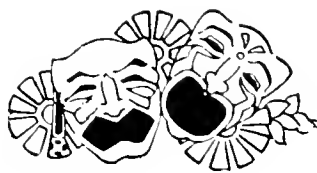

TIGERS RETURN TO GRIDIRON

This year marked the return of Sewanee to gridiron warfare under a new set-up of de-emphasized football. In a program designed to give the sport back to the participant the Purple Tigers played a schedule of 7 games with colleges who stressed the same type of football program as Sewanee. Under the tutelage of W. C. White, ex-Tennessee player, the Purple hung up their first successful season since 1931 by chalking up 4 victories against 3 defeats.

The opening game of the season was played on Hardee Field on the 5th of October. The opponent for the curtain raiser was the strong Presbyterian Blue Stocking team from Clinton, S. C. The South Carolina team, who suffered only one defeat throughout the season, downed a hard fighting Purple team by the score of 12-7. The Blue Stocking attack was based on the passing of Hank Caver, their Little All-American back. The next game found the tough Mississippi College Choctaws defeating a visiting Tiger team by the score of 20-6 as the Mississippi school hung up two tallies in the first quarter. After a two week layoff the Tigers journeyed to Conway, Arkansas, where they won their first game of the season by defeating a Hendrix Warrior

team 25-0 on a wet field. Returning to the Mountain, the squad met their toughest opponent of the year and lost a heartbreaking game on an intercepted pass to the Maryville College Highlanders. The East Tennessee team scored the only touchdown of the day on an intercepted pass in the third quarter. This big, tough Maryville team went through the season undefeated and received a New Year's Day Bowl bid. The Centre College Praying Colonels, an old rival of the Tigers, came in on November 16 to meet a hot Sewanee Club. Led by their ace tailback, Chuck Flowers, who racked up 4 touchdowns, the Tigers tromped on the Kentuckians by a score of 52-7. The Purple, now at their highest peak, hit the road again and downed a Hampden-Sydney club in Farmville, Va., by a score of 31-0. Kenyon College from Ohio was the last opponent for the season and on Thanksgiving weekend the Tigers won their 4th game of the season by a narrow score of 13-6.

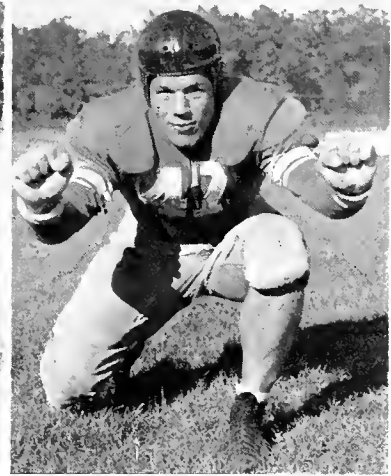

Lloyd Franklin, subbing for Flowers, passed from the visitor's 35 yard line to Red Leach on the 25 yard line. Leach was stopped on the 18 yard line, but thinking quickly, he lateraled to Warner Watkins and the Tiger left end went the rest of the distance for the score. Leach converted and the game was soon over, the visitors winning 12-7.

SEWANEE DROPS SECOND OF SEASON TO MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE

The second game of the season found the Tigers journeying to Clinton, Mississippi to absorb a 20-6 lacing at the hands of the Mississippi College Choc-taws. The Mississippians, employing a baffling double wing back formation, swept to three touchdowns in the first period to take a lead that the Purple could never approach after they had settled down to a good game of football. It was early in the game that Howard, a 155 lb. wingback, swept the Tiger's end and moved 42 yards for the first score. Five plays later, the

Tigers once more baffled by the intricacy of the Choc's formation, allowed the Mississippian's wingback, Gore, to break loose and run 55 yards for another score.

Just before the end of the first period, Mississippi notched its final tally of the game on a fake reverse of Webb that was good for 57 yards and a touchdown.

With the score 20-0 against them the Tigers came back in the second half with a drive that covered 90 yards and ended in their only score of the game. This drive was climaxed by a 44 yards dart through left tackle by Chuck Flowers.

On the second of November the Tigers followed by a small band of faithful rooters journeyed to Conway, Arkansas, to engage the Hendrix College Warriors on a wet field under pouring skies. The Purple Tigers found the Arkansas boys no match and were able to take a 25-0 victory with ease from the Orange and Black.

Failing to score in the first quarter, the Purple could not get rolling till early in the second period when Reed Bell grabbed a Hendrix pass and raced 37 yards for the score. A few minutes later Chuck Flowers hit Elkton Pitts in the end zone from the 23 yard line to make pay dirt again and put the Tigers in the lead by a 13-0 count.

Sewanee was held the rest of the half but came back in the 3rd period when Flowers hit off right tackle and slashed through for 37 yards and the 3rd score of the game. Pitts, Tiger stellar end, blocked a Hendrix punt in the fourth quarter on the Orange and Black 31 yard line to set up a 4th Sewanee score. Little Bob Scivally's pass was taken by Red Leach on the 12 yard line, and the big wingback carried it over for the final score. Hendrix now pulled its only threat of the game by driving deep into Sewanee territory but the game ended with the ball on the Purple 10 yard line as the Warrior's failed to drive through our reserve line.

The Sewanee football team returned to the Mountain after their first victory and quickly readied themselves to meet one of the most powerful little teams in America. Their foes at Hardee Field on November 9th, were the undefeated Maryville Highlanders, who after defeating Sewanee 7-0 went on to close an undefeated season and receive a minor bowl bid.

For the first time in six games this year the Maryville machine was stopped cold by a smashing Purple line backed up by the faultless quick kicking of Chuck Flowers. It took a desperate interception of a Sewanee pass midway in the third quarter to enable the Orange

to remain undefeated. After the Tigers had failed to drive over the goal from the five yard line, the Maryville club kicked out to the 36 yard line. Led by Chuck Flowers who notched 4 touchdowns, the Sewanee Tigers returned to their winning ways on November the 9th at Hardee Field, by defeating the Praying Colonels of Centre 52-7. This marked Sewanee's first victory over the Kentuckians since 1897.

The scoring parade started midway in the first period when Reed Bell plunged over from the one yard line to climax a 75 yard drive. Later in this quarter Leach went 46 yards on a reverse to place the Tigers in the lead by a 13 to 0 score.

After a fumble on the kickoff, Flowers opened the second quarter with a drive through center for the 3rd Purple t.d. game. A 35 yard pass McBrayer-to-Brummitt gave the visitors their only score of the afternoon.

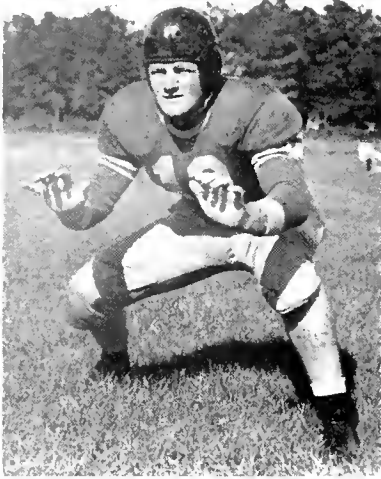

Enloe, Maryville star back, is stopped by the Purple line.

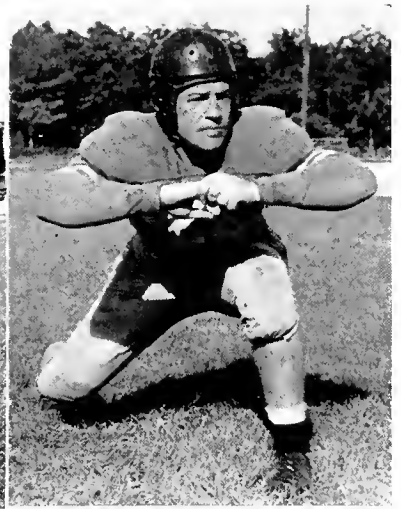

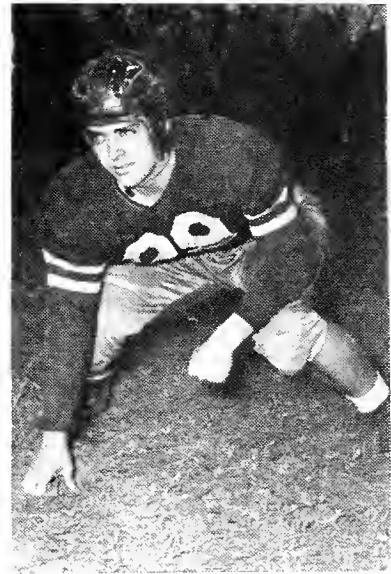


TIGERS DROP KENYON 13-6

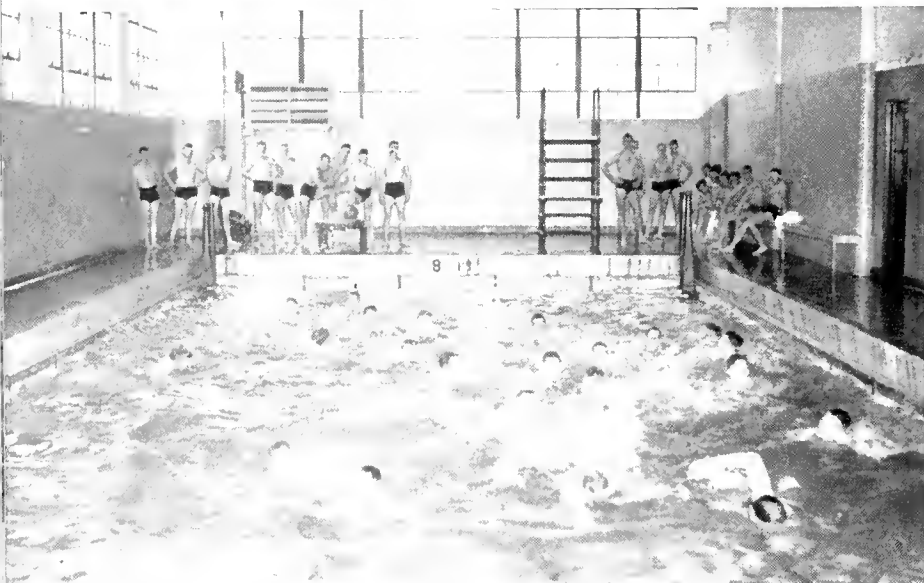

Sewanee had 3 major sports during this time, track, golf, and tennis.

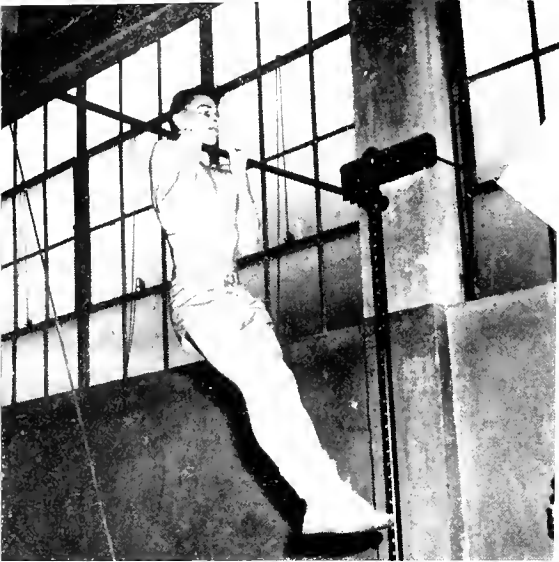
The track team under the direction of Coach Dave Drake had several meets lined up; among the outstanding ones were a three-college-meet
