

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PREFACE

THIS part of the Catalog of Copyright Entries contains a list of motion pictures and filmstrips registered in the Copyright Office from January 1, 1952, through June 30, 1952. Filmstrips, which are registered in Class J, are also listed in Parts 7–11A of the Catalog. Many of the recording scripts made to accompany filmstrips are registered in Classes C and D and listed in Parts 3–4 of the Catalog. Renewal registrations of motion pictures made in this period are listed in a separate section of this catalog.

Arrangement.—This catalog is divided into five sections. The first section, "Motion Pictures and Filmstrips," is arranged alphabetically by title. It contains complete entries for currently registered filmstrips and motion pictures—feature pictures, cartoons, newsreels, industrial films, classroom films, television films, etc. Cross-references from the titles of literary works and from other titles connected with the motion pictures are also included in the first section.

In the second section, "Classified List," the titles listed in the first section are arranged according to general type or intended use of the films. Complete entries for all the titles listed in this section are contained in the first section of this catalog.

The third section, "Subject Index for Non-Theatrical Films," is a listing, under broad subject headings, of published nontheatrical motion pictures and selected filmstrips registered for copyright during the period covered by this catalog. Complete entries for the titles listed are contained in the first section.

The fourth section, "Renewals," lists the motion pictures for which renewal copyrights were registered during the period covered by this catalog.

The last section is an "Index of Claimants, Pro-

ducing Companies, Sponsors, and Authors," for all motion pictures and filmstrips listed in the first and fourth sections of this catalog. Authors of related literary works are included if known. In some instances the releasing agents, if different from the producers, and the American distributors of films of foreign origin are included. Data regarding titles which are followed by a registration number beginning with the symbol (R) will be found in the "Renewals" section.

Bibliographic Data.—In the first section, each main entry includes, as applicable 1) the title; 2) the production statement; 3) the date of release; 4) a physical description of the film, i. e., running time or number of reels, width, etc.; 5) the series to which the individual film belongs; 6) the published literary work on which the film was based, or with which it was correlated; 7) a summary of the content of the film; and 8) the leading credits and actors.

In the fourth section, "Renewals," each main entry includes: 1) the title; 2) the length of the film in reels; and 3) the name of the author, which is usually the original producing company.

For serial entries in both the first and fourth sections, information relating to the entire serial precedes that relating to individual numbers or episodes of the serial.

The names of any authors listed in the application which do not appear elsewhere in the entry are given immediately preceding the copyright data after the statement, "Appl. author(s)." When an employer in the case of works made for hire is named in the application, his name is included in the entry, together with the names of the employees when given.

Copyright Data.—The portion of the entry giving the facts of copyright registration begins with the copyright symbol ©. For published motion pictures and published filmstrips the symbol is followed by 1) the name of the copyright claimant; 2) the date of publication as given in the copyright application; and 3) the copyright registration number. For unpublished motion pictures, the copyright claimant; 2) the date on which the last of all of the items required to complete registration (i. e., each of the following: title, description, representative prints, application, and fee) was received in the Copyright Office; and 3) the copyright registration number. For unpublished filmstrips, the copyright symbol is followed by 1) the name of the copyright claimant; 2) the date on which the last of all of the items required to complete registration (i. e., each of the following: copy, application, and fee) was received in the Copyright Office; and 3) the copyright registration number.

For renewals, the copyright symbol is followed by 1) the original copyright date; 2) the original copyright registration number; 3) the renewal registration number; 4) the date of receipt in the Copyright Office of the renewal application; 5) the name of the renewal claimant; and 6) an abbreviation in parentheses representing the applicant's statement of the basis of his renewal claim—e. g., John Doe (NK) indicates that renewal of copyright is claimed by John Doe as next of kin of the deceased author. Information contained in the copyright application or in the copy of the work itself which relates to the registration of an earlier version of the work is given in brief form at the end of the entry.

In the case of each entry the name of the copyright claimant is that given at the time of registration. Information relating to subsequent changes of ownership recorded in the Copyright Office can be ascertained upon request and upon payment of the statutory search fee to the Register of Copyrights.

Deposit of Copies.—In the case of every copyright entry listed in this part of the Catalog of Copyright Entries, except for renewal copyrights, the deposit of copies (or copy) as required by sections 12, 13, or 215 of Title 17 of the United States Code has been made.

Authority.—The Catalog of Copyright Entries is published by authority of sections 210 and 211 of Title 17 of the United States Code. Section 210 provides in part: "The current catalog of copyright entries and the index volumes herein provided for shall be admitted in any court as prima facie evidence of the facts stated therein as regards any copyright registration."

Organization of the Catalog.—This issue of the Catalog of Copyright Entries is part of Volume 6 of the Third Series. The parts are numbered according to the alphabetical sequence of classes and listed in section 5 of Title 17 of the United States Code. Letters are added to the part numbers to indicate subdivisions.

The classes of material principally contained in each part are listed, together with their respective

symbols, under the title of the part in the "Table of Organization," which faces the title page in this catalog. In each case, the first letter of the symbol is that of the class under which registration is made; the second, if any, is a designation added by the Copyright Office for purposes of statistical analysis of registrations. Foreign works for which two copies have been deposited under section 215 of Title 17 of the United States Code are distinguished by a zero immediately following the class symbol. The symbol R does not represent a class designated in the copyright law, but has been adopted by the Copyright Office to distinguish renewal copyright registrations. Some parts also contain registrations made under symbols other than those listed for the particular part if the subject matter or type of material of these registrations is similar to that generally included.

Orders.—Orders for all parts of the Catalog of Copyright Entries should be sent directly to the Register of Copyrights, Library of Congress, Washington 25, D. C. Orders may be placed as follows: (1) as a subscription for a single year or to continue until further notice, or (2) as an order for individual issues. All orders should state clearly the title of the *Catalog* part and the inclusive dates of the issues wanted. Checks or money orders should be made payable to the Register of Copyrights.

The price of each individual number of the *Catalog* is given in the "Table of Organization." The annual subscription rate for each part is twice the price of a single number, since all parts are issued semiannually. The complete *Catalog of Copyright Entriss* may be secured on a subscription basis for \$20 a year.

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
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
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
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
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PREFACE

THIS part of the Catalog of Copyright Entries contains a list of motion pictures and filmstrips registered in the Copyright Office from July 1, 1952, through December 31, 1952. Filmstrips, which are registered in Class J, are also listed in Parts 7-11A of the Catalog. Many of the recording scripts made to accompany filmstrips are registered in Classes C and D and listed in Parts 3-4 of the Catalog. Renewal registrations of motion pictures made in this period are listed in a separate section of this catalog.

Arrangement.—This catalog is divided into five sections. The first section, "Motion Pictures and Filmstrips," is arranged alphabetcally by title. It contains complete entries for currently registered filmstrips and motion pictures—feature pictures, cartoons, newsreels, industrial films, classroom films, television films, etc. Cross-references from the titles of literary works and from other titles connected with the motion pictures are also included in the first section.

In the second section, "Classified List," the titles listed in the first section are arranged according to general type or intended use of the films. Complete entries for all the titles listed in this section are contained in the first section of this catalog.

The third section, "Subject Index for Nontheatrical Films," is a listing, under broad subject headings, of published nontheatrical motion pictures and selected filmstrips registered for copyright during the period covered by this catalog. Complete entries for the titles listed are contained in the first section.

The fourth section, "Renewals," lists the motion pictures for which renewal copyrights were registered during the period covered by this catalog.

The last section is an "Index of Claimants, Producing Companies, Sponsors, and Authors," for all motion pictures and filmstrips listed in the first and fourth sections of this catalog. Authors of related literary works are included if known. In some instances the releasing agents, if different from the producers, and the American distributors of films of foreign origin are included. Data regarding titles which are followed by a registration number beginning with the symbol (R) will be found in the "Renewals" section.

Bibliographic Data.—In the first section, each main entry includes, as applicable 1) the title; 2) the production statement; 3) the date of release; 4) a physical description of the film, i. e., running time or number of reels, width, etc.; 5) the series to which the individual film belongs; 6) the published literary work on which the film was based, or with which it was correlated; 7) a summary of the content of the film; and 8) the leading credits and actors.

In the fourth section, "Renewals," each main entry includes 1) the title; 2) the length of the film in reels; and 3) the name of the author, which is usually the original producing company.

For serial entries in both the first and fourth sections, information relating to the entire serial precedes that relating to individual numbers or episodes of the serial.

The names of any authors listed in the application which do not appear elsewhere in the entry are given immediately preceding the copyright data after the statement, "Appl. author(s)." When an employer in the case of works made for hire is named in the application, his name is included in the entry, together with the names of the employees when given.

Copyright Data .- The portion of the entry giving the facts of copyright registration begins with the copyright symbol [©]. For published motion pictures and published filmstrips the symbol is followed by 1) the name of the copyright claimant; 2) the date of publication as given in the copyright application; and 3) the copyright registration number. For unpublished motion pictures, the copyright symbol is followed by 1) the name of the copyright claimant; 2) the date on which the last of all of the items required to complete registration, (i. e., each of the following title, description, representative prints, application, and fee) was received in the Copyright Office; and 3) the copyright registration number. For unpublished filmstrips, the copyright symbol is followed by 1) the name of the copyright claimant; 2) the date on which the last of all of the items required to complete registration (i. e., each of the following copy, application, and fee) was received in the Copyright Office; and 3) the copyright registration number.

For renewals, the copyright symbol is followed by 1) the original copyright date; 2) the original copy-

right registration number; 3) the renewal registration number; 4) the date of receipt in the Copyright Office of the renewal application; 5) the name of the renewal claimant; and 6) an abbreviation in parentheses representing the applicant's statement of the basis of his renewal claim—e. g., John Doe (NK) indicates that renewal of copyright is claimed by John Doe as next of kin of the deceased author. Information contained in the copyright application or in the copy of the work itself which relates to the registration of an earlier version of the work is given in brief form at the end of the entry.

In the case of each entry the name of the copyright claimant is that given at the time of registration. Information relating to subsequent changes of ownership recorded in the Copyright Office can be ascertained upon request and upon payment of the statutory search fee to the Register of Copyrights.

Deposit of Copies.—In the case of every copyright entry listed in this part of the *Catalog* of *Copyright Entries*, except for renewal copyrights, the deposit of copies (or copy) as required by sections 12, 13, or 215 of Title 17 of the United States Code has been made.

Authority.—The Catalog of Copyright Entries is published by authority of sections 210 and 211 of Title 17 of the United States Code. Section 210 provides in part: "The current catalog of copyright entries and the index volumes herein provided for shall be admitted in any court as prima facie evidence of the facts stated therein as regards any copyright registration."

Organization of the Catalog.—This issue of the Catalog of Copyright Entries is part of Volume 6 of the Third Series. The parts are numbered according to the alphabetical sequence of classes and listed in section 5 of Title 17 of the United States Code. Letters are added to the part numbers to indicate subdivisions.

The classes of material principally contained in each part are listed, together with their respective symbols, under the title of the part in the "Table of Organization," which faces the title page in this catalog. In each case, the first letter of the symbol is that of the class under which registration is made; the second, if any, is a designation added by the Copyright Office for purposes of statistical analysis of registrations. Foreign works for which two copies have been deposited under section 215 of Title 17 of the United States Code are distinguished by a zero immediately following the class symbol. The symbol R does not represent a class designated in the copyright law, but has been adopted by the Copyright Office to distinguish renewal copyright registrations. Some parts also contain registrations made under symbols other than those listed for the particular part if the subject matter or type of material of these registrations is similar to that generally included.

Orders.—Orders for all parts of the Catalog of Copyright Entries should be sent directly to the Register of Copyrights, Library of Congress, Washington 25, D. C. Orders may be placed as follows: (1) as a subscription for a single year or to continue until further notice, or (2) as an order for individual issues. All orders should state clearly the title of the Catalog part and the inclusive dates of the issues wanted. Checks or money orders should be made payable to the Register of Copyrights.

The price of each individual number of the *Catalog* is given in the "Table of Organization." The annual subscription rate for each part is twice the price of a single number, since all parts are issued semiannually. The complete *Catalog of Copyright Entries* may be secured on a subscription basis for \$20 a year.
