#### CONSTITUTION.

I.—That the name of this Association be "THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA."

II.—That it shall consist of Congregational churches and of ministers of the same church order received at a general meeting, and of those laymen who have been chairmen of the Union and are members of its churches.

III.—That this Union is founded on the full recognition of the autonomy of the local churches, and therefore it shall not, in rela-

tion to them, assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal.

IV.-That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation: 1. To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination. 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated churches. 3. To establish a fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere. 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated churches, occompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary. 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces. 6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general. 7. To receive and administer such funds or other property as may at any time be given or entrusted to it.

V.—To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated churches being represented by two lay delegates, the meeting to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.

VI.—That the officers of this Union be a Chairman, General Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Statistical Secretary, and the Superintendents of departments appointed by the Union. That a committee shall also be elected annually who, with the officers, shall be the Executive Committee of the Union. The duties of the Executive shall be as follows: (1) To act as an Advisory Board with the General Secretary; (2) To prepare business for and make reports to the Union; (3) To carry out instructions of the Union: (4) To act for the Union in matters which may arise between sessions.

VII.—The various kinds of work of the Union may be committed for cultivation and guidance to departments with a Superintendent and committee for each.

VIII.—That alterations may be made in this Constitution at any annual meeting, providing that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting next preceding, or published in at least four issues of *The Canadian Congregationalist* preceding the meeting.

#### STANDING RULES.

1. Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, should be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union, shall be referred to a standing committee on membership. Churches so applying shall present the written recommendation of three members of the Union. Ministers bearing regular letters of dismissal from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of Canada, and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these grounds. Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) Their membership in a Congregational Church; (2) Their ordination to the ministry; (3) If they have come from any other denomination, their good standing therein; and they shall satisfy the Membership Committee in relation to their literary acquirements, and their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views; (4) Should the Membership Committee be satisfied on these points and recommend the applicant for membership, the recommendation shall be filed with the Recording Secretary, and the application and recommendation shall then lie over until the next annual meeting, when a two-thirds vote of the members present shall be requisite for admission into membership.

[Note.—When a minister retires from the active work of the ministry and follows some other calling by which he makes his living, his name shall be dropped from the roll, unless he makes a request that his name be retained. (See Year Book 1906-7, pages 43-44.) Permission to remain on the roll must be obtained every year; the application to be endorsed by some Congregational Church of which the applicant is a member. (Minutes, Friday, June 12th, 1908.)]

2. The Union shall meet annually on the Wednesday after the first Sabbath in June, at 9 a.m., when, if the elected chairman be absent, a chairman pro tem. shall be chosen. After a devotional service, minute sercetaries and reporters shall be appointed, the Report of the Executive Committee presented, and the Committees on Business, Membership. Nomination and Finance chosen on nomination by the Executive Committee. At 11 a.m. the Union will rise to give place to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society. The Committees appointed by the Union shall meet on the Tuesday previous to the assembling of the Union, at such time and place as may be arranged in conference with the General Secretary.

3. On Wednesday afternoon the Union will hold no public session, in order that time may be given to the work of several committees.

4. The Chairman's address shall be delivered on Wednesday evening.

5. On Thursday morning the Chairman for the next year shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, if required, and the votes shall be connted by scrutineers appointed by the Chairman. If no candidate have a majority of the votes cast, the names of two persons having the highest number shall be reported, and another vote taken. The Union will adjourn at 11 a.m. on Thursday in favor of the Canada Missionary Society.

6. The meetings shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend to an hour.

7. No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; no member shall speak twice to the same motion without permission from the chair, and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by the chair.

8. The members of the Union shall register their attendance with the Recording Secretary in a book kept for this purpose. The Minutes of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of each day's session, and the Minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

9. One of the services on the Lord's Day during the meetings of the Union shall be regarded as a session of the Union, at which the Annual Sermon shall be preached, and in connection with it the Lord's Supper shall be celebrated. The attendance of the Union is expected at this service.

10. On Monday evening, during the sitting of the Union, a public meeting of the Union shall be held, the programme of which shall be arranged by the Executive Committee.

#### THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA.

11. Application shall be made by the Statistical Secretary, one month at least before the annual meeting, for statistics of the several churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the annual meeting, and for publication if so ordered.

12. A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each church, on or near the Lord's Day prior to the meeting. From this source, the Finance Committee, after providing for other necessary expenses, shall pay in full if possible, the travelling fares of its ministerial members (providing always that no member of the Union, whether ministerial or lay, attending the meetings, shall receive anything for travelling expenses unless such ministerial member shall have contributed not less than one dollar, and the church represented by the delegate not less than five dollars to its funds): or if unable to pay in full, shall deduct from the claim of each such equal amounts as may be found necessary; such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except with leave of the Union.

13. The delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointment by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if they were present at their annual convocations.

14. All supplies of pulpits required during the Sunday in which the Union is in session, which are not otherwise provided for, shall be filled by the Nomination Committee in connection with the pastor of the church where the Union is held, and a copy of such appointment shall be posted on the door of the church where the Union is assembled.

15. In order to facilitate the introduction of properly accredited preachers to churches connected with the Union which may require pulpit supply, the General Secretary is authorized to send to secretaries or pastors of churches a list of preachers approved by the Executive Committee.

16. The term of office of the Chairman and Recording Secretary shall be the calendar year subsequent to that in which they were elected.



#### MINUTES.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 5TH, 1912.

The Union convened at 9.15 a.m. The devotional service was conducted by the Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, B.A. Mr. T. B. Macaulay, Chairman of the Union, gave the address. At 10 o'clock the business of the Union was begun.

The report of the Union Executive was presented by Rev. W. T. Gunn, General Secretary, and on his motion, seconded by Rev. Harold I. Horsey, it was received and adopted, as follows:—

Report of the Executive of the Congregational Union of Canada for the Year 1911-12.

The Executive desire to express their pleasure in again meeting in Zion Church, this time with the broader work and increased facilities of the Zion Church House.

Executive meetings have been held quarterly during the year, and the general close oversight of the churches has resulted in a very small percentage of vacant churches, short periods between pastorates and also incidentally in increased difficulty in providing sufficient places for the student's summer work.

Concerning the matters referred to the Executive by the Union, we would report as follows:---

## BASIS OF TRANSFER OF THE VARIOUS SOCIETIES TO THE CONTROL OF THE UNION.

We recommend :---

1. That it would be preferable to have the societies continue as separate corporations.

2. That steps should be taken by each society thus desiring to transfer its work, to as far as possible change its by-laws, making its Corporation to consist of the members of the Union.

3. That the details of administration for each such society be worked out along the lines of the College Constitution, in reference to the Board of Governors. This will bring all the societies agreeing to this change under the practical control of the Union, without disturbing their present legal standing, and retain the advantage of having each fund separate, and in no way liable for the other departments of our denominational work.

## MINISTERIAL STANDING.

At the present time, owing to our ministers having a double standing, in the Union and in the Association, there is somewhat of uncertainty and confusion. Your Executive submitted certain suggestions to the various associations for discussion and report. The Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will deal. with the matter at their meeting in July, but the Quebec Association, the Toronto District, Western Ontario, United Brethren and North-West Associations have all approved of the following conclusions:—

1. That ministerial standing be in the Union, that the associations transfer to other associations in Canada, but that transfer to other denominations or to our own denomination in other countries be by the Union only.

2. That membership in the local Association should constitute good and sufficient standing for membership in the Union, provided there be no valid objection to the applicant's character or training.

Where an applicant for membership in the Union resides in the territory of an organized Association, he shall bring to the Union his certificate of membership in the Association.

We therefore recommend that this be hereafter our practice, and that these clauses be referred to the Membership Committee for the preparation of an amendment to Standing Rule No. 1, which shall later be submitted to the Union.

## PUBLICATION DEPARTMENT.

We recommend as follows :----

1. That the Publication Department of the Union be a separate department, with separate funds and financial responsibility.

2. That the Union elect a Publication Committee to take over the control of the work now under the Publishing Company, on October 1st, as the Publishing Company have had to make arrangements covering the printing and publishing of the Congregationalist and Year Book to that date.

3. That the members of this Publication Committee for this year be:—Chairman, Dr. C. J. Copp, Messrs. H. O'Hara, Wm. Copp, Vincent E. Ashdown, H. W. Barker, W. Woodley, James Smith, George Pim, George H. Wilson, Rev. F. J. Day and H. W. Copp.

## STATISTICS.

The matter of a better system of reporting our denominational contributions has been considered several times during the year, and the statistical forms for next year may be somewhat changed.

In this connection it is our pleasure to report that our able Statistical Secretary, Rev. A. Margrett, has reconsidered the resignation which he handed in during the year, and has again for us this year an unusually full report, which we have had printed, in order that the results of our year's work may be more intelligently considered, and these will later be placed in your hands. It must be noted that these returns, compiled from the figures furnished by the Church Secretaries, deal in almost every case with the calendar year.

## THE APPORTIONMENT PLAN.

The Apportionment Plan, with receipts and apportionments for the denominational year, that is from June to June, for the year 1911-12, is as follows:—

## PROGRAMME OF THE UNION.

The Programme of the Union is already in your hands, and will be carried out with few alterations. It is a matter of regret that Rev. Albert Swift, the delegate of the Congregational Union of England and Wales, will not be present, owing to a call to be co-pastor of Christ Church, London, upon which we congratulate him.

We are to have the pleasure of having with us Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, D.D., Moderator of the National Council of the Congregational Churches of the United States.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

On motion of Dr. Warriner, seconded by Rev. G. Ellery Read, the Executive Report was re-opened for discussion of the clauses referring to ministerial standing in the Union. After discussion, led by Dr. Warriner, it was agreed to refer the clauses to the consideration of the Membership Committee, without instructions.

An interim Financial Report was presented by Mr. F. G. Ellis, Treasurer of the Union.

## WEDNESDAY EVENING, JUNE 5TH.

The Chairman of the Union presided. The devotional service was conducted by the Revs. J. T. Daley and W. Wye Smith, and the music was led by the choir of Zion Church. The Rev. Frank J. Day, M.A., B.D., pastor of the church, extended to the delegates the welcome of Zion Church and the sisterhood of the Montreal Congregational churches. The annual address from the Chair was then delivered by Mr. T. B. Macaulay, his subject being, "The Brotherhood Movement in Relation to the Problem of the Church and the Masses." He said :--

As Chairman of the Union it is my privilege to address you this evening. I do not think I can do better than direct your attention briefly to what I believe to be the greatest of all the problems now facing us.

If we take a broad survey of the religious conditions of our great cities, what do we see? In the upper and middle class districts we find numerous churches working with more or less success, and having considerable influence, though not as great as they should have, on the neighboring population. But when we turn to the down-town sections, what do we find? There, where humanity exists in seething numbers, the forces of evil are strongly entrenched, and the overwhelming majority of the residents rarely enter a place of worship. On this side of the Atlantic we have not such squalid slums to contend with, as in the old land, but on the other hand our problem is complicated by the influx of vast numbers of persons of foreign nationalities, who completely destroy the homogeneousness of our population. When the character of a neighborhood has changed, and the better class residents have moved out, the usual thing is for the churches to quietly follow them to the newer residential sections. Many of these church removals are unavoidable. Old districts sometimes become mere sites for factories and warehouses. In other sections the old population is replaced by people not English-speaking, and perhaps nominally Roman Catholic or Jewish in religion. In such cases the removal of a church may be necessary, for altered circumstances call for altered methods if the new-comers are to be reached. But, after all, do we not frequently see a church leave a down-town section where a large, English-speaking and nominally Protestant population still exists? Is not this in itself a confession that our present church methods fail to reach the great masses of the people? Even the churches that remain in the down-town sections usually suffer from lack of both men and means, though I could mention some glorious exceptions.

Such are, briefly, the conditions in our great cities. They are indeed serious, but not quite so discouraging as might appear at first glance. We sometimes hear the remark that the church has lost its hold upon the masses, but that is hardly the case. As the Bishop of London and others have pointed out, the church cannot be said to have lost them, for it never had them. At no time in the history of the world has there been a day when the church really had the masses of the city populations in vital, living touch with itself. The problem before us, therefore, is not how to recover something which has been lost, but how to bring into the Kingdom of God those great groups of humanity who have never hitherto been really reached. The need of these people for God

and the church is even more profound, if possible, than that of their brothers and sisters in the uptown sections.

Let us now quietly ask ourselves why it is that these great sections of the population have not hitherto been reached. Is it in accordance with the will of the Almighty that things should be as they are? Has Christ no message for the masses? Or is there any lack of divine transforming power? Not one of us believes so. If then there be no lack in God, why are the people not being reached? We may be told in general terms that the remedy is that Christians awake to their responsibility. But is even that a sufficient answer? Are there not consecrated Christians of the very highest and finest type-yes, and consecrated churches, too, that yet fail to reach the masses? As a business man, to me it seems that the problem is largely one of methods. The other morning I saw a workman upon the elevated platform of a repair waggon on our Street Railway. He handled the broken trolley wire with the utmost freedom. He was in the closest touch with that great live wire, charged with untold electrical energy, but there was nothing to show it. A street car passed, and the moment its trolley touched the wire but a few feet from where the man was calmly standing, there was a great flash of light, the wheels began to turn and the car moved on. Why was there no evidence of the presence of that tremendous energy in the wire which the workman held? Simply because he was isolated; the current had no connection with the ground. Our position as Christians is very similar. God works through human instrumentalities. We are the channels through which His transforming energy can reach humanity, but we must be connected at both ends if we are to be of any use. Even a man in close touch with the divine power house will fail to influence the masses unless he be also on the earthly side in close touch with the people who are to be reached—and that is a question of methods.

My message to-night is one of courage and brightening hope. I am, as you probably all know, an enthusiast in regard to what is known as the "Brotherhood Movement." A method has at last, I think, been found which really does reach the masses in a way that they have never been reached before. Over thirty years ago a man named John Blackham established what he called a "Pleasant Sunday Afternoon Meeting," for men in a Congregational Church in the Midlands of England. It proved attractive and successful, and gatherings of this kind rapidly multiplied

throughout the country. That was a glorious beginning, but the movement has since developed into something even greater and better. Gradually the Brotherhood idea began to be emphasized. until at last the old "P.S.A." title had been outgrown and thrown aside. To the old thought of having a pleasant time on Sunday, have been added the higher ideals of earnest Christianity, mutual helpfulness and enthusiastic co-operation for aggressive Christian work among their neighbors, and even abroad. Man is a social animal, and these gatherings of men only, where brotherhood and Christianity are strongly emphasized, appeal to all, and in this favoring atmosphere the men open their hearts to the divine influence in a marvellous way. The results already achieved almost surpass belief. I am told that in the old Country about 750,000 men gather every Sunday in meetings of this kind, and the membership is reaching steadily upwards to the million mark. The local Brotherhoods run up into thousands, and their number is rapidly increasing. The democracy of England is at last being effectively reached, and we may well bow our heads in thankfulness that the terrible problem which has baffled the church for so long seems in these latter days to be in a fair way of at least partial solution.

But there is still more to tell. Though the movement began in England, it has not stopped there. It has spread to the Continent of Europe. The attitude of the working classes there is on the whole distinctly anti-religious, and when they threw off the yoke of the Roman Catholic Church they threw off all religion, for they knew no other. Of recent years large Brotherhood delegations have crossed the Channel to France and Belgium, where they have been received with the greatest enthusiasm by the laboring and Socialist elements of the Continent. As fellow workmen they were welcomed, and as fellow workmen their message of a religion of Brotherhood has been listened to with amazement, and favor. One striking incident I remember: A great Socialist hall in a French city was crowded to the doors by an audience of 3,000, with an even larger gathering as an overflow outside. organizers of the British delegation had been told that any reference to religion might even result in bloodshed, but those great audiences listened intently, and so sympathetically, that at the close of the meeting they gave three mighty cheers for the Brotherhood movement, and, most marvellous of all, three cheers for Jesus Christ!

The history of the movement in Canada is not without interest. Over fifteen years ago the first of these societies to be established on the North American Continent, was organized in Calvary Church, Montreal. That Brotherhood is, I am glad to say, living and prospering to-day, and has been the parent of many others throughout the country. The movement was quietly though surely spreading, but the growth would have been slow had it not been that in the providence of God our British brethren were induced to take an interest in the extension of the movement within the Dominion. Mr. Thomas Howell, of Toronto, was so impressed by what he saw of the meetings in the Old Land, that he persuaded Mr. William Ward, the Honorary Secretary of the Federated Brotherhood of England, to visit Canada last year. It was a mere flying trip, but it was a great stimulus, particularly in Toronto. This spring the British Federation was invited to send a delegation to Canada, to take part in the inauguration ceremonies of the Dominion Federation, and so enthusiastically was the appeal responded to that a party of no less than 132 Brotherhood enthusiasts crossed the Atlantic, to give by their presence an impetus to the movement here. Most of them have returned, but Mr. Ward and a few others still remain. What these brethren have already accomplished almost surprises belief. Landing here on the 9th of May, meetings of great importance were held in rapid succession in Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Hamilton. At Toronto the federation of all the various brotherhoods connected with the nonconformist churches of the Dominion was formally completed. Mr. Ward and a chosen few then proceeded to Winnipeg, where a great brotherhood was organized in the First Congregational Church, and a Manitoba federation established, with Dr. Gordon as President. The delegates then proceeded to Portage la Prairie and Regina, establishing a brotherhood in each place. They then passed to Calgary, confirming and inspiring the existing Brotherhoods there; then on to Vancouver, and back to Edmonton, at both of which places I understand steps were taken to organize a brotherhood. The preliminary work had, of course, been already done by tremendous and unsparing efforts of Mr. Howell and others, of whose work it is impossible to speak too highly. But it was the stimulus of the visit of our British brethren which rendered their work effective. The movement has now taken deep root throughout the Dominion, and those of us who understand its vast potentialities must have hearts that overflow with gratitude to Al-

mighty God for the blessing which has in this way come to our land, and in thankfulness and appreciation to the great delegation from Britain, to whom we owe so much. It is almost invidious to mention names, and yet I cannot but feel that we are under a special obligation to Mr. Ward, with his boundless energy and enthusiasm; to Rev. R. Moffat Gautrey, with his impressive eloquence; to the Rev. William Lindsay, President of the Scottish Union; and Mr. R. J. Harry, the International Secretary. We can now look forward delightedly to a steady development of this mighty movement in Canada, and I hope before long to see it spread also from us to the United States, to bless and refresh that country, as I expect it to bless and refresh us.

But how do these facts affect us personally? It is interesting to remember that this movement is another evidence of the individuality which our Congregational system tends to develop in the laymen of our churches, for it was founded by a Congregational layman in a Congregational church. But whatever its origin, we cannot but recognize that a new and powerful instrumentality has been placed in our hands for the extension of the kingdom of God. It is not a mere theory, for it has long passed the experimental stage, and its value has been clearly proved. Let me then bespeak for the movement a hearty and sympathetic welcome at your hands. Every one of our pastors will do well to quietly, prayerfully, ask himself whether he will not be acting wisely if he takes steps for the establishment of a brotherhood in his own church. Possibly some modifications may be required to suit special circumstances, but my strong advice would be to cling to the brotherhood idea, and to follow closely the lines that have been tried and proved, if you would expect the highest measure of If properly directed, effort along these lines will success. certainly result in bringing multitudes of men to God.

But even a brotherhood will not run itself. There are a few brief, practical suggestions which I take the liberty of making to those who may undertake to organize one:

First, study the conditions of your city or town, until you get a vision of its needs. Look outside your little church-going flock. Quietly canvass the situation, and you will be surprised how many people there are at your very doors who are practically outside the influence of any church, even though they be called by some denominational name. If you then listen for the still, small voice, you will certainly hear God calling you to reach these people in

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some way with His message of love and His uplifting power. Your divine commission is "Go ye into all the world and tell the good tidings to every creature." Do you believe that we are carrying out that message, if, instead of going to the people, we content ourselves with preaching to such of the people as choose to come to us? If a business employer gave instructions to an employee to go to certain people, and to deliver to them a business message, and that employee, instead of literally carrying out his instructions, opened an office in which he could speak to such people as might choose to come to him, fully realizing that threequarters of them would never come to him at all, would he be considered to be obeying his instructions? I think that we as pastors and as laymen must realize that we are, most of us, in just this way, entirely failing to reach three-quarters of the people whom we have been given a commission to reach, and that knowledge should make us humble and earnest, and ready to welcome anything that will help us to carry out the mission entrusted to Study the brotherhood movement carefully, and see whether 118. it does not provide just the tool you need with which to do the work you have hitherto failed to accomplish.

If you conclude that a brotherhood would be helpful to your church, then act, and act quickly. The world is full of good intentions that never come to anything. The man who fails to act, who allows himself to be conquered by inertia, or by the press of routine engagements, is the man who fails to accomplish much in life. But he who rises superior to these temptations, and brings his good intentions down from the clouds of nebulous thought into concrete active deeds, is the man who makes his mark on the world. Perhaps you will permit me to add that if you want details of how to proceed, I will be glad to give you every suggestion and assistance in my power.

When planning new work, do not attempt to do everything yourself. Organize! Select one man after another carefully for various positions in connection with the brotherhood, and then put the responsibility on to that one man, or on to that committee. Keep in close sympathetic touch with the organization, exercising a quiet, guiding influence in regard to it, but do not attempt to manage it yourself. The pastor who can get others to work will accomplish vastly more than even the most gifted man who attempts to do everything himself. One great secret of the brother-

hood success is that all the members can become missionaries by inviting their chums to the meetings. Get them to work,

Closely allied to this last suggestion, in another, which I venture to make. Be systematic. The unsympathetic man loses half of his time. The hours of his days which should be freighted with their cargo of accomplished deeds of permanent value, slip by, almost unladen, simply because he has done no advance planning as to how they should be filled. The business man who does not plan his time ahead, comes to the end of his year with but little really accomplished. To my knowledge many of the men who have accomplished most in the business world, and who are looked up to for their success in life, make a practice of preparing a memorandum each evening, of work to be done, and calls to be made, the following day. This is, in fact, the only way by which the business man who has to make his own appointments, and map out his own work, can utilize the hours to full advantage, and this remark applies to brotherhood leaders also, and to every Christian pastor or Christian worker who has the mapping out of his own work.

These, too, have a definite purpose, and work with that purpose constantly in view. That purpose should be to bring every member of the brotherhood into such close personal relation with his God, that his life will be transformed, and he himself made into a missionary to reach others. Do not be content with mere attendance at meetings. Of what value is it to get a man to a meeting, or even to many meetings, unless his life be changed? We must work for more definite results. If you will pardon the comparison: What would a life assurance agent be worth who talked generalities regarding his business? Or who only talked to people in groups or assemblies? He would starve, and he would deserve To obtain actual results, personal visitation of the to starve. homes is essential. This must usually be done in the evenings in order to reach the men. What an opportunity a successful brotherhood gives to the pastor of the church! If he be an officer of the brotherhood, the magic of that name will open to him every door of the nominally Protestant but, too often, non-church-going, element of the population. But of what value is it to have open doors, if the pastor and brotherhood officers do not then enter them? I can bear my personal testimony to the splendid results which follow such personal visitation. It should be carried out on the basis of brotherly sociability, but we should keep it on a

higher level than the mere social call, so as to encourage the men of the house, and after them the other members of the family, to definitely commit themselves to the service of our Lord. We are His representatives, and when we have the privilege of being welcomed in this way in the homes of non-church-going people, we would be recreant if we devoted the whole of the time to gossip or frivolity. The opportunities which a brotherhood gives to its consecrated officers are sacred.

And now I have done. It has been my privilege to tell you a little of a religious movement that has already become a great world force, and which has now reached our shores. May God grant that it prove as great a blessing to this continent as it has already proved in the Old Land, and that we here to-night may do our share to still further increase its influence, and that we may in return receive our share of the blessings which from it will flow.

The usual collection of the funds of the Union was taken. At the conclusion of the meeting the Benediction was pronounced by the Rev. W. Wye Smith.

## THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 6TH.

The session commenced at 9 o'clock. The devotional service was conducted by the Rev. A. F. Pollock. Dr. Schofield gave the first of a series of addresses on "The Soul's Relation to God." Business was begun at 10 o'clock, the Chairman presiding.

The minutes of the Wednesday's sessions were read and confirmed.

### Report of Membership Committee.

The Committee reported on communications and applications that had been referred to them.

That the names of the Revs. J. P. Gerrie, B.A., pastor of the Union Church, Kerrobert, Sask., and the Rev. Charles Pedley, B.A., Woodstock (out of charge), be retained upon the roll;

That the Rev. G. Watt Smith, M.A., be granted a letter of dismissal from the Union, according to his request;

That the Rev. William Chambers, D.D., of Adana, Turkey, be invited to sit as a corresponding member of the Union;

That in regard to the Rev. Wm. Dalton's application to be

placed on the list of Congregational Ministers in Canada, "out of charge temporarily," accompanied by a certificate of "full standing" from the Secretary of the Congregational Union of Englland and Wales, your committee is in doubt as to the interpretation of these decuments, and would recommend that they be placed in the hands of the Executive to admit Mr. Dalton to membership in the Union, should that be his desire, and on condition that the certificate received, or to be received, be found to constitute a "letter of transfer." In the meantime, Mr. Dalton's name be placed on the printed list of Congregational Ministers in Canada;

[Since the meetings of the Union, Mr. Dalton has forwarded a regular transfer from the Congregational Union of England and Wales, thus becoming, by the terms of the resolution, passed a full member of the Union].—G. E. R., Sec.

That the Revs. T. De Courcy Rayner and G. S. Gervin, be granted membership in the Union;

That the application for membership in the Union from Rev. John R. Heyworth of Paris, be laid over for a year in accordance with Standing Rule 1, (4). The name of Mr. H. W. Copp was added to the Publication Committee.

The Recording Secretary was empowered to condense the minutes of the proceedings for publication.

The Membership Committee was instructed to institute a search for the records of the application of the Pinwherry Church, Sask., for membership in the Union.

The Rev. Albert Margrett, Satistical Secretary, presented his annual report. On motion of the Rev. F. J. Day, seconded by Rev. G. Ellery Read, the full presentation of the report was deferred to Friday morning, with the understanding that it be given first place on the order of business for the day.

The Revs. E. LeRoy Rice and A. G. Sleep were appointed to act as scrutineers for the election of Chairman for the year 1913. The Rev. G. Ellery Read, of Sherbrooke, was declared elected on the second ballot.

The meeting then adjourned.

## FRIDAY, JUNE 7TH.

The session commenced at 9 o'clock. The devotional service was led by the Rev. D. C. MacIntosh, and Dr. Schofield gave the

second of the series of addresses on "The Soul's Relation to God." Business was begun at 10 o'clock, the Chairman presiding.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and confirmed.

## CENTURY OF PEACE.

The Business Committee reported through Rev. Herbert Moule:---

That in response to a communication from Ottawa relating to the proposed celebration of the Century of Peace in 1915, we recommend the following:—"We rejoice to place on record our sympathy with the movement looking towards a joint celebration of the Century of Peace between Great Britain and the United States in the year 1915, and will do all that is within our power as a representative assembly, as well as individual churches, to co-operate with the Association that is to be formed for the purpose of making arrangements and carrying out the plans. We further recommend that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to George Burn, Esq., of Ottawa."

The Committee recommends that next year a place on the programme be given to the Canadian Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The report was adopted with the amendment that the recommendation in regard to the Bible Society be referred to the Executive without instructions.

A communication from the Rev. D. S. Hamilton, asking that his name be retained on the roll of the Union, and enclosing five dollars, was referred to the Membership Committee.

## Report of the Committee on Church Union.

Two years ago your Committee reported the result of the tentative vote of our churches and members on the proposed Basis of Union prepared by the joint Committee of the three negotiating bodies, Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational. That report showed (a) as to the churches—That 67 per cent. of the total number voted, and of these 80 per cent. were in favor of Union on the proposed basis—representing 50 per cent. of the total number; (b) as to membership—That the membership of the voting churches was 73 per cent. of the total membership in our churches; that a little less than one-half of these churches expressed any opinion,

but that 78 per cent. of the votes cast were in favor of Union. Thus of the voting churches, 80 per cent. were in favor of union, and of the voting members, 78 per cent. Returns coming in after the report was printed, but reported at the time to the Union, raised both these numbers to 82 per cent.

The Union, in adopting the report, declared that it considered the action it had taken sufficient for the time being, and would "now wait until the other negotiating bodies have had an opportunity" of testing to a corresponding degree the feeling of their constituencies."

That time has now arrived. The various committees of the Methodist Church are now reporting to their Annual Conferences, and the Presbyterian General Assembly now meeting in Edmonton, will hear the report of its Committee.

We have no official report as to the results of the vote in the Methodist Church, but from all we can learn, we understand that the total vote in favor of Union will certainly not be less than our own. We learn from the latest figures of the voting in the Presby-terian Church, that 55 per cent. of the membership voted; that of the elders voting,  $71\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. voted for Union, and of the members voting, 69 per cent. were in favor of Union. This is an advance on the numbers published in April last, and on which the Committee based its report to be presented at the General Assembly now in session.

That report, as printed in the public press, contains the following resolution:—

"This committee is of the opinion that the large vote of the Church in favor of organic union demands some definite action in the direction of closer union between the negotiating churches, though the strong minority in opposition shows that organic union is not feasible at present. It recommends that the Union Committee be reappointed to continue such negotiations as the General Assembly may order relating to union with the Methodist and Congregational Churches in the belief that organic union may yet be consummated. The committee is of opinion that the Assembly should proceed at once in the direction of co-operation as far as practicable in the mission work in home and foreign fields, also in the educational work in the theological colleges and in the official publications of the negotiating churches."

What action will be taken on this report we cannot foretell. If adopted, it will mean that the proposed Union cannot be im-

mediately effected. Your Committee would regret such a result, and yet they would not see in it any indication of the defeat of the Union Sentiment, or any ground for the loss of hope in its final triumph. What has been achieved is a result for which we may well be grateful. That the majority of the members of these three bodies, who exercised their right to vote, should express themselves as desirous of union in one great Christian fellowship, is significant both of loyalty to our common Lord and Master, and of confidence in each other. We agree with the report of the Presbyterian Committee, that the large vote of the church, both theirs and ours, "demands some union between the negotiating churches."

We recommend, therefore, that the Committee be continued, with instructions to co-operate with corresponding Committees of the other two churches, in the endeavor to foster in every way the spirit of Christian fellowship, and to give it practical expression in the life of the church.

In closing our report, we would note two interesting illustrations of the movement towards closer union among the various denominations. In Montreal, the authorities of our College have taken action with those of other Theological Colleges in that city, looking to co-operative work on the part of the Professors and the union of classes in Common Courses. The scheme, which has already been formulated, will be put into operation at the opening of the next session. In the far West, as the result of the growing sentiment in favor of Union, independent Union Churches have sprung up in several places, and there has arisen among these the feeling that some form of co-operation with the three negotiating churches may be desirable. A communication has been received to this effect from the pastor of one of these churches, by the chairman of your Committee, and one has been sent by another pastor to the Secretary of this Union. The matter having been referred to this Committee by your Executive, we would recommend that it be placed in the hands of the Church Union Committee, with power to appoint a sub-committee to act with any similar committee that may be appointed by the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches, should such co-operation be deemed advisable.

The Statistical Secretary then completed his report. After discussion, Mr. A. Wickson moved, and Dr. Warriner seconded, that the hearty thanks of the Union be tendered Mr. Margrett, for his work in preparing so thorough a report. Carried.

## SATURDAY MORNING, JUNE 8TH.

The session commenced at 9 o'clock. Devotional services were conducted by the Rev. A. G. Sleep, and Dr. Schofield gave the third of the series of addresses on "The Soul's Relation to God." Business was begun at 10.15, the Chairman presiding.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and confirmed.

A letter of sympathy with Mr. Henry O'Hara, prepared by the Recording Secretary on request of the Union, was read and endorsed.

An application from the church in Edmonton for membership in the Union was referred to the Membership Committee.

A telegram from the Rev. D. S. Hamilton of Winnipeg, announcing the payment of the balance of the debt on the First

Church, London, through the generous donation of a friend, was read by the General Secretary. The message was received with applause from the Union.

The Rev. W. T. Gunn was unanimously re-elected General Secretary. The Union through the Chairman, expressed its appreciation of the value of Mr. Gunn's work.

A resolution of sympathy with the widow and family of the late Rev. John McKillican, in their bereavement, was adopted by a standing vote.

Greetings were presented to the Union from the C.C.W.M.B. by Miss Silcox; from the Western Extension Society, by Mr. Arthur Wickson; from the Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, by the Rev. E. J. Thompson, Chairman of that Union, and informally from the churches of England and Wales, by Mr. James E. Liddiard, F.R.G.S., of Bournemouth, England.

Dr. Warriner, for the committee appointed to investigate the charges against the Rev. Robert Barron, reported :---

Your committee having made a careful investigation of the case of Rev. Robert Barron, recommend that his name be dropped from the roll, and that a statement of the facts of the case, prepared by the Committee, together with all related papers, be filed with the Recording Secretary.

The report was adopted on motion of Dr. Warriner, seconded by Rev. G. Ellery Read.

A vote of thanks to the Rev. D. S. Hamilton for his interest in the First Church, London, was moved by the Rev. M. Kelly, seconded by the Rev. W. E. Gilroy, and unanimously adopted.



An application for membership in the Union from the First Church, Vancouver, was referred to the Membership Committee.


The meeting then adjourned.

was also conducted by Mr. Day, assisted by the deacons of Zion and sister churches. The prayers of thanksgiving were offered by the Rev. W. Wye Smith and Mr. T. B. Macauley. The closing address was given by Rev. G. Ellery Read. An offering was taken in behalf of the Provident Fund Society.

## MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 10TH.

The devotional service was conducted by the Rev. James Daley: At 10 o'clock the Union convened for business when, owing to the absence of the Chairman, Mr. Daley was elected chairman protem.

The minutes of Saturday's proceedings were read and confirmed.

Rev. Harold I. Horsey reported for the Standing Committee on Young People's Work. On motion of Rev. W. W. Smith, seconded by Rev. G. Ellery Read, the report was received. After some discussion, the report was adopted.

The Membership Committee recommended that the Rev. A. J. Mackenzie be received as a member of the Union; that the name of the Rev. D. S. Hamilton be retained on the roll; that no action be taken on the application of the Rev. J. B. Johnston for membership in the Union, which was laid over from last year, since he has now left the country; that the application of the Rev. Byron Stauffer be received and lie on the table for a year, in accordance with Standing Rule.

The Committee further recommended that, the list of personal members of the Union be amended by striking out all names but those coming under Article 2 of the Constitution;

That in regard to the clauses in the Secretary's Report looking to changes in Standing Rule 1, and which were remitted to the Committee for consideration, that the matter lie on the table and be referred again to the Committee. Meanwhile as meeting to some extent the purpose of the proposed changes, the adoption of the following resolution was recommended:—

"Resolved that in the interest of good order the various district or other associations within the bounds of the Union be requested to make a rule not to give letters of transfer or standing for use outside of Canada, to men who are members of the Union.

The report was adopted.

The Rev. A. G. Sleep was appointed delegate to the General

Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ottawa, and the Rev. Frank J. Day to the Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The meeting then adjourned.

The Union assembled for its closing meeting at 8.15, the Chairman presiding. Devotional services were conducted by the Rev. T. De Courcy Rayner and W. E. Gilroy, B.A. The music for the evening was under the direction of organist and choir of the Point St. Charles Church.

The Recording Secretary was instructed to complete the minutes of the day's proceedings with the understanding that they be taken as read.

The Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, on behalf of the Business Committee, presented a series of resolutions of thanks to the Chairman, for the able manner in which he had presided over the meetings, and for his helpful and inspiring address; to Dr. Schofield for his addresses; to Dr. Boynton, Moderator of the National Congregational Council of the United States; to the Rev. Byron H. Stauffer, Dr. Chambers of Adana, Turkey; to Dr. Sparling of the St. James Methodist Church, Montreal, and to all who had contributed so freely of their time and services, and had been so instrumental in making the meetings of the Union a success. Thanks was also tendered for the hospitality extended by the ladies of the churches, and to the choirs and all who had assisted in the musical services.

The following resolution was also adopted :---

That this Union place on record its loyalty to our beloved sovereign, King George the Fifth; its gratitude that he has sent one of the Royal family, the Duke of Connaught, to be Governor-General of Canada; its thankfulness that the beloved Consort of the Duke is pronounced out of danger from the disease from which she is suffering, and its hope and prayer that she may be speedily restored to complete health.

The usual collection was taken in behalf of the funds of the Union.

The Rev. G. Ellery Read, Chairman elect, delivered an address on "The 250th Anniversary of the Passing of the Act of Uniformity." At the conclusion of the address he was thanked on behalf of the Union by the Chairman. The Benediction was pronounced by Mr. Read, and the meetings of the Union were closed.

## CANADA CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

## CONSTITUTION.

## ARTICLE I.-NAME.

This Corporation shall be called "The Canada Congregational Missionary Society," and shall conduct its operations within the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

### ARTICLE II.---OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be as set forth in the Act of Incorporation, namely, to plant and to foster Congregational Churches in suitable localities; to aid churches in sustaining their pastors where required.

## ARTICLE III.—MEMBERSHIP.

All persons being members or adherents of Congregational Churches, paying two dollars annually into the funds of the Society, shall be members, and those who *subscribe at one time twenty dollars or more* shall be life members. Churches subscribing annually ten dollars or more may be represented at the annual meeting of the Society by one delegate, and churches subscribing fifty dollars or more may be represented by two delegates. Each auxiliary branch contributing annually to the funds of the Society ten dollars or more may be represented by one delegate. The above-mentioned subscribers and delegates shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

## ARTICLE IV.-OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, an Honorary President, a Secretary, an Honorary Secretary, a Treasurer, a Superintendent of Immigration may also be appointed. The Standing Committees shall be a General Committee and an Executive Committee. These officers and committees shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall be members of the Corporation. The General Committee shall consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent, Educational Secretary,

Superintendent of Immigration, Honorary President and Honorary Secretary, and not more than twenty-five members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Honorary President, the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Superintendent, the Honorary Secretary, the Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration Department, one member from each District Association within the bounds of the operations of the Society, and one from the Winnipeg Congregational Church Extension and Building Society, and these members shall hold office from the date of their election by their various Associations.

#### ARTICLE V.—DUTIES.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and its committees, when practicable, and shall seek to promote the general interest of the Society's work.

The Secretary shall have charge of the books and correspondence of the Society, shall call the meetings of the Society and its committees, and shall exhibit the records of the proceedings at each meeting.

The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Society, disbursing them as directed by the General or Executive Committee, and shall present annually a full account of all receipts and disbursements.

The Superintendent shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, to whom he shall report quarterly, visit the churches of the Congregational order within the bounds of the Society's operation with a view of deepening their interest in its work, and of securing liberal contributions for the Society, and shall explore new mission fields, secure missionaries for vacant churches, and have a general oversight of the interests and work of the Society.

The Auditors shall examine the accounts of the Society when required, and make an annual audit of the Treasurer's books previous to the annual meeting of the Society.

The General Committee shall exercise all the corporate powers of the Society, have charge of annual mission grants made to the churches, examine, employ and direct all the missionaries of the Society, and have a general supervision of its affairs. They shall present a report of the work of the Society at each of its annual meetings.

The Executive Committee shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society during the interval between the annual meeting of the General Committee; shall receive all applications from churches for aid from the Society, and report thereon to the General Committee, to whom they shall make an annual report of their proceedings.

#### ARTICLE VI.-MEETING.

The Corporation shall meet annually on the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles. A public annual missionary meeting shall be held on the evening of the next day. Special meetings for the despatch of special business may be called by the Executive Committee at such time and place as may be deemed desirable, provided that a month's notice be given thereof. The General Committee shall hold their meeting at the same time and place as the Corporation, at the call of the Secretary; and the Executive Committee shall hold their quarterly meeting at the time and place it may be agreed upon.

#### ARTICLE VII.-CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

All sums of money specially collected, given or bequeathed for the purpose, together with the proceeds received from the sale of disused church property, shall form a Church Extension and Building Fund, which shall be invested by the Corporation, who may apply the income thereof, by the General or Executive Committee, by the way of loans, or otherwise, for the organization of churches in new fields, and for the erection or enlargement of places of worship where they may be required.

#### ARTICLE VIII.-AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Auxiliary branches of this Society may be formed in churches and localities, to co-operate in the work of the Society. Each branch shall, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, make an annual report to the Secretary and send to the Treasurer all funds collected on its behalf.

# ARTICLE IX.-MISSIONARIES.

Each missionary in the employment of this Society must be a regularly accredited member of a Congregational Church, and shall endeavor faithfully to promote all the interests of the Congregational denomination in Canada. He shall send to the Secretary a half-yearly statement of his work, and furnish such statistical returns as may be called for.

#### ARTICLE X.-MISSIONS.

Each church requiring a missionary grant by the General Committee must make application therefor through the Secretary, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, according to the printed forms provided, in which a certificate to the effect that all previous pledges of support to its pastor have been fulfilled shall be inserted. Churches aided by this Society are required to make an annual collection for the funds and to keep their property sufficiently insured and such churches acquiring property shall have inserted in the Trust Deed a clause providing that in case the church shall at any time be disbanded or cease to exist the property shall revert to the Society.

#### ARTICLE XI.-RECEIVING AND DISMISSING PASTORS.

Churches aided by this Society are required, as far as practiclable, in the settlement and dismissal of pastors, to carry out the recommendations passed by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, in 1876, in relation to Councils. In cases where this is impracticable, the sanction of the Executive Committee must be obtained before a settlement or dismissal of a pastor is consummated.

#### ARTICLE XII.—CONVEYING PROPERTY.

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate, and to discharge mortgages, and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person, on behalf of the Corporation, to accept conveyances of real estate and to receive mortgages. The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may require it.

#### ARTICLE XIII.-AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of twothirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, one day's notice having previously been given of the proposed amendment, in writing.

### NOTICE.

It is becoming more than ever a practice among Christian people to recognize the Lord's portion in their Last Wills and Testaments, whereby, though they be dead, they speak and act in the furtherance of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent objects. American Congregationalists are among the most wise and generous in this day, and have left legacies of blessings for succeeding generations. Among the members of our Congregational churches in Canada there have also been those who have followed a likewise generous course.

For the guidance of those who may desire to make like bequests, the following legal form is subjoined. The amount bequeathed may be devoted specially to the Church Extension and Building Fund, in which case the income would only be used, or may be given for the general purposes of the Society.

### FORM FOR A BEQUEST.

I give and bequeath to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, incorporated by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, A.D. 1885, the sum of \$...... out of my estate, to be paid ...... without any charge or deduction whatever, and I direct that the receipt of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Society shall constitute and be a sufficient discharge thereof.



# FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANADA CON-GREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Your Executive have pleasure in presenting this fifty-ninth annual report. The year has been one of very encouraging difficulties in our work, which has grown in many ways faster than our growing finances could keep pace.

A survey of the progress of the last five years in our Home Mission work as summed up for our annual leaflets, showed a gain in annual church contributions of over 80 per cent., and that gifts to Church Extension in Montreal, Winnipeg, Toronto and Ottawa which did not pass through our books, were close to \$60,000.00, while the gain in value of our aided churches in the five years was nearly \$100,000.00.

This year also has been marked by growth in many far-scattered places, for our Society assists in the support of 45 pastors and students ministering to 55 churches and 40 stations.

In a brief survey of the fields, beginning in the far East, we find Margaret, Cape Breton, has had a good year under Mr. W. J. Bevis. Milton, N.S., has lost some good supporters, and also its pastor, Rev. W. Cannon, who accepted a call to Forest. Pleasant River, with its scattered field, under Rev. G. W. Ball, has added 12 members. Economy continues as usual, under Mr. J. H. Sulston. Liverpool, under Mr. H. G. Wright, has added a new organ to their equipment. Kingsport has just lost their pastor, Mr. Geo. Miller, after a very brief pastorate. St. John, N.B., was much helped by Rev. J. T. Tucker's work, and now under Rev. H. S. Mahood, is encouraged by larger evening congregations, and will, we hope, soon cease to need the present large grant.

In Quebec, Fitch Bay, under Rev. R. Wilson Carr, may soon add another station to its care, and in Ayer's Cliff some expected rivalry has been avoided, both signs of the growing spirit of denominational co-operation.

Our work in Montreal has been very cheering. Point St. Charles has in a very wonderful way, through the aid of the sister churches, been able to enter into their new building, completed and free of debt, and their faithful work has been rewarded by an ingathering of souls. Amherst Park has added very largely to its membership, and is planning a new \$20,000.00 building. Union Church has increased both its membership and its Building Fund. Franklin





Centre is still under student care, and has recovered from its difficulties of a couple of years ago.

In Eastern Ontario, Ottawa South has had a good year, under Rev. A. G. Sleep, and they are industriously working away at their small debt, in order to clear the way for a new church building. Kingston 1st, under Rev. E. Le Roy Rice, reports a good year also; they are renovating their building, and cut their application for grant in half this year. Kingston, Calvary, loses its Pastor, Rev. H. W. Whitmore, but is in good circumstances every way, happily supplied for the summer by Student Orr, and Rev. Sydney J. Butler has accepted their call and begins work in September.

In the Toronto District. Cobourg has gone along happily under Rev. A. F. Pollock, and Barrie remains about the same as last year, under Wm. Hipkin. Humber Summit and Pine Grove, supplied by Rev. C. R. Ashdown, need no aid at present. Churchill has student supply.

In the Western Association, Hamilton, Immanuel, have bricked their church an enlarged it, with a new brick front, and plan to raise their minister's salary. Stratford has secured Rev. A. E. Cooke as pastor, added 27 members, and renovated their building with the proceeds of sale of the old parsonage lot. Woodstock has been without a pastor since the first of the year and needs very considerable help. At present Student Samson is in charge.

Forest Lake Shore and Ebenezer have joined with the Forest Central and Plympton Churches in a large and strong circuit that will need no aid.

The United Brethren Association are doing good work, and have fully repaid all our grants to their churches.

In the West. St. James Park, Winnipeg, under Rev. Edgar Whitehouse, has had a good year, assumes \$300.00 of their pastor's salary, and is enlarging its rooms for young people's work.

Crescent, Winnipeg, takes over its property from the Extension Society, repaying \$3,000.00, and assuming the \$6,000.00 mortgage, and in response to Rev. J. G. Hindley's challenge, assumes \$300.00 of their pastor's salary now, and the whole of it by Jan. 1st, 1913. A site has also been secured for Settlement work in the North End, making the third cause now under the Extension Society in Winnipeg. The Extension Society is also aiding this year the work in Landis and Carleton Union. Rev. Ernest R. Weeks resigned last September his Superintendency of the Ex-

tension Society, and accepted the position of Assistant Pastor of Central Church.

Brandon has doubled its membership under Rev. A. J. Mac-Kenzie, and plans for a new building. Glyndwr, under Rev. W. T. Morris, is doing without aid this year. Dr. Ralph in Carleton Union, has consolidated his field and plans to build a new church at Sanche's Corners. In Landis the Institute and Branch Churches South, under Rev. G. H. Hindley, have done good work, though frozen crops held down their finances. Mr. M. H. Harris supplied Nasby for the winter very acceptably, and Student Watson is in charge for the summer.

Calgary suffers the loss of its Pastor, Rev. A. R. Schrag, whose resignation takes effect June 30th, but the church has made good on the sale of the present site, they expect to build a church and parsonage. In Edmonton a new church was formed in January, and though they have as yet no pastor, their roll has increased to progress and bought a new site in the south-west of the city, where, 62 members. Through the kindly offer of Dr. Warriner of his services for two months in the work of our Society this summer, we have been able to promise them his help for July and August.

Our Swedish work has been as usual, Pastors Sanden, Anderson and Hallberg ministering to the regular fields, while Rev. B. A. Person has acted as a travelling missionary among the scattered Swedish settlers for most of the year.

A new Dano-Norwegian Church at Carlstadt, Alta., with three out-stations, has been added to our forces under Rev. Nils C. Barrie, who, with his people, moved from the Western States and took up homesteads.

Under Rev. F. A. Willman, our German work in Alberta has grown from three churches with 62 members, some 18 months ago, to eight churches with 165 members, with occasional preaching at a number of other stations.

In Vancouver the First Church has just bought the site in Kitsilano for a branch Church and Sunday School, and the building will be put up this summer.

A site of three lots in a new suburb of Sherbrooke, Que., has been offered to our church in that city for a branch church and Sunday school.

Altogether nine new churches, three of them city lands, in Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver, five new German churches and

one new Norwegian church, together with the progress in other fields, is a good decord for one year.

The George Robertson Fund we have used in supporting Rev. J. T. Tucker, whose work in St. John did much to save the situation there, and we had planned to use him for more strictly evangelistic work when he was taken back by the Foreign Missionary Society for a tour among the churches and service abroad. We have also used this fund in helping special services in five churches, assisted by various evangelists, with some 160 conversions as a visible result.

Our Church Extension and Building Fund has been used this year, \$250.00 in assisting the Watford people to rebuild their burned church, and the new church was happily reopened last fall. We also aided the Point St. Charles Church with \$2,000.00 in their final victorious campaign for the opening of their new building free of debt. \$250.00 went to aid Hamilton Immanuel in the building and enlarging of their church.

One of the interesting matters of the year has been the discovery and recovery of two separate funds belonging to Salem Church, Halifax, one dating from 1880, and one from 1886, amounting to over \$1,120.00. This has been added to the capital of the Building Fund.

In matters of property under our care, the Parkdale property has been sold for \$4,500.00, and this less amounts expended, will be a trust fund for Extension in Toronto. Zion Church, Toronto, is still rented, as no offer satisfactory to your Committee has vet been received. The Nelson property has been sold to the First Presbyterian Church for \$6,000.00, and this amount will go back to the capital of the Building Fund. The Truro property has not yet been sold, nor have the Alton trustees yet deeded the parsonage to our Society. We still hold the quarter section near Wetaskiwin, and the two lots in Grandview, Vancouver.

Part of the Stratford property, the site of the old parsonage, has been sold, and the balance applied, after payment of a small debt upon the mortgage, to the renovation of the church.

In the matter of the Jubilee Fund liens, of which we are trustees for the Union, Victoria has paid over to us \$2,000.00, temporarily; Vancouver 1st repaid \$3,230.00, of which \$1,500.00 has been put into the site of their new branch. Ottawa 1st has subscribed enough to allow their lien to be replaced as a second

mortgage on the new building, and Bethlehem's debt to the Jubilee Fund will be repaid when the sale to Calvary is completed.

In securing summer work for the College students, we were met with considerable difficulty, for the churches were well supplied with pastors, and few vacant churches were available. As our closer organization becomes more and more effective in supervision of the churches, this problem of finding temporary supply for so many men will increase, especially as we have no fields that are open in the summer months only. This year places were made for ten men, two returned home for the summer, and three students were loaned to the Presbyterian Board.

We owe a debt to our College Professors for the amount of work freely given by them to the men taking special courses under our care in various fields. The men have in several cases allowed the field work to unduly prolong their courses, and we are grateful to our College Professors for their patience and care in this matter.

We are also under a debt of gratitude to our Woman's Board for their direct contributions to our treasury and for their many contributions to the comfort and happiness of our workers in the field.

The Colonial Missionary Society have also continued their grants to Dr. Ralph's work, the Brandon Church and Rev. E. R. Week's salary till his resignation, and have helped even more in their contribution of young men to our College to be trained for the ministry of our churches.

At our General Committee meeting last year, when it was found that after all possible pruning, the applications for grants came to some \$4,700.00 more than our estimated income, the Committee decided to make the full grants and appeal to the churches to make up their Apportionments in full, as this would about realize the amount needed. This your officers carried out, bringing the matter before the various associations and local churches, both personally and by letter. There have been some increases in gifts, and there are this year voluntary reductions in the grants applied for of over \$1,000.00, but with it all we are left for the first time in years with a large deficit, and the new Committee will have to very materially reduce the grants or increase the contributions.

It is a satisfaction. however, to know that this deficit arises not from decreased contributions or failing churches, but from the

large amount of new, aggressive and healthy work undertaken in the last few years. This has grown faster than our growing contributions.

The various departments of our work, Educational, Immigration and Financial, will be fully presented in separate reports.

It is of interest to note that the total amount raised by our churches for Home and Foreign Missionary work, including revenue, Woman's Board and Church Extension, is slightly over \$52,000.00 for the year 1911-12; of this \$34,300.00 was for Home work and \$17,761.00 for work abroad.

I find pleasure in presenting this annual report for the Educational Department of the C.C.M.S. The work of this office is a labor of love.

The work of the department is done by the General Secretary and the Educational Secretary working together. The General Secretary has knowledge of all the churches at first hand, and it is most natural that these secretaries should work together.

Of necessity the success of the department in a very large measure depends upon the co-operation of the men in the churches. I would again express my appreciation of the general response on the part of the men who have helped to keep the news of the churches before our people through the columns of the Congregationalist. I would also express gratitude to the Pastors, Church Secretaries, and Sunday School Superintendents who have faithfully circulated Home Missionary literature sent to the churches.

During the year Home Missionary news has been circulated through the columns of the Congregationalist, and on February 15th the Home Missionary number of the Congregationalist was issued, presenting the claims of the work East and West, outlining a plan for raising the annual offering, announcing March 3 as Home Missionary Sunday, and stating Home Missionary litera-

ture and envelopes would reach pastors and church officers before that date.

The Annual Home Missionary literature was issued in February and sent to the churches at a cost of \$134.07, including printing and postage. Early in the year it was evident our Home Missionary expenses would far exceed our income unless we raised more money than in former years. Hence, in November we wrote to the officers of each Association drawing their attention to the need of increased giving, and requesting them to deal with the matter in their respective Associations. We also planned our literature on a larger scale, issuing two folders to the churches. One, "Five Years' Progress in Home Missions," the other "Wanted, Twenty Thousand Dollars a Year." The churches were asked to use these in the order given above, and to distribute the envelopes with the second pamphlet. We issued 10,000 of each of these pamphlets. In addition to this we sent out 10,000 leaflets for the Sunday Schools, bearing the title, "Wanted, a Sunday School," and 20,000 envelopes for the Annual Offering. That this literature might not be lost, we put a Home Missionary label on each parcel, requesting postmasters to notify us if the parcel was not called for, and we would send stamps for its return. No parcels were returned, hence we conclude they all reached their destination. We also sent letters to Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents, drawing their attention to the literature, asking them to see that it was well distributed.

You will see we have sent out 50,000 pieces of printed matter and 250 letters to Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents, as well as the Home Missionary number of the Congregationalist, and the news from week to week.

The Home Missionary literature was sent out from the printing office, beginning the 15th of February, in time to reach the churches in good season, but, the great snowstorm of that week blocked almost all the trains east and west, and caused delay in transit. I however think the literature reached most of the churches in time. I received only two complaints. One was vigorous, the other gentle. We are always glad to hear from the brethren.

The kind words of appreciation from the men generally is evidence of their appreciation of the effort of this department to assist the work of Home Missions in our churches.

This department exists for the churches, and as it is our effort to make it of real value to all the churches, we therefore welcome any suggestion or criticism offered by any of our brethren.

# REPORT OF IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT.

This is now the fifth time that it has been my pleasure to present the annual report of this department, the work of which was inaugurated in the summer of 1907.

During the past year we have continued to share with the other churches of Canada in extending the hand of welcome to our newcomers. Each year this involves more work and larger responsibilities, which mark, however, the increasing opportunities of the department. Signs have been seen during the past year of a growing desire on the part of our churches to follow up the welcome that is given by our chaplains at the ports of entry by systematic efforts to bring Congregational immigrants fully into fellowship with the work of our churches. The most notable of these has been the action of the Montreal Congregational Council in setting apart Mr. J. Arthur Stead of our College to devote part of his time to the special work of welcoming the newcomers to Montreal. With headquarters at Zion Church House, Mr. Stead has done splendid service in securing boarding places and employment for all who have reported to him, and otherwise looking up every individual whose specific address has been sent on by the chaplain at Quebec.

The Superintendent has also noted with satisfaction that the Brotherhood of the Western Church, Toronto, is doing special work in the way of sending cards to the ports of entry, and arranging to meet the immigrants on their arrival at Toronto.

In continuation of the Joint Chaplaincy at Quebec the Congregational and Baptist Churches were represented last summer by Mr. P. V. Samson, one of the students of our College. At St.

John, N.B., owing to changes in the pastorate, but little work was done during the winter months, but at Halifax we were able to make an arrangement with the Baptist Chaplain, Capt. I. Harpell, who acted for us from January to the close of navigation, and met a large number of our people.

We again note the fact that the number of Congregationalists going to places where we have no churches is still decreasing. This year the percentage was 30 ,compared with 31 the year before. It is also worthy of note that the numbers going to Winnipeg and the West rose from 41 per cent. to 55 per cent. of the whole.

The actual figures for the season's work are as follows:---

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Of the number entering at Quebec, Montreal received 95, Toronto 264, Winnipeg 137, and Vancouver 95.

It is worthy of note that in the first year of our work, 1907, the largest number of those bound for the cities went to Toronto and Montreal, but now conditions have greatly changed, and the percentage of those going to the smaller communities has greatly increased.

During the present summer the chaplain at Quebec is Mr. M. R. Hartley, of McMaster University.

The Superintendent continues to keep closely in touch with the Colonial Missionary Society, and is constantly in receipt of intimations concerning newcomers, all of which are handed over to the chaplains for action.

# TREASURER'S REPORT, 1911-12.

We commenced the year with an appeal for a \$5,000.00 increase in subscriptions.

The financial report, which is before you, shows that the total receipts (not including proceeds sale of Fairview Lot, Vancouver), amounted to \$13,490.72, as against \$11,502.67 last year, an increase of \$1,988.05 this year.

An analysis of these figures discloses the fact that while the total increase from all sources has been \$1,988.05, the increase in contributions from the churches amounted to only \$770.10. If we are to take advantage of the many opportunities for extension work in the West, and do our fair share of the work as a denomination, we must have increased support from the churches. Now is the time to shoulder the responsibility. Are we doing so? A dollar spent while the country is young will accomplish as much as ten dollars in years to come.

The largest increase in any District was in Ontario Central, namely \$404.57. We are pleased to record this increase; last year Ontario Central was the district showing the largest decrease. We

regret to report the decrease of \$189.14 in Quebec, but it is only fair to the other churches in the district to mention that the decrease is caused by one of the Montreal churches only giving \$161.40, as against \$659.00 last year, a decrease of \$497.60.

The following is a list of the churches contributing more than \$100.00 towards Home Missions. Emmanuel Church, Montreal, again heads the list with \$884.12, the others being :---

The Sunday School contributing the largest amount was Zion, of Montreal, \$133.67, followed by Emmanuel, Montreal, with \$32.96. We would again draw attention to the fact that the Sunday schools generally are not taking as much interest in our work as they might. All schools are not in a position to give large subscriptions, but if the needs of our work could be placed before the scholars of the different schools early in the season, increased contributions would be secured. There are a number of schools which should be giving larger gifts to missions.

Two very welcome subscriptions were \$100.00 from the Young Peoples' Society of Northern Church, Toronto, and \$50.00 from the Young Ladies' Guild of Plymouth Church, Sherbrooke.

The financial statement shows that we disbursed the sum of \$17,434.47 (including balance brought forward from last year) on account of the General Mission Fund, which is \$1,943.75 more than we received from all sources, and we enter the new year with a balance on the wrong side. We hope that with the increased support of the churches throughout the Dominion, this deficit of \$1,943.75 will be taken care of next year.

The Parkdale Church, Toronto, was disposed of during the year, the net proceeds of which, after deducting all expenses.

amounted to \$3,314.92, which sum is available for a new site in the north-west end of Toronto.

Vancouver 1st Church deposited the sum of \$3,320.00 in the Bank of Montreal, Vancouver, for extension work in that city, being amount of Jubilee Debt Fund Lien against their old church property, \$1,500.00 of which sum has been disbursed to purchase a site for another church at Vancouver.

The following amounts were received after the books closed :----Montreal, Calvary, \$200.00; Hamilton, Immanuel, \$4.40; London, 1st, \$11.56.







# CONSTITUTION.

#### I.---NAME.

This Corporation shall be called The Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

#### II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the heathen and other unenlightened people.

### III.-MEMBERSHIP.

The members of this Society shall be persons subscribing \$2 annually, ministers of all contributing churches, one other representative from each church contributing \$10 annually, and two representatives from each church contributing \$50, or over, annually, and each year the delegates appointed from any church to the Congregational Union of Canada shall be delegates to this Society, provided that church be entitled to be so represented. Every benefactor making a donation of \$40 at one time shall be a life member.

#### IV.—OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary. Treasurer, and Board of Directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Society.

### V.—MEETINGS.

An annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the Thursday following the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles.

#### VI.-AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution can be amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed alteration having been given in two successive numbers of the *Canadian Independent.*\*

# BY-LAWS.

### I.—FUNDS.

All funds arising from donations, legacies, subscriptions, or otherwise, shall be lodged by the Treasurer, as soon as collected, with some chartered bank, to be named by the Executive Committee. Money can be drawn from such accounts only by cheques, signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, but the President or Vice-President may sign for either in their absence.

## II.-MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twentyfive members of the Society, including the officers, and shall be elected at the annual meeting, who shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society. Immediately after their election, they shall appoint an Executive Committee, and such other committees as they shall deem expedient for the interests of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of that Board, and shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendents of Departments. and not more than twelve other members, together with two members of the Woman's Board, the same to be appointed by that Board, and who are members of this Society.

#### . III.—MEETINGS.

The Board of Directors shall meet at least once during the year. immediately before the annual meeting of the Society, at the call of the Secretary, to prepare reports, and a list of officers and committees to be nominated at the annual meeting, as well as to transact any other business connected with the interests of the Society.

IV .--- PRESENTATION TO CHURCHES.

The work of this Society shall be presented and a Foreign Missionary sermon preached in each of the churches of the constituency at least once in each year. The Executive Committee shall see that news from the Society's work is distributed to the churches.

V.-DONATIONS FOR SPECIAL WORK.

When money is donated for missionary work outside the Society's missions, it may be forwarded to societies working in that field.

# VI.-AMENDMENT.

These by-laws may be altered in the same manner as the Constitution.

# MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The 31st Annual Meeting of the C. C. F. M. S. was held in Zion Congregational Church, Montreal, on Thursday, June 6th, 1912, at 2 p.m.

In the absence of the President, Rev. E. C. Woodley, the chair was occupied by the First Vice-President, Rev. E. M. Hill, D.D.

Rev. M. H. Sanderson was appointed Minute Secretary.

The report of the Secretary, H. Yeigh, was read by Rev. A. F. Pollock.

The Treasurer's Report was read by Rev. Dr. Schofield in the absence of H. W. Barker.

Miss Effie Jamieson presented her report as Superintendent of the Dept. of S. S. and Young People's Societies.

Rev. A. F. Pollock reported as Educational Secretary.

On motion of Judge Leet all these reports were adopted.

No report for the Prayer Union had come to hand.

An interesting address was delivered by Mrs. F. W. Read on "The Changing Conditions in West Central Africa."

On recommendation of the Executive the Officers, Board of Directors and General Executive were elected for the ensuing year.

On motion of Rev. J. Daley, the Executive were instructed to prepare a resolution of appreciation and sympathy to be sent to Dr. Currie.

Rev. A. F. Pollock moved and Rev. E. D. Silcox seconded the following resolution:—"This Society wishes to place on record their appreciation of the past services of J. D. Nasmith, whose unexpected death has removed from us one of the most interested members of our Executive, and we further wish to express our sincere sympathy to Mrs. Nasmith and her family in their recent sudden and sore bereavement, commending them to God and the Word of His Grace." Carried.



# THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANADA CON-GREGATIONAL FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The past year, the thirty-first of the operations of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, has been marked by some changes in the personnel of the staff of missionaries, and has been a year of preparation for larger service rather than accomplishment of anything out of the ordinary.

The Society and the denomination has suffered severe loss through the demise of Mr. J. D. Nasmith of Toronto, who was for many years a faithful, interested member of the Executive Committee and a liberal supporter of missionary and all religious effort in and out of his own church.

The Society has profited during the year by the intelligent, careful labor of the President, Rev. E. C. Woodley, and while we rejoice that he is soon to resume his chosen work as a missionary, taking up the work in Marash, Turkey, as successor to Rev. F. W. Mac-Callum, we deeply regret the loss of his services to this Society. Our interested prayers and hearty good wishes will follow Mr. Woodley to his new field.

An event of the year was the visit to the West Central African Field by a deputation of Rev. Dr. C. H. Patton and Rev. F. B. Bridgman to investigate conditions on behalf of the American Board. On Dec. 28th, 1911, Dr. Patton met your Executive Committee and conferred regarding their report.

The Deputation recommended several things regarding the organization of the educational work, the location and early establishment of the Training Institute, and other matters.

By request of the Executive Committee the President, Rev. E. C. Woodley, visited Boston early this year and arranged a basis of co-operation with the American Board. This Basis was approved by the Executive, and was ordered to be submitted to the Society at the Annual Meeting for consideration and ratification if found satisfactory.

The Rev. R. Wardlaw Thompson, Secretary of the London Missionary Society, on behalf of the Directors, made grateful acknowledgement of the contribution of \$1,000.00 from this Society, and expressed the hope that the happy relations begun would be "still further cemented and extended, to the joint blessing of the work of the Society and of the contributing churches in Canada."

The Misses Melville having completed their furlough are now en route to Africa to resume their efficient labors at Chisamba. Many of the churches profited by their interesting addresses upon the work at Chisamba.

The enforced return of Rev. and Mrs. Currie at the end of last year owing to the physical disability of Dr. Currie was the regret of the year. Dr. and Mrs. Currie are residing at a place of his own naming some two and one-half miles from Victoria, B.C., called Chisamba R.M.D. No. 5, and recent reports tell of some improvement in his health and hopes of full recovery. We unite in prayer that this hope may be realized. The Congregational Churches of Canada should not and will not forget the capable, intelligent, faithful service of this devoted man and his equally devoted wife.

We record with gratitude the recovery of Rev. Mr. Tucker from the lameness caused by an accident, which permitted his and Mrs. Tucker's departure for Portugal, where they are now engaged in a study of the Portuguese and Ombundu languages for a few months, prior to their departure for West Central Africa to take charge of the Canadian Station at Chisamba. During the first three months of this year Mr. and Mrs. Tucker visited many of the churches in the interest of this Society, and presented the claims of Chisamba with much acceptance. A Commissioning service was held prior to their departure, in Zion Church, Montreal.

Mr. Gordon Cattell of Hamilton, the new Industrial Missionary is now in England on a brief visit to his parental home, and will sail to Africa with the Misses Melville shortly. Mr. Cattell took a course of practical training in wagon and general repairing before leaving Hamilton, and has strong hopes of a successful work in his department. President Woodley conducted a Commissioning service for Mr. Cattell in the First Church, Hamilton in early April.

The Training Institute, so long delayed, is likely soon to be started. Your Executive has authorized the West Central African Mission to make further explorations as soon as possible, and report their recommendation for the site to this Society for final confirmation. Your Executive is looking for a competent man for the position of Principal, with the purpose when he is secured to at once establish the Institute. Under the proposed basis of co-operation with the American Board this Society undertakes to take the initiative in establishing the Institute which will be for the entire

Mission (not for Chisamba alone), butwe do not pledge ourselves to the entire support of the Institute.

It is an interesting fact about the Annual Meeting of the Mission that it is being held about this time, as a camp meeting, on land which has been selected for the new Training Institute. Thus all the Missionaries and Teachers can observe for themselves and pass judgment.

# REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

The one point that seems most important to this department this year is the appointment of Mr. Gordon Cattell as Industrial Missionary to Chisamba, as the young people's representative there. We are deeply grateful that this missionary, who was so much needed in our work there, was found among our own ranks—he is a member of the First Congregational Church of Hamilton.

We are confident his going will mark a new era in the work of the young people at home, through their interest in him and his work new vision will be given, and deeper sense of service. We are urging all of the young people to give their interest, prayers and money in his behalf. It had seemed that probably this year it would be a struggle to meet the expense of our new missionary's outfitting, travelling expenses and salary in the beginning of the work, and so we made a special endeavor at the Northern Church, Toronto, to raise \$300.00 to pay Mr. Cattell's travelling expenses to Africa, but before we had time to pay it into the Treasurer, a letter came from the Hamilton church, stating that they were considering delivering Mr. Cattell f.o.b. Africa, and it seemed that it would be wiser to allow his own church to do this for him, and use the money raised by the Northern Young People to pay for his equipment. So the stone has been rolled away, and we have now only to face the expense of Mr. Cattell's salary, and expect that this will soon be guaranteed, so that any Young People's Society wanting a part in this work will have to act quickly.

During the past year the cause of Christian Endeavour has re-

ceived fresh impetus, and some of our churches have benefitted. It is so much easier to accomplish work among the young of the church when they are organized, and it is almost impossible to work upon missionary lines when they are not. It would seem to us that a Young People's Society is a necessary part of the organization of every church, and that Christian Endeavor is as yet the best society which has been produced for the training of young lives in Christian service. It is adaptable in a small community as well as in a large, and properly conducted will prove a blessing not only to-day, but to the church of the future.

The summer schools are at hand again, one at Whitby, July 2-9; Knowlton, 11-18, and another is being opened at Sackville, N.B., for the young people of the Maritime provinces. So much has already been said of the work and aim of these summer schools conducted by the Missionary Education Movement, that it seems superfluous to say anything more. They are so inspiring and so helpful that we wish it were possible that every church could send at least one representative to these schools-it would be an excellent investment. I would like to point out how we have benefitted already by these schools. The Foreign Missionary Committee had been looking for an Industrial Missionary for some time. Mr. Cattell was sent to Whitby by his society, and there the matter of missions as a life work was so pressed upon his heart, that he offered himself for the foreign field, and so was found in our own midst the missionary for whom we had been seeking. Doubtless there are numbers of others among the young people of our churches who need only to catch the vision in order to reach a similar decision

I am very glad to report that at the meeting of the Prudential Committee yesterday the enclosed memorandum, offered as a proposed basis of co-operation between the Canadian Congregation Foreign Missionary Society and the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, was approved by your Committee, with the understanding that it should become operative when ratified and adopted by the Canadian Foreign Missionary Society. The only changes made in this plan since it was before you are verbal. The last article, 13, has been rewritten, as you will notice, in the interests of clearness of expression, but without any change in the substance of the idea.

I submit this with gratification. We shall be ready to agree to any modification, I am sure, that your Society may wish to make at its meeting.

# PROPOSED BASIS OF CO-OPERATION BETWEEN THE CANADIAN CONGREGATIONAL FOREIGN MISSION-ARY SOCIETY AND THE AMERICAN BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS.

# Proposed Articles:

(1) That the two co-operating Societies unite in the support of missionaries and of the work carried on in the West Africa Mission.

(2) That the status of the Canadian Society in relation to the American Board be that of an Associated Society rather than an auxiliary. This fact to be recognized in the annual reports and in other references.

(3) That certain missionaries and certain stations and institutions be supported by each of the co-operating Societies, it being agreed in advance what missionaries and what stations and what institutions are to be supported by the respective Societies.

(4) That the work in the Mission shall remain a unit, directed and controlled by all regularly appointed missionaries, voting together upon all phases of the work, and within the limits allowed by the co-operating Societies at home, consideration be given to the votes of the Mission with reference to policy, location, and work of missionaries, appropriations and methods of work. The mission, however, shall not have power to permanently transfer missionaries from the Canadian to the American Stations, or vice versa, except by mutual agreement of the Societies.

(5) That all the missionaries appointed to the Mission be appointed by the Prudential Committee of the American Board, but that previous to the appointment of such as are to draw their sup-

port from the Canadian Mission Society, they shall first have been adopted by that Society. Further, they may be commissioned by the Canadian Society.

(6) That the Canadian Society be responsible only for the support of the missionaries it adopts and for the work which it is pledged to support, it being understood that when a missionary has been adopted by either one of the co-operating Societies all the expenses of that missionary at home and on the field shall be met by the adopting Society.

(7) Reports of the meetings of the Mission, as well as all official letters of the Mission Secretary, shall be sent to both the Canadian Society and the American Board. All statistical reports shall be dealt with in the same manner.

(8) That the Canadian Society shall take the initiative in the construction, equipment and support of the Training Institute, it being understood that the Institute is for the entire Mission to be under the direction and control of the Mission receiving students from all parts of the Mission and training them for more efficient Christian service. It is to be understood, however, that the Canadian Society does not pledge itself to the entire support of the Institution after its establishment and anticipated development. Any enlargement of the Institution shall be by mutual agreement of the Societies.

(9) While recognizing that the title to property in the Mission is uncertain owing to the lack of proper government guarantees, yet it is felt that there should be a definite understanding between the two Societies in regard to property. The Canadian Society would like to retain the status quo in existence at the present time, promising that it will not alienate any property from the work of the Mission as a whole so long as the existing joint relationship continues. If at any future date, however, it should seem wise in the interest of the foreign missionary movement in Canada for the Canadian Society to assume the status of an absolutely independent missionary body, then all trusteeship of the American Board shall cease and all property acquired by funds raised by the Canadian Society shall be handed over to that body or otherwise adjusted in a manner satisfactory to both Boards.

(10) The Canadian Society desires that the missionaries it supports shall act under the rules of the American Board and shall feel their relation to the West Central African Mission as a whole, assuming their part in the general work with the sole condition that

they shall not undertake a lengthy absence from the station to which they have been appointed without the sanction of the Canadian Society.

(11) In all cases of serious disagreement in the field when a decision cannot be reached by the Mission, the question or questions at issue shall be settled by the two home Societies.

(12) Furlough and return to the field and all financial matters associated therewith, shall be arranged by the Prudential Committee of the American Board in consultation with the Canadian Society.

(13) The American Board agrees to place at the disposal of the Canadian Society and its missionaries the services of the treasury department and of the purchasing and shipping department of the American Board, and this Board further agrees to serve the interests of the Canadian Society in Africa in the same way that the exclusive work and workers of the Board are served.

# TREASURER'S REPORT, 1911-12.

Your Treasurer begs to present his report for the year ending May 31, 1912.

As will be seen by the printed statement, we brought forward \$376.77 in the General Fund, while the contributions to this fund amounted to \$6,469.87; being an increase of nearly \$1,200 over the previous year. A comparison of the tables at the foot of the Statement shows that the contributions from Ontario have increased \$200; from Quebec, \$606; from the Maritime Provinces, \$21; and from the Western Provinces, \$267; while the Miscellaneous and Personal gifts are \$78 higher—an improvement all along the line.

The other side of the statement shows that we have paid the American Board \$1,676.38, which was the exact amount owing to them at the date of their last account—viz., May 1st. This, I may say, pays the salaries of the missionaries and the other expenses on the field only to Dec. 31, 1911. Last year, we were able to remit an amount sufficient to anticipate the salaries to June 30th. Part of the outfitting and travelling expenses of our new missionaries (Mr. and Mrs. Tucker and Mr. Cattell) is included in the amount we have paid to the Board, being \$164.60 in the case of the Tuckers, and \$424.81 for Mr. Cattell. We also paid direct to Mr. Cattell \$300 for his outfit, as is shown in the printed statement;

while the outfit allowance due to Mr. and Mrs. Tucker was advanced by the Board, but has not vet been charged to us. These new missionaries came into our service at the beginning of the year; and as their salaries from the Board do not begin until they reach the field, we paid them direct at this end. The small amount of \$84.25-Mr. Cattell's salary-is the difference between his wages as an apprentice in a waggon shop, and his regular salary as a missionary. Among the expenditures will also be noticed \$1,000 voted at the last Annual Meeting to the London Missionary Society, the regular \$1,000 set apart for new work, and \$1,000 transferred to the Furlough Fund. Also \$100 voted by the Executive Committee to our retiring President, Rev. C. E. Woodley, to assist in a special course which we know he desires to take to better equip himself for work in Turkey, and which was given as a mark of our interest in him and his work. These, with the other payments shown, complete the disbursements in our General Fund; and, as will be seen, there is carried forward a balance of \$124.86.

Let us now turn our attention to the money contributed for designated objects. The \$10,000 odd brought forward from last year includes the \$5,000 Freeland Fund, the new work fund of \$3,000, and the Furlough Fund of \$2,000. This year, we have received \$5,000 in connection with the Hodge bequest; and the usual transfers of \$1,000 each have been made as noted above to the new work and the furlough funds. On the debit side will be found remittances of \$406.50 for the support of boys (on one case, a girl) and other work on the field, while we have forwarded \$885.17 for missionary work other than our own, such as the Leper Mission, the China Famine Fund, and work in Africa, Japan, Brazil, Peru, Ceylon, India, and Turkey. Our furlough fund has been charged with \$1,018.87-the travelling expenses from Africa to America, and the furlough allowance to date of Dr. and Mrs. Currie; while the Freeland Fund has been invested, \$19.57 having been transferred from the General Fund to make up the even amount of securities purchased. We carry forward \$11,228.67, which is made up of:-

We now come to an analysis of the total giving of the churches. This year, as last, Montreal Emmanuel occupies the first place, with \$1,137.02, which is the largest amount ever reported from any of our churches in one year. The next on the list is Toronto, Bond Street, with \$519; and following close behind, is Toronto Northern, with \$415.50, nearly all of which, by the way, was given by the Young People's Society and the Sunday School, the Young People having undertaken to pay Mr. Cattell's outfitting expenses. After Toronto Northern comes Granby, with \$282.75; then Hamilton First, \$263.41; Montreal, Calvary, \$252.97; Montreal, Zion, \$208.57; and then in quick succession, Sherbrooke, \$176.06; Maxville, \$175.72; Toronto, Broadview, \$166.90; Kingston, Bethel, \$164; Vancouver, First, \$146.25; Toronto, Western, \$141; Brantford, \$137.45; Ottawa, First (for the first time, but we trust not the last), \$118.43; Scotland, \$105.15; Toronto, Olivet, \$101. None of the other churches has reached the hundred mark this year, although many have done remarkably well considering their strength, and deserve special mention :- Cobourg, \$75; Coldsprings, \$42; Embro, \$76; Gainsboro Circuit, \$40: Lanark, \$76; London South, \$45; Rosetta, \$47; Rugby, \$57; Sherkston, West Montrose, and Bloomingdale, \$131.00; Chebogue, \$23; Yarmouth, \$66; Sheffield (N.B.), \$58; Brandon, \$32; Vancouver, Knox, \$75; and Victoria, \$75. We regret not being able to report anything from any of our Winnipeg churches. Winnipeg Central tried hard to get in, as they telegraphed on the afternoon of June 1st that they were remitting \$200; but the books closed the night before, and when this telegram was received the Statement was printed. So they will have to wait until next year to be reported.

We are glad to note that over one hundred churches have shared in the giving this year.

Last year, it was noted that only one church in the Western Provinces contributed to the General Fund. It may be remembered that your Treasurer had the temerity to prophesy great things from the West for 1912. He is not given to indulging in proprecy; but in this case his hopes were realized; and, instead of one church sending \$75 for the General Fund, eleven churches have contributed \$342. May the same increase take place during the coming year!

One pleasing gift which has for years past come almost with the regularity of clock work, at the rate of \$5 per month, is the Little

Hughes contribution, from the children of Mr. and Mrs. Hughes, of Shelburne, Nova Scotia. This is for special work at the Station.

The United Brethren Association has done exceedingly well, their contribution amounting to about \$280.

And now, what of the future? Our new forces have gone forward. We will need twice as much this coming year for salaries and other fixed charges; and it is for our churches to rise to the occasion and increase their contributions. Funds for the proposed Institute are being held, awaiting its establishment, which we trust will be this year; and it is likely we shall have to increase the amount on hand. Let us see that the churches in which we are interested do their full duty in this regard.



# BY-LAWS.

# CHAPTER I.

1. The Corporation shall be called "THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA."

2. Its objects shall be the education of ministers of the Gospel and the encouragement and inauguration of all desirable educational methods and movements, whereby the efficiency of the church may be advanced.

3. Contributors of two dollars annually to the Funds of the College shall be members of the Corporation. A contributor in arrears one year shall not be qualified to vote at the meeting of the Corporation, or to exercise his other rights of membership. The Treasurer's subscription list shall be taken as evidence of contribution.

4. Churches contributing for the previous year to the current expenses of the College the sum of ten dollars and upwards may be represented at the meeting of the Corporation by one delegate for each church; those contributing twenty-five dollars or upwards for the previous year, by two delegates; and those contributing fifty dollars or upwards for the previous year, by three delegates.

5. Persons by whom or on whose behalf one hundred dollars or more shall have been contributed at any one time to the funds of the College, may be chosen life members of the Corporation.

6. A regular meeting of the Corporation shall be held annually, for the reception of the report of the Governors, the election of a new Board according to provisions hereinafter named, and the transaction of other necessary business.

7. The annual meeting shall be held at the same time and place as the Congregational Union of Canada.

8. Special meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business at the call of the Board of Governors, or on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, signed by at least twenty members of the Corporation; provided always that no such special meetings be held without one month's notice thereof in an accredited newspaper in Toronto and Montreal, and also in the *Canadian Congregationalist*.

# CHAPTER II.

### BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

1. A Board of fifteen Governors, having power to choose their own officers, shall be elected from members of the Corporation. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

2. Three members of the Board shall retire annually, in rotation, but shall be elegible for re-election.

3. The powers and duties of the Board shall be:

(a) The administration of the property of the College and the management of its finances.

(b) The appointment and renewal of all officers of the College.

(c) The general oversight and management of the affairs of the College, and

(d) The presentation of an annual report of the general condition of the College to the Corporation at the next regular

4. Any member of the Board absent from its meetings for a year shall be held *ipso facto* to have vacated his seat, but may be re-appointed or re-elected thereto.

5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation or otherwise, may be filled by the Board whenever it may see fit.

6. It shall be competent for the Board of Governors to appoint annually an Executive Committee from its membership, which Committee shall exercise, between the meetings of the Board, such powers as may be delegated to it by the Board of Governors.

7. The Board of Governors shall be called together at the close of the annual meeting of the Corporation, for organization and other needful business. They shall hold an annual meeting at a convenient time before the annual meeting of the Corporation; a special meeting may be called at any time by the Chairman and Secretary, or by the Secretary, at the request of five members.

# CHAPTER III.

#### THE SENATE.

1. There shall be a Senate composed of -(1) The members of the Board of Governors; (2) the Faculty; (3) four representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Ontario and

Quebec; (5) two representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Seven members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Senate shall frame regulations for and supervise all matters of education, honors and discipline.

3. The Principal shall be a member of the Faculty and exofficio President of the Senate.

4. The Registrar shall be a member of the Faculty and exofficio Secretary of the Senate.

5. The Senate shall meet annually within one month preceding the close of the Session, at the College, in the city of Montreal, and at such other times and places as the interests of the College may require, and shall make an annual report to the Corporation through the Board of Governors.

# CHAPTER IV.

1. The Principal and Professors, with such members of the Senate as from time to time may be appointed by the Board of Governors, constitute the Faculty, and as such are entrusted with the educational work of the College and the enforcement of its regulations under the direction of the Senate. The Principal shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Faculty.

2. Members of the Faculty must be members of a Congregational Church.

3. Members of the Faculty shall not be members of the Board of Governors, but the Principal shall be a consulting member of the Board of Governors, and of all standing committees appointed by the Board or the Senate.

### CHAPTER V.

#### THE OFFICERS.

1. The Chairman of the Board of Governors shall be the Presiding Officer of the Corporation.

2. The President of the Senate shall preside at all public functions of the College.

3. The Secretary of the Senate shall be Registrar of the College.

## CHAPTER VI.

### AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these By-laws may be made at any regular meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such amendment has been given at the meeting next preceding.

## ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Corporation of the Congregational College of Canada was held at Zion Church, at 2.30 p.m.

There was a good attendance.

Mr. Charles Gurd, Chairman of the Board of Governors, presided.

The hymn, "Stand up and bless the Lord," was sung.

Rev. A. Margrett of Toronto offered prayer.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were taken as read. The report of the Board of Governors was presented by Alex. McA. Murphy, Secretary.

That portion of the report which referred to the acts and observations of the Senate was read by Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., registrar.

It was moved by Rev. J. T. Daley, of Maxville, and seconded by Judge S. P. Leet, "That the report of the Governors be adopted; that the action of the Board with reference to federation be specially ratified; and that the Governors be empowered to take all such further action as they may deem advisable or requisite, they being hereby clothed with all necessary power to that effect."

After discussion led by Rev. Principal Hill, and participated in by Revs. Geo. Ellery Read, Dr. Hugh Pedley, Horsey of Ottawa, the mover and seconder, and others, this motion was unanimously carried.

The Treasurer's statement was presented by Mr. Thos. Moodie, Treasurer, and adopted.

It was moved by Rev. J. L. Alexander of Granby, seconded by Rev. Galen Craik of Melbourne, and carried unanimously: "That the services of a professional accountant be employed to audit the accounts for the ensuing year, and that the choice be left with the Board of Governors."

It was moved by Rev. Silas Anthony of Cowansville, seconded by Rev. A. G. Sleep of Ottawa, and carried unanimously: "That the matter of an appropriation to the Canadian Congregationalist be referred to the Board of Governors.

It was moved by Rev. A. F. Pollock of Cobourg, seconded by Mr. Bale of Hamilton: "That Messrs. Charles R. Black, Rev. Hugh Pedley, D.D., and A. H. Duff, be re-elected as Governors, and that Mr. Arthur Congdon of Winnipeg, be elected to fill the

vacancy caused by the death of the late S. H. C. Miner, Esq." Carried unanimously.

It was moved by Rev. E. D. Silcox of Toronto, seconded by Rev. Wm. Wye Smith and carried unanimously (the mover putting the motion): "That the thanks of the Corporation be tendered the officers of the College for their services during the past College year."

Mr. W. M. Birks was introduced to the meeting, and in a few words outlined the origin and progress of the work of federating the Colleges, in the culmination of which happy result the speaker had rendered such signal service.

Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, D.D., moderator of The National Council of the Congregational Churches of the United States, was called upon by the Chairman, and after being formally introduced by Rev. Principal Hill, addressed the meeting upon "The Ministry."

This address was inspiring in its every feature, and in its effect could not but encourage and freshly stimulate all present.

A vote of thanks was moved by Rev. Dr. Pedley, and warmly endorsed by all.

Dr. Boynton pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS TO THE MEM-BERS OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CONGRE-GATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA.

Gentlemen :----

The Board of Governors in presenting its annual report for 1911-12, submits for your consideration a citation of facts, problems and possibilities of more than ordinary interest.

The report, as usual, includes those of the Senate, Librarian, House Committee, Ladies' Auxiliary and Treasurer. These are presented without abridgment, exactly as received and adopted by the Board.

Almost the first act of the Board of 1911 was to record the death of its valued chairman of so many previous years, Mr. S. H. C. Miner.

In accordance with the desire of the Corporation, as expressed at its last annual meeting, the College was officially represented at the funeral of Mr. Miner by the Acting Principal of the time, Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., and the following governors, viz., Messrs. Charles Gurd, Rev. Hugh Pedley, Judge Leet and Alex. McA. Murphy.

Mr. Charles Gurd was appointed Chairman for the year just concluded.

The vacancy upon the board is yet unfilled. The position was offered to Mr. Arthur Congdon of Winnipeg. This was done both because of appreciation of the worth of that gentleman, personally, and for the reason that Western representation was thought desirable. Mr. Congdon did not, however, see his way clear to accept. [He has done so since the meeting.—Ed.]

It is still felt by the Board that Western representation should be had.

That there is need of a deepening of a sense of responsibility throughout all the churches, is evidenced by the Treasurer's statement, and the fact that upon the student roll, there is the name of only one representative of the Canadian Churches.

The fact needs to be realized that the College, the corporation of which is now in session, is the only educational institution in all Canada for the upkeep of which churches in Canada are denominationally responsible.

The Board early in the College year, unanimously passed the following resolution, viz.: "That it be the policy of the College to pay the fees of our students in the arts course at McGill University, where necessary. This action of the Board was in keeping with that of other theological colleges. The Board regrets that the students taking advantage of this opportunity, did not this year maintain the denominational traditions with respect to scholastic attainment, but what has been done, has yet been unquestionably worth while, and with accentuated determination on the part of the students and co-operative interest on the part of the faculty, the Board looks forward expectantly to next year's results.

The Board would appreciatively record the receipt during the year of \$2,000.00 from Mr. J. H. McKechnie, in loving tribute to

the memory of his late revered wife, to found "The Mary C. Mc-Kechnie Lectureship." By means of this foundation, distinguished lecturers may be secured for special short courses, or even single lectures of inspirational value.

The Board also appreciatively records the receipt of five hundred dollars from the family of the late James Baylis, to found an annual bursary to be applied to the benefit of the student whose circumstances most nearly conforms to its terms.

The Board also appreciatively records the receipt of a Nelson Shield from the British and Foreign Sailors' Society—the purpose of which gift being to inspire patriotism, and responsiveness to the call of duty.

The Board further records, with kindly and appreciative sentiment, a gift on behalf of the late Mrs. J. G. Burns in her lifetime of Yarmouth, N.S., of a silver trowel presented by the people of Yarmouth to Mrs. Goreham at the time of the laying of the corner stone of Goreham College, and with it a gift from the same source, of the Goreham College Bible.

The matter of most supreme importance, dealt with by your Board during the year, has been that of the proposed federation of the four Theological Colleges of Montreal.

Your Board has been actively represented in all the negotiations to this end, and has unanimously endorsed the proposition. The action of the Board has been approved by the Senate, and it is greatly hoped will also be endorsed by the Corporation.

There is appended to this report, a printed copy of the suggested plan of co-operation, and also a draft of the proposed curriculum of the co-operating faculty, and the lectures assigned to each.

That so much progress, along such a path should have been found possible, in so short a time, is the best possible evidence interdenominating, of a depth of co-operative sincerity, of fundamental concord of faith, of harmony of highest purpose and of joint submission to the sure leading of the Divine Spirit. The movement is without doubt, blessed of God in the manner of its conception, and without doubt will be abundantly blessed of God in the manner of its further development.

Under this arrangement, the responsibility of each denomination will not be diminished, but on the contrary will be still further enlarged. It is trusted that in this regard, the Congregational con-

tributions in men, money, prayers and all other forms of encouragement will be worthy.

The students of all the Colleges will receive tuition in joint, classes.

The present Colleges, under the proposed arrangement will furnish instruction in purely denominational subjects, and will control the curriculum of their own students.

The students will be domiciled in their respective quarters, as now.

The following are the motions passed by your Board on April 26th, 1912, the terms of which the members of the corporation are asked to endorse, along with the final plans co-operatively agreed upon :—

"That this Board re-affirms its attitude of favorableness towards College co-operation, and after due consideration of the "Plan suggested for the co-operation of the Theological Colleges in Montreal," does endorse the outline and general principles of such plan, and does record its readiness to appoint representatives to act with similarly appointed representatives of the sister colleges, to bring the plan into early and satisfactory effect. (Moved by Mr. Charles R. Black, seconded by Judge S. P. Leet).

"That the following committee be appointed to confer with the sister colleges, viz., Revs. Principal Hill, Hugh Pedley, Frank J. Day and Messrs. W. D. Lighthall and Alex. McA. Murphy." (Moved by Mr. T. B. Macaulay, seconded by Judge Leet).

The retiring governors are:—Messrs. Charles R. Black, A. Huntly Duff, B.A., B.C.L., and Rev. Hugh Pedley, B.A., D.D There is also an additional vacancy to be filled.

# THE SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL, 1912.

# To the Members of the Corporation:

Gentlemen,—We beg to submit the following as our report of the work of the last session—the seventy-second in the history of the College. The session opened with Public Exercises, on the 3rd of October, 1911, when the Rev. F. W. Macallum, B.A., a graduate of this College, and now for many years a missionary in Turkey under the American Board, gave an address on "The Religious conflict in Turkey."

## THE ROLL OF STUDENTS.

The classes opened on the 27th September, with about the usual number of students, in spite of the fact that a class of six had been graduated at the close of preceding session. Seven new students were admitted, all of them, however, to the Preparatory Department, five preparing for matriculation, and two who have been admitted to a shorter course preparatory to Theology. The students are classified as follows: seven in the first preparatory year, four in the second preparatory, three in second year Arts, and one in Theology, with one Theological student, who has been granted a year's absence from classes.

The fact that there has been but one student in Theology has not made it any easier, and certainly not more inspiring for either student or Professors, for the same courses had to be pursued. But while we could have wished it otherwise, it is after all the result of the definite policy of the Senate in which the Faculty heartily concurs, namely, to turn the tide of student life into the full course. That tide, we are glad to say, has been turned, but in the meantime it has depleted our Theological classes. Just now, and possibly for a year or two longer, these classes cannot but be small, but our Arts classes will have regained their earlier strength.

In addition to the students in residence, there are seven men who have been doing extra-mural work under the direction of the Faculty. These are the Revs. S. W. Anthony, Ernest Knight, and J. T. Tucker on the B.D. course, and Messrs. W. J. Bevis, John Sulston, Frank Sanders, and Herbert Wright, on courses prescribed

for unordained men under the appointment of the Home Missionary Society. It has not been our custom to count non-resident students, as is the custom in some institutions. If we were to do so, our 15 would be raised to 22.

#### THE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

The Preparatory Department is a necessary and important element in the plan to secure as large a proportion of full course men as possible. It has been with us, as with kindred institutions, a comparatively rare thing to get youths who have been prepared for matriculation in the High School. And our difficulty has been increased beyond that of some other Theological Colleges by the fact that so far we have not been able to maintain a permanent preparatory department. We have to depend on others, and these are not always able to keep. Sometimes they find their own classes quite large enough for such teachers as they have. We are glad, however, to report that this difficulty is now in a fair way of being overcome through the co-operation of the various Theological Colleges of Montreal.

#### COLLEGE FEDERATION.

Largely through the initiation of the Christian Laymen of the various denominations, and the co-operation of the Boards of Governors of the four Theological Colleges of Montreal, that for which we have so often striven is now on the point of realization, viz., the federation of these colleges for united and more efficient work. The plan initiated by the Board of Governors has been heartily supported by the Senate and Faculty. Various meetings of the Principals and Professors of the co-operating Colleges have been held, with the result that common courses of study covering almost the whole Theological Curriculum, will be offered at the opening of next session, which all the students of the different Colleges may attend; the choice of subjects and amount required being left for each individual College to decide.

#### OTHER INTERESTING HAPPENINGS.

This is the first year of the College under the fostering care of the new Chairman of the Board, Mr. Charles Gurd, and Professors

and students alike are grateful to him for his deep and constant interest in our welfare. One of the most pleasant events of the year was a supper given by the Chairman to the students, in order that they might meet the Professors and Governors in a social fashion. It was greatly enjoyed, and did much to foster the spirit of loyalty and devotion to the Institution. The presence of Prof. William Adams Brown, D.D., of Union Theological Seminary, N.Y., added to the delight of the occasion.

Prof. Brown during the same week gave a lecture under the Mary McKechnie foundation to the students on "What Modern Theology can do to Interpret Christ to Modern Men." The lecture was attended by Professors and students of other Colleges as well as City Pastors.

Judge S. Leet also lectured to the students and others on the "Minister's Legal Responsibilities." The lecture was specially appreciated, as coming from one who could speak with authority.

We would also mention with gratitude that the heirs of the late James Baylis, Esq., have donated to the College the sum of \$500, "to found and endow an exhibition or bursary in the name and memory of their late father," the income to be "awarded annually to the student who shall on entrance, prove at the same time his ability and his need."

The First Church at Ottawa has also presented a scholarship for English Bible work, to be given on examination to a student when entering the College, preferably a student from one of the Ottawa churches.

## NEW REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE GRANTING OF DEGREES.

The degree of B.D.—Hitherto this degree has been open to ministers of any denomination and of any country. But this has entailed a large amount of work, which it does not seem necessary to impose upon our staff. The Senate has therefore adopted regulations limiting this course, in the first instance to ministers of any denomination resident in Canada, and to our own graduates, whether resideent here or abroad.

The degree of D.D.—It has been resolved that this degree, when taken in course, shall be open only to one who has held the B.D. degree of this College for at least five years, and who has been an ordained minister for at least ten years.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

As to the students taking the University Courses, their examinations do not show as satisfactory results as we could have wished, each of the men of the second year having to face one or more supplementals.

In the Beginners' Greek Class, however, Mr. J. A. Steed heads the University class, and has been awarded the A. Huntley Duff prize of \$5.

In Theology, Mr. A. J. Orr successfully completed the work of the middle year, and was awarded the "Maria Sawtell Memorial Scholarship," of the value of \$30.

The Jeanie C. Hill prizes in Elocution were awarded as follows:—The first prize, of the value of \$15, to Mr. T. W. Jones, and the second, of the value of \$10, to Mr. A. L. Richards.

In the extra-mural courses for unordained men under appointment of the Home Missionary Society, examinations have been passed by Messrs. W. J. Bevis, Frank Sanders, and Herbert G. Wright.

In the B.D. course, the Rev. J. T. Tucker completed with credit all the required work, and fulfilled all the conditions pertaining to the degree, which was conferred upon him at the closing Convocation. Mr. A. J. Orr was admitted to the B.D. course and passed one examination in Greek Exegesis.

#### CONVOCATION.

The closing Convocation was held in the Assembly Hall of the College on Friday, the 26th of April last. An interesting feature of the occasion was the presentation to the College of the silver trowel used in laying the corner stone of the old Gorham College at Liverpool, N.S., as well as the great Bible used in the College exercises. These came to us through the bequest of the late Mrs. Dr. Burns, a daughter of Mr. Gorham, the founder of the College.

A Nelson Shield was also presented to the College. This is an interesting memento, which is presented to many educational Institutions, made of copper from Admiral Nelson's flag ship "Victory," and presented by the British and Foreign Sailors' Society, through the munificence of Lord Strathcona.

After the distribution of prizes, the degree of B.D. was conferred on the Rev. J. S. Tucker, who graduated from this College

last spring, and now goes to our Mission in Chisamba under the appointment of our Canadian Missionary Society and the American Board.

The degree of D.D., *honoris causa*, was conferred on the Rev. Hugh Pedley, B.A., of the class of 1877, Pastor of Emmanuel Church, Montreal, and on the Rev. F. W. Macallum, B.A., of the class of 1889, now under appointment to represent the American Board as Superintendent of its Publication Department in Constantinople.

The address was given by Prof. Herbert A. Montz, Ph.D., of Auburn Theological Seminary, New York. His theme was "The Place of Christ in the Church."

#### CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report the Senate would express its thanks to Dr. C. C. Gurd, who has for another year freely given his skill and time to the care of the students in sickness, also to Dr. H. S. Muckelston, for his gratuitous services as a specialist.

It would also express its appreciation of the kindness of the Principal and Faculty of the Presbyterian College in admitting our men into some of their classes, to Prof. Gordon of the same College, and to the Rev. E. C. Woodley, M.A., for their aid in examining papers on the B.D. course, and to the Revs. G. E. Read and J. T. Daley, B.A., for guiding and examining unordained men working on extra-mural courses.

During the year ending April 30th, 1912, eighty-six volumes have been added to the library, seventeen by gift and sixty-nine by purchase. The cash receipts of the Library this year for books

and periodicals, were \$126.49, being \$9.90 more than the previous year. The heirs of Mr. S. H. C. Miner very kindly continued his custom of contributing to the library the fine list of periodicals which it receives.

The library is used largely and constantly, not only by students and professors of the College, but by ministers and others of our own and other denominations in Montreal and in various parts of Canada. At the present time forty-three volumes of the library are out in the hands of those who have borrowed them, for the most part to study during the summer.

# TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer has a very poor report this year. This is more to be regretted, as last year we had a good one.

In Ontario, 23 churches (counting the United Brethren Assn. as one) contributed \$473.39; last year 28 contributed \$648.60, a decrease of \$175.21.

In Quebec 9 churches contributed \$862.75; last year 15 sent \$1,219.78, a decrease of \$257.03.

In the Maritime Provinces, 3 churches contributed \$24.04; last year 9 sent \$65.74, a decrease of \$41.70.

In the North-west one church, Vancouver 1st, contributed \$16.00; last year Victoria sent \$25.00.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Miner for her contribution of \$1,800.00, to Mr. Robertson Macaulay for \$120.00 for bursaries, and Mr. A. Huntley Duff for \$5.00 for a Greek prize.

Last year we had a small balance of \$47 on revenue, this year a deficit of \$447.

On behalf of the Trustees' Endowment Fund, I have to report an increase in capital of \$2,560.00; \$60.00 on account subscriptions, \$500.00 for Baylis Bursary, \$2,000.00 to found the Mrs. Mary C. McKechnie Memorial Lectureship, and \$210.04, Ottawa Jubilee Scholarship.

A number of mortgages have been paid recently, so that we have a considerable amount to invest. The matter is under consideration at present by your Trustees.

The investments are all in good shape and are given at cost price.

I herewith present the financial statement, duly audited by Mr. H. J. Ross, Accountant.





# MINUTES OF THE UNION.

The Sixty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick was held in Liverpool, N.S., on Wednesday, July 10th, 1912.

The meeting was opened at 8 p.m., the Chairman, Rev. E. J. Thompson, of Keswick Ridge, presiding.

Mr. J. H. Sulston, of Economy, N.S., and Mr. Archie L. Richards, student of the C. C. C., were appointed Minute Secretaries, and Revs. J. W. Cox, G. M. Whyte, and Mr. William Moore, Nominating Committees.

The Pastor, Rev. H. G. Wright, gave the address of welcome, and referred to the interesting fact that the Congregational Church of Liverpool had entered upon the 151st year of its history. He gave a brief sketch of the history of the Church since its organization as "Old Zion," in 1761, and showed how intimately related the old church was to the early history of the town of Liverpool, and the county of Queens. The address was listened to with deep interest by the audience.

Mr. Wright was followed by the Mayor, Mr. Mulhall, who extended a very warm welcome on behalf of the citizens generally, and also Rev. He also spoke on Church Union, giving the present standing on the question of the three negotiating bodies. He referred also to the proposed federation of the four Teological Colleges of Montreal.

THURSDAY EVENING.

At 7.30 p.m. a short devotional service was held, Mr. Sulston presiding.

Rev. E. J. Thompson then delivered the retiring Chairman's address. His subject was, "The Condition of Revival."

Rev. H. S. Mahood, B.A., of St. John, N.B., gave a powerful address on "The Minister and His Master," which was followed by an earnest address by Mr. Archie L. Richards, on "The Minister and His Message."

The offering was for the College.

Friday was the Woman's Board Field Day.

At 9 a.m. a united prayer service was held, the Secretary, Rev. J. W. Cox, presiding.

At 10.00 and 2.30, the Union Committee held two very busy sessions, and got through with a large amount of important business.

# SATURDAY, JULY 13.

At 9 a.m. a very inspiring hour of prayer and fellowship was enjoyed. The leader was Mr. J. W. Flewelling.

At 10 a.m. the Union resumed business.

The Business Committee's report was received and adopted, relating to next year's programme.

The Union Committee recommended as follows :---

1. That Rev. G. W. Ball and Mr. J. W. Flewelling be the Apportionment Committee, who shall proceed at once to draw up the schedule of amounts that shall be apportioned to the churches.

2. That the delegates urge upon their various churches the adoption of the Duplex envelope.

3. That the resolution re ministerial standing of the Congregational Union of Canada be confirmed, viz., "That membership in the associations be as at present, and that the Secretaries transfer members to one another as at present, but that transfer to other countries and to other denominations in our own country be made hereafter by the Congregational Union of Canada only—thus making ministerial standing to rest ultimately with the Dominion Union."

4. An invitation having been received from Keswick Ridge to hold the Union with that church in 1913,, it was moved that the invitation be accepted, and that the Union meet in Keswick Ridge, N.B., on Wednesday, June 52th, 1913.

5. Rev. Mr. Gunn having reported that the money received from the two Salem Church deposits, being about \$1,100, had been

paid over to the Treasurer of the C. C. M. S., and credited to the capital of the Missionary Society Church Extension and Building Fund, it was recommended that this be confirmed and adhered to.

6. Messrs. Bevis, Sulston and Wright then came before the Committee, with a view to ordination. They were examined as to their religious experience, call to the ministry, etc. The examination was very satisfactory.

It was recommended as follows:

"That this Union. having received a request from the Margaree Church for the ordination of Mr. W. J. Bevis, and having heard Mr. Bevis' statements of his religious experience, do hereby approve of his ordination on the completion of the Union's course of study, and appoint as an ordaining council, the Chairman and Secretary, to co-operate with the Church.

"And further, that having heard the statement of faith and religious experience of Messrs. Sulston and Wright, that when they shall have completed the Union course and requests for their ordination shall have been received from the churches of which they are pastors, we approve of their ordination, and appoint the Chairman and Secretary of this Union to act with any ordinary council that may be called by the churches.

"And in view of the thorough training needed for the present day ministry, it is the hope of this Committee that a further course of training, if possible at College, be arranged for also. In the meantime,

"That licenses authorizing these brethren to act as pastoral supplies be given them by this Union."

7. The apportionment Committee recommended the following:-Brooklyn, \$150; Beach Meadows, \$75; Chebogue, \$100; Economy, \$100; Kingsport, \$100; L. Selmah, \$250; Liverpool, \$125; Margaree, \$75; Milton, \$100; P. River, \$125; Sheffield, \$225; St. John, \$250; Yarmouth, \$325.

It was further resolved that the Apportionment Committee subdivide the apportionments for the convenience of the churches.

Bills for printing, amounting to \$7, were ordered paid.

8. The matters respecting the Economy Parsonage was brought before the Committee, and it was recommended that Rev. Mr. Middleton visit Economy and advise with the church re the matter.

At 11 a.m. a splendid paper was read by Rev. C. C. Claris, on "The Church Prayer Meeting; is it a Necessity?"

A lively discussion followed, in which a large number took part.

The Business Committee recommended and adopted:----

1. "That the thanks of this Union be tendered to the Chairman for his able and inspiring address, and that, if possible, it be printed in the *Congregationalist*."

2. "That the thanks of the Union be extended to John H. Burton, Esq., of Cooksshire, Quebec, for his kindly assistance rendered in the settlement of the Salem Church Funds."

3. "That the heartfelt sympathy of the Union be extended to Deacon Chas. E. Durning, on account of the painful accident from which he is suffering.

Rev. Mr. Gibson spoke on "Christian Canadian Citizenship.". Both addresses were worthy of the occasion and were well received, and will result in good.

SUNDAY EVENING.

At 7 p.m. Rev. Geo. W. Ball, of Pleasant River, preached from Prov. 29: 18; "Where there is no vision the people perish."

The closing exercises of the Union, presided over by the Chairman, were very enjoyable.

Resolutions of thanks were carried with enthusiasm; all who had contributed in any way to the success of the meetings were remembered.

A blessed season of spiritual fellowship was a feature of the meeting, and was a fitting close of a series of meetings that will never be forgotten by all who had the pleasure of atteneding them.



# CONDENSED MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING C.C.W.B.M.

The twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions was held in the Maxville, Ontario, church, on May 30th and 31st, 1912, with 50 registered delegates in attendance, and forty others.

The President, Mrs. Moodie, opened the Convention on Thursday morning and conducted the devotional exercises.

On the recommendation of the Executive, which had met the previous evening, Mrs. Lighthall, the convener of the Business Committee, and Mrs. H. E. Hume, convener of the Committee on Resolutions, appointed their Committees, and Miss E. A. MacCallum and Miss Maud McIntosh were chosen Minute Secretaries. The reports from the several branches and unconnected auxiliaries in the Western Provinces were heard with great interest. A letterogram of greeting was received from the auxiliary of the First Church, Vancouver, B.C., and greetings were also received from the Misses Melville, enroute to Africa; Miss Emily MacCallum of Smyrna, Turkey; Miss Amy E. McKowan in Japan; the President of the London Branch, and from the Presbyterian and Baptist Woman's Boards. Finance, Credential and Press Committees were chosen. Mrs. F. W. Read, of Montreal, conducted both Noon Hour Prayer Meetings.

Winnipeg, Crescent St. ladies signified their intention of affiliating with the Board immediately. New Mission Bands were reported from Stratford, Fitch Bay, and others were reported as in the process of organization. The address of welcome was given by Mrs. D. C. MacDougall of Maxville, and replied to by the President, Mrs. Moodie.

The meals were all served in the Presbyterian schoolroom, by the ladies of the Congregational church, and Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist homes were throw nopen for the entertainment of the delegates.

The Secretary's report showed continued growth and increased interest in every department of the work. Fifteen new Life Members had been added, making 175 in all. Six names had been placed on the Memorial List.

The Treasurer, Miss Thompson, reported contributions \$4,898.60,

an increase over the previous year, but this was little more than half the amount raised.

Mrs. Savage, Editor of the Monthly Leaflet, reported a slight increase in the circulation of the Leaflet. A special vote of thanks was tendered the Editors for their faithfulness and excellent work for the Board.

The report of Nurse Halpenny's work on the Carlton Union field in Saskatchewan, was listened to with eagerness and thankfulness, and much regret was expressed that Nurse, owing to her future plans, would not be able to continue in our service.

A letter from Mr. Daley was read to the meeting, which outlined Rev. J. D. McEwen's plans for the future of his mission in South America, but on account of the unexpected death of Mrs. McEwen, the communication was filed until further word.

A splendid report of the American Collegiate for Girls, at Smyrna, Turkey, and written by Miss McCallum, was read by Mrs. Weegar. The Committee on Government Annuities reported through Miss Sileox. After hearing the recommendations of the committee, it was decided to take out three annuities for the Misses-H. and M. Melville, and Miss Diadem Bell, of Chisamba, W.C.A.

Thursday evening the speakers were Rev. A. G. Sleep of Ottawa, who told of "A Christian's Opportunities," and Mrs. Dr. Stevenson of Montreal, who gave a sketch of Jane Addams' work in Chicago, or, "The Life of a Home Missionary."

The choir of the church rendered great assistance at both evening meetings. Friday evening, Mrs. E. C. Woodley, who was on the eve of departure for Turkey, spoke of "The Women of India," and Rev. A. J. Mackenzie of Brandon, Manitoba, gave us a "Western Outlook."

The reports of the Superintendents of the several departments of the Board were most satisfactory. The following were appointed for the various superintendencies:—

The Board reassumed its pledged work in regard to the salaries of the three lady missionaries in Africa; the scholarship in the Collegiate in Turkey; the Biblical Instruction in the four Government schools in Ceylon; the grant to the C.C.M.S. was increased to \$1,000, recommending that it be used for Home Missions and North-West work as hitherto; \$50 per annum was voted to the maintenance of the "Chisamba Girls' Fund"; \$200 of the Leaflet Surplus was voted to build a cottage for the girls at Chisamba, to be called the "Mary M. Savage Cottage." The balance of the Ella F. Williams Memorial Fund and the Frances Sanders' bequest, \$473.69, was set apart for a nucleus of a fund to re-build the main operating room of the hospital as Chisamba. The name "Rest Fund" was changed to "Missionaries' Travelling Expenses" (Furlough Fund).

The re-appointment of a successor to Nurse Halpenny was left over for the present, and Nurse was given permission to dispose of her outfit as she thought wise.

\$200 was voted to the C.C.M.S. to assist in the grant to the German Congregational work in Alberta this year; \$100 was voted to Rev. G. J. Hindley, for use on the Landis-Pinwherry field as he desired; \$100 was voted to the Secretary, Miss Silcox, in recognition of her exceptionally heavy duties and personal expenses incurred therewith; Miss Silcox and Mrs. Moodie were appointed delegates to the Union meetings at Montreal, and Miss Silcox to the Annual Meeting of the W. B. M. of N.S. and N.B.; Mr. W. B. Unsworth of Toronto, was re-appointed auditor, Mrs. Moodie and Mrs. Read of Montreal were chosen as representatives of the Board on the Committee on the Federation of Womans' Boards, and the

W. B. M. of Boston were invited to send a representative to the next annual meeting, to be held in Emmanuel, Montreal, 1913.

All the officers were re-elected, with the exception of the Vice-President, who had resigned. Mrs. W. D. Lighthall of Montreal, was made First Vice-President. The Editors, Mrs. Savage and Miss Richardson were also re-appointed.

Short addresses were given by Mesdames Stevenson, Macallum and Read, previous to the Children's Hour, which was addressed by Mrs. Read, Mrs. Cale and Mrs. Woodley, and proved a great success, the children acquitting themselves admirably in their part of the programme.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the people of Maxville and all those who had so kindly assisted in any way in making the meetings the unqualified success they had been.

A Notice of Motion was served that a new by-law be inserted in our Constitution to the effect "That hereafter no thank-offering or regular funds of the auxiliaries be used to designate Life Members."

# FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY.

Your Directors report a quiet, but on the whole a fairly satisfactory year. The assets show a substantial increase.

We would fail in our duty should we not again call the serious attention of the younger members of the ministry to the great advantages of the Society, which gives so much for so little, and whose future is so well assured—the case of Mrs. Jane Climie will illustrate this in no uncertain manner. Mrs. Climie became a beneficiary in 1867, and in 44 years drew \$5,358.92—her husband had contributed \$99.00 only. She died August, 1911.

Your Board gave notice of motion in last year's report re change By-Law 3, Clause 1, so that missionaries of the C.C.F.M.S., duly ordained, may become members of the Fund. This is now before the Society for action.

Your Board met with the Rev. G. Ellery Read on the 25th April last, and after hearing the paper, which suggested very material changes and additional financial burdens being assumed, and which was previously given at the Quebec Association (1910)—discussing same at some length, it was decided that the time wot not opportune for the changes outlined, and that any increased benefits could not be recommended unless the funds of the Society were very considerably augmented.

Rev. G. Watt Smith having withdrawn from the denomination, his name has been dropped from the R.M.B.

In the R.M.B., 22 churches have sent \$428.36, being \$122.03 less than 24 churches gave last year.

In the W. and O. B., 2 churches sent \$24.69, being \$15.76 less than 4 churches gave last year.

A decrease of \$137.79 from last year.

The Capital Accounts of both Branches nevertheless show the substantial increase of \$1,787.75. This is the result of good investments, with a high rate of interest and practically no expenses.

The Rev. John McKillican, one of our oldest annuitants, passed to his reward shortly after our last annual meeting. His faithful and long presence in our Councils will be greatly missed.

## NOTICES OF MOTION.

That Article 2, under Section 3 of the By-laws (page 7 of Bylaws) be amended as follows:—

But after having paid in ten years' annual subscription, he shall have the privilege of withdrawing from the Society as surrender value of his claim an amount based upon the reasons of his withdrawal, as follows:—If he leaves the country, but not the ministry of the denomination, he shall be paid three-fourths of the total amount of his annual subscriptions; if he enters the ministry of another denomination, he shall receive one-half of the total subscriptions paid; if he leaves the ministry, he shall be entitled to two-fifths of the total subscriptions paid. But no member shall be entitled to receive anything from the Society if he was not in good standing in the Congregational Union of Canada at the time of his withdrawal from the denomination or ministry.

2. That Article1, under Section 16 (page 15), be amended in such a way as to specify the reasons why annuities may not be paid to beneficiary members of the R. M. Branch, who have attained the age of sixty-five years and have been compelled to resign the ministry.

3. That Article 3, under Section 13 (page 13), be amended to read as follows:--To guardians on behalf of orphans, in addition

to sixty dollars for the youngest and forty-five for each other child until they attain the ages mentioned in the preceding section, twothirds of the annuity that would have been payable to the mother had she not deceased. Nevertheless the Directors shall have power to delay such payments to guardians until they are satisfied that they will be properly applied.

4. That the following article be added to Section 13:—It shall be competent for the Society, on recommendation of the Directors, to continue an annuity to an orphan by special annual grant beyond the period named in Article 2, should there be special reasons for so doing.

### TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer last year was able to report a considerable increase in receipts from the churches, but this year he has to report a falling off.

In the Widows' and Orphans' Branch two churches have remitted \$24.69, as against three for \$40.45 last year.

In the Retiring Ministers' Branch, 11 churches in Ontario and New Brunswick, \$184.45; last year, 14 churches \$273.49, a decrease of \$89.04.

Seven churches in Quebec this year sent \$231.46; the same churches last year remitted \$269.05, a decrease of \$37.59.

Two churches in the Maritime Provinces remitted this year \$5.40; last year one of these two sent \$1.60, an increase of \$3.80.

From the North-West two churches remitted \$7.05; none last year.

After meeting all obligations, we have been able to carry \$1,000.00 to capital account in the W. and O. B., leaving \$585.69 at credit of revenue. In the R. M. B. we have added \$700.00 to capital, leaving at credit of revenue, \$289.02.

The investments are all in good shape and give nat cost price. Next year is the time to revise annuities.

## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGRE-GATIONAL PUBLISHING COMPANY.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregational Publishing Company was held in Zion Church, Montreal, on Friday, June 7th, 1912, at 4.30 p.m.

In the absence of the President, Mr. Henry O'Hara, Rev. J. T. Daley presided. Rev. Matthew Kelly was appointed Minute Secretary.

The report of the Directors was read by Rev. E. D. Silcox, and adopted for publication in the Year Book, as follows:—

## REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE CONGREGATIONAL PUBLISHING COMPANY OF TORONTO, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31st, 1912.

Your Directors take pleasure in reporting that the *Canadian Congregationalist* has been regularly issued for another year, comprising fifty weekly issues, and also that volume No. 39 of the

Congregational Year Book, was duly prepared and published. These publications have been kindly received on both sides of the sea, as many letters which have reached us from various quarters will testify. Rev. Edwin D. Silcox has continued to do the editorial work, while W. Edwin Mertens has published our paper. During the past year the Methodist Book and Publishing House printed the Year Book, and arrangements have been made with the Armac Press to do this work for the 1912-13 edition.

The number of subscribers does not differ materially from that of last year. We sincerely wish our mailing list could be doubled, and we feel confident that this could easily be done if a little effort were exerted on the part of our churches. Each church should appoint an energetic agent to canvas the congregation for new subscribers. Wherever this method has been adopted, it has resulted very satisfactorily. As the paper is the organ of the churches, it would greatly strengthen all our denominational work if a copy went regularly into every church home, keeping the members of the various families informed concerning all our activities.

The Year Book we regard with a feeling of pride. It is well printed and well bound, the very best material being used in its make-up. We feel free to say that our book is second to none in general appearance among the year books of the denominations.

Notwithstanding this fact we regret to report that many of our churches are not sufficiently interested in it to purchase copies at the nominal price of 25 cents each, a cost which alone would not meet half the expense of publication.

Your Directors recommend that hereafter the churches either order the quantity they require at the time of their yearly meetings, and make the Year Book a charge on the church funds, or allow the Directors or Editor to apportion so many to each church, according to its membership. Either plan would greatly facilitate matters. We trust that definite action will be taken in this matter at the annual meeting. The churches through the Union orders its publication, and are so under moral obligation to see to its circulation and the paying of the printer.

Owing to the increased cost of labor, our publishers have felt it necessary to increase their contract agreements, and this accounts for the small balance presented by the Treasurer. This, too, is an additional reason for the increased interest of pastors and churches in the circulation of the publications. Had it not been for the generosity of our advertisers in the Year Book, who added some

\$363 to our revenue, we do not see how the book could have been published. We are greatly indebted to these business firms and thank them for their patronage which, we trust, will be continued.

At a recent meeting of the Directors, it was decided, in harmony with a resolution passed last year, that, on and after October 1st next, all the interests of the Publishing Company should be handed over to the Union under the Act of Incorporation.

We sincerely hope that under the new regime there will come into this department of our work new life and inspiration which will result in an ever increasing success.

The following was sent to Mr. O'Hara by order of the Union: Mr. Henry O'Hara, Toronto.


