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

From the days of old to the present there has not been a year of such tremendous, far-reaching issues, as the past twelve months bear witness. Just as we went to press last year the great European war burst upon the world, in which our Empire has taken a leading part, and which continues to this day under conditions previously unheard or undreamed of.

Never in the history of the world has such a gigantic, colossal, cruel war, been thrust upon the nations of the earth, and never one so unjustifiable as the one now continued to be waged, involving almost the whole civilized world.

It is estimated that upwards of twenty million soldiers have taken part in this fearful eataclysm. It is no exaggeration to say that two million have been mown down as grass, while tens of thousands are among the wounded.

Hundreds of vessels have been sent to the bottom of the sea, earrying with them thousands of human lives. The most dastardly act of the enemy was the sinking of the Lusitania by a German submarine, in which some two thousand lives were lost.

Cities, towns and villages have been razed to the ground; tens of thousands

are homeless and have suffered the loss of all they possessed, and God only knows how many mourners for the dead "go about the streets."

The conduct of the war on the part of the enemy has been most reprehensible—they having resorted to methods hitherto unknown in warfare. The most diabolical atrocities have been practised in order to destroy human lives, such as were unknown in the past ages; deeds of horror have been

gloated over as though they were meritorious.

Alliances, treaties, have been regarded as "scraps of paper." At the very first stroke of this war Germany lost her honor, and it will take ten centuries to regain it. When she like a big bully struck Belgium and wiped her feet on little Luxemberg, using it as a door mat to get into France, she struck liberty in the face and publicly said to the world that a little nation had no rights that a big nation should respect. In all future conferences of nations, when questions of national honor are under discussion, Germany will have to sit silent, with hung-down head. Weep for the land of Luther.

In this war Canada has nobly, heroically, chivalrously taken her part At the first call by the Empire, she promptly responded with \$50,000,000 and soldiers by the thousands, together with shiploads of foodstuff for the needy. On the firing line our men have proven themselves worthy of highest praise. "Canada has entered, as never before, on the stage of world history, and she has entered nobly. We pay our tribute of honor to the men who have been our representatives on such battlefields as those of Neuve Chappelle and

Langemarche.

In view of all the events of the year it is gratifying to report that the work of our churches has gone steadily on, and this 43rd annual volume tells a story of things accomplished for which we render grateful thanks to the giver of all good.

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CONSTITUTION.

- I.—That the name of this Association be "The Congregational Union of Canada."
- II.—That it shall consist of Congregational churches and of ministers of the same church order received at a general meeting, and of those laymen who have been chairmen of the Union and are members of its churches.
- III.—That this Union is founded on the full recognition of the autonomy of the local churches, and therefore it shall not, in relation to them, assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal.
- IV.—That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation:

 1. To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination.

 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated churches.

 3. To establish a fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere.

 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated churches, accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary.

 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces.

 6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general.

 7. To receive and administer such funds or other property as may at any time be given or entrusted to it.
- V.—To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated churches being represented by two lay delegates, the meeting to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.

WI.—That the officers of this Union be a Chairman, General Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Statistical Secretary, and the Superintendents of departments appointed by the Union. That a committee shall also be elected annually who, with the officers, shall be the Executive Committee of the Union. The duties of the Executive shall be as follows: (1) To act as an Advisory Board with the General Secretary; (2) To prepare business for and make reports of the Union; (3) To carry out instructions of the Union; (4) To act for the Union in matters which may arise between sessions.

VII.—The various kinds of work of the Union may be committed for cultivation and guidance to departments with a Superintendent and committee for each.

VIII.—That alterations may be made in this Constitution at any annual meeting, providing that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting preceding, or published in at least four issues of *The Canadian Congregationalist* preceding the meeting.


STANDING RULES.

- 1. Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, should be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union, shall be referred to a standing committee on membership. Churches so applying shall present a certificate of membership in the association of their district, or if in territory not organized as an association the written recommendation of three members of the Union. In the same manner ministers shall present their certificate of membership in the association within whose bounds they reside or if in territory not organized as an association the written recommendation of three members of the Union. Ministers bearing regular letters of dismissal from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of Canada, and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these grounds. Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) Their membership in a Congregational Church; (2) Their ordination to the ministry; (3) If they have come from any other denomination, their good standing therein; (4) They shall satisfy the Membership Committee in relation to their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views and their literary acquirements, their course of study to have been at least equal to the two-year course adopted by the Union; (5) Should the Membership Committee be satisfied on these points and recommend the applicant for membership, the recommendation shall be filed with the Recording Secretary, and the application and recommendation shall then lie over until the next annual meeting, when a twothirds vote of the members present shall be requisite for admission into membership; (6) By vote of the various associations and the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick ministerial standing will hereafter be in this Union and transfer to our own denomination in other countries and to other denominations shall hereafter be given by this Union only.
- 2. The Union shall meet annually on the Wednesday after the first Sabbath in June, at 9 a.m., when, if the elected chairman be absent, a chairman pro tem. shall be chosen. After a devotional service, minute secretaries and reporters shall be appointed, the Report of the Executive Committee presented, and the Committees on Business, Membership, Nomination and Finance chosen on nomination by the Executive Committee. At 11 a.m. the Union will rise to give place to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society. The Committees appointed by the Union shall meet on the Tuesday previous to the

assembling of the Union, at such time and place as may be arranged in conference with the General Secretary.

- 3. On Wednesday afternoon the Union will hold no public session, in order that time may be given to the work of several committees.
 - 4. The Chairman's address shall be delivered on Wednesday evening.
- 5. On Thursday morning the Chairman for the next year shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, if required, and the votes shall be counted by scrutineers appointed by the Chairman. If no candidate have a majority of the votes east, the names of two persons having the highest number shall be reported, and another vote taken. The Union will adjourn at 11 a.m. on Thursday in favor of the Canada Missionary Society.
- 6. The meetings shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend to an hour.
- 7. No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; no member shall speak twice to the same motion without permission from the chair, and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by the chair.
- 8. The members of the Union shall register their attendance with the Recording Secretary in a book kept for this purpose. The Minutes of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of each day's session, and the Minutes of the last day at the close of the session.
- 9. One of the services on the Lord's Day during the meetings of the Union shall be regarded as a session of the Union, at which the Annual Sermon shall be preached, and in connection with it the Lord's Supper shall be celebrated. The attendance of the Union is expected at this service.
- 10. On Monday evening, during the sitting of the Union, a public meeting of the Union shall be held, the programme of which shall be arranged by the Executive Committee.
- 11. Application shall be made by the Statistical Secretary, one month at least before the annual meeting, for statistics of the several churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the annual meeting, and for publication if so ordered.
- 12. A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each church, on or near the Lord's Day prior to the meeting. From this source, the Finance Committee, after providing for other necessary expenses, shall pay in full if possible, the travelling fares within the bounds of Ontario and Quebec, of each ministerial member, and of one delegate from each church; or if unable to pay in full, shall deduct from the claim of each such equal amounts as may be found necessary; such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except, with leave of the Union (providing always that no member of the Union, whether ministerial or lay, attending the meetings, shall receive anything for travelling expenses unless such ministerial member shall have contributed not less than one dollar, and the church represented by the delegate not less than five dollars to its funds).
- 13. The delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointment by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if they were present at their annual convocations.

- 14. All supplies of pulpits required during the Sunday in which the Union is in session, which are not otherwise provided for, shall be filled by the Nomination Committee in connection with the pastor of the church where the Union is held, and a copy of such appointment shall be posted on the door of the church where the Union is assembled.
- 15. In order to facilitate the introduction of properly accredited preachers to churches connected with the Union which may require pulpit supply, the General Secretary is authorized to send to secretaries or pastors of churches a list of preachers approved by the Executive Committee.
- 16. The term of office of the Chairman and Recording Secretary shall be the calendar year subsequent to that in which they were elected.

The minutes of the ninth annual meeting of the Congregational Union of Canada, held in the Welcome-Zion Congregational Church, Ottawa, Ontario, June 9th to 14th, 1915.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 9TH, 1915.

The Session of the Union began at 9.30 a.m.

The Chairman of the Union, Rev. Galen H. Craik, led in devotions.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA FOR THE YEAR 1914-15.

We meet this year in the dark shadow of the great war, whose tragedies have so filled our hearts and minds that our meeting in the quiet time of peace a year ago seems an incredible distance away.

In this time of unparalleled strife and horror we have been able to rejoice with great pride in the splendid leadership of our Empire, both in the earnest efforts for peace and in the justice of the cause in which war was declared. For this reason the peoples of all the over-seas dominions of the Empire, forced by no law, but under the constraint of love alone, have poured forth their treasures and the greater treasure of their sons, and will continue so to do as long as need be. Already our Canadian troops and our Canadian homes have shared in the price of freedom, and we must set our faces steadily to even greater sacrifices.

From our own churches hundreds of men have gone, and of our ministers, eight have sons at the front, including our Chairman, Rev. Mr. Craik.

In the terrible waste and destruction of war there emerge already some redeeming features. Our people in Canada have come back to a saner and better plan of life. Self indulgence and extravagance have been cut down. Unselfish giving and service have increased. The deeper eternal things of life have come to the front. Our churches in spiritual things have had a good year, marked by many large accessions to membership. In financial matters, the local church funds, though feeling the war strain, especially in the West, have kept up nearly to the usual mark. The denominational benevolences have on the whole had an unexpectedly good year. Altogether our churches have reason to thank God and take courage for larger things.

We have this year an unusual pleasure in meeting with a people and pastor who have been together since the very beginning of the church life, for Welcome Zion has as its pastor still, Rev. H. I. Horsey, who began his service and the Church here at the same time in 1896. We congratulate the church and pastor on their unbroken fellowship.

The Executive held in September a three day conference of the departments of our denominational life, with beneficial results, and have met from time to time during the year.

In addition to the various patriotic and relief funds to which our churches have given generously, the grave needs of unhappy Belgium called for a special offering, and this was taken in our churches in February, with the result that \$510.09 was contributed to this cause, arrangements being made to have the amount expended for Canadian goods to be sent forward.

Of the matters committed to our care by the last Union, we would report as follows:

Concerning the dates of the Union, we recommend that no change be made.

The three year course of study for men who are not able to take College training has been under very careful consideration during the year, and we herewith present the details of the course agreed on and recommend its adoption by the Union. In this connection we recommend that this three year course he substituted in Standing Rule 1 for the former two year course as the minimum requirement for admission to the Union.

We would further recommend that this course or its equivalent be regarded in all our Associations as an absolute minimum for ordination, and

that in exceptional cases where it might be deemed advisable to ordain men not having attained this standard, the consent of the Union shall be obtained before ordination.

Standing Rule 12 was also referred to the Executive, and we herewith submit an amendment to that rule covering the points raised.

The Executive have also been considering the possibility of our various funds uniting in a campaign for conditional gifts to the various departments of our work, the income from such gifts to be paid to the donors during life, and the principal to be available for the fund designated on the death of the donor. Guaranteed by the large endowments and income of our funds this would provide full and secure interest on the gift during the donor's life, and secure also for the fund the total of the gift purposed without loss or diminution.

In inter-denominational relations we would report that the Advisory Council for the Union Churches in the North West has held meetings during the year at which we were represented by Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, B.D., of Calgary.

The Committee on Co-operation with other churches has not been called to meet, though the plan of co-operation drawn up some years ago is being largely followed in the Western Provinces.

The Joint Committee on Church Union has met during the year and our Committee will report the result.

The central Commission to prepare for the proposed general Conference on Unity, has in spite of the interruptions caused by the war, gone steadily ahead, and is developing the methods to be pursued at the Conference, and from time to time reports the appointment of representatives by Christian bodies in various lands.

IN MEMORIAM.

We have to report during the year the loss by death of two of the members of our Union, the Rev. Chas. S. Pedley, not at the time in the pastorate, but doing a strong and much appreciated service in the Children's Aid work. Also the death of our Pioneer Missionary to Africa, the Rev. Walter T. Currie, D.D., who passed away at "Chisamba," as he called his home near Victoria, after long and painful illness, leaving our churches in Canada and the work in Africa greatly enriched by his life and work.

We sympathize also with our brother, Rev. Enoch Barker, in the loss by death of his wife. At the last Union we rejoiced with Mr. and Mrs. Barker in the celebration of their sixtieth wedding anniversary, and now express our

sincere sympathy to Mr. Barker in his loneliness.

The Union programme has been prepared as usual and is now before you. We rejoice in the prospect of happy and helpful meetings and in welcoming to our Union Rev. Dr. Edward C. Moore, Plummer Professor of Christian Morals of Harvard University, and President of The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, and also Rev. Professor Welsh of the Presbyterian College, who will come to us as a representative of the happy co-operation of the Theological Colleges in Montreal.

All of which is respectfully submitted on behalf of the Executive.

The following amendment to Standing Rule No. 12 was then presented by the General Secretary:-

That Rule 12 be amended to read after "travelling fares" the words "within the bounds of Ontario and Quebec, of each ministerial member and of one delegate from each church, or if unable to pay in full, etc.," to the end of the present paragraph. The parenthesis "providing always, etc," to be removed and added at the close of the paragraph as an independent clause.

The amendment as presented was then adopted.

Rev. A. Margrett presented the statistical report for the past year. On motion the report was adopted, to be printed in the year book, with thanks to the District Secretaries.

At 12 o'clock Rev. Byron H. Stauffer gave the first of a series of noon hour addresses, "Sermons of Service."

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION.

The evening session was in charge of the Chairman of the Union, who gave the Annual Address, his subject being "Some of Our Needs."

CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS.

The Needs of the Church To-day.

By GALEN H. CRAIK, B.D.

On Wednesday evening, June 9th, the Session was opened with Scripture reading by Rev. R. Wilson Carr, of Fitch Bay, followed by prayer by Rev. Galen H. Craik, of Melbourne, and the congregation sang "The Church's One Foundation." The chorus choir of Welcome Church rendered an inspiring anthem. Rev. Harold I. Horsey, presiding, gave a short and happy address of welcome to the Union.

The event of the evening was the annual address by Chairman Galen H.

Craik, in substance as follows:-

This church in which we are met gives an example of the beneficent results of a long and faithful pastorate. This inscription is seen on the tomb of Sir Christopher Wren in St. Paul's, London: "Would you see his monument,

look around you.'' Welcome Zion Church with its fine and growing plant and its influence in the community are the monument of our brother Horsey's labors for the past two decades.

The theme which I have chosen for this annual message is a simple one but fitting to the hour: "The Needs of the Church To-day." Paul says: "We are the body of Christ." The church fulfils the place of his voice, head, hands and feet. The first work of the church is to give expression to the message of Christ. The supreme purpose of God is to seek and to save that which is lost. The second great work of the church is to express Christ in terms of service to men. Thus is the great message made effective. Sometimes the church fails in one or both of these tasks. Such failure was marked by the rise of John Wesley, was marked again by the rise of the Salvation Army, still again by the appearance of the Christian Science Church. Each of these seems to have sprung up to fill a need which the church had failed to fill.

We need what I have chosen to call "A Popular Apologetic." Something which will bring home to all the people the close relationship which exists between morals, religion, the church, on the one hand, and education, trade and commerce, art, science, invention and all true advancement on the other. A Japanese statesman addressing a great throng of his countrymen together with missionaries and foreign diplomats said: "There can be no civilization without morality, there can be no morality without religion, there can be no religion without Christ." Vice and immorality lower the consuming power of the individual or the community. Said a storekeeper to me, "I have just written off my books a bad account of \$60.00, and" (stepping to the door and pointing) "my \$60.00 went into that hotel door yonder and over the bar."

Pick out the families in a town most vicious and immoral, compare them in their outlay for life's necessities and luxuries—their part in the life of the town, with the consuming power and the serving power of the same number of families of upright church-going people—and the contrast will be startling indeed. There are a few isolated communities in the Eastern Townships that are largely devoid of any interest in the church and religion. They are marked as the most unprogressive and poorest farmed portions of that beautiful and fertile region of Quebec. A friend travelling in Switzerland has noted the contrast upon passing from a Protestant to a Catholic canton. In the former are pretty churches, nicely kept farms clean and beautifully tilled, an air of prosperity about the farm steading and over the whole scene. Then a change as to midnight when he passed over the border into the Catholic canton. Churches dark and forbidding, like charnel houses filled with bones and relics of saints, farms weed-grown with tumble-down buildings, dirty and unkempt children, all showing that a superstitious faith is no match for a reformed intelligent faith in the mere matter of producing good farmers. The farmers' apologetic should teach us that there is a vital and close relation between the church, religion, morals and good farming.

The railroads of this continent, in their lavish expenditures for railroad Y.M.C.A. buildings have pointed the truth that religion helps the laboring man, for railroad officials with one accord testify that with the men under Y.M.C.A. influence there are fewer accidents, fewer cases of wrong-doing and higher grades of efficiency. These things are a quiet, continuous means of awaking the people to the true work of the church.

Another need of the church which calls to us with growing clearness is that of Church Union. The pettiness and contemptibleness of competition between the churches has been forced upon us until we have asked, "O Lord, how long? How long?" Especially in the rural sections do we need this church union. Take a look at our Melbourne field and district in Richmond

county, and at our Ulverton field and district in the adjoining county of Drummond. At the Ulverton field in the township of Durham and a portion of the French township of L'Avenir, are 926 English-speaking Protestants; among these are actually three Episcopal, three Methodist and one Congregational—in all seven organized Protestant churches with buildings, official boards and all necessary paraphernalia to run each. This makes an average of thirty families to each. In stipend these churches pay \$2,500 and entire running expenses total \$3,700, that is \$4 per individual man, woman and child.

As far as members are concerned, one strong church could serve the whole, or, owing to the extent of territory two rightly located instead of seven could do the work, and that far better than it is now done by the seven. Let us take a couple of villages with 1,000 inhabitants each, say in Lancaster in Eastern, and Embro in Western Ontario. In such villages, with nearly the same proportion of Protestants, plant seven churches with sheds, grounds and two parsonages, and you have again conditions analogous to those existing at Ulverton, Quebec.

In Melbourne and district we have two villages, Melbourne and Richmond, with 3,000 people half French and Catholic, and two townships of Cleveland and Melbourne. The total Protestant population here is 2,494. In this territory are twelve churches with horse sheds, six parsonages and property valued at \$50,000. In stipend there is an outlay of \$6,000 per year, with outlay for all purposes of \$10,000. This averages fifty families in each congregation paying \$4 per head for the support of a pure Gospel.

Richmond happens to be a long, narrow town one and a half miles in length, with a total population, Roman Catholic and Protestant, similar to the Protestant population in this Melbourne district, viz., 2,500. Imagine this town to be wholly Protestant. Post along its main street at regular intervals twelve Protestant churches with six parsonages, put an outlay on that little village of \$10,000 per year for the support of the church and you would do just what a denominationalism gone mad has done and is doing in the Melbourne district. Yet one of the Presbyterian ministers in that district went to the General Assembly at Kingston last week and voted against church union. May the Lord have mercy on his soul.

Another need of the church is that its Christian people shall learn faster to co-operate in all kinds of Christian enterprise, especially in resistance to the menace of the great evil which threatens the life of every community. The liquor traffic is a constant challenge to the fighting power of a united church

but it has to retreat step by step before that church.

Still another need is a deepened sense of sin. Let us be thankful for here and there an outstanding clergyman who has spoken plainly and bluntly of the community's transgressions. Such men as Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor), D. C. Hamilton and Salem Bland. May their tribe increase. May the men in the ministry who wax hot and like the prophets of old strike and smite and smite and strike, ever increase. Our conditions are growing worse rather than better. No man can be elected in any constituency who does not put up a good roll of money. Hence from the voter goes the influence that corrupts our whole political fabric and makes every decent self-respecting citizen blush for very shame. Public opinion must be aroused in regard to this question, leading to the appointment of public prosecutors, independent of both parties, whose business it will be to search out and prosecute every act of graft and bribery and to punish the guilty.

In England, the Christian ministry have created what is known as the non-conformist conscience. It is England's best moral asset. Why shall not the clergy of Canada create here a conscience that shall be as effective for

righteousness as the non-conformist conscience of England.

Shall the churches seek these reforms directly or indirectly? We must conserve in our churches the definite task for which they were designed, the bringing of men to God. We must teach men to aspire and worship. Prof. David Smith in his book "Christian Counsel" says: "Are we never to escape from the monastic idea that the world is a Godless domain and its employments irreligious? This is not the scriptural conception. Think of that beautiful passage (Exod. 31: 1-5) where it is written that, when the tabernacle was a building the Lord 'Called Bezaleel and filled him with the spirit of God.' For what end? That he might prophesy or minister at the altar? No. 'To work in gold and in silver and in brass, and in cutting of stones to set them, and in carving of timber, to work in all manner of workmanship.' Bezaleel was a craftsman, his craft was his calling of God, and his skill was the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. And think of our blessed Lord. His ministry of teaching and healing lasted only three years, for eighteen years He was a carpenter at Nazareth. But all the while He was glorifying God, and doing the Father's will, and working the work of Him that sent Him, no less while handling hammer and saw than while laying his hands on sick folk and preaching the Gospel of the Kingdom. He knew that He had come to redeem the world and that the time was short, yet He never fretted at the seeming futility of those obscure years. He accepted what each day brought as God's appointment and waited patiently until His call came. Old Stradivari of Cremona had the true idea of 'Christian work,' when he recognized his violin-making as his calling of God and put his heart into it. 'If my hand slacked I should rob God, since He is fullest good.' 'Tis God gives skill,

But not without men's hands: He could not make Antonio Stradivari's violins

without Antonio."

THURSDAY, JUNE 10th, 1915.

The Session opened at 9.30 a.m.

After devotions by the chairman, the minutes of the previous sessions were read and adopted.

The recommendations of the Business Committee were then adopted, viz., That ten minutes be granted on Thursday morning to Rev. W. M. Rochester, Secretary, Lord's Day Alliance.

That ten minutes be given to Mr. John H. Roberts, Quebec Branch, Dominion Alliance, on Friday morning.

That place be made for Rev. Drs. Pedley and Day to bring in a resolution relating to the war.

That invitations to the Union for next year from Sherbrooke and Montreal to remain over until the arrival of Rev. G. Ellery Read.

The report of the Membership Committee, as follows, was then presented by the convener, Rev. Dr. Day, and adopted.

"That the names of Revs. Joseph Thackeray, L. E. West, Edgar White-house and Robert Stevenson, carried over on probation from 1914, be now entered in full membership.

"That the name of Rev. B. C. Simmons, now on probation, be dropped.

"That the names of Revs. James McAddie and H. G. Rice, M.A., B.D., be dropped from the roll, they having been received by the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

"That the Rev. Charles Croucher be received by letter of transfer from the Warwickshire Congregational Union of England.

"That in accordance with the Standing Rule, the applications of the following be received, and their names stand over for a year: Rev. T. W. Davidson, of Calvary Church, Montreal; Rev. John H. Sulston of Margaree, N.S., and Rev. Andrew G. Mann of Lower Selmah, N.S.

"That the following be received as corresponding members: Rev. T. W. Davidson of Calvary Church, Montreal; Rev. W. J. Hindley of Central Church, Winnipeg; Rev. Edward Caldwell Moore, Ph.D., of Boston, and Rev. R. E. Welsh of Montreal.

"That a letter of transfer be granted to the Rev. Sheldon Slater to the Jamestown Congregation Association of North Dakota.

"That a letter of dismission and fraternal recommendation be granted to the Rev. R. Hailey Trill and to the Bishop and diocese of Montreal."

The Rev. E. D. Silcox, Toronto, was elected Chairman for 1916.

The Rev. W. M. Rochester, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, briefly addressed the gathering.

His Worship the Mayor of Ottawa, Mr. Nelson D. Porter, extended to the delegates the welcome and freedom of the city.

The report of the Resolution Committee, dealing with the war, was then moved by Rev. Dr. Pedley and seconded by Rev. Dr. Day.

"We, the members of the Congregational Union of Canada would place on record our profound sorrow over the fact that the peace of Europe, to which we had grown accustomed, has been broken by a war which has left but small portions of that continent untouched, and whose effects are felt in every part of the world, civilized and uncivilized.

"We are thankful beyond expression that so far as the British Empire is concerned, the issue is an unclouded one. While no doubt the security of the Empire itself was a matter for serious thought, the consideration which finally precipitated action was of a supremely moral character. It is this note, rather than one of material interest, which has resounded to the remotest confines of the Empire, and has secured that unanimity of action on the part of widely separated provinces and dominions, which is one of the most remarkable phenomena in the history of nations.

"We would express the hope that out of this welter of pain and destruction, there shall spring a notable advance in the direction of national freedom and international good understanding. We have by no means abandoned the conviction, that the world is moving towards the hour when disputes between nations, as now between individuals, shall be settled by law and not by the cruel and unsatisfactory arbitrament of force.

"We are deeply moved by the story of courage, self-devotion and heroic deed that comes from the ranks of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Canada has entered, as never before, on the stage of world history, and she has entered nobly. We pay our tribute of honor to the men who have been our representatives on such battlefields as those of Neuve Chappelle and Langemarche. We trust that the call for recruits will ever find enthusiastic response, and that there will be no lack of sympathy and practical service for those who bear the immediate burden of separation, suspense and bereavement."

This report was adopted by a standing vote and the singing of the National Anthem.

At the noon hour, Rev. Byron H. Stauffer gave his second address on "Sermons of Service."

FRIDAY, JUNE 11TH, 1915.

- 2. Your committee urges upon all teachers, superintendents and pastors the need of carefully considering plans for next fall and winter, including:—
- (i.) Increased efficiency in graded classes and progressive training in the schools.
 - (ii.) Regular instruction in Temperance, Missions and Christian History.
- (iii.) Teacher training and catechetical instruction with a pastor's communicant class if at all possible.
- (iv.) That the work of the school be consummated in the confession of Christ and membership in the Church.
- -(v.) Co-operation with the Inter-denominational Sunday School Association.''

At noon the Rev. Byron H. Stauffer delivered his third address on "Sermons of Service." The Union then adjourned to meet at 5 o'clock p.m.

The report of a special committee appointed by the Chairman was received in connection with the publication of the denomination.

The Committee recommended, "That the Canadian Congregationalist be printed as a monthly, equal in capacity to two of the present issues, providing the saving in the cost of publication warrants the same."

On motion this recommendation was carried by a small majority. It was felt, however, that it would be unwise to proceed in this course with such a bare majority for the measure. The motion was therefore reseinded, and the whole matter referred to the judgment of the Publication Department.

It was further moved by the Committee, "That the Missionary Societies and College be requested to divide the amount of the liability of the Publication Committee for the past year, amounting to two hundred and seventy dollars, between them, and that the amount be discharged by them as soon as possible, on a basis proportionate to the income for the year 1914-15."

SATURDAY JUNE 12TH, 1915.

Session opened at 9.30.

Rev. H. J. Kilbourn, for the Sunday School and Young People's Department, then introduced the subject of Evangelism. The report of this department was then discussed and referred to the Union Executive.

The report of the Church Union Committee was read by Dr. Warriner, as follows:—"Your committee has co-operated with the committees of the

Methodist and Presbyterian Churches in the negotiations of the past year. Two conferences have been held. On the 29th of September last, an informal meeting of representatives of the three committees was held in Ottawa to consider the general situation and take what steps might be necessary in preparation for a formal meeting of the three committees in December. At that first conference your committee was represented by the Revs. Hugh Pedley, H. I. Horsey and Frank J. Day.

On the 16th and 17th of December last, the three committees held a conference in the Bond Street Congregational Church, Toronto. Dr. Pedley, the Chairman of your Committee, presided. The Conference discussed:

(1) The proposed changes in the Basis of Union suggested by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church; (2) Changes suggested by the denominational committees on Church Union; (3) The name to be given to the United Church, and the names to be given to the courts and officials of the United Church; (4) The legal aspects of the whole question of Church Union; (5) Other matters preparatory to the final recommendation regarding Church Union to be presented to the proper courts of the negotiating churches.

As expressing the spirit of this conference, we quote the resolution with which it closed, and in which your committee unanimously and heartily concurred: "This joint committee on Church Union, representing the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches, in closing this session desire to give thanks to God for the guidance of His Spirit in their deliberations. They gratefully acknowledge that all the discussions have been marked by such a brotherliness, a freedom, a disinterested effort for the best, as can only in the judgment of the committee, be ascribed to the gracious and unifying influence of the Spirit of Christ.

"The Committee in commending this Basis, so harmoniously amended, to the judgment of the negotiating churches, do so in a faith strengthened by this conference, that this movement so wonderfully carried on thus far will be brought, by the blessing of the great Head of the Church, to a cordial consummation."

We have now to report that the General Assembly of the Presbyterian • Church, meeting this week in Kingston, has expressed its approval of the amended Basis, and has ordered its transmission to the Presbyteries for their judgment under the Barrier Act. The decision of the question will depend on the votes now to be cast, and which will be submitted to the Assembly of 1916.

The Basis as amended is herewith presented for the consideration of this Union. Your committee which has co-operated fully with the committees of the other two churches, does not think that the changes suggested are such as to call for a new consideration and vote by our churches at the present time. Such action of course will have to be taken before the matter can be legally and finally determined. We would recommend.

- 1. That this Union express its approval of the Basis as now submitted, its gratification that the negotiations so long pending have now been advanced another stage, and its hope that there will be no unnecessary delay in bringing the proposed Union to a successful consummation.
- 2. That the Committee be continued, with instructions to take such steps at it may deem necessary to forward the proposed Union.''

The report was adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee was given by Mr. F. G. Ellis, and on motion was adopted. The treasurer was given permission to pay the travelling expenses of the delegates, with a deduction of eight dollars from each.

The devotional hour was conducted by Rev. G. E. Read of Sherbrooke.

SUNDAY JUNE 13TH, 1915.

The Union Service was held on Sunday evening in the Welcome-Zion Church, the Rev. H. I. Horsey presiding. The Union Sermon was preached by Rev. Hermon A. Carson, B.A., of Point St. Charles, Montreal.

The Communion Service of the Union took place at the close of the regular service, and was conducted by the pastor, representative deacons assisting.

MONDAY, JUNE 14TH, 1915.

Devotions were conducted by the Chairman at 10 o'clock.

The report of the Publication Sub-committee was presented and referred to the Executive Committee.

On motion of Judge Leet, the appointment of Finance Committee was left with Executive Committee, as well as the appointment of Treasurer.

The Rev. T. DeCourcy Rayner then called the attention of the Union to a Union cause that had recently been started at James St. Mountain, Hamilton. It was decided to leave this matter in the hands of our Hamilton Churches, to act in conjunction with our General Secretary, with power to enter into such an agreement if deemed advisable.

In accordance with notice of motion given on page 57 of the Year Book, Rev. E. L. Rice moved, "That we commence our Union on Tuesday with the Young People's Meeting, and finish with the Communion Service on Sunday." This was seconded by Rev. H. A. Carson. After considerable discussion Dr. Warriner moved that the matter be referred to the Executive to confer with the Executives of the Committees. This was carried.

The following resolution was then moved by the Rev. H. A. Carson, and carried:—"Whereas it has been the custom in successive years for many ministers to return to their respective churches in order to fill the pulpit, thereby weakening the attendance, the inspiration and success of Union Sundays;

Be it therefore resolved that this Union urges upon all our churches the necessity of the largest possible co-operation in order to free ministers from responsibility on Union Sunday." The Union then adjourned until the evening at 8.15.

After an address by Rev. T. W. Davidson on "The Ministry of Influence," and the closing address by Rev. E. L. Rice, the usual resolutions of thanks and gratitude were passed, the minutes were taken as read and adopted, and the secretary instructed to edit the minutes for publication in the Year Book.

The Union adjourned to meet with Plymouth Church, Sherbrooke, in 1916.

REPORT OF THE PUBLICATION COMMITTEE OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA, FOR THE YEAR 1914-15.

Acting on the authority granted at the Union meeting of 1914, your committee added to its personel Mr. Fred J. Smith and Mr. Robert Wightman.

Your committee begs leave to report the publication of the Canadian Congregationalist throughout the year in fifty numbers, under the editorship of the Rev. E. D. Silcox, with Mr. W. Edwin Mertens as publisher. The amount of paid-up subscriptions is \$98.50 in excess of that of last year; but the amount received from advertisements is \$169.40 less than the amount received the previous year, which was our best year of advertising. The expense account is the smallest in the past seven years.

The Canadian Congregational Year Book was issued in September, 1914, and we regret to report that the returns from the sales are \$22.50 less than the amount received last year, which amount was \$33.75 less than the amount received the previous year. The amount received from advertising is \$80.00 less than last year, and the amount received from advertising is \$80.00 for the church organizations \$55.00 less. The expenses connected with the Year Book are slightly greater than last year.

The net loss in receipts for the year totals about \$228.00, and your committee therefore has to report a liability of \$270.00, being \$120.00 to our editor and \$150.00 to our publisher, less a balance of cash on hand of \$17.36.

In considering the best policy to pursue in order to increase the revenue from our publications, your committee advanced the price of the Year Book to fifty cents. This policy has not received the support of the churches.

The Union Committee retired the liability of the committee for the year

1913-14, which amounted to \$110.00.

Your committee recognizes the importance of our publications to our denominational life, and regrets that it has to present a report carrying with it so large an increase in liability. We feel that the time has come when either our publications must receive more practical support from the churches, or our publications must be carried on under different auspices.

ANNUAL REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES.

Your committee has done little more than to gather information from the schools; to write personal letters to workers concerning methods; and to provide for their part of the Union Programme comprising the Wednesday afternoon Conference, the Monday evening Rally, as well as to have a display of Pilgrim Press S. S. Helps for both graded and uniform systems.

Judging from the statistical returns it is desirable to have more uniformity in the denominational supplies in use in our schools, and the Committee would draw attention to the Pilgrim Series, which is conceded to be the best, and in using these helps we give denominational tone to our work. The Information Bulletins reveal a misrellaneous assortment from Cook, Pres., U.B., S. S. Times, Keystone, and Pilgrim Press, whereas it would greatly assist to concerted

action by the schools to use, in so far as possible, the denominational publications.

While the statistical work done during the year is very incomplete, it marks a beginning in the gathering of specific information other than that sent to the denominational Statistical Secretary, and as the new plan is worked

out should prove valuable.

The committee sent out over one hundred forms, and had fifty-six re-Although this departure was not taken up enthusiastically by half onr schools, those sending in returns have greatly assisted the committee, and these reveal interesting facts, giving some idea of the strength and weakness of our work. For example, we have 23 Teachers' Meetings reported; 11 schools are graded, namely, Calvary, Montreal (in Primary), Plymouth, Sherbrooke, Yarmouth, 1st Congregational, Vancouver, Kitselano, Vancouver, St. James' Park, Winnipeg, 1st, London (in beginner's), Olivet, Toronto, (b), Zion, Lanark, (b) Emmanuel, Montreal, 1st Congregational, Kingston.

There were 27 adult Bible classes reported organized; 11 schools using

the new graded lesson, and 47 the old uniform series.

Thirty-two schools use Cook's publications, 17 the Pilgrim Press, 1 Pres'n, 3 U. B. literature, and 3 the S. S. Times and Keystone.

Thirty-seven reported giving regular instruction in Temperance, 27 in Missions, while 8 observed Decision Day. A number of the churches had ingatherings from their schools, namely: Central Winnipeg 41, Maxville 16, Guelph 15, Calvary, Montreal 15, 1st Vancouver 12, Northern, Toronto 12, Broadview, Toronto 11, Diltz Road, Dunville 10, Western, Toronto 9, Eleho 8, Sherbrooke 7, Beach Meadows 7, three others had 6, one had 4, four had 3, three had 2, and six had 1 addition during the year. In all 183 were reported in the 56 returns sent in, which would indicate a healthy condition, for we did not have returns from some of the larger churches having good increases on membership during the year.

A weakness in our S. S. work is lack of uniformity and systematized oversight, which while advisory, would yet have the weight of accepted and

experienced leadership in this most important department.

The committee would therefore submit the following proposals to the

Union for its consideration:

That at the earliest possible moment a denominational worker be secured to take charge of the Department of Sunday Schools and Young

People's Societies.

Your committee is convinced that should such a trained worker be secured, who together with executive ability for the School and Young People's Department had the gift of an Evangelist, he could not only visit the churches to organize Teacher Training, Graded Departments, and Young People's Societies; but his itinerary would result in an appeal to the young for confession of Christ and uniting with the Church.

Such a missioner to the children of the Church would be felt from an instructional, inspirational, and evangelistic point of view, and in association with the General Secretary would be a most useful denominational officer.

Your committee feels that should the proper man be found, the office, with assistance from the George Robertson Evangelistic Fund, would financially support itself We are convinced that the future of our Denomination needs a strong and well organized effort in this department of the church-life.

With the newer methods being introduced in all up-to-date schools, this Department should be strengthened and in charge of an expert giving the time and effort such as no pastor having the charge of parochial work can

possibly give to it.

Your committee urges upon all Teachers, Superintendents and Pastors the need of carefully considering plans for next fall and winter, including:-

(1) Increased efficiency in graded classes and progressive training in the schools.

(2)Regular instruction in Temperance, Missions, and Christian History. Teacher Training and Catechetical Instruction, with a Pastor's (3) Communicant Class, if at all possible.

(4) That the work of the school be consummated in the confession of Christ and membership in the Church.
(5) Co-operation with the Inter-denominational Sunday School Association in conferences and teacher training.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I .-- NAME.

This Corporation shall be called "The Canada Congregational Missionary Society," and shall conduct its operations within the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be as set forth in the Act of Incorporation, namely, to plant and to foster Congregational Churches in suitable localities; to aid churches in sustaining their pastors where required.

ARTICLE III.-MEMBERSHIP.

All persons being members or adherents of Congregational Churches, paying two dollars annually into the funds of the Society, shall be members, and those who subscribe at one time twenty dollars or more shall be life members. Churches subscribing annually ten dollars or more may be represented at the annual meeting of the Society by one delegate, and churches subscribing fifty dollars or more may be represented by two delegates. Each auxiliary branch contributing annually to the funds of the Society ten dollars or more may be represented by one delegate. The above-mentioned subscribers and delegates shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV .- OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The officers of the Society shall be President, an Honorary President, a Secretary, an Honorary Secretary, a Treasurer, a Superintendent of Immigration may also be appointed. The Standing Committees shall be a General

Committee and an Executive Committee. These officers and committees shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall be members of the Corporation. The General Committee shall consist of the President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent, Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration, Honorary President and Honorary Secretary, and not more than twentyfive members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Honorary President, the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Superintendent, the Honorary Secretary, the Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration Department, one member from each District Association within the bounds of the operations of the Society, and one from the Winnipeg Congregational Church Extension and Building Society, and these members shall hold office from the date of their election by their various Associations.

ARTICLE V .- DUTIES.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and its committees, when practicable, and shall seek to promote the general interest of the Society's work.

The Secretary shall have charge of the books and correspondence of the Society, shall call the meetings of the Society and its committees, and shall

exhibit the records of the proceedings at each meeting. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Society, disbursing them as directed by the General or Executive Committee, and shall present

annually a full account of all receipts and disbursements.

The Superintendent shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, to whom he shall report quarterly, visit the churches of the Congregational order within the bounds of the Society's operation with a view of deepening their interest in its work, and of securing liberal contributions for the Society, and shall explore new mission fields, secure missionaries for vacant churches, and have a general oversight of the interests and work of the Society.

The Auditors shall examine the accounts of the Society when required, and make an annual audit of the Treasurer's books previous to the annual

meeting of the Society.

The General Committee shall exercise all the corporate powers of the Society, have charge of annual mission grants made to the churches, examine, employ and direct all the missionaries of the Society, and have a general supervision of its affairs. They shall present a report of the work of the

Society at each of its annual meetings.

The Executive Committee shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society during the interval between the annual meeting of the General Committee; shall receive all applications from churches for aid from the Society, and report thereon on the General Committee, to whom they shall make an annual report of their proceedings.

ARTICLE VI .- MEETING.

The Corporation shall meet annually on the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles. A public annual missionary meeting shall be held on the evening of the next day. Special meetings for the despatch of special business may be called by the Executive Committee at such time and place as may be deemed desirable, provided that a month's notice be given thereof. The General Committee shall hold their meetings at the same time and place as the Corporation, at the call of the Secretary; and the Executive Committee shall hold their quarterly meeting at the time and place it may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE VII.—CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

All sums of money specially collected, given or bequeathed for the purpose, together with the proceeds received from the sale of disused church property, shall form a Church Extension and Building Fund, which shall be invested by the Corporation, who may apply the income thereof, by the General or Executive Committee, by the way of loans, or otherwise, for the organization of churches in new fields, and for the erection or enlargement of places of worship where they may be required.

ARTICLE VIII, --- AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Auxiliary branches of this Society may be formed in churches and localities, to co-operate in the work of the Society. Each branch shall, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, make an annual report to the Secretary and send to the Treasurer all funds collected on its behalf.

ARTICLE IX. - MISSIONARIES.

Each missionary in the employment of this Society must be a regularly accredited member of a Congregational Church, and shall endeavor faithfully to promote all the interests of the Congregational denomination in Canada. He shall send to the Secretary a half-yearly statement of his work, and furnish such statistical returns as may be called for.

ARTICLE X.-MISSIONS.

Each church requiring a missionary grant by the General Committee must make application therefor through the Secretary, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, according to the printed forms provided, in which a certificate to the effect that all previous pledges of support to its pastor have been fulfilled shall be inserted. Churches aided by this Society are required to make an annual collection for the funds and to keep their property sufficiently insured, and such churches acquiring property shall have inserted in the Trust Deed a clause providing that in case the church shall at any time be disbanded or cease to exist the property shall revert to the Society.

ARTICLE XI .- RECEIVING AND DISMISSING PASTORS.

Churches aided by this Society are required, as far as practicable, in the settlement and dismissal of pastors, to carry out the recommendations passed by the Congregational Union of Outario and Quebec, in 1876, in relation to Councils. In cases where this is impracticable, the sanction of the Executive Committee must be obtained offore a settlement or dismissal of a pastor is consummated.

ARTICLE XII.—CONVEYING PROPERTY.

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate, and to discharge mortgages, and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person, on behalf of the Corporation, to accept conveyances of real estate and to receive mortgages. The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may require it.

ARTICLE XIII .- AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, one day's notice having previously been given of the proposed amendment, in writing.

NOTICE.

It is becoming more than ever a practice among Christian people to recognize the Lord's portion in their Last Wills and Testaments, whereby, though they be dead, they speak and act in the furtherance of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent objects. American Congregationalists are among the most wise and generous in this day, and have left legacies of blessings for succeeding generations. Among the members of our Congregational churches in Canada there have also been those who have followed a likewise generous course.

For the guidance of those who may desire to make like bequests, the following legal form is subjoined. The amount bequeathed may be devoted specially to the Church Extension and Building Fund, in which case the income only would be used, or may be given for the general purposes of the Society.

SIXTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CANADA CONGREGA-TIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY, 1914-1915.

This has been a year of more than ordinary anxiety and responsibility

for the Executive officers of the Missionary Society.

When we closed our meetings in June, 1914, we had based our promises for the year on the fact that the year just closed had been, in spite of hard times, the best year the Society had ever seen. The outlook for this year was correspondingly full of hope. But in a few weeks this gave place to the present terrible and unparalleled state of war. Just how this would affect our whole life, private and public, secular and religious, no one could tell. The first forebodings have, however, not been realized, and in general it has been a good year spiritually and financially among our churches. In spite of lessened resources in a few cases, and of the contributions in both money and men to the war, our churches have come through the year about as usual, and thanks to the persistent appeals for our missionary work and the generous responses, we have been able to meet fully in war the promises made in time of peace, and help also one or two of the most pressing appeals for extra help.

Taking our usual survey of the missions, and beginning with the English speaking work, Margaree, under Rev. J. H. Sulston, reports a good year, with Home Missionary apportionment fully met. South Maitland had a good summer under Student Plowright, and has now happily settled the Rev. Andrew E. Mann.

Economy, under temporary supply all year, is now inviting Mr. F. G. Purnell from Newfoundland with a view to a call. At Kingsport, Mr. Geo. Miller has done good work, and the church in answer to our challenge raised the salary \$100.00.

Liverpool is again vacant, Rev. Jas. Middleton resigning at the end of May. Pleasant River has again in the pulpit their former pastor, Rev. Geo. W. Ball, whose health is somewhat improved. St. John, N.B., had a good year under Rev. Mr. Haughton, added 16 members, but has lost some through removals.

In Quebec Ayer's Cliff and Fitch Bay have kept steadily on under Mr. Moore and Mr. Carr. We are still aiding the Union Church at St. Anne's in connection with the College life there, and good work is reported under Rev. Mr. McLeod.

Amherst Park has had a trying year financially, as the war has delayed the payment of some of their building subscriptions and they have sent nearly two dozen men to the front. At the Point there is new courage and hope under the new pastor, Rev. H. A. Carson. Union Colored Church has lost its pastor, Rev. Mr. Gantt, but hopes to find a good successor in its present supply, Mr. Gregor.

At Crystal Springs, thanks to the generous Montreal friends, the build-

ing is now all bricked.

Coming to Ontario, Kingston First has had a good year under Rev. Mr. Rice, and Kingston, Calvary, is well settled under Rev. Mr. Lyall. Barrie, under Rev. Mr. Hipkin, holds faithfully on. Churchill has had a good student supply. Hamilton, Immanuel, under Rev. Mr. Rayner, has had a good year, and Mr. Rayner is also helping a new Union cause on the Mountain at Hamilton, this having been largely started owing to the generosity of Mr. Jos. Pim, one of the former members of Toronto, Zion.

Stratford changed pastors during the year, and is now under the care of Rev. Geo. E. Morley. Woodstock has lost Rev. A. J. Orr, who did faithful

work, and has now moved to Scotland.

The United Brethren have met all their grants as usual.

In the West the financial depression has been much more severe than in Eastern Canada. Winnipeg, St. James' Park, under Rev. Edgar Whitehouse, has been unable to make the financial advance planned, but is doing good work, especially among the young people. Brandon, under Rev. A. J. Mac-Kenzie, has felt very much the hard times and lack of employment and the going of a number to the war. Dr. Ralph has continued at Carleton, and has signs of encouragement. Landis had a good year under Rev. G. J. Hindley, and Naseby under Mr. Charles Cushing, though Mr. Cushing has now left to enlist in the McGill Corps.

The Calgary Church, under Rev. J. Alexander, has had a good year in service to the community but a hard year financially, owing not only to the

depression, but to the purchaser of their first site not meeting the payments due.

In Vancouver, Kitsilano Church, under Rev. A. E. Cooke, has suffered heavily in both numbers and finances owing to the lack of work and removal of members to other cities. But the work of the church has steadily grown. Knox, Vancouver, has also, with the assistance of our Building Fund, erected a new bungalow church on our Grandview lots, and has promise of new life and vigor, much to the joy of the loyal little band of Knox supporters. The new church is to be called the Grandview Congregational Church.

There has been no change in our Swedish work, Rev. C. G. Anderson having charge at Wetaskiwin, and Rev. G. A. Sanden at Highland Park and Lewisville, with out-stations at Hay Lakes, Little Beaver and Meeting Creek.

Our German work has been under the care of Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, who has made a tour among the fields at the beginning of the year. The work has grown steadily and rapidly. Two new workers, Rev. E. Bernstein at Irvine, Kincorth, Keiley Springs and Forres, and Rev. H. Treise at Prussia and Hilda, have both done good work. At Hanna, Mayton, Sunnyslope and Beiseker the work has so grown that it demands all the time of Rev. F. Anhorn, and he has moved out to these fields, leaving the Calgary German work to have, as it needs, a man all to itself. Unfortunately this has been delayed, the prejudice against all German speaking people has extended to these new citizens of ours, not regarding the fact that though German speaking they are Russian citizens, with relatives fighting in the Russian armies in the Caucasus. This has made the employment problem acute, but makes it more than ever needful that we should send them a preacher. During the winter very gracious seasons of revival have been manifested on these fields. The Calgary German Church, holding two weeks' special prayer for peace and the deepening of the spiritual life, had some thirty converted and join the church. So at the other out-stations, while at Hanna the members of a German Lutheran Church that had been antagonistic, were themselves converted and brought over their church building to add to ours, that the united congregation might have room.

So also on Mr. Bernstein's fields, where nearly a hundred were converted. At present the German Congregationalists across the line are sharing with us half and half in this work, and they, too, rejoice in its manifest blessing.

In Brantford our Armenian work has had its successes and difficulties under Mr. Armen Amerkhanian, who during the winter has given only part time to it. Some hostility developed because of the temperance vote cast by the Armenians, and this led to some parties bringing in an Armenian Georgian priest for a couple of weeks, but this died away. Mr. Amerkhanian was the means of bringing to the attention of our Government the very friendly attitude of the Armenians to the Allied cause, and thus secured for his people the privilege of going on with their work instead of being interned as alien enemies. These Brantford Armenians formed a Rifle Corps, and have drilled as home guards for the defence of Canada. More than one Armenian name, too, has appeared in the casualty lists of our First Contingent, thus showing their loyalty to our cause.

THE GEORGE ROBERTSON EVANGELISTIC FUND.

During the year we have as usual stood back of all special services for which help has been asked. Kingston, Calvary, was aided in holding meetings, with good results. But the chief use of the fund has been in helping the support of our Russo-German work and our Armenian work, where the happy revivals in the German fields, with two hundred converts and the very direct and practical evangelism of the Armenian work, have been very much in line with the purpose of the Fund.

THE CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

During the year this fund has enabled us to come to the aid of Knox Church, Vancouver. Their down town site had become untenable, and with no prospect of sale of their property, it seemed for a time as if the church would have to close. But working with the British Columbia Extension Committee, we were able to enter into an arrangement to lease them for five years the lots held by the Society in Grandview, Vancouver, and with the loan from the Building Fund they have built a neat bungalow church, opened last March, have a good Sunday School and growing church services in a neighborhood where the church is needed and appreciated.

The Zion Church property, Toronto, is still on our hands, the option given on it last summer not having been taken up.* At present the property is again rented for church purposes to what is really a church along Christian

social lines.

The Stouffville Church cemetery has with our consent been transferred to the municipality. The Howick Church property is now in our hands and is being sold. The Wetaskiwin farm we still hold.

EXTENSION WORK.

In addition to the Extension work in Vancouver, by which Knox Church has been enabled to open happily in Grandview, the Western Congregational Church Extension and Building Society in Winnipeg has done a good piece of work in the erection of Pilgrim Institute in the north end of Winnipeg, as a settlement work mostly for other than English speaking peoples. This building on a site secured by the Extension Society, was erected at a total cost of about \$9,500.00, counting the lot, all of which but about \$3,000, has been provided—a generous piece of work for such a year. The building is two story and basement and has provisions for auditorium, class rooms and gymnastic rooms in the basement.

In Montreal through the generous givers of that city the Crystal Springs Church has been bricked at a cost of some seven or eight hundred dollars. Amherst Park, some of whose building subscriptions have been delayed by the financial stress, has also been aided by the Montreal friends to carry the remaining debt, and is prepared to close its account with the contractor.

Also to the committee of The German Congregational Conference in the United States for their aid in the work among the Russian Germans of the West.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY FOR 1914-15.

This has been a year in which the romance of missions has been overshadowed by the tragedy of war. Nevertheless this department has eudeavored to create and sustain Home Missionary interest in our churches and Sunday schools. Very early in the year the difficulty of keeping our Home Missionary givings up to last year's amount was clearly realized, and special plans were made to keep our churches informed regarding the work and imperative needs of the society. The missionaries on the field were urged to send in reports of their work to the denominational paper, and most of them have responded, though letters to The Congregationalist from our Home Missionaries have not been as numerous as we could have wished.

In December ten thousand circulars, entitled "Our Patriotic Fund," were sent out to the churches. This was followed early in the new year with a second pamphlet, "Building Canada a Bigger Job than Beating Germany." Ten thousand of these, together with ten thousand envelopes, were circulated amongst the churches, and a letter sent to the pastors urging them to faithfully present the claims of the Society to their congregations on the first

Sunday of March.

An effort was made to bring the Missionary Vision before our Sunday schools by the preparation of a special Missionary Programme to be used on Review Sunday, March 28th. Eight thousand of these, together with eight thousand envelopes, were printed and sent to the Sunday schools, and at the same time a letter was sent to the superintendents asking them to use this exercise in their schools, and if possible to secure an offering for the funds of the society. We have reason to believe that our Sunday schools have responded very generously to this appeal. The Society's reports do not always show the amounts contributed by our Sunday schools, inasmuch as these are often sent through the church and not directly by the school. Many of our Sunday schools have come to the assistance of the church in an effort to help the church to reach its apportionment. We feel that our Educational Department might well expend more thought and money in the work of missionary education in the Sunday schools, for it is here, after all, that our most fruitful work is done.

In connection with this special Missionary Programme prizes were offered for the three best essays from the scholars on the subject, "Why I Love My Country.'' The prizes have been awarded as follows: First Prize, Madge Owen, 11 Hope Ave., Montreal; Second Prize, Mabel A. Kelly, 17 Fourth

Ave., Ottawa; Third Prize, Aliee Mison, 258 Fifth Ave., Ottawa.

We would be glad to have suggestions as to ways and means of making this department of greater service to the churches. One of the churches has called attention to the diminutive size of the envelopes that were sent out. We shall be very glad to supply larger envelopes in future, in the hope that it may encourage larger gifts. It is just possible that a small envelope may suggest a small gift. We want larger gifts and will be glad to use any honest means suggested to gain the desired end,

REPORT OF IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT.

In common with so many of our national and ecclesiastical activities, we have to record in this department of our work many marked changes owing to war conditions, and that the report we now present shows so startling a decrease in the number of Congregational immigrants, is due almost entirely

to the outbreak of hostilities in Europe.

In pursuance of our now well established plan of co-operation between the Baptist and Congregational churches, we were represented last summer at Quebec by Mr. A. A. Trembert, B.A., of McMaster University. Mr. Trembert proved himself to be a man of ability, and possessed of the necessary qualities of initiative that placed him at once in a position of influence among the chaplains at the port. His duties, however, proved to be very light owing to the sudden drop in immigration, and at the end of the season it was found that he had met only 192 Congregationalists, compared with 1156 in 1913, and 1302 in 1912.

In consequence of this unexpected condition of things, it was deemed wisest to make no expenditure for this work during the winter, and accordingly

no appointments were made for St. John or Halifax.

As all the churches were feeling the same thing, the question of having a chaplain at Quebec this summer who would represent Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists and Congregationalists, came up for discussion and after conference between representatives of each denomination it was decided to make the experiment, the responsibility for the financial outlay necessary being divided among three units, of which the Methodists and Presbyterians represented one each, and the Baptists and Congregationalists one between them. Rev. Wm. Jackson, D.D., a former Methodist chaplain at Quebec, whose past experience will be most valuable, has been appointed to the post and is now at work. Should this plan prove satisfactory I have no doubt that it will be continued for another season, unless the tide of immigration should rise so high as to call for more workers. It marks another most encouraging move in co-operative work.

Your Superintendent endeavors to keep closely in touch with all phases of the immigration problem, but just now his duties are very light.

An analysis of these figures show that while the total increase from all sources has been \$419.38, the increase in contributions from our Churches amounted to only \$13.03.

The largest increase in any Province or District was in Ontario Western—\$245.59, and the largest decrease was in Ontario Central—\$156.71; (this latter District, however, showed an aggregate increase in the three previous years of \$1,478.77).

The Sunday School contributing the largest amount was Hamilton, 1st, \$200.00, followed by Bond Street, Toronto, \$175.00; Montreal, Zion, \$126.36; Pt. St. Charles, Montreal, \$45.00; Toronto, Northern, \$25.00; Brantford, \$24.00; London, 1st, \$22.00; Calgary, 1st, \$20.00. We are pleased to report a greater interest in our work by the Sunday Schools, more than forty having subscribed to our funds, contributions ranging from \$2.00 to \$200.00. The plan adopted this year of having a special Home Missionary Sunday having worked out successfully, and had it not been for the increased support of our Sunday Schools, contributions would have fallen behind last year.

The Young People's Society of Northern Church, Toronto, subscribed \$100.00 towards our funds, and we gratefully acknowledge numerous smaller subscriptions from other Young People's Societies and Mission Bands, and would like to see more of our Young People's organizations taking an interest

in our work.

We are also pleased to acknowledge receipt of a legacy of \$500.00 from the estate of the late J. Scarf, which has been transferred to the G. M. Fund

Capital Account.

The financial statement shows that the total outlay (including last year's deficit of \$2,101.75) on account of the General Mission Fund amount to \$15,219.08, and we carry forward a deficit on the wrong side into next year of \$1,065.40, reducing last year's deficit by \$1,036.35, which, considering the financial condition of the country during "war year," is very gratifying. And now what about the future? To do our share of the growing work in Canada we must have the continued co-operation and support of the Churches. Our budget for the coming year will equal that of the past year, and we appeal with confidence to our churches, feeling that by the close of the next year we will have the necessary funds to carry on our work successfully. Canada is just in the making and the investment of one dollar now will accomplish what ten dollars will later on. The opportunity is ours; what will we do with it?

CONSTITUTION.

I.--NAME.

This Corporation shall be called The Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society.

II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the heathen and other unenlightened people.

III. - MEMBERSHIP.

The members of this Society shall be persons subscribing \$2 annually, ministers of all contributing churches, one other representative from each church contributing \$10 annually, and two representatives from each church tributing \$50, or over, annually, and each year the delegates appointed from any church to the Congregational Union of Canada shall be delegates to this Society, provided that church be entitled to be so represented. Every benefactor making a donation of \$40 at one time shall be a life member.

IV. --- OFFICERS.

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Board of Directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Society.

V .- MEETINGS.

An annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the Thursday following the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles.

VI. -- AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution can be amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed alteration having been given in two successive numbers of the Canadian Independent.*

*Now Canadian Congregationalist.

BY-LAWS.

I .- FUNDS.

All funds arising from donations, legacies, subscriptions, or otherwise, shall be lodged by the Treasurer, as soon as collected, with some chartered bank, to be named by the Executive Committee. Money can be drawn from such accounts only by cheques, signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, but the President or Vice-President may sign for either in their absence.

II. - MANAGEMENT.

The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twenty-five members of the Society, including the officers, and shall be elected at the annual meeting, who shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society. Immediately after their election, they shall appoint an Executive Committee, and such other committees as they shall deem expedient for the interests of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of that Board, and shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendents of Departments, and not more than twelve other members, together with two members of the Woman's Board, the same to be appointed by that Board, and who are members of this Society.

III .- MEETINGS.

The Board of Directors shall meet at least once during the year, immediately before the annual meeting of the Society, at the call of the Secretary, to prepare reports, and a list of officers and committees to be nominated at the annual meeting, as well as to transact any other business connected with the interests of the Society.

IV .- PRESENTATION TO CHURCHES.

The work of this Society shall be presented and a Foreign Missionary sermon preached in each of the churches of the constituency at least once in each year. The Executive Committee shall see that news from the Society's work is distributed to the churches.

V .- DONATIONS FOR SPECIAL WORK.

When money is donated for missionary work outside the Society's missions, it may be forwarded to societies working in that field.

VI.--AMENDMENT.

These by-laws may be altered in the same manner as the Constitution.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

Ottawa, June 10th, 1915.

The thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society was held in the Welcome Zion Congregational Church, Ottawa, on the above date, at 2 p.m.

The chair was occupied by the President, Rev. J. T. Daley, Cobourg.

After the singing of a hymn, prayer was offered by Rev. W. J. Hindley, Winnipeg.

Rev. M. H. Sanderson, Berlin, was appointed Minute Secretary.

In the absence of the Secretary, Mr. Henry Yeigh, the report of the Executive was read by Rev. A. F. Pollock.

The Treasurer, Mr. H. W. Barker, presented the financial report.

The Superintendent of the Prayer Union, Miss F. B. Rawlings, Forest, being absent, her report was read by the Minute Secretary.

The report of Miss Effie Jamieson, Superintendent of the Department of Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies, was read by Rev. F. Sanders.

The report of the Educational Secretary was presented by Rev. A. F. Pollock.

On motion of Judge Leet, the reports were adopted.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. Dr. Gunn, seconded by Rev. Dr. Warriner, and carried by standing vote:—

That we record with very great sorrow the death of our pioneer Missionary to Africa, Rev. Walter T. Currie, D.D., which took place at his home near Victoria, B.C., on April 7th. Dr. Currie's twenty-five years of wise, loyal and self-sacrificing service have been of great value, both in building up a strong Christian centre at Chisamba, and in developing the missionary spirit among our churches in Canada. We pray that we may share his spirit and be enabled to develop the work Dr. Currie loved along the lines so wisely laid down by him.

We would express to the sorrowing wife and mother of Dr. Currie and to his family our sincere sympathy, also to those in Africa who had learned to love and trust Dr. Currie, and who will deeply feel the death of their friend.

Then followed the election of Officers, Directors and Executive Committee. (See first page of this report).

The Rev. Dr. E. C. Moore of Harvard University, President of the A. B. C. F. M., addressed the meeting, his subject being "The Canadians' share in the American Board work."

Greetings from the C. C. W. B. M. were conveyed to the Society by Mrs. Hume of Ottawa.

On motion the meeting was adjourned.

THE THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE C.C.F.M.S. FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31, 1915.

Your officers and Board of Directors welcome this opportunity of presenting to the membership of the Society and to the people of our churches a report of the interests we have had in charge during the year. In connection therewith we gratefully acknowledge the goodness of God to us and to our missionaries. We place on record also our appreciation of the cordial relations that exist between our Society and the A.B.C.F.M. on the one hand, and the C.C.W.B.M. on the other, the co-operation between these three organizations interested in the same mission field has been most hearty and harmonious.

All Christian work has been affected by the unprecedented conditions arising out of the war. Many missionary enterprises, especially, have been the cause of great anxiety. Our sympathy and prayers go out in behalf of those missionaries called upon to endure great hardship in the cause of the Kingdom of God. While letters from missionaries in Africa have indicated the fear of an invasion by Germans from the south, it is a matter for great thankfulness that thus far the invasion has not come, and that the work of the Mission has gone steadily on.

There have been changes in the staff of missionaries.

The removal by death, of our pioneer missionary, Rev. Walter T. Currie, D.D., marks the greatest change in the staff. For so many years Dr. Currie was the great leader, whose enthusiasm, energy and judgment carried forward the work he had inaugurated. The success of the work at Chisamba is due largely to his consecrated ability. The new Institute at Dondi is the result of his foresight and faith. The workman has passed away, but the work he loved and for which he lived, goes on.

Mrs. Currie continues to reside at Chisamba, B.C.

Miss Helen J. Melville, Miss Margaret W. Melville, and Miss Diadem Bell, who are supported by the C.C.W.B.M., have continued their most valuable services. Miss Bell is now on her way home for a much needed rest.

Mr. L. Gordon Cattell and Mrs. Cattell, whose marriage took place in Hamilton a year ago, were prevented by the war from carrying out our plans, that on their way to Africa they should remain at Lisbon to take a six months' course of study of the Portuguese language. Instead they proceeded at once to Chisamba, where they arrived safely in October, and are now happily at work.

Rev. John T. Tucker and Mrs. Tucker have been transferred from Chisamba to the new Institute at Dondi. It is a high tribute to the worth of Mr. Tucker that so early in his missionary career he was elected by the Mission to the responsible position he now occupies. Your Committee was very glad to consent to the transfer, which took place in October last.

As Mr. Tucker's remoyal left Chisamba without an ordained missionary, the Home Boards consented to an exchange of missionaries, whereby Dr. and Mrs. Cammack were transferred to Chiyaka, while Dr. Robert Moffatt and Mrs. Mary Moffatt, with their family, are located at Chisamba. Dr. Moffatt will have permanent charge of the fiedleal work, and as an ordained missionary will take charge of the evangelistic work until a man can be provided to take the place made vacant by Mr. Tucker's removal.

Reports from Chisamba are of a very encouraging nature, and indicate that the seed sown amid great difficulty in earlier years, is now producing an encouraging harvest. Mr. Tucker says in one of his letters, "The faithful work of the pioneers in this field brings us to a point where a tremendous development of all branches of the work may be confidently anticipated." The annual report of the station and the report of the twentieth anniversary

of the church at Chisamba, both show that there has already been a tre-

mendous development.

The annual report is arranged under four headings, Evangelistic, Educational, Medical and Industrial, and the results under each and all are certainly very gratifying.

EVANGELISTIC.

In addition to the work done at Chisamba, eleven groups of men (four in a group) go on Sundays to the surrounding villages to preach. "The average attendance at these afternoon meetings may be placed at from 350 to 400. At Chiyaka a large number of men go in like manner. In estimating the number of hearers each Sunday, the number may be placed at about 2,200, in addition to those who habitually gather for morning prayers." "Altogether about 4,000 hear the Words."

EDUCATIONAL.

The total number of scholars is 1,067, with 54 native teachers and assistants. This does not include the preparatory school at Chisamba, in which are 53 pupils, showing that we have plenty of material for the training institute and girls' boarding school when the latter can be founded.

"As already indicated, the out-stations are a prominent feature of our

work. There are 14 in all, with 880 pupils and 49 native teachers."

The schools at Chisamba have outgrown their accommodation, and the missionaries have asked for more suitable buildings than those now in use. The C.C.W.B.M. has generously undertaken to provide a new building to meet the need of the common school. This is in addition to the recent gift of the C.C.W.B.M. of a girls' boarding school, just about completed, at which girls from the out-stations get training to fit them for the more advanced girls' school we hope to have in connection with the Dondi Institute. (This to be erected at a cost of \$10,000 by the American Woman's Board of the Interior).

Interior).

Our Department of S. S. and Young People's Societies has undertaken to provide a similar Boarding School for boys at Chisamba, to be known as 'The Allan and David Gunn Memorial School.'' More than half of the \$1,000.00 required for this has been subscribed. We hope the full amount will be completed soon, and that the young people of our Canadian schools and societies will find much joy in thus helping the young people of Africa to the

advantages of a higher education.

MEDICAL.

During the absence of Dr. and Mrs. Cammack on furlough, this work was taken by Miss Melville. A large number of patients received treatment. In all some 15,000 treatments were given by Miss Melville. Dr. Cammack reports that in the current year up to the time of transfer in March, 17,300 treatments had been given. "Thus people come for treatment of bodily sickness and often feel the touch of the Great Physician."

That the charges for treatment are not excessive will be inferred from Dr. Cammack's statement, "I took in some \$175 from natives, and about \$100 from whites on medical sales, etc." This makes an average of from one

to two cents per treatment.

INDUSTRIAL.

This important department has been carried on throughout the year. Some boys attending the all-day school at Chisamba have been given instruction in the afternoon in the carpenter shops, etc. New sheds and a kiln have been erected for the purpose of burning tile and brick. With the machine bought jointly by Kamundongo and our station, it is hoped to make all tile required for the new houses, buildings, etc., to be erected in the future, thus avoiding the danger of such a destructive fire as that in August, 1912. Dr. Cammack suggests that drainage by means of the tile now available will greatly improve the hygienic conditions at the station. The value of this department is evident to all who know the conditions on the station.

The Institute at Dondi was opened at the beginning of October. This is the realization of a long cherished hope and the beginning of a much needed help for the work of the Mission at large. Experience in Mission work in other parts of Africa has shown the great value of such a training school for

native Christian workers.

All the stations of the Mission were represented at the opening celebrations, there being twenty missionaries in attendance, and what is more significant, there was present also an entrance class of 26 students drawn from all parts of the Mission.

The Curriculum tentatively adopted at the annual meeting of the Mission

in May, 1914, makes provision for a most excellent course.

The course of study will extend over seven years. First the boys come for a period of three years. Having completed this period satisfactorily they will be given two years' work as teachers in out-station schools. At the expiration of that time they return to the Institute for completion of the course by two years' study.

To indicate the nature and comprehensiveness of the course of study, let

me read the programme laid down for the first year:-

1st Period. 1st year. (School year to last about 8 months).

I. Bible Study. 10 hours per week (4 hours O.T., 6 hours N.T.)

Old Testament, outlines of history, from Genesis to Deuteronomy.
 (a) The Pentateuch, with sidelights from Monumental History and discoveries. Application of the leading episodes to the Ovimbundu to be indicated.

(b) The Psalms: their spiritual meaning and interpretation, with sketch of the composition of the Psalter.

2. New Testament.

- (a) The contents of the 4 Gospels, noting their harmony, character and composition.
- (b) The Acts of the Apostles, with a sketch of conditions in the primitive church, and its history to the sub-Apostolic age.

I. Educational. 13 hours per week.

(a) Reading, writing, arithmetic, as decided by the committee.

(b) Pedagogy, the art of teaching.

(c) Portuguese, grammar and translation.

- (d) Geography of the world, with special reference to Africa, Portugal and Portuguese colonies.
- (e) History of Portugal in broad outlines, with fuller details as to the founding and settlement of colonies.

III. Agricultural. 6 hours per week.

General instruction in:

(a) Pomology and forestry.

(b) Irrigation.

(e) Rotation of crops.

(d) Methods of work and machinery.(e) Gardening and raising of small fruits.

IV. Industrial. 6 hours per week.
A general course of instruction in:—

(a) Carpentry and house building.

(b) Iron work.

(e) Wood working.

(d) Sawing.

V. Medical. Lectures in first aid. Treatment of common ailments. Physiology.

The course for the seven years has been drafted, but is subject to change

as experience may show need for change.

Space does not permit of presenting the course in full. We shall be

very glad to give information to any persons desiring it.

On account of the war the campaign to complete the \$25,000 required to build and equip the Institute was not proceeded with last autumn as proposed. Funds now on hand will enable us to erect some of the buildings needed at once for the carrying on of the work. It is to be hoped this important work will not have to suffer through interruption or long delay in its development.

In addition to the regular work of the society, we are called upon for

these special needs.

AT CHISAMBA.

1. An ordained missionary to have charge of the evangelistic work.

2. A new building for the common school. (The C.C.W.B.M. has generously agreed to provide this building).

3. The completion of "The Allan & David Gunn Memorial School."

AT DONDI.

1. A teacher, to take charge of the educational department.

2. The completion of the fund for construction and equipment.

We congratulate the Society upon the excellent work that has been done, and ask your prayers and hearty co-operation that the good work may be well sustained.

The financial report will be presented by the Treasurer.

REPORT OF PRAYER UNION DEPARTMENT.

We believe that if prayer found its due place in the life of the church, missionary problems would be solved. For in work for God when He orders something done for the glory of His name, He is both able and willing to find the needed individuals for the work, and the means required. We receive not because we ask not. The promises are as true to-day as when uttered by Jesus, and what is more, have been tested by many of His followers. The purpose of the Union is to recognize fellowship with Christ in making known the Gospel to all the world, and to promise to pray for the West Central African Mission, that all who hear the Gospel there may be speedily and truly converted. I have not been able to do very much to forward the work of the department during the past year. Last July I attended the Missionary Summer School at Whitby, practically took charge of the Congregational rally. We had three meetings, which were prayer meetings for our West Central African Mission. We pledged ourselves to pray and look for young people whom we might interest in the work. Each one present took one of our pledge cards and cards to secure new members. The Olivet Congregational Church, Toronto, through their Y.P.S.C.E., took the largest number. I made appeals by letter to workers in the C.C.W.B.M. and to the Woman's Board at its annual meeting. In the London branch of the C.C.W.B.M. I personally urged the work of the Union and the need of prayer. In our local Auxiliary this year we are striving to bring the subject of prayer before each meeting, accompanied by a report of some results that have been known to be in answer to prayer. We recognize that constant preparation of mind and heart are necessary to a deepening ministry of intercession. May we all learn by practice to serve in prayer.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPARTMENT.

Toronto, June 8th, 1915.

This Department wishes to acknowledge gratitude to God that in this sorrow stricken world of the past year, He has mercifully preserved the work of the Mission and permitted its continuance.

of the Mission and permitted its continuance.

This year finds the missionaries of the Young People's Department, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Cattell, on the field at Chisamba, and we are proud of the place they are taking in the work there, and are confident that they will go on

to increasing usefulness.

When Mr. Cattell was home last year he brought a message to the young people from the Chisamba Station, asking that some provision should be made to link up the out-station schools with the plans for the Institute. There are 16 out-station schools, and the boys in them could not be served by the Institute unless an opportunity were provided them for the completing of their primary education, which could not be done under the native teachers. They urged, therefore that a school be built at Chisamba to hold 40 boys, so that the brightest and most promising scholars might be brought from the native schools for further instruction. Mr. Cattell pointed out what an important place this school would occupy in the forward movement for the education of the African to evangelize Africa.

After consultation with the Executive, it was determined to ask the Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies to build this School, and it was unanimously agreed that we would do so, and that we would erect it in

affectionate memory of Allan and David Gunn, of the Broadview Avenue Church, sons of the Rev. and Mrs. W. T. Gunn.

Am glad to be able to report that already at least \$600.00 of the necessary \$1,000.00 has either been subscribed or paid, and we expect that the full amount will be forthcoming shortly. The School is to be a permanent building of sun-dried brick, with tiled floor and roof, and will serve for many years to come in bringing the joy of an enlightened mind, knowledge of books and work, and the gospel of light and gladness to hundreds of boys who otherwise would have continued to dwell, shackled by paganism.

Mr. and Mrs. Cattell are to have charge of the School when completed, and Mr. Cattell will superintend the education of the boys. In addition to the work of the schoolroon, he will teach them all the useful trades, as well as agriculture. There will be forty boys to provide for each year, but as \$15.00 a year will educate one of these boys, we hope that a number of individuals, as well as classes and societies, will want a boy of their own.

We are happy to be able to say that the young people responded to the request for this school with great gladness and heartiness, and the only regrets expressed were that gifts could not be larger. For the joyfulness of their service we give thanks, and it impresses upon us the thought that there are resources in our Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies that we have not

fathomed or indeed touched upon.

There is also a good report to make in connection with the Summer Schools for Missions, as altogether we had the best representation that we have ever had from our denomination, and one of the immediate results was additions to our list of volunteers for Foreign Mission work. There are three schools that touch largely the most of our churches—Whitby, Knowlton and Wolfville, N.S., and we would ask that the pastors urge the young people of their churches to attend these Summer Schools. They will receive a training and inspiration that will be of value to their society and local church. Respectfully submitted,

THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY OF THE C.C.F.M.S. SUBMITS THE FOLLOWING REPORT.

A little more than a year ago, Rev. J. T. Tucker was requested to forward certain views illustrating our West Central African work at Chisamba and Dondi, in order that some new sets of slides might be prepared and circulated among our churches throughout the Dominion, that the interest might be sustained and deepened in the work that our splendid staff of missionaries have done and are doing. Mr. Tucker, though unable to supply all the views we had asked for, sent a number of films which were developed, and the best were made into slides which together with some of the best of the old ones and others purchased from the American Board, were made into a new set and started on the rounds of the churches last autumn. This set, consisting of 90 slides, together with 2 hymn slides and the colored set of 10 illustrating the "Ninety and Nine," has since visited the following churches: Granby, Sherbrooke, Cowansville, Melbourne, Point St. Charles, Amherst Park, Crystal Springs, Zion, Calvary, Emmanuel, Kingston First, Maxville, Broadview, Western, Brautford, Paris, Hamilton First and Hamilton Emmanuel, London First

and London Southern, Vancouver and Calgary. Applications were also received from Ottawa First, St. John, Olivet and Northern, and the Woman's Board requested to have them forwarded to Cobourg for their Annual meeting last week. For these last requests, however, we were unable to arrange as This new set has met with considerable appreciation, and some splendid testimonies have been given regarding it. The following are some of the expressions of appreciation from the churches. One writes, "Both lecture and slides are good and cannot but be productive of good wherever exhibited." This church after exhibiting these views, reported \$50.00 additional raised this year for the support of an African school, and \$25.00 additional for the support of a boy by the Sunday School. Another writes, "We enjoyed them very much." Another, "Lecture is certainly a fine one, and though considerably handicapped by coming through a darkened medium, was enjoyed by all"; and still another, "They are a very excellent set of slides and were much enjoyed by those present." This set has had a wider circulation this set and although it is not all we had bound to make year than any previous set, and although it is not all we had hoped to make it, it is nevertheless, we think, the best we have had on our African work. Your secretary, acting on the instruction of the Quebec Association, has also prepared and circulated another set of slides entitled "Children in Far Away Lands." This set is the property of the Quebec Association, and has up to date been circulated among the following churches: Granby, London Southern, Hamilton First, Waterville, Melbourne, Sherbrooke, Point St. Charles, Crystal Springs, Zion, Emmanuel, Calvary, Amherst Park and Kingston Bethel, and from these churches the highest testimonies have been given regarding the excellence of these colored views. Any church outside the Quebec Association may rent the same for \$2.00 and express charges one way, but they are free to churches within the Association. It will be seen from this report that the smaller churches chiefly, make no request whatever for the use of slides, which is mainly due to the fact that they haven't a lantern and cannot conveniently secure one. Would it not be a good investment for our Society to purchase a lantern so as to put these views within reach of all our churches? has been considerable correspondence in connection with the circulation of these sets, and in several instances four and five letters have had to be written where two would have done had the rules governing the slides been observed. The co-operation of the churches is sought in reducing the unnecessary labor, and in avoiding disappointments which inevitably follow carelessness and negligence on the part of those to whose care the slides have been temporarily intrusted. A number of our prints were sent on request to the American Board to illustrate an article by Mr. Tucker upon the new chief of Chiyuka, Chikosi, for the loan of which your secretary received a letter of thanks and appreciation from the Board. We have still on hand a number of the old edition of the story of Chisamba which are free to pastors, Sunday Schools and Women's or Men's Missionary Societies. One dozen of the stock on hand were recently sent to Mr. H. W. Barker, Toronto, for circulation as occasion required. We would like to remind the ministers and delegates at this Union that we have on hand 150 copies for distribution of an illustrated pamphlet printed by the American Board, entitled "Twenty years in West Central Africa," and we would like each minister and each delegate to take one, and have pleasure in informing you that you may obtain free from the American Board Rooms in Boston, as many as you may desire for circulation among the members of your clurch. The American Board also furnishes free, one copy of the Missionary Herald, an illustrated monthly, to donors of \$10.00 annually, and to Treasurers of churches contributing not less than \$20.00 annually, provided yearly applications be made for the same and 25 cents enclosed for postage to Canada.

In closing we would like to emphasize the monthly prayer meeting for missions; representation at the Summer Conferences; the presentation of missionary nuterial regularly before the Sunday Schools and Young People's Societies, and the importance of the Laymen's Missionary Movements where churches have not yet adopted the plan, and last but not least, much prayer and much preaching on missionary lines, that the great commission of Christ may be more definitely and enthusiastically carried out by the rank and file of the church.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31, 1915.

As might be expected in this year of financial stress, our income has fallen off somewhat, the receipts for the General Fund being about \$550 (or 9%) less than those of the previous year. Considering the monetary conditions that have prevailed incident to the war, and in view also of the fact that so many general appeals for such deserving causes as Red Cross and Belgian Relief have been presented to the people of Canada, I cannot but feel that this result

has been highly satisfactory.

We commenced the year with a balance of \$536.26, which, added to the contributions of \$5,580.30, gave \$6,116.56 available for disbursements. Out of this amount, \$4,156.60 went to the American Board for the salaries, travelling expenses, etc., of our missionaries to the end of 1914, while \$89.28 was used for travelling expenses at home, and \$362.19 for printing, including the usual annual payment of \$200 to the "Congregationalist." Strange to say, for each of the last three years, the travelling expenses of the Executive Committee were the same all but a few cents. The other expenses were those incident to administration work, which is conducted along the most economical lines. And then we transferred the usual thousand dollars to the Furlough Fund. In order, however, to do this, it was necessary to overdraw our general account \$252.60, so that we have not been able to make any contribution to the Institute Fund, as has been done for each of the last four years.

Now let us turn to the designated object account. We brought forward from the previous year \$9,705.53, of which \$8,529 belonged to the Institute Fund, \$1,000 to the Furlough Fund, and \$176.53 to the Hoppital Fund. During the year, we received in contributions \$1,403.21, transferred from the General Fund, for the Furlough Fund \$1,000, and the Himelegary \$528.62, making a total of \$12,637.36. Out of this total, we have remitted to the American Board—from the Furlough Fund, \$1,250.17; for the Institute Fund, \$1,500; for the support of boys and for hospital supplies, \$898.24; while \$228 was forwarded for mission work other than our own—in India, Africa and China. The amount received from the Hine estate has been invested, and the resultant income under the trust is specially designated for the support of a Christian boy in Chisamba. There is carried forward to the New Year in the designated account \$8,232.33, which is made up as follows:—

As intimated in our last report, and as already referred to here, we have received part of the legacy from the estate of our late friend, Miss Hine of Toronto. There were really two legacies, one of \$10,000 left to Dr. Currie in trust during his lifetime, and at his death to revert to the Society; the same to be invested and the income used for the training of native evangelists. A

second legacy of \$1,000 came from the same estate to the Society, this amount to be invested, and the income derived to be used for the training of a Christian boy at Chisamba. By mutual arrangement, the succession duties and other costs in connection with both legacies were deducted from this \$1,000, which netted the Society only \$528.62.

It is pleasing and gratifying to have our friends remember the Society in their wills; and we would remind the members of our churches that they can

thus continue the support of our work after they have passed away.

It will be seen that the gifts for designated objects have increased \$327 this year. We have always found that our constituents take up very readily any special cause for which support is asked. One very gratifying feature of the year has been the hearty response which has met the call of the Young People's Department for \$1,000 for the building of a much needed Boys' Boarding School at Chisamba, this school to be called the "Allan and David Gunn Memorial School," in memory of our dear friends who met such a tragic death last August, and whom we who knew loved so dearly. It will be noticed that \$388.50 has already come to hand, while over \$200 more has been promised. As the whole \$1,000 will not be required until the end of the calendar year, there is little doubt that the full amount will be made up.

The summary at the foot of the printed statement shows the giving by Associations, both for this year and last. Toronto District is \$400 behind, the Western \$300 ahead, the Eastern and United Brethren slightly ahead, while Quebec is \$56 behind, and the Western and Maritime churches have also fallen

behind.

An analysis of the giving of the separate churches is interesting. As before, Emmanuel Church, Montreal, takes the first place, the amount this year being \$862, which is \$100 less than last year. Then follows Hamilton First with \$502, as against \$384 last year. At this rate, Hamilton will overtake Montreal Emmanuel in less than two years. Next, we have Toronto Northern giving \$375, which is \$145 less than they gave the previous year. Then follow Toronto, Bond Street, \$317; Montreal, Calvary, \$259; Guelph, \$255; Toronto Broadview, \$200; Kingston Bethel, \$192; Brantford, \$151; Granby, \$145; and Cobourg, \$117. None of the other churches have gone over the \$100 mark, although some of them very nearly reached that figure.

Contributions were received from 91 churches, while last year 95 shared

in the giving.

It was thought well, in view of financial conditions, to postpone for the present the appeal for the amount still required for the building of the Dondi Institute. The plans eall for an expenditure of \$25,000, and thus far only \$11,000 has been raised. When conditions become more propitious, this appeal will be launched.

Our endowment funds have been invested by the Executive Committee under expert advice; and although the prices at present of some of the stocks are below what they were at the time of purchase, all of them are paying the usual dividends; and when the stock market assumes its normal condition, which we trust will be in the near future, we may reasonably suppose that they will return to their former prices.

FORM OF BEQUEST FOR THE COLLEGE.

BY-LAWS.

CHAPTER I.

- 1. The Corporation shall be called "The Congregational College of Canada."
- 2. Its objects shall be the education of ministers of the Gospel and the encouragement and inauguration of ministers of the Gospel and the encouragement and inauguration of all desirable educational methods and movements, whereby the efficiency of the church may be advanced.
- 3. Contributors of two dollars annually to the Funds of the College shall be members of the Corporation. A contributor in arrears one year shall not be qualified to vote at the meeting of the Corporation, or to exercise his other rights of membership. The Treasurer's subscription list shall be taken as evidence of contribution.
- 4. Churches contributing for the previous year to the current expenses of the College the sum of ten dollars and upwards may be represented at the meeting of the Corporation by one delegate for each church; those contributing twenty-five dollars or upwards for the previous year, by two delegates; and those contributing fifty dollars or upwards for the previous year, by three delegates.
- 5. Persons by whom or on whose behalf one hundred dollars or more shall have been contributed at any one time to the funds of the College, may be chosen life members of the Corporation.

6. A regular meeting of the Corporation shall be held annually, for the reception of the report of the Governors, the election of a new Board according to provisions hereinafter named, and the transaction of other necessary business.

7. The annual meeting shall be held at the same time and place as the

Congregational Union of Canada.

8. Special meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business at the call of the Board of Governors, or on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, signed by at least twenty members of the Corporation; provided always that no such special meetings be held without one month's notice thereof in an accredited newspaper in Toronto and Montreal, and also in the Canadian Congregationalist...

CHAPTER II.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

1. A Board of fifteen Governors, having power to choose their own officers, shall be elected from members of the Corporation. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Honorary Advisory Governors may be appointed at any annual meeting. Such appointees shall require to have served the corporation at some time as active governors. Such appointments shall be for life.

2. Three members of the Board shall retire annually, in rotation, but

shall be eligible for re-election.

3. The powers and duties of the Board shall be:

(a) The administration of the property of the College and the management of its finances.

(b) The appointment and renewal of all officers of the College.

(c) The general oversight and management of the affairs of the College, and

(d) The presentation of an annual report of the general condition of

the College to the Corporation at the next regular meeting.

4. Any member of the Board absent from its meetings for a year shall be held *ipso facto* to have vacated his seat, but may be re-appointed or re-elected thereto.

5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation

or otherwise, may be filled by the Board whenever it may see fit.

6. It shall be competent for the Board of Governors to appoint annually an Executive committee from its membership, which Committee shall exercise, between the meetings of the Board, such powers as may be delegated to it

by the Board of Governors.

7. The Board of Governors shall be called together at the close of the annual meeting of the Corporation, for organization and other needful business. They shall hold an annual meeting at a convenient time before the annual meeting of the Corporation; a special meeting may be called at any time by the Chairman and Secretary, or by the Secretary, at the request of five members.

CHAPTER III.

THE SENATE.

1. There shall be a Senate composed of—(1) The members of the Board of Governors; (2) the Faculty; (3) four representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec; (5) two representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Seven members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum.

2. The Senate shall frame regulations for and supervise all matters of education, honors and discipline.

3. The Principal shall be a member of the Faculty and ex-officio Presi-

dent of the Senate.

4. The Registrar shall be a member of the Faculty and ex-officio Secretary

of the Senate.

5. The Senate shall meet annually within one month preceding the close of the Session, at the College, in the city of Montreal, and at such other times and places as the interests of the College may require, and shall make an annual report to the Corporation through the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER IV.

1. The Principal and Professors, with such members of the Senate as from time to time may be appointed by the Board of Governors, constitute the Faculty, and as such are entrusted with the educational work of the College and the enforcement of its regulations under the direction of the Senate. The Principal shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Faculty.

2. Members of the Faculty must be members of a Congregational

Church.

3. Members of the Faculty shall not be members of the Board of Governors, but the Principal shall be a consulting member of the Board of Governors, and of standing committees appointed by the Board or the Senate.

CHAPTER V.

THE OFFICERS.

1. The Chairman of the Board of Governors shall be Presiding Officer of the Corporation.

2. The President of the Senate shall preside at all public functions of

the College.

3. The Secretary of the Senate shall be Registrar of the College.

CHAPTER VI.

AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these By-laws may be made at any regular meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such amendment has been given at the meeting next preceding.



ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregational College of Canada was held in Welcome Zion Church, Ottawa, on Friday, June 11th, at 2 p.m.

The Chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr. Charles Gurd, presided. The meeting opened with a hymn, followed by prayer led by Rev. Professor Cook.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were, upon resolution, taken as

read and confirmed.

The report of the Board of Governors was presented by its Secretary; the reports of the Senate to the Board—and of the Librarian, were read by Rev. Professors Warriner and Cook, respectively.

The financial report was read by Mr. Thos. Moodie, Treasurer. It was moved by Mr. Alex. McA. Murphy, seconded by Rev. H. A. Moule, that the report be received and discussed departmentally. Carried.

Considerable discussion followed, after which it was moved by Rev. Geo. E. Read, seconded by Judge S. P. Leet, that the report of the Governors be

adopted. Carried unanimously.

Emanating from the discussion of the financial aspect of the Governors' report, the following resolution was moved by Rev. Geo. Ellery Read, seconded by Rev. Frank J. Day, D.D., and carried: "That this meeting assures the Governors of the Congregational College of Canada of its hearty sympathy in all efforts made to provide for the financial needs of the College, and to this end it is suggested that the Executive of the Congregational Union be requested to consider as soon as possible the advisability and desirability of appointing a Financial Committee, which shall have the special care and furtherance of the financial departments of the several organizations connected with the Union."

Notice of motion having been given at the last Annual Meeting by Rev. E. Munson Hill, D.D., to such effect; it was moved by Rev. H. A. Moule (pro forma) and seconded by Judge Lect, "that Chapter II., Sec. 1 be amended by addition of the words 'Honorary Governors' may be appointed in

addition."

It was moved in amendment by Alex. McA. Murphy, seconded by Rev. Dr. Day, and carried, "that Chapter II., Sec. 1 be amended by the addition of the following clause to be termed Sec. 1, Clause (b):

"Honorary Advisory Governors may be appointed at any Annual Meet-Such appointees shall require to have served the Corporation at some

time as Active Governors. Such appointments shall be for life.'

It was moved by Alex. McA. Murphy, seconded by Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., and carried unanimously, "that Mr. Charles R. Black be appointed "Honorary Advisory Governor."

This appointment was recognized as a tribute to Mr. Black's long and valued services, and expressed the desire to retain his connection with the

Board in an advisory capacity.

It was moved by Rev. E. D. Silcox, seconded by Rev. W. T. Gunn, D.D., and carried, "that the matter of an appropriation to the Canadian Congre-

gationalist be referred to the Board of Governors.'

It was moved by Mr. John Black, seconded by Rev. W. T. Gunn, D.D., and carried, "that the services of a professional accountant be employed to audit the accounts of the College for the ensuing year, and the choice to be left with the Board of Governors."

It was moved by Rev. J. T. Daley, seconded by Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., and carried, "that the retired Governors be re-elected, viz., Messrs. Charles

Gurd, W. H. Miner and Alex. McA. Murphy."

The Board of Governors has pleasure in presenting its Annual Report

There are included as part of this report, the annual reports of the Board; of the Senate; Librarian; House Committee; Ladies' Auxiliary and Treasurer.

Your Board endorses the principle of notice of motion given at the last annual meeting, with respect to proposed amendment of Chapter II., Sec. 1, of the by-laws of the corporation; the Board suggests that the appointment to the proposed Honorary Governorship be for life, and repeats its recom-

mendation that Mr. Charles R. Black be so appointed.

Your Board would report that in response to an offer of conditional salary augmentation on the part of the Joint Board of the Co-operating Colleges, it increased the salaries of the Principal and professors by a total amount of \$550.00. This increased amount was covered by special personal A further augmentation by the Joint Board is offered for subscriptions. the coming session, subject to a further increase on the part of our own College. The Board feels that it must defer action in this regard, pending assurances from the churches of increased support.

Your Board would formally report to the corporation the resignation of Rev. Principal Hill, which took effect, in accordance with its terms, at the

close of the session.

Your Board presents as part of this report, a copy of the resignation, the reply of the Board, and the appreciation specially prepared on its behalf.

The question of the vacant principalship is recognized by the Board as the matter of the deepest concern with which it has to deal.

Your Board, both officially and through individual inquiries on the part of some of its members, has been giving diligent and earnest attention to the

solution of the situation, though, as yet, without definite result.

Your Board, in anticipation of the possibility of delayed action beyond the time of the coming session, has appointed Rev. Dr. Warriner as Acting Principal, and has engaged the services of Rev. J. S. Woodsworth as special lecturer in Sociology to replace the course given by Dr. Hill to the students of the Co-operating Colleges.

The Joint faculty will take care of the subject of Pastoral Theology for

the session, by co-operative adjustment.

Your Board would cordially welcome suggestions from any interested members of the fellowship on this or any subject of interest to the College,

and would record its appreciation of valued suggestions, so far.

The Board co-operated heartily in the arrangements which were so impressively earried out in recognition of the 75th anniversary of the founding of the College. Dr. Warriner, Registrar and Acting Principal, has kindly consented to prepare a special report of the meetings which culminated so inspiringly in the Convocation proceedings. In view of financial conditions,

the extra expenses incident to the Anniversary were covered by special personal subscriptions.

The Board appointed Mr. W. H. Miner of Granby, to the Governorship

THE SENATE'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL, 1915. SEVENTY-FIFTH SESSION.

To the Members of the Corporation:

THE WAR.

The work of the College during the past session has been carried on amid the distraction and strain consequent upon the fact that our Empire is involved in the most colossal war ever known.

A large proportion of our students were enrolled in the McGill regiment, and participated in all its manoeuvers. This inevitably interrupted their studies considerably. But they enjoyed good health and devoted themselves so thoroughly to their work that their examinations failed to reveal any noticeable

falling off in the general standard of excellence.

Four of our students are now on overseas active service—Messrs. Cooper, Richards, Craik and Bale, the last three as members of the McGill General Hospital. To them the call was as sacred as that which brought them to the College, and whether it be on the field of battle or in ministering to the sick and wounded, they will manifest the same spirit of consecration to the service of humanity as do their companions, who minister to the churches of Canada. We are proud to have the College represented in this patriotic service.

THE STUDENTS.

Four new students were enrolled, three coming from our Canadian Churches, and one from England. They are Mr. O. S. Craik, son of the Rev. Galen H. Craik of Melbourne, Quebcc, himself a graduate of this College; Mr. H. L. Broomfield, a member of the Church at Paris, Ontario; Mr. Harry Hully of Calvary Church, Montreal, and Mr. George F. Kelly from Monmouthshire, England. Mr. Craik had already matriculated into the University with distinction, the others entered the Preparatory Department to prepare for matriculation.

The total number of students on the roll for the past session was nineteen; of these eighteen were in residence, and one was taking his Arts course in the University of Toronto under our direction. We may add that one of these is a University graduate, six are undergraduates in Arts, and five have taken partial courses in the University.

CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER COLLEGES.

One of the advantages derived from the co-operation of the four Theological Colleges of Montreal, has been the establishment of a common Preparatory School, where men who have not enjoyed the advantage of a High School training may be prepared for matriculation. Two years is the normal period for such preparation. Four tutors have been employed. During the past session seven of our students have attended classes in this department.

Another result of the co-operation movement has been the employment of a professional teacher of elocution and the establishment of regular courses of instruction, attendance upon which, at least as far as our own College is concerned, is obligatory throughout the theological course. During the past fourteen years Dr. Hill has given personal attention to the training of our men in vocal expression, and has done most excellent work. The new arrangement relieves the Principal of this responsibility, and we hope that even better results will be attained.

The opening of "Divinity Hall" as a central building in which the lectures of the common courses are delivered, and in which, too, the joint Faculty meets for weekly conference, is another event of the year to be chronicled with gratitude. It has proved a common centre for the student life, and greatly added to the enjoyment of both Professors and students.

All our regular courses in Theology, with the exception of a short course

All our regular courses in Theology, with the exception of a short course on Congregational History and Polity, have been taken in the common classes. This is now the third year of the co-operative work, and the class which graduated at the close of this last session, and which was composed of men of all the four Colleges, to the number of about thirty, is unique in the history of Canada, as these men had taken practically all their theological course in common classes and under the professors of four denominations, working together as one Faculty.

SPECIAL LECTURES.

At the suggestion of our Board of Governors' the Joint Board of the co-operating Colleges invited the Rev. A. J. Grieve, D.D., Professor of Church History and New Testament in the United Yorkshire Congregational Colleges, to deliver a series of five lectures early in January last.

These lectures, while given in our Assembly Hall, were presided over by Dr. Scrimger, as Dean of the United Faculty, and were largely attended by

the students and Professors of the four Theological Colleges.

THE COLLEGE PHYSICIAN.

Dr. Charles Cowen Gurd, who has for several years past gratuitously given his time and skill to the care of the health of the students, has been obliged on account of a change in his professional practice to discontinue these services. The Faculty has expressed its great appreciation of Dr. Gurd's kindness, and we are pleased to report that Dr. H. B. Cushing has consented to take his place. It means much to the welfare of the College that it has such able, as well as generous friends.

THE COLLEGE LIBRARY.

Through the kindness of Mr. Charles Gurd, Chairman of the Board of Governors, the College has again been supplied with a fine collection of theological magazines and papers.

EXAMINATIONS.

At the University matriculation examinations last September, Mr. George H. Knighton of our Preparatory Department, successfully matriculated and was awarded the Maria Sawtell Memorial Scholarship of thirty dollars. Mr. O. S. Craik, who had matriculated in connection with his High School course, was awarded the James Baylis Bursary of twenty-five dollars.

We may here report also that Mr. T. W. Bale successfully passed a special matriculation examination immediately before his departure on overseas

service as a member of McGill Hospital.

The regular Christmas and sessional theological examinations were held at the appointed times, and it is gratifying to state that no student failed in

any subject.

Mr. Arthur Ernest Teale, the only member of the graduating class, passed all the examinations and fulfilled all the conditions pertaining to the theological course, and was awarded the College Diploma. He also won the Stevenson Memorial (gold) Medal, and the Calvary Church (silver) Medal, and was awarded a Robert Anderson Bursary of thirty dollars.

Mr. Percy V. Samson, B.A., of the Junior Year, was awarded the Charles

Alexander Bursary of twenty-five dollars.

Since the close of the College the returns of the McGill examinations have been received, and with one or two exceptions, the students have done very

satisfactory work.

Messrs. Jones, Steed and Schofield have passed all the examinations of the third year. The first two combined arts and theology. In estimating the marks in competition for the Bursary, account was taken of all the examina-Macaulay Bursary of sixty dollars was awarded to Mr. T. W. Jones.

The A. Huntly Duff prize of five dollars for excellence in Greek of the first year, was awarded to Mr. G. H. Knighton.

SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY.

The seventy-fifth anniversay of the College was duly celebrated in connection with Convocation week. The celebration opened with a banquet to the students, graduates, and visiting friends provided by the Governors of the College. Special lectures were delivered during three succeeding days by such distinguished visitors as Dr. Frank K. Sanders of New York, Dr. J. B. Silcox of London, Ontario, Prof. H. Y. Youtz, Ph.D., of Auburn, and

Dr. Hugh Black of New York.

The Convocation was held in Emmanuel Church, on the evening of Thursday, April 15th. Dr. Black preached the sermon, and the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on three of the College Alumni, viz., the Rev. J. K. Unsworth, B.A. (in absentia), the Rev. W. T. Gunn, M.A., B.D., and the Rev. Frank J. Day, M.A., B.D. The same degree was also conferred upon the Principal, Dr. Hill, as an expression of the Senate's appreciation of his work and service for the College during the long period of fourteen years in which he has held the Principalship of this Institution. Dr. Hill was the first Dean of the Joint Faculty of the Co-operating Colleges, and in laying down the burdens of the Principalship, as he has now done, he will have the gratification of remembering that to him was given the privilege of having a considerable share in making the co-operation of the Colleges the success that it is, and will carry with him the best wishes of his colleagues in all his future career.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT FOR YEAR ENDING APRIL 30, 1915.

To the Board of Governors.

Congregational College of Canada, Montreal.

Gentlemen:—The past year has been a good one for the Library. A list of the most important books added to the Library was recently published in our Canadian Congregationalist. The fine list of periodicals which has distinguished our Library among the Colleges, has again been maintained by the generosity of your chairman, Mr. Charles Gurd. Hereafter we may well economize in this department, as the large list now coming to Divinity Hall for the use of the Co-operating Colleges, will leave only a few of denominational or other special interest which we will need to keep on file in the future.

But the Library proper is on another footing. As yet no funds have been appropriated for a central theological library in Divinity Hall, and although the rapid development of such a library is to be desired and anticipated, it will be some years at best before such a library can be as good as any one of those of the Co-operating Colleges, and we shall have good reason to maintain our library for some time to come as it has been in the past, although the smallest of the four libraries, yet in some important respects the best.

The Financial Report of the Library should always please business men, in that it never has a deficit. For we buy not according to our desires, but according to our means. This year the financial statement of the Library was

The large balance on hand is not due to a lack of eagerness to get books but to the fact that the largest item of income for the year was the convocation collection given by the large audience in Emmanuel Church, just at the close of the year. We could not spend it before we had it, and did not have time since. We would suggest the question whether it might not be well to have other convocations in Emmanuel or other churches, not merely for the sake of the larger library collection, but for the sake of the larger number of people to be interested in the College.

The principal need of the library has been urgently presented to you in previous reports. It is for additional shelving. At present the shelves are fuller than proper administration permits, and another year will make the difficulty acute. A library, like a man, is either growing or dying. Ours is growing and requires space. Will the Governors not authorize the House Committee to provide additional shelving this summer?

We regret to announce the resignations of Mrs. E. Munson Hill, Mrs. S. H. C. Miner, and Mrs. T. B. Macaulay, and would suggest to fill vacancies Mrs. T. W. Davidson, Mrs. H. Moule, and Mrs. Wm. Watson.

The Treasurer reports receipts \$77.05, and disbursements \$98.60. Respectfully submitted,

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer regrets having to report a very poor year financially.

The apportionment for the churches for the year was \$3,115.00, and the total receipts only \$1,923.86, a difference of \$1,192.00. If all the churches had done as well as those that made the effort, we would not have to report a large deficit.

In the Western Association 26 churches were apportioned \$426.00; 12 churches, less than half, responded with a total of \$216.87, half of the amount

asked for.

In the Central Association 14 churches were apportioned \$450.00. Seven, ast half, responded with \$201.00, about 45% of the amount asked for

just half, responded with \$201.00, about 45% of the amount asked for. In the Eastern Association 11 churches were apportioned \$315.00. Nine

churches replied with \$189.84, just 60% of their apportionment.

In the Quebec Association 20 churches were apportioned \$1,369.00. Fifteen churches, three-quarters of the whole, number, forwarded \$1,036.00, close on 76% of their apportionment.

In the North West 15 churches were apportioned \$330.00. Three churches

responded with \$48.25, less than 15% of their amount.

In the Maritime Provinces 17 churches were apportioned \$200.00. Eleven churches sent \$80.85, 40% of their amount.

The United Brethren were asked for \$25.00, but gave no response.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. S. H. C. Miner for continuing her generous contribution of \$1,800.00.

We also thank those who in addition to their regular contributions con-

tributed to two special guarantee funds.

Last year we reported a deficit on the year's work of \$598.89. This year the deficit for the year is \$636.36.

The continued yearly deficits, mostly small ones, now amount to a total of

\$3,304.20.

On behalf of the Trustees' Endowment Fund I have to report a special donation of \$500.00 from Rev. Geo. A. Rawson; this in addition to the \$1,000.00 given two years ago.

Also a legacy of \$200.00 from the estate of the late Mrs. E. Jones, a

member of Calvary Church, Montreal, and formerly of Zion.

The Treasurer received two shares of Illinois Traction Co. common stock in payment of a subscription of \$125.00 to Salary Guarantee Special Fund, and has transferred them to the Endowment Fund at $62\frac{1}{2}\%$.

There is nothing further to report re Smart Estate, of which we are one

of four residuary legatees.

The investments are, with the above addition, the same as last year, and we would also report that all interest and dividends have been paid, notwithstanding the hard times.

CONDENSED MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE C.C.W.B.M.


The 29th Annual Meeting of the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions convened in the Cobourg Church on Tnesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 1915. There were 53 visiting delegates, beside those of the Cobourg and Coldsprings auxiliaries.

The Executive met on the afternoon of June 1st, the opening session of the conference being held that evening, the President conducting the devo-

tional exercises.

Mrs. W. H. Black and Mrs. J. H. Wickson were appointed Minute Secretaries. The several committees were appointed for the convention on the recommendation of the Executive. Reports were heard from the different branches of the Board through their secretaries. Dr. W. T. Gunn gave an excellent illustrated address the second evening on Home Mission work in Canada, Mr. Daley bringing the greetings of the church. The last evening Mrs. F. W. Read spoke concerning the work in West Central Africa, the address being illustrated with views of the country and mission. Rev. Dr. Cooke of the Congregational College, Montreal, spoke briefly at this session.

Greetings were sent from the Convention to the missionaries in Africa, Ceylon, Turkey and those on furlough. Messages of sympathy were sent to Mrs. Currie, Sr., and Mrs. Walter T. Currie, Rev. Enoch Barker and family; letters of thanks for assistance rendered, to the American Board and the Woman's Board of Boston, also to Mr. C. McD. Hay, Pres. of the Lyman Co., Toronto, and Mr. Faed of the same firm, for their valuable aid in the sending of shipments to Africa each year. Greetings and a warm welcome were sent the new Branch of the East, and thanks to Broadview Ave. S. S., Toronto, for the use of their lantern during the convention. Mrs. Hume, the Vice-Pres., was appointed to convey our greetings to the C.C.F.M.S., and Mrs. Munroe of Maxville to represent us at the C.C.M.S. meetings at Ottawa the following week.

Mrs. Daley, President of the Cobourg and Coldsprings Auxiliaries, gave the address of welcome to the delegates, and the Board President, Mrs. Moodie, replied in behalf of the visitors.

The President's annual address was on the subject of "Missions and the War," and was full of interest and information. Those present expressed a desire to have it printed in entirety, which was done later, in the

columns of the Canadian Congregationalist.

The annual reports of the Secretary, Miss Silcox, and the Treasurer, Miss Thompson, were optimistic in tone, showing that considerable advance had been made in many lines of work, and that the giving had been greater notwithstanding the heavy demands made on all by the great war, under the shadow of which we had been for almost a year. Especially gratifying was the response to The MacCallum Memorial Fund, over eleven hundred of the two thousand dollars required having been subscribed during the year. Nine new Life Members had been added during the year and four names placed on the ''In Memoriam'' list. It was decided to transfer the names of the Life Members of the C.W.B.M. of N.S. & N.B. to our list, and the secretary was instructed to send certificates to that effect.

A committee was appointed, consisting of Mrs. E. A. Cale, Mrs. F. W. Read and the Misses Maddock, Snarr and Henderson, to prepare maps of the Home Mission Field, of the Chisamba district, and pamphlets, catechisms, etc.,

for the use of our Mission Circles and Bands.

Mrs. H. E. Hume of Ottawa led the first Quiet Hour, taking for her subject, "Unnecessary Grief." Mrs. H. Wickson, Pres. of the Toronto Branch conducted the second noon session, speaking on the "Gracious Invitation and Prayer." The devotional exercises of the convention were led by Mrs. Nasmith,

Mrs. P. Munroe, and Mrs. Savage.

The reports of the superintendents were most encouraging throughout. The election of officers resulted in the return of all. Eight superintendents were re-appointed, but Mrs. Cale having resigned that of the Mission Circles and Bands, and Miss Daley finding it impossible to attend either Board or Branch meetings, Miss Maddock of Guelph was made Supt. of Mission Bands, and Mrs. J. H. Wickson, Supt. of Associate Members.

The regular pledged work for both Home and Foreign Missions was reassumed, with the following additional items:—\$100 a year was voted towards the running expenses of the Girls' Boarding School, Chisamba; the balance of the two thousand dollars for the MacCallum Fund was asked for; a new school building at Chisamba for the Senior pupils was ordered to be

built at our expense, and, providing no further calls are made on our Fire Fund of two years ago, that the balance of that account be transferred to the new school building fund.

The Editor of the Monthly Leaflet reported that subscriptions showed a net loss this year, owing largely to a falling off in two auxiliaries, the sub-

scribers, however, totalled considerably over two thousand.

Mrs. W. H. Black conducted a Question Drawer on the last morning, and

for an hour questions and answers and suggestions had the floor.

The mid-day and evening meals were all served in the schoolroom of the church by the ladies of the Cobourg and Coldsprings churches, and nothing could have been more appetizing or more daintily served. A fine group photo was taken of the delegation on the second afternoon, and Mr. Harry Field very kindly had the delegates taken for a delightful automobile ride the last evening directly after the supper.

A series of five eight-minute papers were prepared for the last afternoon on "Everyday Life in Mission Lands." Miss Elizabeth Macallum of Constantinople, wrote one on "Turkey"; Miss Edith Clarke, that on "China"; Mrs. Carter, "Japan"; Mrs. Herbert Moule, "India"; and Mrs. E. C. Austin, "South America." The thanks of the meeting were tendered the writers.

Mrs. Cale conducted a conference on Young People's work. The papers given were as follows:—Why do not more of our young people offer for Missionary Service?—''Home Influence'' (Mrs. Cale); ''Educational Influence'' (Miss Macallum); ''Church Influence'' (Mrs. Ritchie). Miss Elizabeth Read, one of our student volunteers, sent a paper on, ''How to Interest Young People in Missionary Work.'' Miss Maddock told of ''Some Methods for Young People of Moderate Means,'' and Miss Rawlings, ''How and Where to Secure Leaders.''

The Children's Hour was held in the parsonage next door to the church, Mrs. F. W. Read enlisting the sympathies of the younger ones in the work

so near to her heart—that of the West Central African Mission.

At the closing session Mrs. Wookey, in behalf of the visitors, expressed the great pleasure it had been to meet with the friends of the Cobourg church and town, and tendered the thanks of the Board to the hosts and hostesses of the occasion; to the friends of the Coldsprings Church for their helpful assistance with the meals, to the speakers who have inspired us, and the singers who had filled our hearts with song; to Mr. Field for the ride, and to everybody who had helped to make the Annual Meeting of 1915 the success it undoubtedly had been.

Rev. Prof. Cooke pronounced the benediction, and after the singing of "God Save our King," the meeting stood adjourned, to convene in Ottawa,

BY-LAWS OF THE CONGREGATIONAL PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY.

GENERAL BY-LAWS.

I.—MEMBERSHIP.

1. As Beneficiary Members.-Ministers duly received by the Society through either of the branches hereinafter mentioned, and retaining their membership in connection with either fund in accordance with its by-laws.

2. As Life Members.—Any person not being Beneficiary Members, who shall have paid to the fund Twenty Dollars at one time.

3. As Annual Members.—Churches collecting for the fund, to be represented at the annual meeting, or at any special meeting held in the year following the payment of their collection, by one delegate, who shall not be a Beneficiary Member.

II .- ADMISSION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERS.

- 1. Any Congregational Minister in Canada who is in good standing in the denomination and the Pastor of a Congregational Church or a Missionary of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, or a Professor in the Congregational College of Canada, may be admitted as a Beneficiary Member of either branch of the fund by a majority of four-fifths of the Directors present, at any meeting of the Board.
- 2. Before confirming the admission of any applicants, the Board of Directors may, if they think it necessary, make enquiries concerning their general health; and if the result of their enquiries proves unsatisfactory, the Directors may, either decline to confirm the reception, or require such additional remuneration as, in their opinion, would be sufficient to cover the extra risk.

III.—TERMINATION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERSHIP.

- 1. Any Beneficiary Member, not an annuitant, ceasing to reside in Canada, shall thereby lose beneficiary claim on either fund, but the amount of his annual subscription to the Widows and Orphans' fund shall be placed to the credit of his family, under the condition of article No. XII., then to accumulate with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum until his death, when it shall be paid to such person or persons as may be lawfully entitled to receive it. Beneficiary members of the Retiring Ministers' Branch, ceasing to reside in Canada shall cease to have beneficiary claim, but may, in special cases, receive relief from the fund to the amount of their subscriptions to the fund.
- 2. Any Beneficiary Member, leaving the Ministry or the denomination shall thereby forfeit all claim upon the fund, unless he has been a member for ten years; but after having paid in ten years' annual subscriptions he shall have the privilege of withdrawing from the Society, and receiving as surrender value of his claim on its fund, an amount based upon the reasons of his withdrawal, as follows: If he leaves the country, but not the ministry of the denomination, he shall be paid three-fourths of the total amount of his annual subscriptions; if he enters the ministry of another denomination, he shall receive one-half of the total subscriptions paid; if he leaves the ministry, he shall be entitled to two-fifths of the total subscriptions paid. But no member shall be entitled to receive anything from the Society if he was not in good standing in the Congregational Union of Canada at the time of his withdrawal from the denomination or ministry.
- 3. Any Beneficiary Member who may have been connected with the Society, as such for a period of not less than five years, and who has paid all his annual premiums may, if he so desires, withdraw his membership from the Society, and claim a refund of two-fifths of the amount of the premiums paid in by him, if wife is still living.

IV .- RE-ADMISSION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERS.

- 1. Any member returning to Canada (if permitted to resume his connection with the Widows' and Orphans' Branch) shall pay all arrears and an additional rate of 20 cents per annum for each year of his absence, and the amount accumulated to the credit of his family shall relapse to the fund.
- 2. Any member resuming his connection with the Retiring Ministers' Branch shall do so on conditions to be arranged by the Directors.

V .- MEETINGS.

- 1. An annual meeting of the Society shall be held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada, at which a report from the Directors, and the Treasurer's accounts shall be presented, Directors elected for the ensuing year and any other general business of the Society transacted.
- 2. Special meetings of the Society may be held at its pleasure, expressed at any meeting thereof, or at the call of the Directors.
- 3. Beneficiary Members, in connection with either branch of the Fund, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Society.
- 4. In case of a division, a majority of two-thirds shall be necessary to constitute a vote.

VI.--MANAGEMENT.

- 1. The funds of the Society shall be held and managed by a Board of ten Directors (five to form a quorum), eight residing in or near the City of Montreal, to be elected annually by the Society.
- 2. The Directors, when elected, shall, from their own numbers, choose a Chairman, Deputy-Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary, and may make such standing rules for their own guidance (not being inconsistent with the Act of Incorporation and its amendments or by-laws), as they may deem needful, subject to the approval of the Society at the next annual meeting.
- 3. They shall also have power to fill vacancies in their own number, shall be eligible for re-election, and shall hold office until their successors are appointed and assume their duties.

VII .-- INCOME AND INVESTMENTS.

- 1. The funds of the Society shall be derived from Annual Church Collections, Subscriptions, Donations and Legacies, the rates paid by Beneficiary Members, and the proceeds of investments.
- 2. The amount received for Church Collections, or otherwise contributed for the general purposes of the Society, shall be divided between the Branches at the discretion of the Board; but money contributed from any source, and especially designated for either Branch, shall be so applied.
- 3. The Funds shall be invested only in undoubted securities to be held on the Society's behalf by the Chairman or Deputy-Chairman, and the Treasurer in the name of the Incorporated Society.
- 4. Any investments or transfer from one investment to another shall be made only by vote of the Board.
- 5. The Treasurer shall give such security to the Board for the funds in his possession as they may from time to time require.

VIII.—DISPUTED CASES.

In the case of any dispute arising between Beneficiary Members on Annuitants, and the Directors of the Society, each party shall choose an arbitrator, and these, if necessary, an umpire, whose decision shall be final.

IX.—REVISAL OF RATES AND ANNUITIES.

The amount of the rates of premium and annuities shall be reconsidered at each fifth annual meeting, reckoning from that held in 1863, and should any re-adjustment be needed such re-adjustment shall not be deemed to be a violation of good faith by any parties whatsoever.

X .-- ALTERATION OF BY-LAWS.

The By-Laws of the Society may be enacted, amended or repealed at any annual meeting, provided that notice to such effect has been given at the previous annual meeting. But this shall not apply to the case provided for in By-Law IX.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' BRANCH.

XI.—BENEFICIARY SUBSCRIPTIONS.

The following shall be the scale of rates, payable annually, by Beneficiary Members of the Widows' and Orphans' Branch:—

- 1. By those received under thirty years of age, and by Alumni of the Congregational College of Canada, subscribing within twelve months from the date of their ordination, Ten Dollars.
- 2. By those received over thirty and under forty years of age, Twelve Dollars.
- 3. By those received over forty and under fifty years of age, Fourteen Dollars.
- 4. By those received over fifty and under sixty years of age, Sixteen Dollars.
- 5. By those received over sixty years of age, such a special rate as may be agreed to by the ociety.
- 6. All subscriptions to be payable semi-annually on the 1st of January and July, and if not paid within three months, to be subject to a fine of \$1. If not paid within twelve months, due notice having been given by the trustees, the minister so in arrears shall be held to have withdrawn from connection with the fund.
- 7. Any Beneficiary Member who shall have paid thirty annual premiums, according to the above assessment, shall be exempt from further subscriptions, and shall maintain his status as a Beneficiary as before.

XII.—ANNUITIES.

There shall be paid from the funds of the Society to the families of the Beneficiary Members the following annuities:—

- 1. To the Widows for life, or until re-marriage, Two Hundred Dollars per annum.
- 2. To their Widows for each Son under the age of sixteen years, Thirty-five Dollars, but Seventy Dollars for the youngest child.
- 3. To Guardians on behalf of Orphans, Seventy Dollars for the youngest and Forty-five Dollars for each other child, and two-thirds of what would have been payable to the Mother had she not deceased, until they attain the ages mentioned in the preceding section, provided, nevertheless, that the Directors shall have power to delay such payments to Guardians until they are satisfied that they will be properly applied.
- 4. It shall be competent for the Society, on recommendation of the Directors, to continue an annuity to an Orphan by special annual grant beyond the period named in Article 2, should there be special reasons for so doing.

RETIRING MINISTERS' BRANCH.

XIII. - BENEFICIARY SUBSCRIPTIONS.

The following shall be the scale of rates, payable annually, by Beneficiary Members of the Retiring Ministers' Branch:—

- 1. By those received under thirty years of age, and by Alumni of the Congregational College of Canada, subscribing within 12 months from the date of their ordination, Four Dollars per annum.
- 2. Those received over 30 and under 35 years of age, Five Dollars per annum.
- 3. Those received over 35 and under 40 years of age, Six Dollars per annum.
- 4. Those received over 40 and under 45 years of age, even Dollars per annum.
- $5.\,$ Those received over 45 and under 50 years of age, Eight Dollars per annum.
- 6. Ministers over 50 years of age shall be received only on such terms as the Directors may agree to.
- 7. Ministers who may pay at once, or for whom may be paid by their Churches or by others, a sum equal to the amount of fifteen years purchase, according to the age rate indicated above, may become Beneficiary Life Members.

XIV .-- ANNUITIES.

- 1. Beneficiary Members of this Branch having attained the age of 65 years, and having been compelled to resign the active duties of the ministry, shall be entitled to an annuity of \$200 for life, payable quarterly, from the Retiring Ministers' Fund; but should there be any good or sufficient reason why it should not be paid—of which reason the Society shall be the sole and sufficient judge—it shall not be paid, anything in these by-laws to the contrary notwithstanding.
- 2. It shall be competent for the Society, on recommendation of the Directors, to increase the annuity of any Beneficiary Member by a special or annual grant, not exceeding the sum of \$100 per annum additional, and said grant may be made for life, by regular vote, after 12 months' notice given at any annual meeting of the Society.
- 3. Should the income of either the Retiring Ministers or Charitable Fund not be sufficient for the payment of annuities for which it is liable, it shall be right and proper for the Society to make such reduction, pro rata, on all annuities as will cover the deficiency, anything in these by-laws to the contrary notwithstanding.—See By-law XVI., Clause 2.

XV.—CHARITABLE FUND.

- 1. The proportion of Charitable Subscriptions, Donations, Legacies, and Church Collections available shall be placed to the credit of an account to be called the Charitable Fund, until the sum of One Thousand Dollars is secured, the interest of which only shall be available for grants or annuities.
- 2. After \$1,000 is secured, one half of said Subscriptions, Collections, etc., shall be reserved to constitute an Endowment Fund, until the sum of \$5,000 has been secured.

3. The other half with the proportion of interest due to this account, shall be available for grants or annuities; but should the income in any year exceed the disbursements of that year, the surplus, after allowing a small balance for contingencies, shall be added to the Endowment.

XVI.—CHARITABLE ANNUITIES.

- 1. The Society may, from the Charitable Fund, make special or annual grants to any aged or infirm Congregational Minister, laboring in Canada, though not a Beneficiary Member.
- 2. Should the Retiring Ministers' Fund not be sufficient for the claims of annuitants, it shall be proper to supplement that Fund from the Charitable Fund.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATIONAL PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY.

The Provident Fund Society held its Annual Meeting on Thursday, 10th June, 1915, in Welcome Zion Church, Ottawa, at 4.30 p.m.

Mr. Charles Gurd in the chair. Rev. J. W. Newbery acted as Secretary.

Rev. E. D. Silcox led in prayer.

The minutes of the last meeting taken as read.

In the absence of the Secretary, Mr. Moodie read the annual report for the past year. Report adopted.

Mr. Thos, Moodie read the Treasurer's Report. Adopted.

Moved by Dr. Warriner, and seconded by Rev. J. L. Alexander, that the best thanks of the Union be tendered the officers of the past year. Carried. Moved by Mr. John Black, that the Board of Directors of past year be

re-elected, viz.:—

Mr. Thos. Moodie was elected to represent the Society in the Conditional Gifts campaign.

Montreal, 31st May, 1915.

The Directors have pleasure in reporting another successful year; although

not as satisfactory as we would wish.

An increase has been secured in our revenue, but we still think there is room for a larger increase. Many of the Churches have contributed nothing, and those which are contributing might well make arrangements to do more. There is no department in commercial or professional life which is served with greater zeal and carnestness by as highly educated a body of men as are our Churches. This service is not a highly paid service, and affords none of the opportunities for acquiring a competence which present themselves to men ongaged in commercial pursuits. There is all the greater reason, therefore, why the Churches, assuming that they are paying all they can afford to pay in salaries, should deal liberally with their Ministers in the matter of retiring allowances and death benefits to their survivors. Such "welfare work," as it is called, is receiving a great deal of attention from all large companies, and the Congregational Church in Canada might be considered a large company, since if its assets in the way of churches and other properties were placed in one figure, its capital would be equal to that of a large corporation.

Neither are we satisfied with the membership. We are offering to our Ministers a most desirable and profitable membership, and it is amazing that

it is not universally taken advantage of.

You will have presented to you, in printed form, the Treasurer's statement for the past year, which ends on the 31st May, and I would like to call

your attention to one or two points in connection with that report.

In the Widows' and Orphans' Branch, beneficiaries paid \$293.00. They received \$1,400.00. The total receipts from beneficiaries was, as stated, \$293.00. From other sources it was \$2,807.00, without including the balance

brought forward from last year.

In the Retiring Ministers' Branch the beneficiaries paid \$101.00, and we paid to annuitants \$400.00. Similarly, of the total receipts but \$101.00 came from the fees, while \$1,867.00 came from other sources of revenue available to the Society in the shape of dividends or investments, and collections from the Churches.

In connection with these figures you should also bear in mind that the expenses of the Society are very light indeed, being less than \$200.00 a year on an income of nearly \$8,000.00. If this were a chartered Insurance Company the running expenses would be one-third of the income. These facts are worthy of serious consideration by those who have not yet become members

of the Society.

The condition of the Society is absolutely sound and improving, as the payments which we make to beneficiaries are based upon the report of an Actuary, who takes into account our ultimate liability toward all the members, and reports and advises the Society each five years as to what amounts it would be justified in paying. Two years ago, on receipt of this report, we were able to make a substantial addition to the benefits paid, and in spite of that our assets are still increasing, affording ground for the hope and expectation that we shall be able to do still better in the near future. The fees are small, and within the compass of any member; and the Minister who is not a member of this Society is exposing his church to a hazard which the church would do well on its part to lessen, by arranging to have its Minister take out a membership in this Society.

The Board has again to express its thanks for the renewed confidence expressed in it by the Society during its term of office. It will be your duty,

at the annual meeting, to elect a new board and an auditor.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer has to report that the past year has been a good one. Last year was the best on record, and this as to contributors has been slightly better, but six churches less have contributed.

Is the Western Association 26 churches were apportioned \$165.00, seven

contributed \$153.00.

In the Eastern Association 11 churches were apportioned \$105.00, four contributed \$29.50.

In the Quebec Association 19 churches were apportioned \$352.00, ten

contributed \$442.68, one church more than last year and \$90.68 over the amount they asked for.
United Brethren were apportioned \$25.00, but no response. Last year

they gave \$7.00.

In the Maritime Association 17 churches were apportioned \$50.00, eight contributed \$27.33.

In the North West Association 13 churches were apportioned \$150.00,

two, Calgary and Vancouver First, contributed \$15.00.

Mrs. Allworth, who was an annuitant since November, 1896, died on the

13th May last.

Rev. Walter Cannon, who was a beneficiary in both branches for five years, has left the denomination, and under By-law III., Sec. 2, has no claim for a refund.

Rev. R. G. Watt, who has been out of the active work of the ministry for some time, owing to throat trouble, has withdrawn and claimed refund of two-fifths of amount paid in, which has been paid him. He states that if he is able to resume the active work of the ministry again, he will rejoin the Society.

In the W. & O. Branch we have carried \$1,550.00 to capital account,

leaving \$374.66 at credit of revenue account.

In the R. M. Branch we have also been able to carry \$1,500.00 to capital account, the largest amount at any one time, leaving \$569.14 at credit of revenue account.

The investments are practically the same as last year, with the addition

of \$3,000.00 to W. & O. mortgages, and \$2,000.00 to R. M. mortgages.

We are pleased to be able to say that all investments are in good shape and interest and dividends were promptly paid.

The financial statements are herewith presented.
