### PREFACE.

THE want of some such work as the Editor has sought to supply in the present volume, has, especially since Confederation, and the creation of a Supreme and Exchequer Court for the Dominion, been very much felt, not only by members of the legal profession, judicial officers, and others having connection with Law and the Courts, but also by a no inconsiderable portion of the general public. The Editor has endeavoured to meet the want, with what success it will be for the subscribers to the work to determine. A great mass of names and facts have been brought together in a small compass, the procuring of which has cost the Editor more time and trouble than many people will be inclined to give him credit for. The obtaining of information in the Maritime Provinces—where there seems to be an almost entire absence of Indexing or Registration to the Public Records—was most difficult and vexatious. Where, in these Provinces, the reader observes that the book is deficient in names and dates, the omission must be set down to the right cause—an utter impossibility of obtaining the desired information. Such as it is, the CANADIAN LEGAL DIRECTORY, as the first attempt at bringing the Bench and the Bar of the Dominion and of the several Provinces thereof under one cover, will, it is hoped, be found to be of service, and calculated to advance the best interests of the profession in Canada. The Editor finds himself under many lasting obligations to leading members of the Bar throughout the country, for assistance of various kinds, to one and all of whom he tenders his warmest thanks and acknowledgments.

### THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, CANADA.

[Established by 31 Vict., Cap. 39.]

MINISTER OF JUSTICE AND ATTORNEY-GENERAL OF CANADA.\*—

\* The duties of this officer are defined by sections 2 and 3 of the above Act; as Minister of Justice, "he shall be the official legal adviser of the Governor and the legal member of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Canada; it shall be his duty to see that the administration of public affairs is in accordance with law; he shall have the superintendence of all matters connected with the administration of Justice in Canada, not within the jurisdiction of the Governments of the Provinces comprising the same; he shall advise upon the Legislative Acts and proceedings of each of the Legislatures of the Provinces of Canada, and generally advise the Crown upon all matters of Law referred to him by the Crown; and he shall be charged generally with such other duties as may at any time be assigned at any time by the Governor in Council to the Minister of Justice."

As Attorney-General, "he shall be intrusted with the powers, and charged with the duties which belong to the office of the Attorney-General of England by law or usage so far as the same powers and duties are applicable to Canada, and also with the powers and duties which by the laws of the several Provinces belonged to the office of Attorney-General of each Province up to the time when the British North Act, 1867, came into effect, and which Laws under the provisions of the said Act are to be administered and carried into effect by the Government of the Dominion; "he shall advise the Heads of the several Departments of the Government upon all

The Exchequer Court has original jurisdiction (1) in revenue cases; (2) in civil suits when the Crown for the Dominion is plaintiff; (3) controversies between the Dominion and a Province, or between two Provinces.

The Judges who are the same as in the Supreme Court, reside in the City of Ottawa, where they hold annually two Sessions, beginning respectively on the third Monday in January and June.

The salary of the Chief Justice is \$8,000 per annum; that of each Puisne Judge, \$7,000. There is a vacation in the Supreme Court at Christmas, commencing on 15th December, and ending on 10th January. The long vacation comprises the months of July and August. In the Exchequer Court the vacation at Christmas extends only till 8th January; the long vacation is the same as in the Supreme Court.

<sup>\*</sup> The Supreme Court is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, five of whom constitute a quorum. It has both original and appellate jurisdiction—Original, as to (1) habeas corpus in criminal and extradition cases: (2) judicial opinions to the Crown; (3) private bills and petitions therefor referred by the Senate or House of Commons; and (4) civil suits in which the validity of a Dominion or Provincial Act is questioned. Appellate, in appeals (1) from the Exchequer Court; (2) from the Provincial Courts; (3) in habeas corpus cases; and (4) in election cases.

### DOMINION LAW SOCIETY.

(From the Canada Law Fournal, January, 1877.)

The following is a report taken from the Halifax *Citizen* of a meeting of the Nova Scotia Bar Society, specially called to consider the report of the Committee appointed to promote the formation of a Dominion Bar

Society. Their Honours, Judges Wilkins and Smith courteously adjourned the civil and criminal courts to permit a full attendance of Barristers.

The following report of the Committee was read by the Secretary:

"Nova Scotia Barristers' Society, Halifax, Oct. 20th, 1876.

- "Report of the Committee to whom was referred the formation of a Domininion Barristers' Society.
- "Your Committee report that as soon as practicable after their appointment they prepared a circular on the subject of the proposed Society which they sent to the office-bearers of sister societies, and also to leading members of the Bar in the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and P. E. Island, there being no society yet organized in P. E. Island. The circular is printed in the Law Journal for October.
- "That on the first of September one of the Committee, Mr. James, having occasion to visit the Upper Provinces, took the opportunity, with the assent of the Committee and of the Council of this Society, to spend some time in visiting the parties to whom the circulars had been sent and other prominent members of the Bar, and advocating personally the expediency of forming the contemplated Association. That he was received as the delegate of this Society with marked kindness and distinction, and the object of his mission, after undergoing the most thorough discussion in all its aspects, was in every instance approved, and the greatest encouragement expressed in favour of the project—not only by the Bar, but many members of the Bench of the Upper Provinces. Official answers have not yet been received from the Law Societies of the Provinces of Quebec and New Brunswick, but the approbation of the scheme so uniformly expressed is sufficient to induce your Committee to recommend that measures be continued to procure the formation and organization of the Society without delay.
- "That it was the intention of your Committee to recommend the Society to invite delegates from the Law Societies and other Barristers to assemble in Halifax next vacation to organize the Society, but the officers and leading members of the Societies in Ontario and Quebec, while they would gladly accept our invitations, urged strong reasons in favour of organizing the Society at Ottawa during the ensuing session of the Legislature. The reasons urged appear to your Committee sufficiently cogent to induce them to recommend that course; and if our Society shall consent, the Committee suggest that a general meeting of the new Society be held in Halifax, next July or August; that the meeting be made as numerous a meeting as possible of the Bar of the Dominion, and that provision be made for the reading of a series of able papers on legal subjects by leading members of the Bench and Bar of the Dominion. Your Committee believe that such a meeting would be attended

with invaluable results to the Bar, and public of the Province and the Dominion.

"The Committee recommend that the meeting at Ottawa be called on the invitation of the Bar at Ottawa, the Law Society of Ontario, or the Law Society of the District of Montreal, to be followed by our invitation to be given at Ottawa for the meeting here in next vacation.

"The Law Society of Ontario has given the project the unanimous and hearty approval of their Benchers in Convocation, and favourable answers are daily expected from the other Societies.

"In conclusion the Committee recommend that the thanks of the Council be extended to the office-bearers of the Law Societies of Ontario, Montreal and Quebec, and to the members of the Judiciary and Bar of the Upper Provinces for the distinction and kindness with which they received the delegate of this Society on his late visit, and the warm interest manifested by them in the undertaking; and also that a special meeting of the Society be held to consider the subject.

"All of which is respectfully reported.

- "The following resolutions were then, after an animated discussion on each in turn, passed unanimously, with the exception of a very mild dissent from one of the meeting to the third resolution:
  - "Moved by Shannon, Q.C., seconded by Mr. Eaton :-
- "Resolved, That the report be received and adopted, and that the committee be requested to continue their efforts to promote the formation of the Society.
  - "Moved by James, Q.C., seconded by McCoy, Q.C.:-
- "Resolved, That the thanks of this Society be given to the Honourable J. H. Cameron, Q.C., Treasurer, and the other officers of the Law Society of Ontario; William H. Kerr, Q.C., Bâtonnier, and the other officers of the Law Society of Montreal; J. Dunbar, Esq. Q.C., Bâtonnier, and the other officers of the Law Society of Quebec, for the distinction and kindness with which they received the delegate of this Society on his late visit, and for the interest manifested by them in the proposed undertaking.

"Resolved, That the thanks of the Bar Society be tendered to the Committee for their efforts in promoting the formation of the proposed Society, and especially to Alexander James, Q.C., Esq., for the able, efficient and satisfactory manner in which he discharged his duty on the recent delegation to the Upper Provinces.

"The meeting was also addressed by the President, McDonald, Q.C., and the Vice-President, Ritchie, Q.C., and by Messrs J. G. Foster, L. G.

Power, and other gentlemen.

"The project was discussed in its various bearings and the spirit of the meeting was cordially in its favour."

The Bar of Nova Scotia have taken this matter up with energy, and deserve great credit for the proper spirit which they have evinced in setting forward the movement.

### CONSOLIDATION OF THE LAWS.

The sum of eight thousand dollars has been voted by the Parliament of Canada "to meet the estimated expenses in connection with the Consolidation of the Laws," but as yet no Commissioners have been appointed. Mr. Thomas Langton, M.A., Barrister, of Toronto, has been entrusted with some preliminary work in connection with this important undertaking.

### PRACTICE COURT AND CHAMBERS.

One of the Common Law Judges holds a court during each term, called the "Practice Court," for hearing matters relating to awards, bail, etc., and determining other questions of practice. Common Law Chambers are held each day by the Clerk of the Queen's Bench, who sits in place of one of the judges of the Courts, except in certain cases. Chancery Chambers are held by the Referee in Chambers, for such business relating to suits in Chancery as may be transacted by a single Judge out of Court.

#### HEIR AND DEVISEE COMMISSION.

### COURTS FOR THE TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS.

The nature of these Courts is sufficiently indicated in their title. The Judges of the Court of Appeal and of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity meet annually in Michaelmas Term, and severally select, by a majority of votes, a Judge of their respective Courts to be placed on the rota for the trial of election petitions. In the case of death or illness of a Judge so chosen, the Court of which he is a member meet and elect another Judge. At trials referring to the Dominion Parliament, two Judges preside, and appeals lie to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. At those relating to the Legislature of Ontario, a single Judge presides, and the appeal is to the Court of Appeal of that Province.

### COUNTY COURTS.

### (Constituted and established by 8 Vic. Cap. 13.)

The jurisdiction of the County Courts of Ontario is similar to that of the Superior Courts of Common Law, but is limited in amount, and does not include cases involving the title to lands (with the exception of actions of ejectment in specified cases), validity of wills or actions for libel, crim. con, or seduction. The senior Judge of the County presides in these courts A great variety of judicial duties, auxiliary, concurrent, special, peculiar and appellate, are made incident to the office of the judges by numerous statutes, Dominion and Provincial. An appeal lies in certain cases to the Court of Appeal.

### Jurisdiction in Insolvency.

Under the laws relating to Insolvency, the County Judge within his Jurisdiction, deals with adjudications of Insolvency, and the collection and distribution of the estate of insolvent traders. He determines all disputes respecting the estate, the ranking of creditors, and tries, in a summary way, contestations of claims, irrespective of amount: deals with frauds, fraudulent preferences, &c., &c. An appeal lies in certain cases to the Court of Appeal.

#### SURROGATE COURTS.

There is a Surrogate Court in each County, presided over by the senior judge. It possesses an exclusive jurisdiction relative to matters and causes testamentary, voluntary and contentious, and in relation to the granting and revoking probates of wills and the administration of the effects of deceased persons, similar to the Probate Court of England, with the right of appointing guardians of infants to take care of their persons and charge of their estates. An appeal lies in certain cases to the Court of Chancery. There is a registrar to each court, besides the *Surrogate Clerk*, who is an officer of the Court of Chancery.

municipality—held yearly. The County Judge appoints and holds the Courts in his Judicial District, determines thereat all questions affecting the franchise raised before him, and certifies the lists as revised. Duties similar to the English "Revised Barrister," but without appeal.

### COURTS OF GENERAL SESSIONS.

The Senior County Judge presides in each county and holds a Court of General Sessions twice a year (except in the County of York, where three Courts are held in the year), for trials by jury in cases of felony and misdemeanour, and for the decision of appeals from the summary convictions of magistrates. Capital felonies and a few other crimes are excepted from their jurisdiction.

### COUNTY JUDGES' CRIMINAL COURTS.

This Court has a general jurisdiction in cases of felony and misdemeanour (capital felonies, etc., excepted.) Any person charged with a crime, when committed for trial, may, if he so elect, obtain an immediate trial before the Judge alone.

### TERMS OF THE COURTS.

### Court of Appeal.

This Court holds its sittings at such times and for such periods as the Judges shall from time to time deem necessary or convenient for the speedy despatch of business, the times now fixed being the 15th of March, June, September and December, notice of the holding of such sittings being given according to the usual practice.

#### Law Terms.

Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Easter begins third Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter; Michaelmas begins third Monday in November and ends Saturday of the second week thereafter. Trinity Term begins on the Monday after the 21st August, and ends on Saturday of the following week. The Courts of Queen's Bench and Common Pleas have power also, at their discretion, to hold sittings in banc in time of vacation (except long vacation), by virtue of a rule or order of the Court, respectively to be made in or out of term, for the hearing of such special cases or rules for new trials as shall be named in a list to be attached to

any such rule or order, and for giving of judgments in cases previously argued, and for disposing of such other business as the Court in its discretion shall see fit; and one of the Judges of either of the Superior Courts sits in open Court on Tuesday and Friday of every week, as well in as out of Term, except during vacation, for the purpose of disposing of all Court business which may be transacted by a single Judge, subject to an appeal to the full Court, which for that purpose may be constituted of two Judges.

### Chancery Terms.

Terms for the hearing of causes, including examination of witnesses, are held twice in each year, at Toronto and on Circuit, the places and dates being previously arranged by the Judges (see Circuits). Terms for the rehearing of causes are held on the third Thursday in February, the last. Thursday in August, and the first Thursday in December. The Court sits every week, except during vacation, for the despatch of business, in the following order: Monday, chamber business: Tuesday, motions: Wednesday, hearings pro confesso and on bill and answer, motions for decree, further directions, petitions and demurrer: Thursday, appeals from Master's reports.

### Long Vacation

Extends from the 1st of July to the 21st of August. In Chancery, there is also a vacation from the 24th December to 6th January.

### County Court Terms.

The several County Courts in Ontario hold four terms in each year, commencing respectively on the first Monday in the months of January, April. July, and October, and ending on the Saturday of the same week.

#### CIRCUITS OF THE COURTS.

#### Law Circuits.

Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius and of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery are held twice a year in each County or union of Counties, in the vacation between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between that period of the vacation after the 21st of August and Michaelmas Term, except the Counties of York and Wentworth, in each of which counties there is held a third such Court in every year, in the vacation between

Michaelmas and Hilary Terms: and in the County of York there is held a fourth such Court, between Easter Term and the first day of July.

The Courts of Assize and Nisi Prius may, in the discretion of the Judges, be held separate and apart from the Courts of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery, and the Assizes for any county are not put an end to by the commencement of Term, but may continue and be holden during Term, subject to special rules in such case for moving against the verdict or for new trials. There are eight Circuits, as follows, viz:—

Eastern: Cornwall, L'Orignal, Ottawa, Pembroke, Perth. Midland: Belleville, Brockville, Kingston, Napanee, Picton. Victoria: Brampton, Cobourg, Lindsay, Peterboro', Whitby. Brock: Goderich, Owen Sound, Stratford, Walkerton, Woodstock. Niagara: Cayuga, Hamilton, Milton, St. Catharines, Welland. Waterloo: Barrie, Berlin, Brantford, Guelph, Simcoe. Western: Chatham, London, Sandwich, Sarnia, St. Thomas. Home: Toronto.

The Courts in each Circuit shall be presided over by one of the Chief Justices or Judges of the Superior Courts, or of the Courts of Appeal or Chancery, or, in their absence, by a Judge of a County Court, or some one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by any one of the Chief Justices or Judges of the Superior Courts to act in that behalf.

#### THE LAW SOCIETY OF UPPER CANADA.

The Law Society of Upper Canada was established by Act 37 Geo. III., Cap. 13 (1797),† which empowered the then Practitioners of the Law to form themselves into a Society, "for the purpose of securing to "the country and the profession a learned and honourable body, to "assist their fellow subjects as occasion may require, and to support and "maintain the Constitution of the Province." By the Act Geo. IV., Cap. 5 (1822.) "The Treasurer and Benchers of the Law Society" were formally incorporated; and under these and other statutes the

Society has continued to be governed by a Board of Benchers in the same manner as the various Law Societies of England. By the Act 34 Vic. Cap. 15 (1870) the Benchers theretofore appointed from time to time by their own body, are made, exclusive of ex officio members, elective by the Bar, the ex officio consisting of the Attorney-General of Canada for the time being, and every person who has held that office, if a member of the Bar of Ontario, and of the Attorney-General for the time being, and all members of the Bar of Ontario, who have at any time held the office of Attorney or Solicitor-General of the former Province of Upper Canada, and any retired Judge of the Superior Courts of Law or Equity of Ontario; the elective, thirty in number, being chosen by ballot, for a term of five years, by the members of the Bar, in manner prescribed by the Act. Vacancies during the term to be filled by the remaining Benchers. The Judges of the Superior Courts are Visitors of the Society, and on the first Saturday of Easter Term, annually, the Benchers appoint one of their body to be Treasurer, who is also President of the Society. The Benchers sit in convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the admission of Attorneys and Solicitors to practice, and of Students to enter the Society, the fees paid by whom form the revenue of the Society. "Osgoode Hall" appropriately named after the first Chief Justice, is the Ontario "Inn of Court," or head-quarters of the Society, in which is provided accommodation for the Courts of Equity, and for the sittings in term of the Superior Courts; with a valuable and extensive library.

- 3. To grant or refuse, after examination, all certificates of qualification and admission required by applicants for admission, either as students or notaries, and to take full cognizance thereof;
  - 4. To summon before it, when necessary, any notary within its jurisdiction;
- 5. To alter from time to time, if it thinks proper, its quorum for the despatch of routine business, but such quorum shall not be less than five members present; and whenever any decision is required to be taken on any matter brought before the board, the quorum shall consist of twelve members present for the despatch of business, and eight for the examination of candidates for admission to the study or practice of the profession.
- 6. According to the gravity of the offence, and according to the provisions of this Act, to punish by itself or through the action of the commission of accusations, any notary within its jurisdiction, by the imposition of all or any of the disciplinary penalties defined and enumerated in section 177 of the Act, and of the several fines prescribed by the Act in the various sections thereof.
- 7. To make such by-laws and orders as from time to time are found requisite for the administration and regulation of all matters under its control, and for the due execution of this Act.

The law is the English law—statutory and otherwise as it existed in 1858—so far as it may not be inapplicable, or altered by Dominion or Provincial Legislation. The practice is according to the Common Law Procedure Acts, and the Rules of the above-mentioned Courts, modified to suit the country.

The terms of the Supreme Court are—Hilary, from 15th to 25th February; Easter, from 15th to 25th April; Michaelmas, from 15th to 25th November, with power of extension in case of press of business.

The Assizes and Nisi Prius are held throughout the mainland during the intervening months between April and November; on the Island of Vancouver, at Victoria and Nanaimo, in Spring and Autumn; and at such other times as the local government may deem proper by proclamation to order.

The Supreme Court is constituted on the English model—governed by similar practices—and the costumes of the judges, barristers, and officers of the court, the same as in England.

<sup>\*</sup> The jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, established in British Columbia in 1858, embraces the jurisdiction of the Queen's Bench, both civil and criminal; of the Courts of Chancery; of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes; of Probate; Administration of the Estates of Intestates; and of the Exchequer and Revenue cases, except so far as the latter may have been limited or amended by the late Act of the Dominion Parliament creating the Supreme Court of Canada.

No salary is attached; emoluments by fees; sittings contingent on emergency.

<sup>†</sup> The County Courts are substantially based upon the County Court Acts of England as they existed in 1858, with a civil jurisdiction only to the extent of \$500. They sit monthly, and are governed by the English County Courts Procedure and Forms, amended by local statutes to suit the circumstances of the Province.

#### GOLD COMMISSIONERS' COURTS.

The Gold Commissioners' Courts in the more settled districts are merged into the County Courts, but when not so merged, the Gold Commissioners and Justices of the Peace hold local courts, and have jurisdiction and powers pointed out and regulated by local statutes.

In the far remote districts of Kooltenay and Cassiar—800 and 1,200 miles from Victoria—and elsewhere, where there are no County Court Judges—the Judges of the Supreme Court when on circuit, in addition to the Assizes and *Nisi Prius*—by authority of special local legislation—hold County Courts and dispose of county court cases.

# PART II.

# BIOGRAPHICAL DATA

RESPECTING THE CHIEF JUSTICE AND JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF CANADA, AND OF THOSE OF THE VARIOUS PROVINCIAL AND COUNTY COURTS OF THE SEVERAL PROVINCES OF THE DOMINION, ARRANGED IN ALPHABETICAL ORDER.

ALLEN, Hon. JOHN CAMPBELL, Chief Fustice of New Brunswick. Son of the late John Allen, Esq., formerly a captain in the New Brunswick Fencibles, a corps raised during the war of 1812, subsequently Inspecting Field Officer of the Militia of New Brunswick, and from 1809 to 1847 one of the representatives of York in the New Brunswick Assembly; and grandson of Hon. Isaac Allen, a loyalist, who practised law at Trenton, in New Jersey, but who, adhering to the Royal cause at the breaking out of the American Revolution, was appointed to the command of a regiment called "The New Jersey Volunteers," and served until the end of the war, when he removed to Nova Scotia, thence to New Brunswick, and in 1784 was appointed a Judge of the Supreme Court of that Province. Born at Kingsclear, York, N.B., 1 Oct., 1817; educated at Fredericton Grammar School; married Margaret, daughter of late Charles Drury, Esq., of St. John, N.B., formerly a captain in 29th Regiment of Foot. Called to the Bar Michaelmas Term, 1840; elected a Bencher of the Barristers' Society, 1851; declined a Q.C., 1860; was for some years Registrar and Clerk to the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes, and also Reporter to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick; was Solicitor-General of New Brunswick from May, 1856, until May, 1857, when the Government resigned, having been defeated at the

general election; Speaker of the New Brunswick Assembly, from 1862 until the dissolution in 1865; and Attorney-General (in Mr. A. J. Smith's Administration) from April until 21 Sept., 1865, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court; appointed Chief Justice of New Brunswick (succeeding Hon. J. W. Ritchie), 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$4,999.92.) Sat for York in New Brunswick Assembly from 1856 until raised to the Bench. As a public man was opposed to the Prohibitory Liquor Law and to the Confederation of the British North American Provinces. Since his appointment Chief Justice Allen has tried many important causes, the most notable of which was the case of John A. Munroe, in 1869, for the murder of Sarah Margaret Vail, whom he had seduced. The trial occupied ten days and excited great interest, as the prisoner was in a respectable position in life, and was generally supposed to bear a good character. The murder was not discovered till nearly a year after its commission, as it was supposed the young woman had gone to the States. The skeletons of the woman and her infant (he murdered the child also) were discovered by some children who were picking berries, and the remains were identified chiefly by portions of the clothing which the woman and child were proved to have worn when last seen. The evidence against the prisoner was almost entirely circumstantial, and the case, on that account, was a very interesting one. The evidence was very conclusive, and the prisoner was convicted and executed. He confessed his guilt. The prosecution was conducted by Attorney-General Wetmore, now one of the Judges of the Supreme Court of N.B. In 1875 he tried a number of persons for a riot at Carraquet, caused by resistance to the enforcement of the Common Schools Act. Carraquet is a parish in the county of Gloucester, and the rioters were French people. They were convicted. He also tried a Frenchman named Chasson, who was indicted, with ten others, for the murder of one Gifford, who was acting in aid of the sheriff's officers in arresting the Carraquet rioters (mentioned above). He was convicted. but the judgment was arrested by the Supreme Court on a case reserved. These cases caused a great deal of excitement in the county of Gloucester, where nearly the whole Roman Catholic population were violently opposed to the School Law, and were determined to resist its enforcement. The murder trial lasted upwards of a month. Every juror was challenged by the prisoner, and the trial of the challenges and the arguments of counsel upon the various questions arising out of them occupied upwards of a month. It was the most lengthy criminal trial that has ever taken place in the Province.—Fredericton.

ALLEY, GEORGE, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Queen's, P.E.I. Son of Thomas Alley, Esq., architect, of Charlottetown, P.E.I. Born there, 22 Jan., 1844; educated at the Central Academy; married Mary Trew, third daughter of late Mr. Henry Blatch, of Charlottetown. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1865. Was in partnership, from 1868 until his appointment to the Bench, 18 July, 1874, with Mr. (now Hon.) L. H. Davies, Attorney-General and Premier. (Salary \$2,199.96.)\*—Charlottetown.

ARDAGH, JOHN ANDERSON, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Simcoe, Ont. Only surviving son of the late Rev. S. B. Ardagh, A.M. (T.C.D.), Rector of Barrie. Born at Waterford, Ireland, 18 Sept., 1835; educated at the Grammar School, Barrie; took degree of B.A. at University of Trinity College, Toronto; married Oct., 1857 Annie M., third daughter of late Edward A. Walker, Esq. Called to the Bar, U.C., Easter Term, 1861, and practised at Morrisburg in partnership with the Messrs. Vankoughnet, and subsequently, at Barrie, with his cousin, Mr. Wm. D. Ardagh. Appointed Deputy Judge for Simcoe 15 Nov., 1869; and Junior Judge 29 Oct., 1872. (Salary \$2,200.)—Barrie.

ARMOUR, Hon. JOHN DOUGLAS, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Ontario. Son of late Rev. Samuel Armour, for many years Rector of Cavan, Northumberland, Ont. Born at Peterborough, Ont. Married. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1853. Created a Q.C., 1867. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871. Appointed County Crown Attorney for Northumberland and Durham, 27 March, 1858; Clerk of the Peace for same Counties, 11 May, 1861. Elected a member of the Senate of the University of Toronto, 8 Jan., 1859. Appointed to the Bench, 30 Nov., 1877. (Salary \$4,999.92.)—Cobourg.

Begbie, Sir Matthew Baillie, Knight, Chief Justice of British Columbia. Eldest son of late Col. Thos. Stirling Begbie, of the 44th and 82nd Regiments, and of North Heath, near Newbury, Berks, Eng. Born, 1819; educated at Elizabeth College, Guernsey, and at St. Peter's College, Cambridge, where he took his degree of B.A. in 1841, as a Wrangler, and became a Fellow of his College in 1844; unmarried. Called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn, 1844; appointed to be a Judge in British Columbia, 2 Sept., 1858; to be Judge of the Vice-Admiralty Court for British Columbia, 18 Dec., 1858; to be Administrator of the Government during the absence, &c., of the Lieut.-Governor, 1 Jan.,

Pelletier, Q.C., and Joseph Papin, then in partnership; and was called to the Bar 1852. Practised in Montreal until appointed to the Bench, 22 Sept., 1873. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—Beauharnois.

BÉTOURNAY, Hon. LOUIS, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Manitoba. Son of Pierre Bétournay, by A. Vincent. Born at St. Lambert, Chambly, P.Q., 13 Nov., 1825; educated at the College of Montreal; married, March, 1859, Mdlle. Marie Mercille. Studied law with late Hon. Justice Beaudry, and was called to the Bar of Lower Canada, 1849; to that of Manitoba, 1872. Created a Q.C., 1872. Was for some years a member of the well-known firm of Cartier, Pominville and Bétournay, of which the late Sir G. E. Cartier was the principal partner. Appointed to the Bench, 31 Oct., 1872. (Salary \$3,999.)—"Villa St. Lambert," near Winnipeg.

BLAKE, Hon. SAMUEL HUME, Vice-Chancellor of the Court of Chancery of Ontario. Second son of the late Hon. William Hume Blake, for many years Chancellor for Upper Canada, by Catharine Hume, grand-daughter of William Hume of Humewood, Esq., M.P. for Wicklow in the British House of Commons. Born in the City of Toronto, Sept., 1835; educated at Upper Canada College and at the University of Toronto, where he took the degree of B.A., in 1858; married, 1859, the third daughter of the late Rt. Rev. B. Cronyn, Lord Bishop of Huron. Studied law with his uncle, the late Dr. Skeffington Connor, subsequently a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, was called to the Bar of Upper Canada, Hilary Term, 1860, and was from that time until his elevation to the Bench, a partner of his brother, Hon. Edward Blake, Q.C., M.P., late Minister of Justice. Created a Q.C., 1872; appointed Vice-Chancellor of Ontario, 2 Dec., 1872. (Salary \$4,999.92.)—87 Pembroke Street North, Toronto.

BLANCHARD, GEORGE AUGUSTUS, Fudge of the County Court of District No. Four, comprising the Counties of Kings, Hants and Colchester, N.S. Son of the late Edward S. Blanchard, Esq., a loyalist refugee of Truro. Born there, 6 Sept., 1811; educated at the Pictou Academy, under

the well-known Dr. McCulloch; married Jane, daughter of Rev. James Robson, of Pictou. Studied law partly with his cousin the late Jotham Blanchard, Esq., M.P., and partly with Hon. J. W. Johnston, afterwards Judge in Equity, and was called to the Bar, 1839. Commenced practice at Antigonish, where he remained until 1847, when he removed to Halifax, and entered into partnership with the present Judge James; was elected Recorder of Halifax twice successively, and as such conducted the legal business of the city. Appointed Judge of Probate, of Kings County, 26 Augt., 1854, when he removed to Kentville, where he continued to practice until his appointment to his present office, 21 Augt., 1876. (Salary \$1,898.35.)—Kentville.

Bossé, Hon. Joseph Noel, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of Capt. Joseph Bossé, of Cap St. Ignace, P.Q., by Marie Louise Blais. Born at Cap St. Ignace, 25 Dec., 1806; educated in Quebec; married Miss Borne; studied with late Andre R. Hamel, Esq., of Quebec, and was called to the Bar, 1833. Created a Q.C., 1867. Sat in Legislative Council of Canada for De La Durantaye division, from 1862 until the Union, when called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, with rank and precedence next after Hon. S. C. Monk, 18 Jan., 1868. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—52 St. Louis St., Quebec.

Boswell, George Mcrss Jukes, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Northumberland, Ont. Son of John Boswell, Esq., Attorney and Solicitor, of London, England, who came to Canada in 1822, and in 1825 was called to the Bar of Upper Canada. Born at Gosport, England, 1804; educated at the Grammar School, Buntingford, Hertfordshire, England; married, 1st, Susannah, daughter of James Radcliffe, Esq., (she died), 2ndly, Mary, daughter of Rev. Thomas W. Wrench, Rector of St. Michael's Church, Cornhill, London, England. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1827; created a Q.C. 28 August, 1841, and is now the senior Queen's Counsel in the Province. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1843. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Northumberland in Upper Canada Assembly at the general election, 1836. Sat for the same seat in Canadian Assembly from 1841 to 1844, when he retired. When in Parliament he was a staunch advocate of Responsible Government, and although Conservative in principle, worked with the Reform party until Constitutional Government was conceded. As a lawyer was specially retained to defend Hunter, Morrison and Montgomery, tried for high treason connected with the Rebellion of 1837, and

as leading counsel succeeded in obtaining the acquittal of the two former persons. Appointed Commissioner of Bankruptcy in 1844; Judge of the District Court for the District of Newcastle, 30 May, 1845; and Judge of the Surrogate Court 4 April, 1855. (Salary \$2,799.96.)— Cobourg.

Botsford, Hon. Bliss, Judge of the County Court of the Counties of Albert, Westmoreland and Kent, New Brunswick. Seventh son of the late Hon. William Botsford, a Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. Born at Sackville, New Brunswick, 26 Nov., 1813; educated at King's College, Fredericton; studied law with the late William End, Esq., of Bathurst, and was called to the Bar, 1838; appointed Surveyor-General, 1863; was a member of Executive Council during the Administration of Hon. A. J. Smith, 1865; and Speaker of the New Brunswick Assembly from 1867 until the general election, 1870. Sat for Westmoreland in the New Brunswick Assembly from 1851 to 1854, when defeated, and from 1862 until 24 Oct., 1870, when appointed to his present office. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Moneton.

Bourgeois, Hon. Jean Baptiste, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. François Bourgeois, by Scholastique Coté. Born at St. Hyacinthe, P.Q., 19 May, 1835; educated at St. Hyacinthe College; married Miss Frances Gibson. Pursued his law studies with Hon. M. Laframboise, and was called to the Bar, 1858; an unsuccessful candidate for Bagot, in House of Commons at general election, 1874. Appointed to the Bench, vice Hon. A. Lafontaine resigned, 1 June, 1876. —(Salary \$3,999.96), Aylmer, P.Q.

BOYD, JOHN, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of York, Ont. Called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1851; appointed Junior Judge of York and Peel, 14 Dec., 1859; Junior Judge of York, 1 Jan., 1867. (Salary \$2,199.96.)—22 Anne Street, Toronto.

Burnham, Zaccheus, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Ontario, Ont. A member of a well-known U.E. family, of which the late Hon. Zaccheus, and late Hon. Asa A., Burnham were members. Born at Peterborough, Ont.; educated there; married Oct., 1848, Sarah, eldest daughter of John B. Warren, Esq., of Oshawa. Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1845; appointed Junior Judge of York, Ontario and Peel, 22 Nov., 1852; Judge of Ontario, 27 Dec., 1853. (Salary \$2,799.96.)—Whithy.

Burrowes, James Joseph, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Frontenac. Born in Ireland; educated there; unmarried. Called to the Bar of Upper Canada, 1844; elected a Bencher of the Law Society; appointed Judge of Frontenac, Lennox and Addington, 1 Feb, 1853;

Clerk of the Peace for the same Counties, 7 Sept., 1861; Judge of Lennox and Addington, 30 Sept., 1864; and Judge for Frontenac, 28 May, 1869. (Salary \$2,600.)—Kingston.

Burton, Hon. George William, a Judge of the Court of Appeal, Ont. Second son of the late Admiral George Guy Burton, R.N. Born at Sandwich, Kent, England, 21 July, 1818; educated at the Rochester and Chatham Proprietary School, under Rev. Robert Whiston; married June, 1850, Elizabeth, eldest daughter of late Dr. F. Perkins, of St. Ann's Bay, Island of Jamaica. Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1842; created a Q.C., 1863; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 18, and again under the new system, 1871. Commenced practice of his profession in City of Hamilton, where he was for a time in partnership with Mr. Sad lier, and subsequently with Messrs. Bruce and Walker; appointed to his present position 30 May, 1874, and in 1875, on the elevation of Mr. Justice Strong to the Supreme Court, became the Senior Justice of the Court of Appeal in his place. (Salary \$4,999.92.)—"Oak Lodge," Toronto; Toronto Club.

CAMPBELL, Hon. STEWART, Q.C., Judge of the County Courts of District No. Six, comprising the Counties of Inverness, Antigonish and Guysborough, N.S. Son of the late John Campbell, Esq., of the Island of Jamaica, who sat in the House of Assembly of that Island for many years, and was a distinguished Militia General Officer during the rebellion in Jamaica in 1832; and grandson (maternally) of the late James Stewart, Esq., of Stewart Castle, Trelawney, Jamaica, who was for many years a member of the Jamaica Legislature, and an Assistant Judge of the Supe rior Court in that Colony. Born in Jamaica, 5 May, 1812; educated in England; married, 1837, Georgina Mackintosh, daughter of the late Matthew Richardson, Esq., of Halifax, N.S. Studied law with the present Chief Justice of N.S., Sir William Young, and was called to the Bar 1835; created a Q.C., 1860; held for some years the offices of Surrogate to the Court of Vice-Admiralty, and Judge of Probates for Guysborough. Was from 1863 to 1865 a Commissioner with Messrs. Blanchard and Harrington, to revise and consolidate the Statutes of Nova Scotia. Was Speaker of the House of Assembly, N.S., from 1854 to 1860, having been thrice elected to that office. Sat for Guysborough in N.S. Assembly from 1851 until the Union, when returned for the same seat to House of Commons by acclamation, where he continued to sit until general election, 1874, when defeated; appointed to the present office, 21 Augt., 1876. (Salary \$1,898.35.) — Guysborough.

CARON, Hon. LOUIS BONAVENTURE, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. Bonaventure Caron, of L'Islet, P.Q. Born at L'Islet, 16 Nov., 1828; educated at the Colleges of Ste. Anne, Nicolet, and St. Hyacinthe; married, 6 June, 1866, Herminie, eldest daughter of E. L. Pacaud, Esq., of Arthabaskaville. Called to the Bar, 1855. Was returned for L'Islet to Canadian Assembly at the general election, 1857, but unseated on petition; an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at the general election, 1861, but returned at the general election, 1863, and represented the County from that time until the Union of 1867, when he was defeated for the House of Commons. Appointed to the Bench, 4 Nov., 1874. (Salary \$4,274.12.)—53 St. Louis Street, Quebec.

CASAULT, Hon. Louis Edelmar Napoléon, LL.D., a Puisne Fudge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Descended from an old French family, now almost extinct, originally from Granville in Normandy. of Louis Casault, Esq., of St. Thomas, P.Q., two of whose sons, in addition to the Judge, rose to distinction, viz., the late Very Rev. L. J. Casault, founder of Laval University, and the late Lieutenant-Colonel Casault, C.M.G., formerly of the French army, then of H. M. 100th Regiment, and at the time of his death Assistant Adjutant-General of Militia at Quebec. Born at St. Thomas, 10 July, 1823; educated at the Seminary of Quebec; married, 7 July, 1870, Elmire Jane, eldest daughter of the late Hon. John Pangman, Seignior of Lachenaye, near Montreal; studied law with Messrs. Lelièvre & Angers; was called to the Bar, 1847, and soon afterwards entered into partnership with Jean Langlois, Esq., Q.C., M.P., the firm subsequently taking in M. Auguste Réal (now Hon. ex-Attorney-General) Angers, and the late J. G. Colston, Esq., Q.C., LL.D. Created a Q.C., 1867; has been Professor of Commercial and Maritime Law in Laval University (from which he obtained the degree of I.L.D., 1865), since 1858. Sat for Montmagny in the Canadian Assembly from 1854 to 1857, when he retired, and for Bellechasse, in the House of Commons, from 1867 until elevated to the Bench (with residence at Kamouraska) 27 May, 1870; transferred to Quebec, 1873. (Salary, \$5,000.) While at the Bar was counsel for the Province of Quebec in the arbitration for the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities, &c., of Upper and Lower Canada. The most notable case that has come before him as a Judge is the Bonaventure local election case, 1876, in which both the petitioner and sitting member were unseated and disqualified.—"Londésir," De Salaberry St., Quebec.

CHADWICK, AUSTIN COOPER, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Wellington, Ont. Son of Mr. John Craven Chadwick, now of Guelph, and formerly of Tipperary, Ireland. Born in Township of Ancaster, Ont., 18 Nov., 1842; educated at Guelph Grammar School, and at Clapham, England; married Caroline, second daughter of R. C. Nicholson, Esq., of Toronto. Called to the Bar, Upper Canada, Easter Term, 1864, and, was, for a time a partner of Mr. Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., M.P.P., and subsequently of Mr. D. Mitchell McDonald; appointed to his present office, 10 Jan., 1873. (Salary \$2,199 96.)—"The Bungalow," Guelph; Guelph Club.

CHAGNON, Hon. HUBERT WILFRID, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. G. Chagnon, by Justine Brousseau dit Lafleur. Born at Verchères, P.Q., 22 March, 1833; educated at St. Sulpice College, Montreal; married, Jan., 1858, Marie Elizabeth, daughter of Jean B. Varin, Esq., Cadastre Commissioner for Laprairie. Studied law with the late Messrs. Jos. Ferreol Pelletier, Q.C., and Joseph Papin, then in partnership, and was called to the Bar, 1855; commenced practice at St. Hyacinthe in 1856, in partnership with the present Judge Papineau, and was subsequently the partner of the present Judge Sicotte; appointed to the Bench, 22 Sept., 1873. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—St. Johns.

CLARKE, GEORGE MCKENZIE, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham, Ont. Eldest son of Charles Clarke, Esq., of Bowmanville, Ont. Born at Cobourg, Ont.; educated there; married Eliza, eldest daughter of the late William Weller, Esq. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1850; appointed to his present position 28 July, 1857. (Salary \$2,199.96.)—Cobourg.

COURSOL, MICHEL JOSEPH CHARLES, Q.C., Fudge of the Sessions of the Peace at Montreal. Son of the late M. Michel Coursol, an officer in the Hudson Bay Company, by Marie Mélanie, daughter of M. Joseph Quesnel, the well-known Canadian poet and dramatist. Born at Amherstburg, Ont., 3 Oct., 1819; educated at the Montreal College; married the daughter of the late Hon. Sir Etienne Taché, who was on two occasions Prime Minister of Canada. Studied law with C. S. Cherrier, Esq. Q.C., who subsequently became his step-father, and was called to the Bar, 1841; created a Q.C., 1873; appointed Joint Coroner for the District of Montreal, 30 June, 1848; Inspector and Superintendent of Police for City of Montreal, 2 Feb., 1856; Judge of the Sessions of the Peace for Montreal, 1870; a Commissioner under 31 Vic., cap. 94, 23 Nov., 1869; and Com-

missioner of Police for the Dominion, same date. Was a Commissioner appointed to enquire into the state of the Montreal Registry Office, 23 April, 1850; and has held the office of Mayor of Montreal. Created a Knight of the Order of Charles III. of Spain, 1872.—" Souvenir," Dorchester Street West, Montreal.

CREASE, Hon. HENRY PERING PELLEW, a Fudge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia. Born in England, 1825; graduated at Clare Hall, Cambridge as B.A., 1847; married the daughter of the late Dr. John Lindley, Ph.D., F.R.S., Professor of Botany at University College, London, and sister of Hon. Sir Nathaniel Lindley, one of the Judges of the High Court of Justice of England. Called to the Bar of the Middle Temple, June, 1849. Called to the Bar of British Columbia, 1858. Was Attorney-General of British Columbia from 14 Oct., 1861, to 13 May, 1870, when appointed a Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia. (Salary \$4,849.92.) Appointed a Commissioner (with Messrs. Phillippo and Alston) for compiling and printing a new edition of the laws of British Columbia, 27 April, 1871; appointed a Commissioner (with Chief Justice Begbie and Mr. Justice Gray) to inquire into the Texada Island matter, 13 March, 1874; appointed a Commissioner (with Messrs. Elliott and McCreight) to consolidate the Public General Statutes of British Columbia, 15 May, 1877.—Fort Street, Victoria.

CROSS, Hon. ALEXANDER, a Puisne Fudge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Youngest son of the late Robert Cross, Esq., formerly ly of the parish of Old Monklands, Lanarkshire, Scotland, and latterly of Montreal. Born in Scotland, 1821; educated at , in the Eastern Townships—where his mother, on the death of his father, had gone to live—and at the Seminary of Montreal; married, July, 1851, Julia, second daughter of William Lunn, Esq. Studied law with Hon. C. D. Day, Q.C. Was called to the Bar 1843, and soon after became the partner of the late Duncan Fisher, Esq., O.C. On the death of that gentleman he became associated in business with the late Hon. James Smith, Attorney-General, and later on with C. P. Davidson, Esq., Q.C. While yet a student, was Clerk to the Municipality of Beauharnois, then comprising the present Counties of Beauharnois, Chateauguay, Huntingdon, and a portion of Napierville. Declined the Attorney-Generalship of Quebec, September, 1874. Appointed to his present office, 30 August, 1877. (Salary, \$4,999.95.)-" Amelia Lodge," 151 Côte des Neiges Hill, Montreal.

Daniell, James, Judge of the County Court of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell, Ont. Son of the late Mr. Stannous Daniell, of Toronto. Born in County Monaghan, Ireland. Came to Canada when young. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1848, and practised for some years in London, Ont. Appointed a Commissioner to enquire into fitness, &c., of the President of University College, Toronto, 27 Dec., 1855; Judge of Prescott and Russell, 5 January, 1863. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—L'Orignal.

Dartnell, George Henry Frewen, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Ontario, Ont. Son of Edward Taylor Dartnell, Esq., (formerly of Limerick, Ireland), County Attorney and Clerk of the Peace for the United Counties of Prescott and Russell, by Catherine Coote Flemyng, of Dublin, Ireland. Born in the City of Limerick, 14 Feb., 1834; Educated at King College School, London, Eng.; married, 1st, Maria Louisa, daughter of A. B. Hawke, Esq., of Toronto, for thirty years Chief Emigrant Agent for Upper Canada (she died); 2ndly, Caroline, daughter of G. C. Gross, Esq., of Whitby, Ont. Studied law, first, with the present Chief Justice Hagerty, and subsequently with the late Hon. J. H. Cameron, Q.C., and with Mr. Christopher Robinson, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1858. Became a partner of the late Mr. H. J. Macdonnell, Clerk of the Peace for Ontario; appointed Master in Chancery at Whitby, Dec., 1858; and to present office, 11 Oct., 1873. (Salary \$2,199 96.)—Byron St., Whitby; National Club.

DAVIS, JOSEPH FREDERICK, Q.C., Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Middlesex, Ont. Born in Cork, Ireland, 1827. Came to Canada, 1834; educated at Belleville; married Miss Laura Charlotte Adams, of Sarnia. Studied law with late Hon. John Ross, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1852; created a Q.C., 1876; was for many years Solicitor to the County of Lambton. Appointed, 1875, by the Dominion Government, in conjunction with Mr. J. W. Manning, a Commissioner to enquire into the working of the Prohibitory Laws of the United States (See Report, 1875). In 1866, during the Fenian Raids, raised the 1st Volunteer Company of Lambton; in 1868 was gazetted Lieut.-Colonel of 37th Battalion, of which his old company formed part. Appointed County Attorney of Lambton, 6 March, 1858; appointed Junior Judge of Middlesex, 9 June, 1876. (Salary, \$2,200.46.)—London.

Deacon, John, Judge of the County Court of the County of Renfrew, Ont. Eldest Son of John Deacon, Esq., a native of Kilkenny, Ireland,

who came to Canada, 1816, and for many years carried on lumbering operations in County Lanark, Ont., by Mary Harper. Born near Perth, Ont., I Jan., 1823. Educated at Perth. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1849, and practised in Perth from that time up to his appointment to his present office, at which time he was senior partner in the firm of Deacon & Morris, the junior partner being the late Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba. Was Mayor of Perth. Appointed Judge of Renfrew, 27 Aug., 1866. (Salary \$2,600.)—Pembroke.

DEAN, WILLIAM WARREN, Judge of the County Court of the County of Victoria, Ont. Son of Rev. Horace Dean, a Wesleyan Methodst clergyman. Born in Canada. Educated at Victoria University, where he took degree of B.A.; married Miss Bogart, of Napanee; studied law with Hon. L. Wallbridge, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1859. Appointed to his present office, 9 September, 1874. (Salary \$2,199,96.)—Lindsay.

Dennistoun, Robert, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Peterborough, Ont. Fourth son of James Dennistoun, Esq., of Dennistoun-Colgrain and Camis Eskan, by Mary Ramsay Oswald, of Auchencruive and Scotstoun. Born at Camis Eskan, Dunbartonshire, Scotland, 1815; educated by private tuition; married 1839, Maxwell, daughter of Major Hamilton, of the 79th Highlanders. Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1849; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1864; created a Queen's Counsel, 1869; commenced practice in Peterborough in 1849, and was for some years in partnership with his son, Mr. J. F. Dennistoun, at Peterborough and Lindsay. Appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the 5th Battalion Peterborough Militia, 1857, and Judge of the County Court, 9 July, 1868. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—"Inverlea," Peterborough.

DES BARRES, Hon. WILLIAM FREDERICK, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Descended from Joseph Frederick Willet Des Barres, a well known military officer and hydrographer, who served under Wolfe at Louisbourg and Quebec, and was subsequently in succession Lieutenant-Governor of Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island. Born, 1800; educated in Nova Scotia; married Miss Cutler; studied law in Halifax; was called to the Bar, 1822, and practised at Guysborough up to his appointment to the Bench, 14 Nov., 1848. (Salary \$3,999.96.) Represented Guysborough in the Nova Scotia Assembly, and was Solicitor-General in Mr. Howe's Administration.—
Halifax.

DES BRISAY, Hon. MATHER BYLES, Q.C., Judge of the County Courts

of District No. Two, comprising the Counties of Lunenburg, Queens and Shelburne, N.S. Descended from a Huguenot family, of which the first who came to America was Thomas des Brisay, Lieutenant-Governor of St. John's (now P.E.I.). Son of Thomas Belcher Des Brisay, M.D., late of Dartmouth, N.S., by Lucretia, daughter of Jesse Woodward, Esq., of Halifax; and grandson of Thomas Des Brisay, captain Royal Artillery. Born at Chester, Lunenburg, N.S., 19 March, 1828; educated in Dartmouth and Halifax; married, in Sept., 1876, Ada A., eldest daughter of John Harley, Esq., late Collector of Customs at Bridgewater, N.S.; studied law in Halifax, and was called to the Bar, April, 1851. Was Secretary to first Provincial Industrial and Agricultural Exhibition, held in Halifax, 1854, and a Commissioner (with others) for the consolidation of the Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1876. Immigration Agent for Nova Scotia from 1872 until 21 August, 1876, when appointed to his present office. (Salary \$2,000.) Sat for Lunenburg in Nova Scotia Assembly from 1867 until his elevation to the Bench, and was Speaker of the Assembly from 3 May, 1875, until he retired as above. While a member of the Assembly introduced and carried the Free Grant and Homestead Law, and the Act relating to Road and Bridge service, the appointment of supervisors, &c. He also introduced a bill to effect reform in the disposal of the Crown Lands, by preventing speculation, and reserving them for actual settlement, on easy terms, which was passed in the Assembly but rejected by the Council.—Bridgewater.

DOHERTY, Hon. MARCUS, A.M., a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of late Thos. Doherty and Bridget McClosky. Born at Dungiven, County Derry, Ireland, 1820; educated at the Dungiven Grammar School, at St. Hyacinthe College, and at the University of Vermont, where he took degrees of A.B. and A.M. Studied law with R. S. M. Bouchette, Esq., and was called to the Bar, 1848; created a Q.C., 1872; was a Commissioner with the late Mr. Lafrenaye, in 1863, to enquire into certain charges preferred against the then Clerk of the Crown, Montreal; and was subsequently Batonnier of the Montreal section of the Bar of Quebec. Appointed to the Bench, 22 Sept, 1873. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—Sherbrooke.

DORION, Hon. Sir Antoine Aime, Knight, Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Son of the late Pierre Antoine Dorion, Esq., who represented Champlain in the Lower Canada Assembly, from 1830 to 1838, by Geneviève, daughter of the late P. Bureau, Esq., who sat for St. Maurice in the same body, from 1820 to 1834; his

brother, Jean Baptiste Eric Dorion (who died Nov., 1866), sat for a considerable period in the Canada Assembly; another brother, Pierre Néré Dorion, sat in the House of Commons, from general election 1872 until general election 1874; and another brother is now a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec (whom see). Born at Ste. Anne de la Perade, P.Q., 17 Jan., 1818; educated at Nicolet College; married, 1848, the daughter of the late Dr. Trestler, of Montreal, (she died). Called to the Bar, Lower Canada, Jan., 1842; created O.C., 1863. Was leader of the Rouse or French Canadian Liberal party of the Province of Quebec from his entrance into political life until his retirement therefrom. Occupied a distinguished position at the Bar; was Batonnier of the Montreal Bar for some years; and also President of the Bar of the Province of Quebec. Declined a seat in the Canadian Cabinet, 1857. Was a member of the Executive Council, Canada, from 2 to 4 Augt., 1858; from 24 May, 1862 to 27 Jan., 1863; and again from the 16 May, 1863, until the 20 March, 1864, and during those several periods held the offices of Commissioner of Crown Lands, from 2 to 4 Augt., 1858, when the Government of which he was co-leader resigned, not possessing the confidence of Parliament; Provincial Secretary from May, 1862 to Jan., 1863, when he resigned on the Intercolonial Railway question; Attorney General of Lower Canada, and co-leader of the Government (with Hon. J. S. Macdonald as Premier), from May, 1863, to March, 1864, when the Ministry retired from office owing to their not possessing a sufficient majority to enable them to carry on the business of the country. Sworn of the Privy Council, 7 Nov., 1873, and was Minister of Justice of the Dominion from that date until appointed Chief Justice of the Province of Quebec, I June, 1874. (Salary, \$6,000.) Was Administrator of the Government of the Province of Quebec, on the occasion of the last illness and death of Lieutenant-Governor Caron, from 8 Nov. to 15 Dec., 1876. Sat in Canadian Assembly as a member for Montreal, from 1854 until general election, 1861, when defeated, and for Hochelaga, from 1862 until the Union. Represented latter county in House of Commons from the Union until general election, 1872, when returned for Napierville, for which he continued to sit until his elevation to the Bench.—336 Sherbrooke Street, Montreal; St. James' Club; Rideau Club.

DORION, Hon. VINCISLAS PAUL WILFRID, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. The youngest of seven brothers, sons of the late P. A. Dorion, Esq. (See ante notice of Chief Justice Dorion.) Born at

Ste. Anne de la Perade, 2 Oct., 1827; educated there; married Radegonde Olympe, daughter of the late Jean B. C. Trestler, Esq., M.D., of Montreal. Called to the Bar, 1850, and immediately became a partner of C. S. Cherrier, Esq., Q.C., now the "Nestor" of the Bar of the Province, and of his brother, the present Chief Justice, with the latter of whom he remained associated in business as long as the Chief Justice continued at the Bar; was one of the collaborateurs of L'Avenir newspaper, and subsequently co-proprietor of Le Pays; unsuccessfully contested Chambly, for the House of Commons, and Drummond and Arthabaska, for the Quebec Assembly, at the general election of 1867; appointed to the Bench, 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$4,999.92.) As a member of the Bar argued many important causes, both in the Civil and Criminal Courts, the last, and perhaps the most important, being the defence of J. R. Middlemiss, in the well-known suit brought against him by the Quebec Government, to recover certain public property at the Tanneries, Montreal, which suit resulted in the defeat of the action of the Government. Since his elevation to the Bench, has tried a matter of an interesting and important character—the Jacques Cartier Controverted Election case in which it was sought to unseat and disqualify the sitting member, Hon. R. Laflamme, now Minister of Justice, whom Judge Dorion confirmed in his seat, with costs against the petitioner.—Montreal.

Doucet, Pierre Antoine, Judge of the Sessions of the Peace, Quebec. Son of Pierre Doucet, Esq., merchant, of Quebec, by Anne Ranoyzé. Born in the City of Quebec, 15 Feb., 1815; educated there. Married, 1848, Marie Thérèse Delphine, daughter of Hon. Jean C. Bruneau, late a Judge of the Superior Court. Studied law with late J. G. Baird, Esq., and the late Gaspard Drolet, Esq. Was called to the Bar, 1838, and practised in the City of Quebec until appointed Clerk of the Court of Requests at Lotbinière, 13 May, 1839. This Court having been abolished on the 28 Jan., 1842, he was appointed Clerk of the District Court for the Inferior District of Dorchester. He returned to the Bar in 1844, and practised in partnership with the late Auguste Soulard, Esq. Appointed Joint Clerk of the Peace for the District of Quebec (with the late François Xavier Perrault, Esq.,) 20 Nov. 1846. After the death of Mr. Perrault, was appointed Clerk of the Peace and of the Crown, conjointly with the late James Green, Esq., on 31 Dec., 1853, both of whom, by warrant from the War Office, were appointed Commissioners for the enlistment of soldiers. After Mr. Green's decease, was appointed sole Clerk of the Peace and of the Crown on the 19 May,

1858. Appointed Judge of the Sessions of the Peace 19 Sept., 1868, and Commissioner of the Provincial Police, 1870. Is ex-officio one of the members of the Police Board of the City of Quebec, under 26 Vic., cap. 57; created a Knight of the Royal Order of Isabella Catolica, 9 Dec., 1871. Elected a member of the Royal Academy of Jurisprudence and Legislation of Madrid, 1 June, 1876, and on 30th June, 1876, a corresponding member of the Academy, with the rank of Professor.—18 Garneau Street, Quebec.

DUFF, Hon. CHARLES, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. Of Scottish parentage, his father and mother having been natives of Perthshire, Scotland. Born at St. Mary's, County of York, N.B., 3 July, 1817; educated at the St. John Grammar School; unmarried. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1840; created a Q.C., 1860; appointed to the Bench 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—197 Charlotte Street, St. John.

DUNKIN, Hon. CHRISTOPHER, D.C.L., a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Born in England, 1812; educated at the University of London (now University College, London), and at the Universities of Glasgow and Harvard, at which latter he was for a short time Greek tutor; married Mary, daughter of late Dr. Jonathan Barber, afterwards of McGill University, Montreal. Studied law with the late Alexander Buchanan, Esq., O.C., subsequently with Mr. F. G. (now Hon. Justice) Johnson, and was called to the Bar, 1846; created a Q.C., 1867. Practised for some years in partnership with the present Chief Justice Meredith and Mr. Strachan Bethune, Q.C. Edited the Montreal Morning Courier, from May, 1837, to the summer of 1838, when he became Secretary of the Education Commission, under the late Earl of Durham, then Governor-General of British North America. Served under the late Lord Sydenham, when Governor-General: first, in carrying out the work of that Commission, and afterwards as Secretary of the Post Office Commission; and from 1841, as Assistant Secretary for Lower Canada—in which office he remained until May, 1847. Was President of the Shakespeare Club, Montreal. Is a Governor of McGill University, Montreal; a Trustee of St. Francis College, Richmond, P.Q.; and of the South Fastern Counties Junction Railway. Was Lieutenant-Colonel of Volunteer Militia: first of the Montreal Light Infantry, from 1856 to 1859; and from Sept. 1866, to June, 1872 of the 52nd ("Bedford") Battalian of V. I. Was a member of the Executive Council and Treasurer of the Province of Quebec from July, 1867, until sworn of the Privy Council and appointed

Minister of Agriculture, Nov. 1869, in which office he remained until 25 Oct., 1871, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. (Salary, \$4,000). Was an unsuccessful candidate for Drummond in Canadian Assembly in 1844. Sat in that body for Drummond and Arthabaska, from general election 1857 to general election 1861, when defeated, and for Brome from Jan., 1862 until the Union, when returned to Commons and Local House by acclamation, where he remained until his elevation to the Bench,—Knowlton; Rideau Club.

ELLIOTT, WILLIAM, Judge of the County Court of the County of Middlesex, Ont. Born in England. Came to Canada at an early age. Studied law with Messrs. Blake and Morrison, and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1852; appointed to his present office, 5 June, 1869. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—London.

FISHER, Hon. CHARLES, D.C.L., a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. His father, Peter Fisher, a native of New York, removed to New Brunswick after the American Revolution, with other lovalists. Born in Fredericton, N.B., about 1811; educated at the College of New Brunswick, where he graduated B.A., 1830; married, Sept., 1836, Amelia, seventh daughter of the late David Hatfield, Esq., a loyalist from New York. Pursued his law studies with the late Hon. G. F. Street, subsequently a Judge of the Supreme Court of N.B.; and was called to the Bar, 1833; created a O.C., 1855; appointed a Commissioner to consolidate and codify the Statute Law of New Brunswick, and to enquire into the procedure of the Courts of Law and Equity, and into the Law of Evidence, 1852. Was a delegate to the Railway Convention, held at Portland, 1850; to the Conference at Quebec of delegates from the several Provinces of British North America for the purpose of preparing a scheme of Union, since accomplished, 1864; and to the final Conference in London, to secure the passage of the "British North America Act" before the House of Commons, 1866-7. Received the honorary degree of D.C.L. from the University of New Brunswick, 1866. Was a member of the Executive Council of New Brunswick from 1848 (declining at that time to accept of any office of emolument), to 1856, when the Government resigned; was Attorney-General (in his own Administration) from 1857 to 1861, and again, from 1866 until the Union of 1867. Sat for York in New Brunswick Assembly from 1837 to 1850, when he was defeated; from 1854 to 1865, when he a second time lost his election; and from March, 1865 until the Union; and for same County in House of Commons from the Union until 3 Oct., 1868, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of N.B. (Salary \$4,000); appointed Judge of the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes for same Province, 14 October, 1868. As a public man he advocated, and did much to secure, the establishment of Responsible Government in New Brunswick, and he lent his best efforts towards the accomplishment of the Confederation of Canada.—Fredericton.

FOURNIER, Hon. TELESPHORE, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. Son of M. Guillaume Fournier, of Bécancour, P.O. Born at St. François, Riviere du Sud, Montmagny, P.Q., 1824; educated at Nicolet College under the late Abbé Ferland the historian; married, 1857, Miss Demers. Studied law with the late Hon. R. E. (afterwards Judge) Caron, and was called to the Bar of Quebec, 1846. Created a Q.C., 1863. Has been Batonnier of the Quebec Bar, and President of the General Council of the Bar of the Province of Quebec. Was one of the Editors of Le National newspaper (Quebec), published in the interest of the Liberal party, 1856-7-8. Sworn of the Privy Council 7 Nov., 1873, and was Minister of Inland Revenue in Mr. Mackenzie's Administration, from that date until 8 July, 1874, when appointed to succeed Hon. A. A. (now Chief Justice) Dorion as Minister of Justice, in which office he remained until transferred to the Post Office Department, 19 May, 1875. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court, 8 Oct., same year. (Salary, \$7,000). Sat for Bellechasse in House of Commons from August, 1870, until his elevation to the Bench, and represented Montmagny in Quebec Assembly from general election, 1871, until 7 Nov., 1873, when he resigned on his taking office. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Montmagny in Canadian Assembly at general election, 1854, for City of Quebec in same Chamber, at general election, 1857; for "Stadacona" division in Legislative Council in 1861, and for "De la Durantaye" division, in same House, 1864. The Supreme Court Act and the Insolvency Act, 1875, were introduced and carried through Parliament by M. Fournier, as Minister of Justice. -- Corner of Daly and Chapel Streets, Ottawa; Rideau Club.

GALT, Hon. THOMAS, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Ontario. Second son of the late John Galt, Esq., the author of many well-known works of fiction in English literature, who was for some years Commissioner of the Canada Land Company; and a brother of Hon. Sir A. T. Galt, K.C.M.G., late Finance Minister of Canada. Born about 1816; educated in Canada; married Oct., 1847, Frances Louisa, youngest

daughter of James W. Perkins, Esq., R.N. Was for some years in the service of the Canada Land Company. Studied law with the late Chief Justice Draper, and was called to the Bar, Upper Canada, Easter Term, 1845; created a Q.C., 1858; was a chief clerk in the office of the Attorney-General for Upper Canada for some years after the Union of 1840. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1855; appointed to the Bench, vice Hon. John Wilson, deceased, 7 June, 1869. (Salary \$4,999.92.)—83 Pembroke Street South, Toronto; Toronto Club.

GOWAN, JAMES ROBERT, Judge of the County Court of the County of Simcoe, Ont. Only son of the late Henry Hatton Gowan, Esq., who, emigrating from Ireland, settled on a farm in the Township of Albion, and subsequently became Deputy Clerk of the Crown and Pleas for County Simcoe. Born in Ireland, 22 Dec., 1817; educated in Canada; married, 1853, Anna, second daughter of Rev. S. B. Ardagh, M.A., late Rector of Barrie, and Incumbent of Shanty Bay. Studied law with late Hon. James E. Small, subsequently Solicitor-General for Upper Canada, and was called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1839; practised in partnership with Mr. Small in Toronto, from the date of his admission until 17 Jan., 1843, when without solicitation on his part, he was appointed Judge of the District and Surrogate Court of the District of Simcoe, and he was for many years the youngest Judge in the Province. The District Judges were ex-officio Judges of the Division Courts in their Judicial Districts, and in 1853, an Act was passed empowering the Governor to appoint five Judges to frame Rules regulating Procedure in these Courts, and for settling doubtful points, &c., under the Division Court Law. Judge Gowan was appointed on this Board, in association with the late Judge Harrison (an English Barrister), and Judges O'Reilly, Campbell and Malloch. In Oct., 1857, the Judges of the Superior Courts, having been empowered to associate a District Judge with them in making certain provisions as to fees, &c., under the Common Law Procedure Act, selected Judge Gowan for that purpose. The Act assimilating the Canadian law of Probate and Administration to that of England, and providing for Courts in every Judicial District, required the appointment by the Governor of three Judges, viz.: a Judge of one of the Superior Courts of Common Law, a Judge of the Court of Chancery, and a County Judge, to make rules and orders regulating procedure in these Courts, the duties of officers, and generally for carrying the provisions of the law into full effect, and the late Mr. Justice Burns, Vice-Chancellor Spragge and Judge Gowan were the three Judges appointed for the purpose in Augt., 1858, and sub-

sequently framed and settled the orders which now regulate the Courts. The important and difficult work of Consolidating the Public Statutes of the country, involving a classification and the recasting of the whole body of the Statute Law from 1792, upon the report of a previous Commission, was committed to Sir James Macaulay, and at his suggestion Judge Gowan was requested by the Governor-General in 1858, to co-operate and assist in the important work, which he did, and was publicly thanked for his aid, Sir James Macaulay in his published report speaking very warmly of Judge Gowan's assistance. This Consolidation became Law, and it was provided by Statute that the public Acts of the same Session should be incorporated therewith, and the body of Statutes thus Consolidated to the day proclaimed as law. Judge Gowan was again appointed by the Governor-General to assist in this delicate and important work, and his assistance was again handsomely acknowledged. Speaking of the Consolidation, Sir James Macaulay himself wrote: "I feel every confidence that a good work has been achieved and a desirable basis laid for future legislation, and for the able and useful services rendered by Judge Gowan. The Government, the Legislature, and the public as well as myself, are greatly indebted to him." In April, 1862, Special Commissions were issued to Sir James Macaulay and Judge Gowan to hold certain Assizes, they being selected to fill the duty of Chief Justice Draper, then absent in England on important public business on behalf of Canada. In the same year, heavy disputed claims between the Government of Canada and the contractors, for the erection of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa were submitted for adjudication to a tribunal of three, the Government Engineer, and an Engineer named by the contractors being two, it being arranged that some one Upper Canada Judge, whom both sides might agree upon, should be the third. Judge Gowan was the one selected, and the tribunal of which he was chairman by an unanimous finding finally settled the difficult and long pending disputes. In 1869, he was appointed to the position of Chairman of the Board of County Judges, a body which possesses large powers for regulating the procedure of the Division Courts, and for settling conflictory decisions, their orders having the force of law throughout Ontario. In 1871, the Hon. Adam Wilson, Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench; Hon. J. W. Gwynne, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas; Hon. S. H. Strong, Vice-Chancellor; Judge Gowan, and Mr. C. S. (now Judge) Patterson, Q.C., were appointed Commissioners to enquire into the constitution and jurisdiction of the several Courts of Law and Equity, Superior and Inferior, Appellate and Original, and into

the operation and effect of the present separation and division of jurisdiction among the Courts, &c., similar to the English judicature commissions; and on 14 Aug., 1873, the Hon. C. D. Day, a retired Judge; Judge Polette, of the Quebec Bench; and Judge Gowan, were by Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Canada, appointed Royal Commissioners to investigate certain charges against the Ministry, in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway Contract. (See Blue Book). Judge Gowan has been for over 30 years a Trustee of the Grammar and High School in his locality; the chairman of the Board of Public Instruction from its institution; and is now chairman of the High School Board of Trustees. (Salary \$2,799.97.)—"Ardrahen," Barrie.

GRAY, Hon. JOHN HAMILTON, D.C.L., a Judge of the Supreme Court of British Columbia. Descended from an old English family; son of the late Wm. Gray, Esq., for many years H. M.'s Consul in Virginia, U.S.; and grandson of Joseph Gray, a U. E. Loyalist, formerly of Boston, Mass., who settled in Halifax at the termination of the American revolution. (See Sabine's American Loyalists). Born at St. George's, Bermuda, 1814; educated at King's College, Windsor, N.S, where he graduated A.B., 1833; married in Dublin, 1845, the eldest daughter of Lieutenant Colonel Ormond, of H. M.'s 30th Regiment of Foot. Called to the Bar, N.B., 1837; to that of Ontario, 1872; and to that of B.C., same year; created Q.C., 1853; received degree of D.C.L. from University of New Brunswick, 1866; occupied for many years a distinguished position as a member of the Bar of New Brunswick and Nisi Prius counsel; was a member of Executive Council, N.B., from 1851 to 1854, and in May, 1856, was requested to form a Government, which duty he successfully accomplished, holding in if the office of Attorney-General from its formation until it ceased to exist in June, 1857; and he was Speaker of the House of Assembly, from 1866 until the Union. Holds a special patent of rank and precedence from Her Majesty as an Executive Councillor, 1855; was chairman of Commission, composed of himself, Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Dr. Dawson, F. R.S., and Hon. Messrs. Saunders and Brown, of N.B., for enquiring into the affairs of, and popularizing King's College, Fredericton, 1854 (Report and Bill thereon adopted by the Legislature, 1859); umpire between Great Britain and the U.S. under the Treaty of Washington, 1857-8, and received therefor the approval and thanks of H. M.'s Government, through Lord John Russell, then Secretary of Foreign Affairs (See Awards of Hon. 7. H. Gray, Umpire. St. John, 1858); H. M.'s Commissioner, under the Great Seal, to settle

in conjunction with Hon. Messrs. Howe and Ritchie, the tenant right question in P.E.I., 1860; a delegate to Portland Railway Convention, 1850; to Charlottetown Union Conference, 1864; and to that at Ouebec, same year; Chairman of Committee of Supply, House of Commons, 1867-8; Arbitrator for the Dominion under the 142nd section B.N.A. Act, 1867-68; and a Royal Commissioner, with Chief Justice Begbie and Justice Crease, to enquire into Texada Island matter, 13 March, 1874. Author of The Practical Application of Passing Events to the Improvement of our own Country: a lecture (St. John, 1863); the Isthmus of Panama: a sketch (St. John, 1867); An Oration at the Encania of the University of New Brunswick (St. John, 1868), and of Confederation, or the Political and Farliamentary History of Canada, from the Conference at Quebec in October, 1864, to the admission of British Columbia in July, 1871 (Vol. I., Toronto, 1872, pp. 432, 800). Appointed to the Bench in B.C., 2 July, 1872; sat for City and County of St. John in N.B. Assembly from 1850 to 1862, when defeated, from 1863 until 1865, when on dissolution on the Union question, was defeated at the general election with Messrs. Tilley, Fisher, and other supporters of the Union; and from the general election in 1866 on the Union question being again submitted, until the Union in July, 1867, when he was returned to the House of Commons by acclamation, and there sat until his appointment to the Bench, 2 July, 1872. (Salary \$3,999.96.) Among the measures introduced and carried through the N.B. Parliament by Mr. Gray may be mentioned: the consolidation and amendment of the laws regulating letters patent; an Act giving committees of the Legislature judicial powers on investigations in relation to public offices and public works; an Act authorizing magisterial investigation in cases of fire without preliminary complaint on oath; an Act enabling parties sustaining damage by the negligence or default of the commissioners of Government railways to maintain an action against the Government. Was a steady advocate of the construction of railways, and of Government aid thereto; and of the Intercolonial Railway, and Union of the Provinces, from his first entrance into public life in 1850. He introduced a measure for enabling parties having claims against Government, either on contract or otherwise, to prosecute the same in the courts of law, which principle, however, was not sustained by the legislature. - Fort Street, Victoria.

GWYNNE, Hon. JOHN WELLINGTON, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, Ont. Son of the late Rev. Dr. Gwynne, of Castle Knock, Dublin, a Minister of the Church of England. Born in Ireland.

Came to Canada, 1832; educated at Trinity College, Dublin; married the daughter of the late Dr. Durie, Staff Surgeon. Studied law with the late Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., Q.C., of Kingston, and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1837; practised for some years in partnership with Messrs. Robert J. Turner and Wm. V. Bacon; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1849; created a Q.C., 1850. An unsuccessful candidate for Huron in Canadian Assembly at general election, 1848, the vote standing: For Cayley, 388; for Gwynne, 320. Appointed to the Bench, succeeding the Hon. Adam Wilson, in the Court of Common Pleas, 12 Nov., 1868. (Salary, \$4,999.99.) A member of the Law Reform Commission, 1871. Appointed a member of the Senate of Toronto University, 26 April, 1873.—20 Gerrard Street, Toronto.

HAGARTY, Hon. JOHN HAWKINS, D.C.L., Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas of Ontario. Son of Matthew Hagarty, Esq., Examiner of the Court of Prerogatives, Ireland. Born in Dublin, 17 Dec., 1816; educated at Trinity College, Dublin. Came to Canada, 1824; married, 9 Sept., 1843, Anne Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Henry Grassett, Esq., M.D., Deputy Inspector of Army Hospitals; studied law with the late George Duggan, Esq., Q.C. Called to the Bar of Upper Canada in Michaelmas Term, 1840, and was associated in business for some years with the late John Crawford, Esq., Q.C., afterwards Lieut.-Governor of Ontario. Created a Q.C., 1850. Was President of St. Patrick's Society, Toronto, 1846, and an Alderman of same city, 1847. Has also been President of the Canadian Institute, Toronto. Was for some time Professor of Law in Trinity College, Toronto, from which institution he received the honorary degree of D.C.L. Author of Thoughts on Law Reform. Was a Puisne Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, from 5 Feb., 1856, until 18 March, 1862, when transferred to the Court of Queen's Bench, where he remained until 12 Nov., 1868, when he was appointed to succeed Sir W. B. Richards as Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas. (Salary, \$6,000).—229 Sincoe Street, Toronto.

HARRISON, Hon. ROBERT ALEXANDER, D.C.L. Eldest son of the late Richard Harrison, Esq., formerly of Skegarvey, Co. Monaghan, Ireland, by Frances Hall, of Newtownbutler, County Fermanagh, Ireland. Born in City of Montreal, 3 August, 1833; educated at Upper Canada College, and at the University of Trinity College, Toronto, at which latter Institution he graduated, 1855, receiving the degree of B. C. L., and afterwards that of D. C. L. Married, 1st, June, 1859, Anna, daughter of the late John McClure Muckle, Esq.,

of Quebec (she died March, 1866); 2ndly, January, 1868, Kennithina Johana McKay, only daughter of the late Hugh Scobie, Esq., editor and proprietor of The British Colonist newspaper, Toronto. Pursued his legal studies in the office of Messrs. Robinson & Allan (the members of which firm were the present Sir James Lukin Robinson, Bart., and Hon. G. W. Allan, Senator), subsequently in the office of Messrs. Crawford & Hagerty (composed of the late Lieutenant-Governor Crawford, and the present Chief Justice of the Common Pleas), and, in Michaelmas Term, 1855, was called to the Bar, "with honours," he being the first so called under the new rules then just in operation, and was warmly congratulated by the late Hon. Robert Baldwin, then Treasurer of the Law Society. Previously to his admission to the Bar-in 1854—was selected on account of his great promise and known fitness for the office of Chief Clerk to the Crown Law Department for Upper Canada, and he served in that position (during the incumbency of the present Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, as Attorney-General, and of the late Sir Henry Smith, as Solicitor-General), from that year up to the fall of 1859, when he retired from the Civil Service, to enter on the active prosecution of a professional career. Created a Q. C., 1867. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871. Practised for some years in partnership with the late James Patterson, Esq., and Thomas Hodgins, Esq., Q. C., M. P., and from 1871 up to 8 October, 1875, when he was appointed to the Bench (as the successor of Sir William Richards as Chief Justice of Ontario), was at the head of the extensive and eminent firm of "Harrison, Osler & Moss," composed of himself, the present Hon. Chief Justice Moss, Mr. Charles Moss, Mr. Featherston Osler, Mr. W. A. Foster, and Mr. W. G. Falconbridge. Wrote largely for the political and legal press, and was, for many years, joint editor of the Upper Canada Law Journal, and on its change of name, after Confederation, of the Canada Law Journal. Author of many important legal works and publications, including: Robinson and Harrison's Digest of cases decided in the Queen's Bench and Practice Courts, from 1823 to 1851 (Toronto, 1852); The Common Law Procedure Act, &c., with notes of decided cases (Toronto, 1858; new edition, 1870); The Municipal Manual for Upper Canada (Toronto, 1859; new edition; 1867, new edition, 1876); A Digest of all cases decided in the several Courts of Error and Appeal, Queen's Bench, &c. (Toronto, 1863). Was an Alderman of the City of Toronto for several years. Was also a Major in the Canadian Militia. Sat for West Toronto in House of Commons from 1867 until the general elec-

tion of 1872, when he declined re-nomination for reasons of a private nature, set forth in a parting address to the electors of the district. Whilst in parliament, held for two sessions, the Chairmanship of the Committee of Miscellaneous and Private Bills. He introduced bills for amending the law as to stamping bills and notes; for extending the law as to carrying deadly weapons; for making provision for the granting of new trials in criminal cases throughout the Dominion; for the collection of criminal statistics, and to abolish the death penalty in cases of rape. The first, third and last became law. While a member of the Bar was retained as Counsel in nearly every important case that arose from 1868 up to 1875, most notably, the prosecution of McHenry alias Townsend, one of the most extraordinary cases of mistaken identity on record, not even excepting the well-known Tichborne case; the Norfolk Shrievalty case, wherein the sale of office by a sheriff was condemned; the Hastings Shrievalty case, wherein the same thing was determined; the Habeas Corpus case of John Anderson, the slave; the "State Trials" of 1858, when the then parliamentary opposition endeavoured in courts of law to break down the Government; the London (Dominion) election case, wherein the respondent was personally disqualified, one of the first cases of the kind in Ontario; the South Huron (Dominion) election case; the Queen vs. Taylor, or the case of the Brewers who disputed the right of the Provincial Legislature to tax them, and other causes too numerous to mention. Appointed arbitrator for Ontario on North Western Boundary Commission, 1876. Since his elevation to the Bench, he in Jan., 1876, tried the rioters on a procession of Roman Catholics in Toronto in the fall of 1875—several of the rioters were convicted and imprisoned. He has also delivered judgments in several cases of general interest, such as the liability of a Government employee to taxation on his salary; the right of a Barrister to contract for payment for his services; and the power of the court to punish for contempt a person vituperating a judge of the court. There were heavy arrears in the Court of Queen's Bench when he accepted the office of Chief Justice of the Province; all have long since been removed. Has been the recipient of many congratulatory addresses from the Bar in different parts of the Province. Is most emphatic in the condemnation of the Court Houses of Ontario, and the system there prevailing for their construction and maintenance by local municipal authorities. Advocates Government control, as necessary to the decentadministration of justice. (Salary, \$7,000 from Dominion Government, and \$1,000 from Local Government.)—" Englefield," Spadina Avenue, Toronto.

HENRY, Hon. WILLIAM ALEXANDER, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. Son of R. N. Henry, Esq., of Antigonish, N.S. Born in Halifax, N.S., 30 Dec., 1816; educated there; married the daughter of Hugh McDonald, Esq., of Antigonish. Called to the Bar, N.S., 1841, and in the same year commenced practice in Antigonish; created Q.C., 1849, and at same time entered the Government of N.S. Was Solicitor-General from 3 April, 1854 to 1856; Provincial Secretary from latter year until 1857, when he resigned office, owing to the course taken by the leader of the Government, Mr. (now Sir) William Young, on what is known as "the Catholic question;" Solicitor-General (in the Johnston-Tupper Administration), from 1857 to 1859; Solicitor-General a third time (in Mr. Johnston's Cabinet), from 1863 to 1864, when he succeeded Mr. Johnston as Attorney-General, an office he continued to hold until the Union of 1867. Was Mayor of Halifax for several years. Appointed an ad hoc Judge for the trial of controverted election cases in N.S., 27 Feb., 1874. While a member of the Government, was a delegate to England on public business, 1865; and to Washington on the subject of Reciprocal Trade, in conjunction with Hon. Messrs. (now Sir) A.T. Galt, A. J. Smith, and Howland, 1866. Laboured strenuously in favour of Confederation, and was a delegate to the Conferences at Charlottetown, Quebec, and to the final meeting in London, to complete the terms of Union. Was instrumental in securing the passage of the Act abolishing the Court of Chancerv in N.S., and blending all the Courts of Law and Equity in one Supreme Court of Judicature. Sat for Antigonish in N.S. Assembly from 1841, up to 1867; unsuccessfully contested Antigonish for House of Commons at general election, 1867, and Richmond, for same House, March, 1869; appointed to the Supreme Court, 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$7,000.) - Ottawa ; Rideau Club.

Hensley, Hon. Joseph, Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature, Vice-Chancellor in the Court of Chancery, and Deputy Judge in the Court of Admiralty, P.E.I. Son of late Hon. Charles Hensley, a Commander in the Royal Navy, who was a member of the Executive and Legislative Councils of P.E.I., for some years, and for a short time Treasurer of the Province. Born at Tottenham, near London, England, 12 June, 1824; educated by private tuition, and at the Hackney Grammar School; married, 8 Sept., 1853, Frances A. L., daughter of Hodgson. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1847, commenced practice in Charlottetown, and was for a short time in partnership with Hon. W. W. Sullivan, late Solicitor-General; created a Q.C., by Her Majesty's

Warrant, 1857; appointed Law Clerk to the P.E.I. Assembly, 1850, and Solicitor-General in following year. Was a member of the Government of the late Hon. George Coles, and Attorney-General from 1853 until Feb., 1854, from July, 1854 until July, 1858, and again from March, 1867 until his elevation to the Bench, 18 June, 1869 In Aug., 1868, became leader of the Government in consequence of the illness of Mr. Coles. Was a member of the Board of Education from 1853, until July, 1876; during the last seven of which he was Chairman of the Board. In 1860, was retained by the Island Government as Counsel for the tenantry, before the Royal Commissioners' Court, composed of Hon. Messrs. Howe, Gray and Ritchie, and argued the matters involved in association with S. R. Thomson, Esq., O.C., of St. John, N.B., before the Court which sat for nearly a month; was retained in the case of the Attorney-General vs. J. B. Cox, argued in 1857-8, which was an information for intrusion brought to establish the rights of the Crown and the public, to what are commonly called the Fishery Reserve Lands. Was a member of the Legislative Council of P.E.I. from 1853 to 1858, and sat for Kings in the Assembly from 1861, until elevated to the Bench, 1869. Was an unsuccessful candidate for Georgetown in 1853, and for Kings in 1858.— Charlottetown.

Hughes, David John, Judge of the County Court of the County of Elgin, Ont. Son of Rev. David Hughes, formerly Head Master of the Classical and Mathematical School of Kingsbridge, Devon, Eng., and subsequently Minister of Vicarage St. Chapel, Yeovil, Somerset, Eng., by Jane Morris, his wife. Born at Kingsbridge, 7 May, 1820; educated there and at the District Grammar School, London, Ont.; married, December, 1843, Sarah, eldest daughter of the late Richard Richardson, Esq., first Cashier of the London branch of the Bank of Upper Canada. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1842, and up to 1847, practised at Woodstock. In that year removed to London to become the partner of the late Hon (subsequently Justice) John Wilson, and so remained until his appointment to the Bench, 29 Sept., 1853. (Salary \$2,799.96.) Has been called upon at different times to hold Assizes for Judges of the Superior Courts, during their temporary absences owing to illness, pressure of duties elsewhere, or overwork, and has so acted in the Counties of Lanark, Renfrew, Leeds and Grenville, Frontenac, Hastings, Kent, Huron, Bruce, Essex, Middlesex, Elgin, and Norfolk.—St. Thomas.

James, Hon. Alexander, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Son of the late Thos. James, Esq., Assistant Commissary-

General, Royal Field Train, who, upon retiring upon half pay, in 1817, settled at Bridgetown, N.S., by Ann Vatly, daughter of Mr. John Crosskill, for some time in Government employ as master of a Provincial vessel. Born in Halifax, 3 Sept., 1815; educated at Bridgetown; married, October, 1845, Harriet Anderson, eldest daughter of John D. Hamilton, Esq., of Dartmouth, N.S.; studied law with Sir William Young, the present Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, and was called to the Bar, 1845. Commenced practice in Halifax. Was from 1848 to 1853, in partnership with the present Judge Blanchard, and subsequently with Mr. James G. Foster, who had been trained in his office. Created a Q.C., 1872. From 1845 to 1856, was Reporter of the decisions of the Superior Courts of Nova Scotia (see Reports of Cases argued and determined in the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, &c., by Alex. James), and from 1874 to 1875, was associated with Hon. W. A. Henry, Q.C., and Mr. J. W. Johnston, Q.C., as ad hoc Judges, for the trial of controverted election cases in Nova Scotia. Amongst minor offices Judge James has filled, the assistant clerkship to the Legislative Assembly, from 1849 to 1852, and from 1854 to 1856; the chief clerkship from 1856 to 1864, and the Mastership (in Equity) of the Supreme Court, from 1861 to 1877. As election judge he had special charge of the controverted elections for Cumberland and Colchester; in the former case he dismissed the petition for want of diligent prosecution; and in the latter he unseated the respondent for bribery by agents, this being the first case of a member being unseated under the new law, and the only one, as yet, for corrupt practices, in Nova Scotia. Judge James, before his elevation to the Bench, wrote largely for the newspaper press as an amateur, chiefly on subjects connected with Responsible Government, Free Trade, the Reciprocity Treaty, the American Civil War (on the Union side), and against Confederation, but he subsequently defended the course taken by Mr. Howe, and warmly upheld him during his contest in Hants, when he returned for re-election, on his acceptance of office. Appointed to the Bench on the decease of Hon. Jonathan McCully, 8 Jan., 1877. (Salary \$3,999.96.) The principal cause in which Judge James has given a decision since his recent elevation to the Bench, was "In re Ritchie," in which the validity of the seal in use as the Great Seal of Nova Scotia came in question, as also the power of the Local Government to alter the precedence of Queen's Counsel. On both points Judge James differed from the other four judges, and both questions are now under appeal to the High Court of Appeal. The whole of the papers, including the decision of the Judges and the opinions of the

Imperial Crown officers, are published in a blue book among the sessional papers of the House of Commons for 1877. Judge James just before his elevation to the Bench, took an active part in endeavouring to form a Dominion Law Society, and was deputed by the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society to proceed to the Upper Provinces to enlist the co-operation of the profession there in the cause, a mission in which he was very successful.—" Evergreen," Dartmouth, N.S.

JARVIS, GEORGE STEPHEN, Judge of the County Court of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, Ont. Son of the late Stephen Jarvis, Esq., of Toronto, for many years Registrar of the County of York, and at the time of his death, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to the Legislative Council of Upper Canada. Born at Fredericton, N.B., 21 April 1797; educated at the High School, Fredericton, and at the Grammar School, York, then under the charge of the late Venerable Archdeacon Stuart; married 1st, Julia, daughter of the late Sheriff Sherwood, of Brockville (she died, March, 1842); 2ndly, Anna Mary, daughter of the late Rev. Salter Mountain, of Cornwall. Studied law with Mr. (afterwards Hon. Justice) Jonas Jones, and was called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1823; practised for some years in partnership with Mr. Jones; elected Bencher of the Law Society, 1835; served when only fifteen years of age as a volunteer with the 40th Regiment at the battles of Oueenston, York, Stoney Creek, Beaver Dam, Fort Schlosser, and at the taking of Black Rock; appointed ensign in the 8th Regiment in 1816, and was at the battles of Chippewa and Lundy's Lane, at the storming of Fort Erie, at the sortie from Fort Erie, and at the siege of Fort Erie, from 1 August till 7th September, 1814; was mentioned in General Orders as having conducted himself with great spirit at Oueenston, and was subsequently, upon the recommendation of Major-General Sir R. H. Sheaffe,\* appointed by the Duke of York to a lieutenancy in the 104th Regiment. Sat in the Upper Canada Assembly for the Town of Cornwall, from 1836 to 1840, and while there introduced and carried an Act to amend the law with respect to the liability of the legal representatives of joint contractors of defendants on joint judgments. Ap-

Jellett, Robert Patterson, Judge of the County Court of the County of Prince Edward, Ont. Eldest son of late Morgan Jellett, Esq., formerly of Ballymena, Ireland. Born in Belfast, Ireland, March, 1827; educated at Cobourg; married 1st, Miss McNider, of Belleville, (she died); 2ndly, the daughter of Rev. John Greer, of same place. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1856; studied law with Messis. Ross (Hon. John) and Bell, and was appointed Deputy Judge of Prince Edward, 6 Dec., 1872, and Judge of the County, 12 July 1873. (Salary \$2,588.09.)—Picton.

Johnson, Hon. Francis Godschall, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Quebec. The fifth of six sons of late Godschall Johnston, Esq., of Arthingworth Hall, Northamptonshire, England, some time Captain in the 10th Royal Hussars, and afterwards H.B.M.'s Consul-General in Belgium, by Lucy, eldest daughter of Sir Cecil Bisshopp, Bart. Born at Oakley House, Bedfordshire, I Jan 1817; educated at Harrow, and subsequently at St. Omer and Bruges; married Miss Mary Mills. Came to Canada, 1835, and studied law first in the office of the late Henry Driscoll, Esq., Q.C., afterwards with the present Hon. Justice Day, and was called to the Bar, 1839. We take from a biographical sketch of Judge Johnson, which has appeared elsewhere, the following further particulars of his career:—

"Owing to his mastery of French, Mr. Johnson speedily took a position of prominence in general practice, and almost immediately upon his admission to the Bar, became a partner of the Hon. Mr. Day, then Solicitor-General.

"A remarkably good speaker, he was retained in all jury trials of importance for years. In 1854, being in failing health, and his home hav-

ing been broken up by the death of his wife, he went to the Red River Settlement as Recorder of Rupert's Land, then under the sovereignty of the Hon. Hudson's Bay Company. He only remained there four years—for the last three of which he was Governor of the Settlement and of the District of Assiniboia, and in both positions was very popular and successful.

"On returning to Montreal he resumed practice, immediately, in the first rank of his profession. The following year he was made Crown prosecutor—then a position of great responsibility—the District of Montreal comprising, at that time, for criminal purposes, all the present districts, having each a Judge of its own. In this new office he showed conspicuous ability.

"The great case of Beauregard for murder, lasted eleven days, and Mr. Johnson obtained a conviction against the prisoner, though opposed by four eminent counsel, led by the Hon. L. T. Drummond, Q.C. His closing address, both in English and French, elicited great admiration.

"On the death of Hon. J. S. McCord, Mr. Johnson was appointed, on 1st June, 1865, a Judge of Superior Court resident in Bedford.

"In 1870, shortly after the insurrection, he was selected as special Commissioner to proceed to Manitoba, and investigate and report upon the state of the laws—an office which it is probably not too much to say no other man could have executed. Leave was given him of one year's absence for that purpose, but at the expiration of the first year he was pressed to return for one year more to execute another commission of the greatest importance and difficulty. Both these commissions were executed by Judge Johnson with acknowledged ability and power; and besides these, he executed the office of Judge in Manitoba—in which capacity he tried the Fenians in the winter of 1871-2.

"In April, 1872, he was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, but on a technical ground, this appointment was objected to, and superseded.

"In 1849, together with many other prominent Englishmen—Mr. Johnson signed what has been called the 'Annexation Manifesto,' which was in reality a demonstration intended to show the contempt, in their opinion, into which the Provincial Government had sunk; for this he was deprived of the silk gown which he had received in 1847, but which he was requested to take back in 1853. In Oct., 1872, Judge Johnson was transferred to Montreal." (Salary, \$4,999.92.)—166 Mansfield St., Montreal; St. James' Club.

Johnston, James William, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of District No. One, comprising the County of Halifax, N.S. Eldest son of the late Hon. James W. Johnston, for many years a leading public man in N. S., and at his death, Judge in Equity of the Supreme Court of that Province; and grandson of Dr. Johnston (M. D., of Edinburgh University), a loyalist, who settled in Jamaica, by the only daughter of Captain Leichenstein, of Austrian extraction. Born about 1825; educated at Acadia College, Wolfville, N.S.; married Miss Fairbanks, of Halifax. Called to the Bar, 1846. Was a Commissioner (with others) for the consolidation of the Statutes of N.S. Created a Q.C., 1873. Appointed ad hoc Judge for the trial of controverted election cases in N.S., 1874, and to his present position, 21 August, 1876. (Salary \$2,400.)—Halifax.

Jones, Stephen James, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Brant, Ont. Son of the late Augustus Jones, Esq., P. L. S. Born in Canada; educated there; married, May, 1847, Margaret, only daughter of John Williamson, Esq., of Stoney Creek, Ontario. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1846, and was for some years in partnership with the late S. B. Freeman, Esq., Q.C., of Hamilton (with whom he had studied). Appointed to his present office, 21 January, 1853. (Salary \$2,800.01.)

KINGSMILL, JOHN JUCHEREAU, M.A., D.C.L., Judge of the County Court of the County of Bruce, Ont. Son of the late Lieutenant-Colonel Kingsmill, who after serving in the 66th regiment through the Peninsular War, and at St. Helena (during Napoleon's captivity), became Sheriff of Niagara, and during the Rebellion commanded the 3rd Battalion of Incorporated Militia. Born in the City of Quebec, 21 May, 1829; educated at Upper Canada College and at the University of King's College, (where he took degree of B. A.), at University of Toronto, and at University of Trinity College, Toronto (where he obtained degrees of M.A. and D.C.L.). Called to the Bar of Upper Canada, Michaelmas Term, 1852, and practised first with the late Hon. A. J. Fergusson-Blair, and subsequently with Mr. D. Guthrie, M. P. Appointed County Attorney for the County of Wellington, 6 March, 1858; and County Court Judge for County Bruce, 15 November, 1866. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Walkerton.

LACOURSE, ANTHONY, Junior Judge of the County Court of the County of Waterloo, Ontario. Only son of Anthony Lacourse, Esq., by Mary Dame. Born at Berthier, P. Q., 1830; educated at Picton Grammar School, and at Regiopolis College, Kingston; married Mary,

daughter of late John Dormer, Esq., M.D., of Kingston (she died). Studied law with late Thomas Kirkpatrick, Esq., Q.C., was called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1855, and practised his profession at Lindsay, Ontario, until his present appointment, 22 October, 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96.) Was for some years Superintendent of Schools in County Victoria, and held the office of Clerk of the Peace and County Crown Attorney there, from 8 January, 1863, until his removal to Waterloo.—

LAZIER, THOMAS APPLEBY, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Hastings, Ont. Son of the late Richard Lazier, Esq., Collector of Customs of Shannonville, Ont., by Anna Bookberet, eldest daughter of Thos. Dorland Appleby, Esq., who came from the State of New York to the County of Prince Edward, 1797, and subsequently removed to Hastings. On father's side is also descended from loyalists. Born in County of Prince Edward, Ont., 20 July, 1826; educated at Victoria College, Cobourg. Unmarried. Called to the Bar, Upper Canada, Hilary Term, 1854. Appointed to present office, 11 July, 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96.)—Belleville.

LEGGATT, GORDON WATTS, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Essex. Youngest son of the late Assistant Commissary-General John Leggatt; and grandson of Thos. Leggatt, Esq., late of the 49th Regiment of Foot. Born at Sorel, P.Q., 26 March, 1826; married, I June, 1853, Margaret Amelia, only daughter of J. B. Laliberte, Esq., of Amherstburg, (she died 1860); secondly, June, 1863, Mary Ann H., second daughter of the late Joseph Cary, Esq., Deputy Inspector-General of Canada. Called to the Bar of Upper Canada, Trinity Term, 1850, and was in partnership for one year with the late J. B. Lewis, Esq., Q.C., of Ottawa. Appointed Deputy Judge of the County of Essex, 27 Nov., 1858, and Judge of the County, 27 April, 1860. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Sandwich, Ont.

LIZARS, DANIEL HOME, Judge of the County Court of the County of Perth, Ont. Eldest son of the late Daniel Lizars, Esq., for many years Clerk of the Peace for Huron and Bruce. Born in Scotland; married the daughter of John Longworth, Esq., of Goderich, who served with Wellington during the Peninsular War. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1853, and commenced practice at Stratford in partnership with the late John Strachan, Esq., and subsequently with the late Robt. Macfarlane, Esq., M.P. Appointed County Attorney of Perth, 6 March, 1858; and Judge of the County, 10 August, 1864. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Stratford.

LORANGER, Hon. THOMAS JEAN JACQUES, a Puisne Fudge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late M. Joseph Loranger, by Marie Louise Dugal, both descendants of old French settlers in Lower Canada. Born at Ste. Anne d'Yamachiche, P. Q., 2 February, 1823; educated at Nicolet College; married, 1st, Mdlle. Sarah Angelique Trudeau, niece of the late Very Rev. Vicar General Trudeau, of Three Rivers (she died); 2ndly, Mdlle. Zélie Angelique Borne, granddaughter of the late A. de Gaspé, Esq., of Quebec. Pursued his law studies with the present Hon. Justice Polette, of Three Rivers, and subsequently with C. S. Cherrier, Esq., Q.C., of Montreal, now the "Nestor" of the Bar of Quebec; was called to the Bar, 1844; and soon after entered into partnership with Hon. L. T. (afterwards Judge) Drummond. Created a O. C., 1854. Was a Commissioner for consolidating the Statutes of Lower Canada and Canada respectively, from 28 March, 1856, to 31 January, 1861. Appointed advising Commissioner to the Commissioners appointed to consolidate the Statutes of Quebec, 16 August, 1877. Author of Commentaire sur le Code Civil du Bas Canada (Montreal, 1873). Sat for Laprairie in the Canada Assembly from the general election, 1854, until 28 February, 1863, when appointed to the Bench. (Salary \$4,000). Was Provincial Secretary of Canada, in the Macdonald-Cartier Administration, from 26 November, 1857, until 29 July, 1858, when the Government resigned on the seat of Government question. As a lawyer, Judge Loranger was retained in a great many important causes. In 1855, he, in conjunction with the late Mr. Angers, argued the famous Seigniorial cause before the Seigniorial Court, against Messrs. Cherrier, Mackay and Dunkin, the two latter being now, like him, on the Bench; and he was the first Colonial lawyer who ever argued a case before the Privy Council in England. In 1877, was elected one of the Law Professors in the Montreal branch of Laval University.—Sorel.

Lyon, Robert, Funior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Carleton, Ontario. Son of late Capt. Geo. Lyon, H. M.'s 100th Regiment of Foot, who represented Carleton in Canadian Assembly from 1844 to 1847; and brother of the late George Byron Lyon-Fellowes, Esq., the eminent Q.C. Born at Richmond, Ont., 6 July, 1829; educated there; married Miss Foster, of Ottawa. Called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1853. Has been an alderman, and mayor of the City of Ottawa. Contested Carleton unsuccessfully for the Canadian Assembly, 1861. Sat for Carleton in Ontario Assembly from 1867 until general election,

1871, when defeated. Was Deputy Judge of the County Court of the County of Carleton from 17 Dec., 1862 to 3 Oct., 1869. Appointed to his present office, 6 Nov., 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96).—58 Theodore St., Ottawa; Rideau Club; "U.E." Club.

Macdonald, Archibald, Judge of the County Court of the County of Wellington, Ont. Eldest son of late Capt. Archibald Macdonald, formerly of 35th Regiment of Foot, by Catharine, daughter of the late Hon. Walter Boswell, R.N., and a member of the Legislative Council of Upper Canada; and a grandson of Macdonald of Garth. Born near Cobourg, Ont., 1823; educated at the Newcastle District Grammar School and at Victoria College; married, 1847, Jane Anne, daughter of Rev. Daniel Wright, of Markham, Ont. Studied law with present Judge Boswell, and was called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1844. Practised in Cobourg for some years and was Deputy Master in Chancery there. Has been chairman of Guelph Board of Education, and a Liceuse Commissioner for South Wellington. Was a commissioner to enquire into the financial affairs of the Township of Arthur, June, 1860. Appointed County Judge of Wellington, 6 Sept., 1854. (Salary, \$2,799.96.)—Guelph.

MACDONALD, ROLLAND, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Welland, Ont. Son of John Macdonald, Esq., of Gart, Gray's Creek, Cornwall, Ont. Born near Fort William, North-west Territories, 17 March, 1810; educated under Dr. Skakel in Montreal, and at Cornwall under Rev. Mr. Leith; married, 1835, Anne, daughter of late Hon. Walter Boswell, R. N. (M.L.C). Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1832. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1851; created a Q.C. in 1856. Practised in St. Catharines in partnership with late Mr. Alex. Yates Macdonell, subsequently with late Mr. Geo. Macdonell, M.P.P., and with his son, Mr. F. W. Macdonald. Was retained in case of Beaton v. Wm. Lyon Mackenzie for libel, before a special jury (in which Mr. Mackenzie spoke for six hours), and which was the only case he ever lost; was leading counsel, assisted by the present Chief Justice Harrison, in the celebrated Townsend murder case; and he was also engaged, for the defence, in the case of Dr. Morrison, tried for High Treason in 1837. Served as a Volunteer during the Rebellion of 1837, was at Gallow's Hill as a private dragoon, subsequently became captain of St. Catharines troop of cavalry with which he did duty on Niagara frontier, and was present as a supernumerary officer of 93rd Highlanders at the Windmill affair at Prescott; was afterwards Lieut.-Col. of 5th Lincoln Battalion,

and finally Lieut.-Col. of the Lincoln Regiment. Contested Cornwall for Canadian Assembly unsuccessfully at general election, 1840, but was returned in 1844 and sat two years, when he retired in favour of late Hon. J. H. Cameron, Q.C., Solicitor General for Upper Canada. Was Clerk of the Peace and County Crown Attorney for Lincoln (having previously declined the Judgeship) from 4 Feb., 1860, to 14 Aug., 1873, when appointed to the Judgeship for the County of Welland. (Salary \$2,552.61).

MACKAY, HON. ROBERT, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Second son of the late Colonel Mackay of the Indian Department, by the daughter of Hon. Arthur Davidson, a Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, L. C. Born in Montreal, 1816; educated there; married, 1st, Miss Ann Kearney, of Saugertes, N.Y. (she died April, 1843); 2ndly, 27 June, 1848, Christina, second daughter of the the late Hon. Thos. McKay, M. L. C., of Rideau Hall, Ottawa. Called to the Bar, 1837; created a Q.C., 1867. Appointed a Commissioner (with others) to consolidate the Public General Statutes of Lower Canada, and Canada, respectively, 28 March, 1856. Has been Batonnier of the Montreal Bar. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, vice Hon. Jas. Smith, resigned, 27 August, 1868; and an assistant Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, 30 November of the same year. (Salary, \$4,999.92.)—1094 Sherbrooke Street, Montreal.

MACKENZIE, Hon. KENNETH, Q.C., Fudge of the County Court of the County of York, Ont., and Judge of the Maritime Court, Ont. Born in Scotland, in the early part of present century; educated there; married the daughter of the late Robert Long Innes, Esq.: followed mercantile pursuits for some years; called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1843; created a Q.C., 1853; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871. An unsuccessful candidate for Kingston, in the Canadian Assembly, against the present Right. Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, at general election, 1848; and for East Northumberland, against Mr. Keeler, for the House of Commons, at general election, 1867. Was Judge of the County Court of the United Counties of Frontenac, Lennox and Addington, from 15 Oct., 1853 until 21 March, 1865, when he resigned, removed to Toronto, and resumed his practice at the Bar. Acted on several occasions as Crown Counsel at Assizes, and, in 1866, was retained by the American Government to defend the Fenian brigands captured at Fort Erie. Appointed Judge of the County of York, 7 Oct., 1876 (Salary \$2,600); and Judge of the Maritime Court

of Ontario, newly established, 12 July, 1877. (Salary \$600.)—26 John Street, Toronto.

Macpherson, Henry, Judge of the County Court of the County of Grey, Ont. Son of Lowther Pennington Macpherson, Esq., Barrister, of Picton; and grandson of Lieut-Col. Donald Macpherson, of the 10th Royal Veteran Battalion. Born at Picton, Ont., 17 August, 1832; educated at Queen's University, Kingston, where he took the degree of B.A., 1851; married, 1876, Eliza McGill, daughter of Allan N. McLean, Esq., of Toronto; called to the Bar, U.C., Hilary Term, 1855. Appointed to present office, 9 Jan. 1865. (Salary \$2,600.)—Owen Sound; "U. E." Club.

MACQUEEN, DAVID SHANK, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Oxford, Ont. Son of the late Capt. Alex. Macqueen (a native of the Isle of Skye), of the Canadian Fencibles, by Grace, daughter of the late Hon. Thos. Fraser. Born in City of Quebec 12 Sept., 1811; educated at Cornwall under late Rev. Dr. Urquhart; married, June, 1847, Fanny Maria Harriet, daughter of late Jas. Muttlebury, Esq., M.D., F.R.S., Inspector-General of Army Hospitals. Studied law at Brockville with late D. B. Q. Ford, Esq., and subsequently at Toronto with late Hon. Henry Sherwood, and was called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1839. Served with distinction as a Volunteer officer during the Rebellion of 1837.\*

<sup>\* &</sup>quot;While pursuing his legal studies at Brockville, the rebellion of 1837-8 broke out in Lower Canada, and Mr. Macqueen was sent, on Jan. 2nd, in a batteau to Cornwall, with a detachment of men in charge of arms for the Glengarry militia. Upon his return from this difficult and hazardous service he was appointed Lieut. in the troop of cavalry commanded by Capt. Harvey, which he had assisted in raising. was then sent to Dickenson's Landing, to bring up the head-quarters of the 32nd and 83rd Regts., under the command of Capts. Markham and Colquhoun; this duty having been done, he assisted, under the authority of Sir John Colborne, Commander of the Forces, in raising a company in the 'Queen's Loyal Borderers,' in which regiment he was gazetted Captain in Jan., 1838, and served in that corps at Brockville for six months. While in Brockville certain suspicious looking vessels, crowded with men, having appeared off the town, apparently making for Prescott, Mr. Macqueen volunteered as a private marine on board Her Majesty's steamer Experiment, Lieut. Fraser, which advance guard received the first fire of the enemy from behind the stone-walls surrounding the butternut orchard at that place."-Extract from Report of Services.

MAGUIRE, HON. JOHN, a Puisne Fudge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of Matthew Maguire, Esq., descended from one of the best families in Ireland, by Catherine, daughter of Owen O'Hara, a leading merchant of Sligo; born near Maguire's Bridge, County Fermanagh, Ireland, April 1810; educated there and at the Seminary of Quebec. Came to Canada with his parents, 1823: married 1838, the daughter of Gordian Horan, Esq., of Quebec, and sister of the late Rt. Rev'd. E. J. Horan, R. C. Bishop of Kingston. Studied law with the late Wm. Power, Esq., afterwards a Judge of the Superior Court, and was called to the Bar, 1834. Was an unsuccessful candidate for the City of Quebec, in the Canadian Asssembly, at general election, 1851. the following year was appointed Inspector and Superintendent of Police at Quebec, and subsequently Judge of the Sessions of the Peace and Chairman of the Quarter Sessions, offices which he continued to hold for sixteen years. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, with residence in Bonaventure, 27 August, 1868; transferred to Rimouski, 1873. (Salary \$4,000.) While a resident of Quebec, was President for some time of the St. Patrick's Society; was a member of the Committee of Management of St. Patrick's Church, and for nine years served in the City Council.—Rimouski.

McCord, Hon. Thomas, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Eldest son of the late Hon. William King McCord, in his lifetime a Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, by Aurelie Pelicite Arnoldi, of Montreal. Born in City of Montreal, 17 October, 1828; educated at Quebec Seminary and at McGill College; married first, Margaret, daughter of James Wadsworth, Esq., of Ottawa (she died 1860); secondly, Caroline J., daughter of Errol B. Lindsay, Esq., of the Trinity House, Quebec (she died May, 1875); thirdly, 30 October, 1877, Marie Marguerite Caroline, daughter of the late Henri Des Rivieres, Esq., of Malmaison, P.Q. Studied law with Mr. T. C. (afterward Hon. Justice) Aylwin, and subsequently with Messrs. Caron, Baillarge and Duval, and was called to the Bar in 1850. Commenced practice in Quebec, in partnership with Mr. Dunbar Ross, Q.C., subsequently Solicitor-General; and afterwards at Aylmer, in partnership with

the late Mr. James Colman. Was Crown Counsel at Aylmer for eight years. Succeeded the present Judge Rainsay as Secretary to the Codification Commission of Lower Canada, 29 November, 1862, and was Law Clerk to the Legislature of Quebec, from 1867 until 6 September, 1872, when elevated to the Bench. (Salary \$3,499.92.) Author of Synopsis of the Changes in the Law effected by the Civil Code of Lower Canada (Ottawa, 1866); and The Civil Code of Lower Canada, together with a synopsis of changes in the law, references to the reports of the Commissioners, the authorities as reported by the Commissioners; a concordance with the Code Napoleon and Code de Commerce, &c. (Montreal, 1867). The most notable case with which he has been connected since he became a Judge, was the Bonaventure Local Election case, in 1876, in which he was associated with Judges Maguire and Casault, and in which both the sitting member and petitioner were disqualified.—New Carlisle.

McCrae, Hon. Walter, Judge of the Provisional Judicial District of Algoma, Ont. Grandfather emigrated from north of Ireland to State of New York about 1770; he resided near Saratoga during the Revolution, but a short time after Governor Simcoe's proclamation, in 1792, removed to Canada, and took up his residence in the township of Montague on the Rideau, where he has many descendants. Born at Burritt's Rapids, on the Rideau, 10 November, 1810; married first, 1836, Anne, daughter of the late Mr. Patrick Murray, of Mohil, county Leitrim, Ireland (she died); secondly, 1852, Eliza Ann, daughter of the late Mr. William Burnham, of Burlington, Vt., U.S. (she died); thirdly, Jane Sutherland Cameron, eldest daughter of the late Alexander Cameron. Esq., of Sault Ste. Marie. Admitted as an Attorney, 1848, and was called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1850. Elected Mayor of Chatham, 1859, he being the first to hold that office under the elective system. Sat in Legislative Council, Canada, for Western Division, from September 1862 until Confederation, when appointed to the Senate of the Dominion, where he continued to sit until elevated to the Bench, 23 December, 1870. (Salary \$2,599.92.) While a member of the Legislative Council, he became identified with the Separate School Law of Upper Canada; he had charge of the bill in the upper chamber in 1863, and carried it successfully through that House.—Sault Ste. Marie.

McDonald, Herbert Stone, M.A., Junior Judge of the County Court of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, Ont. Only surviving son of the late Hon. John McDonald, M.L.C., of Gananoque, Ont.

Born at Ganonoque, 23 February, 1842; educated in part at Gananoque Grammar School, and at the University of Queen's College, Kingston, where he graduated B. A., 1859, and M. A., 1861; married, June, 1864, Emma Matilda, third daughter of David Jones, Esq., Registrar for Leeds, and formerly M. P. P. for same county in Upper Canada Assembly. Studied law with Hon. A. N. (now Lieutenant-Governor) Richards, Q. C., and was called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1863. Practiced for some years in partnership with Mr. F. W. H. Chambers, late M.P.P. for Brockville. Sat for South Leeds in Ontario Assembly from general election 1871, until his appointment as Junior Judge, 22 October, 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96.) Was Deputy Judge of same counties from 24 Aug., 1867, to 30 Oct, 1869.—Brockville.

McDonald, Hon. Hugh, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Descended from the family of McDonald, of the Keppeck, in the Highlands of Scotland. Born at Antigonish, N. S., 1826; educated there; married, 1856, Sarah, daughter of Captain Smith. Called to the Bar of Nova Scotia, 1855; created a Q.C., 1872. Declined the Solicitor-Generalship for Nova Scotia, 1862. An Anti-union delegate from Nova Scotia to England, with Messrs. Howe and Annand, 1866; sworn of the Privy Council, and was Minister of Militia and Defence from that date until 5 November, 1873, when he was appointed to the Bench. Sat for Inverness in the Nova Scotia Assembly, from 1859 to 1862 (having been an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at a previous election); and for same constituency in the House of Commons, from the union of 1867 until his elevation to the Bench. (Salary \$3,999.96.)

McKeacney, Hon. James Charles, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Manitoba. Of Scotch descent. Born in Co. Tyrone, Ireland, 1815; accompanied his parents to U. S. 1822; educated at the High Schol, Sydney, and at MacQueen's Academy, Halifax; married, 1st, October, 1842, Eliza, daughter of R. N. Henry, Esq., of Antigonish, and sister of the present Hon. Justice Henry, of the Supreme Court of the Dominion (she died); secondly, 1851, Eliza, daughter of P. Hearne, Esq., of Sydney. Called to the bar of N.S. 1838; to that of Manitoba, 1872; created a Q.C., 1866; held the office of Judge of Probate for Cape Breton from 1848 to 1867, and was also Surrogate in the Court of Vice-Admiralty, and Lieut. Col. of 2nd Regt. of Cape Breton Militia. Became a member of the Nova Scotia Government in 1850, and was Chief Inspector of Mines and Minerals for that Province from 1859 until the

office was abolished, 1861; appointed to the Bench 7th Oct., 1872, and since his occupation of the judicial office has, on two occasions (during the absence of the Lieutenant-Governor), administered the Government of the Province and of the North-west Territories. (Salary \$3,999.96). Returned for Richmond, in Nova Scotia Assembly, in 1841, but unseated; sat for Inverness in same Chamber from 1843 to 1847; for Sidney (township) from 1848 until 1852, when defeated; for same seat from 1855 to 1859, when he resigned to accept the Inspectorship of Mines and Minerals; and for Cape Breton in the House of Commons from the Union of 1867 until the general election, 1872, when defeated. While at the bar, Judge McKeagney was specially retained for the prisoners in the well-known Richmond famine cases of the Oueen against Currie and others, tried at Arichat, June, 1849, and he secured their acquittal. As a public man he was identified with all the public measures of the Reform party of Nova Scotia from 1843 to 1847, having for his political associates Messrs. Howe, Young, Uniacke, Doyle, Huntington, &c., and he took an active part in the great constitutional debate which led to the establishment of Responsible Government in Nova Scotia. As a judge, Mr. McKeagney has tried several important cases. In the celebrated case of "Lord" Gordon, he, after a full argument, refused the application of the prisoner for bail.—St. James Street, Winnipeg.

McMahon, Thomas Babington, LL. B., Judge of the County Court of the County of Norfolk, Ont. Son of the late Hugh McMahon, Esq., P. L. S., of Dundas, Ont. Born at Dundas, 15 June, 1837; educated by his father; and, in 1862, took the degree of LL. B., at the Toronto University; married Emma, only daughter of Chas. Watts, Esq., of Brantford. Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1862. Practised in partnership with his brother, Mr. Hugh McMahon, Q. C., subsequently with Mr. Wm. N. Miller, and finally with Mr. Robt. C. Smyth. Appointed Deputy Judge of Norfolk, 31st March, 1875; and Judge of the County, 22 July, same year. (Salary \$2,199.96).—Simcoe.

MEREDITH, Hon. WILLIAM COLLIS, D.C.L., Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Quebec. Second son of the Rev. Dr. Meredith, (F.T.C.D.), Rector of Ardtrea, County Tyrone, Ireland, by Eliza, daughter of the Very Rev. Richard Graves, Dean of Ardagh, Ireland.\* Born at Ardtrea,

<sup>\*</sup> Author of the celebrated work on the "Pentateuch," and one of the most distinguished Fellows of the University of Dublin.

23 May, 1812; educated by private tuition; married, May, 1847, Sophia Waters, youngest daughter of Wm. C. Holmes, Esq., M. D., of Quebec. Studied law in the office of the late J. D. Grant, Esq., Q. C., of Montreal; and was called to the Bar, 1836; created a Q. C, 1844; received the honorary degree of D. C. L. from Lennoxville University. Declined the Solicitor-Generalship; and subsequently the Attorney-Generalship, in the Viger-Draper Administration, August, 1844, and the Attorney-Generalship, a second time, in the Draper Goverment, April, 1847. Appointed a Judge of the Superior Court, by the Lafontaine-Baldwin Government, December, 1849; and a Puisne Judge of the same Court, by the Hincks-Morin Government, 1 January, 1852. In 1859, Chief Justice Meredith was offered by the late Sir George Cartier, a seat in the Court of Queen's Bench; he at first declined, but was requested by the Government, and by almost all of the members of the Montreal Bar to reconsider his decision. He did so, and was appointed 12 March, 1859, much to the satisfaction, not only of the Montreal Bar but of that of the City of Quebec, the members of which unanimously adopted resolutions of approval. Here he remained until 17 August, 1866, when he was appointed Chief Justice of the Superior Court, vice Hon. Edward Bowen, deceased. (Salary \$6,000). When at the Bar, Chief Justice Meredith practised rarely in the Criminal Court, but his consulting practice, particularly in Seignorial and Commercial cases, was very large. He was engaged in an unusually large number of important Civil cases, and the firm of which he was the senior partner, Messrs. Meredith, Bethune and Dunkin, enjoyed, it is believed, the most extensive practice in the Province of Lower Canada. We may add that the Judges of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council have spoken in the highest terms of the decisions of Chief Justice Meredith.—16 St. Ursule St., Quebec.

MILLER, THOMAS, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Halton, Ont. Born in Township of Trafalgar, Ont., about 1824; educated at King's College, Toronto. Admitted as an Attorney, 1854; appointed Clerk of the Peace of Waterloo, 29 November, 1856; County Crown Attorney, same County, 20 February, 1858; Judge of Halton, 28 November, 1867. (Salary \$2,600).—Milton.

MILLER, WILLIAM, Judge of the County Court of the County of Waterloo, Ont. Eldest son of the late W. D. Miller, Esq., for many years Deputy Clerk of the Crown and Pleas for the old Niagara District. Born in the Township of Niagara, 30 October, 1810; educated at Niagara District School; married Cornelia, teldest daughter of the late N. G.

Cheschro, of Canandaigua, N. Y. Studied law with the late Hon. Robert Dickson, and late Judge Campbell; was called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1836, and for twenty years practised his profession in the Town of Dundas. Appointed Judge of Waterloo, 21 January, 1853. (Salary \$2,799.96.)—Galt.

Monk, Hon. Samuel Cornwallis, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Quebec. Born in the City of Halifax, Nova Scotia, 29 July, 1813; married the daughter of the late Hon. P. D. Debartzch, M. L. C. Called to the Bar, 1837; created a Q. C., 1854. Is the author of a volume of poetry, printed for private circulation. Appointed an Assistant Judge of the Superior Court, under the Seigniorial Act, 14 September, 1855; an Assistant Judge of the Superior Court, 4 June, 1859; and a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, 27 August, 1868. (Salary \$5,000.) Was a Commissioner, September, 1848, to enquire into charges against Simon Tallon dit Lesperance; and in April, 1855, to enquire into causes of murder of Ann Reilly.—643 Ontario Street, Montreal.

MORRISON, Hon. JOSEPH CURRAN, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Appeal, Ontario. Eldest son of the late Mr. Hugh Morrison, a native of Sutherlandshire, Scotland; born in Ireland, 20 August, 1816; educated at the Royal Belfast Institution, Ireland, and at Upper Canada College; married July, 1845, Elizabeth, daughter of Joseph Bloor, Esq., of Yorkville, Ont.; studied law with the late Simon Washburn, Esq., was called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1839, and at once entered into partnership with the late Chancellor Blake, with whom he had been a fellow student, which connection continued until Mr. Blake's elevation to the Bench; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1850; created a Q. C., 1853. Was Deputy Clerk of the Executive Council of Canada, from May 1843, until December, 1847, when he resigned, to become a candidate for Parliament. Appointed a member of the Commission for the Consolidation of the Public General Statutes of Upper Canada, 1856. Was Solicitor-General for Upper Canada, from 22 June, 1853 until September, 1854. Sworn of the Executive Council, and was Receiver-General (in the Taché-Macdonald and Macdonald-Cartier administrations), from 24 May, 1856 to the 2 February, 1858; again entered the Executive Council (as a member of the Cartier-Macdonald Government), 22 February, 1860. Was Solicitor-General for Upper Canada, from that date until 17 March, 1862, when he retired from public life. Was Registrar of the City of Toronto, from January, 1859 to February, 1860.

Sat for West York in Canadian Assembly from general election 1848 to general election 1851; and for Town of Niagara from latter date until general election 1857. Was an unsuccessful candidate for South Ontario at general election 1857, for North Oxford in 1858, and for Grey in 1861. Whilst in Parliament, besides the measures of the several Governments of which he was a member, he was chiefly interested in the settlement of the Clergy Reserve question, and in all measures relating to education. As a lawyer he prosecuted McDermott and Grace Marks (for the murder of Mr. Kinnear, in 1843), and Brown (for the murder of Mr. Sheridan Hogan, M. P.P., in 1860); both McDermott and Brown were executed. As a Judge he tried Greenwood (who hanged himself the night before his intended execution) for murder; and Dr. Davis and wife, the abortionists, for the same crime. He also tried in 1867, the Fenians captured at the raid at Fort Erie, a great number of whom were found guilty and sentenced to death, but afterwards had their sentences commuted to imprisonment for life in the Penitentiary. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, 18 March, 1862, where he remained until 24 August, 1863, when he was promoted to the Court of Queen's Bench. Transferred to the Court of Appeal, 30 Nov., 1877. (Salary \$4,999.92.) Is now the senior Puisne Judge of all the Courts in Ontario. Was during a period of twenty-eight years a member of the Council of Public Instruction for Upper Canada; and for twenty-five years sat in the Senate of the University of Toronto, during fourteen of which he held the office of Chancellor .- "Woodlawn," Toronto; " U.E." Club.

MORSE, WILLIAM AGNEW D., Q.C., Judge of the County Court, District No. five, comprising the Counties of Victoria and Cumberland, N.S. Second son of Hon. James G. Morse, now the oldest lawyer in N.S., and the only surviving member of the Legislature of 1819, who represented the Town of Amherst many years, and was afterwards elevated to the Legislative Council;\* by Augusta Agnew, daughter of

<sup>\*</sup> This gentleman was the son of Joseph Morse, an officer who served under Lord Amherst in the celebrated French and Indian war in Canada. He was stationed at Fort Lawrence after the Indian war, and was appointed by Governor Lawrence, with Major William Allan, an officer in the British service, John A. Wilson, the nephew of the celebrated Colonel Wilson, John Hutton, Abriel Richardson, Elijah Ayr, and Josiah Throop, Esquires, to introduce settlers in and upon the lands in Cumberland and Chiegnecto, left vacant by the expulsion of the French Acadians. So successful were they in settling these lands that Governor Wilmot, the successor of Governor

Andrew Kinnear, Esq., of Halifax, and grand-daughter of Andrew Kinnear, Esq., an officer in the Commissariat at Fort Cumberland. Born in the Town of Amherst, 1 Jan., 1837; educated partly under Dr. Hen, at Horton, and partly at Sackville Academy, N.B.; married Dec., 1873, Ella Frances Rebecca, daughter of Beaumont Boggs, Esq., a descendant of a Loyalist family. Called to the Bar, 1859; created a Q.C., 1876; remained one year in the office of the present Sir William Young, Chief Justice, in Halifax, when, through ill health, he was forced to retire; subsequently formed a partnership with Hon. S. L. Shannon, O.C., M.P.P., which partnership was dissolved, 1868, on Mr. Morse's removing to Amherst. Appointed Judge of Probate for Cumberland, 1868. Unsuccessfully contested Cumberland for the House of Commons at general election, 1872; appointed to his present position, 21 Augt., 1876. (Salary \$1,898.35.) Was retained as Counsel in the well-known case of the Chesapeake, an American steamer of the Cromwell line, seized by the Pirate Braine, during the American Civil War, recaptured by an American ship of war in British waters, afterwards forfeited to the Crown, and finally, upon argument, restored to the owners.—Amherst; Halifax Club.

Moss, Hon. Thomas, M.A., Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal of Ontario. Eldest son of the late John Moss, Esq., of Toronto. Born in Cobourg, Ont., 20 August, 1836; educated at the Toronto Academy, Upper Canada College, and at Toronto University, at which latter he was gold medallist in classics, mathematics and modern languages; graduated M.A., 1859; and, in 1860, on the occasion of the visit of the Prince of Wales, was presented to His Royal Highness as the most distinguished Alumnus of the University; married, July, 1863, Amy, eldest daughter of the late Hon. Justice Sullivan, of Toronto. Studied law with Hector Cameron, Esq., Q.C., M.P., and Hon. Adam Crooks, LL. D., Q. C., now Minister of Education (who were then in partnership), and was called to the Bar of Upper Canada, in Michaelmas Term, 1861; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871;

Lawrence, granted the settlers, upon the solicitations of Capt. Morse and Major Allan, the right to send a member to the Local Parliament, then being convened in Halifax. The papers connected with the appointment of these gentlemen, and the concession of a member to the Town of Cumberland are now among the original manuscript documents in the archives of Nova Scotia in Halifax. Capt. Morse was among the original grantees of the Town of Cumberland, and held with Mr. Ayr and Mr. Troop, double shares thereon. He named the Town of Amherst after Lord Amherst, and his descendants now reside on the lands granted him in the year 1763.

created a Q. C., 1872. Practised for many years in partnership with the present Chief Justice Harrison, Mr. Featherston Osler, Mr. Charles Moss, and others, the firm being known by the name of Harrison, Osler & Moss, and enjoying one of the very largest and most lucrative practices in Ontario. Was a member of the Law Reform Commission, appointed by the Ontario Government, January, 1872, to enquire into the expediency of amalgamating the Courts of Common Law and Chancery. Declined the Vice-Chancellorship of the Court of Chancery, 1872. for West Toronto in House of Commons, from December, 1873 up to 8 October, 1875, when appointed a Justice of the Court of Error and Promoted to be Chief Justice of the Court of Appeal of Ontario, as the successor of the late Hon. Wm. Henry Draper, C.B., 30 November, 1877. (Salary \$6,000.) Elected Vice-Chancellor of the University of Toronto (of which institution he was Registrar some years previously), 1874. Since his elevation to the Bench, Judge Moss has tried many criminal cases of great public interest, notably the cases of William Henry Smith, for the murder of Ralph Spence Finlay, at the Lambton Fall Assizes, in 1875; of Michael McConnell, for the murder of Nelson Mills, at the Wentworth Spring Assizes, 1876; of William Ward, for the murder of his wife, at the Brampton Spring Assizes, 1876; and of Mrs. Fradette, for the murder of her husband by strychnine, at the Belleville Fall Assizes, same year. All were convicted, with the exception of Mrs. Fradette, who was acquitted; Smith and Ward had their sentences commuted for imprisonment for life in the Penitentiary (where Ward shortly afterwards died), while McConnell suffered the extreme penalty of the law.—14 Grenville Street, Toronto; National Club: Toronto Club.

OLIVIER, Hon. LOUIS AUGUSTE, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of Maxime Olivier, Esq., a retired Militia officer, who served during the war of 1812; and grandson of Louis Olivier, Esq., who represented Warwick in Lower Canada Assembly, from 1810 to 1814. Born about 1817; educated in Lower Canada; married, Nov., 1854, Miss Marie R. Masse. Studied law with Messrs. Aaron Philip Hart, Louis Edward Pacaud, and lastly with Messrs. Cherrier and Mondelet, and was called to the Bar, 1839; created a Q.C., 1864. Sat for De Lanaudière Division in Legislative Council, Canada, from 1863 to the Union, when he was called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation; appointed to the Bench, 6 Sept., 1873. (Salary \$3,999.96.)—Joliette.

PALMER, Hon. EDWARD, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature of Prince Edward Island. Son of the late James B. Palmer, Esq., a Barrister of the Superior Courts of Law, Dublin, Ireland, by Millicent, his wife, daughter of late Benjamin Jones, Esq., LL.D., of London, England. Born at Charlottetown, P.E.I., 1809; educated at Brown's Grammar School, Charlottetown; married a daughter of the late Benjamin Tremain, Esq., of Quebec. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1831, and commenced practice in 1834; created a Q.C., by Royal Sign Manual, 1857. Entered the Government of Prince Edward Island, 1842; was Solicitor General from Oct., 1848, to Augt., 1851; Attorney-General, 1854 (resigned same year); President of Executive Council, 1859; Attorney-General from 28 Jan., 1863, to 1869; and again Attorney-General from 1872, until 20 June, 1873, when appointed Judge of the County Court of Oueen's County; promoted to be Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island (as the successor of Sir Robert Hodgson), 18 July, 1874. (Salary \$3,000.) Was engaged for either one side or the other in nearly every cause of importance argued in the Supreme Court and Court of Chancery between 1845 and 1873. As a member of Prince Edward Island Government, attended the Conference at Charlottetown in 1864, and that at Quebec the same year, for the purpose of adopting a scheme of Union for the whole of the British North American Provinces, which has since been accomplished. Sat for Charlottetown and Royalty in the Island Assembly from 1835, until 1860, when he was appointed to the Legislative Council, and was subsequently twice returned to that body under the elective system. An unsuccessful candidate for Charlottetown in the Assembly, 1870. As a public man, Chief Justice Palmer was closely identified with the questions concerning the Government issue of Paper Currency; Free Trade with the United States; the Revision and Consolidation of the Local Statutes; and the definition of Tenants' sterling rent.—Charlottetown.

Papineau, Hon. Auguste Cyrille, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Hon. D. B. Papineau; and grandson of the late Hon. Louis Joseph Papineau, the well-known Canadian patriot. Born in Lower Canada; educated in Montreal. Called to the Bar, 1851. Appointed a Commissioner to enquire into charges against Didace Tassé as Collector of Inland Revenue, 28 Oct., 1862; a Commissioner for the Civil erection of Parishes for St. Hyacinthe, 12 Feb., 1869; to the Bench, vice Hon. J. A. Berthelot, resigned, 1 Sept., 1876. (Salary \$4,166.60.)—86 St. Denis Street, Montreal.

PATTERSON, Hon. CHRISTOPHER SALMON, a Fustice of the Court of Appeal, Ont. Of Irish parentage. Born in London, England, 1823; educated partly in England, and partly at the Royal Academical Institution, Belfast. Came to Canada 1845; studied law with Philip Low, Esq., Q.C., of Picton, Ont., and was called to the Bar of Upper Canada, in Hilary Term, 1851; married 1853, Mary, daughter of the late Andrew Dickson, Esq., of Glenconway, County Antrim, Ireland. Commenced practice in 1851, in partnership with Mr. Philip Low, O.C.; removed to Toronto in 1856, and practised there as one of the firm of Wilson (now Hon. Justice), Patterson and Beaty; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871; created a Q.C., 1872; a member of the Law Reform Commission, 1871; appointed to his present office, 6 June, 1874. (Salary \$4,999.92). Appointed a Commissioner to enquire into and report upon certain charges, publicly brought against the Central Committee of Examiners of the Educational Department of Ont., 24 Sept., 1877.—422 Jarvis Street, Toronto.

Peters, Hon. James Horsfield, an Assistant Judge of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island. Son of Thomas H. Peters, Esq., of Miramichi, N.B.; and grandson of James Peters, Esq., of Gagetown, same Province, a U. E. Loyalist. Born in St. John, N.B., 9 Jan., 1812; educated at King's College, Fredericton; married, Sept., 1838, Mary, eldest daughter of the late Sir Samuel Cunard, Bart., of Halifax. Called to the Bar of N.B., 1837; to that of N.S., 1838; and to that of P.E.I., same year. Was Solicitor-General of P.E.I., from 1838, to 18, and sat in the Legislative Council of that Province for several years. Appointed to the Bench, Sept., 1848. (Salary \$2,499.96).—"Sidmount," Charlottetown.

PLAMONDON, Hon. MARC AURELE, a Puisne, Fudge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Pierre Plamondon, Esq., by Aimée Mondion, both of the City of Quebec. Born in Quebec, 16 Oct., 1823; educated at the Quebec Seminary, where he greatly distinguished himself; married, Nov. 1859, Mdlle Mathilde L'Ecuyer, of Quebec. Studied law with the late Mr. J. G. Baird, and the late Hon. George (afterwards Judge Vanfelson), and was called to the Bar, 1846; practised his profession from 1847 to 1849, in partnership with the late J. M. Hudon, Esq., Q.C., and from 1849 to 1851, in partnership with F. Braün, Esq., now Secretary to the Department of Public Works. For more than twenty years Judge Plamandon was the only French Canadian practitioner in cases of importance in the Criminal Courts in the District of Quebec. Was twice an unsuccessful candidate, on the Liberal side, for the representation of the

City of Quebec in the Canadian Assembly, on the first occasion in April, 1857, in opposition to Mr. G. Okill, (now Judge) Stuart; and on the second in Dec., same year, with Messrs. Evantural and Huot, in opposition to Messrs. Alleyn, Simard, and Dubord. Appointed to the Bench, 9 Sept., 1874. (Salary \$3,999 96). Judge Plamondon was the founder in 1848, and first President of the Institut Canadien de Québec. As a journalist, in the Liberal interest, he purchased in 1842, the Artisan newspaper, which he published until its discontinuance in July, 1843; in the following year he established Le Ménestrel, a literary and musical weekly, and later on, the Courrier Commercial, both of which had to succumb, owing to the destruction of the printing establishment by fire. Finally, in 1855, in partnership with the present Mr. Justice Fournier, of the Supreme Court, and Mr. P. G. Huot, late M.P., he founded the National, a tri-weekly newspaper, devoted to the advancement of the principles of the Liberal party in Lower Canada, in which course, during its existence, up to 1858, it was very successful. — Arthabaskaville.

POLETTE, Hon. ANTOINE, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. Antoine Polette, by Marie Josephte Bertrand. Born at Pointe aux Trembles, P. Q., 25 August, 1807; educated at Quebec; married, 1st, Mdlle. Dubuc (she died); 2ndly, Mdlle. Duval (she died); 3rdly, the daughter of the late Hon. Justice W. K. McCord. Studied law with M. Hiliare Girard, subsequently with M. Joseph Lagueux, and was called to the Bar, 1828; created a Q. C., 1854. Appointed Warden of the District of Three Rivers, 1 January, 1842. Sat for Three Rivers in Canadian Assembly, from 1848 to 1857. Appointed a member of the Commission for the consolidation of the Public General Statutes of Lower Canada and Canada, respectively, 28 March, 1856; and in July of same year, served as a Commissioner to enquire into the falling of the Montmorenci Suspension Bridge. Appointed to the Bench, 21 April, 1860. (Salary \$3,999.96). Was one of the Royal Commissioners appointed in 1873, to enquire into the charges preferred against members of the then Dominion Government, in connection with the granting of a charter to the proposed Canadian Pacific Railway.—Three Rivers.

Pope, Hon. WILLIAM HENRY, Fudge of the County Court of Prince County, P.E.I. Descended from a Cornish family. Eldest son of Hon. Joseph Pope; and brother of the Hon. J. C. Pope, M. P. for Queen's county, in the House of Commons. Born at Bedeque, P. E. I., 29 May, 1825; educated at a private school in England; married, 1851, Helen, daughter of Thos. De Brisay, Esq., of Charlottetown. Called to

the Bar, 1848. Was Colonial Secretary of Prince Edward Island and ex officio Clerk of the Executive Council from 1863 to 1866, when owing to the opposition of his colleagues to the scheme for the Confederation of the British North American Provinces, he resigned, retaining, by permission of the Queen, the rank and title which he held whilst a member of the Executive Council. Was, in 1863, associated with the present Chief Justice Palmer in a delegation sent to confer with the Duke of Newcastle, then Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the subject of the award of the Royal Commission relative to differences between the landlords of Prince Edward Island and their tenants; and, in 1865-66, was a member of the commission sent by the several British North American Provinces to open trade relations with the West Indies, Mexico and Brazil. Was also a member of the Union Conference held at Charlottetown in 1864, and of that subsequently held in Quebec in the same year, when the basis of the scheme of union of all the British North American Colonies was adopted. Sat for Queen's county in Prince Edward Island Assembly from 1863 to 1866. Appointed Judge of the County Court 20 June, 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96).—" Fernwood," Charlottetown.

PRINGLE, JACOB FARRAND, Junior Judge of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, Ont. Son of Jas. Pringle, Esq., (descended from the families of Pringle of Torsonce, Abercrombie of Birkenbay, and Ogilvy, Earls of Airlie and Findlater), who served as an officer in the 81st regiment during the Peninsular War, and was Clerk of the Peace at Cornwall, from 1837 to 1857, by Ann Margaret, daughter of Joseph Anderson, Esq., a U. E. Loyalist, and granddaughter of Samuel Anderson, Esq., also a U. E. Loyalist, who was the first Judge of the District and Surrogate Courts for the Eastern District of Upper Canada. Born at Valenciennes, France, 27 June, 1816; educated at Cornwall Grammar School, by Rev. Dr. Urquhart; married, September, 1844, Isabella, third daughter of the late Hon. Alexander Fraser, of Fraserfield, M. L. C. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1839. Commenced practice in Cornwall in partnership with the present Judge Jarvis, and subsequently with his brother, Mr. J. D. Pringle. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1857. Was Clerk of the Peace and County Attorney from 20 February, 1858 until 15 November, 1866, when appointed to his present office. (Salary \$2,199.96).—Cornwall.

PROUDFOOT, Hon. WILLIAM, Vice-Chancellor of Ontario. Son of Rev. William Proudfoot, for many years Superintendent of the Theological Institute of the United Presbyterian Church, at London, Ont. Called

to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1849; created a Q.C., 1872; appointed to the Bench, 30 May, 1874. (Salary \$4,999.92).—Queen's Park, Toronto.

RAINVILLE, Hon. HENRI FELIX, LL.B., a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Educated at Laval University, from which he obtained degree of LL.B. Called to the Bar, 1862; appointed to the Bench, vice Hon. J. U. Beaudry, deceased, 3 Feb. 1876. (Salary \$5,000).—36 St. Denis Street, Montreal.

RAMSAY, Hon. THOMAS KENNEDY, M.A., a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Quebec. Son of David Ramsay, Esq., of Grimmet, Ayrshire, Scotland; born in Ayr, 2 Sept., 1826; educated there and at Madras College, St. Andrews; unmarried. Studied law with Messrs. Meredith, Bethune, and Dunkin, the senior of which firm is now Chief Justice of the Superior Court of Quebec, and was called to the Bar, 1852; created a Q.C., 1867. Received honorary degree of M.A., from Lennoxville. Was Secretary to the Commission appointed to codify the Civil Laws of Lower Canada, from 10 Feb., 1859, until 30 Oct., 1862; and was Prof. of Civil Law in Morrin College, Quebec, for several years previous to his appointment to the Bench. From 1864 to 1868, he was Counsel prosecuting for the Crown in the Montreal and other Districts. An unsuccessful candidate for Huntingdon in Canadian Assembly at general election, 1863, and for Chateauguay, in House of Commons, at general election, 1867. Was the founder of the Lower Canada Jurist, one of the earliest legal periodicals published in the Province, and he also edited The Law Reporter or Journal de Jurisprudence (Montreal, 1854). Author of Notes sur la Coutume de Paris, indiquant les articles encore en force avec tout le texte de la coutume à l'exception des articles relatifs aux Fiefs et Censives, les titres du Retrait Lingager et de la garde noble et bourgeoise (Montreal, 1863; 2nd ed., do. 1864, pp. 98, 8vo); Government Commissions of Enquiry (do., 1863); and a Digested Index to the Reported Cases in Lower Canada (Quebec, 1865). Appointed an Assistant Judge of the Superior Court, 5 Sept., 1870; and a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, 30 Oct., 1873. (Salary \$4,999.92). Represented the Crown on the well-known Lamirande extradition case. and in the prosecution of the Fenians at Sweetsburg, in 1866.—1122 St. Catharine Street, Montreal; "Ramsay Manor," St. Hugues, P.O.

REDDIN, DENNIS O'MEARA, Judge of the County Court of King's County, P.E.I. Of Irish descent. Born in Charlottetown, 1830; educated at St. Andrew's College, P.E.I., and at the Seminary of

Quebec; married Susan, daughter of Prof, Brown of the Central Academy. Called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1852. Was Law Clerk to the Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island for several years; Solicitor-General from 1852 to 1860; and Attorney and Advocate-General from September, 1867, to March, 1869. Appointed to his present position, 20 June 1873. (Salary \$2,199.96.)—Charlottetown.

RICHARDS, Hon. Sir WILLIAM BUELL, Knight, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada. Family came from Staffordshire, in England, and settled at Hartford, Conn., and Boston, at which latter place Judge Richards, a member of the family married the daughter of Governor Winthrop, of Massachusetts.\* Eldest son of the late Stephen Richards, of Brockville, Ont., by Phœbe, daughter of William Buell, Esq., a U. E. Loyalist, and an officer in the "King's Rangers," who represented Leeds in the Upper Canada Assembly, from 1801 to 1804. Born in Brockville, 2 May, 1815; educated at the Johnstown District Grammar School, and at Potsdam Academy, New York; married 1846, Deborah Catharine, daughter of John Muirhead, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, of Niagara, Ont., a grandson of Col. John Butler, of "Butler's Rangers" (she died March, 1869). Studied law with Mr. Andrew Norton Buell, late Accountant-General to the Court of Chancery, subsequently with the late Judge George Malloch, of Brockville, and was called to the Bar of Upper Canada in Michaelmas Term, 1837. Was for some years a member of the Town Council of Brockville. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1849; created a Q.C., (with special precedence, next after Attorney-General Baldwin), 1850.† Was a member of Executive Council, Canada, and Attorney-General for Upper Canada (succeeding the late Hon-Robert Baldwin, C.B., in that office), from 28 Oct., 1851 to 21 June, 1853, when appointed to succeed the late Hon. R. B. Sullivan as a Puisne Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, where he remained until 22 July, 1863, when promoted to be Chief Justice of that Court vice the late Hon. W. H. Draper, C.B., transferred to the Court of Queen's Bench. On 16 Nov., 1868, again succeeded Mr. Draper, as Chief Justice of Ontario, the latter being transferred to the Presidency of the Court of Error and Appeal. Appointed first Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Dominon, 8

Oct., 1875. (Salary \$8,000). Appointed Arbitrator on behalf of Ontario, for the settlement of the North-Western Boundary of the Province, 1874, a position he resigned in 1876. Appointed Deputy of the Governor-General of Canada (during the absence from Ottawa of the Earl of Dufferin, on an official visit to British Columbia), 29 July, 1876; appointed to the same office (and as such opened the Dominion Parliament), 6 Feb., 1878. Knighted by Her Majesty the Queen, 1877.\*— "Sandfield Place," 368 St. Paul Street, Ottawa; Rideau Club.

RITCHIE, Hon. JOHN WILLIAM, Judge in Equity of the Supreme Court of N.S. Son of the late Thomas Ritchie, Esq., one of the Judges of the Inferior Courts of Common Pleas of N.S. (now abolished); and brother of Hon. Justice Ritchie, of the Supreme Court of Canada, and late Chief Justice of New Brunswick (see post). Born at Annapolis Royal, N.S., 26 March, 1808; educated at Pictou; married the daughter of the late Hon. William Bruce Almon, M.D., late a Member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia. Called to the Bar, Nova Scotia, 1832; to that of Prince Edward Island, 1836. Is President of the Nova Scotia Historical Society. Held for some years the office of Law Clerk to the Legislative Council, Nova Scotia, of which body he became a member on 11 May, 1864, remaining there until called to the Senate, by Royal Proclamation, on the Union of British North America Provinces, 1867. Was a member of Dr. Tupper's Administration in Nova Scotia (holding the office of Solicitor-General) from 11 May, 1864, until the Union, and as such attended the London Colonial Conference, 1866-1867, to carry out the terms of Union of British North America. Was a Commissioner with Messrs. Young (Sir Wm.), Uniacke, and McCully, for revising and consolidating the Statutes of Nova Scotia;

RITCHIE, Hon. WILLIAM JOHNSTON, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. Son of the late Thomas Ritchie, Esq., one of the Justices of the Inferior Court of Nova Scotia, now abolished. Born at Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, 28 October, 1813; educated at the Pictou Academy, under the late Rev. Thomas McCulloch, D. D.; married, 1st, Miss Strang, of St. Andrew's, N.B. (she died); 2ndly, 1854, Grace Vernon, daughter of the late Thomas L. Nicholson, Esq., of St. John, and step-daughter of the late Admiral Hon. W. F. W. Owen, Royal Navy, of Campobello. Studied law with his brother, Hon. J. W. Ritchie, the present Judge in Equity for Nova Scotia, and was called to the Bar, New Brunswick, 1838. Created a O. C., 1854. Was a member of Executive Council, New Brunswick, from October, 1854, until appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, 17 August, 1855, in which position he remained until he succeeded the late Hon. Robert Parker as Chief Justice of New Brunswick, 6 December, 1865. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, 8 October, 1875. (Salary, \$7000). Sat for the City and County of St. John in New Brunswick Assembly from 1846 to 1851, when he retired; and from 1854 until his elevation to the Bench. Was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat in the liberal interest at general election, 1842. -" Beechwood," New Edinburgh; Rideau Club.

ROBINSON, CHARLES JOHN, Judge of the County Court of the County of Lambton. Son of Dr. Samuel Robinson, of 12 Eccles Street, Dublin; and nephew of Major William Robinson, 8th or King's Regiment, who commanded a Battalion of Incorporated Militia during the war of 1812, was severely wounded at Lundy's Lane, and for his services during the war was voted a sword of honour by the Upper Canada Legislature, and given a grant of land. Born in Dublin, Ireland, 1816; educated partly in England, at Middleton, County Cork, and at the University of Dublin; married, June, 1855, Selina, daughter of Major Arnold Robinson Burrowes, Grenadier Guards, who served throughout the Peninsular War on Lord Beresford's staff. Called to the Bar, Upper Canada, Trinity Term, 1842. Practised first at Niagara, then at St.

Catharines, in partnership with the present Judge Stevenson, of Haldimand, then at Ottawa with the late Mr. John Scott, and finally at Brantford. Appointed Commissioner of Bankrupts for District of Dalhousie, 2 September, 1848; to his present office, 17 March, 1855. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Sarnia.

Ross, WILLIAM AIRD, Judge of the County Court of the County of Carleton, Ont. Fourth son of the late Mr. Donald Ross, of Ardross, Rosskeen, Ross-shire, Scotland. Born at Ardross, 1815; educated in Scotland, and at Queen's University, Kingston, where he took degree of B.A., 1855; married the daughter of the late Rev. Wm. Durie, of Ottawa; studied Divinity for some years, but abandoning his intention of joining the church, he entered on the study of the law with his brother, and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1859; called to the Bar of Quebec, 1868. Was for many years in partnership with Hon. R. W. Scott, Q.C., now Secretary of State of Canada. Appointed Judge of Carleton, 22 September, 1874. (Salary \$2,199.96.)—Richmond Road, Ottawa.

ROUTHIER, Hon. ADOLPHE BASILE, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. Chas. Routhier, by Angelique Lafleur. Born at St. Placide, County of Two Mountains, P.Q., 8 May, 1839; educated at the College of St. Therese, where he was the first pupil to take the degree of B.A.; married, November, 1862, Marie Clorinde, only daughter of the late J. O. Mondelet, Esq., Advocate, of Three Rivers, and neice of the late Hon. Dominique and Hon. Chas. Mondelet, both Judges in Lower Canada; pursued his legal studies at Laval University (where he took the degree of B.L., in addition to that of B.A.,) and was called to the Bar, 1861; created a Q.C., 1873; practiced at Kamouraska for some years up to his elevation to the Bench, I September, 1873. (Salary \$3,499.92.) An unsuccessful candidate for Kamouraska in House of Commons, in January, 1869, and at general election 1872. Was well-known as a writer on literary, historical and political subjects. Author of Causeries du Dimanche, a volume published in 1871, and of other works. Since his elevation to the Bench has tried some important cases, the principal of which was the Charlevoix Dominion Election case.—Pointe au Pic, Murray Bay.

Savary, Alfred William, M.A., Q.C., Judge of the County Court of District No. Three, comprising the Counties of Annapolis, Digby and Yarmouth, N.S. A lineal descendant of Thomas Savary, variously spelt Savery and Savory, who came from England to Massachusetts about 14

years after the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers, among the passengers of the "John and Mary," the pioneers in the settlement of Ipswich and other towns since noted, and who finally settled at Plymton, now North Carver, Massachusetts. Grandfather (who subsequently represented Yarmouth in the Nova Scotia Assembly), removed to Nova Scotia in early part of present century. Son of Sabine Savary, Esq., of Plymton, Digby County, N.S., by Olivia Marshall. Born at Plymton, 10 October, 1831; educated at King's College, Windsor, where he graduated B.A., 1854, and M.A., 1857; married, 20 February, 1877, Bessie Crookshank, daughter of Henry P. Otty, Esq., of St. John, N.B. Called to the Bar of New Brunswick, 1857; to the Bar of Nova Scotia, 1861; created a Q.C., 1872. Commenced practice in New Brunswick, 1857, where he was principally engaged in commercial cases. Removed to Digby, Nova Scotia, in 1862, and in 1874 entered into partnership with T. C. Shreve, Esq., Q.C., and enjoyed an extensive practice in the Counties of Digby and Annapolis, and in the argument of causes from those counties before the Court in Banc at Halifax. Unsuccessfully contested Digby for Nova Scotia Assembly in 1863; but was returned for same constituency to House of Commons, at the Union in 1867, and continued to represent it there until general election 1874, when he was defeated. As a public man Mr. Savary was opposed to Confederation, but when the financial terms were rearranged he accepted the compromise, and with others of his colleagues, supported Mr. Howe in his entry into the Government, and he (Mr. Savary) was selected to move the address at the opening of the next Session of Parliament thereafter, in 1870. Appointed to his present office, 21 August, 1876. (Salary \$2,000.)—Digby.

Scott, Alexander Forsyth, Judge of the County Court of the County of Peel, Ont. Son of Mr. John Scott, of Aberdeenshire, Scotland. Born at Chinguacousy (now Brampton), Ont., 1 July, 1828; educated there; married Anna Sophia, only daughter of Wm. Furby, Esq., of Port Hope, Ont. Called to the Bar of Upper Canada, Easter Term, 1858; appointed to present office, 12 Dec., 1866. (Salary \$2,599.99).—Brampton.

SENKLER, EDMUND JOHN, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Lincoln, Ont. Eldest son of the late Rev. Edmund J. Senkler, M.A., of Caius College, Cambridge, who came to Canada in 1843. Born at Docking, Norfolk, England, 29 Jan., 1835; educated by private tuition. Married, 2 Oct., 1862, the daughter of the late James Cumming, Esq., of Glengarry, Ont. Pursued his legal studies with the

present Lieutenant-Governor Richards, of British Columbia (whose partner he afterwards became), subsequently with Hon. Stephen Richards, Q.C., now Treasurer of the Law Society, and was called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1860; created a Q.C., 1876; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1877; appointed County Crown Attorney for Leeds and Grenville, 7 Feb., 1863, and as such succeeded to the office of Clerk of the Peace for the same counties on the death of the late incumbent, in Nov., 1876; appointed to his present office 29 Nov., 1877. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—St. Catharines; Rideau Club.

SENKLER, WILLIAM STEVENS, Judge of the County Court of the County of Lanark, Ont. Second son of the late Rev. Edmund J. Senkler, M.A. (of Caius College, Cambridge), formerly of Docking, Norfolk, England. Born at Docking, Norfolk, England, 15 Jan., 1838; educated by his father; married, 1862, Honor, third daughter of Benjamin Tett, Esq., late M.P.P. for South Leeds. Studied law with the present Lieutenant-Governor Richards, of British Columbia, and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1861; appointed to present office, 18 Dec., 1873. (Salary \$2,414.99).—Perth.

SHERWOOD, Hon. GEORGE, Q.C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Hastings, Ont. Son of the late Hon. Levius P. Sherwood, a Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Upper Canada, by Charlotte, daughter of the late Ephraim Jones, Esq., of Augusta. Born in County Leeds, Ont., 29 May, 1811; educated at the Johnstown District Grammar School; married Marianne, daughter of the late Dr. Keegan, of Halifax, N.S. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1833, and commenced practice at Prescott; was in partnership for one year with the late Hon. Henry Sherwood, Q.C., and from 1847 to 1860 with the late Judge Steele. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1849; created Q.C., 1856. Appointed a Commissioner to enquire into management of Board of Works, 5 Sept., 1845. Was a member of the Executive Council, Canada, from 6 August, 1858, until 23 May, 1862, during which time he filled the offices of Receiver General and Commissioner of Crown Lands in succession. Sat for Brockville in Canada Assembly from 1841 to 1851, and from 1858 to 1863; was an unsuccessful candidate for same seat at general election, 1851, and at general election, 1854. Appointed to present office, 2 Sept., 1865. (Salary \$2,800).— Belleville.

SICOTTE, Hon. Louis Victor, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of M. Toussaint Sicotte, of the parish of Ste. Famille de

Boucherville, P. Q. Born at Ste. Famille, 7 Nov., 1812; educated at the College of St. Hyacinthe; married, 1837, Marguerite Amelie, sister of Hon. Henry Starnes, M.L.C., of Montreal. Studied law with Norbert Dumas, Esq., Q.C., of Montreal, and was called to the Bar, 1838; created a O.C., 1854. Sat for St. Hyacinthe in Canadian Assembly from 1851 until his elevation to the Bench, 5 Sept., 1863. (Salary \$3,999.96). Sworn of the Executive Council, 17 Aug., 1853, and was Commissioner of Crown Lands (in the Hincks-Morin Administration) from that date until 26th of same month, when he resigned; was Speaker of the House of Assembly from 5 Sept., 1854, until dissolution in Nov., 1857, when he entered the Tache-Macdonald Government as Commissioner of Crown Lands, where he remained until 29 July, 1858. From 6 August until 24 Dec. of same year he was Commissioner of Public Works in the Cartier-Macdonald Administration; and on the downfall of that Government in May, 1862, he became Attorney-General for Lower Canada in the new Administration formed by the late Hon. J. Sandfield Macdonald and himself, which office he continued to hold until the Cabinet was remodelled in May, 1863. Proceeded to England on public business, 1862, and while there acted as a Commissioner on behalf of Canada at the International Exhibition in London.—St. Hyacinthe.

SINCLAIR, JAMES SHAW, Q C., Judge of the County Court of the County of Wentworth, Ont. Son of Alexander Sinclair, Esq., of the Township of Ramsay, Lanark, Ont., and formerly of Caithnessshire, Scotland, by Elizabeth, daughter of the late John Shaw, Esq. Born in Ramsay, 7th April, 1838; educated at the Perth Grammar School, and by private tuition; married Henrietta, daughter of the Rev. James Padfield, of Burford, Ont. Studied with his uncle, the late Mr. William McNairn Shaw, M.P.P., and was called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1863; commenced practice in Goderich in partnership with Alexander Shaw, Esq., now of Walkerton; at the time of his appointment to the Bench, was senior partner of the law firm of Sinclair, Seager & Wade, at Goderich, and much occupied with nisi prius business. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1871 (he being then the youngest member of the Bar elected to that position); re-elected, 1876; and created a Q.C. same year. Conducted the important trial, on behalf of the Crown, of William John Beals, tried at Welland, 1874, for the murder of his wife, at Fort Erie, which resulted in a verdict of manslaughter. Was Crown Counsel in the conviction of McConnell, for the murder of Nelson Mills, at the Hamilton Winter Assizes for 1876. In this case the plea of

prisoner's insanity was set up and strongly urged by his Counsel, and still forms a theme for discussion among medical men; the prisoner was convicted and executed. He also defended Joseph France, for murder, at the Goderich Fall Assizes, in 1874, and Maria Elliott, for the murder of her child, at the Spring Assizes, in 1876, in both of which cases the prisoners were acquitted. Appointed to the Bench, 20th April, 1876. (Salary \$2,199.96).—104 Main Street, Hamilton; Hamilton Club.

SMITH, Hon. HENRY WILLIAM, a Puisne Fudge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Son of the late James Royer Smith, Esq., Q.C., formerly a member of the House of Assembly of St. Kitts, W. I., who removed to Nova Scotia, 1833, where he was admitted to the Bar and appointed Registrar of the Court of Vice-Admiralty. Born at St. Kitts, 1826; married, 1854, Mary A. E., second daughter of Lieut.-Col. James Poyntz, late of H. M. 30th Regiment of Foot. Called to the Bar, N. S., 1849. Was Judge of Probate for County Shelburne for some years, an office he resigned, 1857; and Registrar of Probates for County Queens, which he resigned, 1867. Was a delegate to England, with Messrs. Howe, Annand, and Troop, to obtain a repeal of the Union with Canada, 1868. Was Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, in Mr. Annand's Administration, from April, 1871, until 15th Jan., 1875, when appointed to the Bench, in the place of Hon. E. M. Dodd, resigned. (Salary \$3,999.96). Sat for Queens, in N. S. Assembly, from general election, 1867, until his elevation to the Bench.—Halifax.

SPRAGGE, Hon. JOHN GODFREY, Chancellor of Ontario. Son of the late Mr. Joseph Spragge, for many years Master of the Central School, York, U.C. Born 1807; educated at the Central School, and at the Home District Grammar School, under the late Dr. Strachan, afterwards Bishop of Toronto; married the daughter of Dr. Alex. Thom, Staff Surgeon, and Medical Superintendent of Military Settlements on the Rideau. Called to the Bar, U.C., in Michaelmas Term, 1828; elected a Bencher of the Law Society; and became Treasurer of that body, 1850. Was Surrogate Judge of the Home District from July, 1836, and Master in Chancery, U.C., from 20th June, 1837, until the Union, when appointed Master in Chancery to L. C. Canada, 10th June, 1841. Author of "A letter on the subject of the Courts of Law of Upper Canada, addressed to the Attorney-General and Solicitor-General." (Toronto: 1847, pp. 28. 8vo.) Appointed Registrar of the Court of Chancery, 13th July, 1844; Vice-Chancellor of Upper Canada, 1st January, 1851; and Chancellor, succeeding the late Hon. P. M. Vankoughnet, 27th December, 1869. (Salary \$6,000.) Was one of the Judges selected to make rules and orders regulating procedure in Judicial District Courts, 1858.—8 Portland Street, Toronto.

SQUIER, WILMOT RICHARD, Senior Fudge of the County Court of the County of Huron, Ont. Son of Henry Squier, Esq., by Clarinda, his wife. Born at Brighton, Ont., I June, 1842; educated at University of Victoria College, Cobourg, where he took degree of B.A., and obtained Prince of Wales' Gold Medal, 1864; married, June, 1869, Mary, 3rd daughter of Wm. Butler, Esq., of Brighton. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1869; appointed to his present office, 30 July, 1877. (Salary \$2,400).—Goderich.

STEADMAN, Hon. JAMES, Q.C., Judge of the County Courts of the Counties of York, Sunbury and Queens, New Brunswick. On father's side, descended from a loyalist, who settled at Cornwallis, N.S.; on mother's side, of Dutch descent. Born at Moncton, N.B., 27 March, 1818; educated there; married Mrs. Ring. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1846; created a Q.C., 1867. Was a member of Executive Council and Postmaster-General of N.B. from May, 1860, until April, 1865. Sat for Westmoreland, in N.B. Assembly, from 1854 to 1856, when he was defeated on the Prohibitory Liquor Law question (of which he was in favour); and from 1859 until 1865, when he was again defeated on the Confederation question, which he also favoured. Appointed to the Bench, 19 June, 1869. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Fredericton.

STEVENS, JAMES GRAY, Judge of the County Courts of the Counties of Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska, N.B. Youngest son of the late Andrew Stevens, Esq., W.S., and Solicitor of the Supreme Courts of Scotland, and Freeman of the City of Edinburgh, by the daughter of Sir Colin Campbell, of Auchinbrech, Argyleshire, Scotland. Born in Edinburgh, Scotland, 22 February, 1822; educated there at the Academies and at Edinburgh University. Came to Canada, 1840; and married the daughter of late John Marks, Esq., the descendant of a loyalist. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1847; created a Q. C., 1866. Author of "An Analytical Digest of the Decisions of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, from 1825 to Easter Term, 1873, inclusive (St. 70hn, 1873)"; and of an "Index to the Statutes, Rules, Orders, Regulations, Treaties, and Proclamations of the Dominion of Canada (St. Stephen, N.B., 1876). Sat for Charlotte, in N. B. Assembly, from 1861 until March, 1865, when defeated on Confederation question, of which he was in favour, and, again, from 1866 until his appointment

to his present position, 10 June, 1867. (Salary \$2,599.92.) While at the Bar had an extensive and varied practice in Law and Equity Courts. He was brought into more prominent notice in the conduct and argument of a case in Equity, in which he acted as Counsel for the plaintiffs—the President, Directors, and Company of the St. Stephen's Bank, against the New Brunswick and Canada Railway and Land Company. The case was appealed to the Privy Council in England, and the judgment of the Provincial Court was there sustained.—St. Stephen.

STEVENSON, JOHN GUSTAVUS, Fudge of the County Court of the County of Haldimand, Ont. Son of the late Lieut. Stevenson (half-pay); and grandson of the late Sir John Stevenson. Born at Niagara, Ont. Educated there; married, 1st, Mary, daughter of James Butler, Esq. (she died 1847); 2ndly, 1848, the daughter of Mr. Samuel Street, of Thorold. Studied law with the late Robt. Dickson, Esq., and the late E. C. Campbell, Esq., and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1840. Appointed Clerk of the Peace of Haldimand, 28 Dec. 1850; and Judge of the County, 22 Jan., 1855. (Salary \$2,599.92.)—Cayuga.

STRONG, Hon. SAMUEL HENRY, a Puisne Fudge of the Supreme Court of Canada. Son of Rev. S. S. Strong, D.D., formerly Rector of Bytown (now Ottawa). Born in Dorsetshire, England, 1825. Came to Canada when young, and was educated there. Called to the Bar, Ontario, Hilary Term, 1849. Created a Q.C., 1863. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society of Upper Canada, 1860. Was a Commissioner for consolidating the Public General Statutes of Upper Canada and Canada, respectively, from 20 Dec. 1856 to 5 Dec. 1859; and a member of the Law Reform Commission of Ontario, 1871. Appointed a Vice-Chancellor for Ontario, 27 Dec., 1869, where he remained until 27 May, 1874, when promoted to Court of Error and Appeal for that Province. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, on the organization of that Court, 8 Oct. 1875. (Salary \$7,000.)—Corner of Cumberland and Wilbrod Streets, Ottawa: Rideau Club.

STUART, Hon. Andrew, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Andrew Stuart, Esq., Solicitor-General for Lower Canada. Born in the City of Quebec, 1813; educated there; married, June, 1842, Charlotte Elmire, daughter of the late Phillippe Aubert De Gaspe, Esq. Studied law with the late Sir James Stuart, Bart., and on his elevation to the Bench, with the late Hon. Henry Black, C.B., afterwards Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty; and was called to the Bar, 1834. Created a Q.C., 1854; appointed an Assistant

Judge of the Superior Court, 10 Feb., 1859; and a Puisne Judge of the same Court, 6 June, 1860. (Salary \$4,999.92).—Mount Pleasant, Quebec.

STUART, Hon. GEORGE OKILL, Q.C., Judge of the Vice-Admiralty Court at the City of Quebec. Son of the late Rev. Okill Stuart (LL.D. of Harvard), for many years Archdeacon of Kingston and Dean of Upper Canada, by Lucy, daughter of General Brooks of Medford, near Boston, for several years Governor of the State of Massachusetts; and grandson of Rev. John Stuart, D.D., a U. E. loyalist, and the first minister of the Anglican Church in Upper Canada, who settled at Kingston, 1784. Born at York (now Toronto), 12 Oct., 1807. Educated partly at Kingston and partly at Quebec. Married Miss Margaret Black Stacy, niece of the late Hon. Henry Black, C.B., the late Judge of the Admiralty at Quebec. Pursued his legal studies with Mr., afterwards Sir James, Stuart, Attorney-General, and was called to the Bar, 1830. Created a O.C., 1854. [For the statement which follows respecting the subsequent career of Mr. Stuart, we are indebted to a friend]:-"In 1834, at the time in good practice, he published a volume of useful and interesting cases which had been determined in the Courts of Lower Canada. In the same year he entered into partnership with Mr. James Stuart, with whom he had studied, subsequently Sir James, which lasted until the elevation of the latter to the Chief Justiceship of Lower Canada in 1838. Entertaining a strong feeling for the advancement of the City of Quebec he consented to a nomination as a municipal councillor for his ward in 1844. In 1846, and for four years consecutively, he was chosen Mayor by a unanimous vote, and while holding that office he was the means of introducing into the City of Quebec, the supply of pure water from Lake St. Charles, for which the City is distinguished, and gave his aid to other necessary and useful improvements. Upon his retirement from the Mayoralty he was presented by the citizens generally, with a very valuable silver testimonial, designed in London.

"In 1852, two years after his retirement from the Mayoralty, he was put in nomination as a candidate to represent the City of Quebec, then the seat of Government, in the Provincial Parliament. He was elected by a triumphant majority over the candidates supporting the administration led by Sir Francis Hincks, and sat for Quebec during that Parliament. Opposed to the financial and railway policy of the party in power, he concurred in a vote of want of confidence passed in the House of Assembly which occasioned a dissolution. At the new election for

the City of Quebec Mr. Stuart was defeated by the candidates of the administration, including a Cabinet Minister, but on the re-assembling of Parliament the previous want of confidence vote was sustained by a failure of the Government to effect the election of Sir George Cartier as Speaker. A change of Government then took place. Mr. Stuart was named a Queen's Counsel and appointed a Judge to discharge duties as such, pending the session of Judges of the several Courts under the 'Seignioral Act of 1854.' In 1857 he was again solicited to stand for the representation of the City of Quebec, and after a sharp contest he was elected in opposition to the present Judge Plamondon, and sat for the City during that Parliament, in which he voted as an independent member. While in the Legislature he thoroughly advocated an intercolonial railway from Halifax, to the exclusion of one in connection with a foreign State, so as to connect at Quebec with and along the north shore of the St. Lawrence by rail to the west. With this object he acted with a deputation from the Lower Provinces and influential citizens at Quebec, who were successful in obtaining a change in the policy of the Government. Among other measures of public utility he introduced and carried through an Act but now taking effect; the North Shore Railway Act of 1853, whereby a railway connection with the Intercolonial to Halifax to extend from Ouebec to the far west will be secured. Since 1858 Mr. Stuart has been frequently pressed to allow his nomination to represent the City. but has declined, preferring the pursuit of his profession, to which he is strongly attached as well from education as choice, and in which he has been eminently successful, to a political life where the population is not homogeneous, and where national and religious questions render a political course extremely hazardous to one of a minority. In 1858 Mr. Stuart published in London his first volume of Admiralty Reports involving questions of maritime law of frequent occurrence in the trade and navigation of the Gulf and River St. Lawrence. These Reports are well known in England, and are frequently cited as authority in leading publications there, and are also held in high esteem in the United States.

"Under the late Administration, of which Sir John A. Macdonald, K.C.B., was the leader, Mr. Stuart received the appointment of Judge of the Admiralty, vacant by the decease of Mr. Black. Since then he has relaxed his practising in the other Courts and gives his attention almost exclusively to admiralty matters. In 1875 he published in London a second volume of Quebec Admiralty Reports, to which is added an appendix showing the Jurisdiction of the High Court of Admiralty—and of

the Vice-Admiralty Courts, a work of much use and highly appreciated by the legal profession. The business of the Vice-Admiralty Court at Quebec has much increased. It takes cognizance, when the res on the ship comes within the Province of Quebec, of maritime contracts and torts, whether arising on Canadian waters from Lake Superior to the Atlantic Ocean or upon the high seas; its jurisdiction as to amount is unlimited, and the only appeal from its decision is to Her Majesty in Her Privy Council, a tribunal hitherto but very rarely resorted to as its decisions have been rendered with much care and, when considered necessary, by the Judge, with the aid of nautical experience from gentlemen well skilled in the science of navigation. The Judge of the Admiralty ranks with the Judges of the Queen's Bench and Superior Courts."—(Salary \$2,000.)—St. Ursule Street, Quebec.

TASCHEREAU, Hon. HENRI ELZÉAR, a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Pierre Elzéar Taschereau, Esq., a member of the Assembly of Lower Canada, and subsequently of that of the United Provinces, by Catherine Hémédine, daughter of the late Hon. Amable Dionne, M.L.C. Is a cousin of Hon. Justice Taschereau of the Supreme Court (whom see). Born at Ste. Marie de la Beauce, P.Q., 7 Oct., 1836; educated at the Quebec Seminary; married May, 1857, Marie-Antoinette, daughter of the late Hon. R. U. Harwood, M.L.C, and Seignior of Vaudreuil. Studied law with the present Hon-Justice Taschereau of the Supreme Court, and was called to the Bar, 1857; created a Q.C., 1867; practised in Quebec in partnership with the present Judge Taschereau, then with the late Wm. Duval, Esq., and later on with Jean Blanchet, Esq., Q.C. Sat for Beauce in Canadian Assembly from general election, 1861, until the Union of 1867, when defeated for the House of Commons. Is author of The Criminal Law Consolidation and Amendment Acts of 1869, 32-33 Vict., for the Dominion of Canada as amended and in force on 1st Nov., 1874, in the Provinces of Ontario, Onebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, and on 1st June, 1875, in British Columbia, with Notes, Commentaries, Precedents of Indictments, &c., &c. (Vol. I., Montreal, 1874, pp. 796 R. 8vo.; Vol. II., Toronto, 1875, pp. 556 R. 8vo;\* and of La Code de Procédure Civile du Bas

<sup>\*</sup> Mr. C. S. Canada, with Annotations (Quebec, 1876). Appointed Clerk of the Peace for the District of Quebec, 30 Sept., 1868, an office he shortly afterwards resigned; appointed to the Bench, 12 Jan., 1871. (Salary, \$3,999.97).—Fraserville, Riviere du Loup (en bas).

TASCHEREAU, Hon. JEAN THOMAS, LL.D., a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. The Taschereau family is one of the oldest and most honourable in the Dominion. Thomas Jacques Taschereau, of Touraine, son of Christophe Taschereau, King's Counsellor, Director of the Mint, and Treasurer of the City of Tours, having come to Canada towards the beginning of the last century, was appointed Treasurer of the Marine, and in 1736 obtained the cession of a Seigniory, on the banks of the Chaudière. Son of the late Hon. Jean Thomas Taschereau, who for many years fought for constitutional liberty in the Parliament of ·Lower Canada, was imprisoned in 1810, and subsequently, after his release, was raised to the Bench, by Marie, daughter of the late Hon. Jean Antoine Panet, first Speaker of the House of Assembly of the old Province of Ouebec, an office he continued to hold for twenty years. Born in the City of Quebec, 12 Dec., 1814; educated at the Quebec Seminary, where he greatly distinguished himself; married, 1st, 1840, Louise Adele, daughter of the late Hon. Amable Dionne, M.L.C. (she died); 2ndly, 1862, Marie Josephine, daughter of the late Lieutenant-Governor Caron. Pursued his legal studies under the late Joseph André Taschereau, Esq., subsequently Solicitor-General, and a Judge of the Superior Court, and afterwards with late Hon. Henry Black, C.B., Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty; and was called to the Bar, Lower Canada, 1836, but subsequently followed several law courses in Paris, France. Created a O.C., 1860; received degree of LL.D. from Laval University, 1855; appointed an Assistant Judge of Superior Court, Lower Canada (to replace a Judge of the Superior Court at Quebec during the sittings of the Special Court appointed under the Act for the abolition of Feudal rights and duties in Lower Canada), 3 Sept., 1855; appointed an Assistant Judge of Superior Court, Lower Canada, at Kamouraska (to act during the absence on leave of Hon. J. A. Taschereau), 6 Nov., 1858; appointed an Assistant Judge of Superior

Morin, deceased), 11 Feb., 1865; appointed a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, Lower Canada, 11 Feb., 1873; appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of the Dominion, 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$7,000).—26 St. Louis Street, and Castel de Courcy, Quebec; Russell House, Ottawa.

TESSIER, Hon. ULRIC JOSEPH, LL.D. a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Son of the late Michel Tessier, Esq., merchant, of Quebec, by Marie Anne Perrault. The Tessier family came from La Rochelle, France, to Canada, as early as 1709. Born in City of Quebec, 4 May, 1817; educated at the Seminary of that city; married, 1847, Marie Adele Kelly Drapeau, grand-daughter of Joseph Drapeau, Esq., Seigneur of Rimouski and Orleans. Studied law with Hector S. Huot, Esq., and was called to the Bar of Lower Canada, 1839; created Q.C., 1863. Practised his profession in Quebec from 1839 until 1851. when being returned to Parliament he did not take a very active part in the business of his firm, and in 1870 he retired in favour of his partners, Messrs. Hamel and Tessier (his son). Elected Mayor of Quebec, 1851, (having previously sat in the City Council for some years), and in 1857 was sent to England, with the late Dr. Morrin, to advocate the claims of the city to become the seat of Government. Elected President of the Institut Canadien, Quebec, 1852. Author of Essai sur le Commerce et l'Industrie du Bas Canada (Quebec, 1854). Appointed Professor of Law Procedure in Laval University (from which institution he received the honorary degree of LL.D), 1856. Is the founder, and became the first President of La Banque Nationale of Quebec. Sat for Portneuf in Canadian Assembly from general election 1851 until general election 1854, when he temporarily retired from politics; but on the Legislative Council becoming an elective body, he (in 1858) contested the "Gulf" Division, being territorily the largest electoral district in the Province, and was returned by a majority of 3,830; here he continued to sit until the Union of 1867, when he was called to the Senate of the Dominion by Royal Proclamation; appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, replacing Mr. Justice Taschereau, 11 Feb., 1873; and was promoted to the Queen's Bench (again succeeding Judge Taschereau), 8 Oct., 1875. (Salary \$4,999.95). Was a member of the Sandfield Macdonald-Sicotte Administration, holding the office of Commissioner of

Public Works, from 24 May, 1862, to 27 May, 1863, when he retired with Mr. Sicotte; and was Speaker of the Legislative Council from 13 August, 1863, until Confederation, when, on the completion of his term of office, he was entertained by the members of the House at a complimentary banquet. As a lawyer, Mr. Tessier was retained in many important bank suits, one of which was brought against the City Bank and the Bank of Montreal for the recovery of £27,000; it was carried to the Court of Appeals, and while still pending was settled amicably by the three institutions.—Manor House, Rimouski; 70 St. Louis St., Quebec.

Toms, Isaac Francis, Junior Judge of the County Court of the County of Huron, Ont. Son of Mr. Albert Toms; born in County Norfolk; educated there. Called to the Bar, Hilary Term, 1865; appointed Deputy Judge of Huron and Bruce, 12 June, 1866; and Junior Judge of Huron, 2 Dec., 1872. (Salary 2,199.96).—Goderich.

TORRANCE, Hon. FREDERICK WILLIAM, M.A., B.C.L., a Puisne Fudge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late John Torrance, Esq., merchant, of Montreal, by Elizabeth Fisher, his wife. Born in Montreal, 16 July, 1823; educated there at private schools, at Nicolet College, at Edinburgh, Scotland, under private tutors, and at Edinburgh University, where he took the degree of M.A., 1844, ranking second in the order of proficiency in classics and mathematics in the examination for the degree. He had previously, in 1839-40, followed courses of lectures at Paris, France, at the Ecole de Medicine, Sarbonne, and the College de France. Unmarried. Studied law with the late Duncan Fisher, Esq., Q.C., and Hon. Jas. Smith, subsequently Attorney General for Lower Canada, and a Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, and was called to the Bar, 1848. Was Lecturer and Professor of Roman Law in McGill University (of which he is a governor, and from which he obtained the degree of B.C.L., 1856) from 1854 to 1870. Appointed a commissioner to inquire into the St. Albans' Raid affair, 1865. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, 27 August, 1868. (Salary \$4,999.99).-5 Beaver Hall Square, Montreal.

TREMAIN, BARCLAY EDMUND, Fudge of the County Courts of District No. seven, comprising the Counties of Cape Breton, Victoria and Richmond, N.S. Son of the late John Lewis Tremain, Esq., Barrister-at-law, of Port Hood, N.S., by Anna Kearney Caroline, second daughter of the late Hon. Chief Justice Dodd, of Cape Breton; and grandson of the late Jonathan Tremain, Esq., merchant, of Halifax. Born at Port Hood, 13

April, 1839; educated at Horton; married, at Halifax, Caroline, daughter of George J. Old, Esq., of Poole, England. Called to the Bar of Nova Scotia, 1862. Has been Registrar of Probates for Inverness. Was a candidate for Victoria, N.S., in House of Commons, Dec., 1874, but not returned, although in a majority; declared the sitting member, 17 April, 1875, and sat for the constituency until 21 August, 1876, when appointed to present office. (Salary \$1,898.35).—Baddeck.

Watters, Hon. Charles, Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty for New Brunswick, and Judge of the County Courts of St. John and Kings, in said Province. Of Irish descent, both father and mother having been natives of Dublin, Ireland. Born in City of St. John, N.B., Nov., 1818; educated at the Grammar School of that city; married Malvina, daughter of Major Priestley, formerly of H. M.'s 43rd Regiment. Called to the Bar, 1847. Sat for Victoria in New Brunswick Assembly from Sept., 1855, until 1860, and for City of St. John from latter year until 1865; and was a member of the Executive Council during the whole of that period, excepting one year, and held the office of Solicitor General from July, 1857, until Feb., 1865. While in public life was chiefly identified with the question of Confederation of British North American Provinces, which he strenuously supported from first to last. Appointed a County Court Judge, 10 June, 1867 (Salary \$2,599.92); and Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty, 1 Nov., 1876. (Salary \$600).—St. John.

WELDON, Hon. JOHN WESLEY, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. Of English descent, his grandfather having emigrated from England to New Brunswick in 1764. Second son of John Weldon, Esq., of Dorchester, N.B. Born 11 June, 1805; educated there; married first, Frances Chandler, youngest daughter of the late Hon. Justice Upham (she died, May, 1844); 2ndly, in 1848, Susan, eldest daughter of the late Hon. Justice Haliburton ("Sam Slick"), of N. S. Commenced the study of the law in the office of late Hon. Wm. Botsford, and, on his elevation to the Bench, finished his studies with Hon. E. B. Chandler, Q.C., and was called to the Bar, 1827; created a Q.C. 1843; elected a Bencher of the Barrister's Society, 1850. Commenced the practice of his profession at Richibucto, where he remained until 1857, in which year he removed to the City of St. John. Was a member of the Executive Council of New Brunswick from 1837 until 1842, when, owing to a difference with the then Lieutenant Governor, Sir Wm. Colebrooke, he resigned; and was speaker of the Legislative Assembly of that Province from 1843 until 1851, when he retired from politics.

Sat for Kent in New Brunswick Assembly from 1827 until 1851, when defeated. Subsequently declined a seat in the Legislative Council. Appointed to the Bench as the successor of Hon. J. W. Ritchie, now of the Supreme Court of Canada, 30 Nov., 1865. (Salary \$3,999.96).— Fredericton.

WETMORE, Hon. ANDREW RAINSFORD, a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. Descended from Thomas Whitmore (or Witmore), who came from West of England to Boston, Mass., 1635. Son of the late Thomas Ludlow Wetmore, Esq., Barrister, of New Brunswick, by the daughter of A. W. Rainsford, Esq., formerly Receiver-General of that Province; and grandson of Hon Thomas Wetmore, a U.E. Loyalist, who was Attorney-General of New Brunswick from 1809 until his death, 1828. Born at Fredericton, 16 August, 1820; educated there; married Louisa, daughter of late Thomas Lansdowne, Esq., Sheriff of Kent, New Brunswick. Called to the Bar, 1843; created a Q.C., 1863; was Clerk of the Crown in the Supreme Court for some years; and Attorney-General of New Brunswick, in his own Administration, from 21 August, 1867, until his elevation to the Bench, 26 May, 1870, vice Hon. Neville Parker, deceased. (Salary \$3,999.96). Sat for City of St. John, in New Brunswick Assembly, from March, 1865, until his appointment to the Bench.—St. John.

Wells, William Benjamin, Judge of the County Court of the County of Kent, Ont. Grandfather was a volunteer under Sir Wm. Pepperell, at taking of Louisbourg. Father and mother came to Upper Canada from New Hampshire, 1786. Born in township of Augusta, County Grenville, U.C., 3 Oct., 1809; educated at the Augusta Grammar School, under late Venerable Dean Bethune of Montreal, assisted by the present Bishop Bethune of Toronto; married Miss Hogan, formerly of Newfoundland. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1833. Sat for Grenville, in Upper Canada Assembly, from 1834 to 1837, when his seat was declared vacant. Was a delegate to England in 1836, with Messrs. Baldwin and Duncombe, to protest against the administration of Sir F. B. Head in Upper Canada, and while there wrote and produced Canadiana: containing Sketches of Upper Canada, and the Crisis in its Political Affairs (London, 1837). He established the Vanguard newspaper at Prescott in 1834, in the Reform interest, and has been a constant contributor to the press ever since. Appointed Judge of Kent and Lambton, 27 Dec., 1850, and of Kent (on division of the counties), 11 Jan., 1851. (Salary, \$2,599.92).—Chatham.

WILKINS, Hon. LEWIS MORRIS, D.C.L., a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. Son of the late Hon. Lewis Morris Wilkins, for many years Speaker of the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, and subsequently a Judge of that Province; and grandson of Isaac Wilkins, a loyalist. (See Sabine, and Sparke's Life of Gouverneur Morris.) Born in Halifax, N.S., 24 May, 1801; educated at King's College, Windsor, where he obtained degrees of B.A. and D.C.L.; married Sarah Rachel, daughter of — Thomas, Esq., of Marshfield, near Boston, Mass. (she died). Called to the Bar, 1822; created a Q.C., 1844, Was Provincial Secretary of Nova Scotia from 1854 to 1856. Sat for Township of Windsor in Nova Scotia Assembly from 1835 to 1839, when he was elevated to the Legislative Council, and there remained until 1844, when he was returned to the Assembly for County of Hants, which he continued to represent almost continuously up to his appointment to the Bench, as 'the successor of Mr. Justice Haliburton ("Sam Slick"), 14 August, 1856. (Salary \$3,999.96).—Halifax; Windsor.

WILKINSON, WILLIAM HENRY, Judge of the County Court of the Counties of Lennox and Addington, Ont. Youngest son of the late Mr. Wm. Wilkinson, of Kingston, Ont., and formerly of Belfast, Antrim, Ireland. Born in Kingston, 3 Nov., 1838; educated at the Grammar School there; married, May, 1863, Isabella Allan, eldest daughter of Wm. Allan Geddes, Esq., Barrister-at-law. Called to the Bar, Michaelmas Term, 1861. Appointed County Crown Attorney and Clerk of the Peace for Lennox and Addington, 30 Sept., 1864; and County Judge for same counties, 28 May, 1869. (Salary \$2,599.92).—Napanee.

WILSON, Hon. Adam, a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Ontario. Born in Edinburgh, Scotland; came to Canada, 1830; married the daughter of the late Thos. Dalton, Esq., for many years editor and proprietor of the Toronto Patriot newspaper. Was engaged for three years in mercantile pursuits under his uncle, the late Mr. Geo. Chalmers, M.P.P. for Halton. Studied law with the late Hon. Justice Sullivan, then of the law firm of Baldwin and Sullivan; was called to the Bar of Upper Canada in Trinity Term, 1839, and became a partner of the late Hon. Robt. Baldwin, C.B., which connexion continued until Mr. Baldwin retired from the profession; created a Q.C., 1850, and in same year was elected a Bencher of the Law Society. Appointed a Commissioner in 1856 for the consolidation of the public general statutes of Canada and of Upper Canada respectively. Elected an alderman of Toronto, 1855, and was mayor of that city in 1859 (being the

first chief magistrate elected by popular suffrage), and again in 1860. Author of A Sketch of the Office of Constable (Toronto, 1861). Was Solicitor-General for Upper Canada in the Sandfield Macdonald-Sicotte Administration from 24 May, 1862, until 11 May, 1863, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Upper Canada, where he remained until 24 August of same year, when transferred to the Court of Common Pleas; on 12 Nov., 1868, he was again appointed to the Court of Queen's Bench, succeeding Hon. J. H. Hagarty therein, who had been appointed Chief Justice of the Common Pleas. (Salary \$4,999.92). Sat for North York, in Canadian Assembly, from Jan., 1860, until his elevation to the Bench. Was an unsuccessful candidate for West Toronto at the general election of 1861. A member of the Law Reform Commission, 1871.—Spadina Crescent, Toronto.

WILLISTON, Hon. EDWARD, Q.C., Fudge of the County Courts of the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche, N.B. Father and maternal ancestors came from the United States shortly after the American Revolution. Born in Glenelg, Northumberland, N.B., 18 Oct., 1813; educated at the County Grammar School; married, Sept., 1854, the daughter of Henry Mignovitz, Esq., of Halifax, N. S. Called to the Bar, 1838; created a Q.C., 1866. Was Solicitor General of New Brunswick from 14 April, 1866, until the Union of 1867, when he was appointed to his present office, (Salary, \$2,599.) Sat for Northumberland in New Brunswick Assembly from 1855 until the Union.—Newcastle.

Wood, Hon. Edmund Burke, Chief Justice of Manitoba. Fourth son of the late Mr. Samuel Wood, who, in 1818, removed from Fort Erie to eastern part of Township of Dumfries, and thence, in 1839, to Township of Beverley, by Charlotte, his wife. Born at or near Fort Erie, Ont., 13 Feb., 1820; educated at the common schools and at Oberlin College, Ohio, where he graduated B.A., 1848; married, April, 1855, Jane Augusta, second daughter of Dr. Peter Marter, of Brantford, and formerly of St. Andrews, N.B. Studied law in the office of Messrs. Freeman and Jones, Hamilton, and was called to the Bar, Trinity Term, 1848; called to the Bar of Manitoba, 1874; created a Q.C., 1872; elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1873. Was in partnership for five years with Mr. P. B. Long, of Brantford, and always enjoyed an extensive and lucrative practice. Was first Clerk of the County Court and Clerk of the Crown for Brant when the county was first erected, 1853. Entered Mr. Sandfield Macdonald's Government in Ont., in July, 1867,

as Provincial Treasurer; resigned, Dec., 1871. Sat for West Brant in Canadian Assembly from general election, 1863, until the Union, 1867, when returned to both Local Assembly and House of Commons, and continued to sit in latter chamber until the general election, 1872, when owing to the operation of the Act against dual representation, he retired from the Parliament at Ottawa. During the early part of 1873, Mr. Blake, who had been returned for two places, West Durham and South Bruce, elected to sit for the latter, and so rendered West Durham vacant. The representation of this constituency was pressed upon Mr. Wood, and after some hesitation, he retired from the Local Assembly, and was returned for West Durham to the Commons by acclamation, where he continued to sit until 11 March, 1874, when he was appointed Chief Justice of Manitoba. (Salary \$4,999.92). Appointed Administrator of the Government of Manitoba and the North-West Territories during the absence, &c., of the Lieutenant-Governor, 26 August, 1874. Was one of the chief projectors and promoters of the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway, extending from the waters of Lake Huron to Fort Erie on the Niagara River, and until its amalgamation with the Grand Trunk Railway, was its solicitor and legal adviser. While at the Bar was engaged in many important cases, the most important being Whitehead vs. Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway Co., involving a large amount of money and many grave questions of law-it was instituted in Chancery, and carried to the Court of Error and Appeal; and Widder vs. Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway Co., in which the plaintiff ultimately, on payment of his costs, abandoned his action. When in Parliament, was the author of the scheme for the settlement of the Municipal Loan Fund of Upper Canada, and made all the calculations upon which that scheme was finally carried into effect, the last session he was in the Ontario Assembly. The financial speeches of the Chief Justice, as Treasurer of Ontario (which have been printed in pamphlet form), will give some idea of the perfect knowledge he had of the finances of the Province of Ontario, and with what ability he managed the Department over which he presided for four years. It may with truth be said that he laid the foundation of Ontario's financial status. But his great achievement was in bringing to a triumphant conclusion the financial arbitration between Ontario and Quebec. For years, in the House of Commons, he had struggled to effect an adjustment of the financial rights of Ontario. The accurate knowledge of the financial history of Canada, already referred to, and the ability in dealing with the whole question, displayed by Mr. Wood before the

arbitrators, were such as to challenge the highest encomiums, and led to an award (which was drafted by him) which fully came up to the expectations of the most sanguine in his own Province. Since his elevation to the Bench, has delivered many judgments of public importance, but as there is no reporter in Manitoba as yet, his judgments have not been regularly reported. In two cases the Local Government thought the judgments of sufficient general interest to order them to be published for distribution among Justices of the Peace and others. These cases are Regina vs. Dease, and Regina vs. Schultz; in the latter case the Chief Justice ordered a mandamus to issue commanding Mr. Justice Betournay, acting as a police or stipendiary magistrate, to hear on a preliminary examination before him on a charge of perjury, witnesses produced for the defendant. It was contended he was by law entitled to hear only such witnesses as were produced and offered by the prosecutor. He (the Chief Justice) held he was at liberty and of right ought to hear all the witnesses by whomsoever produced who knew anything material as to the facts and circumstances of the charge. This is no doubt an important decision on what before was a moot question. The case of Dease is also important, especially as affecting the Indians, and the punishment of parties giving them any intoxicants. But the most interesting and important case that has come before Chief Justice Wood, was the celebrated case of the Queen vs. Lepine re Scott murder. This was the first argument he heard on his taking his seat on the Bench. The prisoner had pleaded to the indictment, a plea denying the jurisdiction of the Court in Manitoba, or of the Courts of Canada, over the offence charged in the indictment; to this plea the Crown had demurred. The case had been argued before the two Puisne Judges, and had been standing over from term to term without their rendering a decision. Chief Justice Wood at once heard the argument, and without leaving the Bench, on the conclusion of the argument, pronounced judgment for the Crown on the demurrer. He held that both the Court in Manitoba and the Courts in the old Province of Canada, and since Confederation in Ontario and Quebec, had concurrent jurisdiction of offences of this kind, and over this offence. This had been denied by high legal authority; the late Hon. J. Hillyard Cameron, Q.C., and the late D'Arcy Boulton, Q.C., having published a formal written opinion denying this; and Hon. J. H. (now Justice) Gray having published in the Revue Legale (Sorel), an elaborate article also taking the same ground. The same view was held and announced in the House of Commons by the then leader of the Government, and shared in by most of the legal gentlemen then holding seats, but had always been vigorously denied by Mr. Wood. On reference to the law officers of the Crown in England on a revision of the case, with a view to the commutation of Lepine's sentence, the judgment of the Chief Justice on the plea to the jurisdiction was affirmed and upheld. His remarks in pronouncing the sentence of the law on Lepine were much commended. The trial, which involved most complicated questions of fact and constitutional law, lasted two weeks, and excited very general interest throughout the Dominion.— Winnipeg.

Young, Hon. Charles, LL.D., Surrogate and Judge of Probate, P.E.I. Youngest son of the late Hon. John Young; and brother of Hon. Sir William Young, Chief Justice of Nova Scotia (whom see). Born in Glasgow, Scotland, April, 1812. Educated at Dalhousie College, Halifax. Married Lucretia, daughter of John Starr, Esq. Studied law with Sir Wm. Young, in Halifax; was called to the Bar of Nova Scotia, 1838; and to that of Prince Edward Island in the same year. Practised for a short time in partnership with his brothers, the present Sir William Young, and the late Hon. G. R. Young. Created a Q.C., (the first appointed in P. E. I.) 23 Nov., 1847. Was Attorney-General of Prince Edward Island from 29 May, 1851 to 2 May, 1853, and from 29 June, 1858 to 11 April 1859; and was Administrator of the Government of Prince Edward Island from 26 May to 7 June, 1859.\* Received the honorary degree

of LL.D. from Newton University. Appointed Judge of Probate, 1852, and Judge in Bankruptcy, 1868. (Saiary \$ .) Returned for Queens to Island Assembly in April, 1840, and in December same year was appointed to the Legislative Council, where he sat until 1863, during the last ten years of which service he was President of that body. Judge Young was the first to advocate Responsible Government in Prince Edward Island, and was with others, instrumental in having it established in 1851, together with free schools, freehold lands for the tenantry, savings banks, and other reform measures.—Charlottetown.

Young, Hon. Sir William, Knight, Chief Justice of Nova Scotia. Eldest son of the late Hon. John Young, the well known author of the letters of "Agricola," who for many years occupied a seat in the Nova Scotia Assembly, by Agnes, daughter of Geo. Renny, Esq., of Falkirk, Scotland. Born at Falkirk, 29 July, 1799. Educated at Glasgow University. Married, 10 August, 1830, Anne, daughter of the late Hon. Michael Tobin, M.L.C. Studied law with the late Charles Rufus Fairbanks, Esq., K.C., afterwards Solicitor-General, and was called to the Bar of Nova Scotia, 1826. Called to the Bar of Prince Edward Island, 1835. Created a O.C., 1843. Was in partnership for some years with his brothers, the late Hon. George R. Young, M.P.P., author of the well-known work on Colonial Literature, Science and Education, and Hon. Charles Young, LL.D., now a Judge in Prince Edward Island. Was a Commissioner (with others) for consolidating the Statutes of Nova Scotia. Entered Nova Scotia Assembly, 1832, as one of the representatives of Cape Breton, and while a member of that body, sat successively for that Island, for Inverness and for Cumberland. Was Speaker of the Nova Scotia Assembly, and became Attorney General, 3 April, 1854, an office he again held in his own Administration from 1856 to 1857, when he retired, retaining his rank as an Ex-Councillor, by special permission of Her Majesty. Appointed Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, August, 1860-(Salary \$4,999.92); and was subsequently appointed Judge of the Court of Vice-Admiralty. (Salary \$600). Knighted by Her Majesty, 1868. -Halifax; Halifax Club.

ARMSTRONG, Hon. JAMES, Chief Justice of the Island of St. Lucia, West Indies. Son of the late Captain Charles Armstrong, of Sorel. Born at Berthier, Province of Quebec, 27 April, 1821; educated there; married. 1843, Marie Anne Charlotte, daughter of Hercule Olivier, Esq., of Berthier; pursued his legal studies with the late Henry Driscoll, Esq., Q.C., and the late Henry Stuart, Esq., Q.C., and was called to the Bar, 1844. Created a Q.C., 1867. Practised for some years in Montreal, in partnership with the late Hon. A. N. Morin, afterwards a Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Author of A Treatise on the Law relating to Marriages in Lower Canada (Montreal, 1857). Was Crown Counsel for the District of Three Rivers from 1864, up to the period of his leaving Canada, and while fulfilling the duties of that office conducted the prosecution of Modeste Provencher, for the poisoning of one Joutras, by strychnine, a trial that attracted great public attention at the time, and won for Mr. Armstrong very high praise for the manner in which he conducted his side of the case. Appointed Chief Justice of St. Lucia, 1871. (Salary £730 sterling). Since his appointment, has, in conjunction with Mr. G. W. Des Voeux, C.M.G., consolidated the Laws of the Colony, for which he has received the thanks of the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies.—Castries, St. Lucia.

BADGLEY, Hon. WILLIAM, D.C.L., late a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Son of the late Francis Badgley, Esq., merchant, of Montreal, who represented that city in the Provincial Parliament from 1801 to 1805. Born in Montreal, 27 March, 1801; educated there; married Miss Eliza Taylor (she died 1874). Studied with the late B. B. Beaubien, Esq., of Montreal, and was called to the Bar, 1823; created a Q.C., 1847. Author of Remarks on Register Offices (1837). Received honorary degree of D.C.L., from McGill University, 1843. Sat for

Missisquoi in Canadian Assembly from general election 1844 to 1851, and for the City of Montreal from latter date up to general election 1854, when defeated. Was a Commissioner of Bankrupts for the District of Montreal from 1840 to 1844, in which year he was appointed a District Judge, both of which offices he resigned in April, 1847. Was a member of the Executive Council, and Attorney-General for Lower Canada from 23 April, 1847, to 10 March, 1848. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, 27 January, 1855, where he remained until 12 September, 1863, when transferred to the Court of Queen's Bench as Assistant Judge, and so continued until 18 August, 1866, when appointed a Puisne Judge of that Court. Retired on a pension, 28 Feb., 1874. (Pension \$3,333.34).—99, St. François Xavier St., and 64, McGill College Avenue, Montreal.

BROUGH, SECKER, late Judge of the County Court of the County of Huron, Ontario. Called to the Bar, Easter Term, 1840. Elected a Bencher of the Law Society, 1850. Created a Q.C., 1858. Appointed Judge of the County Court of the Counties of Huron and Bruce, 17 Nov., 1866. Retired on a pension, 25 July, 1877. (Pension \$1,600).

BRUNEAU, Hon. JEAN CASIMIR, late a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late M. François Bruneau, of Montreal, by Thérese Leblanc, his wife; born in Montreal, 2 May, 1801; educated there. Studied with the late Hon. C. C. S. DeBleury and Stephen Sewell Esq., and was called to the Bar, 1825; appointed a District Judge of Lower Canada, 1 Feb., 1842; a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of same Province, 25 Nov., 1857. Retired on a pension 5 Sept., 1863 (Pension \$2,133 34).—Quebec.

COCHRANE, Sir James, Knight, tate Chief Justice at Gibraltar. Son of the late Hon. Thomas Cochrane, Speaker of the House of Assembly, Nova Scotia. Born in Halifax, Nova Scotia, 1798; educated there; married, 1829, Theresa, daughter of Colonel William Haly (she died, 1874). Called to the Bar at the Inner Temple, 1829; was Attorney-General of Gibraltar from 1837 to 1841, in which year he was appointed Chief Justice of same place, an office he resigned in 1877. Knighted by Her Majesty, 1845.—Gibraltar; Thatched House Club, London, England.

DAY, Hon. CHARLES DEWEY, LL.D., D.C.L., late a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Ithamer H. Day, Esq., merchant, Montreal, by Laura Dewey, his wife. Born about 1806; educated in Montreal; married the daughter of the late Benjamin Holmes, Esq. Pursued

his legal studies with Mr. Samuel (afterwards Judge) Gale, and was called to the Bar, 1827; created a Q.C., 1837; is President and Chancellor of McGill University, Montreal; appointed Deputy Judge-Advocate (with the late Hon. Dominique Mondelet, Q.C., and Capt. E. A. Muller, 1st Royals) at the State Trials in Montreal, 28 Nov. 1838 (and as such received the thanks in General Orders of His Excellency Sir John Colborne, then Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief); was a member of the Special Council of Lower Canada from 1838 to 1840; sat for Ottawa (County) in the Canadian Assembly, from general election 1841 to 29 June, 1842, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Court of Oueen's Bench of Lower Canada; was Solicitor-General of Lower Canada, and a member of the Executive Council of Canada, from 13 Feb., 1841, up to his elevation to the Bench; appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, 1 Jan., 1850. Retired on a pension 1 Oct., 1862, (Pension \$2,666 64). Was a Commissioner for the codification of the Civil Law of Lower Canada, from Feb., 1859 until the completion of that great work, in May, 1866; Commissioner to represent the Province of Quebec on the Dominion Arbitration Commission from May, 1868, to July, 1870; and was Chairman of the Royal Commission, appointed 14 August, 1873, to inquire into certain charges then preferred in Parliament against the then Dominion Administration in connection with the construction of the proposed Canadian Pacific Railway. Mr. Day was also a Commissioner some years ago on behalf of the Hudson's Bay Company, in preferring certain claims against the United States Government, under the treaties of 1846 and 1863.—St. Lawrence Hall, Montreal.

Drummond, Hon. Lewis Thomas, late a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Born in Londonderry, Ireland. Came to Canada when twelve years of age, and was educated at Nicolet College; married, 16 Nov., 1842, Elmire, eldest daughter of the late Hon. P. D. Debartzch. Called to the Bar of Lower Canada, 1836; and to that of Upper Canada, in Michaelmas Term, 1860. Created a Q.C., 1848. Was Solicitor-General for Lower Canada (during the Lafontaine-Baldwin Government) from 7 June, 1848 to 27 Oct., 1851; when he joined the Hincks-Morin Administration as Attorney-General for Lower Canada, an office which he resigned 23 May, 1856. Was Attorney-General for Lower Canada (in the Brown-Dorion Administration) from 2 to the 6 August, 1858; and Commissioner of Public Works (in the Macdonald-Dorion Administration) from 28 May to 23 July, 1863,

when he resigned. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench of Lower Canada, 5 March, 1864; retired on a pension, 27 Oct., 1873. (*Pension*, \$3,333.24). Sat for Portneuf in Canadian Assembly from general election, 1844, to general election, 1848, when returned for Shefford, which he continued to represent until Sept., 1858, when defeated; for Lotbinière from Oct., 1858, until June, 1861; and for Rouville, from general election, 1861, until general election, 1863, when defeated.

DUVAL, Hon. JEAN FRANGOIS JOSEPH, late Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench of Quebec. Son of the late Frangois Duval, Esq., of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Volunteers, by Anne Germain, his wife. Born in the City of Quebec, 18 July, 1801; educated at the celebrated academy of Dr. Wilkie, Quebec; married, 1848, Adelaide, fourth daughter of the late —— Dubuc, Esq., merchant, of Quebec, and relict of the late Joseph Duval, Esq., of Three Rivers. Pursued his legal studies with Mr. George (afterwards Judge) Vanfelson, and with Mr. J. R. (afterwards Chief Justice) Vallières de St. Real, and was called to the Bar, 1823. Created a Q.C., 1848. Appointed an Assistant Judge of the Court of King's Bench of Lower Canada, 24 June, 1839; a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, 1 Jan., 1852; a Puisne Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench, same Province, 27 Jan., 1855; and Chief Justice of that Court, 5 March, 1864. Retired on a pension, 30 May, 1874. (Pension, \$3,999.96).—56 St. Louis St., Quebec.

LAFONTAINE, Hon. FRANGOIS XAVIER AIME, late a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late M. Frangois Robert dit Lafontaine, Menuisier, of Three Rivers, P.Q., by Marie Josephte Paradis, his wife. Born at Three Rivers, 7 Oct., 1810; educated at Nicolet College. Studied with the late P. B. Dumoulin, Esq., Q.C., and was called to the Bar, 1838. Was for many years Crown Lands Agent and Prothonotary and Clerk of the Crown for the District of Ottawa. Appointed a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Lower Canada, 11 May, 1859. Retired on a pension, 19 May, 1876. (Pension \$2,666.64).—"Fontaine Vale," Aylmer, P.Q.

LAWDER, JOHN MAJORIBANKS, late Judge of the County Court of the

MARSHALL, Hon. JOHN G., late Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. Son of the late Captain Marshall, who represented a constituency in the Nova Scotia Assembly for several years. Born in Nova Scotia, 1786; educated at the Provincial Grammar School, Halifax; married,

Called to the Bar, Nova Scotia, 1808. Sat for Cape Breton, in Nova Scotia Assembly, from 1811 to 1823. Appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Common Pleas, Cape Breton, 29 April, 1823; retired on a pension, 1841. (*Pension* \$1,200.) Well known as a public lecturer on subjects connected with temperance and social science; and is the author of various works and pamphlets. (See the *Bibliotheca Canadensis*, Ottawa, 1867).—*Halifax*.

Roy, Hon. David, late a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late M. Joseph Roy, of Quebec, by Marie Brunette. Born in City of Quebec, 9 June, 1807; educated there. Studied law with the late Andre Remi Hamel, Esq.; and was called to the Bar, 1832. Appointed a Deputy Judge of Lower Canada, 13 Oct., 1842; a Circuit Judge, 24 Dec., 1849; a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court, 25 Nov., 1857. Retired on a pension, 7 Jan., 1871. (Pension, \$1,866.60.).

WILMOT, Hon. LEMUEL ALLEN, D.C.L., late a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. Son of the late Wm. Wilmot, Esq., of Sunbury, N.B., by Hannah, daughter of Daniel Bliss, Esq.; and grandson of Major Lemuel Wilmot, formerly of the Loyal American Regiment, who settled in New Brunswick at the close of the American Revolution, and married Elizabeth, sister of the Hon. Samuel Street, of Niagara. On mother's side is descended from Colonel Murray, a wellknown Loyalist. Born in Sunbury, N.B., Jan., 1809; educated at the Grammar School, and King's College, Fredericton; married, 1st, the daughter of the Rev. J. Balloch (she died); 2ndly, the daughter of the late Hon. Wm. A. Black, M.L.C. of Halifax. Called to the Bar, 1832; created a Q.C., 1838; received degree of D.C.L. from University of New Brunswick. Was for many years the leader of the Liberal party in New Brunswick. Was a member of the Executive Council of that Province, without office, from 1843 to 1845, when he resigned; and held the Attorney-Generalship, in his own Administration, from 1848 until Ian., 1851, when appointed a Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, from which office he retired 27 July, 1868, on his appointment as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick. On the expi-

ration of his term of office as such, 14 November, 1873, retired on a judicial pension. (Pension \$2,133.33.) Appointed second Commissioner under the P.E.I. Land Purchase Act of 1875 (succeeding the Right Hon. H. C. E. Childers, M.P., in that office), 9 Sept., 1875. Sat in New Brunswick Assembly from 1834 up to the period of his appointment to the Bench. For the following additional facts we are indebted to the Canadian Parliamentary Companion: - "Raised and commanded a troop of Volunteer Dragoons, who performed despatch duty, pending border difficulties, 1838-39; raised and commanded two rifle companies, 1842; raised and commanded a troop of Dragoons for escort duty to the Prince of Wales, on his visit to this country, 1860, and received personally the thanks of His Royal Highness for the service. Was a delegate to England on subject of Crown Revenues and Civil List, 1836, and again on same subjects, 1837, and received a unanimous vote of thanks from the Assembly for the successful conduct of business; a delegate to Washington on the subject of reciprocal trade, 1850, and to Portland Railway Convention, same year, when E. & N. A. Railway was agreed upon. Attended, with the late Sir Ed. Head, a meeting of the Canadian Government at Toronto, on colonial questions, and again, same year, a Convention at Halifax of the Governments of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, on the same questions. Prepared the several Acts of the Legislature of New Brunswick on Collegiate reform. Consolidated the Criminal Laws, 1849, and all the laws relating to counties, towns, and parishes, 1850."-Fredericton, N.B.

WINTER, Hon. PIERRE, late a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec. Son of the late Mr. Robert Winter, of Quebec, by Julie Létourneau, his wife. Born in the City of Quebec, 25 Feb., 1808; educated there. Studied with the late M. Joseph Lagueux, then with the late François Remain, and finally with the late M. Edouard Desbarats; and was called to the Bar, 1833. Appointed a Clerk of the Bankrupt Court, District of Gaspé, 29 Nov., 1847; Joint Clerk of the Peace, Clerk of the Crown, and Clerk of the Circuit Court, 29 Jan., 1856; a Puisne Judge of the Superior Court of Quebec, 29 March, 1858. Retired on a pension, 4 Nov., 1874. (Pension \$2,333.28).—Percé, P.Q.

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
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
