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INTRODUCTION.

BURKE uttered a noble sentiment when he said: "Those only deserve to be remembered by posterity who treasure up a history of their ancestors."

While most persons will assent to the truth of this proposition and while the desire to be remembered and cherished by future generations is universal, very few pay any attention to their ancestral history, and must expect therefore to be forgotten by posterity. Many desire to know more of their ancestors, who they were, what they were, where they lived, and under what circumstances they passed their probation, who have not the leisure to devote to the necessary research, even if the records and persons were extant to furnish the information.

One generation passeth away and another cometh, and the transition is so gradual and yet so rapid, that very soon no one living will be able to say of any of us now upon the busy stage, "I remember him."

The old family bible on the blank leaves of which the

parents have recorded the dates of their birth and marriage, and the births of their children, passes into the possession of one of the descendants, while all the other members of the family are ignorant of every fact except perhaps the date of their respective births, which is recorded only on the tablets of the memory and this perishes with the possessor.

How very few know when or where their parents were born, and a still smaller number can tell the christian names of their grand-parents! The writer has often met men of wealth, intelligence and position who did not know the date of their own birth! In this country especially, families soon scatter to the four winds; parents and children, brothers and sisters, lose all trace of each other. The labor and difficulty of gathering up the records of seven or eight generations no one can appreciate until he has undertaken the task. In the early history of New England, the births, marriages and deaths were by law made a matter of record in each town. These town-records have been of essential service in compiling these memorials, and but for them many facts could not have been ascertained, as none living knew them.

Incomplete as are the records of some of the families in these memorials, the author will have the satisfaction of introducing as kindred, those who were not aware of relationship, and of gratifying many by informing them in regard to their ancestral lineage. May he not also hope that through this example, others may be induced to undertake a similar work and thus magnify the importance of preserving family histories.

The writer had transmitted to him fragmentary records of kindred long since departed, and tradition said that he was of pilgrim stock. Leisure hours were devoted to ascertain the connecting links in his ancestral line. In the successful search after his own lineage, he gathered a large amount of material which would interest his collateral kindred. As a matter both of curiosity and pleasure he continued his work, until this printed volume is the result.

There is nothing in the history of the CARV FAMILY, to render it worthy of being preserved in this form, which does not belong in common to other families. Every family should have such printed memorials, and not be satisfied with the brief record made in the family bible, which very rarely is extended beyond two generations. This volume is not designed for public inspection, but it is printed simply to preserve and perpetuate an accurate record of the descendants of John Cary, arranged in generations and families and to assist kindred near and remote, to trace their connection with the parent stock and with others of the name.

It will be observed that the writer has not attempted to trace the descendants of the female members of the families. When the fact was known, the persons to whom they were respectively married is given, that those who wish to trace their maternal connection to this family, can do so. Blank leaves are provided, to enable those who have the volume to extend their records.

It has been a source of very great pleasure to engraft

the scattered Carys upon the parent stock, and follow the branches through to other branches, until the tender and living twigs of the family tree were reached.

Some who are known to be descendants of 'the same ancestor are omitted in the memorials, because their point of connection could not be distinctly traced. The writer regrets that so few of those, for whose benefit this volume is printed, were disposed to avail themselves of the opportunity of placing it in the hands of their children. Scarcely enough copies have been ordered to pay the expense of printing. We are assured that while the many are indifferent, a few will greatly value their family record.

It would have given increased interest to the volume, if the author could have given more details, in regard to the occupation, modes of life, peculiar characteristics, religious predilections, education, public services, etc. of the persons named therein. He has esteemed himself fortunate to rescue even the names from oblivion and still more fortunate if he could chronicle the year of birth, marriage and death, the three great events in human existence! Who will say that these mere names and dates are uninteresting? What a day was each of these dates to some circle of loving human hearts like our own! How much of joy or sorrow, of hope or despair is hidden under these significant facts? Each is a memorial, not of death only, but of life; of a human heart that once lived and loved, a heart that kept its steady pulsations through some certain period of time and then ceased to act

and mouldered into dust; of an individual life that had its joys and sorrows, its cares and its burdens, its afflictions and its hopes, its conflicts and its achievements, its opportunities wasted or improved, and its hour of death. Enough is known of the Cary's to enable us to record that in each generation there have been wise and good men. A large average proportion of them were professors of the christian religion, and possessed of those traits peculiar to the early settlers of New England, modified of course by the factitious circumstances of birth and education.

The physical, intellectual, moral and social characteristics however modified by marriage, occupation, etc., have been remarkably preserved.

As a race they have been physically above the common stature, stout, muscular, dark hair and eyes, short necks, great powers of endurance, great tenacity to life, and living to more than the ordinary age. Their mental constitutions have been characterized by strength rather than by brilliancy, fixedness of purpose, persistency in opinion, habit and pursuit. The larger number have been farmers, very few in any generation have accumulated great wealth, none have been mendicants, and so far as can be ascertained, not one has been convicted of crime!

Our work would have been more complete, if persons whom we have addressed would have taken the trouble to have furnished records of their families, which were within their reach. To all those who have responded to our inquir-

ies and aided us in collecting and arranging the facts, we tender our grateful acknowledgments. We believe that there are very few errors in our records. Mistakes are unavoidable to such an undertaking. If the records of some families are more complete than others, it is because the material was at hand to make them so. Doubtless there are some, who with the assistance of these records, will be able to make their own more complete. For the interest and gratification of their posterity, we hope they will avail themselves of the blank leaves for this purpose, as well as to record future marriages, births and deaths.

In compiling these records, the author has had no other motive, than to furnish his kindred, near and remote, with their family history. The demand for the volume, is necessarily so limited, that he could have had no mercenary object in printing it. No literary fame can result, as there is no opportunity in such a work, for the display of rhetoric or logic. Any person who would expend the time and money, necessary to collect and arrange the facts, could have done as well.

Finally, these memorials make all of us conscious whatever may have been our ancestry, that our existence here is only temporary, that this world is not to be our permanent abode, that this mortal must put on immortality. Like our fathers we must soon pass away and others will occupy our places in the great drama of life, and they again be succeeded by others in a ceaseless stream.

ENGLISH ANCESTRY.

THE family of CARY in England is one of the oldest, as it has been one of the most illustrious and honored in the kingdom. When our ancestors came to the New World they desired doubtless, not only to sever, but forget the ties of blood and begin for themselves a history. If it comported with our purpose, we could give an extended sketch of the Carvs of England, running through many centuries. Those who wish to learn particularly of their English ancestry, can consult "Burke's History of the Landed Gentry of England." In the year 1198, according to Sir William Pole, Adam DeKarry was lord of Castle Karry, or Kari, in the county of Somerset. For centuries the castle has existed only in history, and the village situated in that locality is known as "Castle Cary." As early as the reign of Edward the 1st, the name was spelled, C-A-R-V. William and John Cary represented the county of Devon in Parliament, in the 36th and 42d of Edward III. John Carv was made a Baron of the Exchequer by Richard II. Sir Robert Cary his son, succeeded to his honors

and estates. A proof of the great prowess in arms, of this gallant Knight, is recorded in the following exploit: "In the beginning of the reign of Henry V, a certain Knight-Errant of Aragon, having passed through divers countries and performed many feats of arms, to his high commendation, arrived here in England, where he challenged any man of his rank and quality to make trial of his valor and skill in arms. This challenge Sir Robert Cary accepted, between whom a cruel encounter and a long and doubtful combat was waged in Smithfield, London. But at length this noble champion vanquished the presumptious Aragonois, for which Henry V restored unto him a good part of his father's lands, which for his loyalty to Richard II, he had been deprived by Henry IV and authorized him to bear the Arms of the Knight of Aragon, which the noble posterity of this gentleman continue to wear to this day; for according to the laws of heraldry whosoever fairly in the field, conquers his adversary, may justify the wearing of his arms."*

SIR WILLIAM CARY, a grand-son of Sir Robert, fell in the battle of Tewksbury, A. D. 1471, fighting under the banner of Lancaster.

LUCIUS CARY, who was Viscount Falkland, Chancellor of the Exchequer under Charles the I, whose marble statue stands at the entrance of the Parliament House, and who was

regarded as the greatest man in England of his day, was of this branch of the family. As a statesman he had opposed the errors of the king with all the boldness and inflexibility of Hampden, but with a grace and moderation of which Hampden was incapable. Though Lord Falkland ardently desired liberty for the subject, he was not prepared to oppose the sovereign, and the gallant and accomplished noble took his stand beside his royal master. Learned, witty, elegant and accomplished he was indignant and disgusted at the evident desire of the popular leaders to deluge the country in blood. From the commencement of the civil war he became very melancholy, losing his usual remarkable vivacity. On the morning of the battle of Newbury, he told his friends that he felt confident he would fall in battle that day. This prediction was verified, Hampden the great leader on the side of Cromwell, and Falkland the most illustrious on the side of the king, both fell in that memorable battle.

SIR WILLIAM CARY, married Mary Boleyn, a sister of Anne, the unhappy consort of Henry the VIII. At "Torr Abbey" is preserved the valuable pedigree drawn up by the Heralds' College at the express order of Queen Anne Boleyn. It begins thus: "This pedigree contains a brief of that most ancient family and surname of the Carys and it shows how the family was connected with the noble houses of Beauford, Spencer, Somerset, Bryan, Fulford, Orchard, Holway, etc.

HENRY CARY, was created by his cousin, Queen Elizabeth, Baron Hunsdon. Froude in his history shows that he

was thoroughly in her confidence and was trusted with many very important matters. His son, Sir Robert Cary, was selected by Elizabeth, to go to Scotland, to assure James I, that the cruel and violent death of Mary, his mother, was not intended by her. Sir Robert was at the bed-side of Elizabeth when she died, and as soon as she breathed her last, he went with all possible despatch to Scotland and was the first to inform James of her death and of his accession to the throne of England.

Queen Elizabeth sought to form a matrimonial alliance between Sir George Cary, her cousin, and Mary Stuart, "Queen of Scots."

"Red Castle," an Irish Estate in county of Donegal and also "White Castle," were granted to branches of the family. The Carys of Ireland are very numerous and although descended from a common ancestor, they uniformly spell the name C-A-R-E-Y. We have not attempted to give a connected history of the family in Great Britain, our object being simply to furnish a few fragments showing the antiquity and distinction of the name. The family in England is still a noble one and traces back its history through the centuries with pride. While none of the name in America will boast of their noble English blood, all will be glad to learn that their ancestral history has been preserved and that there has been in the old world Carys who were worthy of record in the pages of its history.

CARYS IN THE UNITED STATES.

The name of Carv or Carev, is quite a common one in almost every State in the Union. They are all doubtless descendants of De Karry of the Domesday Book, of William the Conqueror, whether their more immediate ancestors were of English, Irish or Scotch extraction. The name was spelled C-A-R-V in the reign of Edward III. Most of those who spell the name C-A-R-V are of Irish extraction, but this rule is not universal as persons not remotely connected spell the name both ways. Some whose records are found in this volume, write the name with an e, but they do so without authority, as their progenitor spelled his name C-A-R-V.

There were four persons all of whom spelled the name C-A-R-Y, who came to this country at a very early period, from each of whom a multitude of families have sprung.

1. John Cary, joined the Plymouth Colony about 1634. He came from Somersetshire, England, a few miles from Bristol. To trace out and connect his descendants has been the sole purpose of the author. Whenever he has connected any

family with any other ancestor than John he has omitted them.

Of John Cary we shall have more to say in another place.

2. James Cary, joined the Massachusetts Colony about 1635 and settled on a farm, at Chelsea, near where Boston is located. It is still known as the "Cary Farm" and some of his descendants still occupy and own small portions of the original tract. He was born in the city of Bristol, England, in the year 1600; and died in 1681. His grave-stones are still standing in Charlestown, Massachusetts and the inscription is still legible.

It is probable that James and John were nearly related, as they emigrated from the same neighborhood in England, but they were probably not brothers. Edward M. Cary, Esq. of Boston, an educated gentleman, a descendant of James Cary, who has given considerable attention to the genealogy of the family, thinks that James and John and Miles were brothers, and this opinion is expressed in Mitchell's History of Bridgewater. We think the known facts do not justify this conclusion. Edward M. Cary's tradition is that "In the reign of King James I there were five brothers of the name of Cary in the city of Bristol, England, the last resided for a time in Plymouth, from which place he removed to Charlestown and settled there as a merchant. His christian name was Fames. Jonathen Carv when in England many years ago in search of family records, wrote "when ye quarrells between James and his parliament took place three of five brothers of ye name of Cary, in ye city of Bristol, adopted a resolution to leave England. One of them went to Ireland, two came to America—one of these James settled in New England, ye other in Virginia." James Cary had four sons and two daughters. One of the sons, Nathaniel, followed the sea. It is recorded that he took his wife, Elizabeth, to Salem as a witch. She was tried and condemned. While in prison with the help of a daughter, she escaped and took a vessel for Liverpool whither her husband had already sailed. The first person her husband met on his arrival at Liverpool was his wife. When he saw her he exclaimed "you must be a witch." She replied "don't be a fool Nat. like the rest of your countrymen."

Jonathan, another son of James, born in 1646, died in 1737 at the age of 92 years. From this son has descended a numerous posterity. Richard Cary, aid-de-camp of General Washington, was his great grand-son. George Cary a wealthy and highly esteemed merchant, (retired,) of Boston, connected with the family of Robert Treat Paine. William F. Cary, Esq., of New York City, extensively engaged in the Tea trade with China; the wives of President Felton and Prof. Agassiz of Harvard, are of this branch of the Cary stock. Samuel Cary who graduated in the class of 1731 and whose life was illustrated by repeated acts of bravery, good conduct and exact probity, and who died at Chelsea, Mass., of wounds received in the French and Indian war, 1755-63 was also of this branch. The old Cary mansion built of oak, now near 250 years old is still standing and in a perfect state of preservation. It may stand a century longer unless destroyed by casualty or the hands of man. We could give a more extended sketch of the descendants of James Cary but it does not comport with our design.

- 3. Col. Miles Cary, joined the Virginia Colony about 1640. He was the son of John Cary, of Bristol, who was a half-brother of James of the Massachusetts Colony. John the father of Miles, and James of the Massachusetts Colony were sons of William Cary, mayor of the city of Bristol in 1600. According to our tradition then, James of Charlestown, Mass. was a half-unele of Col. Miles, of Virginia Colony, and that John of Plymouth, was not a brother of either. Miles died at Warwick, Virginia, in 1667. From him have descended some who were distinguished in the early history of Virginia. Col. Archibald Cary, President of the House of Burgesses at the beginning of the Revolutionary War, a contemporary and intimate friend of Patrick Henry, and alike distinguished for their fiery zeal in the eause of independence, was a deseendant of Miles. The wife of Frank Blair, Sr. and mother of Hon. Montgomery and Hon. Frank P., are descendants of Col. Archibald Cary. W. M. Cary, Esq. of Baltimore, a gentleman greatly interested and well-informed in the genealogy of the family is a lineal descendant of this revolutionary hero. The greater number of the Carys in the Southern States are descendants of Col. Miles Carv.
- 4. Thomas Cary came from Scotland in the year 1680 and settled in the Delaware Colony. His descendants are not so numerous and are widely scattered. Judge John Cary

an ex-member of Congress, living in Wyandotte County, O. is of this line.*

There have been numerous immigrations of Carys to this country from England and Ireland at later periods.

Matthew Cary a distinguished Book Publisher of Philadelphia in the early part of this century, came from Ireland. His son and successor Henry C. Cary, of Philadelphia, has a world-wide reputation as a scholar and writer on political economy, social sciences, etc. All our prominent statesmen know him and seek his counsels on the subjects of Tariff and Finance. The Irish Careys universally spell the name C-A-R-E-Y.

Having said this much of the different families of Carys in this country, we shall hereafter only refer to the descendants of John of Plymouth.

FIRST GENERATION.

John Cary the ancestor and progenitor of the families herein recorded, came from Somersetshire, near the city of Bristol, England, about 1634, and joined the Plymouth Colony. The precise date of his arrival in the New World is not known. It is certain that he did not come over in the "Mayflower," the "Fortune" or the "Ann." There are various traditions in regard to his immediate ancestry and different opinions as to his near relationship to James and Miles Cary, the former settling at Charlestown, Mass. and the latter near Jamestown, Va. The writer has had access to a manuscript more than one-hundred years old and written by a grand-son of John, which says that John Cary when a youth was sent by his father to France to perfect his education, and that while absent his father died. On returning home to Somersetshire he differed with his brothers about the settle-

ment of their father's estate. He compromised by receiving £100 as his portion and immediately sailed for America. As the writer of the manuscript had better means of knowing the facts which he recorded than we can know, we adopt his statement as true. We find his name among the original proprietors and first settlers of Duxbury and Bridgewater. His name occurs in the original grant as well as in the subsequent deed made by Ousamequin, the sachem or chief of the Pockonocket Indians, in A. D. 1639. This deed was made to Miles Standish, (Captain of the Mayflower,) Samuel Nash and Constant Southworth, as Trustees, in behalf of William Bradford, Fohn Cary, and fifty-two others therein named. The deed embraced fourteen miles square and was designated as "Satucket." The consideration named in the deed was "seven coats, a yard and a half in a coat; nine hatchets; eight hoes; twenty knives; four moose skins and ten and a half yards of cotton." Ousamequin was afterwards called "Massasoit." The fourteen miles square was parcelled out to the fifty-four persons, each having his share assigned him by lot. John Cary drew a tract one mile wide, from the north line of the town, running southward seven miles. West Bridgewater is quite level and somewhat marshy, but our ancestor was fortunate enough to get a pretty good farm. Some of his descendants of the eighth generation still occupy a portion of the original tract. Each settler had at first a grant of a "house lot" of six acres on the town river "Nippenicket." The first lots were taken up in West Bridgewater; They were laid out

contiguous, with a view to mutual aid and defense in case of assault by hostile Indians. Bridgewater was the first interior settlement in the old Plymouth Colony. "Duxbury New Plantation" was incorporated into a new and distinct town and called Bridgewater, in 1656. John Cary was elected Constable the first and only officer elected in the town that year. He was elected the first Town Clerk and held the office each consecutive year until 1681. In 1656 there were but ten freemen in the town, of which John Cary was one; in May, 1667 seven more freemen were added. In the same year John Cary was appointed on a jury "to lay out the ways requisite in the town." In 1667 Deacon Willis and John Cary were chosen "to take in all the charges of the late war, (King Phillip's) since June last and the expenses of the scouts before and since June."

We can know but little of the traits of character of the progenitor of the numerous race, many of whose records we have gathered up. He was prominent among his fellows and participated actively in town meetings; was intelligent, well-educated and public-spirited. The tradition is that he taught the first latin class in the colony. Doubtless he was deeply imbued with puritan principles and a decided christian, as were all the Bridgewater settlers. In a preface to a sermon (by the first minister, the Rev. Mr. Keith, June 14, 1717) signed by Increase Mather and Cotton Mather, occur the following passages: "The first settlers of Bridgewater, were a set of people who made religion their main interest, and it became their

glory." "Remarkable was the fate of Bridgewater, a most praying and a most pious town; seated in the very midst of the war; that although they were often assaulted by formidable numbers of the enemies, yet in all their sharp assaults they never lost one of their inhabitants, young or old." The opinion entertained was that their piety shielded them from savage cruelty and outrage. It is an interesting fact that Mr. Keith, their first pastor, who was from Aberdeen, Scotland, was installed in 1663 and preached there 56 years.

JOHN CARY m. Elizabeth, a daughter of Francis Godfrey, one of the first settlers of Bridgewater in 1644. The year of his birth is not known, he died in 1681.

John Cary, son of John, No. 1, b. 1645, m. Abigail, dau. of Samuel Allen, 1670, lived in Bridgewater until 1680 and then removed to Bristol, R. I., where he resided until his death in July, 1721. His will was admitted to Probate in Bristol, August, 1721; the inventory of his property amounted to £700. The will of his wife was recorded in 1729.

John Cary and his wife were buried in the old Cemetery on the common; his grave-stone of slate is still in good order and the inscription legible. It reads thus:

- "Here lies ye body of Deacon John Cary, a shining pattern of piety, whose spirit returned to God who gave it, July 14, 1721, in ye 76 year of his age."
 - "A man of prayer so willing to do good,
 - " His highest worth who of us understood.
 - " Fear God, love Christ, help souls their work to mend.
 - "So like this Saint fit for bliss without end."

The stone now stands in the yard of the Congregational Church. 1594.

Explanations and Abbreviations,

It is almost impossible in a work of this kind to arrange the records so that each person can readily find his own name, and trace backward and forward his family history. After examining a great number of similar works, I have adopted an arrangement of my own.

I have arranged the records by generations, beginning with the common ancestor, John, as the first generation,—his children, the second; grand children, the third and so on.

In all cases I have commenced the generation with the children of the eldest brother in each family and closed with the youngest.

Any person finding his or her name in the index will be referred to the page where the family record is found. The person will find the name of the immediate ancestor with the No. of his family record in the preceding generation, and so on, back to the common ancestor. The No. at the right of the name indicates the place where the descendants of the next generation will be found. The Roman numerals at the left of each name points out the order of birth, or the place in the particular family.

The notes explain themselves, and when they occur indicate that no other mention is made of the person.

Where the same name is found in the index in the same generation, to aid in finding the one sought the birth place or residence is added.

We have added an index in alphabetical order of the names of persons with whom marriages have been had, for the convenience of those who would know their maternal ancestor.

We hope that with these words of explanation any one may in a few minutes find their names and the connecting links backward and forward.

RELATIONSHIP.

If you wish to find your relationship to any other person in the volume, you will count backward to the common ancestor and then downward to the person whose relationship you seek, each generation, being termed in the law a degree—thus cousins are related in the fourth degree—the children of one cousin with the other cousin, are the fifth degree—the relation of the children of cousins, is the sixth degree removed; and are called cousins in the sixth degree.

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FIND the name you seek and the figures denote where the name is first recorded, and then you can readily trace the ancestors or descendants. When the same christian name occurs more than once in the same generation, the place of birth or residence is added to aid in identifying the person sought. Even with this precaution you may have to look two or three times before you find the right person, as the same name occurs frequently having the same place of residence.

The names of persons with whon CARYS have intermarried are given in alphabetical order in generations, the figures denoting the page where the name is found. This will enable their descendants to trace their relation to

the Cary Family.
