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I.—That the name of this Association be "THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA."

II.—That it shall consist of Congregational churches and of ministers of the same church order received at a general meeting, and of those laymen who have been chairmen of the Union and are members of its churches.

III.—That this Union is founded on the full recognition of the autonomy of the local churches, and therefore it shall not, in relation to them, assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal.

IV.—That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation:

1. To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination.

2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything related to the interests of the associated churches.

3. To establish a fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere.

4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated churches, accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary.

5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces.

6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general.

7. To receive and administer such funds or other property as may at any time be given or entrusted to it.

V.—To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated churches being represented by two lay delegates, the meeting to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.

VI.—That the officers of this Union be a chairman, General Secretary, Field Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Statistical Secretary, and the Superintendents of departments appointed by the Union. That a committee of sixteen—eight to be laymen—shall also be elected annually who, with the officers, shall be the Executive Committee of the Union. The duties of the Executive shall be as follows: (1) To act as an Advisory Board with the General Secretary; (2) Eo prepare business for and make reports of the Union; (3) To carry out instructions of the Union; (4) To act for the Union in matters which may arise between sessions.

VII.—The various kinds of work of the Union may be committed for cultivation and guidance to departments with a Superintendent and committee for each.

VIII.—That alterations may be made in this Constitution at any annual meeting, providing that notice of such alterations has been given at the meeting preceding, or published in at least four issues of *The Canadian Congregationalist* preceding the meeting.

STANDING RULES

I. Membership

- (A) Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, should be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union shall be referred to a standing committee on membership.
- (B) Churches applying for membership shall present a certificate of membership in the Association of their district, or if in territory not organized as an Association, the written recommendation of three members of the Union.
- (C) Ministers applying for membership shall present their certificate of membership in the Association within whose bounds they reside, or if resident in territory not organized as an Association, the written recommendation of three members of the Union.

- (D) Ministers bearing regular letters of transfer from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of Canada, and those who have passed the Three Years' Union Course under the care of an Association or of the Union Executive, and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these grounds.
- (E) Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) their membership in a Congregational Church; (2) their ordination to the ministry; (3) their good standing in the denomination from which they come; (4) they will satisfy the Membership Committee in relation to their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views and their literary acquirements, their course of study to have been at least equal to the Three Years' Course adopted by the Union; (5) should the Membership Committed be satisfied on these points and recommend the applicant for membership, the recommendation shall be filed with the Recording Secretary, and the application shall then lie over until the next annual meeting, when a vote of two-thirds of the members present shall be requisite for admission into membership.

II. Ministerial Standing

- (A) By vote of the various Associations and of the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, ministerial standing will hereafter be in this Union and transfer to our own denomination in other countries and to other denominations shall hereafter be given by this Union only.
- (B) Unles engaged in religious or educational work approved by the Union, a minister who has retired from the pastorate or official service of the denomination and follows some other calling, by which he makes his living, may be dropped from the roll unless he make yearly request that his name be retained, this request to be endorsed by the Congregational Church of which he is a member.
- (C) Any member of the Union soliciting funds from the public must on request of the Union submit either personally or through a responsible committee, a statement of such funds satisfactory to the Union; failing this his name shall be dropped from the roll.

III.—Meetings of the Union

The Union shall meet annually on the Tuesday after the first Sunday in June.

The opening session shall be at eight o'clock on Tuesday evening and shall consist of the Annual Sermon and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The full attendance of the Union is expected at this service.

The business sessions shall be held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday,

beginning at 9.30 a.m.

Wednesday morning session. After prayer the minute secretary shall be appointed and the Committees on Business, Nomination, Membership, Finance and the Press, chosen on nomination by the Executive. The executive report shall then be presented, other business transacted, and the Union at 11.00 a.m. shall give place to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

Wednesday afternoon shall be given over to committee meetings and to a Conference on Young People's Work, under the charge of the Young People's

Department.

Wednesday evening, the annual address of the Chairman shall be given. Thursday morning session. After routine business the Chairman of the Union shall be elected by nomination and ballot as hereinafter provided. Nominees must be members of a Congregational Church in affiliation with the Union, and their consent, in writing, to accept the office, if elected, together with the nomination, must be filed with the Secretary of the Union, not later than May 1st.

Nominations are to be made by each District Association at its spring The Secretary of the Union shall, in advance of these meetings, write to the Secretaries of the various Associations, notifying them that such nomination should be made.

In addition to the nominations by the District Associations, any nomination signed by any ten members of a Church or Churches in affiliation with the Union, and duly filed with the Secretary as provided above, will be a valid nomination.

Two-thirds of the ballots cast shall constitute an election.

Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, and the votes shall be counted by scrutineers appointed by the Chairman. If no candidate has the required number of votes, the names only of the two persons having the highest number shall be reported and another vote taken as between the two.

At this session shall be presented the annual Statistical Report. session shal adjourn at 11.00 a.m. in favor of the Canada Congregational

Missionary Society.

Friday morning session. With other business there shall be given the Annual Reports of Standing Committees and Departments.

Devotional hour. All meetings of the Union shall be opened with prayer, and there shall be held daily during the session of the Union a Devotional Hour from 12 noon to12.45 p.m.

II. Statistics

Application shall be made by the Statistical Secretary one month at least before the annual meeting to the Secretaries of the various Associations, and directly to churches in districts not organized as Associations, for statistics of the churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for presentation to the annual meeting, and for publication, if so desired.

V. Finance

A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each church, on or near the Lord's Day prior to the meeting. From this source, supplemented by collections taken at the Union meetings, the Finance Committee, after providing for other necessary expenses, shall pay in full if possible, the travelling fares within the bounds of Ontario and Quebec, of each ministerial member and of one delegate from each church, or if unable to pay in full, shall deduct from the claim of each such equal amount as 'may be found necessary; such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except with permission of the Union (providing always that no member of the Union, whether ministerial or lay, attending the meetings, shall receive anything for travelling expenses unless such ministerial member shall have contributed not less than one dolar, and the church represented by the delegate, not les than five dollars, to the funds of the Union.)

VI.—Miscellancous Rules

(A) The term of office of the Chairman and Recording Secretary shall be the calendar year subsequent to their election, but the Chairman-elect shall from the date of election be ex-officio a member of the Executive until the end of his term as Chairman.

(B) The members of the Union shall register their attendance with the

Recording Secretary in a book kept for this purpose.

(C) The minutes of the preceding day shall be read at the opening of each day's session, and the minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

(D) Delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who cannot fulfil their appointment by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if they were present at the meetings of such corresponding bodies.

THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING

The minutes of the Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Canada, held in Emmanuel Church, Montreal, June 7-10, 1921.

The Union Service was conducted by the Chairman, Rev. George Adam, on Tuesday evening, June 7th. The sermon was preached by Rev. I. W. Pierce. The Communion Service took place at the close, and was conducted by Rev. W. H. Warriner, M.A., D.D., assisted by Rev. H. A. Carson, B.A., Rev. R. W. Carr, and representative deacons.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 8th

The first business session of the Union opened at 9.30 on Wednesday, June 8th, with devotions conducted by the Chairman, Rev. George Adam.

A letter was read from the Canadian Bible Society asking that Canon Shatford be allowed to represent the Society. On motion, the letter was referred to the Business Committee.

Dr. Gunn stated that a letter of transfer had been received for Dr. Ritchie. Dr. Gunn reported that application for transfer to the Presbyterian Church of Canada had been asked for by Rev. R. B. Nelles, and for application for membership in the Union from Revs. W. Cox and E. C. Searle. Dr. Gunn recommended that the name of Rev. J. H. Sulston be dropped, at his own request, he having united with the Presbyterian Church. On motion, these were referred to the Membership Committee.

The Recording Secretary stated that during the year letters of transfer had been granted to Revs. T. W. Davidson, D. A. Armstrong and W.

H. Hill.

Applications for membership were received from Rev. Geo. Laughton and E. R. Bellingham, and referred to Membership Committee.

A letter of greetings was received from Rev. D. Burford Hooke, D.D.. and it was agreed that greetings of the Union be forwarded to him.

The Business Committee was asked to find a place on the programme for the Rev. R. K. MacKay, representing the Congregational Union of England and Wales and the Colonial Missionary Society.

A letter from the Central Young Men's Association was received,

extending their privileges to the Union.

The Report of the Executive Committee was presented by the General Secretary, who moved its reference to the Business Committee.

REPORT OF THE UNION EXECUTIVE FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31st, 1921

It is with gratitude to God that we gather again in this the fifteenth

annual meeting of the Congregational Union of Canada.

The world tumult left after the great upheaval of war has, if not completely cleared away, at least measurably improved, and the life of

the nations is settling into the steadier ways of peace.

In our own denomination there are abundant causes for gratitude. Our reports will show good work done. There have been in many Churches very happy additions to the membership, especially among the young people. There has been also a general increase in contributions to all our denominational funds.

Our College has received an increasing number of students from our Canadian Congregational Churches. The Young People's Department, through its advocacy of the Young Worshippers' League, has markedly increased the attendance of the young people at the services of many of

our Churches.

We have also received from the Primate of the Church of England in Canada a copy of the Lambeth Encyclical in regard to Church Union, which will be considered at the meeting of their Church Courts this fall, but is sent on in advance for our information and consideration. This has been referred to our Church Union Committee.

The Inter-Church Advisory Council, composed of representatives of the Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Social Service, College and Young People's Boards of the Churches, has held several meetings during the year. So far the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Boards have all joined, as have some of the Baptist Boards. The Anglican Boards hav declined to unite formally, but have promised co-operation in specific objects in which co-operation may be possible. The Inter-Church Council is doing quiet, steady work in bringing into fuller cooperation our various Churches and their Boards, and also in bringing under the oversight of the Churches those interdenominational enterprises which, depending on the Churches mainly for support, have yet been without direct communication with or responsibility to the Churches

The Inter-Church Advisory Council, in matters concerning Young People and Sunday Schools, will function through the Religious Education Council of Canada, which is now under control of the Boards of the Churches and replaces the former Sunday School Associations nationally and locally. Under the care of this Religious Educational Council of Canada, on which we are this year for the first time represented, have come the rapidly growing Boys' Work Board and also the Girls' Work Board. The Anglicans and Baptist Boards are represented in the Reli-

gious Education Council.

Representatives of the Foreign Boards of the five Churches also arranged for the holding of a two days' conference in Wycliffe College, Toronto, last winter, when the work of the Foreign Boards was for the first time jointly presented, with much profit.

The Advisory Committee on Relations between the Churches and the Young Men's Christian Association has held two sessions and is making plans for closer co-operation between the Churches and the Young Men's

Christian Association both nationally and locally.

We joined with the sister Churches in appealing to our people for the China Famine Fund and it is a pleasure to record that over \$660,000 has been sent on to China. We also joined in an appeal to the Sunday Schools for the China Famine and Armenian Relief Fund.

We joined also in an appeal for the Vimy Ridge Memorial Church to be erected for the Protestant Church of France in memory of our boys who fell at Vimy, and it is a matter of regret that the response was

not larger.

Our Churches have also been officially represented on the Dominion and Provincial Referendum Committee, and we record our joy in the success of the various Provincial plebiscites and our hope that this may soon lead the way to Dominion-wide and complete prohibition of the use as a beverage of intoxicating liquor.

The Commission on the World Conference on Faith and Order has

held various meetings in preparation for the future Conference.

Coming back to our denominational matters, in view of the delay in the consummation of Church Union and the consequent unsettlement in some of our Churches, your Executive thought it wise to adopt the following as a definite denominational policy, at their meeting last September:

"That in view of the near approach of Church Union, and in order that we may carry into the United Church all of the spiritual and material resources of our denomination and of each local Church, we declare as our policy, the maintenance of every Congregational Church and station and their development to the fullest possible extent."

Nevertheless we have had, with the consent and advice of the Western Association, to close the Kitchener Church, their sister Church at Freeport being cared for by the Waterloo circuit. At the annual meeting of the Western Congregational Church, Toronto, the members present voted to go over to Dale Presbyterian Church and unite with it as part of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. After patient dealing with the seceders by the Toronto Council, the matter was taken up by your Executive, who made protest to the Presbytery of Toronto, and finally approved holding of services for worship by the non-seceding members

and their application to the courts for a declaration of rights.

In Kingston our First Congregational Church has entered very happily into a co-operative arrangement with Chalmers Presbyterian Church whereby the rolls and denominational offerings of both churches continue, both buildings are used, and the prospects are for a larger work unitedly than the two Churches had when separate. At Yarmouth, N.S., the burning of the Methodist Church has led that Church to approach our Church and the Presbyterian Church with a view to the union of the three Churches, and negotiations are proceeding. In the Western Association district the co-operative committees of the three Churches are proposing a number of re-arrangements with a view to better organized circuits and an economy of men. The district covered by the Hamilton Presbytery is being dealt with first and

very considerable re-arrangement is being planned. This affects our Elcho and Zion circuits.

"In matters of denominational organization,-

Your Executive have considered the manner of election of the Chairman of the Union, and, having given due notice, recommend to you the adoption

of the following amendment of Standing Rule 111:

"After routine business the Chairman of the Union shall be elected by nomination and ballot as hereinafter provided. Nominees must be members of a Congregational Church in affiliation with the Union, and their consent, in writing, to accept the office, if elected, together with the nomination, must be filed with the Secretary of the Union, not later than May 1st.

"Nominations are to be made by each District Association at its spring meeting. The Secretary of the Union shall, in advance of these meetings, write to the Secretaries of the various Associations, notify-

ing them that such nomination should be made.

"In addition to the nominations by the District Associations, any nomination signed by any ten members of a Church or Churches in affiliation with the Union, and duly filed with the Secretary, as provided above, will be a valid nomination.

"Two-thirds of the ballots cast shall constitute an election.

"Ballot papers shall be furnished to all members of the Union present, and the votes shall be counted by scrutineers appointed by the Chairman. If no candidate has the required number of votes, the names only of the two persons having the highest number shall be

reported and another vote taken as between the two."

We have also considered it wise that the Chairman of the Union should during his year of office be ex-officio a member of the Executives of the College, Home and Foreign Missionary Societies. We have taken the matter up with these corporations with favorable results. The College states that the election of the Chairman as one of the number of Union representatives on the College Senate will meet the situation. The Home and Foreign Missionary Societies are amending their constitutions to make the Chairman ex-officio a member of their Executives.

We considered also the matter of changing the denominational financial year to coincide with the calendar year. This had obvious advantages in connection with our apportionment system and also in making the financial year of our various funds coincide with the financial year of the local Churches. It was found impossible at present, but your Executive arranged to have the denominational Treasurers close their books on May first so that there might be sufficient time to prepare adequate reports for the Union meetings.

With the co-operation and consent of the Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick we also arranged to have a denominational representative appointed to have oversight of the Churches in that district. Rev. E. J. Thompson was accordingly appointed Superintendent for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The Superintendent of the Young People's Department, Rev. D. A. Armstrong, having resigned, Rev. J. Lambert Alexander, B.D., was appointed in his place.

We recommend that for 1921-1922 this amount be provided as follows: \$1,800.00 from the Forward Movement directly.

\$1,800.00 from the Home Missionary Society, of which \$800 should come from their current revenue and \$1,000 from their share of surplus of Forward Movement over original aims.

\$1,800.00 from the Foreign Missionary Society, of which \$500.00 should come from their current revenue and \$1,300.00 from their share

of surplus of Forward Movement above original aims.

We therefore recommend that the societies named be asked to agree to

these proposals.

Following the movement towards general re-organization begun last year, the question of the size of the permanent staff has had the consideration of your Executive, but no definite conclusion has been arrived at. After consultation with Dr. Day, we, therefore, recommend that he continue in the same position he now occupies for six months, and that meanwhile the Executive face the whole question of a permanent policy and bring in definite recommendations. Further, we recommend that remuneration be at the present rate, and that \$1,000 be taken from the Forward Movement Fund, and \$1,000 from the George Robertson Fund, with which to meet salary and expenses:

The apportionments and receipts for 1920 are herewith attached. The apportionment made last June will not be fully acted upon by all our Churches until the calendar year and the closing of our denominational Treasurer's books a month earlier than usual, both affect the returns. Nevertheless, these figures show a fine advance which will be fully commented upon by the report of the Forward Movement Director, the increasing of our regular givings having been the financial aim of

the Forward Movement during the year.

The apportionment may have to be slightly altered according to the

results shown in the year's work,

The Marriage Law of Quebec. It has been recently found that the Act under which our Congregational Churches and Ministers in the Province of Quebec were granted the right to the performance of the ceremony of marriage needs considerable amendment to be brought into accord with our usual Congregational custom. The necessary documents will be prepared by the Executive of the Quebec Association and when prepared will be presented to the Quebec Legislature by our Union, so that the law may be revised.

We chronicle with regret the death of Rev. W. T. Morris, who has been for years ministering to the little group of Welsh Congregationalists who moved from Patagonia to the neighbourhood of Saltcoats and met for worship in the school at Glyndwr. We extend to Mrs. Morris

and the family our heartfelt sympathy.

It is with deep sympathy also that we have learned of the death of Mrs. J. T. Tucker, and the Union will no doubt desire to express their sympathy to Rev. J. T. Tucker and to the two little sons left motherless.

We will welcome to our meetings Rev. George Laughton, the new pastor of Central Church, Winnipeg, and Rev. G. A. Dickson of Crescent Church, Winnipeg, and also Rev. J. D. Gross, Superintendent of our Russo-German Churches in the West, and also Rev. Merlin W. Ennis, of Angola, West Central Africa; and we welcome, too, Rev. R. K. MacKay, who comes to us with greetings from the Congregational Union of England and Wales and the Colonial Missionary Society.

The programme of the Union has been duly prepared and is here-

FORWARD MOVEMENT

REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR YEAR ENDING JUNE 15TH, 1921.

GENERAL ORGANIZATION

Following the method employed in the first year of the Movement, the Dominion was divided into 22 districts with a Key Man for each in 19 of these, and for Montreal 3 Key Men and for Toronto 2. The following is a list of those who have acted as Key Men and whose services have been of great value to the Movement. Revs. Campbell Tavener, Geo. W. Ball, Mr. J. W. Flewelling, Revs. E. LeRoy Rice, Dr. G. Ellery Read, J. Lambert Alexander, Messrs. A. R. Grafton, W. W. Brewis, A. McA. Murphy, Revs. A. F. Pollock, H. A. Carson, Bertram Nelles, W. H. Thomas, G. H. Knighton, Geo. J. Hindley, Frank Sanders, A. J. Barnard, Matthew Kelly, J. W. Newberry, Geo. A. Dickson, Percy V. Samson, Trevor J. Williams and John D. Gross.

Each Church was asked to appoint a Forward Movement Committee to be as far as possible identical with the Missionary or Benevolence Committee as variously designated. Very few changes were made in the arrangements of districts, and in the majority of cases the Churches re-

appointed the committees of last year.

To all members of Forward Movement Committees, a special communication was sent, outlining their duties for the year, and urging their thorough and earnest co-operation.

PUBLICITY AND INFORMATION

In order to keep in touch with Key Men, Ministers and Chairmen of Forward Movement Committees, a series of memos, have been sent out, 34 in all, dealing with all matters of interest in connection with the Movement, such as Literature, Retreats, Payment of Forward Movement Subscriptions, Apportionments, Budget System, Duplex Envelopes, Interchurch Plans and co-operative movements, Young People's Department, Exchange of Pulpits, etc.

RETREATS

The finely conceived plan of Dr. Ritchie for holding Retreats for Ministers was carried out with most happy results in September, retreats being held, one at Toronto and the other at Montreal, with good attendance at each, a spirit of deep and earnest interest on the part of all the ministers enrolled, and the development of a marked desire for the continuance of the same, arrangements for which by action of the Union Executive, have been handed over to the District Associations.

VISITATION OF THE CHURCHES

Immediately following the Union meetings at Guelph, the Director began his work of visitation in the Maritime Provinces, and up to the date of this report has visited 82 Churches and travelled 19,665 miles. making a total of over 45,000 miles travelled since the beginning of the movement.

According to arrangements made with the Union Executive, the Director was absent on leave without salary in March and April, during which time, however, he kept in touch with the organization through correspondence, memos., F. M. column in "Canadian Congregationalist, etc.

Another means of stimulating interest and developing the spirit of fellowship was tried out on February 13th, when, as far as possible, a general exchange of pulpits was arranged for in Eastern Canada for the purpose of laying special emphasis on the spiritual aims of the movement. Reports from Churches and ministers indicated that the idea proved to be a happy one, and that to preachers and people the services were most helpful.

In his dual capacity as Executive Secretary of the Forward Movement and Deputation Secretary of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, Mr. Barker visited 26 Churches, travelling in all 2,420 miles.

INTERCHURCH PLANS

During the opening months of 1921, the Committee entrusted with the continuation work of the Forward Movement, in the Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, made plans for cooperative and simultaneous action along the lines of our spiritual aims. With this in view, subjects for two weeks of prayer at the opening of the year were arranged, and special communications were sent to all the Churches in the co-operating communions, laying emphasis on personal evangelism and dedication of life to Christ, looking to a large ingathering at Easter.

APPORTIONMENTS

It was the special work of the Movement on the financial side to bring to the attention of the Churches the apportionments made, first of all, by the Union and then assigned to the Churches by the District Associations, or in case of unorganized districts, by the office staff.

These were made known to the Churches through the Associations, followed by a personal communication to each one from the Director, sent to the minister with a copy to the Chairman of the Forward Movement Committee. In addition to this, Key Men were supplied with a copy of the apportionments for each of their Churches, and asked to co-operate with the Forward Movement Committee in doing everything to encourage and help the Churches to reach the ideals set before them. For the purpose of aiding in this endeavour, the series of pamphlets referred to under "Publicity" has been issued by the various Denominational Societies. Unfortunate delays in getting out some of these diminished to some degree their effectiveness.

As a basis of securing permanent increase in all contributions to our denominational activities, the following were recommended to the

Churches:

The adoption of the Budget System. The annual every-member canvass. The use of duplex envelopes.

Periodic presentation of each Denominational Object.

The Key Men have had these specially in hand, and many interesting reports have come to hand of the adoption of these by the local Churches.

Careful observation as to the way in which apportionments were received was made by the Director and the Key Men. In general, an earnest effort was put forth by our Churches to reach them, but in the case of the College and Provident Fund, the increased amounts assigned were considered by many difficult to reach, with the result that these two funds fell very much behind. Inasmuch as the returns we have in hand are for eleven months only, owing to the closing of the books on April 30th, it is very difficult to arrive by analysis at any satisfactory conclusions concerning the response of our Churches or the necessity of further revision, but as far as possible this will be done after the returns of the Union Fund are in, and will be presented to the various Associations. It is a matter of satisfaction, however, to note that the funds reported show an increase of \$3,361.25 over last year. Taking into consideration the total paid by Churches to date on Forward Movement Central Fund, i.e., \$65,020.51, this shows a remarkable increase in the gifts of our people in the space of fifteen months.

It is to be regretted that our people have not been able to reach the new apportionments, part of the reason for which may doubtless be found in the fact that the new figures sent out were in many cases too late to be included in the budgets of the local Churches.

THANK OFFERING

The following is a complete list of all our churches, arranged according to districts, showing amounts subscribed to the Central Fund and amounts paid to May 31st, 1921. It will be noticed that a number of churches made no subscriptions. FUTURE PLANS

The committee recommends as follows:

1. That the organization as at present existing with the divisions

of the Dominion into districts with Key Men, be continued.

2. That in general the line of policy heretofore pursued be followed, namely—to promote all the spiritual aims which have been before us from the beginning, and to so encourage the spirit of giving that we can make all our programmes of missionary work adequate to the growing needs of our times.

3. That on the financial side, the committee have again in charge

3. That on the financial side, the committee have again in charge the apportionments, and that these be carefully revised in consultation with the District Associations and that with these plans be made and carried out to make clear to all our people the absolute urgency of adequate support for all our missionary and educational programme.

4. That the Movement be specially related to the Young People's Department, with a view to planning a new and aggressive policy, looking to the enlistment of all the young life of our Churches in service for Christ.

5. That the Director continue his visitation of the Churches, his special aim being to confer with Boards and Committees in regard to the apportionments, to emphasize the spiritual aims of the Movement, and to investigate and report on conditions of Sunday School and Young People's work, as well as to help by advice and counsel all workers among young people.

It was moved by Rev. F. J. Day, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. H. Warriner, D.D., that a message of felicitation be telegraphed the General Assembly on its action in voting for union with the Methodist and Congregational Churches.

The meeting adjourned.

At 12 o'clock the Union was called to order by the Chairman for the Devotional Hour, at which Rev. George Laughton delivered an address on the Ministry of the Master.

The Union adjourned.

The Union assembled at 8 o'clock, with Rev. George Adam in the chair. The Rev. Hugh Pedley, D.D., pastor Emeritus of Emmanuel Church, delivered an address of welcome, after which the Chairman delivered the Chairman's address on "Religion and Unrest."

THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 9th

Rev. George Adam took the chair at 9.45 and conducted devotions.

The minutes were read and confirmed.

Applications for membership were received from Revs. Chas. Cushing, T. W. Jones, George F. Kelly, O. B. Thompson.

The Membership Committee, Chairman Rev. Dr. Read, presented its report and moved its adoption as follows:

1. That the application of the Rev. Bertram Nelles for transfer

of membership to the Presbyterian Church be granted.

2. That the application of the Rev. John H. Sulston to have his name dropped requires no action, since he has already been received as a member and minister of the Presbyterian Church, and by his action ceases to be a member of the Union. Further, that he be advised that we are not authorized to issue certificates of character or references.

3. That the Revs. E. C. Searle and W. G. Martin, whose names were presented last year and left over in accordance with Standing

Rule 1, Paragraph E, Clause 5, be received.
4. That the Rev. Ernest R. Bellingham, of Coleville, Sask., whose credentials are perfectly regular, and Rev. Geo. Laughton, of Winnipeg Central be received into the Union.

5. That the application of the Rev. W. Cox, of Shedden, for

membership be granted.

Mr. D. Hilton moved an amendment, seconded by Mr. Johnston, that the recommendation as to Rev. R. B. Nelles be referred back to Membership Committee. The amendment carried.

On motion the report as amended was accepted.

Rev. J. L. Alexander presented the report of Business Committee: 1. We recommend that the programme for the morning session be followed.

- 2. We recommend that the change in the method of electing the Chairman of the Union as stated in notice of motion re Rule 111 be adopted. (Read from Report.)
- 3. We recommend that the names of families bereaved by the deaths of Rev. W. T. Morris, Rev. Albert Margrett, Mrs. E. D. Silcox, Mrs. George H. Knighton be passed on to the Resolutions Committee to write suitable resolutions.
- 4. We recommend the adoption of the report of the Executive as a whole.
- 5. Recommend that Rev. R. K. Mackay be given a place in the Friday morning session of the Union to convey greetings from the Union of England and Wales.
- 6. We recommend that Rev. Canon Shatford be heard on behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society Friday morning at 11 a.m. The recommendations were severally put to the Union and accepted.

The report as a whole was then adopted.

Invitations were received for the Union to meet next year in London and Brantford. On motion the invitations were referred to the Union Executive.

A telegram from the General Assembly in regard to the credentials of Rev. R. B. Nelles from Congregational Union was referred to the

Membership Committee.

Department of Sunday School and Young People's Societies—Rev. J. L. Alexander, B.D. (Superintendent), Rev. T. DeC. Rayner (Editor of Young People's Department in Congregationalist), Rev. F. Sanders (Secretary-Treasurer), Rev. E. L. Rice, B.A., Rev. W. H. Thomas, Miss E. A. Jamieson.

The Union agreed to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Dr. Read, in behalf of the Membership Committee, recommended that Revs. G. A. Dickson, R. K. MacKay, M. Ennis, Rev. Dr. J. B. Silcox, be received as corresponding members. Agreed.

Dr. Warriner presented the report on Church Union and moved its adoption, seconded by Dr. Pedley. The report was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION

The Union, having already expressed its graitfication at the action of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in voting to enter into organic union with the Methodist Church in Canada and ourselves, it may not be necessary for your Committee as such to express its feelings, yet as those who have been specially charged with the negotiations looking to this end it may be permitted us to say how greatly we rejoice.

We believe that the Spirit of Christ has led us to this hour, and we pray that the same divine guidance may be given us in the negotiations which will be necessary to consummate the union of that which will be known as the United Church of Canada.

We recommend:

1. That the Committee on Church Union be continued, with power to add to its number and to appoint sub-committees and consulting committees, east and west, as may be necessary.

2. That it be instructed to confer with the Committee of the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches and take such united action as may be necessary to bring the corporate union of the three denominations into effect.

- 3. Inasmuch as our policy requires that each local Church and incorporated Society shall take individual action in order to give effect to the vote of this Union, we recommend that the Committee be empowered to take such steps as may be necessary in association with all local Churches and Societies to bring about the desired result.
- 4. Your Committee has considered the communication received from the Primate of the Church of England in Canada remitting to

us the appeal of the Bishops assembled in the Lambeth Conference of 1920 and looking to a re-united Christendom; but as this appeal is sent to us now only for information and will not be considered by the General Synod until next October, we recommend that it be acknowledged and its kindly spirit reciprocated, and that it lie on the

table until we get the decision of the Anglican Synod.

5. In conclusion, we recommend that the Union reaffirm its readiness to co-operate with similar bodies in all practical ways for the furtherance of Christ's Kingdom, at the same time we do not regard the present situation as an occasion for us to sit lightly to our own peculiar tasks or to slacken in our loyalty to our own institutions. On the contrary, it is a challenge to every one of us to renewed consecration and devotion, to patience and prayer and work in the spirit of love and faith that as a denomination we may be worthy of whatever God in his goodness has in store for us.

Ballots were then cast, which resulted in the election of Rev. H. A. Carson, B.A., as Chairman of the Union for 1922.

The Union then adjourned.

At 12 o'clock the Chairman called the Union together for the devo-

Rev. Geo. Laughton delivered the second of the series of addresses on "The Church and the Changing Order" entitled "The Mission of the Modern Church."

The Union adjourned.

FRIDAY, JUNE 10th

At 9 o'clock the Chairman of the Union, Rev. Geo. Adam, took the chair and conducted devotions.

The minutes were read and adopted.

The Business Committee presented its report as follows:

1. We recommend that the reports of the Statistical Secretary, the Social Service Committee, and the Young People's Department be heard as soon as Reports of Committees have been adopted.

2. That the programme as printed for the morning be followed.

On motion the report was adopted.

The Social Service Committee then presented its report as follows:

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

The Congregational Union of Canada assembled in annual session wish to report the following convictions:

TEMPERANCE

1. That whereas the majority of our Provinces have expressed so definitely their belief in prohibition, we urge that Christian people do all in their power to obey and enforce the law, and to continue their efforts for the complete elimination of the traffic.

GAMBLING

2. That we assure the Social Service Council of Canada of our co-operation in the creation of public opinion against gambling, and respectfully call upon the Federal Government to re-enact the law against race track gambling, in view of the recent revelations in

connection with the wholesale exploitations of the gambling spirit by the Jockey Club of Canada, and their enormous rake-off.

2. That we urge upon the Government the revocation of the permission to Churches and charitable institutions to conduct lotteries in the belief that the prevalence of such is not in the best interests of religion and morality.

3. Further, we call upon the people to practise such self-discipline as shall tend to lessen and discourage the spirit of gambling

in all quarters.

INTERNATIONAL PEACE

That we note with gratification the formation in Ottawa, on May 31st, of the League of Nations Society to educate public opinion in favour of the League of Nations, and we promise our full support in promoting the work, and our continued efforts to bring about international peace.

EDUCATION

That we notice with gratification the attitude of co-operation in religious instruction on the part of so many Boards of Education, officials and teachers in the Public Schools, and that we impress on our ministers the necessity of using this opportunity in assisting in this work.

HOUSING SITUATION

That we deplore the crowded housing conditions in most of our cities that are a menace to the health and morals of the people.

INDUSTRIAL SITUATION


Whereas, we hold that society constitutes the family of God, of which God is the Father and all men brothers, and that the welfare of each member is the concern of all, we recommend:

- 1. That there be a wider adoption of the principle of industrial democracy, in which employees shall share in the opportunity and responsibility of management of industrial concerns:
- 2. That we recognize the right of wage earners as well as employers to organize and bargain collectively through their representatives, and also recognize the labour unions as an agency for the elevation of conditions of labour, and of collective bargaining;
- 3. That we ask employer and wage earner to practise self-discipline, remembering that each is a steward serving not one class but all, and that in the light of this there should be the fullest acceptance of obligations, openness of mind and freedom of speech, to the end that there may be a public service in fact and not in name only;

only;
4. That in the light of widespread unemployment we advocate the adoption of some form of industrial insurance, which shall be supported by our Governments, employers and employees; and

5. That we arge our ministers to study industrial and social conditions from a Christian standpoint.

A telegram was received from Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden asking support and sympathy for the League of Nations Society. The matter was referred to Resolutions Committee.



THE LATE REV. ALBERT MARGRETT

Rev. Dr. Read presented the report of the Membership Committee as follows:

That the Revs. T. W. Jones, Chas. Cushing and George F. Kelly be

received.

That the application of Rev. O. B. Thompson be received and laid on the table according to Standing Rule.

That the Committee reaffirm its recommendation that the transfer

of Rev. R. B. Nelles to Presbyterian Church be granted.

The General Secretary then presented the statistical report. On motion the report was adopted.

Rev. W. H. Thomas, in behalf of Resolutions Committee, presented

the following:

We, the members of the Congregational Union of Canada, in annual session assembled, having heard of the sudden passing of Rev. Albert Margrett, Statistical Secretary and ex-Chairman of the Union, hereby place on record our high appreciation of his character and work, our sincere sorrow at the loss sustained by the denomination through his death, and our heartfelt sympathy with his bereaved widow and family, and with the Church he shepherded. We commend the sorrowing ones to the care and keeping of the Judge of the widow, the Father of the fatherless, and the Great Shepherd of the Sheep.

By a standing vote the resolution was carried and Rev. Hugh Pedley.

D.D., offered prayer.

Rev. Principal Ritchie moved, seconded by Dr. Read, that a resolution of sympathy be sent to the family of Rev. Herbert Symonds, and the matter referred to Resolutions Committee. Agreed.

Mr. D. Hilton, in behalf of the Publication Committee, presented its

report as follows:

REPORT OF THE PUBLISHING COMMITTEE

To the Chairman and members of the Congregational Union now in session in the Emmanuel Congregational Church, Montreal, Quebec.

Gentlemen: The President, being unable to attend the Union Meetings held in Montreal at the time appointed for presenting the report of the Congregational Publishing Committee, Mr. D. Hilton, one of the mem-

bers of the Committee, will present our annual report.

The Union meeting at Guelph last year elected the following members to carry on the work of the Publishing Company: Rev. A. Margrett, Rev. W. H. Thomas, Rev. E. D. Silcox, R. Wightman, C. A. Tubby, D. Hilton and F. J. Smith. Through the courtesy of the other members I was re-elected President. I, therefore, take this opportunity to thank the members of the Committee for the earnest, business-like manner in which the matters pertaining to the Publishing Committee have been carried on during the year, and for the pleasant relationship which has existed during the term.

The Publishing Committee held eight meetings, that is to say, with a full Committee present. The Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, the Secretary, Rev. A. Margrett, and myself had several meetings when there was no

necessity for a full Committee.

Our late Secretary, Rev. A. Margrett, has kept complete minutes recording all records and transactions which have been discussed or dealt with during the year.

The Committee has endeavoured to keep up the standard of the Congregationalist, and we are pleased to say that we have paid our way

during the year after granting a bonus to our Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, of \$100.00, which \$100.00 made \$540.41 paid to our Editor as follows:

Commission on advertising, etc	360.00

We also paid to our late Secretary, Rev. A. Margrett, for services rendered \$75.00, which in the opinion of the Committee are small remunerations for the services rendered by our Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, and our esteemed Secretary, the late Rev. A. Margrett.

The Congregationalist has been issued twenty-one times during the year, and your Committee has endeavoured to make the paper in every way a credit to the denomination, notwithstanding the fact that the printing of the Congregationalist cost three hundred and thirty dollars and eighty-nine cents more than for 1919 and 1920. We are sorry to state that there is a large amount of arrears owing by subscribers, which is not the fault of the Committee. (Subscriptions in arrears to the 1st of June, 1921, amount to \$1,270.00, which amount, in the opinion of the Committee, is at least seventy-five per cent. higher than it should be.) But our Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, states that, in his opinion, eighty-five to ninety per cent. of the arrears will be good.

Three hundred and forty subscriptions have been paid in advance, amounting to \$270.30, which amount is a liability and has, therefore, to be taken account of. I, therefore, give you the earnings and the disbursements for the year, which are as follows:

In view of the resignation of our esteemed Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, who has splendidly served us by his 15 years' faithful conduct of our denominational organ, a Special Committee was appointed to review the whole situation. Mr. Walter E. Booth, Chairman of the Special Com-

mittee, sent us a letter containing its findings as follows:

The available members of the Special Committee appointed to confer with the Publishing Committee regarding the future of the "Congregationalist" and Year Book, met on the evening of May 12th, there being present Mr. W. E. Booth, in the chair, Dr. Ritchie, Dr. Gunn, Mr. Barnard and Mr. H. W. Barker.

After considering the whole matter, the recommendations of this

Special Committee are as follows:

1. We recognize with appreciation the long service of our Editor, Rev. E. D. Silcox, and after careful thought we recommend that his resignation be accepted, the same to date from September 1st, 1921.

2. That Mr. Silcox's salary of \$300.00 be continued for one year

from June 1st, as an expression of our gratitude.

3. That Mr. H. W. Barker be appointed the Editor, with an increase of \$200.00 in his present salary, this \$200.00 to be paid out of the funds of the Publishing Committee.

4. That Rev. Dr. Gunn be Associate Editor.5. That Mr. Barker be allowed to employ what clerical help he requires to relieve him in his own regular work, as well as in the work of the Publishing Committee, the Publishing Committee to be responsible for the remuneration of such helper, the amount, however, not to exceed \$400.00 per year.

6. That we recommend that there be two issues of the paper each month for ten months of the year, and a monthly issue during July and August, providing the postal cost of such monthly issue does not render this inadvisable.

If the Publishing Committee confirm the above recommendations, this Special Committee agree that they go forward to the Union Executive

as a recommendation from the Joint Committee.

We understand that a legacy of \$500.00 will shortly come to the Publishing Committee from the estate of the late Mrs. William J. Stibbs, and that such legacy may be used or anticipated to meet the increase to

the Committee involved in the above recommendations.

With these findings in general we are in full approval, and we recommend their adoption by the Union. We would, however, direct attention to that part of Finding No. 5 regarding clerical help, which reads: "The Publishing Committee to be responsible for the remuneration of such helper, the amount, however, not to exceed \$400.00 per year." Our ability to implement this finding will, of course, be determined by our financial condition. We anticipate no difficulty whatever, provided the arrears on the "Congregationalist" are paid up.

The legacy of \$500.00 left by the late Mrs. William J. Stibbs to the Publishing Committee comes at a very opportune time, and when received will help us to meet the increased expenditure involved in the new

arrangement. We are very grateful.

I close with an expression of great regret and deep sorrow in the passing of Albert Margrett. Glorious and triumphant though it was in itself, the Publishing Committee has sustained a very severe loss. As our esteemed Secretary he served the Committee with consummate skill and scrupulous faithfulness for many years. In such sudden home calls, we can only recognize the hand of God, our Father. Let us be thankful for the gift He gave and the gift He has taken away in the person and the work of our dear departed brother.

Mr. Hilton then moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. Read, that the honorarium be increased to \$1,000.00 if possible, and that a subscription list be opened in the Congregationalist. The motion was adopted.

Rev. E. L. Rice, B.A., Chairman of Nomination Committee, presented a recommendation that Rev. George Adam be the preacher for next year,

with Rev. A. J. Barnard as alternate.

The General Secretary asked that Membership Committee prepare names of delegates to other bodies. Agreed. Rev. A. F. Pollock, Chairman of Military Service Board, presented its report as follows:

REPORT OF THE CONGREGATIONAL MILITARY SERVICE BOARD

In compiling my final report as Chairman of the Military Service

Board, I submit the following for your consideration:

During the process of the demobilization of Canadian Forces, chaplains were demboilized on scale. There remained, however, a chain of hospitals across the continent for the care of those who were convalescing from sickness and wounds. These hospitals were gradually transferred from military control to that of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Reestablishment, and the Director, Colonel Beattie, was asked to arrange the chaplains' work for the S. C. R., thus co-ordinating under his control all the chaplains' work in Canada. At present but one of said hospitals remains under military control, viz., the Manitoba Military Hospital, at Winnipeg, where, for local reasons, it was found impossible to make a satisfactory transfer. One chaplain only, therefore, remains in the service of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, the remainder being under the control of, and doing work for, S. C. R. hospitals and sanatoria. These are chiefly local clergymen who are doing part time duty for the small honorarium of from \$15 to \$20 per month. On December 21st last the Department of Chaplains' Services was disbanded. time the nine remaining M. S. chaplains, including the Director, and our Major Horsey, were demobilized. The former Director (Colonel Beattie) has since been employed on the compilation of the official history of the Chaplains' Service, which duty will end June 30th, although the date of publication will depend on the preparation of similar work by other departments. While Major Horsey, on the demobilization of the C. E. F. Chaplain Service, was appointed to the Chaplaincy of the Ottawa Regiment-Cameron Highlanders-Militia, he also continues to act as Honourary Chaplain to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, stationed in Ottawa.

One Chaplain under the D. S. C. R. is still at work in Kingston, Ont. (Rev. Alex. M. Gordon), where the hospital work has been centralized.

Of the money contributed by the Churches for the Chaplains' social work in Canada, Colonel Beattie has still in hand the small balance of \$250.45, from which he continues to give in cases of need.

In addition to this amount a sum of about \$8,500.00 from the Chaplains' Overseas Fund is held in trust by Colonel Almond, of Montreal, and Colonel MacDonald, of Wolfville, N.S. This amount is to be re-

turned to the contrbuting Churches pro rata.

Finally, I wish to point out that the Government has not seen fit to appoint chaplains to the permanent force, which is regarded by many as exceedingly unfortunate, since the moral and spiritual interests of these men cannot be adequately served except thorugh the devotions of one man's whole time, who possesses a knowledge of the military environment in which these young men live.

The Federal War Service, with this in mind, prepared the following resolution for presentation to the Government, but such presentation was made by letter, and it is a matter for our consideration at this time as to the wisdom of our denomination endorsing this resolution and for-

warding it to the Government.

RESOLUTION

"The Federal War Service Commission of the Churches in Canada would most earnestly and respectfully urge upon the Government of the Dominion of Canada, the importance of appointing to the permanent Canadian Military and Naval Forces of Canada a sufficient number of chaplains to provide at least one chaplain to every garrison where the strength is 300 or more men.

"We believe this to be absolutely necessary for the religious,

moral, social and educational work among the troops of the permanent forces. The value of chaplains to the morals of our Canadian troops during the war was abundantly proved, and we believe it to be even more essential in peace to the forces, largely made up of voung and untried men away from their home surroundings. Each chaplain in charge of 300 or more men would be directly responsible for the work indicated above on behalf of the whole garrison. He would also have constant opportunity for helpful intercourse with individual soldiers; it would also be his duty, according to the policy hitherto in the Chaplains' Services, to see that all men under his care are effectively linked up with their local clergy and churches. We believe that it is only by permanent chaplains and co-operation with local clergy that the work and individual care necessary for the welfare of our young soldiers can be effectively performed.

"We, therefore, join in urging upon the Government the addition to the permanent military forces of Canada of a sufficient number of chaplains to thoroughly care for the spiritual interests

of the troops.

"We would also urge upon the Government the retention of a sufficient number of chaplains under the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Department, to adequately care for the sick and wounded soldiers in hospital."

That this resolution be presented from this Commission to the Premier, the Minister of Militia, and the Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-

Establishment Department.

On motion the report and its recommendation were accepted. Rev. George Adam leaving, Dr. Gunn acted as Chairman.

Rev. W. H. Thomas, Chairman of Resolutions Committee, presented the following resolutions of sympathy with Rev. J. T. Tucker. By a standing vote the resolution was carried.

"We have heard with deepest regret of the passing away of

Mrs. J. T. Tucker, under circumstances which make a very special appeal to the hearts of all our Congregational people. We recognize her thorough devotion to the work in Africa, in which her husband played so important a part, and words fail to express our sorrow that this fine partnership of service should now be broken by the hand of death. We extend to the bereaved husband our most sincere sympathy and hope that in some of God's mysterious ways this great sorrow may result in a fructified and enlarged ministry. Our hearts go out in tenderest pity for the motherless children,

whom we commend with their father to the loving care of God." The Union extends to Rev. E. D. Silcox, a former chairman and for many years closely identified with our publication and temperance work, our most sincere sympathy over the death of his beloved wife.

ill-health she was not able, in the latter years of her life, to take a prominent part in the work of the Churches, but her quiet and pervasive influence has been felt through her husband and her children in our Congregational life in Canada, and also in the U.S.A.

That letters of sympathy be sent by our Secretary to the Rev. G. H. Knighton on the occasion of the death of his young wife, and also to Mrs. W. T. Morris on the passing away of her husband.

We also put on record our sympathy with Mrs. C. McD. Hay in the loss of her husband and our appreciation of his valuable services to our

Churches and to the denomination at large.

The Union, having heard of the death of Mr. B. W. Robertson, of Kingston, would put on record our grateful appreciation of his Christian liberality, his personal consecration and the valuable services he rendered from time to time in our denominational life. We extend our sympathy to the bereaved family.

We appreciate the cordiality and kindliness of the greetings from the Congregational Union of England and Wales brought by Rev. Robert MacKay. There is a special fitness in his being their representative because of his very active connection with the work in Canada many years ago. We ask him to carry back to the Congregational Union of England and Wales and to the Colonial Missionary Society our sincere appreciation of their courtesy in sending so distinguished a representative, and our earnest desire for the prosperity of the work in the dear Mother Land.

We extend to the Pastor and Officers of the Emmanuel Church our appreciation of their kindliness in putting at our disposal all the advantages of their beautiful and commodious buildings; and to the ladies for the generous way in which they have ministered by their hospitality and courtesy to the happiness and comfort of the delegates. We would include in our appreciation the Organist and Choir, the gentlemen who kindly furnished autos, and would not forget the faithful work of Mr. Kent, the caretaker. Also to the Central Y.M.C.A. for their courtesy in extending to us the privileges of their building, and the Montreal Press for sending their representatives and giving us space in their columns.

That a copy of the section of the Social Service Committee's Report, already adopted, pledging us to full-hearted support of the League of Nations and of the whole movement towards the establishment of international peace, be sent to the President of the League of Nations Society, the Rt. Hon. Sir R. L. Borden, and its Secretary, Mr. W. F. Chipman.

Rev. Geo. Adam returned and took the chair.

Rev. Canon Allan F. Shatford was introduced and presented greet-

ings from the Canadian Bible Society and the Montreal Auxiliary.

Rev. Robert Mackay was introduced as the representative of the Congregational Union of England and Wales and Colonial Missionary Society, and presented greetings.

Rev. W. H. Thomas then moved the foregoing resolutions.

were seconded by Rev. E. D. Silcox, and carried.

It was resolved that the Recording Secretary be instructed to have prepared by Dr. Pedley the resolution of sympathy re the Rev. Herbert Symonds.

The Secretary reported having received a letter from Rev. Merten Smith. On motion the letter was referred to the Executive.

Mr. H. W. Barker, in behalf of the Finance Committee, presented a report recommending a cut of \$5.00 on travelling expenses. The report was received and adopted.

REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPT.

This Department early in the year suffered loss through the resignation of its President, Rev. D. A. Armstrong. Rev. J. Lambert Alexander was appointed to the office, and on accepting the position called the Executive together in Toronto to consider the work and to outline plans for the year.

The Executive reviewed the field and were of one mind, that we should stress two or three lines of work during the year. First, stimulate worship among our children and young people by helping parents and pastors to bring them to the regular services of the Church that their young lives might grow in the atmosphere of worship, and that their presence might enrich the services.

We adopted the plan now well known in our Churches as the Young Worshippers' League and stocked supplies for this work in our Church offices, 137 Confederation Life Building, Toronto, asking Miss Effie Jamieson to look after them.

The Young Worshippers' League has been well received in our Churches, and has yielded much fruit, as you will see when the report is given by our Secretary at the afternoon session of the Young People's Department.

Second—Effort was made to strengthen our Sunday Schools. We urged that schools use the best possible supplies, grade the school and use the graded lessons; further, that wide use be made of the organized class. In this connection we advocated the Canadian Standard Efficiency Test (Trail Rangers and Tuxis) for boys, and Canadian Girls in Training for girls. We also pressed for a Teachers' Training Class that teachers might be better fitted for their work.

Third—We urged pastors and teachers to gather the young into the Church, pointing out the central place Jesus gave the child when He placed it "in the midst" and said "of such is the Kingdom of Heaven"; and, further, drawing attention to the fact that of every hundred children committed to the care of the Church only twenty become active in the Church, and at the same time eighty-four per cent. of the Church membership comes from the young people.

Pastors and Churches heartily responded and many pastors conducted Pastor's Classes, preparing Young People for Church membership, with the result many have been received into Church membership during the year, a large increase over last year, as the Statistical Secretary's report, no doubt, will show.

The President sent out letters to each pastor and Sunday School superintendent outlining the plans adopted by the Department, asking for full co-operation. The response has been good.

A special Young People's Number of the Congregationalist was also issued. Many words of appreciation of this number have come to members of the Executive.

The Key Men of the Forward Movement were appointed to act in their districts for the Young People's Department. This they have done. We are deeply indebted to Principal Ritchie, who so willingly and constantly has given us of his valuable time and rich experience and

knowledge in work with Young People.

At present the MSS of a pamphlet "The Child and the Church," by Dr. Ritchie, is in the hands of the printers. We hoped to have had this pamphlet for distribution at the Union Meeting, but we have not been able to get it printed in time. When it is ready we will mail copies to pastors and superintendents and leaders of Young People's Societies and forward supplies for distribution.

We are grateful to Miss Effie Jamieson for the services rendered in

looking after the supplies for the Young Worshippers' League.

We express our thanks to the Congregationalist for courtesies ex-

tended during the year.

We would especially commend Rev. DeCourcy Rayner for the work he has done and is doing as Editor of the Young People's Column in the Congregationalist.

We would also place on record our appreciation of the large place given to Young People's Work in our Association meetings this year.

Recommendation for the New Year: Let hearty co-operation between this Department and the Churches continue; the work is great and worthy of the best that our best men and women have to give. Keep up the good work in the Young Worshippers' League; constantly improve the Bible School; build the child into the Kingdom of God.

We would recommend that each Church have:

1. A Religious Education Committee or Council; the pastor and heads of departments in Sunday School and Young People's Societies should be members of this Council. Have this Council meet early in the Church year and plan work for the year.

2. A Director of Religious Education. Frequently this will be

the pastor of the Church.

3. A Home Department, or what is now known as the Home Division. This will link parents and children up with the main school.

4. A Cradle Roll. Work this in connection with the Primary Department. Early claim the child for Christ and His Church.

5. Have a Teachers' Training Class. The class may be small. Remember, we owe it to the person who is asked to teach to furnish

privileges of training for the work.

6. Reach the teen age boys and girls, organize them for development and service in the Kingdom, make wide use of the C. S. E. T. for boys and the C.G.I.T. for girls, or some similar organizations. Get in touch with Summer Schools and Camps. Miss Effie Jamieson, 137 Confederation Life Bldg., Toronto, will furnish you information.

7. A Pastor's Class preparing Young People for church membership. Follow the communicants in search of men and women as workers in the Church at home and in distant lands. Find labourers

for the fields already white to harvest.

We regret we have not more to report on work being done in Young People's Societies. We appreciate the importance of this phase of our work and our only excuse for not doing more in this field is lack of time. The members of the Executive are busy pastors, hence their time is limited.

Indeed, the Executive are so impressed with the importance and urgency of the work with the Young People in our Churches, so conscious of the need of more thorough work that time and again during the year we have expressed our conviction that the Young People's Department of

the Union should have a man who will give his whole time to this work. If eighty-four per cent. of our Church members come from the young, it is surely evident that we should spend time, thought and money on this work. At the meeting of the Executive held in Toronto, May 13th, the

following resolution was unanimously passed:

"We affirm our conviction of the need of a paid man for this
Department and recommend to the General Executive of the Union that the appointment of such a man be part of the Forward Move-

I thank the members of the Executive for their hearty co-operation and on behalf of the Executive I thank the Churches for working together with the Department.

The Chairman led the devotional hour.

Rev. Geo. Laughton delivered the third address on the "Church and

the Changing Order" entitled "Not Wanted—a Prophet."
Rev. J. B. Silcox, D.D., moved, seconded by Rev. H. Pedley, D.D., that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded the Rev. George Laughton. This was carried unanimously.

The Union then adjourned.

During the supper hour, Rev. W. H. Thomas read the resolutions which had been previously passed relating to the hospitality extended by Emmanuel Church.

It was also resolved that a message of felicitation be forwarded Rev. Enoch Barker on attaining his ninety-second birthday.

REPORT OF GENERAL TREASURER

Before presenting the financial statement of the Union, Mr. Barker, as General Treasurer, reported that there are in the five departments under his care cash and securities amounting to \$324,282.00. He continued: "We have just been passing through an exceptionally favorable timed: We have just been passing through an exceptionally lavorable time for the purchase of first-class bonds. The period of the high cost of living has not been an unmixed evil, for economic history proves that every great rise in the price of commodities is accompanied by a corresponding decline in bond prices. We have been taking advantage of the market to purchase long-dated securities at a low price, and a number of our purchases have been reconverted at a profit, while other bonds recently bought could now be turned into cash at a gain of several points. Every transaction has been with a view to putting our securities in a stronger position. By keeping in touch with the bond market, by judicious buying and selling, and through renewing a number of our mortgages for five years at a higher rate, we have been able to turn into the various funds a profit in cash of over \$1,200.00, much of which will be an annual increase to our treasuries. It is also our policy to keep our funds fully invested, holding in the bank only sufficient cash for imme-

diate requirements.

"Our trust accounts are increasing in number all the time and becoming more complex. In order to keep a correct record of these, a book has been opened in which full information regarding each has been entered.

"Your Treasurer is also glad to be able to attend to the home business of the Missionaries, and is looking after investments not only for those in Africa, but for workers in China, India and Turkey as well. He is also executor of the estate of Mrs. Tucker, whose untimely death has

just been announced."

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I .- NAME.

This Corporation shall be called "The Canada Congregational Missionary Society," and shall conduct its operations within the limits of the Dominion of Canada.

ARTICLE II.—OBJECTS.

The objects of this Society shall be as set forth in the Act of Incorporation, namely, to plant and to foster Congregational Churches in suitable localities; to aid churches in sustaining their pastors where required.

ARTICLE III. - MEMBERSHIP.

All persons being members or adherents of Congregational Churches, paying two dollars annually into the funds of the Society, shall be members, and those who subscribe at one time fifty dollars or more shall be life members. Churches subscribing annually ten dollars or more may be represented at the annual meeting of the Society by one delegate, and churches subscribing fifty dollars or more may be represented by two delegates. Each auxiliary branch contributing annually to the funds of the Society ten dollars or more may be represented by one delegate. The above-mentioned subscribers and delegates shall constitute the membership of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV .- OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES.

The officers of the Society shall be a President, an Honorary President, a Secretary, a Field Secretary, an Honorary Secretary, a Treasurer; a Superintendent of Immigration may also be appointed. The Standing Committees shall be a General Committee and an Executive Committee. These officers and committees shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Society, and shall be members of the Corporation. The General Committee shall consist of the President, Secretary, Field Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent, Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration, Honorary President and Honorary Secretary, and not more than twenty-five members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Honorary President, the President, the Secretary, Field Secretary, the Treasurer, the Superintendent, the Honorary Secretary, the Educational Secretary, Superintendent of Immigration Department, one member from each District Association within the bounds of the operations of the Society, and one from the Winnipeg Congregational Church Extension and Building Society, and one from The Canada Ccagregational Woman's Board of Missions, together with the Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada, ex-officio during his year of office, and these members shall hold office from the date of their election by their various Associations.

ARTICLE V .-- DUTIES.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and its committees, when practicable, and shall seek to promote the general interest of the Society's work.

The Secretary shall have charge of the books and correspondence of the Society, shall call the meetings of the Society and its committees, and shall

exhibit the records of the proceedings at each meeting.

The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Society, disbursing them as directed by the General or Executive Committee, and shall present

annually a full account of all receipts and disbursements.

The Superintendent shall be under the direction of the Executive Committee, to whom he shall report quarterly, visit the churches of the Congregational Order within the bounds of the Society's operation with a view of deepening their interest in its work, and of securing liberal contributions for the Society, and shall explore new mission fields, secure missionaries for vacant churches, and have a general oversight of the interests and work of the Society.

The Auditors shall examine the accounts of the Society when required, and make an annual audit of the Treasurer's books previous to the annual meeting

of the Society.

The General Committee shall exercise all the corporate powers of the Society, have charge of annual mission grants made to the churches, examine, employ and direct all the missionaries of the Society, and have a general supervision of its affairs. They shall present a report of the work of the Society

at each of its annual meetings.

The Executive Committee shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society during the interval between the annual meetings of the General Committee; shall receive all applications from churches for aid from the Society, and report thereon to the General Committee, to whom they shall make an annual report of their proceedings.

ARTICLE VI.-MEETING.

The Corporation shall meet annually on the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles. A public annual missionary meeting shall be held on the evening of the next day. Special meetings for the despatch of special business may be called by the Executive Committee at such time and place as may be deemed desirable, provided that a month's notice be given thereof. The General Committee shall hold their meeting at the same time and place as the Corporation, at the call of the Secretary; and the Executive Committee shall hold their quarterly meeting at the time and place it may be agreed upon.

ARTICLE VII .- CHURCH EXTENSION AND BUILDING FUND.

All sums of money specially collected, given or bequeathed for the purpose, together with the proceeds received from the sale of disused church property, shall form a Church Extension and Building Fund, which shall be invested by the Corporation, who may apply the income thereof, by the General or Executive Committee, by the way of loans, or otherwise, for the organization of churches in new fields, and for the erection or enlargement of places of worship where they may be required.

ARTICLE VIII .- AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Auxiliary branches of this Society may be formed in churches and localities, to co-operate in the work of the Society. Each branch shall, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, make an annual report to the Secretary and send to the Treasurer all funds collected on its behalf.

ARTICLE IX. - MISSIONARIES.

Each missionary in the employment of the Society must be a regularly accredited member of a Congregational Church, and shall endeavour faithfully to promote all the interests of the Congregational denomination in Canada. He shall send to the Secretary a half-yearly statement of his work, and furnish such statistical returns as may be called for.

ARTICLE X .--- MISSIONS.

Each church requiring a missionary grant by the General Committee must make application therefor through the Secretary, at least one month previous to the annual meeting of the Society, according to the printed forms provided, in which a certificate to the effect that all previous pledges of support to its pastor have been fulfilled shall be inserted. Churches aided by this Society are required to make an annual collection for the funds and to keep their property sufficiently insured and such churches acquiring property shall have inserted in the Trust Deed a clause providing that in case the church shall at any time be disbanded or cease to exist the property shall revert to the Society.

ARTICLE XI .- RECEIVING AND DISMISSING PASTORS.

Churches aided by the Society are required, as far as practicable, in the settlement and dismissal of pastors, to carry out the recommendations passed by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, in 1876, in relation to Councils. In cases where this is impracticable, the sanction of the Executive Committee must be obtained before a settlement or dismissal of a pastor is consummated.

ARTICLE XII .- CONVEYING PROPERTY.

The President, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them, shall be the duly authorized persons on behalf of the Corporation to convey real estate, and to discharge mortgages, and the Treasurer shall be the duly authorized person, on behalf of the Corporation, to accept conveyances of real estate and to receive mortgages. The Treasurer shall affix the Corporation seal to all documents which may require it.

ARTICLE XIII .- AMENDING THE CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, one day's notice having previously been given of the proposed amendment, in writing.

NOTICE.

It is becoming more than ever a practice among Christian people to recognize the Lord's portion in their Last Wills and Testaments, whereby, though they be dead, they speak and act in the furtherance of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent objects. The sixty-eighth annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society was held in Emmanuel Church, Montreal, on Wednesday, June 8th, 1921, at 11.00 a.m., the Honorary President, Rev. Dr. Hugh Pedley, presiding.

The annual report was presented by Rev. W. T. Gunn, D.D., and on motion

The treasurer's statement was read by Mr. H. W. Barker, and on motion adopted.

Rev. E. LeRoy Rice, B.A., presented the Educational Secretary's re-

port, which was adopted. The Immigration Department report was presented by Rev. W. T. Gunn,

D.D., and adopted.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again on Thursday morning.

At the Thursday morning session an address was given by Rev. John D. Gross, Superintendent of our Russo-German Congregational work in the West. Greetings from the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions were brought by Mrs. C. R. Crowe. Rev. R. K. McKay presented greetings from the Colonial Missionary Society and other organizations.

Rev. E. J. Thompson, our Superintendent for the Maritime Provinces, reviewed briefly some of the encouraging parts of our work in Nova Scotia.

The officers and members of committees for the ensuing year were then

elected.

It was voted to amend Article 4 in the second to last line after the word "Society," by adding the words, "and one from the Canada Congregational Woman's Missionary Society, together with the Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada ex-officio, during his year of office."

The minutes were taken as read and ordered to be printed in the Year

Book.

CONSTITUTION

I.—NAME

This Corporation shall be called The Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society.

II.—OBJECT

The object of this Society shall be to spread the knowledge of the Gospel among the heathen and other unenlightened people.

III.-MEMBERSHIP

The members of this Society shall be persons subscribing \$2 annually, ministers of all contributing churches, one other representative from each church contributing \$10 annually, and two representatives from each church contributing \$50, or over, annually, and each year the delegates appointed from any church to the Congregational Union of Canada shall be delegates to this Society, provided that church be entitled to be so represented. Every benefactor making a donation of \$40 at one time shall be a life member.

IV.-OFFICERS

The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Board of Directors, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Society.

V.-MEETINGS

An annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the Thursday following the first Sunday in June, at the place where the Congregational Union of Canada assembles.

VI.--AMENDMENTS

This Constitution can be amended by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any annual meeting of the Society, notice of the proposed alteration having been given in two successive numbers of the Canadian Independent (now Canadian Congregationalist).

BY-LAWS

I.-FUNDS

All funds arising from donations, legacies, subscriptions, or otherwise, shall be lodged by the Treasurer, as soon as collected, with some chartered bank, to be named by the Executive Committee. Money can be drawn from such accounts only by cheques, signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, but the President or Vice-President may sign for either in their absence.

II.--MANAGEMENT

The Board of Directors shall consist of not more than twenty-five members of the Society, including the officers, and the Chairmau of the Congregational Union of Canada, ex-officio, and shall be elected at the annual meeting. They shall have full charge and power for the administration of the affairs of the Society. Immediately after their election they shall appoint an Executive Committee, and such other committees as they shall deem expedient for the interests of the Society. The Executive Committee shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of that Board, and shall consist of the President, two Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendents of Departments, the Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada, ex-officio, and not more than twelve other members, together with two members of the Woman's Board, the same to be appointed by that Board, and who are members of this Society.

III.--MEETINGS

The Board of Directors shall meet at least once during the year, immediately before the annual meeting of the Society, at the call of the Secretary, to prepare reports, and a list of officers and committees to be nominated at the annual meeting, as well as to transact any other business connected with the interests of the Society.

IV .-- PRESENTATION TO CHURCHES

The work of this Society shall be presented and a Foreign Missionary sermon preached in each of the churches of the constituency at least once in each year. The Executive Committee shall see that news of the Society's work is distributed to the churches.

V .-- DONATIONS FOR SPECIAL WORK

When money is donated for missionary work outside the Society's missions, it may be forwarded to societies working in that field.

VI.—AMENDMENT

These by-laws may be altered in the same manner as the Constitution.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Fortieth Annual Meeting of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society was called to order at 2 p.m. on Thursday, June 9th, 1921, in Emmanuel Church, Montreal.

Mr. Geo. E. Williams, President, occupied the chair. The meetings was opened by the singing of a hymn and the reading of Scripture, after which

Doctor Warriner and Doctor Ritchie led in prayer.

Moved by Geo. A. Moore and seconded by Rev. H. D. Whitmore, "That article II, "Management" of the By-laws be altered as follows: Insert the words "and the Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada, exofficio," after the word "officers" in the first sentence. Also to insert the words, "and the Chairman of the Congregational Union of Canada, exofficio," after the words "Superintendents of Departments" in the last sentence. Carried.

Moved by Rev. E. Munson Hill, D.D., and seconded by H. W. Barker. the following resolution which was unanimously approved, "At this Annual Meeting of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, we place on record our deep sorrow at the loss from our devoted Missionaries of Mrs. Mabel Lake Tucker; and also our warmest sympathy with her husband and children in their irreparable loss. From our personal knowledge, and from reports of fellow workers in Africa, we prized her beautiful influence and her marked talents. As wife and mother and teacher, she was called upon for a task we cannot realize, and we recognize the heroic spirit in which she met the strain, and filled each role with wonderful spirit and fine ability. sad illness drew out to her an affection from our Canadian people, the warmth of which was only feebly expressed by the hands stretched across the sea. We should be utterly cast down, for ourselves and her husband and children, did we not believe that in the mind and heart of our Father, the God of Providence, there lies the power to make this sacrifice a source of blessing, as when His Son died for the world. After the reading of this resolution the Rev. Merlin W. Ennis offered special prayer for Mr. Tucker and his family.

Moved by Rev. H. A. Carson, and seconded by Rev. H. D. Whitmore, the following resolution which was unanimously approved, "We, the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society in annual meeting assembled, do hereby acknowledge with gratitude the continual Presence and Power of God in the entire West Central Africa Mission. We do further record our grateful appreciation of the consecrated service of the Missionary staff and their assistants. Their continued success in every branch of the work is a matter of profound

gratitude and thankfulness, especially in these trying times."

The Nominating Committee read their report as above.

On motion of Rev. H. A. Carson, seconded by Rev. W. H. Thomas, this

report was adopted.

The representative of the Colonial Missionary Society, the Rev. R. K. MacKay, was introduced to the meeting and on motion by Dr. Hill, seconded by H. W. Barker, he was made a Corresponding member. Mr. MacKay briefly gave a greeting to our Society wishing us every success in our work.

The Secretary read the report of the Board of Directors covering the year's work. This was adopted on motion by Judge Leet, seconded by Rev.

T. W. Jones.

The Treasurer read his Annual Report explaining carefully all details. On motion of Judge Leet, seconded by the Rev. E. J. Thompson, this was adopted.

Rev. W. H. Thomas read the report of the Educational Secretary. This was received on motion by Rev. F. Sanders, seconded by Rev. E. J. Thompson. The report of the Superintendent of the Prayer Union was read by Dr.

Warriner in the absence of Mrs. J. T. Daley. This was received on motion of

Dr. Warriner, seconded by Judge Leet.

Miss E. A. Jamieson, Secretary of the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions read a full and interesting report of their work of the past year. This was enthusiastically received by those present.

Mrs. W. H. Black brought the greetings of the Canada Congregational

Women's Board of Missions which were gratefully received.

The meeting was then addressed by the Rev. Merlin W. Ennis, Missionary on furlough from the American Board Station at Sachikela, West Central Africa.

The meeting then adjourned.

THE FORTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY 31ST, 1921.

It gives me great pleasure to present this 40th Annual Report of the Directors:

The outstanding feature of this year's work was the arrival at Chisamba of an evangelist and a doctor after many years of absence. After Mr. Tucker left to take up the organization and development of the Currie Institute in 1914, no other fully equipped minister had charge of this work. Much credit must be given to the native evangelists and Mr. Cattell and the ladies of the Woman's Board for so bravely carrying on, and although no minister was there the Gospel was preached and many added to the Church. The Medical Department had no doctor in charge since Doctor Moffatt left, but who can measure the heroic service done by Miss Melville, and who can count the many ministrations of her busy hands during the interim. The Gospel has indeed been preached, and the sick and sad made well again.

The Rev. J. A. Steed with Mrs. Steed and their two children arrived at Chisamba on July 4th, amid a tumultuous welcome, and have been busy settling and studying the native language. Mr. Steed has also had a strenuous time in adjusting many difficulties between the Portuguese officials and native boys. He has also done much Industrial work, amongst which was the recent superintendence of repairs to the roads demanded by the authorities, and which had to be done without delay. These latter diversions had to be attended to because of there being no Industrial man at Chisamba at the present time.

Mr. Cattell, our former Industrial missionary, arrived home in Canada early last July to enjoy his furlough. He also resigned, and we have been endeavouring all year to find a man willing and fitted to do this important work. We have had several names submitted to us, but have not yet found

the right man. We appeal to all pastors and delegates to try and find us a consecrated man who can teach the natives to do carpentry and other mechanical work. We must find a man soon, as Mr. Steed must learn the language and organize the evangelistic work of Chisamba. Mr. and Mrs. Steed welcomed a new member to their family on October 19th, when baby Marjorie Kasova Steed was born. May she grow up to love the land of her birth and become a leader to further extend the Gospel of Christ to her heathen neighbors.

Doctor and Mrs. Hall arrived at Chisamba on October 2nd, also amid great rejoicings, and he got to work at once. The Medical Department has been reorganized, and a complete, fresh supply of drugs has been sent forward to him. He has a daily attendance at his dispensary of about 75 natives. We hope that his ministrations will soften the hearts of the heathen and lead them to the further inquiry and a final acceptance of Christ as their Saviour.

At the Currie Institute the work has had to be somewhat curtailed owing to the absence of Mr. Tucker. He expected to arrive back in time to open the Institute's work in September, but was unfortunately delayed by a strike in Portugal upon his return from his furlough, which kept the steamers from sailing. This delay was more unfortunate in that Mrs. Tucker contracted a serious illness which necessitated their immediate return to England upon the demand of Doctors Cammack and Hall. We are extremely sorry to report that Mrs. Tucker, though bravely fighting the disease and being given the best medical care possible, gradually failed, and she passed away on May 31st. Words cannot express the loss we have sustained, nor the sorrow we feel at this tragedy that has come to our fellow worker, Mr. Tucker. We all pray that he may be given the comfort and guidance he needs at this time. We are glad to report that our appeals for special gifts to make Mrs. Tucker's treatment the best possible was responded to with willingness and generosity, and we know that these gifts were a real help in rendering comfort to mind and body. Her only wish was that she might be spared to go back to Africa, and during her illness she insisted on Mr. Tucker going back for a time. He was able to visit Dondi, and also go as far as Capetown with the Phelps Stokes Commission, which was studying mission work in Africa. He was called back to England, arriving there last March, and he has since attended Mrs. Tucker and spent time in Bible translation.

We are also able to report that Major and Mrs. Swaddling arrived at Dondi last October. Major Swaddling is to assist in the building operations, and has already rendered service, particularly in connection with the power

ditch and dam to be used in the development of electric power.

Rev. James Lloyd, who is to go to Kamundongo as an Evangelist, is now in Portugal completing studies in the Portuguese language. He expects to sail for Africa in July.

Mr. Kenneth Prior, who has volunteered as an agricultural missionary for Dondi, has completed his first, year in the Agricultural College at Guelph, Ont.

We will begin to reap value from sending our new missionaries to Portugal for language study before taking up their work in the field. Our mission is located in the Portuguese Province of Angola, and the European owner of this part of Africa is beginning to demand that Portuguese be taught in our schools. We have now several missionaries fitted to carry on this work, and with the assistance of the Woman's Board missionaries will be able to carry out the demands of the authorities to a large extent. It is evident to us that all new missionaries must go to Portugal for this purpose, and also that new doctors go there also to obtain a Portuguese medical certificate permitting them to practice amongst the whites as well.

Another feature of our work is beginning to loom large, and that is the providing of literature for reading purposes for the natives who are learning

to read and write. Although the Bible has largely been translated, and also the Pilgrims' Progress, it will be necessary to greatly enlarge the reading matter if we expect our work to progress and the natives to be properly cared for mentally. The printing press is now located at Kamundongo, but is to be moved to Dondi. There is no printer on the mission at present, and our search for one has not been as yet successful.

The work opens up greatly, and to do only development work requires more workers and funds. We need to greatly increase our income to provide for a doctor, printer and educationalist for Dondi. Then besides these many others are needed if we are to even inadequately supply the demand. The

field is indeed white unto the harvest.

CHISAMBA

The work at Chisamba during 1920 and 1921 has gone on as in the past. In the evangelistic work the elders have been strong helps. In the outstations there are held on Sunday afternoons 15 catechumen classes.

There were 33 new members added to the Church. Some 50-60 regular

preaching places are visited every Sunday.

In the School work the Woman's Board missionaries have done wonderful work. In the Allen and David Gunn Memorial Dormitory some 103 boys were eared for.

There are about 47 out-station schools looked after by native teachers

under the direction and supervision of Miss Bell.

In the Industrial work doors and windows were made and many repairs attended to. Roof and floor tiles were made.

The medical work was largely attended to by Miss H. Melville, but Doctor

Hall has this now in charge.

Looking over the work of the Mission we find that the Gospel has been preached with good results. Many are added to the church and the fruits of the many years of hard and faithful work are now being gathered. With Mr. Steed having the language great advances may be expected. The natives are also taught and the darkness of ignorance is also being cleared away.

Also the sick are being healed, and in all we feel the example of our Saviour is being followed and that a bright light burns in Africa in proof of

faithful work.

DONDI

The Currie Institute which was opened in 1914 is beginning to show marks

of a well established university centre.

The aims originally put before us are being carried out. Native pastors are being trained and grounded, native teachers equipped for school work, industrial leaders developed in carpentry, blacksmithing, masonry work, farming, tailoring. Dondi is becoming a centre of leadership and influence.

Sixty-four pupils attended in 1920 and 79 in 1921. Twenty-six pupils

obtained certificates of three years' study.

In the day school for boys 92 pupils were taught by native teachers.

The Institute has been free from sickness for which great thankfulness is felt.

In the Agricultural work, corn, beans, potatoes and greens were grown. Out-station evangelistic work is undertaken by the pupils. Fifty native helpers visited 20 village Sunday services with an attendance of about 550.

In the building operations a power ditch has been dug and is ready to receive a turbine for developing power. This turbine is now on the way. When the electrical equipment is all in there will be power to run the mills and machine shop, and also to provide electrical light for the whole place.

A church was organized at Dondi on February 1st, 1920, at which 20 charter members were received and 130 others expressed a desire to begin a new life. We hope that this church will be a great power and provide a suitable place for worship and for the building up of a strong Christian centre to hold fast and solidify that which is being done in the Intsitute.

KAMUNDONGO

As was reported before, we are planning to take over this station progressively.

This district has at present an estimated population of 15,000 natives.

There are 25 out-stations having 1,434 pupils and are taught by 41 native teachers.

The church membership numbers 518 and there are 299 catechumens. There are 25 native preachers attached to this station.

Doctor Hollenbeck has had charge of the Medical work and reports 7,920

treatments for the year.

Doctor and Mrs. Sanders are pioneer missionaries and are again at their tasks.

Mrs. Currie of the Woman's Board is now located there in charge of the School work.

Rev. Mr. Lloyd will arrive there this fall and will have to give the greater part of the year to language study.

We are sorry to report the passing away of two of our Directors.

Mr. C.McD. Hay has been on our Board for many years and we bear

testimony to his interest in our work and regret his death.

Rev. A. Margrett, a man well known to our denomination and a former Chairman of our Congregational Union, passed away just a few days ago. Mr. Margarett was actively interested in Mission work and in our African Mission particularly, and the interest amongst his people bears testimony of an active pastor's inspiration.

We sincerely regret the loss of these two gentlemen and express to their

loved ones our deepest sympathy.

We call attention of our members to the large advance made by the Canada Congregational Woman's Board Missions, and are glad to ask your attention to their report which will be read at this meeting. We are glad to acknowledge the help and inspiration which comes to us from their enthusiastic pursuit of Christian Mission work, and our sincere hope is that each year will find a greater advance made and a closer working with us in the Evangelization of Angola for Christ.

The field is large, the needs are great, but we go on in confidence that the interest and faith of our people will meet the demands and that we will justify

our name as a Christian people.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The first report of your new Educational Secretary must necessarily be brief. His individual work, since he undertook the position last October, can be told in a sentence. He has written two or three articles for the Congregationalist and attended to a little correspondence.

Foreign Missionary Education has, nevertheless, been carried on persistently and extensively. Fifteen out of the last seventeen issues of the Congregationalist have had Foreign Missionary matter in them, written mainly

by one or other of our workers in West Central Africa; while the issue of November 28th was a special Foreign Missionary Number. Doctor Ritchie's article on "The Economics of Faith—A Missionary Record and Witness," sent to all our ministers, deserves very honorable mention, and if we are to appreciate the full challenge of Foreign Missions it should be given very careful study. A stock pamphelt, "Building for the Kingdom of God in Angola," and a leaflet on the Prayer Union, written by Mrs. Hill, have been printed and circulated. Mr. Barker in his deputational work among the churches has disseminated information and quickened enthusiasm.

Miss M. Buck, our office stenographer, has kindly attended to orders for books, numbering about 100 on the aggregate. These consist of "The Story of Chisamba Retold," which is being offered at 25c. (a third of the published price); "Canada's Share in World Tasks" (75c. and 50c.), "Canadian Heroes of Mission Fields" (25c.) and "Talks on the Maple Leaf in many lands"

(50c.).

Rev. Bertram Nelles and Miss Jamieson have procured and issued sets of lantern slides to applying churches.

REPORT OF THE PRAYER UNION DEPARTMENT

"Prayer is the chief method of solving the missionary problem. Among all the methods that have been devised none is more fruitful than this. If we could get a definite group of people at home into the habit of supporting by prayer each missionary in the thick of the fight by this simple method alone the efficiency of the present missionary force could probably be doubled without adding a single new missionary."

The Prayer Union quotes this appreciation of prayer by Campbell White with approval. It was belief in prayer as an important factor in missionary work that brought this department into existence. The growth of the Union is due to the growing recognition of the value and power of prayer.

The thing of importance in the work of the Prayer Union has always been the prayers of the people. No adequate report can be given of those prayers. This report is, therefore, confined to items of interest in connec-

tion with the simple organization of the department.

The report must begin with a recognition of the faithful services of Miss Florence Rawlings, who so ably filled the position of superintendent from the organization of the Department in 1897 to the time of her departure for Africa in 1920. The position thus left vacant was filled by the appointment of Mrs. Jas. T. Daley, who took charge of the work in February, 1921.

The Superintendent's desire and aim has been to secure increased interest, closer co-operation and additions to membership. To secure these many letters have been written and articles have been published in "The Leaflet." A folder entitled "A Call to Prayer" has been printed, and

will be freely distributed among the churches.

The Canada Congregational Woman's Board Missions has always taken a great interest in the Prayer Union of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society. The various branches of the Board have been asked to co-operate by appointing persons to help the Superintendent in bringing the interests of the department before the different churches. We gladly acknowledge the help thus given. The Board has given additional evidence of its interest in the Prayer Union by making the Superintendent a member of its Executive. This closer co-operation of the two Mission Boards should

deepen the interest and increase the membership of this "prayer partner-ship" to the great advantage of the West Central Africa Mission and our beloved workers there.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE ELEVEN MONTHS, JUNE 1, 1920, TO APRIL 30, 1921

It was found necessary, with the appointment by the Union of a General Treasurer, to close the books this year on April 30th instead of May 31st, otherwise there would not be sufficient time to have the various financial statements prepared, audited and printed. As this report, therefore, is for eleven months only, it is impossible to make exact comparisons with previous years. While our budget and the apportionment submitted to the churches (which were based on the requirements of the General Fund) called for \$12,000.00, this total has not been attained; but we are exceedingly gratified to know that in the eleven months the total contributions received for the General Fund, as will be seen by the printed statement, were \$10,162.97, of which the churches gave \$8,422.22, in addition to which interest, exchange, etc., increased the amount by \$320.40.

In my last annual report I called attention to the fact that we had a record year and made a gain of 8% over the previous year; and now we have made a further gain of 22% for the General Fund. It is of interest to note that the increase has been general, all the districts except Eastern Ontario showing a substantial advance, the gain from Western Canada being

74%.

The bank interest is for six months only, as cutting off the month of

May deprives us of one half-yearly instalment.

The item of \$1,500.00 is from the anticipated surplus of the Forward Movement, and has been voted by the Society to the College and Provident Fund. Then appears \$147.25, received from the Hine and Wm. Freeland Trusts and from the Institute Account as their share of our general expenses, the Institute contributing \$100.00 and the other accounts 5% of their income.

We have remitted to the American Board for salaries, travelling, etc., \$5,358.76, and direct to the missionaries \$2,674.70. The travelling of the missionaries to and from the field this year has amounted to \$5,448.11. The other items of expenditure are as given in the printed statement, running, as will be seen, about as usual until we come down to the \$879.00 for New York exchange. All the year American money has ruled high, going up to 18% at one time. Where it has been practicable, we have made remittances direct to missionaries on furlough and while travelling, otherwise our exchange would have been much more. The Treasurer of the American Board and your Treasurer here have been "turning handsprings" in an endeavour to discover some way of avoiding this heavy rate of exchange. Half a dozen or more methods have been suggested, but only one which seems practicable, and that is for us here to buy steamship tickets for their missionaries going to those parts of the world where the rate is about the same in Canadian money as it is in American.

Going on down through the expenditures it will be noticed that instead of transferring the usual \$1,000.00 to Furlough Account it is this year \$1,500.00. It is estimated that at least this amount will be required every year now with our present increased staff, although no furlough is due for a few years. If this is not done, a heavy charge will fall upon us

within a short period when the furlough time comes. \$1,453.00 of what we now owe to the American Board is chargeable against Furlough, as the demands on this account have been unusually heavy during the past two or three years.

While we close the eleven months period with a balance of \$764.00 on hand in the General Fund, this fund owes the American Board \$846.00. This must be considered satisfactory as the half-yearly field account to December 31st is paid, and Mr. Lloyd and the Tucker family are practically up to date. During the month of May \$475.00 came in for the General Fund, but besides our indebtedness to the Board we also owe about \$600.00 for drugs.

And now, we come to the account for designated objects. The contributions amounted to \$3,424.00, and the revenue from investments \$986.00. There are two or three items in the total to which special attention should be drawn, such as the following: \$901.00 came in for Chinese and Armenian relief, besides probably a very much larger amount sent direct to the Treasurer of these funds; \$1,288.00 was given by our churches as a love gift to Mr. and Mrs. Tucker; and \$140.00 was contributed by the Bateman, Sask., Union C.E. Society for a bell for the Currie Institute.

The expenditures are as set out below. The last item (\$1,600) is what we received from the Forward Movement towards our share of the expenses of the denominational office, \$100 only (the same as in past years) coming out of our general funds. As, however, the Forward Movement cannot stand further drafts of this size, it is for the Society to arrange to meet

this obligation in future in some other way.

The last account is that of the Currie Institute Building Fund. \$399.00 has been collected on account of the subscriptions to the old campaign, in addition to a gift from Col. W. E. Lyman, of Montreal, through Emmanuel Church. The investments have yielded \$690.00, while \$135.00 more has been added by profit on cashing City of Toronto bond coupons in New York and by selling some bonds. \$10,000.00 has also come from the Forward Movement.

The expenditure includes \$2,064.00 for the sending out of Mr. and Mrs. Swaddling and the paying of their salary to December 31st last, and \$496.00, the cost of the turbine over and above the amount given by Captain Dollar. To date we have remitted and spent on behalf of the Institute Building Fund \$36,882.00, and we have in hand \$5,860.00 in cash, \$13,246.00 in investments, \$2,600.00 is still owing from the old campaign (all good), while \$20,000.00 more is promised from the Forward Movement—a total of

\$78,588.00.

A bird's-eye view of the whole statement reveals some interesting features. Our total income has been \$16,971, and that of the Woman's Board \$14,943. It is appropriate that the largest contributing church this year should be Emmanuel, Montreal, where the Union is meeting, the amount being \$2,703,00. It is likewise appropriate that the second place should be given to Broadview Church, Toronto, the home of the General Secretary and the General Treasurer, the pastor also being a director of this Society. Broadview's gifts total \$1,186.00. Hamilton, First Church, is next in line with \$792.00; then follow Toronto, Northern, \$500.00; Brantford, \$401.00; Granby, \$300.00; Sherbrooke, \$276.00; Toronto, Olivet, \$255.00; Ottawa, First, \$253.00; Embro, \$242.00; Maxville, \$226.00; Winnipeg, Crescent, \$205.00. But the most pleasing gifts of all came from our churches in the west, many of which have never appeared on the list before—Russo-German Association, Peace Church, Hanna, \$170.00; Newburg Church, Hanna, \$50.00; Beiseker, \$70.00; Calgary, Ebenezer, \$75.00; Three Hills, \$40.00; Mayton (Salem Church), \$40.00; also from Sagathun, Malmo, Surprise, Castor, Westerham, and from Alsask, the Union Church at Lemberg,

and other places with unfamiliar names. The best part of these western gifts is that they are almost without exception for the General Fund. And in this connection I would like to say a word to our other churches. An examination of the list reveals the fact that six churches gave for designated purposes, and did not give one cent to the General Fund. "This ought ye to have done and not to leave the other undone." Brethren, if all our churches gave only for special funds, we would have to discontinue our work, for we cannot use designated gifts to feed and clothe our missionaries. The China famine and the Armenian relief funds have appealed strongly to us this year, and it is a great joy to know that our churches have given so liberally for these starving and suffering people; but please don't neglect our own work. This is the task to which we as Canadian Congregationalists are committed.

Your Treasurer, who is also Deputation Secretary of the Society, has had the pleasure of visiting twenty-six churches in Ontario since the last annual meeting (some of them twice), this being done at a cost to the denomination of \$41.60. An address was also given to the students at the Toronto Bible College. It is interesting to find that of the twenty-two churches in Ontario that reached or exceeded their apportionment, ten were among those visited in this way, which shows that deputation work pays. It has also been found that the churches from which missionaries have

gone invariably take the liveliest interest in the work.

Our gifts this year have come not only from Canada, but from Portugal, England, and from New Jersey, Vermont and Massachusetts in the United States.

In the near future two legacies will come to the Society—one of \$1,000 from the estate of the late George Hague, of Montreal, and the other of \$5,000.00 from the estate of the late A. S. Hurd, of Sherbrooke. Your Treasurer would like to suggest that the ministers should at every opportunity point out to their people what a fine thing it is to remember our missionary enterprise in their wills, as some have already done. In all such cases, care should be taken to state clearly that the bequest is to The Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, for on more than one occasion legacies intended for our Society have been disallowed because of indefiniteness.

Our budget for the coming year calls for an expenditure of nearly \$15,000.00 besides a couple of thousand dollars more to which we are committed, but which may not be charged against us this year. What a privilege it is to have a part in this great work! How thankful we should be that God has given us something worth while to do! Does the amount seem large? Not if we realize that the work is the Lord's, and if we cultivate in ourselves, and seek to develop in others, a true idea of stewardship. An average of a little more than two cents per week from each of our church members will make up the amount asked for. When we set this over against the love of God to us, how infinitesimal it is!

BY-LAWS.

CHAPTER I.

- 1. The Corporation shall be called "THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF CANADA.,,
- 2. Its objects shall be the education of ministers of the Gospel and the encouragement and inauguration of all desirable educational methods and movements, whereby the efficiency of the church may be advanced.
- Contributors of two dollars annually to the Funds of the College shall be members of the Corporation. A contributor in arrears one year shall not be qualified to vote at the meeting of the Corporation, or to exercise his other rights of membership. The Treasurer's subscription list shall be taken as evidence of contribution.
- 4. Churches contributing for the previous year to the current expenses of the College the sum of ten dollars and upwards may be represented at the meeting of the Corporation by one delegate for each church; those contributing twenty-five dollars or upwards for the previous year, by two delegates; and those contributing fifty dollars or upwards for the previous year, by three delegates.
- Persons by whom or on whose behalf one hundred dollars or more shall have been contributed at any one time to the funds of the College, may be chosen life members of the Corporation.
- 6. A regular meeting of the Corporation shall be held annually, for the reception of the report of the Governors, the election of a new Board according to provisions hereinafter named, and the transaction of other necessary business.
- The annual meeting shall be held at the same time and place as the Congregational Union of Canada.
- 8. Special meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business at the call of the Board of Governors, or on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Governors, signed by at least twenty members of the Corporation; provided always that no such special meetings be held without one month's notice thereof in an accredited newspaper in Toronto and Montreal, and also in the Canadian Congregationalist.

CHAPTER II.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

1. A Board of fifteen Governors, having power to choose their own officers, shall be elected from members of the Corporation. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Honorary Advisory Governors may be appointed at any annual meeting. Such appointees shall require to have served the corporation at some time as active governors. Such appointments shall be for life.

2. Three members of the Board shall retire annually, in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election.

3. The powers and duties of the Board shall be:

- (a) The administration of the property of the College and the management of its finances.
 - (b) The appointment and renewal of all officers of the College.
- (c) The general oversight and management of the affairs of the College, and
- (d) The presentation of an annual report of the general condition of the College to the Corporation at the next regular meeting.
- 4. Any member of the Board absent from its meetings for a year shall be held *ipso facto* to have vacated his seat, but may be re-appointed or re-elected thereto.
- 5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation or otherwise, may be filled by the Board whenever it may see fit.
- 6. It shall be competent for the Board of Governors to appoint annually an Executive Committee from its membership, which Committee shall exercise, between the meetings of the Board, such powers as may be delegated to it by the Board of Governors.
- 7. The Board of Governors shall be called together at the close of the annual meeting of the Corporation, for organization and other needful business. They shall hold an annual meeting at a convenient time before the annual meeting of the Corporation; a special meeting may be called at any time by the Chairman and Secretary, or by the Secretary, at the request of five members.

CHAPTER III.

THE SENATE.

- 1. There shall be a Senate composed of—(1) The members of the Board of Governors; (2) the Faculty; (3) four representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec; (4) two representatives chosen annually by the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Seven members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum.
- 2. The Senate shall frame regulations for and supervise all matters of education, honors and discipline.
- 3. The Principal shall be a member of the Faculty and ex-officio President of the Senate.
- 4. The Registrar shall be a member of the Faculty and ex-officio Secretary of the Senate.
- 5. The Senate shall meet annually within one month preceding the close of the Session, at the College, in the city of Montreal, and at such other times and places as the interests of the College may require, and shall make an annual report to the Corporation through the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER IV.

- 1. The Principal and Professors, with such members of the Senate as from time to time may be appointed by the Board of Governors, constitute the Faculty, and as such are entrusted with the educational work of the College and the enforcement of its regulations under the direction of the Senate. The Principal shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Faculty.

 2. Members of the Faculty must be members of a Congregational Church.

 3. Members of the Faculty shall not be members of the Board of Congregation.
- 3. Members of the Faculty must be members of a Congregational Church.
 3. Members of the Faculty shall not be members of the Board of Governors, but the Principal shall be a consulting member of the Board of Governors, and of standing committees appointed by the Board or the Senate.

CHAPTER V.

THE OFFICERS.

1. The Chairman of the Board of Governors shall be Presiding Officer of the Corporation.

2. The President of the Senate shall preside at all public functions of the

College.

3. The Secretary of the Senate shall be Registrar of the College.

CHAPTER VI.

AMENDMENTS.

Amendments to these By-laws may be made at any regular meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such amendment has been given at the meeting next preceding.

To the Corporation:

Ladies and Gentlemen:—The Board of Governors has pleasure in presenting its annual report for the year 1920-21. This report includes those of the Senate; the Librarian; the House Committee; the Ladies' Auxiliary and the Treasurer, each of which deals comprehensively with its individual department of work.

The year has been a very satisfactory one scholastically; a rather anxious one financially but in its general features has been altogether definitely

encouraging.

Rev. Principal Ritchie has in every way continued to win the esteem and the appreciation of the members of the Board and all others who have co-

operated with him in the development of the College work.

The members of the Board congratulate him upon his 'appointment as Dean of the Joint Board of the Theological Colleges, affiliated with McGill University. The Board feels that the services he will render in such a capacity will not only redound to his own credit but will also prove of great value to the community at large as well as to the co-operating causes.

The Board records with sorrow and with appreciative memory the death of Mr. Charles R. Black who for many years was indentified with the College in a more than ordinary and effective way as a Governor and benefactor.

The Board records with appreciation the action of the Union executive and the executives of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society and Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society in consenting to the designation to the College of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) from the surplus fund of the Forward Movement.

The Board regrets to recall the death of Mr. B. W. Robertson of Kingston who for many years was a respected Governor of the Institution. He was always one of its most generous supporters and one of the best of its

friends.

The retiring Governors are Messrs. J. R. Dougall; Judge S. P. Leet and Arthur Congdon.

REPORT OF THE SENATE, SESSION OF 1920-21

To the Board of Governors:

Gentlemen:-We have pleasure in submitting our report of the past

session—the eighty-first in the history of the College.

The renovations effected by the Governors in the interior of the College building added much to the pelasure and comfort of students and staff alike. They feel that in this matter their special htanks are due to Mr. Gurd, the chairman of the Board, who gave to it his constant and careful oversight during practically the whole of last summer.

The health of the students was, with only slight exceptions, uniformly good, and they applied themselves with commendable diligence to their work. Dr. Harold Cushing has again laid the College under obligations for his

voluntary professional services so freely rendered.

ROLL OF STUDENTS

The ranks of the students, so sadly depleted during the great war, are being filled up. We have not yet reached the number necessary to meet the requirements of the churches, either in these older provinces or for extension work in our Canadian West or our African mission. Nevertheless, we are glad to report an improvement in this direction. Two years ago we had only eight students in residence, last year we reported twelve, the past session numbered fifteen. Four new students were received and all these were from our Canadian churches. In our last report we drew attention to the fact that very few of the men offering themselves for training were Canadian born. But already the tide had turned for of the five then received four were from our own Churches, and this year repeats the story. Mr. Lloyd M. Somerville is from the church at Middleville, Mr. Earl B. Eddy from the Brantford Church, Mr. Telford Sanderson from Point St. Charles and Mr. Leslie H. Sanders from Guelph. The last two are sons of the manse.

Co-operating Colleges

The scheme of co-operation inaugurated ten years ago continues to grow The School for Rural Improvement in connection with Macdonald College was held again last summer in the beautifully situated village of St. Annes, and six of our rural pastors took advantage of it. A similar session will be held this summer between the second and twelfth days of August. Dr. Ritchie, as Dean of the Joint Faculty, will be Vice-Principal and will also deliver a special course of lectures on Religious Education and Rural Life. This school is made financially possible through the funds of the Joint Board, which also provide for the living expenses of rural pastors in Quebec and Eastern Ontario who receive the certificates of the several colleges.

Special conferences have been held during the winter between members of the Joint Board and Faculty, to consider the claims of the Christian ministry and the means by which students for the ministry may be recruited. A quite remarkable event was the gathering of about one hundred of the leading laymen of the churches in Montreal with the staffs of the four Colleges and clerical members of the Senates and Boards to consider this whole matter. Such a distinguished and representative gathering for such a purpose had never been witnessed before in Montreal. It is surely an indication of a new sense of responsibility for the maintenance of the ministry on the part of the leading men of our Churches.

The Joint Board is also particularly interested in everything which tends to make more efficient the affiliation of the four Colleges with McGill University. It has undertaken to pay the fee known as the "universal fee" for each Theological student, which admits him, whether attending University

classes or not, to the general privileges of the Student Body.

Reference was made in our last report to the new department of Religious Education in connection with the co-operative scheme. This Department is now well under way. A detailed description of it is or soon will be in the hands of our pastors, and will be forwarded to all interested enquirers.

A singing class has also been inaugurated under the efficient leadership of Mr. Harold Key, organist and choir master of Emmanuel Church, who is

also lecturer in Voice Culture.

Ministerial Retreats

Another piece of work inaugurated by the College was the holding of Ministerial Retreats for the study of some important book and the discussion of vital problems of the pastorate. Two such retreats were held last summer in connection with the Forward Movement, and under the personal leadership of the Principal, one in Toronto and the other in Montreal. These were splendidly attended by the ministers and proved most inspiring and helpful.

Arrangements are being made for the holding of similar gatherings next

September.

EXTRA-MURAL COURSES

Union Reading Courses

Three men are working on this course. One of them is in Newfoundland, whose work the College has undertaken to guide and examine at the request of the Colonial Missionary Society. The Western Association of Ontario has now followed the example of the other associations in putting the examination of all such candidates for ordination in the care of the College. We are glad to be able to serve the Churches in helping men for whom the regular College course is impossible, though it is obvious that more and more men should seek the equipment which is given in a full College course.

Bachelor of Divinity Course.

Three pastors have been prosecuting studies in the course for the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology—popularly called Bachelor of Divinity. One of these, the Rev. Arthur E. Teale, pastor of the church at Waterville, a graduate of the class of 1915, successfully completed the course and received the degree at the College Convocation.

Mr. Archibald L. Richards, of the final Theological year, was also admitted to this course. Last summer he attended the full session of Knox College, Toronto, open specially to returned soldiers, and creditably passed all the required examinations. Due credit for this has been allowed him on his B. D.

course.

The Rev. George A. Dickson, pastor of the Crescent Church, Winnipeg, has also been admitted to the course and passed several examinations.

Examinations and Awards

The Christmas and Sessional Examinations were held as usual. As our students attend the co-operating classes their examinations are conducted by the professors of all four colleges. It is therefore satisfactory to report that not only was there not one single failure, but on the contrary a good standing was maintained throughout.

Mr. T. W. Jones, B.A., and Mr. A. L. Richards, completed the Theological

course and have received the College diploma.

Mr. Jones also won the John Frederick Stevenson Memorial Gold Medal for highest standing in the work of the final year, with an average of 90% of marks. He also won the Calvary Church Silver Medal for excellence in Church History throughout the whole Theological course. His average in this department for the three years was 93%.

To Mr. Jones and Mr. Richards was also awarded a Robert Anderson

Bursary of \$30.

Mr. Norman Jackson won the Maria Saidwell Scholarship of \$30 for excellence in the Middle Theological year, and Mr. Reginald J. Smith the Charles Alexander Bursary of \$25 for excellence in the Junior Theological year.

The James Baylis Bursary of \$25 was awarded to Dale Hendry Moore.

The James Bayns Bursary of \$25 was awarded to Date Hendry Moore.

The Huntley Duff prize for excellence in Greek in the first year Arts, won by Mr. A. K. McMinn with 90% of marks, in the year in which he enlisted for

war service, was now awarded to him.

Mr. McMinn has had the charge of Crystal Springs Church in Montreal, and as student pastor has enjoyed the Mrs. Henry Sanders Bursary of \$165

given in aid of mission work in connection with the College.

We have pleasure in reporting that the Rev. R. B. Blyth, B.A., of Cleveland, Ohio, a graduate of this College, forwarded to the Principal the sum of \$25 to be used as a prize. It was decided that it should be awarded for excellence in the matriculation classes. The result of Mr. Blyth's action was that mem-

bers of the Senate subscribed a similar sum of \$25, and two prizes were awarded, one to Leslie H. Sanders and one to Harvey Bronson.

University Classes

Of the fifteen students on the roll one was a graduate of McGill, five were undergraduates, two were taking partial courses, and six were in the matriculation classes of the Preparatory Department of the Co-operating Colleges.

At the University Convocation the degree of Master of Arts was conferred on Mr. T. W. Jones, B.A., and the degree of Bachelor of Arts on Mr. A. K. McMinn. We congratulate these students on the successful completion of their

The Rev. John Fraser Memorial Scholarship of \$60, awarded to the student of this College having the highest standing in the examinations of the final University examinations, was won by Mr. McMinn. The Robertson Macaulay Bursary of \$30 for similar standing in the second year was won by Mr. S. R. Collins.

College Convocation

The Annual Convocation was held in the Assembly Hall of the College on the 19th of April last. It was a large and representative gathering. The address was given by the Rev. Herbert Symonds, D.D., LL.D., Rector of Christ's Church Cathedral, on "The Positive Outcome of the Critical Movement of the Nineteenth Century."

A BRIEF HISTORY AND A PLEA

Early in the session a pamphlet bearing the above title was prepared by the Principal and published as part of the Forward Movement. It is worthy of wide and careful reading and we trust will awaken increased interest in the College.

This institution is prepared to serve the Churches as never before. Its students are worthy of the highest confidence as men of ability and consecration. The history of all our denominational societies proves this. All the teaching missionaries of our African field are graduates of this College. They are eager to serve in the great North West, especially in new and pioneer work. Mr. Richards, one of our graduates, is particularly interested in this new work, but is for the present to labour in the Condo and Naseby fields, Saskatchewan. Mr. Jones, who with Mr. Richards, was oradined at the close of the College, becomes the pastor of Calvary Church, Montreal. We congratulate this church on securing Mr. Jones as its pastor, and we appeal both to the ministers and the laymen of our Churches to look out for the brightest and best of their young people and direct their minds to the opportunities afforded by our Colleges than which we are convinced there is nothing superior in this country.

It was a great pleasure to the Union to have Dr. Gunn with us, and his address on the various phases of our denominational work was much enjoyed.

Mr. H. W. Barker read the financial statement of the C.C.M. Society,

and the meeting adjourned.

The devotional service at 8 p.m was led by Rev. H. Peckover. The Chairman gave a report of the International Congregational Council held in Boston in 1920, and an address entitled, "Because!—A Revelation in a Word," was given by Mr. B. J. Lazenby.

FRIDAY, JULY 8.

The Union Committee met at 10 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

SATURDAY, JULY 9.

Mr. B. J. Lazenby conducted the morning prayer service.

Rev. G. W. Ball was appointed Union Preacher for 1922, with Mr. Lazenby as alternate.

On recommendation of the Resolutions Committee the following resolutions were passed: (1) A vote of condolence to relatives of members of our churches who had passed away during the year. CONDENSED MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING C.C.W.B.M.

The thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions, convened in Guelph Church on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 31st, June 1st and 2nd, 1921. There were 101 officers, delegates, life members and visiting friends registered.

Meetings of the Departments of Mission Bands and Circles, Publications, Literature and Leaflet, Foreign and Home Mission Supplies, met on Tuesday afternoon in round table conference. In the evening at 7.30 a meeting for Intercession was held, followed by the meeting of the General Executive.

On Wednesday morning after devotional exercises led by the President, a wire was received announcing Mrs. Tucker's death in England the day previous. A short prayer service was held to honour her memory and to ask comfort for her bereaved family.

On recommendation of the Executive, Mrs. G. W. Anderson and Mrs. Peter Munro were appointed Minute Secretaries, and the various

Committees for the convention were chosen.

The reports of the year's work as read by the Superintendents of the various departments were very encouraging, much progress having been made along many lines. The Foreign Mission Supplies had a wonderful report and had practically double quantities for shipment this year.

An address of welcome was presented by Mrs. Graham, President of Guelph Auxiliary, which was followed by the President's annual oddress. The Scaret was reported that there had been growth four

address. The Secretary's report stated that there had been growth, four new Auxiliaries and three new Mission Bands. The staff of missionaries has been increased to eight workers.

The Treasurer's report showed the great growth of the Board and gave as the grand total receipts \$14,943.37, a gain of \$1,796.47 over last year, and of \$6,254.34 over two years ago. The budget fixed for next year is \$17,425.00.

The Noon Quiet Hour was conducted by Mrs. Steven of London and Devotional Exercises by Mrs. Hill, President; Mrs. G. A. Mackenzie, of Stratford; Mrs. Frank Sanders, Guelph; Mrs. Thos. Moodie, Montreal;

and Rev. F. Sanders, of Guelph.

Resolutions were adopted expressing the deep regret of the Board at the death of Mrs. Tucker and appreciation of her life and service rendered our Mission in Angola; also, sympathy for Mrs. C. McD. Hay, on the death of her husband, whose services to the Woman's Board have been so many; and to the workers whose resignations had been so regret-fully accepted, Miss Laura M. Miatt as Treasurer, Mrs. E. A. Cale as Convener of the Publications Committee and Mrs. W. H. Abbott as Superintendent Home Mission Supplies.

The Business Committee's Report dealt with a long list of items. The pledged work of the Board was reassumed, a resolution was adopted expressing a new policy for Home Mission work, money was added for the development of new work, the appointment of Mrs. Hunter as the eighth Missionary of the Board was ratified and the General Fund was

increased.

The fund for the erection of Moodie Hall, the new dormitory of the Girls' Boarding School was completed, and this money will be available

for the Station of Chisamba.

Greetings were sent to our beloved missionaries in their far-off fields. and pleasure was expressed at the presence in our midst of Mrs. Merlin Ennis of Sachikela, Mrs. Carscallen of West China, Mrs. Hunter under appointment to Angola, of Mrs. Burdick of Winnipeg, Western Canada,

and of Rev. J. D. Gross of the Russo-German Churches.

Addresses were given by Miss L. M. Silcox on "Canada for Christ"; by the Rev. J. D. Gross on the Russo-German work in the West; by Miss Julia Claris on "Development of Home Base Leadership"; by Mrs. Wightman on "Christian Stewardship"; by Mrs. Ennis on work in West Central Africa and to the children of Mission Band; and by Mrs. Carscallen on "The Changing Status of Women in Non-Christian Lands." Without exception these addresses were excellent and much appreciated.

Notices of motion were given in connection with changes in the Constitution and a Committee was appointed to consider some further changes. A cordial invitation was extended the Board to meet next year in Maxville, and this invitation was gratefully accepted. Mrs. John Leslie, of Montreal, was appointed Convener of the Business Committee, and Mrs. A. F. Pollock, of Ottawa, Convener of the Resolutions Com-

mittee for 1922.

At the closing meeting also a short dedication service was held for Mrs. Evelyn Hunter. Mrs. Hill extended the welcome of the Board, Mrs. Weegar, of Maxville, the greetings of Ottawa Branch, and Mrs. Ennis presented the welcome from the Field, the Rev. Frank Sanders offering

the prayer of dedication.

A vote of thanks to the hostesses of Guelph, including those of the Presbyterian, Anglican, Baptist and Methodist Churches, to the pastor and his wife, to the choir and to all others who had contributed so much toward the comfort and happiness of the delegates, was moved by Mrs. Robertson, of Toronto, seconded, and unanimously carried.

After the singing of "Blest be the tie that binds" and prayer, the

Board adjourned to meet in Maxville in 1922.

BY-LAWS OF THE

CONGREGATIONAL PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY

GENERAL BY-LAWS

I.—MEMBERSHIP

As Beneficiary Members—Ministers duly received by the Society through either of the branches hereinafter mentioned, and retaining their membership in connection with either fund in accordance with its by-laws.

2. As Life Members—Any person not being Beneficiary Members, who shall have paid to the fund Twenty Dollars at one time.

3. As Annual Members—Churches collecting for the fund, to be represented at the annual meeting, or at any special meeting held in the year following the payment of their collection, by one delegate, who shall not be a Beneficiary Member.

II.—ADMISSION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERS

Any Congregational Minister in Canada who is in good standing in the denomination and the Pastor of a Congregational Church or a Missionary of the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society, or a Professor in the Congregational College of Canada, may be admitted as a Beneficiary Member of either branch of the fund by a majority of four-fifths of the Directors present at any meeting of the Board.

2. Before confirming the admission of any applicants, the Board of Directors may, if they think it necessary, make enquiries concerning their general health; and if the result of their enquiries proves unsatisfactory the Directors may either decline to confirm the reception, or require such additional remuneration as, in their opinion, would be sufficient to

cover the extra risk.

III.—TERMINATION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERSHIP

Any Beneficiary Member, not an annuitant, ceasing to reside in Canada, shall thereby lose beneficiary claim on either fund, but the amount of his annual subscription to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund shall be placed to the credit of his family, under the condition of Article No. XII., then to accumulate with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum until his death, when it shall be paid to such person or persons as may be lawfully entitled to receive it. Beneficiary members of the Retiring Ministers' Branch, ceasing to reside in Canada, shall cease to have beneficiary claim, but may, in special cases, receive relief from the fund to the amount of their subscriptions to the fund.

2. Any Beneficiary Member leaving the Ministry or the denomina-tion shall thereby forfeit all claim upon the fund, unless he has been a member for ten years; but after having paid ten years' annual subscriptions he shall have the privilege of withdrawing from the Society, and receiving as surrender value of his claim on its fund, an amount based upon the reasons of his withdrawal, as follows: If he leaves the country, but not the ministry of the denomination, he shall be paid three-fourths of the total amount of his annual subscriptions; if he enters the ministry of another denomination, he shall receive one-half of the total subscriptions paid; if he leaves the ministry, he shall be entitled to twofifths of the total subscriptions paid. But no member shall be entitled to receive anything from the Society if he was not in good standing in the Congregational Union of Canada at the time of his withdrawal from the denomination or ministry.

3. Any Beneficiary Member who may have been connected with the Society, as such, for a period of not less than five years, and who has paid all his annual premiums may, if he so desires, withdraw his membership from the Society, and claim a refund of two-fifths of the amount of the premiums paid in by him, if wife is still living.

IV .-- RE-ADMISSION OF BENEFICIARY MEMBERS

Any member returning to Canada (if permitted to resume his connection with the Widows' and Orphans' Branch) shall pay all arrears and an additional rate of 20 cents per annum for each year of his absence, and the amount accumulated to the credit of his family shall relapse to the fund.

2. Any member resuming his connection with the Retiring Ministers' Branch shall do so on conditions to be arranged by the Directors.

V.-MEETINGS

1. An annual meeting of the Society shall be held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada, at which a report from the Directors and the Treasurer's accounts shall be presented, Directors elected for the ensuing year and any other general business of the Society transacted.

2. Special meetings of the Society may be held at its pleasure, expressed at any meeting thereof, or at the call of the Directors.

3. Beneficiary Members, in connection with either branch of the Fund, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Society.

4. In case of a division, a majority of two-thirds shall be necessary to constitute a vote.

VI.-MANAGEMENT

The funds of the Society shall be held and managed by a Board of ten Directors (five to form a quorum), eight residing in or near the City of Montreal, to be elected annually by the Society.

2. The Directors, when elected, shall, from their own numbers, choose a Chairman, Deputy-Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary, and may make such standing rules for their own guidance (not being inconsistent with the Act of Incorporation and its amendments or by-laws). as they may deem needful, subject to the approval of the Society at the next annual meeting.

3. They shall also have power to fill vacancies in their own number, shall be eligible for re-election, and shall hold office until their suc-

cessors are appointed and assume their duties.

VII.—INCOME AND INVESTMENTS

The funds of the Society shall be derived from Annual Church Collections, Subscriptions, Donations and Legacies, the rates paid by Beneficiary Members, and the proceeds of investments.

2. The amount received for Church Collections, or otherwise con-

tributed for the general purposes of the Society, shall be divided between the Branches at the discretion of the Board; but money contributed from any source, and especially designated for either Branch, shall be so applied.

The Funds shall be invested only in undoubted securities to be held on the Society's behalf by the Chairman or Deputy-Chairman and the Treasurer, in the name of the Incorporated Society.

4. Any investments or transfers from one investment to another shall be made only by vote of the Board.

5. The Treasurer shall give such security to the Board for the funds in his possession as they may from time to time require.

VIII.—DISPUTED CASES

In the case of any dispute arising between Beneficiary Members or Annuitants and the Directors of the Society, each party shall choose an arbitrator, and these, if necessary, an umpire, whose decisions shall be final.

IX.—REVISAL OF RATES AND ANNUITIES

The amount of the rates of premiums and annuities shall be reconsidered at each fifth annual meeting, reckoning from that held in 1863, and should any re-adjustment be needed such re-adjustment shall not be deemed to be a violation of good faith by any parties whatsoever.

X.—ALTERATION OF BY-LAWS

The By-laws of the Society may be enacted, amended or repealed at any annual meeting, provided that notice to such effect has been given at the previous annual meeting. But this shall not apply to the case provided for in By-law IX.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' BRANCH

XI.—BENEFICIARY SUBSCRIPTIONS

The following shall be the scale of rates, payable annually, by Bene-

ficiary Members of the Widows' and Orphans' Branch:-

1. By those received under thirty years of age, and by Alumni of the Congregational College of Canada, subscribing within twelve months from the date of their ordination, Ten Dollars.

2. By those received over thirty and under forty years of age,

Twelve Dollars.

- 3. By those received over forty and under fifty years of age, Fourteen Dollars.
- 4. By those received over fifty and under sixty years of age. Sixteen Dollars.

5. By those received over sixty years of age, such a special rate

as may be agreed to by the Society.

6. All subscriptions to be payable semi-annually on the 1st of January and July, and if not paid within three months, to be subject to a fine of \$1. If not paid within twelve months, due notice having been given by the trustees, the minister so in arrears shall be held to have withdrawn from connection with the fund.

7. Any Beneficiary Member, who shall have paid thirty annual premiums, according to the above assessment, shall be exempt from further subscriptions, and shall maintain his status as a Beneficiary as

before.

XII.—ANNUITIES

There shall be paid from the funds of the Society to the families of the Beneficiary Members the following annuities:-

1. To their Widows for life, or until re-marriage, Two Hundred Dollars per annum.

- To their Widows for each Son under the age of sixteen years. Thirty-five dollars, but Seventy Dollars for the youngest child.
- To Guardians on behalf of Orphans, Seventy Dollars for the youngest and Forty-five Dollars for each other child, and two-thirds of what would have been payable to the Mother had she not deceased, until they attain the ages mentioned in the preceding section, provided, nevertheless, that the Directors shall have power to delay such payments to Guardians until they are satisfied that they will be properly applied.
- It shall be competent for the Society, on recommendation of the Directors, to continue an annuity to an Orphan by special annual grant beyond the period named in Article 2, should there be special reasons for so doing.

RETIRING MINISTERS' BRANCH

XIII.—BENEFICIARY SUBSCRIPTIONS

The following shall be the scale of rates, payable annually, by Bene-

ficiary Members of the Retiring Ministers' Branch:

1. By those received under thirty years of age, and by Alumni of the Congregational College of Canada, subscribing within 12 months from the date of their ordination, Four Dollars per annum.

Those received over 30 and under 35 years of age, Five Dollars

per annum.

Those received over 35 and under 40 years of age, Six Dollars 3. per annum.

Those received over 40 and under 45 years of age, Seven Dollars

per annum.

Those received over 45 and under 50 years of age, Eight Dollars per annum.

6. Ministers over 50 years of age shall be received only on such

terms as the Directors may agree to.
7. Ministers who may pay at once, or for whom may be paid by their Churches or by others, a sum equal to the amount of fifteen years' purchase, according to the age rate indicated above, may become Beneficiary Life Members.

XIV.—ANNUITIES

- 1. Beneficiary Members of this Branch having attained the age of 65 years and having been compelled to resign the active duties of the ministry, shall be entitled to an annuity of \$200 for life, payable quarterly, from the Retiring Ministers' Fund; but should there be any good or sufficient reason why it should not be paid—of which reason the Society shall be the sole and sufficient judge—it shall not be paid, anything in these by-laws to the contrary notwithstanding.
- 2. It shall be competent for the Society, on recommendation of the Directors, to increase the annuity for any Beneficiary Member by a special or annual grant, not exceeding the sum of \$100 per annum additional, and said grant may be made for life, by regular vote, after 12 months' notice given at any annual meeting of the Society.
- Should the income of either the Retiring Ministers' or Charitable Fund not be sufficient for the payment of annuities for which it is liable, it shall be right and proper for the Society to make such reduction, *pro rata*, on all annuities as will cover the deficiency, anything in these bylaws to the contrary notwithstanding.—See By-law XVI., Clause 2.

XV.—CHARITABLE FUND

The proportion of Charitable Subscriptions, Donations, Legacies, and Church Collections available shall be placed to the credit of an account to be called the Charitable Fund, until the sum of One Thousand Dollars is secured, the interest of which only shall be available for grants or annuities.

After \$1,000 is secured, one-half of said Subscriptions, Collections, etc., shall be reserved to constitute an Endowment Fund, until

the sum of \$5,000 has been secured.

The other half with the proportion of interest due to this account, shall be available for grants or annuities; but should the income in any year exceed the disbursements of that year, the surplus, after allowing a small balance for contingencies, shall be added to the Endowment.

XVI.—CHARITABLE ANNUITIES

1. The Society may, from the Charitable Fund, make special or annual grants to any aged or infirm Congregational Minister laboring in

Canada, though not a Beneficiary Member.

2. The Society may, from the Charitable Fund, make special or annual grants to any aged or infirm Congregational Minister laboring in

Canada, though not a Beneficiary Member.

2. Should the Retiring Ministers' Fund not be sufficient for the claims of annuitants, it shall be proper to supplement that Fund from the Charitable Fund.

CONGREGATIONAL PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY

The Annual Meeting was held in Emmanuel Church, Montreal, on Thursday, June 9th, 1921, at 4.30 p.m.

The Chairman, Mr. Charles Gurd, presided, and Mr. W. H. Black, Secretary, acted as Secretary of the meeting.

The Rev. Dr. Hill led in prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting, on motion of the Rev. T. W.

Jones, were taken as read, and adopted.

The Annual Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read by those officers, and, after expressions of appreciation and thanks on behalf of the members voiced by the Rev. J. Alexander, the Rev. Dr. Warriner, the Rev. Mr. Newbery and Mrs. Crowe, were received and adopted.

At this point the Chairman referred to the loss which had been sustained by the death of the Rev. Mr. Margrett, our Statistical Secretary, and the Secretary was instructed to write to Mrs. Margrett expressing the sympathy of the meeting with herself and family in their great loss.

On motion of the Rev. Galen Craik, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Warriner, the Board of Directors were unanimously re-elected. Mr. John Anderson was also re-elected Auditor, and Mr. Thomas Moodie re-elected

as representative on the Conditional Gifts Committee.

Mr. A. McA. Murphy gave notice that at the next Annual Meeting he would move to amend By-laws Nos. 15 and 16 by deleting the word "Charitable" and replacing it by the words "Fellowship Branch," wherever it occurred in those By-laws.

The meeting was closed by benediction by the Rev. Dr. Warriner.

THE PROVIDENT FUND SOCIETY ANNUAL REPORT, 1920-21

The transactions of the Society during the past year are eloquently portrayed in the Annual Report of the Treasurer. To those who are interested in the work of the Society, no better reference can be made than to the figures reported by the Treasurer. We would call attention particularly to the growth in the Society's assets. The fund has now reached \$100,000.00 in round numbers, and from a calculation of the return from the investment of this large sum you will note how well that work has been done. This investment is in the able hands of the Chairman and the Treasurer, who, at the present time, at the request of the Board, are reviewing the total holdings of the Society of all kinds, so that advantage may be gained, if any advantage is to be had, by changing certain foreign investments for Canadian issues, and otherwise improving, if possible, the already creditable return on the capital.

With the growth of the invested funds, and the satisfactory increase in subscriptions reported this year, we may confidently look forward to a substantial increase in the payments to beneficiaries at the quinquennial revision in 1923.

It is suggested to all who are able to do so, that they perpetuate their interest in this good cause by generously providing for it in their wills.

Two very distinct advances have been made by the Society in this last financial year.

The first was the securing, through the Union, of recognition in connection with the Budget, and the allocation of a percentage calculated to produce a revenue more in keeping with the purposes and responsibilities of the Society. We have not been favored with the total allotment of \$3,000.00, but we have received collections from 57 Churches which total \$1,135.41, a considerable increase from those of last year, when \$606.27 was received from 23 Churches.

The second advance was the establishment of a Charitable Fund, long contemplated, and provided for by By-law No. 15. This was made possible by the action of the Executive Committee of the Union in recommending that a grant of \$4,000.00 from the surplus of the Forward Movement Fund be made to this Society, the amount to be placed in the Charitable Fund and to be used in cases of sickness or other circumstances of special need. One thousand two hundred dollars has already been received of this amount. It has been decided that the interest only on all amounts received from this source shall be used, and that distributed in conformity with By-law No. 15, Sections 2 and 3, namely, one-half of the interest to be added to the Endowment Fund until the sum of \$5,000.00 has been secured, and the other half held available for distribution. It was also decided that hereafter the amount received from the Churches, donations or other contributions to the general purposes of the Society, shall be divided as follows:

40% to the Widows' and Orphans' Branch; 40% to the Retiring Ministers' Branch;

20% to Charitable Fund.

This will place, in the hands of the Board, a certain sum to be disbursed from the Charitable Fund, but it might not be amiss to point out the absolute necessity for actual facts to be reported in any case which is sent to the Board for consideration.

Another very gratifying feature is the increase in membership, but

the Board will not be satisfied until every minister in the denomination is a member of this Society, and would urge it as a duty upon the various Churches to see that their minister is placed in this position.

It will be the duty of the Society at the Annual Meeting to elect a

Board of Directors, and an Auditor.

REPORT OF TREASURER

The Treasurer can report the best year ever, an increase in Churches subscribing and an increase in the total subscribed.

In the Widows' and Orphans' Branch the increase in assets amounts to \$3,496.40. We have transferred \$3,500.00 to capital account, the largest amount, leaving \$660.28 at credit of revenue account.

There are 5 Annuitants and 31 Beneficiaries.

By the death of Rev. A. Margrett, his widow and daughters will come on the Fund, making the number of Annuitants five.

In the Retiring Ministers' Branch the increase in assets is \$2,408.35. We have transferred \$3,000.00 to capital account, the same amount as last year, leaving at credit of revenue \$733.36.

We have one Annuitant and 33 Beneficiaries.

The investments are all in good shape.

The financial statements, duly audited by Mr. John Anderson, are herewith presented.
