds shall pass through our hands, providing, however, that the amount of grants to their churches shall not exceed the total receipts from their Association. This will take effect at a date to be set by their Conference meeting next fall.

Much of the success of handling the difficult situation in Zion Church, Toronto, is also due to the prompt co-operation of this Society with the members of the church and the Toronto Council, an example of the new spirit of co-operation in our work which will prevent the loss and disintegration of past years.

Coming then to a consideration of our finances for the year. Our general mission fund shows a total increase of \$12,276.02 for 1909-10, as against an amount of \$12,045.60, an increase of only \$230.00; but an analysis of the figures shows a decrease in personal and special subscriptions of \$550.00, and a decrease in the amount received from the Colonial Missionary Society of \$500.00, their special gift of £100 of a year ago. There is, on the other hand, an increase of over \$1,000.00 in the contributions from the churches, and this increase is shared in by every Province. The Woman's Board has also given us \$72.75 over last year, and the Gorham fund, again on better footing, has brought in an increased revenue.

The balance on hand, \$2,199.00 in the General Fund, is \$350.00 less than a year ago, and would have been very materially less had we been able earlier in the year to secure ministers for our Winnipeg churches and Ottawa South. This balance also, while seeming large, is needed for the payment of the summer quarterly payments of June 30th and September 30th, before which very little comes in from the churches. It is a working fund rather than a balance in hand.

Your Secretary has also just received word that by the will of the late Geo. N. Hodge, of Sherbrooke, Que., the Society has been left one-quarter of the residue of his estate, and it is estimated that this will amount to over \$10,000.00 when the estate is settled.

The Church Extension and Building Fund revenue has been made use of during the year to encourage the friends at Point St. Charles in their struggle by the gift of \$1,000.00 toward their new building. Far away on the Nova Scotia shore our Beach Meadows Church, erecting a new building with generous contributions of money and labor, were encouraged by the promise of \$200.00, which will be paid when they need it this summer—a gift acknowledged by them in a very hearty and unanimous standing vote of thanks passed at the last service in the old building.

St. James Park, Winnipeg, is also making progress, and in

the last month has fulfilled the conditions upon which we promised \$500.00 toward their building, and this will be immediately paid to them.

For next year the new work in Calgary and also in Montreal will give opportunity for a wise use of both the present balance

and next year's income.

All the gifts from this fund are conditional upon generous giving by the churches aided, and are recognized by a lien

similar to that drawn up for the Jubilee Fund gifts.

At present small additions to the capital of this fund will come from the sale of the St. Catharines and Bowmanville properties, part of the proceeds of which, however, will be credited to the Jubilee Fund.

The sale of Zion Church, Toronto, will in the near future place in our hands a large amount, which will be regarded as a separate and special fund for Congregational Church extension

purposes in the city of Toronto and neighborhood.

In this matter we have also been able to make use of the beautiful furniture and organ of the Bowmanville Church, which would have produced very little if sold, by presenting them to Ottawa Welcome Zion. They paid the expense of removal, and now have the interior of their church beautifully refitted in keeping with the exterior, which they have bricked and otherwise beautified.

The George Robertson Evangelistic Fund has been used by us in guaranteeing the expenses of special revival services whereever our churches and pastors desired. This did not make any very considerable draft upon the fund, for where services were held the contributions of the people generally left very little to be provided by our guarantee, and in some cases the whole amount was met locally. This use of the fund has enabled services to be held without any anxiety as to the expense in many places during the last year. It is a pleasure to be able to report that special services, earnest and successful, have been held in about twenty-five of our churches during the past twelve months. We shall be glad to assist any of our churches and pastors to hold special services during the coming year.

We also made use of the fund to secure for one of our aided churches during the illness of the pastor a supply for the pulpit,

evangelistic in spirit, that brought the congregation through the

trying time with increase of spirituality and efficiency.

Our thanks are again due to the Colonial Missionary Society for their continued help, and we have asked Rev. Dr. Hill, our Honorary Secretary, to convey to them our hearty thanks and

greetings.

Our Canada Congregational Woman's Board have also stood loyally by our work during the year with their contributions to our fund, their many gifts for the comfort of the workers and the help of the fields in the North-West, and they now propose to have a worker of their own in the West, a nurse to minister to the scattered settlers upon Dr. Ralph's field.

As we meet again our thoughts go back to our last meeting, and the memory of Rev. Wm. McIntosh, who then presided. His knowledge of our fields and loyalty to our work will be missed in our councils. At the very time of his illness in Nova Scotia he had undertaken several important matters on behalf of the Society. Your Executive, acting on your behalf, sent a message of appreciation and sympathy to the bereaved family.

During the year our beloved and trusty Treasurer for so many years, Mr. Charles R. Black, underwent an operation for appendicitis, from which he happily recovered, but felt the need of release from the work of the Treasurership. His resignation was reluctantly accepted, and a resolution expressing our appreciation of Mr. Black's very great services to this Society will be presented to you. We are happy to say that Mr. Black has consented to serve as a member of an advisory committee on investments, so that in this matter we shall have the benefit of his wisdom and experience.

We have also great pleasure in introducing to the Society our new Treasurer, Mr. Gordon H. O'Hara, one of the loyal members of Zion Church, Montreal, and in business life assistant accountant of the Allan Line of steamships. Mr. O'Hara brings to the office ability, enthusiasm and strength, and we

expect will be a strong helper in our work.

Your Secretary would also report with gratitude the contribution of time and thought given by your Executive to this work. Since the last report, including the sessions of the last Union, your Executive have again held nearly twenty sessions, five sessions of the Corporation at the last Union, six of the General Committee and Executive at that time, and six meetings of the Executive, including the nine sessions since.

In the year past the good work done in so many places, the reduced grants asked for in Victoria and other fields, and the progress in Winnipeg and Point St. Charles, are especially encouraging.

For the year to come the probable new work in Calgary, Vancouver, Montreal and Toronto will give us a happy, responsible and encouraging field for all our strength and resources.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

This literature along with the 2,500 copies of the Home Missionary number of the Congregationalist has been issued by your General Secretary and Educational Secretary, working together.

Again it is a pleasure to report a hearty willingness on the part of men to contribute to the Home Missionary number of the Congregationalist, also to know that the literature on the whole

is appreciated by the people.

REPORT OF IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT.

With the completion of the third season of this special work we may safely say that it has passed beyond the experimental stages and become a well recognized department of our home missionary activities, with ever enlarging possibilities of exerting a useful part in the solution of the many national problems arising from the constantly increasing stream of immigration.

As announced in the last report, Student Moule, of our College, undertook the work of Chaplain at Quebec for the summer of 1909. This marked the beginning of the plan of having one chaplain for the Congregational and Baptist Churches. The experiment proved entirely successful and Mr. Moule discharged the double duties with satisfaction to both denominations and a

substantial reduction in the outlay necessary. The arrangement has therefore been continued this year, and Mr. L. C. Whitelaw, B.A., of McMaster University, is filling the dual position.

At St. John, during the winter months, Rev. S. W. Anthony again filled the office of Chaplain, and although, owing to local conditions, he was not able to give quite as much time as formerly, yet the results were satisfactory and many a newcomer looks back with delight to the hearty welcome he received on landing.

The Department is again indebted to Rev. Dr. Paterson, the Presbyterian Chaplain, who, at Quebec, after the departure of Mr. Moule, and at Halifax, kindly handed out our folders to any Congregationalists be met.

to any Congregationalists he met.

The following figures show the numbers of Congregationalists met during the season:

This shows a decrease compared with the numbers of the previous year. It is satisfactory, however, to notice an increase in the percentage of those going to places where we have churches. In the previous year 52 per cent. were bound for points where we are not represented, while during the last season the percentage dropped to 44. Whenever possible in these cases cards of introduction have been given to a Presbyterian, Methodist, or Baptist minister, with the usual notification of the expected arrival of the immigrant. Through the winter months the superintendent sent out about 100 such cards of notification, acting on information furnished by the Government through the lists of those who had declared themselves Congregationalists. There are no returns denominationally expected from this work, but it is all part of our whole plan for thorough co-operation with other Christian agencies in the splendid work of holding men and women for service, not in any one particular church, but for the Kingdom of God as a whole.

Acting on the advice of the Colonial Missionary Society, no special approach was made by us, as last year, to the ministers of Great Britain and Ireland. This was left entirely with the officials of the C. M. S. The results have been quite satisfactory and we are able to record an increased number of notifications concerning the departure of Congregationalists.

It may be noted in connection with the opening of the new church at Calgary, that the superintendent was able to turn up the lists of immigrants for the past two years and furnish to the pioneers of this movement the names of a large number who, during that period, had declared their intention of settling in Calgary. One government list received within the past two

months contained twenty such names.

It is expected that the present year will show a remarkable increase in the number of immigrants. So far every ship has been loaded to its full capacity and the number of Congregationalists entering during May has increased by 50 per cent.

over that of last year.

As a direct outcome of the work of this department and as indicative of the possibilities of extended influence it may be noted that the Superintendent has had the privilege during the year of giving addresses on the immigration question before the Protestant Ministerial Association of Montreal, the Woman's Club of the same city, and the students and faculty of Auburn Theological Seminary, Auburn, N.Y., and will conduct a week's series of studies at the Young People's Missionary Conference at Knowlton in July next. This fact is mentioned simply as a confirmation of the sentiment expressed in last year's report concerning the immediate and prospective value of the work and which may be repeated in closing-" In the evolution of events the Congregational Churches, through their representatives, will be kept in constant contact with all the forces enlisted, and will be in a position to take a much more active share in moulding the policy that will govern action in this most important national question."

FORM OF BEQUEST FOR THE COLLEGE.

I give and bequeath to the Treasurer, for the time being, of the Congregational College of Canada, a body corporate, by Act of Parliament of the Province of Canada, A.D. 1864, the sum of(either without designation, or "to be added to the Endowment Fund of said College") out of my estate, without any charge or deduction whatever, to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease; and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer, for the time being, of the said College, shall be sufficient and valid discharge of said legacy.

BY-LAWS.

CHAPTER I.

1. The Corporation shall be called "The Congregational College of Canada."

2. Its objects shall be the education of ministers of the Gospel and the encouragement and inauguration of all desirable educational methods and movements, whereby the effi-

ciency of the church may be advanced.

3. Contributors of two dollars annually to the Funds of the College shall be members of the Corporation. A contributor in arrears one year shall not be qualied to vote at the meeting of the Corporation, or to exercise his other rights of membership. The Treasurer's subscription list shall be taken as evidence of contribution.

4. Churches contributing for the previous year to the current expenses of the College the sum of ten dollars and upwards may be represented at the meeting of the Corporation by one delegate for each church; those contributing twenty-five dollars or upwards for the previous year, by two delegates; and those contributing fifty dollars or upwards for the previous year, by three delegates.

5. Persons by whom or on whose behalf one hundred dollars or more shall have been contributed at any one time to the funds of the College, may be chosen life members of the

Corporation.

6. A regular meeting of the Corporation shall be held annually, for the reception of the report of the Governors, the election of a new Board according to provisions hereinafter named, and the transaction of other necessary business

7. The annual meeting shall be held at the same time and

place as the Congregational Union of Canada.

8. Special meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business at the call of the Board of Governors, or on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, signed by at least twenty members of the Corporation; provided always that no such special meetings be held without one month's notice thereof in an accredited newspaper in Toronto and Montreal, and also in the Canadian Congregationalist.

CHAPTER II.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

1 A Board of fifteen Governors, having power to choose their own officers, shall be elected from members of the Cor-Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

2. Three members of the Board shall retire annually, in

rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election.

3. The powers and duties of the Board shall be:

(a) The administration of the property of the College and the management of its finances.

(b) The appointment and renewal of all officers of the

College.

(c) The general oversight and management of the

affairs of the College, and

(d) The presentation of an annual report of the general condition of the College to the Corporation at the next regular meeting.

4. Any member of the Board absent from its meetings for a year shall be held ipso facto to have vacated his seat, but may

be re-appointed or re-elected thereto.

5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation or otherwise, may be filled by the Board whenever

it may see fit.

- 6. It shall be competent for the Board of Governors to appoint annually an Executive Committee from its membership. which Committee shall exercise, between the meetings of the Board, such powers as may be delegated to it by the Board of Governors.
- 7. The Board of Governors shall be called together at the close of the annual meeting of the Corporation, for organization and other needful business. They shall hold an annual meeting at a convenient time before the annual meeting of the Corporation; a special meeting may be called at any time by the Chairman and Secretary, or by the Secretary, at the request of five members.

CHAPTER III.

THE SENATE.

1. There shall be a Senate composed of—(1) The members of the Board of Governors; (2) the Faculty; (3) four representatives chosen annually by the Alumni Association; (4) four representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec; (5) two representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Seven members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Senate shall frame regulations for and supervise all

matters of education, honors and discipline.

3. The Principal shall be a member of the Faculty and exofficio President of the Senate.

4. The Registrar shall be a member of the Faculty and ex-

officio Secretary of the Senate.

5. The Senate shall meet annually within one month preceding the close of the Session, at the College, in the city of Montreal, and at such other times and places as the interests of the College may require, and shall make an annual report to the Corporation through the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER IV.

1. The Principal and Professors, with such members of the Senate as from time to time may be appointed by the Board of Governors, constitute the Faculty, and as such are entrusted with the educational work of the College and the enforcement of its regulations under the direction of the Senate. The Principal shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Faculty.

2. Members of the Faculty must be members of a Congre-

gational Church.

3. Members of the Faculty shall not be members of the Board of Governors, but the Principal shall be a consulting member of the Board of Governors, and of all standing committees appointed by the Board or the Senate

CHAPTER V.

THE OFFICERS.

- 1. The Chairman of the Board of Governors shall be the Presiding Officer of the Corporation.
- 2. The President of the Senate shall preside at all public functions of the College.
- 3. The Secretary of the Senate shall be Registrar of the College.

CHAPTER VI.

AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these By-laws may be made at any regular meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such amendment has been given at the meeting next preceding.

principal" during Principal Hill's absence.

The retiring governors are: Messrs. Charles Gurd, Lt.-Col. J. H. Burland, and Alex. McA. Murphy.

THE SENATE TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

Gentlemen,-

It is with pleasure that we present the annual report of the work of the College. The past session—the seventieth—has been one of quiet and steady progress. One of the most pleasant functions of the year was the conferring, in September last, of the Degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, on the Rev. D. Burford Hooke, for fifteen years Secretary of the Colonial Missionary Society. This was done both as a recognition of the

generous interest of the Colonial Missionary Society for so many years in the welfare of this College and as an expression of our appreciation of the ecclesiastical statesmanship and practical wisdom of Mr. Hooke in promoting the welfare of Christ's Kingdom throughout all the British Colonies, especially in connection with Congregational churches.

OPENING OF THE SESSION.

Lectures commenced on September 17th. The public opening exercises were held on October 5th, when an address was given by the Rev. Edward E. Braithwaite, Ph.D., pastor of the Northern Church, Toronto, on "The Supreme Vocation." In this connection it may be reported that in future lectures will begin about the end of September, and the session will be prolonged two weeks later in the spring. This is necessitated by the action of McGill in changing the dates for the opening and closing of lectures in the Faculty of Arts.

STUDENTS IN RESIDENCE.

The number of students in residence throughout the session has been twelve, in addition to which there are several extramural students in the Extension and B.D. courses.

The students in residence were as follows: Rev. R. Barron, junior year; Messrs. R. W. Carr, G. J. Hindley, A. J. Mackenzie, H. Moule, A. G. Sleep, J. T. Tucker, middle year; I. W. Pierce, E. LeRoy Rice, B.A., senior year; and in the Preparatory Department, Robert Fairgrieve, P. V. Samson and R. N. Stewart.

ARTS DEPARTMENT AND PREPARATORY WORK.

Most of the men during their student life take some courses in McGill. The Senate is insistent in its desire that, whenever possible, the full course in Arts shall be taken, and has instructed the Faculty to press every candidate to the utmost to pursue such a course, and that it will endorse the refusal to receive or keep any who might take that course and yet are unwilling to do so. When a full course is impossible, students are to take some work in the University, that they may share in its large educational life as also in its methods of study.

The great desideratum is a central preparatory school open to all the affiliated Theological Colleges, but under the auspices of the University, where men already past the ordinary school age may be fitted to matriculate into the University.

At present our men are prepared in German by Dr. Cook, in Greek partly by Dr. Warriner, and partly by a Beginners' Class in the University, and for their Literature and Mathematics advantage is taken of the Evening Classes of the Y.M.C.A.

The Senate appreciates the action of the Board in its resolution that those preparatory students who have been formally accepted and are in residence shall be assisted in the matter of preparatory tuition fees.

CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER THEOLOGICAL COLLEGES.

In the beginning of the session an arrangement was made with the Presbyterian and Methodist Colleges by which our students had the advantage of the lectures of Professors Gordon and Patton in the Old Testament Department. We have received good reports of the work of our men, and appreciate the friendly spirit of the sister Colleges which makes such co-operation possible. Dr. Hill has also lectured to large classes of Presbyterian students in connection with his own, in the Department of Practical Theology, six hours a week.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

It has not been possible to secure a special lecturer under the Young People's English Bible Endowment, but it is hoped that we shall be able to do so for the coming session. We had also hoped to secure a special course in Elocution as the Mary C. McKechnie Lectureship. As we were not able to do this, Mrs. McKechnie kindly showed her interest in the College by the gift of 150 hymn books for use at College Convocations. A number of the most prominent city pastors, as well as returned missionaries, have given the students the advantage of their experience at different times during the session. Addresses have been given, for example, by Mr. C. C. Fuller, of the American Board's Mission in East Africa; by the Rev. Mr. McNaughton, of Smyrna; also by Rev. Dr. J. J. Martin, of Chicago; and by

the Rev. Dr. Symonds, Dr. W. J. Clark, Dr. Edgar Hill, Dr. W. S. Sparling, Dr. W. R. Young, the Revs. F. J. Day, J. K. Unsworth and Pastor Sullivan.

EXTENSION WORK.

In harmony with our aim to make the College as helpful to our churches as possible, the Faculty has, at the request of the Home Missionary Society, guided the studies of two men having charge of mission fields, viz., Mr. W. J. Bevis, of Margaree, and Mr. J. H. Sulston, of Brooklyn, Nova Scotia, and has also conducted examinations in their work.

Two of our graduates have also carried on considerable work in the B.D. course, viz., Rev. Matthew Kelly, of Watford, and the Rev. A. R. Schrag, of Yarmouth. The latter came into residence again for a part of the year in order to complete the required work this session. Two students have also done successful work in this department, viz., Mr. H. Moule and Mr. J. T. Tucker. The Rev. G. L. Powell, Ph.D., of Caldwell, Idaho, has also passed several examinations in this course.

EXAMINATIONS AND AWARDS.

The Rev. E. C. Woodley, M.A., of Danville, has been added to the list of our Associate Examiners. To him and to the Rev. F. J. Day the Senate is indebted for assistance in setting and examining papers in the B.D. course.

The regular Christmas and Sessional examinations were held, and all the students successfully maintained their standing.

Prizes were awarded as follows:

To the Rev. Robert Barron of the Junior Year—the Charles Alexander Bursary of \$25.00.

To Mr. J. T. Tucker, of the Middle Year—the Maria Sawtell Memorial Scholarship of \$30.00.

To Mr. H. Moule, of the same year, the second prize of \$20.00, and to Mr. A. Mackenzie the third prize of \$10.00.

To Mr. A. G. Sleep, the first Jeanie C. Hill prize in Elocution, of the value of \$15.00; and to Mr. R. W. Carr the second prize of \$10.00.

The graduating class consisted of Mr. Ira William Pierce

and Mr. E. LeRoy Rice, B.A. To each of these gentlemen was awarded a Robert Anderson Bursary of the value of \$30.00. In addition to this Mr. Pierce won the Calvary Silver Medal for excellence in Church History, and Mr. Rice the Stevenson Memorial Gold Medal for the highest standing in all the examinations of the year. Both these men have accepted calls to important churches. Mr. Pierce goes to Waterville and Mr. Rice to the First Church at Kingston.

To the Rev. A. R. Schrag, of Yarmouth, was granted the degree of B.D., he having passed the examinations and fulfilled

all the requirements for the degree.

The Closing Exercises were marked by the usual interesting features. The Baccalaureate Sermon was preached April 17th, in Bethlehem Church, Westmount, by the Pastor, the Rev. J. K. Unsworth, B.A., who took for his theme "The Apostle Paul—the model Pastor."

The Convocation was held in the College Hall on the Friday following. Several of the graduates who were present assisted in the presentation of the various prizes. The valedictory was given by Mr. E. LeRoy Rice, and the Rev. Robert Johnston, D.D., pastor of the American Presbyterian Church, addressed the students on the subject of "The Preacher and his Message."

PROSPECT.

We are glad to report that the outlook for the future is bright. The Faculty has been in correspondence with a number of promising young men, and already has assurance of a goodly

Freshman Class for next year.

We shall miss the Principal, who will be absent for his Sabbatic year of travel and study abroad, but we shall anticipate his return with enlarged powers for service. The Senate gladly bears testimony to his unfailing devotion to the interests of the College in its every department, as well as other branches of our denominational work. It is for him a labor of love; nevertheless, it is an exacting labor. The Senate unites with the Faculty in wishing him a pleasant and profitable year of study. It may be added that by an arrangement of classes Dr. Hill was able to take his classes through their next year's work, so that nothing was omitted.

The Senate notes with pleasure that the Governors have appointed Dr. Warriner to be Acting Principal during Dr. Hill's absence, and bespeaks the continued and earnest co-operation of all the friends, so that we may make this College an ever-increasing power for service in the Kingdom of our Lord.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA.

I am pleased to report that this has been a year of improvement and progress in the library. The indexing of the working library of the College, which was in progress at the time the last report was made, a year ago, has been completed, increasing greatly the usefulness of the library, and enabling us to guard against the unintentional purchase of duplicates. The accompanying financial report shows that \$139.81 was spent between May 14th, 1909, and May 1, 1910, on the reorganizing of the library, for supplies and services of assistants in the work of the indexing and checking the books, etc. There remains in my hands and in the hands of the College Treasurer over \$18.00 balance of the funds appropriated by you for the reorganization and administration of the library. Probably this amount would easily cover the expense of maintaining the present system for the coming year, but as it might be found desirable to make some further improvements, such as the indexing of some further portions of the library which do not belong to the working library and are not kept in the main library room, I should be glad if a sum of perhaps \$20.00 more were made available for administration purposes.

The accession book shows that one hundred and seven volumes have been added to the library during the past year, twenty-one of these by gift and the remainder by purchase. Mr. Miner has again kindly supplied the library with a fine list of periodicals; \$135.72 has been received for books and periodicals during the year, and \$125.76 spent. There being also a

balance remaining in this fund last year, there is a total balance at present of \$44.82 for books and periodicals, some of which

is reserved for special purposes.

A considerable number of duplicate copies and books not considered of further value for the library have nevertheless been useful gifts for students of the College, and others will be given to the McGill library and otherwise disposed of during this summer, so as to give needed shelf room for more useful books.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

Your Treasurer has to report a falling off in contributions

for the past year amounting to \$392.73.

Twenty churches that contributed last year have not this, and ten churches that did not last year have this; and three amounts, viz., Waterville \$35.00, Forest \$5.50, and balance of Montreal Calvary contribution \$59.00, were received too late for this year's accounts, and a balance of \$100.00 from the Presbyterian College for services rendered was also too late.

If these late ones had been in time we would have closed the year with a small balance on hand instead of a deficit in

revenue of \$177.79.

We have again to thank Mrs. Miner for her generous subscription of \$1,800.00, and Mrs. McKechnie for \$60.00 for a lectureship, but as it was not used for the purpose intended she allowed \$30.00 of the amount to be used in purchasing hymn books for the College, the balance to be reserved for the lectureship. We have also to thank Mrs. Hill for \$25.00 for elocution prizes, and Mr. Robertson Macaulay for \$120.00 for bursaries.

On behalf of the Trustees Endowment Fund I have to report an increase in the Endowment Fund of \$687.40. Of this amount \$250.00 was a legacy from the late Rev. G. Root, and \$287.40 was profit on the sale of Consolidated Rubber Bonds. The investments are all in a satisfactory shape.

CONDENSED MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Women's Board of Missions was held in the Guelph (Ont.) Congregational Church, on Thursday and Friday, May

26th and 27th, 1910, with eighty delegates attending.

The meeting was opened on Thursday morning by the President, Mrs. Moodie, who conducted the devotional exercises, speaking on "The Power of Responsibility." The necessary committees were appointed on recommendation of the Execu-Miss L. M. Miatt, of Toronto, was chosen minute secretary. The reading of reports from branches and unconnected Auxiliaries followed. "Progress" was the keynote of each-Toronto, Guelph, Paris and London particularly, while Quebec and Ottawa told of many good ideas set in motion for the coming Some sixty-one Auxiliaries and twenty-nine Mission Bands reported, an increase in both over former years. Fifteen new life members had been added to the Board, seven Auxiliary members had died. Of the new Auxiliaries were mentioned Vancouver, First, and West Montrose; of the Mission Bands, Western, Toronto, Boynton, Cowansville, Ayer's Cliff, Brandon, West Montrose, while others had been reorganized and one or two were dormant.

The noon prayer hour was conducted by Mrs. (Dr.) Steven-

son, of Toronto, and the meeting adjourned.

On Thursday afternoon the programme included the President's address, Mrs. Moodie speaking of "The Awakening of the World"; the address of welcome by Mrs. C. R. Crowe, and the reply by Mrs. Henry Wickson. The reports of the Secretary, Treasurer and Editor of the Leaflet were also given. All received eager attention and merited approval. An address by Miss M. E. Halpenny, of the Toronto Nursing-at-Home Mission, on "The Mission of the Christian Nurse," proved to be one of unusual interest and enlightenment on mission work and nursing in our large cities.

At the supper, served by the ladies of the church in the schoolroom, fraternal greetings were received from the Mission to Lepers, the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Anglican and

Lutheran Boards.

The evening meeting was a recognised Young People's Session, Miss F. B. Rawlings, Superintendent of Young People's Circles and Mission Bands, presiding. Rev. R. G. Watt. B.A., brought the greetings of the Church and the C.C.F.M.S., and excellent music was rendered by the choir. The speakers of the evening were Miss Effie Jamieson, Superintendent of Young People's Missionary Movement of the C.C. F.M.S., who spoke on "A Life Investment," and Rev. E. H. Tippett, B.A., of Hamilton, who delivered a splendid address on "The Immigrant."

After the opening devotional exercises on Friday morning the reports of the Superintendents of the ten departments of the work were presented and adopted.

That the Misses Melville and Diadem Bell be retained as our missionaries in W. C. Africa.

That \$75.00 be granted towards a scholarship in Miss Mac-Callum's School in Smyrna, Turkey.

That \$60.00 be donated for Bible instruction in four Government schools in Ceylon.

That the Board bear its share of the expenses at Chisamba Station.

That the usual grant of \$600.00 be made to the C.C.M.S.

That at least \$300.00 be contributed towards extension work in the Northwest,

That the services of Miss M. E. Halpenny be secured as nurse for Dr. Ralph's field in Saskatchewan, salary to date from September 1st, 1910.

A notice of motion was served regarding the official standing of our three lady missionaries.

The afternoon session convened half an hour before the scheduled time in order to take in a delightful excursion to the Ontario Agricultural College and Macdonald Institute, through the kindness of the Entertaining Committee.

The Resolutions Committee presented a list of some twenty items, which were agreed to. These bore directly on different phases of the work, and to that which affected the nation and womanhood particularly. Such topics as the white slave traffic, Indian customs, etc., came in for some strong condemnation.

The election of officers resulted in the return by acclamation of the President, Mrs. Moodie; the Secretary, Miss Silcox; and the Treasurer, Miss Thompson. Mrs. Henry Yeigh, of Brantford, was appointed Vice-President-at-Large, in place of Mrs. A. B. Wilkes, resigned.

A Question Drawer, conducted by Mrs. J. D. Nasmith, brought to a close a very practical session.

Mrs. Moodie, the President, presided over the Friday and closing evening session.

Mrs. Catherine Linton, of the San Pedro Mission to the Indians of Argentine, South America, and Mrs. F. A. Steven, of the China Inland Mission, gave two timely and earnest addresses, which were listened to in a silence that could be felt. Two young men rendered a beautiful duet in an exceptionally able manner, after which a very hearty vote of thanks was tendered to all who had in any and every way assisted in making the meetings such a complete success.

The Conference then adjourned, to meet in Olivet, Toronto, in 1911, when the Board celebrates its twenty-fifth anniversary.

MINUTES OF THE UNION.

The Sixty-third Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick was held in Kingsport, N.S., on Wednesday, July 6th, 1910.

The meeting was opened at 7.30 p.m., the Chairman, Rev. Astor R. Schrag, B.D., of Yarmouth, N.S., presiding.

Mr. W. J. Bevis, of Margaree, C.B., and Student A. J. Mackenzie were appointed Minute Secretaries, and Rev. J. W. Cox and Messrs. J. W. Flewelling and Jas. M. MacKendrick Nominating Committee.

Rev. Wm. J. D. Gibson, the pastor of Kingsport Church, delivered the address of welcome in a very pleasing manner,

emphasizing the fact that the church had invited the Union to help them celebrate their 150th anniversary.

Mr. Chas. E. MacMichael, of St. John, N.B., responded on behalf of the Union in a felicitous speech.

The hymn, "The Church's one Foundation," was then sung,

and Rev. J. W. Cox, B.A., of Sheffield, N.B., read an historical sketch of the Kingsport Congregational Church from 1760 to 1910.

Rev. J. K. Unsworth, B.D., of Montreal, was then called upon to address the meeting upon "The Principles and Duties of Canadian Congregationalism." As the hour was late, Mr. Unsworth asked to be allowed to hold over his address to the next day, and instead spoke a few words of hearty congratulation to the senior Congregational Church of Canada on the attainment of her 150th year, and also expressed his thanks to Mr. Cox for his interesting paper.

The offering was received for the C.C.M.S.

THURSDAY, JULY 7.

At 9 a.m. a sermon was preached by Mr. James M. Mac-Kendrick, of Economy, his subject being "The Cross Our Condemnation." The devotional services were led by Mr. J. W. Flewwelling, of St. John, N.B.

At 10 a.m. the chair was taken by the Chairman, Rev. A. R. Schrag. The sessional roll was then called as follows:

Sabbath Service.—Rev. Mr. Gibson and Mr. Davidson.

The report of the Secretary was read and adopted, and the report of the Statistical Secretary was also read and adopted,

showing signs of progress in several particulars.

The Treasurer, Mr. C. E. MacMichael, gave his annual financial statement, showing receipts \$1,005.74, expenditure \$545.00; balance on hand, etc., \$460.74. The statement was received and adopted.

Rev. James T. Daley, B.A., of Maxville, Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada, and Rev. J. K. Unsworth, M.A., of Montreal, representatives of the C.C.C and C.C. F.M.S., brought the greetings of the bodies they represented.

By motion they were received as Honorary Members of the Union. The same privilege was extended to Messrs. McKenzie, Sulston, Bevis, MacKendrick, and also to Mrs. J. H. Sulston

and Mrs. Stewart O'Brien.

NEW MEMBER.

Rev. E. J. Thompson, of Keswick Ridge, on recommendation of Membership Committee, was received into membership of the Union.

TRANSFER.

Rev. I. A. Rose, on recommendation of Membership Committee, was transferred by letter to the Hancock County Conference of Maine.

Miss Jessie B. Archibald, of Halifax, a former office bearer and charter member of the Truro Congregational Church, now disbanded, by letter requested that the Union give her credentials of ecclesiastical standing. By motion it was resolved that Miss Archibald's name be added to the list of Honorary Members of the Union; and that Rev. Mr. Cox, who was Miss Archibald's pastor, be requested to write her a letter of church standing.

The reports of the churches were then received, and were,

almost without exception, encouraging.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

At 2.30 the Union resumed business. The officers for 1910-11 were then elected.

At 2.45 Rev. James T. Daley gave an interesting address on

Church Union, showing the attitude of the Congregational Union of Canada to the question at the present time, and also some of the outstanding difficulties that will have to be overcome, before the proposed United Church will be an historical fact. At the close of the address the Chairman called for questions, and a very lively discussion took place, participated in by many of the brethren.

By motion it was resolved that the offering at the Sunday

evening service be hereafter received for the C.C.M.S.

The Secretary then read a communication from Secretary Gunn explaining his absence, and asking that the apportionment plan schedule be endorsed by the Union, and that certain matters re the Truro Church property be attended to. The letter was referred to the Union Committee.

· Rev. Mr. Unsworth spoke as Secretary Gunn's representative, and also warmly commended the duplex envelope as very helpful in financing the schemes of the Church.

THURSDAY EVENING.

At 7.30 a short praise service was held, led by Rev. Walter Cannon, whose theme was "Divine Anointing for successful service."

Rev. Astor R. Schrag, B.D., of Yarmouth, then delivered the Chairman's retiring address. His subject was "The Christian Ministry."

Rev. J. K. Unsworth then gave a masterly address on the principles and duties of Canadian Congregationalists.

The offering was received for the C.C.C.

Friday was given up entirely to the Woman's Board. The Union Committee held two strenuous sessions in the open air on the grounds of Mr. Ebenezer Cox. Many of the vital problems of the churches of our Union were discussed by the brethren.

SATURDAY, JULY 9.

At 9 a.m. a sermon was preached by Rev. E. J. Thompson. His subject was "The Cross our Justification." Mr. J. H. Sulston led in the devotional exercises.

At 10 a.m. the business of the Union was resumed.

The following recommendations of the Union Committee were passed without discussion:

1. That the official representative of the Canadian Congregationalist for the churches of the Congregational Union of N.S. and N.B. be Rev. A. R. Schrag, B.D., of Yarmouth, and that the necessary expenses of the office be paid by the Union.

2. That we forward to the Year Book copy for four pages for minutes and four pages of statistical tables, to cost not more

than \$16.

- 3. That the same Apportionment Committee be appointed as last year, namely, Rev. Mr. Schrag and Messrs. Flewelling and MacMichael, and that they draw up a schedule for 1911.
- 4. That No. 8 of the Constitution be amended to read: "The other officers shall be secretary, assistant secretary, etc."

5. That the same Union badge be continued for next year.

- 6. A council of the four churches—Milton, Liverpool, Brooklyn and Beach Meadows—be called in re pastoral readjustments and that the Chairman and Chairman-elect represent the Union on such council.
- 7. That Mr. J. W. Flewelling be authorized to print 200 copies of the act of incorporation of the churches of the Congregational Union of N.S. and N.B.
- 8. That the Economy Church be left in the hands of the Chairman of the Union, who shall arrange for a pastoral visitation, etc.

9. That the Union accept the invitation of South Maitland to meet with that church in 1911.

By motion it was resolved that hereafter there will be no public service for Saturday evening placed upon the Union

programme.

By motion of Rev. S. W. Anthony, seconded by Capt. W. P. Godfrey, and resolved, that the Truro matter, brought before the Union for the first time by Rev. W. T. Gunn's letter, lie over until next year. Also, it was resolved that the Apportionment Plan Committee send copies of the schedule of apportionments to each of the individual churches and to Rev. Mr. Gunn.

On motion of the Special Resolutions Committee it was resolved: That we hereby record the deep sense of loss sustained in the removal by death of our dear friend and brother, Rev. William McIntosh, of Ottawa, who gave so many of the best years of his life to the upbuilding of the Kingdom of God among the churches of our Union, and we take this opportunity to express our heartfelt sympathy with the sorrowing widow and fatherless children, praying that they may ever realize the sustaining grace and consolation of their loving Eternal Father.

A special resolution of condolence was also passed in re the decease of beloved members of the churches of our Union during the year, viz.: Kingsport, Miss Mary Eliza Cox and Miss Cora Huntley; Economy, Mrs. Wm. Callaghan; Chebogue, Miss Matilda Hilton; Sheffield, Mr. C. J. Burpee and Hon. Charles Burpee; St. John, Mr. Ross Hamlin; Beach Meadows, Mr. Michael Mouzer; South Maitland, Deacon C. J. White and

Mrs. Angus Rose, Sen.

Strong resolutions in re the Congregational College and Congregationalist and Temperance were moved and carried unani-

mously.

A very helpful paper was then read by Mr. Flewelling upon "The Need of the Holy Spirit by the Sunday School Teacher." The paper was written by Miss Burdett, of England, shortly before her death in the early spring of this year.

A round table upon evangelism was then conducted by the Chairman, and brought out some good points upon the subject.

A splendid outing was enjoyed by the delegates and friends, who were taken on a drive upon the far-famed Look-off of the Cornwallis mountain, from which vantage point they obtained

a bird's-eye view of the wonderful apple orchards of Evangeline land, where Canada's finest apples are grown.

SUNDAY, JULY 10.

At 11 a.m. the annual Union sermon was preached by Rev. Walter Cannon, from 2 Cor. 5: 18: "Hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation." It was a strong sermon.

The Pastor, assisted by the Chairman, presided at the Lord's

Supper at the close of the sermon.

At 2.45 a mass meeting of adults and children was held. The audience was large and deeply interested. Mr. Herbert W. Barker, of Toronto, spoke on "What men of the twentieth century can do through the Living Christ." Rev. S. W. Anthony, of St. John, spoke on "The Child the World's Hope."

At 7.30 the church was filled to overflowing. Rev. J. K. Unsworth preached an eloquent sermon from 1 Cor. 16: 9: "For a Great Door and effectual is opened unto me." His subject was "Canada's open door for a united Christianity."

At the close the prayer of consecration was made by Rev.

Mr. Daley.

The Chairman declared the Union adjourned, to meet in South Maitland in July, 1911.

Your Directors are again able to report a steady growth in membership, as well as assets.

Three new members have been added. They are: Rev. H. J. Horsey, in the W. and O.B.; Rev. Walter Cannon, in both branches; and Professor Cooke, in the W. and O.B. Last year

three new members were added, this making nine new members

in three years.

We have to sorrowfully record the passing away of the Rev. Wm. McIntosh, of Ottawa, on September 18th, 1909. He was long a staunch member of both branches. His widow is now on the fund.

In the R.M.B. sixteen churches have sent \$365.93, being \$54.99 less than twenty-eight churches gave last year.

In the W. and O.B. two churches have sent \$10.00, being

\$43.77 less than eleven churches gave last year.

The net decrease of subscriptions from the churches being therefor about \$100.00. Last year we were able to report a large increase, some 25 per cent.

The capital accounts of both funds show substantial in-

creases, however.

A communication has been received from the Quebec Association, looking to the modification of the by-laws affecting ministers who leave the country, and your Board would commend this to the incoming Board, as the matter reached us too late for action by the present Directors.
